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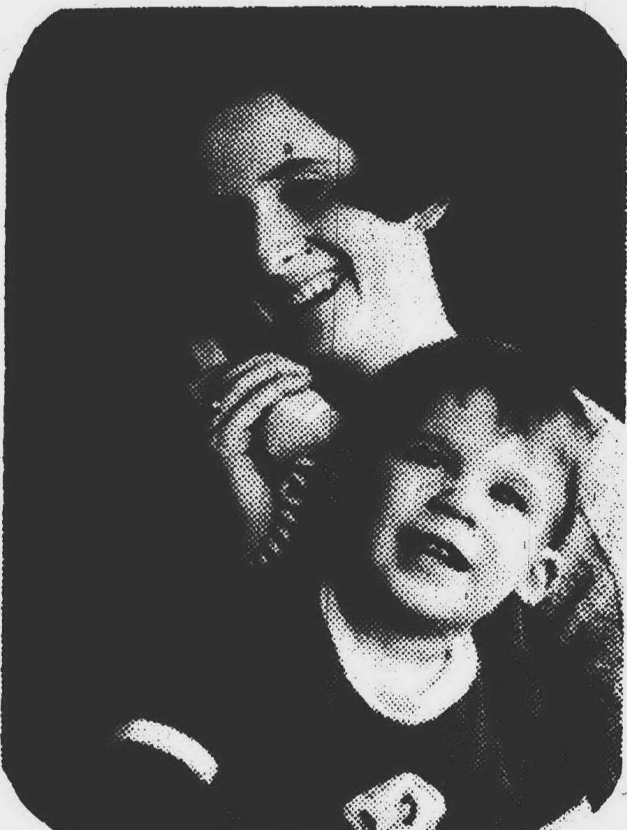

It wasn't even a contest, was it?

At the cost of at least \$7,500 between them, the city and township of Plymouth provided voting booth conveniences Tuesday for a public expression of traditional Republican sentiment that saw the GOP capture all township, and local legislative seats en route to a national Republican landslide.

The latter included victory by John D. McLaren (Rep.) over Joseph Krochmalny (Dem.) for the office of township supervisor, with all precincts reporting, 3,790 to 3,332, or nearly 54 per cent for McLaren.

ALTHOUGH HE LED a Republican sweep of Township Hall, the McLaren margin was not nearly that of others posted by candidates of his own party. This is explained, perhaps, because 1972 marks his first bid for office after moving from the city into the township only three years ago on Beacon Hill.

Clerk Helen Richardson beat her Democratic rival, Lois Lane, 4,104 to 3,009, and unopposed treasurer Elizabeth Holmes paced all vote-getters with 4,945 ballots in her favor. GOP board of trustee candidates Russell Ash and Gerald Burke triumphed easily over Democrats Earl Dey and Joseph Rey, ranging from Ash's 4,173 votes to Rey's 2,756.

Although they all lost, the Democrats made the strongest bid for election within memory in the township.

THE GOP dominated other phases of the local ballot in about the same proportion.

Although returns still were incomplete after midnight, U.S. Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) seemed to have retained his 2nd District congressional seat with unexpected ease after an oft bitter campaign with Livonia's Marvin R. Stempien, who gave up the State House majority leadership post to fight for a berth in Washington.

The latest returns available to the Mail & Observer showed Esch leading Stempien, 40,769 to 33,496, with 115 precincts counted out of a district total of 225. Most significant detail of all, perhaps, was the fact that Stempien lost his own district to Esch, 350 to 485. Esch got 54.9 per cent.

In the race for the 52nd State House of Representatives seat, Rep. Raymond Smit of Ann Arbor—who is seeking to retain a berth in the Legislature after representing the old 53rd District for the last six years—was staging a convincing victory over Plymouth's Robert E. Dwyer at the midnight vote count.

City voters, with absentee ballots yet to be recorded, were posted early this morning to have supported Smit over Dwyer, 2,464 to 1,304. Similarly, Esch whipped Stempien in the five city precincts, 2,723 to 1,230.

On the special ballot proposals, local voters counted by midnight favored daylight savings time, 2,738 to 1,360. However, they were against abortion reform, 2,137 to 1,958, helped beat back Proposition C for elimination of the property tax, 2,444 to 1,545 and swamped the graduated income tax proposition in Proposal D, 2,748 to 1,071.

PRESIDENT NIXON got 4,518 votes in Plymouth Township (with absentee ballots yet to be counted).

ed), while Sen. George McGovern, his Democratic opponent, had 2,219.

In the city, the count was 2,859 for Nixon and 1,197 for McGovern. Nixon got 70.4 per cent.

Similarly, U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin out-pollied Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley, by approximately the same margins both in the city and township.

Smit's midnight margin over Dwyer for the legislative seat was better than 2 to 1 in Dwyer's local Plymouth area, and was expected to lead to an even greater sweep by Smit by the time all his Washtenaw County precincts had been counted.

Plymouthites indicated a definite trend in favor of ballot issues concerning daylight savings time, but rejected all others. In brief, it was just about the most one-sided election the area has known, and seemingly melded significantly with the rest of Michigan.

In Canton Township, Republican James Poole and incumbent Robert Griffin, a Democrat, won seats on Canton's Board of Trustees. Poole lead the ticket with 2,452 with Griffin getting 2,365. Trailing was Conrad Dennis, 20-year-old resident making his first bid for public office.

New Home Is Sought For Police

Heading a plea from the police department for more room, the city commission is pondering a recommendation to purchase the Edison Building across Main Street from City Hall and convert it into a modern police station.

The recommendation was made by City Manager Norman Gaffney last week, and the discussion came to a head Monday night when the commission ordered a complete study of the renovation and the use that could be made of the present police section if -- and when -- it is moved.

IN HIS recommendation, the city manager stated that the Edison Building that housed the State Police Crime lab until a few months ago could be purchased for \$33,750 and that another \$20,460 would be needed to revamp the interior and fit it for the police.

In pointing out the cost, Gaffney related that some time ago he had the city

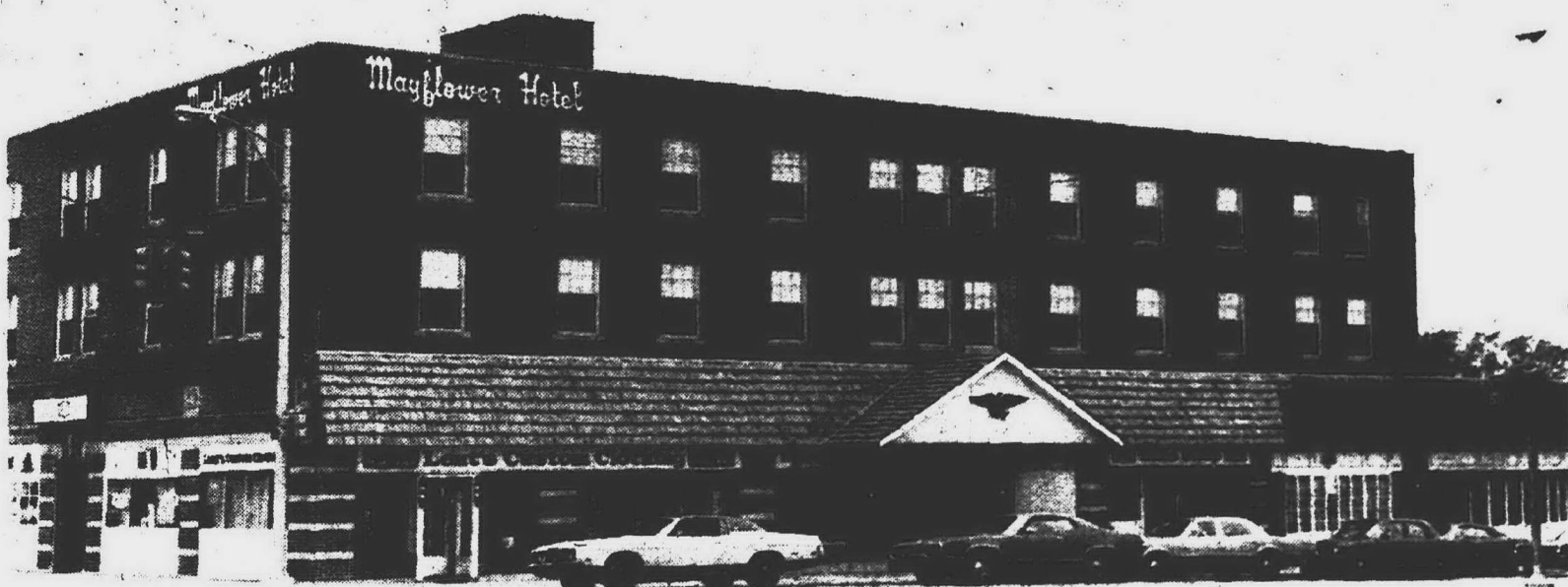
engineer draw the plans for renovating City Hall to meet the space demand and that the approximate cost was set at \$144,000.

Aside from the new home for the police the acquisition of the Edison property would provide the city with 20 more parking spaces to bring the total on the plot to 41.

"This number of parking spaces in the area would prove invaluable," he said.

AFTER LISTENING to the earnest plea, the city commission, while admitting that the property was a good buy, asked for more information regarding the work needed on the Edison Building and the re-arranging of offices in the City Hall.

There was some inclination on the part of the commission to retain the police department in City Hall and move some of the other departments across the street.

The Mayflower Hotel, a landmark in western Wayne County, will celebrate its 45th birthday on Saturday, Nov. 11 -- and what a party they're planning!

"We're going to celebrate for the rest of this year," said Ralph Lorenz, the genial host, "so that we can take care of all the friends we've made through the years."

There'll be special events, special menus and a holiday atmosphere for the next six weeks at the hostelry that serves as the modern travel stop on the way west.

The story of the Mayflower is an unusual chapter in the hotel business. It has survived depressions and a declining economy and still is a popular place often used as a beginning point for directions to any other area.

School Budget Passed

The Plymouth board of education adopted the operating budget for the 1972-73 school year totaling \$11.2 million in a special meeting Monday.

The \$11.2 million includes \$8.6 million in local revenue and \$2.56 million in state and federal aid. Also included in the final budget figure are receipts from the continuing education and recreation programs totaling \$53,000.

The district has an official membership count of 10,933 day students and 194 students in continuing education and Parker High School, which is operated by the district at Detroit House of Correction.

The total operating millage is 27.05 mills and 5.95 mills are levied for debt retirement, bringing the total levy to 33 mills.

THE IDEA OF the hotel was born in the basement of the old Lutheran Church during the weekly meetings of the Plymouth Rotary Club when some of the members insisted that they should have a new place to meet.

It was then that a group of civic minded citizens, headed by Ed Hough, and including such well known businessmen as Ernie Allison, Charlie Bennett, Paul Wiedman, Fred Schrader, A.J. Richwine, John Dayton, Ray Fisher, and H.S. Lee, got together to make it possible.

As a starter they decided that as many citizens as possible should share in the building of a hotel -- which the area sorely needed. With this goal, the group set something of a record in raising \$225,000 in three hours -- from 8 to 11 a.m. -- on a Saturday morning.

The site at the intersection of Main Street and Ann Arbor Trail was chosen because it was on US - 12, the main artery between Detroit and Chicago. Since then, the route of US - 12 has been changed to circumvent the City of

Law Books Donated To Madonna

Madonna College's library is richer by two sets of recently donated law books, and some volumes are antiques.

One came from Judge Ira G. Kaufman, of the Wayne County Probate Court, and the other from State Rep. Marvin R. Stempien (D - Livonia).

Judge Kaufman donated a 30 - volume set of "Michigan Statutes Annotated," the oldest book in the collection published prior to 1870.

Kaufman's wife is Lillian Farbman, a member of the board of Madonna, located in Livonia.

Stempien donated 30 volumes entitled "Public and Local Acts of the Michigan Legislature," including six sets of compiled laws.

These books were supplemented by more than 200 books donated by Robert Plascove, a student in Madonna's criminal justice program. Plascove's donation included rare copies of Michigan Reports, some published prior to 1865.

Instructor's Textbooks Will Be Translated

Irving J. Levinson, 7411 Pebble Pointe, Farmington, has been notified by Prentice-Hall Inc. publishers that three of his textbooks will be mailed to Madrid, Spain, for production and printing in Spanish.

Levinson, dean of special services on the Orchard Ridge campus of Oakland Community College, is the author of "Introduction to Mechanics," "Mechanics of Materials" and "Statics and Strength of Materials."

The books are used in colleges and universities throughout the country. Levinson joined the OCC staff in 1964. He has written several books and articles including the cookbook entitled "The Completely Skewered Up Cookbook" which will be published later this year.

U.S. Academy Applications Due Nov. 10

Congressman William D. Ford (D-Taylor) has set Nov. 10 as the preliminary deadline for youths living in the 15th Congressional District to apply for nominations to the United States Service Academies for the class beginning in July 1973.

