An uneasy peace was reached Monday in the dispute between Plymouth teachers and the board of education when the teachers voted 218-166 to accept the latest 1972-73 economic package offered by the board.

Meeting behind locked doors in the high school auditorium, the teachers were given printed ballots for the purpose of a secret vote, and in effect the outcome seemed to rule out the possibility of a strike.

However, the strength of the teachers' union, has a membership of 478 staff members this year, meaning that the 218 votes cast Monday in favor of accepting the board's proposition actually fell short of a majority of the total membership.

Nonetheless, the turnout easily was sufficient for a quorum. PEA officials also pointed out that they do not permit proxy votes and that the meeting had been properly announced last week to all members.

The resolution which was backed by the majority stipulated that the PEA relinquishes "future rights of appeal for retroactive pay earned during the period of the presidential freeze of 1971."

The PEA had sought governmental approval to collect back contractual wage increases for that period of Aug. 15 through Nov. 14, 1971, but the Pay Board denied the petition after having said in June that it would be allowed.

This has led to a wave of bitterness throughout teacher ranks, and in increasing its final economic package the school board sweetened the pot with approximately \$120,000 which would have been used to pay retroactivity had this been ordered.

Many teachers thus feel that they have been offered only that which was rightfully theirs anyway, and the board's insistence that the PEA relinquish its rights to further appeal before the pay board was branded as "blackmail" by opponents during Monday's discussion.

BILL HEATH, outgoing president of the PEA, said after the meeting was over that "it's a ramrod deal inasmuch as we have very little real choice."

Heath admitted that he voted for the alternative resolution, which would have sanctioned a strike, and so did a second member of the PEA negotiating team, Dolly Carter.

Both said they told the membership how they intended to vote, but that they did not make such statements as a recommendation.

Contrary views were expressed by the two other members of the PEA negotiating team, Ray Homer and John Ryder. Homer is the

# Crenshaw Guilty; 'Murder' Deleted

"I'm disappointed at the verdict. The jury was pretty lenient."

These are the words Charles P. Finlan spoke to The Mail & Observer when he learned that his assailant of last May 31, Donald Crenshaw, had been found guilty of "assault with intent to do great bodily harm less than the crime of murder."

"This has been a big expense to the taxpayers, too; that's one of the things that grinds me," he added.

THE WEEK - LONG trial in Wayne County Circuit Court ended Monday when the jury of eight women and four men, who had deliberated nearly

six hours, found Crenshaw guilty on the reduced charge. He had been tried on a charge of "assault with intent to commit murder."

Freed on \$35,000 bond, Crenshaw faces sentence before Circuit Judge Thomas Foley on Nov. 8.

In spite of his disappointment in the verdict, Finlan was high in the praise of the law enforcement agencies.

"An excellent job was done by the Plymouth police, the prosecutor's office, and the state police," he said.

He also praised the persons who were at the scene of the shooting and who called the police and ambulance.

"IT'S GOOD to see that the

people in Plymouth take an interest. I certainly appreciate their help," said Finlan from University Hospital at Ann Arbor.

Finlan discounted the claim by the defense that the incident may have started with an auto accident in the parking lot next to his office on Main St.

"It was just plain shooting. If there was an auto accident, there should have been an order to pay a very substantial sum for my medical bills, hospitalization and loss of business. There is nothing to the statement that the cars bumped," he added.

FINLAN TOLD The Observer he has almost died twice: "Once when I was shot,

and then during an operation my heart stopped beating."

He said his right arm would be in a cast for four or five weeks, that he hoped to be out of the hospital by December but faces another operation.

At one time Monday, it appeared that the jury would be unable to reach a unanimous agreement.

After deliberating 5½ hours, jurors informed Foley that 11 of them had agreed on a verdict but could not reach full accord. They asked the judge what they should do.

Foley recalled them to the courtroom and asked them to consider the opinions of each other and to reevaluate their own opinion. In less than half an hour, the jury returned with its verdict.

IN CHARGING the jury Monday morning, the judge said they had a choice of four verdicts.

The first was the original charge, "assault with intent to commit murder." Other choices included "Assault with intent to do great bodily harm less than the crime of murder"; "felonious assault" (assault with a deadly weapon but intent is not to commit murder or great bodily harm); or "assault and battery."

If none of these, the judge told the jury, the verdict would then be "not guilty."

The judge told the jury before they began deliberation that they must base their decision "purely on facts learned on the witness stand."

"Only you can decide what the facts are," he said. "The penalty, however, is not up to you (the jury). That is for the court to decide."

Foley told The Mail & Observer that the final verdict reached Monday carries a maximum penalty of 10 years in prison. "The minimum is six months to six years," the judge explained.

As stressed by the prosecutor, the judge told the jury that "motive was not a necessary element in the commission of a crime."

CRENSHAW, who sat through the long hours of waiting holding his wife's hand, showed one of his rare signs of emotion since the trial

# PHS In Top Role At 'M' Band Day

Plymouth High School's 145-piece marching band should not be awed Saturday when it does a post-game solo performance before upwards of 70,000 fans in University of Michigan Stadium as a "Band Day" feature at Ann Arbor.

Bandmaster James Griffith's Rock musicians have been awarded the climactic after-the-game role following appearances by Traverse City, Ann Arbor, Huron and Crosswell bands.

For the Rocks, this will be only a prelude to their New Year's Day performance at Pasadena, Calif., when they

will march before an estimated million live spectators and an untold number of television viewers when they perform in the Tournament of Roses Parade.

Band Day will bring 140 high school musical organizations from throughout Michigan to Ann Arbor, totaling approximately 12,500 musicians as the Wolverine football team attempts to make Tulane its third successive 1972 victim.

George Cavender, director of bands, chose the Plymouth band as one of those to entertain the vast throng in what has become a Michigan Sta-

dium band tradition after the game.

PLYMOUTH FANS who do not get the chance to go to Ann Arbor Saturday can see the smart-marching blue and white troops in a prelude performance of the same show at half-time Friday night when PHS hosts Dearborn in an attempt to win its third straight football victory of the season.

The band's routine will include "Goal Line Blues," "Disneyland Fantasy" and "The Yellow Rose" - with the pom-pom Rockettes doing the "dance of the ping pong balls" to the Disneyland number. In addition, the Rocks will give a simulated marching drill

based on what they expect to be their five-mile march down Pasadena's Colorado Blvd. Jan. 1.

EXPENSES OF the California trip are not being passed on to the taxpayers. Students are trying to raise the money themselves.

One of the features of this community-wide campaign will be the door-to-door sale of band decals on Saturday, Oct. 7.

Meanwhile, with enthusiasm behind an unbeaten football team growing at the high school, plans also were made this week to add a special at-

traction to the Oct. 13 homecoming game in the form of an alumni band.

Griffith, who is vice president of the University of Michigan Band Alumni Association, knows the success this venture has achieved at Ann Arbor, and is hopeful of a good response locally.

All former Plymouth bandmen who would like to appear with the alumni band at the Oct. 13 homecoming game with Belleville are asked to drop a verifying note to Mrs. Richard (Wilma) Newton, P.O. Box 5, Plymouth. She also may be called at her residence, 576 S. Evergreen.

"There will be a rehearsal of ex-bandmen, all of whom are to bring their own instruments, at 4 p.m. in the Plymouth-Salem parking lot," announced Mrs. Newton, "and for those who can't get there that early it will be repeated at 6 p.m."

"All former drum majors also will be welcome. But we must know in advance the instrumentation, which is why we want notice by mail. Richard Newton and Art Davis will organize the alumni band in the rehearsals for its field appearance at the homecoming game. All of those participating should wear dark pants and white shirts."





# Tierney Supports Smit In 52nd District Race

**YOU WOULD** have a better understanding about the No. 1 gripe of Plymouth school teachers if you were to read some of the Pay Board's correspondence out of Washington and relate the circumstances to your own business and fellow employees.

A year ago at this time, all of us were living under the so-called wage-price freeze ordered by President Nixon. When that was relaxed in November, supposedly there still was to be a limit on wage increases. However, not only did exceptions pop up immediately across the face of the nation, but some groups started at once to clamor for retroactivity — and got it.

Narrowing this down to the Plymouth school system, retroactive pay back to the beginning of the freeze was won with governmental approval by administrators, among other employe segments, but not by the teachers.

To personalize this, that would be akin to letting department heads at Observer Newspapers, Inc. collect salary increases retroactively for the period Aug 15, 1971 through Nov. 14, 1971 but denying the same economic bonanza for lesser employees. No matter what the legal grounds might have been, I can tell you that lightning really would have hit the fan around this office had that happened — which it did not.

**THERE REALLY WERE** legal grounds by which such units as school administrators and the union of operating engineers in the school system were able to qualify for retroactivity the way the law was written, and the teachers went ahead and made their pitch, too.

Then, in a classic governmental foul-up of which only Washington is capable, there came to the Plymouth Education Association under date of June 6 a letter under the title, "Executive Office of the President — Pay Board," declaring that the retroactive pay adjustment "may be paid immediately."

The next communication to the PEA — on an identical letterhead — was dated Aug. 2 when it stated:

"You are hereby advised that the Pay Board letter dated June 6, 1972 approving a retroactive pay adjustment is declared null and void and that the subject pay adjustment is denied."

As I suggested before, if that had happened among ONI employees, while administrators were being given the reverse treatment, their wrath would have known no bounds. A concluding sentence on the second Pay Board letter — "We regret any inconvenience to the parties involved" — would have carried little, if any, balm.

**THE ULTIMATE** Pay Board conclusion denying retroactive money to the teachers was based on the fact that the contract for 1971-72 between the PEA and school board was not executed prior to Aug. 15.

One of the sad indications of Pay Board inefficiency was the fact that this was an established and known fact to everyone in Plymouth who was interested in the case when the PEA filed its petition last January — but it was blatantly overlooked.

The PEA's reapplication didn't fare any better, the official denial from Washington coming through last week — and that has only made the teachers angrier than ever.

It is this writer's belief that regardless of the legal pros and cons which substantiated administrative retroactivity but denied it for teachers, our board of education was morally remiss in supporting one plea and not all. If you don't agree that the board goofed morally, you must at least agree that it was a political blunder.

There's a simple way for you to put the matter to a test — just get the pulse of your own employees if you run a business, or your fellow workers if you do not, and see how they react. That management may have been correct legally (in this case the school board) in not paying retroactivity, is not likely to warm many hearts.

**PLYMOUTH** Democratic State Rep. James Tierney of Garden City, whose legislative district included the Plymouth area until recent reapportionment, disclosed this week that he is backing the Republican candidate in the newly formed 52nd District of which most of Plymouth is a part.

"I know this will make me some enemies among Plymouth Democrats," Tierney said at a political rally here Sunday afternoon, "but I hope Rep. Raymond J. Smit is returned to office."

Tierney made his remarks at a small open-house GOP turnout in the Mayflower Meeting House, hosted by Smit, an Ann Arbor Republican who has served in the Legislature as a representative of the old 53rd District since 1966.

Reapportionment has put the bulk of the Plymouth area in with Salem, Superior, Augusta, York and Pittsfield Townships of Washtenaw County, as well as a small segment of the city of Ann Arbor, to form the new 52nd in which Smit resides.

**SMIT'S DEMOCRATIC** opponent in the Nov. 7 general election is Robert E. Dwyer of

Plymouth, former 2nd Congressional District Democratic chairman and currently a member of the State Democratic Central Committee.

