



# Stores Oppose Jan. 1 Non-Returnable Bottle Ban

"I might as well close my store up."

That was the reaction of one Plymouth party store owner to the city ordinance prohibiting the sale of non-returnable beverage bottles that is scheduled to go into effect Jan. 1.

"I'd forgotten all about it," said another store manager.

THE NON-DEPOSIT bottle ban was originally supposed to go into effect Jan. 1, 1972 but was postponed for a year by the Plymouth City Commission on Dec. 6, 1971 following a public hearing on the ordinance at which local store owners and managers protested the ordinance.

Aim of the ordinance is to help the environment by giving consumers an incentive to return their beverage bottles. But city merchants complained that all it would do is cut their business.

"If I didn't have those (non-returnable) bottles," said Rimmon George, owner of the Party Pantry at

614 S. Main, "they (the customers) would buy out in the township or in Northville."

"I didn't know they'd postponed it," George said, explaining he thought the ordinance had been revoked.

AS TIME approached for the ordinance to go into effect last year, City Commissioner Robert Sincok proposed that it be revoked, but his motion died for lack of support. At that time the commission voted to postpone the non-return bottle ban for a year — bringing it up to Jan. 1, 1973.

But with a month to go, the merchants say it might take as long as six months to prepare for stocking and reclaiming returnable bottles.

"It would probably take six months to rearrange the stock and order everything," said Lowell Shick, owner of the 7-11 store at 1307 Main.

"When were they supposed to inform us of that ordinance's effective date?" Shick asked. "We just bought the store in July, and it's funny they haven't contacted us."

Shick, who estimated that 80 per cent of the beverage bottles he stocks are non-returnable, said he was

"wholeheartedly against" the ordinance.

He said that although he currently stocks three types of soda pop returnable bottles, he doesn't have the space to store returned beer bottles.

"If I had beer bottles coming back, I might as well close the store up," he said.

BOB PALMER, manager of the Farmer Jack store on Main St., said he too had forgotten all about the postponed ordinance effective date.

Palmer echoed the lament that there wasn't space to store returnable bottles on the scale that non-returnable bottles are now sold. He said his store has been accepting returnable bottles "for customer convenience" although it does not carry those types of bottles.

He added that the ordinance would mean increased labor costs for the stores to pay for help washing, sorting and stacking the bottles for return to the beverage companies.

Last year the merchants complained that a ban only in the city would send customers to the township stores.

## TCYC Members Plan Swinging Aqueduct, 2nd Commodore's Ball

Ahoy, mateys! It's once again time for the landlubbers of Plymouth's Tonquish Creek Yacht Club (TCYC) to come out of drydock for the second annual Commodore's Ball.

The "semi-sewer formal" event, which is expected to draw a record crowd, is scheduled for Friday from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. at the Thunderbird-Hilton in Plymouth Township.

The ball will include a light buffet and music by Dan Yessian's Arrangements. TCYC members and non-members are welcome. Tickets are \$6 per member and \$7 per non-member.

ACTIVITIES in preparation for the event have been snowballing—including one proposal by Past-Commodore Robert Delaney that a swinging aqueduct be constructed in colonial style to allow boat traffic on the Tonquish Creek (which is now a two-foot wide sewer) to pass over Plymouth's Main Street.

A communique from Delaney to the City about the aqueduct proposal finally

needed the city fathers into a response. Albeit a tongue-in-cheek reaction to Delaney's tongue-in-cheek proposal, the city commission's resolution was, they admitted, sharing in the whimsical plans of connecting the city with the St. Lawrence Seaway.

THE FOLLOWING is Delaney's letter to the city that got the ball rolling: "Some time ago various members of the commission were approached by the leadership of the T.C.Y.C. regarding the construction of a deep water canal between the St. Lawrence Seaway and downtown Plymouth."

"In general our project has received favorable attention by the Department of Inland Waterways of the U.S. Government (to whom we applied for construction funds), as well as the press and TV. Admittedly, however, we were disappointed over the coolness of our city leaders, which in some instances amounted to a contemptuous rejection."

"While our proposal has

invoked the stinging wrath of some voters who do not share our vision, I urge you to just tax them and forget them. Further, in answer to some of this annoying resistance, you will be pleased to know our vice commodore in charge of engineering, John Hanskat has designed a new type of swinging aqueduct which will permit the freighters to pass up over Main Street, so they won't interfere with traffic."

"Keeping in mind what it will mean to all of us when the lake freighters are diverted through our town, the economical potential is frightening, but nevertheless worthy of your support."

"Please support proposition X and vote yes, to permit a

## Bands To Present Concert Saturday

Plymouth High School bands will present a Concert Saturday, Dec. 2, at 8 p.m. in the auditorium of Plymouth-Salem High School, Joy and Canton Center Roads.

## P.O. BOX Drugs

### Whatever Became Of LSD?

Questions should be sent to the Community Commission on Drug Abuse, P.O. Box Drugs, Livonia, 48151.

Q. I don't seem to hear as much about LSD today as before. Is it being used less?  
D.V., Redford

A. LSD ("acid," "sunshine" etc.) is still very much around. This most potent of the mind-altering drugs was a big thing a few years ago. Today it is suffering from a rather well deserved lapse in popularity, mostly because of its documented hazards to the mind.

Oddly enough, traffic in the drug has not particularly diminished. It is merely being sold as something else currently in vogue, most generally, mescaline.

Q. Can LSD cause schizophrenia?  
M.R., Redford

A. It certainly can cause something. However, schizophrenia (a severe form of mental disturbance) is not identical to the effects sometimes caused by LSD. There are enough similarities between some LSD "bad trips" and schizophrenia to have resulted in confusing the two. Technically, the experiences are not identical; in this particular instance we'd say that close does count.

Q. Are LSD "flashbacks" now considered a real problem? Or was this just part of the "scare" propaganda about LSD?  
F.N., Livonia

A. The phenomenon of LSD flashbacks (re-occurrences of earlier drug-induced hallucinations) was undoubtedly used by some as a "scare tactic." This particular scare happened to have some basis in fact. The people who work in drug treatment centers say that the flashback problem is a real one today. These experiences, which can be utterly terrifying, were thought to happen spontaneously but now are considered more likely to be caused by some emotional stress.

Q. Can LSD Kill you? I've heard of animals such as rabbits being killed in tests with it.

R.S., Plymouth  
A. Rabbits are the most sensitive of all animals to the lethal effects of LSD. And in most cases the doses are higher than humans take-or can afford at current prices. We know of only one death directly caused by LSD, and that was of a very young child. This drug certainly can and does - kill people, but only indirectly by causing them to perform irrational and dangerous acts. Once dead, having been killed directly or indirectly should be of merely academic interest to the victim.

## Canton Paves Way For Skating Rink

CANTON TOWNSHIP planning commission members will recommend an addition to the township's M-1 (light industrial) zoning designation to permit the construction of a roller skating rink.

The suggestion came from Planning Consultant Michael Manore at the Nov. 6 meeting, stemming from a request for the rezoning of 3.9 acres on Joy at Lilley Rds. The site is presently zoned M-1 but the zoning ordinance now permits roller rinks to be built only in C-2 (general business) districts.

Rather than rezone the site, Manore suggested the zoning law be changed to allow the following uses in M-1 districts: bowling alley, roller rinks, ice skating rinks, indoor tennis clubs, pool and billiard halls, stadia and sports arenas when having at least 200 feet of frontage along a major road of 120-ft. right-of-way and when located at least 150 feet from any property zoned in a residential classification.

Manore said the large sports buildings have similar characteristics of those in industrial sections.

"The size of the proposed building is 155 feet wide and 205 feet deep with 31,775 square feet. It is equivalent to

the size of a warehouse or similar industrial building. Converting a roller skating rink to such a use would be possible if needed. Traffic would be different, in that trucks would not frequent a roller skating rink and the activities are primarily in the evening and on weekends."

The planning commission set Dec. 19 for a public hearing on the proposed change.

### Fellows Creek Entrances

### Due To Stay

CANTON TOWNSHIP Entrances to Republic Development Corp.'s Fellows Creek subdivision park will remain unchanged despite a request to cut down their size.

Walter Goodman, Republic official, pointed out to the Canton planning commission that the park site adjoins a school site and the boundary of 667 feet never will be fenced.

In light of this, Goodman said, it was felt by the developer that the park entrances could be trimmed from 30 feet to 25 feet. The adjacent lots would get the benefit of the five feet, Goodman said.

However, Canton planners concurred with the planning consultant's report, one section of which stated that narrow park entrances "can be bothersome" especially to people on both sides of the entrances.







# Football Attendance Increased This Year

PLYMOUTH John Sandmann, athletic director in the Plymouth school system, said this week after a review of football attendance and receipts for recent years that he sees "little change" in student and adult interest.

"The population in the district keeps growing," Sandmann pointed out, "and while attendance is up, so is enrollment."

Varsity football gate receipts this past season, bolstered by a five-game Rock winning streak, were about \$12,100 compared to \$10,500 the year before, noted Sandmann. Similarly, paid attendance rose from 9,600 to 11,000.

"The weather and the schedule are highly important attendance factors," said Sandmann. "Historically, Bentley, Redford Union and Belleville are our best drawing cards at home."

PLYMOUTH finished fourth in the Suburban Eight League this year behind Edsel Ford, Trenton and RU, which were the only three teams to beat the Rocks in a nine-game season.

Sandmann also finds other areas of influence which actually are leading to increased interest in school sports, among them the activities of the Athletic Boosters Club which was formed four years ago.

This adult organization helps with crowd control and also publishes the printed program for all home football and basketball games.

Student participation, he notes, also is growing in pace with the expansion of the school system.

During the current academic year, Plymouth is fielding 54 separate teams in all sports that are competing in interscholastic schedules from the seventh grade through the high school level. These include girls teams in tennis, swimming, basketball, volleyball and track.

HOWEVER, THE number of teams will increase to 77 in 1973-74 with the reopening of Central as a middle school and with Canton High School operating as a separate entity. Plymouth-Canton will hold membership in the Western Six conference while

## The Stroller:

# How I Starred In A Broadway Play

It was only natural when word got around that The Stroller had passed another milestone in life that he would be bombarded with a lot of questions regarding his half century along the journalistic trail.

They asked about the thrill of riding with Gar Wood in Miss America X and what it felt like to be riding the water at a speed of more than 124 miles an hour. And they wanted to know if it was a greater thrill riding around the Indianapolis Motor Speedway with three-time winner, Wilbur Shaw, than it was skimming the water with Wood.

They asked about the thrilling moments of watching Joe Louis climb the pugilistic ladder from the Golden Gloves to the heavyweight championship of the world and ranking as one of the greatest all-around fighters who ever lived.

The baseball fans wanted to know what kind of a fellow Ty Cobb was and what manner of man was Babe Ruth...and how enjoyable it must have been traveling with the Tigers when they won the American League pennant in 1934 and the world series, against the Chicago Cubs in 1935.

Then, invariably, came the \$64 million question—What was your most unusual experience?

