Teacher Contract Deadlock Continues On Salary Issue

Board of Education and teacher bargaining teams resumed negotiations Tuesday morning, attempting to resolve what the president of the Plymouth Education Association termed "a very serious impasse."

Their goal is to reach agreement on the terms of a new master contract between the board and P.E.A. (the teachers' union) before the scheduled start of classes two weeks hence.

The two sides are admittedly far apart on economic matters and a P.E.A. statement from President Bill Heath says the current deadlock "seems to be even more serious than in the fall of 1969 when Plymouth teachers went on strike for one month."

At the root of the impasse is the school board's united stand that individual salary increases not exceed the 5.5 per cent recommended by the federal government as the generally allowable level

since the lifting of the wage-price freeze.

The board is willing to assure the P.E.A. that every teacher will get the 5.5, but wants the annual longevity raises known in the teaching industry as "increments" included. The P.E.A. position is that increments should be granted automatically on top of a 5.5 per cent raise - which administration spokesmen say would lift the average to about 11 per cent per teacher.

THE INCREMENTS provided in past contracts for

each teacher take the form of a 12-year salary schedule. According to Heath, teachers begin at the bottom of this schedule with the understanding that after 12 years they will reach the salary they should be earning for their profession.

In the past, teachers have moved up a step each year toward the 12-year maximum and at the same time also have received a percentage increase which the P.E.A. has considered a cost of living provision.

Tuesday's bargaining session was the first in a week and according to Norman Kee, chief administration negotiator, was "about the 15th" since the 1971-72 school year ended in June.

It came on the heels of the issuance by Heath of a prepared statement quoting him as stating "regretfully" that bargaining on the master agreement "seems to be at a very serious impasse." The rest of his statement in its entirety reads:

"IN ADDITION to the economic question of a new salary schedule, non-economic areas, which significantly affect the quality of the educational program to be offered the children of Plymouth, are still to be resolved.

"The P.E.A. has again suggested the use of a state mediator, Thomas V. Badoud, to assist both negotiating teams in bargaining. The current impasse seems to be even more serious than in the fall of 1969 when Plymouth teachers went on strike for one month until an equitable agreement was reached with Judge William Ager of the Washtenaw County Circuit Court acting as mediator.

"The P.E.A. bargaining team has felt that if the salary question could be settled, the rest of the contract would fall into place. However, the last few bargaining sessions have revealed serious areas of disagreement which would effectively block a complete contract agreement if an equitable salary settlement were reached.

"These non-economic areas of disagreement include significant increases in class size (approximately 700 new students without increasing the teaching staff), administrative proposals for changes in working conditions, class schedules and the school day.

"It is the P.E.A.'s expressed concern that the present educational program in Plymouth cannot afford any further erosion."

School Board President George Lawton declined to comment for the time being on the Heath statement. All teachers are due to report at 8 a.m., Tuesday, Sept. 5 for a general P.E.A. meeting, then go to their assigned buildings to prepare for the opening of classes Thursday, Sept. 7.

Only a strike could interrupt that planning.

Revised Park Ordinance Plan Would Drop Specific Curfew

A watered down version of the proposed parks control ordinance was presented to the City Commission Monday night, but there is no assurance that this will be received any more enthusiastically than the original stringent measure.

The suggested ordinance has been reduced from 19 to 12 sections, the original proposal for an 11 p.m. curfew being among the deletions. Substituted for this is a paragraph stating:

"Under circumstances considered by the police to be hazardous to the health, welfare and safety of the community, they are authorized to close the parks at any hour. No person shall loiter or remain within public parks after an order to vacate has been given by the police department. Each such

closing will be documented in reports to be filed with the city manager."

The revised measure continues its ban against wading or swimming in the Kellogg Park fountain as well as the ban against possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages in any park.

PARAGRAPHS in the original ordinance concerning dumping of garbage and refuse in any park, requiring permits for congregations of more than 20 persons, peddling, molestation of wildlife and distribution of advertising matter are among the deletions.

However, a newly suggested provision would read that "No person be allowed to sleep in the parks after 12 midnight."

City Manager Norman Gaffney and Police Chief

Timothy Ford, who drew up the revision upon commission orders, said that duplications covered in other ordinances had been deleted.

Main target of the proposed legislation is Kellogg Park, where vandalism to various degrees has been frequent, and Gaffney told commissioners:

"We still are having problems and need a tool of enforcement. We feel we should have the discretionary right to close the park if necessary."

COMMISSIONER Norbert Battermann, without identifying where he was finding fault, said, "I don't buy this and I don't think it should go to the Human Relations Commission without reflecting our views."

He referred to an agreement

reached last week that when the ordinance finally is in a form of which the city commission approves it then will be turned over to the H.R.C. to hold a public hearing and get citizen reaction before it comes back to the council for consideration of adoption.

As a result of Battermann's comments, the commission agreed to meet informally as a committee of the whole at a 7:30 a.m. breakfast Saturday when it will go through both the old and new versions paragraph by paragraph.

When this body does reach agreement on terms that will satisfy all, the public will be advised of the date picked by the Human Relations Commission for a hearing and, subsequently, of the date when it again will be on the city commission agenda.

THE LATTER gave first reading approval to the original measure with one dissenting vote, that of Mrs. Beverly McAninch, July 3 but since then has been caught in a crossfire between those who want "get tough" legislation and those who wish only moderate restrictions.

Among substitute proposals advanced is one from a group of concerned citizens suggesting that a "park patrol" made up essentially of young people monitor and discourage abusive activity in Kellogg Park. The same group advocates better enforcement of existing ordinances.

Bida Quits Twp. Post

Joe Bida resigned Tuesday night from the third highest paying administrative job in Plymouth Township government, one which included the combined directorships of the public works, recreation and the water and sewer departments.

His letter of resignation to the board of trustees said he will carry on with his duties until Sept. 19. After that date Bida will immediately join the sales staff of the Hines Park Mercury automobile dealership, which he called "an opportunity I just could not resist."

The brief letter also carried political overtones reflecting the fact that for some time there has been an under-the-surface feud between Bida and certain members of the board.

It came into the open in his statement that he wished to thank "a majority" of the seven-member board for their cooperation since he joined the township staff in 1970.

His principal adversaries have been Treasurer Elizabeth Holmes and Trustee Frank Millington.

IN ELABORATING on his decision to quit, Bida said he is a believer in letting a department head have "a strong hand and full authority" which he called "impossible" under the present domination of the board.

He also cited criticism by a

trustee of the maintenance and activities at the township recreation park, board refusal to grant DPW workers the raises he had recommended and what he called "unfair" procedures in setting up specifications for certain purchases of hydrant equipment as contributing to his decision.

Bida's salary had been \$13,100 until it was agreed this year, when he took over the recreation duties, to boost it by \$900 to \$14,000. This pushed him into the third spot behind Supervisor Maurice Breen and Clerk Helen Richardson, moving ahead of Mrs. Holmes, whose span of 18 years in office included a long period in charge of water and sewer affairs until the latter were turned over to Bida.

It is the third time the 50-year-old Bida has given up a governmental post. He was DPW director in Garden City in the early '50s and held the same title in the City of Plymouth for 10 years starting in 1956.

Democrats Lose Party Secretary

Billie Bidwell, who had served since 1966 as secretary of the Wayne-2nd District Democratic party executive board, announced this week that she has resigned from that post and from the role of precinct captain.

Mrs. Bidwell is a resident of the City of Plymouth's fifth precinct and is an elected party delegate from that sector.

She was among a handful of delegates to the Aug. 11 local convention who joined

Chairman Marshall Manning in walking out after Manning had been defeated as a candidate for the chairmanship of the delegation to the Sept. 2 state convention.

"WE NOW HAVE a leftist ideology in control of the Wayne 2nd executive board so totally in opposition to my basic moral principles and ideals I cannot and will not compromise," said Mrs. Bidwell in her announcement. She claimed "it all started at the polls in May when

Human Rights people, New Democratic Coalition members and Trotskyites ran as Democratic precinct delegates under the guise of the McGovern campaign."

There has been no indication as to whether Manning also is planning to resign his local party post. The Wayne 2nd will be reorganized in January to include 63 precincts from Livonia as well as those of Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Northville Township.

Sheldon 'Left Only' Lanes OKd

For several years Plymouth's city government has been imploring the county road commission to take steps that would relieve traffic dangers at the Sheldon - Penniman intersection, and at last action will be taken.

City Manager Norman Gaffney told the city commission Monday night, as he read details of a proposal from the county. "This is one of the most welcome com-

munications my office has received in some time."

County Engineer Russell E. Harrison informed the city that the first step will be to revise lane markings on Sheldon, north and south of the east - west Penniman - N. Territorial thoroughfare, to provide a "center lane for left turn only."

This pavement marking work will be done by the county at no cost to the city as a prerequisite to installation

of a new traffic signal which will have a left turn phase.

HARRISON SAID the estimated cost of modifying the traffic signal will be \$4,060, to be divided equally between the county and the city at \$2,030 each.

"Our forces will do the work, and billing upon its completion will be on the basis of actual cost, including overhead, and not necessarily the estimated amount," said Harrison's letter. The county

will assume the cost of electric energy and signal maintenance.

A study by Police Chief Timothy Ford showed that a preponderance of the vehicular accidents at this intersection, which has been labeled the most dangerous in Plymouth, are of a turning variety. He predicted the "left turn only" provision for north and south bound traffic on Sheldon will alleviate the danger.

the Christmas crib at St. Bruno's; the background is the intrigue and pageantry of King Henry VIII's England.




ANOTHER DUST-COVERED report which was unearthed during a recent office housecleaning pertains to the economics of Plymouth Township.

It was prepared in 1964 by the planning firm of Waring and Johnson when the township board included Supervisor Roy Lindsay, Clerk Jack McEwen, Treasurer Elizabeth Holmes and Trustees Ralph Garber, Dick Lauterbach, Louis Norman and C. Veach Sparks.

From all of its pages, this one paragraph caught the eye as personifying township policy then and now:

"Retail and wholesale trade is a very small proportion of the township economy. The established centers for shopping in surrounding communities precludes any large commercial center being formed, but neighborhood centers will be necessary to supply the local population in the various neighborhoods."

Now, I suggest that you be sure to read an article elsewhere in today's edition of the Mail & Observer about what is under way in Canton Township, because it has definite bearing on the development of both Plymouths.

