City Spends Revenue Share, Calls Its Portion 'Inequitable'

"We didn't get enough," the city is going to complain to the federal government about its revenue sharing funds.

The Plymouth City Commission voted unanimously Monday night to file a formal complaint that its revenue sharing portion was "inequitable" compared to the amount Plymouth Township received.

But at the same meeting, the commission voted to channel its first year's share into a capital improvements fund at the request of Planning Commission Chairwoman Mary Childs.

The city commission originally estimated the city's share would be about \$120,000 -- about \$37,000 more than what it got.

Plymouth Township received \$270,000 -- considerably more than officials there had expected.

"IF THE SHARES had been roughly the same, I don't think there'd be any unhappiness," said Kenneth Way, acting city manager.

The question of whether the city's share is equitable arises because of the township's share, Way said.

"We don't have a formula that we can reasonably review to see if we get enough," he explained.

The equation used by the federal government to determine the local shares is complicated, said both Way and Plymouth Township Treasurer Elizabeth Holmes.

Tax effort of the local government is one of the items in the formula that seems to make a lot of difference.

Plymouth city commissioners wondered whether the formula used for Plymouth Township included the school taxes collected there. If this were the case, it could account for the disproportion between the two governments' shares since Plymouth's formula did not include education taxes.

But Mrs. Holmes does not think the education tax collected by the township was included in the tax effort part of the formula.

SHE SAID that an auditor from the federal government went over the township's financial records about six months before the revenue sharing checks came out and that "what he dug out he dug out on his own."

While she, like most local government officials, professed confusion over the formula, she did hypothesize that perhaps the tax effort from the township was high due to the disparity between the allocated one mill for townships and the actual 3.25 mills allocated as a total.

Way said he hoped Plymouth Township wouldn't lose any money but the city had to take "the back door" way to discovering whether it had received its fair share.

"If I was in the city I'd have to say the same thing," Mrs. Holmes said.

After the city commission voted to earmark its federal revenue share for capital improvements, several members of the city planning commission present at the meeting applauded.

'Don't Increase Density,' Insist NW Cantonites

The Northwest Canton Homeowners' Assn. is stepping up its fight against a proposed change in maximum density zoning in its section of Canton Township.

The homeowners are battling a proposal that would increase the maximum density allowed in their area.

"Our main concern is that if you get too large a population in the community too fast, services lag," said Mrs. Jane Francoeur, secretary of the association.

"The prime (service) we're concerned with is education," she said.

Mrs. Francoeur, of 7872 Thornwood, Nadia Marks, of 50830 Murray Hill, and Martha Miller, of 51137 Topper Drive, who are members of the homeowners' group, also said that roads, police and fire protection and health facilities are services which lag behind rapid population growth.

THE WOMEN said that if schools were built quickly now to accommodate a large increase in elementary school population, there would be a surplus of school rooms later.

"What happens is, you build schools for the little children

and then they grow up," Mrs. Francoeur said.

"I wish there was a law against this," Mrs. Marks said.

They said that also contributing to the problem was that Canton Township was allowing too high a proportion of multiples to single-family residences.

While most communities have about 35 per cent multiples, they said, Canton is nearing 55 per cent.

Mrs. Francoeur also said another consideration in higher density building was the ecology.

"The earth has to breathe and we're just building on it," she said.

"POLICE PROTECTION is another consideration," Mrs. Miller said. "There's one police car (assigned) here from the sheriff's department."

She said she felt that wasn't sufficient.

The fire protection in the township is another concern of the association, they said.

"If one of our houses should burn, it would burn down," Mrs. Miller said.

They said their association has been sincere in trying to block the increased density of the area and that they had not intended anything political about their activities.

"We've never wanted to be political but it's turning that way because when we go down to township meetings no one listens," Mrs. Francoeur says.

"We are not friends or guests (at the meeting) as we should be treated; we're enemies," she added.

"WHERE IS the human voice of the resident homeowner going to be heard and listened to?" Mrs. Marks asked.

"Let's see Canton Township start listening to us and not developers," she said.

"The area should be kept for people who want to get out in a rural area," Mrs. Miller said.

"We're not being snobbish."

"We're trying to preserve what's left of Wayne County," Mrs. Francoeur said.

"We feel these developers are coming in, making a mint

off what will be our sorrow," Mrs. Miller added.

They said it was because Canton Township officials were not listening to their viewpoint that their association had nominated its president, Robert Greenstein, for the vacancy on the Canton Township Board of Trustees.

From (Township Supervisor Phil) Dingledey's statements we can see that he is violently opposed to Greenstein's nomination," a release from the homeowners' association said.

GREENSTEIN HAS also been backed by the Windsor Park and Holiday Park homeowners' groups.

The Northwest Canton Homeowners' release also says Dingledey's and Planning Commission Chairman George Lawton's views on the need for expanding the tax base are "archaic" and that their viewpoint "ought to be placed next to a woolly Mammoth in a museum."

"Should rezoning in northwest Canton for substantially higher density be approved by the township board, the associations will institute immediate recall proceedings of every trustee who voted in favor of rezoning, as well as a referendum seeking a moratorium on building and rezoning," the release concluded.

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Rossman Off School Payroll

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At a special meeting Saturday morning, the Plymouth School Board voted unanimously that Rossman's acceptance of a position as assistant superintendent for the West Bloomfield School District "breaches (his) agreements with this district."

Rossman had sent a letter to the Plymouth board asking that he be released from the full-time duties of consultant which he has been performing to fill out the remainder of his Plymouth superintendent contract.

HE ASKED the Plymouth board to make its decision before Feb. 1 when he was to start in West Bloomfield. Rossman also said that if a decision were not reached by that time he would begin accrued vacation.

The letter to Rossman approved by the Plymouth board Saturday, said his request of Jan. 23 was received "too late to act upon it prior to Feb. 1. It was presented to us on Jan. 23 and was acted upon at our next meeting (Saturday)."

The letter to Rossman further said, "Be advised that any loss of retirement benefits or income incurred by you as a result of this change in position must be borne by yourself.

"YOUR CLAIMED damage to reputation or career as a result of litigation instituted by yourself, in light of the mentioned new employment, appears to this board to be without merit," the letter concluded.

Rossman has filed a \$1 million damage suit against the school district and the four school board members who voted to fire him.

Although he had no comment Monday except to say he had not received the school board's letter, Rossman did say he has not dropped the suit.

City Raises Liquor License Maximum

The Plymouth City Commission voted Monday night to increase the number of tabletop liquor licenses available in the city by one.

Following a proposal made by R. Terry Cuson to put a restaurant in the Consumers Discount building at 555 Forest and a request by him for a Class C (liquor by the glass) license, the commission voted to increase the number of licenses to six.

According to the 1970 census figures, state law would allow eight licenses in the city.

While Cuson was not officially recommended for a license Monday night, the commission gave him a tentative approval of his idea subject to working out some details -- particularly parking.

In 1966 when liquor by the glass was passed in Plymouth for the first time, the city commission said there would be a limit of three licenses in the city.

Four years later the commission set the limit at five.

Reserves Produce Youth Film

A new slide presentation made for area schools and youth groups has been announced by Major Gen. John L. Boros, commanding general of the 70th Division (Training), 34451 Schoolcraft Road, Livonia.

"To a young person unsure of his future a job that teaches a marketable skill in a brief period and also offers a good salary with benefits is ideal," said General Boros. "This presentation lists some of these opportunities and explains the 70th Division's training program."

The Livonia headquarters is one of five centers in Michigan and seven in Indiana that teach young men to conduct basic combat training in the event of a national emergency. Monthly weekend drills prepare the Reservists for two weeks of annual training at a U.S. Army Basic Training Center where 70th Division personnel actually assume the responsibility of training raw recruits. "But not everyone here is a drill sergeant," explained General Boros. "Lawyers, engineers, journalists, teachers, and many other skilled tradesmen serve in the Army by utilizing their civilian talents."

Community and charity projects undertaken by the 70th Division are also discussed in the program. Continued General Boros, "We've sent men to help build a park in Farmington Township, conduct athletic activities at a youth home in Pontiac, and do maintenance work at a Scout camp in Metamora. Projects like these are just part of the new Army."

The 30-minute presentation is produced by 2nd Lt. Don Vaquera, Detroit, a graduate of Eastern Michigan University, and is available to any interested school or youth group.

Voc-Tech Center To Host Public

An educational showplace, the Southwest Oakland Vocational Education Center, will salute National Vocational Education Week, with an open-house on Sunday, Feb. 18, from 1-4 p.m. at the school, 1000 Beck Road, Walled Lake.

The public may inspect the \$2 million school which opened in September 1971 to junior and senior students from public, private and parochial schools in seven school districts.

Administered by the Walled Lake Consolidated School District, the center is one of the four in Oakland County designed to provide students with a salable skill whether they go immediately into full time jobs or continue their college education and work part-time. The Center is funded with state, county and federal funds.

Among participating schools are: Clarenceville, Farmington, Harrison, North Farmington, and Our Lady of Mercy High School in Farmington.

Students attend regular high school classes for half a day and spend the other half day at the Vocational Center.

Refreshments made by the food service classes will be served. Demonstrations of work in the various fields will be held in each classroom.

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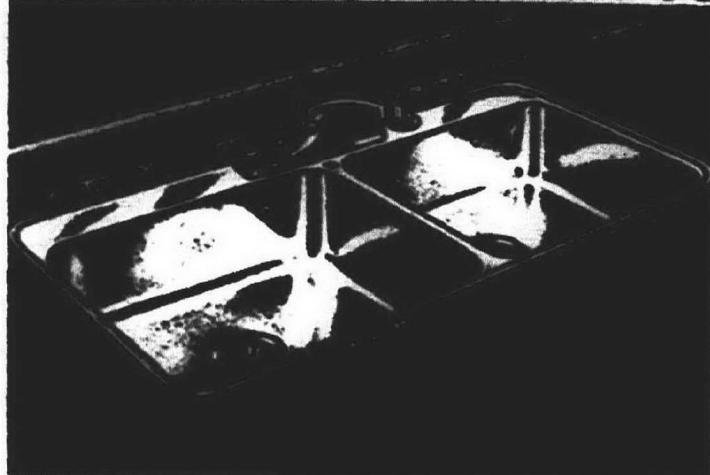
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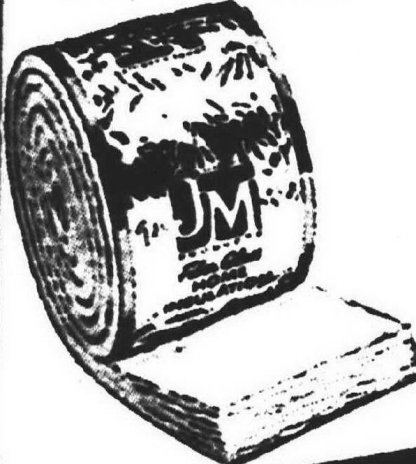
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Family 'Adopts' Korean

they likely ever to meet her.

