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## FOCUS: Suburbia

Mike Bodak got his wish Thursday. Having been wounded by a mortar blast and German machine pistol fire during the D-Day invasion, Mike was left paralyzed from the waist down. He said he wanted to be buried in Arlington National Cemetery when he died.

On Thursday morning, under slightly overcast skies, Mike's body was carried by a horse-drawn caisson, accompanied by the United States Army Band and an honor guard, to its final resting place in Arlington, not far from the Kennedy brothers' memorial. During the full-military ceremony, the Army chaplain presented Mike

Bodak Jr. -- whom Mike Sr. had raised alone -- with the U.S. flag that draped his coffin.

COL. LOUIS G. MENDEZ, Airborne Infantry (ret.), a former battalion commander of Mike's, delivered a eulogy at the grave site.

It was Mendez who was responsible for Mike's getting his final wish Thursday.

Due to the loss of his proof of eligibility for burial in Arlington, the request left in Mike's will was originally denied.

Following his death on Nov. 21, Mike was buried in Mt. Olivet Cemetery.

Then Mendez stepped into the

picture and, checking through Army records, found that Mike was indeed entitled to burial in Arlington.

Mike's body was exhumed and flown to Washington D.C. for the ceremonies Thursday.

TWENTY-EIGHT years ago when Mike was wounded during the European invasion, doctors gave him five days to live.

Mike said then he didn't believe the doctors and didn't give up hope.

He lived and returned to the States where he rejoined his wife whom he'd married shortly before going overseas. Since there were no children, the couple had decided to adopt a child.

Then one morning Mike's wife walked out the door.

He decided to proceed with the adoption alone and named his new son Mike Jr.

The father and his son moved to Plymouth where young Mike was his father's reason for living.

NOW A SOPHOMORE at Michigan State University, young Mike was not surprised when his father did not return from the Veterans' Hospital after a three month stay.

But Mike's determination had made its mark on the Army, as well as his son, and Thursday, as he had always wanted, his "Taps" was sounded in Arlington, rolling down the hills across the Potomac River.

# U.S. Revenue Shares Are In; How Will They Be Spent?

The federal revenue sharing checks are in. Now the officials of Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton Township will have to decide how to spend the money.

Officials in the three communities had said that the equation used to determine the local shares was complicated and had made it impossible to determine what they were going to get.

•The city of Plymouth received a check for \$41,537 from the U.S. Treasury Dept. last week as its first of two installments for this year's share. The total federal revenue money of \$83,000 will represent about a .two per cent increase for the city's \$3,884,000 annual budget.

•In Plymouth Township, the first check totaled \$138,227 and together with the second installment will mean about a \$276,450 increase to its \$1,802,000 total annual budget. This amounts to about 14 per cent.

•Canton Township's first check was for \$18,390 and with the second installment, the first year revenue sharing money will mean an addition of \$36,800, or about a two to three per cent, increase in the \$1,044,760 budget.

The revenue sharing program calls for the local shares to be given in the two equal installments this year and for the money to continue each year for five years. The second portion is expected to arrive in January. A reevaluation of the local shares will take place following the first year.

The city's share was "considerably less" than estimated, said Kenneth Way, acting city manager.

He said the city had anticipated about \$122,000 -- some \$40,000 higher than Plymouth's annual share actually will be.

"But we didn't spend it before we got it, so we're not in trouble," Way said.

Mayor James McKeon said that while the city commission has not decided what the money will be used for, several things like capital improvements, the downtown traffic loop and parking have been discussed as possible projects for which it could be spent.

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP'S share was considerably more than officials there had expected.

"Nobody knew to this stage (the check) what we were going to get," said Elizabeth Holmes, township treasurer.

The township board has not yet discussed how the funds will be spent.

Canton Township Clerk John Flodin echoed the unpredictability of the revenue share. "We didn't know what it was going to be practically until we received it," he said.

Flodin said there has been no decision as yet about how the money will be spent.

The Canton clerk also criticized the differences between local shares, particularly the population figures used in the formula. He said that Canton's population had increased greatly since 1966-67 for which population estimates were used to determine the revenue local shares.

It isn't every day that someone ups and gives \$10,000 to the library in a little town in another state.

But that's what happened some time ago when Elizabeth Barnwell, head librarian of the Dunning-Hough Memorial Library, opened the mail one morning.

In what Miss Barnwell described as "an innocuous looking envelope" on that morning was a \$10,000 check from the Edward C. Hough-Mary Hough Kimble Foundation.

special ceremony Tuesday. And just for the occasion, Cass Hough flew into Plymouth from his home in Arkansas.

In the brief ceremony at the library, Miss Barnwell explained what the gift had been used for and Hough was presented with a plaque to honor the foundation's donation. A second plaque has been hung in the library.

THE GIFT, of which about \$6,000 has been spent so far,

has meant the addition of several types of materials that are now available for the library's patrons to use.

Miss Barnwell explained that the additional portion of the gift will be used later to increase the collection of audio-visual materials.

The grant thus far has enabled the library to purchase some 700 topographical maps of the Michigan area that can be checked out by the public.

Five-hundred new records

have been purchased, 90 per cent of them music. They include classical and semi-classical, covering various periods and major composers, as well as contemporary vocal and instrumental, jazz, sound tracks of show tunes and musical revues, marches, band and military music, operas, dance - orchestra music, the "blues," folk songs and music, and the Time-Life series, "Story of Great Music."

Five per cent of the records are spoken, readings of American poetry and Shakespearean drama. Another five per cent are children's records.

be to junior-high age and up on a rental basis. Rental charge will be 25 cents per album for a limited loan period of seven to 13 days. A maximum of five albums may be charged out at one time and the rental charge must be paid when the records are checked out.

Charges also will be made for damaged records and are set at 50 cents per record side for light scratches, abrasions and excessive dirt and fingerprints. A warped record or one with deep scratches which no longer meets playing standards must be replaced at the cost of the record.

Rental charges will not be made on language, dictation, other educational recordings or children's records.

ANOTHER ADDITION to the circulating library as a result of the gift are 100 eight-millimeter films, including Laurel and Hardy, Charlie Chaplin, Our Gang, Keystone Cops and various other silent classics, plus some Walt Disney films.

One-hundred cassettes of both classical and contemporary music include the score of "Fiddler on the Roof," and the music of Frankie Laine, Tom Jones, the Beatles, Louis Armstrong, Sammy Davis, and Joan Baez plus compositions of Beethoven, Dvorak, Tchaikovsky and Stravinsky.

Also among the cassettes are 50 by radio personality Mike Whorff, covering such topics as American Indians, American fighting men, astrology, ecology, the Roaring '20s, Beethoven, Shakespeare, the Spirit of Christmas, drugs, Stonehenge, and so on. Also included is the series "Adventures in Good Music" with Karl Haas.

Fifty new filmstrips, to be used in the library pre-school and elementary programs, cover children's picture books, the Time-Life series on animals, SVE strips on nature, Indians and science.

The topographical maps, for circulation, include more than 675 quadrangle maps of Michigan; the U.S. series of topographic maps covering Michigan; base, contour, outline and physical division maps of the U.S.; and special maps of Michigan, Chicago, Lake Erie, Lake Superior, Minneapolis and Isle Royale.

Classical music records include works of Lieder, Wagner, Mahler, Chopin, Haydn, Strauss, Dvorak, Bach, Beethoven, Handel, Tchaikovsky, Schubert,

Mozart, Debussy and Rachmaninoff.

Contemporary records list such artists as Dionne Warwick, Andy Williams, the Fifth Dimension, Burt Kaempfert, Mantovani and Mancini.

Jazz artists in the collection are Ellington, Brubeck, Kenton, Boots Randolph, Charles Mingus and Armstrong.

Records of musical scores include "Hello Dolly," "Godspell," "Jesus Christ Superstar," "Gypsy," and "Kismet."

The gift also permitted purchase of two record browser units, plastic jacket protectors, a 16-millimeter projector and an eight-millimeter projector, a slide projector, three map drawer units of five drawers each, and an audio-visual card catalog.

Of the \$10,000 gift, \$6,000 was used to establish the new division and \$2,000 was reserved for each of the next two years. The money will be used to establish new programs or services in the audio-visual area which are deemed suitable and to buy additional materials in the service areas already begun.

# Canton Civic Assns. Seek Hearing Change

CANTON TOWNSHIP  
Would-be trustee Robert Greenstein failed to convince Canton Township's board to recommend that the planning commission change the date of two extremely important public hearings from Jan. 3 and hold them separately.

