Twelve-year-old Walter Eggenburger of 6305 N. Lilly Rd. died Tuesday night in Wayne County General Hospital following an apparently accidental shooting in the home of a friend.

According to Det. Alex Roberston of the Wayne County Sheriff's Dept., the youth was admitted to the hospital following the mishap which occurred in the home of his 12-year-old friend, Richard Davis, of 6225 N. Lilly. Eggenburger was pronounced dead at 8:40 p.m.

Roberston said that the shooting occurred after Eggenburger, Davis and Ricky McIntosh, 6181 Lilly, had gone into Davis' bedroom. All three boys were close friends, police said. While in the room, Roberston stated that one of the boys said he wished he had a blank pistol to scare off prowlers around his house.

Police said Davis then got up and went into another room and took the middle shotgun of three in a rack. He brought it back into the bedroom, police said, and "accidentally" pulled the trigger. The gun was loaded with a round apparently left from a hunting trip last year. Eggenburger was struck in the upper chest.

Roberston said the shooting was "absolutely" accidental.

## 'Moratorium' Dies In Canton

Two attempts by Canton Planning Commissioner Ellen Ruland to declare a moratorium on multiple housing in the township died when any of her colleagues on the planning commission failed to second either motion.

The first motion called for a one-year moratorium and a study of housing patterns. When that motion died, she proposed a moratorium for just the four months in which a previously-ordered land use study is being made. That, too, failed to get a second.

Another high point of the brief but emotion-charged session was the commission's decision to recommend to the township board that 110 acres at the corner of Ford and Beck Rds. be rezoned from R-1A residential to R-1BC that allows apartments and multiples.

# City Appoints New Manager

Plymouth's three-month search for a new city manager has ended.

By a unanimous vote Monday night, the Plymouth City Commission voted to appoint Fred L. Yockey, the former city manager of Midland, to the post and to pay him \$26,000 a year.

Yockey, 48, will assume his duties here March 1 -- exactly three months after Norman M. Gaffney's resignation took effect.

Yockey's \$26,000 annual salary represents an increase of about \$4,500 over Gaffney's salary at the time of his resignation.

The increase, said Mayor James McKeon, reflects the recent trends and the precariousness of political positions. "It's a whole new ball game," the mayor said.

## Liquor License OK'd By City

The Plymouth City Commission voted 5-2 Monday night to recommend a Class C liquor license for R. Terry Cuson, who has proposed a restaurant for the Consumer Discount building at 555 Forest.

Following a discussion of parking problems at the site, the commission agreed Cuson could meet the 77 space requirement by purchasing 30 parking credits from the city for \$30,000.

To meet the zoning requirement of one parking space per three occupants, Cuson needed 30 more spaces than the 47 on the site.

He is proposing to handle 231 persons in the restaurant which will include a pub that could accommodate about 50 persons.

City Commissioner Harold Guenther, who voted against the license recommendation

with Mayor James McKeon, questioned whether "these 30 extra spaces are available (in city owned lots nearby)."

Originally Cuson had proposed a seating capacity of the restaurant at 474 persons. Following that proposal, the city commission asked him to reconsider his plans in light of the parking situation because that capacity would require 158 spaces.

HE DESCRIBED his revised seating capacity as "far more practical."

Following the city's approval of his liquor license request, Cuson said it would take a minimum of six months to complete a remodeling job that he estimated would cost about \$70,000.

The restaurant's operation will be similar to the Mayflower Hotel and the Hillside Inn.

"WHAT WE'RE trying to do is recognize that the makeup of a commission can change more drastically because of an election than the manager can change in time," he added.

Four of Plymouth's seven city commission spots will be up for election in November. McKeon and City Commissioner William Silvis are barred from seeking a third term by the city charter.

McKeon described the contract, which has no specified length, as a "fair agreement considering both the manager and the city."

Yockey was fired from his Midland post on Jan. 22 by a 3-2 vote of the city council there.

The move was regarded as a surprise to all but the three councilmen voting for his dismissal, Yockey told The Plymouth Mail & Observer.

"I'd met with them that afternoon," Yockey said, and then because he was feeling ill, did not attend the city council meeting.

"It (the firing) was a surprise to me," Yockey said.

The Midland city council members who voted to fire Yockey said it was because of "philosophical differences," according to reports in the Midland Daily News.

HE HAD served as city manager in Midland since September, 1966.

Prior to that he served as city manager in Huntington Woods for 14 years, and assistant city manager there before that for 1½ years.

He served as administrative assistant in Rogers City for nine months before that.

A 1950 graduate of Michigan State University, Yockey is married and has four children.

He said he would move to Plymouth while his wife, Marion, who is a Midland school teacher, and children remain there through the end of the school year.

McKeon described Yockey as a "strong personality."

The mayor said the city commission was also considering one other candidate for the city manager spot, having originally weighed four candidates seriously. Two of the candidates withdrew from consideration.

Yockey's contract calls for a three-month severance pay agreement and a city-supplied car.

Gaffney received 60 days severance pay after he resigned following increased friction with the city commission.

## Officials To Meet On Safety

Safety problems affecting Canton Township and the Plymouth School District will be the focal point of a special meeting Monday of school officials and township representatives.

Instrumental in arranging the meeting, to be held in the school board offices, was Mrs. Ellen Ruland, township resident and a member of the planning commission.

She formerly was a member of the Plymouth Advisory Committee but resigned because of the press of planning commission business. She is secretary of the commission.

Invited to the meeting also are members of Wayne County Road Commission's engineering safety committee and officers of Canton's

The meeting, Mrs. Ruland said, is the result of a confrontation last week between school board members and irate homeowners who have requested a skywalk over Joy Rd. for children attending Fiegel School.

The meeting didn't produce any satisfactory answers from the school board, Mrs. Ruland said, "so we thought we'd better find out where we stood with the county."

She added that the road commission will also be quizzed on the possibility of better traffic control at the Ford-Sheldon roads intersection. An appeal to the Michigan State Highway Dept. for a light was denied, prompting residents to seek relief from the county, she said.

# Wayne County, Canton Planners Confer On 'Development Strategy'

Canton planning commissioners and trustees learned first-hand Monday night about the township's role in a Wayne County "development strategy" to offset a restrictive land use plan proposed by Gov. William Milliken.

For Canton, the significant part came in the county planning commission's recommendation that a certain amount of land remain in agriculture if the quality of life of people in Wayne County is to be improved.

The significance is that Canton's planning commission is currently embroiled in a rezoning battle involving large tracts of farmland in the community's northwest sector. The rezoning was instigated by farmers who claim they can no longer afford to farm the land because of high taxes.

THERE WERE other interesting sidelights to the two-hour meeting requested by the Wayne County Planning Commission to consider the 50-page "strategy" report developed at the request of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners. The "strategy" is the coun-

ty's means of beating the state to the punch in the event a pending land use program gains Legislature approval, explained Francis Bennett, head of the county planning commission.

But one of the most in-

teresting revelations for Canton planners had little to do with the far-reaching strategy development proposal.

What surfaced early in the discussion was the fact that Canton is the only township of nine served by the county that holds up action on a rezoning petition until it receives a recommendation from the county planning commission.

All others, it was pointed out, use a reverse procedure. Those planning commissions make a decision, send a copy to the county planners who then make their own decision. The two advisories are then forwarded to the board of trustees for a final decision.

THE DEVIATION came to light in the form of a question from Planning Commission Chairman George Lawton to Bennett, who then confirmed the fact.

After the meeting, Lawton instructed the planning commission secretary to include a discussion on the procedure at the next commission meeting in two weeks. Lawton told the Mail & Observer he learned "by accident about two weeks ago" that Canton was the only township handling rezonings in this manner.

While he declined to comment directly on the variance until it comes up for official discussion, he indicated that the method practiced by the

other eight townships clearly relieves much pressure involved in overriding a county recommendation, either for or against a rezoning.

Recently the commission was publicly ridiculed for its practice of referring an issue

## How Bell Boost May Affect Area

Michigan Bell Telephone Co.'s newest application for rate increases includes proposed changes which would boost the monthly charges of many Observerland customers.

In the \$29.7 million package submitted by Michigan Bell to the State Public Service Commission Thursday is a provision that would increase local monthly residence charges in almost all cities outside Detroit for one-party flat-rate service.

Rates for budget service customers would remain unchanged throughout the state. Rates for 411,000 customers who have one-party and two-party flat rate residence service in Detroit would not change either.

This includes those in Redford Township as well as Hamtramck, Dearborn and Highland Park.

HOWEVER, Livonia, Garden City, Westland, Plymouth, Farmington and Southfield one-party rates will be altered according to the following scale if the PSC grants the company's petition:

Livonia, Garden City and Southfield, all from \$6.70 per month to \$6.90; Farmington and Westland from \$6.15 to \$6.65; Plymouth from \$5.60 to \$6.40.

The company also has requested authority to make upward adjustments in several other categories. These call for a broad restructuring of business equipment rates, a higher charge to install service to a new home, apartment or business; an increase in intrastate long distance charges; replacement of the present statewide nickel-a-minute service with a new budget toll dialing service; and approval to charge for "information" calls when they exceed five per month.

Calls in excess of the five-call allowance would be charged at the rate of 10 cents each starting in the 1974-75 period. Bell officials say that studies show 80 per cent of telephone customers call "information" no more than five times a month.