OUT OF A half century of thrilling experiences in many places this may have seemed like a difficult question to answer. But it wasn't.

As he looks back over the years he has strolled the trail, there are two events that stand out—and both of them away from the athletic fields.

There was the night, many years ago, when a kindly lady walked into the sports department of Detroit Free Press where The Stroller was attempting to eke out an existence, and asked a favor.

She introduced herself as the wife of Kid McCoy, a well known fighter of those days, who had just passed away.

"The Kid has left a note asking to be cremated and that his ashes be spread over Belle Isle," she said. "Now, if it was a regular funeral service I know The Kid would want you for a pall bearer. But, with no service, I'd like you to accompany me when we spread the ashes."

Two mornings later we met at City Airport—the widow and the city's leading fight writers from the daily prints.

Before we boarded the plane the pilot informed us that he wouldn't fly higher than 500 feet and that he'd make two turns of the island.

"WHEN I complete the first turn at the Scott fountain," he told the widow, "I'll tip the wings slowly. Then you slowly open the window and tip the jar of ashes ever so gently while I complete the trip. In that way we'll have the ashes well scattered."

At the moment there was an outdoor restaurant scene on the stage—like the sidewalk cafes of Paris.

"My Lawd," she said when she saw us. "Get right in here," and she sat us down at a table on the stage as she stood in the wings laughing.

In a few minutes the curtain for the first act came down—and we were out of there.

But for an unusual experience—this was it—five minutes in a musical comedy on a Broadway stage.

## Restaurant Firm Tells Shakeup, New Policies

Original Coney Island Inc., headquartered in Livonia, has revealed a major top management shakeup and change of policy.

President Steven Toman announced that all directors except himself have resigned and were replaced by four young Michigan businessmen. Toman stepped down as president but will remain with the firm as vice president.

A company announcement said: "WE WILL immediately adopt a program to sell or convert to franchises those restaurant operations distant from the greater Detroit area."

The firm has 15 restaurants in 10 states. Thirteen are

wholly owned and two under partnership agreement.

Next, the new board plans to locate more restaurants in shopping centers and commercial areas in metropolitan Detroit and nearby cities. Three sites are under consideration.

With shareholder approval, the firm will change its name to OCI Industries, which will be a parent company. The "Original Coney Island" company will be retained as a division, with other divisions to be created if and when business conditions allow.

**NEW DIRECTORS are:** Ira Jaffe, 33, chairman, secretary and chief executive. He is senior member of the

law firm of Jaffe, Snider, Raitt, Garratt and Heuer.

Frederick Goldsmith, 32, president, treasurer and chief operating officer. He is a Southfield attorney and was a vice president of Cobbs Fashion Apparel.

Thomas Klein, 37, director. He is president of Velvet O'Donnell Corp. (peanut butter), executive vice president of O'Donnell Importing Co. (liquors and wines) and a director of Haberstroh Farm Products, Inc. (pre-cooked bacon).

Thomas Limperis, 41, director. He is president of Sensors, Inc., an Ann Arbor-based corporation specializing in high technological sensing devices and biophysical applications to plants and animals.

**ORIGINAL Coney Island, Inc.**, was incorporated three years ago and in March of 1971 completed its public stock sale of 400,000 shares, raising \$700,000. It is actively traded in the over-the-counter market and has more than 500 shareholders in the metropolitan area.

Total 1972 sales are expected to reach \$1 million.

The first restaurant was opened in 1970, five in 1971 and 10 (including a snack bar) in 1972. One was sold last July 31.

The runway will be 2,000 feet southeast of the existing Runway 3R 21L and will be 10,000 feet long and 150 feet wide with a supporting taxiway system. The proposed construction will include, in addition to the runway-taxiway system, necessary runway and taxiway lighting required navigational aids, security fencing and a new storm drainage system outfalling to a new retention basin. To accommodate this runway-taxiway system it will be necessary to relocate Eureka Road and to relocate the existing perimeter drainage ditch. 

## Schoolcraft's 'South End' Will Get Service

Schoolcraft College officially opened its first extension center Monday with a ribbon cutting in Garden City attended by local city and school officials.

Entitled an Information and Service Center, the office is located in Florence School, 29205 Florence east of Middle Belt and north of Cherry Hill. College President C. Nelson Grote said the office will serve Garden City residents as well as residents of the southern portion of the college district. The school districts of Garden City, Livonia, Plymouth, Clarenceville and Northville belong to the college district.

DR. GROTE termed the opening as a "history making event" for the college because it shows that we "view our legal district as our campus" rather than the Livonia campus as the college district. "More and more we are taking programs and services to the people," he said.

The center will be staffed by a full time coordinator, who hasn't been appointed yet, and by Mrs. Agnes Fultz, a secretary who was reassigned from the admissions office. Various college officials will serve at the center until a coordinator is appointed.

Office hours will be from 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. A special registration for students taking Schoolcraft classes offered in Garden City at Garden City West High School will be from 6 until 9 p.m. Dec. 4-7. Students taking classes both in Garden City and on the Livonia campus should register at the main campus.

AMONG THE credit courses offered in Garden City during the winter are accounting, real estate, business law, industrial drawing, law enforcement, human relations, American government and speech.

Since Schoolcraft experienced a decline in enrollments during the fall

semester, the college hopes to boost winter enrollments by offering classes at more convenient locations in the district.

It takes Garden City residents as much as 30 minutes to get to the main campus on Haggerty between Six and Seven Mile in Livonia, Dr. Grote pointed out.

He said that if the Garden City extension proves successful, the college may consider a similar extension service in Canton Township where the population is growing steadily.

Funding the extension was made possible by a state grant to the college in addition to its state appropriations. Approximately \$29,000 is budgeted for the Garden City office operation through June, Dr. Grote said.

CITY COUNCILMAN Wilson Taylor said the city is "delighted that Garden City was selected as a proving grounds for the program."

"Hopefully people will respond and keep the program growing for many years to come," he said.

Asst. School Supt. Bracken Snow said the administration and board of education were pleased to have an extension center open in Garden City.







## Slow Down Land-Water Fund Requests--State

Local units of government in Michigan are urged by the State Department of Natural Resources to slow down their requests for federal land and water conservation funds, and to use "notice of intent" forms prepared by the DNR to file brief, basic information on their proposed outdoor recreation projects.

The DNR's words of advice are prompted by the fact that it is already scraping the bottom of this state's land and water allotment for cost - sharing local outdoor recreation projects during the fiscal year which ends next June 30.

In fact, while Michigan's current allocation for these projects totals some \$4 million, the DNR has received local requests calling for \$5 million, which are in various stages of processing and screening.

"OBVIOUSLY, we're already in the sticky position of not having enough land and water money to go around this fiscal year," explains DNR grants - in aid Supervisor Raymond Schofield.

"However," he stresses, "if any local unit of government has plans for what it considers to be a solid outdoor project,

we want to review its basic proposal to see where the project ranks on our statewide priority list."

"At the same time," he continues, "we want to save these units of government as much unnecessary paperwork as possible and that's why we're encouraging them to send in their project information only on our notice of intent forms."

All such local requests must go to a DNR committee which evaluates the proposed projects and sets priorities for funding them with Land and Water money.

Director Samuel A. Milstein as he outlined the total picture covering local recreation and state projects in the field of wildlife, forestry, parks, fisheries, waterways, and historic preservation.

With the recreation bond program having been tapped ahead of schedule for all of its \$100 million since 1969, the

DNR will require about \$40 million annually in additional state finances to hold together its part of this picture, Milstein explained.

HE STRESSED that the question of additional state funding calls for decision-making outside the DNR, but indicated that it might be

answered by another bonding effort, special taxation, or increased appropriations from the General Fund.

The balance of the financing thrust - projected at \$200 million - would come from matching and restricted funds of local and federal government sources.

Milstein singled out local recreation programs as the "foundation" of any statewide recreation system. "It's time," he pointed out, "that this important public service be considered equally with other activities such as health, police protection, education, shelter, and clean water."

He observed that operating funds continue to be the critical issue in developing adequate recreation programs at all levels of government.

The DNR's needs - report carries these other keynotes:

**WILDLIFE:** "The future of Michigan's wildlife is at a critical point. To provide the necessary habitat we must acquire lands. Wildlife Division must control almost double the present amount of

northern deer yard fringes to insure workable management. Key lands are needed for the protection of rare and endangered species and these key lands must also be managed."

Milstein noted that wildlife and wildlife lands provide over 60 million days of recreation each year, adding that this use is projected to increase a hundred fold.

"In contrast," he went on to point out, "lands closed to hunting by local and state regulation in southern Michigan have nearly tripled in the last 10 years and now total about 400,000 acres."

Under this trend, lands expected to increase to about 1 million acres in less than 30 years. Also, wetlands are being lost at the rate of 65,000 acres each year.

**FORESTRY:** "The future of our forest lands will see further redevelopment of forest camping to provide a quality user experience and protection of the resources."

Underscoring this basic plan of improvement is the

fact that in the 1960s, use of rustic state forest campgrounds doubled and doubled again, and often resulted in heavy overcrowding. In many cases, such people pressures have destroyed the resource values which made these sites attractive in the first place.

**PARKS:** "Parks will grow toward the provision of quality experience. Camping will focus on the quality and the encouragement of and cooperation with private interests."

This statement of direction is keyed to the fact that, while the number of state park campsites has doubled since 1960, the number of private campsites has increased 14 times. These private campgrounds now provide the majority of sites for the camping public seeking modern facilities.

**FISHERIES:** "The new philosophy of habitat improvement will produce projects of a much broader scope. Traditionally, these projects centered on trout streams but will now include warm water lakes and streams."

**MACKINAC ISLAND:** "Planning and development are underway in the Mackinac Island Parks for the future visitor and his fuller enjoyment of these historical crossroads."

## Metroparks Gear For Winter Fun

The major parks of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority will offer the following facilities for winter recreation during 1972-73, with facilities open when Michigan's winter weather arrives:

Kensington Metropolitan Park near Milford is one of the most popular areas in southeastern Michigan and has facilities for tobogganing, skating, sledding, ice fishing and picture taking. Catches of bluegills and crappies are taken by many fishermen who enjoy fishing on Kent Lake.

**SKATING HOURS** are 10 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. daily (weather permitting).

The rinks are located in front of the boat rental building, which is open 2 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. Saturday, Sunday and during the school vacation week (Tuesday, December 26

through Friday, December 29).

This building has a heated lounge with a fireplace, restrooms, food service and vending machines.

Ideal for sledding and tobogganing are the hilly slopes at the winter sports area which has an enclosed warming shelter with a fireplace and tables. There are five toboggan tracks and a separate area for sledding. The area is open daily from 10 a.m. to 9:30 p.m., weather permitting. Park hours are daylight to 10 p.m.

**LOWER HURON** Metropolitan Park near Belleville, an attractive site along the Huron River, has its entrance on Hannan Road just 1/2 mile south of the Willow Run Expressway (I-94) via Haggerty Road Interchange between Detroit Metropolitan Airport and Belleville.

