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As the old year fades into the new, The Plymouth Mail & Observer has asked several area community leaders to review the events of 1972 and to forecast what lies ahead for 1973.

Some of these reviews-forecasts appear here in this edition and some will appear in our next edition, Jan. 4.

Until the early 1960s, Canton Township was still a farm-oriented community. It played an important role in making Wayne County the top sweet-corn producing county in the state. Its people, though primarily oriented to Plymouth, were also served by the market centers of Ypsilanti, Belleville and Wayne.

In the mid-60s, as the suburban wave moved across Livonia and Westland, and water and sewer lines were extended westward, it became apparent that Canton was next in line for heavy growth. Impetus was added to this pattern by a strong growth in industry during the same period, which provided close-to-home employment for people moving this way.

As we moved into the late '60s, development in the Canton area moved from the blue print stage to the construction stage. It moved at an accelerating rate for perhaps the usual reasons: the national trend to leave the urban areas for jobs, good schools and an excellent quality of life. This was normal growth that could be expected and coped with in a normal way.

AT THIS POINT in time, the Roth case, dealing with the integration of Detroit area metropolitan schools, came into the courts. I believe this

case overshadows every other factor in accounting for the growth in Canton, moving from steady growth, to the boom that we are presently involved in.

The simple fact that Plymouth was not included in the busing area opened the door to a growth pattern as rapid as any in the state. Every indication is that, barring severe economic set-backs, this growth will continue to a point, population-wise, of 45,000 to 55,000 people.

A common question in the community today is, "Why doesn't Canton just turn off the faucet and stop the flow of new people?" It would be nice if the solution were that simple.

First, the township is governed by law, not the personal opinions of its leadership. Any decision made by Canton Township, which impairs the rights of any of its citizens, will be overturned by the courts. Because of the assessment of taxes in the township (over which, Canton does not have a strong control), we have increased the taxes on farms in the township to a point where it is no longer possible to even break even farming in Canton Township. This leaves the owners of our township land with the option of selling their farms or operating at loss.

THE STATEMENT is made. "Fine, sell, but don't permit

What '73 Holds For Area's Youth

In writing this piece on the old year and the meaning of the new, I decided on a different approach.

Instead of my thoughts and ramblings, I've tried to capture the impression of young people on the subject. It was difficult to translate the conversations that followed into a simple, coherent package of responses, but some of them struck me as particularly meaningful and I would like to share them with you.

THE FIRST interaction on the subject came from a young man informing me of his enlistment in the Army. I never asked him any questions about the past year. Shattering and tragic experiences of the past year had marred him deeply.

As he saw it, there was nothing for him here. No jobs, except slinging hamburgers on the production line, uncertainty and despair. He wanted tranquility and safety. There was some guarantee in the Army. He could get some training for a career. "Of course, it is far from perfect, but what is? After all, I might as well accept things as they are. They never change; they get worse."

A ONE-TIME "jock," now going to high school in the west, talked about the significance of the past year. "Everything has been better since I left. Now I can be myself...Things are worse here every time I come back." Referring to his peers, "Attitudes are based on what can be bought, on style. There is little concern or in-

volvement. For the typical Plymouth kid, everything is passing by and nobody knows it."

The changing nature of the community had a significant effect on one energetic young man. "The changes made in the park (referring to the recent dissection), the destruction of old buildings were significant." These alterations and overnight physical changes to him.

"There is a changing concept of Plymouth. It's not a community of homes any more but one of business. As it continues to grow, people become secondary to more Goodyear stores." The electric blue emblem of the store, hoisted well above Main Street is particularly disturbing to him, he said.

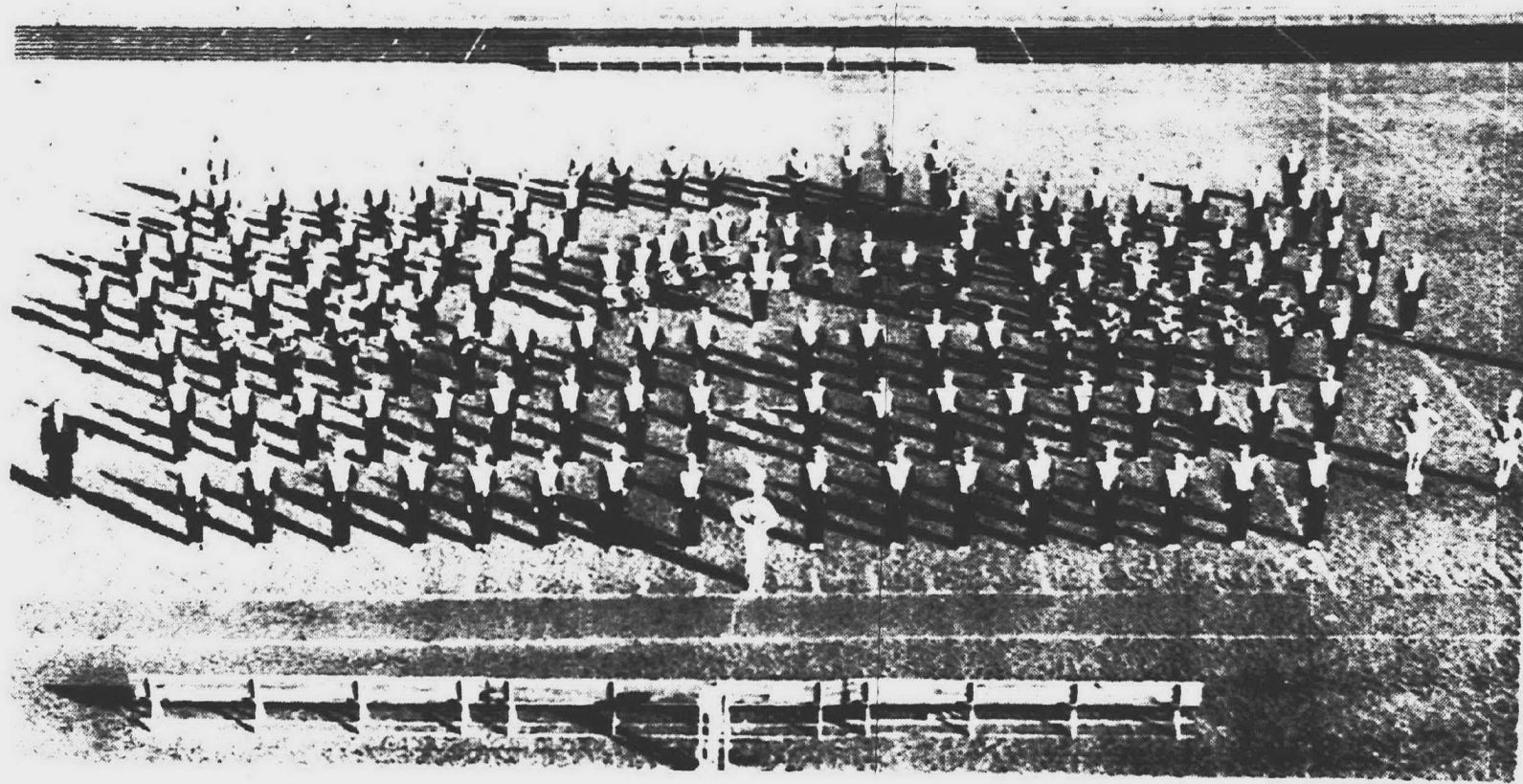
A YOUNG woman interrupted recruitment of fund raisers to respond. She felt that people were growing indifferent, hardened to the needs of others during the past year. "You know, there is too much apathy. Fewer people really care and fewer will next year."

"She said she learned a great deal about people during the past year. No longer shocked by the apathy she finds surrounding her, she carries on with determination that 'someone has to do it.'"

Although we didn't converse about the future, the energy flowing from her indicates that she will not give up caring.

Glancing over my notes, there was little talk about politics or worldly philosophical dilemmas, adjustments to the realities of

They're Off! Band Leaves For Pasadena

Network telecasts of Monday's 84th annual Tournament of Roses Parade from Pasadena, Calif., will put the Plymouth High School band on view before an estimated 100 million persons in the United States, Canada and Mexico - besides the live audience of more than a million which will line the parade route.

Departure of the band's chartered American Airlines B-123 from Metropolitan Airport at 8:30 this morning (Thursday) marked the beginning of this adventure which climaxes the band's rise to national prominence under Director James Griffith.

The 168-passenger plane was loaded to capacity with bandmen and parents, all of whom will be quartered in a UCLA dormitory until the return non-stop flight Tuesday.

THE NEW YEAR'S Day parade steps off promptly at 11:30 a.m. (Eastern Standard Time) and will be televised in its entirety by both CBS (Ch. 2) and NBC (Ch. 4).

Plymouth's band will be No. 83 among 125 parade units. Local television viewers can alert themselves to the Rocks' upcoming appearance when the massed pipes and drums of Winnipeg, Canada, come into view.

Next will come the City of Montebello float, an equestrian group, the Bank of America float, another equestrian unit, the Association of Motion Picture and Television Producers' float and then Plymouth's 136-piece band.

EARLIER in the morning Monday, NBC also will present an hour-long taped parade salute called the "Tournament of Roses Band Revue" in which Plymouth will perform a two-minute segment called "Goal Line Blues," taken from a halftime football show last fall.

This will be taped at Pasadena's city hall plaza Saturday, with singing star Bobby Vinton as master of ceremonies. Rose Queen Salli Ann Noren also will participate and in the competition will be high school bands from these cities:

Plymouth; Angleton, Texas; Cary, N.C.; Elkhart, Ind.; Tulsa, Okla.; Tenafly, N.J.; El Monte, Calif.; and Glendora, Calif.

It is suggested that those who wish to watch telecasts of

the parade and related events check television listings in Monday's Ch. 2 and Ch. 4 logs for specific air times.

There will be 60 floats, 22 bands, approximately 200 horsemen and numerous Pasadena and Tournament of Roses Association dignitaries in the 1973 Rose Parade which has the theme, "Movie Memories." John Wayne will serve as grand marshal.

In addition to the eight high schools already mentioned, these are the other bands which will march in the five-mile parade:

Ohio State University; University of Southern California; Pasadena City College; Salvation Army; McDonald's All American Band; Mutual Savings & Loan Toppers; U.S. Marine Corps; U.S. Continental Army Band; Cal Poly; Glendale and Long Beach All District Bands; Escondido, Calif.; Los Angeles All City Band and the Winnipeg Pipes and Drums.

MOST OF the floats for which the Rose Parade is noted have been under creation for months, although it is not until the last 48 hours before the parade that the thousands upon thousands of live flowers are affixed. In some instances, cost of a float runs to \$50,000 or more.

Just as Plymouth has selected a musical medley to fit the parade's motion picture theme ("Lullaby of Broadway," "Do-Re-Mi" and "Climb Every Mountain"), float sponsors fit their creations to the same theme.

For instance, the Producers Association float which Plymouth's band will be following down Orange Grove, Colorado and Sierra Madre Blvds. for more than two hours has the title, "Memories in the Making." The Tournament of Roses has provided this description:

"The film shown on the entry represents the technology of the motion picture and television industry while the many revolving stars are symbolic of the glamor of Hollywood and its greats through the years - the stars, the producers and the directors."

"A galaxy of glittering, revolving stars is held aloft by a whirling strip of film. The brilliant colors of the film are created by petals of varying colors and specie."

"A profusion of white roses, orchids and spider chrysanthemums provide a softening touch to the heavenly spectacle. The 18 overhead moving stars are all

interphased so that they will interlock in their rotation, yet never collide."

Immediately behind Plymouth's band will come the City of Los Angeles float, "The African Queen," a floral salute to one of the great movie classics showing the legendary craft making its way through a tropical swamp with smoke billowing from its stack.

After their arrival, Plymouth's delegation will spend the balance of Thursday on the UCLA campus, while Friday will be highlighted by a

tour of Universal Studios and a bus trip through Hollywood and Los Angeles.

Saturday will be marked by rehearsal and taping of the special NBC band show at Pasadena, and on Sunday the band will perform at Disneyland as well as visit its many attractions as Disneyland guests.

A visit to Marineland of the Pacific and the retired ocean liner, The Queen Mary will precede the flight home Tuesday. Arrival is scheduled at Metro shortly after midnight.

Vandals Plague Cultural Center

Vandalism in the new cultural center - which has been officially open for two weeks - has caused the city to close down part of the facility.

According to Walter Adams, building manager, the lounge areas, the multi-purpose room and the arts and crafts room were closed off during the Christmas weekend due to vandalism and carelessness.

The partial closing of the building will not include the ice rink, teen activities room, concession area or special events arranged for the other parts of the building.