Application forms and full information may be obtained by writing to Congressman Ford at 125 Cannon House Office Building, Washington, D.C. 20515.

Appointments will be available for the Military Academy at West Point, N.Y.; the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md.; and the Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, New York. There are no openings in the 15th District quota for next year's class at the Air Force Academy.

Applicants for appointment to the academies must be at least 17 years old but must not have reached the age of 22 by next July 1. They must be United States citizens, unmarried, and legal residents of the 15th Congressional District.

EMU Frosh To Meet Old Principals

The 16th annual principal-freshman conference will be held on the Eastern Michigan University campus on Wednesday, Nov. 15. The conference is designed to offer assistance in many areas to the freshmen and the schools from which they came.

Representatives of some 350 high schools have been invited to talk with approximately 2,900 students. Interviews will be arranged between 8 and 11:30 a.m. in McKenny Union, residence halls and other University areas.

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Election Code Change Asked

PLYMOUTH Eligibility to run for public office in the City of Plymouth may require residence of no more than 30 days in the not too distant future.

The 30-day limit was recommended to the city commission Monday night by Russell Schmidt, attorney for the City of Wayne, who represented Plymouth in its losing battle with Mahlon Green in the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals at Cincinnati.

The court ruled, on an appeal, that the present two-year requirement contained in the city charter is unconstitutional. It was the second time the courts have ruled in that matter. The first time came five years ago when Rev. Peter Schweitzer won the right to have his name placed on the ballot as a candidate for the city commission.

"I would advise you to place a limit of not more than 30 days," Schmidt informed the commission, "and I would advise you to do it by ordinance, rather than try to change the charter at this time."

He pointed out that a charter change would require a vote of the people and that it

would be a lengthy and expensive process.

"It will have the same effect if the change is made by ordinance," commented Charles Lowe, Plymouth City attorney.

The commission finally agreed to study the matter and to decide on the proper language for an ordinance within the next few months.

"There is no haste," Mayor James McKeon commented. "We don't have a city election for another year."

Gove Named Engineer For City

Alan F. Gove, who has served as city engineer at Portage for the past few years, is taking over the engineer's position in the City of Plymouth.

He was appointed by City Manager Norman Gaffney and approved by the city commission on Monday night.

In his new role he will succeed Tom Waffan, who served for several years before moving to the Southeast Oakland County Drain authority.

District Judge Dunbar Davis set pre-trial examination for Nov. 20 after Morton stood mute to the charge and released him on \$5,000 personal bond.

Fund Goal In Sight

As the zero hour approaches in the annual Plymouth Community Fund Drive, there is a quiet optimism among the leaders that the goal of \$182,000 will be reached.

The spirits of the workers were lifted over the weekend when the contributions came in at a rate that was hoped for — but not exactly expected. A week ago Chairman Bill Carlson was dubious and there were many who felt that the

drive was doomed to failure for the first time.

"When we counted up totals on Monday," Carlson stated, "we had reached \$84,722, which is 47 per cent of the goal. Last week we were at 23 per cent."

"Now, it would appear that we will make the goal by the night of the Victory Dinner on Thursday, Nov. 16."

While the total now is still approximately \$98,000 short of the goal the payroll deductions

from the various industrial plants have not been received.

When they come in there is expected to be another \$80,000 added to the total.

The lone divisions that still are quite a way from the goal

are the business and professional groups. There is hope, too, that these groups will come through in time for the announcement of a smashing victory at the dinner.

Special Education Teacher Is Fired

The Plymouth board of education fired special education teacher Jack Marts of Belleville in a 5-to-1 vote during a special meeting Monday.

Dissenting in the decision was Gary Mirto who said he had filed a dissenting opinion. Voting for the dismissal were board president George Lawton and Trustees Marda Benson, Fred Penar, Carl Berry and Dr. John Ohno. John Graves was absent.

The board will have a special meeting Thursday at 7:30 p.m. to approve a written decision which will be delivered to Marts.

Marts, who taught the mentally handicapped at Plymouth — Salem High School, hasn't taught in the district this year pending the outcome of private hearings held by the board on his case. He has continued to collect his \$17,000 salary.

Previous charges against Marts have not been made public. He was suspended for three months one year ago but finished teaching the school

year. Hearings began on his case last May and continued through the summer until Monday's meeting.

The board recently won a grievance which had been filed in his case.

The grievance was filed after Marts returned to work after his suspension and was given certain restrictions. The grievance claimed he was given different working conditions than the rest of the teachers, but it was denied.

In making the motion, Penar said that Supt. John Hoben's charges against Marts "have been substantiated and that these charges constitute reasonable and just cause for the dismissal."

"Be it further resolved by the board of education that Mr. Marts be dismissed from the employ of this school district, effective upon his receipt of the board's written decision in this matter."

The decision must be prepared and delivered to Marts within five days of the decision, the resolution states.

Mirto objected, saying he had filed a dissenting opinion "on the merits and procedure of the case."

"It has put the whole board and whole administration in an embarrassing situation. I wish it hadn't happened," said Lawton.

"In my opinion, the majority of the board will rule and has done so tonight," is the

The rental of a vault is to store the bodies for burial at a later date.

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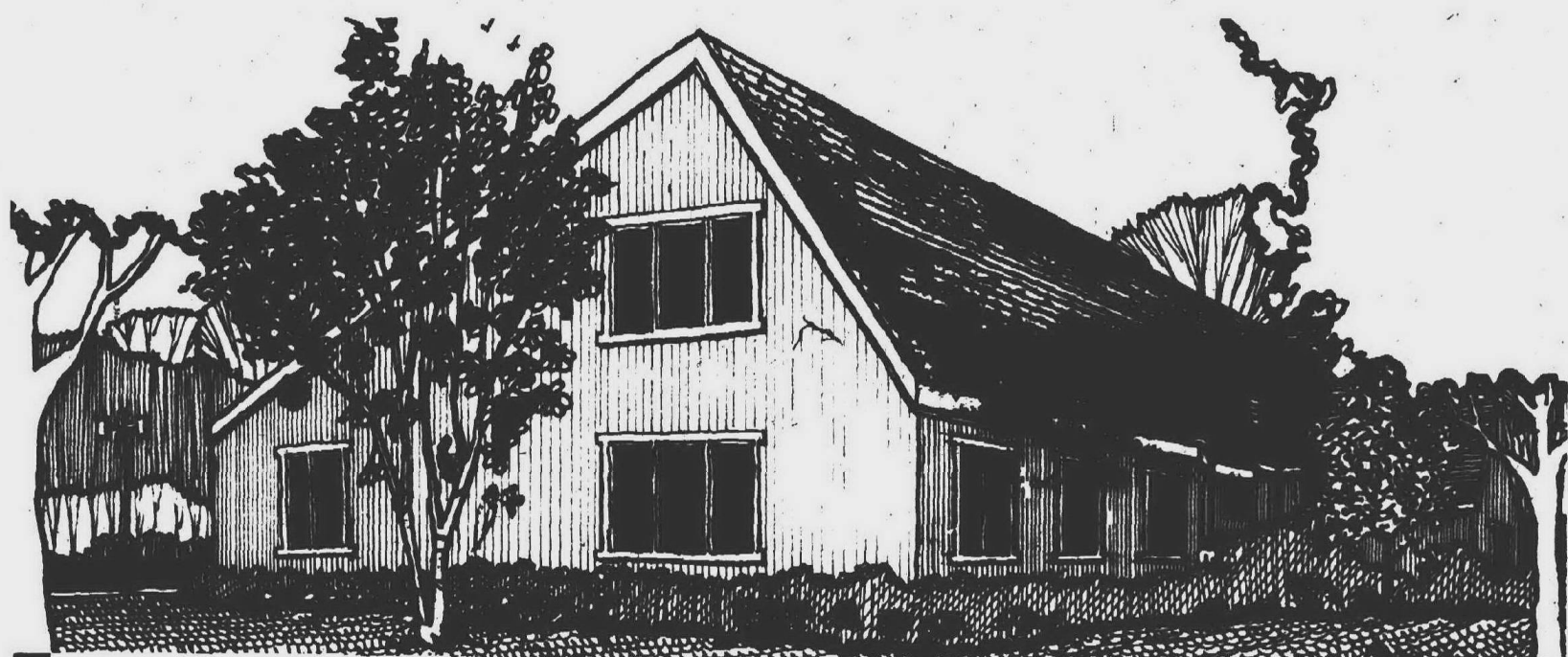

Tax Reform Is Urged

WESTLAND State Lt. Gov. James Brickley delivered another in his series of talks supporting school tax reform Friday before an estimated 300 John Glenn High School students whose parents are paying the highest school tax rate in Michigan.

Brickley, who also delivered the same talk at Stevenson Junior High School in Westland Friday, made the two stops in the Wayne-Westland Community Schools before repeating the talk in Ypsilanti.

THE STATE official was urging eligible voters in the John Glenn High senior class to support Proposal C in Tuesday's election and provide for a more equitable tax structure in Michigan.

Proposal C would eliminate local school property taxes for operational purposes and place a 14 mill limit on county operations and county intermediate schools with another 12 mills to be levied for county and local schools if approved by the voters.

Brickley said the proposal boils down to the question of whether Michigan should finance its most important and expensive service—public education—with the worst tax—the property tax.

THE PROPERTY tax is inequitable by itself and the equality of it varies from school district to school district, he added.

He pointed out the example of two homeowners living a few blocks from each other but in different school districts.

In one district, the homeowner pays \$800 for school tax and the district has only \$400 per student.

The homeowner in the neighboring district, with the same value house, pays only \$400 in school taxes but his district spends about \$800 per student.

Brickley said this is caused by one district having substantial industrial taxpayers while the other one doesn't.

HE POINTED out that state Supreme Courts in other

states and federal courts have already ruled local property taxes as unconstitutional because they deny persons the equal protection of the laws as guaranteed by the 14th amendment of the U.S. constitution.

Brickley admitted that the current flat rate income tax isn't perfect but suggested that the system for financing schools first be improved.

A graduated state income tax is more progressive, Brickley admitted if approved by the State Legislature would put Michigan at a disadvantage with neighboring states in the fight to attract new industries.

DURING the lengthy question and answer period, Brickley said that adoption of Proposal C would provide more equitable state taxes for school support and take away one of the two major arguments in the current school busing controversy.

Homeowners in the district would gain the most financially from its adoption since they already pay the highest school tax in Michigan—36.6 mills (\$36.60 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation) and would realize a net drop in taxes paid even if the state tax rate goes up 2.3 per cent as Milliken has proposed.

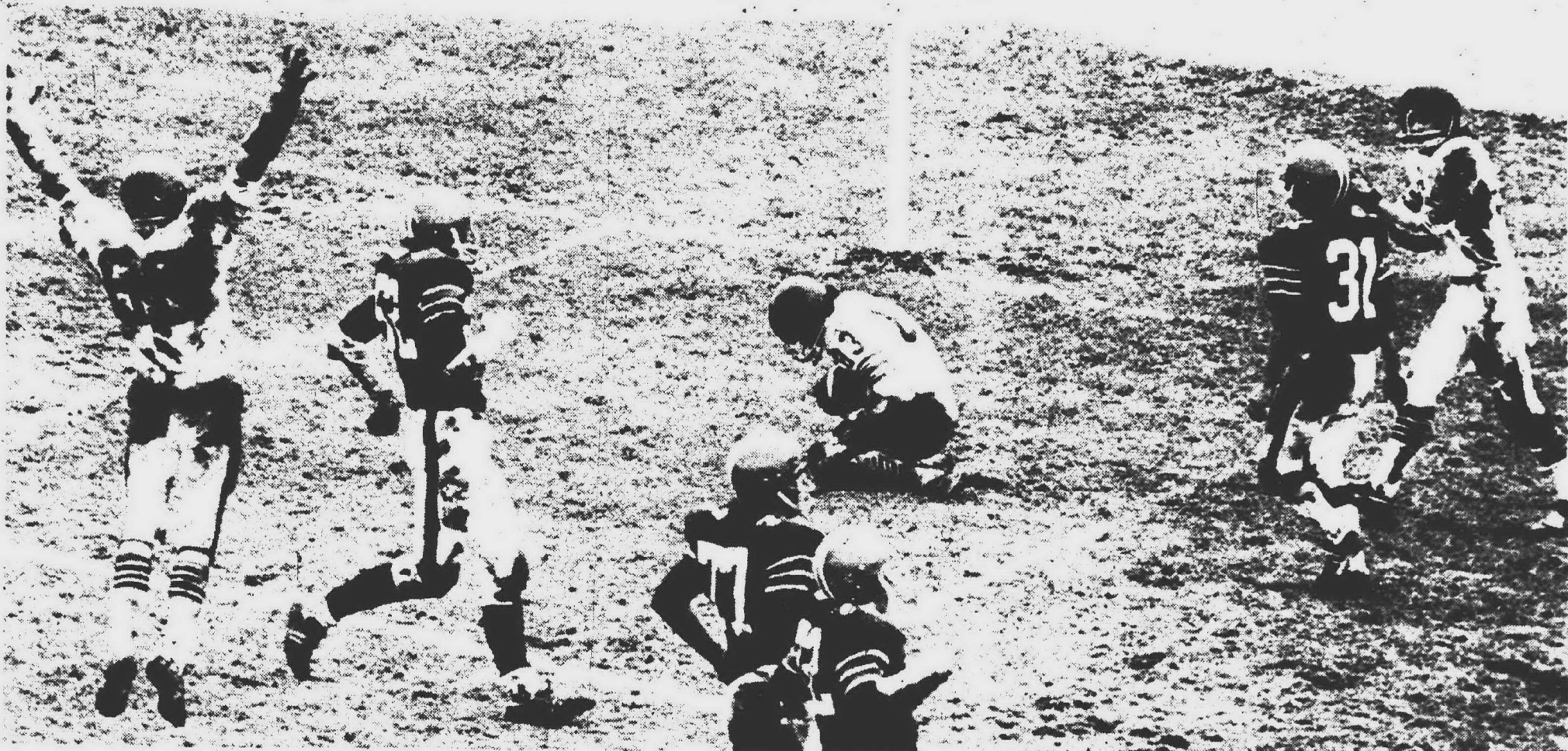

THROUGH BIFOCALS

"HOTEL MAYFLOWER was officially dedicated to civic service last evening, under auspices as colorful and brilliant as have ever been witnessed in this community, when approximately 200 residents and visitors assembled for the banquet and attendant ceremonies."