SCHOOLCRAFT COLLEGE'S boundaries moved southward in a series of land transactions in the past five years. In 1967, the college traded section A (26 acres) for Section A1 (25 acres) which had been purchased by the State Highway Department for the transaction. In the agreement, the college was given the option to buy Sections B and D if it became land-locked. The college then purchased Section C (nine acres) and made an agreement to swap Section D for Section D1 with the Trinity Baptist Church. Section D is the southern corner of the Barron property (Section B) and will be traded as soon as this property is purchased.

# It Takes Land To Run College

The ability to barter for land swaps is hardly in Ken Lindner's job description.

But over the last five years, Lindner has put his talents to work arranging land deals that will fatten Schoolcraft College's holdings by 30 acres and save the college more than \$100,000.

As Schoolcraft's vice president of business, Lindner saw the chance to turn the construction of I-275 at the college's back door into a golden opportunity.

While mapping the proposed expressway's route through Livonia, the State Highway Department found it needed 26 acres of land belonging to Schoolcraft.

The 26 acres composed the northeast section of Schoolcraft's original 139 acres. The 139 acres were purchased in 1962 for \$250,000. They are located between Six and Seven Mile with frontage on Haggerty.

LINDNER KNEW that the Highway Dept. couldn't condemn the 26 acres since it doesn't hold that power over educational institutions. So it was up to Schoolcraft to sell, trade or stand in the way of the expressway.

He told then college president Eric Bradner that Schoolcraft would save money by arranging a trade with the Highway Dept. rather than selling that portion of the land and attempting to purchase land adjacent to the college on Haggerty.

Bradner and the board of trustees agreed, and in November of 1967 an agreement was reached to "exchange land needed for the highway for land needed by the college that was contiguous to and suitable for college purposes," Lindner said.

The terms "contiguous to and suitable for" are the crucial ones in the agreement because they required that the land purchased by the Highway Dept. for the swap had to be suitable for construction of college buildings.

The Highway Dept. spotted three lots facing Haggerty for the trade, but Schoolcraft had to prove "to their satisfaction that this land was necessary for our purposes and that we had use for the land because it was detached from the normal highway right-of-way," Lindner said.

With a rapidly expanding student population, this task was accomplished by showing plans for expansion.

So an agreement was reached to exchange 26 acres of college land for 25 acres of improved land. The 25 acres also included three large homes for which Schoolcraft had to pay only the total salvage cost of \$7,500. The homes alone had been estimated at \$20,000 to \$35,000 in value.

BUT LINDNER wasn't finished. In the agreement, he arranged for the Highway Dept. to put up over a mile of fencing along the college property that borders on the expressway. The agreement also stipulates that the department relocate all of the college's drains and sewers, put some type of identification of Schoolcraft on the ex-

pressway and let the college use any surplus dirt from the exchanged land.

Another added bonus in the agreement was the option to buy 25 acres of land also bordering the expressway IF it became landlocked. This was added because if it became landlocked it would "have no value to anyone but the college," Lindner said.

"So then we entered into Phase II which was to make the Barron property (named for the former owners) landlocked," he said.

THE COLLEGE did this by purchasing a six acre lot on Haggerty for \$72,000 which includes a home that is now used for college offices.

Schoolcraft also bought the back four acres of the Newman House (also on Haggerty) from the Archdiocese of Detroit for \$19,000. These purchases closed off access to the Barron property from the west side.

Lindner then went to the Trinity Baptist Church on Six Mile which had the only other property abutting the Barron land.

The church agreed to swap 4.2 acres for 5.3 acres of the Barron land if Schoolcraft bought it.

This agreement landlocked the Barron property and gave Schoolcraft room for an exit onto Six Mile.

SCHOOLCRAFT is currently negotiating for the

purchase of the Barron land for 85 per cent of what the State Highway Dept. paid for it, or \$161,000.

When all the deals are final, Schoolcraft will consist of 183 acres. Including a 9.5 acre site purchased in 1965 for \$35,000 for a parking lot, the college has spent a total of \$496,000 for land which today is valued at \$1.66 million.

It has plenty of room for expansion and will use the three homes it acquired in one swap for offices.

But the savings to the taxpayer totaled in the thousands of dollars. Schoolcraft would have needed more land and would have had to spend tax dollars to improve the 26 acres which it swapped with the state highway department.

Considering property values and legal fees, Lindner said, "I think it's reasonable to assume we saved the college \$100,000."





workshop as well as a place for storage.

This means that the basement must be protected at all times against flooding, both for health reasons and to

prevent damage to valuable equipment.

The device to do the job is a sump pump or cellar drainer, according to the bureau.

## Christmas Gift For The Home

Good family gifts—something everyone can share—are hard to find. Now The Better Floors Council has come up with a gem: do-it-yourself floor tile. Adhesive-backed vinyl asbestos tile to recover the family room, a hall, the bath, dining room or basement is a practical, thoughtful and comparatively inexpensive gift. It also provides a project in which the entire family can participate.

According to the council, retile a 10' x 15' room can be done in as little as two hours. And with the new self-stick tile, you can replace the furniture and walk on the floor as soon as the job is finished.

No advance preparation is necessary if the floor is smooth and free from wax. Clean it thoroughly, let it dry, start tiling. All you do is peel the paper from the back of the tile, position it carefully, and press down.

The important thing to remember when installing floor tile is to be sure and start from the exact center of the room. And be sure each tile is correctly placed before you push down because the adhesive is very strong. If you follow the simple installation instructions on the package you won't go wrong.

If you don't know where to buy vinyl asbestos tile, look in the Yellow Pages under "Floors—Materials & Laying." Resilient flooring manufacturers supporting The Better Floors Council are Amtico, Azrock, Flintkote, GAF and Kentile.

## Recessed Lighting Captures Beauty Of Accent Piece

You've finally bought that special painting or sculpture, and after much reshuffling of furniture, picked the perfect place to display it. Then, what's wrong?

Often, accent pieces look different (better?) in the store or gallery than in the home. This is because professional gallery owners understand the effect proper lighting has on an object d'art.

To capture the beauty of an accent piece, you need recessed lighting. Recessed lighting is built in, structurally installed in special fixtures above the ceiling.

Only its decorative trim or diffusing element is visible on the ceiling surface.

To accent paintings or wall decorations, a directional (aimed at the object) recessed fixture is recommended. For best results, the recessed unit should be located on a line approximately 20 to 24 inches from the picture or wall decoration (unless the manufacturer specifies otherwise).

Here are a few other lighting pointers from GTE Sylvania. Ask your hardware man to show you how the following work:

• Internally adjustable downlights and eyeballs throw an attractive oval pattern of light on the object. The eyeball has the added advantage of 358 degrees rotation, allowing finer adjustment.

• To confine the light exactly to the picture frame, use an adjustable shutter pinpoint spot.

• For a grouping of several pictures, a series of recessed downlights can be used. Place these about three feet apart, and you'll have a handsome pattern of scallops on the wall to enhance the grouping.

# Borgess Wins 2 In Tourney

It could be an interesting season of basketball at Bishop Borgess High School.

The Spartan cagers are coming off a 5-11 season and are sporting a new coach in Jim Brisky, who is head baseball mentor in the spring.

Brisky coached the junior varsity basketball squad for three seasons, posting a perfect 14-0 mark last winter. Brisky's "rookie season" will not sport a perfect record, however, as Borgess kicked off its '72-'73 campaign in the

eight-team Southgate Aquinas Thanksgiving Tournament with two wins and one loss.

CATHOLIC CENTRAL won the tourney over Aquinas, 66-65.

Borgess was knocked into the losers bracket in the first round with a loss to Aquinas, 93-55.


"We just got blown off the court," said Brisky. "Three of my starters had just finished football a week prior and we just didn't have it together."

One player who did have it together for Borgess was senior co-captain and forward Mark Sopko. The 6-3 Spartan who averaged 20 points per game last year opened up with 26 points and followed with games of 33 and 18 for a tourney total of 71 points.

AQUINAS was paced by Tom Porter with 33 points and Dave Jiles with 23.

The second game was a different story for Borgess.

The Spartans jumped to an 18-14 lead against Carlton Gibraltar at the end of one quarter and led at the half, 30-29.



Carlton spurred ahead after three quarters, 53-47, but it was Sopko's turn to shine in the fourth stanza.

BORGESS outscored Carlton, 19-11 with Sopko popping in 17 of the Borgess 19 points to make the final count 66-64.

Sopko finished with 33 points, the lone Spartan in double figures.

Everything started to jell for Borgess and Brisky by the third and final game. Borgess met Tri-River competitor Southgate and after one quarter it was a deadlock at 12 all.

Borgess moved ahead at the half, 26-22, and gradually pushed forward, winning by 22 points.

It was a balanced scoring effort that crushed Southgate.

SOPKO led all with 18 points, Greg Drypen had 15, Mike Milosch added 12, and Rich Schornack totaled 10.

"You could see a vast improvement from game one to game three," said Brisky.

Borgess will be getting its first taste of Double A competition this Friday, Dec. 1, at home against Divine Child.

"Shrine and Divine Child should be the top teams in the six school Double A," said Brisky. "Everyone is picking us to finish dead last, but I think we'll surprise a few teams."

Brisky is not keeping it a secret that his squad centers around the talent of Sopko, with four other seniors on the Spartan roster.

CO-CAPTAIN Shawn McCarthy is a starting 5-11 guard and averaged 14 points a game last year. At center is 6-4 Rich Schornack. Craig Weiland is a 5-11 guard and Paul Davis a 6-1 forward.

Junior hopefuls are 5-11 guard Dan Kelly, 5-11 forward Greg Drypen, 6-2 Tom Bolyer and 6-1 Mike Milosch.

Brisky has high hopes of a winning season to make it all interesting.

## Northwest Race A 4-Way Tangle

The little round ball is sure to take many a crazy bounce this basketball season in the Northwest Suburban Conference.

Livonia Franklin will be out to defend its first cage crown ever, but it's not going to be an easy lay-up.

The weak pony of the Northwest in Birmingham Groves has "slipped to the Met Suburban Conference and in blew Garden City East, football championship and all.

And to make matters even worse for Franklin Coach Bob Visser, this could be the year for basketball at North Farmington and John Glenn.

FRANKLIN WON it all last year with an 8-2 mark with Glenn second at 6-4. North Farmington finished strong at 5-5, Thurston at 3-7 and Oak Park and Groves brought up the rear.

Groves is out and GC East is in.

East was the No. 1 team in Observerland last year with a 17-5 record, making it as far as the state quarter-finals under the direction of Billy Joe Young.

"I don't really know much about the Northwest Suburban," said Billy Joe. "I know one thing... we will be holding our head high."

The four front-runners have to be GC East, Franklin, John Glenn and North Farmington, with Thurston and Oak Park almost shoos in for the fifth and sixth slots.

NORTH FARMINGTON'S Ken Dean has seven returning lettermen, four of them starters. Glenn's Gordon Davis has three starters back. Franklin's Bob Visser lost all of his starters but has a transfer student from Reece, Mich. who stands 6-6 and weighs 205 pounds.

GC East sports two returning starters and four other returning lettermen.

