## Twp. Residents Want Federal \$\$ For Sidewalks

A five-year safety program has been proposed for Plymouth Township by residents of the Plymouth Estates subdivision who also want the township to use 40 per cent of its federal revenue sharing funds for sidewalks.

The project, the citizens group said, should begin with sidewalks installations and advance to skywalks and other badly needed safety measures throughout the township. School areas would get priority attention, however, they said.

The request from the

residents was aired at the board's meeting Tuesday and sparked considerable discussion. In fact, one veteran board member termed the meeting as "the liveliest we've had yet" since the new supervisor, J.D. McLaren, assumed office.

Supporters of the safety program were represented by Mrs. Mary Leich and Mrs. Mary Anne Macunovich, both of whom live on Redbud Street, in Plymouth Estates. Mrs. Macunovich's husband Phillip, helped outline the residents' plea for 40 per cent of the \$270,000 the township has received

UPSHOT OF the hour-long discussion was the board's decision to take the comments "under advisement" with possibly one suggestion rating prime attention.

That was the suggestion that perhaps the sidewalk issue could be solved more equitably by a three-way split of the costs with funds coming from revenue-sharing, the residents in the affected areas and possibly the Plymouth Community School District.

Declaring "we must represent the entire township," board members attempted to explain that sidewalks in various subdivisions did not benefit the township as a whole.

The decision, explained the board, to install sidewalks through special assessment came in 1971 when it was apparent that the township couldn't afford a full-scale sidewalks paving program.

There wouldn't even be enough revenue sharing funds to handle a sidewalk program, said Trustee Gene Overholt.

He favored a plan where "revenue sharing would be tied in with a special assessment district."

"I think some federal funds should go for safety," he said at one point.

MARCUNOVICH had a counter point in the township's stand that federal funds should be spent to benefit the entire community.

"Give us 40 per cent and spend the other 60 per cent on the rest of the township," he said.

Lost in the verbal shuffle was the suggestion that a series of public hearings—possibly spanning three days—be held to give residents a chance to say how they would like to see the money spent.

"It's our money," said one resident during the discussion.

Board members said that there has been no decisions made on what to do with the shared revenue.

THE PLYMOUTH Estates homeowners said their interest in getting sidewalks was reawakened by the death of 11-year-old Karen Wendt Johnson on Jan. 4.

She was killed when she was hit by a car while crossing Ann Arbor Road to get to East Middle School.

## School Bd. Tables Rossman Action

The Plymouth Board of Education has deferred action on former Supt. James Rossman's request that he be released from his contract to accept a job in West Bloomfield.

Rossman, who was fired Dec. 13, 1971, and assigned later to a consultant position, was offered the post of assistant superintendent of business for the West Bloomfield School District. His appointment was approved by that district's board of education Monday.

Plymouth trustees decided to delay action on Rossman's request because of pending litigation. Rossman has filed a \$1 million damage suit against the district, contending that the firing damaged his professional reputation.

The trustees referred Rossman's request to their attorney, Edward Draugelis.

Board President George Lawton indicated the board would reach a decision prior to Feb. 1, when Rossman's new position takes effect.

Rossman offered to continue as a consultant "at times and places that will not interfere with my duties at West Bloomfield School District."

He said he would continue to live in Plymouth Township and "maintain awareness" of

school district needs and state and federal legislation affecting school operations.

"IF YOU release me from my duties as a full time consultant to accept this position with West Bloomfield Schools, damages will be mitigated somewhat. However, not completely," he stated.

In another action related to the lawsuit, the board adopted a statement clarifying details concerning a letter given to Rossman from the board.

Mrs. Carol Sellman, who takes the minutes of board meetings, wrote a letter to the board saying her notes indicated that the board adopted a letter to be sent to Rossman regarding his position as consultant.

The official board minutes don't include the resolution and could have a bearing on the lawsuit.

Mrs. Sellman's letter states: "I have gone over the notes which were taken at the special meeting on Oct. 30, 1972, to try to clarify any misunderstanding on my part of business transacted at that meeting."

"SINCE THERE was no agenda or superintendent's notes for a special meeting, I find sometimes that it is

## Band Parents Think Bd. Won't Face Music

Plymouth's band parents think their school board and administration are out of step and just won't face the music.

Parents want to keep the band marching together, but the administration has recommended the band be split between Plymouth-Salem and Plymouth-Canton High Schools.

Next year will be the first that two high schools on Centennial Educational Park are operated separately. The administration says that along with splitting up the athletic teams, forensic club, student council and other activities, the band should be split up too.

STILL ENERGIZED from the sunny Tournament of Roses parade, more than 200 band members and their parents attended Tuesday's board meeting to explain their reasons for wanting to strike up -- and not split up -- the band.

"Mediocrity versus magnificence" was foremost in their minds. Parents added that the band has a unifying effect on the community and should be kept unified itself.

"Everybody would like to be on the winning team," Mrs. Homer Clark said, adding that

many students would drop out of the band if it were split.

"It would cost us more money for two mediocre bands than for one magnificent one," she said.

"The real question here is, 'Would next year's bandmen rather be part of one of two mediocre bands or of one fantastic band?'" said Jim Person, a junior.

"A 50 or 60 member band would be ridiculously inept, both in appearance and soundwise," he continued. "The quality of bands would

degenerate and Mr. (James) Griffith's (band director) long years of building the program would be wasted."

"WE ABHOR this idea for the railroading of our bands to ruination. Our bands have received many honors in the past and we wish to continue this tradition of excellence."

Bob DeLano, a sophomore, complained that the band wasn't ready to be split up -- especially since Plymouth-Canton portion would be at a disadvantage without a senior class next year.

"It's obvious we care about what's happening," he said. "We don't want it to happen -- it's as simple as that."

Mrs. Clark said the band acts as a "public relations agency for the schools and the city."

"I think the band acts as a unifying experience," she said.

John Ort, Livonia counselor and former Michigan Education Assn. president, said the band has created interest in the school and community.

"We have to instill interest in the community, and I say, bring it together through our bands," he said.

## Samaritan Renovates Old Baptist Cemetery

Few persons have a more unusual hobby than Ronald Gollop, the 17-year-old graduate of John Glenn High School in Westland -- he renovates cemeteries.

