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# School Budget Man Retires

School budgets have seen many changes since 1955 when Melvin Blunk would sit at his kitchen table and draw up Plymouth's projected school expenditures in two hours on a Sunday afternoon.

Now the budget is a slow eight-month job—but Blunk handles it with the confidence of his 18 years of preparing school budgets and handling school financing for Plymouth.

Blunk, 57, will retire this summer as assistant superintendent of business. But before he goes, he will pass on his home-grown knowledge of Plymouth to his yet unnamed successor.

After 34 years as a teacher and business administrator in Plymouth, Blunk says it is a good time to bring a new face into his job.

"There comes a time when you feel it is best for all concerned that you should leave," Blunk said. "I've been very happy in the Plymouth Community School District, but it's time for a change."

"I've been telling everyone that I have to quit work to get my work done," Blunk said with a smile, adding

that he has a few projects to work on at home.

Blunk says he'll stay in Plymouth, the community where he was born, and which his family helped build. He has known his wife, Roberta, since kindergarten when they attended the school on Main Street which is now Central School.

They attended Michigan State Normal College together (now Eastern Michigan University) before they married. They have a daughter, Mrs. Janet Jaskierny, of Redford Township and a granddaughter, Julie.

The Blunks will travel to Hawaii after his retirement, and he will continue hunting and fishing in the Canadian bush country with friends.

Blunk says he won't quit working altogether and may take a job in some other area of business next year.

During his long years in education, including two as a math teacher in Decatur, Blunk has seen many changes and a fantastic growth in Plymouth schools.

He became assistant superintendent of business in 1955 when Plymouth had 3,862 students and watched the enrollment grow to almost 11,000. Budgets have jumped from

the \$1.4 million budget that took two hours to prepare at the kitchen table to an expected \$13 million next year.

He has handled financing for construction of 11 Plymouth schools and watched state aid to the district drop every year with growth in the district's tax base.

Blunk said he has worked for six superintendents, five of whom were from Plymouth.

Frank Dodge was superintendent in Decatur when Blunk started teaching in 1937 for \$1,200 annually.

"That was the going salary then," Blunk said, noting that his room and garage cost \$2.50 a week.

His experience in Plymouth begins with Supt. George A. Smith in 1939 when Blunk returned to his home town to teach math. He has worked in Plymouth through the terms of Supts. Helmer Nelson, Russell Isbister, James Rossman and the current superintendent, John Hoben.

His dependability led each superintendent to "give me a lot of freedom to run the business section of the district."

His love for precision is reflected not only in his perfectly formed numerals and detailed files, but in his avid love for the Indianapolis 500 race.

Every year he attends the time trials either alone or with friends, and then he and his wife go to the race on Memorial Day.

"The thrill of the speed and the start of the 500 mile race is something you can't describe," he said. "The perfection in driving and me-

chanical work, the extreme detail and having that many people working together to a common end is exciting."

"One person can't win the race, it depends on so many different people."

One person can't run a school district either, and Blunk has high praise for other team members who made his job easier.

"No one person can handle the many details of business administration of the school district," he said. "It takes

the effort and interest of capable people working with me to accomplish the duties of the job. One person can't handle it in this day and age."

"This district has been particularly fortunate to have had consistently good boards of education. We've had some outstanding board members."

Blunk noted that the district has had good administrators in the central admin-

## Gift Proves Surprise

Every morning for more than four years, Walter Hagen, 696 S. Harvey, has glanced in wonderment at a gift from a neighbor who moved to Arizona.

The gift was a group of about seven flat topped stones and each day he be-

came more puzzled as to what they were and what he could do with them.

Now his wondering is ended and the new Plymouth Historical Museum will be the recipient of a lithographing stone that is a reminder of the earliest days of the printing profession.

When told the stones were officially known as lithographing stone, Hagen smiled and said, "Well that answers my problem. My neighbor, Mr. Kermit Smith worked for the Wolfe Envelope Co. before he retired and moved to Arizona."

Lithographing stones have

a most interesting history. Invented by Alays Senefelder, an English playwright, as a means of developing an economic way of publicizing his plays, the stones were patented in 1801.

The method became known as lithography and is a very

## Candidates Split On 2 Issues

Although there is a paucity of crystal-clear disputes among candidates for the two Plymouth Board of Education seats to be filled in the June 11 election, the contest for the one-year term has produced major differences on two issues.

These concern support for the proposed safety millage levy and the question of whether any more high schools should be built in Centennial Educational Park.

Candidates for the one-year term are Marcia Borowski, Joseph Gray and David Trent. On the safety millage proposition Mrs. Borowski has taken an isolated stand with a flat: "I do not support the safety millage."

Gray was equally positive when asked if he favors putting a third high school on the same acreage where Plymouth Salem and

Plymouth Canton are located:

"No, I do not." Position statements on these and other questions have been submitted to the Mail & Observer by all six candidates and appear on Page 6A in their entirety.

The trio running for the four-year term includes Dr. Jay Finch, Zelda Flora and E.J. McClendon.

All six will participate in a public "candidates night" forum at 8 p.m. Tuesday, June 5 in City Hall. Each will have opportunity to discuss his or her personal views on school matters, and the public will be welcome to present questions.

The forum is being co-sponsored by the League of Women Voters, Jaycees and American Association of University Women.

Questions presented to all candidates by the Mail & Observer, leading to the state-

ments on Page 6A, were these:

• Do you favor the proposed building bond issue? Briefly, why?

• Do you favor the proposed operating millage increase? Briefly, why?

