CANTON TOWNSHIP
In what many regarded as a surprise move, the Wayne County Planning Commission voted unanimously Wednesday to recommend denial of the Mocerri project.

The commission said the present proposal for the shopping center and housing development was "not satisfactory."

Their reasons were that the proposed shopping center would be directly across from a residential area and

"narrow roads leading to the site would create a traffic problem."

The county planning commission, like the township planning commission, is a recommending body. Final decision on the project rests with the Canton Township Board.

The Canton planning commission has not made a recommendation on the project yet.

Dominic Mocerri, who attended the county planning commission meeting, was obviously shaken by the vote

and told The Plymouth Mail & Observer he didn't know what his next move would be.

THE PLANNING commission's recommendation for denial was qualified to allow for restudy of the project in conjunction with coordination with the city and township of Plymouth, said Francis P. Bennett, director of the county planning body.

In the orderly 45-minute discussion of the proposal, conducted by Bennett, brief comments were heard from Gilbert Franklin, Mocerri's at-

torney and from Tony Matson, a Canton resident.

Franklin, when questioned by the commission, said the developers were able to "proceed immediately" if given approval.

He told the commission the total cost of the project would run between \$15 and \$20 million. Franklin added that the developers could do nothing about getting tenants for the center until they got approval on the zone change.

Matson, one of six Canton residents who attended the meeting, said he was concerned because the development would bring more people into the township, adding to traffic problems.

He added that with additional residents, the possibility of tax increases would be greater.

BENNETT SUGGESTED coordination between the townships of Canton and Plymouth along with the city of Plymouth.

"This should be initiated before a final determination is made on the zoning petition," Bennett added.

One commission member said that because the shopping center would be directly across from a residential area, "we have no alternative but to turn down the proposal at this time under the present plan."

The Mocerri project would require a zoning change from single family designation to planned shopping and multiple family zonings.

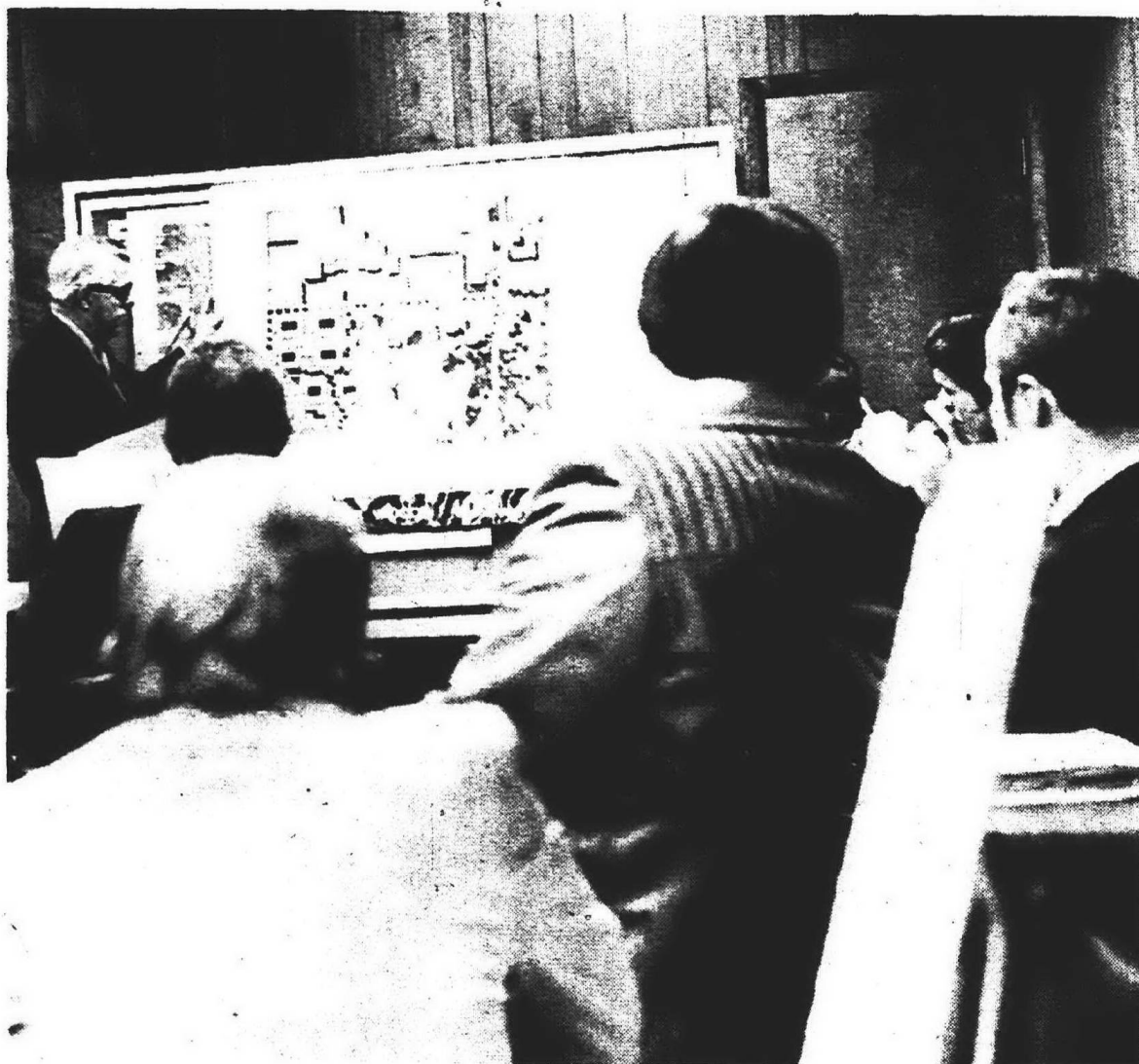
IN PRELIMINARY comments on the rezoning, which had been bitterly protested