The little girl is an eight-year-old, fatherless Korean named Kim Mi Sook. The Aldrichs, of 39678 Edmunton Drive, "adopted" her into their family through the Foster Parents Plan.

The \$16-per-month which the Plymouth family sends tops by five dollars the Kim family's monthly income earned by Mi Sook's 15-year-old sister, Young Sook.

The mother is disabled as a result of polio contracted at the age of five. The father died in March, 1971.

Young Sook works at manual labor, just as her father had to do because of lack of education. Her \$11 monthly wage ekes out a bare living.

BUT MI SOOK looks ahead hopefully to becoming a teacher.

She will begin her third year of primary school in March. Despite a lifetime of poverty and slum misery, the little girl is described by a Foster Parents spokesman as "lively, happy, healthy and with the ability to win friends easily."

She has an older brother, Hong Jae, 12, and a one-year-old brother, Myung Jae. Hong Jae is in sixth grade. The family lives in a single room, cement block dwelling in Kyong-gi province. Electricity is available and a public supply system furnishes water.

The Plymouth family's contribution helps provide the entire family with medical and dental care along with a monthly cash grant. It also allows for the sustained guidance and counseling of social workers, distributions of useful goods and the aid of special educational programs.

Despite the distance between them, the foster parents and Mi Sook keep in touch with monthly letters, translated by the organization. Foster parents also receive a photograph, case history of their "adopted" child and annual progress reports.

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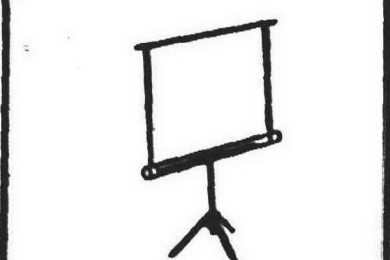
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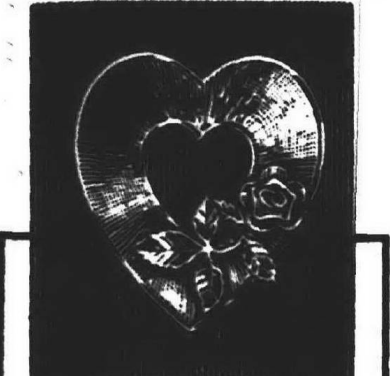

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How Business Boosts Canton Twp. Identity

It Canton Township is to get its own identity, business and industry must play a role.

That, says Don Korte, president of the Canton Township Chamber of Commerce and a Canton Township trustee, is important to see that the growing community has a proper balance.

"Like any other unit of government around, there has to be a balance (between homes, business and industry) so that people can get the services they need," Korte said.

The very formation of Canton's own Chamber of Commerce last fall was a step toward Canton identity, Korte thinks.

One of the five goals established by the Canton chamber at its organizational meeting on Oct. 19 was "Canton identity."

PRESENTLY, most of the new families in the northern end of Canton are dependent on Plymouth and Plymouth Township stores for the majority of their shopping needs.

This is one of the factors that has stifled Canton's independence and identity, say many Cantonites who feel their community is too closely associated with Plymouth. But that will change eventually, Korte says.

"Business identity (in Canton) is starting to take effect," he said.

Following the rapid residential development which the community is seeing now, particularly in the North, will be more business development, Korte explained.

"Most people don't really appreciate how important it is to come up with a balance of residential and business development."

THE CHAMBER president said the business sector of a community helps bear the taxpayers' cost of funding governmental services like schools, fire and police protection, roads, sewer and water and health services. "How do you fund these important things?"

Part of Canton's business picture is the change from the agriculturally related businesses which were predominant several years ago here, to "service" businesses like convenience stores and gas stations which spring up around developments.

"Because of the ideal location of Canton Township," Korte said, "the agricultural aspect eventually will practically phase out of the picture."

"The area is too valuable," he said.

A farmer himself, Korte added that much of the reduction in Canton farm acreage is not unique to this area but is in part related to greater efficiency of the American farmer.

"Efficiency on a farm is so great today that the acreage we're losing is of no significance," he said.

And so, it is mainly farm land that lends its cleared, mildly rolling acres to developments in Canton. Following close behind these developments are the service type stores.

One shopping and residential development, proposed for the old farm land at Joy and Sheldon roads, has met with opposition from nearby homeowners.

Korte said that this kind of business development is necessary to a township.

"I really think if we're going to be responsible people within the township, we're going to have to see that Canton gets its own business base," he said.

Korte added that many of the persons opposing the shopping project would be the first ones to patronize it or apply for a job there.

But it is not this type of business development that centers are necessary at a proper location to serve the people," he said, "but I don't think you want too many of them."

IT IS THE service industry - packaging, research, delivery, warehousing - that he feels will eventually find Canton attractive because of its location near the airports, an expressway and rail transportation.

Areas along Michigan Avenue and near Mettetal Airport are examples of ideal locations for service and research industries, Korte said.

The Canton chamber has begun a land inventory of all available parcels to use in attracting industrial development and this will be used to provide ideas to prospective companies, the chamber president said.

This type of development, Korte feels, will contribute to the community by providing employment as well as a better tax base.

And that is another factor in helping the township gain its identity, he says.

If Canton Township is to stand on its own, "business would be uppermost and it's coming along at this point."

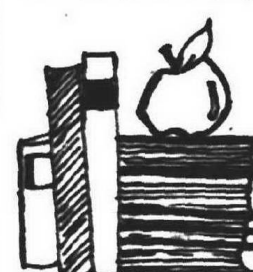

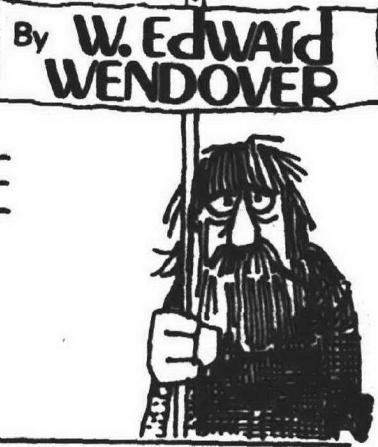
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WITH ALICE TOWARD NONE

"There were some flames running along the rafters of the second floor but we were able to bring it under control."

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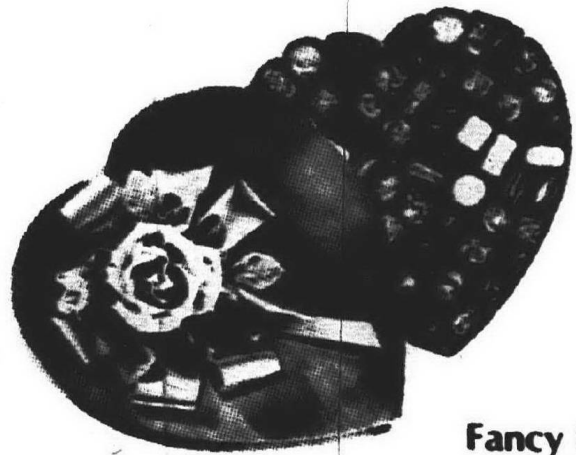
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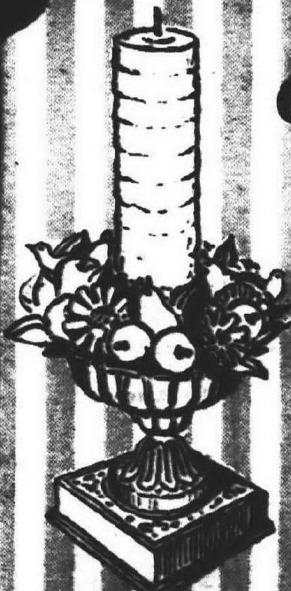
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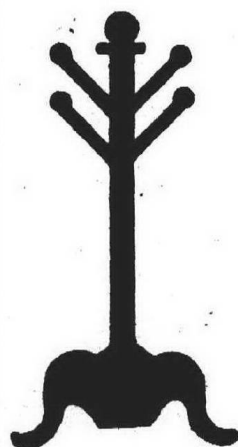
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GC East Upends Franklin, 68-56

Garden City East basketball Coach Billy Joe Young might give some thought to changing his team's home court over to Franklin High.

This Panthers just don't lose at Franklin.

East made it 17 victories in the last 20 appearances in the Franklin gym in a hustling 68-56 triumph over the defending Northwest Suburban champions.

The previous appearance before this on the Franklin court saw East topple Detroit

Northwestern in last season's regional championship.

THIS WIN toppled Franklin out of the No. 1 slot in the Northwest.

working the ball in for the good shot and East was taking advantage of every Patriot turnover.

EAST OUTSCORED Franklin, 25-12, in the third. But the battle was far from over.

In the first 30 seconds of the fourth quarter, Franklin narrowed the margin from 15 to 10. Kaseta made good a three-point play and Jeff Waterstone stole a pass and scored on a breakaway.

Young called a time-out with his Panthers leading 48-38.

Franklin came right out and hit two more buckets to make it 48-42, and Young called for another time out. His Panthers had been outscored 9-0 in two minutes.

"I had to get Grigal back into the game," said Young, who had his leading scorer on the bench with foul trouble. "He's our key to breaking the press. After I put him back in, their press worked to our advantage."

KASETA SCORED on a steal and the margin had sliced to 48-44. Franklin scoring 11 straight points.

Grigal finally broke the ice for East but Kaseta came back with another field goal, Soya then came through with a three-point play for East and the Patriots started having their troubles at the free-throw line and Young couldn't have had a bigger smile on the East bench.

Franklin outscored East, 23-20, in that final period, but East outscored Franklin, 20-12, in the last 5½ minutes.

EAST HIT 26 of 63 from the floor for 41 per cent and Franklin shot 37 per cent on 22 of 59.

"We can't afford to lose another," said Young with hopes of still capturing a share of the Northwest crown.

Plymouth Wallops Hot-Tempered RU

Hot shooting wins basketball games; hot tempers do not.

That's a fact of life which Redford Union has been mulling over all week since Plymouth blew the Panthers off the court, 87-67, behind the record-breaking scoring of senior forward Tim Van Wagoner.

Van Wagoner's 39-point spree for an all-time Plymouth record is a statistic the Rocks will savor far longer than RU will want to recall its figures of frustration in a game which at best makes the Panthers a long shot to repeat as Suburban Eight champions.

Displaying rare lack of poise, the Panthers drew five technical fouls and two of their team were ejected by officials.

AS A UNIT, Plymouth put together the kind of performance Coach Fred Thomann has been seeking all season. Shooting 46 per cent from the floor, hitting on 21 of 29 free throws and building a steadily increasing lead, the Rocks drew from Thomann the praise, "This had to be our best."

In turn, Coach Carl Andrews of RU looked at the Panthers' 35 shooting mark and called it the team's most showing of the campaign.

"You can't win many games shooting like that," said Andrews, whose team now is 12-2 overall and 7-2 in the Sub-8 behind pace-setting Allen Park's 8-0. "The technicals alone cost us heavily, but besides that—the ball just wasn't going in the hole."