• Do you favor the proposed safety millage? Briefly, why?

• Do you favor building any further high schools in the educational park? If so, do you feel each high school should have separate programs (e.g. sports, bands)?

• Do you favor keeping both the modular and traditional scheduling systems? If

not, which of the two do you prefer?

• What alternatives to school building do you favor? (e.g. split sessions, extended school year) Or do you favor building?

All six endorse the \$14.150 million bond issue and the two operating millage proposals. Mrs. Borowski is the only one to break ranks on safety millage.

Also, there is unanimity on retaining both the modular and traditional scheduling systems in the high schools.

On where to build another high school, replies reflect an across-the-board desire for further study, with Gray the

only candidate to go so far as to declare: "Schools should be built as near as possible to the areas where students reside."

As for alternatives to new construction, further study of extended school year possibilities is the most popular answer. However, split sessions, satellite schools and variable starting times also are suggested.

Meanwhile, it has been learned that the Plymouth teachers' union (PEA) will announce within the next few days its endorsement of McClendon and Mrs. Borowski for election to the two vacancies caused by withdrawal from the board of Carl Berry and John Ohno, neither of whom sought reelection.

One other issue has been brought into the campaign by Mrs. Flora—that of "teacher power."

She has claimed in campaign appearances that three of the five carry-over board members are "teacher oriented." John Graves, a faculty member at Livonia Franklin High School, Gary Mirto, associated as an aide to the Detroit Board of Education, and Mrs. Marda Benson, a consultant to Eastern Michigan University.

Both of Mrs. Flora's opponents for the four-year term are University of Michigan faculty members. Mrs. Borowski's teaching affiliating brings to three the number of candidates from the full field of six tagged by Mrs. Flora as having "classroom" identification.

Mrs. Flora is using in her campaign a statement from the dean of New York University School of Education predicting that "the unionization movement will change distribution of power in the control of education" with local boards the losers.

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## The Stroller:

# Indy Wails Sound Like Broken Record

The hue and cry that accompanied the running of this year's Indianapolis 500-mile race, calling for a revision of the rules and a possible rebuilding of the famed 2½ mile oval, sounded like the playing of an old record with a new needle to old-timers who have followed these gasoline derbies through the years.

Ever since 1911 when Ray Harroun, of Flint, won the first of these pulse - quickening thrillers, there have been cries for a change - and many demands to eliminate the event each time death stalks the track.

But if you ever had the opportunity to spend any time along "gasoline alley," as the garage row at the track is called, you'd soon learn that this defying of the fates is part of the annual spectacle.

As The Stroller sat in the comfort of his living room this year and looked at the smashups and explosions that took two lives, he couldn't help recalling his first assignment to the "Indy 500."

It was back in 1935 and he was all eyes and ears as he saw the track (then a brick oval) for the first time. There seemed to be something different about it - yet he couldn't put his mind on just what caused the feeling.

As we circled the track, The Stroller noticed white blotches here and there along the top of the wall. When he asked if there was any significance to these spaces that stood out in the old gray wall, he was shocked at the answer.

"Oh those," our host said. "They mark the spots where the unfortunate drivers have gone over the wall to their death."

As we passed one after another, our host reeled off the names of the drivers and the dates of their passing.

It seemed cold - but that was the way of things at the speedway.

It was down here that The Stroller experienced one of the most unforgettable moments along the sports trail.

On the afternoon before the 1935 race, he was a guest at the drivers' meeting where old "Pop" Meyers, the sage of the famed bricks, was to discuss the rules.

Old Pop was a kind gent, well respected among these strange characters who toil in the garages and sit behind the wheels of the racing cars.

As the drivers gathered this day, they were asked to sit in a circle - and old Pop moved to the center.

"I want to talk to you

today," he began, "because we don't know how many of you will be here tomorrow. And how many of you will be missing depends on the manner in which you observe the rules."

It was the first inference that the "Angel of Death" would be hovering over every inch of the track the next day.

The Stroller had attended many sports events, but this was the first time that possible death was even hinted.

Several years later, on another trip to the oval, a strong friendship was forged with "Shorty" Cantlon, one

of the Detroit drivers in the race.

Shorty had experienced some difficulty preparing his car for the long grind. But he was smiling and rather cocky when the cars were wheeled out on the track for the start.

Feeling it was his duty, as a friend, to wish him well, The Stroller roamed down to the edge of the track, shook Shorty's hand and wished him luck.

Fate would have it that these were the last words ever spoken between us.

Shortly after the field finished the pace lag and was given the green flag, Shorty's steering mechanism failed. He couldn't make the first turn and went to his death over the wall.

It was another of those moments that live with those who have seen the Indy 500.

So, you see, tragedy - or the threat of it - is a part of the 500-mile race.

That's why the hue and cry this year sounded like a broken record.

simple procedure. After the imprint is made on the smooth flat surface, the stone is sprayed with water - then with ink. The ink remains in the slight impressions and is quickly absorbed when covered with paper. Of course, it has been highly improved through the years and lithographing has become an art.

"I certainly have wondered about them ever since I have had them," Hagen said, "and I now feel much better since I know they are going to be put to good use."

A retiree from Evans Products, Hagen who now spends most of his time in the garden, was planning to use them as stepping stones until he learned the background of the puzzling gift.

He got the identity just in time to make possible what should be an interesting exhibit in the new museum.

## Hilltop Cabin Renovated

A complete renovation of Hilltop Cabin, the major building at the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council's Camp Hilltop, is scheduled for completion by the fall, the council has announced. The Ann Arbor camp is used by local scout troops.