From the first day he entered school, Ronald, who lives at 6032 Berry in Westland, has been a local history "buff." But it wasn't until his paper route took him past the old Chubb cemetery at Hix and Warren that he came interested in the condition of the cemeteries.

"Every time I passed it," he said, "I became more concerned with the way it was neglected. So, I started working on replacement of the markers and grave stones."

HOW DID HE get to Plymouth to uncover the neglect of the old Baptist Cemetery on Pearl Street?

"I came out here to visit an aunt," he explained, "and saw the grave stones toppled over. And being interested in local history I went over to see how old they were. And I really

found some old ones."

Little more than six months ago he obtained permission from the city of Plymouth to carry on his hobby in the Old Baptist plot. Since then he has recorded more than 120 of the 144 single grave plots in the area that once bordered on the old Allen Farm.

The oldest grave he found so far is that of Mary E. Gates who died on April 7, 1833. There were others, a bit older that have been interred.

"I have found the graves of 12 Civil War veterans," he said, "and the members of the old Allen family who had been buried on the farm and then re-interred in this old Baptist plot."

WITH THAT, he pointed to a tall evergreen tree in the corner of the plot.

"I don't know exactly how old that tree is," he said, "but that curve in the trunk near the top marks the spot where the members of the church cut off the top for a Christmas tree. When the new growth came it branched out on the side -- but it makes an

historical marker now."

Now that he has straightened up the head stone and cleaned the lettering of many more the young hobbyist has some fine plans for the future.

He has listed the following projects he wants to see finished:

A cobble stone or flagstone sidewalk through a portion of the cemetery.

A flag pole erected.

A sign erected bearing the name "Plymouth Village Cemetery" -- the name officially approved some time ago.

A state historical marker with a message of remembrance for the departed.

A final planting of shrubs and flowers to insure their future blossom to add beauty to the hallowed old ground that many persons in Plymouth had forgotten.

## Community Band To Present Evans In Big Top Show

PLYMOUTH For the second successive winter, the Plymouth Community Band has scheduled a guest conductor's concert appearance for the "Toscanini of the Big Top." Circus Bandmaster Merle Evans.

In a 60-year span, Evans led bands at carnivals, medicine shows, showboats and in theatrical productions, and of those -- 44 years were at the head of the band for the Ringling Bros. & Barnum & Bailey Circus.

He drew a near-capacity audience when in Plymouth last year and will appear again with the Community Band in a 3:15 p.m. concert Sunday, Feb. 4 in the auditorium of Plymouth-Salem High School. Tickets are \$2 for those over

12, and \$1 for children 12 and under. Balloons, refreshments and other circus items will be available at intermission.

Although the Community Band is best known for its annual series of summer concerts under the stars in Kellogg Park, it practices weekly throughout the year and in recent seasons an indoor concert has become a winter fixture.

The Evans concert will bring to the area a cornet virtuoso who is one of the most colorful musicians of the century.

Plymouth Bandmaster James Griffith will conduct the band through its opening numbers and then turn the podium over to Evans for a fast-moving series of circus numbers keyed to traditional acts of the "big top."

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## The Stroller: What Lies Ahead?

For some strange reason, a fellow who writes for the public prints holds an unusual place in our society.

Possibly it is because he is in contact with many persons during his news gathering hours that people look upon him as a fountain of information--a fellow who not only is aware of what has happened but is aware of what lies ahead in this vale of tears.

So it is only natural that The Stroller has been approached with the question, "What's the outlook for the coming year?" Each time he has been forced to smile without answering as the question carried him back to the days when he was toiling in the sports department of The Detroit Free Press and refused to be lured into the role of a seer.

In those days it was the policy of all major newspapers to have each member of the sports writing staff select his choice of the probable winners of the top college football games of the

week. This table of the writers' selections always was printed on Thursday morning--in plenty of time to be used as a guide for the shop workers on the assembly lines in the auto plants and thousands of office employees when they made their choices in the various football pools that then were thriving.

Mind you, the writers had to make selections in games that were being played in all sections of the country and by teams they never had seen, or ever hoped to see. At best the selections were strictly wild guesses. Yet many persons staked their money on them.

And if one of the writers happened to get lucky and come up with a majority of winners, he quickly was given the ranking of an expert. It mattered little to the winner of the football pool whether the writer could write well, or not. He picked the winners. That was enough to stand him in good stead with the bettors.

WHEN THE DAY came that

The Stroller was asked to join in making selections he refused--and caused a bit of consternation in the office.

"What do I know about those teams in the Pacific Coast Conference--or the Southern or the Southwestern Conference?" he asked in the hope of being spared the task.

"I'll never see any of them play and conditions can change from week to week," he went on, "so the whole thing is silly and unfair to the readers who use the 'guesses' as a guide."

Even at the threat of being taken off his assignment as a football writer, The Stroller refused to become a seer and he finally won out.

So now, he thought, as he stood there with the friend who asked for a prediction on the new year, what right have I got to predict what is going to happen in the next 12 months. This is even sillier than trying to forecast the outcome of college football games where even the ball can take some unusual bounces.

AS THE STROLLER stood there he couldn't help

recalling the one time in his sports writing career when he ventured an opinion on the outcome of a major sports event and suffered one of the most embarrassing moments of his life.

It was back in 1936, on a hot afternoon down in Lakewood, N.J. where Joe Louis had just finished training for his first bout with Max Schmeling. Well, you know what happened. The next evening Joe suffered the first knockout of his professional career when he went down in the 12th round under an avalanche of Schmeling punches. You can imagine, too, how The Stroller felt as he watched Referee Arthur Donovan count the fatal 10.

"Check the railroad schedule for me," The Stroller asked his telegraph operator, "and find out what time I can get a train that gets me back to Detroit at night--I don't want to be seen in the daytime."

That's what he did.

NOW, THEY'RE asking The Stroller to predict what is going to happen in the new year. What a laugh! He doesn't know--and doesn't want to know. There's no fun going to the ball park or the football stadium if you know the outcome before you get there.

The annual Plymouth Optimist Club ice skating races will be held today (Saturday) from 3 to 4 p.m. at the Plymouth Cultural Center.

All boys and girls from age 5 through 13 can enter the contests free and trophies will be awarded for each racing group.

The groups will be: boys under eight, girls under eight, boys eight through 10, girls eight through 10, boys 11 through 13, and girls 11 through 13.

