Four persons were arrested and between 300 and 400 pounds of marijuana confiscated Friday morning in a police raid at 12899 Heritage Rd., Plymouth Township. The raid was conducted by Livonia police and the Wayne County Metro Squad.

Arraigned Friday before Plymouth District Judge Dunbar Davis on a charge of violation of the state Narcotic Law—possession of marijuana with intent to deliver—were:

Richard A. Smigelski, 26 of Detroit; Connie J. Yelinek, 21, of the Heritage address; Gary L. Reed, 21, of the Heritage address; and Gregory Daley, 21, of 7805 Sheldon, Plymouth.

All pleaded innocent. Bond was set at \$3,000 each, and pre-trial examination is scheduled for Oct. 2 in Plymouth.

Livonia police said the four had picked up the marijuana in Iowa. Police traced them from there and were waiting for them when they arrived in Plymouth. A warrant has been issued for a fifth person.

Mettetal Airport Vandalism Damages Planes, Risks Life

Potential murders, in the form of vandals, have plagued Plymouth's Mettetal Airport this summer.

Except for the fact that the pilots are trained to check their equipment carefully before takeoff, Mettetal or the surrounding neighborhoods could have been the scene of a disaster.

This danger hovers over the airport because pranksters have drained gasoline tanks, poured pop into tanks, broken off omni antennas (a vital part of the plane's navigating equipment), and poured windshield cleaner into the gasoline tank of another

plane. A stop watch, used by the pilot for instrument flying, was taken from a plane.

ALL THAT WAS needed was for a pilot to take off with a foreign substance in the plane's gasoline tank, and we would have had an accident," Robert Mettetal, owner of the airport said.

"A pilot, not noticing that the omni antenna on his plane had been broken or cut off, could also end up in trouble," he added.

"What these vandals don't seem to realize is that they could be committing murder

by tampering with the air-planes.

"Damage to the airplanes is also punishable, and in the case of a juvenile, the parent is responsible."

METTETAL'S statement was backed up legally by District Judge Dunbar Davis, who said that if vandalism causes a death, the person responsible could be charged with manslaughter or murder.

"Parents of a juvenile who is caught intentionally damaging equipment are responsible for payment of damages up to \$1,500 under state law," Davis said.

The judge cited State of

Michigan statutes which cover this situation. The law says:

"Actions for malicious destruction of property or bodily injury by minors. A municipal corporation, county, township, village, school district, department of the state, person, partnership, corporation, association, or an incorporated or unincorporated religious organization may recover damages in an amount not to exceed \$1,500 in a civil action in a court of competent jurisdiction against the parents or parent of an unemancipated minor, living with his parents or parent, who has maliciously or willfully destroyed real, personal

or mixed property which belongs to the municipal corporation, county, township, village, school district, department of the state, person, partnership, corporation, association, or religious organization incorporated or unincorporated or who has maliciously or willfully caused bodily harm or injury to a person."

DAVIS SAID that should death result from an act of vandalism, anyone over 17 years of age could be charged with murder.

Aside from the fact that death or serious injury could result from this airport vandalism, the cost of repairing the planes runs high.

"The cost of replacing some of these antennas runs as high as \$300," Mettetal said. "Just the cost of replacing lost gasoline is a needless expense when the plane owner has to pay for the prank of some unthinking person."

He explained that when a foreign substance is placed in the gasoline tanks, the plane owner must pay to have the tank cleaned. This could cost more than \$100.

The danger of fire is also present in draining gasoline tanks, Mettetal said.

"We had one instance where 40 gallons of gasoline were drained out of an airplane which was parked on concrete. Should any sort of spark, even from cleats on the person's shoe, been near the gasoline, we could have had someone seriously injured."

METTETAL SAID that there had been previous cases of persons stealing gasoline from the airport. But until this summer, there had been no vandalism.

"We have 200 airplanes based here," he stated, "some of them valued at between \$400,000 and \$500,000. They are

all privately owned, some by companies, some by individuals. There are, also, planes coming in from all over the United States and Canada.

There are lots of kids who visit the airport on their bikes, but they are not supposed to be near the airplanes."

Mettetal said some of the vandalism has been done in the hangars and that he suspected some were the acts of juveniles.

"There have been candy wrappers and popcorn found near the planes, leading us to believe the acts were committed by youths, he said.

REPORTS OF the vandalism have been made to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and to the Wayne County Sheriff and state police.

"The FAA takes no action unless there is an accident," Mettetal said. "However, the sheriff's department has been able to lift some fingerprints from the planes that have been damaged."

He said that he had put up "no trespassing" signs around the hangars, but that they had been torn down.

"Putting a fence around the area would do no good. In addition to the expense of enclosing the 75 acres, it has been proven in other instances that vandals will climb the fence to commit their acts," he stated.

Mettetal is a busy airport. In 1970 and 1971, some 100,000 planes came and went from the field.

Careful piloting and trained mechanics have kept accidents to a minimum. Vandals, however, pose a new threat to the safety of pilots and the surrounding community.

Mettetal hopes that those who are committing these acts will come to realize that they are flirting with murder.

Finlan Case Ready For Trial

Donald Crenshaw, 29, accused of shooting Plymouth businessman Charles Finlan last May 31, will appear for trial Monday before Circuit Judge Thomas Foley.

Crenshaw, who has been charged with assault with intent to commit murder, has been free on \$35,000 bond while awaiting trial.

Finlan is still recovering from the shooting attack which took place about 6 p.m. in the parking lot next to his office at 500 S. Main.

CRENSHAW WAS arrested about 15 minutes after the May 31 shooting at a police roadblock on North Territorial Rd. near Napier. At the time of the arrest, police said they found an automatic pistol on the floor of his car. A card in his wallet identified him as a federally licensed gun dealer.

Intensive investigation as to the motive behind the shooting has been conducted by Plymouth police as well as other police agencies.

Police Chief Timothy Ford said in June that "we are convinced a conspiracy did exist in the shooting of Charles Finlan."

He declined to mention names but did say the conspiracy didn't occur in Plymouth. He said that evidence and information by Plymouth police was turned over to other police agencies who have jurisdiction over the case.

Ford said that evidence that the shooting was "prior

planned and premeditated is piling up.

"WE HAVE further evidence that this shooting was planned well in advance but can't release that information at the present time," Ford added.

The chief said that there was no concrete evidence that the shooting was a "hit," a term for a planned shooting.

Ford also said that Finlan indicated he suspected who was responsible for the attack. Finlan is reported to have made this statement to one of the witnesses to the shooting.

THE TRIAL of David L. Bennett, the 17-year old youth accused of killing Mrs. Vivian Berry last May 9, has been postponed to Oct. 3 from the prior date of Sept. 19.

This is the second time the trial date has been postponed. Bennett was originally scheduled to appear in Wayne County Circuit Court on Aug. 21.

Postponement from that date was granted because the approximately 1,100 page transcript of the pre-trial examination had just been completed, giving defense attorneys Dan Bures and Jerry Raymond little time to study it.

The latest postponement was by mutual agreement between defense attorneys and the prosecution, Bures said.

"There are still some preliminary legal matters to be disposed of," Bures said. "In addition both sides are

still studying the long transcripts of the pre-trial examination.

Bennett remains in Wayne County jail.

MRS. BERRY, wife of the Wayne County Road Commission Chairman Michael Berry was brutally slain in their Plymouth Township home the morning of May 9.

Bennett was arrested the same evening while attending typing class in Central school. According to Wayne County

Sheriff reports, a switchblade knife was found in Bennett's school locker. Deputies also claimed they have his fingerprints from the scene.

Defense attorneys had attempted to have the murder charge against Bennett dismissed, claiming there had been a lack of search warrants and that Bennett had been detained prior to his arraignment. These motions were denied by District Judge Dunbar Davis following pre-trial examination in May.

New Members Sought In 1-Day C. Of C. 'Blitz'

Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce members will pair up in two-man teams Tuesday to conduct a "blitz day" campaign among business, industrial and commercial leaders in an attempt to bolster their ranks.

The Chamber has more than 300 firms and individuals on its present membership roster, but as is often said by its officials, "It's amazing how many don't belong, but should."

Co-chairmen of the membership committee, who have planned this crash program, are Paul Reifel and Roland Lutz.

Two-man sales teams have been set up to canvass the area and they will be briefed Tuesday morning before making their calls on a list of prospects compiled during recent weeks.

John A. Thomas, president of the Chamber, pointed out that the organization is now in its 51st year but must improve its effectiveness through increased participation and increased membership.

"THE CHAMBER is an association of business and professional men and women, corporations, business and civic groups organized to advance, develop and foster the commercial, financial, industrial and civic interests of Plymouth and surrounding area," said Thomas.

"However, we need to get off the ground and improve both our effectiveness and financial structure by getting

more people and more commercial units active."

Strength was added to Thomas' position this week by John H. Henrikson, a sales promotion and advertising official of Michigan Bell who was the principal speaker at a Chamber luncheon.

In a discussion of changing patterns in "today's suburbia," Henrikson emphasized that during the past five years "Plymouth's overall population for the entire area has risen from 26,600 to 41,700. The number of families in the area has also risen at a similar rate, from 8,400 in 1967 to 13,200 today."

"RETAIL SALES for the Plymouth area have jumped during the past five years from \$52 million to more than \$64 million per year. There are very few towns remaining today which, like Plymouth, have been able to maintain the quaint, old atmosphere downtown, surrounded by modern shopping centers and industrial complexes."

"Surveys, projections, anticipations and many other types of statistical gymnastics can show us trends from which we can build hopes and dreams."

"But there are only a few concrete factors that will make those hopes and dreams come true. All of the surveys and projections in the world won't replace solid faith in your community and a total commitment from all to work and strive to make your town the place that others want to call home."

Youth Center Expands With 7 New Projects

A program of activities that touches just about any youthful interest is offered this month at the Plymouth Youth Center.

The center is launching its fall and winter season with a calendar of events which includes seven new projects. However, the glass recycling program is being dropped because of a lack of community support, according to Director Dale Yegiel. He recommends that glass be taken to the Ann Arbor recycling station or the Redford Township glass facility.

Among the fall's new features is a workshop late this month on jobs outside the mainstream which the center calls "vocational for social change."

Commencing Sept. 25 a center tutoring project will serve young people having difficulty with school work and tutors are sought in foreign languages, science and math. Young or old interested in helping tutor are invited to call the center.

ANOTHER newcomer to the

youth calendar is a Film Guild where young people, for a \$5 membership fee, may arrange showings of movies they have wanted to see but missed.

Also kicking off this month for a continuing season are the Poorman's Coffeehouse and Soup Kitchen, Korean karate lessons, a silk screen workshop and pottery making. Yoga will continue with Yoga Podma of the Integral Yoga Institute leading the group in meditation and exercise beginning at 7 p.m. Sept. 19.

The local chapter of the Bobby Fischer Fan Club will continue to meet for chess at 7 p.m. Sept. 20. Players and would-be players are invited to join. A traveling tournament team will be formed to play in the metropolitan area.

The coffeehouse, open from 8 to 11 p.m., will feature Dan Tripp Sept. 16. Music and food will be offered throughout the fall and winter.

KOREAN KARATE will begin from 7 to 9 p.m. Sept. 18 and the class is open to any proficiency.

