McLaren, Man With A Mission

When John D. McLaren, a life-long resident of the community, assumes his duties Nov. 20 as the new supervisor in Plymouth Township, he will be a man with a mission.

Only a few hours after the votes had been counted and his victory over Joseph Krochmalny, his Democratic opponent, was assured, he confided to friends that his main duty, as he saw it, was to guard the future development of the township.

"This always has been a nice place in which to live," he said, "and it will be my job to help keep it that way."

While he didn't lay out any specifics, the veteran

businessman who will succeed Maurice Breen listed the priorities of the new administration.

"First," he said, "would be zoning. We will have to be careful that the population explosion doesn't get out of hand and we wind up with a density problem."

NEXT HE LISTED adequate police protection in an attempt to overcome the criticism that has marked the past administrations.

"And third would be better communications—not only within the various governmental departments, but with the people in general.

"I have dealt with people all of my life, and I am looking forward to meeting a lot of them in my new job."

However, he admitted that guarding the growth of the community was his main concern.

"I am not against good, solid developers," he confided, "but I am opposed to the syndicates—the fellows who come in, buy a large piece of ground, have it rezoned and then sell it. Before you know it, you have large plots with nothing but 60-foot lots and a problem of density."

"This always has been a nice place in which to live," he repeated, "and having such things happen would soon change that. So that's why the growth must be guarded."

For a moment he turned from his duties at Township Hall and confided that the McLaren Co., which has been doing business at the railroad

tracks and Main Street, soon would pass from the picture. "I am the third generation to handle the business since it was started back in 1900," he said, "and no one in the family—after me—wants to run it. So it is up for sale."

"It would require a lot of money to modernize the place and make a cash and carry business out of it, now that coal no longer is a much needed commodity. I don't intend to invest in it any more because the competition is too keen."

HE ADMITTED that he told his employees of his intention, and that with the business ties loosened a bit he will be able to spend more time at the supervisor's desk.

Admittedly, he is a con-

servative and the one thing certain is that he will attempt to run a conservative government. This was assured with his remark about guarding the growth of the community.

"I don't think," he said, "it would be wise to run water and sewer out N. Territorial Road to Ridge Road, to lure developers. I think it much wiser to wait for a sound development and then—when the risk is gone—to provide the services."

He hasn't decided on a plan for better police protection—at least he didn't announce it—but he admitted it was one of the top priorities.

With his ideas as he takes over the new duties as supervisor, the administration should be interesting.

GOP Trend Continues

Republican domination of Plymouth area voting was evident in Tuesday's election in all except three partisan contests.

The exceptions were the Wayne County races for sheriff, prosecuting attorney and clerk.

President Nixon was the biggest vote-getter of all, both in the city and township. But despite the overall GOP trend, voters in both these areas also gave solid support to William Lucas, a black Democrat, in his successful bid for reelection as sheriff.

IT IS THE second successive election in which Lucas has carried both the

city and township. He led his party here by polling 2,592 votes in the city and 4,540 in the township.

Although Lucas was the only Democrat to whom city voters gave a majority, Democrats William Cahalan and Joseph Sullivan had majorities in the township in their races for county prosecutor and clerk respectively.

Plymouthites contributed significantly to the victories of Republicans Robert Griffin, Marvin Esch, Raymond Smit and Brian Arrowsmith in the races for U.S. senator, U.S. representative, state representative and county commissioner and followed the statewide trend in relation to all special proposals on the ballot.

The election brought out 7,551 voters in the township (85.75 per cent of those registered) and 4,790 in the city (73.6 per cent of the number eligible). Together, the participation totaled 12,341—representing 80.6 per cent.

BAD WEATHER WAS blamed for the less-than-expected turnout in the city, while in the township it was obvious that the contests for township offices help boost the response.

Although Republicans retained their traditional control of all township posts, it was no walkaway.

In the contest for the key job of supervisor, Republican John R. McLaren beat Democratic newcomer John Krochmalny only 3,790 to 3,332, the smallest margin of any of the victors.

Significant in this demonstration of newborn Democratic strength was the fact that Krochmalny actually carried three of the nine

precincts. These were Nos. 4, 5 and 9, all on the east side.

TOWNSHIP VOTERS, in a special referendum on a zoning issue, also overturned a decision made last spring by the board of trustees.

At stake was the question of whether a specific parcel of property at Bradner and Schoolcraft Rds. in Lake Pointe should retain the

transitional office zoning classification which the board had approved, or be returned to single family residential zoning.

The vote was 4,302 to 2,219 against permitting the transitional office designation to stand.

A chart showing city and township totals on key contests appears elsewhere in this edition.

Editorial Shifts Announced

W. Edward Wendover, who grew up and was educated in Plymouth, has been appointed editor of the Plymouth Mail & Observer.

He replaces Fred DeLano, who has been promoted to assistant news editor of Observer Newspapers, the parent group of the Mail & Observer.

Announcement of the appointments was made by Observer Publisher Philip H. Power.

Wendover, who previously has served as editor of the Redford Observer, is a graduate of Plymouth High School. He received his degree in journalism from Michigan State University, where he was a member of the Michigan State News advisory board. He won second place in the 1970 Detroit Press Club student competition and served as a summer intern at the Plymouth Mail & Observer.

AFTER GRADUATION, Wendover joined the Ingham County News for a year, and then accepted a position with the Hartford (Conn.) Courant, a major daily newspaper in the state. He joined Observer

Newspapers in 1971, and was appointed editor of the Redford Observer in April 1972. DeLano was appointed editor of The Mail & Observer in 1968. During his tenure, the Mail & Observer developed its local news and photo coverage and won several state and national professional awards for excellence.

DeLano's personal column, "Plymouth Through Bifocals,"

which will be continued in his present assignment—was judged one of the best in the state by the Michigan Press Association.

DeLano, 56, has been involved in journalism from coast to coast since graduating from the University of Michigan in 1937. He has worked for many newspapers, including the Chicago Tribune, and devoted years to the field of public relations—mostly in the area of sports promotion.

He is a former general manager of the Detroit Pistons Basketball Club and a past president of the Southern California Football Writers Association, a post he held while he was daily sports columnist for the Long Beach, Calif., Press-Telegram.

DeLano and his wife, Olga, and their two children, live in Plymouth at 272 Pacific.

IN COMMENTING on the appointments, Power observed:

"For Ed Wendover to come back to his home town to edit the local paper is a real satisfaction for us all. It's a case of a local boy making it good, and with Ed it has

happened to a person of outstanding journalistic competence. I'm sure he will continue the long and distinguished tradition of the Mail & Observer."

"Bringing Fred DeLano inside to our central copy desk will give his remarkable editing and writing talents greater scope than previously possible. Plymouth readers won't be denied his column, since he will be continuing to write about the community from his new post."

"All in all, these staff changes have strengthened our editorial staff significantly," Power concluded.

She Throws Her Voice To Achieve Ambition

PLYMOUTH Many little girls like to daydream about standing before the footlights, beautifully costumed, listening to ringing applause. Few ever live that dream, but one Plymouth high school girl has done it.

Joeline Platt, 16, has been appearing on the professional stage since she was five years old. For the past seven years she has worked as a professional ventriloquist.

Joeline came by her interest in the theater naturally. Her father was a make-up artist and her mother a costume seamstress. Her

brother, Fred, 23, is a musician, and another brother, Norman, 18, an artist. She also has a newlywed sister, April, 21.

JOELENE'S FIRST appearances were with the Children's Theater in Detroit. She spent three years with "International Touring Co.," a children's repertoire group. She acted and sang with the Wayne Civic Players.

Seven years ago her interest turned to ventriloquism and she designed her first full-sized puppet, Andree, a French boy.

She now works with Rusty Nails, a boy puppet supposedly aged about eight years and of a dominating and

flirtatious personality. Joeline also designed Rusty Nails, who has hand-made by famed puppeteer Jack Coats. In between Andree and Rusty Nails have been Darlene, an English girl puppet named after Joeline's mother, and Almer, an All-American boy type whom Joeline describes as "a nut."

The Platt family moved from Taylor to their home at 1142 Byron in Plymouth in the summer of 1971, primarily because the high school modular scheduling program here allowed Joeline to arrange her time to fit in auditions and performances. She revels in the drama and art classes at Plymouth Canton, where she is a junior, and has joined the school chorus.

IN HER PROFESSIONAL career, Joeline has made live appearances on U.S. and Canadian television, and at the Roostertail, Cobo Hall, Ford and Cleary auditoriums and Roma Hall and has filled numerous special engagements. She also enjoys staging benefit performances at nursing homes, orphanages and before school classes.

She taught drama to elementary school pupils in Taylor for two years and co-directed summer drama lessons at Plymouth Central School.

Canton Voters Hold To GOP Tradition

CANTON TOWNSHIP Canton kept to tradition by going with the winners again in last Tuesday's presidential election.

But township officials are the first to agree that it's a voting pattern that could drive political analysts up the wall because of its unpredictability.

Tuesday's election held a special significance for township political pundits who are trying to figure out which side of the political ledger to put the burgeoning township where voter registration has doubled in the last four years. And that's only the beginning.

THIS TIME it would appear that the voters leaned substantially toward the GOP, but don't count on it too heavily, warned Township Clerk John Flodin.

Historically, Cantonites have been ticket splitters with a penchant for picking the winners.

Never was this more evident than in Tuesday's election, Flodin pointed out.

Even the township's newcomers fell into the established pattern, whether they realized it or not.

Flodin's figures show that the township supported the Nixon-Agnew ticket almost 2 to 1 (3,418 to 1,679), but began shifting slightly in the Griffin-Kelley race. Griffin outpolled his Democratic opponent by only an 800-vote margin. Griffin got 2,864 to Kelley's even 2,000.

EQUALLY AS interesting was the race for two trustee posts — the only local feature on the Canton ballot.

