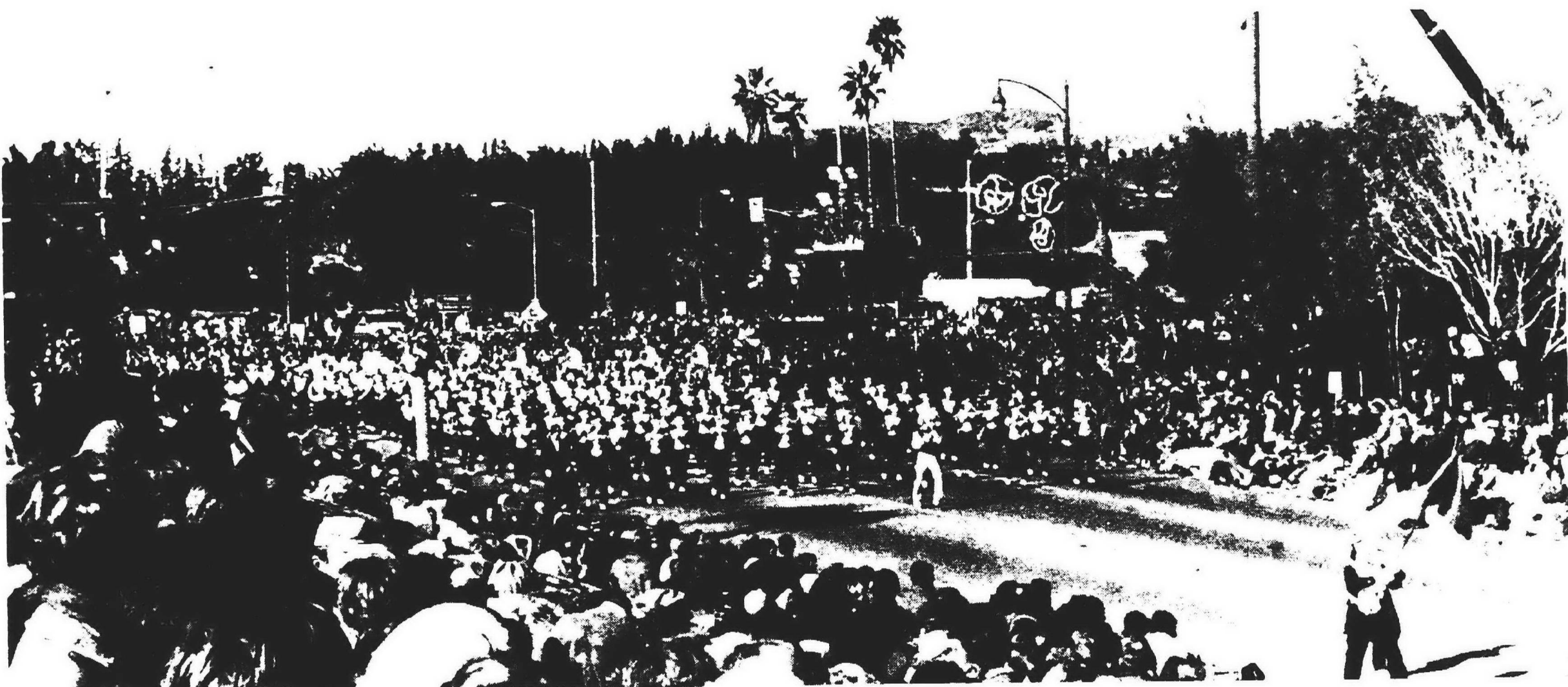

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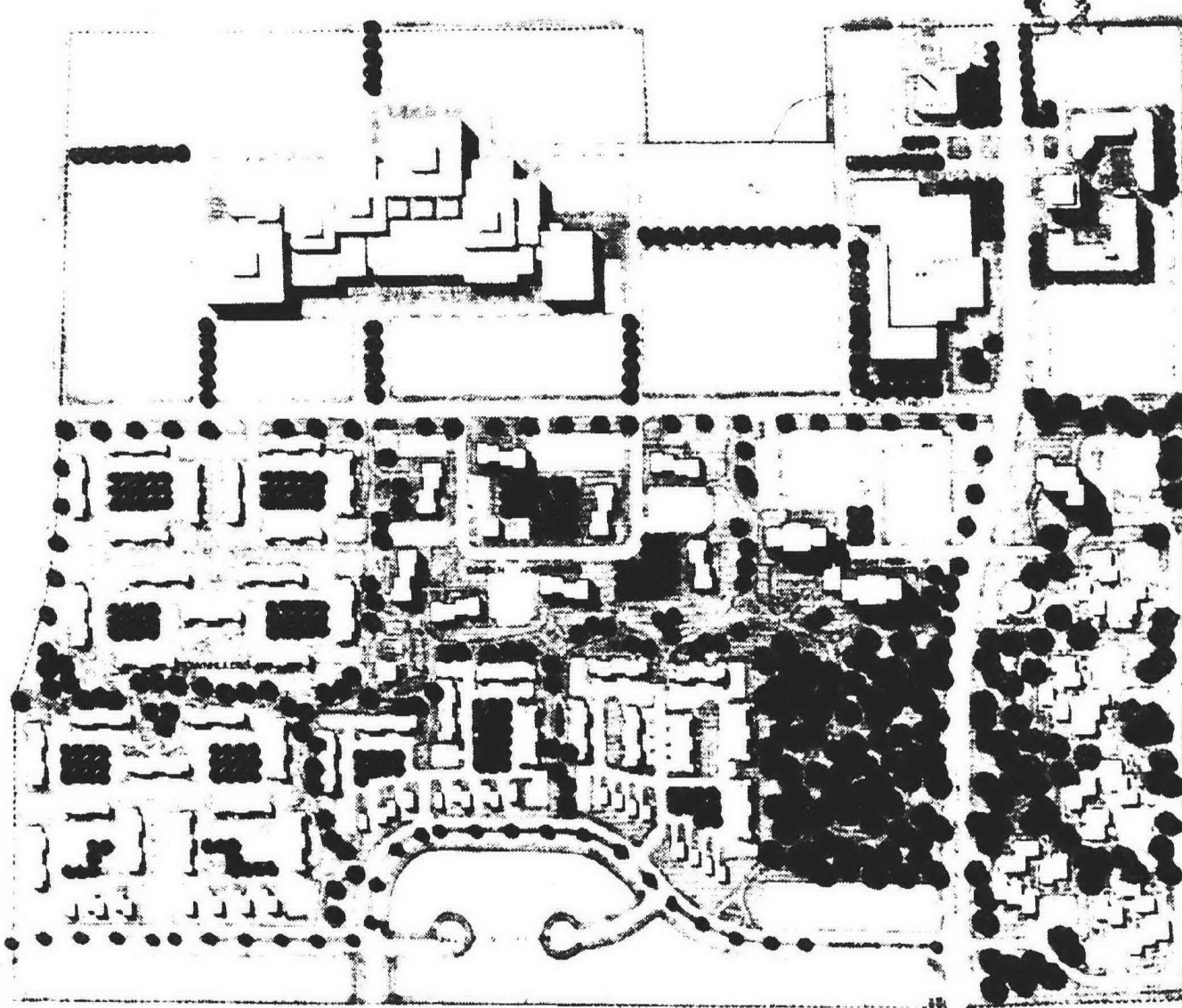

# Berry Won't Run Again

Charles F. Berry, who was appointed to the Plymouth school board in June, has announced that he will not seek re-election when his term expires this year.

In announcing that he would not run again, Berry said his decision was prompted by "politics" on the board.

He particularly singled out Board Member Gary Mirto who recently passed out several memos to other school board members which Berry said were politically motivated. Those memos "put the cap on" his decision to leave the board, Berry said.

Berry, who is also community relations officer for the Plymouth Police Department, said he was not making the entire charge of political dealings on Mirto. "There is a damn serious division on that board," he said.

"I have learned politics play a large role in the education of the Plymouth youth and I regret it," Berry said in a statement announcing that he would not seek reelection. "To me there is no excuse for board members to neglect school district problems to play politics."

Berry's statement also placed a "stop" on the school board's efforts to get the priorities to be completed by the school board.

"I HAVE picked three items. I feel are the priorities and would like to see accomplished before I leave office," his statement said. "They are: financing the high school program and transportation."

The majority of my time will be spent working on these areas for the rest of this school year. I have no intention of using politics to accomplish these goals. They will either go through on the merits of the proposals or they won't go through at all.

Berry, 32, was appointed to the school board on June 12 to fill the seat left vacant by John L. Haskat's resignation. Berry ran third in the June 12 school elections for two other seats which were won by Marda Benson and Mirto.

Berry's term expires in June as does that of Dr. John Ohno. Berry said he would serve until his term expires.

A 1958 Plymouth High School graduate, Berry is president of the Council of Community Concerns as well as being a director of Youth, Inc. and the Plymouth Jaycees.



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# Hoben: Citizens Will Aid Schools In '73

relate to the citizens of the Plymouth Community School District, in a positive and optimistic manner, our concerns and considerations for the future. During the past year we

have used two citizen committees to research information for the board of education. We feel this gives us a check and balance system for the board to weigh with

administration recommendations. The Citizen Cost Reduction Committee made recommendations which totaled some \$400,000 in savings. The board of education accepted

approximately \$300,000 worth of these recommendations (\$160,000 reflected in the one-year closing of Central Middle School.) These monies were used in the operation budget to absorb a growth of 800 students and the operation of two new buildings.

ANOTHER CITIZENS' Committee, the Judd Committee, surveyed the projected four-year growth and building needs for this period. The results of their efforts are most alarming and do have serious ramifications for this school district.

We are looking at projected growth of 4,068 students between now and September of 1974. Our current buildings can accommodate approximately 2,500 of these students at 100 per cent density. Lead time is important for building. The alternatives are not in the best interest of sound educational practices.

Presently another citizens' committee is being assembled to look into the possibilities of extended school year and other alternatives to building programs to insure the taxpayer that we do not overbuild in this community. However, this overbuilding point would not be reached for some years to come.

We feel a general need exists to re-activate the Plymouth Community School Council and will be working toward this goal in 1973. Internally we have a cost analysis committee working to look for economies and efficiencies within current budget procedures.

We are beginning to use plan program budgeting procedures to analyze our expenditures and have moved partially to a "management by objectives" procedure in our evaluations.

It is interesting to note that 28.7 per cent of our budget is spent in language arts, 11.4 per cent in mathematics, 9.4 per cent in science, 8.4 per cent in social studies, with the 42.1 per cent balance spread over 14 other areas of our operation. More than one-third of the budget is spent on reading, writing and arithmetic.

WE HAVE MOVED starting Jan. 5 to an "on-line" computer system for internal accounting, personnel accounting and limited school functions such as grading and attendance. The result will be a broader base of information, greater efficiency and a less expensive operation for these services.

Through the efforts of the Curriculum Coordinating Committee we are in a process of continual evaluation of our course offerings, in-service programs and textbook revision and adaptations.

We have attempted and are continuing our efforts to coordinate our activities with the five units of government

that serve our district. Most noticeable are our efforts to form a "Recreation Authority" which will place the cost of operation of a recreation program on all users in a balanced manner instead of the school being the sole sponsor.

We have met with our legislators in Lansing and have shared concerns and needs with them. We are now meeting with them on a regular basis to review such important pieces of legislation as state aid and mandatory special education.

WE SOLICIT the patience of the community to work with us over the next two years. It is obvious to us that to achieve maximum density in building

will require a great deal of shifting of student populations. We will attempt to achieve this goal in the most efficient manner possible.

Plymouth is a unique community that has set itself apart from other communities in the state by meeting its needs and responsibilities. I am confident that Plymouth will continue to do so. We of the Plymouth Community Schools are looking forward to serving the area's educational needs during 1973 with a great deal of enthusiasm. We have an extremely qualified staff who are dedicated to meeting the needs of individual students.

May I take this opportunity to wish the citizens of this community a most prosperous and rewarding new year.

