Forest Avenue Takes New Look With Mall Shops

Forest Avenue is taking on a new look.

The thoroughfare that has played second fiddle to Main Street and Ann Arbor Trail is going to branch out on its own in a transition that may be one of the most interesting since the days when the city planned the "Colonial" look.

Leading the way into the new scheme of things will be a new mini mall called "Forest Place" on the site of the former Stop and Shop grocery store. And, if present plans materialize, there will be a large new restaurant on the site of the Consumers Discount Building.

ASIDE FROM these activities, some thought is being given to making a shopping mall of the entire area from Ann Arbor Trail to Wing Street. While still in the talking stage, mention has been made of abandoning the street and making it a covered mall.

Forest Place (the old Stop & Shop) will be most unusual when it opens on or about March 15.

The interior is being transformed into an old brick street with shops on each side. The posts that were in the grocery store are being transformed into old fashioned lamp posts to furnish the light for stores' entrances.

THE POSSIBILITY of a modern restaurant came as a surprise as Howard Green, owner of the Peace Paint Store on South Main Street, had visions of acquiring the building for another mini-mall of specialty shops.

"I had a commitment," he said, "and was surprised to hear the rumor of a restaurant. The owners told me that no decision would be made on the sale of the building until March 1, when the present lease runs out."

Meanwhile, R. Terry Cuson, member of a family which has a restaurant on Detroit's East Side, has applied to the city commission for a liquor license. It is on the agenda for Monday night's meeting.

According to the word, Cuson has told some of the city officials the restaurant

will be modern in every detail and will be patterned much along the lines of the operation at Hillside Inn.

"Even if the restaurant comes about," Green stated, "we still can go ahead with the entire mall idea -- though it may not be covered."

FOREST PLACE will consist of nine specialty shops of all sorts of designs and fronts. Along the interior brick street. Some of the shops will have porches, others will have balconies and others old fashioned bay windows. To add to the unusualness of the place there will be no back to the building.

"What they call the back will be just like the front," said Julie Thoman, who will manage the operation with her husband.

"It is right on a parking lot and can be seen from Harvey Street. So it will be ideal."

THE SHOPS already signed to leases include The Mayflower Beauty Salon. The

Christian Science Reading Room, The Panhandler (a gourmet shop); Bed 'N' Sted (a linen shop) and a wicker shop.

"We will have space for nine shops," Mrs. Thoman said, "and it is just a question of which ones we can accommodate. Many shop owners have looked the place over and some of them require more space than we have available."

The idea of the mini-mall specialty shop is an old idea coming to life.

Some years ago planning experts informed the city officials that the city's best hope for the future was a ring of specialty shops. They claimed it would be silly to try to compete with the larger shopping centers in the area.

Taking this advice, the old store at the corner of Main Street and Ann Arbor Trail was converted into a mini-mall. Now the action has spread to Forest Ave.

You won't know the old place in a few more months.

A campaign to obtain stop signs, marked crosswalks and caution signs in the area of Miller Elementary School and other areas around the Carriage Hills subdivision is apparently falling on deaf ears.

At least that is the opinion of Joanne McGarry, of 6818 Montford, and Billie Whiteley, of 44147 Leeann Lane, two residents who are spearheading the drive to make the subdivision safer for children.

"There are several busy intersections around here where we need stop signs, but our top priority is at Leeann and Hanford Rd., right in front of Miller school," Mrs. McGarry said.

Mrs. Whiteley, who has two children attending Miller school, as does Mrs. McGarry, said there are several hundred children crossing that intersection each day.

"There are no signs to warn motorists of the school zone and no stop signs at the intersection," she said.

Hanford is used by many drivers cutting through to Ford Rd. from Warren Rd.

"WE DON'T even have crosswalks painted at the

intersection. Consequently children are dashing across the streets at random. It's just a miracle someone hasn't been hit by a car," Mrs. Whiteley stated.

A member of the Plymouth Community School District Safety Committee, Mrs. Whiteley said she has talked with the Wayne County Road Commission as well as with members of the Canton Township Board, "but our requests remain in limbo."

In addition to the school area, residents are seeking stop signs at South Umlerland and Montford, where two children were hit by cars in 1971.

"These accidents would have been avoided if stop signs had been erected there," Mrs. McGarry said.

"We have also requested stop signs at Sheldon and Ford Roads and at Lilley and Ford. These are busy intersections making crossing them dangerous."

Residents have been attempting to get street lights at Hanford and Sheldon where children wait for the school bus to East Junior High School in Plymouth.

"Children have to be at the corner about 7 a.m. and in the winter time, it's dark. This is a dangerous situation," Mrs. McGarry added.

"I DON'T WANT to see any more children hit because of lack of safety precautions in this area."

"It appears when asking for funds, safety comes at the bottom of the list. How can a price be put on a child's life?"

The residents' concern is shared by Shirley Spaniel, principal at Miller school.

"Because of all the construction going on in the area, we get a lot of traffic on Hanford. Still, there are no signs whatsoever to warn motorists of the school zone."

"We have 560 students attending Miller and the enrollment is growing daily. Since Christmas vacation, we have been enrolling 10 to 12 new students a day."

"There must be stop signs, marked crosswalks and no parking signs on Hanford."

Mrs. Spaniel said "everyone passes the buck" as to whose responsibility it is to get these things done.

She praised the student crossing guards who help the school's kindergarten through fifth grade students cross the streets.

She added that a caution light is needed at Sheldon and Hanford where the speed limit is 45 miles an hour "but the traffic goes much faster than that."

Canton Township's Identity:

How Do The 'Fledglings' View It?

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of a series of articles dealing with Canton Township's search for identity and independence.

The "fledglings" of Canton Township, as one called themselves, are the new families who have moved here in droves during the past two years.

Most are young families -- usually with one or two children -- who are settling in the first home they feel has been built just for them.

The new Canton residents moved here mostly from Redford Township, Livonia, Dearborn Heights, Garden City or the west side of Detroit.

They are the final ingredient in the developments that might be called "overnight neighborhoods."

According to the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments' (SEMCOG) "Southeast Michigan Dwelling Units Report," Canton ranked third in total residential units

authorized out of all communities in Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Washtenaw and Wayne counties during the first six months of 1972.

During the same period of 1971 and 1970, Canton Township did not even appear in the top 10 ranking.

Detroit placed first in all three years; Sterling Heights, second in residential units authorized during the first six months of 1972 was fourth during the same period in 1971 and third in 1970.)

HAS THIS sudden jump into the top 10 growth communities of the seven-county area been accompanied by growing pains?

Has Canton Township's identity been lost behind the ubiquitous development signs that display "Plymouth" name tags to sell the new houses?

Two "fledgling" families think so.

The Stephen Redfern family, of 43849 Brandywine, and the Ernest Koch family, of 43958 Arlington Rd., are not

only typical of most of their neighbors in the new Canton subdivisions but are also much alike themselves.

Both families are young; each has two children -- one just starting school and one still at home.

They live a block apart in Windsor Park subdivision. They each bought their homes in March of 1971 and moved in within about a week of each other the following August-September.

Redfern and Koch each work at white collar jobs. Both Steve and Phyllis Redfern and Ernie and Judy Koch are involved in community and social groups.

The Redferns are active in the Tonquish Creek Yacht Club, and the Kochs are active in the Windsor Park Civic Assn.

The Redferns came from Dearborn Heights; the Kochs from northwest Detroit.

THEY SAY the reasons -- they came to Canton Township were the buys they got on their homes and the quality of the Plymouth School District.

And it is because of the

school district, the nearby shopping and activities in Plymouth that they look at their community as Plymouth.

"Everybody in our area you identify with Plymouth," Koch said.