The public hearings involve "two of the most volatile issues" affecting the township at the present time, Greenstein said at last week's regular board session.

One concerns rezoning in the township's northwest sector, and the other is a rezoning request that would allow a regional shopping center and housing development to be built at Joy and Sheldon Rds.

AS IT NOW stands, both public hearings are scheduled back-to-back on Wednesday, Jan. 3 in Plymouth-Canton

High School. The first hearing is from 8 to 9 p.m. and will seek public expression on changing lot sizes in certain areas west of Canton Center Rd., from Beck Rd. to Napier, between Joy and Ford Rds.

The second hearing involving the proposed shopping center is set for 9 p.m.

Greenstein was highly critical of the planning commission's choice of a date, stating "it was poor timing" to have the hearings held so close to the end of the holidays when many people are still away from their homes.

He asked the board to "consider suggesting to the planning commission" that the hearings be rescheduled for a later date and held separately to give more time for public discussion.

DECLARING that "the planning commission runs its own business," Supervisor

Phil Dingeldey said if there's any changes to be made, they would have to come from the commission without interference from the township board.

Dingeldey suggested Greenstein appear at the planning commission's Dec. 19 meeting and make the request.

"I'm not going to tell the planning commission what to do as long as what they do is legal," said Dingeldey adamantly.

He criticized Greenstein's remarks that he said inferred "ulterior motives" may have played a role in setting the public hearing date.

"There were no ulterior motives," said Dingeldey. "I could say you have an ulterior motive for asking it to be changed."

Greenstein said he was not asking the board -- which he referred to as the "superior body" with controlling power over the commission -- to order the planning commission to switch the date. He merely suggested the board recommend the change "in all fairness to the people."

LEGAL NOTICES of the public hearing have already been inserted in both a Wayne newspaper and the Plymouth Mail and Observer advertising the Jan. 3 date. These would have to be countermanded and could lead to some confusion, some township officials feel.

Jerry Cheske, secretary of the Windsor Park Civic Assn., told The Mail & Observer Thursday that his association's attorney, Maurice Breen, was submitting a letter to Canton Township Planning Commission Chairman George Lawton asking that the first hearing scheduled for Jan. 3 be moved to another date.

Cheske said his group would attend Tuesday's planning commission meeting to ask for the rescheduling there.

GREENSTEIN'S appearance last Tuesday coincided with the formal request filed with the township clerk by three Canton homeowners associations that Greenstein be considered a candidate to fill the vacancy that will occur when Trustee Ray Deeds resigns, presumably sometime in January.

Deeds has sold his home in Canton and is expected to move with his family to Howell at the end of the present school semester.

The homeowners associations that are backing Greenstein include the one which he heads up as president, Northwest Canton Homeowners Assn. The others are Windsor Park Civic Association and Holiday Park Homeowners Assn.

An attorney, Greenstein served as justice of the peace in the township before the advent of the District Court.

## Canton Starts Boundary Study For Recreation

CANTON TOWNSHIP

Canton trustees will ask for a clarification of boundaries before any decision is made to involve the township in a proposed area-wide recreation project.

Trustees said they want it made clear at the outset of the discussion that the entire township would have to be included in recreational plans, not just the Plymouth School District.

Canton is somewhat unusual in its makeup in that it has three school districts within its boundaries: Wayne-Westland, a small portion of the Van Buren district, and Plymouth.

Referring to the recent hiring of the township's first (part-time) recreation director, Supervisor Phil Dingeldey commented: "We've got a pretty good program on the way and I'd hate to spoil it."

The entire township would have to be included in order to justify financial help in the proposed recreation venture being sponsored by Plymouth Township officials, he said.

The City of Plymouth, Plymouth Township and the Plymouth School District have officially pledged cooperation in the development of an area-wide recreation authority.

# St. Matthew Celebrates Anniversary of Merger

The 10th anniversary of a Livonia church merger that was forerunner of a denominational merger is being marked in St. Matthew United Methodist Church this weekend.

The church located at 30900 Six Mile was scene of a reception and anniversary banquet with four former ministers present Friday.

Completing the celebration, United Methodist Bishop Dwight E. Loder will speak at 9:30 and 11 a.m. services Sunday, Dec. 17. Also part of the anniversary is a Saturday prayer vigil sponsored by the men's club.

THE MERGER of the Livonia Methodist Church and Hope Chapel Evangelical United Brethren Church took place in 1962, several years before the parent denominations effected a nationwide merger that resulted in formation of the United Methodist Church.

The first combined service of the two congregations was held Dec. 16, 1962, and the moves that led up to it were chronicled in a church history given by Mrs. Donald Lyon in a slide-illustrated talk at the banquet.

She was at that time secretary to the Rev. James Lange, pastor of Hope Chapel, located at Middle Belt and Six Mile, and she noticed a barn near the church and made inquiries about keeping a horse there.

It was then she learned that the property had been pur-

chased by the Livonia Methodist Church, which had sold its building at Seven Mile and Loveland and was planning to build on the Six Mile location.

CONVERSATIONS then started between Rev. Lange and the Rev. John Grenfell Jr., pastor of the Methodist church. They felt a merger should be considered, since the two church buildings would be located so close to each other and since a denominational merger was in the talking stages.

It was worked out by a committee with members from both churches. Until the present church home was built in 1964 and 1965, services were

held in Hope Chapel and extra space was rented in the Wilcox School.

Rev. Lange and Rev. Grenfell served for a time as co-ministers. Both were back for the weekend celebration, along with the Rev. Paul T. Hart and the Rev. Halden Ferris, who took over in 1968.

Now serving the church are the Rev. William Rickard, who became senior minister succeeding Rev. Hart in January of this year, and the Rev. Jerome Smith, who succeeded Rev. Ferris and was named associate minister in 1971.

Ted Strasser was master of ceremonies for the anniversary banquet.

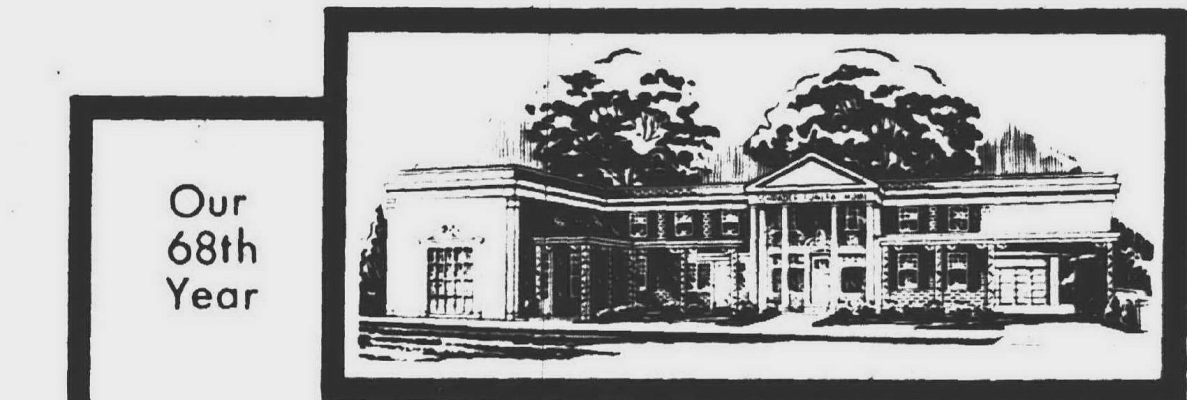

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# 300-Plus Attend School Meeting

PLYMOUTH For what had been billed as a potentially-explosive meeting, Tuesday night's special Plymouth school board meeting on modular scheduling was orderly.

The crowd of between 300 and 400 gave occasional scattered applause as it sat through speeches from residents complaining and praising the high school modular system and from students who said that, on the whole, they favored the system as opposed to "traditional" scheduling.

Four school board members -- George Lawton, Marda Benson, John Graves and Carl Berry -- sat on the stage in Plymouth-Canton High School's commons while speakers representing the three sides approached the microphones on the floor to give their thoughts.

School Trustee Gary Mirto sat in the audience. The night before, at the regular board meeting, Mirto was present in the building but had not joined the board during the meeting and instead talked with parents and students outside.

The format for Tuesday's meeting allowed for half-hour segments to be devoted to speakers opposed to modular scheduling, speakers favoring and students selected by the student council.

Joe Gray, one of the leading opponents of the modular system, began the discussion and received scattered applause from the audience although Lawton, president of the school board, asked that applause be saved until the end of each side's presentation.

Several of the parents said their children who had been good or average students under the traditional scheduling system had received failing grades under modular.

