School Bd. OKs Traditional Modular Scheduling Systems

Plymouth's high school students will be allowed to choose between traditional and modular scheduling next year as a result of board action Monday.

The board unanimously accepted Supt. John Hoben's recommendation to let students contract for either class scheduling system.

THE ACTION culminated a recent controversy over modular scheduling. Many parents opposed that system, saying that the students had too much free time.

Under the modular system, the school day is divided into

15 or 20 minute modules and students can take classes composed of a varying number of modules.

Students electing the traditional method will take approximately seven one-hour classes daily.

Hoben said he "assumed" both high schools would have traditional and modular scheduling.

"We haven't worked out the details yet," he said. "It will affect both student bodies."

At least 200 students are needed to implement traditional, and course offerings will be limited to English, math, science, social studies and language areas with a few other choices.

WITH SCARCELY any discussion, the board unanimously adopted 10 other scheduling proposals made by Hoben but delayed action on splitting the high school band and vocal groups.

Hoben recommended that the band and vocal groups be split between Plymouth-Canton and Plymouth-Salem High Schools next year with the exception of the symphony band and choir which would be composed of students from both schools.

The board tabled the proposal.

Whether ninth graders sign up for traditional or modular scheduling, they will be required to take English, physi-

cal education, mathematics and at least two electives, according to an approved proposal.

"Although it is the feeling of this group (of administrators) that the ninth grade is achieving as well as other grades on the variable time schedule, we desire to lock them into a core program and minimal density," Hoben said in a memo to the board.

The complexion of modular scheduling will change slightly under Hoben's proposals. Instead of the 15 minute module used at the high school this year, 20-minute modules will be used next year with 20 modules in a school day.

Also, the number of courses

will be reduced, particularly in the areas of English and language arts.

STUDENTS WON'T be able to alter their schedules as easily as during the current year since the board established a final cut-off date of the first week in July for schedule changes.

"Only changes relating to failure or computer mistakes will be allowed after this date," Hoben said.

An improved orientation procedure will be implemented with individual interviews arranged for transfer and eighth grade students and small group scheduling used

for prospective 10th, 11th and 12th grade students.

Parents will be kept advised of their child's attendance through printouts on the new data processing equipment.

The board voted to use an elementary feeder system for assigning students to Plymouth-Canton or Plymouth-Salem High School. All of the 12th graders will be in Plymouth-Salem during 1973-74.

Hoben said that it isn't certain which elementary schools will feed into each high school yet.

The heavy use of physical education facilities will be eased under a new plan to let

City To Bear Extra Farmer Paying Share

When Farmer Street is repaved this summer, the city will bear an extra share of the cost.

The city commission voted Monday night to bear an extra 7.5 per cent of the repaving cost which would normally be borne by owners of property on the street.

Normally the city bears about 25 per cent of the cost of all paving projects but in this case, its share will be 32.5 per cent. The city's cost will be about \$106,000.

Commissioner William Silvis introduced the first motion to lower the property-owners' share of the repaving from the 37.5 per cent recommended in a city manager's report to 33.75 per cent for front lot footage and from 18.75 per cent to 16.875 per cent for side lot footage.

That motion was passed by a 6-1 vote with Commissioner Norman Battermann casting the lone dissenting vote

because "it might set a precedent."

Silvis said he wanted the city to bear more of the cost because recent traffic surveys showed Farmer gets about 25 per cent more traffic than intersecting cross streets. This indicates it is used as more of a thoroughfare since it is the only east-west street running completely through the city's north end.

He also said a factor in his motion was the high number of property owners whose side lots border Farmer.

THE REPAVING project will be split into two parts: From Sheldon Road to Blunk Street and from Blunk Street to the C&O railroad tracks.

Under the estimated costs for the two projects, the repaving of the western section will cost \$97,208 and

Mirto's Memos Criticize Board, Administrators

The memos, which Mirto made public at the request of The Plymouth Mail & Observer, were cited by school Trustee Carl Berry in his announcement last week that he would not seek re-election when his term expires in June because of "politics" on the school board.

Berry said Mirto's memos "put the cap on" that decision.

with Berry's statement that "there is a damn serious division" among board members and also doubted Berry would not seek re-election.

"Since July 10 this board has had 206 votes," Mirto said. "Of those, all but three were unanimous."

Saying he was "surprised" by Berry's statements, Mirto said, "I can't really say that since we've been on the board ... there's really any position (Berry has) taken that I haven't agreed with."

"The (school) board is elected, and because you're elected, you're accountable," Mirto said. "Accountability is political. The board sits on top of competing interests, and balancing them makes it political."

Mirto told The Mail & Observer that his and Berry's definitions of "political" were different.

"I'll make a \$50 bet right now that Berry will run again," Mirto said Monday afternoon.

"He has created a very good platform for himself - there's nothing more odious to people than to think their children are being used for political purposes."

"But when he sees Joe Gray and E. J. McClendon file (for the June school elections), he'll find it his civic duty to

run again to keep them from running," Mirto said.

THE FOUR memos released by Mirto call for increased initiative to be taken by board members in suggesting policies, in discussing ideas among themselves before voting, and in setting down priorities for administrators.

In a July 19 memo to "board members only," Mirto said: "I think it is highly essential, for the benefit of our school children as well as restoring the confidence of the

citizenry in the leadership capabilities of the board, that before any of us attempt to initiate any action which would call for board approval, that we seek the advice and input of one another.

"It is my position, and it always will be, that I have an obligation to be protective of and helpful to your (board members) respective positions. You are my colleagues and I owe a loyalty to that relationship.

"If all of us do not share that same conviction with respect to one another, we run the very real risk of becoming

isolated from one another and reducing our influence as individuals and as a board."

IN A JULY 31 memo, Mirto submitted a list of "priority items" to be considered about Centennial Park.

"I have, along with this list, indicated to the superintendent that I expect him to communicate to the staff that the board desires a complete, specific and thoroughly candid dialogue between itself and staff," Mirto said in that memo.

In a Dec. 14 memo, issued three days following the defeat of the \$21 million building bond proposal, Mirto said: "The circumstances in which this school district presently finds itself demand that the board adopt more than just a passive role."

Mirto then listed several items he hoped would be considered in light of the bond defeat.

He also criticized what he said was the way the board was being presented with inadequacies at the high schools in bits and pieces.

"My point being that everyone in an isolated fashion can touch upon individual problems (at the educational park), but no one is giving this board a concrete set of options from which to construct a plan of dealing with the obvious deficiencies out there."

IN A MEMO to Supt. John M. Hoben dated Dec. 14, Mirto criticized school board President George Lawton and other board members.

He also asked Hoben to urge Lawton "to demand, if need be, that all board members begin to regulate their schedules in keeping with the urgent immediate needs facing the district."

"I am sure that (the) staff has sensed the growing chill between myself and the board."

"I have been growing progressively impatient with the lack of leadership from the office of board president as well as with the seeming inability of the board to exercise initiative and a sense of general direction."

Mirto also said, "The coming year will not be a very easy one, and both (administrative) staff and the board have mutual tasks to share, and yet there are a few in-house matters for this board to resolve which are

totally -- I repeat -- totally exclusive of staff concern or influence of any kind.

"I and my fellow board members will have to be about the business of improving our capacity to govern this district as a popularly elected political

body," Mirto said, underlining the last four words.

"THERE IS a growing sentiment in some quarters of this district that the board is too much under the influence of its (administrative) staff," Mirto said.

Berry was appointed to the school board on June 12 to fill the seat vacated by John Hanskat's resignation after running third in the June 12 school election behind Marda Benson and Mirto.

the eastern section will cost \$46,504.

The project is split in two because there is an existing concrete section in Farmer from Blunk to the tracks and the repaving of that portion will therefore cost less.

The cost to taxpayers, under the plan adopted Monday night will be:

• For Sheldon to Blunk: \$11.88 per front foot and \$5.94 per side foot.

• For Blunk to the C&O tracks: \$8.41 per front foot and \$4.20 per side foot.

That cost includes the pavement, which will be 31 feet from curb to curb, the curbs and gutters, and replacement of existing driveway aprons between the curb and sidewalk and relandscaping after the work is done.

THE CITY will also bear the remaining costs, the costs of paving all intersections, the cost of the pavement in front of open alleys, and the cost of any grading changes necessary.

Taxpayers will be able to spread the assessment over a 10 year period with an interest rate of one per cent above the bond project's interest rate -- meaning about a six per cent interest charge to homeowners.

The first payment will be due following the setting of the assessment roles and a public hearing on the rolls.

At Monday's hearing, which was held to determine the necessity of the repaving, about 40 residents of the Farmer Street area attended and said they were not in favor of the repaving because it would lead to increased traffic, more incidents of speeding, and an unfair burden on the property owners because the street was used as a major thoroughfare.

The commission said it planned no changes to existing traffic controls and that it would ask for increased police enforcement in the area.

The original cost estimates of the project were lowered Monday night because the city has found its recent repaving program projects have had bids coming in as much as 30 per cent lower than estimated.

Cantonites Want Building Moratorium

CANTON TOWNSHIP With cries of "keep it natural," and "we hate progress," members of Canton's Northwest Homeowners Association pleaded with the township planning commission to declare a moratorium on building in the township until a land use study now under way is completed.

The pleas were part of remarks by Jack Martz, spokesman for the 260-member homeowners association, at a public hearing last Tuesday night. Purpose of the hearing conducted by the planning commission was to get public reaction to the proposed plan to rezone certain parts of the northwest Canton area.

Michael Manore call for the preservation of one-acre lot development in those hilly areas where most of the single family development is now concentrated.

The flatter areas of farmland will be rezoned to develop at a higher density, more in accordance with development permitted on similar land elsewhere in the township.

Affected are the areas bounded by Joy Rd. to the north; Ford Rd. to the south; Beck Rd. to the east; Napier Rd. to the west. While most of the area will remain at one-acre zoning, other areas will change to permit a 3.5 density per acre and a 4.2 density per acre. The latter would be concentrated in the Ford Rd. area.

FOR AN HOUR, opponents urged the commission to keep the area as it is now presently zoned. Even residents in some of the newer subdivisions in the Sheldon - Warren Rds. area joined the northwest group to argue that the township needs an area "with quality."

"Give us something to look forward to," said one Windsor

Park resident in his comments that the northwest sector could be Canton's Bloomfield Hills or Birmingham.

"Give us something to aspire to," he asked.

Martz, two-time unsuccessful candidate for the office of township supervisor, struck out also at the proposed shopping center that came up for public discussion later that same evening.

He labeled the development as "ominous and frightening."

MARTZ' WIFE asked that the area be kept in its present rural state.

"I hate progress. I hate shopping centers. I hate sidewalks and sewers," she said at one point. "That's why we moved to Canton. To get away from all those things."

Applause from the audience followed.

The plight of the farmers in the area was described by a member of the pioneer Palmer family. No longer able to make a living at farming and unable to keep up with the high rate of taxes, many large land owners would now like to dispose of their acreage but need a higher density to make the land offerings more appealing to developers, it was explained.

The issue was referred to the Wayne County Planning Commission for recommendation.

ONLY commission member

to openly comment on the controversy was Mrs. Ellen Ruland, who was appointed to the group several weeks ago. Mrs. Ruland said that "in order to insure that Canton develops balanced housing for all types of people and income, I feel the rezoning should be denied. To further protect the landowners, Mrs. Ruland suggested that the lots in quadrants 5-7-8 (Warren Rd.) be 100 feet wide.

In the Ford Rd. area lots should also be set at 100 feet, she said.

She also stated "that no multiples should be permitted" in any part of the northwest sector.

Canton Will Redraft Gas Station Ordinance

It's back to the drawing board to look for a new gas station ordinance for Canton Township -- one that the township's legal counsel feels can be defended in court.

"Architects" will be Township Attorney William Sempliner and Planning Consultant Michael Manore. They have been given until March to come up with an ordinance that will regulate the type of work that can be conducted at a gas station and have some controls on their location.

The task was assigned to them by the planning commission after Sempliner said that a proposed ordinance drafted recently by Commissioner Wes Kaiser (with help from his colleague, Bart Berg) was, in part, either invalid or unconstitutional.

Both Kaiser and Berg -- and Commissioner Grant Campbell -- have been working for the past year to get something on the books to control gas stations. They finally came up with a proposed ordinance patterned after the one adopted

recently by the City of Detroit.

Sempliner, however, took exception to three sections of the proposed ordinance.

"Section C" was one of them. This part stipulated that 60 per cent of land owners 300 feet in all directions of the property line must give their approval if the gas station is to be built at a location other than a major intersection (defined as one where the roads have 120-foot right-of-ways).

"IT IS OUR opinion that this proposed section is invalid for the reasons that the municipal corporation has no power to make a use of property conditional upon the assent or permission of private persons, and also for the reason that there is no prescribed standard by which the commission may act," Sempliner said.

Sempliner also said "Section D," which read, "abandoned or closed stations may be ordered to be demolished by the township board after being vacant for 120 days," is in violation of the due process clause because it takes prop-

Civic Leader Robert Wesley Dies In South

PLYMOUTH Memorial contributions for Robert Orr Wesley, onetime Plymouth civic leader who died Dec. 21, may be made to the American Heart Assn. at the family's suggestion.

Wesley, 63, former Daisy-Heddon executive vice president, died at his home in Rogers, Ark. He moved to Arkansas in 1958 when Daisy relocated there from Plymouth.

Wesley was a former trustee of the Plymouth Board of Education, a charter and lifetime member of the Plymouth Jaycees, past president of the Plymouth Symphony Society, and a member of the Plymouth Rotary Club and Alpha Tau Omega, Beta Omicron.