PLYMOUTH Young people at the Plymouth Youth Center are organizing a food cooperative as a family money saving project, and they're hoping senior citizens will join them. "It's like a group of neighbors buying together," explained Director Dale Yagiela. Orders are collated and the food is purchased at Detroit's Eastern Market. Savings come from buying in quantity at the farmer operated stalls.

The project began in a small way last fall, and Yagiela said savings as high as 30 to 50 per cent have been realized on purchase of fresh produce, eggs, cheese and bread.

# Youth, Inc. Cooperative Starts

HOWEVER, the economic factor is secondary, in Yagiela's view, to the social one.

"It's fun for people to work together in a group," he said. "The people involved get together for three to four hours every two weeks. Some take orders. Some combine them into shopping lists. Some work out prices. Some do the marketing. Others break down the food into individual orders and deliver them. The time goes by fast."

Meetings are held Monday at 7:30 p.m. at the Youth Center.

A lot of the young people started the combined buying for their families, Yagiela said, and then the rest of the family members became interested and joined in the work.

"We'd like to get some senior citizens now," Yagiela said, "and help bridge the generation gap."

## Youth, Inc. Needs \$8,000 For '73

PLYMOUTH Plymouth's Youth, Inc. must find \$8,000 beyond the amount expected to be raised from regular fund-raising activities to meet its anticipated 1973 expenses.

A recent \$8,000 grant from the city commission represented about half of the \$16,000 which PYI estimates would be needed to continue its activities this year.

That \$16,000 figure does not include a budgeted \$3,450 which the agency hopes will be returned from button sales, memberships, a fall concert and other activities.

As part of the solution to the money crunch, PYI hopes to receive a \$3,000 grant from the 1973 Plymouth Community Fund. In addition, they are hoping that a surplus in the PCF 1972 budget might be shared with them.

Officials from the PCF say the grant request is being considered by the budget committee and the board of directors. The fund gave \$1,500 to Youth, Inc. in 1971. But even if the PCF grants Youth, Inc.'s request for

money, fund officials say, the grant would be contingent upon income for the fund during the year because the regular fund agencies take priorities.

YOUTH, INC. also has applied to the fund to be granted status as a regular agency, said Sam Blackford, Youth, Inc. president. No decision on that request has been made, he added.

The 1973 Youth, Inc. budget totals \$21,500 with expenses put at \$13,800 for salaries, \$4,200 for maintenance including a new roof which may cost \$2,000, utility expenses of \$2,000 and \$1,500 for programs, including supplies.

Of the \$8,000 yet to be raised to meet the budget, Blackford said, solicitations would be made to local businesses and clubs.

Youth, Inc.'s 1972 budget came to \$24,000, with the city contributing \$12,000. It received \$5,800 in other contributions and met the balance with fund-raising activities.

## Twp. Fire Damage Runs Down In '72

PLYMOUTH Fire loss in Plymouth Township for 1972 showed a sharp decline from the 1971 figures of \$908,643. Fire Chief James Gignac reports. The loss for 1972 dropped to \$217,230.

Gignac said the 1971 figure was exceptionally high due to the fire which destroyed Lofy's night club, causing an estimated \$766,000 loss. Discounting the Lofy fire, the 1971 fire loss figure was \$142,643.

Fire runs in 1972 were 132 or 10 fewer than made by the fire department the previous year. Rescue runs, however, climbed to 405 from the 1971 figure of 321.

There were 12 fewer false alarms turned in during 1972 than in 1971; the department received with 25 in 1971.

One false alarm was turned in during December, while in the same month of 1971, the department received three false alarms.

TOTAL ACTIVITY of the township fire department last year reached 677 calls compared with 673 the year before.

In addition to fires and rescue runs, these figures include assistance to other fire departments, investigation of reported fires, as well as false alarms.

BOARD PRESIDENT George Lawton asked Griffith to speak on the educational benefits of keeping the band together.

"Many of the calls I have received have been sponsored by you," Lawton said. "You have created a little monster here."

"I hope I haven't created a little monster," Griffith said, denying that he told parents personally to call board members. "Whatever I have done was hopefully in the best interest of the school in giving quality education."

Responding to Lawton's question, Griffith read memos which said: "If the present program is divided, we would be compelled to offer only the same basic performance oriented classes, thus continuing to ignore the overall school population."

ONE ADMINISTRATION reason for splitting the band was to give more students opportunity to participate.

Trustee John Graves suggested that both schools have their own music programs which would be determined by the music instructors. A band for Centennial Educational Park would be retained under his suggestion.

But parents objected to his suggestion, as well as Trustee Carl Berry's proposal to have a band for each school and one

for the entire park. When parents' objections began to disrupt the meeting, the board threatened to make them leave.

Kent Buikema, principal of PCHS, said there is "reason to believe participation would double" if two bands are created.

"I think Jim (Griffith) sells himself short if he thinks the band would be diluted (if it were split)," he said.

MOTIONS TO table the issue, leave the band as it is, and to split the band all failed

to get sufficient support from board members.

When it was apparent that the board was too divided on the issue to pass a resolution, trustees agreed to table it.

The board set a special study session for 9:30 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 3, in the board offices, 454 S. Harvey, to reconsider the entire dual high school plan.

The next board meeting is Feb. 12 in Plymouth-Canton High School auditorium. A decision on the band may come at that meeting.

## Hockey, Skating Will Split Ice Time At Township Rink

PLYMOUTH Plymouth Township hockey enthusiasts will get their share of ice time on the township's new -- and only -- outdoor ice rink.

The decision to split the skating time between skaters and hockey players came at the board's Jan. 23 meeting. It followed a written recommendation from the recreation director, Joe Bida, asking that no hockey be allowed on the newly developed site on Ann Arbor Trail, near McClumpha Rd.

Bida's recommendation was also "that we get the State Police, if we need to, to go out there and try to enforce the rule."

He explained he isn't against hockey. He was just trying to enforce the "no ice hockey allowed" rule posted on the site.

However, he added, "I am sure the board is aware that when you allow rough hockey, you eliminate a place for parents to take their small children as the larger boys bully them off the rink, plus they may get hurt with a stick or puck."

Bida said he had received several complaints from parents regarding violations. In the discussion following Bida's letter, it was determined that Bida would have less trouble supervising rink activities if hockey players were given a chance to use it.

ANOTHER ALTERNATIVE, suggested Trustee Russell Ash, was "to build a

second rink to be used for hockey only.