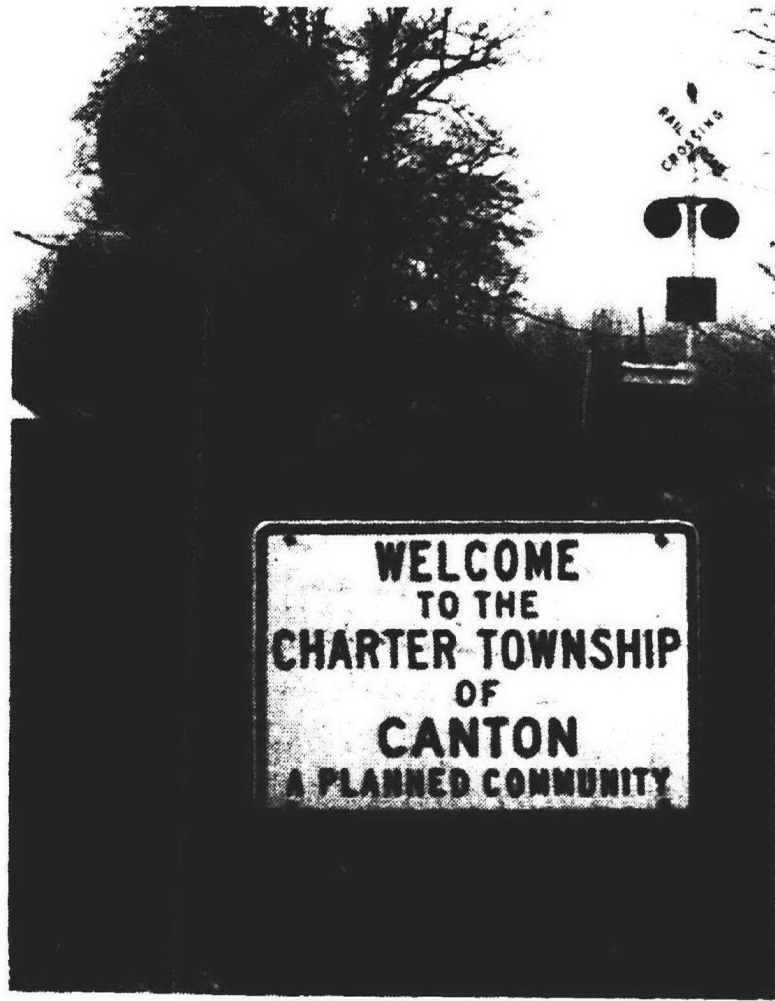
"I thought we were in Plymouth," Mrs. Redfern said. "Not until just before we signed the final papers (on the house) did I know it was Canton Township."

Redfern, who has worked in the Plymouth area for four years, knew the subdivision was in Canton but didn't know much about the township.

"I never knew who the supervisor on down was until I moved in," he said.

Mrs. Redfern doubted many asked about the government in Canton before moving in.

KOCH SAID that before he moved in, he had called the township about the zoning of nearby areas -- particularly the large plot near him for which a regional shopping and housing development is proposed.



"IT'S JUST A JOKE," Ernie Koch said of the bottom line on the signs at Canton Township's boundaries. (Observer photo)

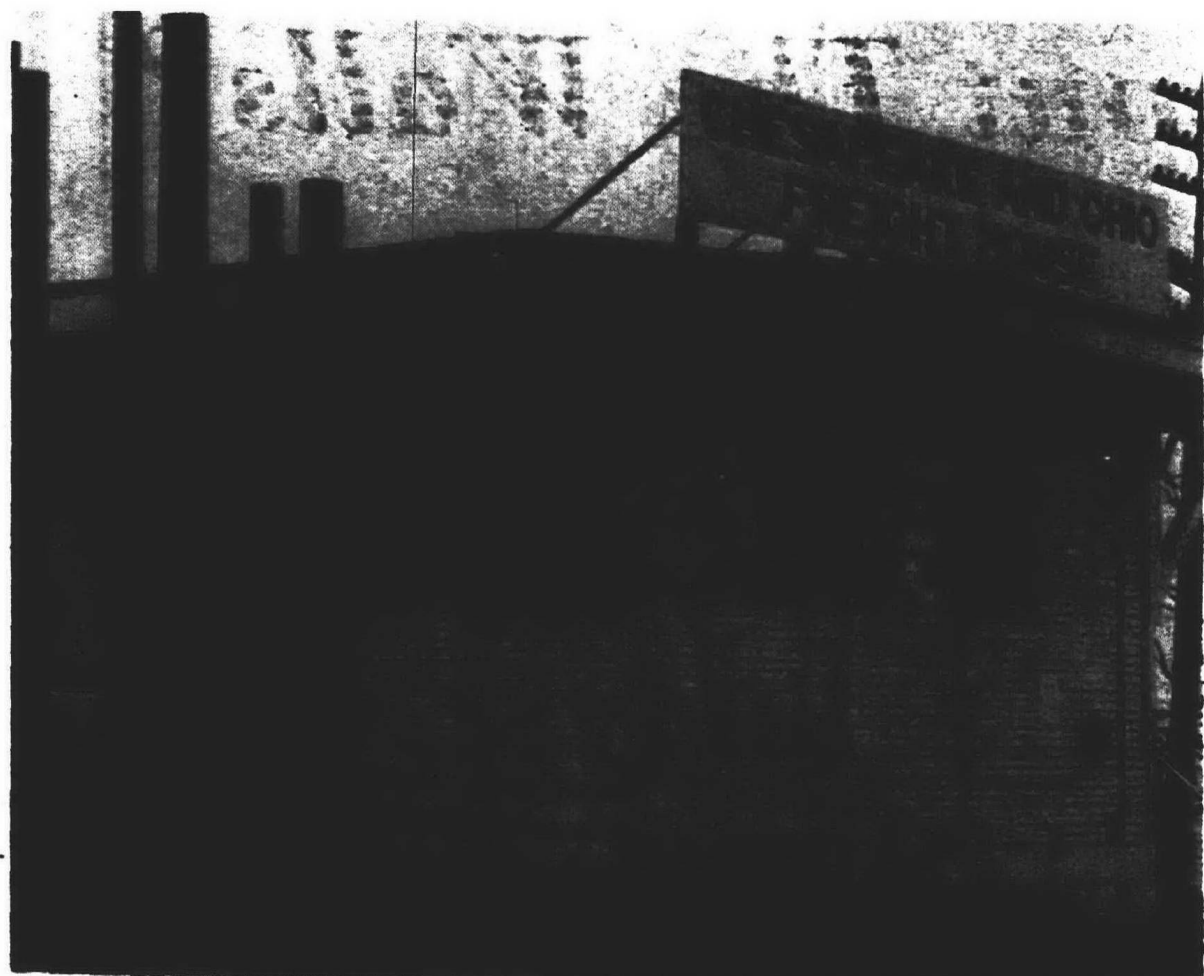

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TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BOARD OF TRUSTEES REGULAR MEETING JANUARY 23, 1973

The meeting was called to order by Supervisor McLaren at 8:00 P.M. All members were present.

READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES - Regular meeting of January 9, 1973 and Joint Meeting of Township Board and Planning Commission on January 10, 1973. Mr. Gerald Burke moved that the minutes of January 9, 1973 be approved as submitted. Supported by Elizabeth Holmes and carried unanimously.

READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF BILLS - Mr. Overholt moved to approve payment of the bills in the amount of \$32,819.79. Supported by Russell Ash and carried unanimously.

OLD BUSINESS - Joseph Bide, DPW Supt., and Brender Hamill & Associates, Re: Water change over from Plymouth System. J. Sinacola, Elizabeth Holmes moved that the additions and alterations to water mains in Plymouth Township to convert City of Plymouth customers in Plymouth Township to Township customers, the change order in the amount of \$5,687.50 be approved. Supported by Helen Richardson. The question was called and the following roll call vote taken: Yes: Overholt, Burke, Ash, Holmes, Richardson, McLaren. No: Millington. The motion carried 6 to 1.

NEW BUSINESS - Mary Leich-Mary Anne Macunovich, Re: Public Sidewalks for Safety and access of all citizens Revenue Sharing Funds. Several residents of the Township spoke in behalf of the above mentioned subjects. Mrs. Mary Leich, Mary Anne Macunovich, Philip Macunovich, Mrs. Phyllis Sullivan, Mr. Joseph Krochmalny felt that the responsibility of building sidewalks, safety paths and bicycle paths should be considered and was for the safety and welfare of all the children in the Township. They further stated that they felt a fair figure of 40% of Revenue Sharing funds should be used for safety purposes for the next five years.

This would provide sidewalks in areas where foot travel is necessary to schools, shopping areas and recreational facilities. After sidewalks have been placed in areas designated in need of foot travel, all money in excess shall be used for safety purposes. Mrs. Sullivan spoke in behalf of the safety committee and urged sidewalks be considered wherever necessary in the Township, not just in one given area. Mr. Macunovich listed several priority areas that their subdivision had considered. Mr. Joseph Krochmalny felt that the answer might be in holding a public hearing as to the uses of Revenue Sharing Funds. Mr. Maurice Breen spoke in behalf of the Special Assessment District and that sidewalks were an individual problem, rather than a problem for the entire Township.

Mr. Richard Gornick spoke to the point in question stating that there were many problems that the Township Board had to consider, such as Police Protection, Additional Fire Protection, Refuse Disposal, Recreation and all such services and that it would be a problem to determine which should have top priority. Each group or individual has selfish interests and it would be the Board's responsibility to make this decision.