ADAMS SAID the vandalism included:

Damage to furniture from intentionally set fires, fires in the trash barrels, damage to toilet facilities, damage to the pool table and games in the teen activities room, burns and spilled drinks on the carpeting.

As a further precaution against vandalism, Adams said there would be an occupancy limitation placed on the teen activities room to prevent unruly crowds from gathering.

He said he hoped the city would hire additional security help for the building.

ADAMS SAID the carelessness to the building's furnishings and the refusal of many of the building's patrons to deposit litter in trash barrels meant that food and beverages sold in the concession area would no longer be allowed in other parts of the building. He said this would include the rink.

There also have been complaints about litter - including beer bottles - in the center's parking lot.

Mayor James McKeon said the city commission would discuss the center's vandalism problem at its next meeting. He said the commission would also consider problems of mechanical maintenance for the facility.

Schoolcraft Registers Jan. 3-4

Registration for the winter semester at Schoolcraft College will be conducted Jan. 3 and 4 in the physical education building on campus. Sophomore day students will register from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. the first day. Freshmen are scheduled that afternoon between 1 and 3:30 p.m., and the balance of students will register during the morning of the second day.

Evening students, including those planning to take classes in Garden City, can register either night between 6:30 and 8:30 p.m.

REGISTRAR Russell Bogarin said nearly 3,700 students have completed advance registration conducted at various times since November.

"Hopefully, another 2,300 will register on the 3rd and 4th, enabling us to reach our projected enrollment of 6,000," he said.

The college has been concerned about declining enrollments which were down eight per cent in credit hours taken during the fall semester. A task force appointed by Dr. C. Nelson Grote, college president, has been directing efforts toward retaining students from the fall to the winter semesters. The advance count is an indication that it has had some effect.

SCHOOLCRAFT'S winter semester runs from Jan. 6 through April 26. The college serves residents of Clarendville, Garden City, Livonia, Northville and Plymouth School Districts.

Resident tuition is \$11 per credit hour; out-of-district students pay \$22 per hour, and all students are assessed a 50-cent per hour activity fee.

Persons wishing registration or other information should call the college admissions office.

OCC Will Register Jan. 2-5

Final registration for the winter semester on the Orchard Ridge campus of Oakland Community College will be held according to an alphabetical schedule Jan. 2 to 5.

Classes begin Jan. 8. An extended registration period will be held daily and in the evenings Jan. 8 to 11 and on Jan. 12 during the day.

Registration times are from 9 to 11:30 a.m., to 4 p.m., and 6 to 8 p.m.

The alphabetical schedule is available by contacting the college.

NEW STUDENTS who are interested in one or several classes should allow about an hour's lead time before registration to fill out an application.

Appointments can be made in advance if the prospective student wants to see a counselor.

Counselor Larry Soldan, who is coordinating registration, said that a person who is taking a class on the campus for the first time should be able to apply and register in 15 minutes.

Applications are available in the building in the center of campus. A \$10 application fee is charged.

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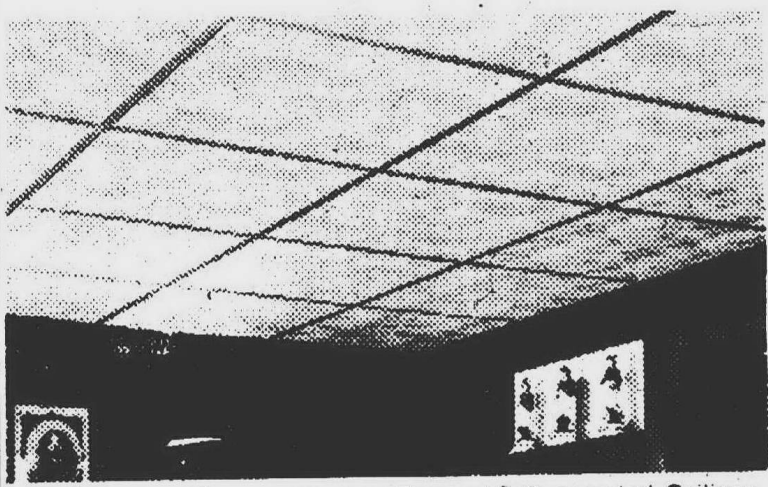
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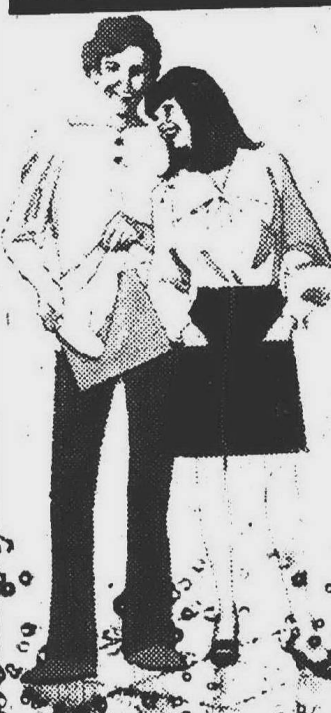
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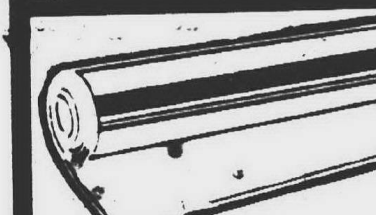
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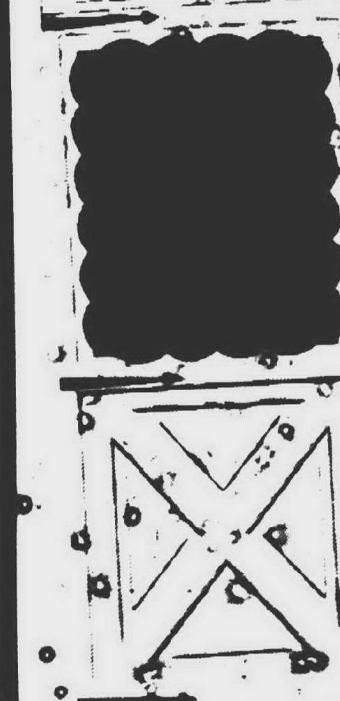


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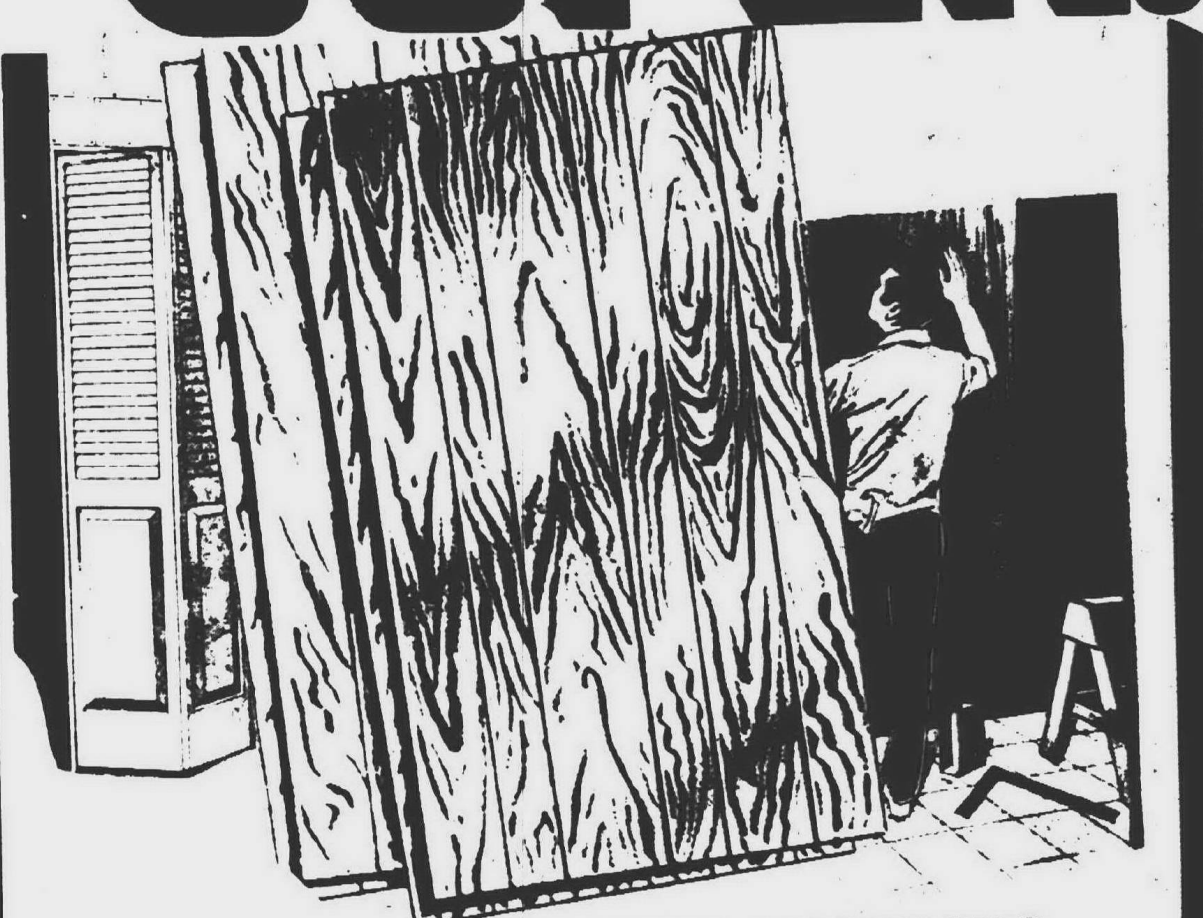
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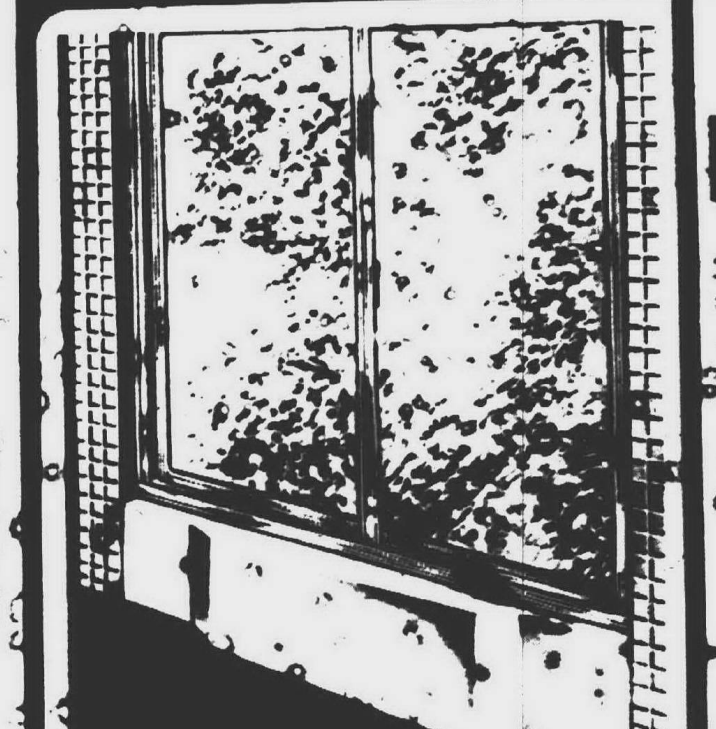
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Packaging Corp. Fire Fit Pattern

PLYMOUTH
The \$5 million fire that leveled the Packaging Corp. of America plant followed a trend. Most damaging fires in the City of Plymouth have happened during the cold months between November and March.

For the past seven years, total loss in both buildings and contents because of fire reached \$5.4 million and this does not include the holocaust at Lofy's little more than a year ago, because that is in Plymouth Township.

Plymouth firemen are still searching through the rubbish and still-smoldering ashes of the Packaging Corp. plant. A small flare-up on Tuesday morning — 10 days after the fire — required the fire department to return to the scene.

THE LARGEST fire previous to the Packaging Corp. razing, was the one that leveled the old P&A theater on Penniman Avenue just about five years ago.

The theater wasn't being used at the time of the blaze, so the loss was restricted to the building and contents of few stores on either side. This loss totaled \$200,000.

Among other heavy losses were the Pilgrim Apartments and the apartments at 1199 Sheldon Road where the total in each case reached \$200,000.

morning and attended her first official meeting that night. She was named secretary when Commissioners Lee Wilson and Grant Campbell declined nomination.

Mrs. Ruland replaces Mrs. Pearl Doyle, pioneer resident and longtime commissioner, who moved from the township several months ago.

Mrs. Ruland was a candidate for township clerk in the August Democratic primary and is vice chairman of the Plymouth School Advisory Council.