## 'It Was Good Year' -- McKeon

The purpose of city government, in its simplest terms, is to provide a better place in which to live and to work. In this respect, 1972 was a good year.

The most evident accomplishment during the year was the completion of the Cultural Center which was the culmination of more than five years of hard work by many people in the community.

Two other significant events in the city last year were the Artrain and the start of construction of the Historical Society Museum. Both of these projects came about by community-wide volunteer effort typical of Plymouth.

CITY GOVERNMENT'S most sustained efforts during the year went toward commercial development, and the most gratifying results have been in Olde Village due to favorable reaction of merchants. Accomplishments thus far are a new parking lot with free customer parking, two improved parks and the Golden Spike Restaurant in the planning stages. We hope that this is just the beginning in Olde Village.

While many developers have shown interest in Central Business District properties, no firm plans are under way at this time. Many local property owners have expansion plans for 1973 and work has already begun on Forest Street.

Two serious problems must be overcome in developing a strong Central Business District to meet the competition of the outlying shopping centers.

One is the availability of properties large enough for successful development. The other is the cost of sites. It is impractical, due to the cost of land, for private enterprise to provide adequate surface parking for a large commercial development in downtown Plymouth.

Consequently, it is the consensus of some of those in city government that municipal multi-level parking structures will be required if desirable commercial development is to happen. The Planning Commission, in proposing a capital improvement program, also emphasized the need for convenient parking to attract commercial expansion.

THE CITY'S first priority of business in 1973 is to take a new look at traffic and parking requirements. There is a strong feeling by some to remove street parking in congested areas and to replace customer - paid parking with either parking assessment to benefiting merchants or the merchants paying for parking through a validation system.

improvements that will generate more tax dollars. The Planning Commission has been hard at work preparing proposals of this nature.

Other events expected to happen in 1973 are a community-wide recreation authority and the city's passage of a cable antenna television ordinance. The latter would provide for local television programming of local events.

To me the big challenge for the ensuing year is downtown commercial expansion and, to my recollection, this is the only commitment I have been unable to fulfill since becoming mayor almost four years ago.

## Plymouth Man Dies In Accident

Kirkland H. McCowan, 32 of 541 Irvin, Plymouth, was killed in an automobile accident early Dec. 24 on North Territorial Rd. in Northfield Township.

Washtenaw County sheriff deputies said McCowan, who was alone in the car at the time, was driving east on North Territorial Rd. at about 4:24 a.m. when his car hit a patch of ice on a curve forcing him to lose control.

Police say the car spun off the road, hit a tree and a power pole, before rolling over more than 200 feet from the road.

Kirkland, who owned a gasoline station on North Territorial Rd. near old U.S. 23, was returning home from his station at the time of the accident.

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## Manning Proposes 'Conservation Corps' For County Youth

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners has under consideration a proposal to establish a far-reaching "County Conservation Corps," similar to the CCC program of the 1930s.

Now under review by the board's public works committee, the proposal was introduced by commissioner Richard E. Manning (D-Redford). Manning raised the proposal in a letter to board chairman, Robert E. FitzPatrick, in which he said "this presents us with a real opportunity to adequately finance our standing governmental obligations and more importantly seek out new and innovative ways to better serve our county."

HE SUGGESTED an expenditure up to \$2.5 million which he said "might have an effect on crime and delin-

quency in our youth, help in getting young people into the work force in healthy and rewarding jobs, and call upon the skills and maturity of many senior citizens."

Manning said his proposal would incorporate the best features of the CCC program of the 1930s and the involvement of the Peace Corps and Vista enthusiasm of the 1960s.

"We could create a climate which would restore the confidence of the young in the ability of our form of government to meet the needs of our times," said Manning. "We could utilize the vast storehouse of skills and knowledge of our mature and vigorous retirees who defy being scrapped by a production oriented society."

SPECIFICALLY, Man-

ning's suggested program would: Recruit young people between 16 and 23 years of age into a two-year work-training program, use senior citizens as planner, directors and supervisors, and execute a program designed to maintain and improve natural resources including the cleaning of the Rouge River.

"Our reordering of priorities has been so long in coming and at times so despaired that we have had little time to prepare for the day when federal funds would again be available to assist our own efforts to renew and invigorate our own community and state," said Manning.

He made the proposal at a time when the county expected substantially more funds from the federal revenue sharing program.

Initially, county officials expected a federal payment of almost \$17 million during 1973. However, the first half-year allotment was nearly \$4 million short of annual expectations and county officials have registered complaints with congressmen and the U.S. Treasury Department.

## Tigers Promote Neal 'Doc' Fenkell

PLYMOUTH Neal K. (Doc) Fenkell, a Plymouthite, has been given a new title and additional duties with the Detroit Tiger television network.

He has been named director of television and radio operations and will add coordination of radio play-by-play activities to his other job of operations and sales manager.

The Tigers produce and market their own telecasts on a multi-station network. Radio Station WJR holds the radio rights.

FENKELL, 50, joined the Tigers in June, 1954, as assistant director of public relations and became director the following November. He was appointed director of special events and manager of the speakers bureau in November 1960. In the latter position he made as many as 240 appearances before an average of more than 300,000 fans a season.

When the Tigers took over operation of their television network in February 1965, Fenkell was named traffic manager and retained most of his other duties as well. The following season he moved into television operations on a fulltime basis.

A native Detroit, Fenkell graduated from Cass Technical High School and Hillsdale College, with additional study at the University of Arizona. He was director of athletic publicity at Hillsdale for three years and at the same time was campus correspondent for several newspapers and United Press International.

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## New Faces On County Board

A newly re-districted, one seat larger Wayne County Board of Commissioners began its two-year term Wednesday with a group swearing in ceremony at the City-County Building.

Partially because of recent reapportionment on the basis of the 1970 census which was required by state law, the board features eight fresh faces, three of them representing Observerland districts.

THEY INCLUDE Brian G. Arrowsmith of Wayne, a Republican representing the newly-created District 27. Also serving their first terms are Tom F. Taylor, a former Westland police sergeant (D-Dist. 20), and Schoolcraft College Trustee Mary E. Dumas (D-Dist. 19), who is awaiting a ruling from the Attorney General on whether she may retain both posts.

The only Observerland hold-over commissioner is Richard E. Manning of Redford (D-Dist. 18).

Because population grew west of Detroit while declining in the central city between 1960-70, two new districts were created in western Wayne County and two districts were combined in central Detroit. Most districts have a population of slightly less than 100,000.

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## NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING AIRPORT CONSTRUCTION BOARD OF WAYNE COUNTY ROAD COMMISSIONERS

The Board of County Road Commissioners of the County of Wayne, Michigan, announces that, pursuant to Section 16 (d) of the Airport and Airway Development Act of 1970 (P.L. 91-258), it will hold a Public Hearing concerning a proposed new runway and related facilities at Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport. The hearing will commence at 6:00 P.M., Eastern Standard Time, on January 5, 1973 at Romulus Senior High School, 9650 South Wayne Road, Romulus, Michigan 48174.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION  
The proposed new runway will serve airline operations for domestic and international, as well as air cargo and general aviation activities. It will be constructed in a northeast-southwest alignment parallel to the two existing northeast-southwest runways. The runway will be 2,000 feet southeast of the existing Runway 3R-21L, and will be 10,000 feet long and 150 feet wide with a supporting taxiway system. The proposed construction will include, in addition to the runway-taxiway system, necessary runway and taxiway lighting, required navigational aids, security fencing and a new storm drainage system outfalling to a new retention basin. To accommodate this runway-taxiway system it will be necessary to relocate Eureka Road and to relocate the existing perimeter drainage ditch. It will be necessary to utilize 1,524 acres of land for these improvements, which have been or will be acquired.

The hearing will afford interested persons, groups, and agencies an opportunity for public consideration of the economic, social and environmental effects of the proposed new runway and related facilities and its consistency with the goals and objectives of such urban planning as has been carried out by the community. "Social, economic, and environmental effects" mean the direct and indirect benefits or losses to the community as a result of the proposed development. These benefits or losses may include but are not limited to effects on:

- a. Safe and efficient use of the Airport;
- b. Economic activity;
- c. Public health and safety;
- d. Property values; and
- e. The human and natural environment, including:
  - (1) Displacement of persons and replacement housing;
  - (2) Sound;
  - (3) Neighborhood character and location;
  - (4) Fish and wildlife;
  - (5) Historic, natural, scenic, and recreation areas;
  - (6) Water and air quality;
  - (7) Land use;
  - (8) Protection and enhancement of natural resources and the quality of environment; and
  - (9) Feasible and prudent alternatives to potential adverse effects on the environment, including consideration of need for the proposed development.

Interested parties may present oral testimony of their views concerning these matters. 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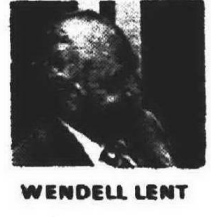
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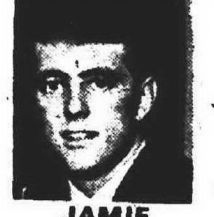
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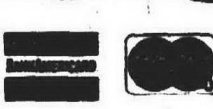
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# Why Bank Sees 'New Era' In '73

A new era in the continuing growth and expansion of the Livonia National Bank dawned with 1973. In fact, it may be even more remarkable in accomplishment than the eight years just ended, which saw bank assets multiply more than fivefold.

Elvin D. Dougherty, who has served as president of LNB since 1965, reflected the optimism with which the bank approaches the new year when he said he is "looking ahead to possibly a 20 per cent growth" in the next 12 months.

"It appears it will be a good year for the economy and for industrial and commercial expansion in western Wayne County," said Dougherty.

At the same time, he revealed that the bank has applied to the Comptroller of the Currency of the U.S. Treasury for permission to establish three more branches. Their locations have not been announced, but approval would give LNB 11 units compared to its present eight.

FOUNDED AS A state bank in January 1953, LNB's two most significant changes in the institution's character came in December 1964 and November 1972.

The first saw the bank convert from a state to a national charter. Total resources which had grown at a mild pace to \$18 million by '64, then jumped substantially each succeeding year and at the close of business in 1972 were an estimated, \$100 million. They already were officially at the \$94 million mark last June 30.

Adding weight to the optimism for the future is the fact that in November LNB was one of five banks whose stock was acquired totally by the Michigan National Corp., which thus became Michigan's largest statewide bank holding company with total assets of approximately \$2.5 billion.

Dougherty emphasized that even though MNC is now the parent entity of Livonia National Bank, LNB retains its own full corporate identity and complete independence.

STANFORD C. Stoddard, president of MNC and a member of the LNB board, pointed out one of the advantages to member banks in the statement:

Dougherty presented immediate evidence of this when he revealed that from MNC's sale of \$38 million of convertible notes consummated in New York Dec. 22, \$2 million is to be invested in LNB corporate stock at once.

"This will enable us to pursue an aggressive expansion program in '73," said Dougherty.

Others in the MNC framework are Michigan National Bank, serving nine outstate communities; Michigan Bank, serving metropolitan Detroit; Oakland National Bank, serving the Southfield area; and Troy National Bank, whose trade area covers northern Oakland County.

STOCKHOLDERS in each of the five banks received proportionate shares of MNC common in establishing the holding company. In the case of the approximately 220 persons who held LNB's outstanding 88,000 shares, each received 1.86 shares in Michigan National Corp. per LNB share.

LNB shares had been trading at about \$67, and MNC is at about \$55. The 1.86 ratio put value of a Livonia share at approximately \$102.

The Livonia bank has roughly 60,000 depositors and 30,000 borrowers, and as Dougherty put it, "The bulk of them are Livonians who consider it their home-town bank. Banking is a service, carrying a responsibility to the community, and our customer acceptance links directly with our steady growth."

THE BANK maintains its executive offices in the branch

at 37276 Six Mile Rd., and Dougherty said that the temporary office which houses the recently opened branch at Five Mile and Haggerty will be replaced this year with a permanent new structure.