Remarks were made by the Board of Trustees that Revenue Sharing Funds could be used for many things, but their prime concern was to use them in such a manner that would benefit the entire Township populace. A thought was made that possibly sidewalk construction could be done on a matching basis, but definitely not paid for in total as the amount of money received on Revenue Sharing could not possibly build all the sidewalks necessary to the Township.

Mrs. Trivadar Balogh presented a sketch showing school sites and some proposed walking and/or bicycle paths that she would like taken under consideration. A letter was also read from Mrs. Audrey Etienne, President, Woodbrook Homeowners Association, requesting the Board to take a more positive approach to the building of sidewalks in the Township. It was stated that our present ordinance covers sidewalk construction on main arteries, but that doesn't take care of those developed in the past, nor where there has been no construction. Supervisor McLaren suggested that the Board take the information under advisement and at some later date, Mrs. Leich and Mrs. Macunovich would be advised of the Board's decision on plans for Revenue Sharing Funds.

The Stroller:

What About The Walls?

In his meandering along the journalistic trail the other afternoon, The Stroller, by pure happenstance, was given a special tour of the Dunning Memorial Building that shortly will house the Plymouth Community Historical Society--and what a time he had letting his imagination run rampant!

Ordinarily there is nothing fascinating about empty rooms--except for size--and blank walls. But in this case there was a difference.

Standing there in company with Margaret Dunning, donor of the building, he couldn't help imagining what the museum would look like when the historical exhibits are in place.

More than that, he got to wondering just what should be placed in the building and what links from the past should be given prominence in the edifice that is certain to become the envy of the entire metropolitan suburban community.

FOR INSTANCE, what can be done to make a large, blank wall attractive and a part of this temple of memories?

Knowing that it would be nearly impossible to reconstruct Main Street as it was back in the days when the old plank road ended at the intersection of Mill Street, The Stroller envisioned a large mural of such a scene on one of the walls.

What could be a nicer throwback to the old days in Plymouth than an enlargement of one of the pictures of the downtown area that could be taken from Sam Hudson's recently published history of the city? It could be

done in good taste, and it would do more than anything else to tell the younger generation was life used to like in the "City of Homes."

Another series of pictures that came to mind and which could be used for a large mural are those that won national acclaim when Plymouth celebrated "Air Mail Week" some years ago.

Highlight of the celebration was the arrival of the Pony Express from Northville and the transfer of the mail to a plane at the airport from where Cass Hough flew it to Detroit.

This certainly is part of Plymouth history that could be preserved.

THEN THERE'S the old log cabin that once served as the Hough summer cottage at Haggerty and Joy Roads. It recently has been given to the Canton Township as a gift. But if its too deteriorated to move, there is the thought that the front logs could be used to rebuild the entrance on one of museum walls to give the effect of having the entire building.

Just dreaming, to be sure. But these things are part of the history of the area that never should be placed in limbo.

As we reached the basement floor and saw the spot where Miss Dunning is planning to exhibit one of her antique cars, The Stroller again expressed the wish that the old Alter car, one manufactured in Plymouth, could be obtained as part of the memorabilia.

So far as is known, there is only one Alter car available...and it is located

somewhere in Ohio. It should be brought back at any cost as a reminder that Plymouth was once part of the automotive world.

MOVING TOWARD the corner of the main floor, there came a vision of an old time ice cream parlor complete with the fountain, such as the one recently removed from the Beyer Drug Store at Main and Mill Street. Probably that one could be obtained.

The old ice cream parlor is fast moving from the scene, and it would be nice to preserve this memory in the museum.

In his imaginative mind, The Stroller envisioned many other things. Among them was a display of pewter by John Q. Groot, the veteran master pewterer now living on Pacific St.

There were visions of smaller rooms furnished in the decor of the old fashioned parlor and an old-time kitchen

with utensils used by early settlers.

Well, the museum is nearing completion and it won't be long until we can see the actual displays. Here's hoping some of the visions become realities.

He said he was told at that time that the area would be residential units, presumably houses like his, because that was the way it was zoned.

Now Koch, who is president of the Windsor Park Homeowners group, is a leader in the campaign against that proposed shopping center.

These kind of zoning issues have become one of the Canton newcomers' major concerns.

Koch said the signs on Canton's borders that say, "Welcome to the Charter Township of Canton - A Planned Community" are "just a joke."

"It's just like somebody took a deck of cards and went..." Mrs. Koch said, waving her arms as if to strew cards about the room.

"If you go down to the township meeting," Koch said, "there's one man proposing homes and 20 proposing apartments or gas stations."

REDFERN SAID he didn't agree with all the campaigns against other types of zoning in the community.

"I don't define a 'planned community' as single family homes for 10,000 miles," he said.

"I'd like to see a well-planned community... good schools," said Koch, bringing up what all four agreed was another important concern to them.

"I don't think anybody out here is opposed to paying taxes," Koch said, referring to the school building bond issue that was defeated in December by Plymouth School District voters.

A large part of that bond issue would have been used to build additional school space for the rapidly growing student population in Canton and also to get ready for even more students in the future.

Mrs. Redfern and Mrs. Koch say they are particularly concerned about overcrowding conditions in the Canton schools because their daughters, who go to kindergarten together, were transferred from nearby Gallimore School to Miller School after the school year had started.

Mrs. Koch said, "We moved here for Plymouth schools, and this end of the district is the fuzzy end of the lollipop. One of the biggest gripes out here is the school district," she said.

KOCH BLAMED zoning for the school district's overcrowding problems.

The Redferns and the Kochs said they had other concerns about the Canton government and about their developer.

Redfern said he didn't think Canton should be using the money to begin a new rubbish pickup service that is scheduled to start this spring. He said he preferred letting each homeowner contract with a collector for pick-up.

Koch said he's been besieged with calls lately because the ice rink in the subdivision park hasn't been flooded.

Homeowners fought with the developer to get the park fixed up. At one point, several Windsor Park homes were adorned with signs warning prospective buyers to "check the park before you buy."

THE NEWCOMERS have been active and vocal as a result of those problems, Koch said.

He described them as the "fledgling" people.

They are the ones moving into subdivisions like "Plymouth Park," "Olde Plymouth," "Plymouth Mills," "Plymouth Landing" and "Plymouth Pointe"--all of which are in Canton Township.

What do the newcomers feel about Canton's identity situation in light of the "Plymouth" nametag?

"I'd prefer Canton identity," Mrs. Koch said.

But she and her husband admitted that although they resented the identification of Canton with Plymouth, they'd joined the Plymouth community.

"You don't tell people you live in Canton," Koch said. You tell them you live in Plymouth.

"Nobody knows where Canton is," Mrs. Redfern said.

Mrs. Reader Heads Women's GOP Council

Mrs. Zar Reader was unanimously elected president of the Oakland County Council of Republican Women's Clubs when members from the eight clubs held their annual meeting.

Mrs. Reader is a Farmington resident and member of the Farmington club. She was called back to serve as president of the council for a two-year term, after retiring in mid-term several years ago due to illness.

Sheldon B. Smith, chairman of the Republican Committee of Oakland County and guest speaker for the 13th annual meet, cautioned members "not to look at 1973 as a non-election year and lie down on

SMITH TOLD of task forces that are being formed now for weekend retreats for long range planning. Meanwhile, women club members will be asked to evaluate issues of 1973, with emphasis on county government, the judicial system, mental health and social services.

THE COUNCIL performs as an informative body, disseminating information on party activities, and as an educational body, recommending current issues to be studied.

It raises funds for campaign purposes, gives teas, luncheons, receptions, rallies and workshops for political education to introduce candidates to the public, and to explain issues and programs that confront various units of government.

A specific objective for 1973 will be to encourage qualified Republican women to seek public office. Three women, who were aided by the council in campaigns last fall, were elected to the Oakland County Board of Commissioners in November.

Y Offers Course On Alcohol

"Reflections in the Glass," a five-session series on alcohol education, will begin Wednesday, Feb. 7, in the Northwest Branch YWCA, 25940 Grand River, Detroit. Meetings will be held at 1 p.m. each Wednesday.

The program is geared to the social drinker or non-drinker and involves a general education on the disease of alcoholism as well as facts, figures and precautions regarding the dispensing of alcohol in today's structure.

It does not have a temperance approach, but rather deals with how alcohol is served and what determines a good hostess. The role the social drinker plays in contributing to the plight of the problem drinker is examined and discussed.

The program is offered in cooperation with the National Council on Alcoholism of the Greater Detroit Area. There is a \$1 registration fee for those who are not members of the YWCA.

Old Farmhouse Saved For Church Center

A Livonia church plans to use a historic house as a religious center near Schoolcraft College.

Trinity Baptist Church, 14800 Middle Belt, has purchased a house which would have been torn down to make way for the I-96 freeway. The house, built in the mid-1800s, is located at 38600 Six Mile.