UNLESS YOU HAVE been hiding under a basket for several years, you should be well aware of the boom - town building craze that is sweeping Canton. And with the influx of people must come services.

Newest of the projects on the Canton drawing board is one which could have a direct and negative effect on downtown Plymouth development, as well as give Plymouth Township more reason than ever for avoiding commercialization.

Marie McGee, who wrote today's Canton story, reports that a regional shopping center proposed by the Mocer Building Co. "would compare in size to nearby Westland or the Livonia Mall." It would be enclosed and would be part of what Marie calls "a vast complex" which would include apartments, townhouses, high - rise office buildings, single family housing, three theaters, a bowling palace and two or three restaurants.

The same company had a role in development of the highly successful Somerset Mall in Troy, but it's in the location of the land picked for this Canton development that its real impact upon Plymouth lies.

The location is to be from Joy Road south, between Sheldon and what will be a southerly extension of our own Main Street. That's less than 1 1/2 miles from Kellogg Park, and may mean that CBD proponents talked 14 years too long.




Plan Vast Canton Complex

CANTON TOWNSHIP Canton Township planners have in their files a second plan for a regional shopping center.

This one, proposed by the Moceri Building Co., would be located on a 195-acre site on the south side of Joy Rd. between Sheldon and what will eventually become Morton Taylor Rd. as a southerly extension of Plymouth's Main St. which now dead-ends at Joy.

Plans for the vast complex were presented to the planning commission last week, but tabled to give the commission an opportunity to study the proposal.

Interestingly, the Moceri project is just a short distance from the regional shopping center that Republic Development Corp. has planned for the corner of Warren and Canton Center Rds.

Although officials gave no specific time when the latter shopping center would be built, it was believed that it would be the final phase in Republic's huge 450-acre development rapidly reaching completion in that area.

THE MOCERI shopping center, which would compare in size to nearby Westland or the Livonia Mall, is part of a development package that includes apartments, townhouses, a high-rise office building and single family housing. Housing units for the elderly also are included.

The shopping center would have an estimated 500,000 square feet and would be enclosed, the developer explained. It would possibly have a second floor gallery of shops - said to be the latest trend in shopping centers.

Linked to the proposed center would be an entertainment complex of three theaters, a bowling alley and two or three restaurants, the initial plans show.

A series of parks would link the interior of the housing development, and children walking to school would not have to cross any streets, according to early plans.

MOCERI WAS associated with the construction of the Somerset Mall in Troy and currently has an apartment complex under construction on Haggerty Rd. in the township. Focal point of that project is a golf course.

In other business at its August meeting, the commission set Sept. 19 for a public hearing for the planned unit development to be called Century Farms at the north-west corner of Haggerty and Palmer Rds.

Action on phase six of Windsor Park subdivision, consisting of 32 lots, was deferred until the Plymouth Board of Education can review school needs of the area.

Originally a school site, the land went back to the developer when the board felt it wouldn't need a school there. Since then, however, the school board has shown renewed interest in the site and the commission agreed to hold off on a decision

Subdivision Keeps Up Its Fight For Parks

CANTON TOWNSHIP
Signs are beginning to pop up in windows of homes in Windsor Park in the latest move by residents of the Warren-Sheldon Rds. area subdivision to get action on promised parks.

Most of the homes along Brandywine, Hillsboro and Parkside - three of the four streets encircling the park site - have signs in the window that say: "Mr. Developer, please finish our parks." A few say: "Visit the model, then visit the park before you buy."

The signs are an aftermath of a meeting held last week at which subdivision residents banded together to form a civic association, separate from the homeowners association they all are members of when they buy houses in the subdivision as part of Canton's "planned unit development" zoning.

At the meeting, a six-man committee was appointed to draft the charter and by-laws for the civic association. The committee also was directed to write a letter to the state Consumer Protection Division and the Department of Licensing and Regulations.

OVER THE signature of David Anderson, one of the leaders in the battle for recreational facilities, and signed by 42 others, a letter has been sent to the two state agencies asking for help in ironing out the difficulties.

The residents turned to the state when they learned they could expect little or no help from township officials. Much

of the parks controversy stems from the ordinance governing the first PUDs that merely requires the developer to clear and grade the park property.

Since the Windsor Park problem surfaced, township officials have directed their planner to revise and strengthen future PUD agreements.

Background material in the two-page letter to the state agencies helps document the residents' charge of a lack of cooperation on the part of the developer-builder, Parkside Construction and Crescendo Homes, Inc.

"We are concerned over the many promises and possible legal obligations of the developer," the letter said. Most of the questions raised in the letter dealt with the amount of money that is presently in the association fund as the result of an annual assessment the homeowners pay.

"HOW MUCH money has the developer contributed and who has jurisdiction and control over the developer's contribution?" the letter asked.

The group also would like to know how many homes are actually in the association. Total number of homes dictates the developer's contribution as well as the date the homeowners can gain control of the association, they point out.

The developer is reportedly going to turn the association over to the residents in the fall of 1973. It will then be their

task to equip and maintain the parks henceforth. Funds for this would come from the assessments - past and future - levied against each homeowner.

"As a group of concerned residents in an area which is rapidly being developed into single and multiple dwelling units, we are concerned that action be taken by the State of Michigan to control the many false and misleading statements made by builders, developers and their representatives," the letter said.

"We encourage your office to fully investigate this specific case which we believe is typical of the Detroit area and would serve as an example for action."



FARMINGTON Final inside work is being completed this week on a new 118-bed addition to Botsford Osteopathic Hospital.

The hospital, located at 28050 Grand River behind the Botsford Inn, serves people from Redford Township, Southfield, and surrounding areas.

The new wing means about 350 full and part time jobs for the area, according to Seymour Cantor, hospital administrator.

"We always need good employees. We particularly are grateful for all our part time employees. If it wasn't for them, we couldn't operate," Cantor said. The hospital employs about 1,000 people.

CURRENTLY about 80 per cent of the jobs created by the hospital expansion are filled. "But we still need lab technicians, and nurses," Cantor said.

Staff and patients officially moved into the new wing Aug. 1.

More important, however, is the sophisticated medical equipment now available at Botsford, Cantor noted.

The new wing includes surgical rooms, intensive care, and coronary care units. The hospital's floor space has more than doubled.

Special heart monitoring equipment was in the process of being installed Monday, and those sections of the wing are expected to be in service soon. The monitoring equipment gives a constant reading of heart action, for a coronary or emergency patient.

The x-ray laboratory has been expanded at Botsford. "It took two men six weeks to

set up our new x-ray equipment," Cantor said.

CONSTRUCTION FOR the new wing began in October 1970. Of the \$6 million cost, about \$700,000 was needed for equipment, Cantor said.

In other developments, Cantor said the hospital would begin teaching a first aid course for firemen, policemen and ambulance drivers.

Cantor said the emergency room was busier than ever.

The first aid program would merely allow the men to handle the patient better until he gets to the hospital. "It does not make them paramedics," he said.

The 80-hour course is offered under the direction of the Michigan State Highway Dept., safety division, Cantor added.

For years on end, The Stroller has looked with scorn upon the railroads of the land.

He never has quite forgiven them for changing the color of the cabooses from red to blue and, in some cases, a bright yellow.

The red caboose was one of the landmarks of his childhood and many were the times when he heard the Pennsylvania Dutch mothers tell their offspring while waiting for a train to pass, "When the little red car comes, then it ain't anymore."

And as he grew up, railroads held a special charm for it was the town custom back home to take a walk over the bridge each evening to watch the "Black Diamond" go by at 9:14. In fact, it was this "Black Diamond," pride of the Lehigh Valley, that brought The Stroller to Detroit.

In later years, he enjoyed his first trip to the Pacific coast on the "Super Chief," one of the best known of all the passenger trains going west. And he still remembers the sight, upon awakening one morning, of roses growing along the tracks as we entered California.

This love of the railroads began to dim some years ago when they started to reduce

passenger traffic and rob many youngsters of the thrill of their first train ride.

THEN ALONG came the diesel engine that permitted double the number of cars on a freight train - with longer and longer waits at the rail crossings.

Never will be forgotten the day when The Stroller, then active in the Chamber of Commerce in the rising new city of Livonia, appealed to the C&O officials to have the morning and evening passenger trains stop in Livonia. He took pains to point out that such a service would end the need to drive 20 miles into the city and pay exorbitant parking fees and could be profitable.

The officials listened, then answered, "We are not interested in passenger traffic."

It was the same when the race track officials asked for a passenger train to run shuttle service from Detroit. But

again the railroad folks said, "no," even when promised a modern station. The Detroit Race Course is the only horse park in the country that isn't served by railroad shuttle service.

These things piled up and fed the scorn through the years. But now there is a softening of the feeling - and maybe the railroads have a point, too.

THE STROLLER had occasion a few days ago, to listen to a railroad official address a service club as he told the railroad side of the story.

"You people forget," he explained, "that you helped to place the railroads in their chaotic condition."

This statement stunned a lot of listeners until he added:

"With your tax money, you built bigger and longer concrete highways to make possible all sorts of shipments - people and material - by bus. The bus lines didn't have

to pay a penny for the road construction, save the tax placed on axle weights and capacities."

Knowing he had surprised his listeners, the official continued:

"You did the same with air travel. Did you ever hear of an airline building an airport? They may have built terminals - but they never had to provide runways and the like. NO. You folks are paying for airports with your tax money. At this moment, several more millions are being spent at Metropolitan Airport. By whom? The Wayne County Road Commission - with a lot of your dollars.

"ON TOP of that," he added, "minimum wage scales for conductors and the remainder of the help on the passenger trains kept increasing, along with the price of food. There was only one answer... drop passenger service."

He pointed out that Amtrak, the government's national rail experiment, lost several millions of dollars last year - even with many concessions.

So, maybe the railroads have a point. After all they blazed the trail - and now seem to be forgotten.

'Education Park' Rumor Fizzles

Right-wing groups, fearful of massive cross-district busing plans for the Detroit metropolitan area, have been concentrating their attacks in the past two months on a proposed education park provision in a new federal law.

Their energies were off-target from the start, and now they are beating a dead horse.

THE EDUCATIONAL park these groups were criticizing was an alleged attempt by the federal government to integrate Detroit and suburban schools.