The Northwest race ought to be one of the tops in the state.

Franklin has two letter-winners back in senior captain Jeff Waterstone at 5-9 and

senior Guy Burke at 6-1. The basketballer that came to Coach Visser's rescue is senior Tim Fischer, a 6-6 center from Reece.

The Patriots' No. 4 man will be 6-6, 180 pound junior Kevin Kaseta who scored an average of 16 points on the junior varsity.

THE FIFTH MAN slot at a wing position is a battle between 6-1 junior Jamie Knapp, and 6-2 seniors Brad Emons and Kurt Caldwell.

"We need experience bad," said Visser. "We blend well together but these first few games are the key."

Franklin opens with Wayne Friday, follows with Plymouth and it's on to Garden City East on Dec. 8.

"Our key will be for our two big men to stay out of foul trouble," added Visser. "With a good start, anything could happen."

"I think 8-2, and maybe 7-3 could win it all this year," said Visser who currently stands with a 34-34 mark with varsity at Franklin. "Our trend has been upward and this year will be no exception."

Franklin is currently on a seven game winning streak in the Northwest.

BILLY JOE YOUNG is starting his 12th season at GC East with a 199-95 record. Young failed to reach the 200 mark last year in the quarter-final loss to Pontiac Central. "Inexperience may tap us a little this season," said Young. But we have a good hustling, intelligent group and we are going to win some ball games.


"We have to improve our shooting and have to dominate the boards."

THE TWO returning starters in Young's attack will be 6-3 1/2 senior center John Grigal, who averaged 11 points last year, and 5-10 guard Randy Mastako, with a 10 point average.

The remaining Panther lineup will be made up of senior 6-4 1/2 Paul Haydon, 6-1 senior Bruce Taylor, 6-0 guards Tim Arner and Keith Anleitner and 6-1 forward Bernie Soya.

That's seven seniors, something unusual for East. The Glenn Rockets are hoping for a repeat of the takeoff last season which featured six straight wins.

ALL-LEAGUE 6-4 senior forward Dave Carlington will be the key to Davis' attack with a returning 14 point average. Two other starters back are 6-1 senior guard J.P. McBride with a 10 point



average and 6-3 1/2 junior forward Jeff Brittain.

"These three are the backbone of the squad," added Davis.

The remaining two berths feature a battle between 6-1 senior guard Mike Taylor, 6-1 senior guard Rick Aro and 6-4 junior Brian Kaluzay who was top scorer on last year's junior varsity with a 15 point average.

"We have as good a chance as any in the Northwest," said Davis. "No one team will dominate and three losses could still win it."

We now come to North Farmington, the "green team" of last season.

The color started changing near the end of last year with the Raiders showing they

## Thurston's Harding Wanted A Winner

Sometimes decisions just aren't meant to appear sweet on the outside.

And usually nobody but the person making the decision really knows of the inside.

Thurston High School junior Dave Harding made a decision and now has to stick by it.

THURSTON HIGH SCHOOL made a decision and away went one of the finest athletes in the area.

The 6-2, 200 pound junior who lettered in varsity football, basketball and baseball his sophomore year, and who was voted All-Northwest Suburban linebacker and Lineman of the Year this past season as well as winning All-Observerland honors, is no longer a Thurston student.

The day after football season ended, Harding obtained his transfer to Catholic Central High School, and was in the CC gym the following day in basketball drills for the upcoming season.

Thurston High School really scored one against itself and prep sports this time.

Section Nine in the handbook of the Michigan High School Athletic Association for junior and senior high schools states: "A student who transfers from one high school to another is ineligible to participate in an interscholastic athletic contest for one full semester in the school to which he transfers."

Now, like any rule, there are exceptions, 12 in this case.

No. 9 says that if a student transfers for educational reasons and if the principal of each of the two schools involved certifies that there was no undue influence for athletic purposes, then the student is eligible to participate immediately.

Such was the case with Dave Harding.

Catholic Central's principal and Thurston's Jack Harms signed the paper stating Dave was transferring only for educational reasons, but try to tell that to any coach in the area.

Dave was a 3.14 student at Thurston, a member of the varsity and in the eyes of Athletic Director Don Reel, just an outstanding student in every aspect.

The "waiver" was signed and sealed by the two principals, then director Reel was notified and then the football and baseball coach at Thurston, Emil Majeski, not to mention basketball coach Dan Bennett.

"What can I say?" asked Reel. "Disappointment is about the only fitting word."

DISAPPOINTMENT is now the word in almost every sport at Thurston.

An All-State candidate in two sports has now slipped away.

"I thought about this move for a long time," said Harding. "I gave it a try at Thurston but things just didn't work out."

"Catholic Central takes better care of its athletes and has better records," added Harding. "I don't feel any regret about the move."

"Catholic Central is a tougher school and my chances of getting a scholarship are better there," added Dave. "Thurston has no winning tradition and more people look at you and see you play at a better school like Catholic Central."

"I didn't feel like sticking it out with a loser," concluded the now Catholic Central basketball player.

"In no way was I recruited," added Harding. "I made the decision on my own with my parents' help."

Just try to convince me that the transfer was for educational reasons.

## MSU Memoir-- Duffy Daugherty

Legends usually are rooted in solid fact, but passage of time and tricky memory eventually make them bigger than life.

So it surely will be with Duffy Daugherty. Ten years from now even Duffy or wife Francie will have trouble sorting out the truth from the sentimental hyperbole about the man and his career.

In such circumstance, the course of reason is to go back to the record. For Duffy, it speaks as loudly and eloquently as the most extravagant alumni bull session tales in 1982 possibly could do.

Some of the diamond-hard and shining facts are these:

He worked his way from a Pennsylvania coal mine to the pinnacle of national fame as a coach, a wit, a beloved personality and a public relations ambassador for Michigan State.

He suffered a broken neck playing college football at Syracuse but came back to captain his team as a senior.

He went into military service in World War II as a private and came out a major.

He devoted eight years, one at Syracuse and seven at MSU, as a lightly regarded assistant to Head Coach Biggie Munn, despite the fact he coached some lines that became known as "Duffy's Toughies."

He took over the seemingly thankless chore of succeeding Munn as State's head coach and not only didn't fumble the ball but carried it into new end zones.

He won two outright Big Ten titles, and placed second four times. Seven times his teams finished in the national top 10 in wire service balloting. His 1965 team was No. 1, his 1955 and 1966 teams No. 2.

He developed 33 major first team All-Americans and 51 first team All-Big Ten players.

Must games for State always are those with Michigan and Notre Dame, and Duffy came out 10-7-2 (wins, losses and ties) with the Wolverines and 10-7-1 with the Irish. Notre Dame thought so much of him he had first shot at the head coaching job there but elected to stay at State, thereby opening the door to Ara Parseghian. Along the way, there were countless

other big head coaching positions tossed into his lap.

He battled the serious business attitude of many of the people associated with the game and sought to make football fun for players and coaches as well as fans. As an exemplar of this philosophy, he became known for his "Duffyisms," spontaneous witticisms which have had the whole nation chuckling.

He was the first man ever to be named "Coach of the Year" twice by the Football Writers of America. He has coached in 11 All-Star bowl games, and won a big majority of them. He wrote a column for the Associated Press for three years.

And that's just the top of it. In Duffy's case the legend will have a hard time outgrowing the facts.

ONCE ASKED whom he was happiest to see returning for a new season, he replied "me."





# Franklin Football-Gone To The Computers

In this age of computer this and computer that, Franklin High's football team has come to fit the times.

Computers have been pushed into operation to tackle the challenge of scouting prep rivals at Franklin, with the man behind the machine being offensive line coach Armand Vigna.

Vigna is a counselor and two year building research director at Franklin in addition to his coaching duties. He also has learned computer programming in line with his football knowledge.

The scouting process began to take roots in '68 when George Lovich took over head coaching duties and Vigna the offense.

LOVICH and Vigna got full wind of the "print-out" system from Amherst football coach Bill Thurston.

"Once I saw it, I knew we had to fit it into our system," said Lovich.

What does this system entail? This is how it was described to me by computer-minded Vigna:

In scouting a football game, you diagram each play with the following information: down, yards to go, hash-mark, what yard line, what drive, what quarter, score, last two minutes in first half, and the last two minutes in second half.

THE DIAGRAMS are then ready to be transferred to a code sheet and IBM cards.

Meanwhile Vigna has programmed the computer to analyze football plays breaking them all down into three brackets: running, passing and field position, and then into 17 complete breakdowns such as field position by zone or hash-mark; running play by formation and which hole; and passing into which zone.

The code sheet is then transferred onto the IBM cards.

TEACHER-AID Barbara Kizer aided the Frank-

lin staff with this task. It took about 20 minutes and out would come an IBM card on every offensive play that they were scouting.

That was the procedure taken to break down a game.

Once Franklin had scouted a team three or four times, which could be done from a game film, all the IBM cards from that team could be fed into the computer and out would come a "print-out."

The "print-out" tells Lovich and Vigna anything they want to know about the opposing team in the form of plays they ran.

"A football team, the whole picture is in front of you," said Vigna. "It reveals the team's tendency; some seem so intricate and subtle, that you couldn't catch it."

EVERY PLAY breakdown will appear in the "print-out." A balanced squad will not reveal that much.

"We would build our game plan on defense and the key," said Lovich. "Everything looks great on paper after we finish analyzing, but it all boils down to how well the kids execute their assignments."

Lovich received a "print-out" from Vigna on every team a week prior to his game with that team.

That "print-out" became Lovich's bible.


"He would sleep, eat and teach with that in his grasp," said Vigna.

Since Franklin has started using the key, the Patriots have piled up a 32-8-1 mark.

"THE COMPUTER doesn't win a ball game for you," said Lovich. "No matter how much paper work we do, it all boils down to the kids and how well they execute."

"It definitely gives one team a defensive edge over the other," added Lovich.

What's the next step with computers and football? How about electronic referees? Start working, Armand.

Will you be a statistic this year? Ski injuries stand out like a sore thumb. Who needs a cast and crutches? The percentage of ski injuries to number of skiers is very small but we always see some guy or gal sitting around the lodge with a beautifully autographed cast, getting all kinds of sympathy from a seemingly endless line of well-wishers.

How do those injuries occur? The National Ski Patrol tells us they usually happen to beginners and generally fall into three categories: skiing out of control (speed, not knowing how to stop and generally being on slopes too advanced for them), equipment failure (bindings set too loose or too tight, opening too soon or too late in a fall), and poor physical condition.

It is to the last that we want to direct our remarks. The sport of skiing demands strength, flexibility, balance, and endurance. In our everyday living we are seldom called upon for any of these attributes. Serious skiers are aware of the importance of the above and are involved in extra-curricular activities that prepare them physically

for the demanding skills involved. You can spot these people; they seem to have a spring in their step, a smile on their face, confidence in themselves, slim, and pride in their bodies.