The silk screen workshop, the center's first artists'

workshop, will hold its first session at 7 p.m. Sept. 21. Bob Houtz will teach the process which is used for poster making, shirt designs and Christmas cards.

Rick Pike and Jill Bassett will coordinate the pottery making project whose goal is to produce goods that the maker will be proud of and which may be sold at the Christmas art sale.

ORDINANCE 27.13 '72

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BY AMENDING THE ZONING MAP.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

PART I. That the Township Zoning Ordinance No. 27 is hereby amended by amending the Zoning Map, by changing those areas indicated on the Amended Zoning Map No. 55 attached hereto and made a part of this Ordinance, pursuant to Section 14 of Act No. 184, P.A. 1943, as amended, for the purpose of conforming the provisions of said Ordinance No. 27 and said Zoning Map to the decrees of the Wayne County Circuit Court, being a Court of Competent Jurisdiction, as to specific lands.

PART II. CONFLICTING PROVISIONS REPEALED

Any Ordinance or parts of any Ordinance in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

PART III. EFFECTIVE DATE

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, welfare, morals and safety and are hereby ordered to take immediate effect and be in force from and after the earliest date allowed by law.

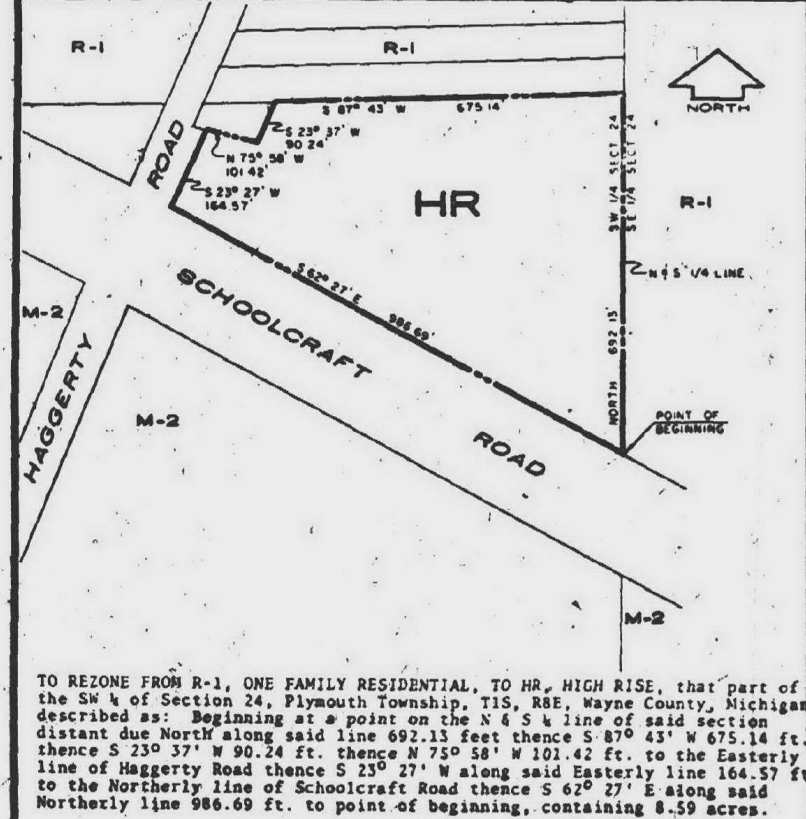
PART IV. ADOPTION

BOARD OF EDUCATION MINUTES

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of the Plymouth Community School District, Wayne and Washtenaw Counties, Michigan, was held on Monday evening, August 14, 1972, in the Board Room of the Administration Building, 1024 S. Mill Street, Plymouth, Michigan, beginning at 8:05 p.m. The meeting was called to order by President Lawton.

Present: Members Benson, Graves, Lawton, Mirto, Ohno and Penar.

Absent: Member Berry.

(Member Berry arrived at 8:45 p.m.)

Administrative present: Sup't. Hoben, Deputy Sup't. Hogan, Assistant Sup'ts. Blunk and Gibson, Admin. Assistant - Personnel Kee, Supervisor of Purchasing and Cafeterias Sirbaugh, Supervisor of New Construction Goble and Principal Nichols.

Others Present: R. K. Bairbour, National Bank of Detroit; Bill Heath, Ray Homer, John Ryder, P.E.A., Kathy Moran, Plymouth Mail & Observer, and Dorothy Balogh, Trivadar Balogh, Dr. Donald Davies, Roberta Gladden, Joe Gray, Dick Kirchgatter, Shirley Mack, John Shimko, Jr., Wendell E. Stowell, and Jim Symonds.

President Lawton requested Secretary Mirto to open and publicly read bids received for the purchase of the \$2,500,000 Tax Anticipation Note. Secretary Mirto opened and read bids as follows:

Detroit Bank and Trust - Interest Rate 2.74%

National Bank of Detroit - Interest Rate 2.59%

It was moved by Member Ohno and seconded by Member Graves that the bid of National Bank of Detroit for the purchase of the Two Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) Tax Anticipation Notes of the School District, against the December 1, 1972 tax, authorized by the Board of Education at a meeting held on June 27, 1972, be accepted and that the Secretary be authorized to return the certified check of the unsuccessful bidder as promptly as possible.

Ayes: Members Benson, Graves, Lawton, Mirto, Ohno and Penar.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

It was moved by Member Ohno and seconded by Member Graves to approve the minutes of the regular meeting held July 25, 1972, with the following corrections:

Page 2: Paragraph 1 - Line 3: Add "building and site" between words "for" and "projects".

Page 2: Paragraph 2 - Line 5: Change "Principal" to "Supervisor".

Page 4: Paragraph 5 - Lines 5, 6 and 7: Delete lines 5, 6 & 7.

Ayes: Members Benson, Graves, Lawton, Mirto, Ohno and Penar.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

It was moved by Member Mirto and seconded by Member Ohno to approve the minutes of the special meeting held August 3, 1972, with the following correction:

Page 1: Last paragraph - Lines 4 and 5: Change "that the guarantee extend for one year from the date the final sale has been completed" to "that the guarantee extend for two years from the date the tartan floor is completed and ready for use".

Ayes: Members Benson, Graves, Lawton, Mirto, Ohno and Penar.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

Suggestions from citizens were solicited. Mr. Joseph Gray requested information concerning the reasons for the reassignment of the Tanager Elementary School and Fegiel Elementary School principals and the change in the administrative structure at Plymouth Salem High School and Plymouth Canton High School. Superintendent Hoben provided the explanations for the changes made.

President Lawton requested Secretary Mirto to read correspondence dated August 2, 1972, from the Executive Office of the President, Pay Board, directed to Mr. Arthur Frederick, Executive Director of the Plymouth Education Association, declaring the decision in the correspondence dated June 6, 1972, null and void and indicating that the parties may wish to submit additional information and documentation for Pay Board reconsideration.

Secretary Mirto read correspondence dated August 9, 1972, from Mr. Arthur Frederick to Mr. Lawton, President of the Board of Education, enclosing the copy of the recent ruling of the Pay Board and indicating that the Plymouth Education Association would appeal the decision and request reconsideration of the application.

It was moved by Member Mirto and seconded by Member Graves that the correspondence be accepted.

Ayes: Members Benson, Graves, Lawton, Mirto, Ohno and Penar.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

Mr. Heath indicated to the Board of Education that the appeal to the Pay Board had been filed. The Board requested a copy of the Plymouth Education Association appeal. Mr. Heath indicated he would provide them with one.

It was moved by Member Graves and seconded by Member Ohno that Plymouth Junior Football, Inc. be permitted to use the Central School Football Field as per the terms listed in correspondence of July 31, 1972.

Ayes: Members Benson, Graves, Lawton, Mirto, Ohno and Penar.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

In view of the fact that a quorum of members of the Board of Education would not be available on August 22, 1972, President Lawton announced that the August 22, 1972 meeting would be cancelled and that a special meeting would be held August 29, 1972.

Sup't. Hoben announced that investments of Building and Site and Debt Retirement monies in Detroit Bank and Trust had been made as per resolution of the Board of Education.

THROUGH BIFOCALS
By FRED DeLANO / Editor Mail & Observer

HAPPY BIRTHDAY to the Plymouth Mail which, as you know, became the Mail & Observer several years ago. This, you see, is the Mail's 85th anniversary, for Vol. 1, No. 1 first appeared on Sept. 16, 1887.

J.H. Steers, who was the editor and proprietor, probably wouldn't recognize the business face of the community as we know it today, but he at least would find a recognizable landmark in the form of Kellogg Park.

Those were the days of dirt roads and wooden sidewalks, and the main business block was right where it is today, opposite the park. Twice fire destroyed all the buildings along that block, first in

1856 and again in 1893, and the structures that were built in the following years still partially remain.

Much can be learned of Plymouth's history by perusing the 36-page volume of pictures and data published in 1968 by Sam Hudson, and if you are new to the area you would do well to find a copy at the library or Chamber of Commerce. You would find its pages fascinating.

AT THE TIME of the Plymouth centennial celebration in 1967, we were able to reproduce the first page of that original edition of the Mail, and it is interesting to review it from time to time and see what made the news in Mr. Steers' day.

His front page was dominated by an ad of the George A. Starkweather - which declared, "Public name, even to newcomers - which declared, "Public sentiment has declared us entitled to first place in the ranks of dealers in dry goods, hats and caps, shoes and slippers, rubbers, millinery, carpets, wallpaper, crockery and glassware, fancyware, cutlery, groceries, etc."

Mr. Steers filled two columns of that page with one-paragraph notes, all under the heading, "What They Say."

Among them he had no qualms in plugging his new product with this tid bit: "This copy of the Mail is given you for perusal. The price is one dollar per year. We hope that you may see that amount of value in it and that you will hand in a dollar for the same at once."

SOCIAL AND BUSINESS items were treated equally, ranging from the fact that "George Wills has opened a blacksmith shop in the old John Bennett building" to this gem, "Smith, the peach man northwest of town, had about 140 bushels this season."

I have no way of knowing what Mr. Steers' religious affiliation was, but the Baptists came in for two good plugs in Vol. 1, No. 1 and the Presbyterians only one, if that is any tipoff. For instance:

"The young ladies of the Baptist church will give a peach and cream social at the parsonage this evening. As the ladies are anxious to make several dollars they would be pleased to have a good turnout."

We also find that "Marvin Berdan's house has been receiving a new roof this week" and "The wife of Julius Penniman, we are sorry to say, is very sick with hemorrhage of the lungs."

And do you know, there wasn't a word anywhere about teachers and school board disagreeing over money, nothing about political disputes, and best of all, not a line about thefts, fatal accidents or busing.

\$50,000 Bond Set

Royal Brousseau, 53, of 45004 Ford Rd., Canton Township, is awaiting pre-trial examination Sept. 20 in 22nd District Court, Inkster, charged with receiving stolen property in excess of \$100. He was arraigned last Tuesday, and bond was set at \$50,000.

Brousseau was arrested last weekend by State Police and Wayne County sheriffs deputies in a combined area raid which netted more than

\$180,000 in contraband. The raid encompassed Inkster, Garden City and Livonia.

Arrested along with Brousseau, who operated a gasoline station in Inkster, was James Nelson of Livonia.