To back up their claim, they pointed to the cluster of buildings at Joy and Canton Center roads in Canton Township. The rumors had it that "they" were building a federally-funded educational park.

Actually, the Joy-Canton Center complex is a local project of the Plymouth Board of Education. It had been planned by local officials since the early 1960s, long before anyone ever heard of the federal plans.

The Plymouth education park, which has one high school built and another nearly finished for occupancy in fall, is solely a local school district project and has no relation to the federal education park provision approved by Congress two months ago.

ANOTHER congressional action has virtually removed any cause for busing foes' opposition to proposed education parks.

The House this month approved the repeal of the controversial education park section from the Higher Education Bill and sent the proposal to the Senate for action.

Controversy over the education parks started nearly two months ago when another suburban weekly newspaper quoted comments made by a New York state education commissioner on the topic 12 years ago.

THE COMMENTS were made by Dr. James Allen Jr., who was later named U.S. education commissioner, a post he later resigned.

Dr. Allen was quoted as supporting education parks and dormitories where students would stay during the week before returning home to their parents for the weekend. The newspaper mentioned that Plymouth school district

"has started such a plan with some buildings already started."

The Plymouth district's plans call for four high schools with academic and vocational training, but no dormitories are even considered.

SINCE THE newspaper published its educational park story in early July, Congressman William Ford (D-Taylor) has been getting numerous requests for copies of the Higher Education Bill with the education parks provision.

The government bill, now changed to delete the controversial provision, defines education parks as a school or cluster of schools located on a common site. The schools on the site would be used by students from various economic classes and racial minorities.

In the Plymouth education park, the Plymouth-Canton High School opened two years ago with the Plymouth-Salem High to open this fall. Two additional high schools will be built in the future.

Phase III, "man in his world," will be offered Tuesdays from 7-10 p.m. for three credits or non-credit, starting Sept. 5.

Tuition is \$37 per credit hour, plus fees. Charges are less for courses taken for non-credit. For details, call the registrar.

Junior Art Program Set At Madonna

Madonna College sponsors a "junior art opportunities" program for interested youngsters ranging from 9-13 years. Due to the limited space this year, only two classes are scheduled consisting of 20 students per class.

These classes begin on Saturday, Sept. 30, from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. and are held for eight consecutive Saturdays. One class is in creative drawing for beginners; the other in design and composition, for more advanced students.

Tuition is \$20 plus \$2 materials fee. Registration is Saturday, Aug. 26 from 10 to 11 a.m. and 1-2 p.m.

3 Adult Art Classes Set By Madonna

Three adult painting classes are planned for the fall term at Madonna College, 36600 Schoolcraft, Livonia.

Contemporary methods and techniques of painting will be stressed in these classes. Although any media may be used, the preference lies in oils. All classes begin in the week of Sept. 10 and run for 14 weeks.

The schedule:

Painting, Monday, 9:30 - 11:30 a.m.; advanced painting, Tuesday 9:30 - 11:30 a.m.; painting, Tuesday 7 - 9 p.m.

Registration is scheduled for Saturday, Aug. 26 at 10 to 11 a.m. and from 1 to 2 p.m. Tuition is \$34 per course.

Observerland Golf Tourney Announced

Whispering Willows golf course, Livonia's 18-hole municipal layout, will be the scene of the first Observerland tournament. The affair, for men and women golfers in the seven communities covered by the Observer Newspapers, will be held over a four day period in mid-September.

The 18 hole medal play event for women is scheduled for Thursday, Sept. 15 and the 36 hole meet for men will be held on Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 16 and Sept. 17.

The program is sponsored by the Observer Newspapers Inc. and the Livonia Department of Parks and Recreation under the supervision of Pro Gary Whitener and DPR Director John Dufour.

A Livonia city-wide tournament has been held each year since the course opened but it was decided to open eligibility to all golfers in the seven communities this year.

WHITENER is toying with the idea of determining city champions in each of the seven areas if enough of the top stars enter.

"All flights will be decided on a handicap basis," he said, "Thus if the top golfers enter from Livonia, Southfield, Farmington, Redford Township, Plym-

outh, Garden City and Westland, then these ranking highest could be crowned champions of their respective communities. That is, provided the community doesn't sponsor a city championship meet."

Entry fee for the women's division is \$6 with a deadline of Tuesday, Sept. 12 and the pairings available at the course on the following day.

There will be a championship flight as well as other divisions on the basis of handicaps. The championship bracket will include scratch through 15, the A flight for handicaps of 16 and over with the possibility of a B flight for those with high handicaps.

There will be prizes for low gross and low net but only one can be won by an individual golfer.

THE MEN'S DIVISION, which calls for 18 holes on Saturday, Sept. 16, and 18 the following day, will be a handicap affair with four divisions, each determined on a handicap basis.

The championship flight will be for scratch through 10; A, 11 strokes to 15; B, 16 to 21; and C for those with a 22 handicap and over.

Play will be open to all golfers, private club members to publins players, and each must turn in an established handicap with the entry blank and fee.

ENTRY FEE for men will be \$17.50 which covers green fees and trophies.

The deadline for men's division is Thursday, Sept. 14 at 5 p.m. at the golf course and first round pairings will be available at the club on Friday, Sept. 15.

"We could hope for more than 200 entries in the two tournaments," said Director Dufour, "This is the first time we sponsored an Observerland wide meet and we are expecting entries from all of the seven communities."

"We have an idea of how many Livonia golfers will enter but are guessing that many of the private club and publins players in the many courses in the area will enter and make it the most interesting tournament ever staged in this section."

A walk to Chatlin and hits by Steve Morrison and Scanlon made it 4-0 in the fourth with Joliet scoring one in the fifth to slice the margin to three.

SINGLES by Mike Cullen and Morrison pushed the advantage to four in the fifth. Joliet scored twice in the sixth but Chatlin kept the Joliet batsmen in check for the opening round win.

Mark Salisbury got the call in the second contest with Northbrook, Ill., and chucked a three-hitter, striking out nine, and walking six with NFWB edging Illinois, 3-2.

Northbrook jumped to a 2-0 first inning lead on a walk, single and three-bagger.





Redford Youths Cross Border...Star In Lacrosse

Two Redford Township athletes have crossed the border and are making a name for themselves in Canadian lacrosse.

Paul Galea and Brian Sangeorzan, both 19, are the only two Americans on the Central Junior C Windsor Warlocks, a club that placed second in the seven team Ontario league.

The two are '70 graduates of U-D High School and will be starting their junior year at U-D University.

They got interested in lacrosse upon graduation from high school when they saw an announcement of tryouts for the Michigan-Ontario league at Olympia.

NEITHER HAD PLAYED the game and Galea said he didn't even know what it was about.

They quickly learned and were members of the championship Leland Westsiders.

The league folded but Galea and Sangeorzan remained interested in box lacrosse and followed the professional Windsor Warlocks.

At the start of the '72 season, the Redford youths went out for the Junior C team in Windsor which is restricted to players 21 and under.

"There were about 50 guys out," said Sangeorzan. "There was one other American but he didn't make the final cut."

PRACTICE STARTED in March and the Warlocks compiled a league mark of 16-4 with Sangeorzan playing left corner and Galea left crease position.

"Box lacrosse is basically the same as ice hockey except its played on cement," said Sangeorzan.

"There are no offside or icing calls and cross-checking is legal."

Each scored a hat trick against Wallaceburg this season with Galea totaling 18 goals overall.

Galea and Sangeorzan played ice hockey at U-D but prefer box lacrosse now.

"THE PLAY PATTERNS are similar to basketball, with running instead of skating," said Galea. "We use the fast break and I love body contact."

The net differs from ice hockey in that it is only four by four feet with the ball made of Indian rubber. Lacrosse sticks are used with the ends having a net to scoop the ball up from the cement.

"Shooting is more accurate in lacrosse," added

Sangeorzan. "You can have the ball in your net and cut loose with it at any time."

BOX LACROSSE features three 20-minute periods, as does hockey with line changes about every two minutes. "Running is tougher than skating," said Galea. "You just can't glide around on gym shoes."

Body contact is part of the game and the two Redford athletes have been fairly fortunate with Paul receiving the worst of the season with 11 stitches.

"The cement floor can get pretty tough sometimes and sticks are always head high," said Galea.

Fights are common, especially in the 15-foot zone around the net which is open territory for just about any type of check one could imagine.

"You can get cross-checked from any angle once you move into the 15-foot crease," said Galea. "That's where you get it the worst and it's a real challenge to keep your cool with somebody banging away on your arms and shoulders."

They got a real taste of Canadian lacrosse in a 15-7 romp in Wallaceburg.

THE WALLACEBURG Satans went overboard to live up to their name - were tabbed with 27 penalties ... which added up to 83 minutes.

The penalties included: one game misconduct; three 10-minute misconduct; three five-minute fighting penalties and 19 two-minute minor calls.

Windsor didn't play the part of an angel either, collecting 37 minutes with three fighting calls and 11 minors.


When the final buzzer sounded with Windsor an eight goal victor, a Wallaceburg player jumped Galea from behind and from then on it spread like wildfire.

"Fans started jumping over the boards as did parents and officials," said Galea. "Those Canadians don't like to lose the game as well as a fight."

"Throughout the game they were spitting on us, and the refs and police had their hands full," added Galea. "It really got Brian and myself in the heat of fisticuffs lacrosse."

Next year will be the last for them on the junior squad and both agree that as long as their bodies hold out and they can make a team, they will be in Canada playing box lacrosse.



Michigan's harness racing activities have moved outstate to Jackson Raceway, in addition to the meeting at Hazel Park, and President Leon Slavin's plant opened on a successful note.

The crowd of more than 4,800 was slightly below that of a year ago but still was the third largest for an opener. Wagering hit \$190,000 and Slavin expressed satisfaction in view of the fact that this was the first late summer meeting in Jackson since 1957.

"We wondered how followers of the sport would accept a late summer date," he said. "Judging from the opening night attendance and wagering, I feel sure that we're going to have a much more successful season than in 1957."

"We have a better quality of horses now than then, we have top drivers, we have one of the finest racing strips in the state and our car check shows that we are getting more and more fans from this section of the state and not necessarily from the Detroit area as in the past."

At the same time, Hazel Park Harness Raceway finally passed the \$800,000 mark with back-to-back handles of slightly more than that on Friday and Saturday. Hazel Park has had the crowds but the per capita has been far below that recorded at Wolverine during the spring. But it appears now that bettors have become accustomed to the many new horses and are ready to settle down to the usual wagering patterns.