A Democratic precinct delegate, she currently seeks appointment to the party's State Central Committee from the 15th Congressional District, which includes Canton.

LAWTON, who is known as a mild-mannered man who can get tough when he has to, is president of the Plymouth Community School District's Board of Education.

His handling of several touchy commission meetings has given him a reputation of wearing a velvet glove over an iron fist, some say.

Mrs. Ruland lives at 44028 S. Umberland in Olde Plymouth, one of Canton's newest subdivisions. She began attending commission meetings more than a year ago while still a resident of Livonia.

She attended Marquette College where she majored in political science and speech. The Rulands have two pre-schoolers, aged two and four.

Canton Funds Zoning Study

CANTON TOWNSHIP
Sorely needed updating of the land use plan and zoning ordinances will begin immediately in Canton Township with approval of a \$14,500 expenditure for the year-long project.

The township board approved the recommendation of Planning Consultant Michael Manore at its Dec. 12 meeting. The study was provided for in the 72-73 budget.

Manore said he will begin immediately to meet with township officials and interested residents as well as visit other communities to update the land use plan originally adopted in 1960.

He will issue periodic progress reports, Manore said, and will also issue an interim map showing development progress to date. He hopes to have the land use study completed by spring, Manore said, and will then tackle the zoning ordinances.

In the meantime, the township will continue to do business as usual. That was the answer given a resident who asked if future rezoning requests would be shelved until the new master plan is adopted.

"I don't think so," said Manore, adding that perhaps more of them might be tabled depending on the request.

more than one or two homes to the acre to hold down the population growth."

Wayne County presently requires paving, curb and gutter, water, sanitary sewer and storm drainage. In addition, developers are normally required to improve the adjacent main roads and to provide sidewalks and recreation areas. Whereas, long-range, this may be sound planning, it presently means that it requires more than three homes per acre to make such development feasible.

Farmers cannot sell land which cannot be developed. Would the courts permit zoning which would not permit the sale of land? Would it be fair for us to economically ruin our farm owners, even if the courts would permit it? (I, personally, don't believe it would.)

There are two valid control factors which may play a part in Canton's development. First, if Plymouth were to be included in the school busing area of the Roth decision, I believe we would have a substantial slowdown in growth rate. It would not appear that this control would be popular with the average citizen.

The second control factor will be the capacity of our sanitary sewer system. If our capacity will serve 50,000 people, as we approach this

figure, the rate of growth will stabilize. This last factor is probably the most positive, single factor that will regulate the rate at which our community grows.

IT WOULD appear that the greatest impact of heavy growth in Canton will be in schools.

Two problems are presented in this area. First, of course, is the problem of providing classrooms and teachers for an immense number of school age children in a very short time.

Adversely, the second part of the problem is long-range and involves over-building. With moderate growth, there is a tendency for older sections to send younger students to school and to balance out the pres-

ures brought by the newer subdivisions with many young children. With very rapid growth, this balancing process does not take place. It produces needs that are immediate.

For the city, I see Canton as a broad, new market area for its goods and services. Commercial requirements for serving so many new people will be immense. If the city continues its present trend of providing locations for the professions as well as commercial service organizations such as utilities and banking; if it continues to expand its unique specialty shops, the surrounding growth would certainly enhance not only the base from a tax standpoint, but also in the cultural and civic life.

IF, AS IT appears, Plymouth is going to receive a normal 15 year growth in six or seven years, then we should perhaps be looking at some, or all, of the following factors.

- We must take special care to plan for the quality of life as well as basic necessities. This includes carefully planned park areas. It includes recreation facilities for all ages.

- We must include the amenities in our planning which separate a planned community from suburban sprawl. We need not go far east to see the effects of strip development.

- We must look toward the goal of providing our total community with adequate police and fire protection, as well as the other services that a community of 75,000-100,000 people requires.

Whereas joint planning tends to run counter to our provincial tendencies, there are many projects and services which can be provided best by the combined efforts of the adjoining communities. Much work has already been done in these areas with commendable results. More needs to be done.

In closing, I would say that Canton is working extremely hard to plan its growth realistically. We do not fear this growth, rather, we welcome it as a challenge to ingenuity and foresight of the people who are charged with the responsibility of planning for the growth of our community.

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THROUGH BIFOCALS

TEARS OF PRIDE are apt to cloud many a Plymouthite's vision for a few moments Monday morning when our kids show up on the "tube" out of Pasadena, and for their sake, I hope California does not welcome the new year with one of its monstrous downpours.

I know there is going to be a wave of nostalgia and homesickness in our house, for in all my professional experience the few years of association with the Tournament of Roses stand unique. Nothing I've ever seen matches the Rose Parade in spectacular beauty and originality.

The crowds start gathering

Meanwhile, finishing touches are being put on the spectacular floats, which must be decorated only with fresh flowers -- a financial bonanza for hundreds of college students. Throughout the night the floats are wheeled into place from their warehouses, a major logistic problem in itself, but somehow everything always is in readiness when the parade moves forward promptly at 8:30 a.m. as California's New Year's greeting to the world.

tersectional collegiate football. The first game in 1902 resulted in Michigan's 49-0 victory over Stanford.

PUBLICITYWISE, the festivities commanded only local coverage in the formative years, but all that has since changed. And it started changing long, long before television came along.

Newspapers, magazines, the wire services and the film industry have been spreading acclaim for the Tournament of Roses for decades, and network radio coverage started in the mid-'20s. It was an obvious "natural" for television, so much so in fact that network advertising time during last year's parade sold for \$32,000 a minute.

The Tournament of Roses Assn. compiles an official film of each procession, showing all floral entries and bands in 16mm color and sound, and you can bet many Plymouth groups will want to view the 1973 copy. Prints are available from the association without charge and are in constant circulation throughout the world.

But in all of the modernization that the parade has gone through, two original elements have been retained -- flowers and horses. Many of the latter are among the finest breeds in the world, but they have the same habit as horses everywhere. I hope I don't have to ask my son when he gets off the plane Tuesday night, "Well, if you saw it, why did you step in it?"

Back in those days, before fancy dinner parties and cocktail gatherings became the vogue on New Year's Eve, the ritual was to attend "Watch Night" services in the old white church on the hill.

It was quite a ritual, too, that brings back many fond memories: GATHERING AT 11 o'clock to spend the last hour of the old year, we'd join in a song service to await the magic moment.

Then, with about five minutes left of the old year, the organist would swing into the rhythm of "The Tie That Binds," and everyone joined hands in a moment, the likes of which didn't happen any other time during the year.

It was a solemn moment. But just about the end of the second verse, the young fellows would slip away

behind the organ and streak for the belfry to ring the bell, tolling out the old year and ringing in the new.

In the years that passed, The Stroller roamed far from the old white church on the hill and found that such things as holding hands in church and singing "Blessed Be The Tie That Binds" were considered old-fashioned and gave way to cocktail parties.

There are some things, though, that a fellow doesn't forget, no matter how far from home he may roam. Ringing the bell on New Year's Eve is one of them.

WHEN FORTUNE smiled on him and made possible owning his own home in what was then known as the country, The Stroller insisted that an old bell be brought in from the farm and given a place of honor in the rear yard.

It was placed there for one purpose -- to ring at the bewitching hour of midnight on New Year's Eve.

So, if you are in the vicinity of The Stroller's domicile on New Year's Eve and hear the tolling of the bell, you can rest in the knowledge that the tradition of long standing is being carried out for another year.

Nowadays when a fellow can sit in his living room and watch the major events of the

world on his TV, he shouldn't long for what some folks call "the good old days." But there are some things The Stroller misses greatly during these winter nights.

IT WOULD BE a real thrill to be back in the church and join the Watch Night Service. Just thinking about it gives him cause to feel goose-pimples. It would be a thrill, too, to join the party for an old fashioned sleigh ride into the country and a good old fashioned "chicken and waffle" dinner.

These used to be society events for the younger set, and what real enjoyment they

were! We used to gather at the main corner in town -- the boys with their girl friends -- and climb up on the horse drawn sleigh for the eight-mile trip to the country hotel.

Once there, after a fine ride, there'd be singing and all kinds of dancing, until the call to dinner. There's the old fashioned waltz, the two-step and the schottische (for the uninitiated, this is the three step and kick routine) and then the closing square dance before the call to dinner. And what a dinner!

THE FARM WOMEN at these hotels did all the cooking, and the chicken and

waffles were served family style. What food, y'know, whipped potatoes and gra.

Usually, the woman who did the cooking would slip by the table and whisper, "Save room for some cake -- I baked it fresh only an hour ago."

Such things are now in the limbo of forgotten things as the concrete highways and the automobiles have made the old country inns a relic of the past.

They'll never be forgotten by those who once enjoyed them -- just another of the things The Stroller misses on these wintry nights along with the tolling of the bell on New Year's Eve.

Four Awarded MSU Degrees

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C'ville Test Scores Near Median

Clarenceville fourth and seventh graders tested at about the mid-point in overall scholastic achievement compared with their peers in other districts throughout the state.

Clarenceville's fourth graders wound up with a mean score of 53.1 and seventh graders at 49.2.

A score of 50 means that half the school districts in the state scored higher, half lower. A score of 70 means that 70 per cent of the districts had lower scores and 30 per cent higher.

Percentile rankings, however, showed a sharp difference between overall achievement of the two grades.

FOURTH GRADERS chalked up a percentile rank ranging from 81 to 86, which translates that 81 to 86 per cent of fourth graders in the state's other districts ranked lower.

In contrast, seventh graders were at the 21 to 26 percentile in composite basic achievement scores, meaning

that only 21 to 26 per cent of seventh graders elsewhere in the state ranked lower.

The composite averages include scores achieved in mathematics, reading and written English. Results of the vocabulary test were excluded.

Results of last year's tests ranked Clarenceville fourth graders at the 17th percentile in composite achievement and seventh graders at the 45th percentile.

THIS YEAR'S results

showed fourth graders ranking at the 79 to 86 percentile in reading and at the 75 to 86 percentile in math. Average (mean) scores came to 52.9 in reading and 53.1 in math.

Fourth graders also ranked at the 88-92 percentile in vocabulary and at the 80-87 percentile in written English.

Seventh graders turned in these percentiles: 53-67 in vocabulary, 11-17 in reading, 20-31 in written English and 32-44 in math.

SOME WEAKNESSES of

the test rankings are disclosed, however, in comparing actual test scores. For example, the mean math test score for Clarenceville seventh graders was 50.3, compared with 52 for Troy. Yet, Clarenceville's percentile rank was 32 to 44 compared with Troy's 61 to 70.

The assessment survey reported Clarenceville with 47.7 professional staff members per 1,000 students which ranked it at the 60th percentile in that category in the state and with 39.6 teachers per 1,000 students or at the 34th percentile.

Clarenceville teachers were found to average 6.3 years of teaching experience, for the 17th percentile in that category -- a young faculty.

Teachers with masters degrees came to 20.4 per cent of the teaching force and the 43rd percentile. The average teacher salary figured to \$10,495 for the 74th percentile rank -- relatively well paid on a statewide scale.

Clarenceville reported at the 38th percentile in socio-economic status. This is a measurement of family income, parents' educational level and parents' occupation.

GM '72 Payroll Is \$85 Million

Payrolls and payments to suppliers during 1972 at the four General Motors facilities in Livonia totaled \$176 million, setting local records.

A joint year-end statement came from Walter O. Muller, Chevrolet plant manager and chairman of the Livonia GM Plant City Committee; F. Harger Green, Fisher Body plant manager; Dick T. French, GM Parts Division manager, and Roger J. Browne, in charge of the Cadillac Motor Car Division-Livonia operation.

Payrolls totaled an estimated \$85 million in 1972, a \$5 million increase over the previous record set in 1971.

IN ADDITION to the record payrolls, GM spent a substantial amount of money on benefits for each employee. For

example, almost \$3,000 per average hourly employee was paid by General Motors for such items as insurance premiums, pension contributions and social security taxes during 1972.

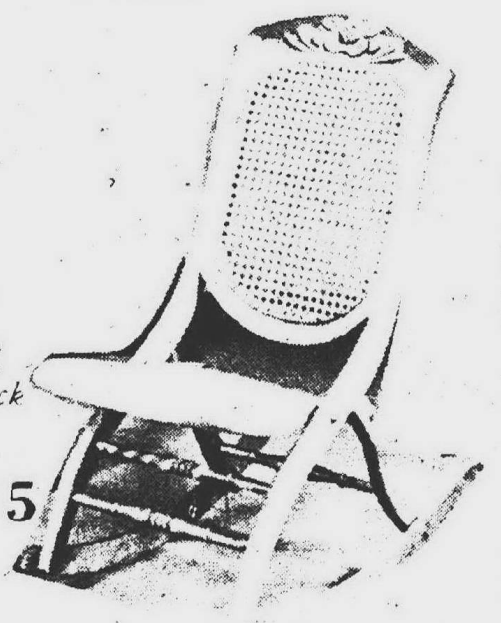
Purchases of goods and services from more than 2,200 suppliers within a 75-mile radius of Livonia totaled nearly \$91 million, an increase of \$3.6 million over last year's previous record.

