Turnout Of 90 Per Cent Expected To Visit Polls

A turnout of as many as 90 per cent of the 15,296 voters in the city and township of Plymouth is expected for Tuesday's election which will fill a variety of offices starting with the nation's presidency.

Also to be decided are several state issues which have stirred great controversy, among them being proposals for abortion reform and a revised tax structure. "Presidential elections always get a big turnout," commented Mrs. Helen Richardson, veteran township clerk, as she revealed that township registration now stands at 8,789 - an increase of 1,564 voters since 1970.

CITY CLERK Paul Brumfield, who was appointed recently to fill the vacancy left by the death of Eugene Slider, said in predicting close to a 90 per cent vote that the demand for absentee ballots has been so great he has had to reorder them twice.

City registration now totals 6,507 voters, which is an increase of 1,043 from two years ago. The township has a full-fledged contest in progress to fill six of its governmental positions, and the only other purely local office at stake is the category of district judge. In this, however, Dunbar Davis, the incumbent, is unopposed.

Another judicial figure who

has no ballot opposition is Thomas J. Foley of Plymouth, who is seeking re-election as a judge of the Wayne County Circuit Court.

The only legislative office on the ballot for which Plymouth has a candidate is the 52nd District seat in the State House of Representatives. Robert E. Dwyer, who lives in the city, is the Democratic nominee. His opponent is Republican Raymond J. Smit of Ann Arbor, who has served three terms as representative from the old 53rd District.

Dwyer formerly was Democratic chairman for the 2nd Congressional District and currently is a member of the party's State Central Committee.

ONE OF THE hottest races in which Plymouth voters will have a voice is that for the 2nd District congressional seat in which U.S. Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) is battling for a fourth term against State Rep. Marvin R. Stempion of Livonia.

Interest in the township campaign is running high as the result of a rare Democratic bid for power.

The Democratic slate includes as its candidates Joseph Krochmalny for supervisor, Lois Lane for clerk, Earl Dey and Joseph Rey for trustees and constable Douglas Ritter and Thomas Sullivan.

Against them the Republicans have nominated

J.D. McLaren for supervisor, Mrs. Richardson for clerk, Russell Ash and Gerald Burke for trustees and Donald King and James Cousino for constables. The party's one other candidate, Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes, is unopposed for the office of treasurer.

ON THE TOWNSHIP ballot, too, is a special referendum item which stems from a zoning dispute.

Dr. Gerald H. Fitch, who currently maintains a dental office in the city, seeks to move that office to property he owns next to his home at Bradner and Schoolcraft. To do this it was necessary to obtain a change in the zoning

classification from R-1 (single family residential) to T-0 (transitional office).

The township planning commission turned him down last spring, and Dr. Fitch then appealed to the board of trustees. In a 4-3 vote on April 25 the trustees overturned the planning commission's decision and approved the T-0 zoning.

However, property owners who opposed the rezoning put petitions in circulation and gained enough signatures to force the question to be submitted to the electorate of the township at large. As the question is phrased on the ballot, a "yes" vote will favor letting the T-0 zoning stand.

New Speed Gun Aimed At City's Violators

To the habitual traffic violator as well as the normal "law abiding citizen" who treats traffic violations as a minor infraction, easily excusable - beware. The Plymouth police department is aiming at you.

In an all-out effort to reduce traffic accidents and speeding on Plymouth streets, police now are using an inconspicuous yet effective device for spotting and recording the speed of automobiles.

Called the Speedgun, it can be hand-held by the officer, in or out of the car, or mounted on the police car.

AT THE MOMENT the officer points the Speedgun at an on-coming or passing vehicle, the speed is registered and held in a small window-like frame at the back of the device.

During normal patrol, should an apparent speeding violation occur within view of the officer, he need only draw

his vehicle to a safe stop and aim the Speedgun at the suspected violation to affirm his judgment of excessive speed.

Hand held operation is different from fixed operation only in that it offers greater flexibility. Accuracy is not affected.

When stopped during patrol, by parking his car where he can observe the maximum area and have easy access into traffic, the officer will be in a position to take instantaneous action should the opportunity arise.

POLICE CHIEF Timothy Ford said the Speedgun enables the officer to work locations previously inaccessible. "This new unit allows the most difficult locations to be covered without creating any additional hazard or traffic tieup," Ford said.

Power for the Speedgun is available by plugging its cord into the car's cigarette lighter or from a power pack.

With the portable power pack, it is particularly useful as a hand-held device out of and away from the police car. The officer may park his vehicle close at hand while he walks into areas where it would be unsafe to park.

"IN THIS ONE single device," Ford said, "we have at hand the capability to perform any speed detection function previously possible plus the ability to make an accurate speed determination in any direction at any time without prior planning and regardless of location in respect to the police car or direction of travel."

Ford said it is hoped that this new equipment will eventually reduce the speeding in Plymouth.

"Since it is impossible for a motorist to see the equipment or know which police cars are carrying it, the safest thing for motorists to do is to observe the speed limits at all times, thus avoiding the possibility of receiving a speeding ticket."

THE SCHOOL district grew by nearly 800 students or 7.54 per cent this year (for a total of 10,993 students) but Hoben said it could grow by another 1,000 before the school year finishes.

Gallimore Elementary School received 14 new students in one day last week, he said. The district is not given state aid for any students who enter the school system between now and June.

Even though enrollment jumped, the district added only five new teachers, Hoben said. The total number of teachers is 479 this year.

Instructional costs make up the largest portion of the budget with elementary instruction taking 30.6 per cent or \$3.35 million and secondary instruction taking 37.9 per cent or \$4.15 million. Both budgets are up from last year

but reflect a slightly smaller portion of the budget this year than they did last year.

OPERATION COSTS make up 12.7 per cent of the budget at \$1.39 million compared to 12.2 per cent or \$1.2 million last year.

Administrative costs are 3.9 per cent of the budget at a total of \$430,000. Last year they were at 3.6 per cent of the budget or \$361,000.

Special education has a \$294,700 budget or 2.69 per cent of the total.

THE DISTRICT'S

REVENUE is primarily from local taxes totaling \$8.2 million. Other local sources (such as delinquent taxes) bring local income up to \$8.58 million.

Other budgeted costs include summer school at .07 per cent of the budget or \$7,786; health and nursing at \$34,900 or .32 per cent; transportation at \$327,400 or 2.99 per cent; maintenance at \$392,000 or 3.59 per cent; fixed charges at \$452,700 or 4.14 per cent; and capital outlay at \$114,700 or one per cent.

School Heads Vote Against Proposal C

Still uncertain which way to vote on Proposals C and D on school financing Tuesday?

If you are, you aren't alone. The highly-publicized proposals are being billed as a pair and voters are being urged to vote either for or against both.

Proposal C will reduce use of property taxes as the main source of school financing. The only exceptions will be that millage used for debt retirement (six mills in Plymouth) and another six mills which can be voted for "enrichment."

Proposal D will remove the state constitutional ban on the graduated income tax. However, the State Legislature will have the final say on how to finance schools if Proposal C passes.

HERE IS A sampling of what school officials in Plymouth think on Proposal C:

School Supt. John Hoben is critical of the proposal because the "distribution of money hasn't been worked out."

"I'm for tax reform of some kind, but I want something that is equitable," he said.

"Something has to happen" to help poorer school districts, but he said that he's "not convinced this is the total solution."

"I'm not sure whether it will bring the Inksters and Clarencevilles up to Plymouth's standard or if it will have the elevator effect where everybody adjusts to a median."

"I don't want the state to control curriculum by controlling the budget," he adds.

DEPUTY SUPT. Earl Hogan said that even if Proposal C passes, the district will still levy millage for debt retirement, and it won't affect plans for the \$21 million bond issue on Dec. 11 to build more schools.

School board President George Lawton says that morally he supports the proposal, but he is against it from a "technical standpoint and will vote against it."

Fund Drive Fears Failure

Unless there is a last minute rush of contributors, the Plymouth Community Fund drive may miss its goal for the first time since the inception of the activity.

With only a few days to the deadline, the drive is only at the one-quarter pole. It is the slowest start ever and the expected "garrison" finish that usually pulled out a last minute victory has yet to show itself.

"We virtually are at the

desperate stage," Bill Carlson, chairman of the drive, stated Thursday afternoon, "and all we can do now is hope - and I hope it is not in vain."

There is one bright note in the gloomy picture. That is the fact that the major industries have not yet completed the wage deduction part of their contributions.

"We are counting on industry to come through with \$142,000," he went on, "and we

are far from that point now." The chairman confessed optimism that industry will do its part. But he is concerned over the other divisions - particularly the business district and the professional group.

"These two groups are about \$10,000 short of the goal we have set and there'll have to be some late rushing to reach it."

In other years the drive has slumped in some areas - but

just for a short time. When things looked the darkest, industry usually saved the day.

"We can only hope that this will be the case again," the chairman stated. "But it looks like a big job."

The Victory Dinner, as it was called in other years, is scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 16 and it may not be known until the final tally is made that night whether the goal of \$182,000 was reached.

Haunted House Attracts 7,000

The Plymouth Jaycees and Jayettes had approximately 7,000 visitors to their "haunted house" during its six-day run over the Halloween weekend.

"Most of the people were just great," said Sue Harper, Jayette chairman of the house. "But we were very disappointed with many of the teenagers."

Many groups made a tour of the haunted house the highlight of their Halloween parties. Scout troops went through en masse as did hundreds of families.

AND THEN THERE were the obnoxious teenagers, "about one in every 10." The behavior was quite consistent and not limited to just one crowd.

"By Monday, many of the girls did not want to work," said Mrs. Harper.

As she described it, they had to contend with hitting, spitting and swearing. One girl was "knocked flat." John Harper received a big cut below one eye. Anyone who was not behind bars was not safe. Several JCs were punched.

One youth picked up a three-year-old in the graveyard room and threatened to throw him into the cemetery. The child was terrified.