Bida agreed, "But the weather's against us," he added.

"If you do, you'd better make the second rink the shape of a doughnut with a mound of dirt in the center -- or you'll have two hockey rinks," commented Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes, township treasurer. She was the lone dissenter in the vote for shared time.

Rising temperatures may even solve the problem for the remainder of the year, another trustee pointed out.

### Twp. Extends Tax Deadline

PLYMOUTH Plymouth Township taxpayers will get the same break other residents in nearby communities are getting in regard to tax payments. They'll get an extra two weeks to pay their bills.

Continuing a custom established several years ago, the township will waive the four per cent penalty on payments that are made between Feb. 15 and Feb. 28. The normal deadline is Feb. 14.

## Catholics Urged To Boycott Lettuce

Catholics in the Detroit Archdiocese have been asked to support United Farm Workers in California and Arizona by joining the lettuce boycott.

Cardinal John F. Dearden, Auxiliary Bishops Thomas J. Gumbleton and Walter J. Schoenherr and archdiocesan vicars recently adopted a resolution supporting the workers.

It urged "all Catholic parishes, institutions and organizations" to refuse to buy non-union lettuce.

CARDINAL Dearden implied that the issue deserved the kind of attention Catholics have given to the fight against legalized abortion.

He expressed hope that pastors and parish Christian Service commissions would bring the cause of the United Farm Workers to the attention of their people.

"The immediate issue," he declared, "is the lettuce workers' right to bargain collectively, a right defended in traditional Catholic teaching and reaffirmed by the Second Vatican Council."

"THE FUNDAMENTAL issue, however, is the lettuce workers' right to a decent life for themselves and their families."

"I am confident that the many Archdiocesan Catholics who expressed their concern for human life by working and voting against abortion on demand in Michigan will support the lettuce workers' struggle for a truly human life as the case is presented to them."

Fr. Byrne plans to retire next summer and Fr. MacKinnon will become pastor of the large parish.


The open house, to be hosted by the Parish Council in the church hall at 1160 Penniman, will be held from 2 to 4 p.m.



## ECUMENICAL REFLECTIONS

There is a religious effort under way this year across the United States called Key '73. As I understand it, the center of the movement is in St. Louis, Mo. There is a definite Protestant or evangelical tone to the program. Yet the Catholic dioceses of that state are all listed as supporting it and some other dioceses as well. That is an effect of ecumenism. While there may be differences about how to stir up the hearts of many,

there is enough in common for one religious denomination to encourage the other.

FEWER PEOPLE are going to church now than before. This Key '73 program hopes to draw back those who either have not been attending or have been present rarely. And other religious bodies face that same shrinkage. Maybe there is as much or even more of genuine goodwill in the hearts of Americans, but they could use the stimulus of company with others who are striving to lead upright lives.

IT IS NO wonder that this

large-scale effort is being backed quite widely.

The older ways, at least among Catholics, of having large congregations and a certain anonymity, are not popular now. Everybody wants to belong to a group where he or she is personally known. A feeling of belonging and of being liked is what we seem to need.

May this effort produce abundant results not only among Christians but among our Jewish brethren and others who may be contacted and find encouragement to be energetic in their faith too.

The yen for bizarre religion has become so widespread in the U.S. that it is surprising that no one has yet cashed in by reviving the ancient Roman practice of seeking divine guidance through study of animal entrails.

Also overlooked has been a revival of the belief in hobgoblins -- although Satanism, the devil worship which recently led to a teenager's ritual murder in New Jersey, is widespread. This particularly repulsive and imbecilic movement might have shriveled in the manner of most fads, but for the obviously unintended longevity given it by the alarmed acknowledgments of such world famed religious leaders as Pope Paul VI and Billy Graham.

JUST WHAT percentage of the public believe in ghosts (which the Bible tells us, also exist) would make an interesting study.

So would a theological inquiry into Melchizedek, the priest who was also king of Salem (Genesis 14:18-20). For the Bible tells us that King Melchizedek -- who is still mentioned by name in Catholic and Episcopal ordination services -- had neither a father, nor a mother -- (and even more remarkably) he had neither "a beginning of days, nor end of life." (Epistle to The Hebrews 7:3)

This extraordinary man

matter has written that if the devil's existence is removed as "a pillar of faith," then "of a certainty" other parts of the Christian faith will collapse.

Billy Graham concludes that the devil exists because (in his favorite and moderately fundamentalist theological creed) "the Bible tells us" so.

The famed evangelist also notes that "A recent Gallup Poll revealed that 65 per cent of the American people believe in a personal devil."

IT MIGHT also be observed that no up-to-date person would contend for the

historical existence of Jack Frost, although nobody denies the reality of frost. It is also presumed that although there was much reference to gremlins during World War II, no competent historian has recorded them as being as much of a reality as for example, Admiral Halsey.

Yet at West Point, a cadet's room -- which was allegedly haunted nine times last fall by a phantom cavalryman of the 1840s -- is still kept vacant.

The Military Academy public information office contends that Midshipman William Gravel's claims to have created this ghost as a grand hoax-haunt before the Army-Navy game are impossible. Commented Naval Academy public affairs officers Leo Loftus with droll delight:

"West Point claims it has a ghost. Midshipman Gravel says he is this ghost. Who knows?"

With conservatives warning that "The first tactic of the devil is to convince Christians that he doesn't exist!" an official church report on exorcism recommended:

"If the demon seems at all active, the priest or doctor should refer it to the bishop." Fortunately there was the good humor of Archdeacon Maxwell Dunlop of Aston, who commented:

"What if the demon is not an Anglican demon? What if he lacks completely the kind of intelligence an Anglican shows when an appeal is made to the bishop?"

The Churchill Chargers have done it again. A short jumper by Mark Reed with five seconds remaining pushed Churchill past Bentley in a non-league city rival cage clash, 64-63.

And for Churchill, which is enjoying winning a lot more than losing this year, it was its second upset victory over a city rival.

The now 8-3 Chargers upended Franklin two weeks prior, 65-60.

FOR BENTLEY, there wasn't much Coach John Farrar could say. This was the Bulldogs' fourth straight loss after opening the new year with a win over Belleville and sporting a 5-2 mark.

Bentley now stands 5-6 overall after a sound defeat by Flint Central, a two-point heartbreaker loss to Plymouth, a four point defeat against Redford Union and now a one-point at the hands of Churchill.