"Jim and I have had a long and warm relationship and we talked today about his Plymouth speech," said Dwyer Monday. "In our discussion, Jim said he didn't mind telling me he admired me. He indicated to me that he thought Ray and I are both very honorable men."

"Jim told me, 'I think the guy is a decent, honorable man, and I think the same of you. It's not anti-Bob Dwyer, but he has done me several

personal favors and he asked me to come to that shindig he had."

"Anyone who has known Jim and who has worked with him as I have respect him," said Dwyer. "He always has been a man who has played the game honorably. Naturally, I would have liked to have had Jim out for me Sunday, but as he said, 'You didn't ask me.'"

**WHEN TIERNEY** was called upon for remarks at the Meeting House, he pointed out that he had been active in Democratic affairs since 1939 but through that period has worked constantly with men "of both parties."

He praised Smit's knowledge of environmental and ecology matters, saying that "without Ray we (in the Legislature) could make a lot of blunders."

"If I lived in this district I would be out campaigning for him," declared Tierney, "and I urge you to do the same."

Dwyer and Smit will have their first opportunity for a man-to-man confrontation on the issues of the campaign when they appear jointly before Plymouth High School governmental classes Friday morning.

chief negotiator, and Ryder will succeed Heath as president as soon as a new contract is ratified.

Ryder said he told the membership it would be "to their advantage" to accept the board's proposition, while Homer said he indicated that "at this time chances of getting retroactivity are quite remote."

**THE SALARY** scale agreed to by the board establishes a minimum of \$8,535 and progresses through a series of 12 annual steps to a maximum of \$16,935 for a person with a master's degree. Increments

of from \$500 to \$700 are included as are Blue Cross coverage in a \$10,000 life insurance policy for each teacher.

The resolution which was approved with 218 affirmative votes read:

"The Plymouth Education Association hereby directs its bargaining team, Bill Heath, Dolly Carter, John Ryder and Ray Homer, to accept the board's proposed salary schedule and fringe benefits package for the 1972-73 school year."

"It is understood that this offer is contingent upon the Plymouth Education Association agreeing to

relinquish future rights of appeal for retroactive pay earned during the period of the presidential freeze, 1971.

"However, ratification shall take place when all issues are resolved and a completed master agreement is available for study and a ratification vote. The membership understands that both parties have pledged maximum cooperation to resolve all remaining issues quickly so ratification can take place at the earliest possible date."



# Rotary Club Told Of Hitler Influence

"The situation in Germany might have been different if young people there had contacts with the outside world during the period when Hitler was reaching for power," said Dr. Eleanor Dulles, a consultant for the State Department and a leader in the Youth For Understanding program.

In an address before the Plymouth Rotary Club, Dr. Dulles, a sister of former Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, said she first learned of the Hitler influence and theories in 1930 while boating on German rivers.

"The power and exposure of Hitler was apparent even then," she emphasized. "But unfortunately other nations didn't take the time to check into the situation thoroughly."

"Later, after the dreadful war, I had an opportunity to talk with persons who were youngsters in the early '30s and most told me they wouldn't have subscribed to Hitlerism if they had contacts with the outside world."

"That's one of the reasons why the Youth For Understanding program has become so popular . . . to acquaint youngsters from other lands about what is going on in other places."

there and foreign students coming to the United States on the exchange basis.

"It is a well known fact that all countries are interested in the United States with its know-how and skills and equipment," Dr. Dulles said.

"Many of the students visiting here are critical of the United States and its practices. But we have discovered that when they realize folks here are friendly and want to exchange ideas, then they suddenly change."

"A good many want to come back to learn more and to continue their studies. When this happens, the student has an entirely different approach than when he first visited the U.S."

DR. DULLES told the Rotarians that Berlin is having major problems with youth. Indications are that they are striving for power and there is a great deal of apprehension on college campuses.

DR. DULLES pointed to figures which show 32,000 young people have participated in the Youth For Understanding program in the past 22 years. The program involves youngsters from the United States attending schools abroad while living with families

# Canton Sets Hearings On Issue Of Acre Lots

**CANTON TOWNSHIP** Both sides appear to have won concessions in the rezoning controversy involving land in Canton Township's northwest sector, but the issue is still far from being settled.

The long-awaited proposed development standards for the northerly section was recommended by the township planner. It calls for preservation of one-acre lot development in hilly areas where single family developments now exist.

The flatter areas — where most large farms are located — should be allowed to develop a higher density, more in accordance with development permitted on similar land throughout the township, suggests the planner.

IT WAS HARD to judge the larger-than-usual audience's reaction to the proposed guidelines. They didn't get a chance to speak. That was due to the deft handling of the regular planning commission meeting by Chairman George Lawton.

With every chair at the Sept. 19 meeting filled, Lawton explained at the outset that the recommendations would be read by Planning Consultant Michael Manore, and then immediately tabled for further study.

Residents would be given a chance to air their views at two special study sessions next week, Lawton explained. The negative side was invited to come to the Wednesday, Sept. 27, session. Those in favor of the recommendations were asked to appear the

following night, Thursday, Sept. 28.

The sessions will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the fire station at Cherry Hill and Canton Center Rds. A copy of Manore's report can be obtained from the township clerk's office, Lawton said.

The proposal would then be an agenda item either the first or second meeting in October, Lawton continued. A public hearing date would be set following the official discussion in October, he added.

THE REPORT centers on land in the northwest sector bounded by Joy Rd. on the north, Beck Rd. on the east, Napier Rd. to the west and Ford Rd. to the south.

Most of the land is currently zoned for one-acre residential development. Except for homes along the section line roads of Gyde and Hanford and the Pilgrim Hills Subdivision, much of the land is vacant and there are several large farms in the area.

"The owners of these farms have been approached by developers, and the owners wish to have a higher density established in order to derive the greatest value from their properties," Manore explained.

Manore said that in making the recommendations that will control future growth of the northwest sector, there were two determining factors: The "unique topography" and existing uses.

"Each of these warrants special consideration," he commented. HIS REPORT states in part: "Much of the single family development has

located in the hilly terrain of the area. The development is significant enough in numbers so that the character of development has been established.

"Farming is still practiced in the area. The farms are generally located in the flat portions of the four sections which represent the best developable land in the area.

"It is recommended that the significant differences in topography be the determining factor in future development as it is the determining factor between the present uses of residential property and farms. The important objective is to preserve the value and character of the present single family development while providing a realistic land use pattern."

# Trainor Story: From Rockets To SEMCOG

James L. Trainor was named executive director of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG).

Approval of his appointment was voted by the SEMCOG executive committee on recommendation of a 12-man selection committee headed by Robert E. FitzPatrick, SEMCOG chairman and chairman of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

Trainor had been serving as acting executive director since May 15 and prior to that was deputy director for six months.

"The selection committee received applications from 44 individuals from throughout the nation and interviewed two of these individuals as well as Trainor," FitzPatrick said.

TRAINOR WAS first employed at SEMCOG on an interim basis by former Executive Director E. Robert Turner to design and institute a more efficient administrative set-up.

Trainor's effort proved so satisfactory that Turner hired him as deputy director to implement the program design.

Trainor, 37, was made

acting executive director, one of the most sensitive governmental administrative tasks in southeast Michigan, after Turner resigned last May to become city manager of Cincinnati, Ohio.

This position has placed him in a number of key positions, including appointment by Gov. William Milliken to a task force on urban imbalance. He is serving as chairman of one of four committees in this task force.

As SEMCOG's acting executive director, Trainor was charged with coordinating the operations of

man staff and maintaining good relations with seven county and 230 local units of government, and a variety of state and federal agencies. He reports to a 35-member executive committee and an 82-member general assembly.

HE JOINED former Mayor Jerome Cavanagh's staff as a special assistant and community development coordinator in October 1967.

He was responsible for revising and coordinating planning efforts to avoid and defuse civil disturbances following the 1967 civil disturbances. These efforts proved sound in April 1968, following the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King.

In a positive effort to help relieve racial tension by reducing racial discrimination, he was placed in direct charge of a campaign to increase the number of blacks in the Detroit Police Department.


In five months of concerted effort between March and September 1968, more than twice the number of blacks were added to the force than were hired in all of 1967.

A 1957 West Point graduate, Trainor served four years in artillery and ballistics missile assignments (1958-61) before becoming military affairs editor for Missiles and Rockets Magazine. He successfully completed Airborne and Ranger schools while in the Army.

He left the magazine for one year (1963) to be program management specialist at the Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt, Md. for the Orbiting Astronomical Observatory program.

From 1964-67, he was associate editor of "Missiles and Rockets" and managing editor of "Armed Forces Management" magazine. In this assignment, he was in constant contact with civilian and military officials charged with the management of complex projects utilizing advanced technology.

## Fall Color Time Nearing

Although Jack Frost already has touched the fringes of some forests, this state's peak fall color touring season is not expected to begin until the end of September, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

The sumac plant -- whose brilliant red signals that 85 species of hard and softwood trees are about to go from green to shades of yellow, orange and scarlet -- is just starting to turn in the north.

"There are more than 19 million acres of Michigan forests and woodlands where the tourist can view color this fall," states Joseph Ratke, Auto Club touring manager.

HOW LONG the color season lasts in any area depends on the weather. Cold weather with heavy frost and strong wind means a short season, while warm weather with sunny days helps color remain in an area up to two weeks.

"The annual fall spec-

tacular begins to peak in the tip of the Keweenaw Peninsula in the Upper Peninsula near the end of September," adds Ratke. "The show then begins a 50- to 75-mile-a-week march southward.

"This means that those who wish to follow the colors can begin viewing in the Upper Peninsula late this month, and continue watching until the show ends 400 miles later in southern Michigan at the end of October," says Ratke.

He adds that the average couple traveling 300 miles on a color tour can expect to spend \$70 to \$100 from Friday night to Sunday night.

Almost anywhere that a person travels in the state, special color tours have been arranged by chambers of commerce.

# Esch Not 'Livonia's' Rep

U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch's (R-Ann Arbor) campaign for re-election suffered a blow Tuesday when a court ordered him to stop representing himself as "Livonia's Congressman." Wayne County Circuit Judge James L. Ryan issued a permanent injunction preventing

Esch from any actions "which would amount to representing to the electors of the City of Livonia that Mr. Esch is presently their incumbent representative in Congress."

State Rep. Marvin Stempien (D-Livonia), who is opposing

Esch for the 2nd Congressional District seat, took Esch to court to stop his "misrepresentation" to Livonians as being their congressman.

ESCH'S BILLBOARDS, mailings and campaigning in Livonia have stressed the

theme that he is "Livonia's congressman."

Esch was represented in court by Livonia attorney Pat Duggan, who said that Esch doesn't mean to imply that he is the elected congressman but that he is representing them.

"A congressman is more than an individual who is elected," he said. "What is important is that he is doing something for the people."

Duggan listed examples where Esch has represented Livonians including obtaining federal funding for a railroad grade crossing over Middle Belt Road at the request of Livonia Mayor Edward McNamara and obtaining funding for educational programs in the area of law enforcement and criminal justice for Madonna College.

OWEN CUMMINGS, Livonia attorney representing Stempien, argued that in the interests of fair play Esch should be made to admit that U.S. Rep. Jack McDonald (R-Waterford) is currently Livonia's elected representative in Congress.