AT PRESENT it costs Michigan Bell \$18 million annually to provide "information," and it is the company's position that those who use the service more should pay more.

Public hearings will be called before the commission takes action on the application. Bell's request for the \$29.7 million overall increase is designed, officials said, "to bring earnings up to the level previously deemed fair and reasonable" by the PSC.

Eleanor Driver, director of Oakland's Continuum Center and a leader in communication skills, will discuss "The Art of Communicating" during the morning session.

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
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
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


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### Clixby Assists Relief Flights

**PLYMOUTH**  
Tech. Sgt. William H. Clixby of Plymouth was among U.S. Air Force crewmembers who helped airlift critically needed food and medical supplies into Nicaragua after the capital city of Managua was devastated by an earthquake just before Christmas.

The sergeant is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert T. Clixby, 2524 Canton Center Rd., and has completed 34 months combat duty in Vietnam.

More than two million pounds of food, water, medical supplies and heavy equipment were carried into Nicaragua during the relief effort. On return flights, the aircraft evacuated approximately 400 U.S. citizens.

to the county group before making a recommendation. The criticism came at the

public hearing the commission conducted on the Mocer zoning petition involving a proposed housing and regional shopping center at Sheldon and Joy Roads. Irate residents charged the commission with "passing the buck" when it referred the request to the county for a recommendation.

AT THE TIME, Lawton patiently tried to explain that the referral was not a stall tactic, but a procedure prescribed by law. However, Monday night, the suggestion that approximately 50 squares miles - or eight per cent - of the total 623 square miles in Wayne County remain in agriculture zoning monopolized the discussion.

Bennett explained that while the county was advocating farm land retention, it was not dictating where the locations should be. That determination would be made on a local level, he said.

Bennett outlined three possible methods a community could use if there was a sincere dedication to keep land in agriculture. One was by using "dual" assessment figures - one set if the land remained agricultural and the other when it returned to the market. Either the owner or the buyer would then have to repay the taxes due for the time the land was used for farming.

A second method was an "easement" agreement between a landowner and local government whereby for a specified time of years, the land will stay in agricultural use and the assessment will be on that use.

He favored stronger zoning requirements, written so that agriculture became "the highest and best possible use of the land." He said this could be done if agriculture was considered a specialized form of industry. He said that both tax relief approaches depended on new legislation while zoning offered an immediate solution.

"What is needed is the commitment to retain agriculture," Bennett said in the report.

LAWTON SAID that the county planners and assessors were in direct opposition on this point.

He said, for instance, that many Canton farmers have appealed their assessments before the Wayne County Bureau of Taxation and have gotten nowhere with their plea for a tax reduction.

Lawton asked Bennett for a letter supporting the strategy position on farmland retention "that we can take to the Wayne County Bureau of Taxation."

Bennett replied that the commission "would take the assignment and work on it."

At no time during the meeting did the question of the Mocer zoning which the county recommended be denied come up for direct discussion.

A vague reference to the development came in a question by Michael Manore, Canton planning consultant. Manore questioned Bennett on how far a community's responsibility goes in informing its neighbors of impending development.

"Would you say a site plan and a letter are enough?" asked Manore.

It is, said Bennett, if the communities have a history of good relationships.

Manore was alluding to the Mocer development and Canton's repeated attempts to meet with the City of Plymouth and Plymouth Township over the Mocer development. The Canton planner's question was an indirect reference to the county's recommendation that the rezoning be denied, with one of the reasons being that Canton officials had failed to consult with neighboring Plymouth Township.

# Services Are Important, Not 'Identity Nonsense'

**EDITOR:**  
After appearing before the Wayne County Planning Commission and submitting several articles to the newspapers concerning our feelings of being ignored and ill-treated by or elected township officials, it now looks like these same officers are taking the homeowners associations seriously and our ideas have some validity. If this is so, the associations are pleased.

We understand that elected officials must consider the benefit of the whole township, not just one area. But we believe that when individual areas are affected directly, then their opinions, attitudes and beliefs should be given respect and consideration far more than those of builders or developers who are interested in reaping profits and leaving the township.

There is a saying, "Call me anything, but spell my name right," which can be applied to Canton Township.

Our identity is not so important that we must prostitute the welfare of township residents, present and future, and that of citizens in surrounding areas.

**WHO REALLY** cares whether Canton has an identity, as long as the area is a good healthy place to raise our children?

The issue of Canton's "identity" seems to be a tempest in a teapot. We don't think Canton identity matters, as long as people are able to enjoy living here, not because it is a famous neighborhood.

Let us concern ourselves, rather, with the quality of our schools, police protection, roads and other services. Let's forget the "identity" nonsense.

If we allow shopping centers and apartments and duplexes to be built all over the township because some public relations man is sharp enough to put Canton's name on a project, pretty soon Canton will have a real identity, but not one that will draw people.

Garbage has an identity, but people don't move great distances to live next to it. An identity can be as unpleasant as pleasant, as undesirable as desirable. Canton could thrive without an identity rather than having an unpleasant one.

Since the homeowners became organized in Canton Township, we have had no official sanction or applause for our positions and ideas.

Finally, a member of the township planning commission and all those of the Wayne County Planning Commission have now given us that sanction.

**ELLEN RULAND** proposed a moratorium to allow our township to get its bearings, and the Wayne County Planning Commission recommended denial of the rezoning from one acre lots to multiple and commercial.

In the past we have been treated as wild-eyed radicals, but now our officials have recognized our position and agreed with it.

Bus officials wondered why half the children already aboard the first bus did not leave for the circus.





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

## Ford Transmission Set New Records in '72

Both production and payrolls for Ford Motor Co.'s Transmission Division were at record levels in 1972. John A. Manoogian, division general manager, reported today.

The division, which has its headquarters and largest plant in Livonia, produced 3,351,699 units during the year — surpassing by more than 300,000 units the previous record established in 1969.

Annual payrolls and fringe benefit costs for the division totaled \$282 million, also an all-time high and \$68.3 million above the former record set in 1971.

NOTING FORD economists' predictions of continued growth in industry auto sales, Manoogian said he is optimistic about the division's outlook for 1973.

"New-car sales in the United States since last summer have been at an annual rate of more than 11 million units," Manoogian pointed out. "Our economists expect this sales pace to hold — or even increase — while truck volume also should continue upward, perhaps exceeding 2.8 million units."

Not only is the automotive market generally buoyant, Manoogian said, but

customers are choosing more optional equipment — a development that also bodes well for the Transmission Division.

"Of our total production in 1972, manual transmissions accounted for only six per cent, with automatics making up the remainder," he said. "As recently as 1965, manual transmissions accounted for 28 per cent of total production."

THE DIVISION produces manual transmissions and automatic units for use with the company's larger engines at the 2.6 million-square-foot facility in Livonia.

No dates have been set for the hearings, Taylor said. At least one will be held in the county hospital.

cludes Garden City and most of Westland, presented the committee petitions signed by 64 area doctors asking for staff privileges at the hospital.

The committee approved eight resolutions at a recent meeting to endorse the major recommendations made last month by the commissioners' task force study of the hospital.

A major recommendation endorsed by the committee is the appointment of five county commissioners to replace members on the Board of Institutions, which oversees hospital operations.

The board will also have private citizens appointed by the commissioners to assure citizen representation.

THE COMMITTEE supported the Task Force recommendation on reorganizing the hospital's management staffing and structure of the hospital.

This would be done with the help of University of Michigan and Wayne State University, which handle the psychiatric section of the hospital under an agreement with the county board.

The committee hopes the psychiatric care division will be eventually separated from the long-term medical section.

Taylor, a freshman commissioner, campaigned last year on the promise of opening up the hospital staff to practicing doctors in the suburbs. He said the current system led to a 71 per cent occupancy rate for the past fiscal year, far below other hospitals, and a \$12 million deficit.

# Youngster Gives GOP Vet A 4-Vote Scare

A Plymouth political novice came a hairsbreadth from winning a seat on the Republican State Central Committee over an established Livonia Republican during the 2nd Congressional District caucus.

Mark McKelvey, a freshman at Michigan State University, was just four votes short of Dave Leathley's tally of 41 votes in the bid for one of four state central seats allotted to the 2nd district.

It was the only contested race in an otherwise placid caucus prior to Saturday's state convention. The whole 2nd District met in the caucus, including Monroe and Washtenaw Counties as well as Livonia and Plymouth.

The balance of officers and state central members from each portion of the district was worked out prior to the caucus and agreed on by all delegates. The Wayne county portion got two officer seats, one state central seat and five seats on the district committee.

AT 18, McKelvey has had the distinction of being the youngest Michigan precinct delegate since his election last May. He almost furthered that distinction by becoming the youngest member of the State Central Committee, and his challenge came much closer than had been expected.

Leathley retired last fall as chairman of the Wayne County portion of the old 19th Congressional district after four years. Prior to that he was vice chairman for two years and chairman of the Livonia Republican Club for two years.

He has worked on several campaigns and is the senior partner of Retzlaff, Leathley, Harrington and Associates candy firm.

Both candidates distributed flyers enumerating their activities in the party. McKelvey, who is studying political science, personally signed each of his. McKelvey also pasted posters in the lobby of the Detroit Hilton where the caucus was held as well as along the stairways and in the caucus room.

"For four years I have been a hard-working Republican," he told the caucus. "I have the time, the desire and would be very proud to serve as your state central delegate. I've been running hard, and I would appreciate your support."