recently by a highly-organized homeowners group from Canton, Bennett said that during 1972, a total of 110 acres of land in Canton Township had been rezoned to commercial use (including shopping areas), and 437 acres were rezoned from other uses (principally single-family residential to multiple-residential use).

"Based on the zoning ordinance and on the data submitted, this provided for 5,380 dwelling units, providing a total population of approximately 19,000 persons," Bennett said.

"The impact of this development on Plymouth Township and the City of Plymouth, which is attempting to maintain a healthy commercial core, is

Did School Bd. Act Officially?

Confusion has surfaced over a letter purporting to be an official Plymouth school board communication to its fired school superintendent, James Rossman.

The letter, which directed Rossman to fulfill the consulting role which he is now performing for the school district, was signed by George Lawton, school board president, and Gary Mirto,

school board secretary.

IT IS NOT on official district stationery although the return address is typed as "454 Harvey Street," which is the address of the board offices. The letter is dated Oct. 30 but the closing remark, "This letter was adopted by the Board of Education, by appropriate motion, on..." was left blank.

The confusion over the letter's official status may play a large part in the

damage suit which has been filed by Rossman.

Rossman said that this letter was one instance where "the board members acted as individuals" rather than in an official capacity.

The fired superintendent has filed a \$1 million damage suit against the school district and the four school board members who voted for his dismissal—of whom Lawton is the only one remaining on the board.

The suit asks half the judgment to be borne by the four members, contending that they did not act in a proper official capacity.

ACCORDING TO the official minutes of the Oct. 30 school board meeting published by the district in The Plymouth Mail & Observer, the school board did not vote on the letter. Those minutes were approved at the Nov. 13 meeting.

The minutes do show that school board members Fred Penar and Carl Berry were unanimously appointed to a committee to meet with Rossman, but they do not mention the letter.

When questioned by The Plymouth Mail & Observer Thursday, Lawton said the minutes "were in error" because the board actually did give approval to such a letter.

He said, "When you come up with an error (like this) in the minutes, you can go back and correct it."

BANQUET speaker will be State Rep. Raymond Smit (R.-Ann Arbor), who will be fulfilling his first speaking in Plymouth since his election to the newly apportioned legislative district.

Rep. Smit is considered the "legislative watchdog" for environmental protection, in the words of awards chairman Jim Herter.

The Plymouth Community Fund elected new officers at its annual meeting Tuesday night.

Board members re-elected were Rev. Paul Cargo and Tom Notebaert. William Carlson was also elected to the board to fill the seat occupied by John Herb, who is resigning. The board terms are for three years and run from January 1973 to January 1976.

A man and woman who have given worthwhile, lasting service to the community will be named Monday night to receive the Plymouth Jaycees-Jayettes distinguished service award.

Announcement will be made at a banquet at Mayflower Meeting House.

Who will be picked for the honor will be decided tonight (Saturday) by a panel of judges meeting at Veterans Memorial Building.

Woman nominees are Sue Harper, Barbara Thayer, Margaret Dunning, Carolyn Siefker, Beverly McAninch, Esther Hulsing, Frances Lang, Martha Davis, Stephanie LaGosh and Mildred Dely.

Men's nominations were held open for further applications. Candidates must be between the ages of 21 and 35 in the men's division. Judges, in graceful recognition of women's reluctance to disclose age, waived an age limit in their division.

Part of the opposition to the recommendation, which comes on the heels of the band's recent appearance on national television at the Tournament of Roses Parade, will include a two-page memo from Band Director James Griffith to the board asking that they keep one music program for both schools.