"I say he (Esch) can't hold himself out to be Livonia's in-

cumbent congressman," Cummings said. "McDonald is collecting a paycheck and will continue to collect a paycheck until Dec. 31. It hurts my client to be opposed in the City of Livonia by a man who claims to be their congressman but isn't."

Duggan argued that Federal Judge Damon Keith's ruling created the new districts immediately when he stated: "They are hereby adopted, created and directed to be set forth."

Ryan said that "his order created congressional districts. It does not create congressional representation."

STEMPIEN SAID after the decision: "That's what's called a clean sweep."

He maintained that the decision meant Esch's billboards must come down, mailings changed to indicate he is not the incumbent representative, and his district office in Livonia changed to a campaign office.

Duggan disagreed, saying that the judge did not mean the district office had to be changed.

George Stevens, admini-

strative assistant to Esch, said congressmen are entitled to three district offices. He said Esch can keep the office in Livonia which, Stevens emphasized, is at Esch's expense.

Cummings will draw up an order for Judge Ryan to sign. Duggan must agree to the terms set forth in the order before it is finalized.

JUDGE RYAN'S order has potential implications for another congressman, Martha Griffiths (D-Detroit). Mrs. Griffiths' new 17th District takes in Southfield, Lathrup Village, Farmington city and township and Redford Township.

Mrs. Griffiths has sent a mailing to the new section of the 17th, as did Esch to

Livonia. Mrs. Griffiths announced federal revenue sharing pictures for the new section of the 17th District, in the same way Esch announced Livonia's aid.

Thus, Mrs. Griffiths is in the position of acting as the congressman for the new section of the district, although she never went as far as did Esch, whose billboards proclaimed him "Livonia's Congressman."

## Stempien Postage Cost Was \$13,000

LANSING An audit of State Rep. Marvin Stempien's (D-Livonia) postage expenditures for the first eight months of 1972 shows that the cost \$13,000 -- down \$3,000 from the original figure released.

A press release from House Spaker William Ryan (D-Detroit) office apologizes to Stempien for the mistake. A report released by House "administrators" mistakenly showed that Stempien spent \$312 in July and \$8,461 in August for postage.

A corrected report shows his expenditures in July totaled \$2,200 and in August were \$3,359 for a total expenditure in 1972 so far of \$13,000.

The original report led a reporter from the Detroit News and television commentator Lou Gordon to conclude that Stempien's heavy expenditures in August were related to his bid for the 2nd Congressional District nomination against five other Democrats in the Aug. 8 primary.

Stempien won the primary and is running against in-

cumbent U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor) in the November election.

"I sincerely hope that the previously reported erroneous figures concerning Rep. Stempien's postage has not caused him any undue hardship," Ryan said, adding that because of the mistake the recording of postage accounts will be centralized in a single office.

## Crenshaw Jury Called 'Lenient'

began, when he heard the verdict.

His face flushed and smiling, he embraced his sobbing wife and mother who had been by his side throughout the week-long trial.

Foley, questioned after court was dismissed, said: "No matter how I feel on any verdict, I refuse to comment to any jury whether the verdict is good or bad or whether there has been a miscarriage of justice."

**WITH THE trial over,** several questions in the shooting of Finlan still remain unanswered.

Two witnesses stated on the stand that Finlan told them as he lay bleeding in the parking lot, "my wife did it" or that "she hired someone to do it."

This question was never asked of Finlan during the court session at University Hospital.

Hints that there would be additional arrests in the May 31 attack and a statement by Plymouth Police Chief Timothy Ford that "we are convinced a conspiracy did exist in the shooting of Charles Finlan," were never mentioned during the trial.

Why Crenshaw was carrying a card with Finlan's address, telephone number and a description of his car was not explained either.

Ford had stated that the conspiracy didn't occur in Plymouth but that evidence and information uncovered "has been turned over to other police agencies who have jurisdiction over the case."

He had declined to name the other agencies, saying that "any further announcement regarding the case will come from the agencies involved." So far, no warrants have

been issued charging any one else with the shooting or conspiracy.

**FOLEY STATED** that if any further evidence is uncovered or any other arrests made, Crenshaw can not again be charged in the shooting.

Monday's verdict came as a surprise to Assistant Prosecutor Stephan Boak as well as to several other persons in the courtroom. Following the verdict, Boak requested an individual poll of the jurors.

When the jury left the courtroom Monday morning, comment in the halls was that it would only be out "about an hour or two."

As time passed, however, several opinions began to change, one visiting attorney commenting: "I wouldn't be surprised if he (Crenshaw) would be acquitted."

Until Nov. 8, Crenshaw is "free" to return to his Bloomfield Township home to await the judge's decision on his future.

# Why Change Your Name?

Jan Welch, daughter of Mrs. Robert Welch of Washington Street, Livonia, was married June 10 in Yugoslavia to George Hare, a fellow graduate of Albion College.

But she's still Jan Welch, specifically Ms. Jan Welch. And that's how she intends to stay in her married status.

She and her husband number among the still relatively few couples who don't equate marriage with a new name for the wife. Ms. Welch offers some research and ideas on the matter in her article printed here.

AS SHE POINTS OUT, the question of "Why?" comes up with great frequency. And for her, it's more a matter of feeling than explaining.

"We didn't sit down and discuss it and decide," she said while in Livonia on a visit to her mother. "We just knew that this was what we'd do."

"For it isn't that there's a specific reason for not changing my name. It's just that I couldn't see a good reason for changing it. I'm not a different person because I'm married, so why a different name."

"The tradition of woman being subordinate doesn't reflect our ideas. And being married in Yugoslavia, we had a choice."

JAN AND GEORGE'S marriage took place in Yugoslavia because the bride had been studying there for nearly a year on a Fulbright Fellowship.

Her husband-to-be joined her there and they were married in a magistrate's office after purchasing a 12-cent tax stamp for the license and proving their free marital status. (That latter was not easy, since U.S. birth certificates do not include the information, and in the end they had to swear that neither was encumbered with another spouse.)

They also were glad to follow a custom they encountered when they filled out their marriage papers -- selecting a tree to plant in the Park of Youth of Zagreb, the city where they were married.

"They gave us a list of trees to choose from," Jan remembered, "and we picked a small bush -- strictly on the basis of cost."

THE COUPLE, currently planning to spend several months in Vienna before returning to newspaper jobs in this country, know there are practical problems that having two names may create. They figure they'll decide them as they come up.

One of these, of course, is the names that might be given their children. "If there are children," Jan said, "we'll decide then about their names. Right now we're leaning toward the idea of a third name."

EVEN THOUGH Yugoslavian law permits a choice in names, the couple's decision apparently was unusual.

"The ceremony was performed in Croatian, which I understand but George doesn't," Jan reported. "The official kept asking me if he understood just what was going on with regard to the names."

The couple had decided at first to tell only their families of their married status, because they felt the matter really didn't concern others.

"Later we realized that wasn't practical," the bride said. "But we have decided that when confronted with forms such as job applications we won't answer any questions about

## Getting Into A Fine 'Ms.'

The phenomenon of prospective brides rapturously writing their future names on restaurant napkins may never die, but an increasing number of women are choosing to change their marital status without changing their names.

Although a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision upheld the right of individual states to require a married woman to legally assume her husband's name, many states have no such requirement. In some states, a woman's name is legally changed by the marriage contract, but may be changed back through court action at a minimum cost of \$50.

Once a woman has surmounted legal obstacles to retaining her name, she still

faces considerable social opposition.

AS THE PRACTICE of married partners with different names spreads, people are less likely to exclaim "But I've never heard of such a thing!" But still the foremost reaction is a stunned "Why?"

The answer may be simply personal preference: the groom's surname is Schickgruber and the bride's is Churchill, for example. And everyone knows at least one story of a bride whose first name is incompatible with the groom's last. (Sally Forth? Sandy Beech?)

More likely, however, a couple decided that the woman will not assume the husband's name for more sober (if less pragmatic) reasons. They consider the gesture of a woman

automatically taking the man's name a symbol of traditional male dominance in marriage -- a tradition they do not wish to perpetuate, either in spirit or letter.

To the argument that a common name symbolizes not male domination but "oneness," they reply "Then why not a new name for both parties?"

Actresses, artists, intellectuals -- women who have achieved significant success in the social sphere -- have traditionally been accorded the privilege of using their given names after marriage.


AS MORE AND MORE women seek and achieve roles in the social sphere independent of their roles as wives, they also seek the privilege that has been granted to a select few. Indeed, say the feminists, retaining an independent identity after marriage should not be a privilege but a right.

A married woman who does not assume a married name introduces inevitable confusion into a system, of course. If the practice becomes widespread, one will no longer be able to tell at the drop of a name who is married to whom. But proponents of the new practice argue that marriage is essentially a private, not public, concern.

More serious confusion, however, arises with the question of children. What is the surname of a child of Mr. John Doe and Ms. Jane Smith? A couple has four options: giving the child the surname of the husband, or the wife, choosing a third name for the child or choosing one for all three individuals.

Needless confusion? Perhaps. But if the crisis of the family in modern civilization is a reality, reevaluating the naming of its members may be far from pointless.

# Child Abuse To Be Studied

A workshop considering child abuse - for parents interested in helping others and parents who feel they need help - is scheduled in Rosary High School, Detroit, on Friday and Saturday, Oct. 6 and 7.

It will be sponsored by Parents Anonymous of Michigan. The school is located at Greenfield and Joy. Parents Anonymous, which has been in operation in the Detroit area for only six months, is a self-help group for parents who abuse their children either verbally, physically or sexually and who want to stop the abuse.

Present members of Parents Anonymous meet together weekly to discuss their progress. They learn to recognize when they are about to lose control of themselves and, instead of lashing out at the child, they call in another member and talk out their rage.

They have found that abusive parents were usually themselves abused. But they seldom recognize the relationship between having been abused and abusing. As they talk about themselves, they see the real reasons they lash out at the child.

Ruth was orphaned at six. A relative who cared for her made her work all the time and constantly criticized her. When Ruth became a mother, she was an excellent housekeeper. But when her daughter made a mess or even demanded attention, Ruth would yell at her so as to terrify the child.

In PA Ruth learned that she was trying to buy love with a spotless house - and that this would never work. When she stopped yelling and started giving attention to her daughter, she found that the daughter had a lot of love to give her back. Ruth still needs PA to keep telling her not to feel guilty for sitting down and

working at believing in herself. Betty had an abusive husband. After his sudden death, she started beating the daughter who looks like him. In PA she is admitting the intensity of her hatred for the dead husband. And she is beginning to see her daughter as a person different from the father.

Grace quit school at 15 to get married. She is very bright, but feels she's not as good as other people because she didn't finish school. She was beating her son daily with a belt, so mother and son spent all their time in conflict. In PA, she was reassured that she could stop beating him. She stopped and now she is

DELTA AND RAY are nice, quiet-spoken people who never hurt another person's feelings. Yet they would lose patience with their children at certain times and hit them harder than they should. Through PA, they realized that the times they lost patience with the children they were really angry with each other. They began talking to each other about their anger and stopped hitting the children.

PA is now starting more chapters so more parents can be helped. Parents needing help may call Parents Anonymous in Detroit.

**THE WORKSHOP** will begin at 8:15 p.m., Friday, with a talk on "Problems of American Parents" by Dr. Marilyn Hines. This will be followed by a panel composed of PA members.