Republican James Poole, an insurance and real estate man who is a relative newcomer to the township, surprised everyone by leading the ticket with 2,452. Winning the second board seat was Democrat incumbent Robert Griffin who received 2,365 votes. Losing out by a scant 135 votes was 19-year-old Conrad Dennis, a Democrat and member of one of Canton's oldest families. Dennis led the ticket in the primary.

Poole lives in Carriage Hills, one of the township's largest planned unit developments. He is a member of Canton's recreation advisory committee and an outspoken critic of the township's guidelines for establishing private parks controlled by homeowner associations within the subdivisions. One of his campaign promises was to seek a part-time recreation director.

IRONICALLY, it was Griffin who helped defeat a recent board resolution to hire a part-time director when the matter came up for a vote before the board two months ago.

In the U.S. representative race, it was back to the Democrats as Cantonites favored William Ford over his GOP opponent, Ernest Fackler. A similar pattern held true in the state representative race with Democrat Thomas Brown defeating Jack Underwood.

Canton, like the rest of Michigan, gave its nod to the daylight savings time proposal and turned down all the others.

LIKE ELSEWHERE in the state, voting lines were long with some precincts still vot-

ing as late as 9:30 p.m., Flodin said.

The long lines have prompted him to make plans to split two of the township's biggest precincts this spring, Flodin said. That's the only time of the year the precinct splitting is allowed under township law, he explained.

How did residents in Canton's new subdivisions vote, and what kind of an impact will they have on future Canton elections?

Flodin can't say for sure, but one thing he does know. They were out in full force. For instance, he said, in Precinct 4, located in the new Miller Elementary School area, 91 per cent — or 956 — of the 1,045 registered voters marked ballots.

No one is disputing the fact that what it all adds up to is a lively political future for once rural Canton that is becoming more cityfied as time goes on.

CANTON TOWNSHIP A planned unit development, titled Stonegate, to be constructed on the north side of Palmer Rd. on either side of Lilley Rd., has been referred to the Canton Township board for approval by the township planning commission.

The development, a mixture of single family homes, multiples and park area, also has received the approval of the Wayne County Planning Commission as well as the Canton commission.

Also recommended for approval was the development slated for the north side of Warren, east of Canton Center Rd.

Receiving tentative approval of preliminary plat

plans were developers of Cavalier Village, to be built at the northeast corner of Sheldon and Cherry Hill Rds.

The development will consist of 248 single family homes, two multiple buildings, a park and a small commercial site.

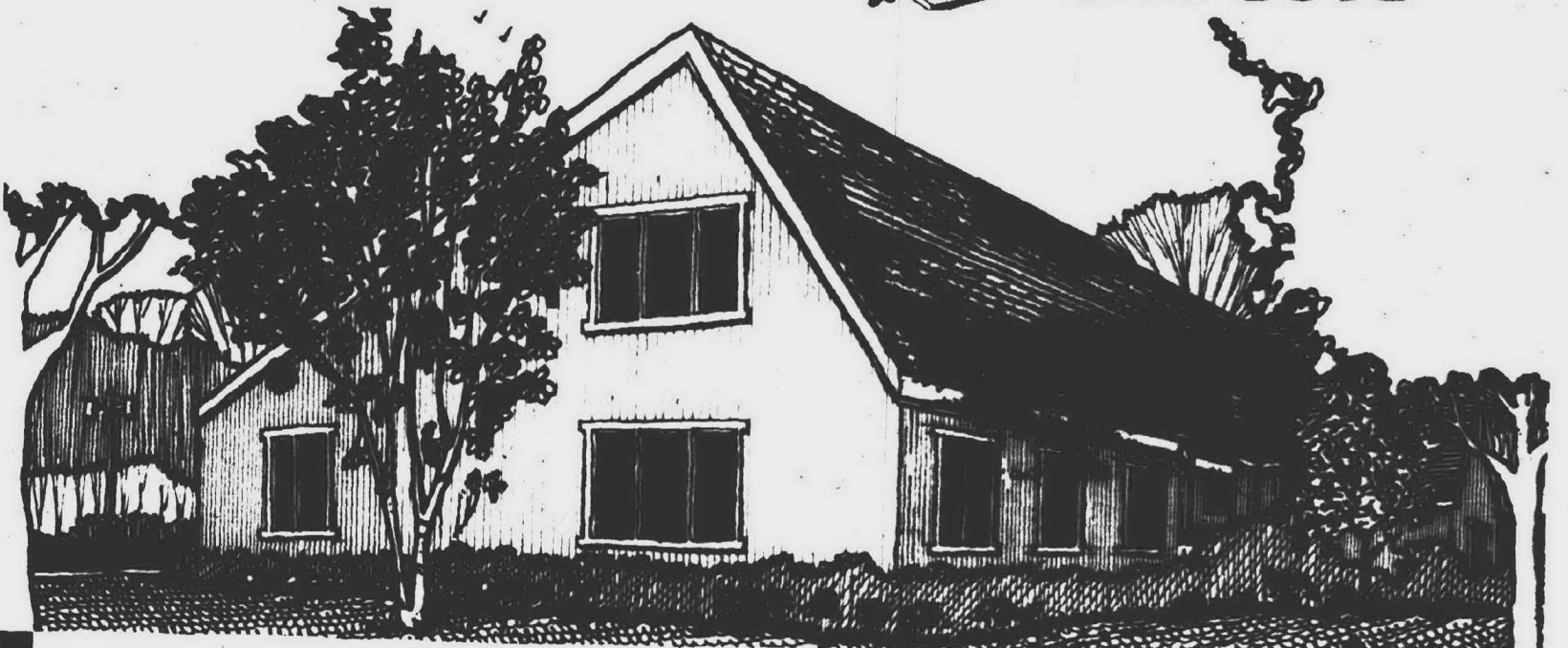

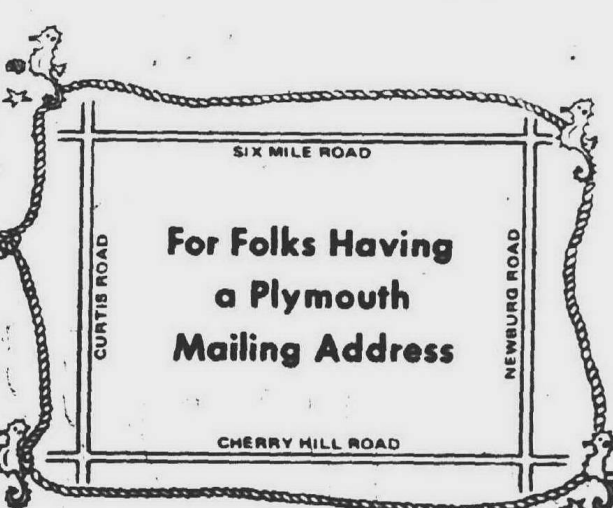

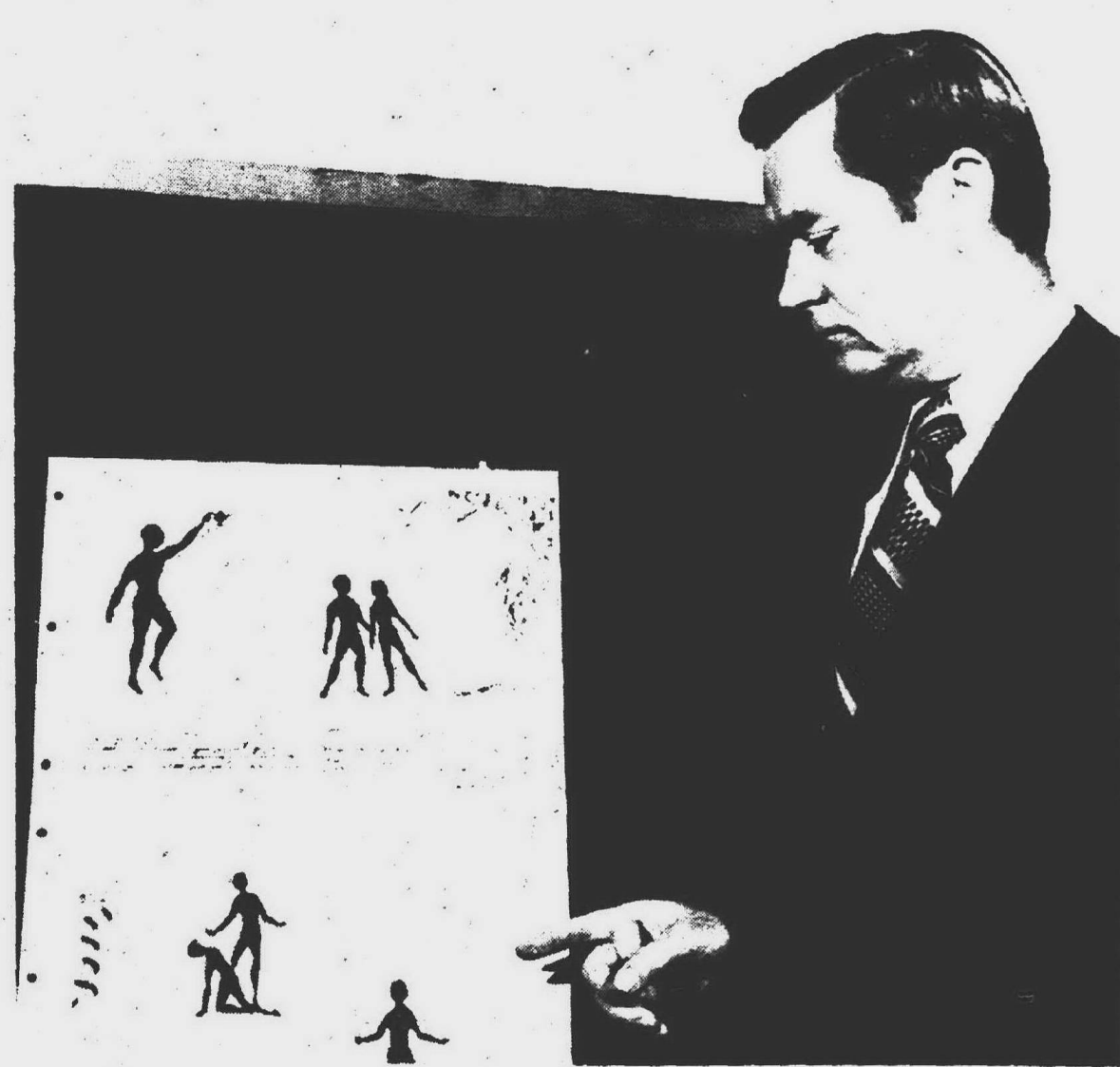

Working through contacts made in the school, mission team members visited homes, first in 1969 and then in a 1971 followup campaign.