- Inadequate housing to run two separate programs out of one building. (The phase of Plymouth-Canton High that would include music rooms is not completed yet.)
- Scheduling difficulties.
- Financial situations that would prohibit two separate programs; \$90,000 would be needed for additional uniforms, instruments, library materials and two more instructors.

Will PHS Band Be Split Into 2?

Opposition to a school administration recommendation to split the Plymouth High School band between the two high schools is expected at Tuesday's board of education meeting.

• Tradition of the band, which attracts students, would be lost.

Griffith's new memo to the board said that by keeping one music program the students of both schools could share the same facilities.

Hoben said he disagreed with Griffith, particularly on the cost estimates, and said, "He's just trying to build a case."

The superintendent said the administration felt that splitting the band, like the forensic program, would:

- Increase participation, giving more students an opportunity.
- Keep the music program consistent with other disciplines.
- Increase the utilization of team teaching.
- Create greater identity for Plymouth-Canton High School.
- Create more involvement at the middle school level when students there see there is a greater chance of participating once they get to high school.

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Because voting was done in order of the nominations, the two other nominees were elected before he was voted on.

The vacancies were created when Board Chairman R. Robert Geake was elected state representative from Livonia and Northville and Mary Dumas, board secretary, was elected Wayne County Commissioner. Both are Republicans.

Mrs. Dumas attempted to complete her Schoolcraft term, but an attorney general's opinion issued earlier this month advised her to resign.

The vote was unanimous for Mrs. Blatt, who was nominated by Paul Kadish. Arch Vallier nominated Kehrl, and Rosina Raymond and Jack La Rue voted against him. When Mrs. Raymond forced a vote on Cox after the

appointments were made, she and La Rue were the only "yes" votes.

banker. He retired as a vice president for NBD two years ago and lives at 41525 Eight Mile.

The meeting was called to order by the Supervisor, J. D. McLaren, at 8:00 P.M. All members were present.

READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES - Regular meeting, December 26, 1972. Mr. Richardson advised that the minutes should be amended on Page 3 under Brender-Hamill, Item No. 4 to read "For Colony Farms Condominiums, Lot No. 41," instead of "Old Colony Sub Condominiums." Mr. Gerald Burke moved approval of the minutes as corrected. Supported by Russell Ash and carried with Gene Overholt abstaining as he was absent at this meeting. **Executive Board Meeting - January 3, 1973.** Mrs. Holmes moved approval of the Executive Board Meeting Minutes as submitted. Supported by Gerald Burke and carried unanimously.

READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF BILLS - Mr. Ash moved that the bill in the Grand Total amount of \$16,134.30 be paid. Supported by Mr. Overholt and carried unanimously.

ITEM NO. II - OLD BUSINESS - Richard Brender, Brender-Hamill & Associates Inc. Re: Specific revisions on the proposed development of Wedgewood Estates Condominiums. Paul Kozub, Mr. Richard Brender, of Brender-Hamill and Associates Inc., presented to the Board a revision on the proposed development for Wedgewood Estates Condominiums on the north side of Ann Arbor Road and approximately 863 feet west of Sheldon Road, east of Fisher property made up of approximately four acres zoned R-1-S adjacent to Parklane Estates. "The prospect of overbuilding the shopping facilities to service the population should be avoided."

"The developer should be urged to move slowly in carefully studied stages with both projects, commercial and residential."

RESIDENTS protested the proposed rezoning of the 195 acres earlier this month at a planning commission public hearing in Plymouth-Canton High School.

Most of the opposition came from residents in two of Canton's newer subdivisions, Windsor Park and Olde Plymouth, both in close proximity to the proposed development.

The Plymouth School

District and the Plymouth Area Planning Commission support rezoning. According to a report from Canton's planning consultant, Michael Manore, both units favored the development, noting "the tax base would be substantial and would aid the overall Plymouth community."

Manore also said that the city of Plymouth had failed even to respond to a letter from Canton officials asking for an opinion on the proposed complex.

AT ITS MEETING Monday night, the Plymouth City Commission voted to retain Vilcan-Leman Planning Consultants to review the proposal and make a recommendation.

Canton Township Supervisor, Phil Dingeldey, said he hoped to hold a joint study meeting with city and Plymouth Township officials to discuss the project. A date for that meeting has not been set.

With only one week remaining of the most successful winter harness racing meeting ever conducted by Jackson Raceway at Northville Downs, President and General Manager Leon Slavin is busy with plans to wind up the season and head for the warmer climes of sunny Florida.