As we get older we tend to lose the tone in our muscles and they tend to get "flabby," due to lack of use. In the sport of skiing we need not only strength of muscles but muscular endurance. Have you ever watched beginners try to get up after a fall? The overweight skiers usually have the most difficulty. But often it is just the lack of arm and shoulder strength! Much of Michigan skiing is of the rope tow. Many skiers become more tired from going uphill than they do downhill!

Holding that rope requires strength and muscular endurance. In other words, the ability to repeat a movement without getting overly tired. Needless to say the legs and abdominal muscles are the "work" muscles in skiing. With snow conditions very unpredictable, you may be called on to ski powder snow, wet snow, ice, etc. These variances place more demand on those muscles than you realize. Try sidestepping on ice sometime!

THE EXERCISES you see on this page are just a few that will help build strength in those "key" muscles. You build endurance by repeating the exercises and building up the number of repetitions over a period of time. They do very little for cardio-vascular endurance (heart and lungs). For this you need rhythmic exercise, such as jogging, swimming, cycling, skating, running in place or jump roping.

Any exercise that causes bending and stretching is good for you. The quickest way to build strength is weight lifting. The more resistance you use the more the muscles have to work. If you have young children you have "built in weights"! Try picking them up several times a day.

Don't worry about getting large muscles. This is an excuse many women use. You'd have to work extremely hard and long to build large muscles. Bonnie Prudden once said, "under every curve there's a muscle-no muscles, no curves!" The average American is overweight. The most practical exercise is pushing away from the table. The secret of weight control is diet. No machine will remove weight.

In order to lose weight and maintain it is by burning more calories than you consume. You'll burn a certain amount of calories from ordinary activities. You should do more of the type of exercises that cause you to perspire. Then you know you've had a workout.

Don't be a statistic this year. Get ready the sensible way.

In the accompanying photos, Julie Sines of the Livonia Y, demonstrates some of the basic exercises. Miss Sines recommends starting out slowly and gradually increasing the tempo.

**EXERCISE 1-TOE TOUCH**  
Stand erect, feet about a foot apart, arms over your head. Bend forward and touch the floor between your feet, keeping your legs straight. Return to starting position. Repeat.

**EXERCISE 2-CHEST, LEG RAISING**  
Lie face down, legs straight and together, arms stretched sideways. Raise entire upper body and both legs from floor as high as possible. Return to starting position.

**EXERCISE 3-SIT-UPS**  
Lie on back, legs straight and together, hands behind neck. Keeping back as straight as possible, move to sitting position, touching knee with opposite elbow. Return to starting position. Repeat, touching other knee with opposite elbow.

**EXERCISE 4-PUSH-UPS**  
Lie face down, with hands under the shoulders, legs straight and together. Push down on the palm of the hands and repeat.

## Turf Tips, Quips

Michigan's thoroughbred racing season closes Saturday at the Detroit Race Course, which is struggling through the poorest campaign since the early years of operation, and just one day before the closing Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley will announce the allotment of running dates for 1973.

State law requires the commissioner to release the dates no later than Dec. 1 and those for harness racing no later than Dec. 15.

There doesn't appear to be any disagreement between Hazel Park and DRC officials over the 1973 season. Matter of fact, it appears that each actually knows its dates already or at least a reasonable facsimile of what to expect.

Shirley has been in close contact with Bernie Hartman and Herb Tyner, new owners of Hazel Park, as well as the DRC management for the past several weeks going over plans for 1973.

Thus, it isn't going to be any surprise when the dates finally are announced. Shirley and the track bosses have thrashed everything out and all that remains is the official announcement.

Rumors are that Hazel Park will receive 120 days and the DRC will be allotted 90 days, as requested, with the option of another 30 days if the meeting is better than that of 1972.

Once again we take pen in hand (or rather a trusty typewriter) to congratulate personable Dick Wilson for his new assignment as vice president and general manager of the Detroit Racing Association.

Dick, who recently was named vice president in

charge of all racing operations of Castleton Industries Inc., owner of the DRC as well as tracks in Pompano Park, Fla. and St. Augustine, Fla. and the dog racing plant in Hollywood, Fla., succeeds Paul Ryder.

**HIS OPERATION** of Wolverine Raceway in the past three years has made that harness racing track one of the best in the nation. During the past season, he directed Wolverine to the first million dollar handle in Michigan harness racing history. A year before, Wolverine became the only state track to go past the \$900,000 mark.

The imagination of Wilson and his staff in promoting races has done wonders for Wolverine and we feel it will do the same thing for the runners, who have had rough going at the DRC for the past two years.

Wilson's first step in his new post was to rehire Tom Dorsey, longtime leader of the Michigan thoroughbred colony, as his No. 1 aide. Dorsey will have the title of director of racing. We know that his name on the staff will be a great help in building better relations with horsemen, especially those from Michigan.

The Jackson-at-Northville Downs program tonight (Wednesday) is headlined by a pace that looms as one of the better mid-week events of the early season.

The eighth race finds Blu Water Duke, a winner in 2:08.3 in its last outing, resuming a duel with Miss Brenda, who was a nose back last week. Miss Brenda drew to the inside of the Duke this time and that may be a deciding factor.

The field also includes Miracle Wendy, owned by Stan Jason and Cass Peters of Dearborn Heights, who won a week ago in a quick 2:05.2, one of the fastest miles to date.

Double G. Battle, with a specialty of coming from far back in the stretch, is also in the field of eight.

There appears to be little question now as to the pacer of

the year and probably the greatest of all time.

The honors have to go to Albatross, the brilliant four-year-old, who won the \$50,000 Western Pace on the west coast by more than five lengths in a blistering 1:56.

The victory was No. 19 for Albatross in 24 starts and boosted his world record earnings for a pacer to \$1,156,470. The Bird will end his racing career this week in the \$100,000 American Pacing Classic at Hollywood Park near Los Angeles. Then he retires to stud duties.

Strangely enough, Silent Majority, one of the top contenders for three-year-old of the year honors, was fifth and last in the Western. Nansemond, a victor over Albatross on four occasions in the past two years including the 1972 Little Brown Jug, was second with longshot Bye Bye Max third.

Michigan harness racing fans will long remember The Bird, winner of the four year old Matron at Wolverine Raceway last spring when he attracted the second largest crowd in state history and was responsible for the first million dollar handle at a Michigan harness racing track.

# Henry Family Donates Yule Ornaments

**PLYMOUTH** Ornaments sparkling among the boughs of the Christmas tree in Dunning-Hough Library are more than just pretty decorations.

Each one represents hours of loving planning and happy work on the part of a woman to whom Christmas was a very special time.

The 85 ornaments, each individually designed and hand created, are the work of the late Mrs. Mary Henry, wife of City Commissioner Ernie Henry. The family donated them for use on the library's tree.

Mrs. Henry began making the ornaments about 13 years ago. The first two or three were made from kits, but she soon enlarged and improved on the commercial ideas until she was turning out her own originals.

As her involvement grew, she began using other materials and improvising. She would travel miles to find the correct shade of velvet to match a certain hue of sequins. Often costume jewelry was taken apart to get "jewels" for individual pieces. Each sequin was fastened individually, using toothpicks and glue. One

ornament might take more than eight hours to complete.

She used materials ranging from ordinary articles found in the home to velvets, satins and pearls. The ornaments go from the whimsical, such as Santa, elves and a snowman, to more sophisticated recessed scenes lined with sequins.

Sometimes Mrs. Henry found herself making Christmas ornaments in July and August, such as corn husk angels. Handicrafts made from corn husks date back to Colonial times, when mothers used them to create dolls and toys.

**THE HUSKS** were collected when corn was in season. They were carefully dried and bleached. Then some were dyed various colors. The forms were sewn by hand and other husks were shredded to make fringed skirts and hair and flowers.

By making a few ornaments each year, Mrs. Henry soon had more than enough for one tree and usually gave some to friends. As a result, examples of her work reach from California to New York and Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

Ornaments were just one of Mrs. Henry's many interests. She was self-taught and a perfectionist.

Among her projects were quilting, cutting and polishing gems for jewelry, carving apal cameos, needlepoint pictures and upholstery, dressmaking, toy making and crewel work.

In later years, arthritis affected some of Mrs. Henry's finer work but she tried to keep her hands active with knitting and crocheting. One of her last projects was china painting.

Doing the actual work was her main satisfaction, her family said. After a piece was finished, it lost appeal to her and she was soon looking for something new to try.

## OBSERVATION POINT

Election '72: Democrats Blew It  
By Ignoring Suburban Viewpoint

Enough dust has settled since the Nov. 7 election so that the shape of the political landscape here in the suburbs can now be seen fairly clearly.

President Nixon, as everybody expected, ran like gangbusters here, getting votes from Republicans, Wallace voters, and disaffected Democrats alike. He easily carried communities such as Livonia (normally regarded as mildly Democratic), and he won in Southfield (usually felt to be solidly Democratic).

Most national political pundits have remarked that the president's coattails were short in this election, citing as proof that the Democrats stayed in control of the Congress. But, in Michigan, at least, the President's coattails were long and strong.

Sen. Robert Griffin narrowly defeated Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley, mostly by running very well in the suburbs where Kelley had hoped to do better.

**PRESIDENT NIXON'S** strength (or Sen. McGovern's weakness) also affected two congressional races that were originally supposed to be very close.

In the 2nd District, Livonia's State Rep. Marvin Stempien felt he had carved out a newly apportioned district which added liberal Ann Arbor to Democratic Livonia and Monroe to provide an ideal district to unseat GOP

incumbent Marvin Esch. When the votes finally were added up, Stempien had been overwhelmed, losing even his home base of Livonia to Esch and failing even to carry his own precinct.

In the 18th District - carved out of south-central and eastern Oakland County to serve as a nice Democratic district for Southfield's State Sen. Dan Cooper - staunch conservative Robert Huber was expected to go down. Most observers felt that Huber was so far to the right that even in a Republican year he wouldn't have much chance against the well-organized Cooper. But the Nixon coattails held firm, and Huber will be taking the oath of office in January.

Other congressional races didn't provide much of a test. Congresswoman Martha Griffiths, an old pro who stayed away from the classical liberal issues and talked instead about abuses in welfare and income maintenance programs, won easily in the new 17th District (including Farmington, Southfield and Redford Township), against weak opposition. William Ford, whose 15th District includes Westland and Garden City and is among the most solidly Democratic in the state, did well, again facing weak opposition.

**THE NIXON COATTAILS** extended farther down the ballot, though with less certain effect.

In the 36th State House District (Westland and Livonia), Democrat John Markes had been expected to be a shoo-in, but only barely edged out Ralph Miller. Democrat Joe Forbes carried his Southfield-Oak Park district, but against an opponent who ran an almost totally non-visible campaign, and Republican Ray Baker did the same thing in his Farmington-Southfield district.

There were few other surprises this far down the ballot, although I happen to think that Republican Mary Dumas owes her seat on the Wayne County Board to the president, since Democrat Eldon Raymond ran a good campaign and has a good political name in Livonia.

**THIS ELECTION** was the first ever held when the suburbs had more popularity than any other sector of American society. Overall, it was a disaster for the Democrats.

I happen to think these two facts are not just coincidence.