"We had to be invited, according to the customs of that land," he said, "but many invitations came through students at the school."

"We visited homes, conducting Bible study, and led gospel meetings at night. Thirty-seven were baptized in the first visit, and when we returned two years later we found 32 of them still faithful and this time converted 68 more people."

Rev. Brown plans to renew some old acquaintances and make a visit to the high school during his Christmas-visit to the area.

Rev. Lester Kinsolving's Religion Update

The Wall Street Journal's recent report of an estimated 40,000 clergy who are preaching \$1 million worth of sermons purchased from a dozen firms is about as morally edifying as the purchase of term papers from similar firms by lazy and dishonest college students.

Among proprietors of this homiletical prostitution, the Journal identifies Father Lawrence Brett of Baltimore, as well as former sportscaster Red Barber, an Episcopal layman who explains piously: "God is the greatest manager of us all."

Also among these procurers for pulpit plagiarism is one James Colaianni, who is quoted as explaining: "Keeping the sermons non-controversial broadens their appeal." (There was, nearly a decade ago, a James Colaianni who was a crusading editor of Ramparts Magazine. But that was before this periodical abandoned its Catholic identification in favor of that far-left literary wonderland which is as sweetly undisturbed by scruple as is Colaianni the sermon-peddler.)

ANY CONGREGATION which discovers its pastor engaged in this sort of preaching - by purchase has every reasonable right to ask: (1) Was his seminary training comprised of theology - or was it limited to instruction in reading? (2) Why can't the parish save on its budget by eliminating the minister's salary in favor of mailing mimeographed copies of his sermon - service to the parishioners at home - while

replacing his pastoral counseling with special subscriptions to either Dear Abby or Ann Landers?

Imitation may be the sincerest form of flattery, but rarely can the pulpit plagiarist approximate even the most modest efforts of a genuine preacher. And while the use of an occasional illustration from another sermon or sermons is perfectly legitimate, the lifting or purchase of an entire sermon by whatever financial arrangement is conduct unbecoming the ministry.

Yet the Journal quotes the Rev. Charles Hund of St. Bartholemew's Catholic Church in Chicago as making the following admission:

"Frankly, I don't have the time or the training to produce a quality sermon each week. I don't think I'm shortchanging my congregation if I find something suitable from an outside source."

FATHER HUND might be even more "practical" were he to emulate a long deceased (1895) West Point chaplain named Postlewaite who doubled as a member of the faculty.

Chaplain Postlewaite prepared 12 sermons, which, after he had preached them once, he repeated in an undeviating 12-week cycle as long as he was chaplain.

He did leave a lasting effect, however - from one of these sermons which every cadet heard 17 times before graduating. Its text was: "Felix trembled." (Acts of the Apostles 24:25). And for

generations at the U.S. Military Academy, a similarly recurrent jellied dessert served in the mess hall was known to all cadets as "Felix trembled."

Some clergy practice lifting sermons without either permission or acknowledgement. This can be risky - as in the case of a young minister in Maine who boldly lifted one of the classic sermons of Harry Emerson Fosdick in its entirety.

The last person to greet this preacher at the door of his church that Sunday was an elderly man who expressed interest in the sermon and pleasantly inquired as to how long it had taken the preacher to prepare.

"Oh, it took me about three hours," replied the youthful parson, loftily.

"Young man, that sermon took me 21 hours to prepare!" shouted the summer visitor, in what became immediately apparent as a full pulpit voice, frequently broadcast over radio.

"Well, Dr. Fosdick," replied the parson with all the aplomb of a charming rogue, "You keep writing 'em and I'll keep preaching 'em."

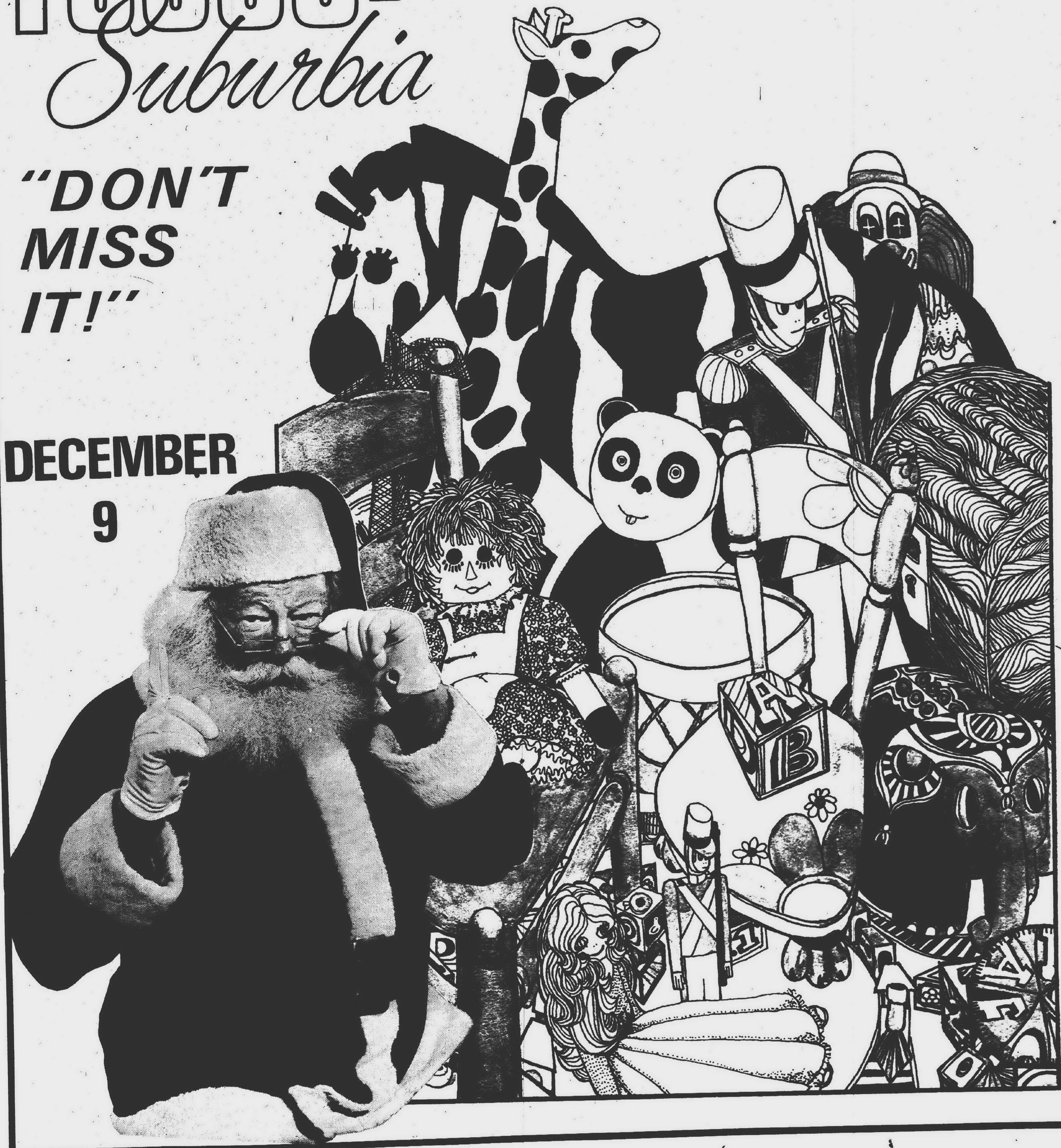

This is the week that most of us who were lucky enough to be around at the time will be recalling one of the most glorious and emotional days in American history.

It will be the 54th anniversary of Armistice Day on Saturday, Nov. 11 and never mind the fact that the government decreed that Oct. 23 was the day on which the official celebration takes place.

To the veterans of World War I -- and those of us who backed them up in the defense plants of the country -- nothing ever will replace the magnetism of the combination -- 11 minutes after the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month.

That was the moment when the armistice was signed to end World War I and set off one of the greatest demonstrations this country ever has known.

A general session will start activities off at 7 p.m. in the Salem auditorium. Wednesday night the Centennial Park Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Michael Endres, will play several selections.

Avenue in New York City to the tiniest hamlet in America, there was shouting and singing, dancing in the streets and all sorts of impromptu parades and marching bands.

It was bedlam from coast to coast -- for the boys were coming home after several years of chanting the famous Irving Berlin tune, "We won't be back till it's over over there."

No sir, no government edict ever could change that day, and so long as any of the characters of that time survive, Nov. 11 will be a day of fond memories and recollections of a day the like of which the country knew before or since.

And when Saturday rolls around, no matter where he is, or what he is doing, The Stroller will be recalling the events of the famous day back in the old home town at the foothills in the heart of the Pennsylvania Dutch Country. Just as there is today, there

had been rumors that peace was on the way. Then, on a Thursday came a report that the war had ended and the country started to "go wild." Even when the report was denied, there was a feeling that the end was near -- that peace could come at any moment.

FOR TWO DAYS nothing happened. Then, on Sunday evening, the little, old, white-haired pastor of the Presbyterian Church on the hill stepped to the front of the pulpit at the close of his sermon and alerted all those within hearing distance that he expected the word to come during the night.

"And when it does," he said very solemnly, "I'll be up in the belfry helping to toll the bell. We Presbyterians want to be the first to sound the good news."

