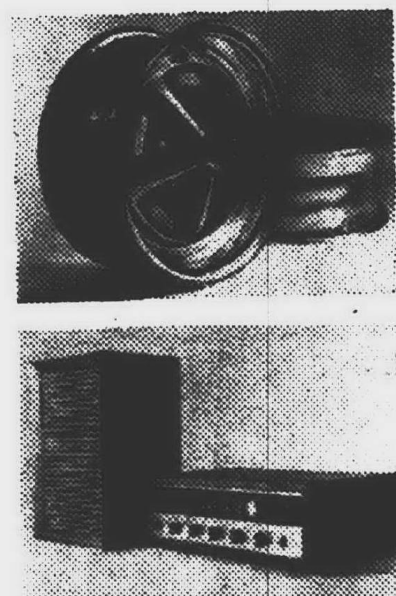

Planned Unit Development Code Seen As Boon To City

The planned unit development amendment to the present zoning ordinance, which was adopted by the city commission last Monday night, is being hailed as a boon to the city's growth and, especially, to the downtown business district.

The amendment, as it was adopted after a conference with the planning commission, provides flexibility to the present zoning code and enables a complete development to be approved instead of single buildings.

More than that, it takes some of the rigid restrictions away from the present code and opens the way for high rise apartments, taller office buildings and even lets the matter of parking requirements to the judgment of the city commission.

"THIS IS THE vehicle we need," City Manager Norman Gaffney stated, "and now we will be in a position to hold our own in competition with neighboring areas for business and other developments."

Gaffney added that he had made a study of what other areas had been doing to lure a broader tax base and found that the planned unit development program was the main tool.

"It is what cities like Birmingham use," he said, "and Birmingham has been holding its own. If it is good enough up there, it should help us here."

Another who looked upon the unit plan as a boon was Ezra Rotnour, a member of the planning commission who has been a watchdog of the city's interests for years.

"We ought to be able to move now," he remarked.

"As an example, let's take the lot where the old P&A theater used to be on Penniman Avenue. Under our present code anyone who wanted to build there would have to provide a fixed number of parking spaces. There's no ground available, so we couldn't issue a permit.

"But because the central lot is right behind the lot and could provide the necessary parking, we now can approve a building."

ANOTHER EXAMPLE was furnished by Commissioner Harold Guenther, head of the downtown revival project.

He pointed to the Ann Arbor Trail opposite Kellogg Park.

"Under our present code, we couldn't permit as much as a tent being built there because there is no parking. But if we can point to the lot between the Penn Theater and the Masonic Temple and say that space will provide the parking, every inch of ground on the Ann Arbor Trail site could be used for a building."

What it might do, eventually, Guenther added, is drive the city into establishing a parking authority and provide parking-- for a fee-- for tenants and developers in the downtown area.

He further explained that the flexibility in the planned unit code would lift restrictions off building heights and permit high rise buildings and apartments in the downtown section or any other area-- if the building suited the adjoining area.

All told, the city officials feel that the unit plan will provide the tool for which they have been looking for some time to keep pace with other communities and, more important, to save the downtown business section.

Decker Named C-C President

William E. Decker, partner in the real estate firm of Baker and Decker, was installed as the new president of the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce at the annual meeting Thursday night.

More than 250 persons filled the Meeting House for the installation and enjoyed a rather humorous discussion of "The Political Scene" by Edgar Wiggins Waugh,

professor emeritus of Eastern Michigan University.

He pointed out that no vice president ever succeeded to the presidency in the last century and that just the opposite was true in the present century. And he noted that only two incumbent presidents were defeated in a bid for re-election since the turn of the century.

Other officers selected with Decker included John Thomas, retiring president

who took over as vice president; William Graham, secretary; Fred Hill, treasurer, and the following new directors: Norman Dietrich, Howard Green and Julie Thoman.

They will serve with the hold-overs on the board, Herbert Chaiken, Curt Copeland, Harold Head, James Jabara and John Peard. The retiring officers were presented with suitable plaques.

One of the highlights of the program was the awards presented by Russ Snow, commander of the American Legion, to Ed Sawusch, of Anchor Coupling, as the industrialist of the year and President William Decker, as the businessman of the year.

During the past year the membership of the chamber has increased 25 per cent and the membership rolls now embrace more than 200 area businessmen.

Bennett Is 'Guilty'

David L. Bennett, 17, was found guilty of murder in the first degree by a Wayne County Circuit Court jury Friday after less than four hours of deliberation. Judge George Bowles set Nov. 13 for sentencing. The jury rejected the plea of Bennett's attorney that the youth was mentally ill at the time he admittedly killed Mrs. Vivian Berry, 43, wife of the Wayne County Road Com-

mission chairman, Michael Berry, in the garage of her Plymouth Township home.

Both a psychiatrist and psychologist called by the defense had called Bennett "schizophrenic" at the time he stabbed the woman to death and then returned to his Plymouth High School classes May 9.

Schizophrenia is a mental disorder characterized by withdrawal from reality.

City Spurned In U.S. Court

The City of Plymouth has lost another court battle involving its residency rule to establish eligibility to run for public office.

This time the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati has upheld the ruling of the lower court that the two year residency rule is unconstitutional.

The appeal was taken following the last election when Circuit Judge Damon Keith ruled the section of the charter unconstitutional and ordered Mahlon D. Green's name placed on the ballot. Prior to that ruling, Green was denied ballot space on the ground that he was not eligible under the two-year residency rule.

HOPING TO get that decision reversed on the

theory that a home rule city, such as the City of Plymouth, had a right to establish its own eligibility code, an appeal was made to the higher court.

This week the opinion was handed down, stating that the opinion of the lower court was being upheld.

It marked the second time that the residency rule was declared unconstitutional.

Several years ago, Rev. Peter Schweitzer, then an assistant pastor in the Plymouth Methodist church, was denied a place on the ballot as a candidate for the City Commission.

Claiming that he was being denied his rights, under the U.S. Constitution he took the city to court and won when Circuit Judge Victor Baum ruled the charter provision unconstitutional.

Breen Sees Trouble For Township

As he prepares to leave office in a few more weeks, Maurie Breen, the lame duck supervisor, spends his time these days wondering how Plymouth Township is going to meet the problems of the immediate future.

"I'm just riding out the storm these days," he said as he tapped his fingers on the desk, "but there are some terrible breakers ahead. The time has come when some very important decisions have to be made, and they can't be put off."

THE DEPARTING official admitted that he was not initiating any activities in his few remaining weeks in office

and that neither of the candidates-- Republican J.D. McLaren, who beat Breen in the primary, or Joseph Krochmalny, the Democratic aspirant-- had been in to get acquainted with the problems. The new administration, according to Breen, will have to do an about face from the policies now in vogue.

"Among the major problems that can't be put off any longer," Breen stated, "are the building of sewers and the running of water mains into the many new areas."