The remodeling will include redesigning of the cabin interior, as well as installation of wood paneling, acoustical tile, carpeting, kitchen cabinets and a hot water heater. The exteriors of the cabin and camp garage will be painted.

The \$10,475 cost of the project will come from the profits of the 1973 Girl Scout cookie sale.

Each year more than 2,000 girls use the camp, which is located on seven acres of land north of Ann Arbor.

## Old Guard Leaves His Post At 88

A spur of the moment job which lasted eight years will come to an end June 15 for Fred Dornblaser.

Dornblaser, who will be 88 next month, will leave his post as crossing guard at the corner of Main and Ross in Plymouth at the end of the school year. He will be given special recognition at a

brunch in honor of the district's adult crossing guards at the Mayflower Hotel next week.

Dornblaser estimates that he has guided some 150,000 Smith School children across Main Street, without an accident, since he took over the post as an emergency substitute. He calls many of his young charges by name as they file by several times a day, and says he has watched many of them grow from kindergarten to junior high age.

Being a crossing guard also means serving as a sort of unofficial information booth, Dornblaser says. He keeps his car parked nearby, well stocked with maps and phone books for wayward strangers.

It also means making a lot of friends. "People stop me all the time down town and say hello, or wave when they go by. I don't know who most of them are—I just see the backs of their necks."

Kids aren't much different now, Dornblaser says, than they were when he was a boy walking to school in the Dutch settlement of Allentown, Pa. If anything, they just look different.

"I got my first pair of pants when I started school," he recalls. "Up until that time I wore skirts with long black stockings. We had one boy in school who was still wearing his father's cut-off pants when he graduated. They were cut off just below the knee but they got shorter as time went on."

Dornblaser went to work in a machine shop after high school, although his real desire was to go on to college. He dismissed the idea because his father, a \$15 a week mill foreman, couldn't afford it.

He didn't tell his father when he found out about a scholarship sponsored by his state senator. Common laborers were earning about nine cents an hour, he recalls, when he skipped work for an entire day to take a competitive test.

He won the scholarship and left Allentown for Pennsylvania State College, where he graduated in mechanical engineering in 1909. The college had an enrollment that year of about 600.

The rare college degree found Dornblaser a number of jobs in at least half a dozen different cities before he came to Plymouth in 1948, while an employee of Burroughs Corp. He and his wife, Oma, whom he met in Akron, Ohio shortly after World War I, still live in the same house at 881 Simpson they bought that year.

Dornblaser left Burroughs while in his mid 60s, but didn't take well to retirement. He answered a newspaper ad for a job at Anchor Coupling Co. in Plymouth and at the spry age of 67 went back to work for nearly five years as an engineer.

It was the same sort of spirit which prompted him to take the crossing guard post, a job which he says he enjoys most because it gives him something to do without working full time. More than that, he has the opportunity to do something for others.

"The greatest pleasure in life is doing something for somebody else," Dornblaser says. "Sitting back in a rocking chair when you retire is just no good." He recalled the story of an old undertaker who was informed that a long time friend had decided to retire.

"Give him two years," the undertaker replied, "and he'll be mine."

## Bicyclists: Here's New Found Friend

Bicyclists, have no fear, the Plymouth Township board is here. And the board has rallied to the fight against the licensing of bicycles by the state.

Senate bill 191 proposes state licensing of bicycles with an annual fee of \$3 to be collected by the secretary of state.

The City of Romulus sent a letter to the Plymouth Township board in opposition to the bill, saying the bill would "prohibit local licensing of bicycles and, with the high licensing fee, impose undue hardship and privation on families with multiple bicycle users."

Township Clerk Helen Richardson agreed with the letter, adding the bill is "the most ridiculous thing I've ever heard."

"I move we approve a similar resolution (against the licensing) and send copies to all neighboring communities," Mrs. Richardson said. The board unanimously agreed.

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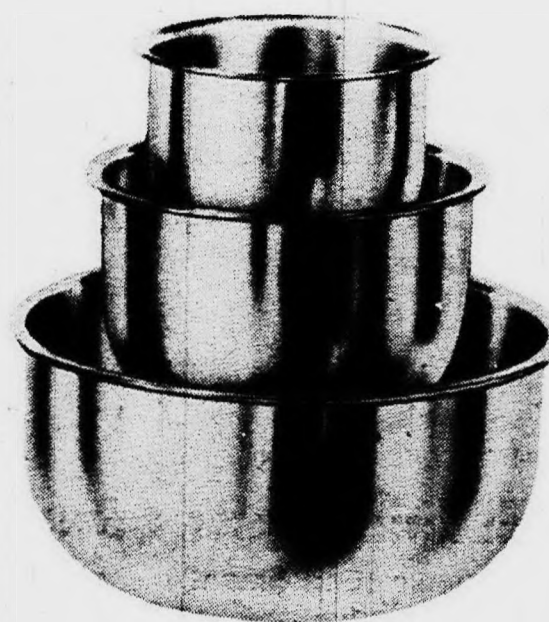