They also complained that the modular system made it too easy for their children to cut classes or school, that it took too long for the parents to learn if their children were missing school and that it was impossible for the school to locate a student if the parent wished to contact him for any reason.

Mrs. Earl Keim Jr., a substitute teacher at the high schools, said that under modular scheduling many students had learned to beat the attendance system, average students were not getting the "prodding" they needed and many students used their free time to play cards and "smoke pot" in the commons area.

"THE LACK of discipline and the 'I don't care' attitude are conducive to 'if I have only one class on Day 6, why should I go to school' (attitude)," Mrs. Keim said.

Another parent said that modular scheduling may be all right for seniors but that his 14-year-old son was failing under the system.

## High Schools Set Tours

PLYMOUTH Weekly tours of Plymouth Canton and Plymouth Salem high schools, located on the Centennial Educational Park at Joy and Canton Center roads, are available to parents and other citizens of the district.

Tours will be conducted each Tuesday at 9:30 a.m. Persons caring to join are asked to call the school administration office so that tour space may be reserved.

The visits include introductory comments by an administrator, a slide-tape presentation, a tour and a question and answer session.

"There is not a ninth grader in this school who can get his homework done sitting in the commons playing cards," he added.

Edward Meade, a teacher and member of the Our Lady of Good Counsel school board, said, "I cannot find an educator that can convince me that modular scheduling is an expedient."

"I have yet to meet students who do not want direction," he said. "They don't like it (direction) but they want it." He also said that other schools have found increased vandalism when they switched to modular scheduling.

Speaking in favor of the modular system, a 1971-Plymouth High graduate began the pro-modular discussion.

"If the parents get behind their students with some enthusiasm, we can get some discipline," she said. "I'm one person that made that (modular) system work."

ONE PARENT said that after moving to Plymouth from California, his two children were doing well under the modular system. "For the first time in their school careers they actually said they liked school."

A woman who said she favored modular scheduling, said it should continually be evaluated. "Modular scheduling can be good but..." she concluded.

Louise Spence, a Plymouth-Salem High School English teacher, said that modular scheduling had personalized education in the English department at the high school.

After one woman asked the school board if a community-wide poll could be taken, Lawton said that would be impossible but asked how many persons in the audience opposed the system.

About half the members of the crowd raised their hands. When Lawton asked how many favored the modular scheduling, about one-quarter of those present raised their hands.

Many in the audience did not raise their hands. Jim Flora said that the system was basically good. He said that it gives students a chance to learn how to make decisions and that schools should not be expected to teach discipline.

"GIVE ME the guy who has some experience with making decisions," he said. "Discipline starts at home."

Another parent, who said he was a teacher, agreed. "They're not going to learn how to make decisions from a text book or with a teacher looking over their shoulders," he said.

Bonny Dore, a teacher at Plymouth-Salem High, said many of the parents opposed to modular scheduling were not looking at it properly.

"You can't judge a new system on old criteria," she said.

Mrs. Dore said that the modular system "creates people who don't just respond to a bell to change classes."

In the student section of the program, Brian Smith, vice-mayor of the student council, said a recent survey showed that about 90 per cent of the students favored the modular scheduling system.

Al Petro, a senior at Plymouth-Salem, said, "Modular scheduling has opened a great opportunity."

"THE PROBLEMS at the high school are not the result of modular scheduling -- that just makes them more visible."

Another high school senior, Mark Allen, said that under the present modular scheduling system there's too "much idle time."

He added that "teachers are forced to teach in concepts that are almost totally different than what they had been trained to do. Some teachers are still teaching the old technique."

Mike Nestor, a Plymouth-Salem junior, said that the modular system provided:

- Specialized classes and extracurricular activities that are easier to schedule.
- More flexibility for those on the co-op education program.
- Greater use of resource centers.

A chance for students to do homework while in school. Another student said that the modular system catered to the "non-average student, the meaning every student"

because there are no "average" students.

Senior Don Davies said modular scheduling "professionalizes the role of the teacher."

At the conclusion of the student portion of the meeting, Lawton said the board would consider the comments made. He later told The Plymouth Mail & Observer that the modular system was

"flexible" in that it was changed from time to time as evaluations showed the need for updating the system.

## Keller Attends Update Class In Assessing

PLYMOUTH Ronald P. Keller of Plymouth was among participants in a short course for assessing officers held in Ann Arbor earlier this month.

The course is designed to bring assessors up to date on new information and developments in their fields.

The short course was one of a series being held throughout Michigan and was sponsored by the Michigan Assessors Assn. in cooperation with the University of Michigan Extension Service.

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## 1st Quarter Grades Better This Year, Statistics Show

PLYMOUTH An analysis of the first quarter grades received by Plymouth high school students shows an improvement in most categories studied.

The figures on the first marking period showed:

- All "A" records were posted by 22 per cent of the freshmen; 77 per cent of the sophomores; 62 per cent of the juniors; and 79 per cent of the seniors. Last year, 01 per cent of this year's sophomores; 60 per cent of this year's juniors; and 80 per cent of this year's seniors had perfect first quarter grades. (Statistics on the first quarter academic records for last year were not available on the freshman class.)

- The first quarter honor roll this year include: 24.2 per cent of the freshmen; 23.8 per cent of the sophomores; 33.2 per cent of the juniors; and 35.2 per cent of the seniors. Last year the respective figures (beginning with this year's sophomore class) were: 18.8 per cent; 26.2 per cent and 36.6 per cent.

• According to this year's

figures, 23.9 per cent of the freshmen, 21.2 per cent of the sophomores, 26.7 per cent of the juniors, and 19.3 per cent of the seniors received one "E" or more. Last year, 35.6 per cent of this year's sophomores, 31.9 per cent of this year's junior class, and 22.9 per cent of this year's seniors received one "E" or more on their first quarter marking.

• In the overall student body tabulation, this year's first quarter showed that 79 per cent of the students got perfect grades, 28.8 per cent made the honor roll, and 22.8 per cent received one "E" or more. Last year these respective figures were: 8 per cent, 26.3 per cent, and 30.8 per cent.

Plymouth School Supt. John M. Hoben credited the overall improvements to "changes in administrative controls (such as) unit coordinators."

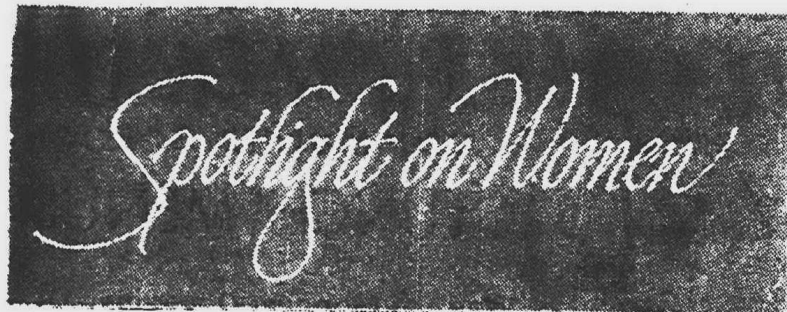
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## Bride Wears Mother's Gown

Both mothers selected full-length gowns for the ceremony and reception in St. Maron social hall. Mrs. Abdo was in aqua and Mrs. Vader in pink.

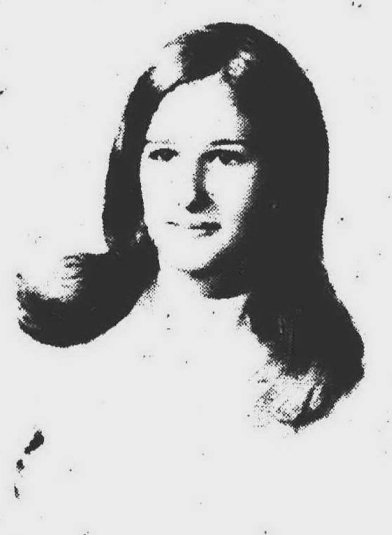

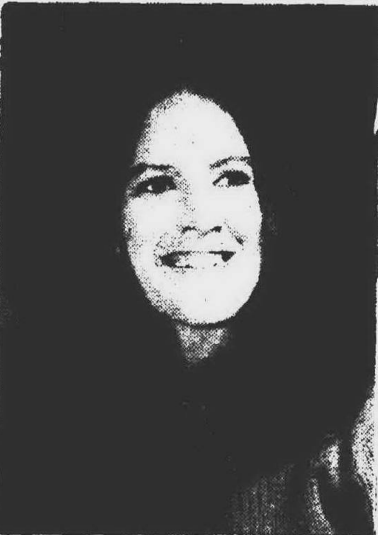

# Puppets Teach Dental Health

Seven women, one guitar, a puppet stage, and a cast of puppet dolls packed into one station wagon on its way to the inner city provide a fun lesson on dental health care.