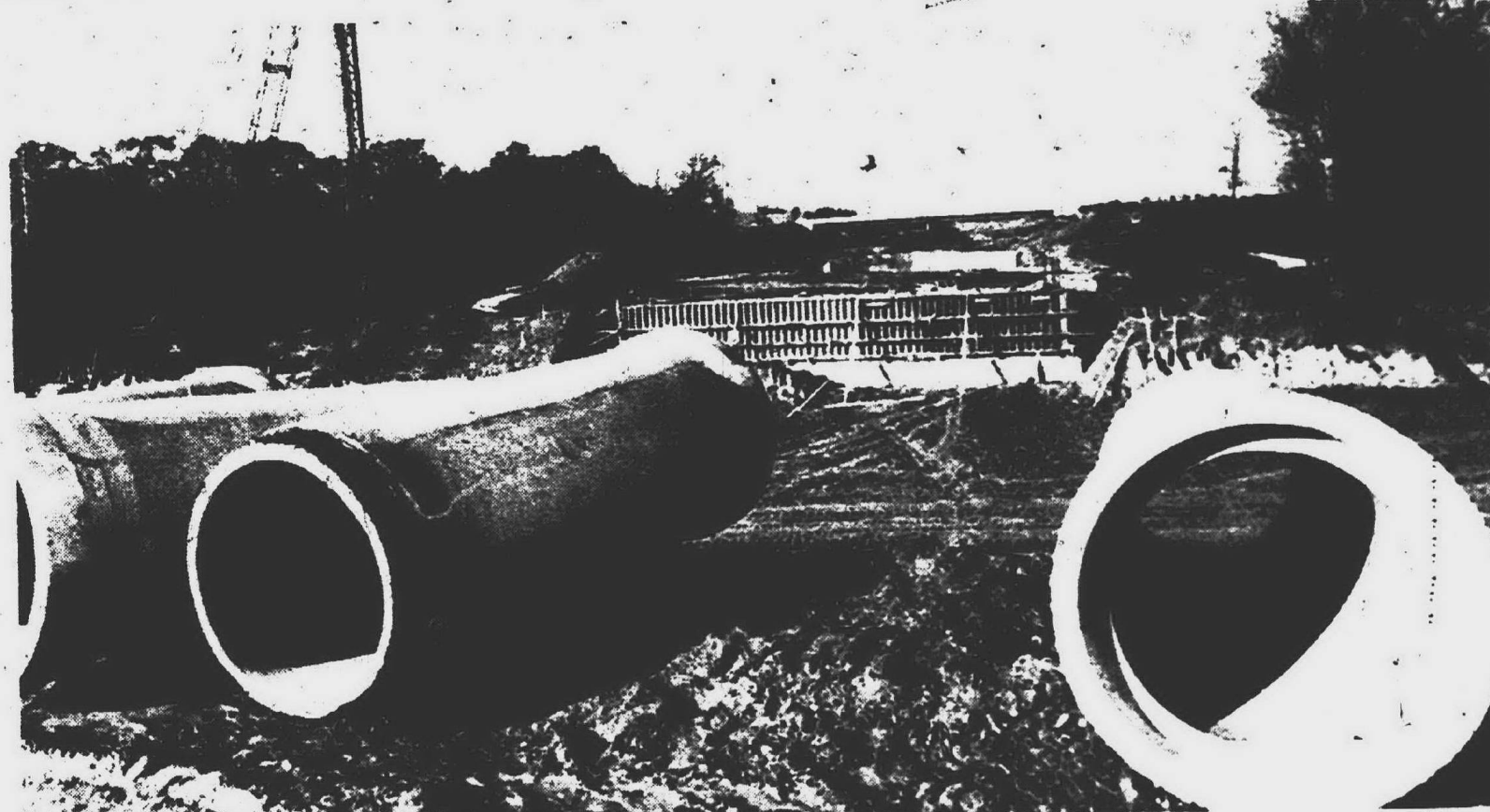
The culprits seemed to be the ones who went through the house three or four times. They knew when to expect someone to jump out at them and simply slugged them.

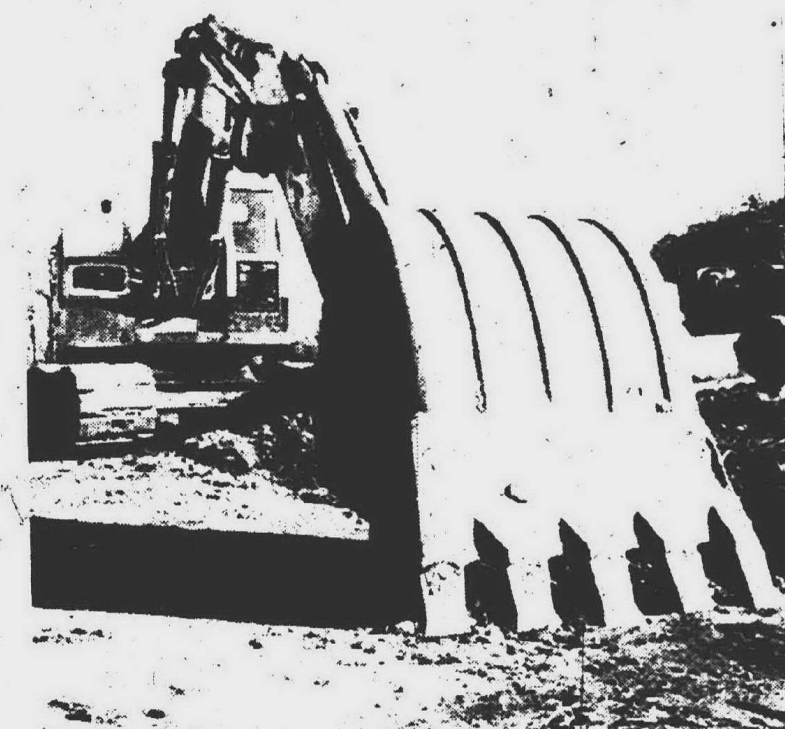
Will the JCs be in the haunted house business next year?

"Nothing has been drawn up as to how we specifically are going to finance these things," he said.

"Either way we are going to take a shellacking from the state," Lawton said, explaining that because Plymouth has a high income per person and a high tax base, it stands to lose money under the proposal.

"I'M GOING to vote against it," trustee John Graves said, citing his major objection as "lack of local control."

"I really don't think it will give taxpayers the tax break they think it will," he said.

THROUGH BIFOCALS

YOU FOLKS in the city's fourth precinct don't know it yet, but you will be among the nation's guinea pigs Tuesday.

This stems from the fact that the American Broadcasting Co. which is represented here by WXYZ (Ch. 7) - has selected the fourth as one of the "key precincts" on which its projection of winners will be based.

As explained by John H. Thompson, manager of ABC's political unit in New York, "Each key precinct is part of a statewide sample, which is a miniature of the state in terms of major factors which yield voting patterns."

"Among these factors are region of the state, urbanization, ethnic background, religion, income and past voting history. ABC selects key precincts in every state to clarify voting patterns for our news analysts on the air and our political scientists out of camera range."

"On election night, all this demographic data about each key precinct is stored in a computer memory. When an election reporter telephones the voting returns from a key precinct, that information is entered into the computer, which compares the new returns with the stored data. This enables us to detect the trend of the voting well in advance of the final outcome."

ABC HAS selected 81 such precincts in Michigan and will rely on volunteers from the League of Women Voters to report the returns by telephone to New York. The network's instructions here are to report the fourth precinct's totals only for president and U.S. senator.

Mrs. Melvin C. Gutherie Jr. of the Plymouth-Northville chapter to the LWV is reporting coordinator. Working with her will be Mrs. James Suhay, Mrs. Robert White, Mrs. Paul Cargo and Mrs. Fred Prezioso.

Mrs. Gutherie calls the project "a marvelous exercise in league performance and dependability."

Speaking for ABC, Thompson says, "Experience has shown that no other organization can match the league in election reporting. In state after state, 100 per cent of our sample is reported. If there are 50 key precincts in a state, 50 reporters will telephone, often in spite of considerable local difficulty. And they will call promptly, so that the sample takes meaningful shape quickly."

"In return, ABC contributes a flat sum to each state league for each key precinct covered, plus a state organizing fee. Of course ABC pays all expenses in addition. In 1972, league treasuries will be enlarged by a total approaching \$100,000, above expenses."

THE FOURTH precinct is that area of the city that lies within Sheldon Rd. on the west, Main St. on the east, Ann Arbor Rd. on the south and the combination of Elm and Wing Sts. on the north.

It has 1,428 registered voters who are eligible to participate in Tuesday's election and they live on such streets as South Evergreen, McKinley, Harvey, Herald, Jener, Woodland, Linden, Beech, Carol, Sutherland, Palmer, Hartsough, Ross and Byron.

Their voting record is consistently Republican, and undoubtedly it was that record of consistency which caught the eye of ABC analysts.

In 1968, the fourth gave Richard Nixon 627 votes for President, while Hubert Humphrey got 336 and George Wallace 70. Nixon's share was 61.7 per cent of the total, but if you put Nixon and Wallace figures together they represent 68.4 per cent.

In 1970, 73.1 per cent of the fourth's voters cast ballots for William Milliken for governor, and if you'll go back as far as 1964 you will find that George Romney received 76.7 per cent of the fourth's support

ABC obviously will be interested Tuesday in seeing whether the fourth stays around the 70 per cent mark in its Republicanism, or fluctuates drastically in either direction. When this is linked with the 80 other key precincts it has singled out in Michigan, the network will flash to the nation as early in the evening as it can who carried the state. It may be that over your Wednesday morning coffee you can say, "As the fourth went, so went the nation."

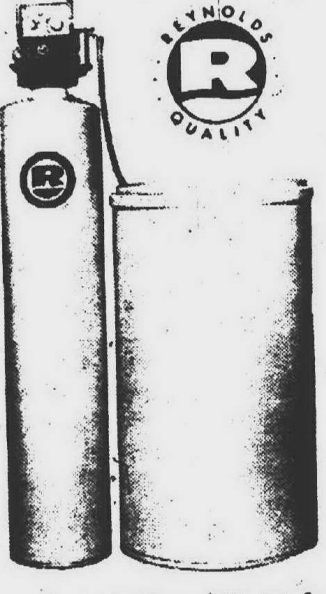

Mozart's Symphony No. 25, Mendelssohn's Piano Concerto No. 2, with Carolyn Jewell Anderson as soloist, Smetana's Overture to "The Bartered Bride," and Sibelius' Symphony No. 2. This concert will be in the Rackham Auditorium of Wayne State University.

Savola will also work with the Dearborn Symphony in November, while its conductor is away.

Savola came to Livonia in 1957 as instrumental music teacher at Bentley High School. Shortly after his arrival, he organized a youth orchestra and a board of directors and thus created the Livonia Youth Symphony Society. He was musical director and conductor of the organization for four years.

He received his bachelor of music degree from Northern Michigan University and his

master of music degree from Indiana University School of Music. He also studied at the Westminster Choir College.

Savola has conducted orchestras abroad. He spent the 1965-66 season in Finland as conductor of the Joensuu City Orchestra and the Joensuu Youth Orchestra. In 1963, he was guest conductor of the National Philharmonic of the Philippines and of the Northern Michigan University Orchestra.

He speaks German and Finnish fluently and travels almost every summer. His travels have taken him on an African safari, on a trip into the jungles of South America and around the world. He has made 14 trips to Europe.

In December, he'll be traveling to Disney World in Florida, where the Allen Park Symphony will present a concert the day after Christmas.