The eastside plant is now aiming for a \$900,000 night with the expectations that it will reach that level over the Labor Day weekend.

A million dollar night? Hazel Park will have to reach that figure before the middle of September... it is a well-known fact that wagering dips after that. It will be interesting to see what does happen in the next month.

As of this moment, we have no idea what management will do if the petition is presented. It could be abhorring as so many petitions of that kind do. Management must have studied the situation at length before making the decision to close the line during the week and to add the additional windows to the second level line in the new clubhouse.

There isn't anything that excellent roads and an upturn in the general economic conditions couldn't correct. But unfortunately the DRC is battling highway construction on Schoolcraft and Middle Belt Roads and getting in and out of the plant is a real fight. It isn't going to be corrected this year and conditions may still be snafued come another season.

It may seem that Saturday, Sept. 16 is a long ways off but not to the top brass at the Detroit Race Course. That's the date of the \$100,000 added Michigan Mile and an eighth for which the closing dates for nominations passed last Saturday.

Now Racing Director Norris Guin and his staff will wait until the end of the week for late mail before officially closing the nominations and taking a look at what the rich purse attracted.

Guin and DRA Vice President and General Manager Paul Ryder were very careful in selecting the date for the renewal of the state's richest and oldest thoroughbred stake... they checked stakes dates from every major track in the land and finally selected a Saturday on which no major event for three years old and upward was listed.

Thus they have their fingers crossed as they anticipate the finest list of nominations in the 24-year history of the rich event.

Native Royalty defeated aged Royal Harmony a year ago in a great race and went home with \$85,930 for the afternoon's work.


It isn't known yet whether Trainer Pat Devereaux will enter Royal Harmony for another crack at the big money. He does have his aged star on hand and the distance is just right for the eight year old.

IT WAS JUST a week ago that DRA officials decided to close down the mutual line on the first floor of the new clubhouse and shift personnel around to other spots during

the week and then return to the clubhouse on Saturdays and holidays.

The word was that wagering on the line had dropped below figures of a year ago and management decided to make a change. This consisted of constructing an addition to the mutual line on the second floor of the clubhouse and opening windows in the Terrace and mezzanine areas. Actually the same number of workers but moved to other spots.

That was fine for management but Saturday, owners and trainers were passing a petition which asked the track to reconsider and reopen the ground level betting line.

Prior Accord Is Must On Mortgage 'Points'

The Michigan Supreme Court has ruled that a house seller has no legal obligation to pay "points," unless this re-

quirement is spelled out in a contract. The court also said that real estate brokers have an obliga-

tion to see that both buyers and sellers understand all aspects of sales contracts, particularly FHA terms.

The court's opinion, written by Justice Thomas E. Brennan, was handed down in a case involving purchase of a

house by Mr. and Mrs. Ocie Wilson from Mr. and Mrs. Sotirios Romeos in Pontiac Township, Oakland County.

THE ROMEOS entered into an agreement with real estate broker Wyman Lewis in October 1965 to list their home for

sale for \$11,500 on FHA terms. In December 1965 they agreed to sell to the Wilsons. The Wilsons paid the broker an \$800 deposit and the Romeos agreed to vacate the house by April 15, 1966.

The Court of Appeals affirmed, the Supreme Court remanded the case to pass upon the issue of sufficiency of tender, and the Court of Appeals affirmed once again.

The Wilsons secured their mortgage in March 1966, and the deal was to be closed May 16, 1966, but the Romeos did not appear for the closing.

On June 6, 1966, the Wilsons filed suit in Oakland County circuit court, asking that the Romeos be ordered to fulfill terms of the agreement, or that they be awarded damages for breach of contract.

The matter was first assigned to Judge Phillip Pratt, then re-assigned to Judge James S. Thorburn. Attorneys for both sides agreed that the contract was binding, but that the contract did not bind the seller to pay the points.

The agreement, and an order issued Jan. 24, 1967 by Judge Thorburn, concluded that the purchaser would pay mortgage costs, and would get financing other than FHA because FHA forbids the purchaser to pay points. The transaction was to have been completed by Jan. 30, 1967, but was not.

ON FEB. 14, 1967, the Romeos asked that the case be dismissed. It was then assigned to Judge Clark J. Adams, who concluded that Judge Thorburn had no authority to enter the previous order, and ordered the matter for immediate trial.

No order was entered setting aside Judge Thorburn's order, and the matter did not come up for trial until April 30, 1968.

Judge Adams ruled on May 9, 1968, in favor of the Wilsons, ordering that the sale be completed.

IN THE SUPREME Court's opinion, Justice Brennan wrote:


"The case cried for settlement. Seasonable settlement. Merciful settlement. And indeed settlement came. . . . But it was a hasty settlement, pregnant with the embryo of its own defeat."

"Accurately, the circuit judge concluded that the defendants were not obliged to pay the mortgage premium. Unrealistically, he concluded that the plaintiffs should be ordered to do something that was neither legally permissible nor physically possible in today's mortgage market."

"Under federal law, Mr. and Mrs. Wilson could not pay the mortgagor's premium. And everyone in court should have realized that getting an FHA mortgage without payment of the premium was an impractical pipe dream."

"... Concern for the equality of the division of the judicial workload came ahead of concern for the people whose litigation begged for attention. The matter was not returned to the judge who entered the order of settlement. He might even then have been able to iron out his own action."

The court said that under general court rules, Judge Adams had no jurisdiction to set aside Judge Thorburn's order. The court remanded the case to Judge Thorburn with the instructions to immediately make a final disposition of the case in accordance with the court's opinion.

Suburban Gardener

Roadside Stands:
The Last OutpostsBy BETTY FRANKEL

Baskets piled high with glossy red tomatoes, great piles of yellow and green squashes, stacks of dewy, fresh corn ears are temptingly displayed at the many roadside stands that have sprouted up all over suburbia. They are almost as abundant as the harvest they market.

Some of these stands are small and temporary, no more than a patio umbrella raised over a round table. Others are neat, sturdy, permanent structures. Most are rather rough and rickety, but picturesque.

These stands, marketing the fresh-picked home grown produce are an anomaly. They don't fit with the rest of our organized, commercialized way of life. They are the last outposts of our agricultural heritage and are evidence of an independence and rugged

individualism that is resisting the squeeze of urbanization.

We suburbanites who patronize the roadside stands enjoy the break in the dull routine of supermarket shopping. We feel freer and less fettered, too. There is a bit of adventure in pulling off the road onto a dusty, rutted shoulder, examining the luscious vegetables spread in the open air and selecting the most tempting basket-fuls — which are then promptly emptied into a paper bag so that the basket can be used again.

Many of the stands have been in the area for years. A second and perhaps third generation of customers is patronizing them and swears their corn is the best — and it is.

WHAT ARE the favorite varieties? Golden bantam is still one of the tops, as it has been since grandma's day. You'll also find Country

Gentleman, another old favorite that has white kernels. Most often though, growers will have newer varieties such as Ioana, Ilini, and Barbecue.

Many of the larger stands sell produce that they purchase from the Eastern market, as well as their own homegrown corn and tomatoes.

They have California plums and grapes, Florida melons, Georgia peaches, and lettuce and potatoes that have been trucked in from other states. Of course, there is no attempt made to pass these off as home grown. They are matter-of-factly displayed in their wooden shipping crates.

Other stands, especially the smaller ones, have only home grown produce. One such stand is run by Sally Snyder who grows all the produce she sells on an acre of land behind her attractive Southfield house.

On a typical day you'll find her in the garden in the morning and in the afternoon sitting on the front lawn beside a table piled with ears of just-picked corn, glowing purple eggplants, some baby beets and a bunch of parsley. On a nearby umbrella table are tomatoes and young carrots and squash.

A MILE OR so away another lady gardener sells bunches of flowers and perennial plants as well as her home grown vegetables.

There are several stands in the area that specialize in "organic" produce that has been raised untouched by commercial fertilizers or chemical pesticides or insecticides.


Anne and Daniel Landgraf have been running their organic stand for five years now. Their eight acres have been farmed for 30 years and are still producing abundantly.

The rambling stand, shaded by the branches of an old fir tree and a spreading silver maple, is overflowing with produce — corn, tomatoes, cucumbers, cabbage, carrots, potatoes, six kinds of squash, four or five kinds of onions, sweet peppers, hot peppers, beans and dill weed. There are raspberries and blueberries in season and now there are large baskets of early apples.

When asked about their organic growing methods, Mrs. Landgraf said they use an organic fertilizer that comes from Kentucky. Mostly, they rely on compost.

The weeds and trimmings and leaves and stems of their produce are all put into a large hole where they decompose into humus which is dug back into the fields the following year. Also they use manure from their chickens, ducks, geese and ponies.

Wherever you go, and whatever you buy, it's bound to be a pleasant little adventure.

Home Building Booms
In Canton, Farmington

Southfield and Canton Township were among the top 10 communities in southeastern Michigan in authorizing 1971 building permits, but Westland dropped from the list.

And the City of Farmington was one of the biggest growth areas for multi-family dwellings in the seven county region.

These Observerland communities emerged prominently in the report of residential construction in 1971, compiled by the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments. The report lists total residential units and then makes a separate listing for multi-family units.

Oakland County led the region with 14,747 units, an increase of 119 per cent over 1970. Here's how some local areas did:

• The City of Southfield led the total list with 2,953 units

and the multi-family list with 2,741. The prior year, Southfield was in eighth place in total units and not even on the list in apartments.

• Canton Township ranked eighth in total units with 1,085. This breaks down to 486 single-family units and 599 multi-family units. In 1970 it was fifth.

• The City of Farmington, didn't make the overall list, but it did land in eighth place on the apartment list with 643 units authorized.

• Westland, which led the 1970 list, fell off the top 10 completely in 1971 in overall residential construction. Westland's 1970 authorization was 2,201, but its 1971 showing was only 880, of which 496 were single-family houses and 380 multi-family units.



Quince seed lotion: Many home gardeners who make their own quince seed hand lotion will tell you that the finished product is softer and silkier than many of the commercial lotions on the market. In case you didn't know it, quince seed, when soaked in water becomes mucilaginous and forms the basis for a good lotion.