The women are all members of the auxiliary of Alpha Omega dental fraternity and are well-versed in their parts. They've been putting on the shows more than three years and can switch roles, double up or fill in when someone can't make the next show.

They make their trips with the blessings of the Detroit Board of Education, which

furnishes the schedule and makes arrangements for small assemblies, reaching children who have never seen a toothbrush.

CAROLYN JACOBS, a Southfield member who was president of the auxiliary when the puppet shows were first started, said, the board was very receptive to the idea. "We were given a list of schools where our show was needed most and we've been busy ever since," she added.

Marcia Blume, a Farmington member who jokes that she "makes the best puppeteer because I've got the longest arms," added that the show has played in most of the depressed areas in the entire metropolitan area. The latest contact has been with Head Start directors, who asked the women to perform.

Story lines for two different scripts were written by Joanne Zuroff of Southfield, who also lends guitar music to the act. They are simply written, evolving about comic

strip or fantasy characters, and aimed solely at getting the young child to be concerned about the care of his teeth.

EVERY YEAR during Dental Health Week the women have put the show on local television.

"We know both Bozo and OOpsie very well," Mrs. Jacobs said. This in turn has brought the auxiliary members many number of invitations to perform for local nursery schools.

"We comply," said Louise Bittker, a Southfield resident who is president of the

auxiliary this year, "but these are really not the children the show was written for. We want to reach the child who has never gone to a dentist, doesn't know what a dentist is -- the child who has never owned a toothbrush."

Toothbrushes are a big expenditure from the auxiliary's budget because the puppet show ends with gifts of toothbrushes for all the children in every audience.

More toothbrush gifts go every year to the D.J. Healy home, a residence for children who are waiting to be placed in foster homes.

# Why Plymouth's School Bond Proposal Failed

By KATHY MORAN  
School officials are scratching their heads over the events of the past week — not just because the proposed \$21 million bond issue fell to defeat Monday, but because even the people who would have benefited most passed it by just three votes.

Canton Township is the area that is growing by leaps and bounds and is expected to deliver the bulk of an anticipated 6,000 new students by 1975.

A citizens' study, chaired by Edmond Judd, projected a 20 per cent growth by next year alone and predicted that 90 per cent of this growth would come from Canton.

"THERE ARE presently (in October) seven subdivisions being built in Canton Township and by February 1973, there will be 26 subdivisions under way," the study says.

Yet when Canton residents voted at Gallimore Elementary school, the result was 363 for the bonds to build schools and 360 against it.

"We needed 1,000 votes for it from Canton to win," Board Chairman George Lawton said after the election.

SOME SCHOOL officials said that the lack of identification with Canton, where the new schools will be built, helped push the issue under.

Many Plymouth residents view it as a "non-entity" west of the city and not as a vital part of the district they say.

During the campaign some people were even suggesting that Canton be cut off from the rest of the district and left to form its own school district to build schools.

This attitude was reflected in election returns where 66 per cent of the city voters voted against the bond issue.

Plymouth Township residents were a little kinder (perhaps because it too is still growing and will need more schools) and delivered 58 per

## WARMWATER FISH REGULATIONS (STATEWIDE)

The Natural Resources Commission, under Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, rescinds the order of September 19, 1969, and orders that for five years from January 1, 1973, it shall be unlawful to catch or attempt to take in any manner the following named species except during the open seasons prescribed and within the maximum daily limits designated:

Statewide open seasons on all waters not otherwise closed to fishing shall be from the Saturday preceding Memorial Day through December 31 on largemouth and smallmouth bass, May 15 through all of February on walleye, sauger, northern pike and muskellunge (including tiger muskellunge). The size limit on sauger will be 13 inches. The daily possession limit shall be 5 singly or in combination for largemouth and smallmouth bass, walleye, sauger and northern pike; 1 for muskellunge (including tiger muskellunge) and 10 for white bass.

The above regulations apply except that walleye, muskellunge and northern pike may be taken in that upper portion of Lake Huron known as Whitney Bay, Pike Bay, Island Harbor, Les Cheneaux Channels, Potagannissing Bay and certain waters on the south side of Drummond Island from May 1 through March 31 of each year, that walleye and sauger may be taken at any time from the connecting waters of the Great Lakes and Lake Erie, that bass may not be taken on Lake St. Clair, St. Clair and Detroit rivers before the last Saturday in June of each year, and that muskellunge in Lake St. Clair, St. Clair and Detroit rivers may be taken only from the first Saturday in June through December 15 of each year.

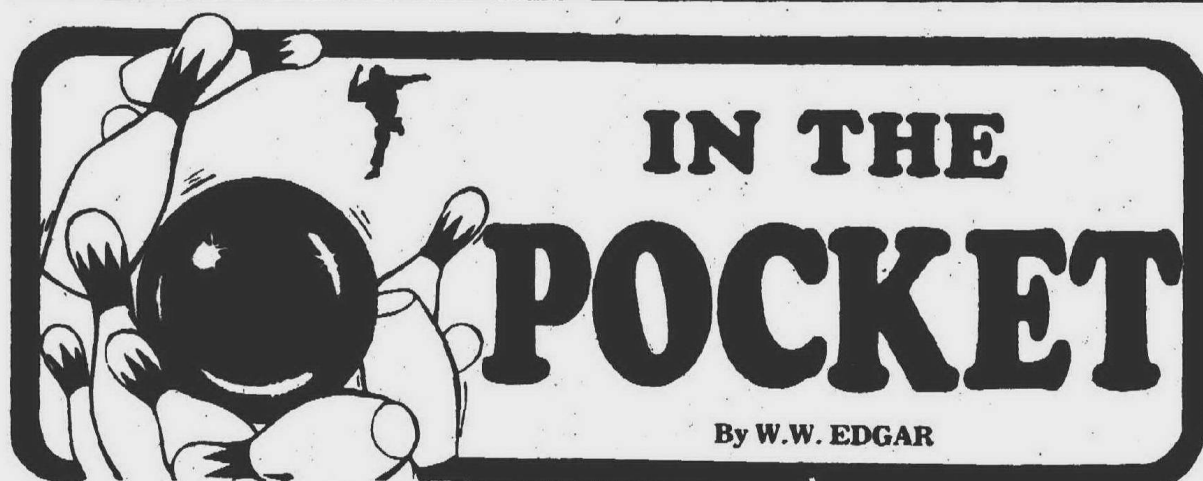

## Turf Tips, Quips

To the surprise of practically no one, which makes one wonder just why Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley has to wait until the final moment to make his announcement, the harness racing dates for 1973 were divulged earlier in the week by the racing chief.

As could be expected, the dates were made public for the first time in the weekly meeting of the Detroit Broadcasters' Association and as anticipated not one of the area radio and television stations as much as mentioned the news.

That should prove something to the commissioner, the only ones interested in his pronouncements are the press. If the local media doesn't use space to tell of the commissioner's activities, then none does.

But that's another matter. It has been known for some time that Shirley had decided on the 1973 dates but wouldn't make them public until the Dec. 15 deadline set by state law.

Almost two weeks ago, Jackson Raceway officials indicated they had been notified of approval of Jan. 1 through Jan. 27 dates for the first meeting of the new year at Northville Downs. It will be recalled that last year the commissioner made the Jackson-at-Northville meeting cease operations in late December and then reopen after the start of the New Year.

It came at a time when Northville was just getting the impetus to make things interesting for Windsor Raceway. The two week break gave the Canadian track the opening it sought and Northville never did regain the earlier impetus.

Be that as it may, the dates for 1973 parallel those of 1972 with Jackson receiving 24 nights in January, 57 nights at the Jackson track and 47 more in November and December at Northville.

Northville Downs, under the supervision of Executive

Director John Carlo, will have two meetings. The first of 39 nights from Jan. 29 through March 14 and the second lists 36 nights from June 20 through July 31.

Wolverine Raceway and Hazel Park received 82 nights each with the former operating in late winter and spring and the latter in late summer and early fall.