LNB's net income per share at year-end has not yet been determined for 1972, but shows this growth record for the previous five years: \$2.83 in 1967; \$3.77 (1968); \$5.14 (1969); \$6.46 (1970) and \$8.39 (1971).

Other directors, in addition to Dougherty and Stoddard, are Leonard Broquet, Melvin Cruzen, Russell Fairles, Nathan Fink, Irving Goldberg, Samuel Greenawalt, Kempf Hogan, Herbert Jacob, Gerald Kiebusch, Edwin Orr, Norman Stockmeyer and Frank Welsher.

Recently, Manufacturers National Bank announced that it has applied for permission to open a new state-chartered bank in Livonia, and speculation has arisen as to whether LNB will oppose the step.

"Our feeling at the moment is that we will not oppose this (Manufacturers' proposed expansion)," said Dougherty. "At this point in time, we aren't considering any formal protest."

EMPHASIZING the optimistic outlook for LNB's future, Dougherty underscored the new affiliation under the Michigan National Corp. and pointed to these as some of the benefits which may be realized:

1. Greater flexibility and ability to provide additional capital and resources through utilization of the holding company's borrowing capacity.
2. Diversification of stockholder risk, since the combined group has a broader economic and geographic base and is therefore less vulnerable than an individual bank to fluctuation of earnings due to unusual credit or fraud losses.

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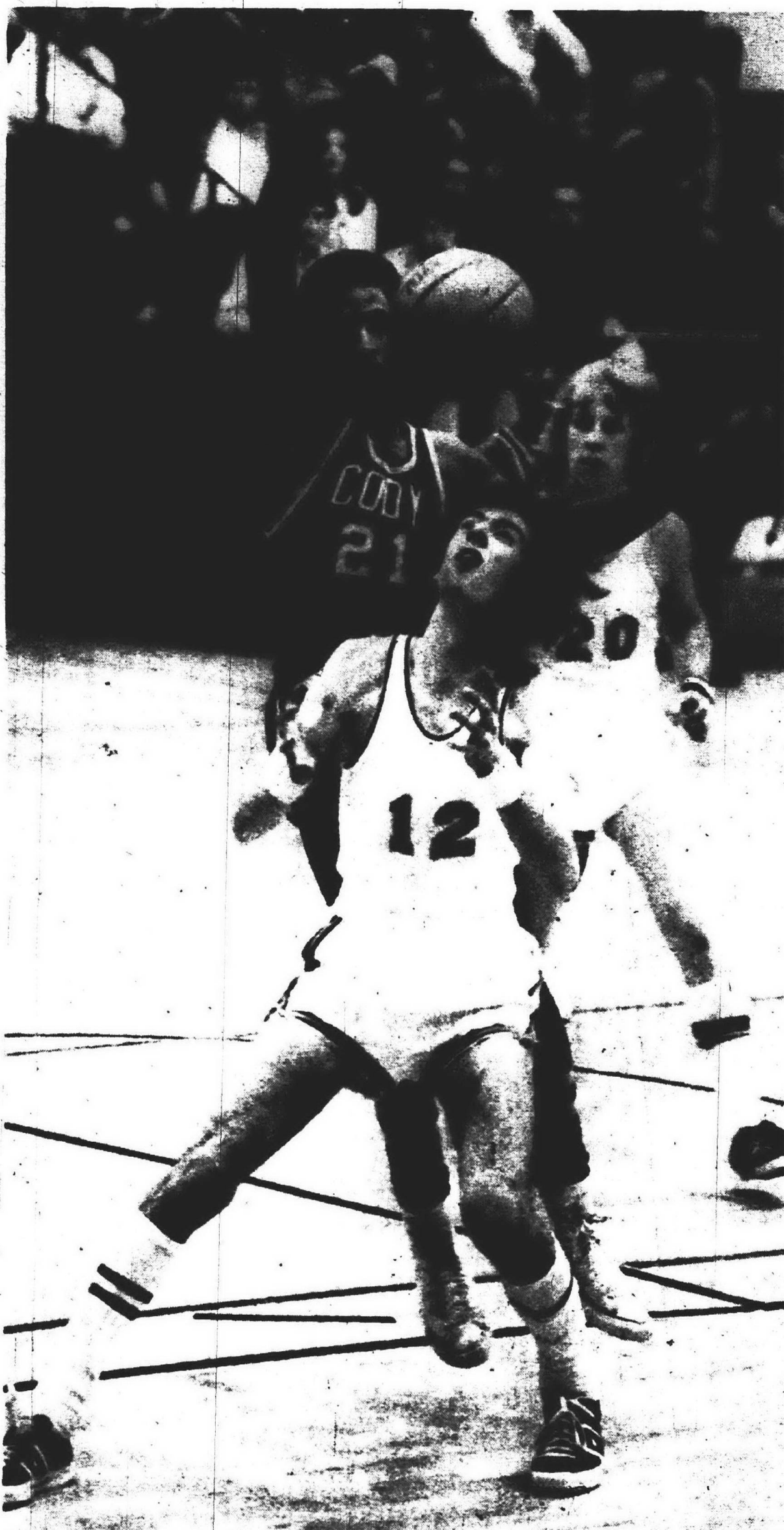

## Turf Tips, Quips

Memorial services were held for Orlow G. Owen Sunday afternoon in the Northville Methodist Church and thus ended the career of an individual who had more to do with the growth of harness racing in Michigan during the past quarter-century than any other single person.

Orlow left this world Friday morning after suffering a series of damaging strokes. He retired as vice president and general manager of Wolverine Harness Raceway in 1969 due to illness, but never lost interest in pacers and trotters.

It was that enthusiasm and desire to make the sport grow to major proportions that gained him the title of "Mr. Harness Racing" of Michigan. For years, Orlow was a lobbyist for the metropolitan Detroit harness racing tracks, doing everything possible to better conditions in the area as well as at county fair tracks throughout the state.

It was through his efforts the Legislature passed a bill providing that the state add \$3 for every \$1 put up by county fair associations as purses for harness racing programs. This boosted purses to the point where the Michigan fairs rank near the tops in the nation in dollars for racing. He was instrumental in building up a breeders award fund which returns a check to the breeder every time one of the horses from his establishment wins, regardless of who is the owner.

It was Owen and his close cooperation with the Michigan Harness Horsemen's Association that had legislation passed which set up the rich two and three-year-old trotting and pacing futurities which now have annual purses ranging up to \$40,000. Then there is the Charlie Coon Memorial, for four-year-olds, which is expected to soar to more than \$70,000 next summer. All of these were the direct result of concerted efforts by Orlow and clearly showed why he deserved to be known as "Mr. Harness Racing."

BECAUSE OF his efforts, the harness racing industry has become a big thing in Michigan. Where there were few, if any, breeding farms back in 1944 when Orlow first became interested in the sport, now there are 100 or more spread across the state.

Back in 1944, operators of Northville Downs, who were pioneering parimutuel racing under the lights, had trouble filling an eight race card. In fact, horses came back two and three times during the course of the program to make

racing possible.

Contrast that to the situation now where the track operators have to turn down hundreds of applications for each meeting and very carefully screen all horses to get the best possible horses. That big change can be attributed to the efforts of Orlow in promoting and building harness racing.

We first met him in the spring of 1945 when he was the race caller at Northville Downs and also assistant to General Manager Sam Wiedrick. Orlow had helped Wiedrick and his five partners from Buffalo, N.Y. get the ingredients necessary for night racing. It meant securing lamp posts and lights for the track at a time when such things were not available due to World War II.

Prior to getting into harness racing, Orlow, a graduate of Michigan Normal College, now Eastern Michigan University, had been involved in several different types of employment... all in the Northville area. He had been a coach and counselor at Northville High, operated a men's clothing store, worked for an automobile agency and even a restaurant.

BUT HE found his niche when he turned to harness racing. Those who heard him call races during the late '40s still feel he was the best. Those who had contact with him during his years as announcer and administrator at the Downs, and then as general manager of Wolverine Raceway starting in 1952, praised him for his willingness to listen to all.

Orlow would spend as much time with the groom or driver complaining about conditions in the barn area as he would with important owners or state legislators. He always had time to listen, and then he

tried to correct things brought to his attention.

Selected by Frederick Van Lennep as Wolverine general manager when Van Lennep took over the harness racing lease at the Detroit Race Course in 1952, Orlow played a major role in the construction of the plush Pompano Park track in Florida and served as vice president and general manager for three years.

Then he discovered the overlap of dates in Florida and at Wolverine made it necessary to make a choice, and his decision was to stay in his native Michigan. A stroke curbed his activities in 1967 and finally brought his retirement in 1969.

But the interest was there to his dying day. Harness racing in Michigan has lost one of its leaders. May it progress as much in the next 25 years as it did during the time Orlow Owen was associated with it.

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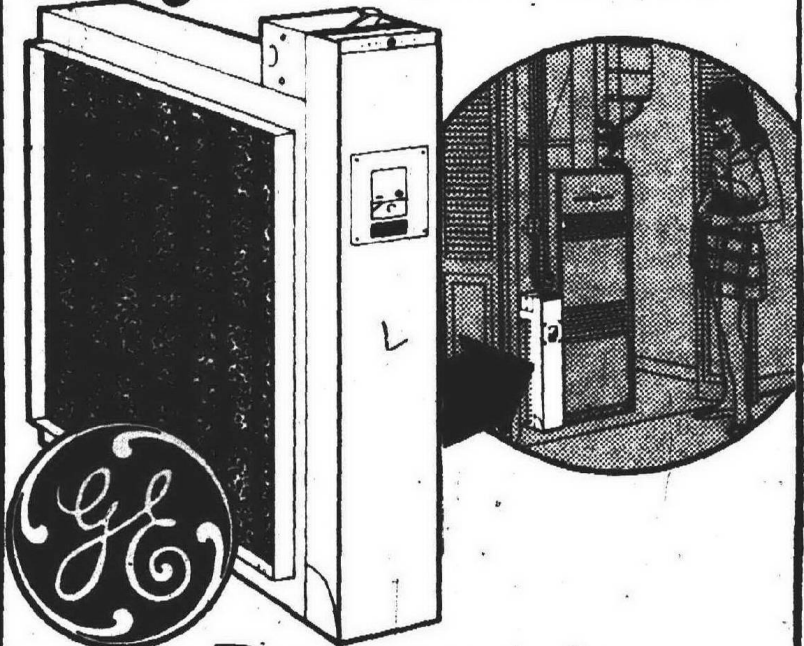

## Lights Will Glow For '73 Tigers

The lights will glow on the Tigers during 1973 spring training as never before in their history.

Four of the 31 exhibition games announced by Jim Campbell, executive vice president and general manager, will be played under the lights at Marquette Stadium, in Lakeland, Fla., where the Tigers have trained since 1934. The Tigers played only one night game there last spring, beating the Boston Red Sox a few hours before a players' strike cut short spring training and delayed start of the regular season.

The 1973 spring games will open with a traditional series against the Minnesota Twins, at Orlando on Saturday, March 3, and at Lakeland the following day. One other Sunday and three Saturdays are on the schedule at Marquette Stadium, where the night games will be played March 22 (St. Louis), March 24 (Pittsburgh), March 29 (Boston) and April 2 (Cincinnati).

The exhibition season will close with an April 2-3 series with the Cincinnati Reds, after which the Tigers will head north to open their '73rd

American League campaign at Cleveland on Saturday, April 7.

THIS MARKS the fifth time in the last six years that the Tigers will play all their spring games in Florida, with 17 at Lakeland. They will meet 12 of the other 16 teams training in Florida - five American League teams in 13 games, seven National League entries in 18 games.

Five exhibitions have been scheduled with the Red Sox while three National League teams will be met four times each. They are Cincinnati, New York and Pittsburgh - the three teams which have had a monopoly on National League pennants since 1969.

## Tax Base Heart Of School Case

An Observer Roundup

The Michigan Supreme Court decision outlawing the state's system of funding public schools leaves legislators facing the necessity of devising some new method of financing for the 1973-74 school year.