THE RAID is believed by police to have broken up one of the largest "fencing" operations in the western Wayne County area and is suspected to be tied to the drug traffic.

The raid came after more than eight months of observation and investigation of Brousseau's gasoline station.

Police say stolen property had passed through the gasoline station, Brousseau's home, and Nelson's home. According to police, more than 200 assorted firearms and 5,000 rounds of ammunition were recovered at Brousseau's and Nelson's homes.

More than 20 officers were involved in the raid.

Lawton Cool To PEA Arbitration Request

PLYMOUTH As negotiations continued this week between the Plymouth Education Association and school administration on terms of a new teachers' contract, the president of the board of education said he looks with skepticism at the PEA's request for binding arbitration.

PEA members voted in a general meeting Sept. 5 to ask the school board to agree to put all unsolved contract issues in the hands of a state arbitrator for settlement.

Although there has been no formal action on this request on the part of the full board, President George Lawton Friday issued a prepared statement which seemed to close the door to that possibility - at least until all avenues of local negotiation are exhausted.

SAID LAWTON: "We have a fine staff of capable teachers who deserve

compensation commensurate with the districts which surround us. We, as a board, are prepared to provide this.

"The request of the Plymouth teachers' union for arbitration at best must be looked at with skepticism."

"The chief negotiator for this union did not appear at the bargaining table from June 13 to Aug. 15. Then on Aug. 22, just one week later, the board was presented with the union's demand for arbitration. One week of negotiations could hardly be considered the basis for binding arbitration."

"IN EARLY July, the board formally offered the union complete access to the financial records of the district in an effort to share with them the immense pressures on our budget during the coming year. To this date, no serious and thorough examination has been made. "This board has been, and is, willing to negotiate a fair and equitable contract with our local teachers' union. We are not ready to stand quietly by and let our district be used as a target district by elements outside our community."

"Neither is the thinly veiled threat of strike going to drive us into settlement which is not fair to the total district - students, teachers and citizens alike."

"It is my sincere hope that our educational system, which has accepted the responsibility for teaching our young people, will set an example of objectivity and fair play at the bargaining table."

PLYMOUTH "Drug Abuse - a Game Without Winners" will be the topic for the Plymouth Optimist Club's dinner meeting at 7 p.m. Sept. 18 at Hillside Inn. Speaker will be Fred Luxton of Parke-Davis Co.

The bargaining teams met Wednesday, after which Ray Homer, chief PEA negotiator, reported "some movement," and they are due to meet again for resumption of talks Sunday afternoon. Meanwhile, teachers are being paid on a day-to-day basis under terms of the 1971-72 contract.

Thomas Root To Manage School Farm

PLYMOUTH Plymouth's Rotary school farm has a new manager this year - Thomas S. Root who was raised on a farm and has studied agricultural education.

Root, 28, graduated from Ithaca High School and completed 117 hours in agricultural education and the biological and physical sciences at Michigan State University and intends to complete his degree in the near future.

He was recently employed as a field representative with Smith-Douglass division of Borden Chemical Inc. where he worked with farmers. Root also is a former Junior 4H leader.

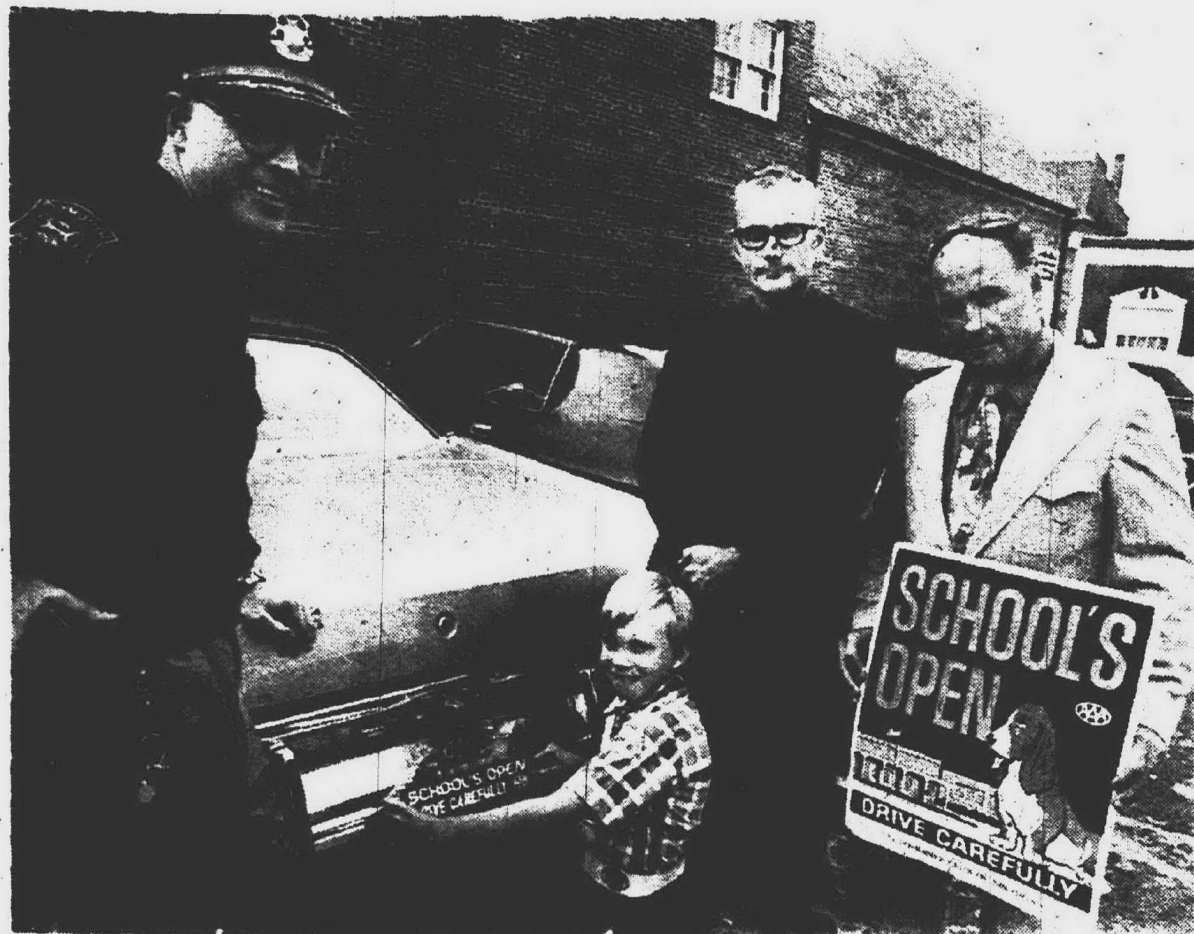

The Stroller... What's In A Name!

"I take it, you're a Michigander," the young man said as The Stroller took a seat at the visitors table to make up a meeting of his luncheon club out-state.

"No, not a Michigander," the young visitor was told, "but a Michigander."

"How come?" he asked, "why do you use the letters 'er' instead of the 'ns' that is most often used around the country?"

It was a good question, and while no one at the table had an answer it did open up a most interesting discussion.

IF YOU LOOK down the list of states in the Union, you'll find that most of them use the "ian" as a suffix, and there's no sound rule by which the practice started.

For instance, you'll read of Ohioans, Pennsylvanians, Virginians, Minnesotans, Kansans, Texans and so on down the line.

Granted it would sound rather peculiar to refer to anyone from Ohio as an Ohioer, or a fellow from Pennsylvania as a Pennsylvanian.

It became rather plain during this discussion that it was simply a matter of smoother sounding words to use the letters "an" with some states and not with others until the young visitor, seemingly eager to gain some unusual knowledge, asked, "I can understand that -- but why do you folks in Michigan add a 'd' and refer to residents as

Michiganders? Michiganders would sound better."

THE DISCUSSION took a serious turn when the young visitor, who acknowledged he was from the east, rattled off the names of the states that used "an" and compared them with the few that used the "er", such as Michigan, Maryland, Vermont, and was doing all right in making his point until some one asked, "What about Maine down in your country? It uses neither 'er' nor 'an'. The same goes for Massachusetts and New Hampshire. Why do you group them all as New Englanders or Yankees?"

"And why do you break the chain and refer to a person from Rhode Island as a Rhode Islander?"

The question brought no answer, rather a shrug of the shoulder.

FINALLY, ONE of the other visitors cut in with the remark that the same question we had been discussing about the states could apply to cities.

He pointed out that a person from Chicago always is referred to as a "Chicagoan" and never as a "Chicaguer."

"Down in your own section of the state, you use a variation. There's where a fellow from Southfield would be a Southfielder, and a fellow from Farmington would be Farmingtonian. How do you figure that one?"

Well, The Stroller admitted, there didn't seem to be rhyme or reason, but the references were handed down from one generation to another, and

that was good enough.

THE QUESTION of identification with one's city or town arose in Plymouth several years ago when the city was about to celebrate its centennial.

At the time, the city was cheered by the news that the lord mayor of Plymouth, England, had accepted an invitation and would spend the entire week of the centennial in Plymouth along with several members of his city council.

"We Plymouthians will be delighted to join with you in the celebration," he wrote. "Plymouthians!" This was a new one, for it has been the custom for years to refer to Plymouth, Mich. residents as "Plymouthites."

Yet, in all correspondence with the folks from across the sea, they always referred to "Plymouthians."

Why they dropped the "u" from the name of their city and why they didn't use the term "Plymouthites" they couldn't explain; but they did get a good laugh out of the use of the word "Plymouthite."

IT WAS MINDFUL of the old question:

"If a man from Michigan is a Michigander, is his wife a Michigander?"

Or the other old one: "You can tell a man from Harvard -- but you can't tell him much."

Strange, isn't it, the odd discussions that often become a part of the lunch hour?

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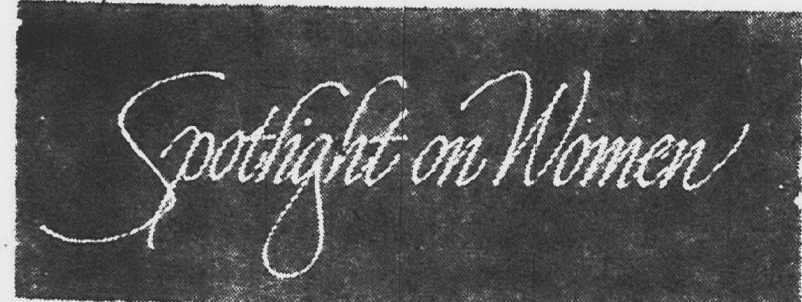
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AAUW To Study Quality Of Life In Livonia

Beardsley labels his receiver department the 'best he has ever had at Farmington,' in Jim Eveleth, Al Firek, Bob Drake and Bill Cox.

Turf Tips, Quips

Detroit Race Course officials saw a dream come true Thursday when 20 horses entered the \$100,000 added Michigan Mile and an eighth and the state's richest stake had to be divided into two divisions.

Thus a race that could have gone for as much as \$150,000 now becomes worth \$158,000 with \$79,000 up for taking in each division. The winner will collect \$51,000.

And that makes that day's chore well worth while. More than that it means two owners will pick up a check of that size where only one would have collected the big money if the field had been less than 16.

There was a bit of scrambling when Director of Racing Norris Gwin announced the field had been divided in accordance with the Australian system. This places the top weighted in one division and the second top weighted in the other. The same system is used throughout all of the 20 starters.