Saturday's sessions will begin at 10 a.m. with a welcome address by Ed Wolz, chairman of the board. At 10:30 a.m., there will be dialogues in which small groups will be formed and workshop participants will have an opportunity to talk freely with PA members.

At 1 p.m., there will be workshop sessions on "When to Call Protective Service," "How to Help in a Crisis," and "Disciplining Your Child."

Those attending are asked to bring their own lunches. Beverages will be provided.

## Workshop Attacks Problems

Creative solutions for all kinds of problems will be the subject for a five-week workshop beginning Thursday, Sept. 28, in the continuum Center of Oakland University.

Mrs. Barbara Hoffman, Continuum staff member who will conduct the workshop meeting from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., said it would involve problems "encountered in the arts, at home, on the job or in organizations."

"Or they may be just those irksome everyday problems that make us think there must be a better way," she added. "Sometimes new and different approaches to challenges require a deliberate stretching of the imagination, looking at things upside-down, trying new ways of thinking for size, fantasizing, playing around with ideas or brainstorming with others."

"Like any muscle, the imagination needs limbering to work for us."

Mrs. Hoffman said part of the workshop would be devoted to locating the real problem that needs solving. "Most of the time we look upon it as a big fuzzy mess and avoid it, so we miss a solution that might come very easily."

# Jail, Juvenile Home On Ballot

Wayne County voters will decide Nov. 7 whether to approve two special five-year millage levies to finance new jail and juvenile facilities.

The County Board of Commissioners decided last week to put the two propositions on the election ballot.

A levy of six-tenths of a mill (60 cents per \$1,000 of valuation) will be on the ballot to finance the jail facilities. It would raise a total of about \$39 million over the five years.

Four-tenths of a mill (40 cents per \$1,000 of valuation) will be voted on for juvenile justice facilities. That would raise approximately \$26 million over the five years.

The two proposals amount to one mill (\$1 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation). If both were approved, they would amount to \$10 per year on property worth \$20,000.

AFTER LENGTHY studies, consultants recommended additional jail facilities which would cost \$39.6 million and more Juvenile Court and Youth Home facilities estimated to cost \$29.3 million.

The Board of Commissioners has not adopted specifics of the two reports as yet, and ultimately could adopt plans costing less than the \$68.9 million total estimated cost of the two sets of recommendations.

proposition came on a 15-4 vote after lengthy debate.

Commissioner Richard Manning (D-Redford) favored putting the proposal on the ballot but argued a new jail is unnecessary because of the recent increase in court facilities.

John McCann (D-Livonia) favored the ballot proposal. James McCartney (D-Westland) was absent when the vote was taken.

Some board members argued that reduction of the jail population from nearly 1,600 two years ago to its Sept. 18 level of 637 showed that a new jail is not needed.

Others argued, however, that no amount of renovation of the present jail, opened in 1929, could improve it to the point where it would provide humane conditions for prisoners, as ordered by a three-judge Circuit Court panel.

The commissioners' legal counsel advised that the board's submission of a plan which set a Jan. 1, 1973 target date for the start of jail construction committed the board to building a new jail.

APPROVAL OF the juvenile justice facilities proposal was unanimous.

Commissioner Albert J. Zak, D-Hamtramck, who proposed that two separate proposals be placed on the ballot, argued that a combined

proposal would risk defeat of both if a majority of voters were opposed to one.

An earlier proposal that the facilities be financed by one-half mill levied over 20 years was dropped because it would have required borrowing through issuance of bonds.

Commissioner Paul Silver, D-Detroit, made the motion that a total of one mill for five years be sought instead. This, he said, would save about \$50 million in interest charges by making issuance of bonds unnecessary.

Consultants have recommended that a new jail facility for 750 inmates in downtown Detroit be completed by 1975, that an out-county jail facility for 400 inmates be built by 1980, and that \$3.35 million worth of additional renovations be undertaken at the present jail.

A study by consultants and an advisory committee of public officials has recommended that a second Juvenile Court and detention home for 110 juveniles be built in Westland by 1980, that the present Youth Home in Detroit be expanded from its current capacity of 215 to 325, and that the present Juvenile Court building, built in 1929 and considered obsolete, be replaced.

The two county propositions will be listed after five state proposals and will precede local proposals on the election ballot.

## Court Ruling Clouds Status Of Bond Issues

Warned of a possible block against government bond issues, the Wayne County Board of Commissioners has asked the Michigan Supreme Court to clarify its opinion which halted sale of bonds for the proposed riverfront sports stadium project.

The board Sept. 18 authorized its legal counsel to petition for a rehearing of portions of the opinion issued by the high court Aug. 30.

However, the commissioners stipulated that the county corporation counsel was not to ask for a rehearing or join anyone else in seeking a rehearing with relation to the stadium bonds or the stadium.

CORPORATION Counsel Aloysius J. Suchy told the board that portions of the opinion cast a shadow over all issuance of bonds by governmental units and school districts.

Spokesmen for the County Road Commission said that sale of bonds for airport improvements and other projects had been postponed indefinitely at the advice of bond counsel due to the confusion caused by the opinion.

Issuance of bonds to finance sewers, roads and other public facilities apparently will be stalled until the confusion is

cleared up, the county board was told.

Suchy said one section of the opinion appears to change the basis for computing a governmental unit's bonding ceiling in such a way that the county would appear to be at or in excess of that ceiling. This would mean the county may not issue any additional general obligation bonds.

That section appears to include the interest on a bond issue, as well as the principal in determining bonded indebtedness. In the past, only the principal was included.

WAYNE COUNTY legally is limited to slightly less than \$1.3 billion of bonded indebtedness. Counting principal only, the county's current indebtedness would be \$532 million. But with \$700 million in interest added on, the bonded indebtedness of the county would be more than \$1.2 billion practically at the limit.

As a result of the Supreme Court decision, Suchy said, it might also be impossible now to use the method of financing which made possible construction of the City-County Building and the new extended care facility at Wayne County General Hospital.

Bonds issued to finance construction of the City-County Building are being

paid off through rental payments from the city and county for use of office space.

Bonds were also issued to finance the extended care facility, with the bonds to be paid off from revenues derived from various sources for patient care.

## Juvenile Network Centers Approved

A new approach to juvenile delinquency, spelled out in a plan called the "juvenile facilities network" (JFN), has been approved by the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

The first of up to eight neighborhood youth centers planned under the JFN is expected to be open before year's end.

In addition, the JFN for the first time will provide central coordination of more than 200 youth-serving programs and agencies in Wayne County.

PLANS FOR the program - to be financed by \$3.1 million in local, state and federal funds - were approved by the county legislators Sept. 21.

Six to eight youth centers, housing recreational facilities and a variety of other services, are planned.

Target date for opening two centers - one in the Gratiot-Harper area on Detroit's east side and one in Inkster - is Dec. 15.

Each center is expected to serve 300-500 juveniles and their families.

# Bread Has Its Day On Oct. 3

By ELLY

Across the country, ceremonial luncheons and banquets will mark Oct. 3 as the "International Day of Bread." This is a revival of an ancient custom of celebrating the harvest.

The modern version began in West Germany in 1953 and spread to other countries of Europe, South America, Asia and Africa.

Bread comes in so many shapes and sizes, each with a heritage, each with a tradition. An estimated 70 different different kinds can be found in this metropolitan Detroit area.

As a part of Michigan's celebration of "Day of Bread," Chef Renee Ori of the J.L. Hudson Co. will demonstrate baking some of her favorite bread recipes. On Oct. 3 and 4 she will demonstrate in the downtown store 10th floor Culinary Corner.

At Eastland, Westland, Northland, Oakland, Southland and downtown stores, "Day of Bread" will be marked with novelties for children and informational pamphlets for adults distributed in restaurants Oct. 3 and 4.

Bread is French-born Renee Ori's forte. She was a Paris Cordon Bleu student of Monsieur Guillaumet, pastry and bread specialist and is resident chef for Hudson's culinary arts.

### RENEE ORI'S FRENCH BREAD

Mix together in a large, warm mixing bowl:

- 2 1/2 c. lukewarm water
- 1 egg yolk (room temperature)
- 2 packs dry yeast
- 3 T. melted butter
- 1 T. salt
- 3 T. sugar

Beat by hand for three minutes, then add seven cups of unsifted flour. Mix with hands for five minutes. Dough will be sticky, so put melted butter on hands several times while mixing. When the dough is soft and well mixed, smear a little soft butter onto bowl; put in the dough, turning once to put greased side up. Let rise for one hour, covered in a warm, draft-free place. Punch down the dough and turn in bowl. Grease a bread board with a little butter; divide the dough into three equal parts. Roll gently back and forth to lengthen loaf. Place it diagonally on ungreased baking sheet. Make eight slashes in dough at one-inch intervals.

Let it rise for another hour. Bake each loaf at 425 degrees for 25 minutes. Remove from oven and quickly brush the loaf with one egg white lightly beaten with one tablespoon of lukewarm water. Put the loaf back into the oven. Bake for five more minutes at 425 degrees. Remove bread from baking sheet. Place on wire cooling racks. This bread will keep for about one week. Yields three loaves.

### EGG BREAD

- 10 T. margarine or butter
- 1/2 to 2/3 c. sugar
- 2 pkg. yeast
- 1 1/2 c. warm water
- 1 t. salt
- 4 eggs (whole)
- 7 to 8 c. flour

Beat together butter, sugar, salt and eggs. Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water and add to egg mixture. Add one cup of flour at a time, beating after each one, until it is easy to handle. Turn onto a board and knead about five minutes. Set aside and let rise one hour. Punch down and shape into loaves, or whatever shape you desire. Let rise one hour and 20 minutes. Then bake in a moderate, preheated 350-degree oven for 25 to 30 minutes.

### SOURDOUGH STARTER

In a three - quart crock, dissolve one package active dry yeast in one quart lukewarm water. Add two teaspoons sugar and four cups sifted flour; beat to mix. Cover and let rise until light and slightly aged, up to 48 hours in a warm kitchen near stove. Starter may be kept in refrigerator seven to 10 days without attention. Then it should be stirred and equal amounts of flour and water added.

To use starter, pour off amount needed for recipe, and then add equal amounts of flour and water needed to replace amount poured off. Return to refrigerator.

Muddy Waters was born McKinley Morganfield on April 4, 1915, in Rolling Fork, Miss. During the early years of World War II, he recorded for the Library of Congress, principally singing and playing country Delta blues. Among his hit tunes are

"I'm Your Hoochie Koochie Man," "Got My Mojo Working," "Long Distance Call," "Baby, Please Don't Go" and "Honey Bee."

Until the mid-1950s, the music of Muddy Waters and his fellow bluesmen was marketed as "race music" aimed almost exclusively at black communities.

TODAY HIS audience is largely young whites. Muddy makes numerous college appearances each year, and he plays mostly in white clubs and theaters.

Muddy says "Young whites are more responsive." He adds that "the blacks are more interested in the jumpy stuff. The whites want to hear me for what I am."

When asked about the white rock groups like the Rolling Stones who have made a lot of money with his songs, Muddy says, "I don't ever give it a thought...if they had never started taking my stuff, I don't know that I could have moved up financially."

# Fall Decision: Vacuum, Shred, Rake Or Sweep?

Short of living in a climate where trees keep their foliage year-round, falling leaves are as certain as Thanksgiving. How to handle them depends a lot on you and your property.