McKelvey stressed that he

would be an active member of what he considered a passive committee.

"I'VE ATTENDED state central meetings, and I've thought of them as a glob of people who don't do anything," he said prior to the caucus.

He didn't want to be a token youth on the committee, he added.

"I think of myself as a young person who's been able to bridge the gap between young delegates and older ones," McKelvey said. "I don't think of myself as a token young person."

Leathley promised to be an active committee member but, while talking to the caucus, he stressed his credentials and the fact that he knows "important" Republican officials personally.

"I'm on first name terms with not only local officials in Michigan but statewide officials," he said. "I think this is the most important aspect."

Livonia school board member Marvin Pridgeon nominated Leathley, saying that he "has built up a lot of debts that he can deliver for the district." Pridgeon's brief speech extolling Leathley's virtues drew attention when he nearly slipped off the stage without mentioning Leathley's name.

WHEN THE VOTE was taken, delegates from Washtenaw and Monroe Counties were divided between the two. McKelvey got votes from Plymouth delegates and a few conservative Livonians, including former Livonia Republican chairman Chuck Chandler and school board member Martin Seitz.

"It was a fair race, and I congratulate Mr. Leathley," McKelvey said after his loss. "I'll keep working—I'll still be around."

Later Leathley said the vote

was closer than he had expected. He said he would invite McKelvey to all of the meetings and encourage him to stay active.

In the uncontested races, E.O. (Bud) Webber of Northville was re-elected 2nd district vice chairman, and Carol Sellman of Plymouth was elected district secretary.

Mrs. Sellman had resigned as secretary of the Wayne 2nd district immediately after she was elected in January with a slate of officers. She had supported Tony Licata of Plymouth in his unsuccessful bid for Wayne 2nd chairman and refused to serve under the winner, Mrs. Sylvia Skrel.

The conflict was apparently resolved with Mrs. Skrel

nominating Mrs. Sellman for district secretary.

The caucus also elected five local Republicans to the 2nd District committee including Mrs. Skrel, Licata, Ron Cowden, Harry Greeleaf and Joyce LeMaster.

In Howmet's year-end report, sales of both years were restated to eliminate the sales of operations whose disposition is expected.

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
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

"It was very apparent that we didn't board well," added Andrews. "Petsch was high for us with eight."


"The race is over," said a dejected RU coach. "I can't envision Allen Park losing two more. They may lose against Bentley but not against any other."



# Plymouth Roars By Edsel Ford

An all-time Plymouth High School basketball record is within reach of first-year coach Fred Thomann and his charges who now need only two more victories to become the winningest Rock team of them all.

Plymouth's 1950-51, 1954-55 and 1968-69 clubs all notched 14 wins to share the school record for total victories, and Friday's 70-54 decision over Edsel Ford made it No. 13 for the 1972-73 Rocks.

Thomann's troops will have a shot at the record-tying No. 14 this week, but lying in wait with a home-court advantage will be Livonia Bentley - the oldest and most honored of Plymouth's rivals. Plymouth won an earlier meeting, 60-58.

After that, one more pre-tournament game will remain for the Rocks. That will be at home against Trenton March 2.

Six-foot-five Ron Egloff was the take charge guy in victimizing Edsel Ford to make the season's count 13-4 and Plymouth's Suburban Eight record 8-4. The aggressive senior center matched his game-leading 20 points with 20 rebounds - half his team's total - as the Rocks made it seven wins in their last eight starts.

Edsel Ford had upset Plymouth, 50-48, in December, and the Thunderbirds were in the hunt this time

throughout the first half. They trailed only 18-14 at the quarter and their 17-10 spree in the second period behind the scoring of Mark Bores and Mike Booth gave Ford a 31-28 halftime lead.

JANICE has had a table tennis paddle in her hand since the age of 10 when her father, Castle, used to take her to play at different recreation centers.


At the age of 12, Janice won the state championship for girls in the 13 and under bracket at Cobo Hall and since has found her way into



## Turf Tips, Quips

Are Michigan harness racing enthusiasts seeing a repeat of the Doctor Stanton story of the late 1940s?

That's the question being asked by those who still remember the feats of the famed Canadian pacer who did as much to build interest in the sport in Michigan than any other single horse.

The reason for the queries is the spectacular performances of Bedford Jet, the six-year-old speedster owned and trained by Ed Weber, of West Bloomfield. As of this writing The Jet hasn't lost in five 1973 starts, meeting and beating all of the fastest horses at Northville, Downs and Windsor Raceway.

The big pacer ran out of competition at the 'Downs and Weber moved him to Windsor to see how he would do against the top stars there. He has the answer... The Jet paced like one a week ago in his first start and won handily from the No. 8 post. He made it two in a row last Saturday when he whipped a classy field in 2:04.3.

As of now it appears as if Bedford Jet will receive an invitation to compete in the rich Provincial Cup pace at Windsor in mid-March. It all depends how he performs during the next three weeks... if he continues to mow down competition, then he'll have a crack at the \$50,000 purse... if he has a letdown, then chances are that Racing Secretary Joe De Frank will not issue the invitation.

Weber, who is a millman for a Walled Lake lumber yard, with a yen for pacers and trotters, would like nothing better than a bid. He believes his horse is in the best form of three years and could be a strong contender.

In addition, he'd like to show folks in Michigan and Ontario that his horse isn't a flash-in-the-pan but a great star in the making.

THE RACING career of Bedford Jet resembles that of the late Dr. Stanton who was purchased for \$350 as a green pacer in 1946 by Lindsey Fraser, of Forest, Ontario, and became one of the great stars of that era.

Fraser brought out Dr. Stanton at Northville Downs in 1946. The pacer hadn't started a race but had shown something in workouts that made Fraser know he had the makings of a real star.

The good Doctor won his first start in good time for a

green horse. He repeated the next week and then continued winning until he had a string that attracted the attention of racing fans all over the state and in Ontario.

The 'Downs kept bringing in fast pacers from other tracks then in operation and Dr. Stanton beat them all. He was responsible for the sudden growth of interest in night parimutuel betting racing in Michigan. As Dr. Stanton won, more and more turned out to see the wonder horse and the handle climbed to record proportions for that time.

Eventually Fraser took his star to Roosevelt Raceway where he continued to win, banking almost \$200,000 before his tragic death during a morning workout as a 12-year-old at Hazel Park.

The Bedford Jet story follows the same pattern. Weber purchased the horse as a green pacer for \$500 in February 1970 at the Delaware, O. sale.

"I JUST WANTED to buy a horse and Bedford Jet was at a price I could afford," said Weber in recalling the auction sale. "I thought it would be nice to have a horse capable of competing at the county fairs."

The going was a bit rough the first year since The Jet showed plenty of speed but didn't stay on gait long enough to win.

That's when Weber turned him over to his 17-year-old daughter Lisa and she worked wonders in settling down the nervous pacer.

The Jet started to show flashes of speed as a four-year-old and then was on the sidelines most of last year with a baffling illness that was cured only by the long rest.

However, his earnings

through his fifth year totaled more than \$40,000... quite a showing for a \$500 "cinderella" horse.

When Bedford Jet failed to measure up in the late closing pacing series during the Jackson-at-Northville meeting in December, Weber took him back to the farm for another rest.

WHATEVER WAS WRONG was corrected by the care and attention given by Lisa and her father and The Jet was declared fit again when the 'Downs opened its winter meeting in late January.

"Fit" is putting it mildly for the pacer sped away from competition in his first test to win by seven or eight lengths in 2:04.1, fastest mile of the winter.

He repeated a week later, laid off a week, and won again. That's when he ran out of starts at the 'Downs and had to shift to Windsor to keep busy.

The big question now is whether he'll have the same situation there. To date two starts, two victories and a bankroll of more than \$15,000 thus far during the winter.

Perhaps the Canadian owners will back away as the owners of the top horses at Northville did. It will be interesting to see what happens.

FROM WOLVERINE Raceway, which opens an 82-night meeting in mid-March, comes word that Vice President and General Manager Dick Wilson has received permission from Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley to use a form of the quadtractor as one of three betting gimmicks.

Wolverine will have a nightly double on the first two races, a trifecta and a superfecta (quadtractor). It will be a first for the last mentioned which has gained considerable popularity in Windsor.

The Farmington Falcon wrestling squad scored a first it will long remember.

For years on end, this birthday story has been handed down, and no one ever admits that it is a myth and nothing more than a bit of fiction concocted by old Parson Weems, self-acclaimed "world's greatest liar."

Every time he hears the story, The Stroller has to smile and recall his school days including the day he helped break up a Washington birthday celebration.

THERE COMES to mind that dreary afternoon in the little old, red school house back home when the teacher went to great lengths to point out that Washington was a model for all persons, especially the younger generation, and that he never did anything considered out of line.

As she spoke, The Stroller got a glimpse of a picture on the wall showing Washington crossing the Delaware River with his troops the night before the battle of Trenton —

and he was standing up! "What about him standing up in a rowboat?" The Stroller asked. "You've often warned us never to do that so he couldn't have been much of a model."

All The Stroller got in answer was an icy glare — but the birthday celebration ended abruptly.

AND NOW, AS the memories come rolling down through the years, one of the oddest Washington birthday stories concerns a life-sized bronze statue of the man whose home in Mt. Vernon is one of the nation's most hallowed shrines.