That paragraph from a lead story in the Plymouth Mail of Nov. 11, 1927, carried under an eight-column banner reading, "Mayflower Opening Is Great Success," reveals why this weekend 45 years later will be turned into something special at the old hostelry.

In all truth, however, the hotel's 45th birthday party is a symbol of something far more significant than the fact that the hotel has stood successfully all these years at the corner of Main and Ann Arbor Trail.

More than anything else, it is an occasion which dramatizes the faith, persistence and imagination of the man who has been the heart and soul of the Mayflower since 1939 — Ralph Lorenz.

IT TOOK A GROUP of local business leaders, who banded together under the name of Plymouth Community Hotel Corp., to make construction of the Mayflower possible. Under the chairmanship of Edward C. Hough, and with a motto of "Every Citizen A Stockholder," they conducted a blitz fund-raising campaign that netted upwards of \$200,000.

"Those people left us a legacy," asserts Lorenz, adding, "We need a group just like that today."

Our innkeeper, you see, is a veritable fountain of ideas and is totally dedicated to the proposition that downtown Plymouth shall not wither and die on the economic vine of an exploding area population growth.

He sees and accepts the competition which this mushrooming growth is breeding, and then answers it with innovative new features of his own. Ralph doesn't question that competition is healthy, pointing with satisfaction to a weekend's patronage of his own

landmark facilities by several hundred persons, but there is one thing about which he is impatient.

The Plymouth of his image demands a progressive central business area and the years of talk, talk, talk about downtown development without cohesive, positive results irritate Ralph no end. That's why he makes the point, "Those people left us a legacy," when he talks of the business leadership of 45 years ago. His Plymouth would thrive, not just survive.

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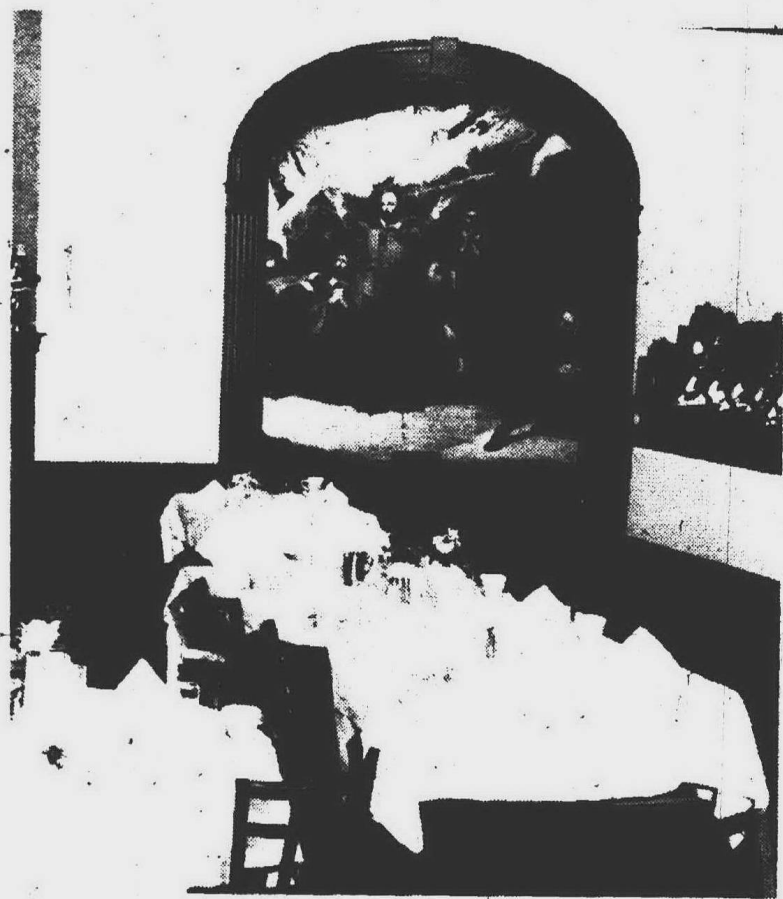

Dr. Carman Tells Olympic Story

PLYMOUTH Members of the Plymouth Rotary Club were taken behind the scenes of the recent Olympic Games in Munich, Germany, last Friday, and when the vicarious trip was ended, they realized that it would be almost impossible for the summer games of the famed international competition ever to be in the United States.

"When you realize that the German people spent \$650 million to stage the games," said Dr. Kenneth Carman, a former track star at the University of Iowa and presently a member of the Garden City Board of Education, who attended the games, "you can readily understand why Detroit never could play host and why the United States wouldn't either."

He drove the point home even further when he explained that none of the \$650 million came from tax money -- that it was raised by the German people in any number of ways.

THE GREATEST portion of the money was raised, he told his listeners, through the sale of 10 - mark medallions. "They sold 65 million of them at a profit of \$216 million and added another \$146 million in a country - wide lottery," he explained.

"They even sold 15 million guide booklets that netted \$50 million along with \$2.5 million from the sale of emblems --

and another \$21 million from TV."

Dr. Carman had his listeners aghast when he informed them that the roof of the main stadium, erected for the games, cost \$15 million.

"I doubt if that kind of money ever would be spent over here," he said. All agreed.

PEERING INTO the future Dr. Carman expressed the belief that the biggest problem facing the Olympic com-

mittees is to define amateurism.

"Most of the foreign athletes are sponsored by their countries," he explained, "and it makes for unfair competition. "And the other big problem will be the cost of staging the games."

Montreal, Canada, will stage the 1976 games, and the Rotarians now will have a greater interest in how the Canadian city will finance the extravaganza.

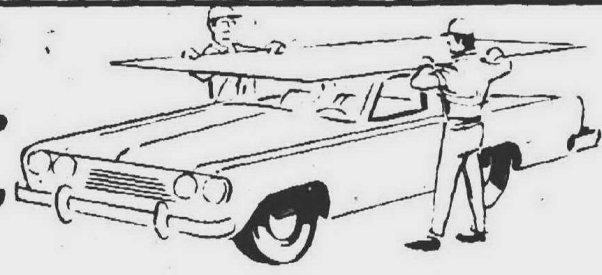

Redford Union Athletic Director Howard Kraft couldn't have put on a better show and area athletes couldn't have given it a better 200 per cent.

Flint Kearsley captured team honors with 116 points but right behind in second place was Paul Holmberg's Stevenson squad with 127 points.

Kearsley ran 12-14-22-25-43 for 116 while Stevenson ran 2-8-27-36-54 for 127 points.

STEVENSON'S Dave Mathia was second across the line in the team race behind Tom Hammer of Grosse Pointe North. Hammer came in at 15:52 and Mathia was next at 16:02.

Steve White was No. 2 man for Stevenson in eighth place at 16:13.3, Rick Galindo No. 3 man in 27th place at 16:41.1, Bill Walker No. 4 man in 36th at 16:51 and Chuck Minear No. 5 man in 54th at 17:08.6.

The individual race of 85 runners was won by Wayne Memorial's Walter Nowak. He dashed across in 15:56 with Farmington's Mike McGuire second at 16:02.2. Southfield's Dan Henry was third at 16:09.2 and John Yurchis of Garden City East fifth at 16:15.5.

The Class A All-State team was picked from the day's top 15 times, combining both the team race and individual race.

Five Observerland runners placed in the top 15, which is one-third of the All-Staters from 188 Class A high schools. Observerland covers only 17 Class A high schools.

Not a bad showing at all.

Franklin Scores But... Churchill Wins No. 8

The pressure was on. Churchill had to win, Franklin had to win.

Only one would win and one would lose.

Churchill was boasting a perfect 7-0 record which included a six game shutout streak, while Franklin stood at 5-2 with victories the past two years in the meetings between the two clubs.

Many believed that the winner would be the one who made the fewest number of errors.

FRANKLIN ERRED and Churchill played good hard nose football.

Churchill had its shutout string broken at six but scored its first victory ever over Franklin, 20-8, and is now one game away from a perfect season with Livonia Stevenson on tap this Friday afternoon.

"Defense is the name of the game," said Churchill Coach Ken Kaestner. "Our defense came up with a tremendous showing, it was just super."

"We forced their quarterback into making mistakes," added Kaestner. "We dropped him five times for a minus 50 yards attempting to pass."

And from the other side of the field:

"We (Franklin) lost our own game," said Franklin Coach George Lovich. "We blew too many plays and made way too many mental errors."

"Our defenders left their zone on two of the touchdown passes," added Lovich. "The wet field really hurt us. We couldn't get outside and that all but killed our outside option play."

The offensive battle featured Churchill's Bobby Blaies against Franklin's Joe Jinnett. Both hit on seven of 15 passes but Jinnett was dropped on five occasions and was in constant pressure from

the front Charger fivesome. CHURCHILL was fired up and outthit Franklin.

Franklin won the coin toss and elected field, position instead of receiving the ball. Churchill received but had to punt and Franklin took control on Churchill's 42.

Jinnett passed to Ron Urban for a first down on the 28 and a five yard penalty called against Churchill made it first and five on the 23.

DAVE HOCHSTADT was stopped for no gain and a pass sailed over the head of Tony Dattilio. Dan Quinn was stopped on the 21 by Churchill's Don Forest and Hochstadt was halted on the fourth down play, one yard short of a first down.

Churchill ran three plays and punted and Franklin took control again on Churchill's 48.

Dattilio was all alone in the flat but dropped a Jinnett pass and the Patriots were forced into a punting situation.

Franklin got the break it had been looking for and Churchill was called for roughing the kicker. It was first and 10 on the Charger 27.

Churchill's Kevin Arnold dropped Jinnett for a 10 yard loss and a penalty halted a short spirited drive with Franklin's Dattilio booting it into the end zone.

After a quick exchange of punts, Churchill took control on its 21 with 10:20 left in the half.

PHIL DAMASKA spurred for five yards and Franklin was called for "piling on."

So it was first and 10 on the 37 and Phil Skender broke loose for six and Damaska chalked up a first down on the 47. Blaies hit Dave Brubaker for seven yards and Phil LaFave for another first down.

Blaies then switched to his running game and pounded out gains of three and 14 yards

and a first down on the Franklin 25. Blaies ran it down to the 20 and Franklin set in and Churchill was faced with a third and five.

OFF-SETTING penalties gave Churchill a break and another third down play after the first attempt failed. Blaies combined with Damaska to the Franklin 16 and hit Ron Miller on a 13 yarder. Skender then thundered in and with 5:16 left in the half, Ernie Comini converted and Churchill was up, 7-0.

Both teams were then warned for hitting after the whistle.

CALMER HEADS prevailed and the half ended with Churchill up, 7-0.

Churchill received the second half kickoff, ran three plays and punted to the Franklin 10. Hochstadt was knocked back to the five and Foster halted Jinnett on the eight.

Arnold threw Jinnett for another loss on the five and Dattilio was in for the punt, back in his own end zone.

"BLOCKED PUNT" was in the air and Arnold broke through, a Franklin block was missed, a shoulder ducked, and Churchill recovered on the Patriot four yard line.

Tom Moore ran it to the three and Blaies hit Brubaker who was all alone in the end zone for six points. Comini split the uprights and it was a 14-0 ball game.

Franklin was a far cry from out of it.

ON A DRIVE started from his own 38, Dattilio broke loose for 12 yards and Hochstadt

sprinted to the Churchill 37. Jinnett then found Dattilio alone down the right sidelines and hit his mark and Churchill's shutout streak came to an abrupt halt.