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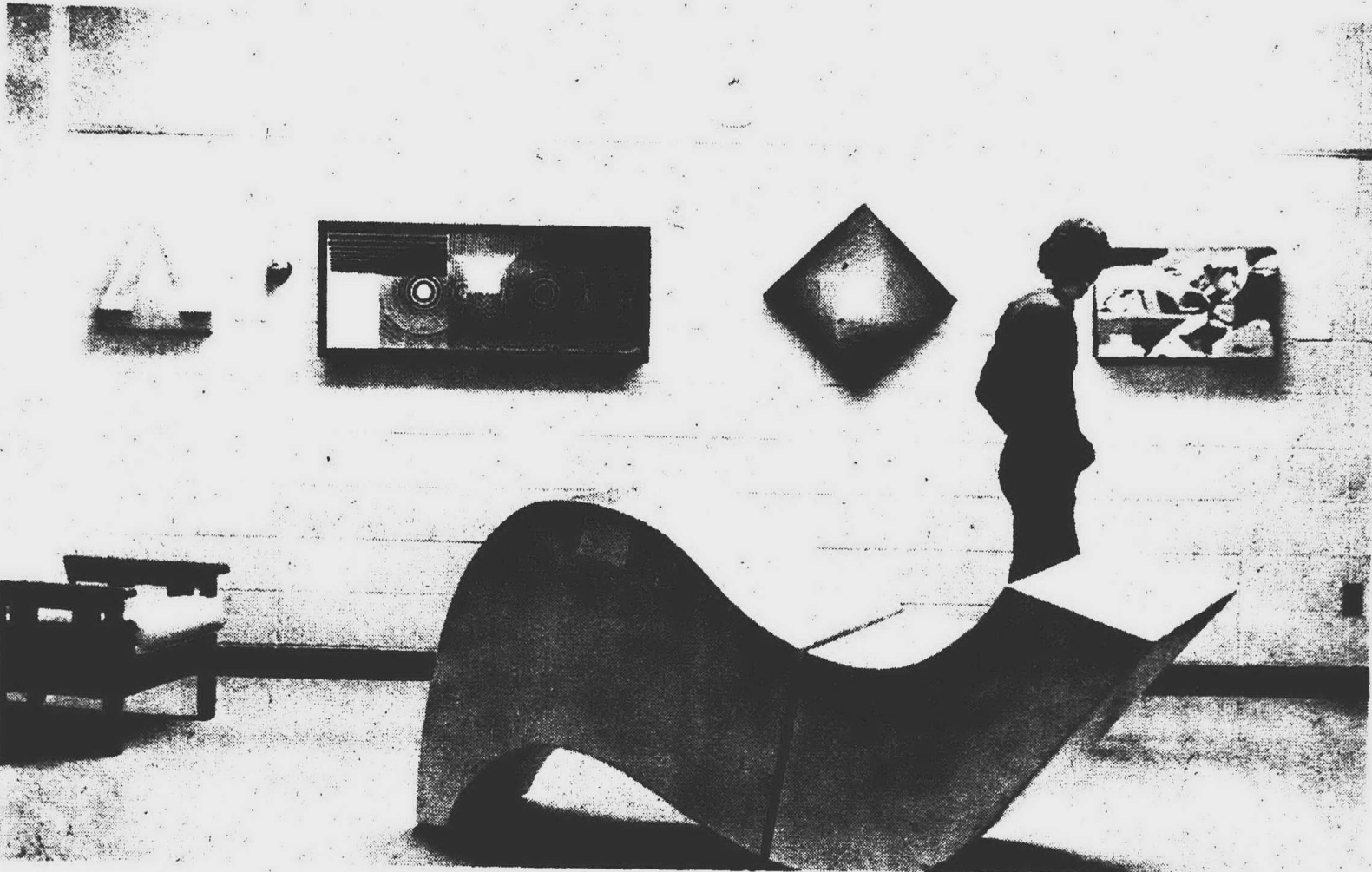

Lacking showcases and the long-planned fine arts building, artwork is currently being displayed in the library also.

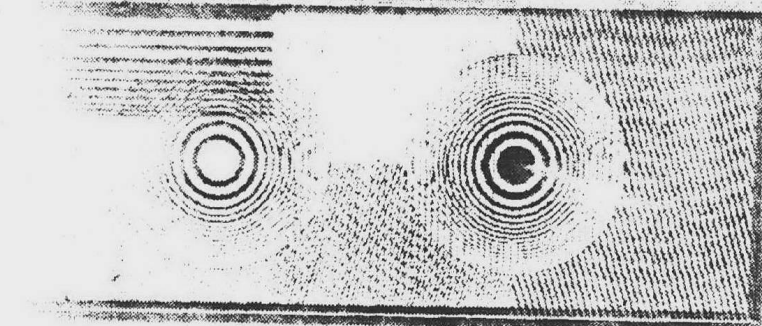
Dufort said prints, silkscreens, collographs, and figure drawings in various media are displayed.

"We would like student work to be available (for viewing) to the students and community," he said.

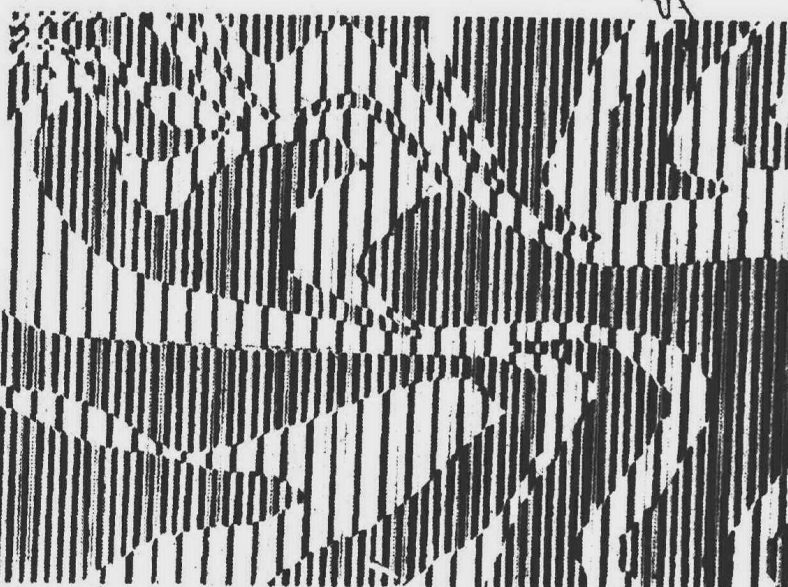
THE DISPLAY began because "at the end of each semester many of the students have had good products, and we regretted not having shared them with somebody," Dufort said.

And even if you aren't a dreamer, you can enjoy the masterful acting and superb photography in the film which just opened at the Northland Theater in Southfield.

IT HAS the same romantic-type music that made "Camelot" a joy — and, besides, it's a fun movie to watch.

The movie, directed by Arthur Hiller, is both the story of a poet and playwright who is imprisoned during the Spanish Inquisition and of his story of an old man who thinks he's a gallant knight, Quixote.

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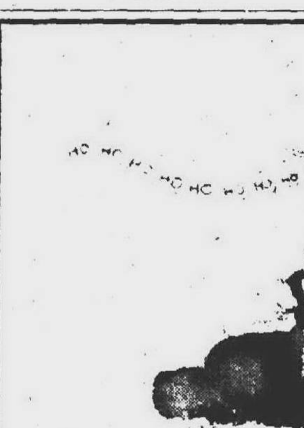

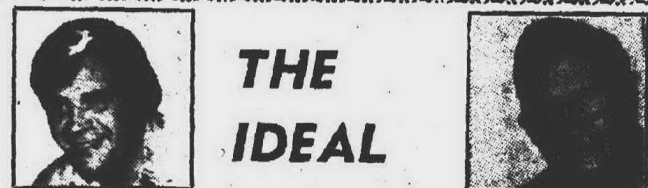

## Peppy Peppermint Gingerbread

### PEPPERMINT GINGER BARS

- (24 bar cookies)  
1/2 cup shortening  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 egg, beaten  
1 1/2 cups light molasses  
1 1/2 cups enriched flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon ginger  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves  
1/2 cup crushed peppermint candy  
Peppermint icing  
2 tablespoons crushed peppermint candy

Cream together shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Blend in egg and molasses. Combine flour, salt, soda and spices; blend into creamed mixture. Stir in 1/2 cup candy. Spread batter evenly in greased 9x13-inch baking pan. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven 25 to 30 minutes, or until done. Frost with Peppermint Icing. Sprinkle remaining candy on top. Cut into bars.

Peppermint Icing  
3 1/2 cups confectioners' sugar

- 1 package (3 oz.) cream cheese, softened  
2 tablespoons water  
1/2 teaspoon peppermint extract  
Red food coloring  
Cream together 2 cups confec-

tioners' sugar and cream cheese until light and fluffy. Add water, peppermint extract and a few drops food coloring. Blend in remaining sugar.