For 40 years, from Roosevelt to Johnson, the Democratic Party has consistently sought to help the lot of the working man, to improve his pay, shorten his hours, and bring him and his family up into the ranks of the middle class. The process has worked very well, and the former members of the working class have now bought houses and moved to the suburbs, where they

are more interested in keeping property taxes down and making sure their school systems are high in quality and free of the scourge of busing than they are in helping out the poor and the blacks who have been left behind.


President Nixon's campaign was brilliantly geared to attract votes from this group. He stressed economy in government and pledged no new taxes; he opposed cross-district busing and suggested that the Democrats were the party of radicals and muddle-headed social reformers; he argued that the country had enough social legislation on the books already and urged the nation away from permissiveness and back to the old fashioned virtues.

Against this, the Democrats were by and large ineffective.

For years, the party has been led by liberals (whatever that means nowadays) who attracted votes from a coalition anchored on the working man. But as time went on, the liberal leadership of the party gradually forgot that they were essentially a minority force in American politics with a limited mandate for social change from the gradually suburbanized working class. They figured that because they were correct in their view of the world, everybody else would recognize that and vote accordingly.

That didn't happen, and where it didn't happen was here in the suburbs.

2 'Resignations'  
Point To A Disease

On successive nights last week, Plymouth's city manager and Farmington's superintendent of schools submitted letters of resignation which, in part at least, appear symptomatic of a disease which is proving all too prevalent among our elected boards, councils and commissions. It is called "administrative interference."

Neither Norman M. Gaffney of Plymouth nor Dr. Roderick J. Smith of Farmington quit because he had been offered a better job somewhere else. Nor does either man intend to leave his chosen profession, in Gaffney's case municipal government and in Smith's education.

In Farmington, where the school board voted 4-3 to accept the resignation, phrases such as "forced resignation" and "administrative differences" came into open discussion. In Plymouth, where Gaffney's resignation was accepted by the city commission, 7-0, no public comment was made at all. But in both cases it was obvious that a majority of elected representatives held the upper hand.

When it came to light that both men already had agreed to financial severance terms, it became all the more obvious that the polite way out had been mutually agreed upon rather than dismissal with its potential of public furor.

**ONE CANNOT** question the right of either of these legislative bodies to act as it did, but the suspicion is widespread that the increasing friction which led to these resignations can be summed up in the words spoken by the manager of another city, "They think they know more about my job than I do."

These have not been isolated changes in personnel at the level of chief executive, and we are not presenting a case either for Gaffney or Smith. What disturbs one is the rate of attrition which seems generally prevalent among municipal and school administrators across the land, and the lack

of a properly defined role for the boards, councils and commissions under whom they serve and who did the hiring in the first place.

The role of the appointed professional administrator in local government has become well established in the United States. The need was recognized as early as 1821 when Daniel Webster was a member of a Boston charter committee which proposed the appointment of "an efficient, responsible, and active executive officer."

It was only a quarter of a century later that school boards in the east began the practice of appointing school superintendents. The principle was the same, and still is -- to get a trained professional to run the show.

**IN THE BELIEF** that a direct parallel can be drawn between the responsibilities of a local school board and a local municipal council, we find the following paragraph to be intriguing. It is taken from a document published by the International City Manager's Association:

"The council is the governing body of the city, and the city manager is its agent in carrying out the policies which the council determines. It is understood that the council deals with administration only in a formal manner through the city manager, that administrative functions are at no time delegated to committees or to individual members of the council, and that department heads are selected and directed by the manager."

In other words, the hired administrator should be allowed to administer without usurpation of this authority by the elected politicians. The purpose of the latter is to establish policies and guidelines and then back off.

Rather, our boards and councils are a conglomerate of persons of varying interests and experience who too often interpret a ballot victory as a source of God-given authority and intelligence.

We suggest that it is time for a moratorium on "government by committee."

## Lottery, Dogs No Panaceas

Does the State of Michigan have to depend on legalized gambling as the only new method of raising needed dollars to bolster a sagging treasury?

Judging from the recent activities of the Legislature, it appears that way. For instance the lawmakers quickly approved a state lottery with the predictions that it would raise millions within a short time.

Judging from the success of the first drawing, one would have to conjecture that it will be some time before the new legalized gambling device proves its worth. Latest figures from those in charge indicate the state's share will be well over a million dollars, but that's before operating expenses are paid. We believe the total will be substantially less when the final report is made.

**RIGHT NOW** there's a bill before the House that has a great deal of bearing on the communities of Livonia and Northville, each of which receives considerable cash from the operations of horse race tracks within its confines. The bill is whether to legalize dog racing in Michigan.

Livonia receives \$600,000 annually from the state's share of the mutual handle for the operation of the Detroit Race Course, which is the home of the Detroit Racing Association and Wolverine Harness Raceway.

Northville is the recipient of almost \$300,000 from the operations at the Northville Downs harness racing plant.

For both communities, this is like reaching into the air and coming down with a handful of cash. Neither has to do much for

the money, and for each it is a tremendous boost in the annual budget.

Now there is a movement in Lansing to approve gambling on dog racing. For more years than one cares to think about, lobbyists have tried in vain to get such a bill passed. Generally it hasn't even come out of committee for consideration of the Senate and House.

**BUT THIS IS** a different year. The state is plagued with financial problems. There are those who believe the only way to get additional revenue is to play on the weaknesses of the electorate. And that weakness, from the viewpoint of the lawmakers, is gambling.

The popular thought is that legalizing gambling will hit a mortal blow to bookmakers and to organized crime which controls all of the illegal activities.

"The more people we can get into race tracks, licensed by the state, the less people will be interested in calling up their friendly bookie to make wagers on races," appears to be the general feeling among legislators.

"It is a painless way of extracting money for the state coffers since we'll just take a share of the mutual handle and bettors won't miss it a bit."

All of which may be true, but then one has to point to the fact that stories coming out of Lansing recently report that those behind the dog racing promotions have been busy warming the hot hands of some legislators with the green stuff that seems to have a definite effect on the final vote.

If this is the only way the promoters and lobbyists have of getting support for their project, then it's high time House members bear this in mind when they vote on the bill some time this week.

**THE BILL HAS** received approval in the Senate by a narrow margin. Now it rests with the House, and one wonders whether House members will remember the newspaper reports of payoffs or whether they will forget all about such stories. It would appear that any bill with a touch of impropriety would be immediately rejected - perhaps even left in committee to die. That's the way it should be in this instance.

The House should remember that harness racing has become a major business in Michigan in the past eight or 10 years. Breeding farms have blossomed in many parts of the state. Hundreds of persons are employed on a year round basis. There is winter activity throughout the state and actually racing around the calendar.

All of which will be endangered by the inroads of dog racing, which would have programs nightly and thus cut into the trotting operations.

There's more to the approval of such a bill than meets the eye immediately. It could hurt hundreds of workers more than it helps the state treasury, and members of the House should take a clear look before taking any action on an already tainted bill.

EDITOR:

This cutting across a lawn is O.K. for kindergartners for whom the edges of roads are dangerous, of course. But when kids reach near to the teens, this cutting across a neighbor's yard is selfish, wrong and terribly rude -- especially when to cut across at a corner home and yard, they walk or run noisily right past a living room window!

Lest you parents start thinking, "Who can this crab be who is such a child hater, let me assure you that I am not a crab, nor do I dislike your children. In fact, un-

derstanding human nature as well as I do, and remembering my childhood when nine in my family (kids) tore around to play in our neighborhood, I realize how difficult today's child has it around his neighborhood -- no nearby parks, not an empty field available to play baseball in, nor are there any organized groups to get these idle youngsters together in true constructive endeavors or hobbies and play and work.

For most children, all that's available is the neighbor's yards or streets in which to play ball, or his own yard, and older children have outgrown their own yards.

It's true that neighbors must be tolerant of these children, because as the cartoon states so explicitly, one child saying to another, "what are you gonna be when you grow up, if the neighbors let you?" It's true that much of what a child learns is what he gleans through his peers, from his

churches and schools and from his own stomping grounds. If I were to tell you, parents, that your child egged the inside of our car four months before Halloween, you wouldn't believe it! If I told you your child shot a hole in a brand new car's head light you would say, "He couldn't have!" If I were to tell you he

threw a stone into a window and broke it while we were not at home, you'd answer, "Not my child!" Yet a child did do these things.

Selfish parents and selfish neighbors will have children who are also self-centered, and can't show consideration or courtesy to others.

# Local Officials Ponder Rouge Cost

Local officials already are raising an eyebrow at a \$253 million proposal to reduce pollution and eliminate flooding of the Rouge River basin.

All 46 affected communities would have to hold public hearings because they will be asked to share the cost, based on the expected benefit.

For example, Wayne County Commissioner John J. McCann (D-Livonia) said that "with the amount of money and the cooperation of two counties needed, it doesn't seem realistic to me."

THE PLAN was financed by a \$35,000 contribution from Wayne and Oakland counties 15 months ago and was drawn up by the engineering firm of Wade, Trim & Associates of Taylor. Even the \$35,000 study stirred a controversy, particularly in the Oakland board.

The idea is that much of the Rouge's pollution and flooding are due to unified waste water and storm water sewers. When holding basins become filled during a heavy rain, the water in the basins spills out into the river.

The plan calls for a giant underground drain to take the spillover.

Two years ago, Henry ("Cap") Herrick, outgoing Wayne County drain commissioner, predicted in local speeches that such a project would cost \$250 million. He was right on the target.

BRIEFLY, THE plan calls for construction of a tunnel 18 miles long, extending from Hunter Boulevard in Birmingham to the Detroit River. This tunnel then would be fed by all the branches of the Rouge and would effect every section of Observerland.

Aside from the construction of the tunnel, the plan calls for the acquisition of 791 acres of flood plain for the establishment of parks. If accomplished, there would be an almost continuous green belt from Birmingham to Dearborn.

The plan further calls for the improving of 10 bridges crossing the main channel of the Rouge and the phasing out of all septic tank systems in the drainage area and con-

structing new sewers. Construction of these sewers would be financed by the local communities and would be apart from the estimated \$253 million price tag.

THE PROPOSED tunnel would connect with the encasement of the Rouge in a concrete trough south of Michigan Avenue that is now being constructed by the Army Corps of Engineers to increase the water carrying capacity.

The tunnel, a new facet of the plan, would increase in size from 15 feet to 17 feet to 35 feet and later to 45 feet in

diameter as it reached the point south of Michigan.

Under the proposal a seven member commission would be named and would include the state agricultural director and three officials from each county.

One of its first tasks would be to ask the state to authorize the sale of bonds to finance the project. It has been estimated that the bond proposal would cost the taxpayers \$20.4 million a year for 50 years.

Before this is done, the public hearings would have to be held in all 46 communities which drain into the Rouge. The commission would decide

the communities' share of the cost, based upon the benefit they received from the project.

THE MOST expensive portion of the project and the one that is certain to be the most controversial, is the building of the tunnel. Not only is the initial cost high but the system would cost \$3.9 million annually to operate.