It will be moved to 38900 Six Mile, adjacent to property owned by Schoolcraft College.

TRINITY members have for some time been holding services in an old church located at 38840 Six Mile, close

to the old farmhouse, as well as in the Middle Belt sanctuary.

These are conducted by the Rev. Norman Mathias, extension pastor, who will occupy the house after it is moved and head a program for Schoolcraft students.

The Rev. Lyle Adams said use of the farmhouse will be "oriented to the college" in a manner similar to that of the Newman Center sponsored by the Catholic Church on the Schoolcraft campus.

BOTH THE BIG house and the small church were built

originally by Luther Briggs, an early settler in the Livonia area.

The house was part of a farm owned by Joel Barrons for about 30 years. The farm land was purchased by the state for the freeway right-of-way.

The house will be moved next to the old Union Cemetery on Six Mile. Briggs also deeded some of the land for the cemetery.

"WE COULDN'T see it torn down," Adams commented about the house.

Eventually, church members plan to restore the house. Moving day is indefinite, but the move will take place as soon as arrangements can be completed.

ALSO included in the worship area is carpeting, chandelier lighting and seating for 80 choir members.

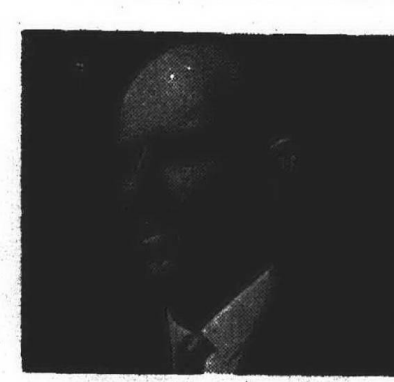

In demand as a speaker for both youth and adult groups, he participates, in church conferences, youth conventions, seminars and workshops on both a local and national level.

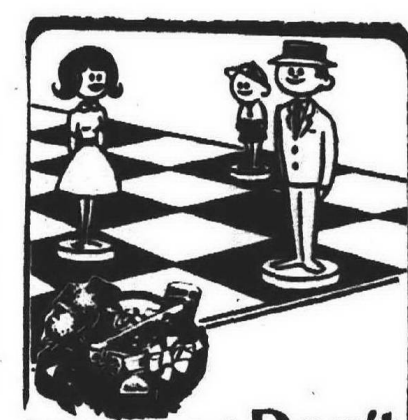

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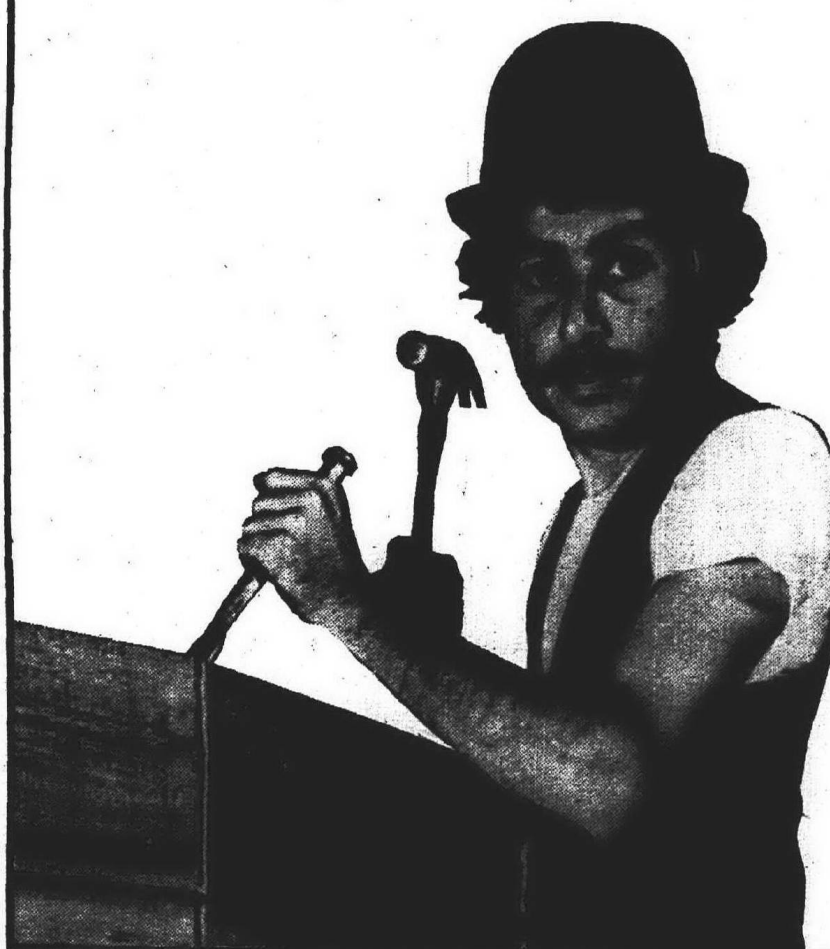

BOARD OF EDUCATION MINUTES

A special meeting of the Board of Education of the Plymouth Community School District, Wayne and Washtenaw Counties, Michigan, was held on Monday evening, January 15, 1973, in the Board Room of the Administration Building, 454 S. Harvey Street, Plymouth, Michigan, beginning at 8:00 p.m.

The meeting was called to order by President Lawton.
Present: Members Benson, Berry, Lawton, Mirto, Ohno and Penar.
Absent: Member Graves.

Administrators present: Supt. Hoban, Deputy Supt. Hogan, Assistant Supts. Blunk and Gibson and Administrative Assistant: Personnel Kae.

Others present: Edward Wendover, Plymouth Mail and Observer, John Ryder, P.E.A. and four guests.

Present Lawton reviewed the purpose of this meeting to consider all aspects of a special election for a bond issue, including items No. 2 and No. 3 on memorandum from Supt. Hoban on December 21, 1972, and on two memoranda from Administration dated January 13 and 15, 1973.

Supt. Hoban reviewed the issues as Administration sees them at the present time including student population projections, opening of Central School to alleviate some problem and explained the new proposals for a bond issue as recommended by Administration.

President Lawton described the new satellite system of school buildings, and it was the consensus that more information should be forthcoming on this new approach to growing population areas which allows a means of taking care of growth without overbuilding.

Each Board member asked questions to be reported back by Administration including present capacity of buildings. Members Berry and Penar requested a complete set of guide rules and all capacities for facilities as are now available and the usability of all facilities.

Discussion of location of a third high school followed and opinions were given on an election date choice by each member.

Supt. Hoban expressed the opinion that this School District has evidence that it is getting more mileage from each tax dollar than many other districts and that administration continues to work on all aspects to save as much money as possible.

Dr. Hogan explained the new plan for elementary precinct organization with block captains to conduct a new bond campaign.

Administration reminded the members that a 1 1/2 mill renewal would be due in the election in June 1973, and that 8 1/2 mills, 5 1/2 mills and 5 mills would be up for renewal in the three ensuing years respectively. Supt. Hoban indicated that the bond issue as now presented would raise taxes by 1.15 mills. He also projected the number of new teachers to be needed. A Judd Committee projections materialize, with same class size ratio as at present to be 98 additional. Budget projections could be up to \$12,500,000 to \$13,000,000 for the 1973-74 school year depending upon enrollment.

Mr. Blunk indicated that qualification for a new bond issue could be obtained from the State Bond Loan Organization by January 23 or January 24. Election date could be cleared with the attorneys and the Wayne County Election Commission by January 23, and that he would be able to refine all millage figures by the Board meeting on February 12.

Member Penar brought up a number of philosophical issues which need more discussion and consideration, such as shared facilities, organizational structure and sports activities as concerns a third high school within the Centennial Park.

President Lawton suggested that Shared Facilities at the Centennial Park be made Item No. 1 on Workshop Agenda for the second meeting in February. It was moved by Member Mirto and seconded by Member Berry that Assistant Superintendent Blunk be authorized to qualify a bond issue as follows with the State Bond Loan Board:

The motion was carried.

This suggestion is forthcoming due to the unfortunate accident which took the life of a student crossing Ann Arbor Road from this subdivision.

Another student rose to ask that the Board consider hiring more counselors at the High School in order that less time would be needed for students to see counselors when necessary.

Supt. Hoban circulated a memo from John Thomas, Legal Counsel, who indicated the opinion that the Board must continue payroll deductions for union dues for union members even in the situation where a member has quit the union and requested termination of payroll deductions for dues and that such dues must be deducted until June 1, 1973.

Turf Tips, Quips

After five nights of below average attendance and wagering, Northville Downs swings into its first big Saturday of the 39-night winter season with great hope of bettering the track's all-time high for single night in the cold and wind of winter.