\*Spoon flour into dry measuring cup. level. Do not scoop.  
NOTE: If self-rising flour is used, omit salt.

## Whole Wheat Flour Holiday Spice Cake

Healthy is as healthy does. Nutritious goodies for the holidays were reported this week by Jack La Lanne's shop in Peninsula Center.

### NUTRITIOUS SPICE CAKE

- 1 c. certified raw butter  
1 c. natural brown sugar  
3 organic eggs, slightly beaten  
1 cup sour cream  
1 cup organic raisins or chopped dates  
1 cup nutmeats  
2 c. sifted whole wheat flour  
2 tsp. baking powder

- 1 tsp. baking soda  
1 tsp. allspice  
1 tsp. cinnamon

Cream butter and brown sugar together. Add slightly beaten eggs. Sift flour three times with baking powder, soda, and spices. Add dry ingredients to butter-brown sugar mixture alternately with sour cream, starting with flour and ending with flour. Bake in buttered square pan, 9"x9", for 50 minutes at 350 degrees.

This also makes 2 dozen small cupcakes. They make a delicious dessert topped with certified raw whipped cream.

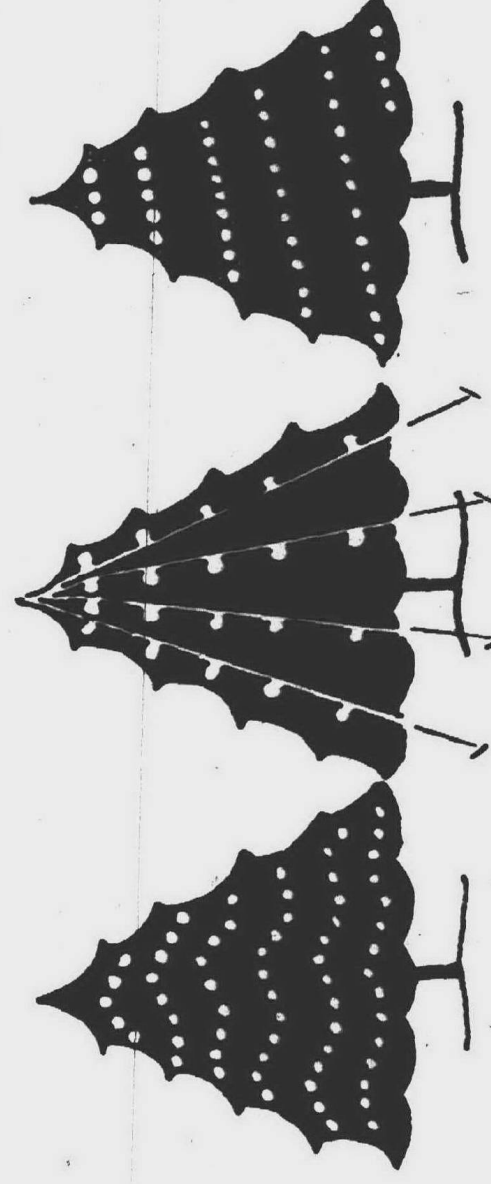

# BASKETBALL SOLDIERS FROM GIFT WRAPPINGS

Christmas — what a fabulous, fascinating, thoroughly fantastic day for the children! It's a day for eating the tastiest goodies, opening the most exciting surprises from Santa, playing with the most wonderful toys, dolls and games.

In fact, it's so exciting that sometimes even the liveliest youngsters want to rest.

This is the signal for Mom and Dad to suggest a change of pace such as a slow-paced game to play or something that's fun to do or make.

"Basketball Soldiers" could be the answer.

A diagram accompanying this article shows dimensions to follow in cutting out the soldiers. The whole idea was developed by the Norcross design studio.

The following materials, or substitutes, can be used:

Solid-color glazed gift wrap; patterned gift wraps.

Foil gift wrap

Cord and ribbon

Ribbon spools, 3/4" wide x 3" diameter

Stapler

White glue, rubber cement, spray adhesive

Corrugated board, poster board or

heavy cardboard

Numbers cut from gold paper

1. USING SPRAY adhesive, cover corrugated board (26" x 36") with foil gift wrap. Edge board with gold ribbon.

2. Cut soldiers from poster board. Score arms on back at dash lines (see diagram) and fold forward.

3. Cement patterned gift wrap to hat and shirt area, including backs of arms.

4. Cement foil gift wrap to legs. Glue a piece of cord down center of legs to divide trousers.

5. Add sequins for eyes. Cut mouths from gift wrap.

6. Decorate hat and add other decorations, from shredded ribbon.

7. For the ring or "basket," remove top and bottom from ribbon spool. Cover the inner ring with foil. Place arms around ring and staple in place. Staple ring to body.

Basketball soldiers can then be glued to covered, corrugated board and numbers glued in place under each figure. Object is to toss ping-pong balls into the rings. Numbers on board, under the soldiers, determine the score.