And the new method, the court said in essence, must go farther in helping poorer districts.

Michigan supports its schools through a combination of local property taxes and state aid. Because of differences in property values across the state, the amount raised by local property taxes varies widely from district to district.

The state aid formula attempts to adjust this by providing more help for poor districts than for wealthy ones. But the court said this unequal spending of public funds for students in different school districts is unconstitutional.

THE COURT, in a 4-3

decision, actually ruled only on the state aid formula applied in the 1970-71 school year. But legislators and other agreed that little of the inequality has been remedied since then.

At the heart of the ruling is a school district's property tax base—the value of taxable property behind each pupil. Even with the adjusted state aid, various school districts spend widely different amounts on pupils.

In Observerland, for example, Southfield is the wealthiest school district with \$31,458 in taxable property behind each public school student. Garden City, with only \$8,363 behind each of its pupils, is the poorest. (See chart.)

The state's school aid formula, designed to overcome such disparity, provided Southfield with \$204 per pupil for the 1970-71 school year and Garden City with \$501 per pupil.

Even so, there was inequality.

Southfield was able to spend

\$985 in total expenditure per pupil; Garden City put out \$758.

But Southfield raised \$827 per pupil in local property taxes, while Garden City produced only \$263 per pupil from the same source.

SOUTH REDFORD, with \$30,811 in taxable property per pupil, got only \$174 per pupil from the state but spent \$982 per pupil.

Redford Union, with \$13,002 behind each student, got \$386 per student from the state but spent only \$865 per student.

South Redford raised \$834 per pupil in local property taxes and Redford Union produced \$519 per pupil from that source.

In effect the court said the Legislature must fashion some type of school financing plan—using state taxes, local taxes or a combination—that provides for general equality of spending per pupil for basic education. Districts wishing to pay extra taxes for special programs, such as art, could do so, however.

## Stempien Eyes Job Writing Betting Law

Former State Rep. Marvin Stempien may be hired to draft legislation to combine dog racing, horse racing and off track betting into a private, state-regulated corporation similar to the Michigan Public Service Commission.

Stempien, who was Livonia's state representative until Jan. 1, has returned to his private law practice in Livonia after an unsuccessful bid for Congress against U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor).

Stempien is also considered a likely candidate for state Democratic Party chairman, but maintains that he is not an "active candidate."

THE PROPOSAL to establish a corporation regulating racing and betting was made by House Speaker William Ryan (D-Detroit). Ryan said it would function like the Public Service Commission, which regulates utilities companies.

In discussing the proposal, Ryan said Stempien might become a consultant and lobbyist for both dog and horse racing interests promoting such a plan.

But Stempien vigorously denied that he would be a "lobbyist," saying that he might be hired as an attorney to write legislation creating the corporation.

"I'm not a lobbyist, I'm a practicing attorney," Stempien said. "I have been asked to rewrite the parimutuel act."

"I would be happy to do it if suitable arrangements can be made to hire me," he added. He said he could be hired by the House to draft the legislation, by one of the interest groups or through a pool of funds from the interest groups and House.

EVERY YEAR for the past decade, major disputes have arisen between horse racing interests and backers of dog racing and off track betting, he pointed out. Horse racing lobbyists are afraid the tracks would lose money if dog tracks are permitted.

Under the corporation plan, everyone would have an equal chance at parimutuel wagering.

"I'm not sure we would work something out, but we could give it the old college try," Stempien said. "I think it would be more reasonable and sensible to see all parimutuel interests have their needs met without scrapping over it every year."

"I would like to see the dog and horse racing people together have an approach

DRAFTING legislation to satisfy all sides would take more than dealing in mechanics, Stempien pointed out.

The legislation would have to satisfy the major objectives of both sides, and it would take "someone they trust" to do it, he said.

"I've got the rapport with both sides, the expertise, and happen to be available," Stempien said.

Stempien said the proposed act would "give everyone in parimutuel betting a reasonable opportunity to make a profit."

Stempien said that although racing is considered a sport, "the people wouldn't be in it unless they expected to make money."

"I would hope my function would be complete in a two to three month period," he said.

IF ELECTED state Democratic chairman, Stempien said he wouldn't be involved in drafting the legislation.

Currently he is taking "one

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## Windows Contribute To Beauty Of Home

If you look through a window and never see it, you're missing a lot.

Windows are often taken for granted. But, their contribution to home comfort and beauty is too great to overlook. When choosing windows, be sure they offer the best available benefits: good style, visibility, ventilation and insulation.

Operating, or ventilating, windows are important year-round, even in air-conditioned homes. Invigorating fresh air circulation is as vital to home comfort in winter as cool breezes are in summer. In the artificial climate of air-conditioned homes, fresh air provides welcome relief.

Casement windows, of ponderosa pine, which open out at a 90-degree angle, are popular ventilating windows. They are often used in combination with fixed sash.

Also effective as ventilating units are awning windows, which open up and out, and hoppers, which open in and down. Even in rainy weather, awning units can be left open for ventilation.

EFFECTIVE home insulation requires windows with good insulating capabilities. Engineering tests show that wood sash windows with insulating glass and factory-applied weatherstripping substantially cut heat loss and keep rooms comfortable year-round. By promoting efficient use of heating and cooling systems, the windows also help conserve fuel and reduce costs.

Use of insulating glass, available in all styles of ponderosa pine windows, eliminates the need for storm sash.

Good visibility often depends on choice of window

styles and proper window placement. Bow and bay windows generally afford the largest glass expanses.

Casements and sliders offer uninterrupted glass areas, and are often used in series for more extensive views. Awnings and hoppers stacked one atop the other can open up a whole wall to the outdoors.

A RULE of thumb for proper window placement is to set them at eye level. This means that in living and dining rooms, where people sit most of the time, windows should be set lower in the wall than in kitchens, where people are most likely to stand.

Whenever possible, window styles should complement a home's architecture. The variety of ponderosa pine window styles available in stock sizes at local lumber dealers, makes such choices feasible.

## Extra Lamps, Lighting Make 'Bathroom Plus'

We've come a long way since the birth of indoor plumbing. Cleopatra had a dozen hand-maidens to fill her tub with perfumes and oils. But even she would be jealous of some of the affordable luxuries you can add to your bathroom.

Witness, special lamps:

• **Heat lamps.** Infrared bulbs give instant heat that warms the body by radiation rather than by heating the air. They provide quick heat in the spring and fall when regular house heating is not operating. . . or for keeping the baby warm while drying and dressing. Because of condensation, the hard-glass type of heat lamp is recommended in bathrooms to avoid shattering.

• **Sun lamps.** During rainy weather along the Nile, you can bet Cleopatra would have loved to use a sun lamp. Properly used, sun lamps can maintain a healthy tan year-round. Reflector lamps in either recessed fixtures over the lavatory, or hooded bullet fixtures on either side of the mirror, may be used.

Be sure to follow manufacturer's instructions regarding distance and exposure time. Check local wiring codes before installing both sun and heat lamps.

• **Ozone lamps.** Ozone lamps are small four watt bulb that activate the oxygen in the air, destroying unpleasant odors. The ozone lamp should be mounted above eye level in a

shielded metal fixture, and never viewed directly because it may have harmful effects on the eyes.

• **Night lights.** Illumination at night is necessary in the bathroom. The panelescent Nite Lite provides just enough see-power for dark-adapted eyes. An electroluminescent source that consumes very little electricity, it runs continuously at a cost of a few pennies a year.

ONE WARNING--Be careful to place lamps in bathrooms where they won't be splashed with water.

One drop of water hitting hot lamp can cause it to shatter and send glass flying all over the place.

## Nothing Like Real Sleep

There's a sleep myth to the effect that just resting in bed, even if you toss around and can't sleep, is as valuable as sleep itself. But this is challenged by medical findings.

Three hours of good sleep, according to researchers at a mattress company, may be more refreshing than eight hours of being in bed while the mind is occupied with the cares of the day.

Anything that disturbs sleep, such as uncomfortable bed clothes, a lumpy mattress, or a poorly ventilated room, should be avoided.

## The Green Thumb

If you're looking for a good winter job, why not make some labels for marking your plants next spring?

Save those leftover TV dinner trays and cut them into one by four inch strips. You can write the plant name on the aluminum using a sharp nail or an ice-pick.

Some gardeners tie the aluminum strip to a plant, using aluminum wire. Labels last for years, and are useful for boy scouts and students for marking trees in a park.

Many gardeners take plastic bleach bottles and cut them into strips. These make fine labels and can be written on easily with a soft lead pencil or special marking pencil.

**PARLOR PLANT:** We're getting lots of letters asking us what can be done to make the Hoya or wax plant (also called parlor plant) bloom. Grandma had the secret when she had plenty of blooms in her kitchen. The old-time kettle whistling away gave off a lot of moisture and this apparently helped the plant flower.

Even if you can't get yours to bloom, the fleshy, evergreen leaves are attractive, as well as its clusters of fragrant, pinkish star-shaped flowers, so waxlike, that people are fooled.

Give your plant a bright, cool winter and soil mixture that's good and loose — one part each of sand, peat and loam. In winter give less water, but in summer they take plenty of it.

**ARE THE BUDS** dropping off your favorite African violets?

This and poor flowering can be due to any of the following: Too dry atmosphere, lack of humidity, too little light, and not enough air circulation. Also a lack of humidity, overwatering, extremes of temperature, and drafts will raise havoc with your violets.

**NIGHT LIGHTS** and plants: Will the safety night lights in your backyard have any effect on flowering of house plants or outdoor plants?

They can. For years, ordinary mercury vapor lamps have been commonly used as street lamps. Though these lamps had only a slight effect on the growth and maturity of green plants, they do have a harmful effect in a roundabout way. The blue light given off by these mercury vapor lamps attracts large varieties of plant-eating insects in spring and fall.

Yellow lights are the best.

**GREEN THUMB CLINIC:** "We have some shrubs which are a neglected mess. Can they be cut back this winter?"

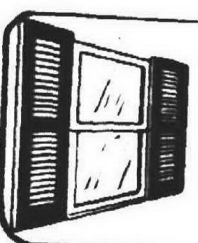

# City Gives 1st Look At Cable TV Ordinance

Under the proposed ordinance, the licensee would have to demonstrate it has the facilities and financial stability to accommodate serving the city.

# Missing Man's Body Found

The body of John Edward Higgins, 22, of Plymouth, who had been missing since Nov. 13, was found in Wilcox Lake Sunday by Michigan State Police.

Detective Sgt. James Collins, assigned to the case since Higgins was reported missing following an automobile accident, said he spotted the body floating at the foot of the dam on the east side of the lake at the intersection of Wilcox Rd. and Edward Hines Drive.

Higgins had been the subject of an intensive search by State Police and Collins said he had been checking the lake area almost daily for several weeks.

State Police divers had searched part of the lake several weeks ago. Police had also searched the surrounding area with dogs.

A graduate of Plymouth High School, Higgins was employed at Evans Products Co. He disappeared early the morning of Nov. 13 after the car he was driving went off the

road at Hines Dr. and Northville Rd.

**STATE POLICE** said Higgins' roommate, Steven D. Slider, with whom he lived at 616 Church St., was in the car at the time of the accident.

Slider is reported to have told police he went for help, leaving Higgins alone in the car. When he returned, Higgins was gone.

Police say three keys were found on the body along with an employee badge from Evans Products.

Although there were no signs of violence on the body, according to police, the case is still under investigation by the Plymouth State Police post.

Services for Mr. Higgins will be in the Memorial Funeral Home, 20226 W. McNichols, on Saturday, Jan. 6 at 10:30 a.m. Officiating will be the Rev. Robert Schaden of St. Edith Catholic Church, Livonia. Burial will be in Woodlawn Cemetery.

Survivors are: parents, Reuben and Elizabeth; brothers, Dr. William Luoma and Jeffrey; sister, Mrs. Robert Hutton of Plymouth.