Jinnett passed to Kevin Markwardt for two points and with 4:48 left in the third quarter, the score was sliced to 14-8.

Churchill picked itself up and instead of letting down after the Franklin score, which was only the second touchdown its defense has given up in eight games, the Chargers were on the loose.

Damaska ran for a first down on the 38 and Moore sprinted to the 49. Blaies hit Foster for a first down on Franklin's 35 and an un-sportsmanlike penalty pushed it to the 20.

BLAIES HIT Ron Miller who was left alone in the end zone corner when Guy Burke strayed away. The kick was no good but the margin pushed to 20-8 at the end of three quarters.

Franklin struck back with the aid of two penalties and it was a first down on the Churchill 26.

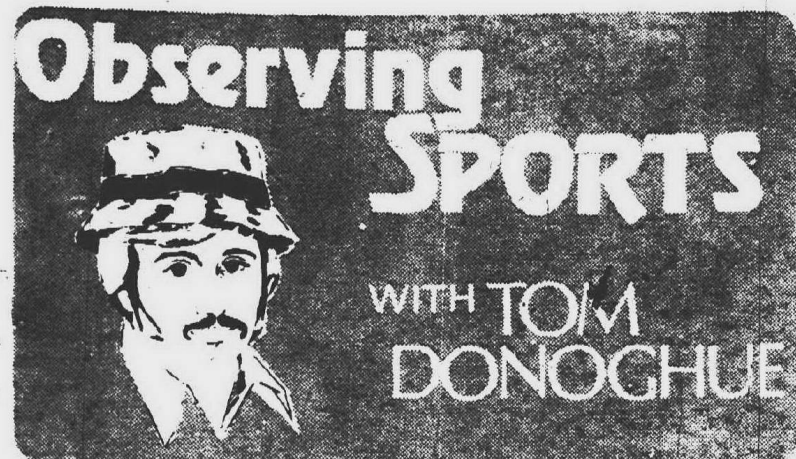
Jinnett went to the air and Al Leirstein picked off a pass on the 20 after a Franklin end slipped to the mud. Churchill was forced to punt and Franklin again went to the air with Skender picking off a stray Jinnett pass and Franklin's hopes were gone.

Churchill collected 12 first downs to Franklin's six and outrushed the Patriots, 141 to 76.

HOLMBERG HAS been accused by some coaches of not using tact in allowing tough football games after practice.

"I guess it could be considered a little dangerous," said Holmberg. "But it helps keep the pressure off."

"Cross country is the kind of sport where a kid has to give of himself more than his talent. Running, running and more running can drive you crazy."

"Determination and drive have to stand above talent," added Holmberg.

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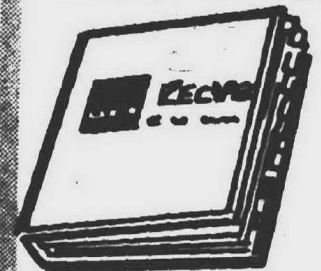

The rest was Edsel Ford. TIGHT END Ralph Plummer caught two touchdowns passes from Ford quarterback Mike Booth on plays of 57 and 27 yards, fullback Tom Miller scored

twice on runs of 23 and one yards and Carl Ziomek booted four conversions.

Booth hit on 14 of 22 passes for 263 yards and pushed his season total to 71 of 113 for 1,305 yards and 19 touchdowns.

Plymouth signal caller Steve Robb hit on seven of 22 passes for 112 yards but had three intercepted.

Ford rushed for 214 yards and Plymouth gained 109.

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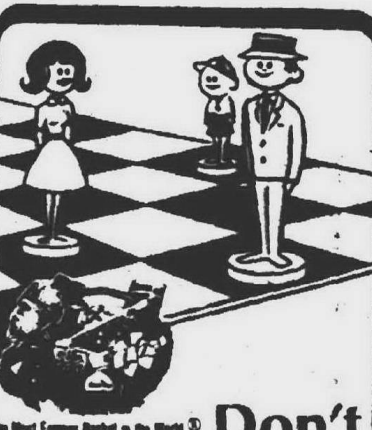

Garden Chores Listed For Fall Wrap Up

The gardening season is just about over for this year. Even avid gardeners have to admit this as they look at bare tree branches and withered stalks in the flower beds.

It is time now to finish up any planting that is still on the schedule. Get the last of those tulip bulbs tucked into the ground and if you still have some of the smaller bulbs that have not yet been planted, tuck them in also.

Now is the time to plant leaf-losing trees and shrubs. This can be done until late in fall as long as the ground can be worked. Or, if you have a really large tree that you want to transplant, prepare the hole now. The tree can be delivered to the planting site after the ground has frozen when a heavy truck driving on the lawn will not damage it.

ALTHOUGH some people plant roses in fall, most experts feel that this planting job is best done in the spring.

If you want to give your trees and shrubs a boost, you can give them a feeding now. However, only feed established trees and shrubs. Do not feed newly planted trees and shrubs. A light feeding in fall will get your lawn greened up early next spring.

Watering is a chore we do not often think about in fall. Before you put that hose away give all newly planted trees and shrubs a thorough soaking. Also, if you give all of your evergreens a thorough watering now they will come through the winter with less damage from drying winds and will look much greener next spring.

When these watering jobs are done drain the hose, coil it loosely, and hang it up in the garage or basement.

KEEP THE LAWN RAKED. Do not let leaves remain on the lawn all winter. They are apt to kill the grass underneath them as they mat down and cut off air circulation. Don't forget that those leaves are worth their weight in gold as compost. Put them on the compost pile and they will turn into rich humus that can be used to enrich the flower beds.

Mulching is done in winter for an entirely different purpose than summer mulching. The summer mulch is put on to keep moisture in the soil. A winter mulch is put on to keep the ground frozen. Use straw, hay, leaves or evergreen branches and do not put them on until after the ground is frozen. This blanket prevents alternate freezing and thawing which damages plant roots.

Plan to put a winter mulch on tender perennials, all newly planted perennials and newly planted shrubs. Don't forget that if you put the mulch on before the ground freezes you are inviting the mice to move in. They are then apt to chew up the very plants you are trying to protect.

Tidy up the shrub beds and the flower beds. Pull up all the weeds that have sprouted up. Cut back the stalks of withered perennials and pull up the old annuals. It is better to dispose of these rather than putting them on the compost pile because they might be harboring insects or diseases.

If there are some bulbs in the garden that you have not dug up yet, such as dahlias, glads, or canna. Be sure to do this right away. Clean these bulbs, label them, and store them in a cool, frost-free place for the winter.

ROSES NEED a little special care. It is a good idea to cut back the stems to about 18 inches this fall and prune them shorter when spring comes. Work a little

bone meal, about a cupful per plant, into the soil around the roots. Then bring in soil from another part of the garden and mound it up around each plant in a cone about a foot high. This will actually keep the soil around the roots warmer and prevent winter damage to the lower part of the cane.

Climbing roses and rambler roses should be checked and any long canes that might be whipped around by winter winds should be cut back. Also, make sure that all of the canes are securely tied so that they will not be blown around.

If you want to increase your supply of shrubs this is a good time to try making hardwood cuttings. Cut stems from Forsythia and other shrubs six

to eight inches long with four nodes on each stem. Tie these in a bundle and insert the bundle at a slant in a box of damp soil or peat moss and put in a cool cellar.

By spring many of these cuttings will have developed roots and can be planted in the garden.

Finally, when all the outdoor jobs are done, clean the tools, rub them with an oily rag, and store them for the winter. Clean the lawn mower, drain the tank, and cover it with a sheet of plastic so that it will be ready to go next spring.

Store sprays and dusts in a dry place. Dispose of any with labels that you can't read.

Finally, turn your attention to indoor gardening.

New Cauliflower Released By MSU

A new cauliflower variety that protects itself from the sun has been released by Michigan State University's agricultural experiment station.

The new variety produces "wrapper leaves" that curl over the head resulting in the blanching, white tint most desirable in cauliflower. It gets its name—Self-Blanche—from this characteristic.

According to Dr. S. Honma, MSU horticulturist who developed the variety, Self-Blanche can be used for both fresh market and processing purposes. The variety matures in mid-season and a crop can be harvested over a relatively short period of time.

Self-Blanche heads are smooth, deep, solid, pure

white and finely textured. They freeze well and have a superior flavor either cooked or raw.

The wrapper leaves give adequate protection to heads seven to nine inches in diameter. If larger heads are desired the leaves will require tying to get proper blanching. Also, the degree of self-wrapping is best if the variety matures during cool weather.

Self-Blanche could reduce costs for growers, processors and consumers, because the hand typing needed to blanch other commercial varieties is a major part of cauliflower production cost.

Self-Blanche has been commercially tested for three years in Michigan, Indiana, Oregon and Florida.

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New No-Bias Housing Rules Eyed

The Michigan Civil Rights Commission has adopted new measures to halt discrimination in employment patterns and is considering additional steps in the housing field.

MCRC President Mrs. Frank Wylie said the new job guidelines are based on legal interpretations of a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision in the case of Griggs vs. Duke Power.

The interpretation is that the enforcement agency no longer needs to prove discriminatory intent—only that the effect of practices and procedures is discriminatory. In the housing field, for example, advertising to all-white audiences would be considered discriminatory.

The MCRC is an eight-member agency set up under the state constitution with power to halt discrimination on the bases of race, religion, sex and national origin.

Here are examples of how the job guidelines will affect employment practices:

• **FAIR RECRUITMENT:** Every employer is required to conduct hiring and recruitment to assure that minorities and women are given fair notice of job vacancies and are given equal opportunity to apply. Where any practice, such as word of mouth referral, maintains an all-white job force, it is strictly forbidden.

• **FAIR EMPLOYMENT:** When such matters as plant location adversely affect

minority employment, employers must take appropriate action to assure minorities equal employment opportunities. Employers who move are required to adopt as a minimum goal, the same level of minority employment as previously attained in their previous facility.

• **ALLEGATIONS OF Employment Discrimination:** No longer is it necessary to prove that race, color, national origin, religion, age or sex is the sole cause of a discharge. It is sufficient if the prohibited grounds are one of the considerations which led to discharge. Where disputes as to fact occur, other related aspects of possible discriminatory employer behavior will be considered.

MCRC has also adopted all guidelines on testing, and employment discrimination based on sex, religion and national origin as promulgated by the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC).

These guidelines are immediately binding on MCRC staff and hearing referees. Believing that the Griggs vs. Duke Power principle of defining discrimination and the affirmative remedial action required is applicable in other areas where discrimination is prohibited, MCRC staff drew up comparable housing guidelines.

At its October public meeting, MCRC directed that these housing guidelines be distributed to the public, relevant state agencies, state officials and other concerned persons and groups.

MCRC will consider official adoption of these guidelines at its next meeting in Lansing Nov. 28.

The new housing guidelines are similar to the employment guidelines previously adopted, inasmuch as they have as their base the Griggs vs. Duke Power Supreme Court decision. Therefore, all acts, practices or procedures which have the effect of restricting minority access to housing are illegal unless justified by business necessity.

There are examples of how these new guidelines may be applied:

• **DISCRIMINATION IN Rental of Multi-Family Housing:** Word of mouth recruitment by present all-white occupants, reliance on walk-in applicants in an all-white neighborhood, outdoor advertising exclusively in all-white areas, or media advertising whose audience is all

white are violations of law where the effect is that only white persons apply.

• **DISCRIMINATION IN Practices and Procedures:** Any practice or procedure which makes it more difficult for a non-white person to obtain housing is forbidden. A common practice of landlords has been to consider only the income of one wage earner among prospective tenants, generally the male head of family. The new guidelines require that for qualification purposes, all income to the prospective family be considered.

• **DISCRIMINATION IN Initial Sale-Condominiums, cooperatives and homesites** are included in the new guidelines, if the projects contain 10 or more housing units in an area which is predominantly white and it appears sales will be primarily to white applicants. Advertising of these units will be scrutinized for such violations as advertising restricted to white communities, selling practices which discourage minority applicants, failure to display the equal housing opportunity logo, or any practice which has the effect of attracting only white applicants.

• **MOBILE HOME PARKS:** Any practice which tends to preserve segregated trailer parks is expressly forbidden in the new guidelines. No longer will applicants be denied such facilities because they have not lived previously in a "trailer park environment" or previously owned a mobile home.

• **LAND AND HOMESITE Development:** Recreational land areas and homesites are covered by the new MCRC housing guidelines. All practices which direct sales solely to the white population,

particularly those listed above, are forbidden.

• **PUBLIC NOTICE OF Fair Housing:** Each developer, real estate company, seller, owner, landlord, manager, or operator should display in sales and rental offices, in advertising and solicitation, equal housing logos and slogans, "in a form which is as visible and important as other information conveyed." Failure to do so will be considered prima facie evidence of discrimination in cases brought before the commission. Financial institutions whose lending practices and procedures contribute to segregation are also covered by the new guidelines.