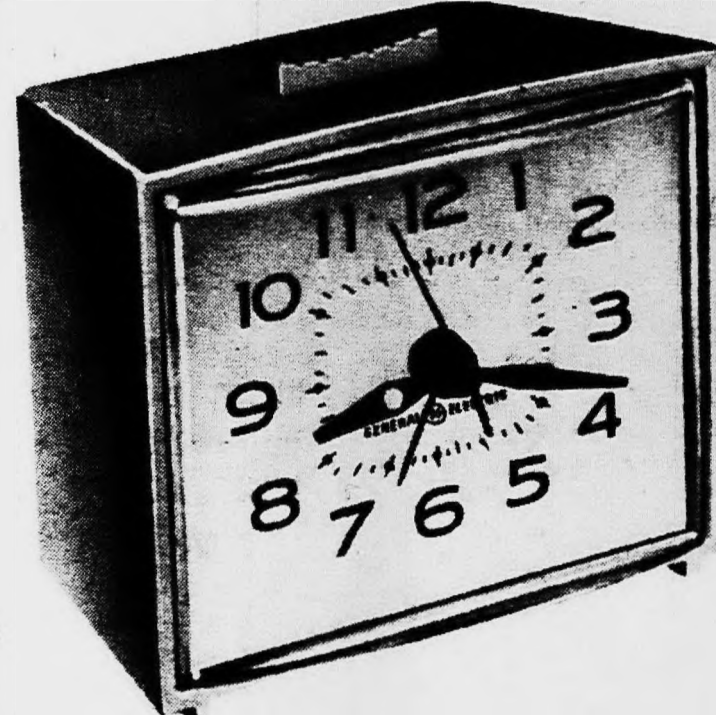

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# Northwest Leaders Talk Of Faith

Often, it is hard for a man to talk about his religious beliefs in a personal way, the deep meaning for his life, and his prayers. Most Americans tend to clam up on such as that, saying something like, "I have my own faith."

Not so with five "undershepherds" and Pastor Paul Bersche of the Northwest Christian and Missionary Alliance. The church is on 10 Mile between Inkster and Middle Belt.

Pastor Bersche answered a request to visit the church with a suggestion that several in leadership positions join. So Burt Hendricks of Livonia, Tom Sellers of Detroit, Harl Leach of Commerce Township and Art Ford of Southfield met together.

Pastor Bersche gave a brief explanation of how the church was founded. A Presbyterian minister, Dr. Albert B. Simpson, began holding evening prayer services in a New York City theater in the early 1890s. He had the feeling that the word of Christ wasn't getting to the man on the street.

"So many came to Christ through his ministry that eventually they said, 'Let's have our own church,'" Pastor Bersche explains.

Congregationalists, Methodists, Presbyterians, Episcopalians — all gathered to preach with him, and this became the Christian Alliance. For a while the Mission Alliance was separate, but when the two became cumbersome to operate, they were joined.

Now there are 1,500 Christian and Mission Alliance churches in the United States and Canada. They support more than 1,000 missionaries in 36 countries. There are 10 churches in the metropolitan Detroit area.

The undershepherds are so called, because each one ministers to about 40 church families assigned to him. Deaconesses work with the undershepherds to meet needs of their assigned families. Each home is visited at least once a year, many more often. The need may be anything from an emergency babysitter to a prayer service.

Pastor Bersche says about the membership, "This church is definitely not inbred. It is a great cross-section of various denominations."

"The people were led here by the spirit of God. They didn't come here by accident," Hendricks says in answer to a question about the membership.

"Some churches are empire builders. Here the emphasis is on Christ," says Tom Sellers, whom the men refer to as the "philosopher."

As they continue talking about the spirit of God, Pastor Bersche makes an observation: "It's a contagious thing. The presence of God in a person's life makes that person a delight to be around. Enthusiasm comes from the Greek ethos — to put God in you."

Christ continues, "In Christ they've found reality, it's the person of Christ within us that's unique. We don't say, 'come to my church,' but rather, 'I'd like you to know my Christ.'"

Leach picks up the conversation: "If a man be in Christ, he is a new creature. When this happens there is a natural attraction for each other...Our main basis is a literal acceptance of the

word. Northwest Church is four-square Gospel — Jesus Christ Savior, Sanctifier, Healer and coming King."

Ford expresses his feelings: "He lives with us. He is with us constantly in our homes, in our businesses, wherever we are He is there, a very real Person."

Healing, as expressed by Leach, is part of the responsibilities of the undershepherds. They do not want to have it cheapened, as frequently happens when religious healing is mentioned. To a person, the men strongly believe in healing through prayer.

Seller refers to the fifth chapter of the book of James: "If any man is sick, let him call for the elders of the church."

"It's a low key thing," says the pastor. "It's not emphasized; it's always done in a very quiet way."

The undershepherds recently prayed at the altar rail for a woman to be healed.

The pastor says, "We believe God has touched her body and the evidence of that touch will be seen."

He explains the healing of the soul by salvation as all-important, and the healing of the body, he adds, "is like a fringe benefit."

Ford was concerned that not enough of the emphasis in the conversation had been placed on prayer.

"Good point," said Pastor

Bersche. "The major part of our lives and the major part of our ministry is prayer."

"We encourage our people to have prayer partners. They share with one another the things which God is teaching them. They pray for their hurts — everybody hurts someplace."

Ford added, "This prayer life has to extend to our work. When there's a problem, the answers are there afterwards. This is sometimes surprising to me."

The congregation will mark the seventh anniversary of the completion of the

building the first week of next month.

The members come from a wide area, including Westland, Garden City, Pontiac, Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti as well as the closer Farmington, Farmington Township and Southfield.



## Rev. Alberti Leaving Redford

The Rev. Godfrey E. Alberti, pastor of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Redford Township since 1969, will leave July 15 to accept a new call.

He will become pastor of a three-community rural parish in Sanilac County.

## Foster Care Topic For Talk

The need of foster care for children in Oakland County and the procedures for offering it will be discussed in a special meeting in Our Lady of Sorrows Catholic Church in Farmington Thursday, June 6.

