It should help to Planning Commission, and in leaving the post urged a "closer working relationship" between the governmental bodies which give the agency

create a balance between industrial, commercial and residential tax base.

"The main objective would be a closer working relationship between the govern-

ments," Wright continued. He also urged development of a comprehensive plan for the total area, saying that "no single area will be able to stand alone and maintain the favorable tax position we are now enjoying.

"I believe that the townships should develop their areas so as to enhance the city, rather than cause it to decay." he advised. "A community cannot become a success, nor prosper and exist for any period of time, without an

identity." He called the PAPC "a contributing force in maintaining orderly growth, rather than growth by the developer," and said he feels the agency should be continued.

However, Wright suggested even stronger funding to permit the PAPC to live up to the image it is trying to portray of a prosperous, fast growing community.

THE PAPC now shares quarters with the Chamber of Commerce in the Mayflower Hotel and Wright expressed the view that more office space is needed to continue the dual operation.

Expressing his appreciation for the governmental cooperation given him, Wright revealed that he has a November speaking date before University of Detroit engineering and planning students when his topic will be the Greater Plymouth area.





AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE UTILITY ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH FOR THE PURPOSE OF CHANGING FIRE HYDRANT RATES ONLY

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

PART I. PURPOSE. Pursuant to the provisions of Act No 342 of the Public Acts of 1939, as amended, of Act No 94 of the Public Acts of 1933, as amended, and of certain covenants of the Township of Plymouth, for the purpose of changing fire hydrant rates charged the Township of Plymouth and of reaffirming all other portions of Ordinance XXI as heretofore amended. Ordinance XXI shall be, and the same hereby is, amended by PART II, below PART II. The Utility Ordinance of the Township of Ply nouth. Ordinance XXI, as heretofore amended, is hereby amended in the following manner and respects only

SECTION 5. Water Rates

Fire Hydrant Rates

For water used through fire hydrants for fire protection and other purposes the Township shall pay in during each fiscal year the sum of Five Dollars (\$5 00) for each fire hydrant



Most balls are made of either hard rubber or plastic. The size is standard, but weights range from seven to sixteen pounds. Children use the lighter balls, men usually pick a 14 to

16 pound ball, and women pick something in between The correct weight ball for a person is determined by that person's strength, rather than by his size or weight, although the two do go somewhat hand in hand The way to test is this. In the second step, if the shoulder drops too much. the heaviest ball you can throw comfortably. Try several of the bowl-ing center's balls before you invest. A little experimenting will tell you what weight is best for you. is so heavy the bowler cannot main-tain good control. The rule is to pick knock down more pins than a ball that