Here's a good recipe we hope you'll try: ¼ cup quince seeds soaked overnight in a pint of water (rainwater is ideal but not entirely essential). Strain and add ½ oz. of glycerine, 2 oz. of bay rum and ½ oz. of any perfume.

Not many people bother to use the quince fruit for food. Try this recipe for quince jelly: The whole fruit or just the skins may be used. Cut in small pieces, being sure to reject the seeds. Cook in enough water to cover, until tender, then strain through jelly bag. Measure juice and boil 20 minutes. Have ready

same amount of sugar heated, add to juice and boil one minute, then turn into heated jelly tumblers. When cool, pour melted paraffin on top.

Quinces may also be combined with grapes for jelly. And if you like steamed quinces, wash, core and

quarter the fruit. Place in steamer and when tender, serve with cream and a generous amount of butter.

tablespoons of 25 per cent malathion per gallon of water. This gets the young crawlers which you may have missed with the burlap cloth. Spraying alone will not check mealybugs, as the pest has a waxy coating over it, causing the pesticide to roll off.

GREEN THUMB Clinic: "Is it true that cattails are edible? We have access to many of them."

Answer: Yes, cattails are a versatile "wild" food plant. They provide vegetable, salad and even "flour." Early in spring new leaves start to sprout, and these tiny stalks and leaves resemble garden asparagus. Some oldtimers call them Cossack asparagus, and they eat them by pulling the stalks. The crisp white stem can be eaten raw or cooked in same manner you'd eat asparagus. Some people even eat cattail pollen, using it for a flour substitute in many recipes.

GREEN THUMB CLINIC: A reader writes: "We want to slip some roses and other woody plants. Is it too late?" Answer: No, you can still take cuttings. Root them under a glass jar and leave this "greenhouse" on all winter.

SCALE ON YEW: If your Japanese Yews or Taxus shrubs have a white cottony mass on the stems and leaves, it means the mealybug is present. This is a sapsucking pest which tackles Taxus and other ornamentals.

Take a piece of burlap in your hand, pull it tightly over the area where the mealybugs are, mashing the entire mess. Then spray the plants with two

Time To Dry Flowers
For Winter Bouquets

EAST LANSING Carry a bit of summer all through the winter by picking and preserving flowers now, says J. Lee Taylor, extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University.

The best way to preserve a blossom's shape and color is by drying it, he says.

Flowers like cockscomb (celosia), goldenrod, bittersweet, statice, salvia, yarrow and hydrangea respond best to the hanging method of drying.

Pick them just before they reach their prime and strip off any leaves. Tie small flowers together in bunches so that the heads do not touch and hang them head down in a dry, dimly lighted place for two to four weeks. Hang larger flowers singly.

FOR FLOWERS like foxglove, petunias, snapdragons, gladioli, lilies, delphinium, coral bells and pansies, Dr. Taylor recommends the drying mixture method.

Pick before the flowers have reached maturity. Cover the bottom of a box with one inch of silica gel or borax. Place the flowers in the box and cover them by gently sprinkling additional drying mixture over them. Store the boxes in a cool, dark place for two weeks or until the petals feel crisp.

To preserve foliage, crush or split the ends of the stems and stand the plants in a three- to five-inch deep solution of two-thirds glycerin and one-third water.

Within a few days to two weeks, tiny beads of moisture will appear on the leaves. This indicates the foliage is ready

to use. It will last indefinitely, Dr. Taylor says.

For more detailed instructions and more complete lists of the flowers best suited to each method, Taylor recommends Cooperative Extension bulletin E-410 "Flower Arranging," available for \$1.50 from your local Cooperative Extension Service office.

Sow Pansy Seeds Now

EAST LANSING For large, vigorous pansy plants next spring, seed now, says Dr. William Carlson, extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University.

Sow the seed in a seed flat containing a porous soil made up of 1/3 peat, 1/3 soil and 1/3 perlite. Cover the seed lightly with soil and wrap the flat with plastic to retain moisture and maintain a constant temperature. (Germination proceeds best at a temperature of 60-65 degrees F.)

After the seeds have germinated, move the flat into a well-lighted area to prevent the seedlings from stretching. When the seedlings have grown to the size of a quarter,

they should be transplanted six inches apart in a porous soil outdoors. Dr. Carlson recommends a soil made up of three parts soil and one part peat moss.

Once the transplants have started growing, water and fertilize them regularly to stimulate vigorous growth. In the fall, cut back on watering and do not fertilize. Protect the plants through the winter with a mulch of straw one foot deep added after the first freeze.

When new growth appears in the spring, remove the mulch and fertilize. Give the plants two or three weeks to harden off before transplanting. Move them carefully, being sure to leave the roots intact.

Dem Delegates Few And Tired

Fifteenth District Democrats—which includes Westland and Garden City party workers—were apparently too tired from the May 16 presidential primary campaign to turn on any energies for the district convention issues at last Friday's get-together.

There were six resolutions voted on for future action at this coming weekend's state party convention and an unexpected challenge for the post of convention chairman.

BUT BOTH failed to get any of the nearly 80 delegates present excited about anyone or anything.

District Chairman John Canfield, Dearborn Heights mayor and district head since it was organized in 1964, was challenged for the post of convention chairman by Al Neal, a Gov. Wallace supporter from Dearborn Heights.

Canfield had little trouble in the colorless roll call vote which had him emerge the victor by a 73-13 margin. Even other Wallace supporters in the district supported Canfield over Neal.

OF THE six resolutions offered by a subcommittee of the district convention, only four passed.

Even though the four that gained convention approval were important to future Democratic Party operations, there was little discussion or debate on them.

One resolution, if approved by the State Legislature, would prohibit party crossovers in primary elec-

tions and prevent the Democratic Party problems that came up at the May 16 presidential primary, first in Michigan in more than 40 years.

In the primary, President Nixon was unopposed and large numbers of Republican voters crossed over to vote for Democratic nominee Gov. George Wallace of Alabama.

Westland delegate Michael O'Toole commented during the convention that the "integrity" of the party's primary must be protected.

OTHER RESOLUTIONS approved for consideration at the state convention to be held in Grand Rapids were:

1-Support of equal rights for women, including equality in job employment, equal pay for equal work, in addition to federally-funded child care centers, and liberalized abortion laws.

2-Support of a no-fault car insurance law.

3-Support of a bill to allow voters to become automatically registered or registered when they renew their drivers' licenses.

DEFEATED were resolutions concerning county-wide voter registration mechanics and mandatory use of auto seat belts.

On hand for the convention, held in the United Auto Workers' Region IE hall in Taylor were several political figures who were seeking support for the party's nominations for various positions at the Grand Rapids convention.

One was Neil Staebler, former state party chairman, who is campaigning to regain a seat on the expanded Democratic National Committee.

Staebler was former congressman and the party's candidate for governor in 1964 when he was defeated by Gov. George Romney.

FORMER STATE Rep. Vincent Pettipren was passing out flyers for his wife's candidacy as Wayne State University board of governors' nomination.

The Wayne State board nominations, along with board of regents for University of Michigan and board of trustees for Michigan State University, will be finalized at the state convention.

Mrs. Pettipren, Westland resident, has been on the Eastern Michigan University faculty since 1965 after being an elementary teacher for four years. She is now working toward her doctorate degree at the University of Michigan's center for higher education.

THE CONVENTION may be the last under the old district boundaries. The new district includes several communities in the downriver area which were added following the required reapportionment of congressional districts following the federal census.

Canfield refused to be specific on whether he was a candidate for chairman of the new district. But he will have at least one opponent if he does seek another term, which is considered certain by several delegates.

Giving serious consideration to the party chairmanship is Arnold Keller, New Democratic Coalition leader and supporter of Sen. McGovern, presidential nominee.

DELEGATES said following Friday's convention that the 15th District Democrats are still suffering from the three-way split caused by the May 16 primary.

The party regulars are facing challenges on many issues from the more reform-minded McGovern backers and also the newly-emerged Wallace backers.

No Amnesty, Say Republicans In 15th District

Hitting at a Democratic tender point, Republicans in the 15th Congressional District are opposing amnesty.

Precinct delegates in the district convention last week adopted a resolution opposing "the concept of amnesty for deserters and draft dodgers."

The resolution took the opposite side of one pushed through the Democratic state convention in 1970 favoring amnesty for young men who opposed the war in Vietnam on moral grounds. Party leaders later disavowed the plank.

The 50 delegates attending the meeting in the Colonial House, in Taylor, also endorsed their district chairman, Dwight Vincent, for the Michigan male post on the Republican National Committee.

Vincent, a Dearborn Heights attorney, ran against St. Clair Innkeeper Creighton Holden as national convention delegates from Michigan met Sunday in Miami Beach. Vincent's effort collapsed when Gov. Milliken voted for his old friend, Holden, who was then elected by acclamation.

OTHER 15TH District resolutions:

• Endorsed Sen. Robert Griffin (R-Mich.) for reelection this year.

• Supported Circuit Judge Thomas Roumell's bid for a Republican State Supreme Court nomination. Roumell is a resident of Dearborn Heights, which is in the 15th. A former Romney Administration official, Roumell received a gubernatorial appointment to the circuit court bench.

• Called on the party to listen to the voice of youth.

MAIN BUSINESS of the convention was to elect 74 delegates and an equal number of alternates to the GOP state convention in Detroit Sept. 1-2, when candidates will be nominated for the Supreme Court, State Board of Education, and three university boards.

Garden City—Harry Till, Ron Randle, Al Haney, Darman Smith.

Westland—Audrey Gibson, Richard Buerk, Vivian Cline, Bill Bielecki, Ralph Miller, Bob Zandowski, Louie Waggoner, Anne Harbison, Norman O. Stockmeyer, Craig Bielecki and Gary Dixon.

- 1 t. cinnamon
- 1 t. nutmeg
- 1 t. cloves
- 2 c. oatmeal
- 2 c. flour
- 1/2 c. chopped nuts

Cream sugar, shortening, salt and egg. Cover raisins with water and bring to a boil. Save the liquid. Mix dry ingredients. Add soda to raisin liquid. Combine all ingredients. Drop by spoonful onto greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees about 10 minutes or until lightly brown.