However, this wasn't going to stop him from coming back to turn defeat into victory for the Chargers.

REED REBOUNDED with six points. Don Braun collected four and Phil Damaska four. With 1:22 remaining in the first half, Churchill was up, 28-27, and Bentley's Bollin was called for his third foul.

Braun and Damaska put Churchill in front, 32-27, at the half but the Bulldogs came right out in the second half to score three quick buckets by Bracke. Bollin and Bob Deacon to take the lead, 33-32.

Bentley went up by five and Reed picked up his fourth foul. Braun collected his fourth for Churchill but Damaska hit two baskets near the end of the third period to cut it down to 46-44, going into the final eight minutes.

BUT BOLLIN had also collected his fourth for Bentley and was on the bench to start the fourth.

Damaska and Jim Foster

got the lead again for Churchill, 47-46, but Braun fouled out and it was back and forth basketball from here on out. With five minutes left on the clock, Farrar sent Bollin back in, trailing, 51-50. The lead then changed hands and with 1:49 remaining Churchill went into a stall, leading 57-56.

BRIAN KELLY sank a free-throw for Churchill but Boegler came back with two for Bentley to make it 58 all, 1:37 remaining.

Don Forest hit a short jumper to put Churchill back in the lead and made good a free-throw on a three point attempt. But the official ruled that Forest crossed over the line and instead of a three point lead it was back to two, 60-58.

Bollin made one of two at the line to slice it to 60-59 and with 34 seconds left, Deacon fouled out for Bentley.

In a tie-up under the Churchill basket, Bollin was fouled again and Forest got the gate on his fifth for Churchill.

BOLLIN MISSED the first on a one-and-one but picked up the second rebound to stuff it home and put Bentley on top, 61-60.

Damaska drove right back up the middle and put it in to give Churchill a 62-61 lead, but a whistle was blown. The basket was good but Damaska was called for an offensive foul.

Bollin was again at the line for Bentley, his squad trailing 62-61 and only 13 seconds left. Little could the Bulldog fans forget what happened a week prior when Bollin missed two free throws in the closing seconds against Plymouth to lose, 60-58.

But Bollin wasn't to miss this time. The lanky center connected on both to put Bentley up, 63-62.

CHURCHILL called time out with nine seconds to play. Montano set up his play. Damaska passed to Reed and the Charger forward drilled it home. The ball bounced to the floor and Bollin picked it up, stepped out of bounds to heave it down court, and the final buzzer sounded.


# GC Band Is Recruiting

# Depression Era, Discrimination Are Recreated

If you liked "To Kill a Mocking Bird" and follow the television adventures of "The Waltons" you'll enjoy the movie "Sounder."

It's the same sort of nostalgic look at a close-knit family struggling against poverty. But "Sounder" has an added dimension. The Morgans, Rebecca, Nathan Lee and their three children are black. They live in Louisiana and the time is the 1930s.

ALL THE fairly simple, familiar ingredients are there. As if poverty weren't trouble enough, Nathan Lee is sent to a work camp for a year for stealing food for his family.

There is the white lady, who tries to help the family and risks being ostracized by her neighbors, and the white sheriff who thinks more of rules than feelings, and enjoys it.

And there is the father whose favorite saying is: "You lose some of the time what you go after; but you lose all of the time what you don't go after."

But "Sounder" is so beautifully constructed and acted, the result, though familiar, isn't simple.

CICELY TYSON and Paul Winfield are magnificent as Rebecca and Nathan Lee, who bear their lot with a pride that

will never be defeated. Kevin Hooks plays their oldest son, David Lee, and it is on him, believably, and a dedicated young Negro teacher, played by Janet MacLachlan, that their hopes rest.

Martin Ritt, who directed "Sounder" also directed Carol Burnett and Walter Matthau in "Pete n' Tilly," another film memorable for its human values.

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## Turf Tips, Quips

It involves only a change in management but Michigan's harness racing activities switch from Jackson-at-Northville to the 30th opening of the state's pioneer night, parimutuel betting operation at Northville Downs on Monday.

It will be the first of 39 nightly programs with racing continuing through Wednesday, March 14 when it will move from Northville Downs to Wolverine Raceway at the facilities of the Detroit Race Course.

With Jackson ending its most successful winter meeting at Northville tonight (Saturday), Downs Executive Manager John Carlo is looking forward to a big season.

There isn't any question in the minds of those close to the racing scene that success of the Northville Downs campaign will depend entirely on the weatherman.

Jackson has had a tremendous January due primarily to the fact that the weather has been fabulous, especially on the weekends that mean the difference between a big week or an ordinary one. Business can be better than average during the first four nights of a week but if the weather turns on Friday and Saturday...then the week can wind up as a flop.

The weekend attendance and wagering at the Jackson programs, over the half-mile Northville strip, have been the best in history. Especially was this true last weekend when a Saturday crowd of more than 5,700 net the betting to more than \$453,000...both highs for the year.

With a break in the weather tonight, the track could better those figures and wind up with a nightly average handle of

more than \$300,000. That, my dear folks, would be an all-time high for Jackson whether operating at Jackson Raceway or at Northville Downs.

It also bears out the prediction that winter racing in Michigan can match that of most other midwest tracks...provided of course with a bit of aid from the weatherman.

NORTHVILLE'S 30TH opener and plans for the 39-night season will follow the format of previous years with a few exceptions.

Carlo has announced an 8 p.m. post time on the first race but plans to speed up the races so that the 10th and final event will be over and have folks leaving the clubhouse and grandstand no later than 11 p.m.

This means operating on a schedule of 20 to 22 minutes with the additional time used on the fourth, seventh and 10th race which will include perfecta wagering.

"We are going to set a tight schedule," said Carlo. "Then we will follow it throughout the week. It may be that additional time will be needed on Fridays and Saturdays but other than that we'll have patrons on the way home by 11 on the remaining four nights."

The Downs has dropped the trifecta from its gimmicks for the winter meeting and has substituted a perfecta. There will be a daily double on the first and second races and then the perfectas on No. 4, 7 and 10.

The official family will be the same as that of last summer's meeting with the exception of one or two positions. The changes were

announced earlier and find Dr. Eugene Capuzzi replacing veteran Dr. Linwood Snow as track physician and Chuck Coon Jr. filling in for his brother Jerry as track superintendent.