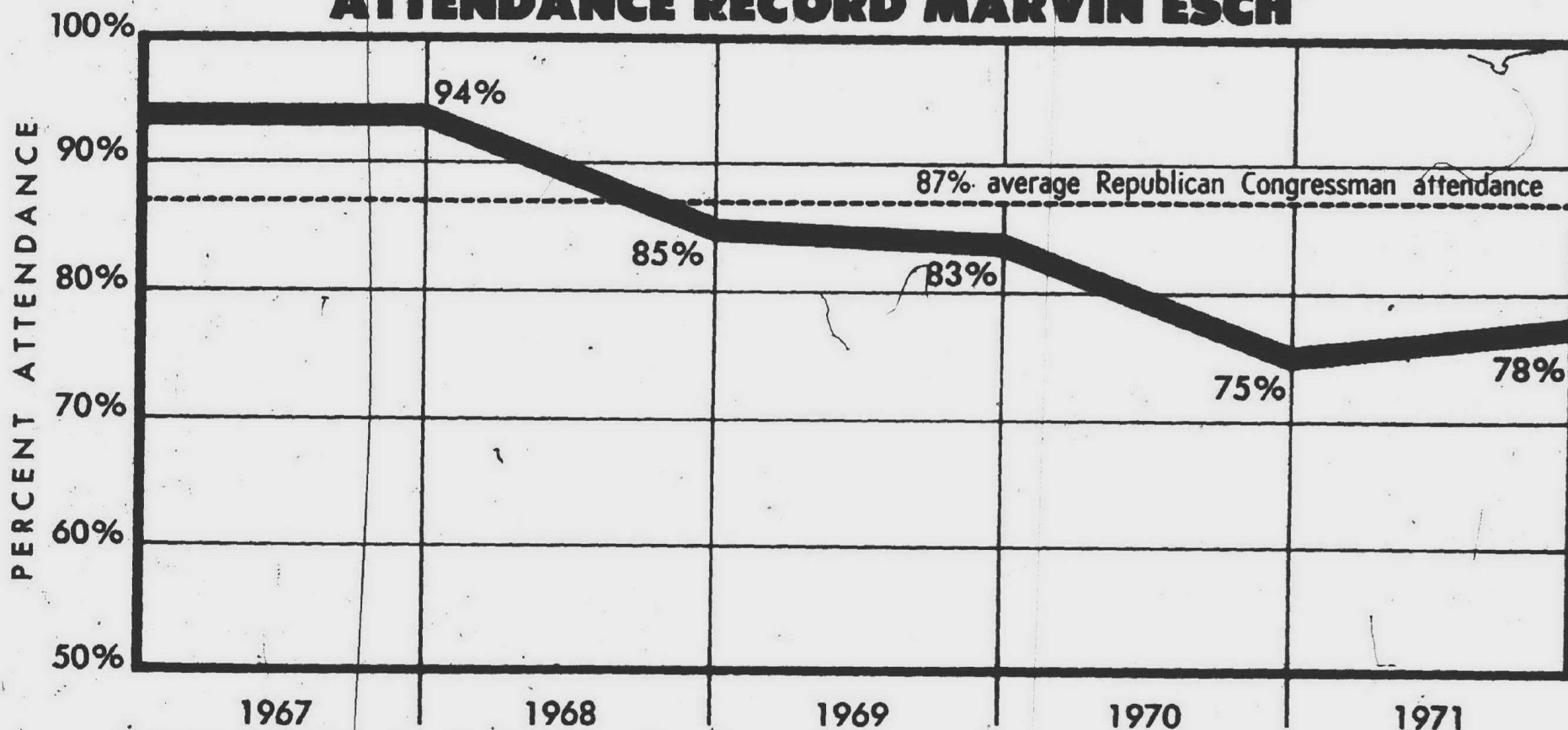

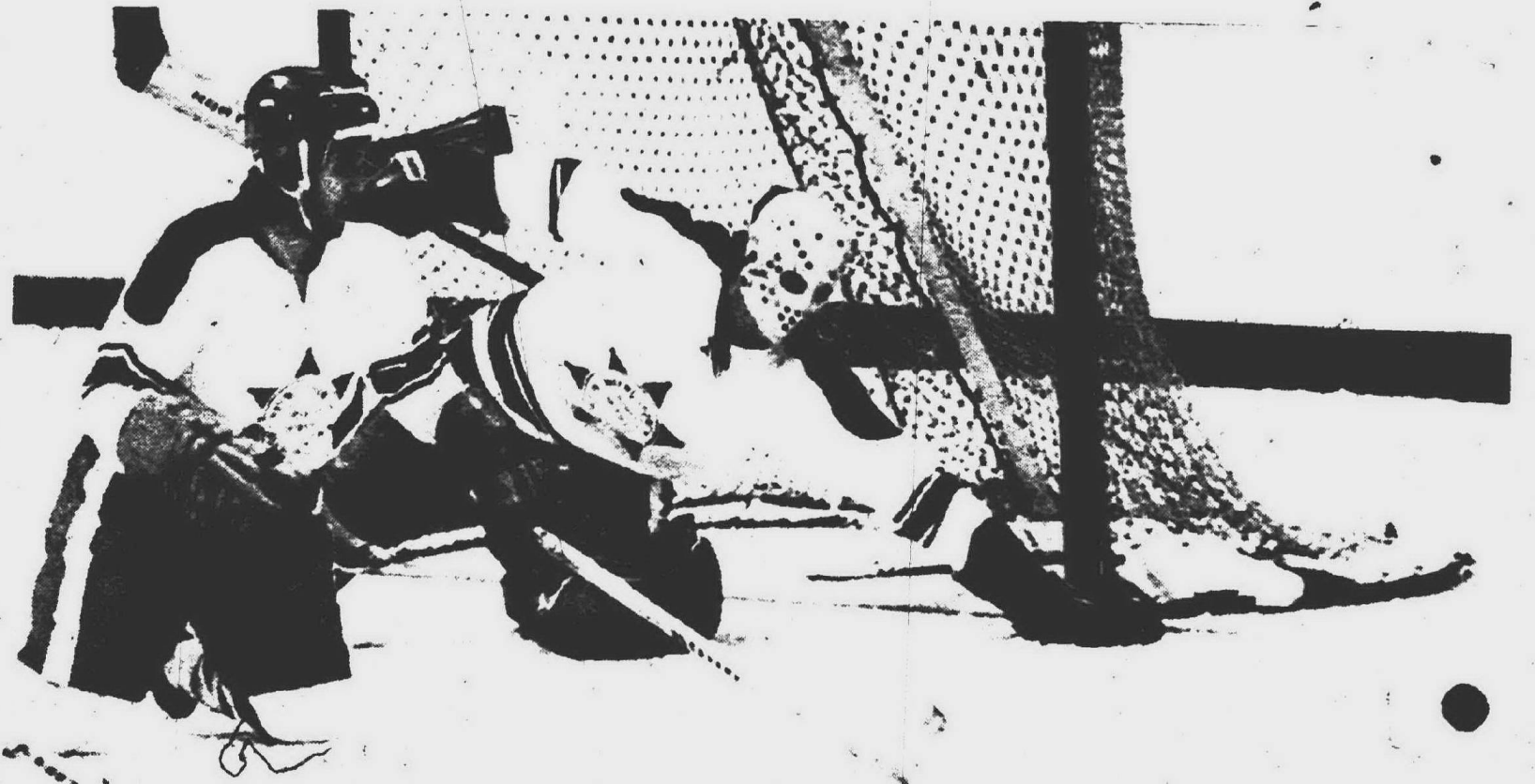

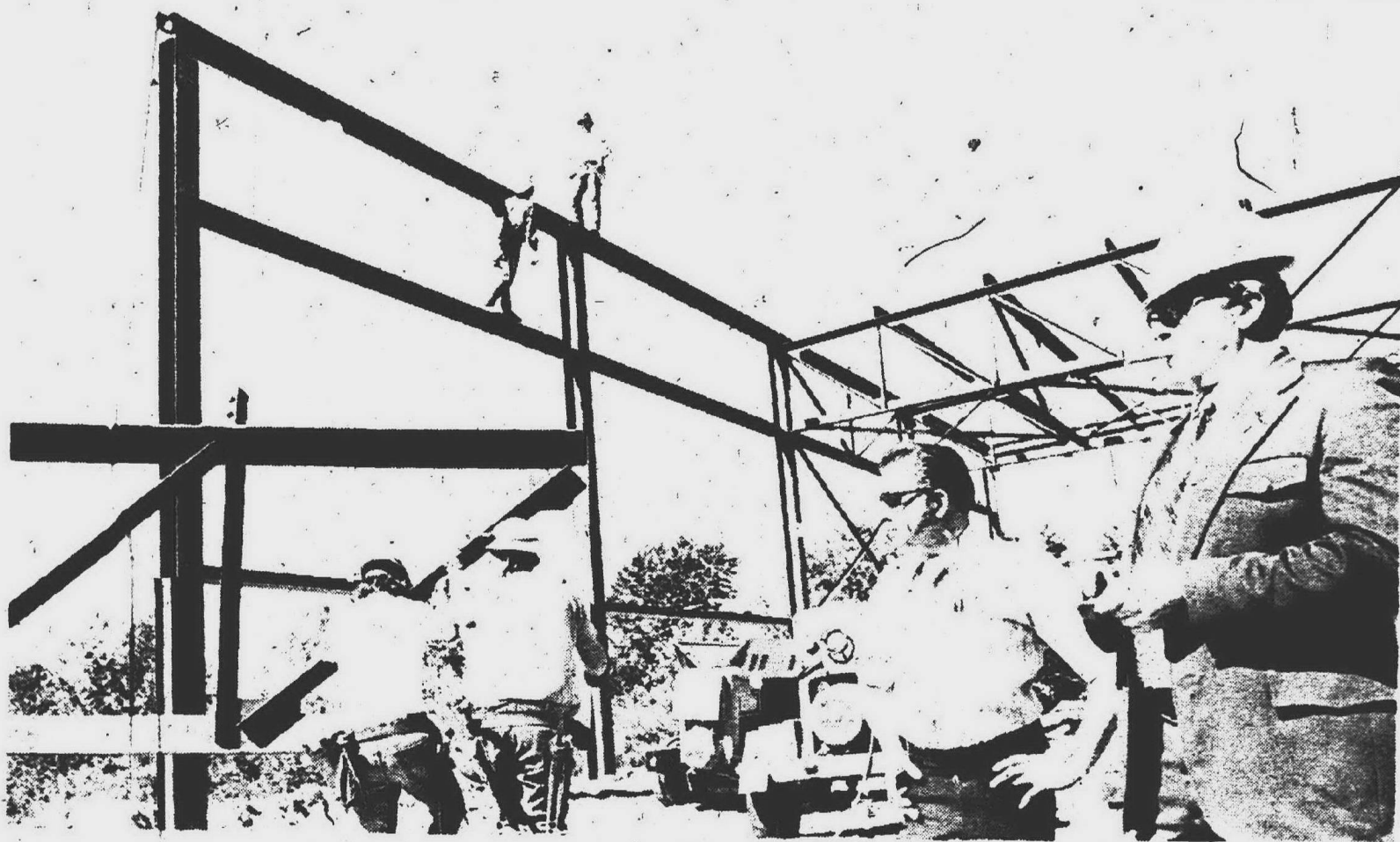

City Chamber Of Commerce Opposes State Proposals

LIVONIA

The board of directors of the Livonia Chamber of Commerce has voted unanimously to oppose two amendments to the state constitution which appear on the Nov. 7 ballot.