Wesley continued his civic and cultural activities in Rogers, where he was a past vice president of the Chamber of Commerce and a member of the Benton County Historical Society, Bella Vista Fine Arts Center and other fraternal and civic organizations. He also was an elder of the Presbyterian Church.

Wesley was born in Detroit and attended Albion College and Wayne State University. He was a Daisy staff member 36 years, joining the firm in 1936 as advertising manager. Surviving are his wife, Carol V. Domine Wesley; three daughters, Mrs. Ronald M. Krump of Reno, Nev., Mrs. John W. Ford of Rogers and Mrs. R. Michael Cory of Omaha, Neb.; two sisters, Mrs. H.O. Hansen of Los Angeles and Mrs. Helen Bartley of Detroit; two grandsons and three granddaughters.

PLYMOUTH A higher fee schedule for electrical permits and inspections has been adopted by the Plymouth Township Board.

The revision puts township fees in line with those of surrounding communities and, hopefully, will enable the building department to be self-supporting, according to James R. Briggs, chief inspector.

To underscore need for the increase, Briggs reported total income from electrical fees was \$6,040 in 1970, \$6,220 in 1971 and \$8,458 for the first 11 months of 1972.

THAT INCOME, he pointed out, was insufficient to pay for a full time electrical inspector, let alone for paperwork and other overhead. The township, as a result, was able to hire only a part-time inspector and pay him on a percentage basis.

Not only was part-time help insufficient to meet increased building, Briggs said, but there is a likelihood the State Licensing Division may refuse to allow part-time help for electrical inspections as it

already has for plumbing inspections. Most part-time inspectors also operate private businesses, Briggs explained, and the state sees a conflict of interest in a tradesman inspecting the work of a competitor.

THE TOWNSHIP board authorized hiring a full time plumbing inspector last fall, when it increased plumbing inspection fees, but Briggs said the post still is unfilled.

"You can't find someone willing to give up \$20,000 a year for \$14,000 or \$15,000," he said.

The new fees reflect no overall percentage increase but Briggs termed them "substantial."

To illustrate, he cited a typical house in the Fairwood Subdivision. Electrical permit fees under the old schedule would have come to \$30, he said, and to \$48.50 under the new. Fees for the same house charged by surrounding communities would vary from \$37 to \$50, he calculated. At the same time, he predicted that a community now charging \$37 "will probably be going in for a raise very soon."

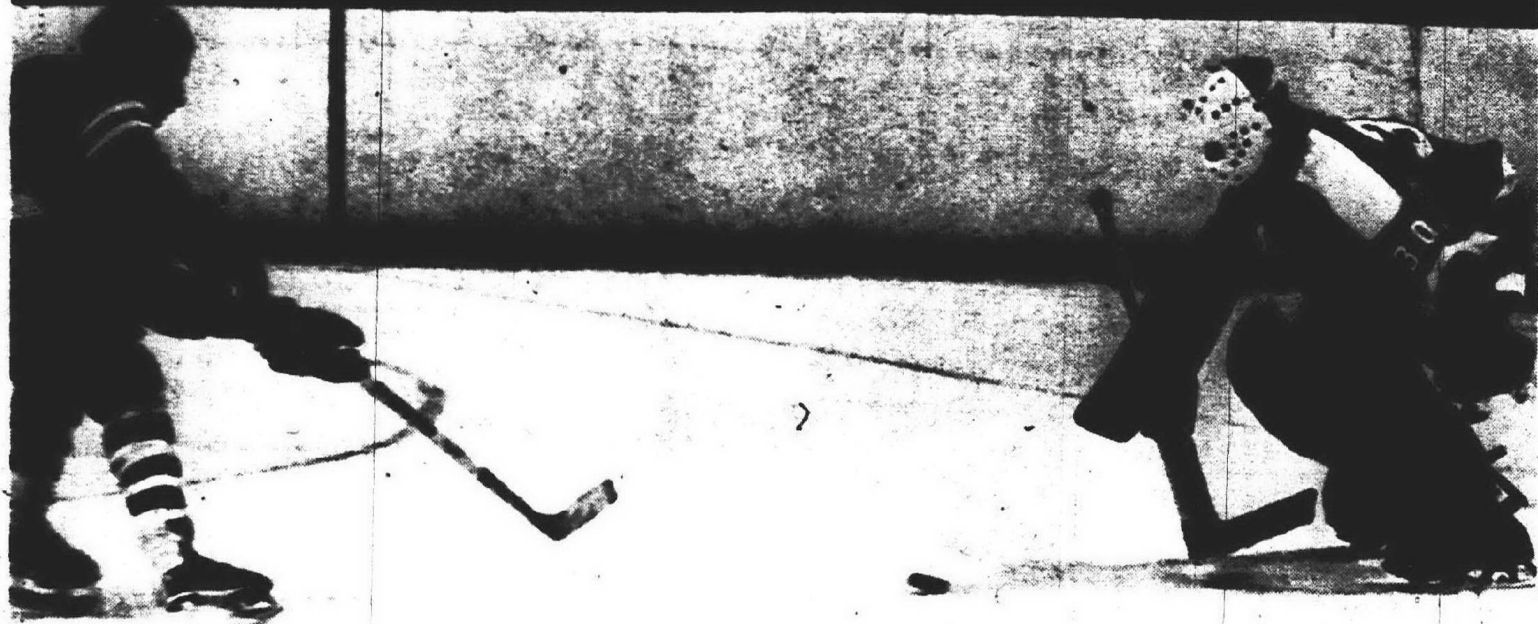

It's A 3-Way Tie; Spartans Win, 5-4

Senior right-winger Kurt Geiger deflected a Don Finn shot into the Churchill net with 1:54 remaining to give Stevenson High a come-from-behind Suburban Hockey League victory, 5-4.

The two hockey rivals picked up right where they left off last season in their fight for a co-championship.

Stevenson edged Churchill, 4-3, in the first game last year. The two then fought to a four-all tie and the season ended with the Chargers upending a previously unbeaten Stevenson squad, 3-2.

GREG HIRAMI put Churchill back in front one minute later, but Hillman responded with another goal to make it 3-3, six minutes remaining.

Stevenson then went ahead for the first time.

Churchill's Pat Meyers was off for interference and junior left wing Brian VanNorman beat Parks on his right side. Hiram came back with his second goal two minutes later and with 2:25 remaining, all bedlam had broken out at Ford. It was all tied up at four-all.

The play carried back and forth with Churchill just missing on two clear shots from the blue line.

Vermeesch did what he does best in the Spartan net and the play then switched to the Churchill zone when Geiger deflected a Don Finn shot which Parks never saw and it was all over.

But look out on Feb. 9. The two will be going at it again.

After the battle, he said, "The long layoff over the holidays hurt us and we didn't execute properly. On almost any night we should beat them. We didn't this time. Churchill's defense put it to us."

From the other side of the scorer's table came these remarks from Montagnano.

"We have better material than Franklin and a better bench. We have come a long way since the holiday tournament."

"Five scrimmages since that loss to Plymouth showed the kids that they play better as a team, instead of individuals."

"OUR KIDS don't have to get fired up for Franklin, the rivalry is there all year round. I have to give Franklin credit. They showed up and gave it a shot. If they gave a bad performance, it was due to our great defensive effort."

"If we played Franklin 10 times, we could beat them nine," concluded Montagnano.

Churchill jumped to a 15-6 first quarter lead and was never really threatened.

Franklin's pitfall had to lie in the showing of 6-6 junior Kevin Kaseta. The 180 pound Patriot had been averaging over 18 points a game but was hindered with a bad back which had not permitted him to practice the week before the Churchill game.

It was obvious that Kaseta's timing was off and he started pressing after the first quarter. He ran into foul trouble, picking up No. 5 early in the fourth period after collecting his first three midway through the second.

It all opened with Churchill called for a man in the jump circle and Franklin awarded the ball. Jamie Knapp put the Patriots up, 2-0, and that was the last Franklin was to see of the lead.

BOBBY BLAIES tied it at two-all. Phil Skender made good one of two at the line and Mark Reed popped in a two-pointer. The Chargers then reeled off eight straight points on buckets by Reed, Don Braun, Skender and Phil Damaska and before Visser knew what was happening, his Patriots trailed after the first eight minutes, 15-6.

With two minutes remaining in the half, Churchill had exploded to lead, 30-12, and Franklin was in foul trouble - Kaseta with three and Tim Fisher with four. Churchill led at the half, 34-19.

Franklin didn't spend much time in the locker room at the half, and with six minutes remaining in the half - time show, the Patriots charged out of their locker room to practice shooting but had to wait until the "Churchill dancing girls" finished their routine of the Charger fight song.

Kaseta finally started finding the mark in the third quarter but Churchill kept its margin and carried a 42-29 lead into the last eight minutes.

With 2:23 remaining, Franklin sliced it to a 57-46, but that was the closest it could push with Churchill smelling victory from the opening tip on.

CHURCHILL HIT on 24 of 52 from the floor for 46 per cent, Franklin shooting 35 per cent on 19 of 54.

Franklin going three for eight from the floor the first quarter and four for 13 the second.

As in football, defense was the key to this victory for the Charger cagers.

Franklin was held to only five buckets from inside the lane with senior forward Reed bottling up the middle and keeping Kaseta in trouble the entire night.

Rebounding belonged to Churchill, 35-28, Braun and Reed hauling in nine apiece.

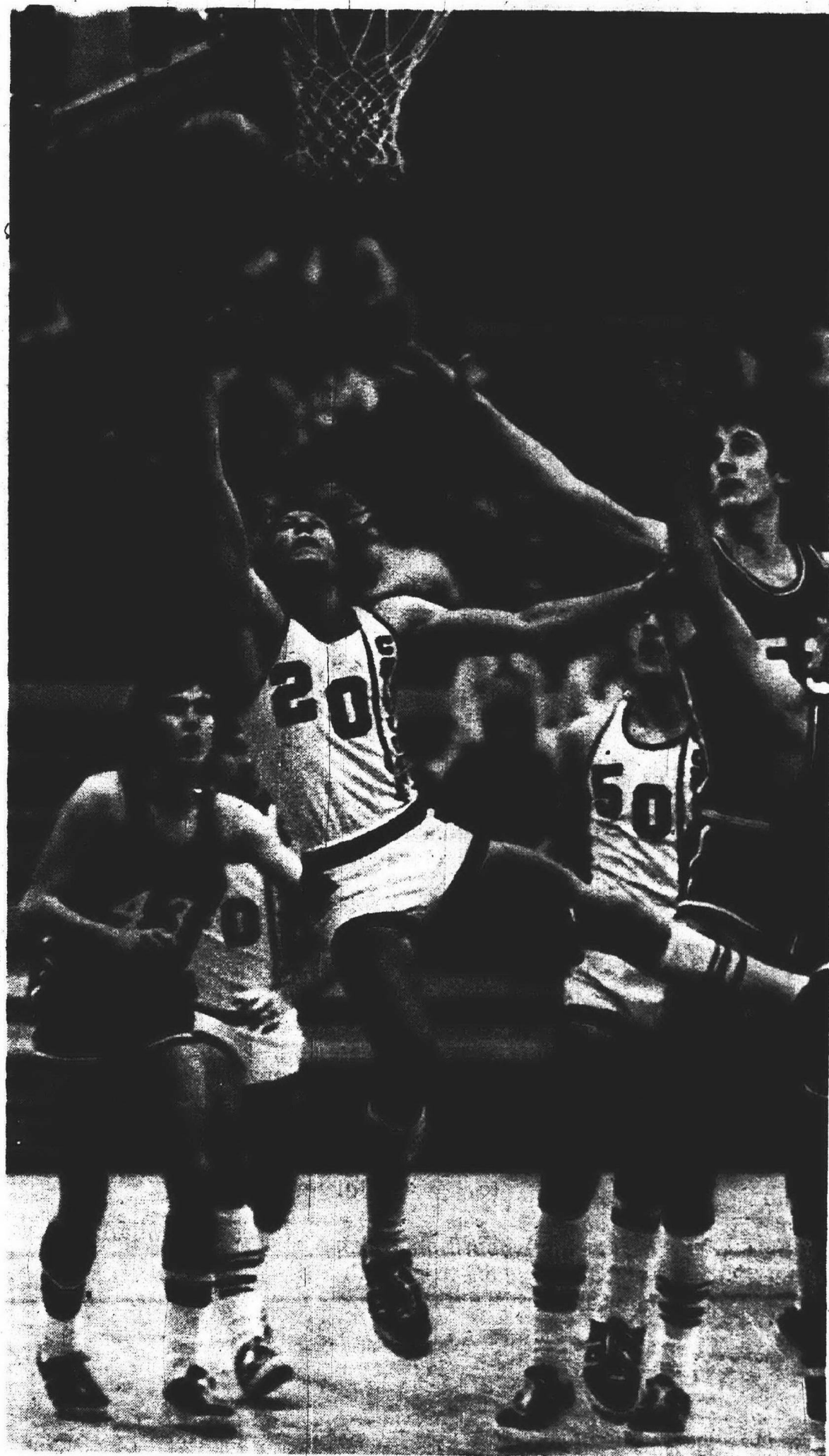
Montagnano and his Chargers are now looking toward the Western Six with a 1-1 record and Montagnano sees his squad as the strongest contender.