CARROT OATMEAL COOKIES

- 1 c. firmly packed light brown sugar
- 1/2 c. soft shortening
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 c. milk
- 1 c. grated carrots
- 1/2 c. all - purpose flour
- 1 t. baking powder
- 1/2 t. soda
- 1/2 t. salt
- 1/2 t. cinnamon
- 1/2 t. nutmeg
- 2 c. quick cooking oatmeal
- 1/2 c. seedless raisins

Cream sugar, shortening and eggs until light and creamy. Add milk, carrots and stir until well mixed. Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Add remaining ingredients and stir until raisins are well coated. Mix with the creamed mixture. This will be a fairly stiff batter. Drop by tablespoon on to a greased cookie sheet and bake at 375 degrees about 15 minutes, or until brown all over.

- AUNT VERA'S DATE-FILLED OATMEAL COOKIES
- 1/2 lb. lard or 1/2 lard and 1/2 butter
- 1 c. brown sugar
- 1/2 t. soda
- 2 t. boiling water
- 1 dessert spoon vanilla
- 2 c. sifted flour
- 2 c. oatmeal (heaping)
- 1/2 t. salt

Cream sugar and lard. Mix soda, water and vanilla. Mix dry ingredients. Mix all together. Roll into small balls, place on greased cookie sheet and press down with fork which has been dipped in cold water. Bake at 350 degrees about 10 minutes.

DATE FILLING
To a 12-ounce package of pitted dates add one cup of water and one-half cup sugar. Bring to a boil then lower heat and cook until dates are soft and the entire mixture has the consistency of a thick jam. When cooled, spread the filling on the bottom of one cookie and press together with another. Cookies will stay crisp if spread with filling just before serving.



Alleged Political Impropriety: So What's The Big Problem?

Both Richard Nixon, now renominated for the presidency, and George McGovern, his Democratic opponent, have made the issue of public confidence in politics and politicians a central one in their campaigns.

They are quite right in doing so, for all available polling data shows that public confidence in government as an institution and politicians as individuals has reached nearly an all-time low. In a society that claims to be governed according to the consent of the people, eroding confidence in politics and politicians is a serious matter.

Although Nixon and McGovern each will address the issue in national terms between now and Nov. 7, much of the problem is rooted at the local level.

Local politicians are more

visible, better known, and more relevant to the life of the average guy than national politicians. And if local politicians are ineffective or dubiously motivated, or only marginally honest, such behavior will sap public confidence in politics and politicians quicker than anything else.

THAT'S WHY in last week's Redford Observer, we broke a story which detailed allegations of political impropriety on the part of Joe Patchett, Democratic leader in Redford Township.

According to statements submitted to the Observer, Patchett has asked local candidates for money and political patronage jobs in return for endorsement by him and his organization.

Aldo Vagnozzi, of Farmington, who is chairman of the 19th

District Democratic Party, has told the Observer that such alleged activities were the reason the district party pulled the charter from Patchett and his group four years ago.

"I see no reason why any candidate is obliged to contribute to any organization," Vagnozzi added.

CYNICS, HOWEVER, may ask: "Just what's so wrong with a political group asking candidates it endorses for contributions and political patronage jobs? After all, it's done all the time, so what's the big deal?"

Aside from legal implications (i.e., possible conflicts with state elections laws, income tax problems, etc.) I think such alleged behavior is wrong because it saps public confidence in the political process, right at the local level.

Government jobs ought to be filled by the best qualified person available and not by political patronage deals. Why? Because the taxpayers have a right to get the most qualified person in a government job; otherwise, their tax dollars are wasted.

Political endorsements ought to be made on the basis of scrutiny of all available candidates, to see which of them best represents the viewpoint and interests of the group making endorsements. They ought not be offered because some candidate is willing to pay off the endorsing group with 10% of his salary.

Suppose, for example, the National Action Group decides to endorse candidates in this November's election. NAG clear-

ly is interested in endorsing the candidate who will most effectively work to stop busing.

But if some candidate who isn't very effective or not really very much opposed to busing gets NAG's endorsement because he or she pledges to give NAG 10% of his or her salary, NAG's members would have every right to be plenty sore.

THAT'S WHY we broke the story. Because the public has a

right to know what's going on.

That's why we will continue to investigate the story. Because newspapers have an overwhelming obligation to inform the public about what's going on.

And that's why we will break other stories of the same sort, regardless of who they involve or where they occur in our circulation area. Because rooting out allegations of political misbehavior is central to making our system of government work.

A Living City Will Always Survive

(The Observer has asked governmental and civic leaders to write guest editorials during the vacation period on the problems of the suburbs. Today's guest is Mayor James Lowe, of Garden City.)

I have been asked to answer the following question: "The City of Garden City is largely built up and its school population stable. What can the city do to keep from deteriorating?"

Unfortunately, the question assumes a dangerous degree of stability, almost one of stagnation, and we all know what happens to stagnant water.

FIRST, WE MUST look closely at our city to see what is and is not stable. True, a large majority of our city is built up. However, land is available in Garden City. What we do with that land then becomes the item of importance.

Next, our school population may be leveling off, but educational demands are a living thing, ever growing in need and size. How we maintain our system then becomes an item of importance.

The third item of importance is the "city" itself. Like our educational system, it too is a living thing, with ever growing needs and demands. So you see, to assume stability is to court stagnation. Such was not the intent of the innocent question.

I have referred to our city as a "living" thing. As long as we keep it alive, our city will survive. Life in itself will not prevent deterioration. This life I speak of is dependent upon you the people, and only through your actions and involvement can our city, or indeed our country, hope to survive.

To keep our city alive, people of all ages must begin to realize that if they throw a can, bottle or empty package on the ground they are involved. If they throw open their door in the early morning and let their pets run wherever they please to deposit their wastes, they are involved.

If they destroy public or private property for any reason, they are involved. I could go on, but how many of you will listen. And yet you are involved. Begin to accept your responsibility and practice the golden rule.

Begin to teach discipline where it is needed and you will help solve many of your own problems. Our nation was built by gallant men and women. Do not let fear tactics tear it down.

Start at home. Clean up your house and property. Then get your neighbor to do the same. Finally, respect each others property and, above all else, begin teaching your children the same. It's a beginning.

NEXT, I BELIEVE the city has a responsibility to the people. That responsibility is exercised first through the ordinances

passed by the governing body, and secondly by the enforcement of those ordinances.

As concerned citizens having cleaned up what you can by your own efforts, now look to your city government for aid in still existing problems. You will have your differences, but how many of you can say you have gone through life so far and never felt a pain. Is that not you perhaps differing with yourself.

As your city continues to live, costs and requirements go up. It is easy to blame unions or employees, or labor and material costs, but let me ask each of you, do you not want and expect a raise in your pay?

City employees are people. Does their cost of living go up like yours? Reasonable demands are to be expected. They will have to be met if services are to continue. Tax relief is needed. Tax reform and revenue sharing may be the answer. However, wherever the money comes from, we pay it. Therefore, wise use of tax dollars becomes very important.

THE QUESTION of taxes then brings us back to land use. Some of our still vacant land can be used to bring in tax dollars through proper development. Some can be used for housing. Some should be left vacant for open space requirements.

The city planning commission knows this and they are trying to please everyone, keeping the good of your city in mind. A tough job? Can you please everyone around you all the time?

I am not as qualified as others to discuss our school system. I can only say that through you, our schools are living things and what I have already said applies here as well.

Finally, how can the city help itself. Believe it or not, paving our streets would be a credit item. Oh, I know many of you disagree, but we cannot afford

the luxury of wasting supplies in an unending battle very much longer.

Sidewalks should go in. The drain program must be completed and laterals put in so our open drainage ditches can be pushed into the past where they belong.

Continued efforts between the city and local businessmen must continue in order that we can push forward together. In closing, I must touch on urban renewal. This is a subject in itself. It has good and bad points. In our city, an urban renewal plan does exist. Given a chance, it might work wonders.

Northville Experiment Has Eyes Of All School Boards

Some parents may not like the idea, a good many of the teachers in the school system think it is silly, and many pupils may not go along with the plan. But regardless of objections, the Northville Board of Education is pioneering the state's first year round school program, and every school board in Michigan is watching the progress closely.

Northville was one of several systems asked to participate in a study of the feasibility of year-round programs. The request came from state officials, and each district posed the question to the community and had numerous meetings in which every detail of the proposal was discussed.

The communities involved were of various sizes so that state officials could get an idea of whether year round classes were possible in all school systems or whether workable in the smaller

communities and not in the larger ones.

OUT OF THIS series of reports came the thought that year round classes would solve a great many financial problems for the schools.

It definitely meant that more use of the buildings would stem the need for additional facilities, even though the enrollment climbed.

There was a thought that additional savings could be made by use of the teachers year round and that members of the teaching staff would have opportunities for vacations at four times during the year rather than all in the summer.

Those interested in winter activities could have time off during the winter, those desiring a spring vacation could go then, and the same story could be written for parents and students.

Thus, Northville took a big step forward when the board officially opened the experimental voluntary K through 5, 45-15 year round school program on July 31.

THAT SOUNDS LIKE a lot of numbers that don't mean much to the average reader but actually it is very simple.

Translated, it means that a voluntary program has been started in Northville for youngsters in kindergarten through grade five. Classes will be conducted on the basis of 45 school days, and a 15 day vacation on a year round basis.

The initiation of the program was the culmination of more than four years of study, and North-

ville was the first to accept the challenge.

Classes are being conducted in the Amerman elementary school and, as indicated above, on a complete voluntary basis. Parents volunteered to enroll their youngsters, and teachers volunteered to accept the year round assignments.

PRINCIPAL OF the experimental school is William Craft, a longtime elementary school administrator who is well known in Livonia, educational circles as a former member and former president of the Livonia school board.

Northville hopes, with the support and cooperation of citizens, fellow educators and public officials of varying classifications, to prove through a change in the traditional school calendar that children's individual needs can be better met.

It aims to prove that better utilization will be made of tax dollars; that more efficient use of school equipment and facilities will take place; and that the 45-15 school year calendar will be more adaptable to the living patterns of the 1970s.

The Northville school board and the community are to be commended for pioneering such a program. It will be interesting to see the reaction after a full year, and it will be even more interesting to see how quickly other systems follow suit.

A faint heart never won anything, and one certainly can't accuse Northville residents and school officials of having faint hearts.

A few layers of newspaper do a marvelous job of wrapping the wet, nasty garbage if you don't compost it, and the rest of the garbage (cans, bottles, paper, plastic) either don't have to be wrapped or can be recycled.