It has been a long, hard, late fall and winter for Slavin who closed a meeting at Jackson and then moved to Northville for the back-to-back early and mid-winter sessions.

With this and next weekend remaining of the 24-night meeting, which opened racing in Michigan in the new year, Slavin has high hopes that the handle will hurdle the \$500,000 barrier either tonight or the closing Saturday.... a week away.

More than 5,400 poured into the plant last Saturday and the fact that many of the mutual machines had to be closed, because of lack of workers, kept the plant from reaching the highest level ever. The handle was \$412,000, just short of the record for winter racing.

Clubhouse reservations for

tonight (Saturday) are even greater than a week ago with no less than seven parties on tap, including groups ranging from 10 to 50. Additional tables will be set up and the dining room management has arranged for additional help to take care of the rush. It was caught short a week ago but won't be this time.

THE JACKSON meeting runs through next Saturday and then Northville Downs will take over the following Monday for its mid-winter campaign, operating nightly with the exception of Sundays until mid-March.

The program for the next to last Saturday is even better than that of a week ago when the packed house saw more thrilling finishes than at any other time of the meeting.

Heading the card is a \$4,000 preferred pace that finds Bedford Jet, guided by Gordon Norris, bidding for a second straight victory. The Jet turned in the fastest mile of the winter, hitting the half-mile in 1:01.1 and winning comfortably in 2:03.4.

One doesn't expect a clocking like that in January in Michigan and it just proved that an exceptionally fast racing strip and a pacer in top form can combine for an amazing performance.

Bedford Jet is well known for his races in the early month of the new year and thus didn't surprise the experts with his triumph, taking the lead in the backstretch and holding it for the final lap and a half.

The competition will be much the same with six challengers slated to go against the Jet. The field includes: Pepper Byrd, winner of two in a row for veteran Elmer Conrad; Sparkling Bret, handled by George Bowman; Adakio, winner of the preferred two weeks back; Knox Abbe, who hasn't measured up in recent weeks even though heavily supported by the betting public; Action and Erlanas Valley.

More than 75 per cent of the stables at the Jackson meeting were filled by Michigan owned. The story is expected to be much the same for the Downs competition.

He swept both ends of the daily double with Directnik (\$5.40) and Monterey Millie (\$8). Then came back in the third to guide Rebellion (\$5.60) home by a length and repeated with El Tera (\$18) in a tight finish over Dodge Acres Millie in the fourth.

MISS MO, a 13-year-old nearing the end of a brilliant trotting career, made it three in a row in Wednesday's featured trot. Driver Don McMurray had the aged mare flying in the final quarter and she just did last to hold off the late rush of Prince Doyle. Miss Mo shows earnings of \$42,515 through 1972 and boasts winnings of \$2,350 in her three for three in 1973.

Some grass roots political activity, a student workshop and a helping hand from Sen. Robert Griffin combined to carry a Farmington High School senior to this weekend's inauguration excitement in Washington.

Claireann Schwehr, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Will Schwehr, flew to the nation's capital yesterday, armed with a camera, an engraved invitation to attend the inauguration of President Richard Nixon and an inquiring mind ready to take in the whole scene.

When she returns to classes Jan. 29, she'll be able to report on the inauguration ball and a couple of other special events in addition to Saturday's big ceremony.

She'll also have attended a week of specialized study in governmental functions along with high school and college students from all over the country.

THE STUDY is sponsored by Washington Workshops, a non-partisan organization for

students, and it was the original reason for Claire's travels.

But that's getting ahead of a story of a busy young lady whose family has long been interested in Republican politics.

"I had done a lot of ringing doorbells, passing out handbills and addressing mailers for all Republican candidates in the last election," said Claire.

She also had studied international relations last year with Thomas Peace of the Farmington High faculty, and she is president of the FHS United Nations Association.

So she was interested in the information Peace received about the Washington Workshop. She applied for a place and was accepted.

"THERE WAS a choice of several workshops," Claire said, and I picked the one that runs from Jan. 21 to 18 because I thought it might give me a chance to hear Mr. Nixon address Congress."

Then she started thinking about the possibility of getting to Washington early and found it was possible to stay a couple of extra days on the campus of Mt. Vernon College, where the workshop sessions will be centered.

She had written to Sen. Griffin that she planned to be in Washington, saying she hoped to talk with him. After learning she could arrive early, she called his office to see if it might be possible to see a bit of inauguration proceedings.

"And then it snowballed,"

she said. "Two days after I called, I received an engraved invitation to the inauguration by special delivery."

"Then came invitations to the inauguration ball, the Youth Ball, the parade, a concert in the John F. Kennedy Center for the Arts and a salute to American Heritage in the Concordia Auditorium. "There's really no way I can thank the senator enough for the interest he has shown."