The more than 6,900 GM employees set another record with their payroll deductions for U.S. savings bonds when they invested \$3.1 million in the program.

Nearly \$189,000 was awarded to employees under terms of the GM suggestion plan for ideas to improve the quality and efficiency of GM's products and operations.

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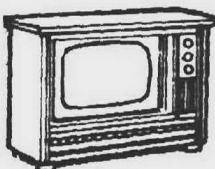


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Tree Removal Bill: \$75,000

A \$75,000 expenditure for removal of dead and diseased trees from the Wayne County parks system has been approved by the County Board of Commissioners.

Commissioners last week authorized a transfer of budget funds within the Parks Department of the County Road Commission.

The outlay will finance removal of some 2,000 potentially hazardous trees, mainly dead or dying elms, located throughout the park system's 4,400 acres.

The county park system includes Bell Creek and Lola Valley Parks in Redford; Elizabeth Park in Trenton; Veteran's Park in Hamtramck; Victory Park in Belleville; plus Edward Hines Drive and the Lower and Middle Rouge and Metropolitan Parkways.

According to Edward E. Mika, superintendent of the Parks Department, work to remove the trees will begin immediately and is expected to be completed by May 1973.

"It is essential that we begin and complete the work while the ground is frozen hard," he said.

Rather than increase the size of the park system work force, the \$75,000 will be used to hire temporary outside services. This will assure that the project will be completed before warm weather stimulates heavy traffic, said Mika.

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Comprehensive Testing Offered

Wayne County General Hospital has opened a comprehensive screening center designed to detect disease at early stages.

Called the "multiphasic screening comprehensive care unit," the center has a system where 20 individual examinations are performed with the assistance of specially trained nurses, technicians and doctors.

The screening center is available to adults age 18 and older and is open from 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Appointments can be made at the outpatient by calling the outpatient department.

PATIENTS FILL out a medical history which is computerized and consists of nearly 100 questions.

Tests included electrocardiogram (EKG), glucose tolerance for diabetes detection, chest X-ray, lung function tests, blood pressure, eye exams that include both vision and glaucoma tests, hearing tests, dental checkups, blood tests which

analyze 12 separate bodily functions, blood counts and urine analysis.

Cancer detection tests include a pap smear and mammogram for all women over 45.

Also included is a sickle cell anemia test under the supervision of Dr. Norman Nelson, chief of hematology. Individuals who want the sickle cell test can call the multiphasic screening clinic.

IF THE TESTS detect sickle cell anemia, the patient can be treated at the hospital.

AFTER ALL tests are processed, the patient returns for an appointment with a physician for personal evaluation, examination and final diagnosis.

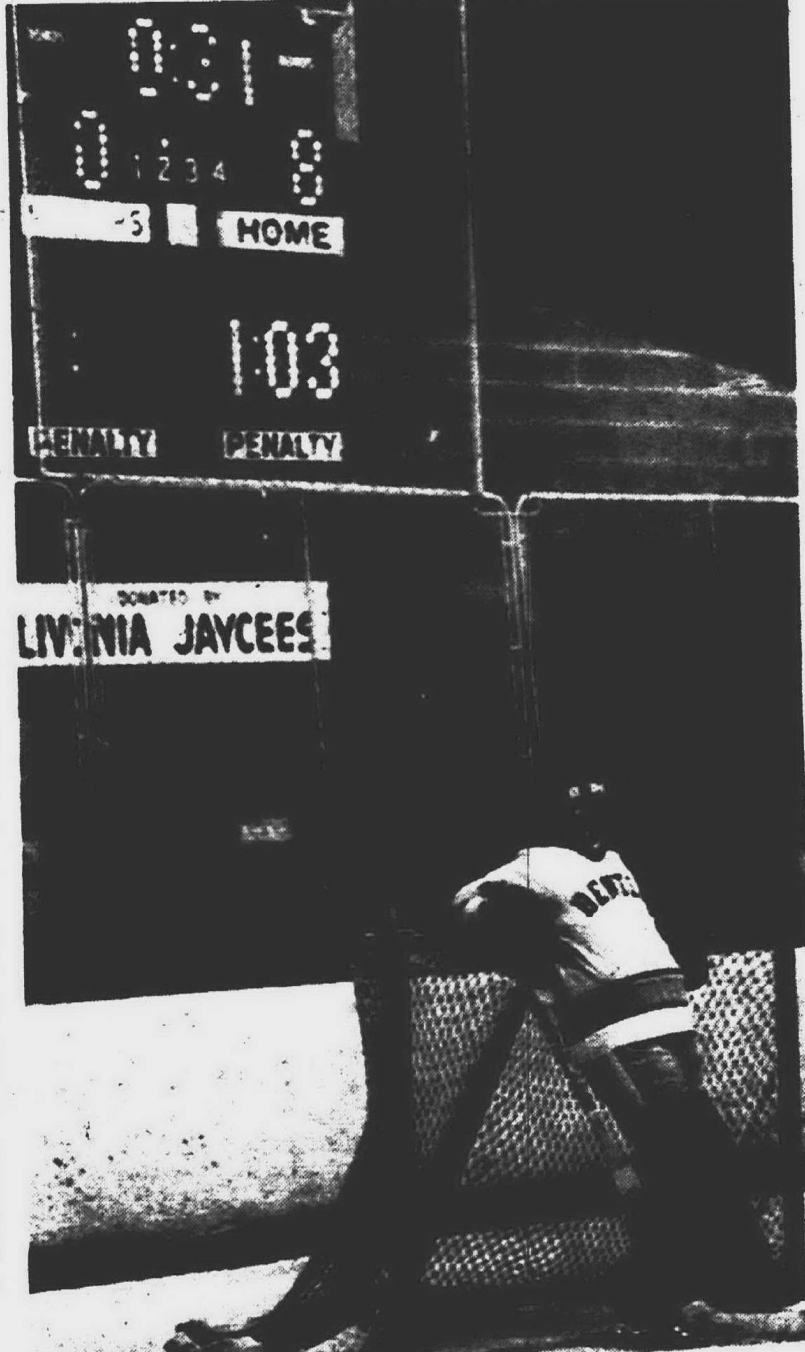

Turf Tips, Quips

Jackson Harness Racing Association, headed by President and General Manager Leon Slavin, has the unusual honor of closing the Michigan racing season Saturday and then opening the 1973 campaign the following Monday.

It could be added that Jackson officially started the 1972 racing activities with a month-long meeting at Northville Downs. The story will be the same in the new year.

Although many of the better trotters and pacers have been farmed out for a rest during the remainder of the winter while awaiting the opening of the Northville Downs season in late January, Jackson racing secretary Tom Smith still has some excellent horses available for the remaining nights at Northville.

Speedway Jackie, best of the trotters, is getting a much deserved rest. Erlana's Valley, surprise winner of the \$10,000 finale of the late closing pacing series at Jackson-at-Northville, is freshening up as is Michigan Mack, star of the Ralph Mapes stable which won four of the six legs of the series.

Even with the loss of these speedsters, the competition is the keenest in years and Smith has little trouble arranging better than average programs.

With the Northville Downs opening only a month away, Smith expects to receive numerous requests for stall space from stables that have been freshening up horses since the close of the Hazel Park campaign.

But there is slight chance any of the requests will be granted. In the first place such applications have to be approved by the representatives of the Michigan Harness Horsemen's Association, and secondly all requests for stall space for the Northville Downs session have to be screened by the committee made up of MHHA officers, Racing Secretary Harry

Peterson and others from the 'Downs official family.

From Wolverine Harness Raceway comes notice that stall applications are available and must be received by Feb. 15. That isn't so far away that horseowners can delay sending in blanks. All will be carefully screened by the committee and confirmation of stall allotments will be in the mail a few days later to all owners, drivers and trainers.

FOR THOSE MEMBERS of the State Legislature who have been toying with the idea of legalizing offtrack betting as another means of bolstering the state treasury, it might be wise to take a look at what has happened in New York.

Roosevelt Raceway, which began the year with hope and anticipation of big things in January, ended in despair and disillusionment in December with attendance and handle showing declines.

New York City's ill-conceived, ill-advised and ill-operated Off Track Betting Corp. was the major factor in the dips, continuing its assault on both harness and thoroughbred racing in the metropolitan area.

Roosevelt's yearly total attendance was down 14.1 per cent and the handle dropped 6.4 per cent during 1972. The fall meeting, which ended two weeks ago, showed major declines in all statistics.

The average nightly attendance was 14,811, a drop of 18.5 per cent from the previous year, and wagering was down 7.8 per cent.

This despite the fact that Roosevelt had the best horses and drivers in the land.

ONE SHUDDERS to think what could happen to racing in metropolitan Detroit where all tracks, harness and thoroughbred, suffered during the year. Hazel Park and Wolverine more than held their own in harness racing but the Detroit Race Course

and Hazel Park runners had disastrous campaigns.

As we see it, lack of interest by management contributed to the decided dip in attendance and business at both tracks. Hazel Park's top brass knew it had the plant sold and apparently cared less whether the season was good or bad.

The situation was a bit different at the DRC where the track was plagued by miserable highway conditions on Schoolcraft and Middle Belt Roads. That added to the fact management was convinced prior to opening day that it was going to be a poor year and nothing could improve it. So it did nothing and actually crawled into a hole or buried its head in the sand.

Small wonder that a change was made at the end of the year.

But just think what would have happened had the tracks been faced with off track betting...the legal kind and not that handled by bookies. If the large New York City tracks suffered big disastrous declines, those in metropolitan Detroit would just about have been ready to close the doors. That's what offtrack betting could have done and that wouldn't have boosted the state treasury a nickel's worth.

THIS 'N THAT...Eddie Landau, longtime assistant in the program departments at Jackson, Northville Downs and Wolverine Raceway, is back on the job at the Jackson-at-Northville meeting. Eddie was rushed to the hospital after suffering a seizure at Northville. However, examinations showed it wasn't a heart attack and thus he was able to get back quicker than thought possible at first.

Rollo Sims, Jackson insurance man, radio announcer and longtime handyman at Jackson Raceway, is the "Jack of all trades" at the Northville meeting. Rollo has charge of admissions, often spends part of the evening helping park cars, then goes up to the judges' stands to post the official finishes of races while waiting for the official turnstile count.

From New York City comes a report that Herve Filion, the nation's leading driver with almost 600 winning rides, is planning trips to Illinois and perhaps Windsor during the remainder of the week. Herve, who set a world's record of 543 victories a year ago, is determined to make it 600 or more. The only problem is that he's running out of places to drive, with some of the eastern tracks dark until after the start of the new year.

With 11 dual meets remaining, Livonia Churchill already has set a school record of three wrestling wins in one season, in a 42-16 triumph over Novi.

Churchill Matmen Set Mark, Win 3rd

The Novi victory also marked the first time Churchill has ever won two consecutive meets.