The chamber board, at its Oct. 25 meeting, voted to oppose proposals C and D. Proposal C would amend the state constitution to limit the use of local property taxes for schools. Proposal D would permit a graduated state income tax.

Before the vote, the chamber polled its members and found that 75 per cent opposed C and 83 per cent opposed D.

The chamber said the primary reason given for opposition to C was its vagueness in specifying the method of replacing the \$1.2 billion in lost local revenue.

The chamber commented: "This proposal would grant Michigan State Legislature unlimited power to raise taxes without seeking voter approval. It also goes one step further toward eliminating the accountability of local governments and school systems."

While the Livonia Chamber of Commerce favors property tax relief, we cannot in conscience endorse a proposal which is so totally

confusing. We are not willing to trade our present taxes -- no matter how inequitable -- for something as inaccurate as this proposal."

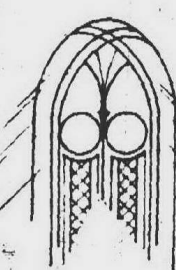

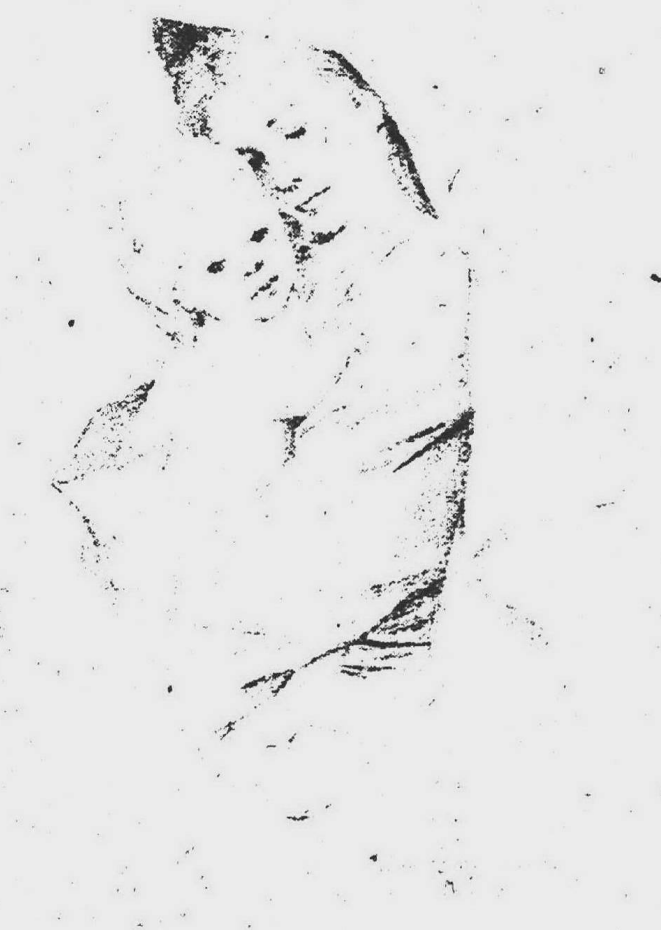

Who's Got Those New Lottery Licenses?

Tickets will go on sale Nov. 13 for Michigan's new weekly lottery, and a 36-man staff is criss-crossing the state handing out licenses to some 7,000 business places where the tickets can be sold.

But where those places are, the Bureau of State Lottery couldn't exactly say late this week.

The master list was fed to a computer, explained Dave Hanson of the bureau staff, where it is being digested and hopefully will spew out by Monday.

A random check turned up five locations in Observerland where lottery

tickets may be purchased, the most unusual Redford Township Hall, Idyl Wyld Golf Course claims it got the first license issued in Livonia. The Mayflower Hotel and McAllister's Grocery in Plymouth report they have been licensed. So does Samhat Bros. liquor store in Redford.

The first preliminary drawing will be Friday, Nov. 24, and subsequent drawings Thursdays.

Besides licensing the ticket sellers, licenses are being distributed to about 100 banks who will service the sales agents.

Judd Attacks Mrs. Griffiths' Campaigning

Ralph Judd, Republican candidate in the 17th Congressional District, called a press conference last week but failed to get attention from the press.

Judd, who is running against U.S. Rep. Martha Griffiths (D-Detroit), said he intended to announce his positions against abortion and in favor of other issues. His opponent has refused to take a position on abortion saying it is a state ballot issue.

The 17th district includes Redford Township, Farmington City and Township, Southfield, Lathrup Village and northwest Detroit.

JUDD EXPLAINED prior to the conference that he had filed a charge with the Fair Campaign Practices Committee charging that Mrs. Griffiths violated fair campaign practices.

He has been working on the charge for some weeks but filed it just a week before the election. He made the same charges as did State Rep. Marvin Stempien (D-Livonia) against U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor) in the 2nd district in mid-September.

Judd charged that Mrs. Griffiths is representing herself as an incumbent in Farmington and Redford despite the fact that U.S. Rep. Jack McDonald's (R-Waterford) term doesn't expire until December.

He added that she says she's the incumbent in Southfield even though U.S. Rep. William Broomfield (R-Royal Oak) still officially represents those residents.

"She alluded to the fact she is an incumbent and uses it on her literature and ads, using the word 're-elect' in these areas."

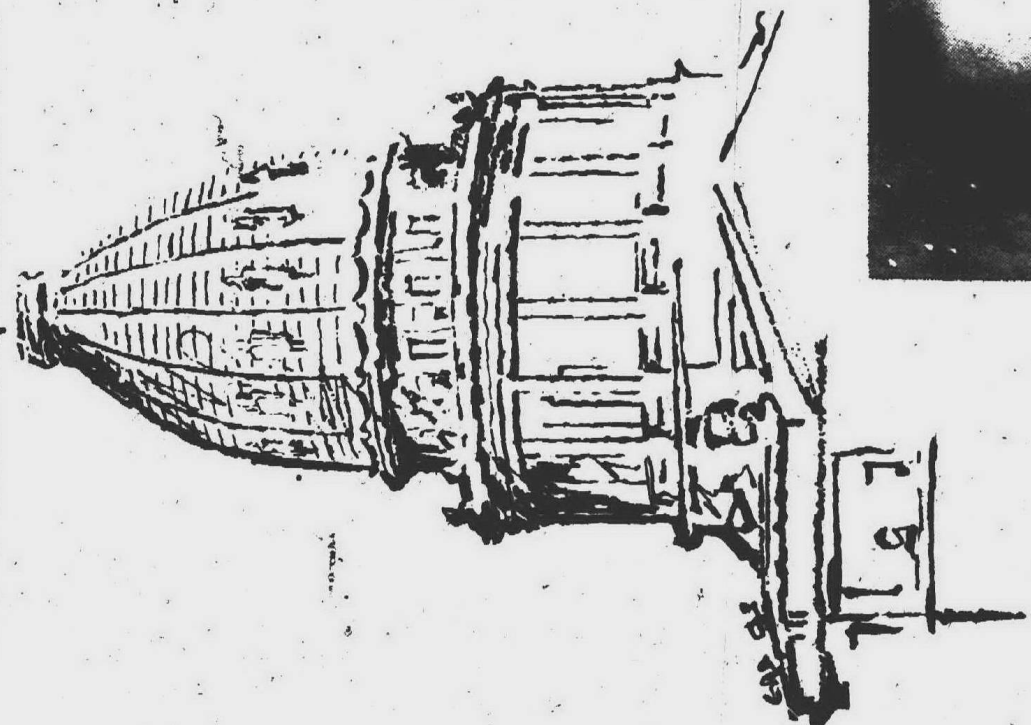

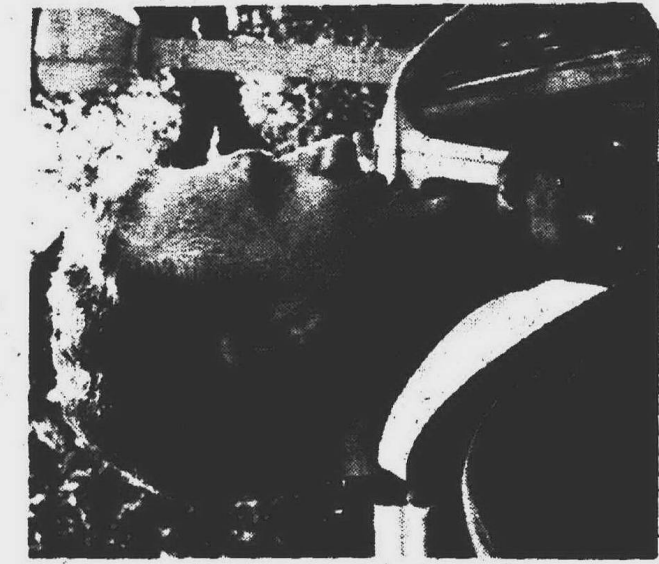

A long list of state candidates faces each voter in the Nov. 7 election beginning with the races for the U.S. Senate seat.

U.S. SENATE

Top runners in that race are Republican incumbent Sen. Robert Griffin and Democratic Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley.

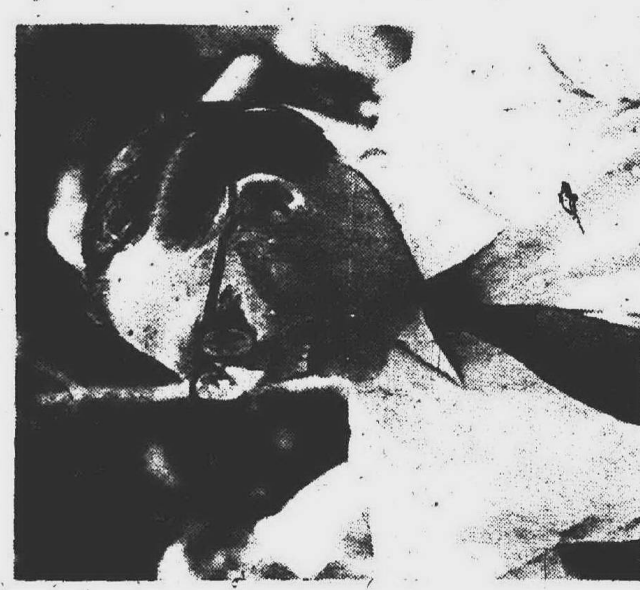

On the Republican ticket are Aubrey Radcliffe, 33, a Lansing teacher; and Jack M. Stack, MD 34, a general practitioner in Alma.