"This assures us of tight competition in both divisions," said Gwin. "We will have two evenly matched fields by weight and it should result in two of the finest races in the 24-year history of the Michigan Mile."

Asked which horses he thought looked best in each division, Gwin took refuge under the ancient dodge "I'll have to go by the way I weighted the horses. The two I feel should carry the most weight would have to be my choices."

Others in the gathering of owners, trainers, jockeys, turf writers and representatives of radio and television stations, didn't agree with Gwin but the results of the two divisions will determine who is right.

For the benefit of those interested, Autobiography is top weighted at 119 pounds in the first division and Droll Role at 122 in the second.

PERSONALLY we lean towards Whisk and King's Bishop in the first race and Triumphant and Monte Christo 2nd in the second. The races are listed as the seventh and ninth on the card which means the first will go around 5:30 p.m. and the second at about 6:30 p.m.

All we can say is the weatherman has ordered perfect weather. The track is fast, the field is the largest every with the most money in history at stake and it appears as if the crowd will be the largest ever to attend the Michigan Mile during the last summer meeting.

And that means those expecting to find parking space should arrive early. Every indication points to the biggest turnout of the year. It's about time horse lovers and those who like to wager a bob or two show their appreciation to a management

that has brought the biggest field in 24 years to the area. Just imagine, the first running of the Michigan Mile was for \$3,000 as an overnight event and today's running will go for almost \$160,000. How times have changed.

JOE O'BRIEN, the aging harness driver who, like wine, seems to get better with age, once again proved his ability to rate his horses when he scored an amazing upset in the \$10,216 breeders' filly three-year-old pace Thursday at Hazel Park.

Romalie Hanover, generally considered the best of the filly crop this year with earnings of \$109,256 and a record of 13 wins in 16 starts, went postward as the odds-on favorite.

All this was a natural thing for the bettors. After all Romalie had a winning mark of 1:57.3 and looked like a sure thing if there ever was one.

Billy Houghton, who has to be considered one of the top drivers in the land, had Pammy Lobell with a mark of 11 times in the money in 15 starts, earnings of \$61,885 and a clocking of 2:00.1.

Stan Dancer had Decorum with a bankroll of \$28,990 this year and then there was O'Brien with the Canadian-owned and bred Armbr Mimi with a share of 13 checks in 22 outings, \$39,417 in the bank and a clocking of 2:01.2.

With all of that talent small wonder that tiny Joey went to the post as a 12-1 longshot. But typical of the veteran Canadian, Joe kept his filly off the pace until midway through the backstretch when he sped up on the outside to pass the leading Romalie Hanover and actually open up two lengths as the field turned into the stretch.

That's when Driver Roland Beaulieu apparently had all the confidence in the world that his filly could overtake the leading Mimi in the long stretch.

had no thought of losing. Romalie did pull up within a half length but when the numbers were flashed on the board it was Armbr Mimi with Romalie Hanover second. The payoff was a fat \$27.60, indicating it doesn't pay to overlook an O'Brien when the chips are on the line.

The story was a bit different in the \$29,700 Brown Jug Trial three-year-old pace where Houghton showed his skill with an easy win behind Silent Majority.

The son of Henry T. Adios, who has to rank with the top two or three pacers in the division, isn't eligible for the Brown Jug next week in Delaware, O.

But Silent Majority was very much a loud majority this time, taking the lead after a half mile and then pulling away to win handily in 2:02. Bruce Nickells' Fast Clip was second and Michigan-owned Creeder Limbo was coming fastest of all in the stretch for third.

The two stakes ended Grand Circuit activities at Hazel Park, a series that was marked with rain most of the time and a resultant slow track. The strip was fast Thursday as the times of 2:01 in the filly pace and 2:02 in the Jug Trial showed. The latter could have been much faster had the competition pushed the winner.

The Eastern Chapter of the National Drag Boat Association will present the last race of the year at Ford Lake in Ypsilanti, Sunday, Sept. 17.

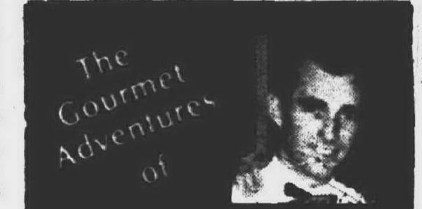
The N.D.B.A. officials expect a large turn out of boats with some coming from Virginia, Kentucky and St. Louis.

There was a time—not too many years ago—when every bowler dreamed of the day when he could register a 600 series and the thought of averaging 200 was just about out of the question.

But the double century figure no longer is the main target. It now has been boosted to 700 and even these sky rocketing series are more numerous now than the magic 600 used to be, even among the stars.

What has caused the change?

There could be many reasons, most of them centered on the fact that we now have better conditions. These conditions include uniform lanes and pins. In days gone by each proprietor had his own idea of how the lanes should be conditioned with the result that the bowler seldom bowled under the same conditions two or three nights in a row.

ASIDE FROM THAT, in the days before plastic coated pins came into being, the bowler was asked to shoot at all sorts of targets. Oft times there were tall and short pins, lop-sided pins, and greatly bashed in pins.

Now, because of the plastic coating, and other improvements such as firm bottoms, conditions are the same and the bowlers now concentrate on their game. The result is higher scores.

Not the least in the reasons for better scoring is the fact that the bowlers now compete oftener and the more practice, the better results. Or so they claim.

A FINE EXAMPLE of the new trend came during the opening week of league competition throughout Observerland where at least three 700's were posted. Such performances were almost unheard of during the

opening week in years gone by.

Bob Cassar, at Garden Lanes, and Aaron Lipshey, the pro shop manager at Merri-Bowl, shared top scoring honors with counts of 713.

Cassar posted his big series on the opening night of the Garden Lanes Classic, when he put together games of 214, 256 and 243 for a 713.

Then came Lipshey, bowling in the Suburban Travelling League at Wonderland Lanes.

He opened with a 279 and followed with a 250. He was well on his way to a real series, only to find the pressure too much and he slumped to 184 for a finishing game and his 713.

Cassar had to be on the ball to pace the Garden Classic, where competition reached a high note.

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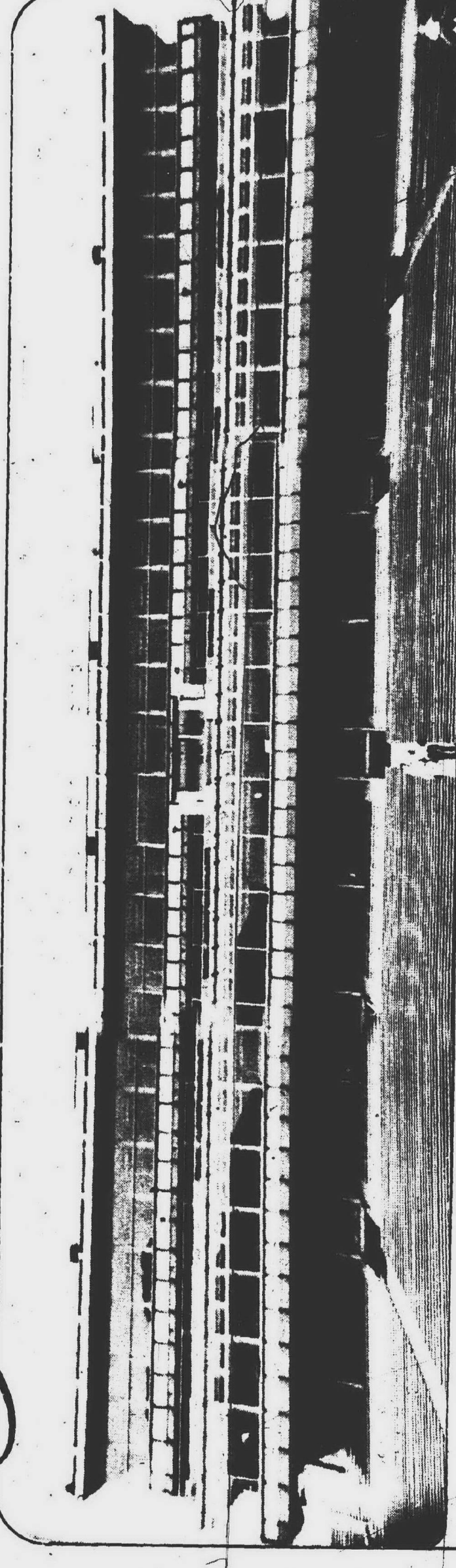
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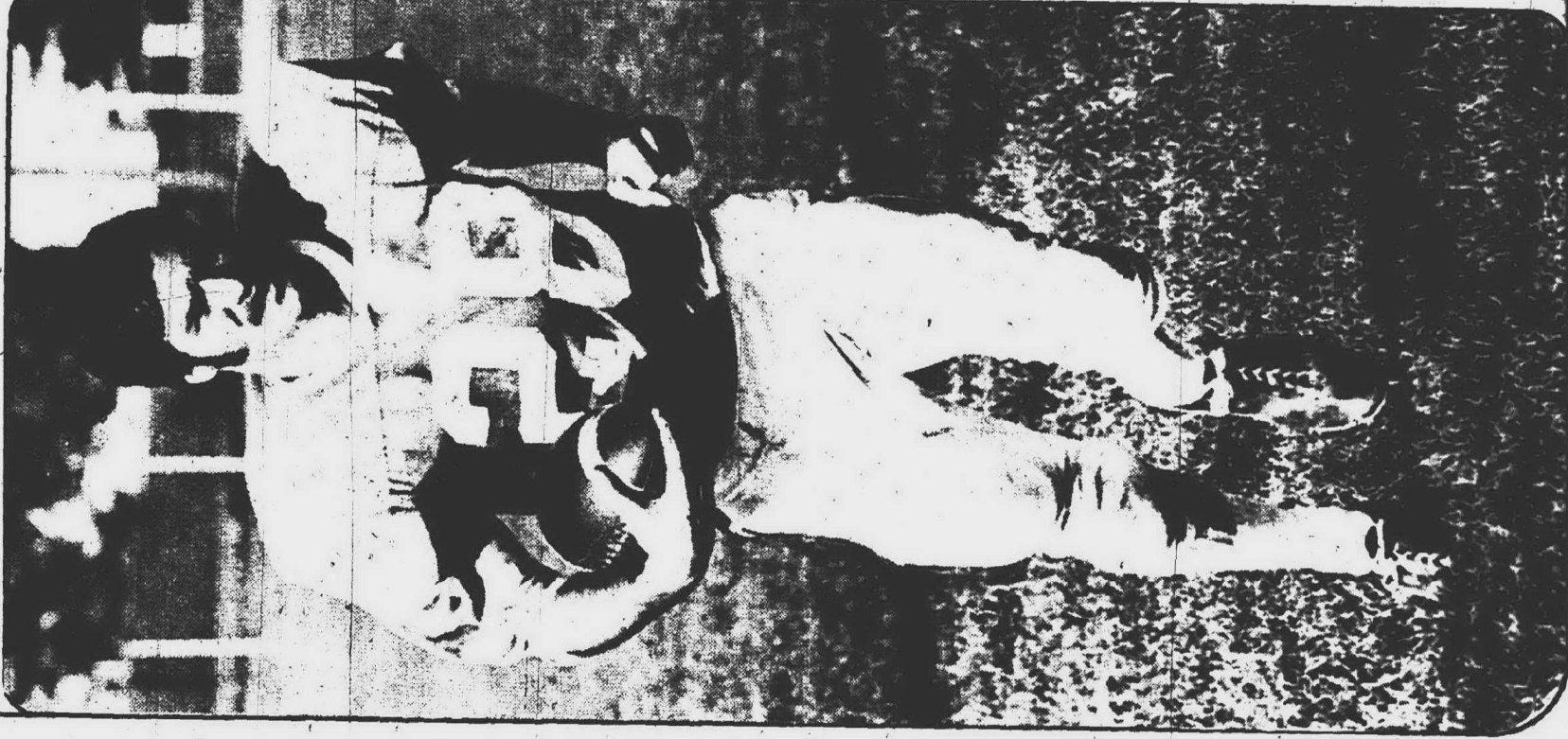

Harrison sports 16 returning lettermen including 10 starters and Herrington has a tough assignment ahead of him to prove to opponents that Harrison wasn't all Manos.