The mark came on the 36th night a year ago, a Saturday, when a crowd of 5,908 sent \$433,428 through the mutual machines.

Inasmuch as the Jackson-Northville campaign, which ended a week ago, had handles of \$453,000 and \$463,000 on its final two Saturday nights, the 'Downs management has every reason to believe it will do as well or better.

However, veteran bettors take a dim view of this type of thinking. They point to the decided dip in wagering during the first week of the meeting and blame it on the dropping of the trifecta from the list of gimmicks.

Executive Director John Carlo, who has an aversion to gimmicks, especially those involving more than two horses, decided to go with a daily double and three perfectas, eliminating the trifecta.

Carlo also eliminated the sale of lottery tickets at the track and the free lottery ticket night. Both were extremely popular when introduced by Leon Slavin, president and general manager of Jackson-Northville racing.

Whether these are the reasons for the decline can't be determined at this early date but the attendance and betting over the first weekend will be a decided factor. A big weekend will mean that the cold weather of the past week was a major reason, a poor weekend will mean that track officials will have to do some studying.

TOM SMITH, acting racing secretary, is doing his bit to make the weekend test

plausible. He has arranged an all-pacing card for Saturday, matching all of the better class horses at the track.

Heading the 10-event program is the \$3,000 preferred pace with a field of six including the spectacular Bedford Jet and the surprising Erlana's Valley.

The six-year-old Bedford Jet will be returning to action after a week off and seeking his third straight feature victory in 1973. He made his '73 debut four weeks back with a brilliant come from behind triumph in 2:04.3, fastest time of the winter in Michigan.

A week later, Gordon Norris guided The Jet to equally as impressive a triumph against the same challengers, hitting the wire in 2:04.2.

It was Erlana's Valley, owned by Livonia auto dealer Bill Brown, was the surprise winner of the \$10,000 early closing series sponsored by Jackson during the month of December.

The duel between The Jet and Erlana's Valley could make the race the best thus far in the meeting. But there are four other challengers each capable of upsetting the apparent.

The quartet includes: Elmer Conrad's Pepper Byrd with tremendous speed in the stretch; H.T. Pilot, a fast closing second last week; Knox Abbe, guided by Don McMurray, who also has a lot of speed in the final lap; and Action, the always dangerous speedster from Ohio.

Post time for the first race is 8 p.m. sharp and Carlo has speeded up the programs so that folks are on the way home by 11 p.m. on week nights and promises an early close on the weekends, not as early as during the week but much earlier than in the past.

FIGURES FOR the Jackson-Northville campaign, which closed a week ago, show it was far and away

the best ever conducted by President and General Manager Leon Slavin.

Wagering showed a hike of almost 25 per cent with a nightly average of \$302,000 compared to \$273,000 in January a year ago. The crowd of 5,749 on closing night boosted the nightly count more than 13 per cent better than in 1972.

Veteran Gerry Banfield, of Farmington, won his third straight driving championship at a Jackson meeting. Gerry was the best at the Jackson Raceway summer and fall session and won the crown at the early winter programs at Northville and repeated during the January 24-night season.

Banfield had three winners on closing night, boosting his total number of victories to 32 and his winning percentage to .391. He had 32 wins, 14 seconds and 18 thirds in 117 drives.

Larry Stone was second percentage wise with .368 and Gordon Norris and Clarence Ayotte were second in triumphs with 11 each.

DRIVER OF THE YEAR...

Herve Filion, the sensational Canadian pilot, has won North America's all-around driving crown for the fourth straight time and has been honored as Driver of the Year by Harness Tracks of America.

Herve shattered his own world's record for races won in a single season with 603. He also set a new mark for total money earned by a sulky driver in one year with \$2,473,265. Filion ended the year with a winning percentage of .373, 11th in the nation and quite remarkable when one considers he had a record 2,665 drives, most ever in one year by a driver.

Joe Marsh Jr., of Findlay, O., who is well-known in the Detroit area where he started driving years ago, was second in wins with 307.

Lathrup Edges Seaholm, 68-66

Southfield Lathrup survived a fourth quarter surge by Birmingham Seaholm, an ankle injury to top rebounder John Gardner and a 15-footer at the buzzer to score its 11th consecutive basketball victory.

It was Lathrup, 68-66, over Seaholm for the Chargers' 12th win in 13 contests.

"This was one of our top team performances," said Lathrup Coach Jim Kourtakas. "We lost Gardner in the second quarter and just pulled our talent together to overcome our loss on the boards."

Lathrup did manage to maintain the lead all the way.

THE CHARGERS led after one quarter, 13-11, and scored 20 points in the second quarter to take a 33-28 margin into the locker room at the half.

Bob Malaby hit for eight points in the second stanza, but 6-7 Gardner, who had hauled in 10 rebounds, sprained his ankle with three minutes remaining in the first half.

Gardner was averaging better than 15 rebounds a game and 11 points.

LATHRUP WON the third quarter, 17-14, but the Seaholm club closed the gap in the final minute of the fourth.

The Chargers were up by two with 30 seconds to play and Malaby made good two from the line to push the difference to four. Seaholm came back to score and stole the ball to get another shot with five seconds remaining.

It bounced off the rim and Lathrup had survived the fourth period, although being outscored, 24-18.

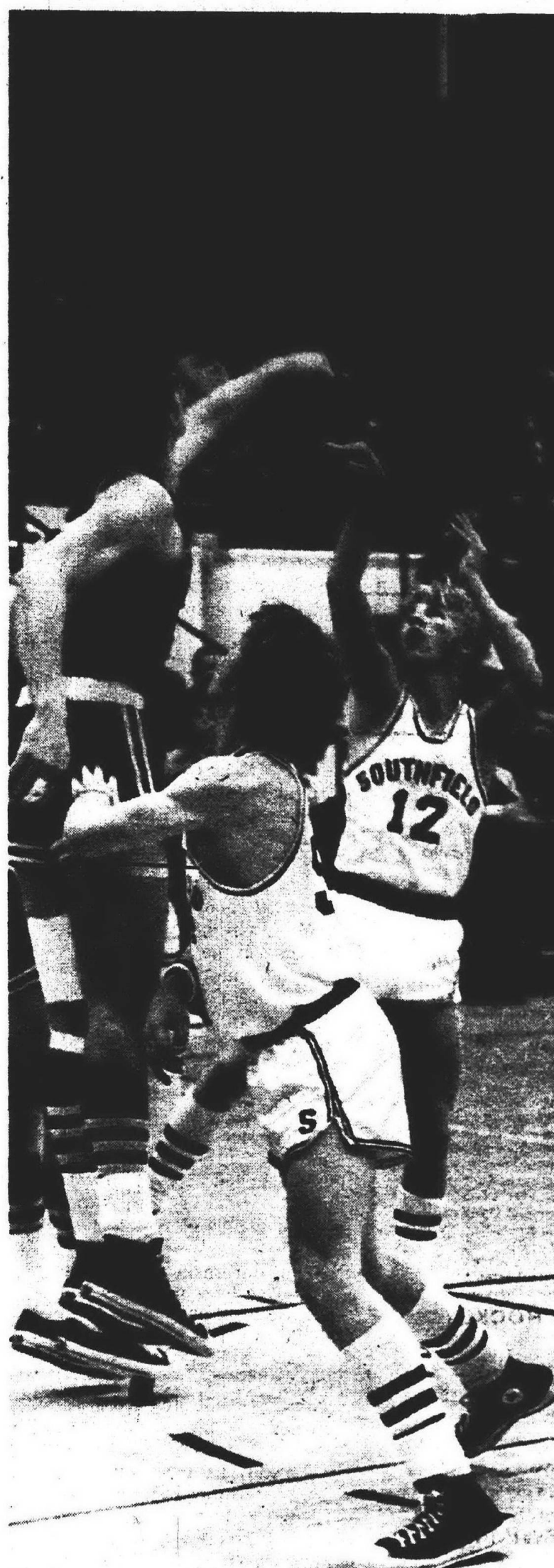

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CPAs COMMENT ON FILING 1972 MICHIGAN INCOME TAX RETURNS

How do the present Michigan income tax laws affect you? The Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants offers the following comments on the filing of your 1972 Michigan income tax return.

Michigan income tax forms and instructions are available at local offices of the Michigan Department of Treasury, post offices, banks and tax return preparers.

Basically, you are required to file a 1972 Michigan income tax return if your Federal adjusted gross income is greater than the amount allowed for personal exemptions. Michigan allows \$1200 for each personal exemption claimed. Because of the low income allowance, some taxpayers will not have to file a Federal return but will have to file a Michigan return.