Also running for the seats are James Horvath and Frank Troha, Socialist Labor; and David W. Brinn, Human Rights.

WAYNE GOVERNORS

Two persons will also be elected to Wayne State University's Board of Governors.

Wilber M. Brucker Jr. and Kurt R. Keydel are both incumbents on the board seeking reelection on the GOP ticket. Brucker, 46, is currently board chairman and Keydel, 67, is vice chairman.

Democratic challengers are Kathleen Straus, 48, an inter-agency liaison officer for the southeast Michigan Council of Governments; and Michael Einheuser, 20, a student in Monteroth college at WSU.

with all women, she concentrates discussion on the inequities in laws applying to women and then explains what she has done to eliminate the discrimination.

Talking on tax loopholes before a large Republican audience, she said that the largest tax loophole is interest on mortgages. Closing this loophole will hurt the middle class more than anyone else, she said.

ANOTHER FAVORITE TOPIC IS

national health care. Judd favors a health care plan, but Mrs. Griffiths goes a step further and explains a complex health care bill she has introduced.

Each person would pay one per cent of his income into the plan up to a maximum income of \$15,000. Employers would kick in 35 per cent, and the federal government would add a share. The money would form a

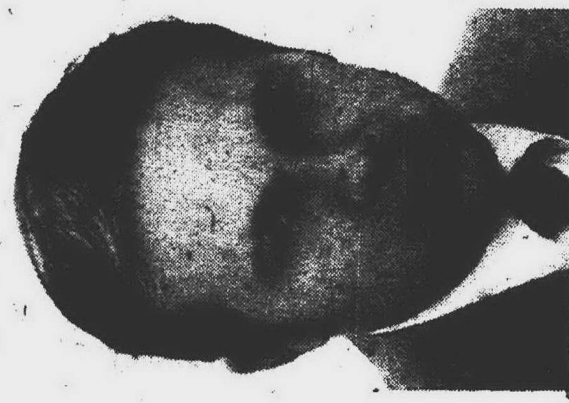
fund to cover all medical costs for each person.

"It's the middle class that's taking it on the chin," she said of the current system. "They pay for better medical care for the aged and poor than they can afford for themselves."

Judd has been stressing that "if we are going to reelect Richard Nixon, we should give him a Congress to work with."

As a ranking member of the Ways and Means committee, Mrs. Griffiths says that several major pieces of legislation will come before the committee in the next year. If she is reelected, the residents of the 17th district will have a direct voice in these bills.

Judd responds to this saying, "I don't care whether you are two or 22, nothing gets out of ways and means without (U.S. Rep.) Wilbur Mills' (D-Ark.) okay on it." Mills is committee chairman.

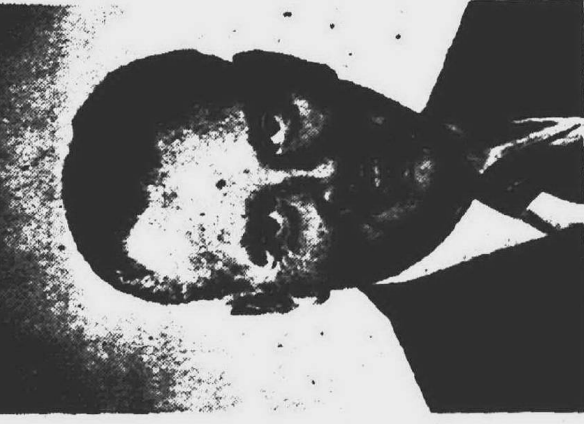

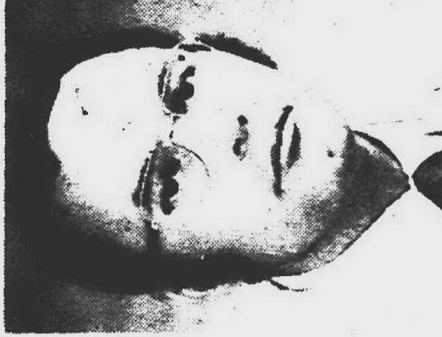
"The computerization of society is not being brought out," Judd, who is 34, said.

The biggest handicap to his campaign has been lack of support from his fellow Republicans, he said. He hasn't been given any financial support from the party.

Although Marvin Esch and Marvin Stempien have argued long and hard about who should be 2nd District congressman, they agree on top priorities -- ending the Vietnam war and expanding employment opportunities.

They listed their similar goals -- which also include congressional reform and environmental protection -- in response to a League of Women Voters survey.

Esch, 45, an Ann Arbor Republican, has been 2nd District Congressman for three terms. Stempien, 38, a Livonia Democrat, has served three terms in the State House of Representatives.

This is how they responded to the "priorities" Question:

STEMPIEN: "Change emphasis of federal spending ... from military orientation--end war, reduce military foreign aid, cut spending on weapons systems.

"Emphasize spending to meet domestic needs: 'Employment creating programs; more equitable tax burdens, shift from property to graduated (income) tax, close loopholes; environmental protection; national health programs; education--quality and equality without busing students; housing law reform.

"Congressional reform: (Change) seniority system; every vote on final passage a record, all expenses of members a public record, reasonable limits on congressional travel."

ESCH: "My primary goals would be to continue my work to: End the war and the draft; expand educational opportunity through vocational, career and job education, day care, increased federal funding of elementary and secondary schools and greater coordination of education programs.

"Environmental protection and restoration; seek a more responsive government through (a) congressional reform, (b) improved fiscal management, especially in the appropriations process, and (c) government reorganization with an emphasis on returning more power to state and local governments."

Asked about federal assistance to urban areas, they made these replies:

ESCH: "The complex problems of urban areas require expanded initiatives in many areas including mass transit and housing."

Educational opportunities should

be improved through "additional federal funding, utilization of unemployed teachers to supplement educators in overcrowded schools, rethinking education programs to meet changing needs, and expanded technical and vocational training to make education relevant to those uninterested in academics."

Esch, who has a doctorate in education and taught at Wayne State University and the University of Michigan, serves on the House Education and Labor Committee and continually emphasized such programs as "greatly improved manpower training and employment services for adults" and "day care facilities."

He also mentioned "comprehensive land use planning to assure open space and recreational facilities, greater use of paramedical personnel to supplement medical shortages, greater police training and funding and area-wide coordination and planning between government services."

STEMPIEN: "The federal government can best attack both long range and short range problems of urban areas by returning the economy to a healthy state and by moving to cut Michigan's 9.3 per cent unemployment rate by at least half.

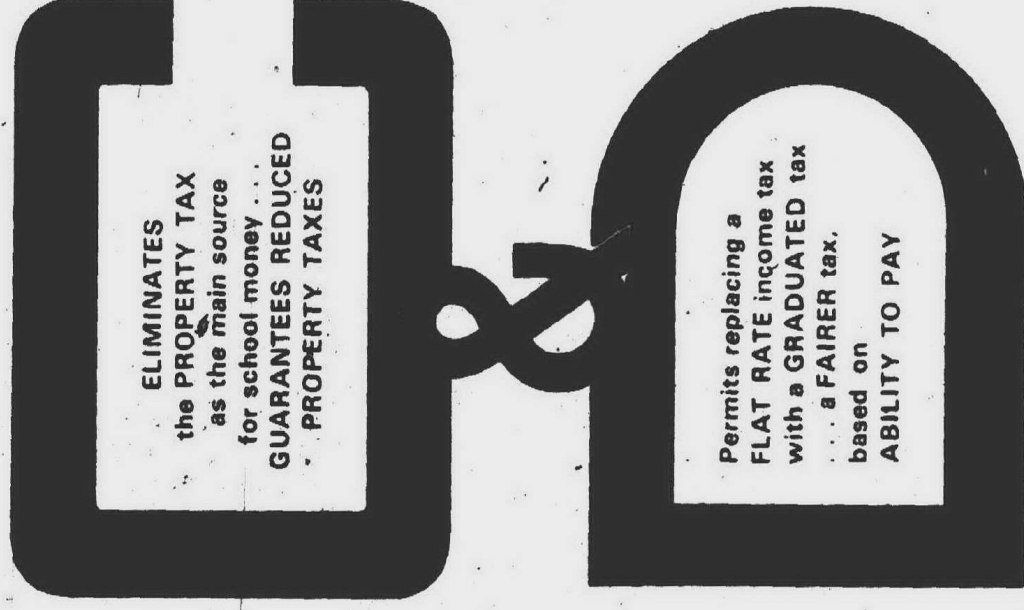
"Congress must assure that jobs are available for all who want to work, preferably by stimulating private employment, but by making the government the employer of last resort, if necessary.

"Simultaneously, Congress must do more to improve quality of life for individual citizens through adequate housing, adequate education, mass transportation, air and water improvement, availability of public and private health care and necessary fire-police protection.

Stempien, a lawyer in private practice, has been interested in a variety of topics in his role as majority floor leader in Lansing. He has a reputation for favoring metropolitan-interest bills that many suburban legislators have shied away from, including the gasoline tax/mass transit bill.

Also in the race is Henry W. Kroes Jr., a member of the American Independent Party. A Livonia resident, he failed to reply to the questionnaire by the LWV's deadline.

BALLOT ISSUES:

VOTERS MAKE THE LAWS

"Election," to most people, means picking candidates, but Michigan was born politically in the Andrew Jackson era, and so we have a great amount of lawmaking by the people.

The Nov. 7 ballot contains proposed amendments to the constitution, new state laws, a pair of Wayne County proposals and local proposals in Southfield and Farmington.

All Michigan voters will have a chance to cast ballots on Proposals A through E.

PROPOSAL A would change Michigan to daylight saving time from the last Sunday in April until the last Sunday in October each year, putting Michigan in line with most other states in the country.

Michigan residents would get up an hour earlier during the summer and have an extra hour of sunlight in the evenings, if it passes.

PROPOSAL B would overturn Michigan's abortion law to permit abortion under certain conditions.

The proposed law would allow a physician to perform an abortion at the request of the patient, if "the period of gestation has not exceeded 20 weeks and if the procedure is performed in a licensed hospital or other facility approved by the Department of Public Health."

PROPOSAL C to amend the constitution would "limit property taxes for school, county and township purposes and to provide that the Legislature shall establish a state tax program for support of schools."

If passed, it will eliminate the property tax for general school operation purposes, limit the property tax to a maximum of 26 mills for county, township and school purposes; require the Legislature to establish a tax program to finance public school education; and require the Legislature to provide for distribution of supplemental funds based on local need and for specific purposes.

This proposal got on the ballot after a petition drive conducted by the Michigan Education Assn. It is supported by Gov. William Milliken.

The property tax would be replaced with an income tax and voters will have the chance to provide for a graduated income tax in a companion proposal.