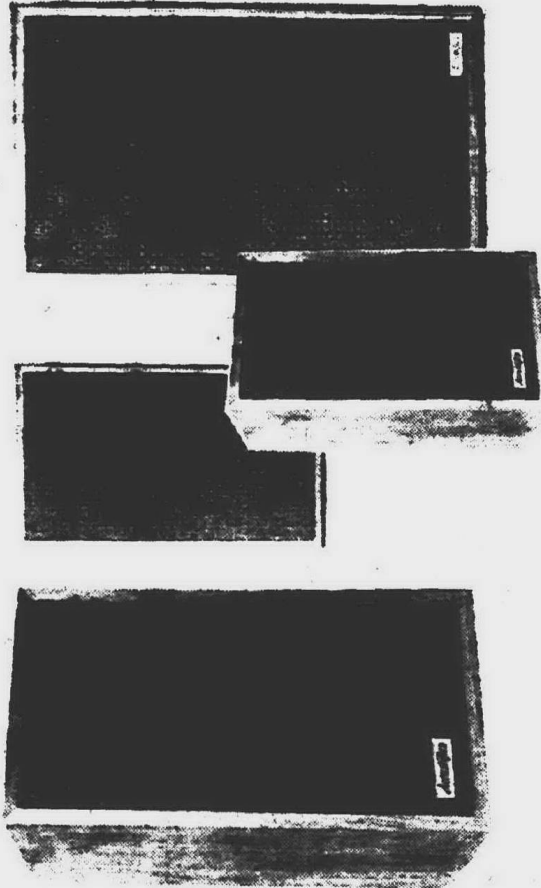
The Hawks finished 1-4 in non-league competition last season to finish at the .500 mark overall.

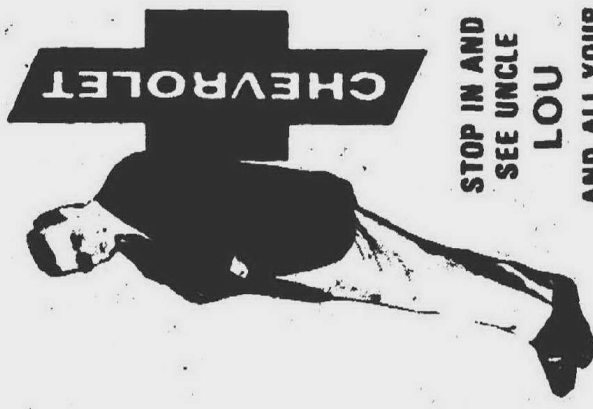

Garden City East is the "rookie" team this fall, filling the shoes of Birmingham Groves.

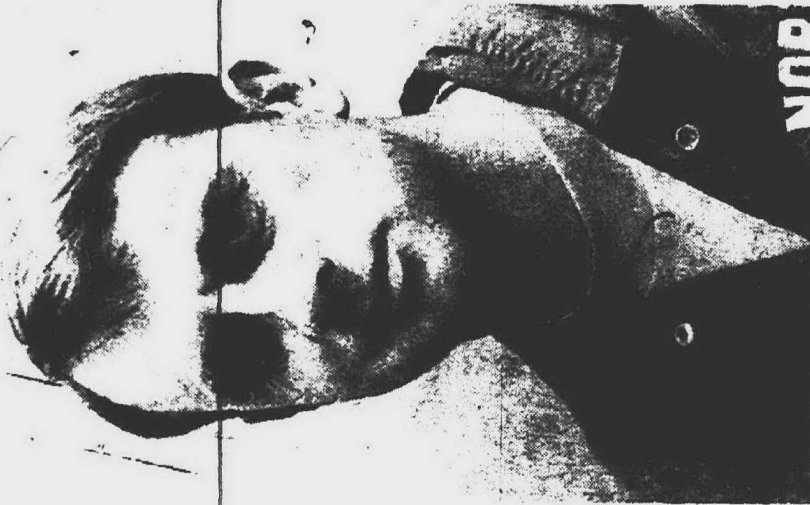
The Mid-Wayne league of which East was a member, collapsed and with Groves moving to the Metro Suburban Conference with Southfield Lathrup, East has stepped in.

Glenn has never won the league outright and finished at 3-2 last year in the conference and 5-3 overall.

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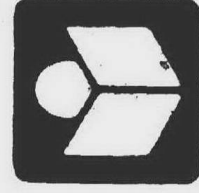
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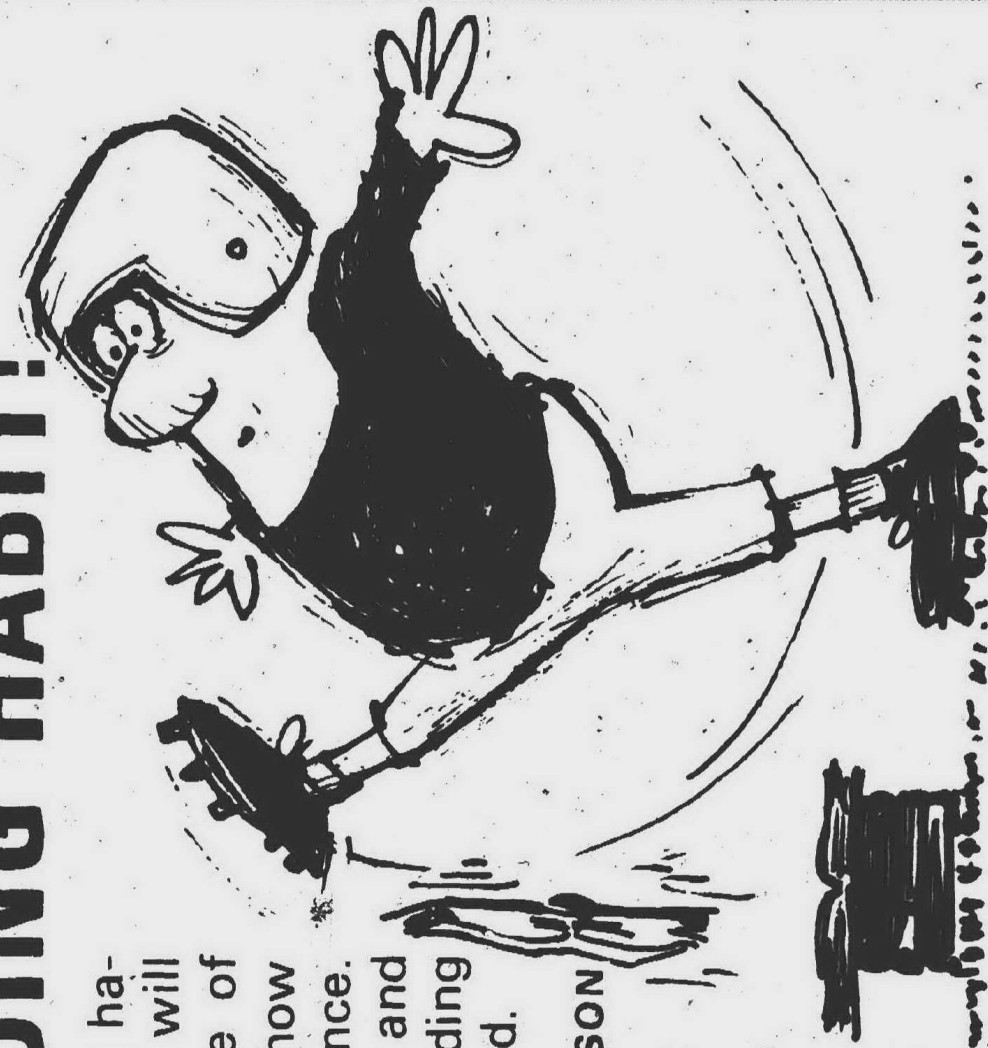


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Two Observerland Prep Standouts Seen As Keys To M Grid Fortunes

"We're pretty thin in some positions, but we are going to make a run for it and it will take a good club to beat us."

With these words Bo Schembechler, head coach at the University of Michigan, summed up the Wolverines chances of successfully defending the Big Ten championship which they won in two of the last three years.

"We lost a lot of good men from last year's squad," Bo told the traveling group of football writers from the Big Ten areas in their annual visit, "and as often happens during

the second week of practice we are being plagued by minor injuries.

"But," he emphasized, "we have some good looking players as replacements--but not as many as we would like to have."

Two of the weakest spots, he confided, were lack of depth in the secondary on defense and a lack of depth in the offensive backfield.

ONE OF THE major surprises of his report to the writers was Bo's announcement that Bob Thornbladh, former star fullback of the Plymouth High team, had taken over the No. 1 spot from Ed Shuttlesworth, last year's starter who was considered one of the best in the Big Ten.

Along with high praise for Thornbladh, the Wolverine coach also let it be known that another Observerland athlete--Craig Mutch, of Thurston--is the leading candidate for the important middle line-backer role.

"Thornbladh has come along fine since last year," Schembechler reported, "when an injury retarded his advancement. He is showing plenty of determination and a willingness to work. Moreover, his blocking has improved, and I have to pick him over Shuttlesworth."

Much the same is true of Mutch, who suffered an injury last season and didn't get to play. As a result he will

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have an extra year of eligibility and this makes him a valuable asset.

"If Craig's knees hold up," Bo stated, "he'll be a great help to what should be another great season."

Four other Observerland candidates are on the squad. They are: Mike Day, of Livonia; Dave Brandon of South Lyon, Jon Cederberg, of Plymouth, and Art Fediuk, of Livonia.

"He comes with a great record, Bo confided, "and he can run or pass. More than that, at Massillon he was inoculated with the winning spirit."

Massillon is the town that also produced a fellow named Bo Schembechler, so there was reason for

smiles among the writers with his comments on Franklin.

Schembechler made a very serious effort to convince the writers that Michigan would be the team to beat. But at the finish they chose Ohio State as the favorite over Michigan by a vote of 24 to 6, with Purdue in third place and Michigan State fourth.

The "skywriters," who finished their tour of the Big Ten camps with the Ann Arbor visit, have picked the winner for the past three years. Michigan picked up six first place votes, 13 seconds, 12 thirds and two fourth place selections for 339 points against 403 for Ohio State. The 64 point spread is the largest in the 19 year history of the writers tour.