Very few of the worshippers

slept that night. They lay, waiting.

Then, along about 2 a.m., there came the sound of the bell... the war was over... the time had come to offer thanks... and celebrate.

It seems like only yesterday that The Stroller's mother raced into his bedroom and, excitedly, said:

"Run down to the school house and help old Mr. Lindeman ring the bell... we've got to let everybody know."

SO, OFF TO the schoolhouse, he went and sure enough there was kindly old Mr. Lindeman struggling with the ropes. It wasn't long before he had all the help he needed.

Down below you could hear the blaring the impromptu bands and the most amazing line of marchers you ever had seen. There were old men, old

women, mothers with babes in arms, mothers who had left their weekly wash tubs to join in the fun.

Up one street and down another, picking up marchers along the way until the line reached the volunteer fire company. Then out came all of the equipment -- the first engine, hose carts, and what not -- to make of the parade one that will live forever in memory.

If you can recall how Detroit went wild in 1918 when the Tigers won their first pennant in 23 years, just duplicate that in every city, town and hamlet in the country and you will have some idea of what it was like through the United States on Nov. 11, 1918.

No government edict ever

can take away the magic of that day and no matter when the later generations decide to celebrate what is now called Veterans Day, Nov. 11 always will be a hallowed occasion.

ONE WOULDN'T dare try to change Pearl Harbor Day from Dec. 7 just to give the working men a longer weekend.

That's why, on Saturday, The Stroller will pay a visit to the cemetery and place a few flowers on the graves of the veterans of World War I.

It will be his way of paying tribute and recalling that glorious and emotional day back home in the Dutch Country -- 11 minutes after the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month -- Nov. 11, 1918.

CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDINANCE NO. 386

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 8 OF ORDINANCE NO. 201, AS AMENDED, OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ENTITLED: "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ACQUISITION AND CONSTRUCTION OF SANITARY SEWERS FOR THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH, TOGETHER WITH NECESSARY APPURTENANCES AND ATTACHMENTS THERETO; TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SELF-LIQUIDATING REVENUE BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE COST THEREOF UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF ACT 94, PUBLIC ACTS OF MICHIGAN, 1933, AS AMENDED; PROVIDING FOR THE FIXING, COLLECTION, SEGREGATION AND DISPOSITION OF THE REVENUES OF SAID SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM OF THE CITY AND PAYMENT OF SAID BONDS OUT OF THE REVENUES THEREOF; AND CREATING A STATUTORY LIEN ON SAID REVENUES."

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. Section 8 of Ordinance No. 201 of the City of Plymouth, as amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 8. The rates to be charged for sewer service furnished by the System until July 1, 1956, shall be those in effect at the date of this Ordinance, and commencing July 1, 1956, and until otherwise provided, shall be at the rates and shall be collected as follows:

SEWER RATES

A. RESIDENTIAL CONNECTION CHARGES

1. For all new houses or residential dwellings constructed or completed subsequent to the date of the adoption of this Ordinance, connecting directly to the sewers to be constructed from the proceeds of sale of the bonds herein authorized, the sum of \$400 shall be paid as a connection charge or charge. Such charge shall be paid in full at the time a permit is requested for a connection to the Sewage Disposal System.

2. For all houses or residential dwellings heretofore constructed or completed and occupied, connecting directly to the sewers to be constructed from the proceeds of sale of the bonds herein authorized, the following shall be paid as a connection charge or charge: (a) The sum of \$400 in cash prior to a permit being issued for any connection, or (b) at the option of the applicant, in lieu of such cash payment, such connection charge or charge may be paid at the rate of \$4.50 per quarter period until a total of \$488 has been paid, said sums to be billed quarterly (each three months) at the same time as the consumption rates hereinafter set forth are billed, as a separate item in said bill.

3. For all houses or residential dwellings heretofore or hereafter constructed and completed, connecting directly to lateral sewers constructed by developers or constructed from the proceeds of special assessments on the property benefited but which use of or are served by sewers constructed from the proceeds of sale of the bonds authorized herein as an outlet, the sum of \$200 shall be paid as a connection charge or rate. Such charge shall be paid in full at the time a permit is requested for a connection to the System.

All connections to the System shall be made by and at the expense of the property owner or user so connecting, subject to any rules or regulations therefor now or hereafter established by the City; and subject to inspection and approval prior to use. Permit for such connection shall be obtained in advance from the City, and the property owner or user making such connection shall pay all inspection charges now or hereafter established by the City prior to the use thereof.

CONNECTION CHARGES

All commercial, industrial, school, multiple family residential, and church users hereafter connecting, directly or indirectly, to sewers of the System constructed from the proceeds of sale of the bonds herein authorized shall pay a connecting charge or rate as follows:

(a) Commercial and multiple family residential (3 units or more) connections: \$1 per front or side yard footage parallel to the sanitary sewer main, serving the property per year, payable in quarterly installments

- (b) Industrial and school connections: \$100 per acre per year, payable in quarterly (each three months) installments, for a period of ten (10) years.
- (c) The connection charge for churches, not dedicated as a church day school or a seat of learning, shall be \$1,000.

C. DEBT SERVICE CHARGES

Such charges shall be levied in addition to the connection charge set forth above, on each lot or parcel of land, building or premises now or hereafter having any connection with the System, on the basis of quantity of water used herein or thereon, as the same is measured by the water meter installed therein, and shall apply to users connecting directly to the sewers of the System constructed from the proceeds of sale of the bonds herein authorized and for users who make use of said sewers as an outlet.

Such debt service charge shall be 10 cents per 1,000 gallons.

D. SEWAGE CONSUMPTION CHARGE

Such charges shall be levied in addition to the connection charge and debt service charge set forth above, on each lot or parcel of land, building or premises now or hereafter having any connection with the System, on the basis of the quantity of water used therein or thereon, as the same is measured by the water meter installed therein.

Schedule of Sewage Consumption Charges:

Minimum quarterly charge (18,000 gallons of water) - \$3.96

Balance of water consumed - 22 cents per 1,000 gallons

BILLING

Bills for the connection rates and charges (where payable in installments), debt service charge and consumption charge, shall be made as separate items on the water bills for those premises served by the System who have connections to the water system of the City of Plymouth, and separate bills for such rates and charges, or those applicable, shall be prepared for premises having no connection to the water system. For those premises not having a water meter to measure the quantity of water used, a special debt service rate and consumption charge may be established by the City. (Said bills shall be rendered quarterly (each three months) during each operating or fiscal year and shall represent charges for the quarterly (three months) period preceding the date of rendering the bill. Said bills shall become due and payable within the (10) days from the date thereof.

MUNICIPAL CHARGE

For the benefit derived by the City-at-large, the City shall pay a charge of \$14,000 per year, which charge shall be payable in quarterly installments, in advance from the current funds of the City, or from the proceeds of taxes which the City, with constitutional and statutory limits, is hereby authorized and required to levy in an amount sufficient for that purpose.

SPECIAL RATES

For miscellaneous services for which a special rate shall be established, such rates shall be fixed by the City Commission. Where a user uses a large amount of water which is not discharged into the sanitary sewer system, a special rate for sewer service of such user may be established.

ENFORCEMENT

Charges for sewer services shall constitute a lien on the property served and if not paid within six (6) months, shall be placed on the next general tax roll and collected as a part of the general City taxes.

The City shall have the right to shut off and discontinue the supply of water to any premises for the non-payment of sewer rates when due. A fee of Five Dollars (\$5.00) shall be paid to the City prior to turning on the water to such premises.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance shall become operative and effective on the 28th day of November, 1972, A.D.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION NORTHVILLE TOWNSHIP BUILDING AUTHORITY

ARTICLE I.
The name of the corporation is Northville Township Building Authority.

The purposes for which the corporation is formed are as follows: acquiring, furnishing, equipping, improving, enlarging, operating, and maintaining a building or buildings, automobile parking lots or structures, recreational facilities, stadiums, and the necessary site or sites therefor, together with appurtenant properties and facilities necessary or convenient for the effective use thereof, for use for any legitimate public purpose of the Township of Northville, Wayne County, Michigan, and for any purposes now or hereafter provided by statute pursuant to Act No. 31 of the Public Acts of 1948, as amended, being Sections 123 951 through 123 965, inclusive, C.L. 1948.

ARTICLE III.
The name of the governmental unit incorporating the Northville Township Building Authority pursuant to Act No. 31 of the Public Acts of 1948, as amended, being Sections 123 951 through 123 965, inclusive, C.L. 1948, is the Township of Northville, situated in Wayne County, Michigan.

ARTICLE IV.
The Northville Township Building Authority shall be directed and governed by a Board of Commissioners, which shall be known as the Northville Township Building Authority Commission, of three members, who shall be nominated by the Northville Township Supervisor and elected by the Northville Township Board of Trustees and shall serve for six-year terms. Said Northville Township Building Authority Commission shall designate one of their number as chairman and one as secretary, and shall adopt bylaws and rules of procedure and provide therein for regular meetings. If within 60 days of the occurrence of the vacancy of a member(s) of said Northville Township Building Authority Commission due to death, resignation, removal, incapacity or expiration of term, a successor for said vacant term has not been nominated and elected as hereinbefore provided, the remaining member(s) of the Northville Township Building Authority may select an elector of the Township of Northville to serve the vacated and unexpired term(s).

Members of the Northville Township Building Authority Commission may be paid such compensation and such per diem and mileage for attending meetings as may be provided by the Northville Township Building Authority Commission with the approval of the Northville Township Board of Trustees. No member of the Northville Township Board of Trustees shall be eligible for membership or appointment to the Northville Township Building Authority. Any member may be removed for malfeasance, misfeasance or nonfeasance by the Northville Township Board of Trustees, provided such member is removed by a two-thirds vote after a hearing by said Board of Trustees. The time and place of which having been duly noticed a reasonable time in advance to such member along with a reasonably detailed statement of the charges preferred against such member and at which hearing such member shall have had the right to be represented by legal counsel, to cross-examine witnesses against her or she and to call witnesses in his or her behalf.