PROPOSAL D would lift the constitutional ban on a graduated income tax. It doesn't provide for replacement of the property taxes with a graduated income tax but states it "would enable the Legislature to impose a flat rate or a graduated state income tax and to enact laws to permit local units to levy a flat rate or graduated income tax."

PROPOSAL E would increase the county millage by six-tenths mill for five years to pay for construction of a new jail. The jail is expected to cost nearly \$40 million. And...

PROPOSAL F would increase the county millage by another four-tenths mill for five years to cover the costs of planning and constructing juvenile facilities. It is estimated to cost \$29 million.

Passage of both proposals would produce an additional \$6 million annually through 1977. It would cost homeowners \$1 on each \$1,000 of state equalized valuation.

The county board of commissioners has stated that alternative methods of financing these facilities would cost more in the long run. If bonds were issued to cover the costs, the interest would make the costs nearly triple.

FARMINGTON residents will vote on a \$1.2 million bond for construction of a city indoor ice arena and sports facility to be located at Shiassee and Orchard Lake Rd.

SOUTHFIELD residents have three local proposals on their ballot:

- Proposal F would raise the millage ceiling in the charter by 3.5 mills, from seven to 10 mills.
- The additional revenue would be primarily for police and fire operations.
- Proposal G would provide for a special election for mayor if a vacancy occurs between regular elections.
- Proposal H would abolish the pay board which is currently appointed by the mayor and which sets the income for all elected Southfield officials. It would keep salaries at the current level unless increases are approved by the voters.

FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP is electing three full-time administrative officials and two of four township trustees.

The supervisor race is unopposed on the ballot, with Robert McConnel, Republican primary victor running with no Democratic opposition. Incumbent GOP Supervisor Earl Teeple has been campaigning as a write-in candidate.

For clerk, incumbent Republican Floyd Cairns will run against Joyce Hungerford, Democrat.

The treasurer's race will be between Democrat Catherine Vignoe and incumbent Republican Thomas Nolan.

The trustees race in the township is a four-way race for two seats, now held by Republicans Margaret Schaefer and Frederick Lichtman. They are running against Democrats Maynard Gordon and Michael Zeglen.

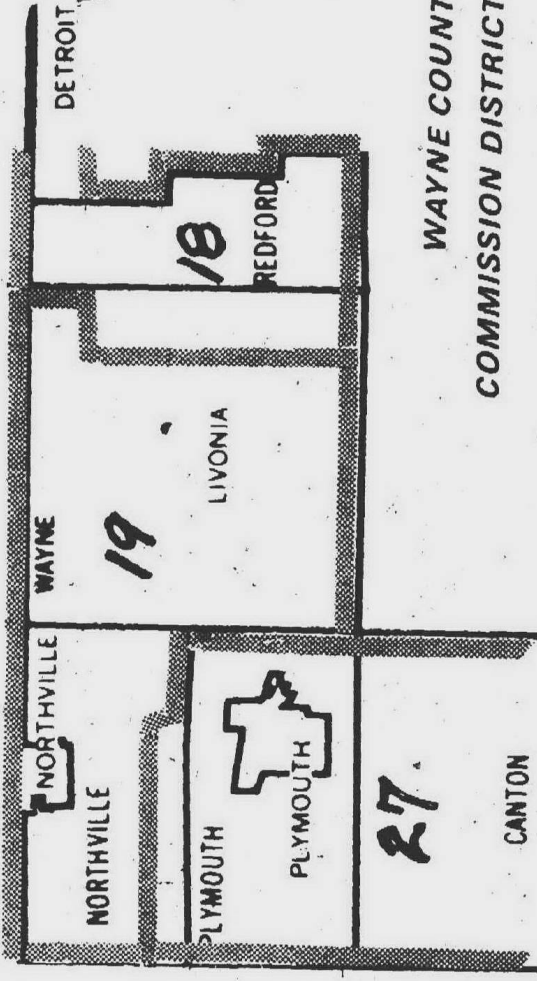
PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP, where Republicans have ruled the local government for as long as anyone can remember, has discovered in 1972 that there is a two-party system after all.

A vigorous campaign by a Democratic slate headed by supervisor hopeful Joseph Krochmalny has added a long forgotten dimension to Tuesday's election, forcing the Republican machine into similar action for the first time in many years.

J. D. McLaren, Krochmalny's GOP foe for the post of chief executive, concedes that "it's a contest," which by itself represents a change in Republican attitude since the August primary when, out of habit, it was assumed party nomination was tantamount to election.

McLaren is a third generation

District stretches from Six Mile Rd. in Northville Township to the Monroe County line, the contest is strictly between two Wayne residents -- Democrat Paul Lada and Republican Brian G. Arrowsmith. A third candidate, American Independent George A. Koster of Belleville, is given little chance.

Lada, 50, is a Wayne city councilman who advocates re-evaluation of road patrol services, continuing the county commissioners and their constituents.

SOME TOWNSHIP ELECTIONS TURNING INTO REAL BATTLES

Plymouthite who owns three business firms, while Krochmalny is a young financial analyst at American Motors. Except for McLaren, who unseated incumbent Maurice Breen in the primary, the Republicans are pitting an all-incumbent team against the Democrats, none of whom have held public office before.

At stake are the posts of supervisor and clerk, two seats on the board of trustees and two constablerships. Only Republican Elizabeth Holmes, seeking her 10th term as treasurer, is unopposed.

REDFORD TOWNSHIP'S ballot Tuesday will be the biggest one in the state.

But to the Redford Township Republicans, the election is a "big one in another way."

The GOP will be trying to regain a voice on the township board -- which is currently made up of seven Democrats, five of whom are up for reelection.

Republicans are charging the incumbent township hall Democrats with running the township's "fiscal integrity" while the Democrats, like all incumbents, are running on their "record."

The Democratic candidates include Bill J. Robbins, supervisor; Ruth Sullivan, clerk; Edward T. Kennedy, treasurer, and Don O. Christie and Roger M. Handy, trustees.

Republican candidates are Robert J. Anderson, supervisor; E. Kenneth Pniwski, clerk; John A. Basile, treasurer, and Eldon Funk and Dawn Rice, trustees.

From minority parties are Frank Hanna Jr. (AIP), state representative; Brownie S. Shaltis Jr. (AIP), county commissioner; and Carmen C. Herrero (Conservative Party), township clerk.

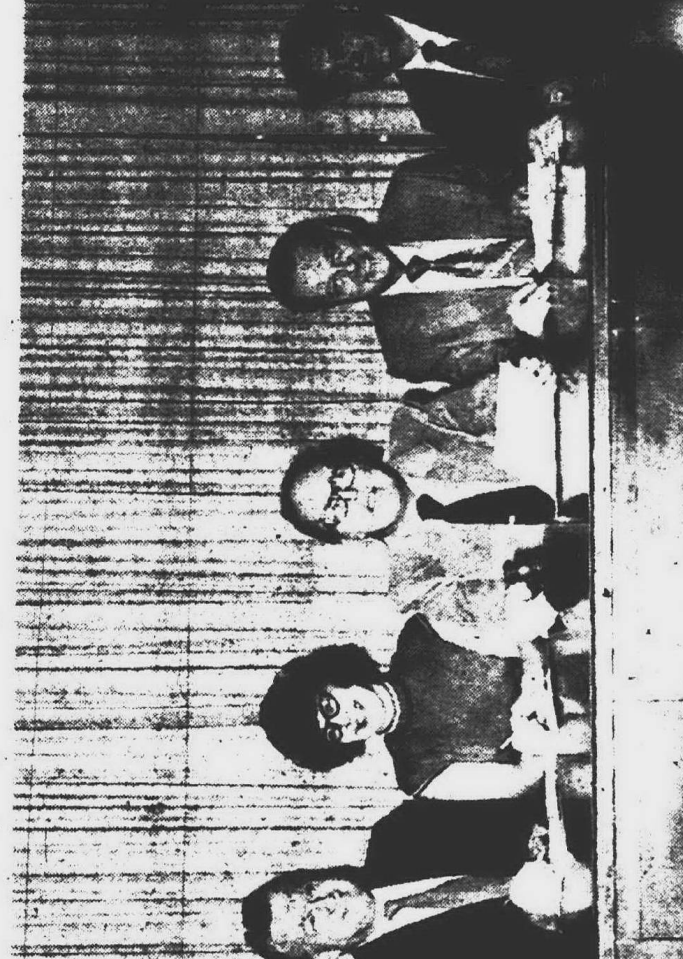

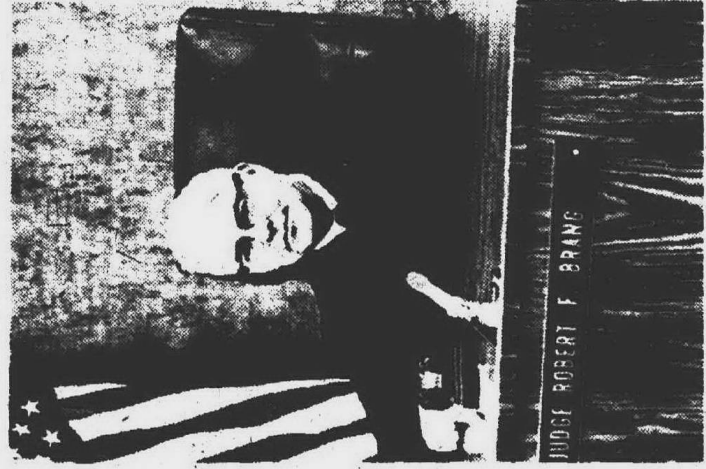

SHOULD WAYNE BE REORGANIZED

WAYNE 18th
Incumbent County Commissioner Richard Manning, Democrat, faces William L. Roskelly, Republican, and Brownie S. Shaltis Jr., American Independent.

Manning has been a commissioner since 1971 and was Redford Township supervisor between 1955 and 1959. He is an attorney and partner in Manning and Finn law firm. He earned his law degree from the University of Detroit.

"County government should be reorganized with separate and distinct administrative and legislative branches responsible for these separate functions," he said in a League of Women Voters guide. Roskelly is president of Basney and Smith Inc., consulting engineers, land planners and surveyors. He became known in the area for his attempts, and final success, at getting a court injunction placed on the sale of bonds to finance a domed stadium on Detroit's riverfront.

Neither Roskelly or Shaltis answered the LWV questionnaire.

WAYNE 19th

Mary E. Dumas, Republican, and Eldon R. Raymond, Democrat, are

running for the 19th commissioner seat. (Incumbent John McCann is seeking another office.)

Mrs. Dumas is a Livonia resident and a trustee at Schoolcraft College. She is a substitute teacher in Livonia and a member of the regional development council of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments.

County government should be further streamlined for added efficiency, economy and closer coordination of planning, she said. Semi-autonomous boards and commissions should be reorganized or placed under direct control of the elected commissioners "to give voters a greater voice in county government," Mrs. Dumas added.