Some years ago, the members of the Masonic fraternity in Michigan hit upon the idea of honoring George — a member of the craft — by placing a bronze likeness of him on Washington Boulevard in downtown Detroit.

The idea proved popular, and it wasn't long until the funds were raised, the statue ordered, and plans inaugurated for a grand unveiling at the intersection of the boulevard and Clifford Street.

It wasn't until the big day was close at hand that someone remembered that the city's permission had not been obtained. Worse yet, there was consternation in the Masonic ranks when the city fathers decreed there was no room for the statue on the boulevard!

Imagine that! No room for a statue of the man for whom the street was named.

To make matters worse, a statue of Pulaski, the famous Polish general, was being erected on the extension of the boulevard that had been Wayne Street — named after Gen. "Mad Anthony" Wayne. What to do?

FORTUNATELY, A member of the committee recalled that Washington was an Episcopalian by faith and

that Old Mariners Church on East Jefferson Avenue also was of that denomination. Quickly, arrangements were made and permission


granted to place the big, bronze statue on the lawn of the old church for all to see. Few people who come to view it now know how the

statue got there — that it wasn't allowed on the boulevard named for him — or that it once was the center of a controversy.

Maybe, someday to commemorate the birthday, the city fathers will decree that East Jefferson Avenue, like Wayne Street before it, will be

designated as an extension of Washington Boulevard. It would be a fitting way to honor the man with enough courage to stand up in a

rowboat the night before his greatest battle. And it's the only way the statue may ever have a place on Washington Boulevard.

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# Now Is Time To Plan 1973 Vegetable Garden

**EAST LANSING**  
Home gardeners, now is the time to sit down in your warm house and make plans for your spring garden. Michigan State University horticulturists say that planning now will save you time and trouble later on.

Think about last year's garden. Did you have any special problems with it? If so, figure out what caused them and try to do things differently (and better) this time.

Much of your garden's success depends on its location. An open, level area away from buildings, trees or shrubs that can block sunlight is best. Nearby trees and bushes may also use up some of the soil moisture and nutrients that should be reserved for your garden plants. Soil should be loose, rich

and fertile. Good drainage is a must.

For convenience, your garden should be close to the house and to a water supply.

Make a scale drawing of your proposed garden. Indicate size, row spacing, arrangement of crops, planting dates and any other useful information.

Your garden should be big enough to meet the needs of your family, but not too big, or it can become a burden on the gardener.

If you are limited to a small plot, you might want to avoid vegetables that take up a lot of space, such as cucumbers, melons, potatoes and squash.


**SELECT** vegetables that your family enjoys. Consult seed catalogs to select the varieties you want, and order

early to avoid sellouts. Be sure to choose disease-resistant varieties.

In deciding which crops to plant in which rows, try to keep early variety together. Also, tall-growing plants should be together and to the north or west of shorter plants to avoid shading them.

Why not plant several varieties of the same vegetable or stagger planting dates to extend your harvest period?

**The Green Thumb**

There are two ways to start a small asparagus patch: seeds and plants. Seed is the cheapest method but takes longer.

If you want just enough for the family, your best bet would be to order some roots from your local or mail-order nursery. Asparagus will grow in any well drained soil. Add all the humus you can get to the soil before planting. Enrich it with manure, compost, leafmold, sawdust, whatever is available.

Allow about 15 plants for each member of the family. If you plan to freeze some, then better allow 25 plants for each member of the family.

How about young seedlings which come up voluntarily in the patch... can they be used?

No reason why you can't transplant these young plants from seed and start a patch. Your neighbor would be glad to share these with you, as he undoubtedly has some he wants to get rid of.

Home gardeners who want to sow asparagus seed, should soak seed 24 hours before planting. After they come up, be sure to thin them out, two inches in the row. There are about 1,500 seeds to an ounce.

**WATCH YOUR CANNAS:** Take a look at your canna roots to see if any have rotted. Cut out rotted portion and dust with sulfur. Late February is a good time to start your cannas in pots, if you want earlier blooms. Or you can leave them in the boxes where they are stored, and plant outdoors in shirt-sleeve weather.

Canna roots multiply like mad, so you should have enough roots for yourself and your neighbor. Cannas are ideal as border plants (background) or in bed. If you want a striking effect, plant a bed of cannas with salvias, marigolds or petunias ringed around it.

After the canna blooms have gone, you still have color from the salvias or other plants, plus the showy leaves of the canna themselves.

**GREEN THUMB CLINIC:** A reader writes: "We want to set out some strawberry plants, and wonder if Catskill, an old variety is any good."

Yes, Catskill is still a good variety, noted for its big crops. Fairfax is another good oldtimer. Try Sparkle and Jerseybelle for late types, ideal for eating fresh and freezing. Surecrop is another good one to try.

## Wetlands In Home Can Be Hazardous

Be one-handed in the wetlands.

The "wetlands" are bathrooms, kitchens, and laundries, which have one thing in common - water. And water contributes to three major hazards in the home: slips, scalds, and electric shock.

Electricity is likely to be used near water sources, therefore, do not touch such appliances as toasters, mixers, or coffee makers with one hand while you turn on the faucet with the other, warns the Institute for Safer Living of the American Mutual Insurance Companies.

**TAKE HEED** of the "tingles." Sometimes, with dry hands and standing on a dry floor, you can feel a slight tingle of electricity when you touch the metal housing of an appliance. That's a tip-off to current leakage.

It may or may not be a hazardous amount, but can you afford to take the chance? Have the questionable device checked by an electrician.

Some persons disconnect an appliance by removing the cord from the appliance itself, instead of from the wall outlet. That's bad, says the institute, especially in the household wetlands.

When cords for coffee makers or electric shavers

are left to dangle from wall outlets, the cords remain energized - and lethal if dropped into a sink filled with water.

Never use a plug-in radio while you're taking a bath or shower (portable battery models are OK). The same thing goes for record players, hair dryers, hot combs, or any other appliances. Exercise care with all electrical appliances in the wetlands.

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

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# Suburban GOP Cool To Transit Plan

From the figures, it looked as if Gov. William Milliken won a big victory when he persuaded the Republican state convention to reject a resolution opposing the state's new two-cent gasoline tax hike.

The vote was 436 in favor and 1,223 against a floor proposal calling for repeal of the tax hike, which includes a half-cent for public transportation. On paper that looks like nearly a 4-1 victory for the governor, a champion of "balanced transportation," but in truth there are some soft spots:

• Two voice votes were so close that convention chairman Nancy Chase of Ann Arbor had to resort to the roll call.

• Milliken himself took

the podium, interrupting the roll call (improper under most parliamentary rules), to denounce the proposal as "irresponsible" and say its passage would be a "direct repudiation" of him and his works.

• Two big suburban delegations, the 14th and the 17th, were bound up in recounts so that their votes were never recorded.

• There were other weak spots in suburban delegations, even though the suburbs would be among the chief beneficiaries of a major tax hike goal: Takeover by the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority of Detroit's DSR bus system and a metropolitan bus system.

TAKE, FOR ONE notable example, the case of the 17th District, which covers north-

west Detroit, Redford Township, Southfield and Farmington.

A first tally showed 70 in favor of the amendment and 44 opposed - a more than 3-2 margin against the governor.

Chairman Denzil Hammond took the delegation to the rear of the Cobo Hall convention room in an effort to get a more accurate count. Meanwhile, Milliken backers used all their powers of persuasion on the antagonistic votes.

As the 17th still caucused, convention secretary Weldon Yeager announced that enough votes had been accumulated to indicate the proposal had been defeated.

A Redford delegate, Clarence Irwin, charged that Hammond and the district leadership polled the delegation four separate times

without a vote being changed. Irwin said Redford delegate sentiment was heavily in favor of the gasoline tax repeal. He blamed Hammond's alleged delaying tactics for depriving the 17th of its vote.

IN THE 14th, which includes the Grosse Pointe suburbs, Chairman Richard Durant, a conservative thorn in the side of moderate Republicans, announced a vote of 102 to 7 in favor of the repeal proposal.

A woman delegate challenged the count, however, and the 14th also was taking a recount when Yeager ended the roll call.

Even the 2nd District (which includes portions of Wayne, Washtenaw and Monroe counties) was no tower of strength for the governor. Overall, its vote was 55 to 39 against the repeal proposal, a weaker margin of Milliken support than many out-state districts provided.

Looking more closely, the Wayne portion (Livonia, Plymouth, Northville) provided a bare majority for the governor - 18 to 16 with one abstention.

Of Observerland delegations, only the 15th (Garden City, Westland, Canton and points south) gave Milliken strong support, 62 to 2.

IT'S ONE THING for a party to oppose its own governor's proposal. But in this case, the matter was more serious because the gasoline tax hike, with its public transit provisions, has already been enacted into law.

Moreover, the western suburbs' degree of dissent was all the more surprising because the State Senate's chief sponsor of the bill was Carl Pursell of Plymouth.

It's not unusual for a governor to plead his case directly to delegates. Milliken's predecessor, George Romney, often did so. But last Saturday, Milliken dropped his lunch and interrupted a roll call to plead his cause.

All standard parliamentary rules forbid the interruption of a roll call by anyone for anything but a fire, and some delegates attempted to shout down Milliken as out of order. The governor raised his voice and got his way. But it was close.

## Students Stir Up GOP Convention

Anyone who expected last weekend's Michigan Republican state convention in Detroit to be dull wasn't counting on Mari Egbert and Kent Aitchison.