# Requests Sidewalks On Overpasses

**PLYMOUTH**  
Plymouth Township is investigating the possibility of getting the State Highway Department to install sidewalks on the overpasses now being constructed over the proposed I-275 expressway.

The township board recently voted to ask the state to install nine-inch high walkways on the overpasses.

The township board was alerted to the issue by a letter from Plymouth School Superintendent John M. Hoben who asked the board to look into sidewalk overpasses, particularly in school areas.

Hoben's letter said that he had James Rossman, now acting as a consultant to the Plymouth School district, research the possibilities of a footpath over the bridges to be constructed on Ann Arbor Trail, Cherry Hill, Palmer and Warren roads that will span I-275.

According to Hoben's letter, Rossman found that the state did not include walkways on its overpasses "unless sidewalk approaches are brought to them."

The township board voted to ask Supervisor J. D. McLaren to notify the state that it preferred nine-inch high walkways.

McLaren sent a letter to the highway department on Dec. 28 asking for clarification of the procedures which the township must go through to have the sidewalks installed on the overpasses.

### ORDINANCE NO. III - A '72

RESOLVED, that the Township of Plymouth does hereby rescind Ordinance No. III - A '67, which was an ordinance to amend Ordinance No. III, Section III - Fees, known as the Electrical Code for the Township of Plymouth, said ordinance having been adopted by the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees at a meeting held on February 25, 1969.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:  
PART I. That Ordinance No. III, known as the Electrical Code of the Township of Plymouth, is hereby amended by amending Section III. Fees for inspection to read as follows:  
When an application is made for a permit required under the terms of this Ordinance, a fee shall be paid in the amount as prescribed by the Township Board of the Township of Plymouth. Such fees shall be sufficient to pay the cost of administration and inspections. These fees may be adopted, changed or amended by resolution by the Township Board of Trustees as deemed necessary.

PART II. REPEAL. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with any of the provisions of this amending Ordinance are hereby repealed.

PART III. VALIDITY. Should any section, clause or provision of this ordinance be declared by the court to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole, or any part thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid.

PART IV. EFFECTIVE DATE. The provisions of this ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety, and are hereby ordered to take effect and be in force from and after the earliest date allowed by law.

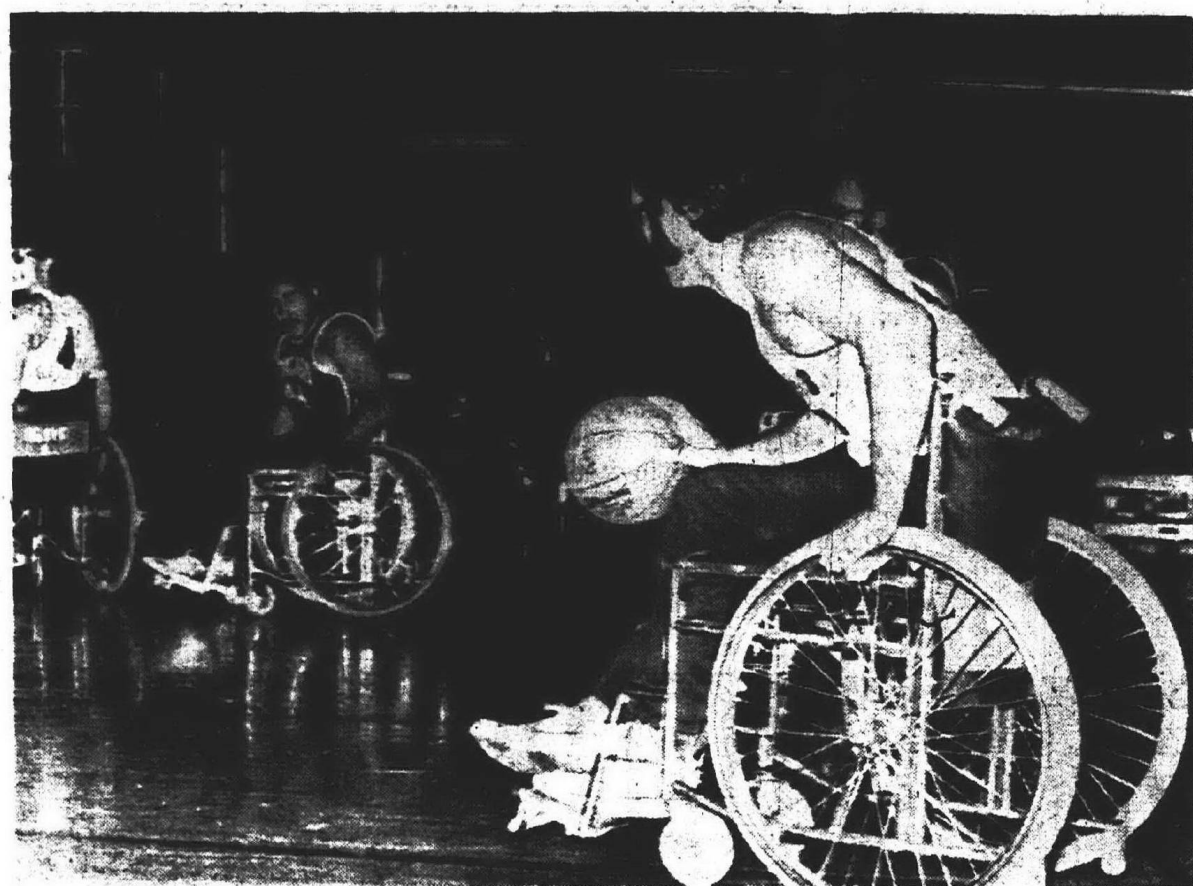

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## Cooking You Do With Kids

Early childhood education experts agree that cooking experiences for preschool children have a valuable place in a nursery school curriculum.

At Mayfair Co-Op Nursery in Farmington, teachers Jane Fagen and Rachel McCormick sometimes have as many as 24 children participating in some phase of a food project. That alone might make cooking with just one or two preschoolers at home seem attractive.

At a recent workshop for cooperative nursery school teachers Rachel shared some of her professional hints and child-tested recipes.

Since so many of the young child's discoveries are based on sensory perceptions, the different textures, smells, colors and tastes of the ingredients are all considered. Similarities and differences in salt and sugar, flour and baking powder, the change from liquid to solid when a cake bakes are exciting observations for a child to make. The children do their own measuring, spooning flour from a bowl into a measuring cup, for example.

Some recipes she rewrites in picture form. Of course, hands are washed before participating and caution is exercised in the use of heat and cutting utensils.

Here are some of the nursery school recipes which can be adapted for home cooking.

**APPLE SAUCE**  
Each child washes and helps cut an apple with a table knife. Children will want to cut some across to see the design made by core and seeds. Put pieces in a large saucepan. Add two cups of water for 24 apples. Simmer for about 30 minutes. Add one cup of sugar and one teaspoon of cinnamon. Stir all together and then put through a food mill, colander or strainer.

**PEANUT BUTTER**  
Children help to shell cooked peanuts. Put into electric blender and grind. Add salt to taste and enough honey or peanut oil for spreading consistency. Let children spread on crackers or bread for snacks.

**INDIAN BREAD**  
Sift flour, baking powder and salt through a sieve into a large bowl. Melt butter and add to milk. Add milk mixture to dry ingredients and beat with a spoon. Flour a board. Divide the dough into four balls. Knead and make into round flat loaves about an eighth of an inch thick. Heat oil in a skillet and brown each loaf on both sides. Spread with preserves or fruit pie filling, cut into wedges and serve immediately.

**CRAZY CAKE**  
1 1/2 c. sifted flour  
3 T. cocoa  
1 t. soda  
1 c. sugar  
1/2 t. salt  
5 T. cooking oil  
1 tsp. vinegar  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 c. cold water  
Put your sifted flour back in the sifter, add to it the cocoa, soda, sugar and salt and sift this right into a greased square cake pan. Now make three holes in this dry mixture. Into one pour the oil, into the next the vinegar, into the last the vanilla. Now pour the cold water over it all. You'll feel like you're making mud pies now, but beat it with a spoon until it's nearly smooth, and you can't see the flour. Bake it at 350 degrees for half an hour. Frost by putting chocolate-covered peppermints on top of the hot cake and then spread around as they melt. Children can do all the measuring and mixing of this cake and love to do it. Great to use when wanting to build vocabulary and to show that sometimes it takes many ingredients to make a certain food.

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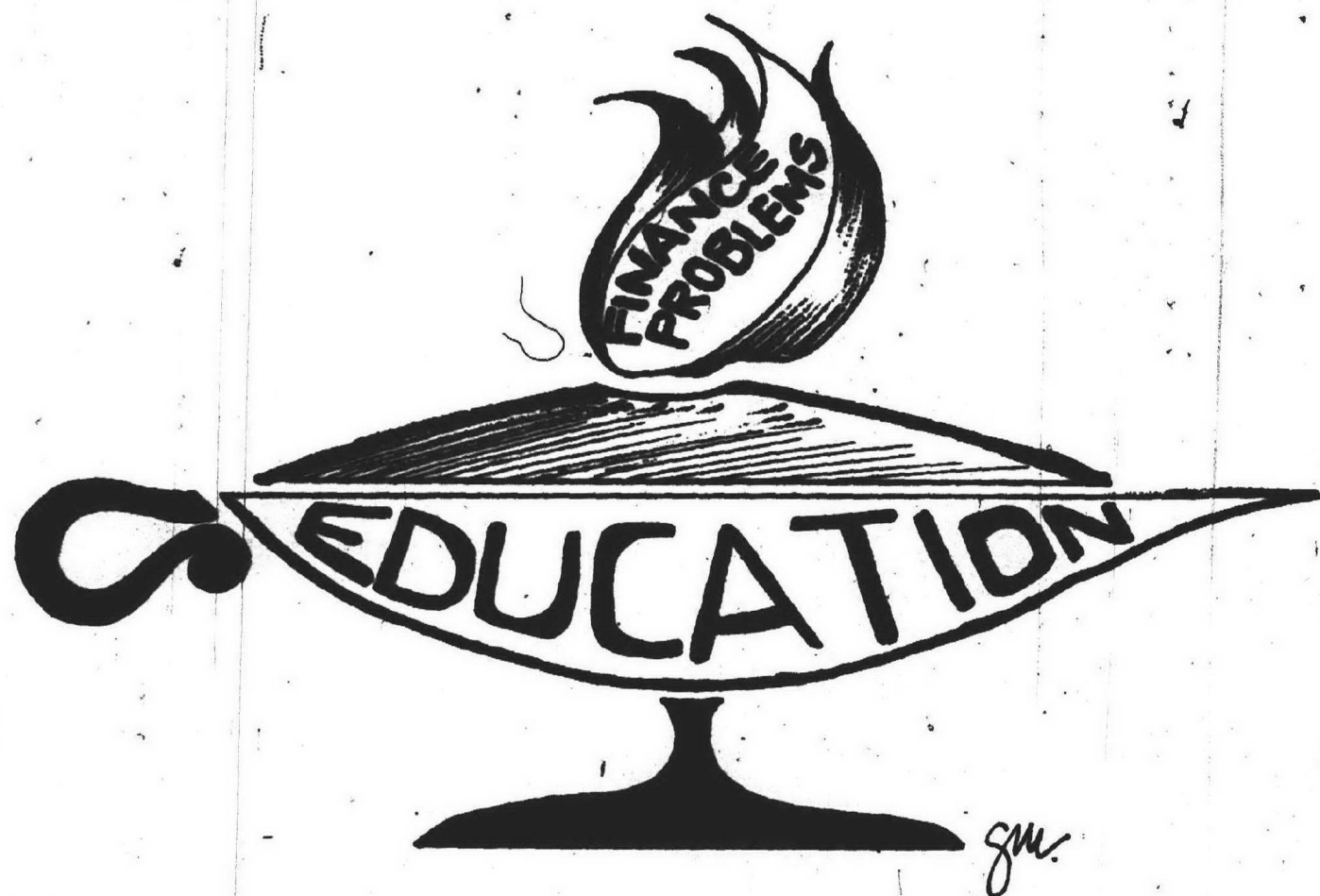

## A Service That Doesn't

For months folks have been complaining about the slowness of the Postal Service. It appears they are paying more now, two cents more for first class, than last Christmas and the service just gets worse each day.