Raymond, also a Livonia resident, is general manager and vice president of a commercial and industrial financial institution and a member of the Livonia Zoning Board of Appeals.

"I feel that every effort should be made to establish home rule government so that we might have every available tool to work with in an effort to solve the many problems confronting the county in its effort to service the citizens," he said.

THE COURTS:

INCUMBENTS RARELY CHALLENGED

Michigan State University law professor, is the Human Rights Party candidate.

Oakland Circuit Judge William John Beer, who once had his eye on a Democratic nomination, was nominated by the American Independent Party.

The only local resident running for the Supreme Court is William A. Ortmann, who has served two terms on the Wood Creek Farms village council.

COURT OF APPEALS

Nine judges serve on the second highest court. Three are elected for six year terms every two years. Three judges come from each of three districts. Wayne County constitutes one district; Oakland and mid-state counties are a second; the outlying counties the third.

In the Wayne County district, incumbent Appeals Judge T. John Lesinski is unopposed.

In the district including Oakland County, incumbent Appeals Judge Timothy C. Quinn is unopposed.

OAKLAND CIRCUIT JUDGE

One judge is unopposed to fill a vacancy, and three others are unopposed for new six-year terms.

There are two new vacancies, however, and a hot contest has developed between four candidates.

Alice L. Gilbert (PWQ), 40, a district judge in Birmingham.

Richard D. Kuhn (PWQ), 43, Pontiac, a former Constitutional

Convention delegate and conservative Republican leader.

John N. O'Brien, 43, Berkley, a former, assistant Oakland County prosecutor.

Julian A. Cook Jr., 42, Oak Park, former chairman of the State Civil Rights Commission.

Circuit court handles civil cases involving \$10,000 or more and all felony (criminal) cases. It also hears appeals from district courts.

OAKLAND PROBATE JUDGE

An spirited contest with partisan overtones has developed between two men seeking one six-year post. You may vote for one.

Incumbent Judge Donald E. Adams (PWQ), 60, of Pontiac, has been on the bench 11 years.

Barry M. Grant, 36, of Southfield, is a former school board member and assistant county prosecutor.

Probate court handles estates, wills, appointment of guardians for minors, adoptions and juvenile delinquencies. A probate judge also has certain powers in political appointments--which is why Republicans are strongly backing Grant.

DISTRICT JUDGES

Farmington District Judge Michael J. Hand is unopposed for a new four-year term.

In Southfield, Mayor Norman Feder is unopposed in seeking a newly created judgeship.

There is a two-man contest in another Southfield District Court seat. Incumbent Judge James Clarkson

(PWQ), 47, a former mayor and state representative, is being challenged by Sol E. Goldberg, 44, a local attorney.

WAYNE CIRCUIT JUDGE

Nine incumbent circuit judges are unopposed for new six-year terms. There are two contests for the Wayne circuit bench.

For a new six-year term, Thomas J. Brennan (WQ) faces W. Leo Cahalan (Q). Brennan, 50, of Dearborn, is a member of the State Board of Education and former member of the State Employment Security Commission Appeals Board. Cahalan, 41, of Grosse Ile, is an assistant Wayne County prosecuting attorney.

For a vacancy ending in 1974, John R. Kirwan (PWQ) faces John J. McCann (Q). Kirwan, 45, of Detroit, is a judge of Recorder's Court (traffic division). McCann, 43, of Livonia, is a Wayne County commissioner.

WAYNE PROBATE JUDGE

Three incumbent judges are unopposed--George Bashara, Ernest Boehm and Ira Kaufman.

DISTRICT JUDGES

In Redford Township, Judge Robert Brang (WQ), 52, is finishing his first term. He is being challenged by Paul W. Harty (WQ), 55, a former member of the zoning appeals board of the township.

Livonia's Judge James Mies is unopposed.

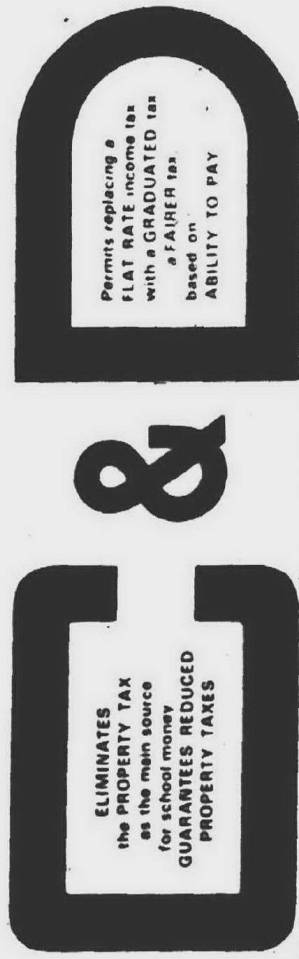

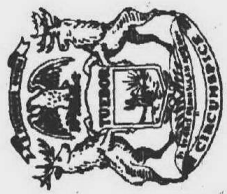

NEW HOUSE DISTRICTS BUT AN OLD PROBLEM —

State House of Representatives boundaries are new — sometimes drastically — this year, and several Overland districts are seeing new faces.

Representatives serve two year terms, and the entire 110-member chamber is up for election. This year the biggest single issue seems to be what to do about high school property taxes and whether a graduated or flat rate income tax should be substituted.

34th HOUSE DISTRICT

This district previously covered only Redford Township but after reapportionment was extended to pick up part of Dearborn Heights.

Democrat John Bennett won the seat in 1964 and has been reelected continuously since then. Prior to that, he was Redford Township treasurer for 10 years.

Republican challenger is Cornelius J. Clifford, a member of the South Redford Board of Education.

Both men have opposed Proposal C on the ballot.

35th HOUSE DISTRICT

A close contest has developed between Republican R. Robert Geake, 36, of Northville, and Democrat Marie Miller, 42, of Livonia. There is no incumbent.

Mrs. Miller, a former public health

nurse and now an assistant Wayne County prosecutor, denounces "over-reliance on local homeowners' property taxes (to finance schools) and inconsistent assessments by local assessors throughout the state."

She suggests but doesn't flatly advocate "homestead exemptions and other relief," and says "income tax increases, lottery income and federal revenue sharing" be investigated.

Dr. Geake, an educational psychologist in private practice and board chairman of Schoolcraft College, favors a homestead exemption of about \$5,000 but opposes "total removal of the property tax" for schools. His campaign has also emphasized employing able-bodied welfare recipients on public works projects.

36th HOUSE DISTRICT

This new district covers the southern portion of Livonia and northern Westland.

Democrat John F. Markes, 39, is Westland city council president and an electrical engineer for Detroit Edison Co. He calls a graduated income tax "a hopeful solution" to the problems of rising property assessments and federal revenue sharing formulas that hurt suburbs.

Republican Ralph M. Miller, 51, of Westland, is a salesman for Employers Insurance Co. of Wausau and is

active in GOP affairs. He favors state funding of schools and "possibly investigate a graduated income tax for the best education possible no matter what the tax base."

Norman L. Szewc, 38, of Livonia, is the American Independent Party candidate. He works for G.M.A.D. at Willow Run and says no new taxes are necessary and the state should "rid itself of the huge bureaucracy" and "stay out of the free enterprise market."

52nd HOUSE DISTRICT

This new district is dominated by Ann Arbor and eastern Washtenaw County but extends eastward into most of Plymouth.

Incumbent Rep. Raymond Smit (R-Ann Arbor), seeking a fourth term, favors Proposal C (reducing school property taxes) but opposes D (allowing graduated state income tax), arguing that tax limits are needed to prevent "uncontrolled spending," especially on welfare.

Robert Dwyer, a Plymouth businessman, has been a secretary of state branch manager and Democratic district leader. He favors treating C and D as a package, advocates a graduated income tax as the "fastest method of financing schools," and denounces the "local control bugaboo."



The heartiest race in Oakland County is for prosecuting attorney between Thomas G. Plunkett and L. Brooks Patterson.

Plunkett, a Democrat, is the incumbent, has served in the office since 1969 and is vice chairman of Oakland County Criminal Justice Coordinating Council. "We have launched programs that attack the drug abuse problem, that strike at organized crime, that invoke citizen involvement in the criminal justice system, (and) that bring higher skills for police agencies," he says of his first term.

Patterson, a Republican, is an attorney and former assistant prosecutor 1968-71. He also is a former senior trial lawyer for the prosecutor's office.

As prosecuting attorney, Patterson said his responsibilities would include representing the people in all criminal cases, representing the state in court, assisting in the "education and training of law enforcement agencies," and "setting policies and guidelines which will effectively combat the alarming rise of crime -- especially in the area of narcotics."

SHERIFF

The contest for sheriff is between Democrat Johannes F. Spreen of Farmington and Republican Leo R. Hazen of Pontiac, currently under-sheriff. Sheriff Frank Irons is retiring.

COUNTY CLERK

Jeanne W. Saile, Democrat from Clarkston, and Lynn D. Allen, Republican incumbent from Drayton Plains, are running for county clerk and registrar of deeds, a single post in Oakland.

OAKLAND COUNTY

WHO WILL ENFORCE THE LAW?

Spreen was Detroit police commissioner from 1968-70 and currently is coordinator of the law enforcement and protection program at Mercy College. He formerly wrote a column for The Detroit News.

"The sheriff has a unique opportunity to act as the catalyst in improving local police protection outside the major cities," he said. "As top county law enforcement officer, only the sheriff is in a position to provide near-at-hand backup service and act as an umbrella of support to help local police protect local citizens better."

Hazen has 24 years experience with the sheriff's department and has served on committees for traffic control and drug control.

As sheriff, Hazen said he would "establish special units in the department to fight particular types of crime such as drug traffic and organized crime," as well as continue in-service training for members of the department. He would also work to "establish a better rapport between youth of the community and police."

assets and the effective investment thereof. The treasurer should also be "spokesman for the citizens and taxpayers in matters of finance and taxation."

DRAIN COMMISSIONER

The race for drain commissioner features William Richards, Democrat incumbent; and George W. Kuhn.

Richards is a former county commissioner, past chairman of the county Board of Public Works and is national chairman of the pollution control committee.

As drain commissioner, Richards said he has taken environmental factors into consideration in the planning of drain projects. "I will strengthen and expand our environmental policies," he pledged, adding that he will also work for unification of county public works to eliminate costly duplication.

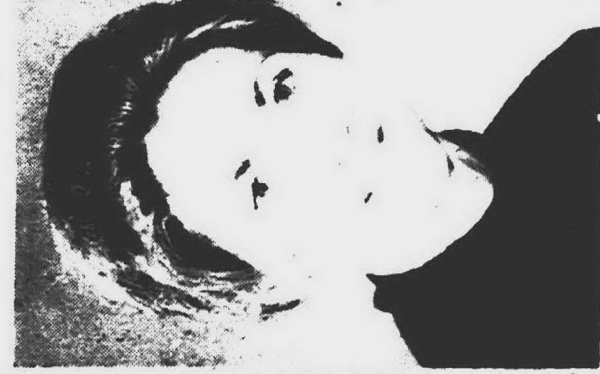
TREASURER

Incumbent Republican C. Hugh Dohany of Southfield is challenged for the treasurer's office by James M. Brennan, Democrat of Berkley.