"On top of that, there'll have to be a new look at the zoning code as it pertains to industry and such things as high rise

aprtments and office buildings."

UP TO NOW, the township has refused high rise apartments and office buildings, along with some industry on the premise that neither water nor sewers were available.

"This no longer is the case," Breen explained.

"The Supreme Court has ruled that it is the duty of the township government to supply such things as sewers and water and that lack of them is no reason to deny rezoning."

He also pointed out that the same holds true with high rise apartments. The court has ruled that high rises are residences and shouldn't be

denied in a residential neighborhood.

"This is going to force a change in the thinking of our planners and commissioners," Breen continued, "and the entire picture will be different."

ALONG WITH these problems, Breen also called attention to the widening of Ann Arbor Road that will be costly and bring with it additional problems that will call for careful decisions.

One of the chief concerns of the future, in the opinion of the departing official, will be lowering of the water level in many areas of the township.

This has been brought about by the construction of the

expressways and could cause some major difficulty all around.

As Breen sat at his desk, pondering the future, and the decisions that must be made, he quietly added: "And the schools are talking about a \$21 million bond issue-- to add to the troubled breakers ahead."

MEANWHILE the "lame duck" is peering at his own future, too.

While he didn't mention that he was glad to be moving away from the decision making, he said he'd be returning to law practice and real estate where there wouldn't be tough decisions to make.

The new administration will take office on Nov. 20.

Canton Plans Gas Station Code Changes

CANTON TOWNSHIP Rezoning of a 19-acre site from single family zoning to multiples at the southeast corner of Lilley and Warren Rds. will come up for a public hearing Dec. 5.

The developer proposed 190 one, two and three bedroom townhouses, renting from \$215 to \$270 a month, a spokesman told the Canton planning commission at its October meeting.

The development, to be known as Racquet Club Apts., is a half mile from the Met-tel Airport and the developer will be required to leave undeveloped that portion of the project that is within the airport flight pattern.

IN OTHER commission business, a rezoning request for a travel trailer sales and service building at the south side of Ford, between Ridge and Napier, was denied based on a report from the township planner.

In his recommendation, Michael Manore, Canton's consultant noted that the facility was inconsistent with the residential characteristics already present in the area.

Manore added that he felt the township already had sufficient commercial zoning available without adding any more. The site is presently zoned agricultural and would require rezoning to C-2 (commercial) for the travel trailer salesroom.

ORDINANCE NO. 385 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 341, ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH, MICHIGAN, AS AMENDED

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. ARTICLE XVI - GENERAL EXCEPTIONS - is hereby amended by addition of a new section to be known as "Section 1601 PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT," to read as follows:

Section 1601 Planned Unit Development. Although the specific requirements as set forth under the individual and collective sections of this Ordinance assure compliance with objectives deemed essential to the public health, safety and general welfare, it is recognized that more desirable development can often be attained if flexible procedures can be substituted for rigid specifications in meeting these objectives. Therefore, and particularly to meet the needs of changing methods and techniques, it is the intent of this section to provide an alternative method of determining compliance with the objectives of this Ordinance.

To this end, any applicant for development of any lot(s) in any use district may effect of his own volition to request consideration of a development proposal on the basis of a submitted plan and related documents, and shall present, in full, his explanation of the compliance of his proposed plan with stated objectives in such a manner as to be, in his judgment, superior to a plan which could have been prepared under strict adherence to related sections of this Ordinance.

1. Application for consideration under this section shall be accompanied by a fee, the amount of which shall be set by resolution of the City Commission, and shall be used to defray the expense of publishing notice of public hearings, the expenses of said hearing, and for such other expenses as may be required.

2. Application under this section shall include proposed plans for the development and for all properties within one hundred (100) feet thereof, in sufficient detail and with sufficient explanatory narrative explanations to enable the Planning Commission to evaluate the proposal with regard to its compliance with the following objective standards:

(a) The proposed use or uses shall be of such location, size and character as to be in harmony with the appropriate and orderly development of the zoning district in which it is situated, and shall not be detrimental to the orderly development of adjoining zoning districts. The principal use proposed shall be of the same basic classification as that established for the property by the Zoning Ordinance. This requirement shall not preclude the provision of related uses and character as to serve a residential planned unit development in a residential zone, or of comparable related uses to serve principal uses in other zone districts.

(b) The location and size of the proposed use or uses, the nature of the intensity of the principal use and all accessory uses, the site layout and its relation to streets giving access to it, shall be such that traffic to and from the use or uses, and the assembly of persons in connection therewith, will not be hazardous or inconvenient to the neighborhood. In applying this standard, the Planning Commission shall consider, among other things, convenient routes for pedestrian traffic, particularly of children; the relationship of the proposed project to main traffic thoroughfares and to street and road intersections; and the general character and intensity of the existing and potential development of the neighborhood. In addition, where appropriate, the Planning Commission shall determine that noise, vibration, odor, light, glare, heat, electromagnetic or radioactive radiation, or other external effects, from any source whatsoever which is connected with the proposed use, will not have a detrimental effect upon neighboring property or upon the neighborhood area in general.

(c) The location and height of buildings, the location and nature and height of walls and fences, and the nature and extent to landscaping of the site shall be such that they will not hinder or discourage the proper development and use of adjacent land and buildings nor impair the value thereof.

(d) The number of parking spaces and the use of the site, the amount and location of open space, and the provisions of other amenities shall be in proportion to the anticipated needs and desirability for the proposed uses.

(e) All public or private streets and all drives, parking areas, drainage facilities, utility installations and other site improvements shall equal or surpass the applicable engineering standards of the City, as established by resolution of the City Commission.

(f) Permanent organization for maintenance and management of all common areas and of all building exteriors and roofs shall be assumed by legal documents acceptable to the City Attorney prior to final approval of the development by the Planning Commission, and shall be irrevocably recorded prior to the issuance of the initial occupancy permit. In this connection, access to all structures and areas for fire and police protection and for trash collection shall be assured by review of plans by the appropriate agencies having jurisdiction, and, in the event of private streets and drives, suitable permanent easements for use by public emergency vehicles shall be recorded prior to initial occupancy.

3. If at a time of initial review the Planning Commission considers additional information on or desirable for the purpose of gaining acceptable information on that to make a determination regarding acceptability of the proposal, such hearing may be scheduled at the next regular meeting, or at a special meeting, provided that public notice shall have been given not less than two weeks prior to the date of such hearing.

4. Upon completion of review and analysis, the Planning Commission shall:

- Find the proposal acceptable as submitted, or
- Find the proposal acceptable subject to certain required changes, which shall be set forth, with reasons therefor, as a part of the approval action, or
- Find the proposal unacceptable, setting forth the reasons for the disapproval.