The second phase of the program, according to the report of the study, also may be headed for trouble. This is the phase calling for acquisition of 791 acres of flood land, much of it

privately owned, in Oakland County.

These acres would be developed into playlots, softball diamonds, nature trails, bike paths, tennis courts and swimming pools. This cost is estimated at \$24.4 million with an annual maintenance cost of \$80,000.

All of these projects are along the main branch, but the study advocates the expenditure of \$350,000 for studies of the eight branches—and mostly the middle branch that runs from Walled Lake through Northville, Plymouth and Livonia on the way to the river.

WHILE MAKING the study, the engineers bypassed as impractical an underground retaining basin or approximately 1,100 above-ground basins. They also ruled out a proposal for the widening of the stream and the straightening of the curves, claiming such moves would interfere with the river's flood plain and the displacement of numerous homes along the way.

After learning of the report, drain officials in both Wayne and Oakland Counties ventured the opinion that it would be some time before such a

project is undertaken—if at all. The matter becomes a problem of priorities, according to Stanley B. Patterson, chief engineer of the Wayne County drain commission. He called the project "feasible," but questioned whether Wayne County would give it high priority.

In Oakland County James Pemberton, chief engineer, stated that at least three years of study are needed on the proposals—even if both counties approved of the idea.

From the start, Oakland County has been critical of the

idea, claiming that it was a ruse on the part of Wayne County to gain financial help to clean up its pollution problem.

McCann, who represents the Livonia-Plymouth-Northville area on the Wayne County Board of Commissioners, remarked, "I have read the account of the report and I still don't know just what it means."

"There's one way to get the job done, and that is to drain Walled Lake (which is artificial) and start all over."

Meanwhile the commissioners of both counties have taken the plan under advisement.

## For Some, An Age-Old Question :

As preparation for the Christmas season begins throughout Observerland, an annual dilemma comes to the fore again by one segment of its population — Jewish families in the area.

They must decide how they can best help their children grow in appreciation of their Jewish traditions while the buzz of Christmas excitement goes on all around them.

"It's not easy to be a Jew in suburbia," said one father whose young family is preparing to begin the celebration of Hanukkah with the lighting of the first candle Thursday evening.

"When we were growing up, most of the neighborhood was Jewish, and there was less exposure to television and not quite so many Santas around," he added.

MRS. NORMAN ZACKS of Livonia, mother of four and former Livonia School District teacher, has lived with the problem long enough to find it less pressing as time goes by.

"More and more Jewish families are deciding to celebrate Hanukkah by our ancient traditions," she said. "and more and more Christians are interested in learning about our Feast of

Lights while they celebrate Christmas."

In fact, Mrs. Zacks added, she sees some danger of over-commercialization happening to Hanukkah as it has to Christmas.

When Hanukkah comes early, as it does this year, there is less push for extensive decoration of the home, Mrs. Zacks said.

"We decorate very simply and exchange gifts only on Hanukkah," she added.

BUT HER CHILDREN have learned to appreciate other traditions of the season, she said.

"They've helped trim Christmas trees in friends' homes and invited their friends here for some of our celebrations," Mrs. Zacks said. "We've even had the opportunity to be a part of Eastern Orthodox church ceremonies, which come on Jan. 6."

"And I can't say Santa Claus has been a problem. They know Santa is for Christmas. My children have talked to him, and when he asks what they want for Christmas they explain we only celebrate Hanukkah."

THE GIRLS' program was begun last spring when questionnaires were sent out to explore community interest.



## Women on the Go

### Enthusiastic Accountants Would Add To Numbers

They've all tried accounting and they like it, so three Livonia women are ready now to show young people why their futures might well be in that profession.

Mrs. Ruth Jones, Mrs. Donna Johnson and Mrs. Jean Budd all are members of the American Society of Women Accountants, which recently put together a film to show students the way into an interesting profession.

They want to show the film in area high schools, and they also would be glad to take it to club and organization audiences.

"OUR SOCIETY aims to promote women in accounting, to encourage young women to go into this profession and to help interested women return to the labor market," said Mrs. Jones, chairman of the speakers' bureau that has formed to show the film and talk about its content.

"This film is a tool to use, especially in the second of our aims."

Mrs. Jones has sent letters to all schools in the area. "We know there is a need to give young people counseling in their choice of career," she said. "Teachers have found that people who have worked in various professions can give students better information than is available just from books."

"We've worked in a field we like, and we're glad to tell about it."

THE THREE Livonians represent varying viewpoints in the same career. All are certified public accountants.

Mrs. Jones has been employed by the state of Michigan for a number of years. Donna Johnson is a mother who took time out to have a family and now is self-employed.

Jean Budd is employed in the Livonia office of Richard J. Dickshott, CPA.

All three would like to see more women consider accounting for their career.

"It's a field that is associated with finance, and for years money matters have been considered a man's realm," Mrs. Budd said.

"But we all know how great a role women play in money management, and accounting, even aside from its value as a

profession, is of tremendous use in managing household finances."

Mrs. Johnson pointed out that it's a field easy to return to when it's time to re-enter the business world.

"AND ACCOUNTING doesn't have to be an end in itself," Mrs. Jones said. "It's a good base from which to go into many fields. Most businesses now are computerized, and an accounting background is needed for programming computers."

"We hear a lot about computers taking over for people, but they can do only the write-up work, the busy work, you might call it. People must be trained to feed the computers."

Good accountants are so much needed in business and industry, she added, that many students are employed while going through their four-year college courses and step right into well-paid jobs.

THE FILM the local accountants are preparing to show was made up by the Los Angeles chapter of the American Society of Women Accountants and funded by contributions from chapters across the country.

The Detroit area group, fifth to be organized of 89 chapters in the country, is choosing the speaker bureau method of passing on its message. Some 25 to 30 members in the metropolitan area are prepared to go before classes and organizations. Anyone interested in more information may call Mrs. Jones, 18361 Norwich, Livonia.

A future project being considered by the Women Accountants group is a program of workshops for club and church group treasurers.







west Detroit, Newburg United Methodist Church of Livonia is seeking an answer to the perennial Christian problem of "coming to grips

with whiteness in the middle of a vacuum."

The words are those of the Rev. William A. Ritter, whose 1,100-member congregation is

in the midst of a "getting-to-know-you" project with Scott Memorial United Methodist Church, a congregation similar to Newburg in size, budget and member composition.

So far the Livonia church and Scott Memorial, located at Wyoming and West Chicago, have exchanged pastors for two consecutive Sundays, joined in a family retreat and begun a family-matching "Pal" program.

On Sunday, Dec. 3, the choirs of the two churches will fill each other's pews, giving Newburg and Scott still another link in a hoped-for chain of familiarity, and therefore understanding.

THE WHOLE PROGRAM is designed as one solution to a problem articulated this way by Rev. Ritter:

"Every church in a situation like ours is still faced with the question of how do you build real bridges of racial understanding, how do you begin to accept black people where there are no black people around?"

Several aspects of the program that began coming together during the last Lenten season seem important to Rev. Ritter in view of the "polarization" he sees as a result of the busing issue.

"First," he said, "there's nothing paternalistic about this situation. This church is as big as ours, and its budget is a little larger. Its members are roughly comparable from



an economic and occupational standpoint. "Scott moved from the lower east side to northwest Detroit because its membership moved—in other words, it has been through the same dilemma faced by many white suburban churches. "As I put it to my congregation, 'They definitely don't want our old hymn-books.'"

ALSO, HE SAID, the invitation for the fellowship came from Scott Memorial's pastor, the Rev. David Scavella, during a Lenten

"But we of the church really have to ask ourselves if we are then serious about finding a solution that is unforged, far more natural and completely voluntary."

"If we can't do it with society at large, can we at least begin with a group of fellow Christians who happen to be black?"

REV. RITTER said Newburg has had a history of working toward racial understanding.

A number of years ago, he pointed out, the congregation had worked with Westland St. James church, on Annapolis Road where Westland and Inkster come together.

"But that was a much smaller congregation, and no matter how hard anyone tried it tended to be a benevolent kind of relationship," he said.

"Then came the spirit of black separatism, and all

attempts at bridge-building went out the window. We tried some seminars on racism, but found we were largely operating in a vacuum because we lived in white suburbia."

That, he said, was the spirit that prevailed when he and Rev. Scavella first got together and began talking of the fellowship. After the invitation, the boards of the two churches held several joint sessions and came up with several aims for this year.

The Pal program is just beginning, he said, and about 20 families in Newburg have volunteered, along with a smaller number from Scott.

"There is a certain fear on their part of being used," he said, "but we find this fear is slowly becoming less."

The pulpit exchange, he said, was deemed successful.

## Sex Education Issue Debated In Westland

WESTLAND A proposed sex education program in the Wayne - Westland School District has stirred a spirited debate among school board members and a member of a citizens' committee - even before the board has received any recommendations from the committee.

Mrs. Yvonne Adkins, of 32509 Luce Ct., Westland, objected to various materials she said are used in the high schools now and other materials on a suggested list to be used if a sex education program is adopted.

ROBERT REICHARD, school board president, pointed out that the citizens' committee hasn't submitted its suggested curriculum guidelines for board review.

At a press conference following the discussion, Mrs. Adkins admitted that the citizens' committee, of which is a member, hasn't approved the five - page set of guidelines.

She said the guidelines were circulated among committee members for review and comments.

Mrs. Adkins, who has opposed the sex education program in past board meetings, was supported Monday by two other private citizens, Charles Baker and Aldi Fuhrmann.

Baker said the board is "overstepping its bounds" in getting into the sex education area.

Fuhrmann wanted a copy of the curriculum guidelines when they are printed and notice of the school board meeting when the program will be acted on.

Reichard replied that the materials and notice will be given to Fuhrmann.

At one point, the board president and Fuhrmann clashed on Reichard's handling of the meeting. Reichard told the resident that if he doesn't like how the board session is run, he could leave the meeting.

MRS. ADKINS complained to the board Monday that several books on the list of materials yet to be approved by the committee or the board include materials suggested

by the Sex Education Information Council - United States (SEICUS), which she said is "writing hard - core pornography."

When asked for examples, she cited "Boys and Sex" by Dr. Wardell Pomeroy.

Another book is "Why Wait Until Marriage," whose author urges pre-marital sex.

The citizens' committee has been active over a period of several years working on a proposed curriculum for the fifth - through - 12th grades.

The program is tentatively

scheduled for the Monday, Dec. 11 board meeting, but action isn't likely then since the board plans a private workshop - study conference for board members and administrators the previous weekend.

The workshop - conference will have the staff and board members discuss about 18 educational issues - one of which will be the sex education program, and there may not be enough time for a decision at the Dec. 11 board meeting.

## Kasper In Line As Oakland Chairman

**PONTIAC**  
Now that Republicans have gained supremacy on the Oakland County Board of Commissioners, two Southfield Democrats who formerly led the board will be returned to the ranks.

Replacing Lawrence Pernick as chairman of the county board will be 32-year-old Bloomfield Township attorney Paul Kasper, a Republican whose election in early January is assured.