Van Wagoner's bombing was instrumental in carrying the Rocks to 16-15, 39-34 and 60-50 leads after the first, second and third periods respectively.

GARY FULKS, who had been the key man in RU's earlier 64-60 win over Plymouth, was good for 11 first half Panther points and it was not until three minutes into the third quarter that the Rocks could open appreciable daylight.

A seven-point spurge by Van Wagoner and Ron Egloff boosted Plymouth from a slim 43-41 edge to a 50-41 margin and what already had been a highly physical contest grew even more so.

The battle under the boards between Egloff and RU's Jerry Petsch was intense all evening. Eventually Egloff was one of two Rocks who fouled out, Steve Robb being the other.

Petsch, Curt Montney and Glen Richmond brought RU within nine points at 66-57 midway in the final period, but

two quick buckets by Egloff shot it to 70-57 and the fireworks were under way.

Fulks was banished after a flareup with Plymouth's Rick Neu and Richmond got the thumb soon after.

Meanwhile, the 6-3 Van Wagoner kept popping away to hit on 13 of his 23 field goal attempts besides canning 13 of 19 free throws as he drew foul after foul. His total of 39 broke Plymouth's one-game record of 30 set by Chuck Callett in 1965.

AFTER ECLIPSING that mark with a rebound early in the final period, Van Wagoner's last seven points all came on free throws.

In fact, 13 of Plymouth's final 17 points in the last three minutes came at the charity line as fouls proved utterly disastrous to the frustrated Panthers for whom the victory had been a "must."

The Rocks are now 5-4 in the Sub-8 and 10-4 for the season and will be at Dearborn Friday while Redford has a home date with Edsel Ford.

In that one, the Panthers may be keeping one eye on Allen Park where Bentley will be trying for the upset RU desperately needs to get back in the title chase. Redford will have its own crack at home against the Parkers next Tuesday.

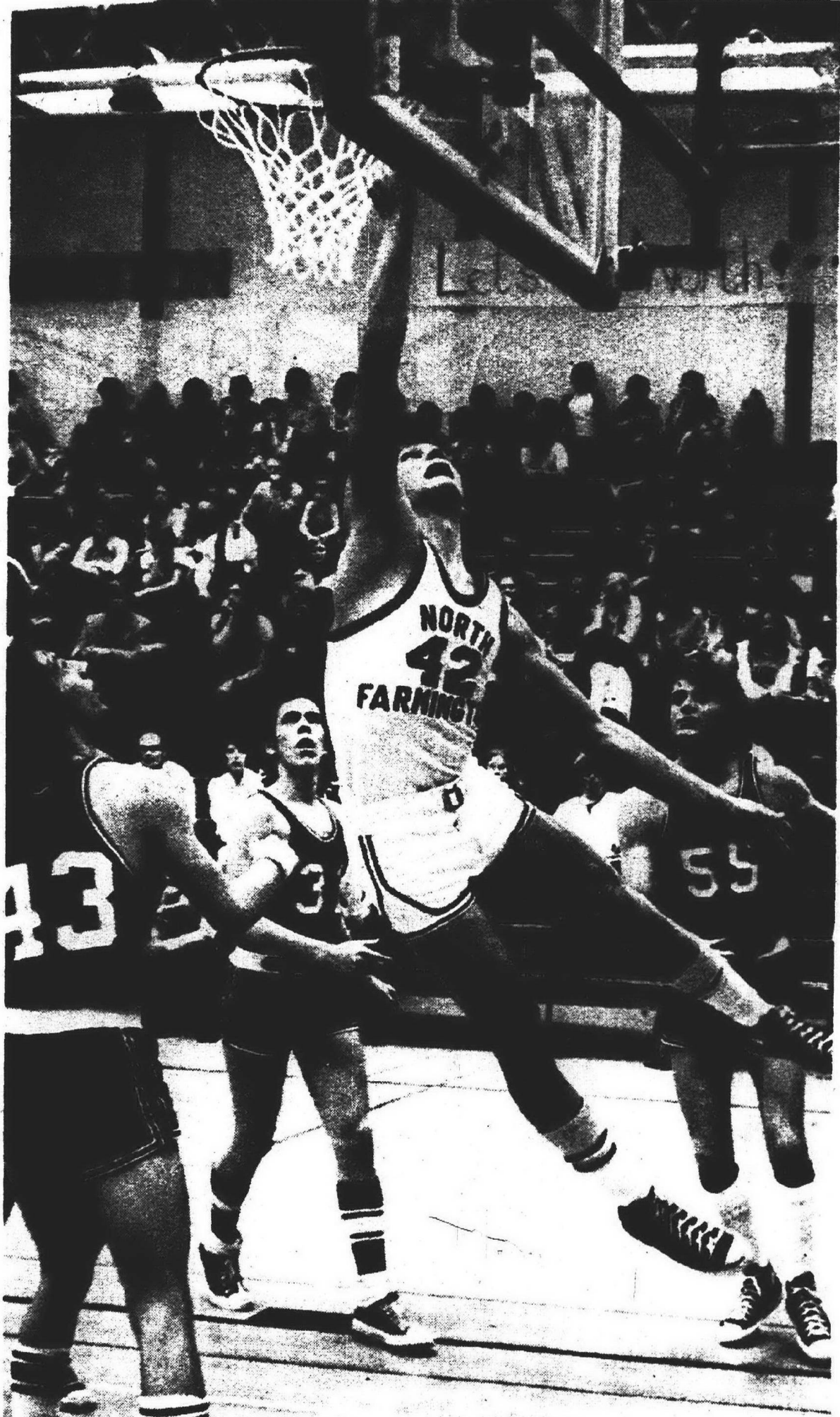

For every bit of darkness there's little bit of light. Innsbruck was chosen as the site of the 1976 Winter Olympics. It may very well be the last winter games because of the controversy on commercialism but I can't think of a better setting. I landed in Innsbruck a week after the 1964 games. You couldn't find friendlier people. The city is surrounded by mountains and skiers take the streetcar to the lifts at the end of town.

I can't say I was sorry to see our bid turned down. Twenty years from now the demise of the winter games will be blamed on the U.S. You can bet we'll be apologizing for a long time. The world may be beginning to realize we're not the "fat cats" they thought we were. On to Innsbruck!

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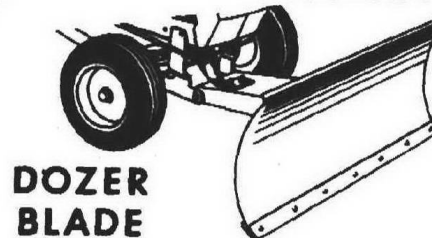

17 Seconds Left—Spartans Tie Bentley, 5-5

Chalk up two points in the win column for area preps in the first year Suburban Hockey League.

Then split the two points, giving Stevenson High one and Bentley High one. That's what the two earned 10 times over when they met in a crucial clash in the Suburban stand-ins.

An on coming Bentley Bulldog crew coached by Mike Dudley was more than ready to take on undefeated Stevenson coached by Gerry Goode. Bentley sported a 4-3-1 league mark and the Spartans a 7-0 record.

Since returning to full strength for the first time this season, Bentley has beaten Southfield Lathrup, 10-0; Wyandotte, 14-2; tied Churchill, 5-5; lost to Trenton, 7-2; toppled Franklin, 8-2, and crushed Lathrup again, 15-3.

Next followed the matching of talent with Stevenson.

THE SPARTANS spurred to a 1-0 first period edge and led after two stanzas, 4-2.

Bentley overcame the two goal deficit and captured a 5-4 lead with 1:54 remaining.

But Stevenson rebounded on a six on two break with Dale Marczak scoring at the 14:43 mark only 17 seconds remained and the Suburban clash ended in a 5-5 deadlock.

"This is the fourth time this season that Marczak has scored for us in that last minute of play," said Goode after pulling out all strings to salvage a tie.

THE STANDOFF enabled Stevenson to maintain its first place margin of two points over Churchill and five over Bentley.

Bentley's Mark Reid and Stevenson's Van Vermesch turned in brilliant performances under constant pressure before a crowd of 1,300 at Ford Ice Rink, with Bentley outshooting Stevenson, 34-29.

The lone score in the first period came at the 7:55 mark.

Stevenson was playing a man short with Don Finn off for interference.

BENTLEY was breaking in for a power-play shot but Stevenson's center, Steve Hillman, intercepted a pass across center ice. He skated in on Reid all alone and let go a shot 15 feet out and the Spartans were first on the scoreboard.

Bentley's Bob McCann was in the penalty box when Stevenson scored its second goal at 8:57 of the second period on a shot by Kurt Geiger, Finn assisting.

Finn made it 3-0 Stevenson 38 seconds later, and the Bulldogs had their work cut out.

"I KNEW we had to change to Stevenson's style of hockey," said Dudley. "We had to go out and fore-check and back-check like we had never done before."

"I told the kids that we had to skate toe-to-toe with Stevenson if we were to do anything," added Dudley.

At the 5:07 mark in the second stanza, Stevenson's Hillman was called for roughing and the Bulldogs scored 43 seconds later, Bob Wasilewski from Jeff Munson.

The Bulldogs got the best of Vermesch 25 seconds later, Steve Marlowe slapping it in. Stevenson's Geiger then picked up a two-minute infraction for hooking but the Bulldogs were caught deep in the Spartan zone and Brian VanNorman made it 4-2 Stevenson at the 9:15 mark.

BENTLEY came out in the third period, took one glance at the scoreboard and knew what it had to do.

With 2:33 elapsed in the third, Dave Ward made it 4-3 and at 7:40, with Stevenson's Dan Morrell off for slashing, Munson tied it up at four-all. It was anyone's game.

WITH 1:54 remaining, Greg McKernan slipped one under Vermesch's pads and for the first time the Bulldogs were in the lead, 5-4.

That goal came only three seconds after Bentley's Dave Ward went to the penalty box for slashing.

Twenty seconds later, Paul Roshirt of Bentley was called for tripping and the Bulldogs had the lead but now had two men in the penalty box, 1:37 remaining.

The Bulldog defense came to arms and Reid was kicking

away shots like he owned them.

With 29 seconds showing on the clock, Bentley's workhorse, Bob Wasilewski, picked up a loose puck in his zone, skated across the blue line and without looking just cleared it into Stevenson territory to eat up the clock. If he had looked he would have seen an empty Spartan net.

GOODE had pulled Vermesch for a sixth attacker and Wasilewski had a clear shot and didn't see it.

Marczak picked up the puck behind his net for Stevenson and this was it for the Spartans, with the clock showing 20 seconds. At that time, Munson broke his stick for Bentley and retreated to the Bulldog bench to be relieved.

"I thought he was just coming over to get a new stick," said Dudley. "Nobody replaced him."

So with two Bulldogs in the penalty box and one on the bench, Marczak led a six on two charge. He carried it right into the Bentley net with a quick backhand from five feet out, and it was five-all with only 17 seconds left.

Reid realized he had been only 17 seconds away from upsetting Stevenson, slammed his stick into the boards and just stood alone in front of the Bentley net while the entire Spartan squad swarmed Marczak.