JACKSON WILL FEATURE a \$4,000 preferred pace on its closing program tonight (Saturday) but the star of the past two weeks, Bedford, isn't listed in the eight-horse field. The Jet romped away from competition in the last two Saturdays, winning each feature in times of 2:04.

But those victories caused others to back away from him in the finale and Driver-Trainer Gordon Norris didn't enter his star, leaving the field open to the other challengers.

It could well be the best closing night program ever presented by Jackson-at-Northville and President and General Manager Leon Slavin is looking for more than 6,000 and a handle of \$500,000.

That would be a perfect ending on a long campaign by the energetic Jackson boss who has been directing racing operations since last August without a break.

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## PROFILES OF OUR CITIES

Farmington is a city that cannot be separated from its history. First settled in 1824 by Arthur Power, one of whose descendants is Philip Power, publisher of Observer Newspapers, many of its streets are dotted by quaint and charming old homes, many bearing historical plaques, and tall, leafy trees. Farmington's oldest residence, the Carpenter house on Shiassee Street, was built in 1824.

The crossroads for three ancient Indian trails once traveled by Potawatomi and Chippewa Indians, Farmington still bears a living Indian land mark, a huge maple tree on Gill Road, just north of Freedom, believed by biologists to be more than 350 years old. Indians used it as a guide in reaching certain destinations.

**THE NAMES OF** such streets as Freedom and Independence Roads are constant reminders to Farmington residents of the town's once active involvement in the Underground Railroad movement.

There are many homes on Shiassee that bear evidence of hiding places once used as shelters for runaway slaves on their way north to Canada, according to Paul Schreiber, chairman of the Farmington Historical Commission.

Little on the subject was ever written down because such evidence was incriminating; people who harbored runaway slaves in their barns or cellars were acting illegally under the Fugitive Slave Law.

So the mysteries of Farmington's Underground Railroad movement are largely unraveled and await future detective work by some of its interested citizens.

**A TOWN WITH** a proud past, Farmington now enjoys a reputation for being an especially fine residential community.

Its biggest growth spurt came in the 1960s with the development of many handsome housing developments that have been able, quite compatibly, to take their place along side picturesque landmarks that still give it a unique historical flavor among the communities of Observer land.

### FARMINGTON SCHOOL DISTRICT

Farmington school superintendent is currently Marianus VanAmeyde, serving while the seven-man school board decides on a permanent appointment for the post. The office is at 32500 Shiassee.

The school board meets in the same building on alternate Tuesdays, at 8 p.m. with some irregularly scheduled public study sessions.

Board president is Kenneth Perrin, who serves with Aldo Vagnozzi, Elizabeth Brannan, Dr. Mervyn Ross, Ronald Emmitt, Richard Corliss and Kathryn Stirling.

To get on the agenda, contact the superintendent's office. To speak on a subject on the agenda, merely raise your hand to be recognized.

### CITY OF FARMINGTON

The city council meets alternate Mondays in the City Hall, which is tucked in behind the stores on Farmington Rd. south of Grand River

City Manager Robert Deadman, who keeps an office in City Hall, also prepares the agenda for the council, and he is the one to contact for a spot on the program.

Comments from the audience are also scheduled after regular business. Ralph Yoder is mayor, which means he conducts the council sessions. John Richardson, Fred Seibert, John Allen and Richard Tupper share council seats.

### FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP

Township Hall is located at Orchard Lake and 11 Mile.

Supervisor Robert McConnell, Clerk Floyd Cairns and Treasurer Thomas Nolan share administrative responsibilities there.

The township board meets every other Monday at 8 p.m. in the court room at the township hall.

Frederick Lichman, Mrs. Margaret Schaeffer, David Stader and Earl Oppenhaus share seats with the three administrative officials when the board is in session, with McConnell acting as chairman.

Agenda items may be added through Cairns' office before the meeting. To speak on a subject on the agenda, you must ask the clerk before the meeting; otherwise you must wait until the end of regular business.

Careful strategy throughout its vigorous period of growth and development has given Livonia reputation as a "master planned city."

Originally a tiny rural hamlet named after an ancient province in Baltic Russia, Livonia's population now exceeds the 100,000 mark.

Mostly a residential city with middle-income to higher priced homes, Livonia boasts some of the largest and newest industrial plants to be found anywhere in the Observer area.

In fact, industrial development, concentrated between Plymouth and Schoolcraft Roads, has exploded from 22 plants in 1950 to more than 140. The Schoolcraft Freeway with a projected opening in 1975, will undoubtedly bring in even more development.

**A RECENT** survey has shown that the city has the nation's most affluent population for a community of 100,000 or more; the median income in Livonia is more than \$15,000, which means that there are as many households above that level as below it.

This fact, along with the many advantages in recreation and community services within the city, undoubtedly help to set Livonia's mood and tone.

**Attend the Memorial Day parade which annually winds its way down Farmington Road to the City Hall to absorb the local color and the feeling of contentment that pervades the city.**

There you'll see scores of comfortably dressed, casual suburbanites alongside the curvy moms and dads, shielding their eyes from the sun and freckled-faced youngsters waving to the people they know in the parade. "Hi, Mrs. Peters!"

## HINTS FROM A SOCIAL WORKER

### BEAT THE NEWCOMER'S BLUES

A transplanted flower needs extra care and attention.

So do transplanted people. Adolescents, for instance, find a change of environment particularly difficult. They have problems enough to begin with, comments Kay Woods, social worker in Livonia school district. "The added burden of having to adjust to a new peer group brings a good deal of added pressure."

Often, fighting is the way to become accepted into a group of little boys. "The non-fighter may have some rough going," says Miss Woods.

When parents are attuned to their children and aware of the problems they may be experiencing as newcomers, the entire period of adjustment can be much smoother, counsels Miss Woods.

**AND WHAT OF** parents? They, too, are confronted by some major and even startling changes.

"What happens to the mother affects the whole family," continues Miss Woods. "If the mother adjusts to her new environment in a confident, positive way, then the children are apt to do so, too."

Miss Woods has seen families from different regions of the country, where the climate and local speech patterns are different than they are in Observer-

erland, who often feel especially strange.

"Keep reaching out," she advises. "You'll find a responsive chord eventually. Reach out to the other person. You may find yourself touching someone in greater need than yourself."