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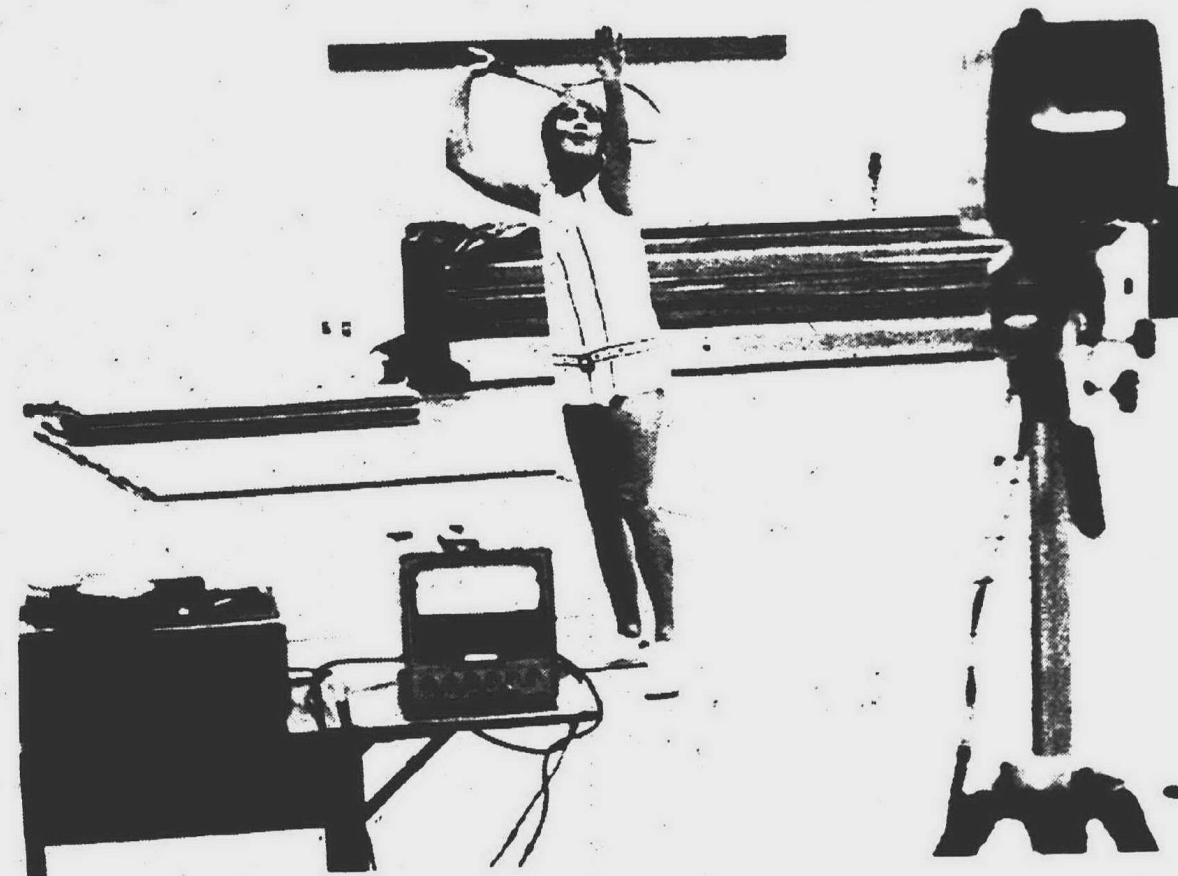

Cameron stated, "The ball machine can be adjusted to various angles and two speeds, enabling our students to get the full range of ground strokes, overheads and volleys."

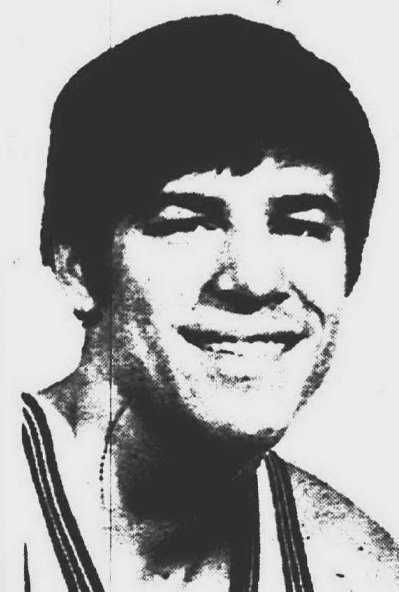
He went on to say, "There is no doubt that a private lesson from a qualified instructor is the best way to correct a stroke deficiency. The ability

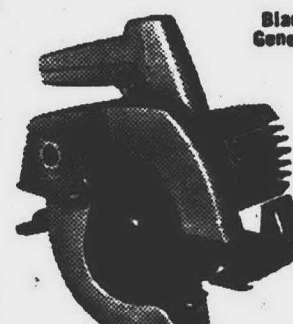

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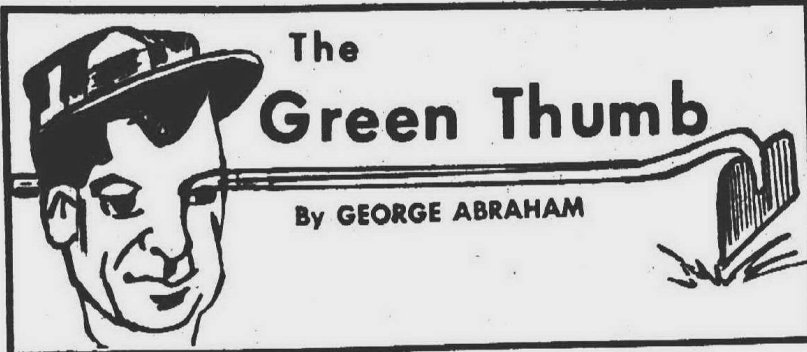
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Garbage Can Horticulture Is Fun

EAST LANSING
The makings for a fun and easy indoor garden are as close as your garbage can, says J. Lee Taylor, Michigan State University horticulture specialist.



You can get more mileage from your holiday plants, even those with short lives, if you give them the right care. Here are a few hints for handling some:

Azalea: Likes a bright window, but not direct sunshine. Water thoroughly, never allowing the soil to dry. Temperature 70 degrees in day, 55 at night. After plant has finished blooming, continue to water it and grow in bright window. In summer, plunge pot in partially shaded spot in garden and water regularly. Snip off any long one-side shoots. Before frost in fall, bring indoors, and grow in coolest window you have. After Jan. 1, you can put plant in warmer room, where it will bloom again for you.

Christmas Cactus: Likes bright window, night temperature around 55 to 60 degrees. Above 70 degrees buds will drop or if the light is too low. Do not keep dry as you do other cacti, but keep soil uniformly moist. During summer put plant outdoors, or in cool bedroom.

Christmas begonia: Keep in bright window, and 60 degree night temperature. In day 72 is fine. Showiest of all begonias, sometimes most difficult. Mildew gets on foliage. After blooming, cut plant back half way or more and let it fill out again.

Christmas Pepper: Likes sunny window, temperature 65 to 70 degrees in day, less at night. After peppers are ripe, pick them off and grind them up (they are hot and edible). Start new plants from seed. Discard old plant.

Cineraria: Likes lots of water, full sun and night temperature of 50 degrees; 70

to 72 degrees in day. Poor light or dry soil will cause leaves to wilt or turn yellow. Plants get aphids, so spray or dip in soap solution. Discard after flowering because it is an annual.

Poinsettia: No. 1 holiday plant likes bright window (no direct sun), uniform supply of water, and day temperature of 72 degrees. At night keep at 65 degrees. Yellow leaves can be due to hot rooms, or dry soil, or lack of light.

GREEN THUMB CLINIC: A reader writes: "Last year we grew a hibiscus called Southern Belle. I'm not kidding when I say the flowers were almost a foot across! Will the plants come up again this year?"

Answer: Yes, hibiscus is a perennial and will come up every year. Cut the stems back to the ground and new shoots will pop up. Southern Belle is a good hybrid and we believe you when you say the flowers are nearly a foot across. Plants grow about five feet tall, and you can get colors including deep red, rose, pink, pink with red eye, white with red eye and pure white.

FREE: Send me a self-addressed, stamped envelope for my bulletin, "How to Grow Perennials."

Save those citrus seeds, carrot and pineapple tops and avocado seeds you usually throw away, he urges, and let them provide you with a garden of wintertime greenery.

Plant orange or grapefruit seeds fresh from the fruit, he advises. Don't dry them or plant them days later. Sow them about 1/8 inch deep in whatever type of soil you have on hand, set the pot in a sunny window and water occasionally.

The top 1 1/2 inches of a carrot will grow fine, fernlike leaves when placed in a dish of moist sand. Keep the sand moist but not wet and be sure it gets plenty of light.

SAVE THE TOP off a fresh pineapple and let it dry for several days. (If the fruity part is not dry, it will rot.) Then plant it in moist sand. Make sure the sand remains moist and keep the dish in a shady place. In about six weeks, examine the pineapple for roots. When it has grown several, transplant it to a pot of garden soil. If you keep the soil moist but not wet and put the pot in a sunny place, new leaves and

eventually a tall stalk of leaves will grow from the old top.

Wash an avocado seed to remove the brown outer skin, or peel it off. Suspend it on toothpicks with the flat end in a jar of water. In a few weeks a root will appear, and in a few more the seed will crack and a shoot will grow out of the top. Then plant it in a pot of soil with one-half to two-thirds of the seed above the soil. You can also plant it directly in soil.

Follow a similar procedure to grow a sweet potato vine, Taylor says. Put the potato sprout end up part way into a container of water. Keep in a warm but shaded place until roots appear. Then pot it and place in the sun.

Most of these plants are fun to grow, Taylor says, but he urges would-be gardeners not to expect grapefruit plants to grow into full-sized trees and produce fruit. Keep these and the other plants as long as they are attractive as houseplants, he advises, and then discard them and start new ones.

The statement was made to eliminate confusion which may stem from the fact that the state's regular 1972 fishing licenses and stamps expire on Dec. 31, 1972.

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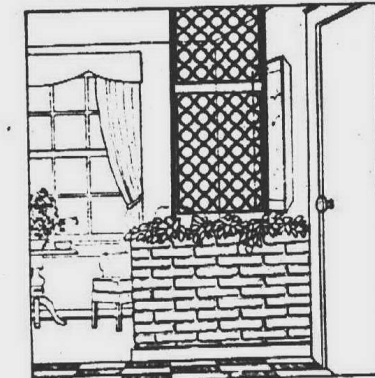


Build Entry Divider

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Most At Schoolcraft Sign Loyalty Pledge

Nearly all Schoolcraft College faculty members have signed an oath swearing to support the constitutions of Michigan and the United States.

The oath is mandatory under a public act of 1935 which was brought to the college's attention during a general audit conducted by the Michigan auditor general's office.

Auditors recommended that all faculty sign oath cards since the act requires all teachers, instructors and professors in educational institutions to sign the oath before the institution can get any state aid.

states he is willing to take the oath, it is sufficient to make the institution eligible for state aid.

However, the memo hasn't been located, and the college proceeded to have the faculty sign oaths.

On all college job applicants were asked to state if they were willing to take the oath. All vocational and technical teachers had to sign the oath to make the college eligible for federal aid.

BUT 90 of 120 remaining instructors hadn't signed it.

On Dec. 15 instructors were asked to take the oath and have it notarized to comply with the law.

The faculty bargaining unit, Faculty Forum, encouraged all instructors to sign it.

Two instructors, one of whom is on sabbatical, were unable to sign it Dec. 15, but both said they would, a college spokesman said.

Name Change

Eastern Michigan University in Ypsilanti, has had a series of name changes in its 123-year history. It was first called Michigan State Normal School until 1899 when it became Michigan State Normal College. In 1956 it was called Eastern Michigan College. The present name was adopted in 1959.

Aliens Must Register

Armand J. Salterelli, district director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, stated that aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the attorney general in January.

All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the U.S. on Jan. 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month. The classes of aliens who are excused from this requirement are accredited diplomats and persons accredited to certain international organizations.

Forms for the report can be obtained from any post office or Immigration and Naturalization Service office during January.

SC Moves Day Care Facilities

The day care center at Schoolcraft College has been moved on campus for the winter semester beginning Jan. 6.

In announcing the move, Edward McNally, vice president for student affairs, expressed hope that parents will find the new location more convenient.

The center's new location is in a house, 17800 Haggerty, next to the south student parking lot. The building was recently acquired by the college in a property exchange with the state. It and two others are being renovated for use by the college.

The center is open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and serves preschool children while their parents attend classes. Previously the center was located in Pilgrim United Church of Christ on Seven Mile.

The center is now registering children for the winter term. A health certificate is required. Costs include a \$5 family registration fee, and a 60 cents per child hourly charge. Enroll children in the center by calling Mrs. Dorothy Irving at the college.

- Finally, if you feel a guest has had too much to drink, don't let him drive home. Arrange for someone else to drive him home or call a taxi.

A MISCONCEPTION: Coffee, tea, milk and other non-alcoholic beverages have no sobering effect. But they are good substitutes for alcohol when the hour grows late and guests are soon to depart. The only real detoxicant is time -- it takes an hour for the body to get rid of an ounce of alcohol.

COCKTAIL HOUR CHEESE SPREAD

In a wooden bowl, make a thick paste of one pound sharp aged grated Cheddar, one three ounce package of cream cheese, and enough olive oil to give it a velvety consistency. Add one teaspoon of dry mustard, a few caraway seeds if desired and two jiggers each of brandy and Kirsch. Add any grated cheese, wine or liquor to the mixture as desired. A variety of cheeses may be used for the cheese pot. Store the mixture, covered, in the refrigerator until an hour before serving.

To have this cheese spread always on hand, store it in a stone crock. Save a small amount of the original mixture as the "mother" when the crock is renewed. This will keep the flavor rich.