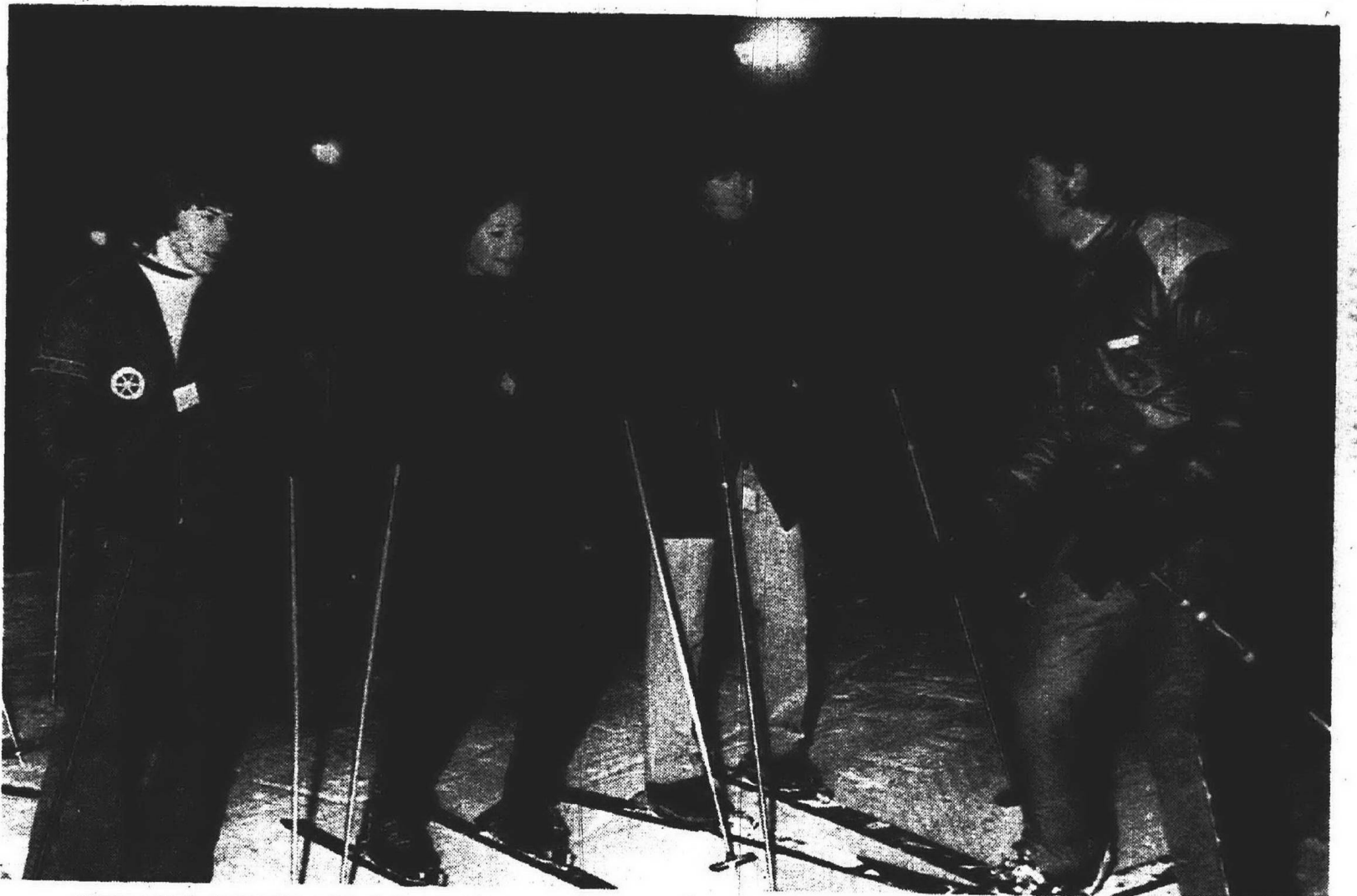

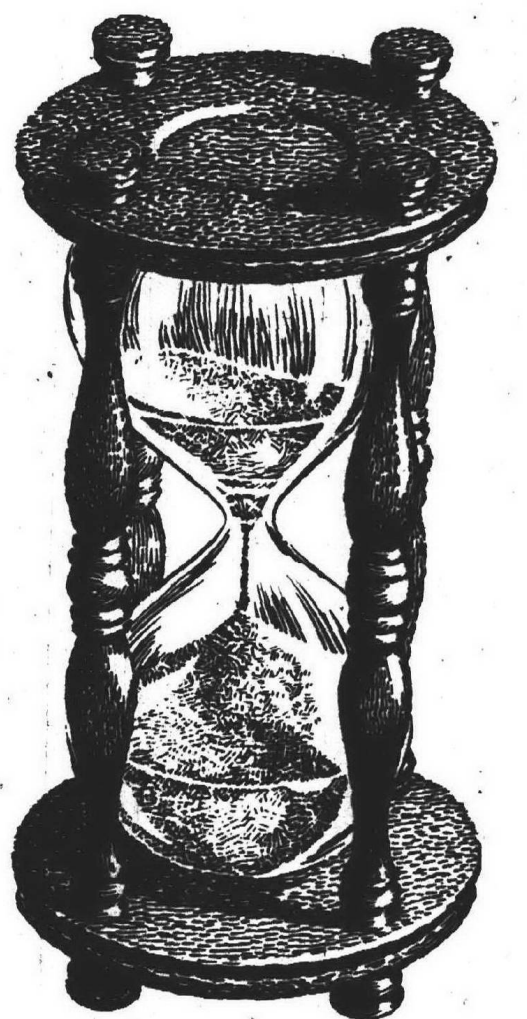

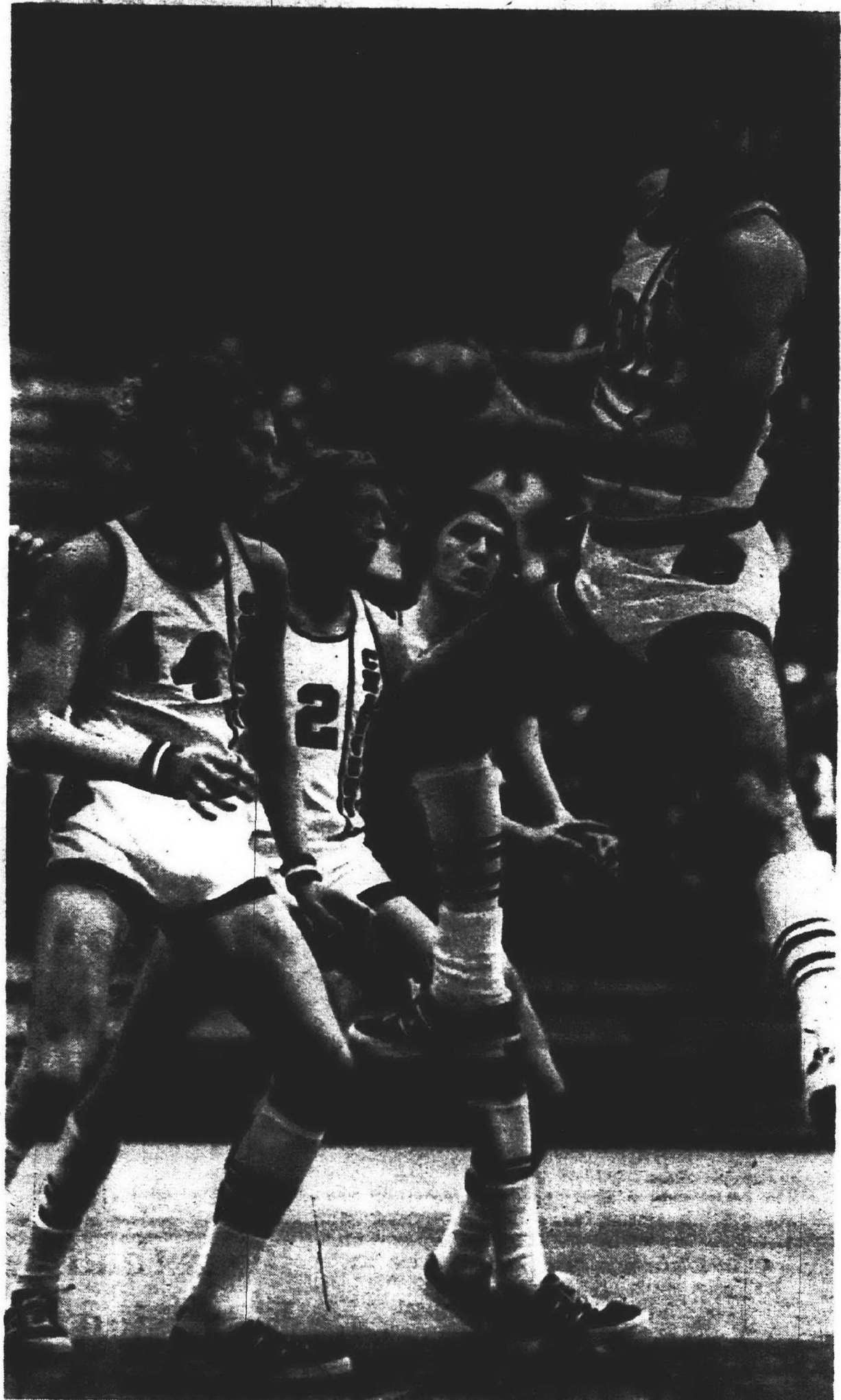

Turf Tips, Quips

Using the first week of the 1973 season as a guideline, it appears that harness horsemen competing at the Jackson-At-Northville meeting will receive another hike in purses before the season reaches the halfway mark. The current campaign is for 24 nights and purses

were boosted by an average of \$200 last Monday.

The reason for the optimism for a third purse increase is due to the tremendous business over the past weekend.

Saturday's crowd of 4,889 was the largest since Jackson opened at Northville in mid-

November and the handle soared to \$394,759, a high for the year and the best night of the early and mid-winter meetings.

The thermometer was down around 15 degrees. It was anything but an ideal night to attend the races Saturday and yet the crowd kept pouring in, jamming the parking lot and all but filling every seat in the clubhouse and grandstand.

Fans were in a waging mood as was apparent in the first race. Three times during the evening the handle climbed past \$30,000 much to the joy of President and General Manager Leon Slavin.

"The attendance and wagering proves something we have been trying to get across to our patrons all season," said Slavin. "We have been pointing out the advantages of the glass enclosed clubhouse and grandstand. But it wasn't until a night like Saturday that we definitely proved our point...the interior is well heated during the coldest weather and air-conditioned during the hottest nights of the summer."

"WE DIDN'T have a single complaint about lack of heat and only those who walked outdoors to watch the running of the races knew that it was plenty cold. Folks also realize that we now have a track capable of holding up under the extreme winter conditions. There may be a bit of dust in the air during a race, but the strip was fast as the times attest."

Slavin had hoped to reach \$400,000 in wagering and probably would have but for a five-horse field in the featured eighth race. As it turned out the \$3,000 pace was one of the best of the evening and found longshot Adakio, guided by Ray Fuller, taking the lead from the start and staying there all the way.

Adakio hit the wire in a quick 2:07.2 and paid \$20 as the 9-1 outsider. Knox Abbe, the short priced favorite, was a fast closing second and Action finished third.

The huge turnout received a big thrill in the fifth race when Pepper Byrd, piloted by veteran Elmer Conrad, stormed down the outside

fence to get a dead heat with May Time, owned by Bob Kalish of Southfield.

It appeared that May Time had a comfortable lead over the field with a brilliant burst of speed in the stretch, but suddenly the crowd realized that Conrad had brought up Pepper Byrd on the extreme outside. It took quite a while for the judges to make a decision, and after viewing and reviewing the race films they finally called it a dead heat.

THIS 'N THAT... Herve Filion set a world's record for victories by a driver in one calendar year when he wound up 1972 with a total of 604 triumphs. That was way ahead of his previous record of 542 set in 1971. Filion, the spectacular Canadian reinster, had his sights on 600 as early as October. He didn't set the record until the final day of the year. To turn the trick, he drove in 20 races on Saturday and then 10 more on Sunday.

It was just a few years back that Bob Farrington, the Ohio driver, set a national record with his total of 300 wins in a single year. He bettered or equalled that mark for the next three years before Filion appeared on the scene. The latter has dominated the standings since.

What we wanted to bring to the attention of our readers was that Joe Marsh Jr., the Ohioan who formerly was the best in the area before taking off for Chicago, won more than 300 races last year. That earned Joe second place in the final standings...just 300 victories behind Filion.

From a yearling no one really wanted to a \$2.5 million syndicated stallion, so runs the tale of Albatross. Owned by Bert James of Windsor, who tried to sell the colt as a two for \$7,200, and developed by Harry Harvey, Albatross blitzed competition as two, earning two-year-old of the year honors and a record \$183,540.

Syndicated for \$1.25 million before his sophomore year when in the Stanley Dancer barn, Albatross became "horse of the year," set a race mark of 1:54.4 and banked a season record of \$58,009.