BETWEEN semester finals taken a week early—Claire managed to pack a Victorian ball gown and a good supply of film and on-the-go clothes for a busy week.

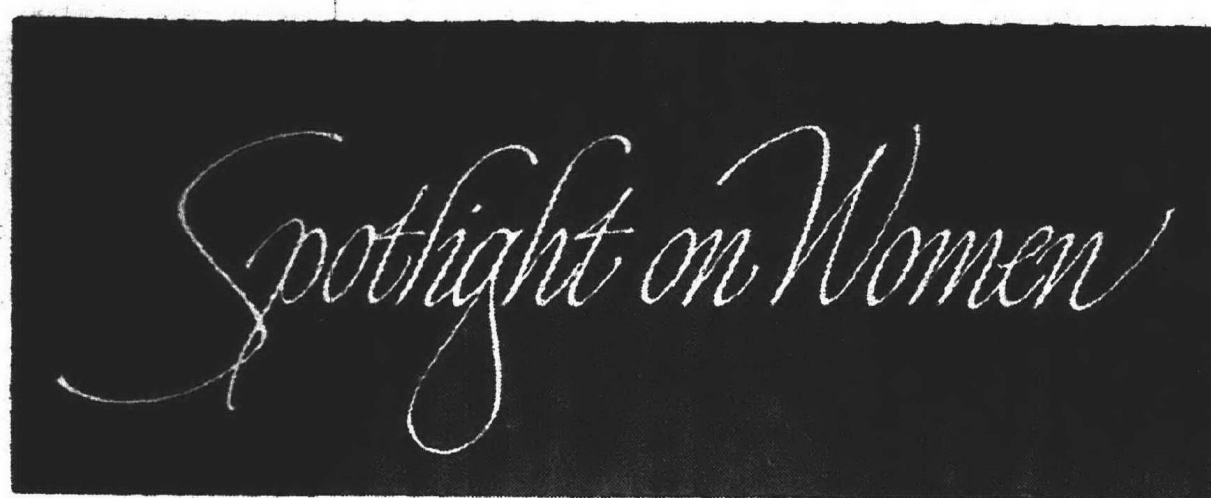

"In any case, I know I want to go on traveling and meeting people."

She's getting a good sample this week.

KENSINGTON PARK NATURE TRAILS

Take a wintry ride to Kensington Park on the I-96 freeway and get reacquainted with the white loveliness that is winter.

Make the Nature Center Building your first stop for it is the hub of activities in the wildlife sanctuary at Kensington and serves as the starting point for all the nature trails. It is filled with exhibits aimed at helping you to understand the natural environment.

• Tamarack Trail... 1/2 mile. A short trail which explores the tamarack bog and several of the ecological communities bordering the bog.

• Aspen Trail... 1 1/4 miles. Wandering along the edges of several different habitats, this medium length trail provides abundant occasions for observing bird life.

All trails are marked by labels which point out to visitors the ecological relationships between plant and animal life.

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HISTORY AND WOOD LORE AT THE NANKIN MILLS NATURE CENTER

Located on Ann Arbor Trail just south of the foot of Farmington Road in Westland is a charming old building that is rich in both history and the treasures of nature.

The Nankin Mills Nature Center was built before the Civil War and served as a grist mill for what was then rural Nankin Township.

In the 1920s, no less a person than Henry Ford purchased and remodeled the handsome, three-story frame building for use as a factory which produced small automotive parts.

It was, in fact, the earliest of Ford's "village industries"—small plants in rural neighborhoods that attempted to combine the advantages of industry with the soul soothing benefits of country life.

"THE ADVANTAGES of the country are natural; and the advantages of the city are human; when both are fused, the cities lose in large degree their justification for existence. When they bring their best to the country, their work is done," wrote

Henry Ford about the philosophy that shaped his plans for the village industries.

The factory at Nankin Mills had a life of over 20 years; there, farmers got a chance to work for good wages in an idyllic atmosphere, while still maintaining their families' homes and farmsteads.

After World War II the historic old building was sold to Wayne County and became a nature center in the midst of the wildlife sanctuary, Holliday Park, thus beginning a new chapter in its long and useful life.

It is now open during the winter from 1 to 5 daily every day except Monday. Admission is free and families and individuals are welcome to visit without advance reservations.

School classes, scout troops and other groups must make reservations for a visit that can include a hike through one of the nearby nature trails and a discussion led by naturalist Mary Ellsworth.

The Nankin Mills Nature Center includes such permanent exhibits as

rocks and minerals, wood samples, Michigan trees, bird nests, insects, local history as well as aquarium of native fish.