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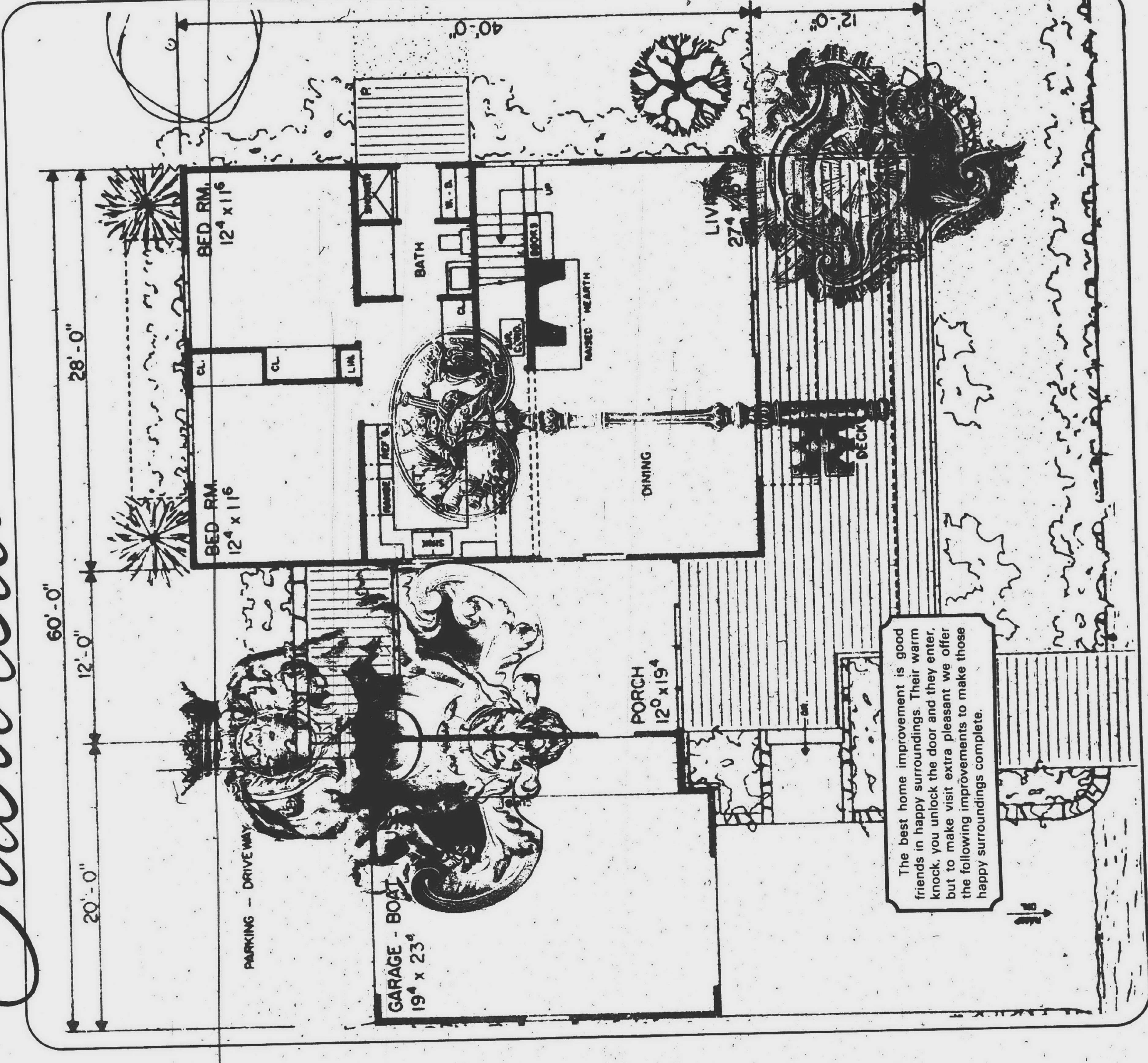
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




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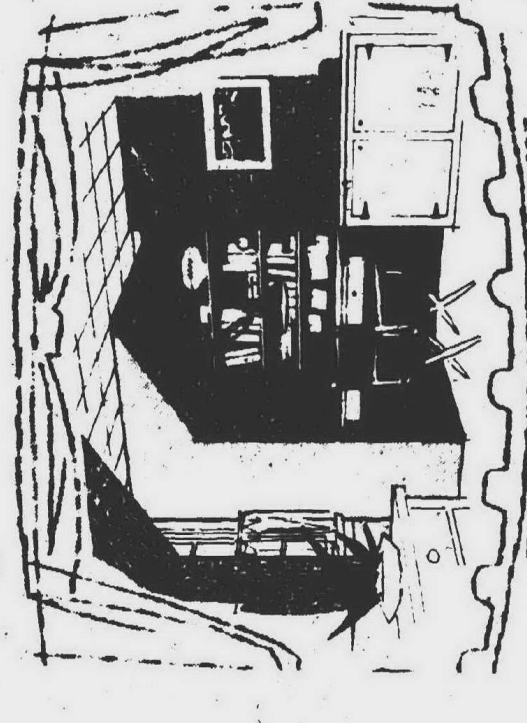
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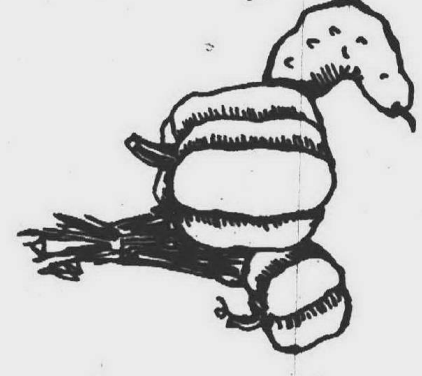
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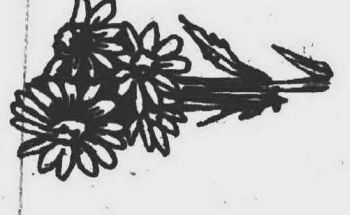
You'll have higher quality vegetables if you tend your garden right up to harvest time. Keep plants well watered, weed and insect free.

Keep a weather eye open for early frost. The tomato season can be extended for about two weeks. If they can get through the first chilly night without harm they should last a few more weeks before it really turns.

cold. Bales of straw around the plants topped by storm windows will protect the plants; or use some other cold frame arrangement.

Mature gourds should be picked, leaving a two-inch stem to prevent rot, then dried indoors.

Pumpkins and winter squash keep best when stored at a temperature near 60 degrees.



THINK SPRING

Lawns in this area should be seeded before Sept. 20. An inch of screened compost spread over established lawns is beneficial now.

All members of the narcissus family should be planted in September, also bulbous iris and peonies. When planting be generous with the bone meal and compost.

It's time to get hardy perennials well-established before winter. Lily of the valley, peonies, daylilies and bleeding hearts can be lifted and divided now.

When leaves turn yellow, lift gladioli corms. Hang to dry until leaves separate easily from corms. Store in a cool, well ventilated place. If packed in fresh wood chips they will dry out less and stay firm and plump.

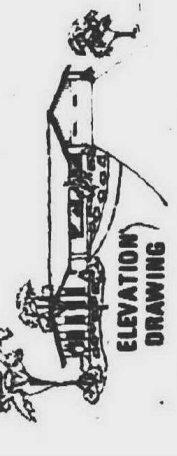

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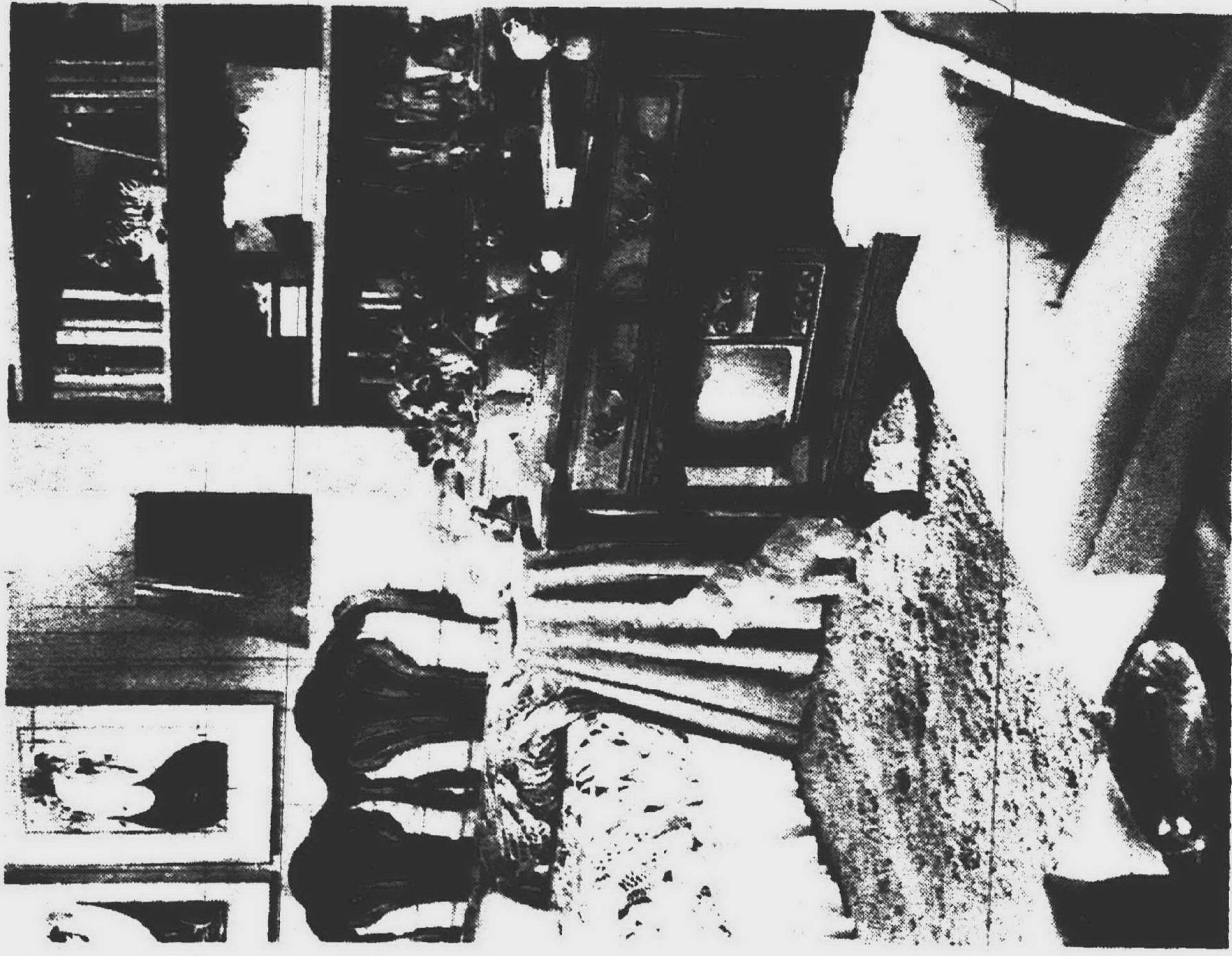

FALL BUGS

Somehow the bugs don't understand when summer is over. As long as there is green leaf they keep munching away.