Also nominated in a GOP caucus was Wallace Gabler, 52-year-old Royal Oak businessman, who was named vice chairman and will replace Alex Perinoff.

Elected Republican caucus chairman was E. Frank Richardson, 44-year-old Waterford Township real estate salesman.

REPUBLICANS won 18 of the 27 seats on the county board in the Nov. 7 election and, for the first time in four years, will have a numerical advantage.

The first two years of the

elected board, Democrats had a 15-12 edge and the next two years it was 16-11.

"This is a GOP year and the Republicans will certainly dominate the board with a 18-9 majority," says Perinoff. "Many decisions require two-thirds, or 18 votes, and the Republicans will be able to railroad in a lot of things."

"That's something we were unable to do when we had a 16-11 Democratic majority. We couldn't get two Republicans to go along when we needed those 18 votes."

PERINOFF says the Republicans will also dictate committee assignments, but admits:

"Democrats did the same thing. It's too bad those best qualified aren't necessarily selected because appointments are made along strict party lines."

The former vice chairman says he hopes the Democratic platform won't be seriously

affected by the new GOP majority.

He feels construction of a county hospital for elderly indigents is a most deserving project as is a proposed \$4.5 million Children's Village. Republicans have appeared apathetic toward many capital improvements, Perinoff comments.

"I hope Republicans won't be apathetic toward a proposed south Oakland County service center with satellite offices to serve residents in the Southfield area. And it would be great if they got on the bandwagon for solid waste disposal."

"That's something I intend to push hard for. A lot of people are alarmed because we lack a rubbish disposal facility and, by 1975, we'll be choking to death."

Perinoff isn't too worried about losing clout in Oakland because Pernick and he no longer will head the county board.






# Lumber Prices Up; Who's To Blame?

Who's to blame for higher lumber prices that are pushing up the cost of Observerland homes \$500 to \$1,000 over last year?

A spokesman for the building industry said last week in Southfield that the Federal Price Commission is to blame, and he's pointing to American producers who export timber.

But a spokesman for the lumber industry placed the blame on a booming housing market with profit margins too low to encourage greater supplies.

They spoke to the Builders Assn. of Southeast Michigan, a group concerned with what lumber costs are doing to the prices of houses.

**HOWEVER INCONVENIENT** to these businesses, though, the net effect is a higher sales price for a new home. For the consumer, this means more dollars paid out for points assessed, possibly a larger down payment, and more dollars paid in interest for the life of the mortgage.

Because of an inflationary lumber market in 1972, the homebuyer paid \$1,000 more for his home plus an additional \$1,500 in interest paid over 30 years, for a minimum added expense of \$2,500.

An examination of what is happening in the lumber industry reveals the price of new homes sold next summer will be higher yet, because timber prices will continue to rise through this coming winter and spring.

Here's what can be expected in the suburban housing market for 1973.

**IRVING YACKNESS**, executive director of the Builders Assn. of Southeast Michigan, says the price of lumber has advanced steadily despite government regulations and price control devices.

"It is beyond me how the federal government can control the entire economy, but cannot control the prices of framing lumber."

Yackness made that declaration at the annual

meeting of the Builders Assn. of Metropolitan Detroit, now renamed Builders Assn. of Southeast Michigan, held in the Raleigh House, Southfield.

The association has complained to President Nixon that U.S. tree-growers are exporting raw timber without price controls, and that they are discouraged from meeting increased domestic demands because controls are placed on manufactured lumber sold within the nation.

The administration counters that lumber exports are needed to maintain a balance of trade, Yackness notes. The builders have also asked the government to relax quotas on lumber cutting in the northwestern states, but this move is being opposed by environmental groups.

Yackness told builders the lumber industry fails to make regular reports to the price commission and says the U.S. Dept. of Justice may investigate lumber pricing problems.

Yackness reports the association is considering starting a class action lawsuit against the lumber industry to determine if there are any violations of restraint of trade laws.


**AFTER MAKING** this threat of a suit, Yackness then introduced as speaker William R. Chaplow, executive director of the Detroit Lumbermen's Assn.

Chaplow's group represents 78 companies, including lumber retailers, wholesalers and manufacturers, in the metropolitan area.

The lumber business is fragmented in the U.S., Chaplow explained, with some 35,000 industries and each lumber operation handling some 8,000 items. This fragmentation makes it difficult for the price commission to take meaningful action, he added.

"Some of my remarks might appear provocative, but are intended only to be constructive."

"I can appreciate the federal government's sincerity. However, from what I saw and witnessed when appearing before the price

commission, I am convinced that the administration and pricing commission don't know what they're doing.

"It is a very amateurish approach to the whole problem and they are doing more harm than good as far as prices are concerned in the lumber industry. Under present philosophies, they will never cure this situation."

**CHAPLOW** commented that lumber retailers know what is wrong, but need a cure.

"Many persons, including the builders and price commissioners, volunteer the symptoms of the illness. But they don't have the cure."

"They don't have the complete answer simply because they don't understand the lumber business, which is a highly complicated and traditional industry."

Chaplow stressed that the lumber industry is "married to" the building industry. "It is to our advantage to stimulate profit for builders to stimulate volume and profits for ourselves."

"It is obvious that you cannot build a \$25,000 house and expect to sell it to a \$20,000 market. A banker isn't going

to force excessive interest rates on a borrower in order to bankrupt him. He would be defeating his own purpose."

"A businessman doesn't want to price himself out of a market, and neither do we."

**THE LUMBER** shortage isn't an emergency situation, stressed Chaplow.

"We are simply in a fast expanding market where demand is exceeding supply. This is a seller's market as opposed to the buyer's market we had in 1967-68."

One reason for present high lumber prices, notes Chaplow, is housing starts have been very strong creating higher lumber demands.

Weather has also been a factor, he added. There was a late winter in 1971 and a resulting slow spring which pushed demand later into 1972, giving a false market picture of demand for early buying.

Most of the timber in the U.S. is on lands owned by the federal government, Chaplow continues.

Because of Sierra Club lawsuits and ecology lobbyists' pressures, the Federal Forest Service is refusing to

release timber to meet demands. "If logs would have been made available, additional production would have come on the market sooner."

Because of price controls, he continued, too many lumber retailers saw maximum prices with possible drops and held off on their buying. Inventories were quickly depleted.

**NORMALLY**, higher demand would result in increased production.

"However, this year, because of ceilings on profits, there isn't any incentive to increase production. The mills are discouraged from producing."

"We cannot encourage non-production, because then we'll get non-production. And if we penalize production, we still get non-production."

During the past 90 days, Chaplow revealed, Canadian lumbermills have been purchasing large shipments of timber in the U.S., shipping them to Canadian mills, and then selling processed lumber to U.S. markets.

U.S. mills cannot compete against this maneuver, says Chaplow, because they have price ceilings and cannot bid as high for these logs as can

the Canadians, who have no controls.

As a result, in recent months, Canada has been supplying 50 per cent of the lumber used for residential construction in the U.S.

**SPARKING** on price controls' effects, Chaplow asked his audience of contractors: "How would a builder react if asked to sell the last 20 houses of a 60-house project at below cost price because he made too much on the first 40 houses?"

"He would conform to the law. But next year he would only build 40 houses." The crux of the economic controls, Chaplow maintained, is that they allow higher price on timber but, by limiting profits, stymie production and lower domestic inventories so demand isn't met.

"Controls didn't prove effective in increasing the wood supply but created an artificial market heavily dependent upon Canadian production, which isn't controlled."

Chaplow predicted that U.S. lumber production will remain stymied while Canadian prices will continue to be high. He anticipates higher lumber prices going

into the winter and spring of 1973.

**CHAPLOW** concluded: "The answer to this whole problem is to let supply and demand take their natural courses. Let us remove price controls, at least for a given time. I am convinced that the laws of basic economics will cure this illness of extraordinary high prices."

He invited the builders to form a committee to work cooperatively with lumber retailers.

Chaplow invited the builders association to inspect his association's books and invoices. "I place the blame on the price commission, not the retailers."

**IN A LETTER** to Congressman William Bloomfield (R-19th), James R. Van Every, president of the Detroit Lumbermen's Assn.,

commented on the lumber shortage and excessive prices.

"It started in the 1968-70 recession when many small producers were forced out of business. Their loss has been an important factor in the industry's inability to furnish sufficient material for a greatly increased market."

"In addition, another major reason is the federal government's policy of promoting log exports which have steadily increased even during the present high domestic demand."

"It is important to note there now is no ceiling price on these sales and, as a result, many domestic producers have elected to sell their raw material overseas rather than produce a manufactured product for the domestic market."

## St. Mary's Management Gets UF Praise

St. Mary Hospital has been placed on one of the highest pinnacles among the medical institutions of the state by the man who should know—Jacques Cousin, executive director of the United Foundation.

Delivering the main address at the dedication of the enlarged institution last Tuesday, he paid high tribute to the Felician Sisters, who established the original hospital in 1959, and then said:

"We at the United Foundation are very proud of St. Mary. We work with many institutions during the course of a year but none can match the record of St. Mary."

"We never have to wonder what is happening out here. Not only is the hospital well managed, but we always know what is going on where the hospital is going and how it plans to get there."

COUSIN ADDED that the hospital in the short span of its existence—13 years—has set up an enviable record—not only in serving the community but in hospital management and its involvement with the community.

He cited the work being done with the nursing courses at Schoolcraft College, at Madonna College, and the work being done with the Livonia Fire Department in teaching the men how to handle patients en route to the hospital in emergency calls.

"No finer job is being done anywhere," he said, and we are proud to have been part of it through the UF contribution of \$2 million dollars from our capital fund through the years."

CITING figures, he stated that 50,000 babies had been born in the hospital since its opening and he added, "that would be about a capacity crowd at Tiger Stadium and would half fill the mammoth University of Michigan Stadium."

It also was revealed that the emergency work has reached the 32,000 a year mark and with the new facilities could handle 50,000 cases in the next year.

"That will be an average of an emergency case every 15 minutes," Cousin stated, "and that's as fine a record as you'll find anywhere."

More than 100 invited guests attended the dedication and witnessed the blessing of the enlarged facility by the Most Rev. Walter J. Schoenherr, DD. He was assisted by Rev. Robert Pomponi, chaplain of St. Mary Hospital, and Rev. Eugene Kijek, chaplain of the Sister's Motherhouse.

president of the Board of Trustees, was master of ceremonies. After the invocation by Rev. Joseph Kubik, pastor of St. Florian Church, Shuey paid tribute to the hospital management—Mother Mary Columbine; Sister Mary Calasantia, executive director; and Rita Radzialowski, administrator.

Greetings from the trustees were brought by Jacob Sobieraj, president of the board of trustees, and Dr. Harry Tarpinian, president of the medical staff, brought the greetings from the doctors and nurses.

In paying the city's tribute, Livonia Mayor Edward McNamara traced the history of the hospital and in a light vein recalled some of the incidents that have added to the hospital lore during the years.

He closed with the wish that Mother Columbine and Sister Calasantia, who have been instrumental in bringing the hospital to its present status, would be allowed to remain on the job—from now on.