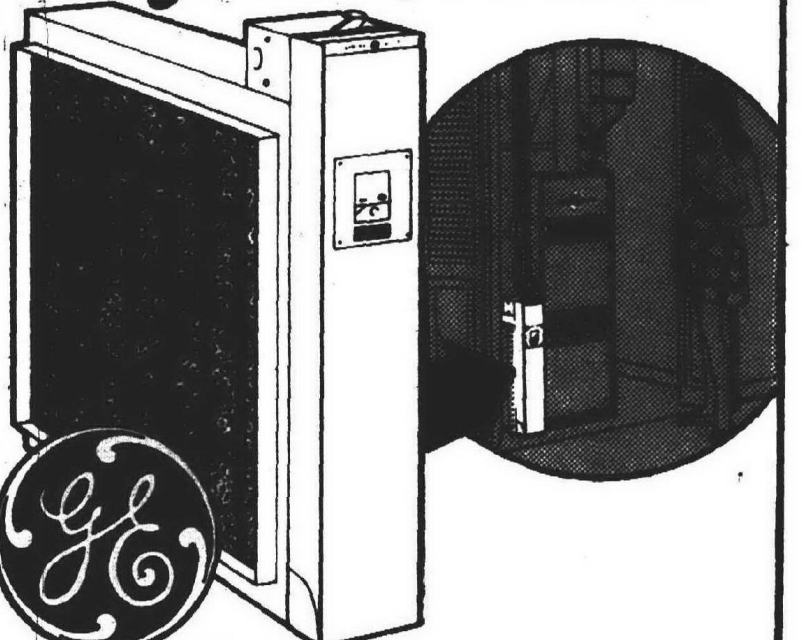

If you think you are seeing more of the Detroit Red Wings this winter, you could be right. The Detroit Red Wings have skated into Observerland, four families strong.

The Tim Ecclestons and Gary Doaks have taken up winter residence in Southfield and the Guy Charrons and the Billy Collins are living in Redford Township.

Now, to get you a little more acquainted with these four players and their families, and to get you a little more into the mood for the NHL playoff drive, here are your neighbors.

Starting off with the senior member of the Observerland foursome, here is Billy Collins, No. 22 on the Olympia ice.

COLLINS, 29 years old, and his wife, Carol, have two children in Brenda, 5½ years old, and Scott, three years old.

The 6-0, 190 pound right winger was born in Ottawa, Ontario, July 13, 1943, and was given a pair of skates at the age of six and began his professional career with Denver in '63 in the WHL.

He was drafted by Minnesota from New York in the expansion draft in '67, traded by Minnesota to Montreal for Jude Drouin in '70, and was traded by Montreal with Mickey Redmond and Guy Charron to Detroit for Frank Mahovlich on Jan. 13, '71.

Billy and Carol, who were married on May 30, '64, make their home in Ottawa where they both went to high school.

High school sweethearts, yes, but...

"CAROL TURNED ME DOWN when I asked her to the prom," said Bill. "It was only three days prior and she told me that I had to give her at least a week's notice."

"We then cooled it for about a year," added Billy, with wife Carol sitting across the way, smiling. Collins played football and basketball while in high school but his main love was hockey.

"I never thought of anything but hockey," said Bill, smiling across at Carol. "My mom and dad encouraged me all the way and Toronto started scouting me when I was 13. I eventually turned down scholarships to St. Lawrence and Michigan Tech."

Collins' first big season came in the '69-'70 season with Minnesota, scoring 29 goals. Then came the trade to Montreal and Detroit, quite a surprise seeing they had just bought a home in Minnesota.

"I was so excited, I almost had the baby right there in the stands," said Carol. "It turned out to be a false alarm. The following week Bill got his second hat-trick and the following morning, Scott William came into our lives."

Collins refers to his wife as the "greatest second guesser in the world of hockey."

"Carol is always saying things like, 'Why didn't you shoot? Why didn't you pass? Why didn't you score?'" chuckled the right winger.

Just down the road from the Collins in Redford Township is another Red Winger, 23-year-old Guy Charron and his wife Denyse.

Born in Verdun, Quebec, Charron was schooled in the Montreal Canadiens' system and came to Detroit in January 1971 along with Mickey Redmond and Collins.

THE CHARRONS are French-Canadians, attended the same high school in Verdun, and were married in June of '69.

Guy then turned pro in the fall, played 20 games in the NHL with Montreal in two years and it was then on to Detroit.

"I'll never forget that first night in Detroit. I was told I would be on the line with Howe and Delvecchio. I couldn't believe it, here I was 22 years old — playing with 39 and 42 year old super stars."

"All I remember about that first night was Alex feeding me a pass and I was breaking in all alone and hit the goal post," sighed Guy.

Guy has been caught in the many line changes of Johnny Wilson but is not afraid to speak of his likes and dislikes.

"I can't really click with Redmond, we differ too much. He is a great individualist and I prefer to open up the game."

"I can play my type of game with Delvecchio and Marcel Dion; us Frenchmen can play together," said Charron.

He's No. 8 on the ice and could be around the Detroit organization for quite a few years.

That takes care of the Redford contingent of the Red Wings, now across to Southfield where right winger Tim Ecclestons and defenseman Gary Doak are taking up winter residence.

The 25 year old Ecclestons and his wife, Sue, have one spry 16-month-old boy, Mark, and another child expected in May.

NO. 17 isn't even the one who wears the crown around his household.

The "King" is a four-month-old Golden Retriever, and you guessed it, named King.

Tim is a 188 pound, 6-0 right winger, born in Toronto, Ontario.

Unlike most major league hockey players, Tim spent just one year in the Ontario Hockey Association Major "A" circuit before turning pro. After one season with the Kitchener Rangers, he signed his first

pro contract with New York in '67. Before he had a chance to report to the Rangers training camp, he was sent to the St. Louis Blues as a part of a five-player transaction.

He was traded by New York with Gary Sabourin, Bob Plager and Gord Kannegiesser to St. Louis for Rod Seiling.

Tim was immediately accepted in St. Louis and married Sue on August 16, '69.

The first three years at St. Louis saw the Blues in the Stanley Cup finals with Ecclestons improving with each season. Then with 15 goals in the first 47 games in '70-'71 came the trade to Detroit on Feb. 6 '71.

Tim went along with Red Berenson to Detroit for Garry Unger and Wayne Connelly.

"We were just getting settled in St. Louis and then the trade happened, but we moved as a family, disappointment and all," said Ecclestons.

The Ecclestons make their summer home in Toronto, where Tim is employed as an instructor in a hockey school. He is also quite the avid golfer and Sue is tops in driving the golf cart around the fairways.

Now to the lone defenseman of the crowd, 26 year old Gary Doak, a native of Goderich, Ontario where he and his wife, Judy, make their summer home.

Gary is a product of the Detroit organization and played his junior hockey with the Hamilton Red Wings in the OHA from '62 to '65 before turning pro.

DOAK INKED his first professional contract in '65 and was assigned by Detroit to their American Hockey League farm club in Pittsburgh. He appeared in 48 games before being dealt to the Boston Bruins.

During the stay with Boston, he was a member of the Stanley Cup champion squad of 1970.

Gary remained with Boston until June 1970 and was then drafted by the new Vancouver Canucks. The New York Rangers then acquired him and the Red Wings traded for him in May of '72.

Gary and his wife, Judy, are not alone in their Southfield apartment.

They have the company of four-year-old Tausha, a bronze colored poodle who is every bit part of the family, according to Gary.

You won't see No. 19 scoring a lot of goals for Detroit in this year's stretch drive, but if a rugged, scrappy defenseman catches your eye, chances are it's Goderich's own Gary Doak.

MHS Gives Tips On Winterizing Your Dog



THE MICHIGAN Humane Society reminds dog-owners of winter care of their pets. It also offers plans for a snug doghouse.

As you raise the thermostat and listen to the cold winds blasting icy particles against your snug storm windows, give a thought to your dog.

Is his house winterized too? The Michigan Humane Society (MHS) reminds pet owners to make certain that their dog and his house, if he is to be left outdoors, are prepared for the cold weather.

In most cases, it's all right for a dog to be kept outdoors during the winter months - if he's used to it. The average dog is able to acclimatize himself to the weather, but on a gradual basis.

Naturally, a dog that's indoors most of the time shouldn't be put out for too long on a cold winter day. And, conversely, a dog with a heavy, thick coat would be most uncomfortable if made to stay indoors all day.

When a dog is left outdoors there is one requirement that must not be overlooked. It is most important that the animal has shelter available at all times.

IN PREPARING a doghouse for the cold weather or constructing a new one, the MSH suggests that dog owners check the following:

Size: Because the doghouse will be heated by the animal's own body heat, it should not be too large. A good rule to follow is to make the house a little bigger than the dog's body, measured diagonally from his nose to his hind paws or from his front paws to his tail.

Construction: The doghouse should be built on the downwind side of a structure, such as a garage, house wall or fence, so as to prevent the wind from blowing in. In addition, there should be a flap covering the doorway or double protection at the door

like a layer of canvas hung just behind the regular opening.

The roof should be hinged or completely removable so that it is easier to clean the house. Also, make certain that the roof does not leak.

For warmth and protection from drafts, the floor should be off the ground about three or four inches. This can be

done by setting it on a styrofoam pad.

The doghouse should be built of plywood or particle board, insulated with styrofoam and covered with waterproof roofing material. Avoid fiberglass insulators.

HEAT AND INSULATION: Blankets, an old mattress, straw and shredded

newspaper will all offer some insulation as well as varying degrees of comfort.

A 100-watt light bulb can be put in the doghouse to provide some heat, but it must be thoroughly protected so the dog cannot knock it down or chew the cord.

Here are some additional cold weather precautions from the Michigan Humane Society to provide your pet with maximum protection this winter:

1. Inspect the doghouse frequently to make certain

that his food and water aren't frozen. Change the water often.

2. Feed him better - more carbohydrates - and more often to give him additional energy.

3. Watch out for toxic snow melting substances which could make him sick and sting his paws.

4. Check his paws frequently for ice. It can be very painful for a dog when the ice on frozen paws begins melting.

5. Put a sweater on your pet. It's not a silly idea; it'll keep him warm.

6. A garage is not an acceptable overnight shelter for a dog unless it's heated.

Stable Year Predicted By MBAM President

"There will be ample housing funds to meet local needs in 1973."

That optimistic prediction, along with other encouraging forecasts for the mortgage-lending industry in Michigan, were made by John P. Ray, newly elected president of the 400-member Mortgage Bankers Assn. of Michigan. Ray is executive vice president and chief loan officer of Standard Federal Savings and Loan Association.

Ray took over the affairs of MBAM in November from Robert P. Lambrecht, Detroit mortgage banker and head of the realty and investment firm of Lambrecht Realty Co.

AMONG OTHER predictions made by Ray in his New Year's statement:

- There will be new records

set in 1973 for increases in savings accounts. The year could turn into the greatest net savings gain year for Detroit area thrift institutions -- perhaps as much as nine per cent.

- Mortgage interest rates are likely to remain stable as they have for the last 14 months. Stability of long-term rates can be attributed to successful controls on inflation, high savings growth and continued Eurodollar support.

- There is always danger of increased inflation and we might see mortgage rates inching upwards toward the end of the current year.

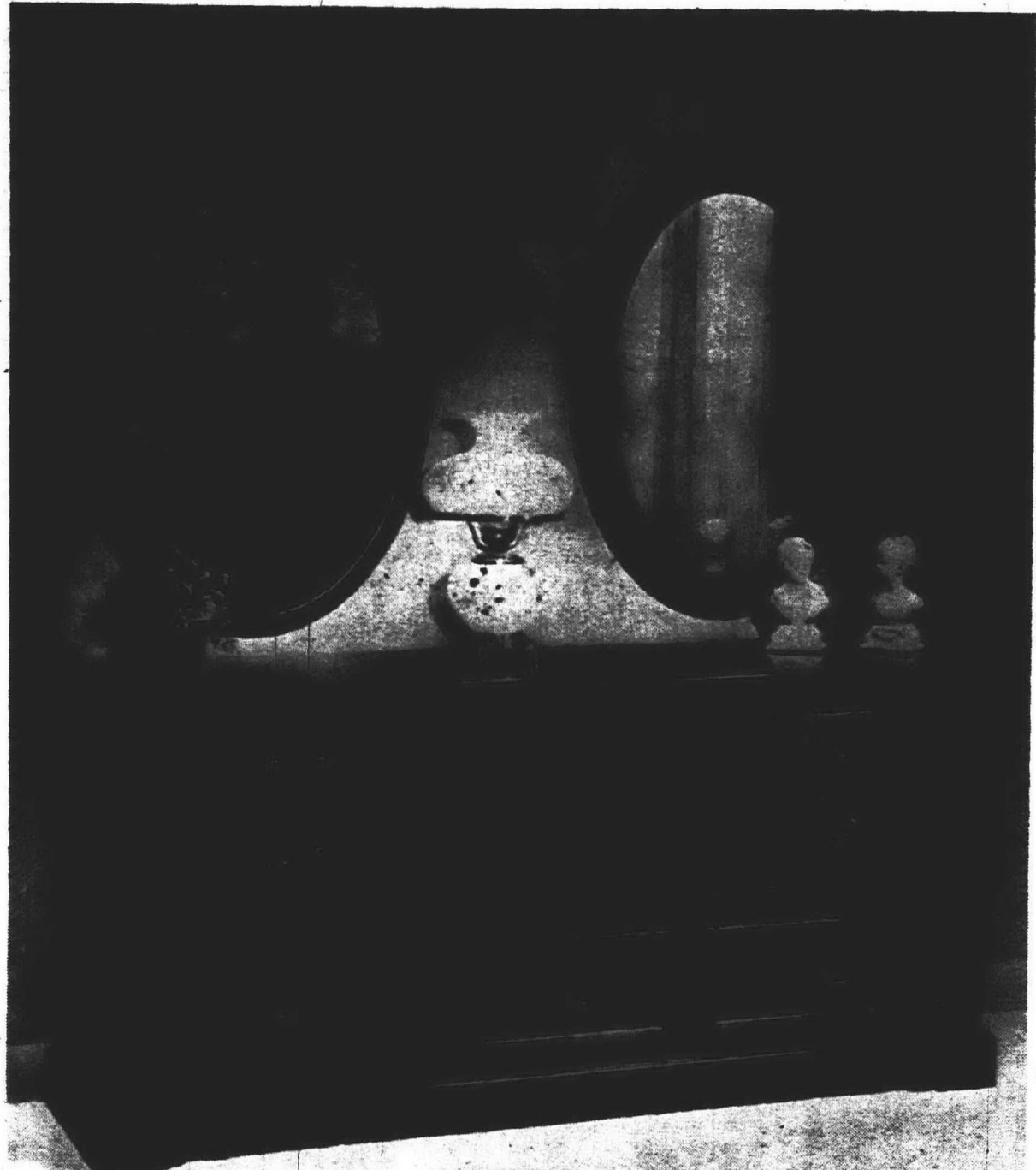
- New housing in 1973 may not be as great as in the last two years, but it should be above average.