If you plant seeds of oranges, grapefruits, lemons, etc., will the plants produce edible crops? Not usually. You'll be lucky to get blossoms, but this is a bonus, since the leaves of any citrus are handsome. In other words, the plants are valued mainly for foliage effect.

Flowers smell like a gardenia, but the fruit which might come along is sour and small. Citrus aurantifolia has small edible limes (golfball size). One eye-stopper you can grow indoors is the so-called ponderosa lemon (C. Limonia ponderosa), producing big edible fruit, some weighing over a half-pound.

The Calamondin (Citrus mitis) or miniature orange has fragrant white flowers, edible fruits, one to 1½ inches in diameter. The mandarin orange, citrus, another citrus grows indoors. Also, the C. taitensis or Otaheite (Oh-tuh-hee-tee) produces golf-ball sized fruit which is attractive, although inedible.

Dwarf limes and pomegranates are also available for indoor culture. All citrus prefer a loose, well-drained soil, loam, sand and peat mixed together and fortified with half cupful of bone meal to each peck. Citrus plants like cool temperatures from 40 to 50 degrees at night during the winter. They also

need full sun and an airy location. Temperature and sunlight are important in bringing the plants into flower and fruit.

• **PRESERVING berries:** If you find that bittersweet and other berries shed and do not keep well indoors, try spraying them with hair spray. Or you can mix some clear or white shellac with an equal amount of alcohol, either wood alcohol or the kind sold in paint stores for thinning lacquer. Shellac alone can be used, but alcohol cuts it enough to make the coating almost invisible on stems and berries. Dip the berries in the mixture and hang them up to dry.

Brown Adds Mazda Agency

Bill Brown will open a Mazda agency Dec. 1 just west of his Ford agency in Livonia. Mazda, a Japanese import, is the only rotary engine car available in the U.S.

The Mazda agency, at 35000 Plymouth Rd., will be a separate corporation and in a separate building from the Ford agency on a site that was previously the firm's used car sales space.

President is Edward Brown, son of Bill Brown, the founder. General manager of the Mazda agency will be Roy Bowden, previously general manager of the Ford agency.

THE BROWN agency is one of 67 new ones which will open across the U.S. the same date, bringing Mazda's number of American outlets to 80. Ed Brown said he is in the

process of adding six or seven sales and service personnel and visualizes some expansion of the building at a later date.

The new agency is located on 288,000 square feet of land and costing more than \$500,000. The entire space will be used for sales and service of the nine-model Mazda line.

Most unusual feature is the rotary engine, which has one-third as many parts, one-half the size and one-half the weight of a conventional piston engine of comparable horsepower.

American and many European manufacturers are spending millions to acquire rights to, or develop their own, rotary engines.

Mazda expects 1972 sales to total 60,000 vehicles, about triple 1971 sales, and projects 1973 sales at 100,000.

Bill Brown started a Ford agency in Detroit in 1941, opened the Livonia agency with a brother in 1955 and was actively head of it until 1970.

Ed Brown joined the firm three years ago after earning a BA degree at Western Michigan University and spending two years in the U.S. Army.

State Can't List Lottery Agents

The Bureau of State Lottery appears to be risking a stumble in its race to be in operation 73 working days after the agency's creation.

Just one week before the first tickets go on sale Nov. 13, the state possessed only one copy of a master list of authorized sales agents, and that a computer readout sheet in its Lansing office.

It still lacked a list of the 100-odd banks which will serve the 7,000 sales agents.

METROPOLITAN National Bank of Farmington was notified just last Friday that it had been picked as a lottery depository and received basic instruction in what that meant only on Monday.

The bank was told sales agents would pick up their lottery tickets from the bank. But as of Monday, the bank had neither tickets nor a list of agents authorized to receive them.

Applications for authorization to sell lottery tickets seemingly were mailed to all state liquor licensees and sales agencies selected according to traffic and volume of their liquor sales.

The Mayflower Hotel in Plymouth, for instance, received three applications, one for each of its three liquor licenses, owner Ralph Lorenz said. He returned one and in turn was licensed to sell lottery tickets.

The owner of a wine shop, a Mayflower Hotel tenant, also applied for and received a lottery sales agency license, with the result that two locations in the same building are lottery ticket agents.

Youth Job Bill Signed By Nixon

President Nixon has signed into law legislation originally sponsored by 2nd District Congressman Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor). The bill will expand the Youth Conservation Corps and would make it a permanent program rather than just a pilot program.

Esch originally sponsored legislation to establish the Youth Conservation Corps in 1970. "I introduced this legislation after consultation with the Wilderness Society, the Sierra Club and ENACT (an environmental group at the University of Michigan)," Esch explained.

"It provides an opportunity to attack many of our problems at once - it provides employment for our youth while at the same time assisting to preserve the environment. It provides a unique opportunity to utilize

the idealism of youth in a practical project of worth for the entire nation."

Esch pointed out that although 124,000 applications were received during the first year of the program only 2,600 students were hired. Last year 3,000 were hired. The bill approved by the House would expand the authorization for 1973 to 25,000 and for 1974 to 50,000.

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Players Work To Make Costuming Authentic

The drama staff and the Masque Players of Schoolcraft College have been working hard this week to present as authentic a production as possible of the Greek tragedy "Oedipus Rex."

The play will open Friday, Nov. 10, in the Liberal Arts Theater on the college campus, 18600 Haggerty Road, Livonia. It will also be staged Nov. 11, 12, 18 and 19. Performances are at 8 p.m., except Sundays, when they are 7 p.m.

TICKETS ARE \$1.50 and may be purchased or reserved at the cashier's office in the Administration Building from 1-4 and 6-9 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and in the student activities office. They will also be sold at the door. Among the props being prepared for "Oedipus" are

masks and colorful costumes. Masks were used on the Greek stage by the tragic actors to give some indication of the actors' age, station and mood. They also made it possible for a small number of actors to enact many parts.

The widely-opened mouth helped make the actors' voices more resonant and capable of being heard in the large open-air theaters. Masks were made of linen, cork or wood and with painted expressions on them provided information for the spectators.

The Greek actors (all male) also wore a headdress which towered over the masks. Known as "onkos," these headdresses varied with the station of the person the actor was portraying. The king's, of course, would be the tallest.

THE FUNDAMENTAL

costume was known as the "chiton," a loose-fitting and flowing garment which extended from the neck to the ankles and had sleeves extending to the wrist. This was often decorated with bright colors and ornamented with formal designs or painted with animals, figures or symbolic forms.

Over this was thrown a cloak, which was beautifully colored for symbolic effect. Finishing touches are being put on all of these at Schoolcraft this week under the direction of Dr. Lawrence Rudick and Ralph Kelley, drama instructors, but Schoolcraft actors have decided not to try to put together the "cothurnus" or heavily-soled wooden boot, another traditional Greek indication of the importance of the character.

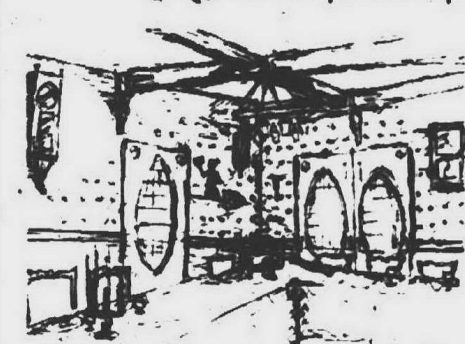

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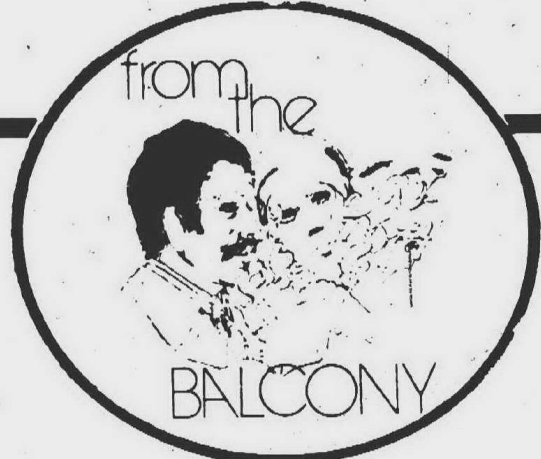

ANN ARBOR Duke Ellington, a "legend in his own time," and his renowned group of musicians will be presented at the University of Michigan at 8:30 p.m., Saturday, Nov. 11, in Hill Auditorium.

The special benefit concert is for the University Musical Society and "will help insure the long-standing tradition of excellent concerts in Ann Arbor," according to the society. It will be Ellington's first appearance under the society's sponsorship.

TICKETS ARE available from Observerland merchants. Prices, which include a tax deductible contribution, will be from \$4 to \$50, with top price ticket holders invited to a special after-concert supper and jam session.

Edward Kennedy "Duke" Ellington is, the society notes, "probably best described by a pair of his own superlatives, which he has used to honor qualities he admires in others, 'a man of heroic proportions' and 'beyond category.' The terms apply to Ellington as a person, as a piano-composer, as a writer, and as leader of today's most famous and exciting jazz orchestra.

"Little wonder that President Nixon has appointed the personable Dr. Duke Ellington official goodwill envoy for American music abroad."

Ellington has received honorary degrees from 10 institutions, including the Christian Theological Seminary, Assumption College, Brown, Washington and Yale Universities.

His compositions include "Satin Doll," "Mood Indigo," "Solitude," "I Got It Bad and That Ain't Good," "I Let a Song Go Out My Heart," "Do Nothing 'Til You Hear From Me," "Prelude to a Kiss," "All Too Soon" and "I Love You Madly."

IN MAY 1970, Ellington was inducted into the National Institute of Arts and Letters, and in June of the same year, the American Ballet Theater premiered his ballet, "The River," at Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts in New York City.

Already the subject of many books, Ellington was honored again with Scribner's 1970 release of "The World of Duke Ellington" by critic Stanley Dance.

He was one of the first 10 songwriters to be elected to the Songwriters Hall of Fame,

and was inducted into the Swedish Royal Academy of Music in 1971.

The Ellington Orchestra in a typical month can span the spectrum of sacred concerts in churches and synagogues, performances with major symphonies, college dances and symposiums, nightclubs, dance halls, television specials and Las Vegas hotels.

Formsma, 47, died Thursday. Stevenson students held a memorial service in the school at 9 a.m. Monday. At noon, a service was held in Ward United Presbyterian Church.

AT STEVENSON, Shannon Hurd, president of the student senate, praised Formsma for his work while ill.

"At least since January, Mr. Formsma had been performing this very difficult and strenuous job in the midst of extreme physical pain. He lived up to the responsibilities of his job and did not weaken in his illness. He remained concerned and anxious to know about student ideas, activities, thoughts and problems."

"Up until the very last day before his hospitalization, he was involved with students in school, making decisions and working out problems."

"Even as his condition worsened, his thoughts and concerns were of the students and the school. Upon his request, he was kept informed on senate activities and on the wins and losses of our teams," Miss Hurd said.

OTHER SPEAKERS at the Stevenson service were: Mrs. Sarah Dick, social studies teacher at Stevenson since it opened; Asst. Principal O.J. Weipert; Alan Helmkamp, representing Stevenson alumni; Arlene Patruski, Formsma's secretary for eight years; Jonathan Swift, English department chairman; and teacher Irwin Weisberg. The school's symphonic choir also performed "Prayer for Man and His World" and "The Lord Bless You and Keep You."

Rev. Ronald Vander Werff and Rev. Moody Yap, both of the Church of Our Saviour, eulogized Formsma at the service in Ward Presbyterian. Formsma was a founder, Sunday school superintendent and teacher, an elder, and vice president of the Consistory of the Church of The Saviour.

VanderWerff stressed Formsma's faith. "If anything was sure in

Jay's life, it was faith," he said.

A "tremendous testimony" to Formsma's life, VanderWerff added, was "the way he lived a Christian life under those kinds of conditions."

He added: "He depended totally upon Jesus Christ. There was no doubt about that."

Burial was in Chapel Hill Cemetery, Grand Rapids.

HE IS SURVIVED by his wife, Jean; a son, Mark; a daughter, Linda; three brothers, Duane of Coleman, Gerald of Kalamazoo and Gordon of Benton Harbor; and parents-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. John D. Laninga of Grand Rapids.

Formsma was a member of the Livonia Educational Administrators Assn.; the Lions Club; The Michigan

Assn. of Secondary School Principals; the National Assn. of Secondary School Principals; Travelers Protective Assn.; Livonia Youth Inc.; the board of directors of the Livonia Town Hall; Phi Delta Kappa; and the "W" Club of Western Michigan University.

He received his BS degree from Western Michigan, a master's in administration from the University of Michigan and an educational specialist degree from Michigan State University.

After spending four years as a teacher and coach at Kent City, Formsma became a secondary school principal.