Contact your local school for advice on how to get involved with others. Many people have found a whole new world of activity within their PTA groups.

**BUT IF PTA** isn't quite your bag, your school can put you in touch with other types of groups.


Involved in the southern portions of the Livonia school district, Miss Woods has been active in helping to establish extra hour activities for people in the Ford, Perrinville and Nankin Mills school areas.



# A WORLD OF WONDERS--AT YOUR LOCAL LIBRARY

The guiding spirit behind your nearest library is the Wayne County library system, a large and benevolent force that remains unseen and unnoticed by most Observerland residents in its offices on Van Born and Veno in the City of Wayne.

Your library, all other libraries in the Observer area as well as many in Oakland County, are served by the Wayne County system. It's one of the top 10 systems in the nation and the very biggest in the State of Michigan, with libraries in the Observer area getting the heaviest use.

**JUST WHAT DOES the Wayne County system do for your local library?**

The library factory on Van Born and Veno orders, processes and delivers all of the books that you see on the shelves of your nearest library. About 170,000 books are processed each year.

Once a week your local librarian comes to the headquarters building where he or she can select new books in a room that houses the latest collection of newly published materials.

A "Hot Line" acts as an extensive book tracing service for any person who has requested a particular book within the system.

If his nearest library does not have it, hot line places calls to other libraries in search of it, even contacting libraries outside the system, if necessary.

Within a short time the book will be delivered to the library where the request was made; the person making the request will be notified either by mail or phone.

When he is done using it, he can return the book to his nearest library. A delivery truck will eventually return the book to its original home.

Such a speedy and efficient interloan system guarantees that no one in the Observer area need be cut off in any way from whatever sources of information he may desire.

A COLLECTION of more than 3,500 films may be borrowed by community groups at no charge.



schools may use these materials at a small fee.

Pre-school story hours are offered in the Observer area, including the libraries in Farmington, Livonia, Plymouth, Redford and Southfield.

Special elementary school programs, free movies and summer reading clubs are featured as well.

**Blind and physically handicapped people who are unable to read books reap the benefits of the system's extensive Talking Book Program.**

Records and cassettes of the latest books, along with recorders, are made available to visually handicapped people through mail; anything from best selling "Jonathan Livingston Seagull" to juvenile favorite "Pippi in the South Seas" can now be ordered, as well as a wide variety of recorded magazines such as Good Housekeeping and Newsweek.

Recently, a voter information program of taped and recorded material on local and state candidates was offered.

**"WE ARE CONSTANTLY reaching out to more people,"** explains Douglas Weiser, assistant director of information services. "We would like all visually handicapped people in the area to know about the program we offer."

Although much of the service for the blind is conducted by mail, the staff at headquarters is on a personal, one-to-one basis with many users via the telephone.


Braille materials are available through the State of Michigan library services; Wayne County deals exclusively in recorded subjects.

**WHO PAYS for the myriad of services offered by the Wayne County system?** Most operating funds are provided by local communities themselves, with some assistance at the state and federal levels.

Your local library, then, is mainly supported by you through your city tax dollars. Considering what you're being offered, it should make you a little more cheerful when you part with your money.



# Year-'Round School Feasibility Studied By New Citizens Committee

PLYMOUTH Caught between voter rejection of new school construction and a fast moving wave of incoming students with no classrooms to house them, the Plymouth Board of Education is casting out in three directions to meet what it sees as a housing emergency.

A year-round school study committee has begun investigating the feasibility of a 12-month school year to extend present space.

Voters, who turned down a \$21 million construction bond bid in December, will be asked to approve a lesser \$14 million proposal in June.

The latter would include \$250,000 for revival of so-called "satellite schools."

The satellite concept provides for purchase of houses in areas of rapid pupil growth which can be converted into elementary schools and then resold when a maturing population removes their need.

Flint and Redford Union utilized satellite schools in the 1950s and early 1960s when they were undergoing a pupil crush.

THE CONCEPT now is being applied in Jefferson County, Colo., outside Denver, which currently is undergoing a building boom similar to that in Canton Township.

"It maintains the neighborhood school concept," said Dr. Earl Hogan, deputy superintendent. However, he conceded that the satellite schools pose problems as well.

"What you actually come up with is about two classrooms," Dr. Hogan said.

Fire marshal regulations must be complied with and approval must be won from the State Department of Education.

The year-round school committee, co-chaired by Dr. Wendell Hough and Dr. E.J. McClendon, will update and look beyond a similar study conducted in Plymouth in 1968. The district at that time lacked sufficient high school space.

The 1968 committee failed to

back the 12-month concept, favoring an extended, split-shift school day instead. Subsequently, Plymouth-Salem High School was built to alleviate overcrowding.

Now, however, the district faces overpopulation not only of high schools but elementary and middle schools as well, school officials say.

ALL MIDDLE schools are operating now at full capacity, Hogan said, adding that the reopening of Central School will soften that crunch next fall.

However, all elementary and high schools will be filled

to capacity by next September, he stated, and middle schools will reach capacity during the following year.

Meanwhile, the school population will continue to grow. The current enrollment of 10,900 students will reach 15,000 by 1974, school administrators project, and will go to 17,000 by 1975 and 19,000 by 1976.

Serving with Hough and McClendon on the new study committee are Marda Benson, Gary Balcony, Mrs. John Harper, Mrs. Edward Draugelis, Mrs. Marilyn Finch and Hogan.

It will probably quadruple in size as subcommittees are

formed to study the many facets of the year-round concept: economics, educational quality, community acceptance, and the like.

The group also will consider alternatives to the 12-month school year to meet the housing crisis.

A suggested committee calendar provides for a recommendation to be ready by April. This would be followed by a survey of parents, patrons, students and staff for their reactions. A final recommendation could be completed in May and a referendum be placed on the June ballot, Hogan said.

## Where Year-'Round School Idea Originated

Northville is taking a new look at an old idea in experimenting with keeping school open year-around.

As a matter of fact, up until 130 years ago, city schools did hold classes for the full year. Only rural schools, governed by the need for children to do farm work in late spring, summer and early fall, operated an abbreviated year.

Schools in agricultural areas ran classes only in winter for the young farm helpers. Very young children, not needed for farm work but kept home during the winter by poor road conditions, attended special schools in the summer.

BEFORE 1840, Buffalo operated its school system for 12 months, Baltimore and Cincinnati for 11 months, New York for 49 weeks, Chicago for 48 weeks.