Dohany is former Southfield treasurer and a member of the county tax allocation board. He regards the office as "one of great public trust with a tremendous responsibility for the safekeeping of all county funds and tax records."

Brennan is a member of the county board of auditors and is a former county commissioner where he chaired the finance committee. He said the office "primarily involves the control of the county's intangible

WAYNE COUNTY:

WHERE PARTY LABEL COUNTS

Does a Democratic drain flow differently from a Republican drain? Is a Republican treasurer different in any philosophical respect from a Democrat?

Probably not, but that's the way county elections must be run -- on a partisan basis. Here's a rundown on who's running for what and why in Wayne County this year, as gleaned from questionnaires submitted by the League of Women Voters.

SHERIFF

Incumbent William Lucas, 44, of Detroit, was an FBI agent and New York police officer before being recruited here as undersheriff. He's seeking his second term. He has a JD degree from Fordham University law school.

Lucas favors "adoption of county home rule and election of a county official (and) consolidation of all law enforcement functions under the jurisdiction of the sheriff."

Republican Kenneth C. Gallagher, 59, of Detroit, is an engineer, manufacturer and a former member of the old Wayne County Board of Supervisors.

Gallagher pledges to "assure that traffic violators will not be jailed with hardened criminals, clean the county jail by eliminating dope pushing, sexual assaults and other abuse of prisoners and end nepotism and

favoritism in promotions." Joseph P. Schrick, Dearborn, is the American Independent Party candidate and failed to reply to the LWV.

TREASURER

Democrat Louis H. Funk, 69, of Detroit, has worked in the treasurer's office for 32 years and was elected to the top post in 1964. He is a high school graduate.

Kathryn A. McAlpine, 26, the Conservative candidate, has an AB from the University of Michigan and is working on an MA. She says, "We need to curb the runaway expenses in our county government. Introducing multi-party government, electing a person who will not rubberstamp fiscal irresponsibility, is a step in the right direction."

AIP candidate is Thomas A. Kirby of Detroit. Neither Kirby nor Funk replied to the LWV.

DRAIN COMMISSIONER

Charles N. Youngblood, 60, of Detroit, is a former councilman and state senator. He upset the incumbent in the Democratic primary. He made no reply to the LWV.

PROSECUTOR

Prosecutor William H. Cahalan, 47, of Detroit, had been in private practice for 10 years before becoming prosecutor. He pledges "a long look and study of county home rule with possible adoption ... This would take the county out of the 'step child' position it now has with the state."

Republican John F. Burns, 36, of

Detroit, is an attorney, volunteer counsel to State Bar grievance panel and co-editor of Michigan Basic Practice Workbook Vol. 5. "It is extremely important to demonstrate to the public that the prosecutor, along with the police, is as much in the public service as any part-time poverty lawyer or other volunteer."

REGISTER OF DEEDS

Bernard J. Youngblood, 73, of Detroit, has held the post 30 years and says: "Changes for the sake of change alone should not be made."

Republican Coleman F. Flaskamp II, 32, of Belleville, says he "would work to combine the county clerk and register of deeds into one department."

AIP candidate is Julia C. Shepherd of Detroit.

COUNTY AUDITOR

Incumbent Leohard D. Proctor, 53, a Detroit Democrat, attended Touge-loo College (AB) and Wayne State University (MEd). He serves on the board of the county retirement system, the plat board, drain board and SEMCOG executive board.

Republican Thomas J. Grzywacz, 41, of Detroit, attended Walsh College and the University of Detroit and is a self-employed certified public accountant.

Joseph R. Mercier, of Dearborn, is the AIP candidate.

SCHOOL FUNDS

64th HOUSE DISTRICT

Newly reapportioned, this district still includes all of Farmington and southwestern Southfield.

Rep. Raymond L. Baker (R-Farmington), seeking a seventh term, failed to respond to League of Women Voters' questionnaires, both for the primary and the general election. He has not taken a firm position on the two tax proposals.

Democratic challenger John P. Campbell, 36, of Farmington, has a BA from Bates College, MA from Louisville and is doing advanced work at Wayne State University. He is a high school teacher of government and history. He favors a graduated income tax and says the district "needs more vigorous representation. I would meet regularly with city and township officials."

Conservative John J. Riley, 36, of Southfield, is a former member of the school board there and former president of the Southfield Federation of Homeowners. Opposing the "Robin Hood" approach to taxation, he puts primary emphasis on the "sales, tobacco, lottery and present level of income tax," opposing Proposals C and D. He opposes using gasoline taxes for mass transit.

67th HOUSE DISTRICT

This district covers Lathrup Village.

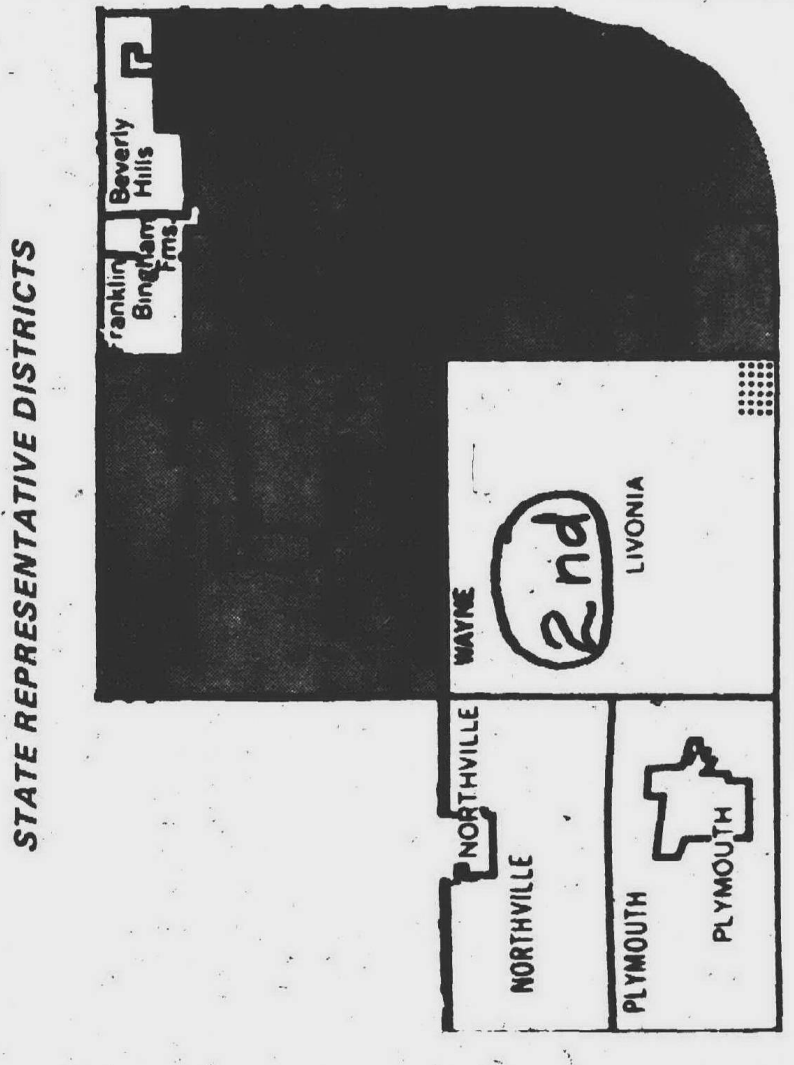
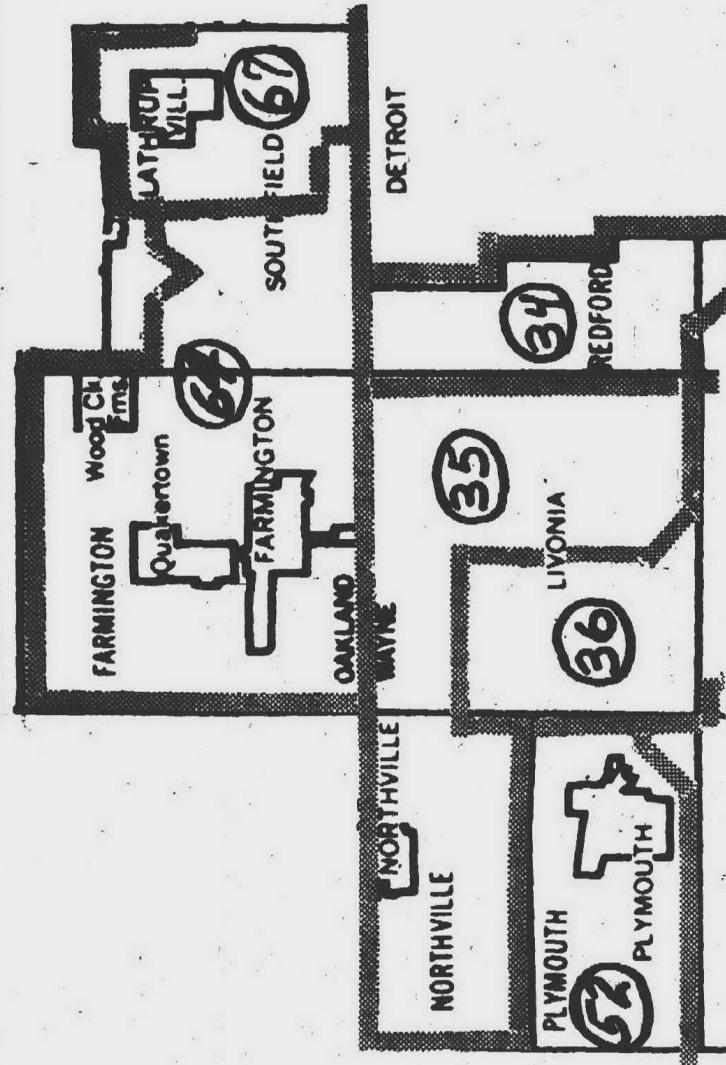
eastern Southfield, western Oak Park and Royal Oak Township.

Democrat Joseph Forbes, 55, is seeking a second term in Lansing after serving as Oak Park mayor, councilman and county board member. He favors repealing the property tax and replacing it with a graduated income tax based on ability to pay. He favors raising any additional state funds through a lottery, off-track betting and dog racing.

Republican Harry Kirsh, 50, of Oak Park, has a mechanical engineering degree from Wayne State University and is general manager of a tool and die shop. He favors "property taxes to a prescribed limit, supplemented as required by a graduated income tax, approved by the electorate." He adds: "An attempt must be made to answer the drug problem and crime situation that goes with it." Kirsh sees high school vocational training as a way to combat unemployment.