Also on display are an unlikely and exotic array of animals, many of them natives of tropical climates.

ON VIEW TO the public now are two tarantulas, a boa constrictor, parrots, an owl monkey as well as a spider monkey.

An "animal rehabilitation center" in the basement, which is not open to the public, functions as a hospital for a surprising collection of sick and injured birds, rabbits and other creatures, many of them brought in for treatment by area residents who unexpectedly encounter such animals in their back yards or front lawns.

Director Mary Ellsworth, acting in the role of medical director, tries to restore each and every animal so that it can be returned to its life in the woods; if this is not possible, the animal is kept on and the Nature Center becomes home for yet another wild creature.



An assortment of wild animals is kept in cages in front of the Nature Center. These animals are unable to fend for themselves—some have been born in captivity and others have been permanently maligned by traps, hunters or other animals.

Look for a coyote, grey, red and black foxes, an albino raccoon, a Canada goose with a broken wing, a skunk, by the name of Fibello—and surprisingly enough, a couple of peacocks who are hardy enough to enjoy the winter climate.

This small zoo is a good place to take youngsters who think that eggs come from the supermarket dairy counter. Take along some bread crumbs as well—you'll find it a food way of making new animal friends as well as yet another activity to enjoy in the midwinter months that lie ahead.

A WINTER SAFARI THROUGH HOLLIDAY PARK

High adventure can be yours right here in Westland by exploring one of the many nature trails that lies nearby.

Holliday Park, a Wayne County forest and wildlife sanctuary that with enough snow on the ground so that you can discover wild animal tracks. Bundle up with your collection of winter woolens—sweaters, scarves, face warmers, mittens, long johns—and set out for a winter safari that you'll remember long into summertime.

HOW TO APPRECIATE THE

WINTER LANDSCAPE

TIP FROM A NATURALIST

"People are apt to think that there's nothing much to see in the winter woods," explains Mary Ellsworth, director of the Nankin Mills Nature Center. "Actually, there's a great deal to see. The winter landscape is much simpler than it is in summer and this gives observers a chance to see much more than they might in the summer."

Trees, for example, are shorn of their summer foliage, thus revealing a variety of branch and twig shapes that are fascinating in design. Each tree has its own personality--some are graceful and lithe, others stark and twisted--and this can best be appreciated right now in the midwinter season.

The particularly rough bark of such trees as the sycamore and hackberry can best be observed now, too; watch for these things on your nature trail and you'll find your eyes opening to sights you may have never known before.

WATCHING FOR animal tracks in the snow is another game you might play while out in the winter woods. Miss Ellsworth reminds hikers to watch for the footprints of a great variety of woodland creatures --

foxes, raccoons, possums, muskrats, squirrels and rabbits. If you're lucky, and very quiet, you might discover the animals themselves.

"We tell groups on nature trails that we're actually trespassing on animal homes," explains Miss Ellsworth. "That's why it's important to leave the area undisturbed and to remove nothing from it. Noisy, messy visitors are apt to have a lonely hike, quiet ones will often be rewarded by the sights of many animals as they go about their lives in the forest."

Winter hikers can also be on the look-out for animal homes--a "den" tree with hollows is apt to be the shelter for a family of squirrels as well as a home for birds. Such trees are often dead but are left alone because of their usefulness to wide numbers of wild creatures.

Winter, with its absence of foliage, is an excellent time to spot birds. While some of our feathered friends take off for the south during the cold weather, a surprising number remain right here.

Miss Ellsworth suggests that observers watch for woodpeckers, bluejays, crows, chickadees, winter



their hikers for a question and answer period.

So open your eyes and ears to a series of rare treats and uncover, for yourself, some of the secrets that hide in the wintry woods, undisturbed by the 20th century world that man has created.