THE FINAL buzzer sounded a few moments later and both teams shook hands, Stevenson realizing it just did salvage a tie and Bentley knowing it scored a well earned point.

Dudley's smile had disappointment written in it but he knows he plays Stevenson one more time and then comes the George Gee Tournament.

Turf Tips, Quips

Although business was a bit slow during the first three nights of opening week, Northville Downs crowds and wagers picked up in the final three programs. The result, after a big weekend, was a handle of \$441,942 Saturday with a crowd of 5,563 in the stands.

That was the second largest attendance for the mid-winter campaign at the 'Downs in two years, falling short of the 5,908 on March 11 of 1972.

The wagering was the best in three years of winter racing, bettering the previous high of \$423,426 on the same March 11.

Of course, one has to remember that Jackson-at-Northville closed its January campaign a week earlier with an all-time high handle of \$463,000 and a nightly average of \$302,000 for the 24 nights.

THE TURNTABLE count for the first weekend at the 'Downs was 9,294 and betting climbed to \$760,097. Wagering fell short of the winter weekend record of last year on March 10 and 11 when figures soared to \$801,495.

"We are pleased with the business for the opening week," said Mutuel Manager Lou Carlo. "But for the unexplained dips on Tuesday and Wednesday, it could have been the best six nights for a winter meeting."

"If the weatherman continues to smile and give us more of the perfect conditions of the first week, then we believe we are headed for our best winter season."

As it turned out, Bedford Jet, the six-year-old star of the Ed Weber stable of West Bloomfield, demonstrated why he's considered the best pacer at the track by winning his third straight preferred event.

Bedford Jet, who seems to reach top form during the winter, took over the lead after a quarter and stayed in front for the remainder of the mile.

Erlanas Valley, surprise winner of the \$10,000 finale of the Jackson-at-Northville late closing pacing series, pressed The Jet in the final half-mile but actually never was that close.

Gordon Norris had Bedford Jet flying in the final quarter and the aged pacer hit the

wire a length and a half in front in 2:06.4, fastest mile of the evening over a slow, cuppy racing strip.

TOM SMITH, who served as racing secretary for the long Jackson season that stretched over a six-month period, had visions of taking life a bit easy once the Northville Downs meeting opened. He was slated to be assistant to Harry Peterson, veteran racing chief of the 'Downs.

But that all changed a few days before the Northville opener when Peterson notified Executive Director John Carlo that he would be late in reporting. So Tom had the task of making up condition books for the first two weeks and filling the races for opening week.

Latest reports from Florida, where Peterson is busy with his real estate business, is that "Pete" may not be available for the entire 39 nights. Seems like real estate is booming in the sunny south and it could be that Peterson may decide to give up his racing assignments and stay in Florida year around.

In the meantime, Tom has drawn up condition books for all but the final two weeks.

NEW HONORS have been given Richard S. Wilson, vice president in charge of racing operations for Castleton Industries Inc. and vice president and general manager of Wolverine Raceway and the Detroit Racing Assn.

Wilson was elected treasurer of Harness Tracks of America at the annual convention in San Francisco last week. At the same session, HTA accepted Pompano Park as a new member and renamed Donald MacFarlane, president of Hazel Park harness racing, general counsel and chairman of the board.

Pompano Park is Castleton's harness racing track in Florida and the most plush plant operated by the company headed by Frederick Van Lennep, who also is president of Wolverine Raceway.

Wilson, who has been busy at Pompano Park for the past month, is expected to return to Michigan this week to start making preparations for the Wolverine meeting. The 82-

night session opens in mid-March.

FROM HAZEL PARK comes word that Track Supt. Ken Marshall has completed the task of installing a new racing strip for the runners and the standardbreds.

It was a joint effort on the part of the Hazel Park Racing Assn. and Hazel Park Raceway, aimed at giving the plant the fastest five-eighths mile track in the mid-west.

A 10-man crew from the Charles Rogers Construction Co. ripped out the old racing strip and installed a much improved surface that will serve in all types of weather. The old surface consisted of eight inches of float stone, then a 10-inch layer of clay and a five-inch layer of limestone dust.

The new surface, according to Marshall, will consist of the float stone, then a seven-inch layer of limestone, which will compact to six inches, and a five-inch layer of limestone dust and clay.

The job required 30,000 tons of limestone, limestone dust and clay.

TRACK SUPT. Jim McPhee, of the Detroit Race Course, will start work on a new racing strip within another week. With the start of Wolverine Raceway's harness season less than seven weeks away, McPhee plans to have his crew busy correcting the troubles that cropped up in the thoroughbred meeting last fall.

McPhee has been given the go-ahead sign from Vice President and General Manager Dick Wilson to make all improvements necessary. The track was full of holes during the thoroughbred season and McPhee must eliminate the holes and get the big mile track in top shape for the lengthy trotting meeting.

Considering the miserable weather conditions of last spring, the Wolverine track was considered one of the best in the midwest with more than 25 miles in 2:00 or less.

But the situation changed during the fall and early winter thoroughbred campaign when rain, snow, sleet and generally the worse conditions in several years caused the track to break up.

McPhee vows that all will be corrected well in advance of the return of the pacers and trotters.

Subfloor Is Important

A resilient floor will stay smooth and even only if the subfloor beneath it is smooth and even. That's because it is a thermoplastic material, semiflexible, and it will eventually conform to the shape of whatever is under it.

Thus, vinyl asbestos tile laid over an uneven wood floor or rough concrete will in time mirror imperfections in the subfloor. But there are remedies. You can install plywood or underlayment hardboard if the floor is in poor condition.

Bad concrete presents a different problem. Cracks, holes and depressions can be filled in with latex patching compound. A drum sander will remove minor imperfections, but be sure to rinse the floor thoroughly and let it dry completely before beginning the tile installation.

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Choice Of Builder Is First Important Step

A key factor in building a home successfully is choosing a good builder, advises the American Wood Council.

A good way to gauge a builder's quality is to check with a local builders association affiliated with the National Association of Home Builders. The local group can be found in the phone book.

When you work with a member of this builders' association you can be sure you're dealing with a professional businessman.

Also you can ask your mortgage lending institution to evaluate the builder you have in mind. The lender has about as much at stake as you do and he'll advise you about the builder's reliability and reputation.

Another good source to consult is your attorney, who

can easily check the builder's credentials.

DON'T BE AFRAID to ask the builder before you build if he has a special "callback" policy to correct a problem or deficiency in a house.

Any new house will probably have a few minor problems and a reliable builder should correct such things even after his customers have moved in.

One of the best ways to check out a builder is to ask him for the names of three or four local families he has built homes for. Ask them if they are happy with their homes.

The American Wood Council stresses the importance of using your own judgment in evaluating a builder. Look carefully at both the materials he uses and the quality of construction.

Notice where he locates the

house on the lot and whether he built around existing trees - these factors indicate his concern for the quality of living he provides.

The builder who creates something extra in design and materials, whose model homes are both well-furnished and well-landscaped will probably give you the most value for your money.

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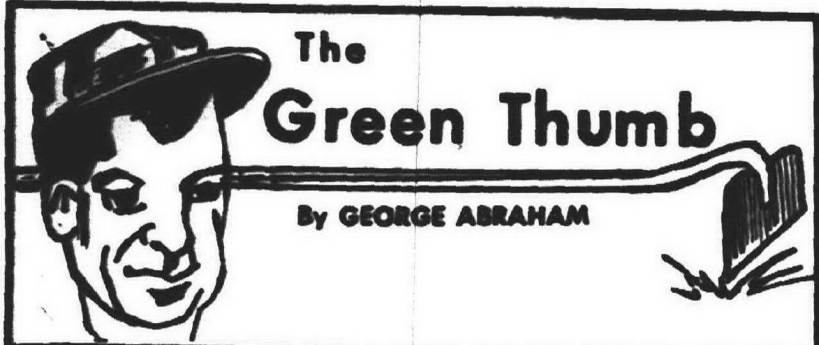
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The Green Thumb

By GEORGE ABRAHAM

It's not generally known that birch trees can be grown from seed but it can be done.

If the birds haven't eaten all those worm-like structures on the tree (these are the seed bearing catkins, and how birds like to peck at them!) you can start now to sow.

Gather several in your hand and crush the whole catkin. Plant hulls and all in a pot of moist humusy soil, not too deep. Those cottage cheese plastic containers are ideal for starting birch seed. Scatter seed on top and press it into the starting material.

We like to use a mixture of sand and peat, or perlite, vermiculite with a little peat added. It takes several weeks

before seed appears - they are tiny and can be mistaken for weeds.

Seedlings grow slowly, about six to eight inches the first year. Set them out in the garden when large enough to be on their own - and watch them take off.

TOMATOES IN 1973: Last year was a bad one for tomatoes. For some it was tomatoless because of the weather. In many parts of the U.S., plants made plenty of growth, but set little or no fruit. Blame this on the chilly nights when temperatures plummeted below 55 degrees. Just about all varieties will shed their flower buds if the temperature gets below 55 degrees at night.

Now that the seed catalogs are rolling in, you'll probably be wondering if there is a variety that shrugs off cold temperatures. I doubt if there is such a variety. In fact, there is no one variety that is fool-proof.

Some good varieties to try include Supersonic, Big Boy, Better Boy, Moreton Hybrid and Heinz 1350. There are many other good ones and you should try two or three types, instead of concentrating on one.

If you like small-fruited types, try Presto, a salad-sized tomato remarkably early (60 days) and high in flavor. This hybrid has small vines (about 40 inches) packed with clusters of fine golf-ball size tomatoes. Small Fry is another small fruited tomato.

GREEN THUMB CLINIC: A reader writes: "We want to grow some morning glory from seed, but never have good luck, even with plants started from seed. What is wrong?"

Answer: For faster germination, soak morning glory seed in warm water for eight hours prior to sowing. It's easy to grow morning glory if you have a soil of low fertility, and if you don't overwater them. Start your seed in pots or Jiffy pellets, and grow them in a different spot this spring, if they wilted last summer.

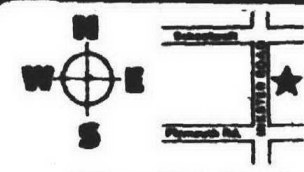

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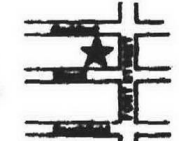

Pursell Will Chair 3 Groups

State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) will assume leadership of three subcommittees following a realignment of the responsibilities on the appropriations committee.

Pursell had been the only senator from southeast Michigan on the powerful committee but is joined this year by Sen. Stanley Rozycki (D-Detroit).

Under a new committee structure, Pursell will chair subcommittees on community colleges, governmental efficiency and general government.

WITH A NEW emphasis on subcommittees, Pursell said the public and senators will become more involved in scrutinizing the state budget.

"I think the community college chairmanship is highly significant," Pursell said. "It's my intention to bring our subcommittee to the colleges through a series of budget hearings."