The Christian Service Commission at OLS is inviting all churches in the area to participate in the 8 p.m. meeting.

Two representatives of the social services division for Oakland County will discuss what's involved in offering a temporary home to one of some 300 children between the ages of eight and 16.

Letters about the informative talks and discussion have been sent to area churches.

"The need is great for people who can open their homes for a little while to some of these young people," said Mrs. Donna Batchelor of the service group.

"We hope many will be interested in finding out how they can do so."

Those who persist in predicting the imminent death of organized religion (a fad which is centuries old) ought to confer with conservative political columnist James J. Kilpatrick.

"The largest response I've ever gotten," the syndicated columnist told this writer, "is from the column I did on the Episcopal Book of Common Prayer."

In this column, Kilpatrick conceded that just how the Episcopalians worship is surely their own business — although, he observed, their Book of Common Prayer "is part of the common inheritance of literate men."

Noting the current Episcopal experimentations with a series of vastly revised liturgies called "The Green Book," he summarized this effort as the work of "a committee of earnest butchers...the work of men with tin ears; good clerics but bad poets."

The political columnist cited as an example the tinkering with the General Confession, so that the classic beauty of "We have erred and strayed from Thy ways like lost sheep..." becomes what he terms "the store-bought piety" of: "We have not loved you with all our hearts."

Kilpatrick also zeroes in on the simplistic, change-for-change-sake methodology wherein the Lord's Prayer's reference to "this day our daily bread" becomes "today our daily bread."

This best known of all prayers is further altered to what Kilpatrick regards as a "disaster," — with "Lead us not into temptation" excised in favor of an even more misleading phraseology than this unfortunate suggestion that God is a tempter.

"Do not put us to the test," is the proposed form, which evokes from Kilpatrick: "What do the words mean?"

Why shouldn't we be brought to a test? Most of us rather like to be tested."

Were it not for the tyranny of space limitations in a newspaper column, Kilpatrick could have gone on at considerable length.

There is, for example, the service of the consecration of a bishop. What should be the solemnity of the appointing of a purported successor of the 12 Apostles is shattered midway, by the ceremonial directive that the congregation shout, all together, as if a chorus line of nincompoops:

"HE IS WORTHY! HE IS WORTHY! HE IS WORTHY!"

Presumably he is, although some theologians note that nobody is worthy in God's sight. But why does this have to be howled?

Few if any Episcopalians will contend that their Prayer Book is not in need of some change. The service of holy baptism, for example, suggests that unbaptized children are not children of God. And one prayer in the holy communion service ("That we may eat his flesh and drink his blood") has long been described by some skeptical youth as "Swallow the Leader."

The otherwise beautiful order for holy matrimony still contains that reference to "the dreadful day of judgment, when the secrets of all hearts shall be disclosed," while the communion service prays to God "unto whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid."

The vastly revised proposals of the denomination's standing liturgical commission, however, have proven repugnant to many. Some outraged Episcopalians have reportedly raided church pews at night and shipped crates full of the hated "Green Book" to national headquarters in New York.

Others have joined a new organization called the SPBCP. The Society For The Preservation of the Book of Common Prayer (Box 12206, Ackley Station, Nashville, Tenn., 37212) has grown, in just the one year since it was founded, from 12 people to more than 17,000. It now has an office with five rooms and seven employees.

Dr. Walter Sullivan, one of three Vanderbilt University English professors who were among SPBCP's 12 founders, is by no means awed by the Episcopal establishment power structure — or afraid to do battle for his cause.

The issue will come up when the denomination's highest governing body, General Convention, meets this October in Louisville, and Bishop Hines discovers that SPBCP is unwilling either to shut up or to get out.

# School Board Hopefuls Give Views On Issues

Jay Seim Finch, M.D., is a 36-year-old native Detroit who is an associate professor of anesthesiology in the University of Michigan Medical Center. A graduate of Redford Union High School, he also won cum laude honors in the U-M Medical School.

Dr. Finch's professional credits in the field of medical study fill three pages, demonstrating teaching, administrative and academic knowledge from "Clinical Investigation of the Analgesic Potency and Respiratory Depressant Activity of Fentanyl, a New Narcotic Analgesic" to "The Use of Racemic Epinephrine in the Treatment of Infectious Croup."

Dr. and Mrs. Finch have three children. In 1970-72 he was president of the Galimore PTA.

The next several years will be crucial to the development of the Plymouth Community School District. The rapid growth of this community will result in the need for decisions which will affect this school system many decades from now.

I am in favor of both the proposed building bond issue and the operating millage increase because passage of these are absolutely essential to maintaining the present level of quality within the district. The concept that

failure to support these issues will in any way retard the growth of the area is fallacious and can only damage the educational excellence we now have.

I do favor the safety millage issue; however, I would like to see the involved local units of government participate in this area.

Regarding construction of further high schools in the Educational Park, I feel that I need more information concerning the effect that having so many students clustered together will produce. In any case, construction of another high school within the educational park will not eliminate the need for additional high school construction outside of the park if the area continues to grow as presently planned.

I should like to continue both the modular and/or traditional scheduling systems within the high school. Modular scheduling, I think, has so much to offer the student preparing for a college

program in which independent study is important. The availability of traditional scheduling however, is important for those students who either because of lack of maturity or lack of academic interest are not capable of functioning in the modular program. I do think that greater emphasis on independent activity in the elementary school would make acceptance of a modular concept easier when a student reaches high school.

