



Political Scientist Will Address 51st **Chamber Banquet**

Dr. Edgar Wiggins Waugh, who retired as professor of political science in 1968 after 40 years at EMU, has received numerous accolades for his writings and public service but this will be his first major speaking engagement in Plymouth.

A native of Mississippi, he has studied at that state's university as well as at Eastern Michigan, Columbia, George Washington and the University of Michigan.

He also has been a consultant to congressional committees and in 1951 was the losing nominee of the Democratic party for state superintendent of public instruction in Michigan.







ORDINANCE NO. 384 CITY OF PLYMOUTH, MICHIGAN

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 141, AS AMENDED. THE WATER ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH, MICHIGAN.

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. Section 8 of Ordinance No. 141. as amended, the Water Ordinance of the City of Plymouth, is hereby amended as follows:

Section 8. The rates for services furnished by said Water Supply System shall be as follows:

Except as herein otherwise provided, water to be furnished by the System to each tap shall be measured by a meter installed and controlled by the City. Water charges shall be as follows for each quarterly (three-month) period. to-wit:

For fire protection, the City shall pay out of its appropriate funds, the sum of Two Dollars (\$2.00) per year for each fire hydrant, said sum to be paid annually.

The term "tap" as used herein shall include any opening or outlet heretofore or hereafter made in the System, for the purpose of withdrawing water therefrom for any use, public or private, either commercial or domestic, excepting fire hydrants, and no taps shall be made to the System unless authorized by the proper City authorities. APPLICATION FOR CONNECTION

Prior to the making of any connections to the System. application therefor shall be made to the office of the City Treasurer, upon forms furnished by the City.

Charges for all water service connections (taps) to users within the corporate limits of the City of Plymouth shall be Two-Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00), or actual cost plus fifteen per cent (15%), whichever is greater. A deposit of Two-Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) shall be required at the time an application for tap is filed for use within the corporate limits of the City.

Charges for all water service connections (taps) to users outside the corporate limits of the City of Plymouth shall be Three-Hundred Dollars (\$300.00), or actual cost plus fifteen per cent (15%), whichever is greater. A deposit of Three-Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) shall be required at the time an application for a tap is filed for use other than within the corporate limits of the City.

SECURITY DEPOSIT

A cash deposit of Twenty-Five (\$25.00), as security for the payment of water bills, shall be required to each user in such cases as the City Commission shall deem such security to be advisable, or in such cases where a deposit is required by the provisions of Section No. 21 of Act No. 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended.

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
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






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Catholic 'First' Involves Women **Deacon From Livonia To Meet**