"I'll seek to open the process to input by administrators, faculty and students of the institutions. The aim will be to reach for the deepest possible evaluation of the needs of each community college."

He said the efficiency committee will serve as a "trouble-shooting" strike force to focus on government at all levels statewide.

It will utilize the expertise of the Senate fiscal agency and the auditor general's office and will "both initiate efficiency studies and be responsible to possible irregularities brought to our attention."

Ease Lottery Limits--Broomfield

A federal restriction against broadcasting winning state lottery numbers on radio and television would be lifted if Congress adopts a resolution introduced by U.S. Rep. William S. Broomfield (R-Bloomfield Township).

Michigan Lottery Commissioner Gus Harrison says passage "could assist greatly in informing the public about the lottery."

Broomfield's resolution, co-sponsored by eight other Michigan congressmen, would permit the transportation,

mailing and broadcasting of advertising, information and materials relating to state-authorized lotteries.

Currently, radio and television are highly restricted in terms of what they can say about the lottery. They cannot, for instance, broadcast winning numbers or tell the public where to buy tickets.

THERE ALSO is a postal restriction against mailing editions of newspapers containing lottery advertising or promotion.

Harrison says this "has caused problems for the bureau as well as licensed agents who would advertise the availability of lottery tickets if the restrictions were eliminated."

Harrison emphasized that Elmer White, executive secretary of the Michigan Press Association, "has been especially helpful in dealing with existing advertising and news restrictions and is working for a change in those restrictions."

The commissioner pointed out that similar legislation was considered in Congress last year, but was not approved.

"SINCE THAT time the number of states operating lotteries has increased to 10," said Harrison. "With one-fifth of the states now operating lotteries and several others likely to get into the business this year, the Broomfield resolution would appear to have a good chance of passage."

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2nd District Dems Pull Upsets

The already wide gulf between Democrats from Livonia and Plymouth stretched even wider and produced a few surprises during caucuses Saturday prior to the state convention.

Precinct delegates and party members gathered to elect new leaders for the 2nd Congressional District and delegates to the State Central Committee. The newly-apportioned 2nd district includes Washtenaw County, Monroe County, Livonia, Plymouth and Northville.

Before the longest caucus in

their history was over at 9:45 p.m., two local residents had scored upsets.

RICHARD MCGINN took his well-organized campaign for a State Central Committee seat to the caucus and managed to win the seat over Larry VanderMolen, who was supported by most Livonians.

Shortly after McGinn's victory, Paul Kadish of Livonia won the at-large delegate's seat despite delegate agreement that the seat would go to the area with the most votes—Washtenaw County.

Local Democrats were

generally frustrated over the power Washtenaw delegation held—and exercised—over the Monroe and Wayne delegations. Washtenaw holds 54 of the 61 majority votes needed to pass resolutions or confirm elections.

But McGinn, who has been an active Democrat since 1952, went into the caucus with a shrewd plan to swing Washtenaw votes in his direction—and it worked.

Political science instructor at Schoolcraft College, was the choice of Wayne County's delegation for the state central seat. He had beaten McGinn for the nomination, getting about 70 per cent of the votes cast.

Livonians heavily outnumbered Plymouth delegates. VanderMolen had agreed in a previous convention to endorse former State Rep. Marvin Stempien of Livonia over Bob Dwyer of Plymouth for chairmanship of the Wayne district with the understanding that Livonians would support him for state central seat.

BUT LIVONIANS were outsmarted when a rule was passed making all State central seats subject to confirmation by the entire 2nd District delegation.

With both Monroe and Washtenaw delegates voting on the Wayne County seat, McGinn managed to draw support from delegates outside of Wayne and defeat VanderMolen whose main support was from Livonia.

The same happened to Monroe when Washtenaw delegates chose to ignore the county Democrat's recommendations and elect challengers for the woman's state central seat and district vice chairman.

KADISH'S strategy differed. He had the support of Livonians, but Washtenaw County's delegation was split between two Ann Arbor contenders for the at-large seat.

Mike Koen was the strongest Washtenaw candidate with Gerald Faye splitting the county's votes. When Faye had a poor showing on the first ballot, he threw his support to Kadish, a Schoolcraft College trustee, giving him 65 votes over Koen's 54.

George W. Sallade was easily elected district chairperson despite a weak challenge by Fred Schwall, a Ypsilanti Township trustee. Schwall was backed by

Stempien and most of the Livonia delegates in what was considered a challenge at Washtenaw's power and an attack on the county that failed to give Stempien financial support for his unsuccessful 1972 congressional campaign.

When it became apparent that Schwall couldn't win and the lunge at Washtenaw might cost Wayne County its male state central seat, Stempien attempted but failed to pull Livonia's support from under Schwall.

STEMPIEN WAS elected 2nd vice chairman of the district. Ted Preston of Livonia was elected treasurer and Ann Tavolacci of Livonia was elected corresponding secretary.

Pat Whitton of Livonia was elected the woman delegate to state central and Barbara LaRue of Livonia and Joe

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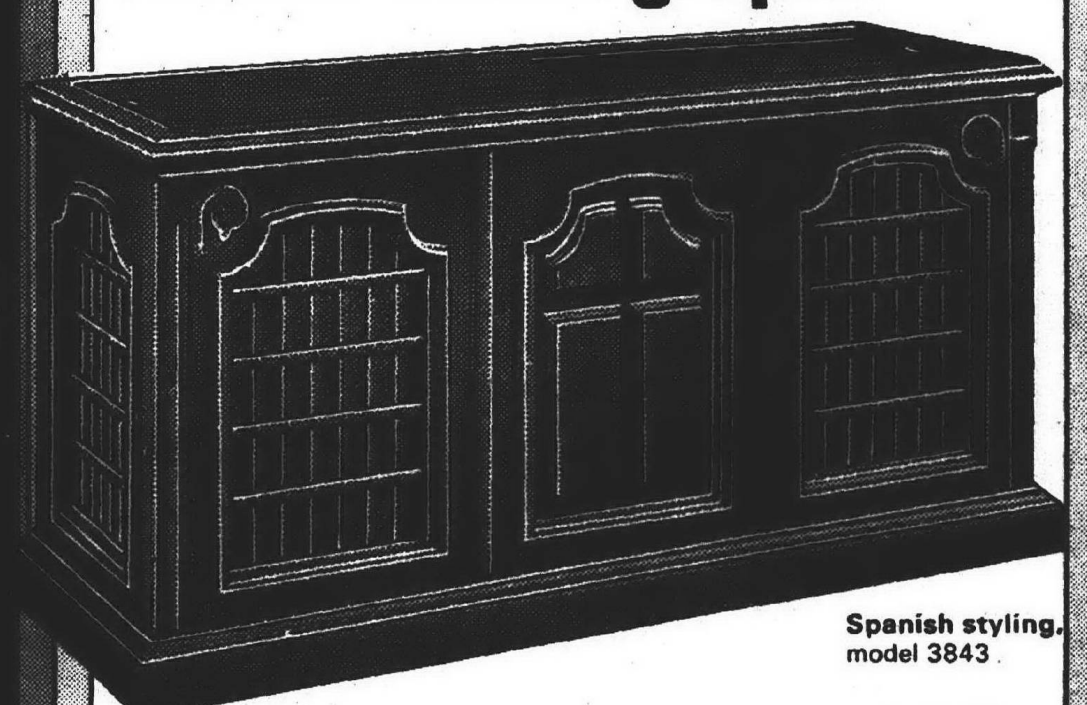
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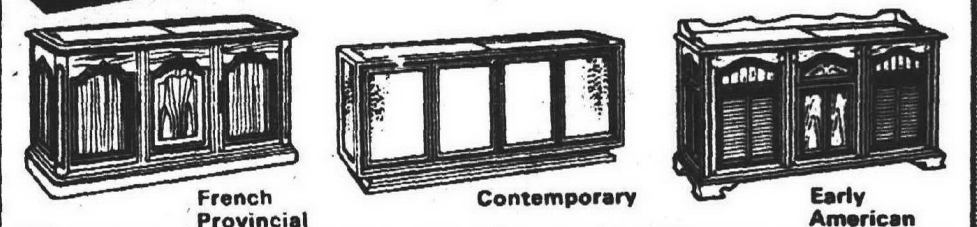

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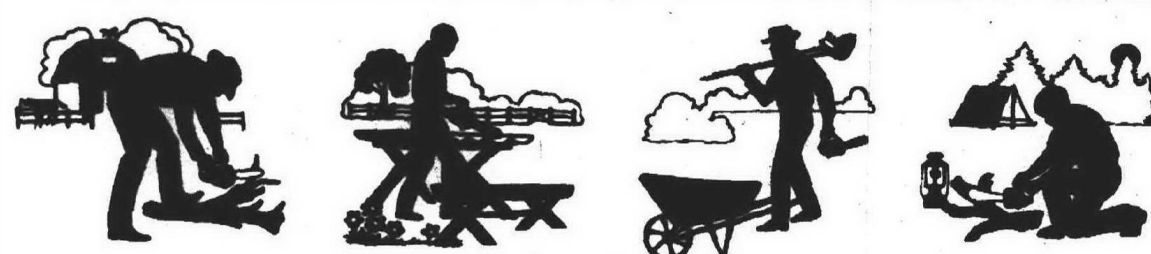
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Attendance Is Poor; But Dancers Aren't

This is what happened last week when the Schoolcraft College Cultural and Public Affairs Committee and the Plymouth Community Arts Council sponsored a performance by Jose Molina's Bailes Espanoles in Plymouth High School auditorium.

And it frightens me because I wonder how long a dedicated few will go on trying. Will they leave us with the option of

traveling miles to see something of this caliber or staying glued to our television sets?

YOU HAVE to wonder when you know that a junior high school band concert (which may do something for maternal and paternal instincts, but leaves a good deal to be desired esthetically) will really pack local auditoriums.

But for those who saw the Spanish dancers, it was a rewarding evening both esthetically and emotionally, an evening charged with electricity, rhythm, color, laughter and sex. Latin

machismo might be hard to live with, but it's fun to watch and it's at its best in the distinctive dances of Spain.

A couple of the dances, "La Noche" or "an encounter cloaked in the shadows of the night" and "Goyecas," an intermezzo from the 18th century classical school, were both artistic and seductive.

JUST AS interesting were the delightful "Jota Espana," more closely resembling a light-hearted ballet type of dance, with lilting music by Chabrier, and the finale, the "Caudra Flamenco," in which company members demon-

strated their skills in solos and duos.

Molina's finale, with the saucy and earthy Carmen Dominguez, was a real crowd-pleaser.

Molina was first dancer with Jose Greco's company for five years before forming his own company. In comparing the two, maybe it was the size of the auditorium and the smaller company, but it seemed that Molina's production has a more intimate quality. You could really appreciate not only the different dances, but also the different styles of each dancer.

'Avanti!' Good Antidote For Winter Blues

The movie "Avanti!" won't win any Oscars and some may find it a little corny and reminiscent of the comedy style of the '40s. But I found it a bright spot in a dreary Michigan winter day.