The year generally was split into four terms of 12 weeks each, with a one-week vacation at the end of each term. As time went by, one week's vacation was added at Christmas, another at Easter and two weeks in summer.

The 75 years following 1840 saw city school years gradually shortened and vacation time increased. Simultaneously, rural areas were lengthening school years. Eventually the two nearly matched.

From time to time ever since, the subject of the year-around schools has arisen,

particularly in times like now when spiraling construction costs and growing enrollments run into hardening taxpayer revolt.

All-year schools were widely debated between 1924 and 1931, between 1947 and 1953, and again in the 1960s.

YEAR-AROUND school was instituted in a number of districts in the early 1900s, largely for the purpose of utilizing buildings more fully, the same argument used today.

Businessmen, in particular, asked: "Why not use the school buildings 12 months of the year as they do in industry? Why close them for three months when keeping them open could educate a quarter again as many children in the same buildings, saving construction costs?"

Bluffton, Ind., adopted the year-around program in 1905; Newark, N.J., in 1912; Minneapolis in 1918; Los Angeles in 1920; Minot, N.D., in 1922; Nashville in 1925; Amarillo, Tex., in 1927, and Ambridge and Aliquippa, Pa., in 1928.

Altogether, more than a dozen school systems were operating all year during the 1920s. But the number had slipped to six by 1930, and only one, Chattanooga, Tenn., still was operating year-round by 1950.

ADOPTED for financial expediency only, in most cases, the concept was

dropped when money became more plentiful.

Since then, study after study has been made of the 12 month school concept, only to have the idea abandoned.

Michigan underwrote six studies with a \$100,000 grant in 1968. Study funds went to Ann Arbor, Freeland, Northville, Port Huron, Utica and the combined districts of Okemos-Haslett-East Lansing.

Northville tried to implement a mandatory four-quarter program in which children would be divided into four groups, each entering at different times, attending three consecutive quarters and vacationing the fourth quarter.

Despite such guarantees as pledges that all children in a family would be in school and would vacation at the same time, a survey showed about 60 per cent of the parents were opposed, and the idea was dropped.

LAST YEAR a big push for year-around schools got under way again. The National Education Assn. estimated 600 districts had the proposal under serious study.

The latest revival of interest stems from inauguration of two recent, widely applauded plans: a voluntary four quarter plan for secondary students in Atlanta, Ga., and the 45-15 plan for elementary students in the Valley View District, at Romeville, Ill.

But nowhere in the nation are all K-12 grades in a single district operating year-round.

## Frank Chapman, 62

# Former Lord Mayor Dies

PLYMOUTH A hands-across-the-sea tribute is now being planned to the memory of Frank Chapman, former Lord Mayor of Plymouth, England, who, with his cabinet, was the honored guest at the City of Plymouth Centennial in 1967.

Chapman succumbed to a lingering illness Jan. 11. Word of his passing came as a shock to members of the Plymouth delegation who, in 1970, returned his visit to help celebrate the 350th anniversary of the sailing of the Mayflower.

When informed of the loss of this link in the chain of friendship between the two Plymouths, Mayor James McKeon immediately put the wheels in motion for a memorial on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean.

One of the thoughts that quickly came to mind of those who recalled the friendliness of the former Lord Mayor during his visit here was the planting of two blue spruce trees on the plot between City

Hall and the Dunning-Hough Library.

On that site is encased the chunk of rock that was taken from the dock from which the Mayflower sailed in 1620. Chapman presented this as a gift to the City of Plymouth during the civic dinner tendered him.

While the two blue spruce trees would help keep his memory green here, it also was suggested that a tree—preferably a blue spruce—be planted in Plymouth, England, as a tribute from the Michigan friends.

IN RETURN for Chapman's gift in 1967 the people of Plymouth, through the city administration, presented the British visitors with four locust trees that are now growing on the lawn of the Municipal Building in Plymouth, England.

At last word, one of these trees has been damaged by the elements and may have to be replaced. If this is the verdict of the "Men of Trees" organization in England, it is likely that the replacement will be dedicated to Chapman's memory.

During the visit of the Michigan delegation in 1970, a tree was planted at the Door of Unity—a sacred bit of ground in downtown Plymouth, England—to commemorate the trip. It is growing fine and it is possible that the memorial tree could be planted at that hallowed site.

Chapman's visit here in 1967 was the highlight of the centennial because it was the least expected.

Chapman's passing is the first link lost in the chain, but his memory will live on.

## Blunk's Celebrates 50th Anniversary

PLYMOUTH One of Plymouth's oldest businesses, Blunk's in Old Village, will celebrate its golden anniversary this year.

The current president, Douglas M. Blunk, represents the third generation of his family to be occupied with the firm.

Blunk's was a dry goods store when it was founded in 1923 by William A. Blunk and his four sons, Benjamin W., Manna G., Arthur E. and Irving E. It then was located at 332 Main Street, in the building now occupied by John Smith Men's Store.

Twelve years later, the Blunk brothers purchased the stock of Schrader Furniture held by Fred Schrader, father of Edwin Schrader. A long association began with furniture and the Blunk name.

By 1939, three of the brothers had left the firm and Horace Thatcher and Irving Blunk joined to become Blunk and Thatcher. The operation was moved to 825 Penniman.

Thatcher left the business in 1943 and it became Blunk's, Inc., with the addition of several stockholders and with Irving Blunk as president and majority stockholder. He remained president until his death in 1960.

Walter B. Rensel, a stockholder, and Douglas M. Blunk, son of Arthur E. Blunk, purchased the stock and moved the business to its present location at 640 Starkweather. Rensel became president and the company continued sale of furniture, floor coverings and appliances.

In 1968, Blunk purchased Rensel's stock and in association with Irving E. Blunk's widow, Edna, the firm again became family owned. Furniture was discontinued and the company now retails floor coverings and the Magnavox line of TV and stereos. Blunk's has been associated with Magnavox for 24 years and with Bigelow carpets since 1936.

Present officers are Douglas Blunk, president; Edna Blunk, vice president; and Winifred Downing, secretary-treasurer. Mrs. Downing has been with the company 30 years as its bookkeeper.

Heading the sales force is Lynn W. Daniel, a five year employee. Donald Mills, chief installation mechanic, has been with Blunk's nearly 17 years.