Miss Egbert, 20, formerly of Northville and now legally a Livonia resident, and Aitchison, 19, of northwest Detroit, ran campaigns as sophisticated as any senior party member had ever put together.

Miss Egbert won the third vice chairmanship in a roll call vote that concluded the convention. The third VC seat, by party rules must go to someone between the ages of 18 and 24.

The unannounced final tally was 1,440 to 327 in favor of Miss Egbert, although the spread was tighter until the closing minutes. A third candidate, Bill Whitlock of Hope College, withdrew, sought out the Egbert forces for bargaining purposes, and threw his support to the lady.

SHE BEGAN her career at 14 in the Northville Teenage Republican Club and in 1970 was a youth coordinator in the successful campaign of State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth).

Pursell returned the favor by letting the Egbert team use his office in Lansing and by advising them on strategy.

"You know, she's got at least five persons working for her in every congressional district," Pursell marveled.

It showed she carried 17 of the 19 congressional districts; Aitchison won one, and another failed to complete its tally.

The 2nd (Livonia, Plymouth, Northville, Washtenaw and Monroe) went for Egbert, 85 to 10; the 15th (Garden City, Westland, Canton and points south) backed her, 46 to 18. Only his home 17th (northwest Detroit, Redford, Southfield, Lathrup and

Farmington) gave Aitchison a majority, 110 to 4.

An enthusiastic stump speaker, Miss Egbert told caucus groups she intended to re-establish the youth advisory council in the party and the TAR clubs, inactive in recent years.

She also advocated that every county organization have a youth vice chairmanship.

Writing from her Michigan State University dorm room in her pamphlet, the blonde political science student said flatly: "I feel I am entirely capable of fulfilling these responsibilities considering my previous record of leadership and dedication."

AITCHISON'S own organization was nearly as good. The University of Michigan student said that so far he is the only youth vice chairman of a senior party organization (17th Congressional District) in the state.

Denzil Hammond, 17th district chairman, spoke glowingly of Aitchison's work as an advance man for Sen. Robert Griffin's successful 1972 campaign.

"Kent doesn't come in and boss everyone around. He finds out local strengths and weaknesses, asks what he can do for you, and then tells you what he would like done."

HUMMEL'S ATTITUDE and fantastic stories drive his fellow recruits up the wall, especially Kress (Orson Wingo), who contributes the comic relief in the first act.

There is a Hummel in every military company, and anyone who has ever been in the military will enjoy the realistic flavor of blanket parties, five-mile runs, crap games and foul language that run throughout the first act.

The second act concentrates on the serious aspect of the military, war, and all that is

inherent in that most ancient of man's endeavors. Although running too long and with an anti-war theme which would have thrilled many a few months ago but seems hackneyed today, the play is technically sound, well-performed and is worth seeing.

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
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

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After 2 Special Meetings

# Livonia School Trustees Discuss Differences

**LIVONIA** Monday night's meeting may be a showdown between opposing factions of the Livonia school board.

Trustees John Stymelski and Martin F. Seitz held a second aborted special board meeting Wednesday night. Other board members boycotted it, as they did a similar meeting called by Seitz and Stymelski the week before.

However, the items listed on the agendas for the two special meetings are scheduled to be discussed at Monday night's regular meeting.

The rift between Seitz and Stymelski on one hand and Trustees William Brown, Charles Akey, Mrs. Geraldine Joyner, Mrs. Constance Hierta and Marvin Pridgeon on the other, continued to grow last week. Both sides issued statements criticizing the other.

Last week's special meeting featured Seitz and Stymelski reviewing their press releases for an audience of eight and reporters.

Neither meeting called by the pair was official, however, because of a lack of a quorum. Seitz and Stymelski's statements took a harsher tone this week after other trustees individually issued scathing attacks last week.

**SEITZ, WHO** the week before refused to discuss his differences with Board President Brown, Wednesday night accused Brown of withholding information from the board.

Seitz said Brown failed to inform the board of a certified letter concerning a grievance which resulted in confusion at a board hearing. A school source said normally certified letters on grievances, though addressed to Brown, are delivered to administrators.

Seitz also charged that Brown overstepped his authority by writing a letter to City Clerk Addison Bacon about the possible use of the school district's computers by the city government.

In addition, Seitz charged that Brown "has taken my mail from a school district employe and held it without my approval or knowledge." Brown was unavailable for comment on the charges. However, the letter which Seitz's statement alleges was withheld from him is addressed to Brown. Seitz attached copies of both Brown's letter to Bacon and Bacon's reply to his release.

Seitz's conclusion is that "... the board president decides, on his own, not only what information the board will receive, but if, and when. I believe such actions are unethical and unbecoming of the office of president of the board."

**STYMELSKI** argued that the other board members are attempting to stifle comments from him and Seitz. The board majority, he said, does not want a public confrontation.

"No board can function divided. It is very evident that we are pushed into silence by the overwhelming unity of five members of the board," Stymelski said.

The trustee also challenged comments from other board members that the items should be discussed at a regular meeting.

The agendas for the two special meetings have included items about operation of board committees and officers. The first special meeting agenda had an item about employe negotiations. Seitz said the item was deleted to meet objections of other trustees.

"Whenever we try to bring the board members together,

which is a legal right of any two board members, we are told to bring our desires to the next regular board meeting for consideration. We are never sure what will appear on an agenda because it is in the hands of (Supt. R.H.) Upton and Brown," Stymelski said.

Stymelski said at a previous meeting he had asked to speak at the beginning of the meeting under "correspondence," but his request instead was placed at the end of the agenda.

**THE FIVE** other board members issued a joint statement Wednesday saying they would not attend the special meeting.

"They (Seitz and Stymelski) were, on Feb. 12, asked to withdraw the call for the special meeting and have their proposal included on the agenda of the regular board

meeting on Feb. 19. No response was received from this request," the statement said. The board held a private session on negotiations Monday.

The five said they are

willing to discuss Stymelski and Seitz's items at a regular meeting. However, they said the special meetings were called without the "courtesy" of advising other trustees of their intentions and without

asking when the other trustees were available.

Seitz and Stymelski also did not present alternatives to present board policies and procedures before the special meeting, they said.

# We're No. 1 In Sweet Cherries

By ELLY

Larrestine Trimm of the Michigan Department of Agriculture reminds us February is National Cherry Month. She also has the good news that Michigan is now the nation's top producer of sweet red cherries.

The state has been tops in sour cherry production for years. It has ranked second or third in sweet cherries and in 1972 it attained first place.

With George Washington's birthday coming up tomorrow, you may be serving the traditional cherry pie.

"To add a nutty flavor to your favorite cherry pie," Mrs. Trimm suggests, modify the pastry recipe for a two-crust pie by using one cup of uncooked oatmeal and two teaspoons of white sugar in place of one cup of flour."

A great proportion of the sweet cherries is made into maraschino cherries. Here's a favorite recipe of my mother's. Be sure to cut into very small bars because they are very rich.

**CHERRY NUT BARS**  
In a saucepan combine:  
1 c. brown sugar  
1/2 c. butter or margarine  
1/2 c. milk  
Bring to a boil, remove from heat and add:  
1 c. graham cracker crumbs  
1 c. chopped nuts  
1 c. coconut  
8 maraschino cherries, chopped  
Blend well.

Arrange a layer of graham crackers in the bottom of an eight-inch square pan. Cover with the filling then top with another layer of graham crackers. Press down. Spread with icing made of:  
1 c. sifted confectioners sugar  
2 T. butter  
1 T. milk  
1/2 t. vanilla.  
Drizzle with melted chocolate or cracker crumbs. (Optional) Cut into small bars.

**CHERRY SQUARES**  
30 arrowroot biscuits  
1 lb. colored marshmallows, cut up  
1/2 c. chopped nuts  
1/2 c. maraschino cherries, chopped  
1 can Eagle Brand milk  
Coconut  
Roll biscuits to fine crumb stage. Add marshmallow pieces, cherries, nuts and Eagle Brand. Mix well. Sprinkle bottom of a nine-inch square pan with coconut. Pour mixture over this and top with more coconut. Chill overnight. If you are not fond of coconut, icing sugar may be used instead. Cut into bars or squares.

**CHERRY NUT BREAD**  
2 1/2 c. enriched flour  
1 t. salt  
4 t. baking powder  
3/4 c. sugar  
1 1/4 c. milk  
1 egg well beaten  
2 T. melted shortening  
1/2 c. chopped nuts  
1 c. all-bran  
1 1/3 c. chopped candied cherries

Sift dry ingredients. Combine milk, egg and shortening. Add all at once to dry ingredients and stir just until dry ingredients are moist. Stir in remaining ingredients. Turn into a greased loaf pan (5 by 9). Sprinkle with cherry nut topping and bake in 350-degree oven for one hour.

**CHERRY-NUT TOPPING:** Combine one teaspoon softened butter, 1/4 cup brown sugar, 1/3 cup chopped cherries and 1/4 cup chopped walnut meats.

**CHERRY CREAM DELIGHT**  
8 graham crackers, crushed  
1/3 c. butter  
8-oz. pkg. cream cheese  
1 c. confectioners' sugar  
1 pkg. dessert topping  
1 can cherry pie filling

Line bottom of nine-inch square pan with graham cracker crumbs mixed with the butter. Soften cream cheese and blend with the sugar. Prepare dessert topping and blend with the cream cheese mixture. Spread on graham cracker base, reserving a small amount for top. Pour cherry pie filling over cream mixture. Garnish with dabs of the cream mixture and chill thoroughly. Cut in squares for serving. Delicious.