And for the first time, I can really understand the fondness many English and American authors have for Italy.

"Avanti!" is set on the island of Ischia, famed for its health resorts, and on the screen a lovely, lovely place.

JACK LEMMON plays to perfection Wendell Armbruster, hard-driving 40ish American executive who snaps his fingers impatiently and gets things done.

He jumps off the golf course in a company plane, jets to New York, hops on an Italian plane, jets to Rome, takes a train to the coast and a boat to Ischia...to claim the body of his father, who has been killed in an automobile accident while on vacation.

He arrives Saturday and has to have the body back in Baltimore for the closed circuit TV funeral Tuesday.

Should be fairly simple for a finger-snapping American executive, but Armbruster runs into complications, including the fact that his father wasn't alone when he died, nor had he been spending his Italian vacations alone for the past 10 years.

Juliet Mills plays the uninhibited English gal, Pamela Piggott, who comes to

claim her mother's body, meets Armbruster and is ready to idealize her mother's romance by reliving it, including the nude dawn swim sessions.

She also learns that her psychiatrist was wrong: she's not unhappy because she's overweight—she's overweight because she's unhappy. In Ischia, she finds happiness.

IT'S INTERESTING to see the way director-co-writer Billy Wilder has skirted the thin line between comedy and farce in "Avanti!" There are a few sophomoric bits, but many more that are not.

The Italians, treated with less finesse, could have emerged as stock characters, but even the avaricious body-snatchers receive a certain amount of sympathy.

Best of the Italians is the hotel's manager, Carlo Carlucci, played by Clive Revill. He gives a convincing portrayal of urbanity and humanity.

"Avanti!" is a United Artists release.

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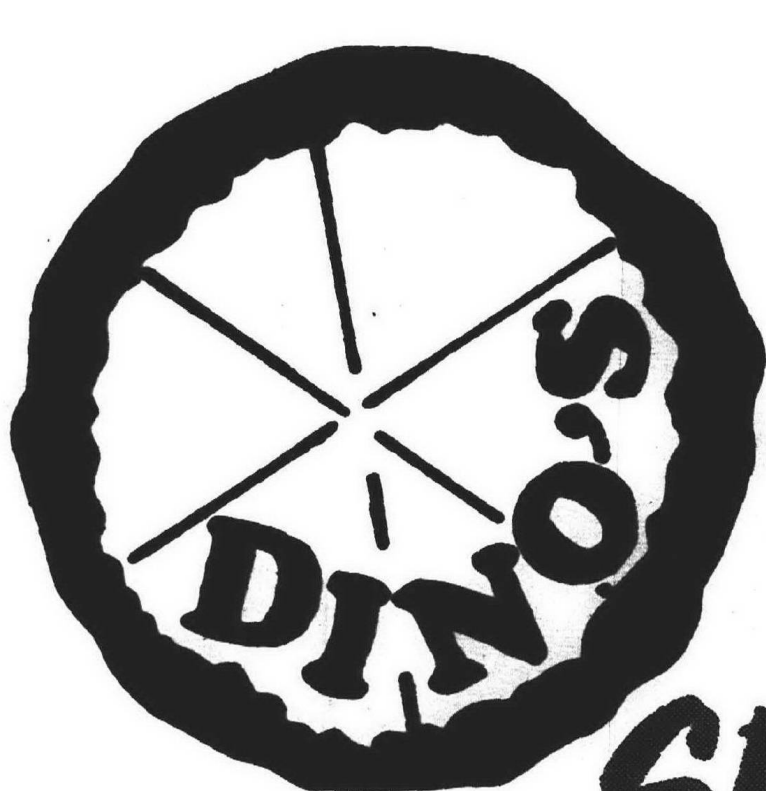
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Warm Up With Food For Fiesta

There comes a time, in the midst of cold Michigan weather, when most people would happily exchange a spot in the winter wonderland for a place in sunny Acapulco, the Yucatan Peninsula, or even Baja California.

An easy and delicious way to satisfy your appetite for warmer climes is to enjoy a Mexican dinner.

GUACAMOLE
1 large ripe avocado
2 t. fresh lemon juice
1 t. chili powder
1 garlic clove, crushed
2 T. mayonnaise
Salt

Peel avocado and remove seed. Mash pulp completely. Add lemon juice and mix well. Add chili powder, garlic, and mayonnaise. Season. Serve with kinsize corn chips. Makes about 1½ cups.

RICE CON QUESO
1½ c. raw brown rice (cooked with salt and pepper)
¾ lb. shredded jack cheese
1 small can chilis, chopped
½ lb. ricotta cheese thinned slightly with milk or yogurt
3 cloves garlic, minced or pressed
½ c. grated cheddar cheese
1 large onion, chopped
½ c. dry black beans (or blackeyed peas), cooked

Mix rice, beans garlic, onion, chilis. Layer this mixture alternately in a greased casserole with jack cheese and ricotta (spreading evenly over casserole). End with rice mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for one-half hour. During last few minutes of baking sprinkle grated cheese over the top. This is an ideal dish for a buffet dinner. Serves six.

VEGETARIAN ENCHILADAS

Sauce:
1 c. onions, chopped
Olive oil as needed
2 c. canned tomatoes
1 8-ounce can tomato sauce
1 clove garlic, minced
Pinch cayenne
10 drops hot sauce
½ T. chili powder
1 T. honey
½ t. salt
¼ t. cumin seed, ground

Saute onions in about two tablespoons olive oil until golden. Add remaining ingredients and simmer, uncovered, for 30 minutes. This is a very hot sauce. If you prefer something milder, omit the cayenne and cumin and reduce the amount of hot sauce and chili powder.

FILLING:
½ c. dry beans, cooked and ground
1 clove garlic, minced
½ c. chopped onion
2 T. chopped ripe olives
1 t. chili powder
¼ t. salt

Saute onion, garlic, and olives in olive oil. Add mashed or ground beans and seasonings and some of the above sauce if it seems too sticky.

TO ASSEMBLE:
Fill six to eight corn tortillas with two to three tablespoons of filling and one tablespoon grated cheese. Place, rolled up, in a shallow baking pan. Cover with sauce, sprinkle with cheese, and garnish with black olive halves. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes till bubbling hot. Makes four to six servings.

Spice CABINET

SPICED PEACHES FLAMBE
1 can (1 lb. 13 oz.) peaches
2 sticks (2-inches each) cinnamon
16 whole cloves
1½ teaspoons cornstarch
2 ounces brandy

Drain juice from peaches into a saucepan. Add cinnamon and cloves. Bring to boiling point. Blend cornstarch with 1 tablespoon water and stir into juice. Cook until juice is clear and transparent. Add peaches and heat only until they are hot. Turn into a heatproof serving dish. Heat brandy and pour over the fruit. Ignite and bring to table flaming. Serve as dessert. Six portions.

OBSERVATION POINT

Suburban Democratic Head Faces Toughest Job In Own Back Yard

Michigan Democrats went with yet another leader from the suburbs of Oakland County, as over the weekend they selected Morley Winograd, of Troy, to be their new state chairman.

Winograd, 30, previously was Oakland County Democratic chairman, as was the man he succeeds as state chairman, James McNeely, who once lived and in the nearby community of Milford and taught in Farmington.

McNeely, in turn, succeeded a previous Oakland County chairman in the state chairmanship, as Sander Levin first made a political name for himself in Berkley and then representing Southfield in the State Senate.

Just what the fascination of the state Democratic party for Oakland County chairmen might be is not at all clear, although the county's organization is generally conceded to be better than anywhere else in the state. Winograd made a good record for himself in Oakland County, showing good administrative ability and some little skill in getting along with various factions of the faction-ridden party.

Local Democrats, asked how

they interpreted Winograd's selection, stressed that if the party is to succeed in bringing itself back from last year's disaster, it must develop a more positive image here in the suburbs. Winograd, they feel, has enough suburban savvy to manage that tough effort.

JUST HOW TOUGH was revealed over the weekend, when some enterprising political reporter broke the story that a group of Democrats who supported Gov. George Wallace last year nearly swiped the party's name right out from under it.

Late last week, a trio, including Philip Lee of suburban Warren, announced that they had incorporated the Democratic Party in their names and filed incorporation papers with the state and in all 83 Michigan counties. They then said that this action blocked the regular Democratic Party from using its name and assets, and demanded Lee's election as state chairman and selection of three Wallace supporters to Democratic National Committee offices in return.

Regular Democratic lawyers scotched the plot, however, by

early Friday morning filing papers reserving the name "Democratic Party" with state officials — just minutes before the Wallace group tried to do the same thing.

ASIDE FROM the humor in the whole thing, the name-stealing episode struck me as symbolic.

For the malaise that has struck the state's Democrats lies in very real measure in that the traditional roots of the party's strength — the working man and his family — have gradually been stolen away from the Democrats.

This has come about largely by design — everybody now knows that President Nixon's major political objective as president is nothing less than remaking the map of American politics so that Republicans are the dominant party by assiduously courting the working man who is fed up with Democratic liberalism.

The president appointed New York building trades hard hat Peter Brennan as the first Labor secretary in many years to be a member of the labor movement. He has sought to portray Democrats as the party of the poor, of the blacks, of the rich liberals,

while presenting Republicans as advocates of the working man who made it on his own, the suburbanite who wants to keep taxes low, and the average guy who feels that government (especially in Washington) is too big and too expensive and too incompetent.

Looked at in this light, Sen. George McGovern's candidacy played right into the president's hands nationally.

In Michigan, the same pattern is going on. Although Democrats did well in local and congressional races last fall, Gov. Milliken won two years ago with considerable Democratic suburban support, and his declaration that he stood against any state tax increase for the next two years made Democrats who want to spend more money to solve social problems look bad.

Winograd's challenge is nothing less than to bring back to his party precisely the working man who now lives in the suburbs and considers himself a member of the middle class, with economic interests to protect, and is accordingly tempted to go against old patterns and vote Republican. It'll be a tough job.

A Pioneering Idea To Study

The much discussed and often cussed year around school program, officially known as the extended school year, is meeting with popular acceptance in Northville, which makes one wonder why other school systems in Observerland aren't giving it more consideration.

It was back in 1969 that Supt. Ray Spear, an advocate of year-around classes, started pushing the idea in Northville.

A limited pilot program was instigated by State Supt. of Public Instruction John Porter, and the state helped fund it. Funds beyond those normally met by the school district's budget were allocated by the state.

Northville was one of six school systems in the state selected to test such a program for acceptance by parents, pupils and teachers.

UNDER THE PLAN, which was voluntary for teachers and parents, the year-around program was to start in one elementary school including grades K-5. The school selected in Northville was Amerman Elementary with William Craft, of Livonia, as principal.

Craft, a former president of the Livonia Board of Education,

volunteered to take over the program for the initial test. He is high in his praise for the manner in which it has been accepted in the community.

In fact Craft believes the voluntary enrollment will more than double for the second year which begins in September.

Under the ESY plan, pupils attend classes for 45 days and then have 15 days vacation. This allows for four three-week vacations during the year as well as time off for Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter.