There isn't any time of the entire year when folks have an excellent chance to compare mail delivery than at the Christmas holidays. That's when almost everyone goes all out to mail greeting cards. Most persons put more cards in the mail than during the other 11 months of the year.

And most mail their greetings in ample time to have all in the hands of loved ones and longtime friends well in advance of Christmas Day.

FOR YEARS the Post Office Department hired additional help during the Yule period to make certain all mail was delivered ahead of the big day. For years hundreds were employed for the temporary work including many collegians who had the opportunity to pick up some extra cash.

Then the powers that be in the Postal Service decided to eliminate temporary workers and give the regular mailmen a chance to earn some of the overtime. That system worked well for the simple reason that the regulars

could handle the mail much faster and better than the temporary help.

In each of the past few years, the ones in command, in Washington and not at the local level, have cut back the overtime. The word was for mailmen to sort as much mail as possible in the limited time during the early morning and then make deliveries, leaving the unsorted mail for another day.

Overtime was slashed to an absolute minimum; especially this year, when mail service ended on Dec. 23 and did not resume until Dec. 26. In the past, regular carriers remained in the office sorting mail while substitutes made deliveries, and there always was a Dec. 24 delivery, regardless of what day of the week.

SO WHAT happened this year? We already know that no deliveries were made from Dec. 23 to Dec. 26. We already know that few, if any, of the mail carriers accrued much overtime. . . we know because we asked some of the mailmen in various areas and they told us so.

The slow deliveries aren't the fault of the mailmen. Rather, they are due to the system ordered by Washington which

appears to be designed to discredit the Postal Service.

Why the supposed "brains" in the national capital are doing everything possible to slow down service is a vexing question for area postmasters. They realize the ordered changes aren't working but are helpless to do anything about it.

Never was poor service more apparent than at the recent holiday season.

Time was when one could drop a letter in boxes in the loop area of downtown Detroit in the morning and have it in the hands of the receiver by afternoon. Postal authorities took pride in that kind of service.

There was a time when one could drop an air mail letter in a suburban area in early afternoon and know it would reach its destination the following day.

But those times appear to have vanished. Now, one can post an air mail, special delivery letter in a box in late afternoon and then suddenly realize that it won't be picked up until late the next morning.

REMEMBER WHEN one could mail a letter in Livonia and have it delivered in Plymouth or Redford Township, adjoining communities, the next day?

We received a Christmas greetings card on Dec. 27. It had been mailed in Livonia on Dec. 19. Matter of fact, we received numerous cards as late as Dec. 28 that had postmarks of Dec. 19 and 20.

If that is the new Postal Service, the system devised in Washington for quicker deliveries. . . then we recommend going back to the days of the Pony Express. It was a bit more dangerous, but one couldn't say it was any slower.

## Sense And Nonsense

Our friendly ecology nut advises:

"Everyone who bought an electrical appliance, either for himself or as a gift during the holidays, voted 'yes' on raising Detroit Edison's rates." Think about it.

So 1973 is here, and as the French say, the more things change, the more they are the same.

From 1969 on, the key issue in this state has been how to revise an outmoded and inequitable system of financing education by the property tax.

It led to a taxpayers' revolt which has made it impossible for local school boards to pass local millage for education for the past three years. It contributed to the school busing crisis which dominated the political scene ever since the judges ruled for busing in Pontiac. It helped create a situation in which, of the approximately 80 school superintendents in the tri-county area, 40 are vacant. It was a key issue in the November election, in which voters turned down a new plan which would have set a limit on property taxes and added an income tax.

Last Friday, on the last possible business day of 1972, the Michigan State Supreme Court held that the present education financing system is unconstitutional and must be changed.

So as we move into 1973, bright with the hopes of a new year, we find before us the same darned issue of education financing we have seen for the past three New Year's Days.

WHAT THE COURT said was that it was unequal and therefore unconstitutional for a child in one district to have, say, \$800 spent on his education while a child in another school district has, for example, \$1,000 spent on his schooling.

Precisely what should be done about the present system was not spelled out by the court's 4-3 decision, although the majority of justices did suggest two sorts of guidelines.

One remedy might be to fix up the state aid formula to wipe out any per capita inequalities in spending from one school district to another. Another appropriate reform might be to change "the taxing and expenditures boundaries of school districts," which is language that sounds much like the idea of a state-wide tax distributed to individual school districts through a central state office.

Beyond this the court did not go, clearly hoping that the new State Legislature will step into the breach and come up with a plan on which most can agree. Given the Legislature's past

performance in this area, it seems an optimistic hope.

OF THE TWO approaches to education finance reform — full state funding and equalization of funding via a changed aid formula plus additional state tax revenue — the former seems the least likely to be adopted, mainly because it was essentially this plan that the voters rejected last November.

Jiggling around with the state aid formula — which is intended to equalize support for each child, regardless of what district he is in, but which doesn't — seems complicated but surely is something the Legislature could work out without going through a big spasm.

The approach has the big defect of still relying on the property tax. But in the current atmosphere of high voter suspicion against school boards and the like, it might have an advantage of giving taxpayers a way of voting against things they don't like.

This coming year will see the Legislature going round and round on this one, with Democrats generally favoring state control over financing approach (because it eliminates the property tax) and Republicans favoring jiggling with the state aid formula (because it retains the property tax).

If all this sounds like something you've heard someplace before, you're right.

## How A Detroit Mayor Helped These Suburbs

The most popular political game in the suburbs is knocking Detroit and its elected leadership.

There was one bright exception last Friday morning, the day after Mayor Roman Gribbs of Detroit announced that he won't seek a second term in 1973.

GENERALLY, that kind of announcement doesn't stir emotions west of Telegraph Rd. and north of Eight Mile Rd.

Gribbs is being credited with helping the suburbs by at least one Observerland mayor who, in private, appreciates the Detroit's efforts in getting federally-shared revenue out of Washington, D.C.

In past years, cities usually received federal loans or grants only for specific purposes — even if the project wasn't needed or else was given a low priority.

For example, most suburbs need more policemen and equipment. Most federal grants in that area are for equipment, not manpower, although the manpower problem is given a higher priority in suburban city halls.

THE OBSERVERLAND

mayor pointed out that Gribbs fought long and hard for federally-shared revenue, which helps a lot of suburbs near Detroit.

Granted, Gribbs was mainly looking out for Detroit which has its own money problems.

Nevertheless, his efforts in the revenue-sharing field paid off with the government helping a lot of suburban cities without the prior restrictions on what the money can be used for.

In some suburbs, the federal funds are being used to offset a property tax increase — or at least keep any tax increase to a minimum.

In Garden City, some of the funds were used to build a \$450,000 enclosed civic arena, which includes an ice rink.

GRIBBS' departure from city hall — which seems to be a burial site for budding political figures — may not bring a loud chorus of cheers from suburban city halls.

But the taxpayers in the suburbs should be appreciative of what Gribbs did to lighten their local property tax load and improve local services and facilities.

## Ryan Doesn't Know His Racing

Interesting indeed was the recent news report from Lansing where House Speaker William Ryan (D-Detroit) said he will formally propose that horse racing, dog racing and offtrack betting all be part of a single private corporation regulated by the State of Michigan.

He suggests such a plan would eliminate the continuing legislative battle over legalizing dog racing and offtrack wagering in the state.

Ryan has been a strong supporter of dog racing, which narrowly failed to win approval of the Legislature in early December.

ALL OF THIS leads one to wonder if Ryan realizes all the ramifications.

First, there is the matter of getting the lawmakers to approve dog racing and offtrack betting, each illegal at this time. It is doubtful if either will be passed

in a single year. Dog racing may make it in 1973, but offtrack betting is another matter altogether.

Then one has to consider the benefits to the state. Everyone familiar with state government knows of the huge amount of bureaucracy. One shudders to think how much would be needed with the state guiding a corporation which would include thoroughbred, harness and dog racing plus offtrack wagering.

During 1972 it is estimated the state received between \$25 million and \$30 million from the race tracks. . . this without the state investing a dime. All of the work is done by the tracks and the money turned over.

Figures aren't available from the tracks about profit or loss statements for 1972, but it is doubtful if the two thoroughbred and four harness racing operations will show profits of more than \$2 million. This is due to the

dismal seasons at the Detroit Race Course and Hazel Park thoroughbred racing plants.

WE MIGHT point out to Ryan that his proposal would be just as much in line had he suggested placing Ford, General Motors, Chrysler and American Motors in a single corporation regulated by the state or aligning the Lions, Tigers, Pistons and Red Wings under state supervision.

The same is true of the four major professional sports teams. If horse racing, dog racing and offtrack betting are to be under state guidance, then the individual owners of the four teams should be forced to pool their efforts and have the state tell them how to operate.

It makes just about as much sense as Ryan's proposal. All are licensed by the state, and it makes just as much sense as having Michigan become the gambling czar.

## County Approves Air Patrols For Parks

Sheriff's helicopters will begin flying regular patrols along the 26-mile length of Edward Hines Drive soon in one of two new law enforcement programs recently approved by the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

The board authorized the helicopter patrols and increased policing of the county park system at its last full-board meeting of the 1971-72 term.

HELICOPTERS will be used by the Sheriff for the first time in history for tasks such as patrol of high crime areas, crowd control and apprehension of fleeing suspects. They are expected to be in the air by summer.

Hines Drive will be the focus of the air patrols, according to Sheriff William Lucas, and deputies will assist local police in the communities along the patrol route on an emergency need basis. Hines Drive runs through Plymouth, Livonia, Garden City, Westland, Inkster and Dearborn Heights.

The Board of Commissioners also approved year-around patrol of the county park system by a special force of 18 Sheriff's deputies. In the past an 18-man force patrolled the

parks from May 30 to Nov. 30. During the other six months, the parks were patrolled by 12 men who had other duties as well.

In requesting the year-around patrol, Lucas said activity in the parks is as great now in winter as it is in summer. He said greater use has brought increased problems such as drug abuse, traffic control and accident prevention, as well as more serious offenses.

"It is important to properly police the parks so that the very places which should be preventing crime do not turn into breeding places for crime," Lucas stated. The expanded patrol will cost \$168,000 annually.

Leasing and operation of two helicopters by the Sheriff's department will be covered for one year with a \$163,235 grant in federal law enforcement assistance funds.

The three-person aircraft will be piloted by Sheriff's deputies who will carry another deputy as observer.

The federal funds were approved by the Michigan Crime Control Commission which allocates the funds, the day before the commissioners gave the program their approval on a 13-7 vote.

IN ALL the one-year cost of the helicopter unit will amount to \$262,100, including the deputies' salaries and a county cash contribution of \$4,788. It was revision of an earlier grant application to include the cash contribution that the commissioners acted on officially.

According to police, helicopters patrol more effectively than scout cars and take only 15 minutes to cover as much area as a car would in six hours.

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# How Local Towns View Trash Crisis

**An Observer Roundup**

The business of trash, uninviting as it sounds, is among the fastest-growing in the country, generating millions of dollars for newly-emerging corporate giants whose sole concern is helping America get rid of billions of tons of bottles, cans and debris.

Unfortunately for most American communities, the trash business is the chief victim of its own rapid growth. The universal solution to the problem of solid waste disposal is to bury it, and land for that purpose, a welcome neighbor in few towns, is becoming more and more scarce and expensive as the trash pile mounts.

The problem for Observerland communities ranges from nuisance to crisis. None, however, will be able to ignore for long the fact that when old dumps fill up, new ones not only cost more but are getting farther and farther away.

**THREE CITIES.** Garden City, Westland and Lathrup Village, have joined

regionally-organized programs of waste disposal. These employ centrally-located transfer stations and huge incinerators to cut down on the bulk of waste and the expense of transportation.

Others use the simple messy and expensive method of hauling undisturbed trash directly to the nearest dumping place.