In regard to the last question concerning alternatives to school building, my views are as follows:

Ideally the rate of growth of the community should be such that building could proceed at a rate that could be comfortably funded by the growing electorate. This would obviate the need for any of the alternatives to building. Should the growth rate exceed the building capability of the district, I feel that the use of the satellite school system and split sessions within the elementary years would accommodate this growth and do it with the greatest economy and least destructive influence on education. For example, split sessions do have the potential for maintaining or reducing class size.

I feel that while the extended school year may have considerable educational merit, this is not an easily adopted program (three year lag time) and should not be considered as a real alternative to building.

In later years I worked with the youth of our community as a member of Youth, Inc. and the Council for Community Concerns, and later as a voluntary probation officer for the 35th District Court.

With my experience in business, travel, public relations, mother of seven, interested in youth in our community, I feel qualified to help our school system maintain its growth and excellence on

a sound business basis. With concern for the budget, taxes and wise use of the facilities we already have, while giving our children the superior education they deserve.

The Plymouth school system has given me, through their service to my children, a great deal in the past 19 years. I believe that every citizen, particularly today, should become involved in her government wherever she feels she can help the most. I feel my area of service to my community can best be served as a member of the school board and I will not be afraid to speak up for the needs of our children.

With the increased population resulting from accelerated new home construction in the Plymouth Community School District, additional facilities are certainly indicated. Therefore, I am supporting the present building bond issue. Hopefully we can better utilize the buildings resulting from this bond issue so that future construction

can be reduced. Let's take a look at year round use of our present facilities.

Our student load increase next year is projected at 20 per cent and another school must be staffed. Therefore, I support the operating millage increase. Let's look for meaningful saving alternatives for the future.

I am supporting the safety millage, but favor professional advice in formulating how these funds are used.

I have mixed emotions on building more high schools in the educational park. It is the most economical approach, but many taxpayers I have spoken to would rather have the next high school placed in another section of the city. This needs more study.

I would keep both modular and traditional scheduling ... to be better able to meet the needs of all children. I believe in individualized instruction and more humaneness in the classroom. I believe in providing alternatives both for children and their parents. Some feel the need for traditional methods. We must be responsive to their needs.

I favor the extended school year. I have looked into Northville and they are using the 45-15 extended year plan. I hope to visit there and observe its effectiveness.

I now have the time to contribute to this position, not just board meeting attendance, but the day to day attention I feel this job requires.

I am asking for your vote.

A resident of Plymouth since 1965, Dr. McClendon is chairman of health in the School of Education, and professor of health education in the University of Michigan School of Public Health. He also is former assistant supt. of the State of Michigan Department of Education and was deputy supt. in the Highland Park school system.

He serves as co-chairman of the Plymouth schools committee on maximum building utilization; is a member of the Plymouth Community Human Relations Commission, and served on the Judd Committee on School Facilities and Finance. He's also on the Governor's Task Force on Environmental Education.

He is a native of Oklahoma, holds numerous college degrees and has been a high school principal among numerous other assignments. Dr. and Mrs. McClendon are the parents of three.

I favor the building bond issue -- our studies have shown that even if the most drastic action were taken to increase building use we would still need the rooms that are proposed in this bond issue. I believe we should do a study of the maximum population that can be expected in the district and begin to plan now to locate buildings and increase use so we will not over build or badly mislocate our buildings.

I favor the operating millage proposal -- increasing costs are hitting schools, too; however, I will not vote to levy any portion of the millage which is not absolutely essential for support of the program. I believe a more careful accounting system can help us get more from the funds we now spend.

I believe separating the safety millage from regular operating millage is an excellent idea. Thus it will depend on the citizen's willingness to pay for safety and will not come from the educational program. I personally favor the issue since

municipal governments have not provided adequately for these needs.

In regard to building more high schools on the Centennial Park site, I have been urging a citizens study of this issue for two years. I do not feel we should make decisions almost by default that lock this community into a position for 50 years without study and broad citizen input. No one knows what the pros and cons of this issue all are or what the people want.

I am in favor of continuing both the modular and the traditional schedules and in being sure that a great enough variety of courses are offered on the traditional schedule to make this a real option for student and parents. We should provide for some students to have a combined schedule in both programs.

The variable starting and closing times in the high school is, in my judgment, the least disruptive option for increasing building use; however, I also feel we should plan to make available a year round school program for those parents who would volunteer to have their children on it to determine its effectiveness and acceptability. The decision to "test" the satellite school idea has already been made and the current bond issue will permit trying this plan, if approved.

The Plymouth schools face some difficult days ahead. Growing numbers of students with no guarantee of an increase in tax base will force higher taxes or less money for education. The biggest challenge to the board of education will be to try to accommodate the increasing numbers without losing the quality education which has been a Plymouth tradition.

I support the bond issue for new schools. There is no question that the schools are needed now and pains have been taken to see that we are not overbuilding.

With the new state tax law just signed, even the property tax has become more progressive (based on ability to pay) so that additional millage will not cause too great a burden on those who can least afford to pay, especially senior citizens.

I also support the millage renewal and increase because of the new tax situ-

ation mentioned above, and because, in order to insure our children the best education possible and the broadest participation in all the fine programs of the schools. When the distribution formula is set by the state and the SEV and all tax appeals are settled, we will be in a better position to determine if the extra millage is definitely needed. It can be passed and not levied by the board.

We need to do more than we are doing to insure that each individual child succeeds to his fullest potential in school -- which means that we must broaden our support programs such as guidance and counseling for the child as well as for parents. We must offer options within the schools so that each child, according to his style of learning, can be guided to the type of educational program (structured, modular, traditional, open, etc.) that the child needs and will insure his success.