- Higher land, material and labor costs, especially lumber, are putting the price of housing out of reach of many home buyers.

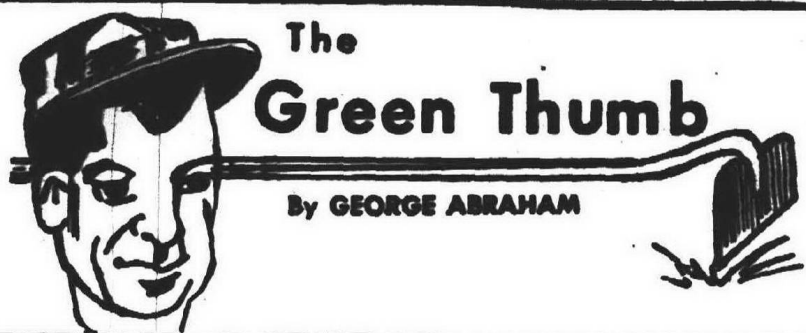
- As long as thrift institutions are deluged with savings funds, easier mortgage credit terms will continue to bridge the cost gap, but for how much longer is questionable.

Ray said he believed there would be a softening in the market for condominiums in 1973, after two boom years. He finds some condominium owners happy and some unhappy and disappointed.

"Condominium housing is," said Ray, "for the most part a limited market designed for the older and the younger and is a second choice when compared to owning a single-family dwelling."

If you want a real thrill, grow hyacinths indoors.

First, remember they need a cool period for root formation. Best bet is to start the bulbs in a hyacinth vase containing water.

Place it in your refrigerator or any place where the temperature can be kept around 40 degrees F or so. Freezing is not necessary. Start the hyacinth any time between Dec. 1 and Jan. 15. Keep them in the refrigerator or garage for six or seven weeks so a good set of roots will develop.

Check the vase from time to time and when you see the flower bud sticking about three or four inches out of the neck of the bulb, you'll know the roots are sufficiently developed. After that, bring the vases into light and warmer temperature of your home, living room, bedroom, etc. During the first week or 10 days when the plants are growing rapidly and turning green, do not keep them in direct sunlight.

After a week, you can move the vases into full sunlight, and watch the flowers develop. After flowering, set the bulb outdoors where they will bloom again for you next year. You can use the hyacinth vase for flower arrangements.

ONE OF THE BEST house plants is the so-called "prayer plant," so called because at night the leaves fold up, as if in prayer. There are two plants often called prayer plants, and one is the Calathea, with leaves rather broad and pointed at the tip. They have a rhizome-like root system with leaves arising from the crown. The other prayer plant is Maranta, a close relative of Calathea. The Maranta has rows of brownish to dark green blotches in a row, hence the common name of "rabbit-track" plant.

Culture for both: They like a light, humusy soil (1/3 each sand, peat and loam) warm room temperature both day and night (about 70 degrees). Keep soil uniformly moistened, never soggy. Also avoid a temperature drop below 50 degrees since these

plants are tropical. Start new plants by dividing the tuberous roots in spring.

GREEN THUMB CLINIC: A reader writes: "We planted the seeds of pumpkins you sent us. One pumpkin weighed 92 pounds. Is that a record? No, but it's a good pumpkin. The largest pumpkin I've seen weighed 192 pounds. The present contest record has stood since 1968, when Lynn and Susan Price of Marietta, Ga. won with a whopping 235 pound Hungarian squash."

GREEN THUMB CLINIC: A reader writes: "We have a Jade Plant (Crassula) which has withered leaves. What causes this?"

Answer: Withering of leaves and stems is due to too much water or poor drainage, or disease. Give good drainage and avoid soaking too much. Let plant get dry between waterings.

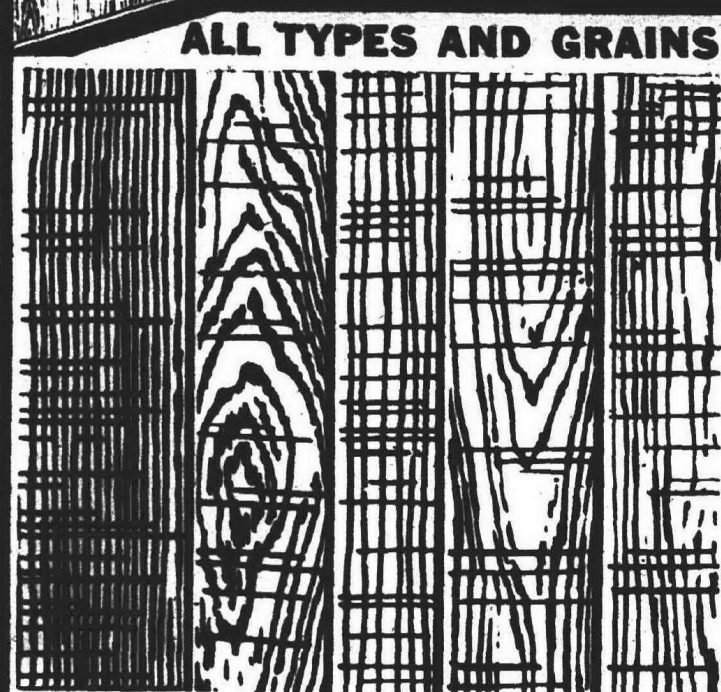

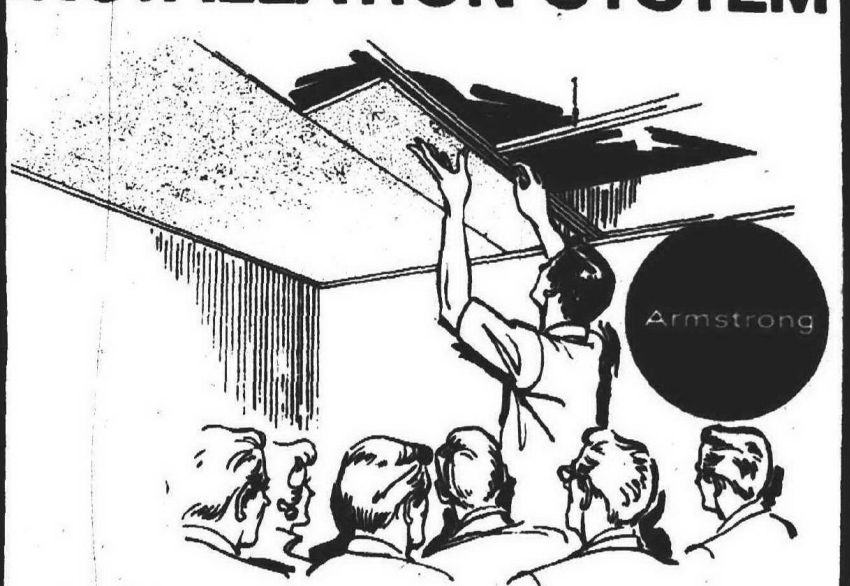

New Dems' Chairman

Stempien Starts Party Comeback

By KATHY MORAN
Former State Rep. Marvin Stempien won the chairmanship of the 2nd congressional District-Wayne Democrats during their reorganization convention Saturday.

Stempien won the chairmanship over Robert Dwyer of Plymouth during the first convention in the new Wayne-2nd which was formed during 1972 reapportionment to include Livonia as well as Plymouth City and Township and Northville Township.

In recent years, Plymouth and Northville Democrats have comprised the Wayne-2nd organization but have been overshadowed by the remainder of the district, which stretched into Washtenaw, Monroe, Livingston and Lenawee counties.

The addition of Livonia to the district gives Livonia nearly 4-1. However, Democrats a numerical edge

Northville won nearly 40 per cent (11 of 27) of the executive board seats for the district.

Stempien, who is practicing law in Livonia after failing to unseat U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor), was winning about 75 per cent of the votes for chairman when Dwyer withdrew from the race. Dwyer, an unsuccessful candidate for state representative, withdrew midway through the roll call vote when the tally was 37-13.

Marshall Manning, who has been under fire recently by his own party, was chairman of the Wayne 2nd but is moving to Florida.

Vice-chairmen elected include Lois Lane of Plymouth Township, Thomas Curran of Northville Township, Ted Preston of Livonia and Jerry Tyrell of Livonia.

Alice Hosback of Livonia was elected recording secretary and Earl Dey of Plymouth corresponding secretary. Elizabeth Tavarozzi of Livonia was elected sergeant-at-arms and the trustees include Joe Krochmalny of Plymouth Township, Paul Cazabon of Livonia and Irving Rozian of Plymouth Township.

AT - LARGE members of the executive board include Estelle Kadish of Livonia,

Robert Crompton of Northville, John Bergin of Livonia, Livonia Mayor Ed McNamara, Thomas Healy of Plymouth, Richard Wernette of Plymouth, Marsha Borowski of Plymouth, Ann Tavalacci of Livonia, Ray Barnes of Livonia, Joe Rey of Plymouth Township, Alan Helmpkamp of Livonia, Ken Morris of Livonia, Jeanne Stempien of Livonia, Jerry Raymond of Livonia and Dwyer.

At-large members were limited to 15 because the convention voted to abide by the district's old constitution. Stempien said that a constitutional convention will be called within 60 days to ap-

prove a new constitution for the district.

He said the executive board will probably be expanded under the new constitution to recognize the larger district.

CONVENTION delegates also voted to allow all precinct delegates and paid-up party members who attend the state convention to have an equal say how the district's 39 votes should be cast during the state convention on Feb. 3.

Democrats also voted for a strongly-worded resolution calling on Michigan congressmen to support legislation to withdraw all

non-economic aid to Vietnam and all of Indochina and withdraw all U.S. forces within 60 days of the release of prisoners of war.

A minority resolution giving the president 90 days to complete negotiations before withdrawing aid was rejected.

Stempien, who is considered a candidate for state party chairman, introduced Oakland County chairman Morely A. Winograd, who is also seeking the state party chairmanship.

Winograd spoke briefly on his platform urging re-unification of the state-wide party organization.

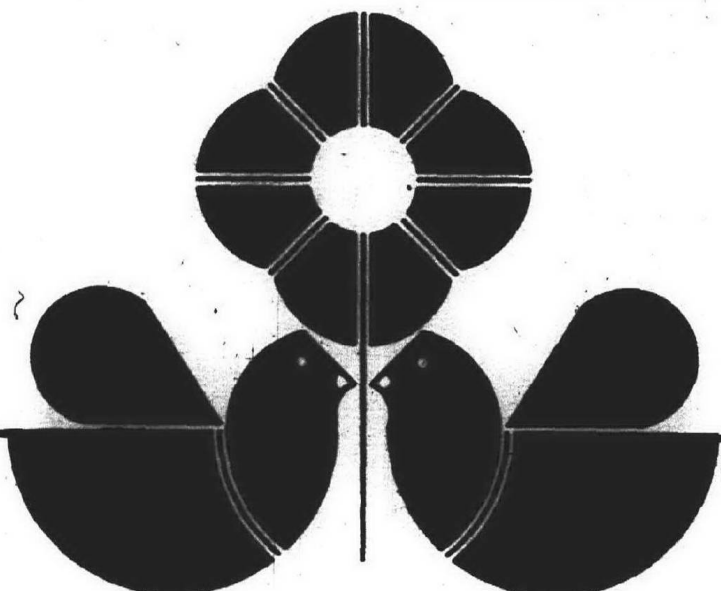

Mulled Drinks Chase Chill

Mull, v.t. To heat, sweeten and enrich with spices; as, to mull wine.

By ELLY

One thing about skiing, sledding, ice skating, snowmobiling, or even snow shoveling is that the participants usually don't feel the cold until they compare it to the indoor warmth.

That's when a hot drink to soothe the throat and warm the insides is most delectable.

MULLED WINE

1 qt. Madeira, sherry, or Tokay
1/4 t. grated nutmeg
4 eggs
1/4 c. brandy
Sugar

In top part of double boiler over direct heat, bring wine and nutmeg almost to the boiling point. Beat eggs until light and stir in brandy. Pour heated wine onto egg mixture. Add sugar to taste. Put back in double boiler and cook over hot water for two minutes, beating constantly with rotary beater. Serve hot in small cups. Makes four cups.

MULLED CIDER

Bring just to the boiling point: four cups apple cider, six whole cloves, and a cinnamon stick. Remove spices and serve hot. Makes four cups.

MULLED GRAPE JUICE

2 c. unsweetened grape juice
1 c. water
1 c. sugar
1 cinnamon stick
6 whole cloves
juice of one lemon

Mix juice, water, and sugar in sauce pan. Tie spices in a small cheesecloth bag and add to liquid. Bring to a boil. Stir and allow to stand over very low heat for 10 minutes. Remove spice bag and add lemon juice. Bring again just to a boil. Serve hot. Makes four servings.