5. If the proposed development has been approved or approved with conditions by the Planning Commission, the Planning Commission action shall be submitted to and reviewed by the City Commission, which may either grant final approval or deny the application. The City Commission shall not approve any application which has been disapproved by the Planning Commission, nor modify any conditions imposed as a part of a Planning Commission approval except by the affirmative vote of five (5) members of the entire membership then holding office and qualified to vote.

6. Following approval of the Planned Unit Development by the City Commission, building permits may be issued, but strictly in compliance with the plans as approved, except for minor modifications which may be necessary to meet building code requirements or to adjust for unforeseen elements, but in no event at variance with the objectives of the approved plan.

7. In those instances in which platting is required by law, the owner or owners shall thereafter submit proposed final plans for the Planned Unit Development for approval as in the case of other subdivision plans and in compliance with all other applicable laws, ordinances and regulations pertaining to the procedures and requirements for the approval of plats except to the extent that such requirements have been modified by the above approval by the Planning Commission and City Commission.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance shall become operative and effective on the 7th day of November, 1972. A.D. Made, passed and adopted by the City Commission of the City of Plymouth, Michigan, the 16th day of October, 1972. A.D.

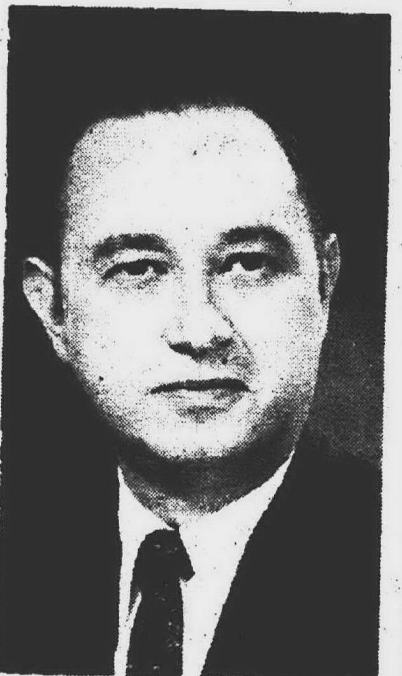

After nearly a year's study, Canton's planning commission will hold a public hearing soon on amendments to the zoning ordinance governing gas stations.

The Canton amendments follow closely those adopted recently by Detroit, according to Planning Commissioner Bart Berg.

Aldersgate Sets Dedication

Aldersgate United Methodist Church, established in Redford Township 28 years ago, will dedicate its sanctuary at 10000 Beech in services at 9:30 and 11 a.m. Sunday, Oct. 22.

The sanctuary was consecrated in 1959 by Bishop Marshall R. Reed, and an educational unit was opened formally in 1964.

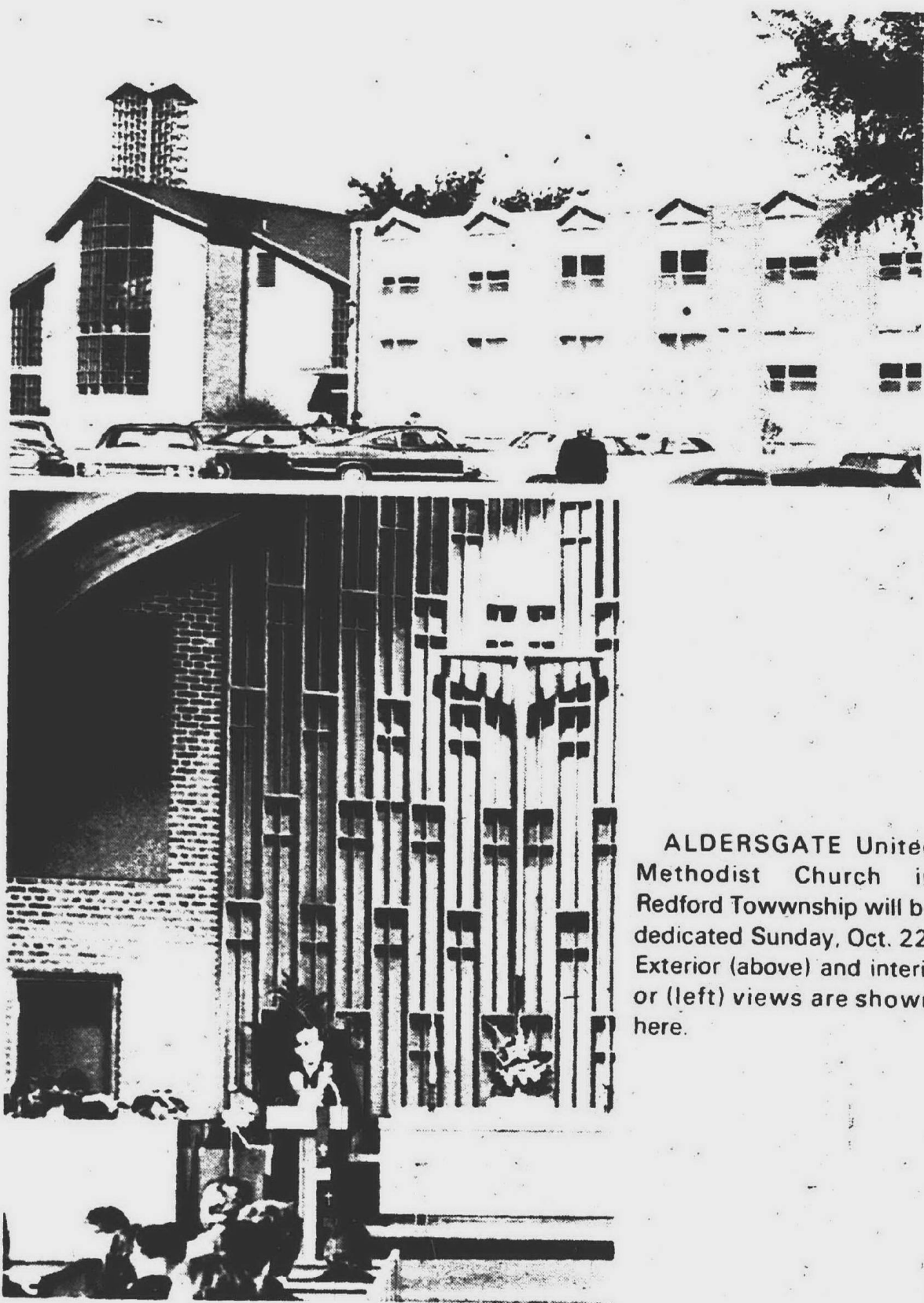
THE CHURCH facilities now are valued at more than \$950,000, including a three-manual pipe organ installed in 1965, and final payments were made this year.

The Rev. William G. Wager has been pastor of Aldersgate since 1966, and the Rev. William Smith joined him as associate pastor two years later.

UNICEF Collection Begins; Churches Sponsor In Plymouth

As the ghost and goblin season of Halloween approaches, many area youngsters are preparing to "trick or treat for UNICEF."