I promise a very close scrutiny of the budget so that our tax dollars are spent to give each one of our children a superior education.

I do not support the safety millage. We all pay taxes to our city and township governments, as well as the state and county, to insure the public health and safety. We must demand from these units of government the services we pay them to provide so that we can spend education dollars on education.

We urgently need to re-examine our concept of the educational park. We must find a way to utilize the advantages of bigness (by providing excellent facilities for vocational, scientific and physical education) but at the same time provide a small school atmosphere, the advantages of which are a personal closeness between students and faculty, opportunity for participation in a broad variety of activities, and closeness within the student body. We must find a way to achieve this.

Parents and students must be offered options in types of educational programs to suit the individual child. We must keep the options of traditional and modular open and provide for even more individualized styles of learning.

We must build the schools that we need. However, whether or not the bond issue fails, we must continue our exploration of the extended school year. Its economic advantages look promising, and its educational advantages look outstanding.

Mr. Gray and his family, which includes three children enrolled in local public schools, have lived in the community six years. He operates the firm of J. I. Gray and Associates in Detroit, a manufacturer's representative organization.

A graduate of Western Illinois University, Mr. Gray has served in a variety of volunteer capacities with Plymouth's junior basketball and football associations since moving here, including roles as coach and board member.

1. Do you favor the proposed building bond issue? Yes -- Both the Rossman Committee and the Judd Committee reports show the necessity for more buildings due to the population increase in Canton. If the schools were to go on half-day sessions, there would still not be sufficient classrooms available to meet the projected needs. I feel that a long term study to determine our population saturation point is necessary so we do not build excessive school buildings but also keeping in mind that we must control average class size for maintaining quality education.

2. Do you favor the proposed operating millage increase? Yes -- General operating costs for schools have increased just as they have for individual homeowners. Goods and services such as heat, light, transportation and supplies have risen steadily. Due to increased enrollments, part of the money should be allocated for additional teachers in order to keep the class size at an adequate level.

If the 1.5 additional mill is approved, the Board of Education determines how much of this is necessary to operate. As a homeowner and taxpayer, I would not levy the full amount unless it was absolutely necessary for school operation.

3. Do you favor the proposed safety millage? Yes -- These safety precautions are definitely needed. If they save the life of even one child, they are definitely worth it. I do feel that the two townships and the city should bear more responsibility in this area. The problem does not entirely belong to the Board of Education.

4. Do you favor building any further high schools in the educational park? No, I do not, unless the cost of a third high school on another site proved to be prohibitive. Schools should be built as near as possible to the areas where students reside. Special and expensive facilities already existing in the educational park would not have to be duplicated until the programs are filled to capacity. Students enrolled in these programs could be transported for part of their

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school day. The large numbers of students at the Centennial Park causes an impersonal atmosphere where administration has lost control of the situation and created an atmosphere where many students feel they are a number with no individuality.

I favor separate programs for each high school regarding sports, band programs and extra curricular activities. The split should be carefully planned well in advance and gradually implemented so that we maintain programs of high quality such as our present band represents.

5. Do you favor keeping both the modular and traditional scheduling systems? Yes, under the following conditions:

• Both programs offer equal quality and opportunity.

• Observation of the student's behavior and record, sixth grade through eighth grade in order to decide which program would best fit the student's needs.

• Program selection made by parents along with strong counselor recommendations.

• Personal interviews between parents and students and counselors be mandatory before entering ninth grade and at the beginning of the sophomore year. If the parent cannot attend or is not interested, program selection for the student would be made by the counselor after an interview with the student and a review of past behavior and performance.

• Re-implement the structured modular program for those students who need close supervision but do not fit into traditional scheduling because of special interests or students on modular who find they cannot handle their free time.

• Attendance procedures for every class be recorded daily so the attendance office has a record of where students are at all times, who is attending class and who is not.

6. What alternatives to school building do you favor? The ideal situation is building the schools necessary for our growing population and at the same time being careful we do not over build.

There is a study presently being done in Northville to determine what, if any, cost savings or advantages there are for year round school. If the bond issue and future bond issues fail, the school board will be forced to choose the best of alternate plans or a combination of them such as split sessions and extended school year. Renting extra class space in the community such as churches and public buildings or renting classroom space from neighboring communities is also a possibility.

Currently a student at Schoolcraft College, majoring in Criminal Justice, my understanding and awareness of the educational process has expanded immensely in the last year and I feel I can be of aid in sharing my concerns. Certain areas include curriculum, teaching, alleviating apathy among the elements that make up our schools, and overall, giving an open mind to the board in the hopes of bringing about solutions to problems and furthering the development of good education in Plymouth.

Being active in our school system I am, of course, in

favor of the proposed bonding issue, safety, and operating millage increase. However, it should be noted that the citizenry, in general, does not particularly want to pay more taxes and it should come as no surprise if the increase in operating millage is defeated. But, if the electorate realized the importance and need of this additional millage, I am sure they would vote in favor of it.

In regards to the bonding proposal, we should take a close look at what kind of third high school we are going to build. Specifically, do we need another sports and band program? Are two high schools sufficient to meet the needs in these areas? I question whether we do need these and perhaps we should only build classrooms and design programs to further improve the curriculum, and then construct the high school in the Centennial Park accordingly. This would go along with the college-like atmosphere the educational park concept was conceived and implemented for in our school system. A similar outlook at our safety millage proposal would, also, be of benefit so that the taxpayers'

money gains the maximum utilization that should result from it.