Students have 180 days of instruction, the same as those attending on the traditional calendar.

Teachers as well as pupils have volunteered for the 45-15 schedule. Classes are limited to 25, and a recreation program was developed to keep the youngsters from getting bored during vacation periods.

"Our experience during the current school year is that parents have discovered the four vacation periods are working out well, and the teachers love the four breaks during the various times of the year," says Craft.

BUT THE ONE big item that Supt. Spear stressed in trying to sell the program was that year

around use of the school buildings will mean that new buildings will not have to be constructed.

The theory is that with classes around the calendar, the buildings will be used constantly, and rarely will it be necessary to build a new one, even in cases of tremendous growth and expansion.

That's why other school boards in the area should watch

the progress of ESY with more than a casual glance. Such communities as Plymouth, Canton Center, Farmington, Southfield and Livonia have learned that folks aren't approving additional millage for anything these days.

Thus a program that could save millions in construction costs deserves plenty of study.

Why Are Our Reflections Bad?

EDITOR'S NOTE: In a recent address before a convention of the Michigan Press Association, Gov. William G. Milliken observed, "One of the important ways in which we can hasten the awakening of a golden age of peace and prosperity is to start believing in ourselves again, believing in our capacity to change."

The governor then continued with the following remarks.

The press is the mirror of the day. In it, we see the momentary, constantly shifting image of ourselves. If the face of society is ugly, then the image will be ugly. If the face of society is pleasant, then the image itself will be pleasant.

Many people in this country are saying these days that the mirror distorts, but I do not believe it does. Occasionally the mirror needs to be cleaned; and occasionally, I believe, the press needs to turn the mirror on itself.

THERE IS SOMETHING going on these days that is a bit frightening and disturbing — the attempts of some people to draw a curtain between the mirror and the many — faceted images it is supposed to reflect.

Far from limiting press freedom, I believe very deeply that we should extend it. I believe every effort should be made to facilitate the operation of a free press, that the door of government should not just be left slightly ajar but opened

completely — that free access to legitimate information should be a rule for every governmental official.

As governor, I have tried to put these principles into practice, and I believe the results have been good. They have been good for the press itself, but perhaps more importantly they have been good for the quality of government and in turn for all of the people of the state.

ANY GOVERNMENT which walls itself off from the press turns into a kind of institutional greenhouse in which corruption and self-interest thrive. I believe that erosion of the sources of information is erosion of the basic freedom of information — which is the cornerstone of freedom itself.

Because I believe this, I have been working with the Michigan Press Association and others in and out of the press to develop a legislative package that would include means of improving our "shield" law, as well as laws covering open meetings and better access to records.

I understand you have had some panel discussions on what our shield law will and will not do. Clearly, it will have to provide better protection, well beyond its current limitations to grand juries. It should cover court trials, legislative investigations, and investigations by the executive branch of government.

With Court Help, Girls To Challenge Boys At Sports

Women's lib has had its effect on high school sports in Michigan following a court order of a week ago that allows girls to compete in all but "contact" sports.

Such a ruling was expected due to the tremendous growth in girls interscholastic sports activities in the past three or four years.

Especially has this been true in Observerland where practically all high schools have reinstated girls varsity sports, in many instances on a league basis.

But there has been a difference. The girls were limited to playing on all-girl teams against feminine competition.

THE MOST recent federal appeals court ruling allows girls to participate on any varsity team with the exception of those involving personal contact, such as football, basketball, water polo and wrestling.

That means girls will be competing against members of the male side for varsity positions on the baseball, swimming, golf, tennis and track teams.

We have vivid recollections of the days back in the '20s and '30s back in Ohio when girls competed against each other in baseball, basketball and track. The games attracted large crowds, especially in basketball where the girls received equal billing with the boys.

Matter of fact, the annual girls' championship tournament, in those days, attracted capacity crowds, often more than the boys. Those were the times when girls played for state titles, and national tournaments were the rule rather than the exception.

Then the hue and cry was raised about the harmful effect of varsity competition on girls. It caused so much agitation that school officials decided to drop girls teams from the athletic scene and the girls could only participate as cheerleaders and band musicians.

It was a sad day for parents and girls when the ban became official. Gone were the colorful games and tournaments. Gone were the days when girls earned varsity letters and wore sweaters in the school's colors with chenille letters . . . just like the boys.

BUT A DEMAND for girls' athletic competition started several years ago — in Observerland, about 10 years back — and school boards have gradually eased the ban.

It first started with girls basketball, finding teams from one school meeting others in a limited schedule and no official standings. The games were played in late spring after the boys had ended competition.

Then within a span of four years, track, tennis and swimming have been added . . . some on a league basis with awards to champions. This appeared to be the answer of more competition for girls. But girls teams did not appear on the same programs as the boys varsity teams, bringing cries of discrimination.

We have no idea what the future will bring, but it will be interesting when the first girl among Observerland's 22 high schools clinches a spot on the varsity. As we see it now, it will come in either tennis, golf or swimming. It will be some time before the girls equal boys in baseball.

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Livonia Students Tell Their Side Of Boycott

EDITOR:

We, the Livonia Student Union, are a group of students from all four Livonia high schools, concerned with trying to institute some form of democracy within the schools.

We wish to respond to a series of articles published in the Observer concerning the boycott of classes, protesting the current attendance policy.

We feel a misunderstanding has been formed in the minds of all who have read these articles regarding the boycott of Tuesday, Jan. 16.

We would like to put forth the facts and the reasons behind the boycott.

The union feels the appeals procedure, which entails presenting student proposals to the student body of government, the principal, the regional director, and finally the board of education for final approval, is not an effective way for students to promote change. Therefore, actions such as protests are necessary to express student dissatisfaction.

The Livonia Student Union recognized this unrest within the high schools and decided upon a boycott of classes to display the dissatisfaction we suspected. Apparently our suspicions were correct since at Stevenson alone, over 600 students skipped at least one if not more classes, and 300 students missed the entire day, resulting in over 900 unexcused absences.

note that many other reasons may have kept a student from attending the boycott: The fact that many teachers gave major tests on the day of the protest, while other reported educators actually recruited their students to class by giving out extra points or A's to people who did not sit in the hall and miss class. Yet the most important fact was that many of the people most affected by the policy could not participate because they would be kicked out of their classes.

The students and faculty at Stevenson know that well over 150 students crowded the halls around the library, yet never did the Observer enter any of the schools to uncover the facts. Also, when an attempt was made to cover the timely demonstration, the principal, Dale Collier, was asked to professionally estimate the crowd. He stated that "never were there more than 150 students at one time" enclosed around the library. When questioned after the demonstration how he could account for the students who skipped on the attendance list, (500 in fact) he could find no suitable answer.

The paper reported that one out of every 20 students participated in the strike while in fact, with the correct figures, one

out of every nine boycotted classes.

Our biggest disagreement with the attendance policy is that students had no say in the creation of the policy and we feel that for students to learn responsibility they must understand the first tenet of our society—which is the democratic way.

If we are not allowed to take active roles in the democratic process every day in our respective schools, how are we expected to become citizens capable of making rational and intellectual decisions after graduation from high school?

We feel if so many students do in fact agree with the present policy—then if it were put to a vote, the school board would have no fear that there would be an overwhelming response in favor of the policy.

We hope to have cleared up any confusion concerning the boycott and hope in the future any story published about our activities or beliefs—the consideration will be afforded to talk with us, so future misconceptions will not be passed as facts.

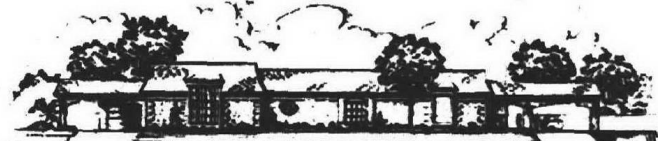

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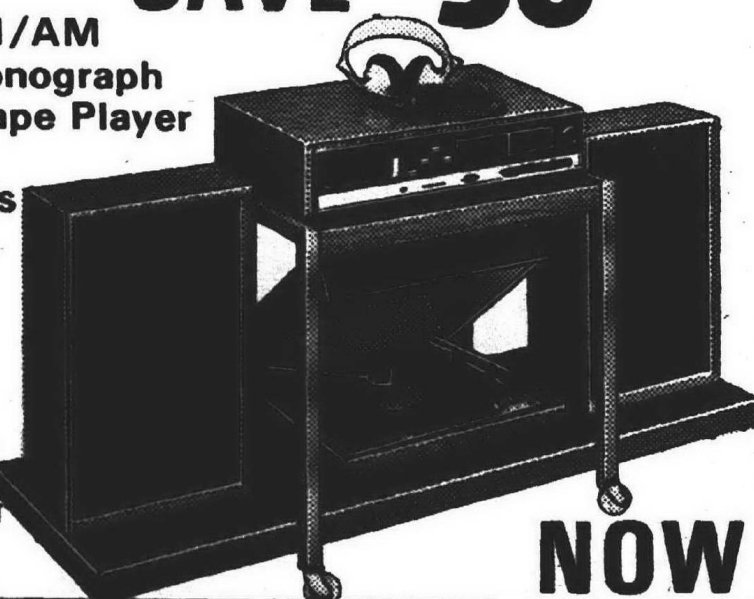

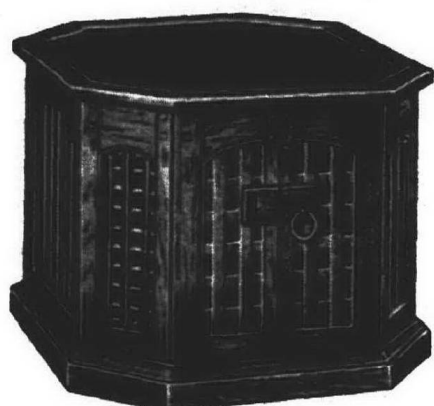

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Builders Fight CP Gas Cutoff

A meeting of the membership of the Builders Assn., of Southeastern Michigan for an airing of the cutoff of gas permits by Consumers Power Co. in Michigan will be held at 8 a.m. Friday, Feb. 9, on the sixth floor of Stouffer's Northland Inn in Southfield. The meeting was called by Ivan Frankel, home and apartment builder and president of the 1,000-member BASM, and Irvin H. Yackness, executive vice president and general counsel.

The association says its home and apartment building projects in the metropolitan region and outstate Michigan face serious curtailment if the Consumers Power Co. order which went into effect Feb. 2 continues.

"AS MANY as 40,000 new housing starts will be affected by the order," said Yackness, in calling the meeting which he said was an emergency gathering of builders and suppliers "for the purpose of updating the industry, which is heavily involved in residential construction, on the natural gas cutoff by Consumers Power Co."

The order, said Yackness, affects a "very substantial part of Michigan, especially

the populated areas in Wayne and Oakland counties."

A further purpose of the meeting, according to Yackness, will be to give the builders of homes and apartments a report on a hearing by the Michigan Public Service Commission in Lansing, to be held Feb. 7.