MULLED RED CINNAMON CIDER

1/2 t. whole cloves
2 2-in. pieces cinnamon
2 qt. water
2/3 c. loose tea or 20 tea bags
1/4 c. fresh lemon juice
4 red apples
8 whole cloves
1/4 c. red cinnamon hearts (candies)
Thin Sugar Syrup

Add cloves and cinnamon stick to water. Bring to a boil. Add tea. Cover and brew for about four minutes. Stir and strain. Add sugar and stir. Add apple cider and lemon juice. Peel and core apples, but leave whole. Stick two cloves into each apple. Add cinnamon hearts to Thin Sugar Syrup. Poach apples in Thin Sugar Syrup. Pour mulled cider into serving bowl and add apples. Serve hot. Makes four quarts.

THIN SUGAR SYRUP

Combine one cup sugar and two cups water. Bring to a boil. Simmer, covered, for three minutes. Syrup is now ready for poaching. Makes about 2 1/2 cups syrup.

HOT COCOA

5-6 T. unsweetened cocoa
4-6 T. sugar
Dash of salt
1/2 c. water
3/2 c. milk

Mix cocoa, sugar and salt in a saucepan or in top part of a double boiler. Stir in water. Place over low heat. Cook mixture in saucepan for about two minutes, or until thick and smooth. Stir constantly. Stir in milk; heat to boiling, stirring occasionally, but do not boil. For a frothy drink, beat before serving. Makes six cups.

HOT CAROB MILK

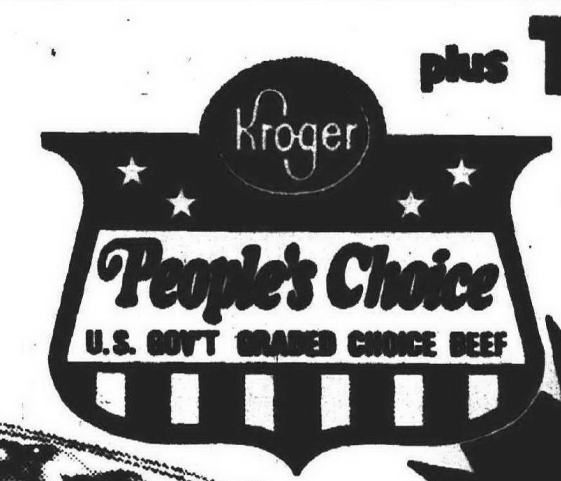
3 T. Carob powder
1 T. powdered skim milk (optional)
1-2 T. brown sugar (or honey or molasses to taste)
4 c. milk
1/2 t. smooth peanut butter
1/2 ripe banana

Combine dry ingredients with one cup milk. Place in liquefier or blender and mix thoroughly. Add remaining milk, peanut butter and banana. For eggnog add one well beaten egg.

Rep. Griffiths' Study Shows Federal Programs Sap Incentive To Work

What are the richest cities around?

Birmingham? Franklin? Grosse Pointe? Other rich suburbs around the country, like Shaker Heights near Cleveland, Silver Spring near Washington, D.C., or Stamford near New York?

These are rich cities alright. But they're not as rich per family as two communities right here in the suburbs.

Recently released census figures show that Southfield leads all cities in the nation with populations between 50,000 and 100,000 in median (i.e., as many below as above) family income, at \$18,141. Livonia is the richest city in America above 100,000, with a median family income of \$15,216.

Other communities in this area did alright in the economic stakes, too, with income gains in Farmington and Plymouth particularly striking.

NEXT QUESTION. Where does much of this income go?

To the government in taxes, of course.

And what does the government do with all this money?

It spends it, obviously, but in very curious ways.

For example, perhaps the biggest chunk of the federal government's budget goes into various income maintenance programs, such as Social Security, veterans benefits, food stamps, welfare, unemployment insurance, etc. These programs cost the taxpayers more than \$100 billion per year, which is about \$20 billion more than the very much more publicized Pentagon budget.

Now another number. A recently released government report shows that despite this massive surge of expenditure, the number of persons below the poverty line increased by 139,000 between 1970 and 1971.

In addition, there are now more people than ever on welfare, and most states (including Michigan) which have to pay for welfare are finding that this category is the most rapidly rising part of their budgets.

ALL OF WHICH makes particularly interesting a press release from Congresswoman Martha W. Griffiths that floated into the office before Christmas.

Mrs. Griffiths represents Redford Township, Southfield and Farmington in this area, and to say she steamrollered her opposition in last November's election would be an understatement.

Mrs. Griffiths has two further characteristics. (1) She's a good politician (i.e., tough-minded, responsive to the needs of her

constituents, effective, and smart). (2) She's a member of the House Ways and Means Committee, which is the key group controlling your taxes and mine.

For some years she has been concerned about whether that \$100 billion the feds are spending on public assistance is doing the job, and she can't help but hear what suburban families who work hard and pay their taxes are saying about people who don't work and are quite willing to live off welfare and suchlike.

Mrs. Griffiths is chairman (I'll make it chairwoman or even chairperson if you like, Martha) of a special subcommittee on fiscal policy of the Joint Economic Committee, which is looking into how public income maintenance programs discourage their recipients from wanting to get off the public dole and work for themselves.

THE SUBCOMMITTEE'S study makes fascinating reading.

• In New Jersey an unemployed

man with a wife and two children receiving public assistance and food stamps would add only \$110 to his net monthly income if he took a full-time job paying \$500 a month. In addition, he would lose eligibility for medicaid, which pays an average of \$52 a month for the medical bills of an AFDC family in New Jersey.

• An aged couple receiving veterans' pensions and a social security check for \$140 per month achieves only a \$30 per month increase in spendable income if one of them earns \$300 per month from a part time job.

• A Tennessee father who is eligible for food stamps and the unemployment insurance maximum gains only \$4 per week by taking a part-time job paying \$75 a week.

• A New Jersey mother of three receiving benefits from medicaid, aid to dependent children, food

stamps, and public housing would gain only about 20 per cent of the total income derived from taking a full-time job paying as much as \$1,000 per month.

Mrs. Griffiths reports that many government programs base benefits on the recipients' income. So when earnings rise from taking a job, government-provided benefits are reduced. Sometimes this reduction in government benefits is more than the additional income from the job!

What Mrs. Griffiths is showing is that in many cases, government rules themselves discourage recipients of public assistance from wanting to work, thereby continuing their dependence on the government and insuring continued high levels of public assistance spending.

I think her study is a fine one, and I hope she keeps it up.

Maybe some day it will result in cleaning up the welfare mess and reducing all of our taxes.

Our Expensive Trash Will Be A Gold Mine

No one is happier in his work than an archeologist who has discovered a dump.

I remember the glowing face of the young woman in the string-crossed pit in the ancient city of Winchester, England, as she proudly dropped a bone on a plate. "Not human," she smiled. "Pig and sheep bones. We've discovered an old Saxon dump," which made it about 1,000 years old.

And the Michigan State University archeologists digging near the statue of Pere Marquette in downtown St. Ignace, seeking the footings of a French trading post.

A dump is valuable because it tells how people lived -- what their technology was like, what games they played, how sophisticated was their art, which other tribes they came in contact with.

IF THAT'S SO, our society shall leave an unusually rich hoard for the archeologists of the third millennium Anno Domini. Our population is still increasing at a tremendous rate, and the rate at which we throw stuff away is increasing faster still.

A Jesuit missionary may leave

behind an empty inkwell or two. An office worker today will discard scores of used ballpoints in his lifetime.

A few broken brandy jugs mark the officers' quarters at an old fort. An American picnicker leaves a half-dozen beer cans (aluminum doesn't deteriorate rapidly) and non-biodegradable plastic forks, knives and plates, and the homeowner contributes a non-biodegradable plastic milk container, "throwaway" bottles, and foil wrappings from the TV dinners.

A SURVEY of what local governments are doing about trash has just been completed by the Observer Newspapers, and several frightening ideas emerge.

• The amount per person is increasing.

• It takes longer to rot, and some hardly rots at all.

• We don't want it around us, so we truck it off to rural areas. But there are fewer and fewer sites in those rural areas, and the folks who live there don't want our stuff dumped near them.

• A man driving a dump truck can haul half as many loads when

he must drive twice as far to a dump site.

• We're all going to have to discard less waste material. A law forcing us to recycle beer and pop bottles has been discussed though not passed; yet its passage is inevitable. We may have to do the same with catsup and liquor bottles, too.

• Those good ol' grass roots governments aren't going to be able to do the job. Garden City and Westland are already in a mid-Wayne County disposal authority with incinerators. Lathrup Village is in a similar Oakland County authority. But even such good-sized cities as Southfield and Livonia are still using largely 19th century methods.

EVEN COUNTY-WIDE authorities to incinerate and crush trash aren't the whole solution. That five to 10 per cent residue must still be dumped somewhere -- perhaps outside the county of origin.

Denounce "regional government" if you will, but that's exactly the direction we're headed.

Snob Zoning Case: It Could Have Happened Here

The stories are originating out of Walled Lake, an unfriendly little city of 4,000 in Oakland County, lying north and west of Observerland suburbs.

But it could have happened here. And maybe it should have.

For years, Dr. Gordon Yudashkin, then superintendent of Northville State Hospital and now director of the State Dept. of Mental Health, and his successor at NSH, Dr. Richard Budd, have told of the personnel problems they have at the hospital on Seven Mile Rd. in Northville Township.

Public transportation is nonexistent. The bulk of the 900 employees are non-professional and far from highly paid. Many are black. They either couldn't afford or couldn't get adequate housing close to the hospital, where they help care for our mentally ill.

SO THE EMPLOYEES got together and formed a non-profit housing corporation and with some state housing funds paid \$350,000 for 30 acres of land in Walled Lake, only a half-dozen miles north of the hospital.

The people in Walled Lake are little different from those in Observerland. Racially, they don't like blacks; economically, they want to practice snob zoning.

When they learned of the housing group's plans, they suddenly and wondrously became very concerned about proper zoning procedures. The land had been re-zoned for multiples in 1967, but suddenly the folks in Walled Lake decided too little public notice had been given.

They went before Oakland Circuit Judge Farrell Roberts, who agreed with them and upheld Walled Lake's refusal to issue a building permit.

The employees housing group won a reversal of Judge Roberts' ruling recently before the State Court of Appeals.

NATURALLY, the Walled Lake folks aren't direct enough to admit they don't want low income blacks living there. Nope, they looked around for a "legal" way out.

They hired Robert Lord, known locally as counsel for the Tri-County Citizens group fighting the inter-district school busing order. Lord is a cut above Brooks Patterson, former National Action Group attorney. Lord was successful at intervening in the school busing case where Patterson failed.

Anyway, Lord's tactic will be to go to the State Supreme Court and claim that one of the appeals judges, Victor Targonski, was improperly appointed.

Lord may be successful; Targonski has been one of the most unpopular Democratic politicians ever to hold office in Michigan and was one of the few circuit judges ever voted out of office in Wayne County.

Lawyers and judges operate in a fictional Never-Never Land of rules and procedures, and so they will probably try the case on its legal merits.

But the truth of the matter is that this case is all about bigotry and snob zoning. It happened in Walled Lake. It could have happened here -- and maybe it should have.

While very often it is more practical and safe to make right hand turns than left, such as I did when I received the ticket, this would be the exception rather than the rule.

My work for the past 15 years calls for well over 100 miles a day of driving, on the average. I expect that Mr. McDonald spends most of his day at one place or he would know the impracticality of his proposal. If I, and others like me who spend a great deal of time on the road, were to follow his advice, our mileage would double and we would get very little work done.

Besides this, the message in my letter was not just to lodge a complaint against Farmington. It was to set some wheels and gears turning to solve the problems.

If we were all satisfied to follow the current, so to speak, and not make waves, problems would never get solved.

My letter was my way of "making waves." I am entitled to that. For instance, there should be either a "right turn only" sign posted where I made my exit or a "keep driveway clear" sign so people can exit with safety. That is a lot better solution than handing out traffic tickets or "grinning and bearing" the problem.

College Clean, Audit Shows

Schoolcraft College received a "clean" audit of its policies and procedures last week from the Michigan auditor general's office.

After five months of examining policies and checking to see if they were implemented, the auditor general's office had little criticism of Schoolcraft.

The office undertakes several community college audits annually as required by the college appropriations acts.

Since the audits are at random, Schoolcraft didn't know it would be audited last year until auditors appeared on campus in January, according to college President C. Nelson Grote.

DR. GROTE termed the audit a "clean one" which points out the college's strengths and weaknesses.

"I've seen every audit of a community college in Michigan, and I think our audit is one of the best," he said.

The audit covers the 1970-71 fiscal year, but auditors read back over the minutes of board meetings since the college was founded to determine if policies and procedures were implemented.

Auditors discovered that the college didn't require all faculty members to sign oaths

of allegiance to the constitutions of Michigan and the United States as required by a 1935 statute.

Immediately after the auditors pointed out the college's failure to administer the oath, it was implemented.

THE AUDITING team also recommended that Schoolcraft liquidate shares of National Bank of Detroit stock which was given to the college. The stock was sold after approval by the board of trustees.

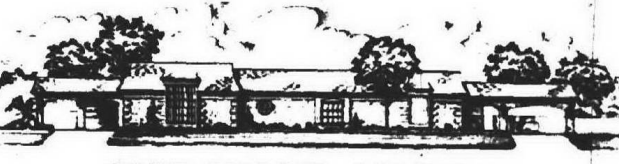

School Income Tax Plan Blasted &

The State Senate Education Committee heard a forecast of increased board of education recall elections if an income tax provision is retained in a proposed 1973-74 school aid bill.

The state Senate Education Committee heard a forecast of increased board of education recall elections if an income tax provision is retained in a proposed 1973-74 school aid bill.