He was a principal at Eay Claire, Belding High, and Holland High. He was hired at Stevenson nine years ago, a year before the school opened so that he was involved in the school's planning.

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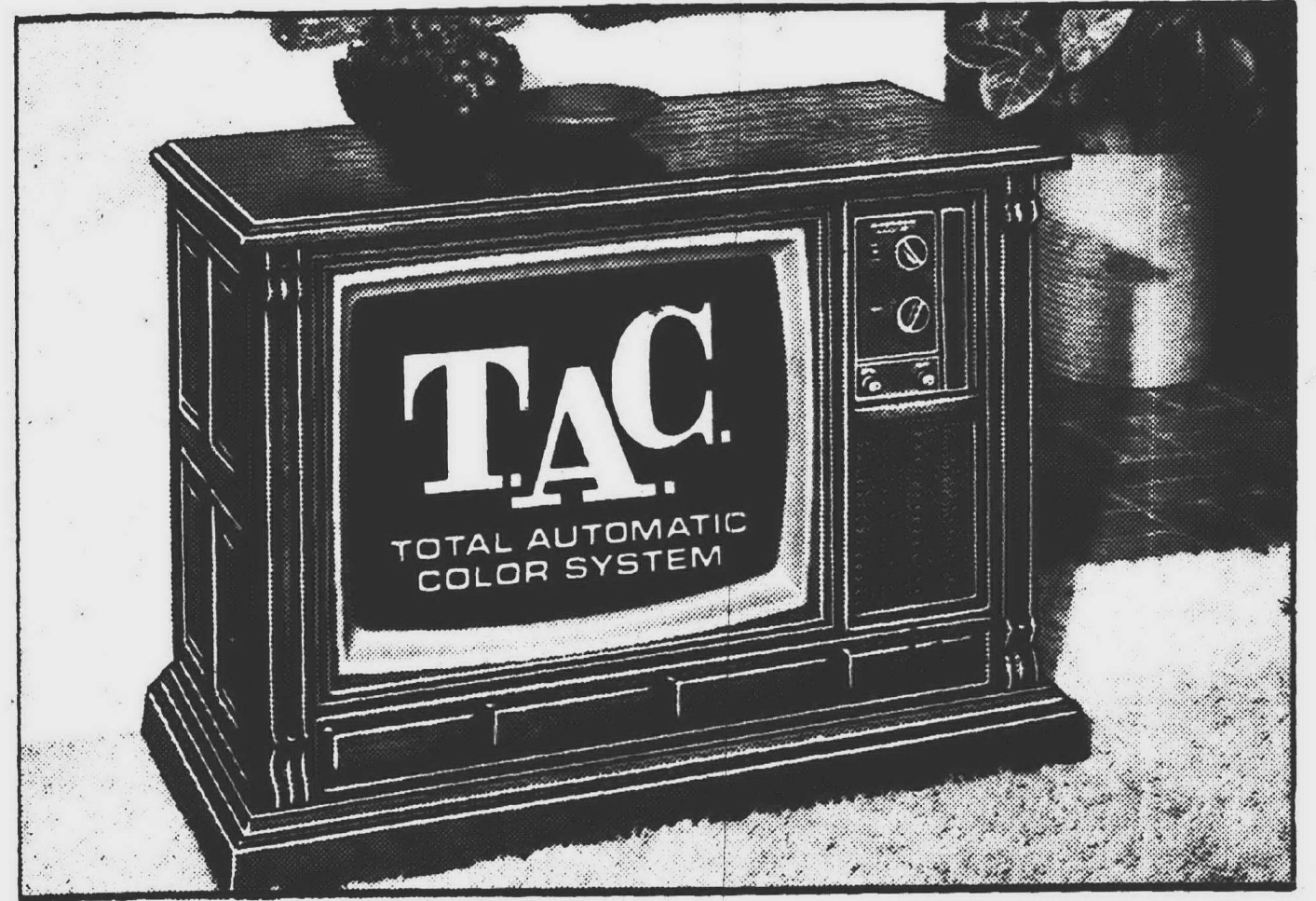


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BLACK EYE

There is just something inherently humorous about a black eye. To the beholder, not to the wearer. There are a few yaks, some ruffled feelings, and then the shiner faces away.

People in my line of work have more trouble with black eyes... the figurative type that somebody hangs onto their reputation. It takes it a long time to fade away.

Don't get me wrong. Furnace inspection and repair is necessary. But the homeowner should be in control of the situation. Nothing should be torn apart or replaced without his consent in advance.

Voting Machines And The Nostalgia Of The Old-Fashioned Paper Ballot

I have this disturbing feeling that this is going to be the first middle-aged column I have ever written.

Why middle-aged? Because I suspect it's going to be the first one I can remember that looks back to how things were when I was young and compares them unfavorably with the way things are today.

I couldn't help thinking that way when I voted yesterday.

I walked into the antiseptic booth, pulled the big red plastic handle, and... shtwonk... the cable-powered curtain swished shut behind me. Trapped now inside the machine, I faced the ballot which was carefully secured from my touch behind the glass and metal of the box.

And all those levers!

I searched out the candidates I wanted to vote for, reached out, pawed the levers down. Click (softly).

I had just voted, played my part in the essential action of a democracy. And what happened? Just a small, soft click.

Where, I wondered, had my vote gone? Spun down electronically, whispering its way into the vacuum tube bowels of the machine, its fate entirely in the hands of whatever serviceman who set up the machine before voting.

VOTING BY MACHINE is like drinking a weak martini. You expect to get something out of it, but not much happens.

Back in the old days, we used to vote with paper ballots.

You'd walk into the polling place, get your ballot, and step into one of the rough wooden booths. You'd turn, pull the curtain shut yourself, and settle down to work your way through the ballot spread out in front of you.

You voted with a pencil (ball point pens were dangerous, since the flick of a thumb by a partisan teller could spoil your vote), and when you found a candidate you particularly liked, you could put an especially deep black mark in the box opposite his name. None

of those soft little impersonal clicks.

Then, finished, you could rip back the curtain in defiance or open it smoothly and confidently, depending on how you felt (today's voting machine gives you only one mechanical, unfeeling speed) and walk over to the ballot box with your own ballot in your hand. You'd have folded it up, and you stuffed it into the box yourself as you walked out.

You might have some worries about the honesty of the tellers, but you had the nice feeling of knowing that it was your ballot, marked just the way you wanted. And you knew darn well that your vote went into the ballot box because you-- not some electron tube -- put it there.

Voting by paper ballot in the old days may not have been efficient, and it certainly was open to shenanigans in the counting. But at least it was personal and individual, something you could relate to and make your own.

IN SHORT, voting the old way by paper ballot was satisfying.

It may have been inefficient, and it may have been more open to dishonesty than the modern machine method, but the whole process of making your own mark on a ballot somehow gave me more of a sense of involvement with the political process than the soft click of that darned lever that I pulled yesterday.

Commentators have been puzzled about this election. They have remarked on the declining sense of involvement in the political process they see in the electorate, and they have wondered that the stories of political payoffs and corruption (on the part of both parties) have so little stirred the people.

I wonder if a small part of the problem doesn't lie in the actual mechanism by which most people have any contact with the political process: voting. And I wonder if in some subtle way the unfeeling, dissatisfying, impersonal process of voting by machine hasn't played a role in changing the way people feel about politics in our country.



As Press Improves Attacks Increase

The current paradox is this: Never has any nation had so many newspapers (and news periodicals) of such high quality, with such varied and sophisticated newsgathering resources.

The other side of the paradox is that never in the history of this country has the press been under such consistent and widespread attack from so many sources.

I THINK the real crux of any credibility gap between the press and its audience is that never before in the history of this country have so many divisive issues arisen in so brief a span. These are issues on which thinking people have very strong and very personal views.

One of our periodicals recently published a long, and in my professional opinion right-down-the-middle, news article on Vice President Agnew and his views. My desk soon was piled high with letters about equally divided between those denouncing our article for making a hero of the vice president and those maintaining we had slandered a great patriot.

I assure you that any news article on Southeast Asia policy, women's rights, ecology, student activism and Mid-East policy results in the same sort of response.

Personally, I figure that when we get attacked by both sides, we must have done a good, honest job of reporting and editing. But many people today tend to see events in black and white -- when, in all truth, most occur in varying shades of gray. And they bitterly resent the press's reporting of events which they find disagreeable or at variance with their point of view.

No longer is it possible to count the really good American newspapers on the fingers of your two hands. Today many of the finest newspapers in the country are in the 25,000 to 100,000 circulation area.

FROM THE DAY this republic was born until 1971, it was the consistent policy of the federal government to encourage and facilitate the rapid and economical distribution of news and information. That policy apparently now has been reversed.

The United States Postal Service, operating on the basis of a cost accounting study which is as mysterious to outside experts as it appears inexplicable, apparently will succeed in raising second-class (publication mail) postal charges by astronomical amounts in the next few years. In the case of some large national publications, the increases will approximate 200 per cent.

CURRENTLY, and for the first time in the history of this nation, newspapers are subject to economic controls.

If improperly exercised, these controls could be used to punish newspapers whose policies are disliked by the government and to reward those who are "good boys." I am not in any way suggesting that any such thing will be done. But the power is there.

THERE IS A well-defined and organized campaign to limit severely the right of newspapers to report all the facts on individuals arrested and indicted for serious offenses. The argument is that such reporting could prejudice the accused's right to a fair trial.

Just a few weeks ago in New York City, a local judge actually conducted a trial in private (the public and all newsmen being excluded) because he said he feared that the reputation of the accused, previously identified as a gangster, would be so mentioned in news stories and that it would prejudice the jury.

Bad habits spread quickly. A judge in Sullivan County, N.Y., decided that an arson case should be tried in secret.

An Unpleasant Campaign Ends

This has to be the most unpleasant political campaign I've ever covered.

Perhaps it was because it was so long -- the better part of a full year. Perhaps it was because politicians no longer have respect for the public and each other, the same way the public tends increasingly to mistreat officials.

THE FAVORITE low-down trick seemed to be the last-minute charge.

Paul Hart, seeking to upset Judge Robert Brang in Redford Township, began a lawsuit in the last week of the campaign concerning the incumbent's ties to the Democratic Party. Naturally, the Circuit Court couldn't possibly settle the matter prior to the election.

Morley Winograd, Democratic chairman in Oakland County, was upset about the way votes were tabulated in some Republican-dominated areas in the Aug. 8 primary. So he waited until one week before the Nov. 7 election to ask Secretary of State Richard Austin's office to send special poll watchers down to the GOP areas.

The Republicans pulled the same kind of stunt. Months ago, Oakland County Board Chairman Larry Pernick (D-Southfield) wrote a letter endorsing another

Democratic candidate. It apparently was on official county stationery. The Grand Old Party waited until the closing days of the campaign to cry "foul."

REPUBLICAN Ralph Judd knew for months that 17th District Congressman Martha Griffiths was passing herself off as Farmington, Southfield and Redford's servant, even though the district doesn't officially change until Jan. 1. Nevertheless, Judd waited until the final week of the campaign to make an issue of it.

Running for Wayne County commissioner, Mary Dumas (R-Livonia) was running ads and distributing literature which many persons felt inflated her contributions as trustee and board secretary of Schoolcraft College. I tend to think they were right, but that's not the point. The point is, why did her fellow trustee, Arch Vallier, wait until the final days of the campaign before suggesting with a public letter that Mrs. Dumas be relieved of some of her college duties?

On the Saturday before the election, I received in the mail a newsletter from State Rep. Marvin Stempien (D-Livonia). It was mailed in what appeared to be official state stationery (at

least there was no disclaimer, "not printed at state expense"). It discussed the ballot issues and bade farewell to his old legislative district.

But why did Stempien wait until the weekend prior to the congressional election to send out a newsletter on state issues? Why did he use his congressional campaign picture, and his congressional campaign logotype with the arty "S", on a legislative newsletter? Granted, he didn't mention his congressional campaign directly, but anyone who thinks Stempien wasn't

practicing the Madison Avenue technique of image building is a fool.

ON TOP of it all, there was little discussion of some of our real political issues: The approaching energy crisis, integration of the suburbs by other-than-busing means, the disposal of that mountain of trash we're placing at our curbs each week. America's weakening competitive position in foreign trade, the resulting unemployment.

This has to be the most unpleasant political campaign I've ever covered.

Superintendents Show The Strain

Not too many years ago, the toughest job in society was the policeman's.

Then the national columnists, newsmagazines, and pundits reached the conclusion that possibly the toughest job in America was a high school principal's because of student strikes, protests, and school activism that reached a peak in the late 1960s.

But now there seems to be a new successor to the policeman and high school principal -- the school superintendent.

In large cities, superintendents are damned by white homeowners' groups if they recommend integration of the public schools and damned by civil rights' groups if they are too slow in integrating.

SUBURBAN superintendents also have their problems as evidenced by Observer stories over the years.