## Evidence Indicates 1973 Should Be Strong Economically In Suburbs

The news lately has been filled with ominous rumblings and grumbings about the state of our economy.

Last week, the dollar was devalued by 10%, the second such drop in the past 14 months. If you're a scotch drinker, your favorite brand will go up pretty soon, and if you had your heart set on that little foreign sports car, you'd better check your bank balance once again.

Then there is Phase III of the President's economic stabilization plan, coming just a few months ahead of the regular bargaining trauma between the auto industry and the United Auto Workers. Preliminary noises coming from the contestants seem to show that the union is going to concentrate on non-economic issues, while the auto companies see this year as a good one for a "non-inflationary, responsible settlement," which means an inexpensive one.

For the Detroit metropolitan area, the state of local business depends on the state of the auto industry, which in turn depends on the state of overall national economic policy and the worldwide state of the dollar.

Just what kind of a year can we look forward to here in the suburbs?

EVIDENCE is scanty, particularly with the auto talks looming in the future. But there are some bits and pieces which can help folks make an educated guess about what's going to happen.

By all standards, the auto industry had one whale of a year. Profits were at an all-time record level, sales were very strong last year and look very good for the rest of 1973. The jobbing shops in this area had, in general, a good year last year, and you don't hear of many people being laid off as we move toward summer model changeover time.

Oddly, the strong showing by the auto companies did not reflect itself in the unemployment figures, as it used to do regularly. Nationally, unemployment in January was 5%, but in Michigan it was 7% and in the metropolitan area it was 6.2%. Clearly, we can no longer assume that just because auto sales are good, unemployment will be down, probably because the auto companies have discovered that it's cheaper to run significant amounts of overtime than to hire

new workers and pay the fringe benefit package for each new employee.

The unemployment problem, however, seems to be affecting us in the suburbs very little. Most suburban businessmen I talk to say they are starting to experience difficulty in hiring qualified help, particularly in the skilled trades, and this indicates to me that much of our 6.2% unemployment is concentrated in the black labor force in Detroit.

ANOTHER STRAW in the wind comes from the University of Michigan Survey of Consumer Attitudes, which comes out quarterly and is just about the best economic analysis of what the consumer feels is going to happen and thus the state of buying demand.

The most recent survey showed that consumer optimism failed to improve during the fourth quarter of 1972, slipping back a bit from the high levels of the first three quarters. An unusually high number of families (52%) reported they were making more money than a year ago.

Survey economists point out that it is not uncommon for consumer optimism to level off

after a strong recovery such as 1972's, but the data show confidence in the government's ability to control inflation weakened and many people said they were troubled by rising prices.

The survey suggests consumer attitudes will remain strong and generate high demand for goods and services through much of 1973, but that people's concern over rising prices and worry over the government's ability to control inflation might signal

problems for the last part of this year and 1974.


MY LAST PIECE of evidence comes from this newspaper's own classified want ad section, which I happen to think is a darned good economic indicator.

Three months before the 1970 recession hit, our want ad count went to pieces, and it remained soft until late in 1971, just before the 1972 recovery, when it took off.

Ad count and dollar volume remained strong in the section through much of last year, but took another big jump beginning last November.

Right now, we are running between 20% and 30% more ads in our classified section than we were at the same time that year ago, and I take that as solid evidence that 1973 -- at least the first three quarters -- should be a darned good year economically for the suburbs.

## Garden City Board Isn't Ducking Anti-Busing Issue

The fever in the cross-district busing dispute in suburbia is getting higher and before it goes down, someone will get hurt in more ways than one.

The latest turn of events is reminiscent of the Sen. Joe McCarthy period during the 1950s when persons were termed communists or communist sympathizers and were forced to prove they weren't -- something impossible to do.

In the 1970s, in the busing

controversy, the latest switch is to term people or school boards pro-busing and try and let them prove otherwise.

TWO EXAMPLES of the new technique of trying to prove who is the most opposed to busing for purposes of racial integration were seen recently in the Garden City and Wayne-Westland school districts.

It probably won't be long before anti-busers in other suburbs catch on and try the same techniques -- especially with candidates trying to get elected to local school boards this June.

In reviewing both instances in Garden City and Wayne-Westland, it was clear that everyone concerned was equally anti-busing (at least in principle if not in degree) but were split on how to best fight busing and achieve educational goals in which cross-district busing could be averted.

In Garden City, the school board itself was called pro-busing by a group of angry parents who felt it should have supported them in an unsuccessful student boycott of classes.

SCHOOL principals, acting on a 1½ year old administrative regulation, issued unexcused absences for those missing from school Jan. 29 and also gave failing marks for that day's assignments for those specifically absent as part of the boycott.

The Garden City school board, despite angry charges to the contrary, is just as opposed to busing as ever. In fact, its public record is an admirable one if you are on the same side of the issue.

The board happened to have a regularly scheduled meeting on Monday, Sept. 27, 1971, the day Federal Judge Stephen J. Roth declared Detroit's public schools were illegally segregated.

An angry crowd of parents that night asked the board members to tell where they stood on the possible question of inter-district busing.

Each member maintained support of local schools for local students and opposed cross district busing.

It was probably the first suburban board to do so with such speed and positive manner.

SEVERAL months later, the board was the first (or least tied for first with the Wayne-Westland board) in suburbia to approve funds for an attorney to fight the busing case in Roth's court.

Garden City voters last June voted 29-1 on an advisory question opposing busing -- the largest margin reported in suburbia.

There is no question the public and school board stand together on opposition to busing -- angry shouts to the contrary.

In the Wayne-Westland district recently, school board member Ronald Scott was termed pro-busing by one of his colleagues in what could foreshadow the upcoming school board election where Scott is up for reelection.

SCOTT, who hasn't decided yet to run for another term, has said publicly over the past 1½ years that he is opposed to cross district busing.

Although he is the most liberal board member when it comes to social issues, Scott says he is opposed to busing and we'll take his word for it unless evidence is presented to show otherwise.

Recent events in suburban schools indicate the worst is yet to come.

As one school official said privately last week, "we'll have to wear our Ku Klux Klan sheets in public to prove our anti-busing position."

He wasn't smiling.

# Schoolcraft Changes

## 2 New Administrators?

By KATHY MORAN

Schoolcraft College President C. Nelson Grote proposed an administrative restructuring Monday that would add two new positions and change the chain of command.

Recognizing that his proposals are dependent on the budget, Dr. Grote also included options of adding just one administrator or just realigning positions. In a detailed presentation during a board study session, Dr. Grote outlined both long and short-range plans. These were the first recommendations he has made on the administrative structure since becoming college president in June of 1971.

"FROM MY vantage point as the chief administrator, we could adequately justify 35 administrators (currently there are 31) for the 1973-74 college year," Grote said.

"Realizing the financial and political constraints, I am recommending a total of 33 or two additional positions and a new configuration as a result of transfers. If necessary, we can get by with one additional position, and if absolutely mandatory, we can continue with 31 new positions in a new configuration."

"To reduce the total aggregate number of administrators for 1973-74 would in my judgment, be detrimental to the institution as we attempt to accomplish our stated purposes."

The new positions would be (1) director of information and service centers and (2) director of institutional planning and research. His proposals would also upgrade the position of director of community services to a dean's spot and downgrade the position of business manager to manager of business services.

An apparent concession to the faculty's criticism of a middle administrative layer of area directors, Dr. Grote would elimi-

nate the position of director of apprenticeships and make the director of social science a part-time position.

AN "EXECUTIVE" (secret) session was held Tuesday night for a discussion between Dr. Grote and board members on the restructuring and its relates to specific employees and their performances.

The long-range plans move toward isolating the presidency. An executive vice president would be placed directly under the president with the other administrators reporting to the executive vice president.

Richard Arlen, president of the Faculty Forum bargaining unit, distributed a faculty evaluation of the instructional administrative structure.

The faculty report concludes "there is a serious deterioration over the past three years in communications and meaningful relations with the administration."

# Will Fair Housing Get A Court Test?

Open housing laws will have to be strengthened through amendment or tested in the courts before any real change in housing patterns can happen.

That's the opinion of Mrs. Frank Wylie, former head of the Michigan Civil Rights Commission, and she predicts that open housing indeed will come eventually.

"We've had open housing laws on our books for several years now," Martha Wylie said in a recent talk to women of the First United Methodist Church of Plymouth.

"Yet housing has become more segregated than ever as far as city and suburban patterns are concerned.

"THE PROBLEM is there are so many levels where discrimination can take place—with the seller, the real

estate agency, the salesman, the lender and others.

"There has to be implementation to make it easier to find out where the discrimination takes place. I think it will have to occur through amendments or in court cases."

Mrs. Wylie pointed out that "fair employment practices have been court-tested and desegregation of schools is on its way through the courts" so, she said, it seems reasonable that housing must go the same route.

Mrs. Wylie told the Observer she is no longer a member of the Civil Rights Commission because "Gov. William Milliken saw fit not to reappoint me when my term expired in December, although he had nothing but praise for my work as chairman."