Returns for the calendar year 1972 will be due on or before April 16, 1973. There are special rules for extensions, non-residents, and persons moving into or out of the state. Expert assistance is recommended in these areas.

The changes you find on this year's return include a tax rate of 3.9 per cent for the calendar year 1972 up from 3.14 per cent for the calendar year 1971.

Starting with 1972, individual taxpayers are entitled to a deduction up to \$50 for contributions to political parties or candidates. This deduction

is to be taken on line 38 under other subtraction. Also on line 38, any winnings from the Michigan State Lottery, to the extent included in Federal adjusted gross income, should be subtracted in determining income subject to Michigan income tax.

This year you must include with your Michigan return a copy of those Federal schedules which show a loss i.e. a business, farm, rental, capital and other types of losses. Also if you claim any adjustments to income on your Federal return, you must include a copy of the Federal form with your Michigan return. Adjustments to income include sick pay, moving expenses, employee business expense and payments by a self-employed person to a retirement fund.

Last year there were 3 1/2 million Michigan income tax returns filed. Ten percent of these returns received additional attention because of the following omissions: unsigned returns, incomplete address, no indication of over-payment was to be refunded or applied to next year's estimated tax payment, and attaching W-2 forms. Be sure your return is complete in all respects to avoid additional processing.

And finally, the Michigan CPAs advise that you are required to notify the Michigan Department of Treasury, within 60 days, of any changes made to your Federal return as a result of an audit or an amended return.

TAX REFUND RECIPIENTS: FILE EARLY

An estimated 40 million taxpayers have special reason this year to file their income tax returns well in advance of the April 16 deadline, according to The Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants.

Most of the 40 million are members of families having only one breadwinner, from whom the withholding rates in 1972 caused more taxes to be withheld than were actually owed. Unless such taxpayers made arrangements with their employers to reduce the withholding, they are likely to have substantial refunds coming. The total amount to be refunded is estimated to be about \$7 billion.

This year, after a lapse of four years, those whose tax situation is uncomplicated can again use the simplified short tax return form 1040A, which can be completed in minutes.

"If a person's income is almost entirely salary or wages and his deductible expenses are so few that he will take the standard deduction," said Robert N. DenBraber, President of The Michigan Association of CPAs, "the taxpayer usually should not have any difficulty in filling out the short form tax return himself."

Even easier than using the short form is filing no return whatever. DenBraber noted that recent changes in the tax law have greatly expanded the number of persons in that category. A \$300 increase this year in the low-income allowance plus the increased personal exemption now exempts single persons earning less than \$2,050 and childless married couples earning less than \$2,800 from filing tax returns. If they have refunds coming, however, they will have to file to collect.

The low-income allowance applies not just to poor people but also to the children of more affluent families. A child earning less than \$2,050 can forget about filing a return. And even if he does file, to collect a refund, he can still be taken as a dependent by a parent who provided more than half of his support.

Persons who held two or more jobs simultaneously during the tax year are likely to have overpaid their Social Security taxes, since each employer was required to withhold 5.2 percent of wages on the first \$9,000 paid. Payments of Social Security taxes over \$468 may be taken as a credit against income taxes owed for the year, the CPAs advise.

U.S. Individual Taxpayers Ask IRS

Q. How can I tell if I'm eligible to use the short form 1040A?

A. Basically, the short form 1040A may be used if all your income was from wages, salaries, tips and not more than \$200 in dividends and \$200 in interest and you do not plan to itemize deductions. If you receive the short form in the mail, it was sent to you based on the return you filed last year. If you did not receive a short form 1040A in the mail and want to use it, a copy may be obtained at any Internal Revenue office and most banks and post offices, or you may use the order blank in the form 1040 package to obtain a copy.

Q. In every taxpayer who is eligible to use the short form 1040A required to do so?

A. No. Use of the short form is optional. If you had sizeable expenses for such items as medical and dental care, interest, taxes, contributions, alimony, child care, etc., it may be to your advantage to itemize deductions. This can only be done on Schedule A of your Form 1040 and not on the short form.

A formula for determining whether or not you should itemize deductions is found in your tax form instructions.

Q. I should receive a refund

when I file my Federal income tax return. Can I still designate it of my tax towards the Presidential Election Campaign Fund?

A. Yes. Every individual (other than a nonresident alien) may participate in the Presidential Election Campaign Fund if he has a tax liability of \$1 or more (\$2 or more for joint return filers). In addition, completion of Form 4875 in your tax forms package to designate the check-off will not change any of the figures on your Form 1040 or 1040A.

Q. Have the filing requirements for older taxpayers been changed?

A. Yes. If you are unmarried and 65 or older, you do not have to file a return unless you have a gross income of \$2,800 or more. For married persons filing a joint return, the filing requirement is \$3,550 if either husband or wife is 65 or older, and \$4,300 if both are 65 or older.

However, if you are self-employed, you must file a return if you had net earnings from self-employment of \$400 or more, regardless of your age.

Q. I'm retired and eligible to receive the retirement income credit. Will the IRS compute it for me?

A. Yes. If you elect to have

the IRS compute your tax and you have a retirement income credit, the IRS will also compute this for you. Just follow the directions in your tax form instructions.

Q. How do I go about ordering free IRS tax publications?

A. Just fill in the order blank on the back of your tax forms package, choosing the form or free publication that you want from the list shown, and send it to the IRS office shown on the package.

Q. Are there any limits on how much you can deduct as a charitable contribution?

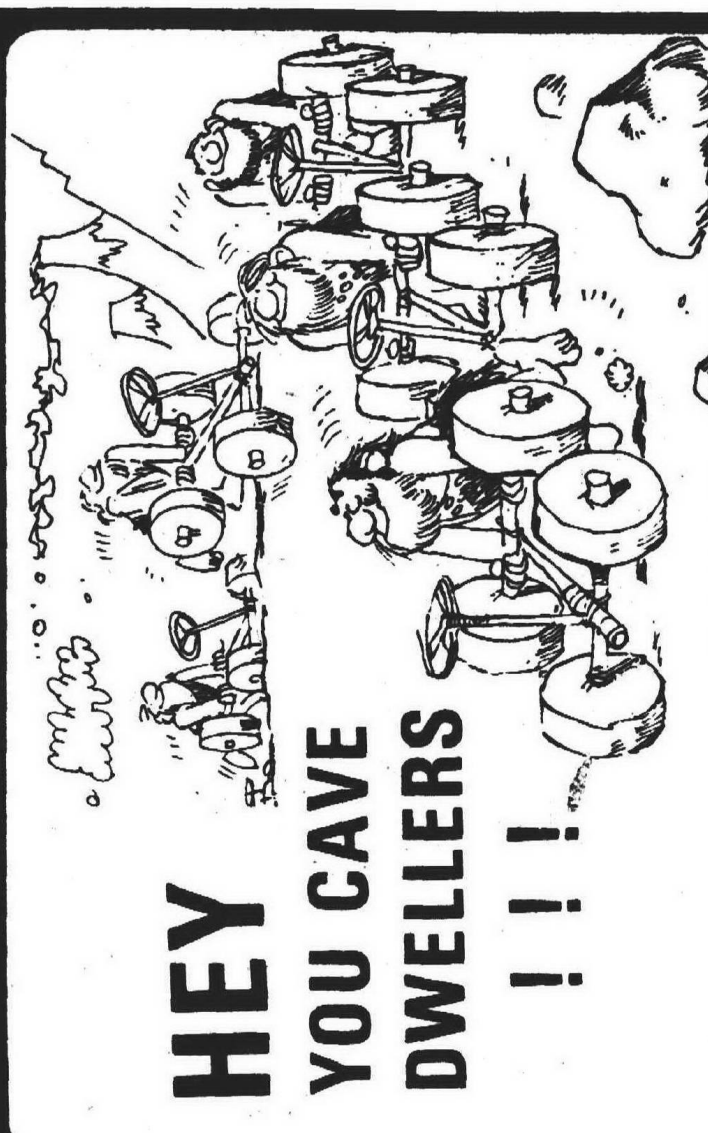
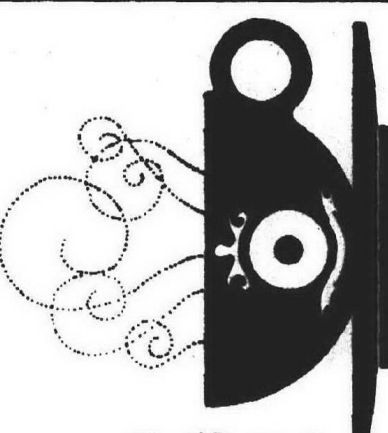
A. Yes. In general, contributions to most charities, such as churches, educational organizations, hospitals, etc., may be deducted up to 50 percent of your adjusted gross income. However, contributions to certain private non-operating foundations, veterans organizations, fraternal societies, and cemetery organizations are limited to 20 percent of adjusted gross income. The organization itself can tell you which of the two categories it falls into.