Participating in the hearing at Lansing from BASM will be its directors and other top officers, including Frankel and Yackness; Paul Forcier, vice president; James Raisin, vice president; Manny Dembs, vice president; Edward Milligen, vice president, and Herman Frankel, chairman of the BASM's utilities committee.

THE MPSC hearing in Lansing will come following a series of meetings and discussions which BASM has initiated with Michigan State officials, including State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth), a member of the powerful appropriations committee; William Rosenberg, chairman of the MPSC, and representatives of Consumers Power Co., as well as members of the governor's study committee on energy.

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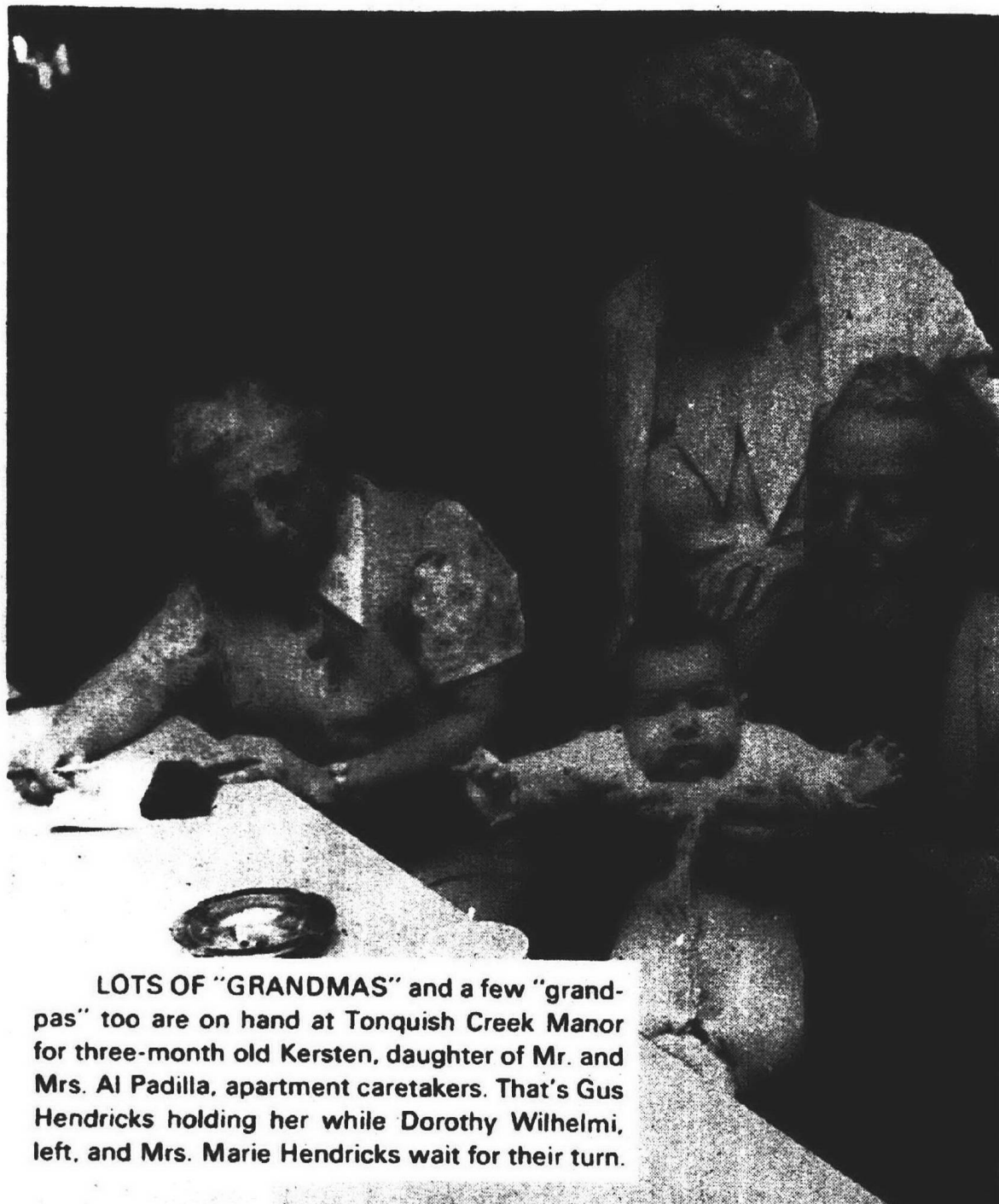
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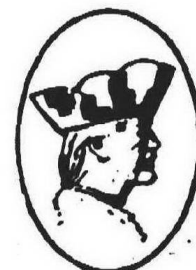
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Child, Adult, Parent -- You're All 3

You're a mother, and you ask your daughter if she's seen your curlers. "I didn't take them - you're always accusing me of taking your things," she answers.

It's the child in her talking - she's feeling resentful.

Or you're the daughter, and you ask your mother the same question.

"If you'd put them where they belong, you'd know where they were," mother may answer.

That's the parent in her talking. She's feeling preachy.

OR AGAIN the question might be a simple request for information, and the answer - from either - might be:

"I used them last night, and I'm afraid I left them on my dresser."

That's adult - to - adult talk. The terminology is part of a relatively new process of dealing with personal relationships called "transactional analysis."

It comes from a book by Thomas Harris titled "I'm OK - You're OK," and its implications in parent-teen relationships were discussed recently in a panel

meeting in Antioch Lutheran Church of Farmington.

DR. NATHAN CLAUNCH, consulting psychiatrist who led the discussion, explained that, in using these terms as "handles" to understand relationships, you can consider that everyone has three parts in his makeup.

There's the adult - the seeker of information, the assessor of environment. The computer.

There's the parent - the reincarnation of the individual's own parents. The

parent in everyone, explained Dr. Claunch, is part nurturing parent, the protector and sustainer, and part critical parent, the controller and harper.

And there's the child, part natural child, as Dr. Claunch explained it, and part adoptive child.

"The natural child is what you'd do with no controls," he said, "and the adoptive child represents the repressions that have been trained into you."

JOINING Dr. Claunch in the discussion before about 50 parents and teens were four persons who work closely with Farmington young people.

They were Jack Peuhler, director of the Farmington Area Advisory Council; Kathie Kaniel, program director for the FAAC; Don McMillan, director of the Farmington youth assistance program and Les Zalewski, Farmington school district social worker.

"None of us has teen-agers, so our minds are uncluttered," the leader said.

The panels pointed out that any individual may react as a parent, adult or child in any given situation, depending on the occasion, mood and other individual involved.

"The healthy person is the one who keeps the adult in charge, keeps the natural child freed and realizes that his own responses and those of others may be on any of the three levels," Dr. Claunch added.

MOST PARENTS fail, the panels agreed, in listening as an adult to their teens' ideas and requests.

"There are times," Dr. Claunch said, "when the controlling parent part has to step in and say 'No.'"

"But even then," pointed out McMillan, "it's a matter of checking first with the adult."

Teens should remember, the panels said, their fathers and mothers "tend to come on parent when they're feeling child."

The important thing is to find a way to approach them on the adult level, the young people in the audience were told.

Anger as a response is going to be part of everyone's life, Dr. Claunch said. "But tantrums aren't particularly useful," he added. "It's possible for the adult in you to report your anger. That's much more productive."

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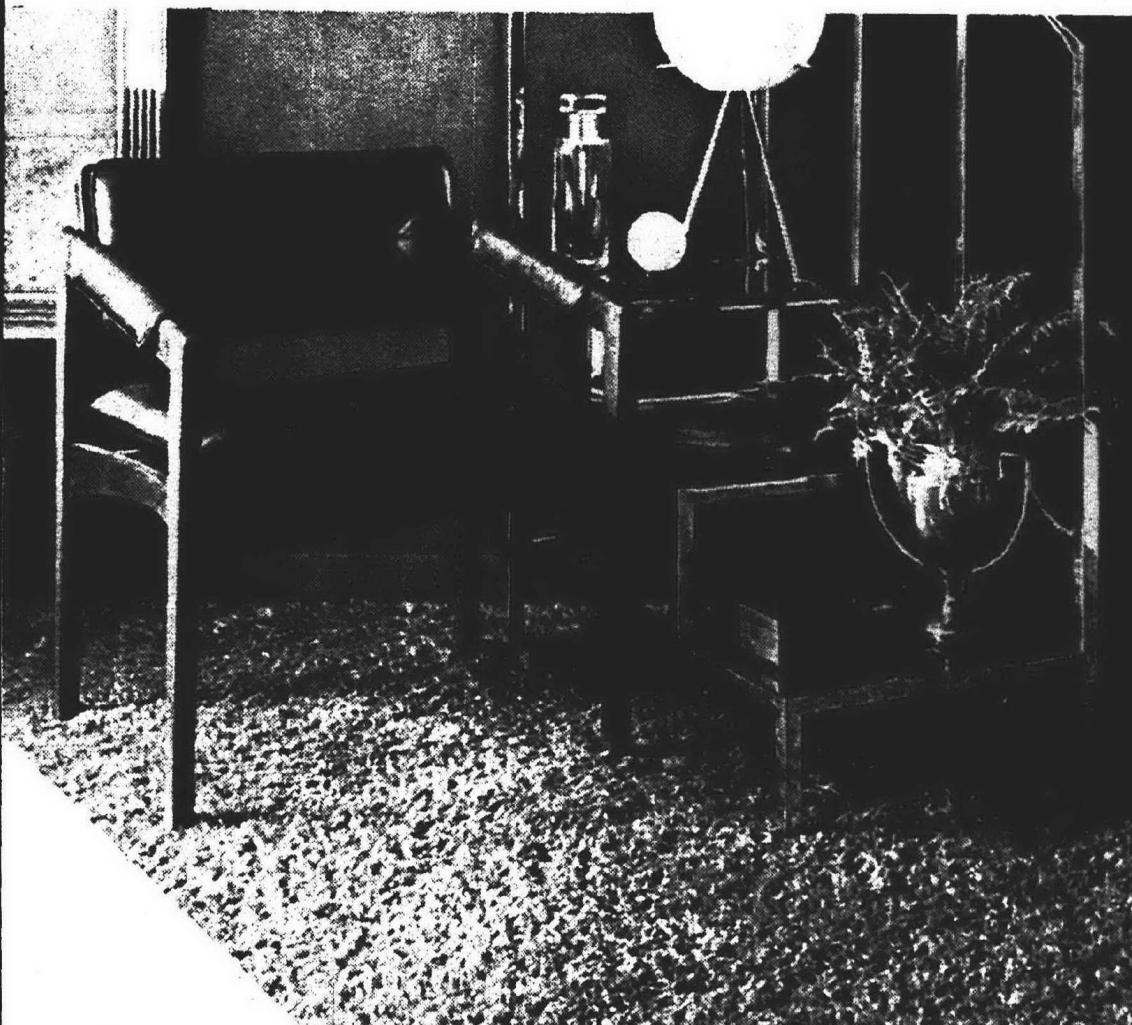
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Panelists To Discuss Housing For Retarded