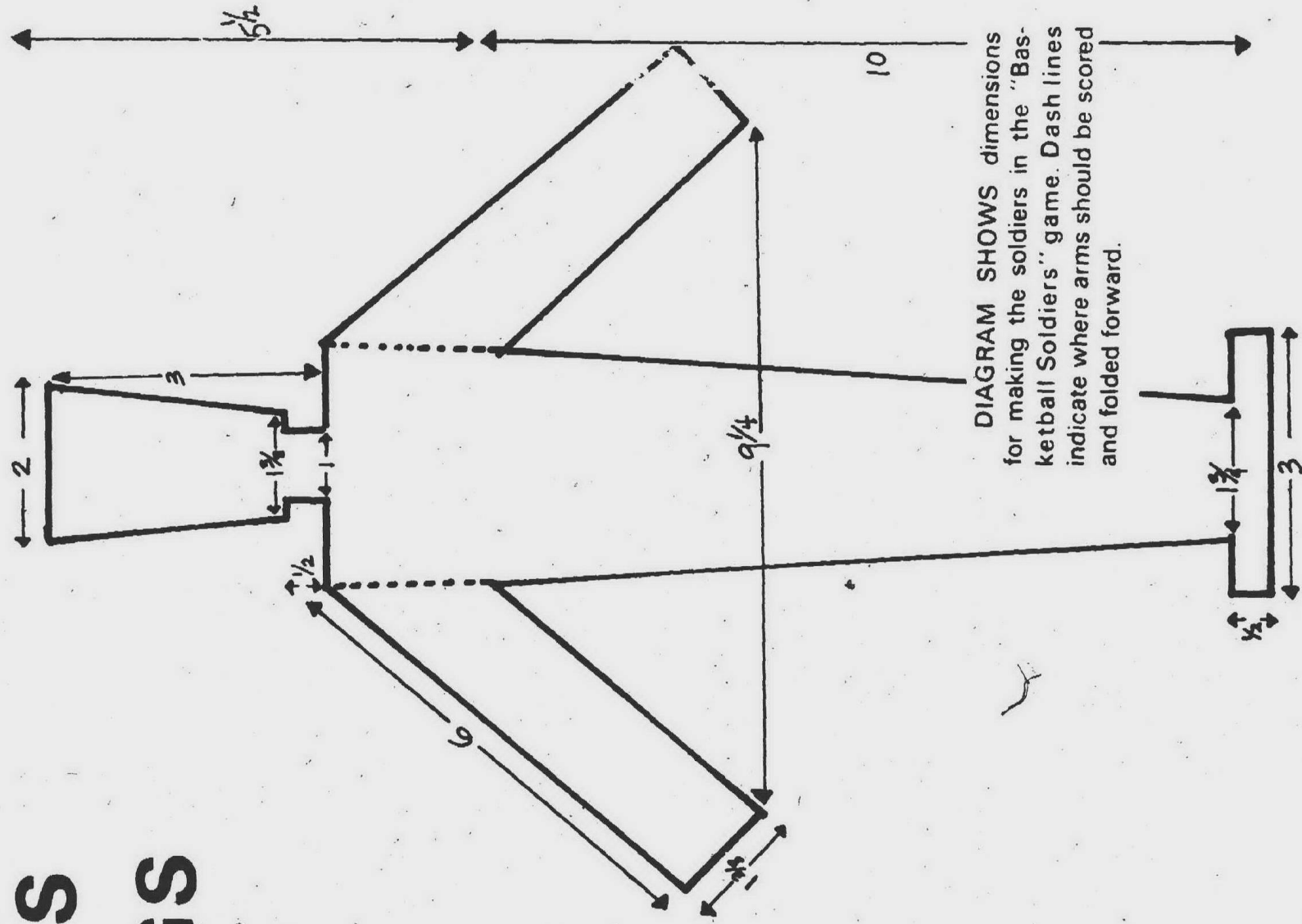
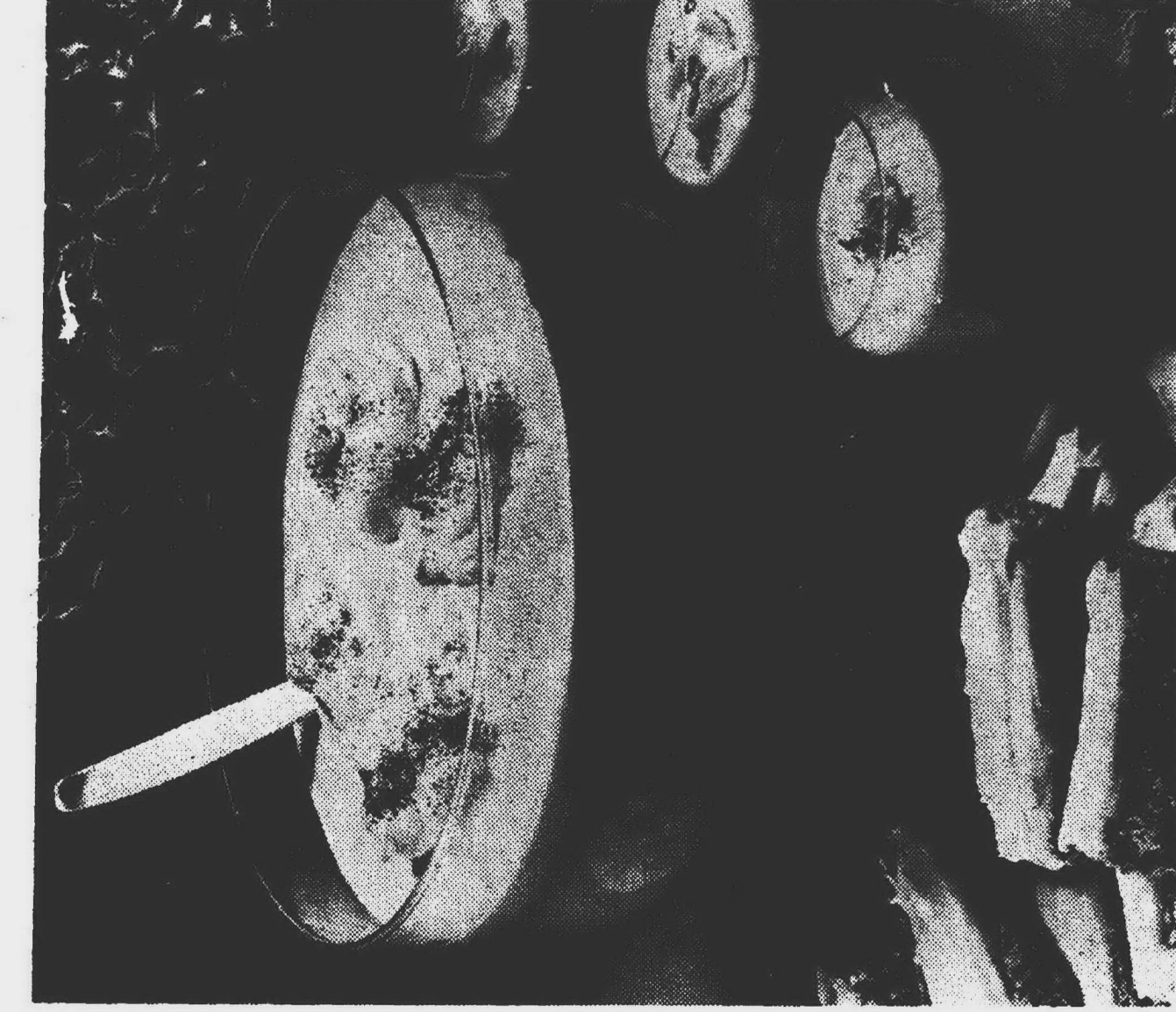
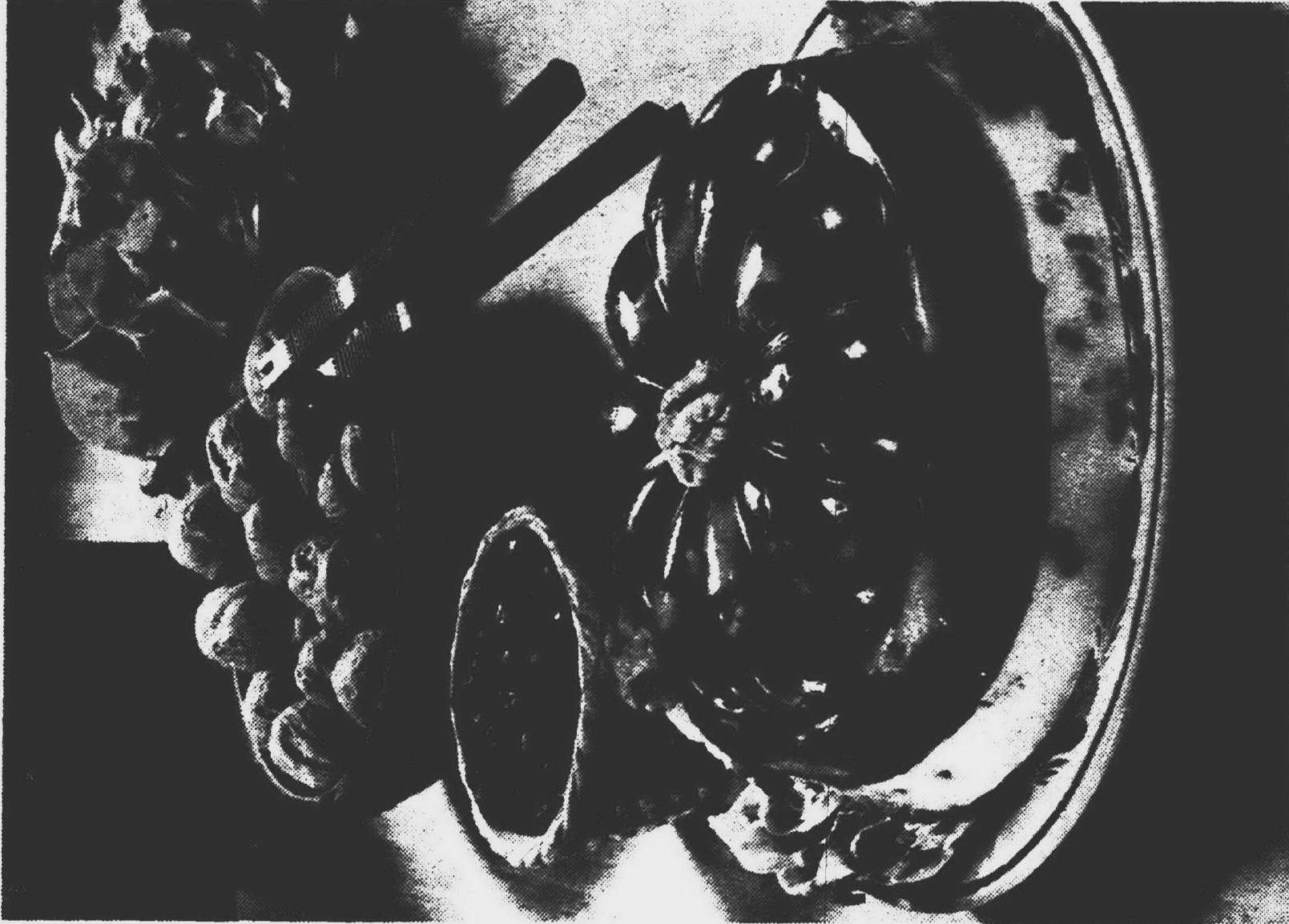


DIAGRAM SHOWS dimensions for making the soldiers in the "Basketball Soldiers" game. Dash lines indicate where arms should be scored and folded forward.

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HOLIDAY VISITS

The cookie gift tins are then covered with gay wrapping paper or coloring creations prepared in advance.