Finally, when it all comes down, I'll bet your cat would rather climb a tree than into a paper bag and I'll bet, in fact I have bet, that you would rather your children have a forest to walk in when they're

Why Taxpayer Is Revolting

EDITOR:

This is, I hope, an objective, though belated, rebuttal to your front page editorial about three editions ago where you urged us to vote "yes" for a millage increase to build new parks and recreational facilities.

Mayor McNamara's article

on the front page of the Aug. 12-13 edition - as to why the voters turned down the proposal - was also thought provoking.

I noted that you and the mayor frequently used the harmless sounding term "increased millage" which actually means an increase in property taxes. Don't you and his honor realize that most of us know that the word "mill" refers to a monetary denomination? Further, do you think that the majority of homeowner voters are unaware that increased millage means higher property taxes?

The box-score in your editorial indicating that the added millage would only amount to about \$10 was very neat and tidy. Perhaps \$10 this year, but by 1975 that amount would probably be \$30 or \$35. No, Mr. Editor, best you and the mayor revise your thinking and admit the fact that a voter revolt against higher property taxes is rampant in this community as well as across the nation.

Maybe you haven't thought about it, but higher property taxes mean higher home mortgage payments. It's that simple.

I feel that Mayor McNamara's proposal to build a playground near Plymouth and Farmington - virtually within a stone's throw of beautiful Edward Hines park - is no less absurd than his comparison of "motherhood and apple pie" with an increased economic burden on homeowners.

I interpreted the mayor's statements in the Observer to mean that "if we don't hurry and solve the busing problem, the voters will refuse to accept proposals for increased property taxes and the Livonia government will grind to a halt."

That sounds to me like a mixture of childish frustration and admission of inadequacy on the part of the McNamara administration.

After 55 years on this mortal coil, I voted in my very first primary last week. And I voted "no" on every city and county proposal that advocated a raise in taxes. Your front - page editorial, so provocative to a buying homeowner - prompted me to do so, even if it was raining that day.

I also voted for John Markes, candidate for the 36th District House seat because he spoke out for tax reform, no - fault auto insurance, and tax relief for disabled veterans and senior citizens.

You see, Mr. Editor, I'm a 100 per cent service - connected disabled veteran, WWII and Korean campaign, and have been unemployed since March 1971. Yet the Livonia tax assessor and his stacked - deck board of review tell me that I'm not eligible for tax exemption benefit afforded disabled Michigan veterans.

I am buying a modest 15 - year - old home, worth about \$28,500 and my monthly mortgage payment is \$192. I make the monthly payment out of my VA compensation. And, out of the \$192 each month, \$53.66 is taken for property taxes.

"Jobs for Veterans" is a nationwide effort program to assure the returning serviceman gets a fair shake in the labor market.

The number of servicemen being discharged is rising substantially each month, and if the planned withdrawal from Viet Nam continues on schedule, most of them will be looking for jobs.

Has Congress considered the possibility of voluntary retirement with social security benefits available to any who desire to retire at a younger age than 65? Many persons currently employed would retire at 50 or 55 if social security benefits were available.

Anyone agreeing with this, we suggest you write your U.S. senator and congressman urging some action along this line.

Several dozen hours of loving labor went into the shimmering wedding gown Charlene Richardson wore Saturday afternoon when she met Kirk Spencer at the altar of Plymouth's First United Methodist Church.

Her dress was crocheted by her mother, Mrs. James A. Richardson, and a friend, Ann Mark of Livonia.

Arlene Richardson made the skirt, using a lacy fan and feather stitch to fashion its 70-inch sweep.

"I kept track of the hours, and it was 68 for that part of the work," she said. "I had to finish it by the July 4 weekend because we were leaving for our vacation."

Miss Mark, a co-worker of Mrs. Richardson's at the Hawthorn Center, took over then.

A crocheter as far back as she can remember and now a producer of custom apparel and teacher of crocheting and knitting, she had fashioned the bodice with a "simple half-double crochet" stitch with worked-in darts and a shell stitch at the neckline.

Before the holiday weekend was over, she had joined the skirt and bodice with a band of jeweled trim at the empire waistline, attached full, sheer polyester sleeves and even sewn in a perfectly concealed zipper.

Miss Mark also fashioned the satin headpiece, decorated with matching jeweled trim, to hold Charlene's sheer, bouffant veil.

How much time? "One doesn't really keep track," she said.

THE PROJECT BEGAN, somewhat unfittingly, with a christening dress. Mrs. Richardson made it

about a year ago, because she thought it would be nice for some future grandchild.

Charlene, who recently had accepted Kirk's ring, commented that the crochet pattern would make a beautiful wedding dress.

"I repeated that to Ann," Mrs. Richardson said, "and she said it could be done."

The work was begun in February and picked up speed after Charlene and Kirk set the date. The material is an imported synthetic called parafit, and its sheen gives the gown a shimmering effect. Mrs. Richardson said the total cost for materials was \$175.

"It's supposed to be machine washable," Miss Mark said, "but I'd certainly hate to see it go in a machine."

"Absolutely not," said Mrs. Richardson. "We'll handwash it, and hope it will become a family heirloom." Thirteen-year-old Sherilyn Richardson, who was one of Charlene's bridesmaids, hopes so too. She'd like to wear it to her own wedding some day.

THE BRIDE wasn't the only one with crocheted finery in Saturday's wedding.

Mrs. Richardson's mother - of - the - bride dress was light blue polyester with panels of ecru crocheted Queen Anne's lace from high waist to hem.

Two other co-workers, Mrs. Jeanne Stumpf of Livonia and Mrs. Mary Wilson of Plymouth, made it for her as a surprise.

"I really didn't see it until it was all finished," she said. "I had fittings with a bag over my head."

Ann Mark teaches crocheting and knitting at Churchill High School in the Livonia Adult Education program. She also is working on a book on crocheting and fills all sorts of custom orders for apparel.

"I've made whole wardrobes," she said. "But this is the prettiest."

Information Distribution

Jaycettes Have New Mission

A new project for Jaycee auxiliaries is aimed at softening just a bit one of the most shattering blows that can befall parents of babies.

The Jaycettes of Livonia and other Michigan communities are distributing literature and information about "sudden infant death syndrome"—SIDS for short, and also known as "crib death."

In Livonia, police and fire officers, as well as pediatricians, general practitioners, churches and funeral homes are getting kits with facts known so far about the strange disease that kills babies so suddenly.

THE PROJECT is much appreciated by the Michigan Chapter of the National Foundation for Sudden Infant Death, Inc., which had its beginnings in Livonia.

"The tragedy of putting a healthy child to bed and then finding him dead a short time later is much worse when the parents didn't know about the disease," said Mrs. Mary Pearce of Farmington, whose daughter and son-in-law lost a baby boy when they were Livonia residents several years ago.

"My daughter and her husband had heard of sudden infant death, and that helped a little," she added. "But there are so many cases in which nothing is known and couples blame themselves or each other."

MRS. MARGE RIKER, chairman of the SIDS committee for the Livonia Jaycettes, said the drive to inform the public about crib death is a state-wide one.

In this area, the Plymouth, Redford, and North Jaycette groups also have begun information distribution programs. The Livonia women will have passed out about 300 kits by the time they complete their work.

Each includes a letter from the auxiliary over Mrs. Riker's signature, asking that the recipient take a little time to study the information. There's also a booklet explaining that SIDS is not suffocation, aspiration or regurgitation, is not hereditary and is not even "freakish" since it affects between 10,000 and 15,000 babies every year.

Also in the kit is a letter from the Michigan chapter of the foundation and a list of names and telephone numbers of members who can be telephoned by tragedy-stricken parents any hour of the day or night.

THE INFORMATION is being given funeral homes Mrs. Riker said, in the hope that some visitors there will find a contribution to SIDS research an answer to the what-can-I-do question.

The U.S. Congress has appropriated \$10 million for such research, and some statistics have been compiled about how the disease occurs, but no cause has been found.

Mrs. Pearce termed the Jaycette effort another good step in the direction of making facts about SIDS better known.

"After the Muskegon Jaycettes went into action," she said, "the hospital there asked for brochures for all its graduating nurses."

ONLY A FEW years ago, she added there was great resistance to efforts by the Michigan chapter of the national foundation to send speakers out to inform people about the illness.

"It was considered too depressing. Now, as newspaper and magazine articles are published and especially since the Marcus Welby television show on the subject last year, people want to know more about it."

I wasn't so sure. Maybe I wasn't quite ready for the end of the doll era.







"The status quo can't be
changed without some effort -
so if you really care you make
that effort."

That's the philosophy that
Mrs. Paula Tobocman, busy
mother of three young sons,
puts into action. Because,
from the vantage point of a
comfortable Farmington
home, she sees a lot of status
quo that she feels needs
changing.

As human resources
chairman for the Farmington
- West Bloomfield League of
Women Voters, Mrs.
Tobocman has looked at this
area's welfare system, at
schools and education, at the
sub-standard housing within
a few miles of her own home,
at housing patterns in
suburbia.

And she's not only looked -
she's also led a committee to
take action in whatever way it
might have a chance to make
a difference.

THE COMMITTEE'S most
recent enterprise has been to
be sure fair housing posters
are displayed prominently in
all real estate offices in
Farmington.

"When this whole con-
troversy over busing came
up," she explained, "we tried
to decide as a committee how
we could be effective."

"We couldn't do anything
about school integration here,
although the league always
has taken a position for
equality of opportunity in
education, employment and
housing."

"And employment op-
portunity - well, that depends
on education. But in housing,
it seemed there might be some
action we could take."

"In February, the Depart-
ment of Housing and Urban
Development issued some new
regulations for its affirmative
fair marketing program, and
required the display of the
signs in real estate offices."

"We felt this put some teeth
into the fair housing law."

LEAGUE MEMBERS, she
pointed out, have often heard
people say in connection with
the busing controversy that
they would rather have blacks
living in the neighborhood
than see their children bused.

"If they mean it, this is the
time to push compliance with
this regulation," she added.

The checking real estate
offices, carried on in
cooperation with the North
Suburban Inter - Faith Center
for Racial Justice, will not
insure open housing in
suburbs, Paula Tobocman is
well aware the store.

"Experts say true in-
tegration in housing will take
at least three generations,"
she said. "But you have to
start somewhere."