By far, the most popular method, short of hand raking, is to put an inexpensive blade attachment on your rotary power mower. The mower then acts as a leaf shredder with centrifugal force of the mower blades whisking the leaves into your catcher, or if you prefer, dropping the shreds back to the ground as a winter frost cover.

sweepers which use a rotating brush (much like street sweepers) to sweep whole leaves back into a catcher as the sweeper proceeds across the lawn.

These are neat and efficient and particularly adaptable to medium sized lawns with few tight spots.

Since the leaves are left whole, it is well to choose a model with a large catcher to cut down on the number of times the catcher must be emptied.

ability to suck leaves from under shrubs and tight corners.

Certain models even have hose attachments to clean garages and workshops.

Just the opposite from the vacuum is the blower. These units are capable of creating winds of almost hurricane force to blow leaves across the lawn at each pass.

Equipped with throttle controls to vary the wind velocity, the blower can pile leaves as neatly as you can with a hand rake.


There are also power

NEXT ON the list is the lawn vacuum. This is usually a push-type unit with a wide nozzle on the front. The vacuum works much like your house vacuum. The nozzle sucks in every leaf it passes over with the blower forcing the leaves into very large catcher bags.

The force of the blower tends to compress the leaves in the bag so it has to be emptied less often. An advantage of the vacuum is its

If you're a gardener, you might team up one of the units above with a shredder that grinds and pulverizes leaves, sticks, stalks, trimmings, vines. Mix in some manure and or rock phosphate and you're making your own plant fertilizer.

## Drying Gourds Is Easy

**EAST LANSING**  
The odd shapes and bright colors of ornamental gourds make them a natural for indoor decorating in fall and winter.

The trick is to harvest and cure them correctly, says J. Lee Taylor, extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University. He offers these tips:

A gourd is ready to harvest when the stem turns brown and begins to dry. Use a knife or sharp shears to cut off the vine, he suggests, and be sure to leave about a four-inch length of stem.

Wash gourds in warm soapy water and then rinse them in a dilute disinfectant solution (five to 10 per cent chlorine bleach). Dry them and spread them on layers of newspaper in a warm, sunny place for a week.

Wipe them with a household disinfectant and spread them on newspapers in a dry, dark place for three to four weeks.

For display, the gourds may be waxed with paste wax and buffed with a soft cloth, shellacked, painted or left in their natural state.

## Garden On A Shelf Planted In Bottles

One of the wonders of first grade is seeing a sweet potato vine growing in a jar of water.

There are a number of plants that will root and grow in water, says Michigan State University horticulturist William Carlson, and with a little time and effort the homemaker can put together a bottle garden as unique as it is easy.

The choice between an empty pickle jar or a dainty vase depends, of course, on the location for which the container is intended. The vase might blend more harmoniously into the living room decor, for instance, while the jar might do very nicely on the kitchen windowsill.

The plants best suited for bottle gardening include geranium, peperomia, impatiens, wax begonia, hibiscus, coleus, aucuba, ivy, aglaonema and grape ivy. Many of them have embryonic root systems at each point where a root originates. These preformed roots develop systems at each point where a where a root originates. These preformed roots develop rapidly when the plant is placed in water.

Any waterproof container can become the start of a bottle garden, Carlson says.

PREPARE the container by washing it with warm soapy water, rinsing thoroughly and drying it. Wash the plants, too, Carlson advises, in soapy water with a vegetable brush.

Cut off any leaves that would be below the water line and any dead or damaged foliage, and cut the plant stem just below the node, the point where a leaf originates. The cut should be sharp without damaging the stem, he notes.

By grouping tall and short bottles with different types of plants, you can create a veritable garden on a shelf.

Remember to replace the water lost by evaporation, Carlson says, and change the water monthly to control algae growth and keep the container clean and clear.

For best results, he advises adding a water-soluble house plant fertilizer to the water at 1/4 to 1/5 the rate recommended for potted house plants.

**Pest Of The Week**

**SLUGS**

With cool, wet weather these pests multiply rapidly and emerge from damp areas of organic matter at night to eat flower and vegetable plants. Ragged holes in the lower leaves and young succulent stems chewed completely off at ground level are indications they are present. Glistening slime trails are often present. These pests are like snails without shells.

**CONTROL:** Metaldehyde bran baits in the form of pellets can be broadcast on the ground under plants. The carbamates also seem to be effective as a drench to the soil. Try two tablespoons to a gallon of 50 per cent Wettable Sevin as a soil drench in areas where they hide under shrubs and other low growing plants. Commercial growers can use Zectran instead of Sevin.

# Best Use For Revenue Sharing Funds? Reduce Local Taxes!

After many years and much confusion, revenue sharing is at last a fact. Two weeks ago, Congress passed a compromise bill authorizing direct payments of federal tax revenues to state and local government units.

Although it's too early to tell whether revenue sharing will be the salvation of central cities like Detroit, it surely will help hard-pressed communities here in the suburbs. For the sums involved aren't chicken feed.

Southfield will receive \$238,000 in new income for this year. Livonia gets \$559,407. The City of Plymouth will receive \$163,189. Amounts available for other local government units in this area are still being worked out in Washington, but it is now clear that townships are eligible and that Redford Township's share for example, will be around \$200,000.

LOCALLY Southfield got the short end of the revenue sharing stick, because the final compromise measure provided less than either the House or Senate version.

The House bill, regarded as favorable to heavily urbanized

areas, would have given Southfield around \$1.054 million. The Senate bill, written with needs of rural states in mind, would have granted Southfield \$268,000.

The revenue sharing bill uses a number of different tests to determine how funds should be divided between states and cities, primarily population density and the current tax effort being made by local government millage. Because Southfield has a high tax base and low charter millage limitation, the city is presently levying only 7.5 mills, which is below the national average millage levied by cities. Southfield is thus penalized when local taxing effort is used as a test for splitting up the pie.

Local officials, who had hoped the House version would pass, were pleased but not exactly overwhelmed at the outcome.

ADDED FUNDS, however, are a real boost for local communities, particularly when you realize that the revenue sharing measure authorizes payments over five years.

The big question now is just how the money will be spent.

Southfield officials indicated that much of it will go for public safety, as this is the area of greatest need. Livonia will spend the money for police officers and firemen, together with various capital improvements.

Most local officials are approaching the problem gingerly, trying to work out very carefully the most effective way the money can be used with a minimum of waste.

I CERTAINLY hope that one of the options considered by local solons will be to use the added revenue to reduce taxes on the ordinary taxpayer.

In Plymouth, for example, the \$163,189 represents nearly two mills of city tax, and I don't know any local taxpayer who wouldn't like to see his tax bill cut by this amount.

Livonia Mayor Edward H. McNamara says the city tax bills will be about 15 per cent lower than they would have been because of shared revenue. Because the tax bill would have gone up anyway due to rising valuations, the net decrease this

year will probably be about five per cent.

Part of the problem of using federal funds to cut local taxes, of course, is that if local taxes are in fact reduced, next year's federal payments will be also cut because of the tax effort part of the sharing formula.

I do feel, however, that the local property taxpayer has been taking it on the chin for so long that local governments should look very carefully at lowering their taxes. If there's a problem with the allocation formula, then some intensive lobbying in Washington might make a real difference.

## Board Haggling Proves Nothing

One has to be puzzled by the doings of Observerland school boards who seem to have a penchant for getting into the headlines with some weird maneuvers.

It appears to be the thing these days for trustees to bring up matters that appear to have very little to do with school affairs or to attempt to keep silent on actions that should be brought to the attention of taxpayers and particularly to parents who have youngsters in classes.

WE POINT A finger to the Plymouth school board which has been involved in a continuing debate with former Supt. James Rossman. It will be recalled the board decided to dispense with the services of Rossman with time remaining on his contract.

At the moment, the state tenure board has held a hearing on the case with a decision expected in the not too distant future.

In our thinking, both sides should await the decision and allow the situation, which isn't a good one at all, to remain as is.

However, neither side seems to feel that way, and neither is doing the school system or the community any good with constant bickering.

THEN TAKE a look at the actions of the Livonia board which, when normal, are unpre-



dictable. We might interject that we have covered many boards in more than 40 years in newspaper work, but never have we encountered such happenings as in Livonia.

There hasn't been anything close to a unanimous vote on any matter for several years. The trustees can't agree on any item except perhaps that of adjournment.

Matters reached a high of ridiculous debate recently over public relations... how to handle the media, how to get the "good" news to the public, how to keep administrators, board members or anyone connected with the school system from talking to the press without first discussing the topic with the public relations committee.

It is our feeling the board is off on a tangent that will do nothing but bring unfavorable publicity to the trustees and to the school system.

Meetings of the board are open to the public except in those instances when an "executive" session is called, and only those involved are permitted to sit down with the trustees.

One can't help but mention that never does a school board need more help than when seeking additional operating millage or hoping to pass a bond issue.

AND WHERE WILL that

editorial help come from if the media has to depend on a public relations committee, made up of board members, for its source of information? Perhaps the trustees have a strong feeling that they are experts in this field. Perhaps they feel they can write stories better than trained newsmen. Perhaps they would like to go out on their own and try to sell a skeptical public.

We say that most school boards have to get their advice and information from the administration. These are the people hired to do these kind of things because they are trained in such matters and because they have the necessary experience.

It is a big mistake for any board to discount the knowledge of the administration. One doesn't go to a policeman to have a broken leg taken care of and one doesn't go to a hospital to ask a nurse to make an arrest. Thus it would follow that a school board should hire a public relations counselor to take care of public relations and to deal with the news media.

Few school districts know the value of a good public relations person. Garden City is one of the few in Observerland. Perhaps Livonia could take a lesson from Garden City and start acting like a school board should.

## Who Are The Candidates?

By now, 95 per cent of us have made up our minds about the presidency between Nixon and McGovern, but there's a second major branch of Our Government that has received scant attention. And that's too bad.

Our congressional candidates, notably the challengers, so far have run either lack-luster or non-existent campaigns. They are failing to treat us to anything resembling the kind of debate we need to hear as we make decisions that will affect the quality of life in the 21st century. I will name names.

RALPH JUDD, a Republican from northwest Detroit, is supposed to be running against Democrat Martha Griffiths, an 18-year veteran of Congress.

The 17th District includes four communities that weren't in it in 1970 - Redford Township, Farmington, Lathrup Village and Southfield. Unfortunately, Judd either hasn't shown his face there or, if he has, has yet to utter a peep.

The election is only six weeks away, but Judd hasn't campaigned worth a hoot. The fact that he was interviewed by Observer Newspapers at all was because we called HIM.

When Mrs. Griffiths was

running for that office the first few times, she went up and down residential streets in a house trailer, inviting folks out for a cup of coffee and a sales pitch. Judd hasn't even tried to match that act.

Granted, Mrs. Griffiths has multitudes of friends in both parties, but she is still far from a middle-of-the-roader. If Judd and the Republicans don't intend to campaign in the 17th, they should say so and avoid cluttering the ballot.

ERNEST FACKLER, a Republican from Dearborn Heights, is on the ballot against Democrat William D. Ford, who is seeking his fifth term in Congress. After announcing his candidacy, Fackler too has been silent.

This newsman pried himself out of his easy chair one evening to travel to the bowels of the earth, somewhere around Taylor, to cover a 15th District Republican convention. The convention, as expected, was dull, but the real reason for the trip was to get acquainted with and interview candidate Fackler.