AMBROSIA TORTE

1 3/4 c. milk
3 eggs
1 1/2 t. grated orange peel
1/4 t. salt
3/4 c. sugar
2 T. orange juice
1 c. pancake mix
Scald milk; set aside. Beat salt and eggs until thick and lemon colored. Slowly add sugar, beating constantly. Add orange peel and orange juice. Stir in half the milk and half the pancake mix; repeat. Pour into two greased and waxed - paper lined eight - inch round cake pans. Bake 25 to 30 minutes at 325 degrees. Remove from pans, carefully peel waxed paper from cake layers. Cool.

BEANPOTBEEF

4 lb. round or chuck steak
4 large onions, sliced
1 T. curry powder
salt and pepper
2 c. consomme or beef bouillon
1 c. red wine
4 c. sour cream
2 T. horseradish

Make this in a large beanpot or heavy, deep casserole. Cut meat into 1 1/2 inch cubes. Put meat, onions, curry powder, salt, pepper, wine and consomme in pot. Bring to boil on top of stove, being careful about burning meat. Cover and put in 325 degree oven for 2 hours or until meat is very tender. Uncover towards end of cooking to allow some liquid to evaporate. Remove pot from oven, stir in sour cream and horseradish. May be kept warm in a very low oven. Serve over noodles or rice and accompany with garlic buttered bread. Makes 12 servings.

HONEY CAKES

4 T. butter or margarine
1/2 pound honey
Minced rind of 1 lemon
4 T. almonds, chopped fine
2 c. sifted flour
1/2 t. salt
1/4 t. nutmeg
1 t. baking soda
Nuts or chopped citron
Melt butter or margarine on low heat; add honey and blend well. Allow mix to cool; add lemon rind, almonds and flour sifted with salt, nutmeg and soda. Mix thoroughly and chill. Roll to 1/2-inch thickness and cut into 1-inch squares. Decorate with nuts or chopped citron and bake 8 minutes at 400 degrees. Yield: 4 dozen.

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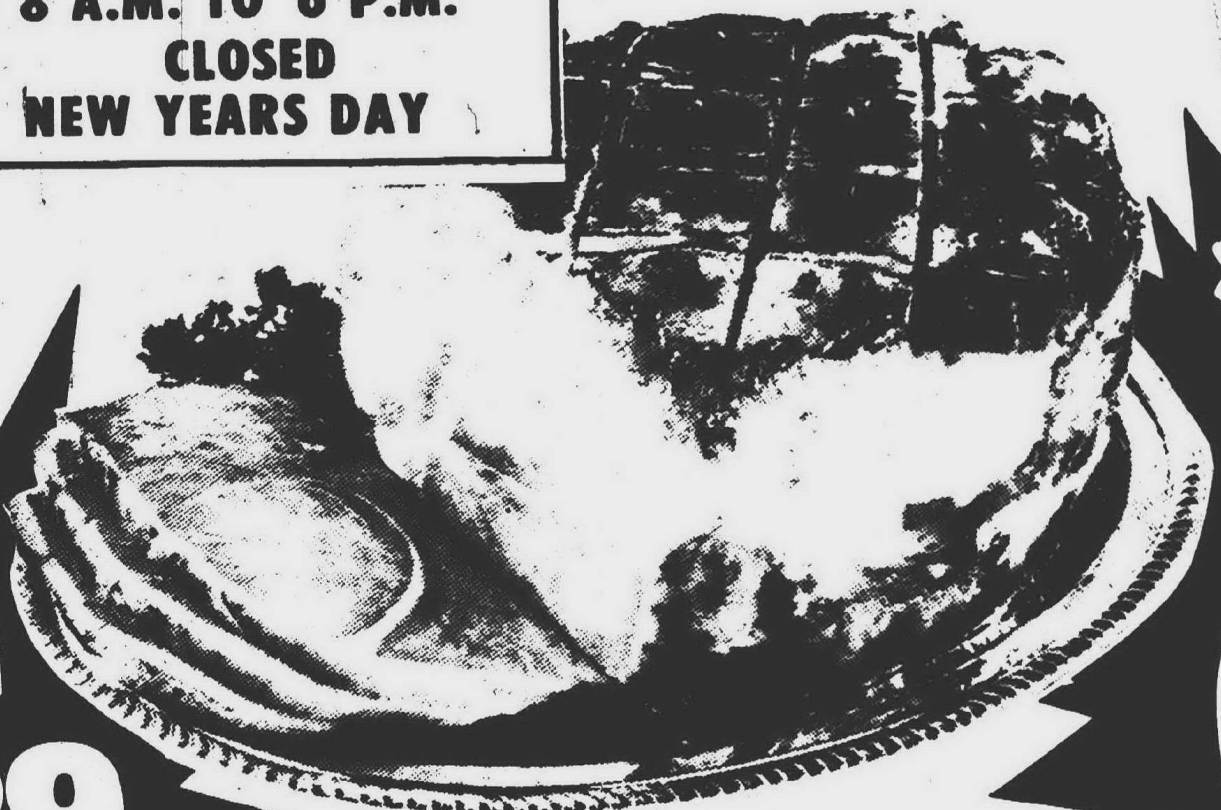

OBSERVATION POINT

1972 Showed Power, Breadth
Of Bussing Issue In Suburbs

This last column of 1972 gives me a chance to reflect on the events of this year and to try to make some sense out of what looked like a hopeless tangle while they were happening.

For that most crucial of suburban issues -- bussing -- 1972 was a year of wait and see. The issue wound up in what seems like an endless series of court hearings. This more than anything spelled the end of the National Action Group (NAG), which looked in 1971 as though it would become the biggest new power group around.

But 1972 also saw the solidification of anti-bussing sentiment into an absolutely necessary political position for anyone even musing with the idea of getting elected to public office.

The bussing case probably will wind up in the U.S. Supreme Court some time next year, but anyone who has driven through the subdivisions in Westland and Garden City and Livonia and seen the "This Family Will Not Be Bussed" signs

Bussed" placards in the windows knows darn well just how deep and intense suburban feelings about bussing really are, regardless of what the courts say.

CONTINUED concern over bussing this year led to a quite unexpected drop in enrollments at local public schools -- a story this newspaper broke ahead of any other news medium. Whereas most school officials had expected a two to five per cent enrollment increase in 1972 over 1971, many local schools saw a small drop, and others remained about even.

Most logical explanation (admitted by school officials off the record) was that parents fearful of bussing were enrolling their children in school systems outside bussing -- threatened suburbs.

The bussing issue also became topic A for all political activity, and was directly responsible for George Wallace's remarkable showing in the August primary

election as well as Richard Nixon's sweep in the November bout. Robert Griffin, although breathing hard, will be sitting in the U.S. Senate for the next six years, probably because of his early opposition to bussing.

Bussing and President Nixon's coattails licked two local figures who thought they had a good shot at winning seats in Congress. Livonia's Marvin Stempien and Daniel Cooper, who represented Southfield in the State Senate. Even some state representative races thought by most to be shoo-ins (for example John Markes in Westland) wound up very close.

IN PART IN response to bussing (why pay more millage if all it's going to be used for is to bus my kids into Detroit?) virtually all local school millages were defeated this year.

In addition, the voters rejected a proposed revision of the state method of financing public education, partly because they were suspicious of an income tax

and partly because no one was willing to support a whole new kind of tax system while everything was so confused by bussing.

So in very real terms 1972 was the year of the consolidation of bussing in the voters' minds.

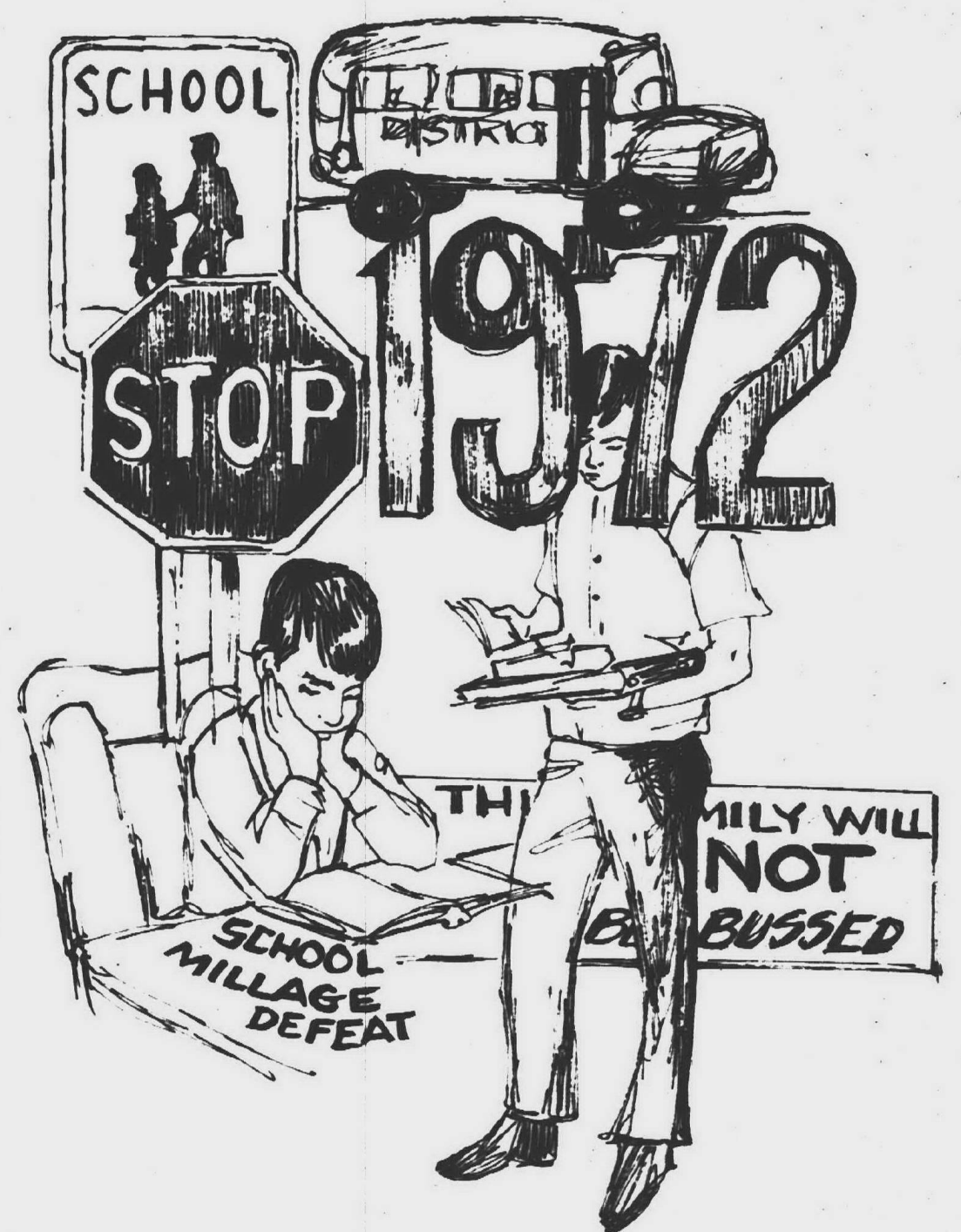
But it went farther than that. It showed what everyone had been saying in 1971 about the coming power of the suburbs was right.

It showed that the white, middle class -- precisely the kind of family that lives in suburbs -- was the key interest group in the country.

And it showed that when an issue of the emotional clout that bussing has emerges, it affects everything having to do with the suburbs in very far-reaching ways.

History, I suspect, will show that while 1971 was the year that Irene McCabe rode the school bus to transitory fame, 1972 was the year that the suburbs showed their power when united by an issue.

Resolutions For School Boards

After watching events of the past year in Observerland, it's high time that many organizations and governmental units made resolutions for the new year -- resolutions aimed to correct weaknesses that often resulted in embarrassing situations.

For instance, the Plymouth school board should be interested in a resolution that would resolve quickly the problem of what to do with a school superintendent who refuses to leave when fired. Perhaps it would be smart for board members to have all the facts well in hand before acting. The Plymouth board apparently didn't, and deposed Supt. James Rossman refused to accept the dismissal.

We don't blame him for his position since he did have a contract with a couple of years remaining. But the furor over the situation resulted in the community rejecting a request for bonds needed to finance a new high school, complete one under construction and to build other much needed buildings.

Perhaps the new year will bring the board the wisdom needed to counter such situations and to create a better image in a community which frowns on such shennanigans.

school board should resolve to get a better understanding of relations with the media -- especially in the matter of contract negotiations. It is wise to remember that there is always a leak in wage matters, and it is best to keep the media informed rather than to throw a cloak of secrecy around the meetings. The voters aren't buying secrecy these days and generally made that known when requests come for additional millage or for new bond issues.