Westland and Garden City have been the most successful in dealing with the problem. They were among early pioneers in seeking a means of efficient waste disposal nearly 20 years ago, when they joined the Central Wayne County Sanitation Authority—a five-city coalition which put a two-furnace incinerator into operation in Dearborn Heights in 1964.

Although the facility had to add its third furnace four years ahead of schedule, it has effectively created a substantial savings for taxpayers, costing residents approximately \$8 per household per year—compared to an average of about \$30 in most other cities.

The approximately 1,400

tons of trash which is burned daily in the incinerator is reduced 85-90 per cent in bulk. From there it goes to an 84-acre dump site in Huron Township which Authority Supervisor Virgil Eller estimates will meet space needs beyond 1987.

**LATHRUP VILLAGE** shares its incinerator with the 13 other municipalities in the South Oakland Incinerator Authority, formed in 1951 and joined by Lathrup when it incorporated in 1953.

Rubbish collected by city crews is trucked to a transfer station in Troy, where larger vehicles are used to transport loads to the incinerator in Madison Heights.

The facility was enlarged in the early '60s and equipped with anti-pollution equipment. Stricter state pollution standards instituted since

then have resulted in \$1.4 million in additional renovation scheduled for completion next year.

Waste disposal costs Lathrup households about \$26 annually, substantially less economical than the Garden City-Westland system, but still some \$6 cheaper than the cost to surrounding residents in Southfield, which has no incinerator.

The system has been successful in meeting a volume of trash which doubled last year without a significant increase in cost.

**SOUTHFIELD AND LIVONIA** share the same private trash disposal service, Commercial Removal Co. of Southfield.

Commercial's manager, Ron Caramango, 29, commands a fleet of 60 seven-ton trucks which haul the

collected refuse of several contractors to four or five landfill sites in Wayne and Oakland County.

The distance his trucks must travel to dump their load increases every year, and Caramango says three or four sites closed last year. The company is building relay stations to cut down on transportation costs, but Caramango claims incinerators will be his only real solution.

The service costs Livonia homeowners about \$1.1 million in property taxes annually, Southfield about \$25,000.

**THE CITY OF Farmington** pays 70 cents a cubic yard to Holloway Construction Co. for the privilege of dumping in its Salem Township landfill.

Holloway is a small-scale example of the money-

making potential of the dump business. It takes in some 2,000 yards (\$1,400) a month from Farmington, and numbers the City of Detroit among its other dumpers. The land, if properly filled, can be resold as a prime construction site within a few years.

Seven independent contractors take care of the trash output of Farmington Township, some using the same Salem Township landfill. A special township committee is studying present and future waste disposal problems in the fast-growing area.

In Redford Township, nine DPW trucks pick up 150 tons of trash a day, but because local zoning ordinances prohibit landfills (as do those of most communities), the rubbish is disposed of by a commercially-operated transfer station, B&R Disposal Inc.

The company compacts the trash hydraulically before transporting it out of the Township for dumping.

**THE MOST** frequently suggested solution for equalizing the wide variation in waste disposal costs and keeping them down in the future is to take the burden off local governments and place it on county or regional authorities with the power to acquire landfill sites by the exercise of eminent domain powers.

Oakland County has announced plans to request such authority from the State Legislature, and a preliminary report by a committee studying the problem for the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments suggests a county-wide approach.

The SEMCOG committee,

headed by Bloomfield Township Supervisor Homer Case, suggests state legislation delegating county authorities a condemnation power with tight regulations on landfill operations to insure that property is not made useless.

Acquisition of the property could be paid for with bonds to be retired by income earned by operation of the dumps, the report speculates.

The state Chamber of Commerce has suggested creation of a special state department to help local governments deal with waste disposal problems, and specifically to help them comply with a new state law which requires all counties, cities, villages and townships of 10,000 or more population to submit plans for solid waste management to the state by July 1, 1973.

## Mrs. Dumas Must Give Up College Post

Schoolcraft College trustee Mary Dumas resigned from the board this week, leaving the board with two vacancies which must be filled this month.

Mrs. Dumas was elected Wayne County commissioner from Livonia and was sworn into office Wednesday.

Her resignation from the Schoolcraft board was prompted by an attorney general's opinion stating that the two offices are "incompatible."

The opinion from Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley's office says that there is no "conflict of interest" as defined by a public act. It stated, however, that the two offices are incompatible because the county commissioners certify the college's budget.

Although the county doesn't allocate funds to Schoolcraft, it does certify the tax levy.

"I WAS disappointed from the point of view of the college and balance on the board," Mrs. Dumas said. "But I'm going to be busy enough on the county board."

Another vacancy exists on the board because former chairman R. Robert Geake was elected to the State Legislature and resigned his post.

The non-partisan board was split politically. But with Republicans Geake and Mrs. Dumas resigning, Democrats will have an opportunity to pack the board in their favor.

A study session is scheduled at 8 p.m. Jan. 17 to discuss the appointments. It is expected that the appointments will be made at a special meeting following the study session.

attorney general's opinion, said that the decision was based on a "minor issue."

The question of an elected official serving "one term of office at a time" is more important, he said.

"I think that's the major issue," he said.

"It will be in the best interests of the college and the county that Mary resign to serve the county position which is salaried and includes an expense account," Pursell said. "It will let the college appoint a representative who can devote 100 per cent of his time to the college."

**SCHOOLCRAFT** President C. Nelson Grote praised "the efforts of Sen. Pursell in securing an early opinion."

"It will permit the board to make some decisions that are timely and in the best interests of the college," Mrs. Dumas said she was reluctant to announce her resignation since it left "two vacant seats on the board at this time, with the possible resultant loss of the board and healthy balance which the present board has maintained."

"There are some critical, controversial issues which may arise again in the near future, and I only hope that those persons selected to fill the vacancies will have as much sincere concern for the long-range future of Schoolcraft College as I believe I had."

She described her 15 months on the board as "challenging and rewarding."

The two appointees will serve until the June 12 election.

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# What Is A Liberated Woman?

## Does She Live In Our Suburbs?

### What has women's liberation meant in the life styles of suburban women?

"I have this new awareness of me as an individual rather than me as a wife," says a client of Plymouth Family Service.

And as she goes on, she pretty well sums up the difference in attitude that made its way across this area, affecting all manner of suburban women.

"Before the Women's Liberation Movement, I was programmed to be a maid. Now I know that women are equal to men."

WOMEN'S liberation, agreed homemakers Sue Rennels, Betty Wagner and Wilma Halliburton, puts new dimensions in living.

"It's seeing things with new eyes," said Mrs. Halliburton, folk art teacher at the Northwest Branch YWCA.

"I've enjoyed seeing so many younger women get involved in new interests. Some find new ways to express themselves artistically - others turn to things outside the home."

"It seems to me," said Mrs. Rennels, "that the movement means human beings being able to express themselves fully. If they happen to be women, and their talent is not involved in the home, then they go outside."

"I have one friend who has taken up guitar playing and another painting. They plan their days with time for these things."

"I have another friend who went to work so her husband could go to school full time. When he finishes, he'll work near the college of her choice so she can get her degree. She's doing what she wants, and she's not going back to being a full time housewife."

MRS. WAGNER found in a human potential course at Schoolcraft College many insights into herself as community member as well as wife and mother.

"I think it's unfortunate," she said, "that many people think women's liberation means demeaning men and deserting families."

Women's liberation in the last few years has become a fact of American life, with its manifestations ranging from the attention - getting bra-burner to the gal who quietly enrolls in an adult education course - just for her own fulfillment.

But how has it hit the suburban scene? Who is the liberator of areas like Observerland, and what makes her the way she is?

Does she see herself - and her husband and her family - in a different light? Does she act differently as the ideas of women's lib spread? Are her relationships changing?

ARE HER educational goals different? How about her employment, aims and the jobs she lands? Does she find that the ideas she passes on to her daughters - and sons - are different from those she inherited.

And what sort of help and advice is available as the world changes around her and she changes with it?



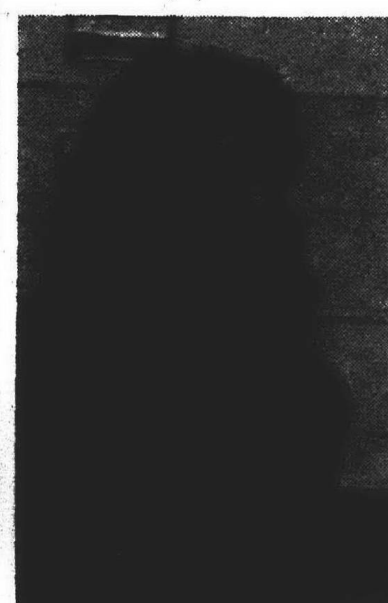

### Which women are affected?

Definitely not all women are interested in liberation.

It's the woman over 25 who feels its impact, rather than the 18-year-old, believes Barbara Geil of Schoolcraft College.

"The younger ones still have the 'Teddy Bear syndrome,'" she said. "They want to be hugged. They are almost playing out the role expectations their parents had for them."

"YOUNG GIRLS still are anxiously awaiting their own pads," added Emilie Norris. "But after girls get married and, from their picture windows, watch a couple of children go off to school, they become interested in the liberation movement," said Miss Geil.

Interest in liberation doesn't

necessarily mean getting outside the home," she added. "Women who prefer being housekeepers, homemakers, should be allowed to be individuals doing it," she said.

"I THINK there are some women who feel threatened by liberation," said Sue Rennels. "They are happy with life as it is and don't want to be bothered with things like developing potential."

Economics may enter the picture, added Emilie Norris. "Women with husbands making over \$15,000 a year don't need to think about changing attitudes," she said. "If they're looking for employment, they'll settle for conventional, part-time jobs. They will have the need when their hubby drops them like a hot potato."

### How does the change affect her marriage, her family, and the training she gives her children?

Marriages and families in the suburbs already are feeling strongly the impact of women's lib.

There's the feeling among men, reports Walter MacDonald of Plymouth Family Services, that they will no longer be taken care of as they have in the past.

"A man marries a woman thinking she's going to fill a certain role. But often household chores and taking care of children don't give a mother enough to do to keep her feeling good about herself."

"Then she becomes depressed and questions her role and problems arise."

MacDONALD predicted that "the woman's lib movement is going to grow, and the divorce rate is also going to grow. Women are getting out of emotionally dead marriages. This is beginning to hit women in their 40s."

"But the marriages influenced by women's lib are

going to be more equal and more stable," he added.

Emilie Norris put it succinctly another way:

"I tell my grandchildren 'never let your sex life interfere with your education.'"

IT'S THE role - assigning that can and should get the biggest jolt from women's lib, agreed those interviewed.

"I wish we could eliminate the ideas that 'men aren't supposed to do this' and 'women aren't supposed to do that,'" said Wilma Halliburton.

"I even heard that when I went out in my yard to barbecue," threw in Sue Rennels.

"I think men will benefit as much as women from the movement," said Betty Wagner. Walter MacDonald agreed, saying:

"An OK woman, one who feels her worth as a person, is more apt to say to her husband 'you're OK, too.'"

Mrs. Wagner said she has appreciated her husband's encouragement of her ac-

tivities in developing her own interests. But as mother of three small children, she said she occasionally runs into some objection from her youngsters in the matter of being gone from the house.

"Then I back off," she said, "not because it's my mother role, but because I chose to be married and have children and my family is important to me."

BETTY WAGNER and Sue Rennels both felt their interest in the new womanhood stems at least in part to the fact that their mothers were intelligent women who had definite opinions, expressed them and taught their daughters there are more things in life than playing with dolls.

They, too, have trucks and games and sports equipment for daughters as well as sons, they believe, and Mrs. Rennels said emphatically that her daughter never will have a Barbie doll unless she finances one for herself.

"I hate the things," she said. "It teaches little girls that what's important is how

you look, how you dress and how many material things you can accumulate, and that furthermore you have to get a new and different model every year."