Well, candidate Fackler didn't choose to be interviewed on the record, although we did amiably

hoist a few when the business meeting was over. It was a pleasant chat, but I got nothing out of it to report to the voters on where Ernie Fackler stands or sits.

Granted, the 15th District has been voting 70 or 72 per cent Democratic, what with areas like Garden City, Westland, Canton Township, Inkster and Romulus in it. But don't Fackler and the Republicans owe it to The System and themselves to try and whittle that margin down to 68 or 66 per cent this year - especially when it looks like their top candidate will be re-elected?

MARVIN STEMPIEN, Democrat of Livonia, is an odd duck to figure out. He is running for Congress in the 2nd District against Republican Marvin Esch, who is seeking a fourth term on Capitol Hill.

As a state representative in Lansing, Stempien has spent something like \$13,000 of Michigan's money and an unknown amount of his own slush fund on mailings during the last year. These mailings, by my recollection, dealt almost exclusively with legislative issues. The mailings to not only his 35th State House District (Livonia and Northville) but also over the entire 2nd Congressional District and even over other parts of the state.

All of these mailings came after Stempien, in the worst kept secret of the Water Wonderland, had decided he wouldn't run for a Lansing seat again but would try for Congress.

So far, Stempien's literature has hardly mentioned congressional issues. His chief gambit to date has been to haul Esch campaigners into circuit court for claiming Esch is "Livonia's congressman." Even if Stempien is correct (and I suspect he is), what substantive difference does it make? What's a billboard got to do with population pressure, welfare, consumer protection, job retraining and safety, defense and foreign aid?

Get busy gentlemen.

## Need For Finding Cheap Places To Live

Few people will argue that there is a shortage of cheap housing in the metropolitan Detroit area, particularly in the suburbs.

To some who live here, this spells comfort, a feeling that the riff-raff who can't afford an expensive home are being kept behind some kind of economic "mortgage curtain."

But liberal guilt still prevails, especially when the suburban homeowner realizes both his children and their mother are sealed off behind the same wall of high prices.

THE PRIVATE HOUSING industry has admitted its failure to build a cheap house. Private developers gave up long ago even trying, and find sufficient profit in providing for the "over \$15,000 set" to keep up a nice business.

The government has been muddling around with the problem for years now, with assorted subsidy programs.

It seems at least part of the problem is that the government has refused to attack the problem directly.

The label that has been developed and most commonly used, "low income housing," unfortunately describes the government attitude as well as the kind of housing.

"Low income" describes the person who inhabits a house, while "cheap housing" describes the house.

Why bother worrying about a person's income, when the point is simply to provide housing that people of moderate means can afford, or wealthy people might prefer?

RESTRICTIONS ON income and assets which are tied to all "low income," "moderate income" and "senior citizen" housing projects have resulted in massive concentrations of the aged, the destitute and black in "low income" housing in the past.

Liberals continue to pipe dreams about a heterogeneous community, where the poor and the rich, black and white, live side-by-side. Nothing like this is implied by the phrase "low income housing."

The dream might be possible with "cheap housing."

But: "low-income housing" remains an attitude, as well as a building. The government continues to remain fearful of stepping on the toes of developers by "competing with private enterprise," although developers long ago got their feet out of the way.

It is apparently un-American to consider government subsidies going to anybody but the very rich or the very poor - the developers who build the projects and the "low income" people who inhabit them.

The steadfast refusal of most suburbs to accept "low income" housing can be traced at least partly to the muddling the government has done with its housing program.

"Low income" has mixed highly abstract social problems, a weird puritanical morality and the concrete problem of cheap housing into an unacceptable package at which suburbanites have balked.

A new approach might solve at least one of the problems, and that problem is finding a cheap place to live.

# State Works To Correct Juvenile Law Ruling

## EDITOR:

I have received your letter of Sept. 1 (which contained Tim Richard's Aug. 29 editorial) regarding the Michigan Supreme Court ruling in *People v. Fields*, which restricted the ability of probate judges to waive jurisdiction over juvenile offenders, and am happy to answer the questions you raised.

In my judgment, state government responded both quickly and forthrightly to the vacuum left in our state law as a result of that decision. As you may know, the House Judiciary Committee is currently considering legislation (HB-6362) which will return us to the situation

existing prior to the court's decision.

The Office of Youth Services, the state's probate judges and numerous legislators have taken great interest in securing passage of that bill at the earliest possible date.

Additionally, the Supreme Court has agreed to rehear *People v. Fields*, the case that resulted in the current dilemma. I think it is important to remember that the court's decision was not a final order, but rather an opinion regarding where our current law is deficient, and I am

confident that the Legislature will seek speedy consideration when it returns this week.

For these reasons, I am not inclined at this time to reconvene my Special Commission on the Age of Majority, but greatly appreciate your interest in this subject.

## Enrollments Dip At OCC, S'craft

An Observer Roundup

Both Schoolcraft College and Oakland Community College felt drops in their enrollments this fall compared with the fall semester of 1971.

Schoolcraft reported a three per cent drop in enrollment and eight per cent drop in credit hours with preliminary figures in. Those figures will be revised when the community services classes begin since some are being offered for institutional credit.

Oakland Community College, which has four campuses including the Orchard Ridge campus in Farmington, is down 3.7 per cent overall in students and 9.4 per cent in credit hours.

THE FIGURES are more drastic for Orchard Ridge which experienced a nine per cent enrollment decline and 18 per cent decline in credit hours for the fall. The decline at Orchard Ridge was balanced by increases at the college's southeast campus in Royal Oak.

Dr. James Manilla, Orchard Ridge provost, says the decline was expected and keeps the college in line with its budget projections.

In contrast, Schoolcraft is worried about the unexpected decline. Discussion of what effect the drop will have on the budget is scheduled for the board of trustees meeting tonight (Wednesday).

Because community

colleges receive state aid based on their number of full time equated students (average of the equivalent number of students taking full class loads), they are especially hurt when their enrollments and credit hours are down.

By contrast, universities get state aid based on their projected needs and don't have to return any of the state aid if they don't meet student enrollment projections.

OCC'S TOTAL number of credit hours this fall for its four campuses is 114,484, with Orchard Ridge's credit hours at 51,975. The headcount at OCC is 14,034 including the 5,675 at Orchard Ridge.

In 1971, OCC had 128,305 credit hours during the fall which was down from the 1970 figure of 129,171. The headcount followed the same pattern with 14,572 students enrolled during the fall of 1971 and 15,001 enrolled in 1970.

Orchard Ridge's enrollment dropped from 6,247 in the fall of 1971 to 5,675 this year. Credit hours were down from 63,485 in 1971 to 51,975 this fall.

Schoolcraft has a similar set of figures showing 5,842 students enrolled this fall compared to 6,017 last fall. Credit hours are down at 50,945 this fall compared to 55,649 in the fall of 1971.

An analysis of enrollment figures for this fall by Russell Bogarin, registrar at Schoolcraft, shows that the decline is due to a drop in liberal arts students.

ENROLLMENT IN liberal arts students had increased steadily from 1969 to 1971 and then dropped below the 1969 level this fall.

In 1969 the number of credit hours in liberal arts for the fall semester totalled 33,407; in 1970 it was 34,437; in 1971 it was 38,078 and in 1972 it dropped to 32,553.

Enrollments in business, health and vocational-technical classes have continued to increase, including this year.


Business credit hours are up from 8,466 last fall to 8,849; health credit hours are up from 2,191 to 2,598; and vocational-technical credit hours are up from 6,914 to 7,079.

WHILE SCHOOLCRAFT will begin to consider possible cutbacks in the budget, Dr. Manilla said OCC won't have to make any cuts.

"We feel pretty much in line with our projections," he said, pointing out that the Legislature had revised the college's enrollment projections downward when figuring state aid.

In a sense, the college has already revised its budget because of the reduced projections, Dr. Manilla said.

The 5,700 students enrolled at Orchard Ridge give the campus a "little breathing room" even though it can accommodate upwards of 7,000 students, Dr. Manilla said.

## Firms Cheapen Dollar -- Nader

Inflation is generally blamed by the unhappy worker who complains that the buying power of his dollar is decreasing. But Ralph Nader says inflation is only a symptom of a more widespread ailment.

"Scratch a politician and he'll talk about inflation," Nader said. "But there is a whole area of forces that cheapen the dollar value that doesn't get considered."

With this prelude, Nader launched into an attack on pollution, price-fixing, corporate conglomerates and other American ills which he believes can be remedied by "consumerism."

AN AUDIENCE of more than 400 persons turned out Thursday to hear the consumer advocate's second talk on the Schoolcraft College campus. But those who came a second time to hear Nader talk on the announced topic of the 1972 presidential party platforms and their relation to the consumer left disappointed.

The party platforms were barely mentioned as the 38-year-old Nader elaborated on his favorite subjects and did his best to inspire his listeners to become active and aware consumers.

Politicians were recognized when Nader said that conservatives blame inflation on government spending and liberals blame the war in Vietnam.

But Nader said the consumer's dollar is cheapened by more subtle things such as having automobile owners spend a total of \$1 billion annually on ornamental bumpers that serve no purpose or by large corporations who conspire to fix prices and pass unjust costs onto the consumer.

The "Seattle conspiracy" was described by Nader as an example of the consumer paying \$24 million unnecessarily because of companies fixing the price of bread. He didn't say over what period of time that the consumers were "cheated" subtly out of the \$24 million.

"I've been told by attorney generals that they couldn't begin to prosecute for price fixing. It's rampant."

POLLUTION IS another area where consumers are forced to spend their wages for items caused by pollution such as sickness, cleaning

bills, keeping cities clean, damage to crops and erosion. "Pollution is a massive form of silent, cumulative violence," Nader emphasized. "Unfortunately, it's not the kind of violence that provokes people to do something about it."

Because of the widespread destruction and devastation caused by pollution, Nader stressed that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

The public is constantly dissuaded from action against polluters by waving the cost factor before them, Nader said.

"When are we going to ask how much is it going to cost NOT to clean up pollution?" Nader asked, urging his listeners to consider the long-range costs to the public in sickness and property damage.

If automobile companies would have set aside a small portion of their profits several years ago, pollution by automobiles and the companies would have been markedly reduced by now, he said.

"The cost would have been peanuts (compared to the corporations' overall profits), but look what it would have done for the country."

ONE REASON advancements in curbing pollution are slow in coming is that research in this area is "starved of modern, life-giving technology," he added.

To this cause, Nader urged the public to become aware and participate in citizen action groups. He said career goals should be revised to include "full time citizenship as a career goal" where some people could devote their time to correcting problems and

giving average citizens a voice and some power.

Students in Oregon have formed a Student Public Interest Research Group which is funded by a \$3 contribution per student in the entire state each year. This group has been able to hire its own lawyers and consultants and become a viable force in the state.

Nader said that a similar group is forming in Michigan. SPEAKING THE same day that Ford Motor Co. announced a recall of 90,000 automobiles for a defect in the steering, Nader only briefly mentioned "unsafe automobiles."

"The automobile companies have recalled far more cars since last September than they've produced since then," Nader said.

Nader first became known when he investigated the Corvair and published the book "Unsafe at Any Speed," a scathing indictment of the automobile industry for producing allegedly unsafe automobiles.

During a lengthy question and answer period, Nader hit briefly on other subjects, including the impact of noise on humans such as damages to hearing, people with heart trouble and the nervous structure.