Typical autumn pests include fall webworms, army worms and billbugs as well as those home invaders that start moving indoors when the weather turns cool.

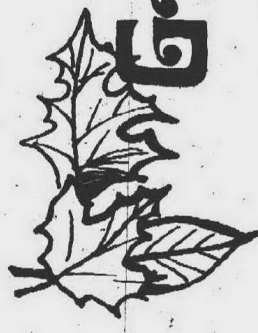
Fall webworms resemble tent caterpillars since they spin a tight web in the branches of trees just like their spring cousins do. Control is the same for both. Spray the net and the surrounding foliage with a broad spectrum chemical like Spectra-

cide or Sevin. Use a stiff spray that will penetrate the net.

Any list of unwelcome guests from the garden will include the "biters," such as ants, chiggers, flies and brown dog ticks, not to mention "the crawlers" and "hoppers" like earwigs, millipedes, clover mites, boxelder bugs and roaches.

To keep bugs out, whatever their type, a bug barrier around the house is effective.

Spray a strip around the foundation and three or four feet up the house with a chemical like diazinon. It's easiest to do when spraying the flower beds after the fall cleanup.



GARDEN CLEANUP

Before you put away the lawnmower and retire to those long-awaited TV football games, take one more look at the garden. A few more minutes in the yard can save a lot of time next spring.

While you are raking the leaves, clean frost-killed plants and debris out of flower beds and vegetable gardens. These can harbor insects and disease agents during the winter which will mean big problems next spring.

It is best to follow such a cleanup with a thorough spraying of diazinon to make sure the job is complete. Also dispose of all plant debris: waste that's left sitting around harbors plant pests just as effectively as if left in the garden.

If you are adding the debris to a compost pile, be careful not to include visibly diseased plants.

Don't add woody materials or fats, meats, seeds or pits that may attract rodents.

Compost piles are good for leaves, pine needles, grass clippings, manure, leafy vegetable tops, lettuce leaves, fruit and vegetable parings.

If you have time, cut thick stems into smaller pieces before tossing them on the pile. This promotes more rapid decomposition. An occasional sprinkling ground limestone will help prevent acid conditions which also slow decomposition.

The addition of manure, nitrates or potash will increase the pile's fertilizing value. Water it down once in a while and turn and mix the pile from time to time to keep it moist and spungy. You'll find the compost handy for use in the flower beds next spring.



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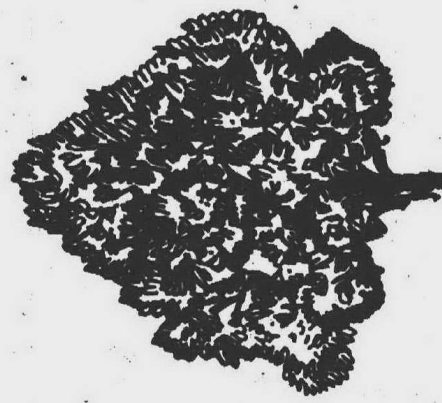


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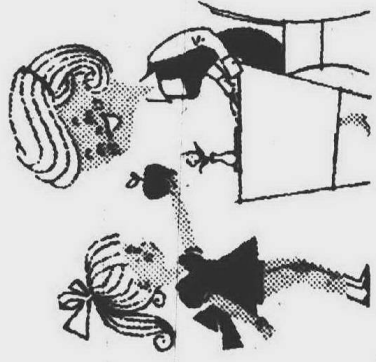

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Parents Foster Development Of Good Study Habits

The fall term has started and before the first marking period rolls around each student deserves the right kind of spot to do homework, where he or she can sit, work and see with comfort and efficiency.

Homework for grade school pupils demands an average of 320 hours a year, it has been estimated, and more for high schoolers.

Confusion and noise are the natural enemies of good study habits.

That's why many parents are setting aside a place in a bedroom, basement, attic or porch for the student in the family.

A logical place for a study is in the child's room. To make it something more than a bedroom parents can enlist the youngster's ideas so together they can come up an environment that will make the child comfortable and happy to be there.

Drab walls can be brightened by paint but the study area itself stands out when distinguished by a paneled wall.

Simply setting aside an eight-foot wall in this way makes the area "special."

A suitable desk with drawers, or two filing cabinets with a hard-board topped working surface should be provided. And of course, a comfortable chair.

One decorator suggests, "A rug will help establish an atmosphere helpful to effective study. Walls and ceiling should be attractively finished and decorated with pictures, maps and the like. The window should be draped or curtained to please the girl or boy."

If the bedroom is too small to accommodate a study, then a corner of the basement, utility room or attic can be used.

Simply take a corner of such larger space and enclose it for privacy and quiet, using partition

walls covered by prefabricated hardboard paneling.

Perhaps the ingredient most often missed is proper lighting. Lighting that's bright enough, but balanced and always where it is needed. Effects of poor lighting can range from poor study habits to edginess, fatigue and headaches from eyestrain.

Wall bracket fixtures, properly selected and properly located at the desk may be the answer. Wall fixtures stay put, do not tip over, and free the desk top for maximum working surface.

A pair of 60-watt wall fixtures can be mounted on each side of the desk. The light sockets should be 30 inches apart with the bottoms of the shades 15 inches above the desk top.

Or, a wall bracket that extends the length of the work area can be mounted 15 inches above the desk. Such a fixture should use two 15 or 20-watt fluorescent tubes.

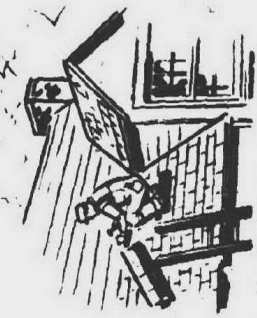
six inches from the wall, with a faceboard shield that distributes light upward and downward.

A study area that is conducive to proper reading should avoid lighting that is too dim, too glaring, or too harshly contrasting in brightness and shadow. Also be sure that the desk does not reflect glare from a window.

According to lighting experts there should be lights elsewhere in the room to balance the lighting and avoid the eyestrain caused by contrasts.

There is a wide range of colors to choose from. Asphalt shingles are available in "earth" and "forest" tones, pastels and an unlimited variety of blends, in addition to white, black, grey and charcoal.

Modern roofing technology has come up with a white roof that will never become discolored or stained by fungus.

Mineral granules embedded in the surface of asphalt shingles protect them, and give them their color. And now most roofing manufacturers offer asphalt shingles with white, fungus-resistant granules that can easily be installed over your present roof.

For extra long roofing life, homeowners are advised to specify heavy weight shingles, weighing 290 pounds or more per 100 square feet of roof area. These come with self-sealing tabs and are designed to last up to 25 years.

They bear the UL label for wind resistance.

Self-sealing shingles now account for 57 per cent of asphalt shingle sales, according to industry reports.

The red cedar shingle or the handsplit shake can also be applied over the existing roof.

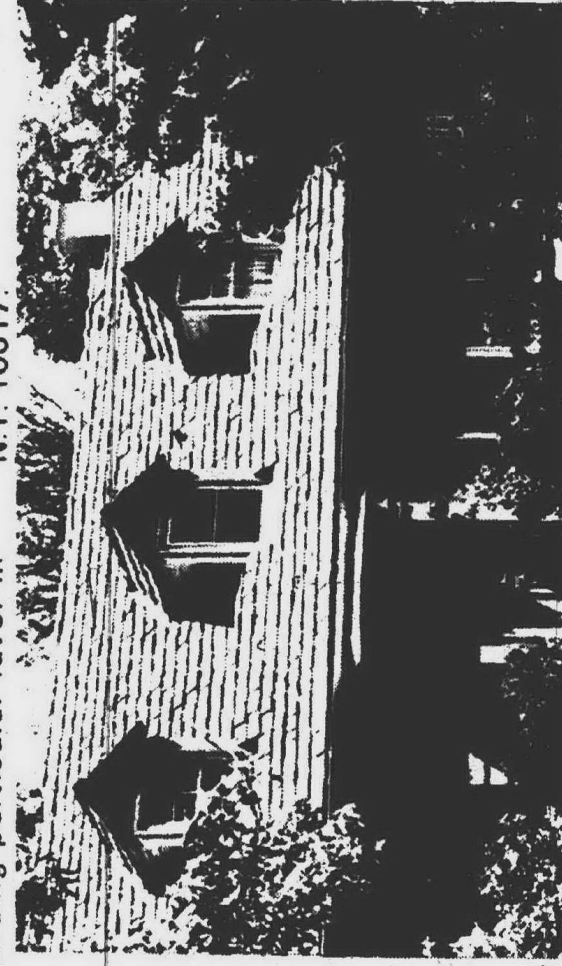
Shingles, for the most part, are a tailored, retiring material that quietly complement the lines of the home.

Shakes, on the other hand, are bolder, more dominant and aggressive, finding particular favor in

reroofing and over-roofing circumstances because they present such a distinct contrast in depth and contrast.

Once you have chosen your roof color, you can select colors for the sidewalls, trim, shutters and doors. With brown shingles, for example, you may want siding of beige, white, olive green, yellow or a medium blue.

HANDSPLIT CEDAR SHAKES were used on this roof for a natural, rugged look.