Each year special canisters are distributed by the United Nations Children's Fund, and young people go door-to-door to seek funds for needy children in more than 120 developing nations.

In Plymouth, the UNICEF collection again will

be sponsored by the Community Council of Churches, and some 300 school children will be out collecting Wednesday, Oct. 25 and Thursday, Oct. 26.

A NUMBER of churches in other communities have canisters to distribute, and they also are available at the Livonia Family Y, 14255 Stark, Livonia, and the North-west YWCA, 25940 Grand River, Redford Township.

Funds raised in the UNICEF drive provide vitamins, vaccines, antibiotics, food and school supplies for children overseas.

In Plymouth, the young people will be out during the early evening hours Wednesday and Thursday. They will be in small, supervised groups and will be easily identified by their official name tags and orange-and-black collection canisters.

Mrs. John Culotta, drive coordinator, said the organizers for the Council of Churches are trying to plan carefully so that all homes in the city and Plymouth and

Canton townships are visited only once.

ACCORDING to the most recent United Nations statistics, four out of five children in developing countries receive no medical care, three out of four suffer from malnutrition and half receive no schooling or must leave school before finishing primary grades.

A 10-cent contribution to UNICEF buys medicine to cure one child of trachoma, 50 cents buys enough vaccine to protect 40 children against tuberculosis, \$1 buys 50 cakes of soap or a stethoscope for a health center and \$5 buys a set of garden tools for a school nutrition program.

UNICEF was created in 1946 by the United Nations to aid young victims of World War II, and its program gradually shifted to meet long-range needs of the young.

The agency helps governments plan and initiate programs to meet the most pressing needs of children. Specific UNICEF-supported programs now include health,

education, pre-vocational training, nutrition, family and child welfare programs and emergency aid.

The young men also are involved in leadership responsibilities in the campus program. Lyne is chairman of the Youth Convention Committee, which plans a special weekend for high school students interested in Bethel and Keller works with local high school Campus Life clubs.

Ministry In Schools

Teens function best, believes a young man now heading a Campus Life movement in Livonia, if they balance their lives with attention in four areas — the physical, the mental, the social and the spiritual.

"We've found all over the world," Ray Harwell said, "that most high school students have the furthest to go in the area of the spiritual."

The basis for the four-way emphasis by Campus Life, Harwell, comes from the gospel description of Jesus meeting in the temple with the elders and then returning home where "he grew in wisdom and in stature and in favor with God and man."

HARWELL, whose organization is affiliated with Youth for Christ and Voice of Christian Youth, has been working a year with students in Bentley and Stevenson High Schools.

"We have two basic goals," he said. "One is to reach the kids who don't know Christ and introduce him as a personal savior."

Hosts Lunch

The United Methodist Women of Lola Valley United Methodist Church are sponsoring "Luncheon Is Served" at 12 noon, Tuesday, Oct. 24. The church is located at Puritan and Delaware, Redford Township.

"Luncheon" is a meal put on to advertise new foods on the market. A talk is given afterwards on what was served and how to prepare it.

"The other is to work with young people who are Christians and help them to mature and develop to a point where they can reach fellow students."

In each school where a Campus Life ministry is being established, Harwell said, he talks to the principal to "explain what we're doing and establish a working relationship with the school."

"The reception has been good," he said. "At Stevenson, Jay Foersma said we were the best thing that had happened to the school."

UNDER HARWELL'S leadership, there now are Campus Life meetings every two weeks in the homes of Stevenson and Bentley students.

"These are basically evangelistic and for all kinds of kids," Harwell said. "We have games to break the ice, then some discussion on a given topic. We give the kids a chance to express their opinions, and then I try to wrap it up at the end of a meeting."

On alternate weeks, he said, Campus Life sponsors insight meetings, also in homes, for Christian students who want to study the Bible closely and apply its teaching to everyday life and problems.

An attractive magazine called "Campus Life," published by Youth for Christ International, is used as text for the student meetings.

LARGER EVENTS several times a year also are part of the program.

The next major one will be sponsoring a Halloween "Scream in the Dark" haunted house in an old house on Six Mile between Haggerty and Newburgh.

"The State Highway Department has given us permission to fix it up for this fund-raiser," Harwell said.

The ministry also will sponsor a Nov. 14 assembly in Stevenson and occasionally brings Christian rock groups

and other musicians to the area.

There are occasional retreats for interested students and a delegation will go to Niagara Falls Dec. 27 to 30 for a Youth for Christ Holiday Teen Convention.

Harwell's headquarters for the Campus Life ministry are located at 14300 McNichols, Detroit. He said he hopes in the next few years to expand to several more high schools in the area.

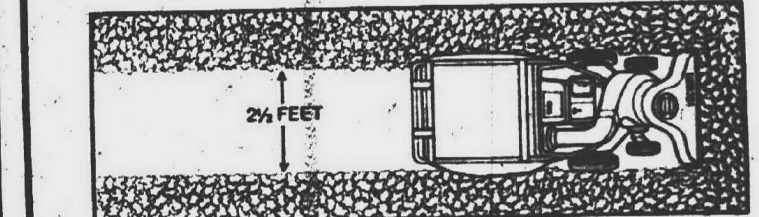

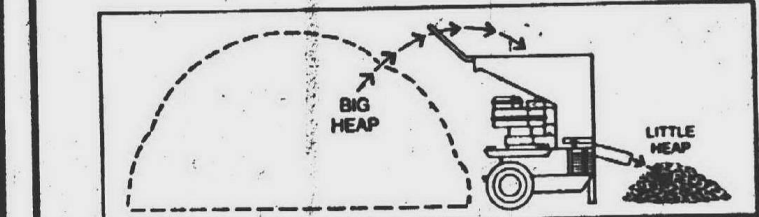

Hero Fails As Newsmen

The day when rowdy, hard-drinking Hildy Johnson, whose soul is lost to the newspaper game, should turn into a song-and-dance matinee prettyman should never have arrived. But it did.

The Meadow Brook Theater revival of Ben Hecht and Charles MacArthur's boisterous comedy of Chicago in the '20s, "The Front Page," at Oakland University turned this reviewer to her program notes to verify the production was not an amateur performance.

THE COMEDY classic is set in the era of gang war, grafting city officials, corrupt politicians and press wars, when headlines instead of home delivery sold newspapers on the streets and the number of newspapers made competition fierce.

Newsman generally were drifters, tough, underpaid but with a passion for their jobs that passeth understanding.

Meadow Brook flubbed it. While the rest of the press

room crowd turns in acceptable performances, Hildy, supposedly the star reporter of the criminal courts building, fails both as dedicated newsmen and as sincere lover of the girl for whom he is supposed to be quitting the news for the advertising world.

William LeMassena comes closer to his role of the ruthless managing editor, but the performance is flawed by slips into near geniality.

