

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BY AMENDING THE ZONING MAP

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:


PART I. That the Township Zoning Ordinance is hereby amended imending the Zoning Map, by changing those areas indicated on the Amended Zoning Map. No. 67. attached hereto and made a part of this Ordinance. FART II. CONFLICTING PROVISIONS REPEALED. Any Ordinance or

parts of Ordinances in conflict, herewith, are hereby repealed PART III. EFFECTIVE DATE. The provisions of the Ordinance are here

by declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety, and are hereby ordered to take immediate effect and be in force from and after the earliest date allowed by law.

Application forms are being sent to all college district high school music departments. April 20 is the deadline.