There are also certain limitations on contributions of property, such as stock. For details, see IRS Publication 528, "Income Tax Deduction for Contributions," available free from your IRS district office.



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Q. I deducted a casualty loss on my 1971 return for damage caused to my house by a hailstorm. This year, my insurance company gave me a greater reimbursement for my loss than I had originally estimated. Is this taxable?

A. Yes. If you receive a larger reimbursement than you estimated you would receive, after you claimed a deduction for the loss, you must include in your income, for the year of recovery, the amount that exceeds the loss you deducted in your tax return. You do not recompute the tax for the year you claimed the deduction.

Q. Does the IRS automatically impose a penalty on a taxpayer who underpays his estimated tax installment?

A. A penalty of 6 percent per year is imposed by law for underpayment of installments of estimated tax except in certain situations. The penalty does not apply if each installment is paid on time and (1) is at least 80 percent (86 2/3 percent for farmers or fishermen) of the amount due on the basis of the tax shown on the return for the taxable year, (2) is at least as much as would have been paid if based on the tax shown on your prior year's return, or (3) is based on a tax computed by using your income for last year and this year's tax rates and exemptions. For additional exceptions in unusual cases see Form 2210, Underpayment of Estimated Income Tax By Individuals, available at your local IRS office. Farmers and fishermen should use Form 2210F.

PITFALLS IN DEDUCTING BUSINESS COSTS

In computing income tax deductions, one area in which there is widespread misunderstanding is the use of business expenses, according to The Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants.

"Many taxpayers," says Robert N. DenBraber, MACPA President, "overlook valid business deductions entirely, while others have an exaggerated idea of what is deductible."

It is not just businessmen who are affected. People in almost any line of work can incur expenses simply to hold their jobs. Among these are dues paid to a union or professional society, subscriptions to technical publications, tools, and uniforms or special work clothes worn only on the job. Such items are usually deductible. The costs of commuting to and from the job are not.

Educational or training courses taken in order to stay abreast of recent developments in one's line or to enhance skills may be deductible, but only if they are needed to retain present salary or employment status. If the course prepares the individual for a new, different job it doesn't qualify.

If the nature of one's work requires an office or other work area in the home, a percentage of household maintenance costs and depreciation may be deductible. The percentage is usually based on the ratio of floor space or number of rooms used for business to the total floor space or number of rooms in the residence.

This ratio applies only if the area is used exclusively for business. If the space is used for business only a part of the time, the deduction must be reduced accordingly.

Deductions for business entertainment are closely watched by the Internal Revenue Service. DenBraber points out. Business lunches with customers or valuable contacts are not as likely to be questioned as are dinner parties, sports events, fishing trips and other forms of entertainment. If there is more than just a meal and conversation, it is necessary that business be discussed before, during, or after the entertainment.

"The presence at such affairs of non-business friends other than wives increases the likelihood that the deduction will be questioned," said DenBraber.

If a taxpayer plans to take a deduction for a trip that was partly for business and partly for pleasure, he must be ready to prove that it was not just a vacation in disguise. Evidence of attendance at meetings or convention sessions or of calls on business contacts must show that most of the time was spent on such activities and not on golf or sightseeing.

All personal deductions for unreimbursed business expenses are likely to be questioned or disallowed if the taxpayer is a principal in a closely-held business firm.

Better Times Just Around the Corner



WHAT INCOME IS AND IS NOT TAXABLE

Is all the income one receives from all sources subject to the same Federal income tax? No, says The Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants. Some types of income are exempt from taxation, while others are taxed at a rate different from that for ordinary income.

The MACPA says the types of income to be included with salary and wages as part of one's adjusted gross income include:

- Tips, bonuses, commissions and incentive payments

- Dividends (except for the first \$100 and except for so-called dividends on insurance policies, which are actually rebates of premiums and not taxable)

- Supplemental payments by one's employer under a guaranteed annual wage plan

- Interest received on bank deposits, loans, etc.

- Casualty or health insurance benefits over the amount of loss or the cost of treating the illness.

- Gambling winnings and prizes won in contests (after subtracting participating losses and the costs of participating in the contests, including the costs of purchasing Michigan lottery tickets; and for this reason unlucky lottery stubs should be saved.)

- Michigan lottery winnings, although subject to Federal Income Tax, are exempt from Michigan State and City income taxes.

Short-term capital gains on invest-

ments sold after being held six months or less.

- One half of long-term capital gains realized on the sale of investments held longer than six months)

- The CPAs say that, with certain exceptions, the types of income that can be excluded from one's adjusted gross income on tax returns include:

- Salary or wages up to \$20,000 earned outside the United States if the taxpayer was a bona fide foreign resident for the entire taxable year.

- Sick pay up to \$100 a week if one's employer has an established wage continuation plan.

- Social Security benefits

- That portion of retirement income resulting from one's own contributions to a pension fund, if the money contributed was taxed before being paid in.

- Food and lodging provided by an employer, if it was for his convenience.

- Unemployment Insurance Act or the program for Federal employees.

- Strike benefits paid by a union under certain conditions.

- Legacies. (Estate taxes are paid by the estate.)

- Gifts or prizes that did not require the recipient's participation or the payment of a fee.

- The Michigan Association of CPAs advises that, because of the many qualifications attached to some of these exclusions, care should be taken in claiming them.