"We are so accustomed to noise that we hear silence," Nader concluded.

## Bentley Falls In Overtime Plymouth Wins

Overtime football as a means of breaking ties came to the Suburban Eight for the first time Friday as Plymouth edged Livonia Bentley in a 25-22, thriller; and the new rule drew mixed reactions from fans and coaches.

What it seemed to boil down to was a philosophy that it's a great rule when you win in overtime, but a poor one if you lose.

Sure-footed Jim Szilagyi kicked a fourth-down, 21-yard field goal to end the wild and woolly contest at Plymouth and give the Rocks their second straight victory after they had trailed Bentley, 22-14, with only four minutes left in regulation time. It left the Bulldogs with a 1-1 record for their first two starts.

From Coach Tom Moshimer down through the ranks of the fans there was jubilation at Plymouth's overtime success and little criticism of the rule that made it possible.

IN THE BENTLEY camp, however, the fans were downcast after apparently

having the first triumph over Plymouth in three years in the bag. Coach Glenn Goode, obviously disappointed, commented that "neither team deserved to lose." He praised his own club as having played "well enough to win," but conceded that Plymouth has "a fine, well coached team."

"I don't like starting from the 10 yard line," added Goode in reference to the newly adopted overtime procedure.

"It's true that coaches don't like ties, but this gives a tremendous advantage to the team that has the ball last."

After Plymouth came from behind to tie the score at 22-all on a 73-yard touchdown pass play from Steve Robb to Steve Crowther late in the fourth quarter, the Rocks won the flip of the coin entering overtime and chose to go on defense.

THE ROCKS stopped Bentley's Norm Stalzer inches short of the goal on fourth down and then, getting their opportunity to run four plays starting from the 10, knew that if they didn't get a touchdown,

a field goal would do the trick.

Three plunges by Fullback Jeff Horton put the Rocks at the Bulldog three, leaving it up to Szilagyi, who is one of the best placed kickers in PHS history. Last year he booted 24 of 25 extra points and now in two games this fall has four conversions and two field goals without a miss.

Stalzer, who paced Bentley with 106 yards on 18 carries, set the pattern for the free scoring contest when he pounded 69 yards for a touchdown on the opening play from scrimmage. A missed conversion left the Bulldogs with a 6-0 lead after only seven seconds of action.

Later Stalzer was to score again on a 12-yard run, and Randy Lasota got Bentley's other touchdown from the three. Twice, Bob Wasilewski passed for two-point conversions to round out the 22 total.

PLYMOUTH took a 7-6 lead after Stalzer's opening burst, going 59 yards in 12 plays - all on the ground - but then fell behind, 14-7, on the second

Stalzer tally early in the second period.

Horton accounted for both of Plymouth's first two scores on short plunges. The second, plus Szilagyi's kick, knotted things at 14-14 midway in the second quarter.

Bentley made it 22-14 at halftime on the Lasota romp, but could mount only one major drive in the second half. On that one, the Bulldogs were held for downs at the Plymouth 16.

The Rocks came to life on the Robb-Crowther aerial thrust, which was followed by a two-point plunge by Horton, and neither team threatened seriously to break that 22-22 tie.

HORTON, a junior who played for the Plymouth jayvees last fall, led the Rocks with an impressive 178 yards on 32 carries in addition to scoring 14 points. Moshimer lauded this performance, plus praising the offensive blocking of linemen Terry Donahue, Jeff Waller, Scott Bacon, Rick Campbell, Jim Baron and Jeff Jacobs as making it possible.

The Rocks suffered six turnovers including two fumbles, two interceptions, a Bulldog punt bounding off a Plymouth player's leg and having a lineman run into a Bentley punter. The Bulldogs fumbled once. Over all, Plymouth amassed 302 yards by ground and air and Bentley 251, all on the ground. Friday's renewal of Suburban Eight competition will find the Rocks at home to Dearborn while Bentley meets Redford Union on the latter's gridiron.

Churchill High's cross country squad got off on the right foot in defending its Western Six League championship.


After two non-league losses to Dearborn and Stevenson, Churchill blitzed Walled Lake Western, 16-41, capturing the first fourth slots.





## Turf Tips, Quips

Although business is below figures of two years ago when the DRC had the fall meeting, and is clearly a reflection of the economic conditions, track management is proud of the fact that the big mile track is faster this season than in years.

All of which reflects two track records and a tie—equally clocking for a third in races last week.

One of the new standards came in Saturday's closing event, one of the mile and 3 16ths handicaps in the distance series, when Young Reaper, with Jockey Al Herrara up, was timed in 1:57.

Earlier the same day, Fairway Flyer, a three-year-old filly shipped in from the West Coast for the Milette over a mile and an eighth, tied the 1:47.2 clocking set by Calandrito in the 1969 Michigan Mile and equalled by Fast Hilarious in the 1970 renewal of the rich stake.

Two days earlier Spray, another three-year-old filly, established a track mark of 1:39.2 for a mile and 70 yards.

Thus a combination of better horses and a lightning fast racing strip paid off with three outstanding performances.

BUT THAT'S only part of the story. Kentuckian William H. Floyd, owner of Fairway Flyer, promised Director of Racing Norris Gwin that he would leave the filly in Detroit for another week to prepare for next Saturday's \$35,000 added Damsel Stakes.

One of the nominees is Spray and what a race it could be if both are named to start.

Fairway Flyer came from a deep fifth at the head of the stretch to overtake Kentuckian Albert Clay's Aladancer, who was in front by two lengths, and capture the \$58,400 Milette.

It was the kind of race the crowd of 16,051 expected and Fairway Flyer had all standing and cheering with her speed in the stretch. Rated in fine fashion by Jockey Phil Rubbico, the filly was content to allow Aladancer move to the front on the final turn.

Rubbico called upon the slender Nashua filly at the head of the stretch and she responded by picking up five lengths and won going away in the track equalling time.

Lauries Dancer, handled by Sandy Hawley, one of Canada's leading riders, came from far back in the stretch drive to take third money.

Now track followers can wait until Thursday's draw for the Damsel Stakes to learn if owners of Spray and Fairway Lady actually did place their names in the entry box. If so, Saturday's renewal could turn into one of the fastest races and best duels witnessed at the DRC in a long time.

THE RUMORS that start and pass like wildfire around a racing plant when business and attendance are below the expectations of management.

Just to check out some of the stories, we asked some of the people that should know and came up with what should be the right answers.

The most prevalent is that the Detroit Racing Association will turn over the final 30 days of its meeting, scheduled to end the first week in December, to the new owners of Hazel Park. We were informed there is no truth to such wild tales.

The second was the DRA would drop both trifectas within another week. Matter of fact it was supposed to happen two weeks back. Again we were informed...no truth.

And perhaps the wildest rumor was the one that all harness racing would go to Hazel Park in the future and all thoroughbred racing to the DRC. And again the answer was no truth.

It will be recalled that when Jim Inglis was state racing commissioner, he suggested that it might be a good idea to have all the pacers and trotters at one track and runners at the other. He couldn't convince the track managements then and we're certain that Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley, if he were thinking of such a proposal, would run into the same situation.

It will be interesting to see how the Commissioner allots the dates for 1973.

It is our understanding that all tracks already have discussed dates with Shirley. We presume the racing boss also has been in contact with the horsemen and knows their thoughts on year round racing.

# Blaies Passes Churchill To 16-0 Glenn Win

The '72 football season at Churchill High has the making of being one long to be remembered.

The Chargers ripped Northwest Suburban foe John Glenn, 16-0, to match the longest winning streak ever at Churchill ... two games. Churchill edged Thurston in the opener, 7-6.

The Western Six squad opens league competition Friday afternoon, (Sept. 29) against Waterford Most on the Churchill gridiron in hopes of win No. 3.

Churchill goes against defending league champion Farmington Harrison the following week. Charger Coach Ken Kaestner sees this game as Churchill's first real test.

THE CHARGER DEFENSE has to be the real key. Churchill has not given up one touchdown on the ground in eight quarters and only one in the air.

Bob Blaies was the story in the Glenn victory.

The Charger quarterback enjoyed his finest day as a prep, hitting on 11 of 20 passes for 180 yards and two touchdowns.

"I have to admit that Bobby surprised the entire coaching staff," said Kaestner. "We knew he had the ability but showed us the poise in key situations."

A 24 YARD scoring toss from Blaies to Phil Damaska broke a second quarter scoreless tie. This climaxed a 50 yard march and Ernie Comini split the uprights to make it 7-0.

A missed 27 yard field goal by Comini set up the next Churchill score.

Comini stubbed the attempt and the ball dropped dead on the Glenn two yard line. The Rockets took over and on the first play from scrimmage, Kevin Arnold and Tim McMahon tackled Glenn's Mickey Stein in the end zone for a safety and two points.

Churchill took the punt from the 20 and Blaies hit Damaska on a 25 yard play for a first down on the Glenn two. A holding penalty set that series back and the Chargers settled for a 9-0 halftime score.

JOHN GLENN came out in the third quarter to play football as Damaska fumbled on his own 46 and the Rockets were moving. Two left end sweeps earned first downs and it was first down on the

Churchill 20. Dave Wesley was picking up the Rocket yardage.

In three plays, Glenn picked up seven yards. On a fourth and three situation, the Churchill line came to arms and stopped Glenn one foot short of a first down.

This was Glenn's deepest penetration.

Churchill rebounded with a 60 yard drive late in the final quarter. Blaies connected on a four yard pass to Damaska, Comini's kick was good and the Chargers were up, 16-0.

Churchill outnumbered Glenn in first downs, 13 to 8, but fell short in the rushing department, 117-57 with Glenn holding the upper hand.

Glenn's passing hit on only one of 11 for 23 yards while Blaies had a field day, 11 of 20 for 180 yards.

RON MILLER hauled in four of Blaies' passes for 87 yards and Damaska caught four for 75 yards.

Glenn's Stein was the entire running game with 77 yards in 14 carries.

Churchill's defense picked off three Rocket passes.

Dan Eckhout, junior linebacker and Phil Skender are cousins and each hauled in a Glenn pass to spark the Charger defensive backfield.

CO-CAPTAIN Paul Black, 5-9 and 170 pounds, headed the Charger linebacker corps with 18 tackles.

Kaestner tabs senior leadership the key to a tight winning Churchill squad. Waterford ... next.




## Dateline: Outdoors

Most of the days have been lovely, but outdoorsmen, strangely, have been nearly inactive.

So few fishermen are on the inland lakes that it's hard to make any kind of report.

On the hunting front, Friday was the opener for squirrel, but hunters will have trouble finding tartets because of the heavy foliage still on the trees.

Large flocks of blue-wing teal were spotted by conservation officers on the Detroit River - if anyone goes down that way.

TODAY IS open house day for the Western Wayne Conservation Assn., which has headquarters at 6700 Napier in Plymouth Township, and for the Livonia Sportsmen's Club, exhibiting in the ice rink at Ford Field, Farmington Rd. near Lyndon.

It's all tied in with National Hunters Day, an event which sportsmen are taking seriously but others are not.

Don't call this office and scream that we're advocating it, but you ought to know about the "Hunt the Hunters Club," one of the funniest spoofs we've seen in a long time.