DON KONRAD'S portrayal of the wistful, escaping anarchist is the most believable performance of the evening. Both Elaine Brown as Mollie Malloy and Renee Clare as Peggy Grant, Hildy's beloved, lacked polish. "Front Page" will be at Meadow Brook through Nov. 4.

Meadow Brook's next showing will be "Inherit the Wind," based on the famed "monkey trial" which pitted the famed liberal lawyer Clarence Darrow and fundamental Baptist conservative William Jennings Bryan.

Hockey



The biggest problem in amateur hockey these days is that there is just not enough ice to provide for the ever swelling numbers of hockey enthusiasts.

Not that new rinks aren't being built. There are more rinks than ever before, but "Every time a new rink is built, more interest is generated and new teams are formed," explains Pete Hind, manager of Spectrum Ice Rink in Romulus and a past board member of the Michigan Amateur Hockey Association.

"I got up at 3:30 in the morning every Sunday for four years to take my team up to Tilbury, Ontario," Hind explains cheerfully.

Did he mind? No, not really. It was just a small sacrifice that he and all other hockey lovers -- are glad to make for the thrill of participating in the "fastest game in the world."

THE MICHIGAN Amateur Hockey Association with headquarters at 21706 Love Ave., St. Clair Shores, provides teams for boys from about 3 1/2 to 18. Old fogies have their chance at hockey, too. Senior Hockey Leagues are for adults only, and the Over 30 Leagues provide a slower game with no checking for family men and "the more chicken at heart" who

shy away from rough physical contact.

A call to your local parks and recreation department should put you in touch with nearby teams and associations. Applications for hockey players are often taken through December so there is still plenty of time to sign up and find yourself a team that may be looking for someone just like you.

The challenges of hockey are:

many, as any player can tell you. "Hockey teaches the responsibilities of sportsmanship and fair play probably more than any other game," explains Pete Hind. "The close physical contact stresses discipline and keeping a cool head. These things are essential to the playing of the game."

Team fights and brawls on the ice? These things happen, of course, but neither amateur nor professional coaches like to see them because they point to a break-down in the

game and a loss of "that cool head" that every good hockey player strives to maintain.

HIND STRESSES the importance of well-made equipment and protection. It's tempting to economize on cheap helmets and shin and elbow pads, but many injuries can be avoided through the use of quality gear.

Hind recalls a head injury to a boy on his own rink and says that the boy would have been unharmed if he had been wearing better protection.

The monetary difference between a cheap helmet and a really good one is only about \$8 (quality helmets can be purchased for about \$12), and the difference to one's physical safety is well worth it.

"If the game is played well, it's not that dangerous," says Hind. "Most of the dangers come from back checking or the puck itself, and in these cases the injuries are usually minor."

Kids who play hockey are kept busy during week nights and weekends with games and practices.

"My boys are always occupied," says one working mother of two rosy-cheeked elementary schoolers.

"I'm counting on hockey to keep them out of trouble for the next four or five years," she added wryly.

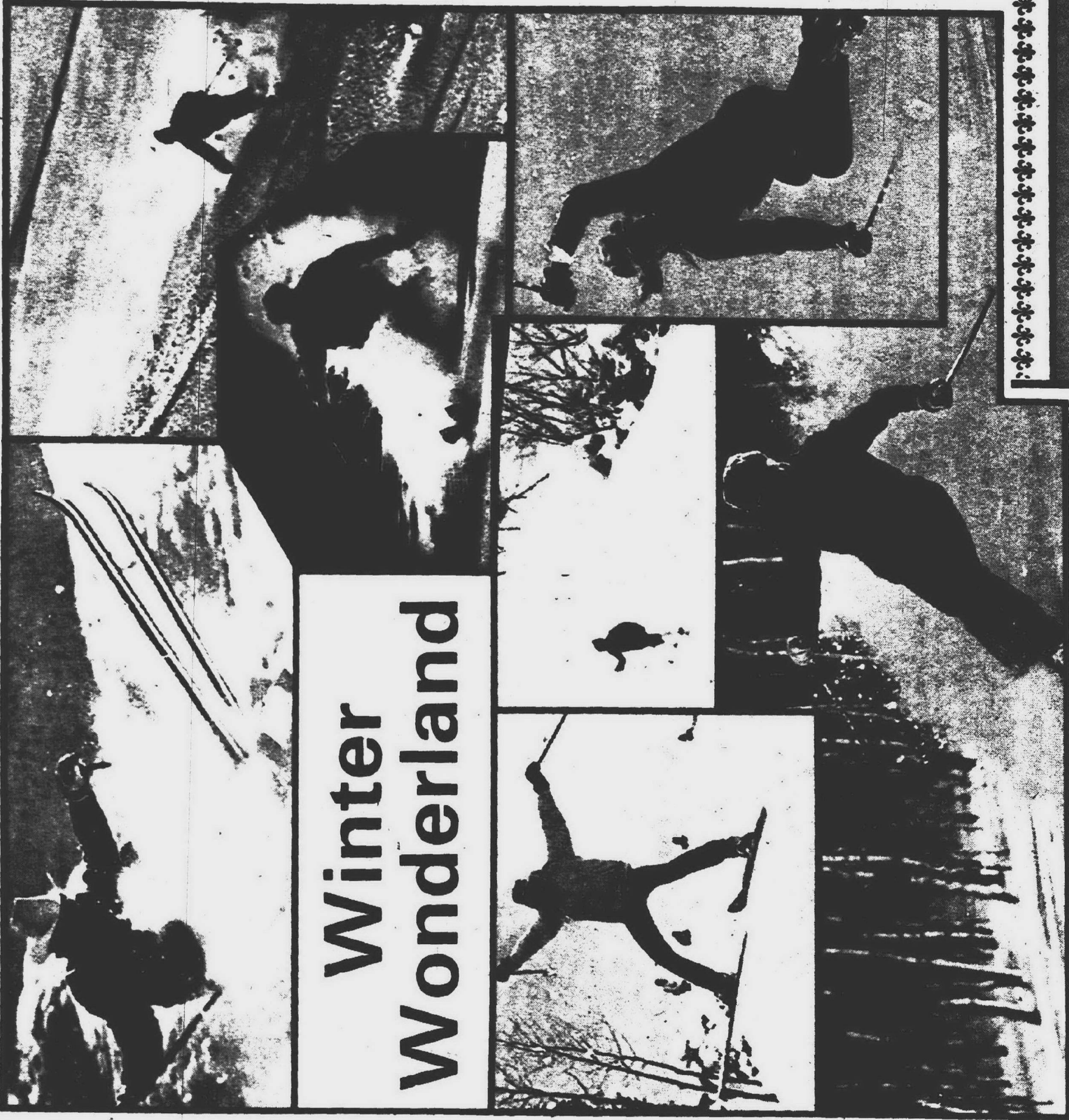

Ski Lodges

Nor more than a few hours from Observerland, there are a number of good, well equipped ski areas that can be enjoyed by beginning skiers as a means of whetting appetites and providing introductions to the sport.

