Seven months as a minister have convinced one young woman that the calling is exciting and rewarding - and one in which women learn the meaning of discrimination.

"I understand now what my friends in the women's liberation movement were talking about," the Rev. Carol Johns told the women's association of Newburg United Methodist Church in Livonia Wednesday.

"There have been specific instances - like the time someone didn't want me to do a funeral because I am a woman - and a general feeling that people are not guite ready to accept a woman as a minister.

The three myths most commonly believed by dealers and the buying public are:

Are Used Primarily For Hunting, Fish-ing, and Camping. Like many myths about the recreational vehicle market. this statement was true in the early 1950's. At that time, units were limit-ed to travel trailers and homemade campers owned by a mere handful of outdoor enthusiasts. The myth picks hunting, fishing and camping as the primary uses of recreational vehicles. Actually, only one-sixth of the survey respondents use their units mainly for these activi-

ties -- and women and children go along on 98 our of 100 trips. Many recreational vehicle owners indicated a strong interest in camping and having their own accommodations. Only one in 10, however, camp off the beaten path where no other facilities re available.

A large proportion of today's recreational vehicle advertising and sales promotions are centered around "men only" hunting and fishing scenes. The Mobile Life survey limited appeal. In addition, the survey suggests that the camping use of recreational vehicles is part of a larger selling point -- using recreational vehicles to/turn weekends into short. demonstrates that this is an extremely inexpensive vacations.

2. Recreational Vehicles Do Not Appeal To All Segments Of The Population. This misconception comes from the belief that the vast majority of recreational vehicle owners fall into the 35-45 age group. A nationwide survey of 500 camping families conducted by 3M National Advertising Co during 1971 revealed that the average age of recreational vehicle owners (head of household) is 45 years. Over half the respondents were white collar workers and the average income was in excess of \$12,000.

The average family size was 4.1 people; 2.6 over age 18 and 1.5 under age 18. Their camping vacations can be quite extensive

Strain and load on the tow vehicle is controlled by the balance of the recreational vehicle and specially designed weight equalizing hitches. Hitch and installation costs are not usually included in the purchase price of a trailer.