The commission now is headed by Ed Barrera of Saginaw, who she said may be



the first Mexican American in the country to hold such a post, and the new director is James Blair, formerly head of the New Jersey division on human rights. "Both are fine men," she said.

Mrs. Wylie said she had declined a request from the governor that she serve as a member of the Oakland

University board of controllers.

SHE WAS ASKED by the church women if "housing shouldn't come ahead of the busing issue."

"I don't like to call it the busing issue—it's really a school desegregation issue, and busing is a tool," she answered.

"And while it's true that truly integrated housing would end school desegregation, that seems a generation away, and school integration NOW has been ordered by the U.S. Supreme Court."

She also stated that "the Federal Housing Administration a few years ago

helped create school segregation by having different policies for granting FHA mortgages to white and black buyers.

"That is part of what Judge Stephen Roth was talking about when he found 'de jure' segregation in Detroit schools," she added.

MRS. WYLIE described the work of the state Civil Rights Commission, listed what she considered reasons for opposition to its work and made suggestions to the church women interested in useful action toward implementing equality in civil rights.

She mentioned that, while many cases that come before the commission are brought by blacks and members of other minority races, an increasing number involve discrimination against women on the basis of sex.

She cited particularly a

case in which the pay of 233 nurses aides had been upgraded to the wage of male orderlies.

"In talking to you about opposition to the work of the Civil Rights Commission," she said, "I'm not concerned with the bigots. It's the 'good people' who also resist our efforts to implement laws."

MRS. WYLIE said she could see four major reasons. "First," she said, "a lot of progress has been made in the last 10 or 15 years, and people tend to think the job has been done. But it hasn't. While national average income is up, the income of whites has risen faster than that of blacks, so the gap is wider.

# Cathy's Research Goes To WSU

The "bad news" chemical compound that kept Livonian Cathy Gerovac busy all summer turned out to be good news after all.

For eight weeks, in a special student seminar on the campus of Carson Newman College in Jefferson City, Tenn., the Bentley High School senior worked on the original compound in a cancer research project.

She finished it the last day, and it's now being tested in England to see if it deters tumors in animals.

CATHY HASN'T learned any results of that testing yet.

But she has been asked to be one of 12 students in this area to report her research in the ninth annual Southeastern Michigan Junior Sciences and Humanities Symposium. It will be held Friday and Saturday, Feb. 23 and 24, at Wayne State University.

Presenting her paper on "Cancer: Compounds and Research," she will reproduce for overhead projector the complicated formula she wrote out for our photographer in a visit to The Observer Newspapers office.

Her appearance for the symposium will have to be worked into a full schedule. Cathy carries several advanced classes at Bentley—and has a 3.9 grade point average. She's also senior class vice

president, a member of the Livonia School Board Advisory Committee, active in several other school organizations and has a part time job.

Planning to go into medicine, she has been accepted by Michigan State University and also has applied for admission to the University of Notre Dame. She decided against accepting the four-year scholarship Carson Newman College offered her because she wanted to go to a bigger school.

HER SCIENTIFIC summer at the Tennessee school Cathy described as "really fantastic."

About 35 high school students from all over the country participated in various aspects of scientific research.

"I worked with Dr. Carl Tabb Bahner, who was giving his summer to the symposium and to further cancer research," Cathy said.

"He got me working on this compound—it was called the 'bad news' compound there because it took so long and often didn't work as it was supposed to.

"I was at it six hours a day, five days a week, and finished the last morning of the eight weeks. Later, when it was tested, it checked out pure." However, Cathy guessed

that it probably was necessary for someone in the research project to make the compound again after she returned to Bentley classes.

"After all that work," she said, "I wound up with one-tenth of one per cent of a gram."

A REPORT on the research, with Cathy as co-author, is due to appear in a journal of medical chemistry.

This student researcher was most impressed by the dedication of the professional

men involved in the symposium.

"After what I saw there this summer," she said, "I'm convinced a cure for cancer can't be far away—maybe 10 years."

The WSU symposium, jointly sponsored by the university and the U.S. Army research office, will involve more than 150 top high school students and 75 teachers from Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, Washtenaw and Monroe counties.

# Boycott For A Porpoise

Mrs. Lane of Redford Township likes her tuna-fish sandwiches as well as the next person.

But she's willing to give them up for the sake of Flipper and his friends, and she hopes others in this area will consider doing the same.

Mrs. Lane is supporting the Detroit Audubon Society's Operation Dolphin, part of a nationwide drive to get the tuna industry to stop using the huge nets that kill thousands of dolphins and porpoises along with the tuna catch.

THE PORPOISES and dolphins, she said, should be

protected because their high intelligence makes them useful in research.

But, as warm-blooded, air-breathing mammals, they are smothered when trapped with the tuna in the nets that have proved an efficient method of taking tuna.

A statement from the Detroit Audubon Society, which has taken up the cause because it seeks to protect all wild life, explained the problem.

"The traditional method of capturing tuna for market formerly employed hook and line," the statement said.

"Some tuna are located by

sighting dolphin, which the tuna usually accompany.

"The tuna fleet has switched to a more productive method called purse seining. A net, perhaps a mile long, is towed by a ship in an encircling maneuver until the loop is closed.

"This also traps the dolphin, and many thousands are injured and killed 'accidentally.' The tuna industry estimates about 200,000 U.S. government estimates are higher and Smithsonian scientists estimate up to 900,000 are killed yearly."

THE SOCIETY is asking

that all interested boycott tuna products by refusing to buy them "to make it economically desirable by the tuna industry to cease the useless slaughter of dolphin."

Mrs. Lane, who lives at 17466 Lennane, said she has information and bumper stickers distributed by the Audubon Society in the cause, and she also is asking Observerland residents interested to send letters or telegrams to heads of companies that produce tuna.

These, she said, should be sent to the Ralston Purina Co., Checkerboard Square, St. Louis, Mo., 63188; the Del Monte Corp., San Francisco 94119, and Star-Kist Foods Inc., Terminal Island, Calif. She also recommended writing to the Inter-American Tropical Tuna Commission, Scripps Institution of Oceanography, La Jolla, Calif., 92037.

MRS. LANE said she had become interested in the Audubon society and its aims because she and her family live in the wooded area near Presbyterian Village.

An elder in Village Presbyterian Church, she has asked members of her congregation to consider that "since God has given man dominion over all things, it's man's responsibility to protect our environment against needless destruction."

Also sacrificing for a porpoise is the Lane's 20-pound cat "Sweetie Pie."

"He loves tuna," said Mrs. Lane. She hopes he understands.

The objectives of this course are summarized in comments from recent graduates.

"This panel will touch on phases of child abuse that the first panel did not cover and would, therefore, be of interest both to new audiences and those who attended the November meeting," she said.

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
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

"And while in 1955 the median female income was 64 per cent of males', in 1970 it was 55 per cent."

The second reason for opposition, as she sees it, is that many "feel their rights are being diminished as those of minorities and women are raised."

"This country's constitution guarantees a variety of rights," she said, "and it's true they sometimes come in conflict. But the guarantee still is there."

**THIRD**, Mrs. Wylie stated, "people tend to choose whom they will sympathize with—who should be poor."

"So there was a lot of sympathy for laid-off Lockheed workers who had to go on welfare, but many others on welfare are considered loafers," she added.

Finally, she said, people really don't realize "the extent to which civil rights law has advanced during the last 15 years."

"**That's not intent that is important, but actual progress in integrating work forces both in regard to race and sex,**" she added.

"Over the years, white males have held the majority of high-paying jobs, and this system is self-perpetuating

unless there is recruitment among minorities and among women.

"No employer would be asked to hire an unqualified applicant for any job. But to achieve balance from a racial and sex standpoint, it might be found that he should hire an applicant who is qualified for the job but not necessarily the most qualified."

**WHAT CAN** women interested in equal rights do to be more involved?

"First," advised Mrs. Wylie, "examine your basic beliefs about equality. I did when I accepted my job on the commission, and I made a moral decision. After that, life was easier and logical steps followed."

She suggested that women then make their beliefs known as issues arise "because if we don't do this, we leave the

field to the extremist, and then we have no kick."

Supporting public officials and candidates "who decided to take seriously their responsibility to uphold the Constitution" also was recommended by Mrs. Wylie.

"As parents, you can think carefully about what attitudes you are passing on to your children," she added. "And you can help your children realize changes may come and help them accept them calmly."

One other thing she suggested to the women was they make sure any domestic help they employ receives adequate wages, vacation pay and social security.

"Domestic help is the most exploited field for women," she said.

## School Board Doesn't Back Mocerri Project

PLYMOUTH The Plymouth Board of Education directed the school administration to prepare a letter disavowing any action either for or against the controversial Mocerri complex in Canton Township.

Trustee Gary Mirto requested the letter because of allegations that the school district has taken a position in favor of the \$45 million housing and regional shopping complex.

Dr. John Ohno, board member and a school representative on the Plymouth Area Economic Expansion Committee, said the confusion apparently arose over the committee's support of the project.

"Frank Millington (chairman of the committee) took a position in favor of it on behalf of the school district," Dr. Ohno said.

"That confirms my suspicions," Mirto said, noting that the board of education has never formally supported or opposed the plans.

Canton Township Planning Consultant Michael Manore told the planning commission at its public hearing on the project that the school board supported it.

## State Sheds No Light For Sheldon-Ford

CANTON Subdivision residents in the Warren-Sheldon roads area were stunned to learn that the Michigan State Highway Dept. has flatly refused to install a traffic light at the Sheldon-Ford road intersection.