While the ski areas mentioned have enough facilities for even the experienced skier, they are particularly recommended to the cautious newcomer, who is leery of investing a lot of time. What he wants is a quickie trip and just a little taste of it all to decide whether or not he's going to become really involved.

MT. HOLLY -- Fifteen miles north of Pontiac on Dixie Hwy., Mt. Holly offers 10 open slopes with extra long beginner and intermediate slopes. A ski shop, ski school and two rental equipment departments are available as well as a lodge, two restaurants and a cocktail lounge with entertainment.

MT. BRIGHTON -- Featuring 16 runs up to 1,500 ft. long with a 200 ft. vertical drop, Mt. Brighton also boasts three chair lifts, J-Bar, 12 rope tows, a lodge, dining room, cafeterias, 3 fireplaces, a cocktail lounge and 24 certified instructors. Exit 1-96 at Grand River, 1/4 mile east to Chellis Rd. Turn right, drive one mile to 4141 Bauer Rd. in Brighton.

IRISH HILLS -- 16 slopes, among them an 1,800-footer and one that is half a mile long. You'll also find a chair lift, three T-bars, six tows, a lodge with a sundeci, fireplaces, food, cocktails, a ski shop, rental equipment, instructors, a 100-bed dormitory for groups and a toboggan area. US-12 at Towers, 10 miles west of Clinton.

ALPINE VALLEY -- Includes 18 slopes (the longest is 1,500 ft.), cross country trails, eight chair lifts, 14 tows, ski shop with rentals, instructions, cocktail lounge with entertainment, cafeteria, lodging facilities adjacent, and a complete new beginners' area with beginners' chairlift and Sitz lift. On M-59, 10 mi. west of Pontiac, 13 mi. east of US-23.

PINE KNOB -- With 14 slopes to 2,300 ft., new beginners' area, two chair lifts, nine rope tows, certified instructors, complete rentals, ski shop, lodge with cafeteria, cocktail lounge, restaurant, night club. Sasabaw exit from I-75, north to Clarkston Rd., then east.

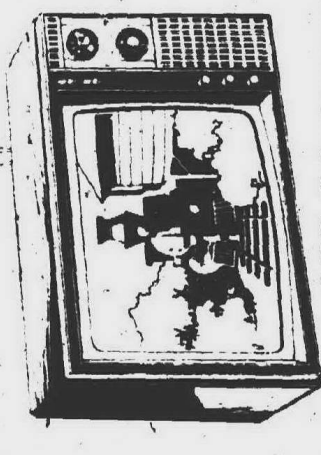

The History Of Skiing

Today, skiing is a sport for relaxation and recreation. About 4,000 years ago, it was a form of transportation, used by ancient Laplanders, dressed in fur and hides, who strapped wooden slats with rawhide thongs on their feet and set off to distant hunting grounds, or maybe to visit neighbors in a distant cave.

The earliest traces of skiing activity can be found in the walls of a Norwegian cave drawing which depicts men on skis. Believed to be about 4,000 years old, the drawings depict skis shaped like snow shoes.

As a matter of fact, the ancient Danish word for "ski" translates as "shoe."

In time skiing was used for military pursuits. The tactical maneuvers on skis played a major role in winning the Battle of Oslo in 1200 for the Norwegians.

UNTIL THE 19TH century, skiing was still used as only means of defense and transportation. The technique used until then could be classified as early cross-country.

Downhill skiing techniques as done now were still unknown.

The first officially recorded ski competition did a lot to revolutionize skiing techniques. Until that time

people. In 1932 the Winter Olympics were held at Lake Placid, N.Y., and the resulting newspaper coverage helped drum up new enthusiasm throughout the nation.

T-bars, chair-lifts and gondolas began appearing in the '40s and suddenly skiing was made more desirable to the many people who were unable, or unwilling, to hike up a hill for hours only to glide down in the course of a few minutes.

In the 1950s, huge ski lodges near major cities such as Detroit began appearing, and now the sport was possible on a local level for people with the time and a little extra money.

ONCE A RICH man's sport, skiing is now the rage among many middle income Americans and their children. Many public schools have ski clubs and teenage ski weekends are part of their programs.

High fashion ski wear available in the growing number of specialty ski shops has given glamor to the sport and the aura of its being a really "in" thing.

More than five million skiers will take to the slopes this year to do their thing with fiberglass skis and bright, handsome waterproof ski-wear.

That old Leplander with his wooden slats and rawhide thongs wouldn't know quite what to make of it all. Times have changed, and so has skiing.

More than just a winter sport, skiing has become a way of life. Ask anyone who skis. You'll hear tales not only of the sport itself, but glowing stories of travels, good times and an exciting social life.

Take traveling, for example. Dyed-in-the-wool skiers are apt to plan their vacations around the sport itself and head off to some of the fabulous and far-away slopes in the West, in Canada or in Europe.

Ski enthusiasts are not at a loss in planning their vacations. It's off to the slopes for them, where they'll not only ski but enjoy comfortable lodgings in a chalet styled hotel complete with planned activities, good companionship, hardy meals and a refreshing change of pace from the work-a-day world.

WHAT MIGHT you expect on a typical ski weekend? Well, think snow and come along on an imaginary trip through an enchantingly white world.

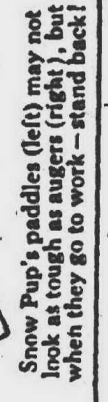

Skating In Observerland

Observerland is full of great places to skate. Find out just what the various facilities closest to you are, and then take advantage of them!

GARDEN CITY--A brand new enclosure for the ice rink at Merriman and Cherry Hill opens up a whole new world of activity in Garden City. Figure skating lessons run for 10-week sessions and will begin at the end of October, depending on when the new rink is ready. Mondays and Wednesdays, 4 p.m. to 4:30--skating lessons for schoolchildren. Tuesdays and Thursdays, 1 p.m. to 3 p.m.--Moms and Tots skating lessons.

Also planned are a one-night-a-week class for teens as well as open skating on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. If you want to play hockey, remember that the Over 30 Hockey League is expanding and looking for new players. Dennis Rivard, Civic Arena director, also plans a business-men's open skating period between 11:30-1:30 as well as senior citizen activity and a possible student ice show.

LIVONIA--Two enclosed ice rinks, Devon-Aire at Sunset near W. Chicago, and the Ford Rink near Lyndon and Farmington (which includes its own rifle range) are open from September to March. Figure skating lessons are now in process but another session starts at the end of November. There are half-hour classes for moms and tots as well as for school children.

PLYMOUTH--Another brand new indoor rink for Observerland, Plymouth's is located at 525 Farmer St. and is part of a giant new cultural

center, which includes arts and crafts rooms, offices and meeting facilities. Skating classes are already in session, but registration for the next session will begin in January. Classes meet for 10 sessions, last a half-hour and also include two extra hours of free skating.