It was formed by Friends of Animals, Inc., and its legislative arm, the Committee for Humane Legislation. Head of the organizers is one Alice Herrington, who says that a \$10 hunter-hunting license fee paid to the committee will bring the donor a definitive anti-hunting magazine, an "I

don't Hunt" arm patch, and information on campaigns in the field of battle - the halls of Congress.

To quote from the organization's pamphlet: "The group plans to ask Congress to ban hunting on public lands which it claims hunters turn into 'private butcher shops.'

"Miss Herrington also stated, 'We intend to free Mother Nature from the ecological havoc wreaked by self-styled wild-life managers who burn, bulldoze, flood and cut national forests to make them hospitable to deer, ducks, hand-raised turkeys and pheasants at the expense of other wildlife and nature's balance.'

"To undercut the wildlife managers, Miss Herrington said, the group will ask Congress to transfer from the Fish and Game Commissions to the general treasury the 11 per cent excise tax on handguns and bullets.

"She said these taxes have netted the wildlife managers and the hunters about \$500 million since 1937. These funds should be expended on behalf of all the people, not just the hunters, and the people could logically demand that they be earmarked for the purchase of land to serve as

wildlife sanctuaries,' she concluded."

WE SUSPECT that Miss Alice Herrington - if there really is such a person - is pulling the legs of a lot of super-serious gunners, especially since her Friends of Animals, Inc. is located at 11 W. 60th Street in downtown New York City. Funny place for "friends of animals" to hang out.

The cool-headed sportsmen I know won't be offended by her campaign. But there will be a minority - we all know a couple - who will scream that she's a commie or a pervert or something.

These screamers will be the guys who can't look at an animal without thinking how much fun it would be to blast it in half; the fellows who don't feel comfortable unless they have an arsenal in the house; the characters from a Freudian tract who get thrills along their spines as they gaze at the gleaming barrels of lavish collections of antique and modern weaponry ... these types will holler.

Let 'em. They're fair game. AT THE PRESENT, all area governments follow the Building Officials Conference of America Code (BOCA), one of the four national model codes. Under the new bill, local governments have the option of retaining the BOCA code or adopting the code setup by the state commission.

Mayors and township supervisors are bracing for the possible downgrading of local building codes and a loss of autonomy in amending the code to suit local needs.

Reason: The Michigan State Legislature has passed State Construction Code.

Objections that local leaders have to the code is that the state commission makeup will be unrepresentative, local governments will be restricted in their amendment power to the code, and two clauses dictate the use of materials that some communities fear would bring inferior housing to their areas.

LOCAL BUILDING inspectors told Observer Newspapers that even though BOCA and the state code would be about the same, the state code would make local adjustment through amendment nearly impossible.

An even stronger objection has been raised by mayors and township supervisors to two sections which don't allow

organized labor, premanufactured building, municipal building, and two persons from the general public.

Area leaders feel the makeup should lean more heavily toward architects and engineers so as to maintain quality housing.

Whether a municipality adopts the new code or maintains the BOCA code, the law provides that the state commission will nevertheless have the power to reject amendments sought by the local governments.

Local governments say they are amending the BOCA code to meet quality standards they feel are necessary to their communities. Under the law's provisions, the state commission could reject these amendments if they felt the amendments were harmful to the welfare of the people.

The contract was awarded by the U.S. Navy's Office of Naval Research in Washington, D.C., and work will be performed under the direction of the Naval Research Laboratory and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Marshall Space Flight Center.

The LAXRAY experiment will consist of 10 detector modules with a total active X-ray sensing area of 60 square feet. It will map the entire galactic sky for X-ray sources during the first six months of operation.



# The Stroller... Arena Born In Turmoil

When the new cultural center building was opened to ice skating a few days ago, it brought to mind the fact that this facility, of which the entire community can well feel proud, was born in the turmoil of one of the strangest series of arguments ever conducted in the council chambers of City Hall.

It all happened little more than five years ago when the city was planning its centennial and Jim Houk, the shoe man who then was serving as mayor, decided that the centennial should not be a matter of a few days celebration and then be forgotten.

To that end he appointed a committee to study plans for some sort of a facility that would forever stand as a monument to the city's 100th birthday celebration. And to head that committee he named Joe Tarantino, then the general manager of the Gaylord packaging company and one of the city's younger energetic go-getters.

From the moment the appointment was made, the entire plan became a controversial affair and it wasn't long until all sorts of suggestions came floating through the air.

THEN CAME the night of the committee's first report and the council chamber was filled with several groups hoping to put across a pet project.

The senior citizens were loud in their claim that nothing would be better than a senior citizens housing project - the type of which would make the city of Plymouth stand apart.

"But the city owes something to the senior citizens and a housing project would be just the thing - inasmuch as several adjoining communities are launching similar proposals," it was claimed.

This argument sounded good until the Plymouth Historical Society, in no uncertain terms, let it be known that a building to house their organization and some of its prize exhibits was badly needed.

"Such a building not only is needed," the historical group emphasized, "but it would be a real asset to the city and help to bring visitors to the downtown area." Further, the group stated, there were many charming items available just waiting for a place to be shown.

No one in the hall could argue this point, but the meeting exploded wide open when Tarantino, the chairman, announced that he was highly in favor of a skating rink.

THE GROUP sat stunned.

"Skating rink," they whispered, "what kind of a memorial would that be for the centennial?"

Chairman Joe. Tried to argue the point - but with

little success even though his committee agreed with him.

Joe took great pains to point out that ice skating was growing in popularity and that Plymouth could get the jump on all adjoining communities if the skating rink project was adopted.

Meanwhile, Houk, sitting in the mayor's chair, attempted to restore order with the announcement that the meeting had been called simply to make suggestions and that nothing definite would be done.

Meanwhile, Tarantino didn't sit idly by. He called his committee to map future strategy. Then came the gem of an idea.

"We made a mistake by using the term 'skating rink,'" one of the committee members explained. "Let's call it an ice arena and liken it to the Olympia. We can point out that such a facility will have facilities for more than ice skating. It could house a hockey league...be a convention site...and maybe a home for large meetings and even the Plymouth symphony."

Fine. The idea was adopted when the historical group pulled out of the debate and the senior citizens followed suit.

AS THE debate simmered down, the late Gene Slider, the city clerk, and members of the council succeeded in interesting the government in a senior-citizens housing project that now is ranked as one of the finest in the area.

Next, Margaret Dunning, one of the real public spirited residents of the community, announced that, in memory of her parents, she would provide the funds for a building to house the Historical Museum.

Into the picture then came Norm Gaffney, the new city manager, and he went to work on the ice arena.

It wasn't a one-man job-but the drive succeeded and the building now is open.

So, if you happen to notice the wide grin on Jim Houk's face and sprightly spring in his step, you'll know the reason.

His dream of a monument to the city's centennial in 1967 has come true.

# PCF Campaign Ready To Roll

# Eddie: A Legend In His Own Time

Hailed as "genuinely one of the few to be a legend during his time" and "an institution of today" by longtime friends and associates, W.W. ("Eddie") Edgar, dean of the Observer Newspapers Inc. editorial staff, Sunday was honored by the Felician Sisters and the St. Mary Hospital staff as the recipient of the first annual distinguished person award.

Feeling that the Livonia hospital should each year honor an individual for outstanding services to the institution, the award was started this year by the advisory board: Mother Mary Columbine, president-corporate board; Sister Mary Calasantia, executive director; and other members of the hospital administrative staff.

Eddie, who has been closely associated with the hospital since the idea was first broached more than 20 years ago, was the unanimous choice for the initial award.

WITH AN AUDIENCE of more than 300 looking on, including longtime friends who worked with him in numerous projects in the development of the city of Livonia from a township to a bustling metropolis, and associates from the newspaper world and from bowling, the smiling Dutchman from Pennsylvania received the highest award ever given by St. Mary hospital.

"Eddie Edgar is genuinely one of the few persons I have ever known to be a legend during his time," said Publisher Philip H. Power of the Observer Newspapers Inc.

"It is a particularly delightful, pleasant honor to come at a time when this still young couple can enjoy it."

"Eddie's career breaks into three chunks. First as a professional who can stand up with any other in the state or the nation. He has

always been a tough writer, a tough reporter and a darn good editor.

"He was a member of the Free Press staff during the golden era of sports. His columns in the Observers have been winners, far outshining the younger members of our staff."

"His second virtue is in community service. He has compiled a high batting average for success during his more than 50 years in the newspaper field."

"He personally has more historical data than any other individual in this section of the state on the rise and growth of western Wayne county and particularly Livonia."

"He has never snubbed anyone and always answers all problems in the same warm manner that has marked him through the years. The great ones always have humbleness and that is one of Eddie's virtues."

STATE SEN. CARL PURSELL, a longtime friend of Eddie since the days when Eddie was editor of the Plymouth Mail and Observer, told the audience: "We are paying tribute to a great man and his wife, a man who has become an institution of today."

He traced the career of Eddie from the days when he was asked by the late Mayor Albert Cobo, of Detroit, to sit in on the planning for Detroit's waterfront development, to his role in starting the Bowling Hall of Fame, his part in organizing and starting the Livonia Chamber of Commerce, the manner in which he led the fight for Livonia's own post office, and the part he played in starting a movement that resulted in the construction of the ice rink and cultural center in Plymouth.

"We are honoring a man who is nearing his 75th birthday but still as youthful in his thinking and his daily chores as when he first entered the newspaper field as a youth of 18."

RAY GRIMM, who has been involved in the rise of Livonia for as many years as Eddie and was closely associated with him in most of the projects, related some of the incidents of the earlier days.

This was when he and Eddie were members of the charter commission, worked on writing the city charter, and each served on the first city council for four years.

"Eddie is different from most of us," he smiled. "He has always been a dreamer but one who is also a doer and makes the dreams come true."

"He envisioned industry along the railroad and was one of the very first to talk about the need of a hospital. He told us that industry would form a major tax base for a new city and that every effort should be made to get industry into Livonia. One just has to look along the railroad and see what has happened."

"In those days we learned quickly that when we had a problem we could go to Eddie for the answers."

"I'll never forget the day when Eddie told me he had been asked to serve on the St. Mary Hospital advisory board. Just imagine he said, 'a Presbyterian and a Mason serving on a Catholic Hospital board; what kind of thinking is that?' You must know by now that it did work out perfectly because of the kind individual Eddie is."

"It was Eddie who saw the need for paving the main thoroughfares in the city, and he told us how to get money... and we did."

"There was only one time when I managed to outdo Eddie. That's when we ran for council, and I received the silver medal and he the bronze."

CLARENCE HOFFMAN, who operated the Livonia Lanes for years and who never called Eddie anything but "W.W.", mentioned how Eddie has raised the level of bowling during their 35 years association.

"There was a time when pool halls and bowling alleys were looked upon as places not to visit," he said. "Then the bowling proprietors hired W.W. as moderator, and he gradually built up interest and feeling toward the game to the high level it has now."

"I have always wondered when he had time to sleep. He would attend meetings until the wee hours of the morning and be right back on the job at 9 a.m. It was that determination and will power to improve bowling conditions that made him one of our most respected leaders."

"More than that, I have always known W.W. to work at two speeds, the one he shows at most times and then the other that is a bit slower but still way faster than most at his age."

The award presentation was made by Mother Mary Columbine and the welcome address by Sister Mary Calasantia.

As an added high spot, a letter was read from Gov. Milliken and his wife expressing their disappointment at being unable to attend the affair.