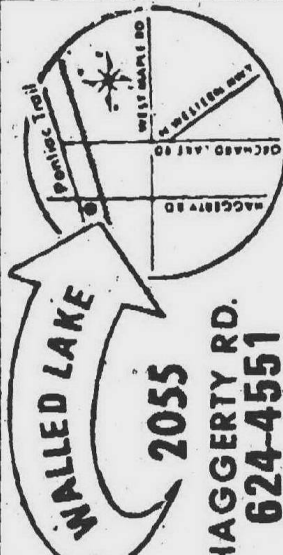


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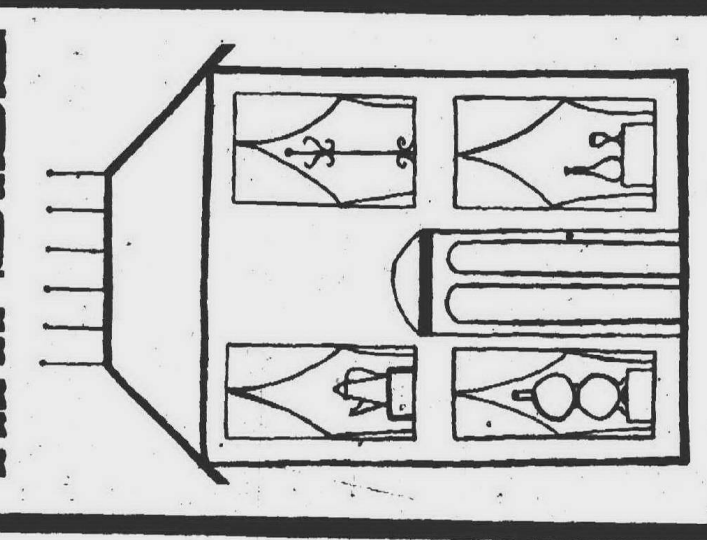
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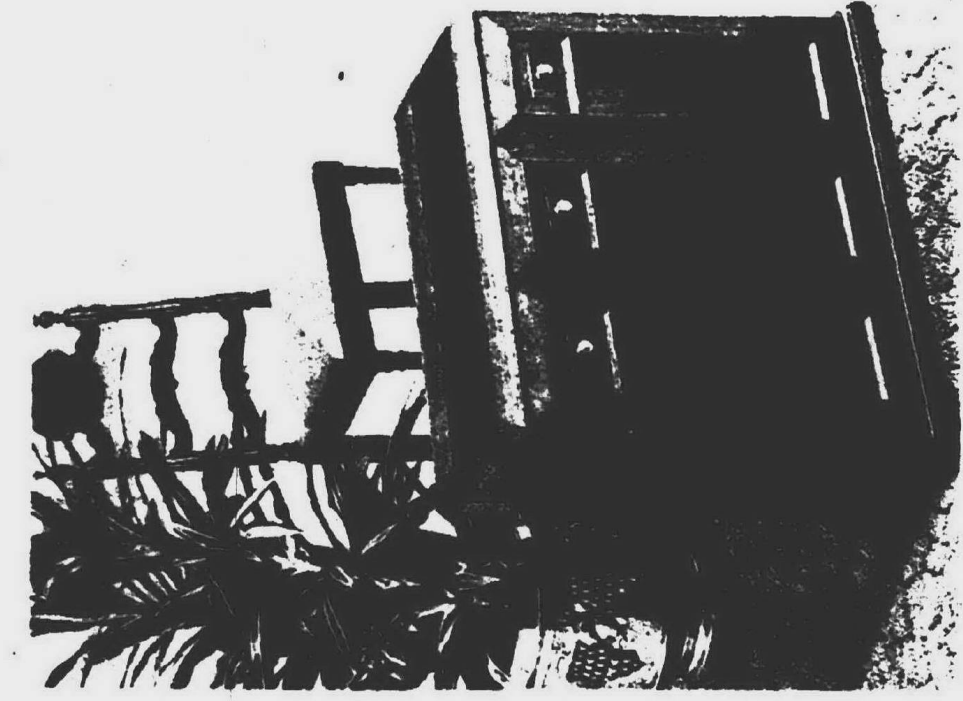
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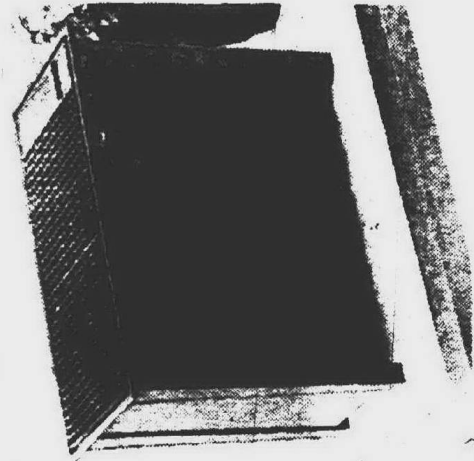

Gremlins? Poltergeists? Dry Air Is The Culprit

What keeps a piano in tune during the winter months and also cuts down on heating costs?

The answer: A humidifier.

Here's a simple test to determine whether or not you need a humidifier.

Drop three ice cubes into a glass tumbler. Add cold water and stir. If moisture doesn't form on the outside of the glass within three minutes, your house needs a humidifier.

For best results, check to see that the temperature of your home is 72 to 75 degrees when making the test. Also, don't try it in the kitchen where cooking vapors may give a humidity level not in line with the rest of the house.

Dry air is the culprit responsible for much discomfort and many unpleasant happenings during the winter months.

Those jolts you get from touching a doorknob, metal object or even your dog's nose are the result of dry air.

Static electricity builds up in the home where when the air is dry and there are no conductors of electricity, such as humidity in the air, readily available to disperse the electricity. Moisture in the air allows the electricity to discharge into the atmosphere rather than shocking a hand.

Those unpleasant physical irritations such as dry nasal passages and scaly skin are caused by dry air.

Dry air pulls moisture from walls, causing plaster to crack. It dries out furniture, causing it to come unglued.

The average heated home without

humidification of any kind has a relative humidity of 13 per cent. This is about nine per cent drier than the Arizona desert.

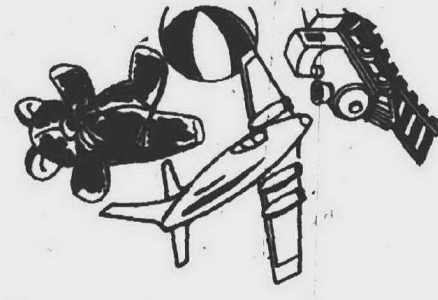
In order to feel warm and comfortable in a home with a relative humidity of 10 per cent, the house would have to be heated to 76 degrees. The same amount of warmth and comfort can be achieved by increasing the relative humidity to 45 per cent and cutting back on the heat to 72 degrees.

The 1972 line of humidifiers has the appearance of walnut decorator pieces. A model that looks like a stereo set provides humidification for more than 3,000 square feet of living space.

There's a new mini-humidifier which has been developed for mobile homes, small apartments, motel or hotel rooms. This table-top model evaporates three gallons of water into the atmosphere in 24 hours at 75 degrees F and 30 per cent relative humidity. The unit retails for under \$30.

Humidifier experts from the West Bend Co. suggest that a portable unit should be placed on an inside wall facing a stairwell. A humidifier placed on an upstairs floor will not be as effective, as moist air rises.

If moisture forms on your windows, or in other areas of your home during period of extreme cold, set the humidistat at a lower level. Console-type portable humidifiers are available with automatic controls which turn them off and on so that a constant pre-set humidity is maintained throughout the house.



Play Corner A Happy Thought

With the advent of cooler weather, the sand box, gym set and wading pool lose their popularity. The children's interest in books, games and indoor toys is revived, and they spend more time indoors.

To keep youngsters and their toys from getting under-foot, give them a play corner all their own.

Here are a few points to keep in mind:

1. The child's own room is the first choice as a play area. You can also use a corner of the utility room, breakfast room or utility room.
2. The floor should be washable and easy to keep clean. tile is good.
3. Give the child a washable area rug to sit and kneel on. The rug should have non-skid backing to prevent slips and falls.

4. Furnishings should be child size and durable.
5. Have plenty of accessible storage space. Consider stacking vegetable bins of non-marring plastic. Or arrange a series of sturdy corrugated boxes that have been spray-painted or covered with self-adhesive contact paper in bright colors.

For extra storage you can use an underbed storage chest that glides in and out easily.

6. Put cork tiles on the wall for the child to display his artistic masterpieces. This will keep walls unscarred.

7. Wall surfaces should be easy to keep clean. Washable paint or vinyl covering is recommended.

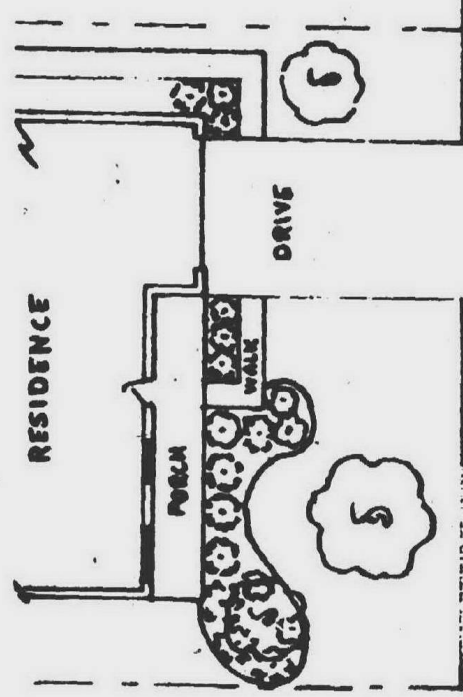
8. Finally, provide enough light, preferably from an overhead fixture, or wall-mounted lamp that can't tip over.



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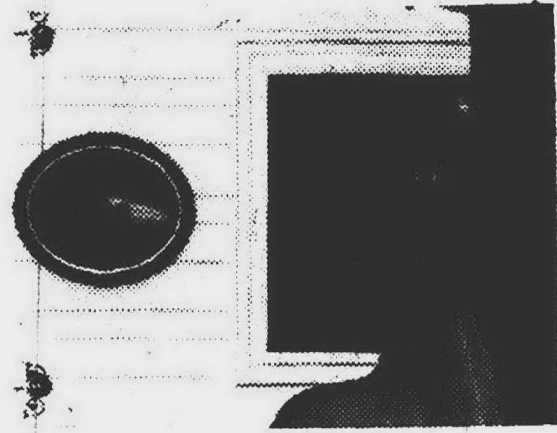

They also felt a fireplace creates a natural conversation center and a distinctive focal point for room decor.

The decorating impact and charm of a fireplace depend to a large degree on the mantel.

What makes it possible for an increasing number of apartments (where tenant appeal must be measured against the cost feasibility of luxury features) to offer fireplaces, is the availability of elegant

For a cold spot in the home, with no space or outlet for a natural fireplace, the electric or gas fireplace give the desired warmth and effect.

Most of these have a thermodynamic heat control, a cheery blaze of natural logs, and can be installed, by a rank amateur, in less than half an hour.



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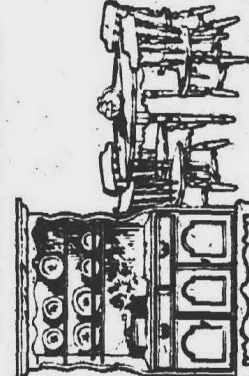
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Six Tips On Decorating A Living Room

"Decide what you want of a living room," advises Elroy Edson, "and write down your list. It may at first include a TV, a piano, a desk, and enough seating for a dozen people. After analyzing," Mr. Edson says, "you may realize you've crowded too much into too little space for no good purpose. The TV might better serve you in the master bedroom. A piano might be better enjoyed in the family room or den. Desk work possibly can be done at the kitchen table. And, except for holidays, you may find that no more than four or six people ever sit in the living room." His moral: "Never make your decorating demands for exceptional things, but rather list needs that are constant."

Secondly, wonderful as it is to start from "scratch," rare is the opportunity. "We are always blessed with either Aunt Carrie's drop-leaf table or a cocktail table bought years ago at auction." Make a list of re-usable or emotionally essential items for the living room; donate the extraneous to the Salvation Army. Then, and only then, consider buying new things.

Make a floor plan of the room to be decorated. (Mr. Edson adds that it should be done in 1/4" scale with each quarter inch equalling one foot.) Every window and door should be on the floor plan. Then make quarter-inch scale drawings of each piece of furni-

ture you plan to use. Cut them out and move them around on the floor plan until you find an acceptable arrangement that fits your needs, your exciting pieces, and the pieces you intend to buy.

"When plotting your floor plan," he points out, "try to remember how the traffic flows through your room. Try to avoid placing angular furniture near doorways. Group seating for best conversational advantage, rather than lining it up all along the walls. Separate one activities area from another by the use of a folding screen, a sofa or a console table."

Try to create special interest areas in the room. This could include a corner where you exhibit a china collection, collect books, listen to music or enjoy art. "Most interesting rooms," Mr. Edson points out, "are the ones that tell you something, often through collections or hobbies. Incorporate your special interests in your floor plan."

Finally, before buying, take time to carefully consider room schemes and furnishings that really appeal to you. Clip newspapers and magazines, observe how other people live, shop store floors, even window-shop and cover museum collections -- from Williamsburg traditional to modern exhibits seen in such places as Manhattan's Museum of Modern Art and Hallmark Galleries.