REDFORD--Still another new one! Located on Beech Daly between Schoolcraft and Plymouth, this new enclosed rink includes a pro shop which sells sporting goods equipment. Classes start toward the end of October (depending on just when the new rink is ready) and run through Dec. 15.

The second session for figure skating will begin with Jan. 6 registration. Classes are a half-hour long and meet once a week during the day and after school.

SOUTHFIELD--You can register at any time for ice skating lessons for classes beginning Nov. 6, Jan. 8 or Feb. 12. Classes are 45 minutes long and are held once a week for five weeks. Moms and tots, kindergartners, elementary schoolers, teens, adults and advanced skaters all have their own classes as well as a chance to take part in the student ice show in April.

WESTLAND--The city has two municipal outdoor rinks, one at Jaycee Park on Hunter and Wildwood, the other on Henry Ruff and Palmer. Figure skating lessons and a hockey clinic are usually given by the end of November, depending on weather conditions. Future plans include the enclosure of the Jaycee Park rink.

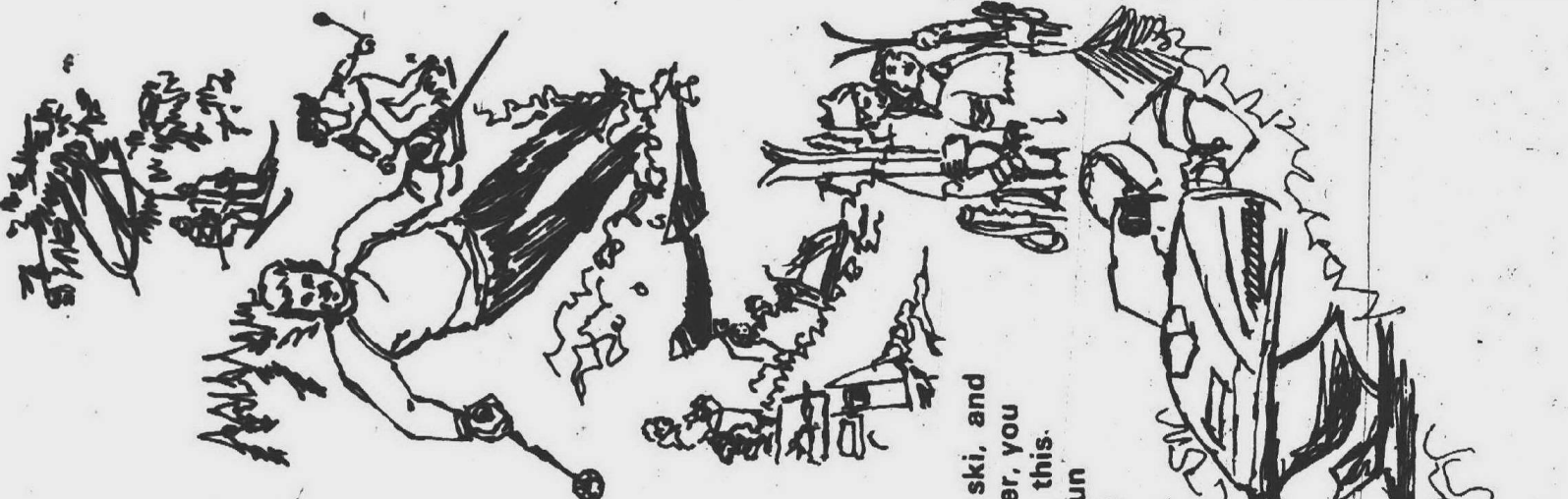

Ice Fishing

A great frigid expanse of grey ice reaches gracefully into the pale winter sky ... a lemon colored sun cooly observing a snowy world ... such is the scene for ice fishermen who visit Michigan's lakelands at the very height of winter.

There's something of magic in it really. To be able to pierce the vast ice and to capture live, fresh food from beneath its grim exterior is a challenge that pits man against his hostile environment.

They're there all right, those perch, blue gills, crappies and pike. But if you want them you must be patient, persevering, hardy and skillful.

The rewards are many. It's good for the soul to escape from our over technologized world into the quiet serenity of a wintry lake. And it's fun to create your own little cocoon of warmth and good fellowship within a fisherman's shanty that rests on the ice.

Some ice fishermen build their own collapsible models out of wood. Others buy or rent canvas shanties from sporting good dealers. A shanty,

town on Lake St. Clair is set up, weather permitting, and individual shanties are rented out to ice fishermen.

Your home on ice can be heated in a number of ways. You can build a fire if you like things primitive or you can use any one of a number of portable stoves or heaters that are available to sportsmen who don't mind a few little touches civilization.

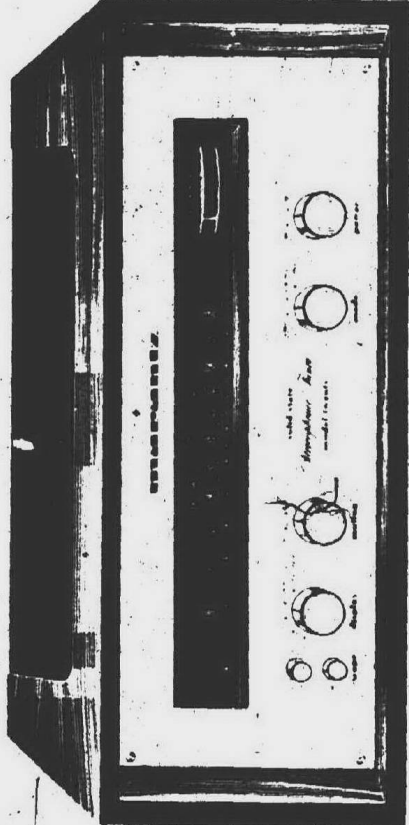
Ice fishing equipment is simple enough. The winter fisherman can choose between a short ice rod that he operated by hand or a tip-up rod (used for pike) that rests by itself on the ice and gives a signal when a fish gets hooked.

The ice fisherman will also need to insulate himself against the cold: a good pair of waterproof, lightweight coveralls like the ones worn by snowmobilers will serve him well and can be purchased for as little as \$29.95 at most sporting goods dealers.

Don't forget about piercing that ice. An auger will drill a hole for you mechanically, and a spud, a sharp ended iron pipe, can be inserted with the strength of your own muscle power.

Because Michigan winters are uneven, the ice fishing season is fairly short, points out Colum Harrison, Manager of Gell's Sporting Goods in Livonia. So winter fishermen are advised to watch out for the times that ice is 18" to 2 feet thick - and then really go to it.

Skating On Ice

Rejean Tremblay (most people call him "Ray") is a handsome young French Canadian who is in love with life and most particularly in love with his job as manager of Southfield's fabulous Sports Arena.