Out John Glenn High way in Westland, a resolution should be considered defining the powers of school principals -- especially since the end of the football season when Coach Bob Lusk indicated he resigned because of pressure from the principal. Matter of fact, his resignation was written by the principal and turned over to the superintendent and the school board for a decision.

Perhaps things are different at John Glenn, but from our angle we have always had an opinion that a principal was hired to guide the school and not get involved in the hiring and firing of coaches. To our mind, that was always the prerogative of the school board after recommendations from the superintendent.

SECRECY APPEARS to be the way of life for the Farmington Board of Education and never did it become more apparent than in the recent forced resignation of the superintendent of schools.

Not only did trustees keep their plans in complete secrecy, but they have refused to give reasons for the sudden dismissal. Apparently members are working on the theory that they have a right to take such actions and do not have to answer to the voters.

This is the same board that acted in a similar fashion when a request for millage failed and schools faced a loss of all extra curricular programs, including all sports at the high school level.

During the push to get the message across for the need of the additional millage, the board pledged that all sports would be abandoned. But a few days before

the election, trustees met with a citizens group which promised to raise the money needed to continue the athletic program, and the board agreed to accept.

Thus when the millage went down, the parents knew they had to raise the money to keep up sports and knew the funds would be accepted by the board.

So it appears that this board needs a resolution, one that it will be bound to, outlining its plans to better its image in the community.

What with superintendents leaving in Farmington, Garden City, Wayne, Plymouth and Redford Union for various reasons and with trustees not satisfied with administrators in Livonia and Northville, perhaps all school boards should take another look at the situations. Perhaps it isn't the administration that deserves the blame -- perhaps demanding and unreasonable boards are the cause. Time alone will tell.

It seems there is a political victory for the little people every Christmas season, and a city council in Garden City last week was no exception.

The council was faced with an administrative recommendation to boost program fees a modest \$5-\$10 for members of the synchronized and speed swimming teams, sponsored by the Garden City Parks and Recreation Department.

THE RECOMMENDATION was easily justified on the ground that the last increase was seven

years ago and the increase wasn't financially burdensome on the families whose youngsters take part in the swim teams.

The administration's purpose was pure and simple. It wanted to reduce the budget deficit of its swimming program, although it admitted that the proposed fee increase wouldn't come close in balancing any budget or making the program self-supporting.

Even the swimming coaches had no objection to the proposed increase.

But it wasn't quite that simple.

GARDEN CITY speed swimming teams have won regional, state, and national recognition, and the synchronized swim team has also won numerous awards competing in the metropolitan Detroit area.

Speed team members have won nearly every time they get in the water for a meet, and they have an accumulation of national and state speed records.

All of this reflects on the positive image of the community, whose city officials in past years have gone out of their way to honor its teenage athletic heroes.

As recently as last summer, the city council and administration sponsored an appreciation dinner for the Garden City Team in the Sandy Koufax baseball competition for winning the national title.

SEVERAL city councilmen recognized the circumstance that the swimming teams have brought some positive publicity that can't be bought in any other way.

City hall appreciated that and agreed to keep the swim team fees at the 1965 level instead of raising them a few dollars.

Swimmers are happy that there aren't any Scrooges in city hall.

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Snowmobile Bill Received Local Votes

LANSING

Most local legislators voted for a bill which gives snowmobilers the right to travel on public highway rights-of-way and to ride on road shoulders to cross bridges.

The bill passed on the last day of the fall session by a 25 to 1 vote in the Senate and 76 to 11 vote in the House.

The State police and Automobile Club of Michigan are asking Gov. Milliken to veto the bill, saying it will cause driving hazards for motorists and snowmobilers.

Sens. David Plawecki (D-Dearborn Heights) and William Faust (D-Westland) voted for the bill. Sens. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) and Daniel Cooper (D-Oak Park) didn't vote.

Also voting for it were Reps. John Bennett (D-Redford Township), Marvin Stempien (D-Livonia), James Tierney (D-Garden City), Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park), Raymond Smit (R-Ypsilanti) and James Defebaugh (R-Birmingham).

Rep. Thomas Brown (D-Westland), voted against it and Reps. Richard Young (D-Dearborn Heights) and Raymond Baker (R-Farmington) didn't vote.

Current law permits snowmobiles to operate on rights-of-way only in the Upper Peninsula and northern Lower Peninsula.

Col. John Plants, director of the State Police, has urged a veto saying that "cars and snowmobiles don't mix."

The rights-of-way begin just off road shoulders.

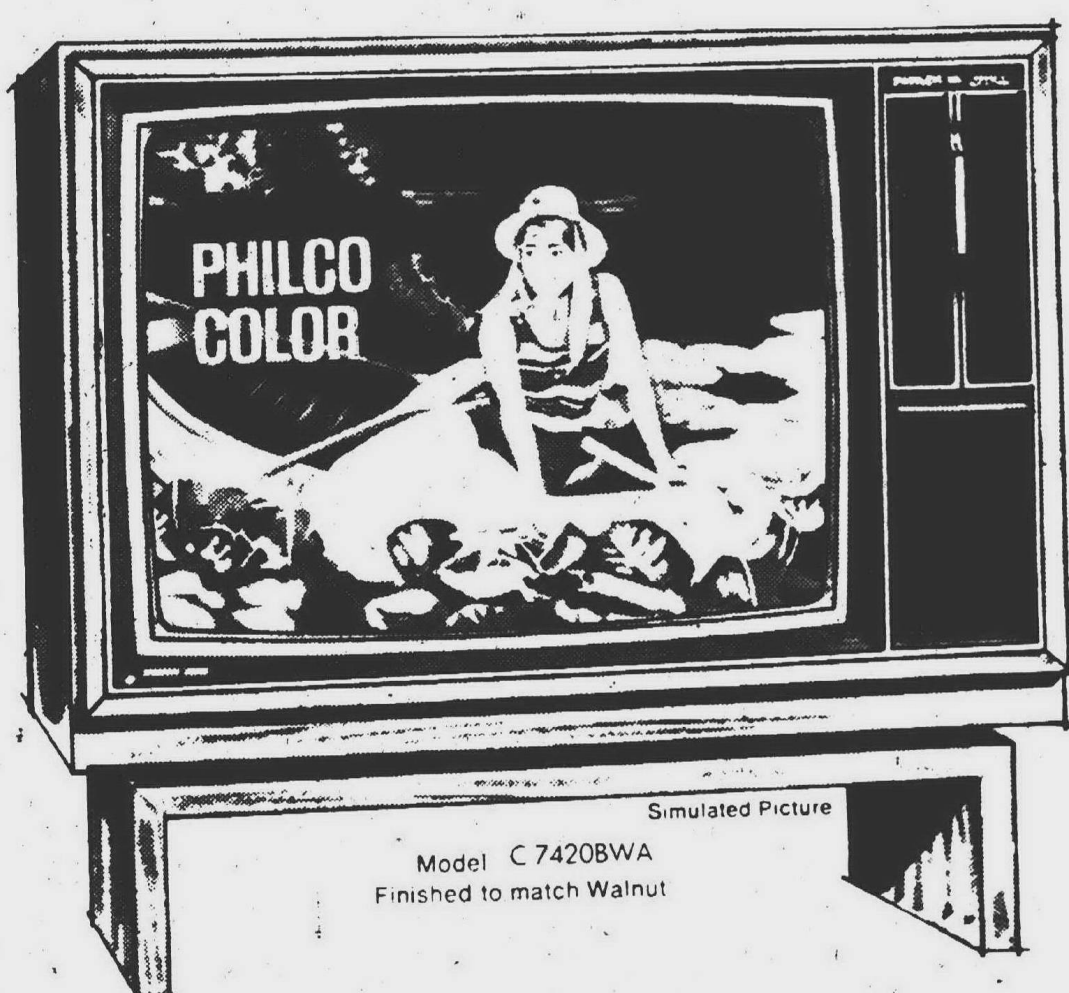

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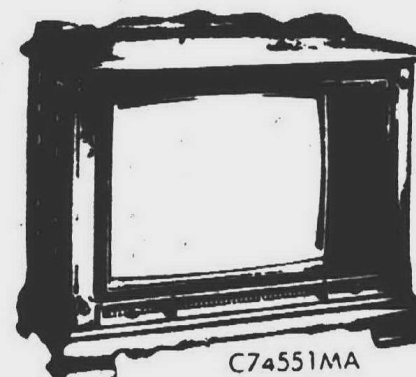

In spite of the rush, Mrs. Morse is pleased with the new hobby and thinks she'll get some instruction and do some more needlepoint.

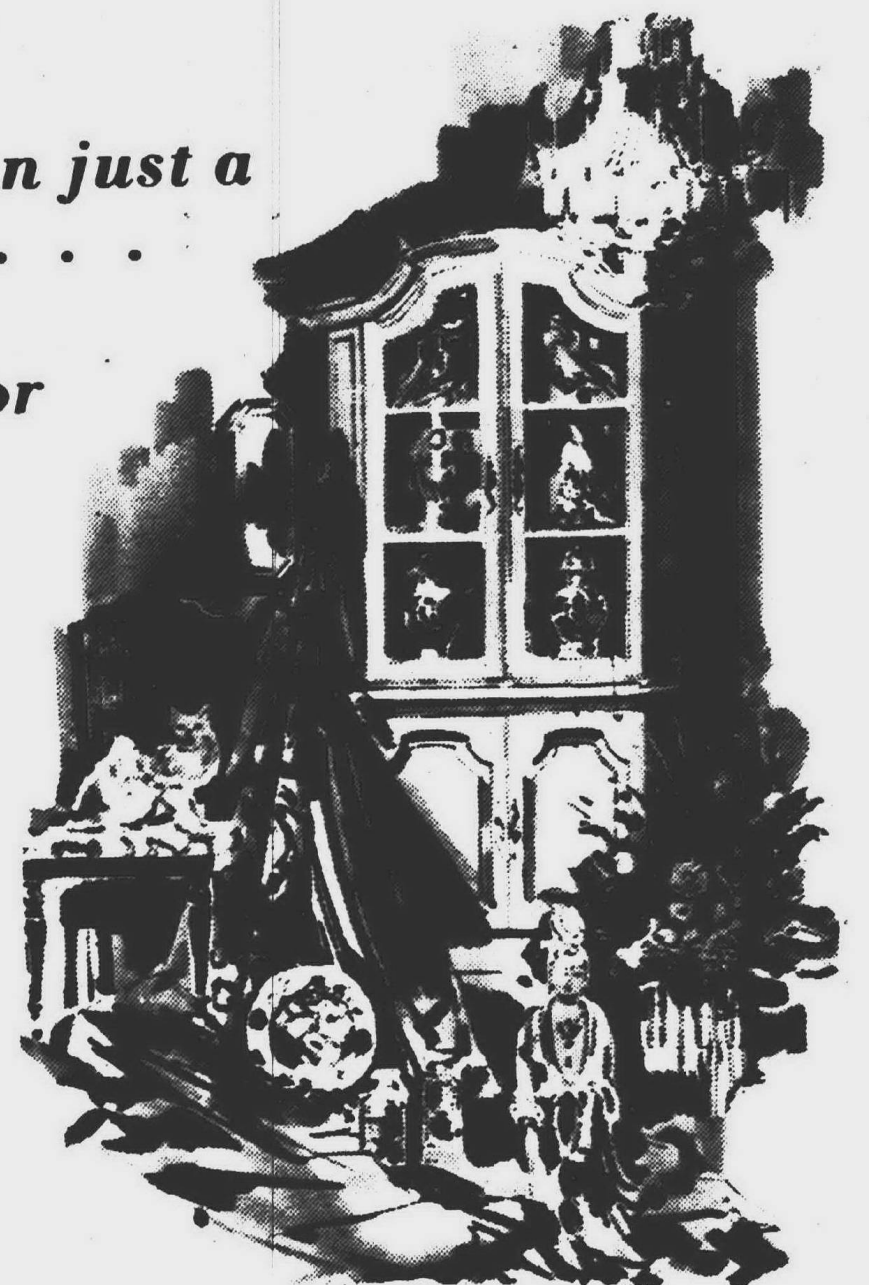
"I think next I'd like to work out something for the house, including the whole family," she said.

She's Retired But Not Gone

A lady who has kept a close eye on the account books of the Northwest YWCA through 18 years of growth retires this month as its office manager.

But Ruth Childress Fuxa definitely won't sever her connections with the YW. She'll be back to take some classes in the branch at 25940 Grand River—and she's planning to work as a volunteer while breaking in a successor.