The prediction came from Don Elliott of the Michigan Assn. of School Administrators at the first of eight statewide public hearings held at Inkster City Hall.

The provision also was challenged on its constitutionality. Harry Howard, Wayne-Westland school superintendent,

said he was "bothered" because the bill still fails to provide equal educational opportunity while striving to provide equal dollars.

THE BILL is an attempt to meet a recent Michigan State Supreme Court decision outlawing the current method of distributing state school funds.

Sen. Gilbert Bursley (R-Ann Arbor), education committee chairman, called the measure a "discussion vehicle" for refinement and reintroduction in the 1973 legislative session.

The bill, as written now, provides a three-year phase-in of the "guaranteed tax yield principle" of state school aid distribution.

Each school district would be guaranteed in combined state aid and locally raised

revenue a total per pupil amount of \$38 for each mill levied up to 22 mills in 1973-74. This would increase to \$39 per pupil for each mill levied up to 25 mills in 1974-75. For 1975-76, \$40 per pupil per mill would be guaranteed without limitation on the amount of millage covered.

IN DISTRICTS failing to vote at least 20 mills for general operating purposes, local boards of education would be empowered to levy local income taxes of 0.2 per cent for each mill of deficiency. Twenty-one mills would be the minimum for districts with a budget deficit. The additional mill would go to retire the deficit.

But school administrators and local trustees at the hearing indicated it would be either a courageous or foolhardy board which would im-

pose an income tax on an electorate which had just turned down a millage at the polls.

Tom Summerville of the Inkster Federation of Teachers (AFL-CIO) joined Howard in saying the committee had not been able "to come up with a basic amount for a good education."

"I think we'll still be on the same spot," said Summerville, whose district is among the state's poorest while still levying a 25.65 school millage.

SEN. WILLIAM Faust (D-Westland), education committee member who presided at the hearing, commented that his area points up the "major wrongs" of the current distribution method, based on a district's state equalized valuation (SEV).

"We have a district with the very highest tax and the low-

est SEV," he said, "next to a district with the highest SEV."

Richard Smith of the Detroit public schools said he saw a constitutional conflict where a district which financed its schools through a combined property and income tax was limited to 20 mills while those relying on property tax alone could have up to 22 mills.

But Gene Caesar, Senate educational consultant, said the choice would have been made by the electors who refused to vote the property tax.

Smith also saw a constitutional conflict in the ratio allowed to apply toward state reimbursement for a district using the income tax option. The state formula, he said, considers one per cent of income tax to be the equivalent of five mills, whereas one per cent income tax on Detroit residences would be the

equivalent of approximately seven mills.

Guests at the opening hearing were Reps. Tom Brown (D-Westland) and William Keith (D-Garden City).

Further hearings will be held during the next two weeks in Ann Arbor, Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, Detroit, Flint, Traverse City, Marquette and Lansing.

Bursley said he anticipates introducing an education bill by the end of January or early February and that the Senate will have voted by the end of February or early March.

New River Park Plan For Huron

A new river oriented park plan will be developed as an alternative to the proposed 980-acre Island Lake dam and impoundment on the Huron River in Livingston County's Green Oak Township.

O. J. Scherschligt, head of the Department of Natural Resource's parks division, said, "The alternate plan which will evaluate every possible use of the park, including environmental impact, will be completed late in March.

Since its inception, the plan for the impoundment has suffered opposition from local people and organizations who fear damage to the downriver flow and who objected to the alteration of the wild area belt surrounding the stream bed.

as well as pollution and the construction of artificial impoundments, have left very few typical examples of an unsullied, unchanged river and its valley in southeastern Michigan, Scherschligt explained.

The meandering six-mile river stretch is considered perfect for canoeing—safe but beautiful and varied. The countryside ranges from swamp and muck to rolling hills covered with growths of sycamore, ash and oak. In the spring the land is carpeted with wildflowers, mostly marsh marigold and trillium.

A bright daisy and thistle poster hangs on the wall of the pocket-sized office that will house a brand new continuum program at Schoolcraft College.

"He who is not busy being born is busy dying," are the words Mrs. Nancy Dufour brought along when she arrived to organize the program just a week ago.

"That's really what continuum means to me," said the soft-spoken young woman who comes to Schoolcraft after four years of counseling with the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

"IT'S CONTINUING to grow and learn.

"It's the realization that learning doesn't stop at the end of high school or at the end of college. It's knowing the fascination of continuing to grow all your life, in whatever area is meaningful."

Mrs. Dufour was chosen from a number of applicants to head the long-awaited program that will be funded initially by a \$27,430 state grant that was part of a \$100,000 fund earmarked for several special projects.

The state guidelines said the grant was intended to develop community education programs off-campus, and Schoolcraft leaders long have felt the need for reaching more women in the area it serves.

Schoolcraft's continuum, said the new director, will aim at helping women "take a look at themselves, their abilities, interests and potential."

BUT WHETHER it will follow the

lines of similar programs -- such as the one in operation several years at Oakland University -- remains to be seen after Mrs. Dufour has had time to acquaint herself with the special needs of this community.

"I want to talk to a lot of women -- find out what kind of program they need and what they will support," she said.

One push, as she sees it now, will be for getting information to Observer-land women about new career opportunities for women in traditionally male fields.

"The new Equal Rights Amendment is going to mean a pull by employers as well as a push from women themselves to open new careers," she said.

"That amendment means that business receiving government funds must be planning to move women into all phases of their operations -- and there will be government checks to make sure they have plans to do so.

"So businesses will be looking for women trained to step into spots in such fields as engineering, electronics and drafting."

NANCY DUFOUR, 26, earned a BA degree in psychology from the University of Michigan and a master's from Wayne State University in guidance and counseling. She's been working with young people in her time with the MESC, both as counselor and supervisor.

She and her husband, Larry, make their home in Troy. "I was interested in this job," she said, "because in the last few years I've become increasingly

interested in women's problems and potential."

At all stages of their lives, Mrs. Dufour believes, "women should establish short and long range goals for personal growth."

"The unique talents of many women go unnoticed," she added, "when they could make a great contribution to the community."

LOOKING ahead, Mrs. Dufour considers it likely that workshops and discussion groups will have a big place in the developing continuum program.

She is particularly interested in sitting in on some sessions of a Schoolcraft course to be offered this semester under the title of "Women in Society: A Symposium."

To be given Thursday evenings for eight weeks beginning Feb. 8, it will examine the position of women, past and present, through the reading discussion of a variety of works ranging from the Bible through the writings of Margaret Mead and Gloria Steinem.

"I'm also talking to women of the community -- leaders of organizations and members of the Schoolcraft women's advisory board," she said, to learn their ideas about a continuum program.

Mrs. Dufour would like to hear from all interested women as she maps continuum projects. She can be reached through the Schoolcraft community services office.

He will be heard at 10:30 a.m., Wednesday, Jan. 17, in the Terrace Theater, 30400 Plymouth Road, Livonia.

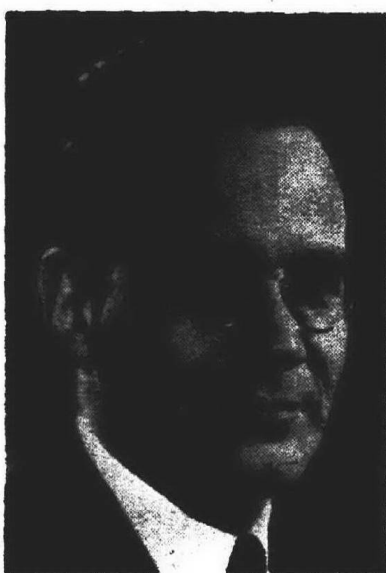

Last Request Fulfilled

More than half a century ago, in the Tennessee town of Etowah, a dying railroad worker asked his best buddy, Herman Vandiver, to watch out for his wife and three children.

The words in that request were the last Herman Davis ever spoke, and Herman Vandiver, a bachelor and railroad worker like his friend, took them to heart.

He married the widow and helped rear the children, and last week he and Katherine Davis Vandiver, now both 84 and living in the Farmington Nursing Home, celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary with a party for all the residents of the home.

THE GOLDEN anniversary also was marked by visits from several family members in this area and cards from many. One was from the yardmaster of the Detroit

Railroad Terminal, where Vandiver worked 29 years after 30 with the Louisville and Nashville line in Tennessee.

Mrs. Noah Swiercz, one of the children who now lives in Detroit, recalled the beginnings of the 50-year marriage of her mother and Vandiver. "He and my father were such good friends that he couldn't go back to the yard where they had worked together," she said.

"He went north, but kept coming back to be sure we were all right. Then one time he came down and had a long talk with my grandfather."

"And a little while later my mother and the three of us went to Cincinnati on the train and met him there and they were married in the judge's office. I signed their marriage certificate -- it has my tears on it."

THE COUPLE went to

Women on the Go

Blind Student Blazes New Pathways

Laura Pappas, a Farmington freshman at Western Michigan University, recently took a bus from Kalamazoo to Temple Israel in Detroit where she talked to a group of people who had helped back in the days when she was a junior high student.

To express her appreciation, she entertained the group with several piano selections and told about her school experiences.

Then she traveled alone by bus back to Kalamazoo, where she's majoring in music.

All of which wouldn't be at all remarkable, except for the fact that Laura has been blind since the day she was born 18 years ago.

THE GROUP she addressed was composed of members of the Tri-County Braille Volunteers, holding their semi-annual meeting, and Laura was glad to meet them because they were in large part responsible for transcribing into Braille the books she used while attending East Junior High School in Farmington.

But the pleasure of acquaintance was mutual.

The volunteers who put long hours into getting books into a form the blind can "read" with their fingers were well aware they were meeting a young woman who never has permitted the handicap of blindness to deter her from the course she has set.

LAURA, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Pappas, first attended Braille classes in the Detroit public school system.

When her family moved to Farmington, she became the first blind student to attend East Junior High.

"The first half-year, everything had to be read to me," she remembers. Then the Braille volunteers began working for her, and she had textbooks in Braille the rest of the way.

When she started attending

East, Laura already was playing the piano by ear. In the junior high orchestra, she began playing the violin, and during those school years she began learning to use Braille music, too.

LAURA TRANSFERRED to the Michigan School for the Blind in Lansing for high school, continuing her study of music.

She entered district and state solo and ensemble competition in her sophomore and junior years, earning ratings of 1 and 2 for piano and violin efforts, and she also played in the school orchestra which was given top ratings.

"In my senior year, the school didn't compete in solo and ensemble festivals," she said, "so instead I put on a piano recital."

She was the first student in the history of the state school to do so, and by the end of the school year she had been awarded the Mu Phi Epsilon citation for outstanding achievement in music.

DURING one of her high school summers, Laura attended Youth Music School on the campus of Michigan State University, a four-week program for talent high school musicians. The rest were sighted.

She also had a summer at a Vermont camp where she met blind people from all over the country and one from France.

Laura has been a Girl Scout since elementary school days in Detroit, and maintained her

membership in Farmington Senior Troop 258 even while away at school in Lansing.

"I was able to participate in some of the activities, when I was home," she said.

IN THE COURSE of her studies in the Michigan School for the Blind, Laura took both regular and advanced "mobility" courses which involved learning to get around the city on her own.

The eight-week course taught this young student, who uses a white cane, to travel by bus to unknown spots. "You have to learn to ask questions and not worry," she said. "Once I got on the wrong bus and it didn't go far enough, so I had to transfer to get where I was supposed to be."

The training proved invaluable when she got to the Western Michigan campus, she said. "There are a lot of buses there, and most of them stop at the same place. But after a few days I found I could get around very well."

In her first semester at

WMU, Laura used mostly textbooks that have been tape recorded. Her music books were in Braille, and she had a reader for a science course.