The drug problem -- including the hard drug problem -- has moved out from the inner city to the suburbs, and parents are demanding that public schools do something to solve it.

When college students in the 1960s demanded more relevancy in their classes and curriculum,

the public schools responded by expanding their class offerings to cover more than just the basic three R's.

Plymouth's James Rossman was fired by his school board nearly a year ago in a controversy that isn't resolved yet.

Harry Howard, in the Wayne-Westland school system, was well-liked and considered a competent, top-notch administrator during his more than six years there, but he too has given notice that he will look elsewhere for a job when his contract expires in June 1974.

Dr. Don Shader of Garden City, also admired and well-liked in the job he has held for more than five years, is leaving in a few months to accept a more demanding job as No. 2 man in the State Dept. of Education.

But the job of directing a suburban school system, keeping everyone happy isn't an easy one.

This was pointed out recently when a teachers' union member commented about Harry Howard that he was surprised to know that he was "only 48 years old -- he looks closer to 60."

Milby is also the owner of several retail merchandising firms.

With the resignation of Owens, there are two vacancies on Hamilton International's 14-member board. Outside directors will be sought.

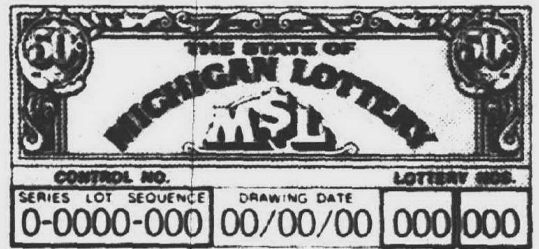

3 Brides In Family

Gown Carries On Tradition

Three generations—three lovely brides—one beautiful wedding dress.

One dress, that is, that underwent complete reconstruction so it could be worn Oct. 21 by Martha Jane Stover, third in its line of brides, when she was married to Fred N. Scott III in North Farmington Baptist Church. Time had damaged irreparably the satin and net in the gown that had been worn 60 years ago by Marty Stover's grandmother, Mrs. Fred G. Smith, and 30 years ago by her mother, Mrs. Robert Stover.

But the beautiful silk and linen lace that formed wide panels and narrow trim was as good as new, and the style and detailing were perfect for a bride of 1972.

So Mrs. Stover, in a triumph of dressmaking skill, duplicated the dress in today's polyester fabric, copying the lines and using the old lace.

THE STORY of the gown goes back to 1912, when Olive Rusler was married to Fred G. Smith in Grandville, Ohio. Her bridal gown was sewn by her aunt, Leah Browning, a professional dressmaker.

And, the seamstress's grandniece decided more than half a century later, "she must have stood Mother up and sewn her into it—that's the only way all those hooks in the back could have worked."

With the satin and dotted net and lace gown, the bride of 1912 wore a flowered headpiece. "It belonged to a friend and was mother's 'something borrowed,'" Mrs. Stover said.

AFTER THE WEDDING, the dress was packed away, to be brought out when the Smiths' daughter, Nina, was planning a wartime wedding to Robert Stover in Johnstown, Ohio.

Her mother was no longer living, which may have had some bearing on her decision to wear the gown. "Besides, in 1942 materials were hard to get, and you used what you had," she remembers.

"The dress didn't fit me as well as it fit Mother," she added. "She was a tall, stately woman. But because I had to shorten it, I just cut away the soiled part at the hemline and made no other changes."

Again, after the wedding, the dress was packed away. When Mrs. Stover next looked at it, the family was living in Farmington, the Stovers' two sons were married and daughter Marty was grown.

"At that point she said she hoped I wasn't expecting her to wear it," Mrs. Stover laughed, "so I figured that would be the end of it."

BUT WHEN MARTY became engaged to Fred Scott, he gave her the engagement ring that had belonged to his grandmother. And when plans got under way for an October wedding, mother and daughter looked again at the heirloom wedding dress.

When it came out of the box, the satin and net began to disintegrate.

"I took it to several women I considered fine seamstresses," Mrs. Stover said, "but they wouldn't take it on. So I decided to try."

After an unsuccessful search for satin to match the

lace, she settled on lutesong, a polyester fabric. That was in July, and from then until the first of October, she said, "I don't think there was a day when I didn't work a little on that dress."

"Even the day before the wedding I moved a couple of snaps," she added. "One friend said I was making it twice—working in the daytime and then staying awake at night to figure out the next step. She was about right."

Mrs. Stover took the dress apart with sharp scissors and a razor. She used the old satin in the skirt as a pattern so that the intricate soft pleats in the back could be made the same way.

The front of the skirt was changed a bit to a style that suited mother and daughter better, and the dotted overlay was eliminated. The sleeves, with their complicated cutouts and lace edging were copied exactly.

"The first took me three days to make," Mrs. Stover said. "The second went faster."

THE IMPOSSIBLE hook arrangement in the back gave way to a modern zipper, but finding a way to use and conceal it was another small bit of engineering.

With leftover scraps of lace, Mrs. Stover fashioned a headpiece to hold Marty's veil. "She couldn't wear mine because it was made of wartime nylon and just fell apart," she explained.

Marty, like her grandmother and mother, wore with her wedding gown a turquoise, pearl and gold pendant.

And, after she had walked down the aisle on her father's arm, and after the church reception and the newlyweds' departure for a honeymoon in the Smoky Mountains, Mrs.

Stover washed the dress and it looked like new.

Before being packed away, it will be displayed in a talent show the women of North Farmington Baptist are putting on Nov. 19.

The polyester should hold up better than the satin, Mrs. Stover said.

"But I've been told that the lace will outlast this material too," she added. Some future generation bride some day may know.

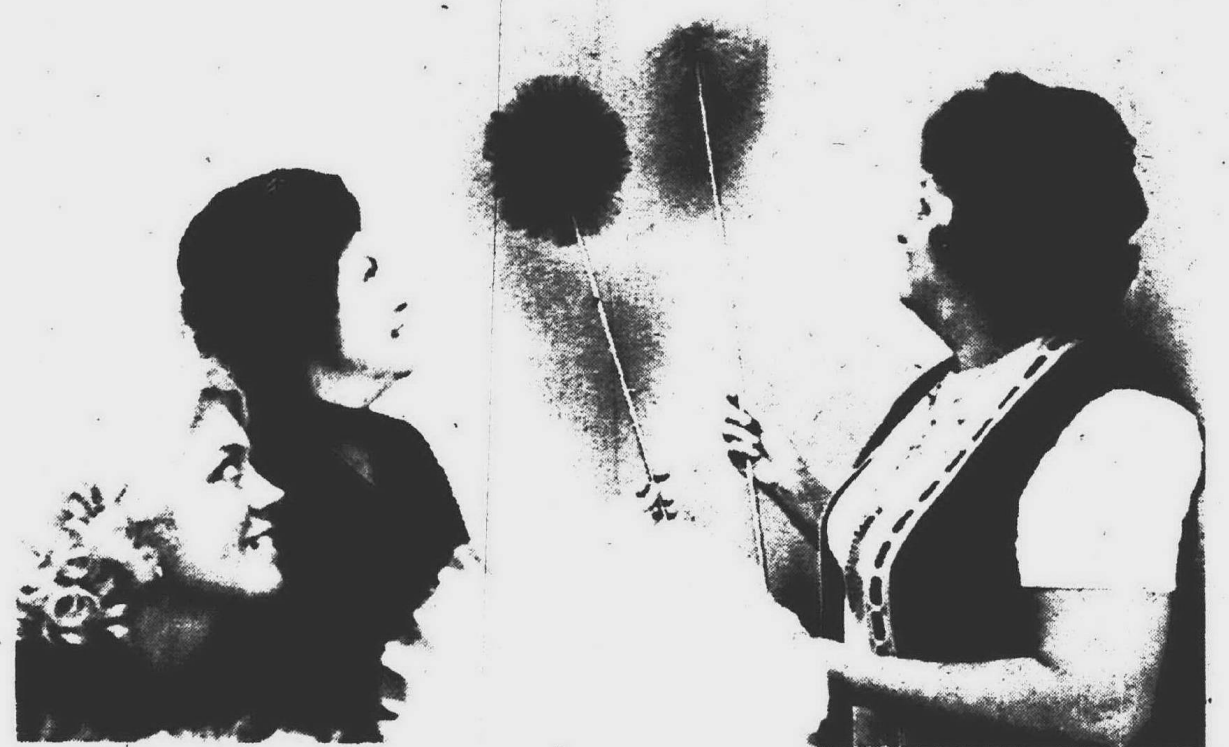

This Livonia Mother Writes Kids' Books

Among the books in the library of Livonia's Henry Clay School is a rather special one.

Its title is "The Fastest Quitter in Town," and it was presented to the school library by Bruce Green, an eight-year-old student at Clay, and his sister, Sharon, who graduated from the sixth grade last June.

Their mother, Mrs. Phyllis Green, just happens to be the author.

What's more, there may be a second presentation in a matter of a few months. Another of Mrs. Green's children's books has been accepted for publication by Young Scott Books. It should be in the bookstores soon.

"THE FASTEST Quitter in Town" is the name that finally evolved for Mrs. Green's story of a young boy who found something went wrong with everything he tried, especially every baseball game.

"His great-grandfather helped him learn to stick with what he started," Mrs. Green said, "and eventually he is able to help his grandfather find a lost ring."

She described the book as a family story, and said the great-grandfather is based in part of her frequent association with her own grandmother, still living and 97 years of age.

The book also is an easy-to-read type, though Phyllis Green didn't plan it that way.

"I wasn't trying to write with a controlled vocabulary—just to tell a children's story," she said. "I guess a writing course I took when we were living in California taught me to write simply."

ACCEPTANCE of her book by the division of Addison-Wesley Publishing Co. in Reading, Mass., was a first for

Mrs. Green, although she has had poems and stories published in magazines like Scholastic and Young Miss.

Her career as a writer she describes as "easy to write—hard to sell."

A former third grade and special education teacher, Phyllis Green remembers that "I used to tell stories when I taught."

Then she started writing them down.

"Just before I met my husband," she said, "I heard from a publisher asking that I make some revisions on a story I had sent him."

"It was one of the first times I had sent off a manuscript, and I didn't realize what a precious thing that letter was—

it was a long time before I again received anything besides rejections."

BUT THE STORY didn't get revised—the writer got married instead. And it was some time later that she decided to take a night course and work at writing seriously.

"Then I started sending things out a lot—and getting them back a lot," she said ruefully. "It's still that way pretty much."

But rejections don't daunt this mother-writer, especially since the recent successes.

She always has several literary projects going and "my dining room table usually is piled high with things I'm working on," she said.

RIGHT NOW, for instance, Mrs. Green is working on some revisions for "Ice River," the tentative title for her second children's book. She's also in the midst of two children's novels and two children's novelettes (that means a 50-page manuscript) and she has another children's picture book in the works.

Phyllis and husband Bob—he's in the insurance business—moved to Livonia with their family four years ago.

She has been a member of the Detroit Women Writers for two years and last year served as co-chairman for the group's writers' conference at Oakland University.

Women Students Offered Grants

Twenty merit scholarships for women whose education has been interrupted are being offered by the center for Continuing Education of Women at the University of Michigan. Amounts will range from \$300 to \$2,000.

Among the criteria for selection of the CEW merit scholars are strength of motivation, promise of impact in a chosen field, academic record and potential and creative and scholarly contributions.

Individual need will be considered and will determine the amount of the awards.

These scholarships are made possible through donations from individuals who share the center's goal of encouraging women of promise in reaching their educational and vocational goals.

SINCE THE PROGRAM was begun in 1970, 35 women have received the grants.

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Fellowship Fund Topic For Livonia AAUW

Mrs. Helen Timmons of Ann Arbor will speak on "Fellowships and the Centennial Fund" at a meeting of the Livonia Branch of the American Association of University Women at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, Nov. 14, in the social hall of St. Paul Presbyterian Church, 27475 Five Mile, Livonia.

Mrs. Timmons is past president of the Michigan Division of the AAUW. She attended the first organizational meeting of the Livonia branch and has offered guidance to the group. As president of the division, she gave the group its original certificate of recognition and presented the gavel to the branch president, Mary Lodge, at the state convention in May, 1971.

MRS. TIMMONS received her BA from Jamestown College in North Dakota, and has served in several offices and committees in the Oakland and Ann Arbor branches of the AAUW, including the ad hoc committee on juvenile delinquency. She is currently working on legislation at the division level.

IN 1971-72, gifts and contributions from AAUW branches and members for fellowships, research and projects totaled \$959,845. The Centennial Fund has a goal of \$10 million in new endowment funds by 1982.

In its first year, the fund has

brought 10 existing fellowship endowments to stipend-producing levels. AAUW fellowships are granted to women who have completed all work for the doctorate except the writing of the thesis.