ARTICLE V.
The Northville Township Building Authority shall be a body corporate with power to sue or be sued in any court of the State of Michigan. The Northville Township Building Authority shall have all the powers necessary to carry out the purposes of its incorporation and those incident thereto. The Northville Township Building Authority shall have the power to enter into a contract or contracts whereby the Northville Township Building Authority will acquire property contemplated by its purposes as hereinbefore provided and lease the same to the Township of Northville for a period not to exceed 50 years. The Northville Township Building Authority for its purposes may issue, pay and retire bonds pursuant to the provisions of Act No. 31 of the Public Acts of 1948, as amended, being Sections 123 951 through 123 965, inclusive, C.L. 1948.

The consideration specified in such contract for such use shall be subject to increase by the authority if necessary in order to provide funds to meet its obligations. Any rental obligation or consideration applicable to the Township of Northville under such contract shall not be considered as indebtedness of the Township of Northville within the meaning of any statutory or chartered debt limitation of said Township of Northville. With the consent of the Northville Township Building Authority as contained in the contract or otherwise secured, the Township of Northville to which the property is leased, may sublease the property or any part thereof to any 1 or more persons, firms or corporations, where the sublease or contract benefits and serves a legitimate public purpose of the sublessee. Any sublease or contract may extend for a period not to exceed 50 years and is not a franchise or grant within the meaning of any statutory or charter provision.

The acquisition of any stadium with appurtenant properties and facilities by the Northville Township Building Authority and the contracting for the lease thereof by the Township of Northville, for the purpose of providing facilities for sports, recreational and other activities and events, with or without admission charges, and furnishing facilities for use or enjoyment by the public and to induce sports and entertainment organizations, whether amateur or professional, to utilize the facilities for games, contests and other performances and attractions, and thus to increase business activity and employment, constitutes a benefit to and a legitimate public purpose of the Northville Township Building Authority and the Township of Northville.

Where any stadium with appurtenant properties and facilities is acquired by the Northville Township Building Authority and leased to the Township of Northville, the subleasing thereof to, or the contracting for the use thereof by, any sports, entertainment or similar organization or any owner of a franchise in any professional sports or athletic league or association, in consideration of the agreement of the organization or owner and, if necessary, the league or association to hold, conduct or produce games, contests and other performances and attractions in such stadium, with or without admission charges, constitutes a benefit to and a legitimate public purpose of the Township of Northville.

The Northville Township Building Authority for the purpose of accomplishing the objects of its incorporation may acquire property by purchase, construction, lease, gift, devise or condemnation, and for the purpose of

condemnation, the Northville Township Building Authority may proceed under the provisions of Act No. 149 of the Public Acts of 1911, as amended, being Sections 213 21 to 213 41 of C.L. 1948, or any other appropriate statute. The enumeration of any powers provided herein shall not be construed as a limitation upon any general powers delegated to or vested in the Northville Township Building Authority pursuant to Act No. 31 of the Public Acts of 1948, as amended, or any other statute of the State of Michigan pertaining to the Northville Township Building Authority as herein created, empowered and established, provided, however, that the Northville Township Building Authority shall not contract for or incur obligations of any nature as a result of acquiring, furnishing, equipping, owning, improving, enlarging, operating or maintaining a building or buildings, automobile parking lots or structures, recreational facilities, stadiums, and the necessary site or sites therefor, together with appurtenant properties and facilities necessary or convenient for the effective use thereof, without first obtaining the express written approval of the Northville Township Board of Trustees that such contract or the incurring of such obligation is for a legitimate public purpose of the Northville Township Building Authority and the Township of Northville, Wayne County, Michigan.

ARTICLE VI.
The Northville Township Building Authority shall hold all public meetings at specified times and places, of which public notice shall be given. Public notice of the schedule of regular meetings shall be given once for each calendar or fiscal year, and shall show the regular dates and times for meetings and the place at which meetings are held. Public notice of each special meeting and of each re-scheduled regular or special meeting shall be given of the date, time and place of each meeting.

Public notice shall be given by listing a copy of the notice prominently at the principal office of the Northville Township Building Authority or at the public building in which the meeting is to be held, or by publishing the notice once in a newspaper of general circulation in the Township of Northville, at least three days prior to the time of the first regularly scheduled meeting in the case of regular meetings, and at least 12 hours prior to the time of the meeting in the case of special or re-scheduled meetings. The Northville Township Building Authority shall supply, on request, copies of the public notice thereof to any newspaper of general circulation in the Township of Northville and to any radio station which regularly broadcasts into the Township of Northville.

All regular, special or re-scheduled meetings shall be held in the Township of Northville or in the City of Northville. "Public meeting" shall mean that part of any meeting of the Northville Township Building Authority during which it votes upon any resolution, recommendation, or other official action proposed by or to the Northville Township Building Authority dealing with the receipt, borrowing or disbursement of funds or the acquisition, use or disposal of services or of any supplies, materials, equipment, or other property or the fixing of personal or property rights, privileges, immunities, duties or obligations of any person or group of persons, but shall not mean any meeting, the publication of the facts concerning which would disclose the institution, progress, or result of an investigation undertaken by the Northville Township Building Authority in the performance of its official duties. Every public meeting of the Northville Township Building Authority shall be open to the public.

ARTICLE VII.
The Northville Township Building Authority Commission, and the members thereof, shall have all powers and duties granted or delegated or imposed pursuant to Act No. 31 of the Public Acts of 1948, as amended, being Sections 123 951 through 123 965, inclusive, C.L. 1948. Each member of the Northville Township Building Authority Commission shall be known as a Commissioner and before assuming and entering upon the powers and duties of said office shall swear or affirm that he or she will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Michigan, and that he or she will faithfully discharge the duties of the office of Commissioner according to the best of his or her ability. Each Commissioner shall be subject to the provisions of Act No. 317 of the Public Acts of 1968 as amended, being Sections 15 321 through 15 330, inclusive, C.L. 1948, and the penalties therein provided.

ARTICLE VIII.
The date upon which the Northville Township Building Authority shall become effective is January 1, 1973.

ARTICLE IX.
These Articles of Incorporation shall be published in the Northville Record and in the Plymouth Mail & Observer pursuant to the provisions of Act No. 31 of the Public Acts of 1948, as amended, being Sections 123 951 through 123 965, inclusive, C.L. 1948.

ARTICLE X.
The term of the corporate existence of the Northville Township Building Authority is perpetual.

ARTICLE XI.
The Northville Township Building Authority shall make an annual written report to the Northville Township Board of Trustees concerning the operations and the status of the activities of the Northville Township Building Authority, including recommendations regarding actions by the Northville Township Board of Trustees related to the operations and planning of the Northville Township Building Authority.

ARTICLE XII.
Amendments may be made to these Articles of Incorporation if adopted by the Northville Township Board of Trustees pursuant to the provisions of Act No. 31 of the Public Acts of 1948, as amended, being Sections 123 951 through 123 965, inclusive, C.L. 1948.

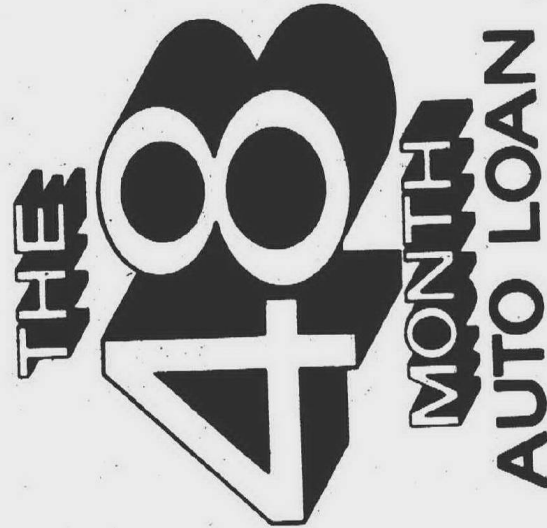
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T.V. AND TIME...

Tempus does fugit.

It was 25 years ago that television receivers were first mass-produced and began to appear in the nation's living rooms.

Today its Cycloptic eye gleams in virtually every room in the house.

By the end of 1947, when a total of about 143,000 sets had been sold, it was a neighborhood wonderment - or status symbol - when a family purchased a 10-inch screen table model, encased in a rather massive wood cabinet, that flickered and faded but still brought a new dimension to home entertainment.

In the last quarter-century more than 190 million sets, including both black-and-white and color, have been purchased by the American public. More than half of those sets are still operative.

There are now more TV sets in the U.S. than there are telephones, refrigerators or bathtubs.

TV now is beamed into 95 per cent of all U.S. homes; more than 40 per cent of them have more than one set, and about 50 per cent of the homes have color receivers.

Originally, TV was regarded as a room gimmick for family, friends and neighbors. For generations reared on phonograph recordings and radio, TV added sight to sound and established itself as a part of everyday life.

While TV was born as a facet of living room entertainment, it since has become a prominent feature of recreation rooms, bedrooms and even kitchens, where housewives can compose exotic menus with the aid of TV instructions.

A quarter of a century ago, when TV was in its swaddling clothes, there were only a relatively few thousand sets coming off the industry's production lines. Of course, these were black-and-white sets with tiny viewing screens that measured only about 10 inches.

As screens grew bigger - and large screens now are fairly commonplace - the housing of the sets became more compact. The first mass-produced sets weighed up to 85 pounds and cost more than some of today's portable color models.

As far back as October 30, 1946, a public demonstration of color TV was held at Princeton, N.J. The transmission of color pictures had been the dream of radio scientists since the time of Thomas Alva Edison.

Less than three years later, in 1949, compatible, all-electronic transmission was announced and the budding medium had taken on a new dimension.

Naturally, progress cannot stand still and this year - 25 years after its mass-production birth - even the color has been improved.

Entertainment in the homes across the country has come a long way in the past 25 years and this must be as good a time as any to salute the electronic medium that has so changed our way of life.