THE DO - SOMETHING
approach has led the LWV
human resources committee
to several other kinds of action
in the matter of busing and
also the welfare situation.

"We're joining in the
Metropolitan Coalition for
Peaceful Integration," she
said, "because we believe in
law and order and peaceful
compliance to court orders."

"And we feel that if in-
tegration comes, we'd like to
be among those who want to
protect our children from
incidents like bus burnings
and threats - to see that what
happened in Pontiac doesn't
happen to us."

WELFARE REFORM and
its ramifications also was the
subject for detailed study by
Mrs. Tobocman's committee
during the past year.

"The housing allotment for
Aid to Dependent Children
families is limited at \$100 a
month," she said. "But we
studied this part of Oakland
County and found you can't
buy a home that meets
minimum standards for less
than \$10,000."

"That means that welfare
families in this area either are
living in sub - standard
housing - and we know many
are - or are putting food and
clothing money into housing,
or are living under over -
crowded conditions."

She said her committee
testified about its findings
before the Oakland County
Board of Commissioners.





Sons May Get Hair Cut

A prediction of shorter haircuts, especially for younger men, and diminishing popularity of boots, were recently made by Ken O'Keefe, fashion director of the Men's Fashion Association of America.

O'Keefe, in Detroit with a showing of fashion trends for men, said that since fathers have accepted longer hair, sons may veer away from it. The fashion director suggested that last year's popular boots will be replaced by "blunts"—shoes with a higher boxy heel, but with a squared off toe as opposed to points and stilettos.

"Boots are too hot," O'Keefe said, "men, like women, have found this out."

BETWEEN THE haircuts and the "blunts", there is a whole world of interesting clothes for men. The guys will be borrowing the "layered look" this fall and using it to coordinate lots of patterns, the boldest and most popular of which will be the plaids.

A plain sweater over a patterned shirt, topped by the

classic blazer may be the thing that ties it altogether. The layered look will generally involve at least one knit garment and a sweater is almost essential.

O'Keefe says of knits, which can be one item, a whole coordinated ensemble or a suit. "They continue to bloom."

"Baggies," a pant gathered in soft pleats at the waist and cuffed to fall at about the instep may run a close second to jeans for the young set.

Suits for the young and young at heart will show up in a variety of fabrics—velvets, corduroys, denims and brushed denims are making the scene for fall.

Black velvet will carry over to evening dress which the fashion director still feels is one aspect that should, and does, remain conservative. The big change, he notes, "You don't have to be uncomfortable in evening clothes anymore. A man can wear a cummerbund if he wants to, but it isn't necessary and the collars are soft and comfortable."

While evening wear is staying conservative and

dressy, there is a dressing down in leisure wear—it means more comfort but with style and individual identity.

SO FOR MEN this fall, it's blunt toed shoes that add up to a half inch to natural height, a mixed bag layered look with lots of bold plaids, plenty of color, comfortable fabrics, coats hitting at about the knee and the old standby blazer.

To O'Keefe, who travels the world to get the feel of the men's tastes, it's the young

men and older men who set the pace.

"The middle age man has the button-down mind," he says. "The middle age man who is just getting with the long hair has to be careful—for some long hair means instant age."

The men's fashion world is less autocratic than women's. Men tend to copy the fashions they see television and sports figures wearing and are less influenced by name designers.

Pre-School Eating Habits Are Lasting

What a child gets in the habit of eating as a preschooler pretty much indicates what he will eat in later years. And those early eating habits are generally picked up by imitating parents.

Those are the results of a recent study at Michigan State University.

For her master's thesis, Nancy Beyer studied the food habits of a group of healthy, middle - class, elementary school - age children who had been studied as preschoolers. Her findings indicate that food habits established among preschoolers remain consistent into the elementary school years.

THE STUDY also emphasizes the importance of training children to eat nutritiously at an early age.

A survey of snacking habits among the children showed that the patterns set up by the preschoolers tend to remain consistent. Those who snacked on "empty" calories — soft drinks, sweets, potato chips, etc." continued to do so, and those who ate nutritious snacks were also consistent.

Other food likes and dislikes showed some changes during the two to four years between studies. The children at the elementary school age preferred meat and mixed dishes more than they had at the younger age. Their dislike for vegetables remained about the same and the popularity of liver declined.

MISS BEYER'S study points out that children learn their food habits by imitating their parents. Therefore it is necessary, she says, that from the start parents provide children with an example of good nutrition.

It is much easier, she notes, to establish good food habits in young children than to try to correct poor ones later.

Miss Beyer will soon submit a report of her findings for publication in a professional journal. She conducted her research under the direction of Dr. Portia Morris, associate professor of food science and human nutrition.

BOARD OF EDUCATION MINUTES

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of the Plymouth Community School District, Wayne and Washtenaw Counties, Michigan, was held on Tuesday evening, July 25, 1972, in the Board Room of the Administration Building, 1024 South Main Street, Plymouth, Michigan, beginning at 8:07 o'clock.

The meeting was called to order by President Lawton.
Present: Members Benson, Graves, Lawton, Mirto, Ohno and Penar.
Absent: Member Berry.

Administrators present: Supt. Hoban, Deputy Supt. Hogan, Adm. Assistant Kee, Supervisors Sirbaugh and Goble and Principal Gorgue.
Others present: William Heath, John Ryder, Dolly Carter and Charles Kramer, P.E.A. Art, Frederick, M.E.A. Kathy Moran, Plymouth Mail & Observer, and Dorothy and Trudier Balogh. Dr. Donald Daves, Dick Eldred, Roberta Gladden, Bill Grueter, Adina Rics, Barbara Lockwood, Shirley Mack, Candi Marr, John Pruster, Adina Rics, James Rossman, Harriet and Sander Schiff, Jim Symonds and Rose Tonda.

Deputy Supt. Dr. Earl Hogan was introduced and welcomed into the School District by the Board.
Additions to the agenda were called.
It was moved by Member Graves and seconded by Member Ohno to approve the minutes of the statutory organizational meeting and regular meeting of July 10, 1972, with the following correction:

Page 6 change "Director" Goble to "Supervisor" and "cording" to "filler" in paragraph 1.

Ayes: Members Benson, Graves, Lawton, Mirto, Ohno and Penar.
Nays: None.

The motion was carried.
Suggestions from citizens were solicited. Dr. Donald Daves asked that where possible resolutions acted upon by the Board be read aloud before discussion and vote. He also inquired as to recognition of citizens at other times during the Board meetings except during the allotted time. President Lawton pointed out that allowing citizens to comment upon Board business at times other than that provided for on the agenda was subject to the discretion of the Chair.

Supt. Hoban reported on status of state aid as passed by the Legislature. If this is finalized, Plymouth should have projected receipts of approximately \$10,806,807 to \$10,900,000 with a budget figure available of \$10,600,000 to \$10,700,000. State aid itself would amount to \$1,877,004.51 or total with other funded programs of \$2,237,887.11.

Mr. Hoban also reviewed new programs at Plymouth Canton and Plymouth-Salem High Schools which will be eligible for reimbursement under the State Vocational Education Department, that of dental assistant, salesperson, child care service and integrated office occupations. He also called attention to Supplementary Report No. 20 from the Michigan Association of School Administrators, especially a report on passage of Senate Bill No. 1193 as signed by the Governor which allows school boards, with approval to use the unexpended balance of the proceeds on school district bonds for building and site projects other than what the bonds were authorized. A memorandum to Mr. John Amburger, Superintendent of Detroit House of Correction, was distributed, outlining operation of Parker High School during the coming school year. This provided for supervision, direction and administration of the school, the moving of two relocatable classrooms to the DeHooz site and provisions therefor, the appointment of Mr. Larry Masteller as ("Supervisor") expansion of facilities to the male section of the prison, etc. Supt. Hoban indicated that Councilman Carl Levin would have to approve the proposals.

It was moved by Member Mirto and seconded by Member Graves that administration be granted approval for the expenditure of \$5,000 needed for relocation of two portable classrooms at the Detroit House of Correction facility if and when its administration approved the Board's proposals regarding Parker High School.
Ayes: Members Benson, Graves, Lawton, Mirto, Ohno and Penar.
Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

It was felt that funds for the moving of the two portable classrooms to West School would be forthcoming from the Building and Site Fund No. 1.
The Board concurred in the suggestion of Administration that Continuing Education and Recreation facilities at Central School be moved temporarily to the administrative quarters so that the area could be utilized by the Director of Pupil Personnel Services and his staff on a more permanent basis.
A memorandum was submitted announcing administrative transfers for school year 1972-73 as follows:

Mr. Donald Rank from Fiegel to Tanager Elementary School, 43-week contract. Mr. Ronald South from Tanager to Fiegel Elementary School, 46-week contract. Mr. Frank Kumbacher to Pioneer Middle School as Industrial Arts teacher. Mr. Ralph Goble, temporarily added assignment as Building and Grounds Supervisor until subsequent bond issues are passed.

It was moved by Member Ohno and seconded by Member Penar that Mr. George Dodson be approved as Principal of Gallimore Elementary School, as recommended by Administration.
Ayes: Members Benson, Graves, Lawton, Mirto, Ohno and Penar.
Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

It was moved by Member Graves and seconded by Member Mirto to authorize the President and Secretary of the Board of Education to sign contracts for Superintendent and Deputy Superintendent as written by legal counsel and in accord with resolutions of Board when hired.

Member Ohno requested copies of the above-mentioned contracts.
The Board was informed of 1971-72 fractional reimbursement from Michigan Department of Education for special education director and teachers, total program cost to be \$268,082.50.
The matter of the IBM installations for payroll and personnel records was

deferred to the first meeting in August, at which time a decision would be made as to whether to go with Washtenaw or Oakland Intermediate School Districts.

Supt. Goble reviewed plans for renovation of the Bell Building. The main problem at this time is employment of an electrical contractor, but it is expected that building should be ready for occupancy within three weeks. Mr. Goble reported that the building had been purchased at a cost of \$11 per square foot but had total worth of \$30 per square foot presently, including space for 69 paved parking areas.

It was moved by Member Penar and seconded by Member Ohno that Member Graves and Deputy Supt. Hogan be appointed to a study committee to allow all possible community involvement from general citizenry in the general decisions of the School District. It was felt that reporting back to the Board by Mr. Graves and Dr. Hogan the opinions of the community would improve community relations within the District.