"Can you run a mimeograph?" was the only question this efficient manager was asked when she applied for work in the tiny northwest Detroit store where the branch was quartered in 1954.

She could, so she was hired as part-time office assistant by June Boetzel, the director then.

"AND I immediately began campaigning for a new mimeograph," she laughs. "That one was a monster to run."

Hired to put in 10 hours a week, she was a full-time worker for the Northwest YWCA by the end of that first year. The branch then had 1,500 members and a busy schedule of activities crowded into its small rooms.

By the time Mrs. Fuxa was honored with a retirement party Dec. 18, she had seen the branch move to its Redford

Township quarters and then build an addition to house all its programs.

The membership had grown to 11,000 and the branch staff to 17 people, not counting the class teachers.

"I'd never been in a YWCA when I started working for this branch 18 years ago," Mrs. Fuxa remembers.

In her early days there, parking was a problem when groups of women gathered for classes and other activities in the store-front building.

"ONE OF MY jobs was to run out and put nickels in the parking meter," she remembers. "Another was to set up nursery equipment each time it was needed."

Then, as the program expanded to Carpenter's Hall in Redford and swimming classes began in Cody High School, there were regular trips to the two locations to be sure all was going well.

Like all interested in the branch, Ruth kept close watch over the building activities when each unit of the present quarters went up. And now, as she leaves her job, she's just a little embarrassed about "all the fuss."

"I'll still be around," she points out.

Mrs. Fuxa, who came to the YW as Ruth Childress, was married two years ago to Gene Fuxa. They are planning to join the YW trip to Australia and New Zealand next year, and they'll also go to the west coast to visit Mrs. Fuxa's sister.

"I ALSO want to learn to cook again and find more time to use the swimming pool in our apartment building," Ruth said.

Then there'll be a sewing class and a gym class at the YW because "I've never had time to take any classes before," and volunteer hours helping Ruth Kerr take over the office books.

That old YWCA mimeograph may be long gone, but its operator stays in the busy picture.

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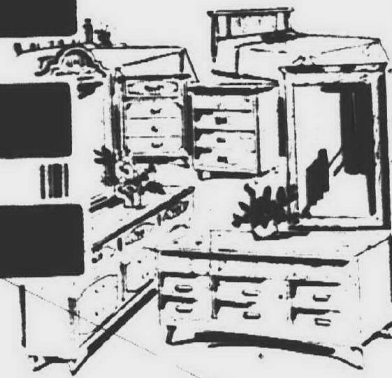

Scouts Get \$5,000 For New Program

A program to develop adult leadership among residents of low-income areas by the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council has received a \$5,000 matching funds grant from the national Girl Scouts of the U.S.A.

Under the program, three part-time field aides will begin in January to develop summer recreational programs for school-age youngsters in low-income neighborhoods. Possible sites for the program are Perry School and New Bethel in Ypsilanti and Norwayne community in Wayne County.

THROUGH WORKING with residents of these areas, the council hopes to find adults who are interested in working with young people on a sustained volunteer basis, and

perhaps become troop leaders for their areas in the fall.

"We would like to see troops led by local people," said Mrs. James A. Kennedy, council president. "Not only would it make for stronger troops, we feel, but it would also allow young people to see adults they know performing leadership roles."

THE LOCAL program is one of more than 20 such projects being funded by the Julie Eisenhower Fund and the Colgate-Palmolive Fund. The Julie Eisenhower fund was created when Mrs. Eisenhower donated the profits from the sale of her crewel needlework designs. The matching funds will come from local private donations.

This leadership program is designed to coordinate with the current effort of the council to establish troops in disadvantaged areas. Approximately 100 girls from these areas are organized into

seven troops in a program which began this fall. It includes one brownie troop in Ann Arbor, and one brownie, three junior and two cadette troops in Ypsilanti.

Fifteen Eastern Michigan University students, social welfare majors, are serving as troop leaders as part of their field placement requirements for graduation.

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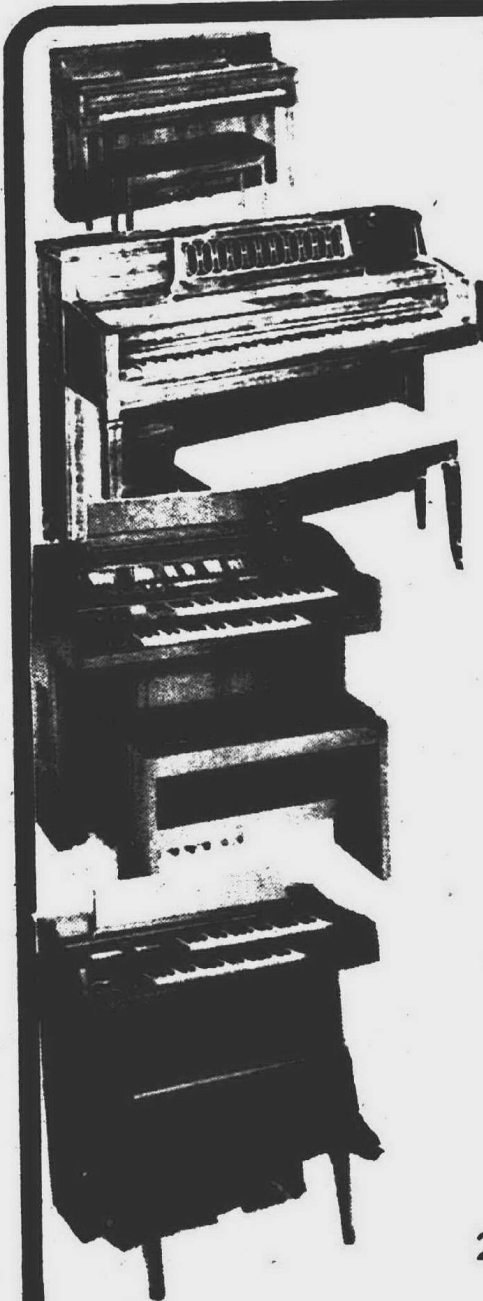
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Girl Scouts Vacation In Florida

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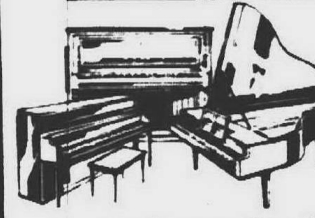


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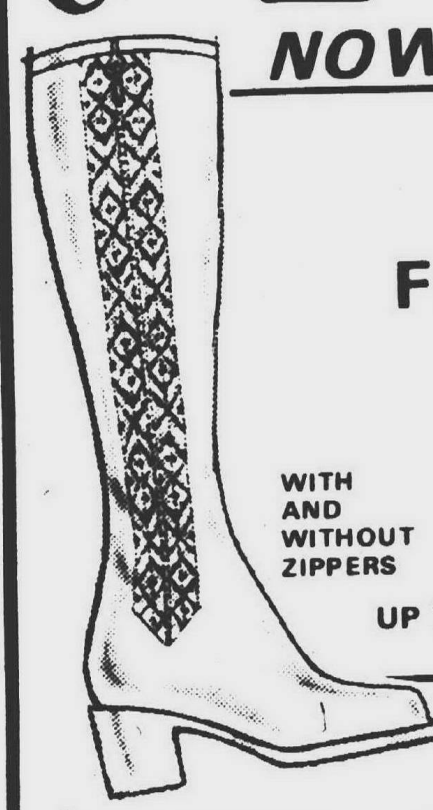

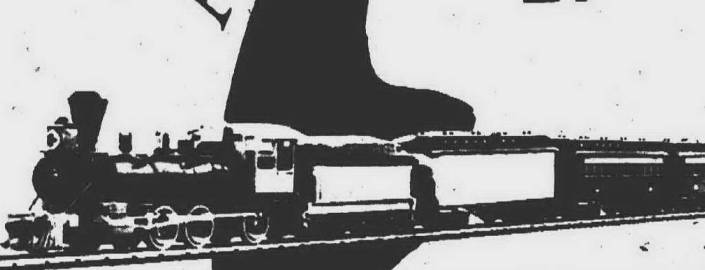

Frater Joseph A. Gietl Jr., S.C.J., has professed final religious vows as a member of the Congregation of the Sacred Heart Fathers and Brothers.

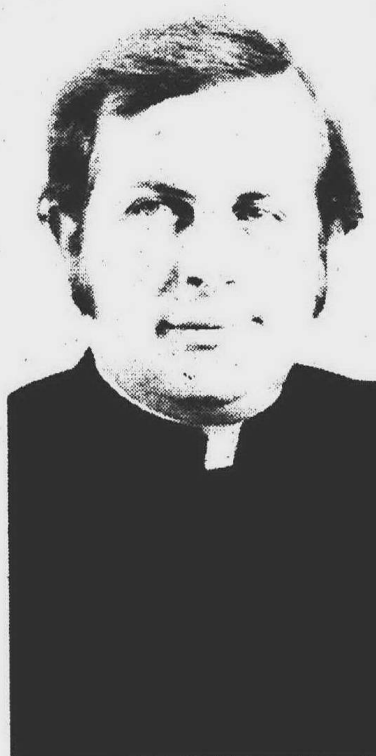
He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Gietl, 26519 Five Mile, Redford Township.

Religion Update

Rev. Lester Kinsolving's

The National Council of Churches (NCC) possibly may survive the three-year presidency of the Rev. W. Sterling Cary — but not if his administration is anything like the General Assembly which met in Dallas recently.

For Dr. Cary, a United Church of Christ official from New York City, spent nine months as chairman of planning for this triennial meeting.

The result was disastrous from the very first day, when the NCC invited black militant poet Imamu Amiri Baraka (formerly LeRoi Jones, of Newark, N.J.) as one of two featured lecturers.

Baraka, a playwright and porn poet, delivered a 90-minute, obviously ill-prepared, rambling hate-America — and whitey war dance with the flatulence of a poison gas bag. It could have been duplicated by using old tape recordings of anachronistic people like Stokely Carmichael.

Baraka's ranting was devoid of the frequent and vicious anti-semitism ("cracking steel knuckles in a Jew lady's mouth") which has been so recurrent in his writing that his invitation by the NCC evoked strong protest from leaders of the American Jewish Committee, the Anti-Defamation League and the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. During a press conference Baraka declined to repudiate such sentiments. It took newsmen two days to

pry loose the fact that the NCC had guaranteed payment of \$1,500 to meet Baraka's lecture fee.

"His fee is of no concern to the press!" Dr. Cary loftily informed some 50 reporters. And the Rev. David Hunter, the NCC's deputy general secretary, reacted with: "It's nobody's damn business! And you can quote me!"

IT SUBSEQUENTLY became apparent why there was such a fervent attempt to conceal expenditures of money contributed by the estimated 42 million members of 33 denominations who comprise the NCC.

For it was learned that San Antonio's Catholic Auxiliary Bishop Patrick Flores — who was put on the same platform as the \$1,500 Baraka, but who by contrast had his lecture prepared — was not paid a dime.

When asked how he thought this astounding financial discrimination would appear to the nation's Catholics, including Chicanos, President Cary laughed and replied: "I think they will celebrate the fact that the bishop was close enough and had enough of a budget to be with us."

Bishop Flores recently pawned his bishop's ring in order to help the poor.

COMMENTED Orthodox Bishop Mark Lipa of Massachusetts after hearing Baraka's demand for

revolution and the destruction of capitalism: "This is the end of the National Council of Churches."

And Houston's Methodist Bishop Kenneth Copeland added: "I'm critical of a program which does not provide someone to answer a man of this sort."

Dr. Cary, a generally soft-spoken and affable 44-year-old who bears something of a physical resemblance to the late Dr. Martin Luther King, also disclosed, when asked, that he was a signer of the notorious Black Manifesto.

When asked during a press conference if he had ever repudiated this document, he replied instead: "Conditions in America made the Black Manifesto a necessity. And those conditions are worse

Churches Aid Welfare Petition

Members of several Observerland churches cooperated in a drive that last week put before Michigan Gov. William Milliken a petition to get a budget allowance to cover gas heating for welfare recipients.

The drive, which netted 35,000 signatures, was spearheaded by the Welfare Reform Coalition.

Present when the petition was presented in the governor's Detroit office were Bishop Walter Schoenherr of the Archdiocese of Detroit, the Rev. Royal Swinwall of the United Methodist Detroit Conference, Mary Grace Adams, representing the Detroit Presbytery and Rabbi David Jessel, former Livonia clergyman now with the Jewish Community Council. Livonia churches involved in the move were St. Maurice and St. Edith, both Catholic, Pilgrim United Church of Christ, St. Matthew United

Methodist and St. Timothy United Presbyterian.