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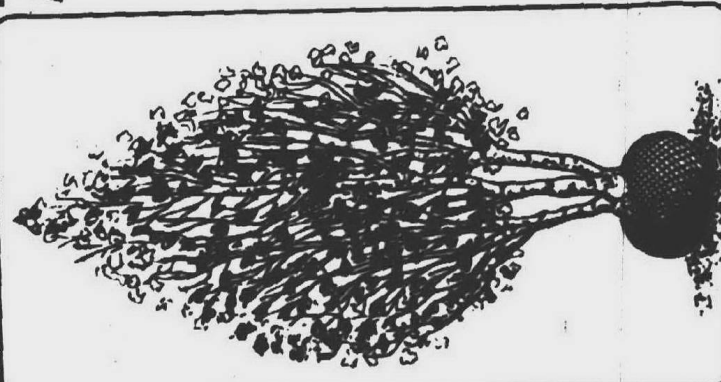
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TELEVISION THE NECESSITY TODAY

Just a few short years ago a television set was a household luxury. Today, two or more sets in a home is taken for granted.

Color television sets, once a novelty, have become more and more perfected and with this a growing demand among consumers for color sets.

It has been estimated that this year, American consumers will buy over two million solid state color television receivers, more than double the number purchased in 1971.

William H. Anderson, division vice president, marketing for RCA Consumer Electronics, said color television manufacturers continue to introduce more sets with solid state chassis designs.

Noting that a growing number of the advanced technology solid state receivers are being sold in this area, Anderson said that "by 1976 we estimate that 75 per cent of all color sets sold to the public will contain tubeless chassis."

He said the shift to the advance technology products is occurring at a greater rate than anticipated, indicating that the consumer will choose products that are designed to offer longer life and are easier to service.

Consumer interest in large screen receivers, according to Anderson.

console products is being increased with the greater variety of furniture designs and features, including simplified color tuning.

One of the newer design innovations is the use of architectural glass tops for decorative effect and easier entertaining in the home.

Along with the growth of color television sets, is the increasing demand for "all-channel" antennas.

This market has grown sharply in the past few years, with more and more firms getting into the business.

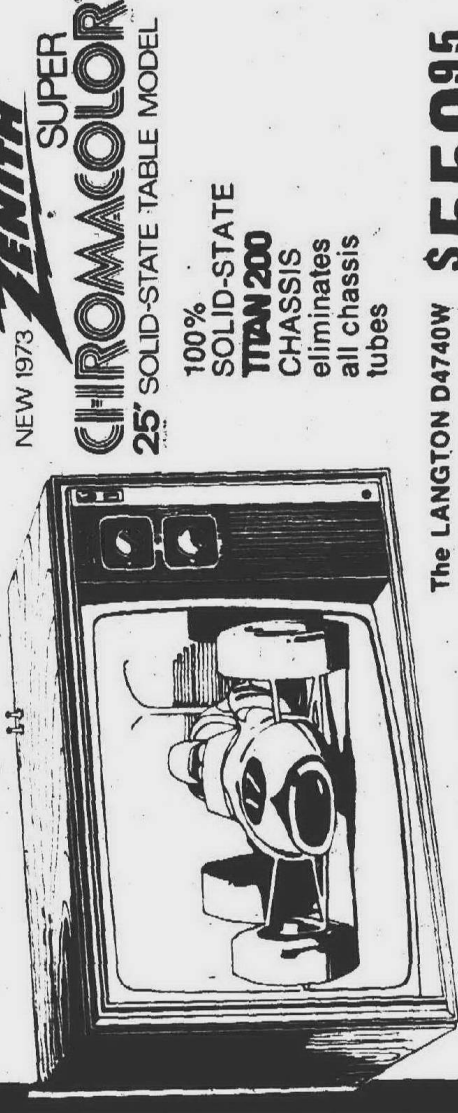
With these antennas, which can be rotated in the home, viewers are able to triple their television enjoyment.

In the color television set itself, one of the most significant trends of late has been toward solid state designs in the receivers.

Along with this technology there has emerged a development called ceramic circuits.

Developed primarily as space age technology, solid state circuitry is coming more and more to the attention of the consumer.

More consumers are learning that ceramic circuits and the other solid state devices which are gradually replacing vacuum tubes, make possible improved performance and help extend the life time of television receivers, according to Anderson.

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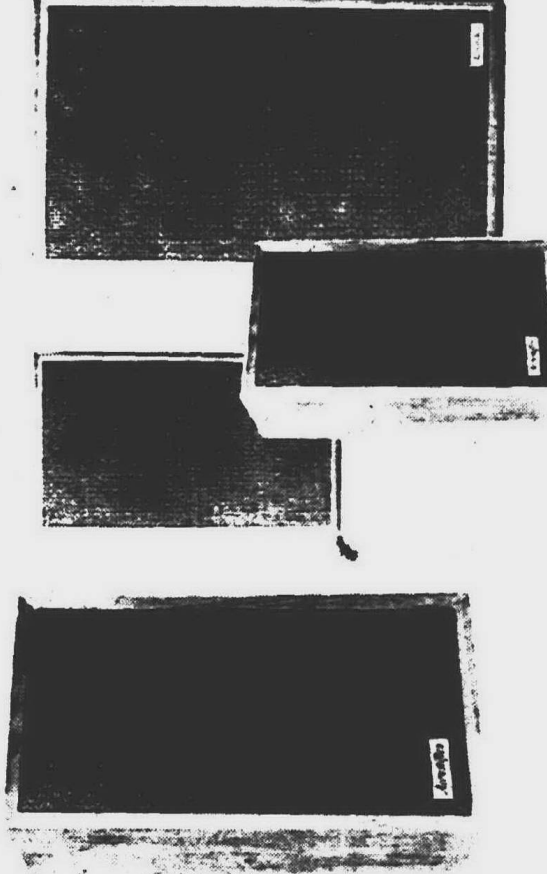
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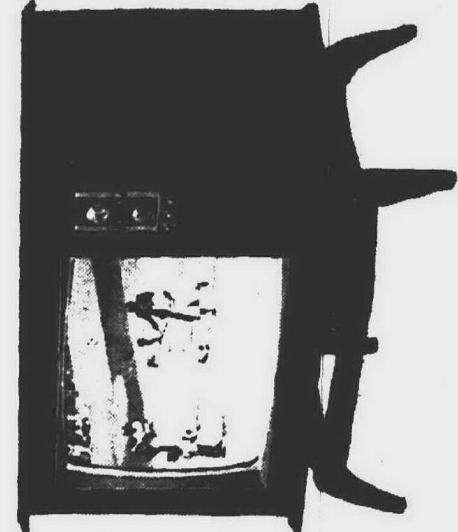

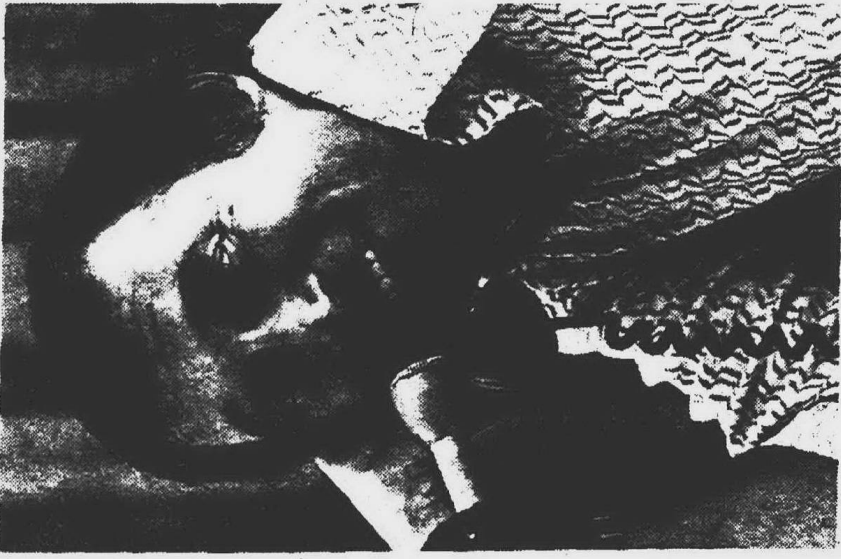

Stations have built up their own personalities, some of them as masters of ceremonies, some as weather men, as well as disc jockeys and newsmen.

Each of these radio and television personalities has a solid background in the business, each has his own style.

RADIO & T.V. THE MAGIC MEDIA

Two of Radio Station WJR's key men are J.P. McCarthy and Jimmy Launce.

McCarthy, who joined WJR on Oct. 1, 1956 as a staff announcer, became master of ceremonies of the 6:15 to 9 a.m. "Music Hall" program in 1958. Except for the little over a year he spent on a San Francisco station, he has handled the program since then.

In the spring of 1966, McCarthy became host of the nighttime discussion program "Focus," where he interviews guests from all walks of life on a myriad of topics.

Interviews have also become a part of his morning show. Audience participation, via the telephone, is another feature of "Music Hall."

In addition to his on-air duties, McCarthy, last November, became program director of the station. In his "spare time," he has appeared on several television programs.

Jimmy Launce is host on the Afternoon Music Hall in which he involves his listeners in a wide assortment of topics. By inviting his listeners to talk on the air, give their opinions or ask questions on subjects, Launce makes his audience a part of the show.

For listener interest, Launce seeks

out the unusual. For instance, because he wants to find out what it's like to be a window-washer, he became one -- for 10 minutes.

Launce strapped himself into a harness outside the 22nd floor window of the Fisher Building and interviewed a man who washes windows for a living.

Once he flew an F-80 Jetstart and at the same time talked into a tiny recorder microphone placed in the oxygen mask.

Another example of specialized programming is WXYZ radio's Dick Purtan morning show.

His listener appeal lies in the fact that no one knows who will fall victim to his barbed comments which he aims at prominent personages, politicians, and prestigious policy-makers alike. No one is exempt from Purtan's buffoonery, regardless of name or stature.