The news was a bitter disappointment to the hundreds of new residents who use that route to get to main arteries from their homes. Traffic jams - occurring daily now - in the morning and early evening hours prompted residents to

petition the state for a traffic control light. The corner currently has a blinker light.

In a letter to Canton's state representative, Tom Brown, highway officials stated that based on a state-conducted traffic volume study, there wasn't a need for a light at the intersection.

The highway department suggested that Sheldon be widened for a short distance both north and south to alleviate the congestion. The widening, however, would have

to be done by Wayne County Road Commission, it was pointed out.

The issue is expected to come up for more discussion, however, when highway officials are in the area for an annual roads parley hosted by the Plymouth Area Economic Expansion Commission.

"We'll ask some more questions at that time," commented Trustee Don Korte, Canton's representative on the commission.



# How A Lone Delegate Beat GOP Committee

Although there was controversy on aid to Vietnam, amnesty and the gasoline tax, the Republican state convention voted down only one resolution at Saturday's gathering - and a Redford Township man was responsible.

Les Meszaros, now in his second year of party activity, spoke out against a proposed criminal justice plank in the party platform.

In fact, he was the only person to speak on it. So confident was the resolutions committee chairman, State Rep. James Defebaugh of Birmingham, that he didn't bother to offer a rebuttal.

So when it came time to vote, the 1,600 delegates shouted down the proposal, which had said in part:

"WHEREAS our system of criminal justice is extremely complex, particularly as it affects various areas of our state...Be it resolved that the Republican Party establish a Special Commission on Criminal Justice to recommend specific measures to strengthen the criminal justice system..."

Meszaros responded: "We've got too many commissions. We know what needs to be done -- put criminals behind bars."

The convention majority bought his reasoning. It was the only resolution they dumped out of 19 proposed. Asleep at the switch, none of the television stations or metropolitan daily papers reported it.

State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-

Plymouth), whose 14th District will cover Redford Township in the next election, shook his head, smiled fatalistically and confessed: "I wrote that resolution."

WHO'S THIS Les Meszaros? "I've lived in Redford since '71 after attending Wayne State University." His line of work is insurance and workmen's compensation.

How'd he get into politics? "I called Dave Leathley (leader in the old 19th

District) last year, and he put me on the track."

All of which shows what a newcomer and a lone delegate speaking his piece can do.

the law of averages, if there is one, gives them a better chance than Kalamazoo's 85,000 -- among whom sales are definitely lower and who will have one participant Thursday?

Questions such as that in relation to the 56 cities listed as mailing addresses for Thursday's lucky 120 defy answer. Yet, there are statistics indicating that areas where sales are heaviest corral proportionately more rewards.

The Michigan Lottery Commission looks at the state as

consisting of five regions. The percentage of participants from each who are in Thursday's million dollar drawing adhere to the pattern of sales volume remarkably closely.

Figures from the state show Region 1 (southeastern Michigan) buys about 66 per cent of the tickets weekly. It also has 83 persons (69 per cent) in Thursday's drawing, including 31 from Detroit.

Region 2 (Lansing, Kalamazoo, Benton Harbor,

Grand Rapids, Muskegon etc.) has the second biggest weekly sales, about 16 per cent. Of the 120, 22 (or 18 per cent) are from that area.

Residents of Region 3 (Flint, Saginaw, Bay City, the Thumb area and midsection of the state) average about 10 per cent in lottery buying strength and will have 10 representatives Thursday. That's 8.3 per cent.

REGION 4 covers the northern lower peninsula, and up there they buy about four per cent of the tickets. The area has four million dollar hopefuls, three from Petoskey and one from Mio, constituting 3.3 per cent of the 120.

The upper peninsula is Region 5, and weekly sales run about 2.5 per cent of the state total. Robert J. Collins, of the crossroads community of Hubbell on the Keweenaw Peninsula, is the only person north of the straits with a chance for the million -- 1/120th -- but like his 119 colleagues, he's assured of at least \$1,000. There also will be prizes of \$5,000, \$50,000 and \$100,000.

While lottery trends indicate payoffs logically are more

abundant in areas where sales are greatest, there are other aspects which may not be so easily understood.

Weekly drawings have been in progress since Nov. 24, and so far there have been 20 "Even" numbers and only six "odd" numbers. Will they eventually equalize between odds and evens?

They could, of course, but it would be wrong to assume that they necessarily will.

**DISREGARDING** the theatrical complexities of how Michigan comes up with two three-digit numbers each week, the fact remains that the big rack holding the 1,000 balls numbered 000 through 999 has no memory.

The so-called "law of averages" implies that certain things must always happen in a certain frequency. Professional gamblers would advise that nothing is further from the truth.

The science of probabilities concerns only what may be expected to happen over an infinite period of time -- not what is going to happen on the next chance.

Dice have no memory, nor do cards, nor wheels, nor coins, nor lottery racks.

The basic rule of those who

study the mathematics of these matters is simply this: Every single chance event is entirely independent of all preceding events -- and of all those which follow it.

Throw a single die on the table, and your chance of calling any individual number from one to six is 1 in 6 the first time you throw. It is still 1 in 6 the 100th time you throw, even if you threw the same number on the first 99 rolls.

**IT IS THE SAME** with the Michigan weekly lottery drawing. None of the numbered balls runs and hides because it was picked previously, and every Thursday it is 999 to 1 against any

given number coming up. There's an age-old story among writers that six monkeys, trained just to hit the keys of typewriters at random, would eventually come up with the complete works of Shakespeare, if they had an infinite amount of time.

Time is based on the theory that odds work out only in the long run, which can't be specifically defined except as an infinite number of chances. But under the theorems of probability, the monkeys could just as well start out by writing "Hamlet" the first day and save the gibberish until later. Averages are not a branch of science; probabilities are.

## How To Handle The Grand Prize

Michigan's lottery will transform someone's dreams into reality this week.

And with dreams of six zeros dancing in their heads, more Michigan residents will be inspired to buy tickets in case their lucky numbers come up.

That \$1,000,000 entitles the lucky winner to buy his dreams -- a yacht, trip around the world, fancy car -- but it also carries a heavy responsibility.

The IRS will be standing ready to collect its share -- which could amount to about 40 per cent. A family of four with an income of \$10,000 which wins \$50,000 can expect to pay about 40 per cent of that in taxes.

So the exuberant winner should take a little time to examine his finances and learn to cope efficiently with "instant wealth."

**WHILE THE** circumstances surrounding each winner will be different, two Schoolcraft College instructors have some general advice for winners and those who think their lucky number is due.

Richard Arlen, accounting instructor, and Gregory Worosz, marketing instructor, say the best advice they can give is to keep living as normal a life as possible.

First of all, DON'T go to the drawing, they caution.

"Send a representative," they said. Avoid the notoriety attached with winning big money, and the winner will at least be partially saved from the sharks, shysters, flood of charity requests and relatives coming out of the woodwork.

"You have the crime aspects to think about, too," Worosz said. "What if your children are kidnapped?"

What about after the drawing?

Should the winner quit his job, take a long vacation buy an expensive television and stereo system, pay off his home mortgage?

A TRIP might be advisable until the notoriety dies down. But both instructors caution the winners to hold onto their jobs and deposit the check in the bank until the glory of winning subsides.

Before starting to spend the new-found fortune, Arlen and Worosz say to consult three professionals:

- A tax attorney.
- A personal finance counselor or certified public accountant.
- An investment counselor.

They also advise taking care of personal items right away -- like changing one's will, increasing insurance, installing a burglar alarm and possibly changing the telephone number.

"The big thing initially is that you need competent tax advice, so get a good tax attorney," Arlen said. "He may cost \$50 to \$100 an hour, but the money you will save makes it well worth it."

Most major banks can ad-

vice a person on good tax attorneys, finance counselors and investment counselors. But Arlen and Worosz advise the winner to interview the professionals, looking for ones who are dependable, knowledgeable and eager for the business.

**THEY ALSO** recommend that the winner find professionals who are in the same age bracket since their services may be needed as long as the winner is alive.

The accountant or finance counselor may become the winner's boss, putting him on a budget if he tends to overspend and allocating the income for luxuries, investments and living expenses.

Expert investment counselors will advise the winner on safe and risky bonds, municipal bonds, stocks and other investments. Bonds are rated according to their possible return, and stocks are classified by their degree of risk.

A person who feels guilty if he loses money on a risky investment would do well to stick to "safe" stocks and bonds and time savings certificates, they said. The certificates tie the money up for about two years but draw maximum interest.

While risky investments have the greatest possibility for acquiring large sums of money, they also can fail, Arlen and Worosz noted.

They advise winners to scrutinize their own psychology before starting to play the stock market.

**THE TAX** attorney will advise a person on tax shelters -- which generally put money away to come back as income at a different period of time and lower tax rate. They also can advise on income averaging, which may save some taxes.

Value judgments, such as whether it is wiser to pay off a mortgage or invest the money, are dependent on numerous circumstances and have to be made on individual basis, they said.

Finally, both Arlen and Worosz recommend that the winner attend classes to learn about different aspects of finance and investment instead of depending completely on professional advice.

"There's no excuse in this day and age for a person to stay uninformed," Arlen said.

Schoolcraft offers courses in the day and evening on investments, personal finance, tax accounting and several related areas.