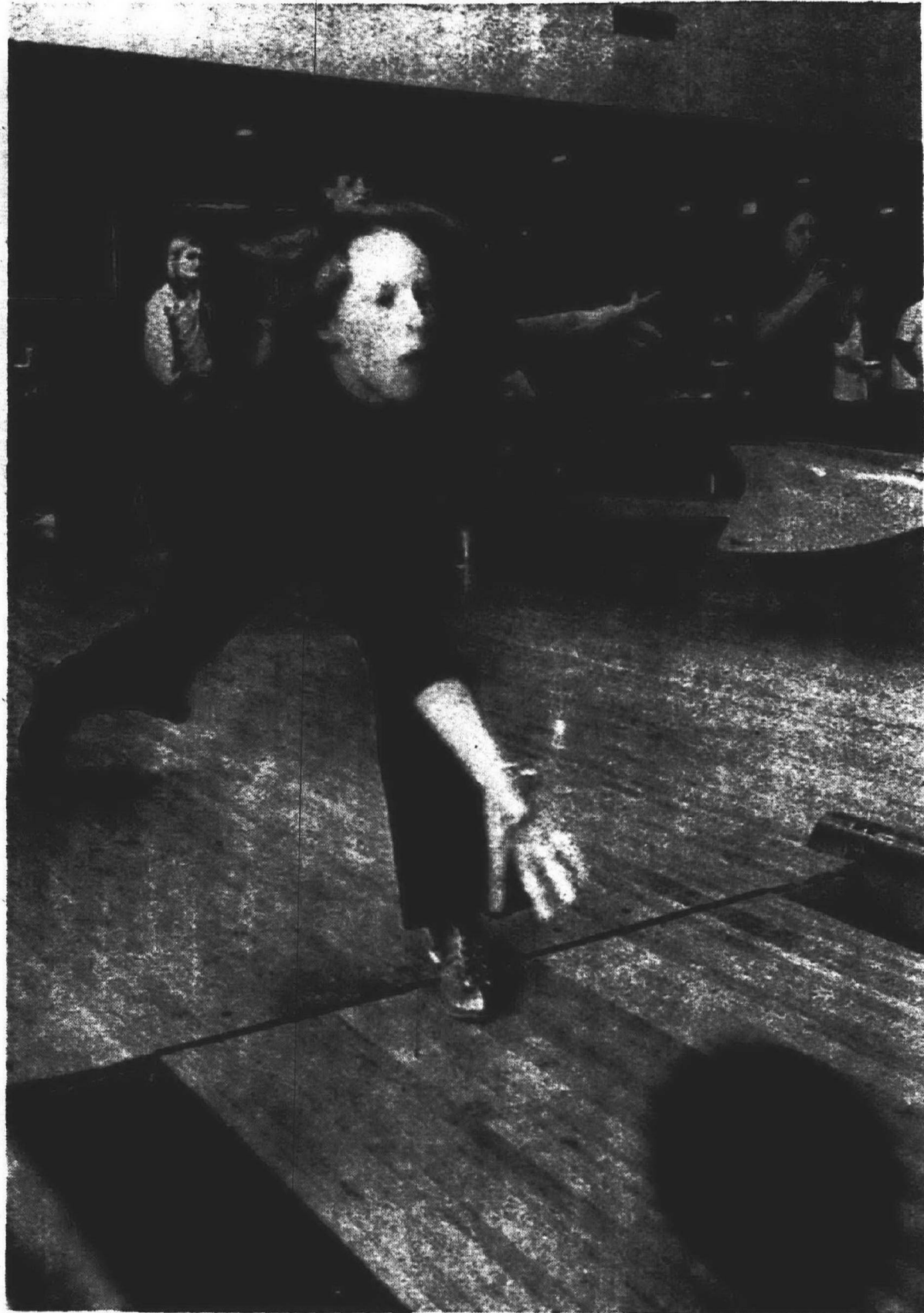

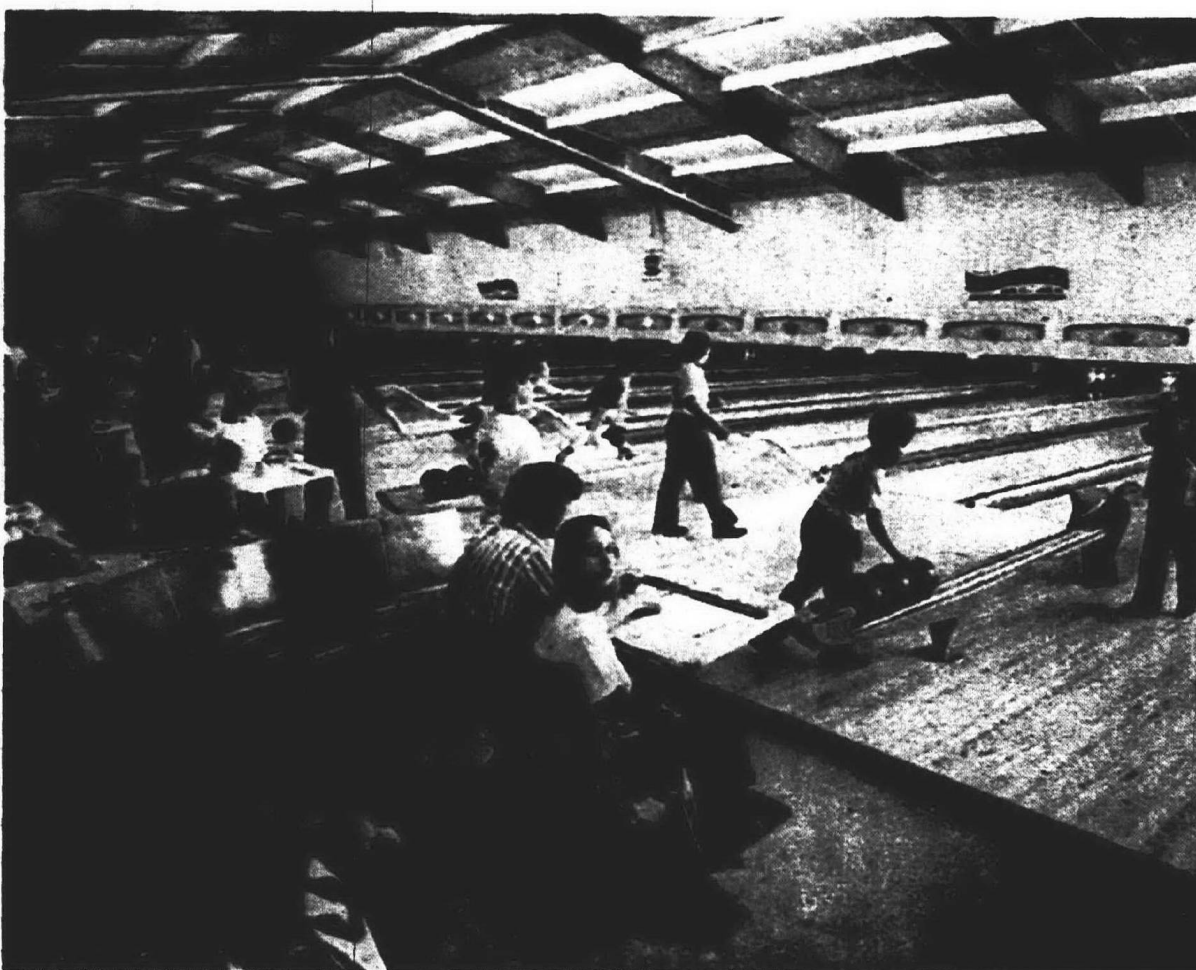

MORE THAN that, the children of the land have turned to bowling for their leisure hours after school and on Saturday morning. It is a familiar sight to see entire families now engaging in the ancient recreation.

The switch of entire families -- and even church groups -- to the game that long had been restricted to males is one of the most fascinating of all sports and recreation activities.

There was a time when bowling was nothing more than an adjunct to the old time saloons. It provided a source of activity between drinks to settle friendly bets.

Then, back in 1916, the first sign that women would take an important part came when the late Jim Shillady, then manager of the Detroit Recreation building, which passed into history several years, opened one of the 22-lane floors to women.

It was the first time in America that women were invited to take part in the game. And to relieve all criticism he had all-female help, even the pinsetters.

From that humble beginning, the game has become more and more attractive until today the women's national association numbers more than 3 million members.

And the Detroit association -- where it all started on a high plane -- tops the nation with more than 100,000 members, each of whom bowls in sanctioned play at least once each week.

THE BIG SURGE came in 1946 with the advent of the automatic pinsetter. This complex bit of mechanism made bowling possible at all hours of the day.

women's morning leagues -- many beginning at 9 a.m. -- and provided an outlet for children's after school hours.