Purtan began his broadcasting career in 1957 while working towards a Masters Degree in advertising at Syracuse University. His first radio job was at WOLF in Syracuse where he played country and western records as "The Buckaroo Sandman."

Housewives have an opportunity to

phone in questions concerning household problems on Bob Allison's "Ask Neighbor" show heard mornings on WWJ radio.

On the program, listeners may inquire about a new cooking recipe, how to get the car started in the morning, what to do with a child who won't eat, or how to set time deadlines for teenage daters. The list of problems and solutions discussed on the show is almost endless.

Allison broke into broadcasting in 1949 while attending high school. He

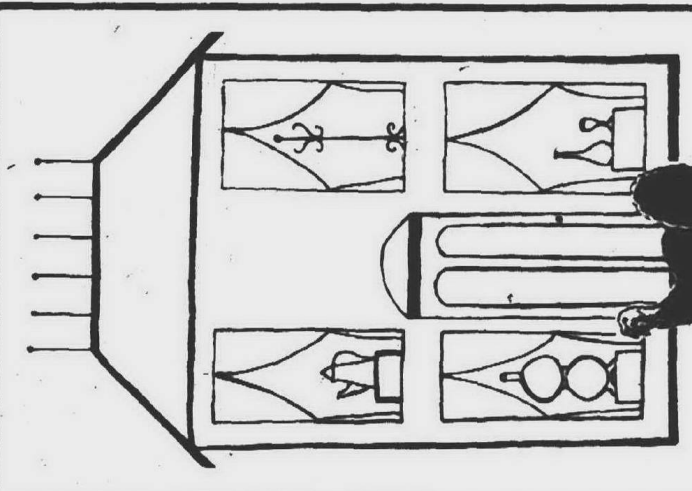

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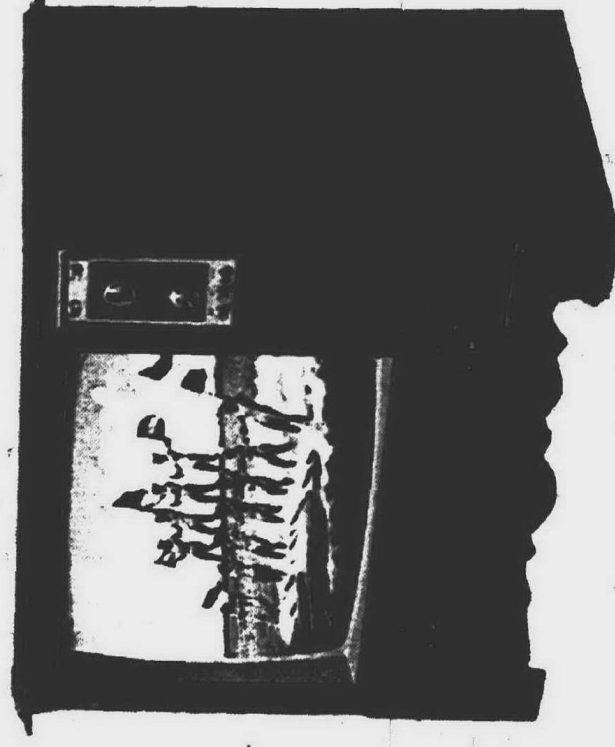

A new type of radio program is catching on across the country, including Detroit.

Thousands of women in the Detroit area are tuning in and many more are telling their most intimate secrets on the radio.

The show is number one in the ratings in Los Angeles and Miami.

It's among the top three in Toledo, New York and Cleveland.

The program hit on the air on WDEE in March with regular morning dee-jay Tom Dean hosting the 10 a.m. to noon show.

What's happening?

"The most significant new development in radio since the days of rock and roll," say some.

"Trash, x-rated radio," say others.

Women from all over the tri-county area are confiding in a man they don't know and most have never seen.

Tom Dean is becoming a household word to many women. He is a surrogate psychiatrist, telephone lover and "just someone to talk to" about their near-great or no good husbands or lovers.

Fem Forum is for women callers only but station officials estimate that more men listen to the program than women.

"The calls start coming in about 5:45 a.m.," says John Mazer, station program manager.

"We've tried to tell the women we don't accept any calls for the program until 9:45 a.m., but it doesn't do any good. They keep right on calling early anyway."

What causes these women to bare their souls and secret lives? You could get a thousand different answers from those who listen to the program.

Age of the average listener to the program has been set at about 30 years old. Locally it is believed they are averaging out a little younger.

The program has plenty of critics as well as listeners.

One thing appears certain. You either love the program or hate it. There are very few fence straddlers.

financed his education at Indiana University by working at WTTS in Bloomington, Ind.

He worked at several radio stations, both in the Midwest and far west before moving to Detroit in 1961.

Among his outside activities, Allison is 1972 Wayne County crusade chairman for the American Cancer Society.

An "air" personality who combines his talents to both radio and television is Ray Lane, probable better known as play-by-play radio announcer with Ernie Harwell of the Detroit Tiger baseball games.

Born in Detroit, Elliott was educated at Central High School and Wayne State University where he began his career in broadcasting as an actor.

During World War II, he piloted B-24 bombers over Germany. He was shot down in early 1944 and spent the next 18 months as a prisoner at Stalag Luft I in Barth, Germany, where he and his fellow prisoners passed the long months of captivity by staging original skits and revues.

A new face on the local television scene but one familiar to many network television viewers is Dean Miller, anchorman on WWJ's news-cast.

A former movie actor, owner of two radio stations in Ohio and editor and publisher of his own weekly newspaper in Sidney, Miller did considerable network television work.

He appeared as host of Art Linkletter's "House Party" for a summer and did a CBS daytime series, "There's One in Every Family."

He became best known for his role

as Matt Henshaw in the "December Bride" series starring the late Spring Byington. He also served as master of ceremonies of NBC's "Here's Hollywood" for two years.

Over at WXYZ-TV a former news-caster, John Kelly, is heading a morning show, "Kelly and Company" which delves into topics of the day and presents guests who are interviewed on various topics.

Programs and stations are becoming more specialized than ever before.

And since response to these programs has received nation-wide attention, it is likely additional radio and television stations will switch to this type of programming.

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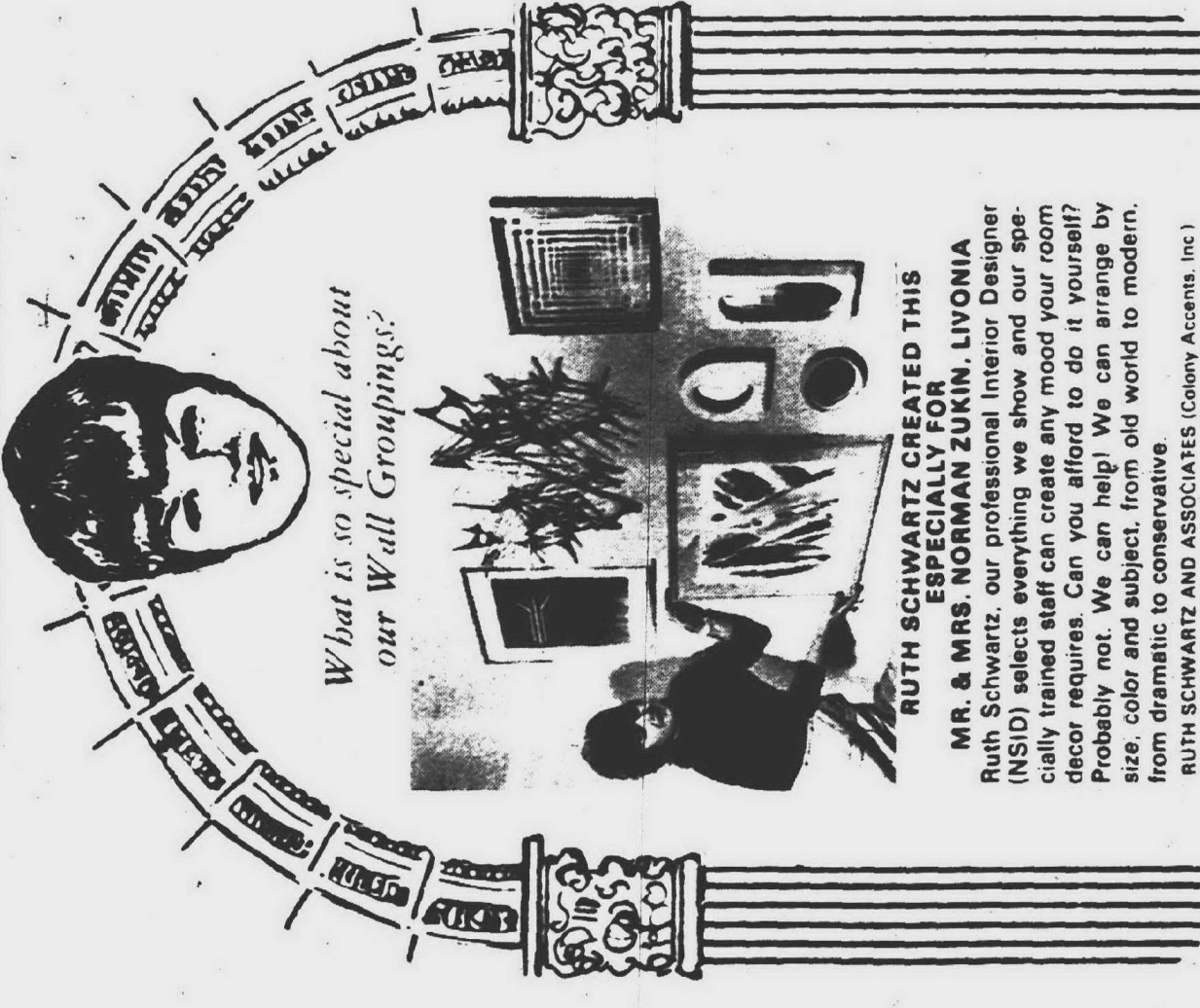
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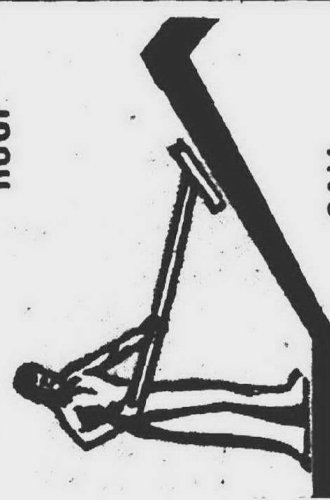
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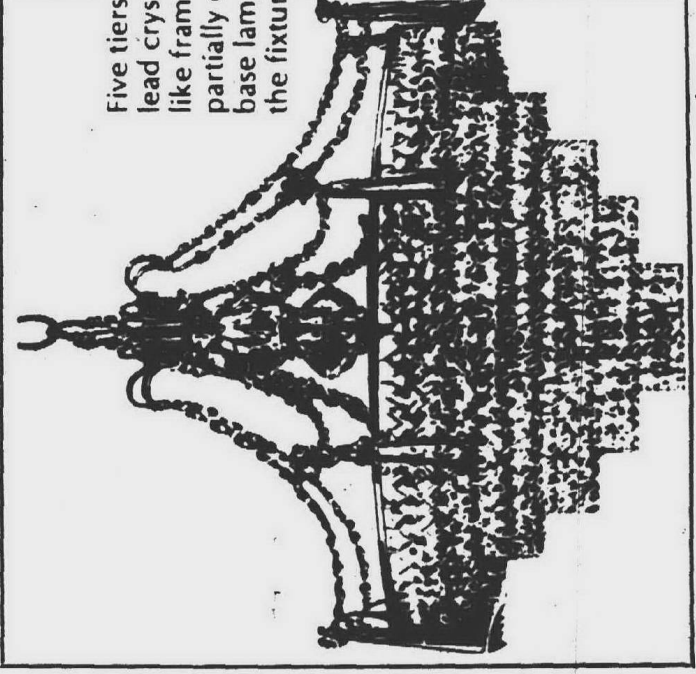
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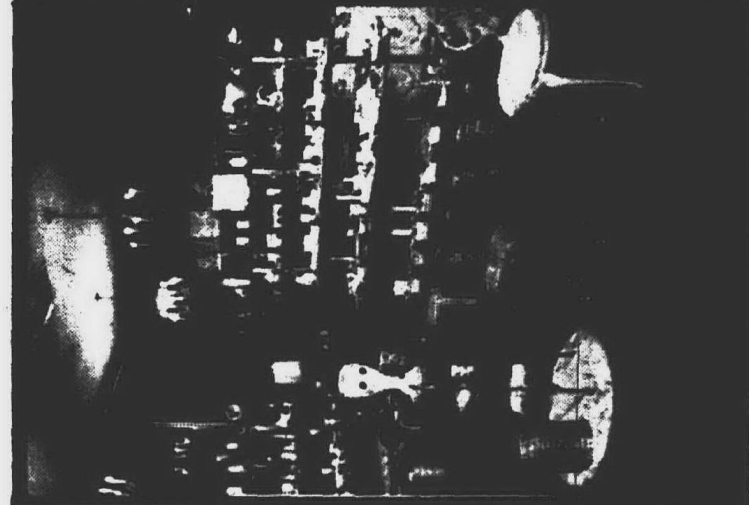
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RADIO 1973 SOUND