The national AAUW per capita contribution is \$5.66. Ten states top this national average, including Michigan with per capita giving of \$7.48. Doctoral and professional level fellowships currently aid more than 80 American and 50 international students in advanced study and research.

Two International Fellows now studying at the University of Michigan are Lucia Amenuvor of Accra, Ghana, in the field of public health; and Keike Beppu of Nishinomiya, Japan, in English language and literature.

Following Mrs. Timmons' talk, the members will hold a "make it, bake it, grow it, sew it" auction. Proceeds will go to the fellowship fund. 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Hines Park Will Get Bike Paths

Hard-surfaced bicycle paths extending six miles or more adjacent to Edward Hines Drive in the Livonia, Plymouth and Northville area are expected to be constructed in 1973 as the result of legislation pushed by Sen. Carl D. Pursell (R Plymouth).

An allocation of \$50,000 for this purpose was proposed by Pursell as an amendment to Senate Bill 1356, specifying statewide capital outlays for recreation. After legislative adoption, it has since been signed by Gov. Milliken.

Although the project will be financed with state funds, actual development, maintenance and operation will be in the hands of the Wayne County Parks and Recreation Commission headed by William Maki.

THE PROJECT is part of a program in which the County Board of Commissioners is cooperating with the state to

provide hiking, bicycle and horseback riding facilities throughout the county.

The funds to accommodate the growing legions of bicycling enthusiasts will come from the \$100 million recreation bond issue approved by Michigan voters in 1968. Pursell said Wayne County had not requested all of the funds available to it under that program, and thus the state took the leadership.

"Hines Parkway is a natural for bicycle paths," said Pursell, "as it is 27 miles long and it is in an excellent location to serve our people."

He said the paths will be near the road system, "allowing maximum mobility and safety for cyclists."

The immediate plans for 1973 construction now are being mapped by Maki, and Pursell said it has been specified in his Senate amendment that this project will run west from Newburgh

Road. He added that he will seek another \$50,000 appropriation next year to permit installation of similar paths along eastern stretches of Hines Drive.

Hines Dr. Stretch Is Closed

A section of Edward Hines Drive on the Livonia-Plymouth border will be closed until mid-December.

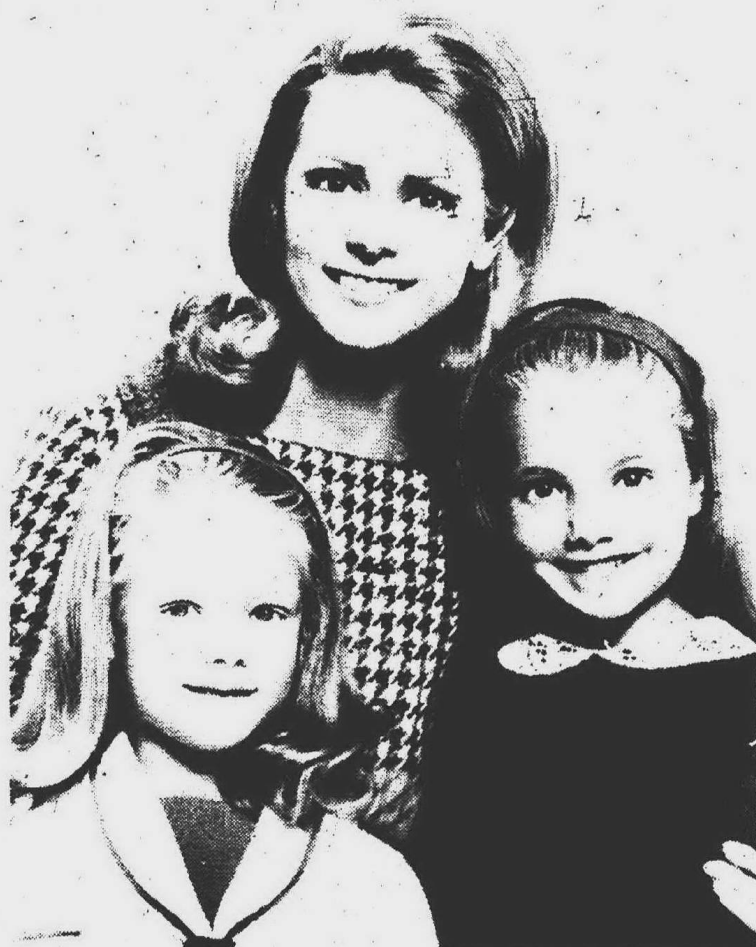
The State Highway Dept. said the stretch between Haggerty and Newburgh Roads will be closed 30 working days during construction of the I-275 freeway.

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Mincemeat Has Many Tasty Uses

Mincemeat was originated back in the days when smoking and drying were the only methods of preserving meat. By cooking the minced meat with spices and fruits there was no danger of spoiling, and ingenious cooks found many uses for the tasty mixture.

Over the years many meatless versions have evolved. A typical mincemeat contains raisins, spices and fruit, usually apples, pears or tomatoes. Sometimes currants, meat, suet, candied fruits, brandy, rum or other liquor are added.

Those little nine-ounce packages of condensed mincemeat are very handy items to have on your pantry shelf. Broken into small pieces and reconstituted according to package directions, they produce a good mincemeat. It can be dressed up according to family tastes with lemon juice, orange juice, brandy, rum or sherry. For those who prefer a less tangy flavor, apple sauce, more currants or raisins will "tone it down."

BAKED PEARS WITH MINCEMEAT

3 firm fresh pears or 6 pear halves (canned variety)
Lemon juice
1 1/3 c. mincemeat
1/2 c. Marsala wine (optional)
Cut fresh pears in half lengthwise, through stem end. With melon baller or teaspoon, remove cores, leaving stems intact. Sprinkle cut surfaces with lemon juice. Place pear halves in 10-inch pie pan or shallow baking dish and fill pears with mincemeat. Spoon any remaining mincemeat around pears. Carefully pour wine over and around pears. Bake in 350-degree oven 45 to 60 minutes, or until pears are tender. (Canned pears do not require more than 30 minutes in the oven). Serve slightly warm with sauce from baking dish.

MINCEMEAT TWIN ROLLS

1 pkg. condensed mincemeat (9 ounces)
1/4 c. orange juice
2 (7-oz.) pkg. crescent rolls (refrigerated type)
2/3 c. sifted confectioners' sugar
2 to 2 1/2 t. orange juice
Glace cherries (optional)

In a small saucepan, break mincemeat into small pieces. Add one-quarter cup orange juice. Place over medium heat; stir until lumps are broken then boil briskly for one minute. Add chopped walnuts; set aside. Open one package of crescent rolls according to package directions. Unroll in a horizontal rectangle. Separate along the perforated lines into three rectangular sections. Form a verticle triangle by taking each section and lining it up with the other sections along the wider sides. Pinch edges together. Repeat with second package of rolls. Spread half the mincemeat evenly on each rectangle. Roll up from the narrow side. Place each roll in a small 8 by 3 1/2 by 2 1/2 - inch loaf pan. Bake in slow, 300-degree oven for about one hour or until crust is golden. Combine confectioners' sugar with enough orange juice for desired spreading consistency. Drizzle over tops of loaves while still warm. If desired, garnish with glace cherries. Serve warm.

MINCE CRUMB COFFEE CAKE

1 1/2 c. sifted flour
2 1/2 t. baking powder
1/2 t. salt
1 egg
3/4 c. sugar
1/3 c. softened margarine
1/2 c. milk
1 t. vanilla extract
1 (9-oz.) pkg. condensed mincemeat, chopped fine
Sift together: flour, baking powder and salt. Beat egg until frothy, then add sugar and margarine. Beat until well blended. Add vanilla and milk. Beat until well blended. Gradually beat in flour; blend well. Fold in chopped mincemeat. Turn into greased 9 by 9 by 2-inch baking pan.

TOPPING: In small bowl, combine half-cup sugar, quarter-cup flour, quarter-cup softened butter or margarine and one teaspoon cinnamon. Mix until crumbly. Sprinkle over batter. Bake in 375-degree oven 30 to 35 minutes or until cake springs back when lightly touched. Good served warm.

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Senior Citizens To S'craft: Day, Neighborhood Classes

Senior citizens would like programs on medical care, social security and legal information offered during the daytime and in their neighborhoods.

These are some of the conclusions drawn from a survey taken of senior citizens by Mrs. Betty Andrews of Plymouth in cooperation with Schoolcraft College and the Institute of Gerontology at the University of Michigan.

And these are some of the results that led Schoolcraft to offer a six-week retirement studies program this fall and to initiate plans for hiring a person to conduct the program beginning in January.

A LACK of programs for senior citizens was apparent to Ron Griffiths, who came to Schoolcraft more than a year ago to direct the community services programs.

So when Mrs. Andrews, a graduate student at the institute, inquired about the college doing something for senior citizens, the wheels began rolling.

Senior citizens from Plymouth, Northville, Livonia, Garden City and Clarenceville were surveyed and the survey was printed in the Aug. 9 edition of the Observer Newspapers to give those who hadn't been surveyed a chance to respond.

One woman, age 68 and recovering from a plastic hip operation, responded to the newspaper article saying "thought I would let you know how wonderful of your young people to want to help the old."

Another responded saying her biggest problem was finding an apartment with reasonable rent for a person living on a fixed income.

"MY TROUBLE is I sold my little home in Redford couldn't find an empty apartment, so I had to move to Livonia and pay \$170 per month which I can't afford."

"As far as legal matters -- every senior citizen needs that because they are charged so much."

"As far as school is concerned, I don't think many

would be interested -- they like enjoyment, playing cards and games or just getting together for coffee," she added.

Another respondent offered his services for the program to put his talents to work for his peers.

A total of 420 persons filled out the survey, answering questions on their needs and interests.

RESULTS SHOW that 36 per cent wanted information on medical care and services, 33 per cent on social security benefits, 32.7 per cent on making the most of retirement income and 31.8 per cent on legal information on wills and estate planning.

Other results include 31 per cent wanted information on good health during retirement -- nutrition, fitness and personal hygiene; 27.8 per cent on uses of leisure time; 27 per cent on how to buy more economically, 25.5 per cent on selecting a nursing home; 24 percent on different living arrangements for retirement years; 19 per cent on family and friend relationships after retirement; 15 per cent on employment opportunities and rights for retired persons; 14.8 per cent on meal planning and preparation for the small family; and 13.8 per cent on training for volunteer opportunities.

MANY INDICATED an interest in the cultural events that take place at the college, including 22 per cent for the film series and musical concerts.

Nearly 20 per cent said they were interested in short courses in bridge and other card games, 19 per cent in knitting, 18 per cent in square dancing, 15 per cent on floral arranging and jewelry making and 11 per cent on investments after retirement.

Fifty per cent of the older persons said they preferred daytime programs while only 10 per cent preferred evening programs.

Asked, whether they preferred programs in their neighborhood or at the college, 58 per cent said they

preferred them in their neighborhood.

Griffiths said that the program offered this fall is a "meager effort" to meet some of the needs pointed out in the survey.

A SIX-WEEK program began Monday in Northville and today (Wednesday) in McNamara Tower No. 2 in Livonia.

The program will emphasize social security, and medicare, financial planning, health, legal affairs and opportunities for retirement living.

Participants will help evaluate the program, and the information will be used in planning future programs, Griffiths said.

Schoolcraft is a pioneer in retirement studies at community colleges in Michigan, he said.

"To my knowledge no other community college in the state has a person who is devoting his energy to retirement studies as a special program for older citizens," he said.

Schoolcraft's efforts will be enhanced by an allocation from a state grant to the college. The exact amount that will be pumped into a retirement program is still uncertain.

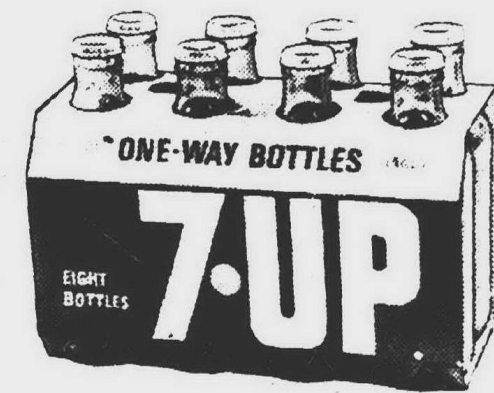
EVENTUALLY THE college hopes to reach persons from 55 years on up for a "pre-retirement" program, he said. One area that Schoolcraft

hasn't touched on is the transportation problems of many senior citizens, he said. The survey indicates that 26 per cent need transportation to programs at Schoolcraft and 18 per cent would even need transportation to neighborhood programs.

"This is a real critical problem," Griffiths said.

Griffiths pointed out that more than 9,000 persons over age 65 live in the Schoolcraft area. More than 10 per cent of the City of Northville's population are senior citizens with 8.8 per cent of Plymouth's population, 6.8 per cent of Northville Township, 4.4 per cent of Livonia, 3.8 per cent of Plymouth Township and three per cent of Garden City's population is over 65.