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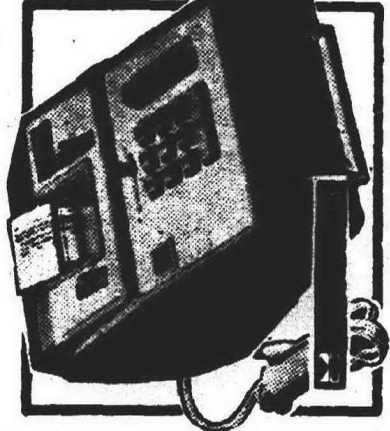
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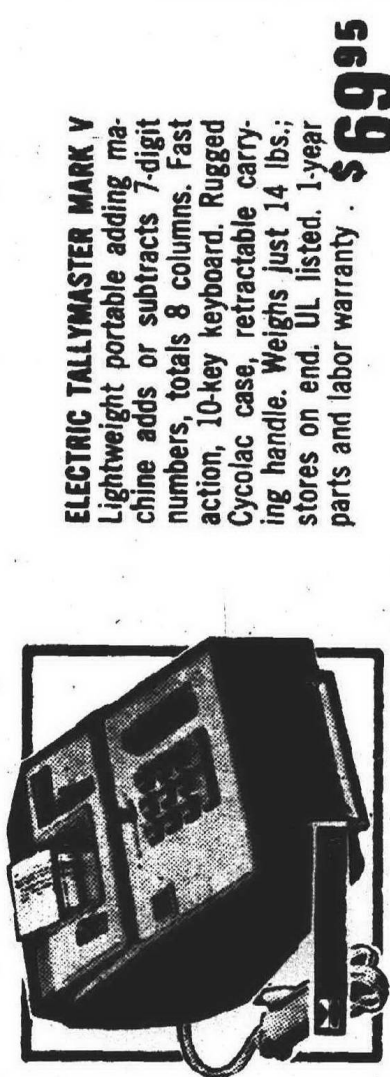
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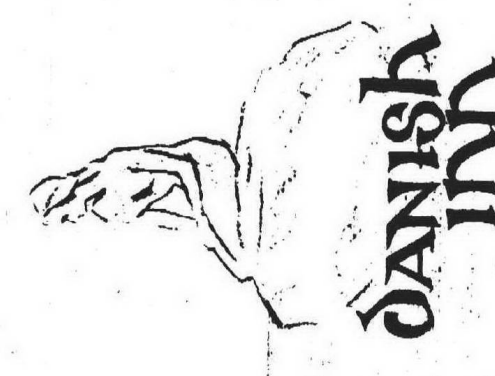
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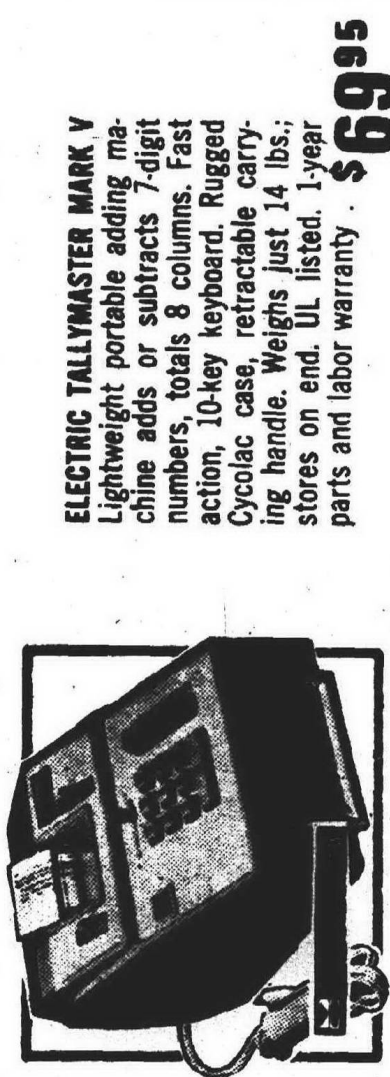
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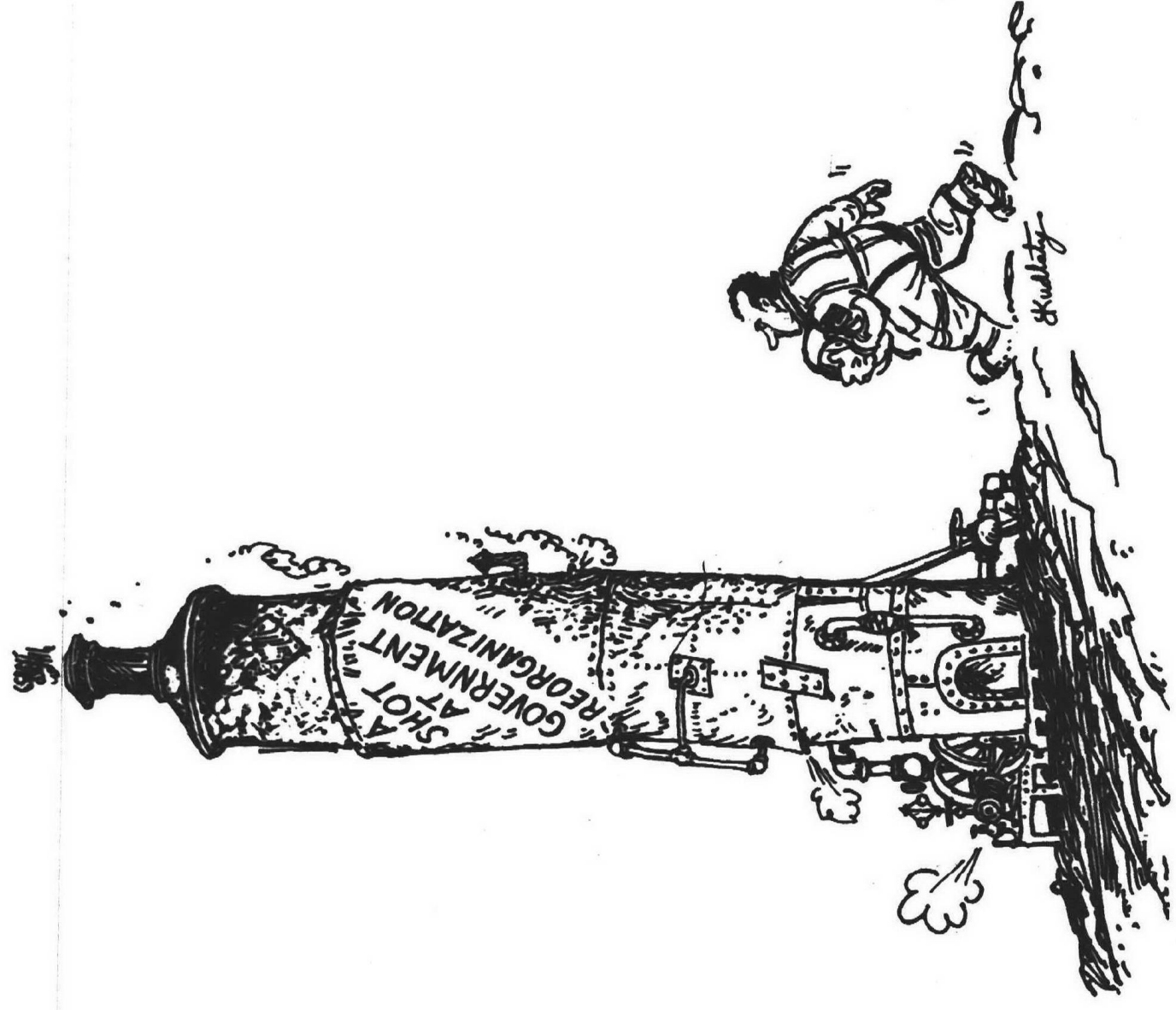
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1972 TAX LAW CHANGES

With the time for filing 1972 federal income tax returns upon us, taxpayers are wondering what tax law changes there have been since last year. The answer provided by The Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants is that the changes aren't numerous, but they are important.

"The one affecting the most people just about everyone ... is the increase in the personal exemption from \$675 to \$750," said Robert N. DenBraber, MACPA President. "This amount may be taken for each dependent, including the taxpayer, himself."

Next in importance in terms of number of taxpayers affected is the liberalization of the standard deduction for those who do not itemize their deductions. Last year one could deduct 13% of adjusted gross income up to a maximum of \$1,500. This year the standard deduction is 15% with a \$2,000 maximum.

A third major innovation, DenBraber noted, is the boost in the low-income allowance, the amount of income on which there is no tax at all. It's up from \$1,050 to \$1,300. By combining this with personal exemptions a family of five can earn up to \$5,050 and incur no tax.

Very important to persons in the high tax brackets is a lowering of the ceiling on income taxes. On earned

income ... as distinguished from interest, dividends, etc. ... the top tax rate is now 50%, down from 60% in 1971.

For working mothers, and fathers whose wives are disabled or no longer in the home, there are new deductions for the costs of having someone take care of children or invalid adult dependents. The new law, applying to fees paid to babysitters, housekeepers who also babysit, and nursery schools, is crammed with qualifications, so expert assistance in this area is recommended.

Another major change, in Internal Revenue Service policy rather than in tax law, severely restricts the deductibility of expenses resulting from ownership of a vacation home that is rented out part of the year. Except for interest and tax payments, deductions for such a home are limited to the amount of rent it brings in, says The Michigan Association of CPAs.

Finally, the MACPA offers a reminder that contributors to political campaigns may now take a tax credit (a reduction of the amount of taxes owed) of one half the amount contributed, up to a maximum of \$12.50 (\$25 on a joint return). Alternatively, they can take a deduction for the full amount contributed, up to \$50 (\$100 on a joint return). Persons in higher tax brackets gain most by taking the deduction, while those with lower incomes do better with the credit.

TAX LAW APPLICATION FOR AGED

Elderly taxpayers enjoy certain breaks under Federal tax laws, but some of the regulations affecting them are rather complicated. The Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants has attempted to clarify the picture.

"Beginning with the most clearcut provisions of the Revenue Act," said Robert N. DenBraber, MACPA President, "benefits under the Social Security and Railroad Retirement Programs are tax exempt. Also, pensioners are not taxed on that portion of their pension benefits resulting from contributions they, themselves, made from previously taxed income." DenBraber pointed out.

Most other pension benefits are taxable, but the tax rates for the elderly, because of their usually reduced incomes, are in most cases low. Each person over 65 gets a double personal exemption, and since the exemption went up to \$750 in 1972, that means \$3,000 in exemptions for a couple above that age. Taken together with the low income allowance, which also went up -- from \$1,050 to \$1,300 -- this means the couple can have an income allowance, which also went up -- from \$1,050 to \$1,300 -- this means the couple can have an income of \$4,300 over and above their Social Security benefits without incurring any tax obligations.

If a person has received pension or annuity benefits that are taxable, the MACPA recommends that he call or write the nearest IRS office to obtain simple forms for reporting them and computing the tax due.

"To avoid having to pay one large tax on pension earnings at the end of the year, it is often possible to arrange with the company making the payments to withhold income tax from the monthly pension check," DenBraber advises.

Retired people who receive little or nothing from Social Security can sometimes save up to a few hundred dollars on the taxes owed on investment income by use of a device called the retirement income credit. For this, qualified guidance is almost indispensable.

For the children of retired people, MACPA reminds us that an unmarried person may qualify for special tax treatment as a "head of household" if he provides more than half the support of dependent relatives. Relatives other than parents have to live in the taxpayer's home, but parents can live elsewhere.

If more than one child supports an elderly parent, yet none provides more than half the support, one of them can still take the parent as a dependent. The others must agree not to claim the exemption that year. In some families the children alternate in taking the exemption, says The Michigan Association of CPAs.