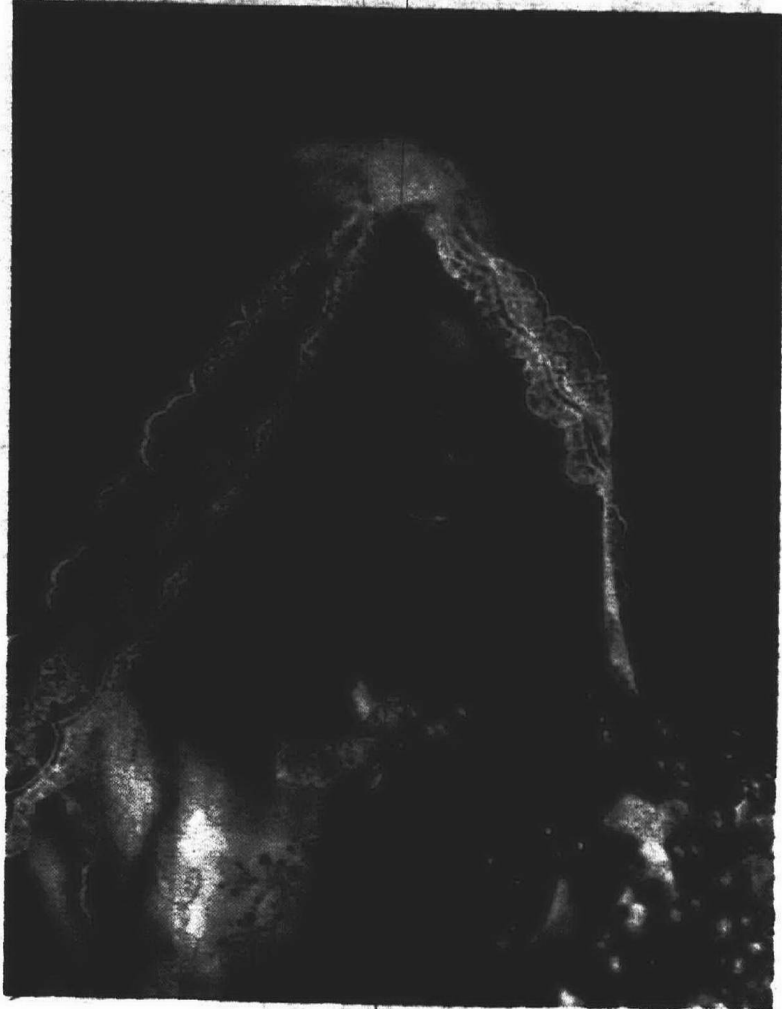

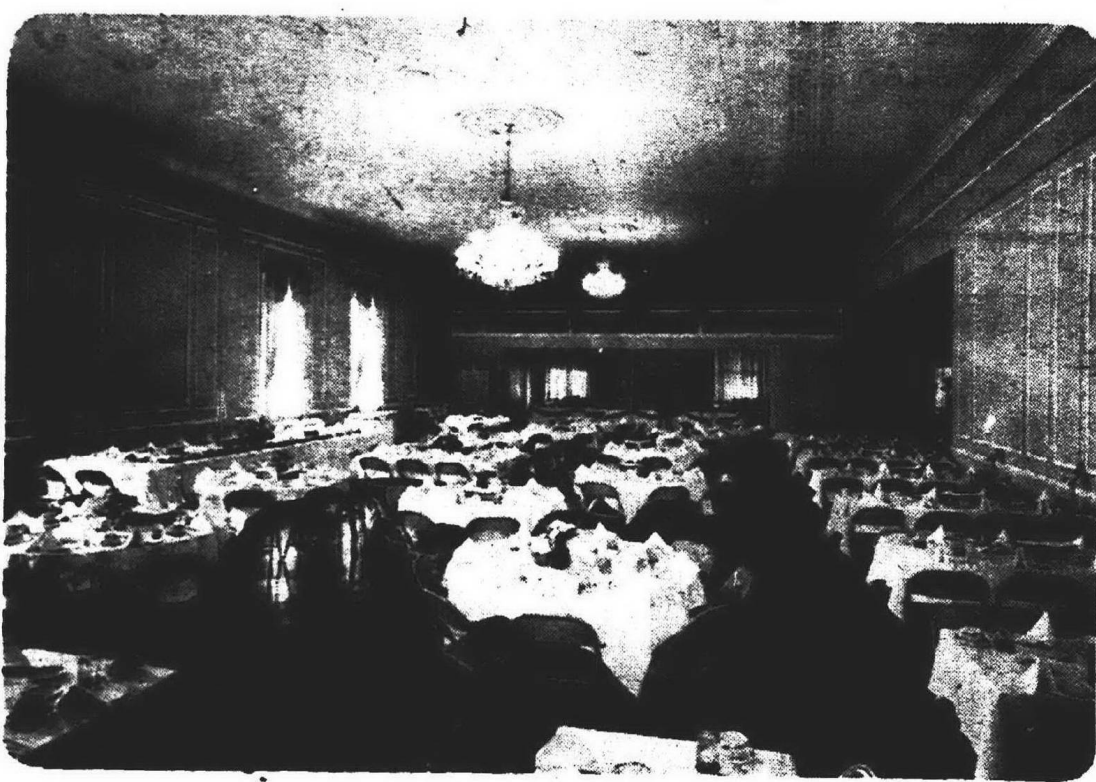

LWV To Consider Federal Role In Solid Wastes

The problem of solid wastes and the federal role in recycling will come up for consensus in the meeting of the Plymouth Northville League of Women Voters at 8 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 11.

The meeting will be held in Epiphany Lutheran Church on Five Mile in Plymouth Township. Mrs. Donald Stacy, president, said the issue on which consensus will be taken is "Environmental Quality: The Federal Role in Recycling and Solid Waste Management."

INVOLVED in the question will be whether the major responsibility for solid waste management should remain

with the localities and states or whether the federal government's authority should be expanded. Also to be considered will be priorities in a national policy of recycling and disposing of industrial and consumer wastes.

Mrs. Stacy said consensus in the LWV means agreement among a substantial number of members reached after sustained study and group discussion. It is not just a simple majority, nor does it necessarily mean unanimity.

The decision reached by the local league is forwarded to the state and national league boards who analyze consensus reports from all over the country.

THIS MAJORITY opinion then is formulated into a national LWV position statement, and the league can then begin to take direct action through legislative process.

"This opportunity to help

decide future policy exemplifies grass roots in action," Mrs. Stacy said.

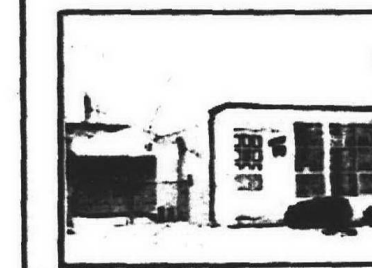

How Psychic Course Came To OU

An associate professor of philosophy at Oakland University has his students doing psychic research of their own choosing, in a course entitled "Mediums, Mystics and Mountebanks."

"It was just three years ago that this parapsychology course came into being," recalls the instructor, Dr. Richard Brooks, whose normal field of specialization is Indian philosophy.

"The philosophy club here at the university got together to decide what topic they wanted to use for the year."

"One of my colleagues came up with the idea of 'Esoteric Pretenders to Knowledge,' and it really angered me. He was making a value judgment with his use of the word 'pretenders.'"

"Well, we ended up changing the title to 'Esoteric Knowledge Claims' and the topic was chosen by the students."

"AT THE NEXT meeting of the philosophy club, two of my colleagues gave a talk on the subject. It was obvious that they knew nothing about it, and at the end of the evening, it was admitted that they had never even read any psychic literature."

"Knowing that the student interest was there, I brought my request to teach a course on parapsychology before the appropriate people. After some reticence on their part, I was given the chance. I added 'Mountebanks' to the title because I wanted to cover the frauds, too."

The accredited course is offered to senior undergraduates through a programmed curriculum deviation called Senior Colloquia. A Senior Colloquia course does not fit into the regular curriculum, but is one that an instructor, or students, want to teach and or learn from. Non-violence and civil disobedience; Indian mythology; the literature of alienation; ecology; and the new morality are some other examples of offerings through Senior Colloquia.

Wayne State University offers a parapsychology course through its adult education program. The University of Michigan has a doctoral researcher within its psychology department. But according to Dr. Brooks, Oakland is the only university in Michigan — perhaps in the nation — that offers such a course, for credit, to undergraduates.

Even at Duke University where parapsychology was researched for more than 35 years, no such course was ever offered, Dr. Brooks pointed out.

"Mediums, Mystics and Mountebanks," is popular at Oakland University. The class had a capacity enrollment after a half-hour on the first day of student registration this fall.

STARTING WITH a basic textbook called "Parapsychology: A Scientific Approach," by Milan Ryzl, students research material, conduct tests that interest them, and get a feel for the difficulties of psi (extrasensory perception) and the types of controls.

To prove the existence of psi phenomena, a statistical average of chance is first established. If the subject averages scores significantly above the mean chance expectation, he or she has psychic ability.

One of the better known test procedures was developed by parapsychology researchers at Duke University in the 1930s. Special decks of 25 cards each, with stars, circles, crosses, squares and waves, were used to test for both telepathy (where a mental image or thought of an object is exchanged between agent and sender); and for clairvoyance (extrasensory perception of objective events or things).

The average score expected on the basis of chance alone would run five in 25. If the subject averaged scores of more than five guesses in multiple runs of 25, he or she was said to have extrasensory perception.

In a typical class of "Mediums, Mystics and Mountebanks," held this month, student reports were given on telepathy, dowsing, aura and the psychokinesis of radioactivity. Loose interpretations of their testing procedures and resulting data were explained to the class by each student reporter. In turn, they were subjected to careful questioning by their peers. Only the first names of the students will be used here.

DIANE RESEARCHED "aura." "Aura" is defined in parapsychology literature as "the luminous, sometimes colored, radiation or halo reported to surround the physical body, and capable of being seen by some sensitives."

Diane used her four children, all boys, as subjects. When she began, she could see no aura, but because she believes in telepathy she knows aura exists. With further reading, she discovered that she would have chosen female subjects because there is a more contrasting aura.

Through meditation and techniques of hypnosis, Diane was unable to see the aura surrounding her children, but she has taught herself to see aura extending from her fingertips. With the palms facing away from her, and to each side, she slowly brings them toward each other. A light must be behind her, and a black background beyond her hands.

Diane, as happens with many people who go through psychic experiences, was very frightened the first time she saw the aura. It was blue-grey in color.

The discussion that followed brought up a parallel: Doctors use infrared rays to detect illnesses; the ill part of the body throws off more heat and this radiation technique makes it observable. It was suggested by the class that this was a form of "aura" from the body.

Psychokinesis is defined by parapsychologists as "the direct influence exerted over a physical system by a subject without any known intermediate physical energy or instrumentation."

Using a standard trial of 100, Gary measured 661.6 as the number of disintegrations on a Geiger counter. When his subject consciously tried to increase the radioactive decay, Gary found a 10 per cent shift in distribution, to 670.9, which shows psi phenomena.

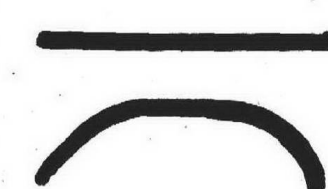
Chris worked with dowsing experiments. He arranged a pendulum over water, trying to seek out hidden objects in the water. He made pendulums of different materials, copper, a variety of metals. His statistical interpretations showed nothing. But in class discussion, it was discovered that he had misinterpreted the data, and there was significance in his findings.

Terri conducted a telepathic experiment with her friend of 17 years, Joan. Terri explained that she and Joan used relaxation techniques learned

from hypnotists and made the additional requirement that each of them had to be in a good mood for the tests, which were conducted by telephone between Lake Orion and Ann Arbor.

Terri acted as the sender at first, but results were insignificant. She and Joan switched roles.

Joan would concentrate on something in her room, and Terri would draw a picture of it. The first picture Terri drew was



Terri described her picture as a line with a bump under it. Joan responded that she had been thinking of a book that was laying on its side. Directly under the book was a mask, face up.

Terri's next drawing was

Terri described this as tubular columns. Joan replied that she had been concentrating on a leaf of a spider plant, which has big, dark veins.

For the last, Terri drew



Terri told Joan that she had drawn a triangle laying on its side with one line missing. Joan had been looking at her watch. The hands showed the time to be 10 minutes after three.

Terri made the conclusions that her descriptions of what she saw were unreliable. She then confided that the accuracy of the line images she made "really spooked" her.

THERE ARE difficulties in the statistical approach for

testing psi phenomena, because more emphasis is placed on the statistics than on the phenomena itself. But parapsychologists have been forced into this position: To somehow prove unconscious phenomena with scientifically valid proofs. They are not accepted as scientists or as psychologists, and are looked upon with suspicion by the academic community as a whole.

When this writer was first trying to track down, by phone, the teacher of the course on parapsychology at Oakland University, she was mistakenly switched to the psychology department by the university's information operator. The psychologist who answered the phone repeated at least three times, in a very firm voice, that the psychology department had "absolutely nothing to do with parapsychology."

Dr. Brooks himself, will admit that the psychologists at Oakland ridicule the parapsychology course.

Even at Duke University, where psychic research of the highest quality possible within the confines of today's culture was conducted for more than 35 years, the parapsychologists were finally forced out of the university, and now occupy a building across the street.

Some progress is noted. ESP experiments have been recorded as far back as 1882. By 1940, a total 145 experimental and original reports of psi phenomena had been collected by psychic investigators. Since that time, 1,000 of the same are acknowledged, which means that more people are now involving themselves in psychic research.

More important, in 1969, the

Parapsychological Assn. was accepted as an affiliate to the Council of the American Assn. for the Advancement of Science.

PSI CAPACITIES are nonphysical and part of man's subconscious mind, but still unanswered is the nature of psi ability itself. Is it dormant in all people? Can one acquire the ability for it and, if so, how?

One of the more interesting theories regarding psi phenomena is the belief that this sixth sense was a form of communication for prehistoric man.

In the ruins found with Peking man, for example, who lived more than a half-million years ago, archeologists recovered bones of large game, which suggests that hunting was probably a cooperative effort. Therefore, some form of communication between members of the group was necessary, but were these fossil men and women capable of articulate speech?

Then, the theory continues, in the process of evolution and with the development of language, this sixth sense was no longer required or relied upon for survival. So the ability, through misuse, has been suppressed.

Nevertheless, it is estimated by psychic researchers that one in every 10 persons has psychic ability.

"How do we know what the nature of the world is?" muses Oakland's Dr. Brooks. "What about the person who sees ghosts? We don't allow that. We place restrictions on perceptions."

Yes, indeed. Restrictions on perceptions. Restrictions on feelings. Restrictions on all things extraordinary.

consulted a counselor. Either of these can be arranged by calling the counseling center.

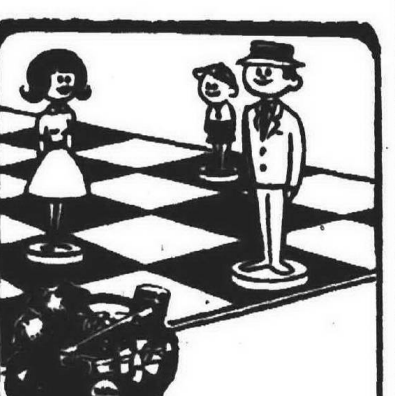