Mrs. Rennels said she also suggests, when her daughter mentions playing nurse, that she could also be the doctor, and for her son has tried to show a mother "different from the Dick and Jane models in his schoolbooks."

WILMA HALLIBURTON, with her interest in folk history and heritage, summed up woman's changing family role.

"Pioneer women had to give full time to household chores, because if they didn't function the household stopped," she said.

"I don't want to go back to that, but I want to understand them and fill my mind my own way. My husband feels this is important too, and I think the fallout of the new ideas will be for the next generation."

"It's the young who will benefit from our new lack of taboos."

These were the questions that Observer editors Margaret Miller and Betty Masson asked around the area as 1972 drew to a close.

INCLUDED in this most informal survey were Barbara Geil, director of admissions at Schoolcraft College, and one of those organizing a local chapter of the National Organization of Women (NOW); Walter MacDonald, counselor for Plymouth Family Services; and Emilie Norris, a Garden City resident who works in the Plymouth office of the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

We also talked to three wives and mothers who have been active in projects of the Northwest Branch YWCA.

Sue Rennels of Farmington also is a local chairman of Common Cause, a national organization known as the people's lobby. Betty Wagner of Livonia is on the board of the Northwest Interfaith Center for Racial Justice, and Wilma Halliburton is fascinated by folk art and teaches it in the northwest YWCA.

The influence of lib on suburban women isn't great enough when they seek education and almost nil when they seek jobs.

That's the assessment of Barbara Geil of Schoolcraft College and Emilie Norris of the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

More women are attending school beyond the high school level, Miss Geil said, and this includes many returning to the classroom after being married and having children and staying home for a while. But then they limit themselves, careerwise, and the schools aren't helping, she believes.

"OUR PROGRAMS, at this stage, haven't been designed to include women," she said. "There are more than 1,000 women waiting for health career training. We have to do something to get them into other occupational areas as well."

"They don't know what job opportunities are available in such things as electronics. It's ridiculous that we listen to transistors built by women in Japan, and few women think of it as a possible occupational field here."

Women also limit themselves in job mobility, insisting on working near home, she said. And the schools, in her opinion, should do more to widen horizons by coming up with programs for divorced

women who have no training, by retraining teachers and nurses whose occupational fields are crowded and helping publicize "role models" such as suburban women doctors and lawyers.

AND IN THIS respect, the education field could set an example, she concluded.

"Most school administrators are men, and at Schoolcraft we don't have any full-time women in our social science department, which is a really vital spot for a woman's attitude."

Miss Geil recalled the variety of jobs women held during World War II.

"If we went back, we'd be way ahead of where we are now," she commented.

IN THE JOB market, Mrs. Norris is inclined to consider women their own worst enemies.

"Women are led by their emotions and not their intellect," she said. "Their emotions are being molded by the media - we are socialized to such a degree."

"Television is such a powerful force. I notice as the years go on, women are portrayed more and more as men pleasers."

"Many older women are dissatisfied," Mrs. Norris also said, "but they won't try something new. Women are fearful of not playing the role that is assigned to them, because the end results might be disastrous."

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## Women Progress Little Jobwise, Profs Find

**EAST LANSING**  
A woman is elected to a state supreme court "a woman is named to a college presidency (while her husband is appointed her vice president)" a woman completes her first season as a football referee.

These and other cases indicate that women are making some gains in fields traditionally reserved for men. But at the same time the widespread attention they attract helps disguise the fact that working women aren't progressing as much as the public supposes.

So say two faculty members at Michigan State University, and the two plan to point to this and other problems facing women in a new course scheduled this winter at MSU.

**THE COURSE** is called "Women as Workers," and its instructors are Jacqueline Brophy, associate professor of labor and industrial relations, and Collette Moser, assistant professor of agricultural economics.

It is among about a half dozen MSU winter term courses that will deal with topics related to the feminist movement. The courses are in a variety of areas, ranging from "sex roles in a changing society" to "women in the industrial age."

Jacqueline Brophy and Collette Moser share backgrounds and interests in both labor studies and the role of women in the labor market.

Prof. Brophy, whose father was John Brophy, an early leader of the United Mine

Workers and the CIO, is acting director of the labor program service of the MSU School of Labor and Industrial Relations.

Prof. Moser serves in MSU's Center for Rural Manpower and teaches in the public affairs management program of agricultural economics. She is active on women's status committees of both the American Association of University Professors and the American Economics Association.

**THEY AGREE** that changes are occurring for women in today's labor force. The number of working women, for example, has doubled since 1900.

But Prof. Moser contends that "a lot of barriers (against women) still haven't come down."

Adds Prof. Brophy: "It is still so unusual for women to be in some jobs that they're written about, so almost every case gets publicity. This projects the feeling of real change, but it doesn't necessarily mean progress."

History contains some ironies for women as workers, the two professors note.

At the turn of the century, for example, there was pressure for legislation to protect the working women. A major achievement was legally limiting the number of hours that a woman could be required to work, but in today's world that achievement has become a drawback because it has closed off some jobs to women.

**PROFS. BROPHY** and Moser plan to look at a number of topics, including: How the plight of women in professions compares with that of women in manufacturing and service industries; how women are paid and promoted in relation to their production; the status of women in higher education and government; and the status of women who work, but not for pay, in such jobs as housewife and volunteer service, or who are on welfare or social security.

Prof. Moser says that there is "a real lack of knowledge by both employers and employees regarding the guidelines for employing women. A lot of people still think it is acceptable to classify jobs by male or female."

"The security of staying in sex roles is common to both men and women," adds Prof. Brophy. "We've all been socialized to either femininity or masculinity."

But Prof. Moser contends that it is not necessarily the job, but the work environment that dictates roles by sex. "In the Army, men are typists and secretaries and nobody minds."

**EQUAL PAY** as a function of job equality is a major concern, and it will be examined in the new course. "Women have always been thought to be willing to work for less money than men," says Prof. Brophy, "but in most cases they really have had no alternatives."

That is changing, however, and the evidence is clear.

A recent issue of Business Week magazine reported that so far some 400 cases have been filed for women by the U.S. Department of Labor under a 1963 Equal Pay Act. The success rate has been high. The department has won 128 of 208 lower court decisions so far, and it has won 14 of the 30 "losers" after appeals.

In addition, an even higher number of cases is expected to be filed on behalf of women in equal hiring, promotion and other job patterns.

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# U.S. Revenue Facts Due Soon

By early January, all local communities were to receive from the U.S. Treasury Department the information used to compute their federal shared revenue payments, a protest by the chairman of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners determined.

County Board Chairman Robert E. FitzPatrick reported that Treasury Department commitment after he made an appeal to Michigan's congressional delegation which drew a quick response from U.S. Rep. John Conyers Jr. (D-Detroit).

Conyers reported by letter to FitzPatrick that Treasury officials would release the sought-after statistics "no later than Tuesday, Jan. 2, 1973, and possibly as early as Dec. 31, 1972."

THE LETTER also indicated that the Treasury Department would, by the same dates, make available to the Wayne County Board a formal complaint procedure through which the Board can dispute population figures, taxes and per capita income used to compute the County's revenue sharing allotment.

FitzPatrick wants an opportunity to review the Treasury

figures because Wayne County's first-year revenue sharing allotment appeared to be some \$4.5 million less than indicated previously by federal officials. Observerland cities made the same complaint.

In his written appeal to the U.S. legislators, FitzPatrick complained the Treasury Department refused to release the "population, adjusted tax effort and inverse per capita income factors" on which the county allotment is based.

An error, which omitted five Wayne County townships from the distribution of funds, caused Wayne County a reduction of some \$1.2 million when re-adjusted.

INITIALLY, Wayne County was to receive \$16.7 million, based upon 1967 taxes. The figure was reduced to \$15.5 million.

Adding to the concern, pleaded FitzPatrick, is the fact that the first half-year revenue sharing payment for Wayne County was only \$5.8 million. This would indicate that the full-year entitlement would approximate only \$11 million, some \$4.5 million less than expected.

# Recorder's Court Hit: County Vote Asked

Wayne County Commissioner George Z. Hart has launched a push for county-wide election of Detroit

Recorder's Court judges, declaring he will take the issue to court if necessary.

He charged that because only Detroit residents may vote and run for Recorder's Court judgeships, this is taxation without representation since the county finances a major portion of the court's operation.

Hart, a Democrat from Dearborn, said he will ask the County Board of Commissioners to adopt a resolution calling on the State Legislature to amend the state laws governing Recorder's Court in order to make the elections county-wide.

If his resolution is not acted on, Hart said, he will start a court suit seeking to have the present limitation declared unconstitutional and requiring county-wide election of recorder's judges.

IN HIS resolution, Hart points out that Wayne County pays \$24,000 of the current salary of \$35,912 for Recorder's judges, plus the entire cost of the court's probation department. The latter expense will amount to more than \$2.4 million this fiscal year.

"Specifically the present situation deprives the citizens of Wayne County outside the City of Detroit of equal protection of the laws and constitutes taxation without representation, as well as a

violation of the principles of 'one-man, one-vote' as enunciated in a series of United States Supreme Court decisions in recent years," the resolution states.

Following normal procedure, Hart's resolution was expected to be referred to the Board's Public Safety & Judiciary Committee for consideration and a recommendation. Hart is the committee vice-chairman.

His move came within a week after County Commissioner Richard E. Manning (D-Redford) proposed that the county take punitive action against newly-elected Recorder's Judge Justin C. Ravitz because Ravitz failed to stand or recite the pledge of allegiance to the flag at the swearing-in of new judges Dec. 19.

However, Hart said his action had "no relationship whatsoever" to the Justin Ravitz incident. He said he had been planning to act against the inequity of the present Recorder's Court setup before the incident occurred.

MANNING proposed that the county withhold its portion of the judicial salary of Ravitz and complain formally to the Judicial Tenure Commission about the "moral and ethical fitness" of Ravitz.

Hart co-sponsored Man-

ning's resolution which was referred to the Public Safety & Judiciary Committee for consideration after lengthy debate at the Board of Commissioners formal meeting Dec. 21.

Manning also urged that commissioners ask the presiding judge of Recorder's Court not to assign any cases to Ravitz because Ravitz "espouses Marxism, which is just another name for Communism" and because "allowing him to sit in judgement would be an added insult to every citizen of this county and state."

Ravitz said he declined to recite the pledge of allegiance because he felt the words, "indivisible with liberty and justice for all," were not true and as a protest against the Vietnam war.

Hart predicted his bid to force county-wide election of Recorder's Court judges would be misinterpreted as a move to dilute the ballot power of the Detroit's black population.

"That certainly is not the case at all," he stated. "It is a matter of simple equity for the voters of Wayne County, both white and black. There are thousands of black residents

who may not vote for Recorder's Court judges or run for that office because they live in Ecorse, Inkster, Highland Park, Hamtramck or any number of other cities."

Vice-Chairman Philip J. Neudeck declined the chairmanship and chose, instead, to remain a commissioner for the remainder of his current term.

Ordinarily, the post of chairman and vice-chairman rotate among the three commissioners every two years.

Neudeck's decision to decline the role of chairman broke the ordinary chain, and Berry will retain his role while Commissioner Freddie G. Burton will become vice-chairman.

Neudeck has been a practicing attorney in Detroit for nearly a half-century and was elected to the Road Commission in 1962 by the then Board of Supervisors.

## 4 Communities Receive Crime Control Funds

Four local communities will receive nearly \$250,000 in federal crime control funds to develop communications programs.

The Michigan Crime Commission allocated \$49,350 to Garden City; \$75,835 to Livonia; \$31,540 to Plymouth and \$88,900 to Westland for development and improvement of communication programs.

The commission distributed nearly \$5 million to law enforcement and other agencies in Wayne County. The Detroit Police Dept. received the largest share of \$3.29 million while Wayne County received \$800,000.

Wayne County will use the grant to lease and operate two helicopters for the Sheriff's Dept. and finance schematic design for the proposed county jail, a court clerk training extension course and three-day drug rehabilitation programs.