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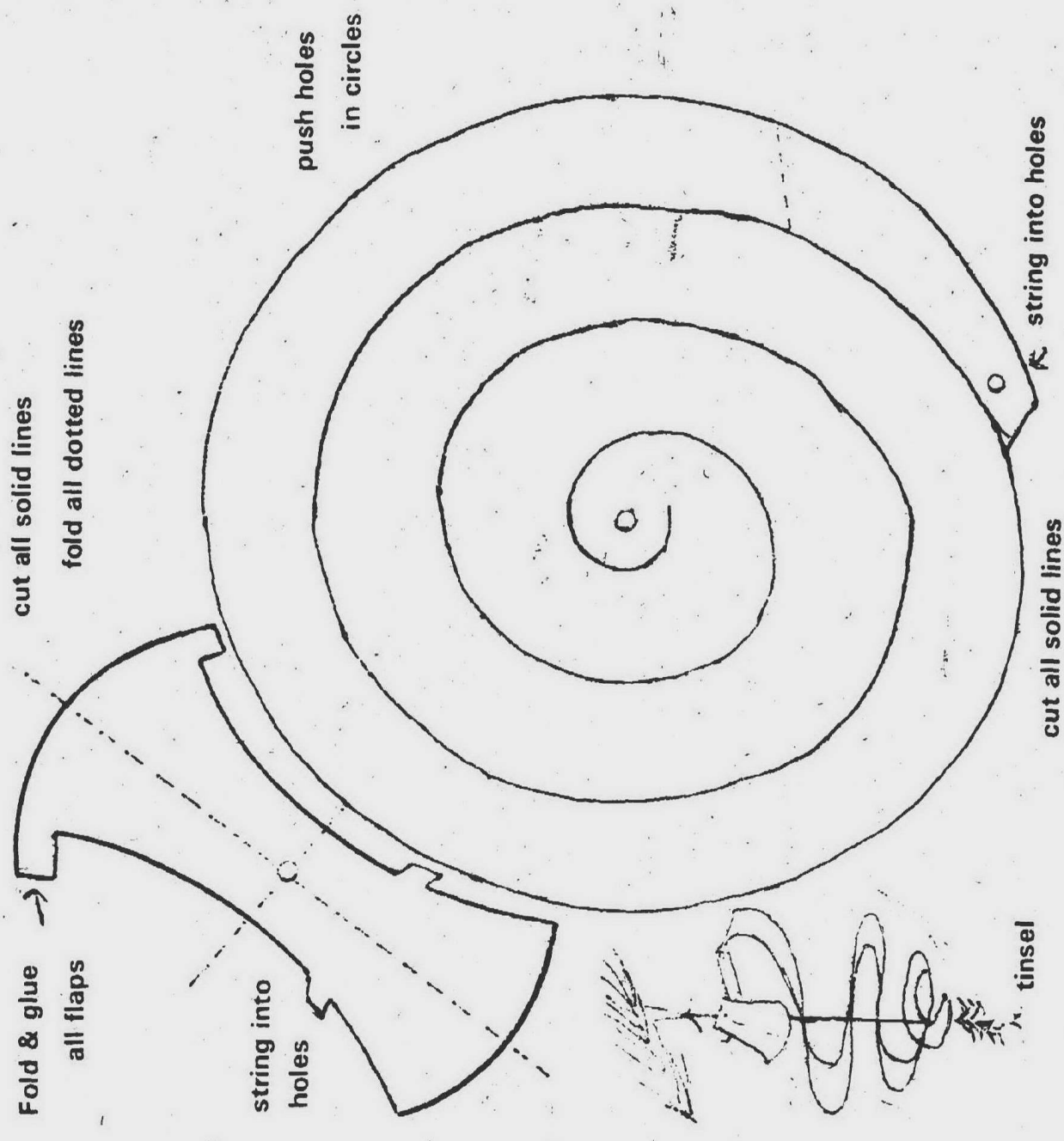

The topping is equally simple and appropriate — an egg nog sauce. It is made by beating one egg in a small bowl until foamy. Beat into this a third of a cup of melted butter, 1 1/2 cups of sifted powdered sugar, one teaspoon of vanilla and a quarter of a teaspoon of nutmeg. Lightly fold in one cup of heavy whipped cream. Chill. Stir before serving on cooled cakes. This recipe makes about three cups of topping.

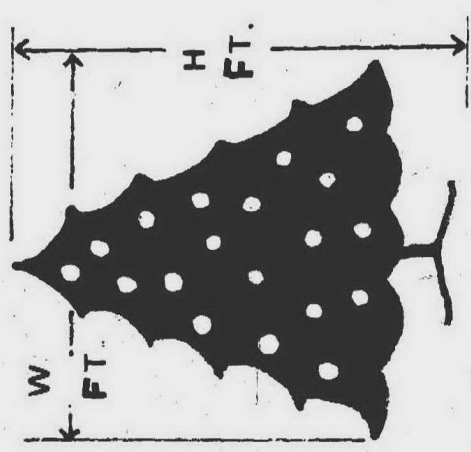

CHRISTMAS SPIRAL



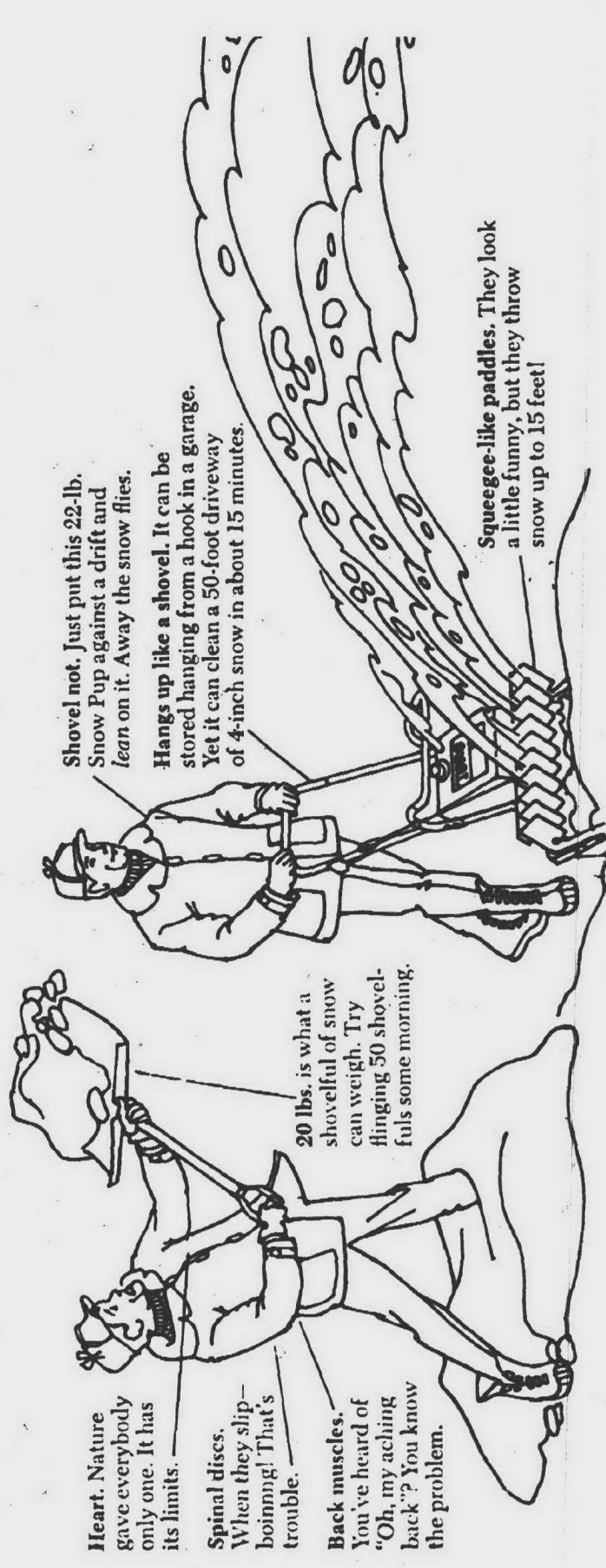
THERE'S SOMETHING PERSONAL about a Christmas tree that has homemade ornaments hanging from its branches. This pattern can be copied on foil or sturdy colored construction paper. String through the bell, the spiral, and tie to a piece of tinsel. The ornament will twirl with any breeze that is made.

BARE branches need about five lights for every foot of height. On a larger tree, a 25-light set is used for every five feet of tree 10 feet from ground. Lights should be UL listed for outdoors.



THE RANDOM PATTERN is most usual. Tent style, has lights fastened to wires running from tip of tree or a pole to ground. Spiral and contour require closely spaced bulbs, easily done by overlapping two light strings.

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