The demand for "listening type music" is widespread.

Radio stations featuring "good music" are numerous, a good many of them are FM stations.

Stereo AM-FM radios are the common thing today. There is hardly a large console sold that doesn't include FM. Portable radios with FM bands are also popular.

The stereo radio set grew in popularity as stations began broadcasting music in stereo. This desire to hear music as it was recorded has spread over into the phonograph field which is now moving from two channel stereo sound to four channel.

Those who have heard music on four channel stereo say the improvement over two channels is much greater and more dramatic than the earlier change from monophonic to two channel stereo sound.

In the pre-stereo era, many sound lovers felt even the best audio systems then available fell short in an important respect.

different channels that the music suddenly sprang to new life with a richer, more satisfying quality.

The performers were not only spread out in a line before the listener but some could be heard distinctly on the left, on the right, at dead center and at points between. Different instruments and vocalists stood out in relief with a new clarity, no longer blurred together.

The effect was far more realistic than anyone had ever heard to that point. In more than one sense, a new dimension had been added to listening.

Now with four channel stereo, a new listening thrill is here. The rich resonance of the live performance, which approaches the listener from every direction, not just from the front, can now be recreated.

When the audience applauds during a four channel broadcast, for example, the listener can hear the applause all around, in back; even

right beside him. There is a feeling that you are part of the live event.

Several different techniques have been proposed for recording and broadcasting in four channels.

There is the so-called discrete four-track method, which pertains only to tape.

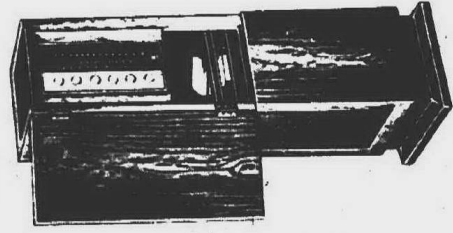
There is synthesized four channel stereo, which is compatible with all existing equipment and media, discs, tapes and broadcasts.

There are proposals for special broadcast techniques that would, by altering present FM transmission standards, permit four channels to be transmitted but would not be useful in recording.

There are also proposals for modifying disc recording techniques to incorporate four channels but which would not solve the broadcast problem.

In addition, there is the matrixing approach, which permits four channels to be mixed down to two and then recovered. This technique is

soon become obsolete. This is understandable, but unwarranted.

It is possible to buy units that can accommodate all two channel and four channel techniques and materials now in use and sufficiently flexible to adapt to any foreseeable developments.

Intelligently designed equipment can readily handle both discrete tapes and matrixed sources, whether recorded or broadcast, and also synthesize rear channel ambience from existing two channel sources.

That much capability may be all that is necessary for the future, as well as the present.

Nevertheless, to be on the safe side, well-designed gear should have sufficient input and output facilities to accommodate any converters, decoders or other adaptive equipment it may need to handle anything the future brings.

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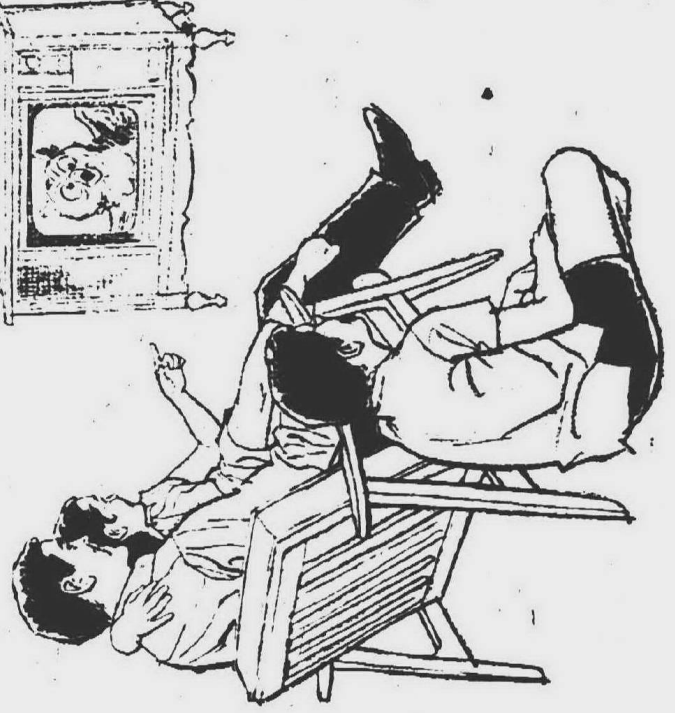
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TELEVISIONS BEGINNING

When and how did it all begin, this miracle of television?

It was developed in the 1930s in laboratories with the principal patents going to Vladimir Zworykin and Philo Farnsworth, who developed it independently.

Television was authorized by the Federal Communications Commission on July 1, 1941

There were five months of telecasting to about 10,000 sets before Pearl Harbor.

The first commercial television originated from the Empire State Building in New York in 1941.

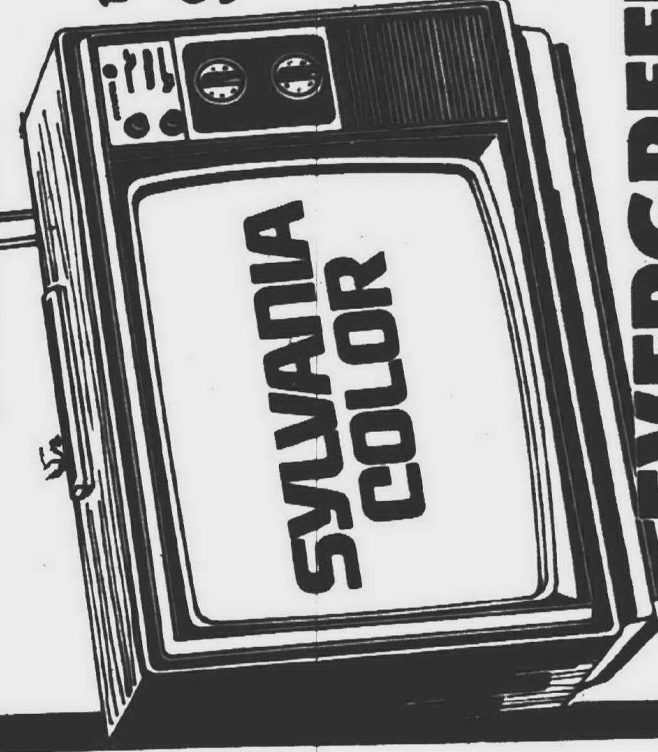
First television stations were WNBT (NBC, New York), WCBW

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