One of the first big steps in youth bowling was taken in Livonia. Figuring that the two most "dangerous" hours of the day were from 3 to 5 p.m. when school let out and parents were at work, the Livonia parks and recreation department sponsored a league that occupied all of the lanes in the city for a time.

Today, more than 1,000 in-school youth are in this program. It is built on an unusual set-up where the school children pay \$1.50 for two games of bowling, shoe rental and a contribution toward the annual banquet. This is now the largest group of its kind in America.

Out of this interest has grown two national organizations. The oldest is the American Junior Bowling Congress and the latest is the Youth Bowling Association sponsored by the bowling proprietors. The YBA boasts a membership of more than 15,000 in the metropolitan area. One-third of that number are girls.

THE YBA PROGRAM divides the youth into four divisions. The peanut group is for those under nine years of age. The prep division runs from 10 thru 12 years, the juniors from 13 thru 15 and the majors from 16 thru 18.

A full schedule of tournaments and awards is arranged each year with the climax coming with the All-America Youth championships in Washington, D.C., each August.

The senior citizens have no such extravagant schedule, but they compete in traveling leagues throughout Observerland.

For many of the senior citizens, this is only time during the week when they gather for any type of function and the memberships are growing steadily.

No group enjoys the game more than the elderly bowlers. It is a throwback to the days of their youth and they make the most of the good fellowship with little regard to the scores.