His eyes light up at the mention of last year's Ice-O-Rama show in April which was the culmination of Southfield's extensive ice and figure skating program. "I've seen a lot of ice shows," says Ray, who has been speaking English for only a few years, "but I've never seen one with such spirit as this one."

Participating in the show were nearly 100 people, most of whom were students in the skating classes sponsored by the city's recreation program. Complete with skis, special lighting and costumes designed by Jim Cope, Southfield's figure skating instructor and a former Ice Capades performer, the show included skaters of all ages.

A FAVORITE with audiences were the four-year-olds who performed as wooden soldiers complete with costumes of red jackets and black stripes sewn for them by their mothers. The oldest performer was a woman of more than 70 who had just completed with the first class.

The three sellout performances

delighted the audiences, although the calibre of skating was not always at a professional level. Tremblay recalls that the skater who portrayed Snoopy spent a lot of time "on his derriere," thus scoring a hit with spectators and adding a special light-hearted touch.

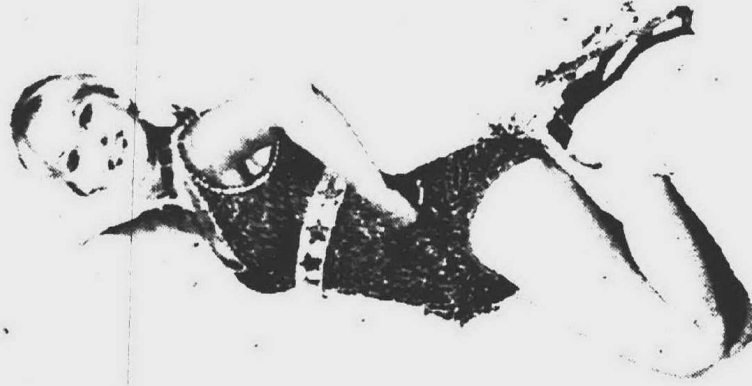
This season's ice show will be held in April of 1973 and will run for five performances to accommodate the large numbers of people expected.

The cast will be made up of members of Southfield's skating classes which are now being formed. To register, visit the Sports Arena at Southfield's Civic Center and sign up for the November, January or February sessions. Classes are 45 minutes long and are held once a week for five weeks.

What should parents do to insure their children of a good skating experience? Tremblay, native of Cicoutimi, a small town about 130 miles northwest of Quebec City, doesn't remember "when I first put skates on my feet," although he thinks he was probably around a year and a half.

A former hockey professional and coach in Southfield's Hockey Club, Tremblay feels that "the smaller you are, the better you can learn."

THE KIND OF skates a child

More is yet to come for Southfield is planning still another ice rink in its Civic Center on Evergreen Road between 10 and 11 Mile Road.

These facilities plus many more have made Southfield a finalist in the national gold medal award contest for excellence in the field of park and recreation management. Is it any wonder?



Ski Clubs

Ski clubs have sprung up like mushrooms during the last few years and are doing their share to make skiing one of the biggest of all winter sports.

There are ski clubs for married couples, and there are clubs for singles. There are ski clubs for old married folk in their 30s and 40s and there are clubs for the bell bottomed set in their 20s.

The Livonia Ski Club has a large group of more than 110 members, while the membership of most area clubs is single, the Livonia club is made up largely of married couples between the ages of 30-35.

THE GROUP takes several trips each year; this year they contemplate weekend visits to Boyne Highlands and Sugar Loaf in Michigan and are tentatively planning week long trips to Aspen, Colo. and a train journey to Canada.

"Generally speaking the people you meet through ski clubs are sort of young at heart, and the partying is pretty good," comments Paul Dufault, a member of the Livonia Ski Club.

Dufault became a ski lover when

his brother dragged him along on a ski trip and he came back "hooked."

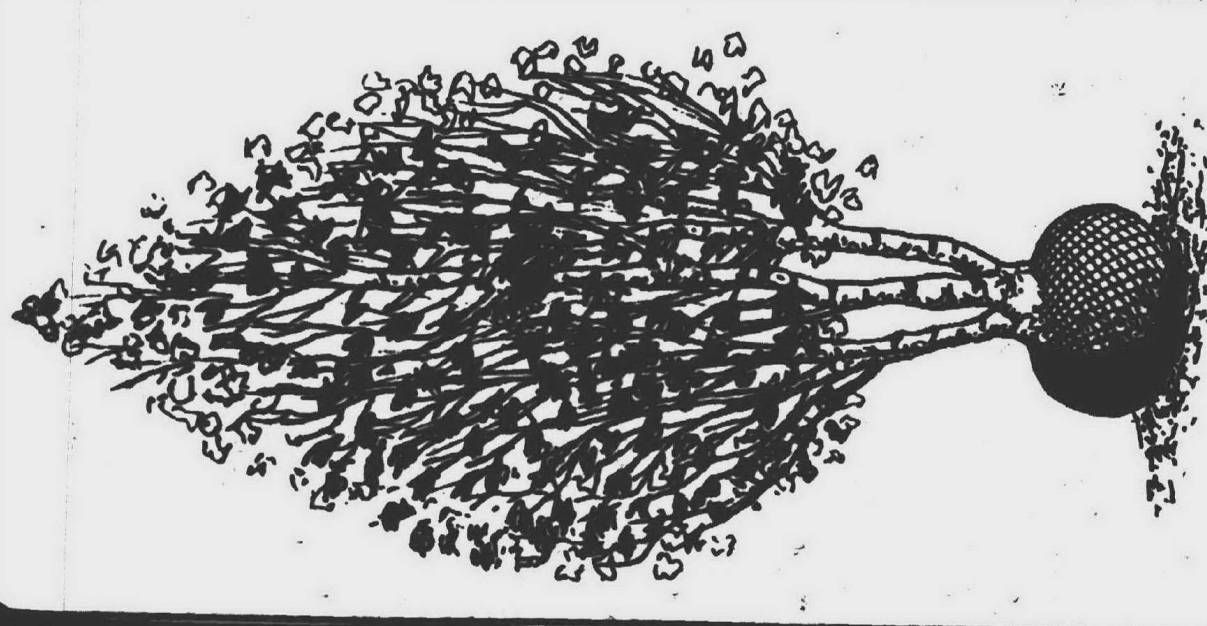
Skiers, as a group, are notoriously accident prone, but this doesn't seem to bother them.

"We've had a lot of broken bones," Dufault comments cheerfully. "I had a broken shoulder last year, and several of our past presidents have had their share of accidents."

LAUGHS AND YUKS are a regular part of the Livonia Ski Club's agenda; members frequently meet for such crazy events as a backwards skiing "contest" and competitions that give prizes to the least accomplished skiers.

On the more serious side are lectures and discussions on training and technique given by President Gary Gothard of 14744 Huff, Livonia.

Best of all is an attitude that is nourished and stimulated by ski clubs. "Once you ski," says Dufault, "you are no longer imprisoned by winter as other people are. You can look forward to it and use it for your own enjoyment."