Most everyone recognizes the fact that the monies being asked for schools this election are desperately needed. Fortunately, we have been able to see how some mistakes are made in connection with larger school districts which we will be in the near future. As an alternative to building in the years to come or if a bond issue was defeated, I would favor an extended school year. Schools are supposed to be a place of learning and I'm for learning all year round.

Controversy has arisen over what type of teaching system will be used in the classroom: traditional or modular. A realistic and objective approach by all is necessary in weighing not which systems is best, but in deciding what method of teaching will better a child's learning ability.

So, in short, I would keep both, allow modifications, and let the teacher and student individually come to a decision as to which mode of operation they desire or will do best under.

Therefore, let it be known that the Holiday Park Homeowners Association recommends that all conscientious citizens of the Plymouth School District vote for passage of all three millage proposals.

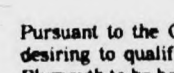
To vote against these proposals is to give our children an inferior education, inferior even to the education we obtained a quarter of a century or more ago.

J. D. McLAREN, Supervisor. (a) Re: Appointment of member to Civil Service Commission. Mr. Ash moved that the Board accept the recommendation of the Township Engineer and give final acceptance and final payment to Peter A. Baskie & Sons, Inc. for Brookside Drive Rear Yard Drain. Supported by Mr. Burke and carried unanimously.

JOE BIDA, D.P.W. Superintendent. (a) Recommendation on appointment of Norman Dietrich Associates to inspect the Wedgewood Village Condominium Project. Mr. Millington stated that his committee was working on a similar item, which covered Engineering fees. Mr. Millington moved that the Board defer action until the report from the Committee was submitted. Supported by Mr. Richardson, for discussion purposes. Mr. Ash moved that the meeting be adjourned. Supported by Mr. Overholt. Supervisor McLaren adjourned the meeting at 9:10 P.M.

## Turf Tips, Quips

Imagine a race between three and four-year-old pacers in which every one of the six starters has a mark of less than 2:00?

That's the story tonight (Saturday) at Wolverine when the track management presents the finest program of the season. We have been saying that each week as the season progressed and we repeat it again for the simple reason it's true.

The purse distribution for the 10 races is an all-time high total of \$73,900 for an overnight program at a harness track in Michigan. There have been nights when a track would put up more money when it presented some early closing stakes but an average of \$7,390 for a 10-race card is unheard of at a Midwest oval.

Included are two \$12,500 invitational paces, a preferred worth \$8,000, another for \$7,500 and a \$10,000 claimer with a value of \$6,900. Matter of fact, the cheapest event has a value of \$4,000.

It wasn't so long ago that \$4,000 was high for the evening and went to the horses in the featured race. It's unbelievable how much purses have gone up in this one meeting.

Getting back to the battle between the three and four-year-olds. We can't recall so many standout pacers in one race at Wolverine or

for that matter any of the tracks in Michigan.

Neither can Racing Secretary Bill Connors who has had that title since the pacers and trotters first started at the Detroit Race Course 24 years ago.

"This program is the finest I have ever put together in the Detroit area," said Connors. "But that race between the three and four-year-olds is the kind a racing secretary dreams of and seldom gets a chance to arrange."

Take the three-year-olds. There's J. R. Skipper, the son of Meadow Skipper that Driver-Trainer-Owner Stan Dancer offered a million for earlier in the year before changing his mind. The Skipper is rated in the experimental handicap ratings as a horse with a possible speed of 1:56.

The Skipper won \$108,695 for Owner J. Russell Miller of Dutton, Ont. a year ago and has banked \$36,777 to date in 1973. The colt was a fast closing third in the \$122,400 Messenger at Roosevelt Raceway two weeks back.

Then there's Racing Knight, a son of Race Time from the Dick Buxton stable of Ohio who won the \$21,650 Motor City last week at Wolverine in 1:59.1, fastest mile of the meeting. Racing Knight has earned \$38,100

this year and has banked \$55,000 in two years.

The third sophomore in the field is the Forsyth Stable's much improved Bret Over Again who was second in the Messenger and probably would have won had Driver Ted Taylor been able to get him out of a pocket at the rail. Bret Over Again did get loose but ran out of track before he could catch the eventual winner Valiant Bret.

The late Ray Forsyth, Birmingham industrialist, who died suddenly in December, would have enjoyed watching the Bret Hanover colt develop. It was one of his favorites from the moment he bought it at the Tattersalls sale in Lexington, Ky. as a yearling. It has won three of four starts, banked \$40,033 and looms as one of the choices for this year's Little Brown Jug as it continues to improve.

The four-year-olds are equally as impressive and could make the three youngsters knuckle down this time.

The best of the trio is Keystone Pebble, a Bye Bye Byrd offspring with a mark of 1:59 and earnings of \$63,954 this year. Owned by Dr. L. A. Swinehart of Warren, O., Keystone Pebble beat some of the best in the land when it won the Realization at Roosevelt in 2:07.1 for a mile and a sixteenth. It

won again last week in 2:01 at Saratoga Raceway.

Easy Irv, the most improved four-year-old in the Midwest, is well known to area fans for his performance at the big mile track. Owned by Charley Farber, of Brighton, Easy Irv dropped its first three starts and has been unbeatable since, winning its fourth straight a week ago in 1:59.4.

That clocking equaled the time of Bedford Jet, another Michigan favorite, set earlier in the year and enabled Irv to win the \$12,500 invitational. The remarkable improvement of the horse in each race forced Connors to move it up in class after each of the victories. Now it's in the top ranks and whipped the best last Saturday.

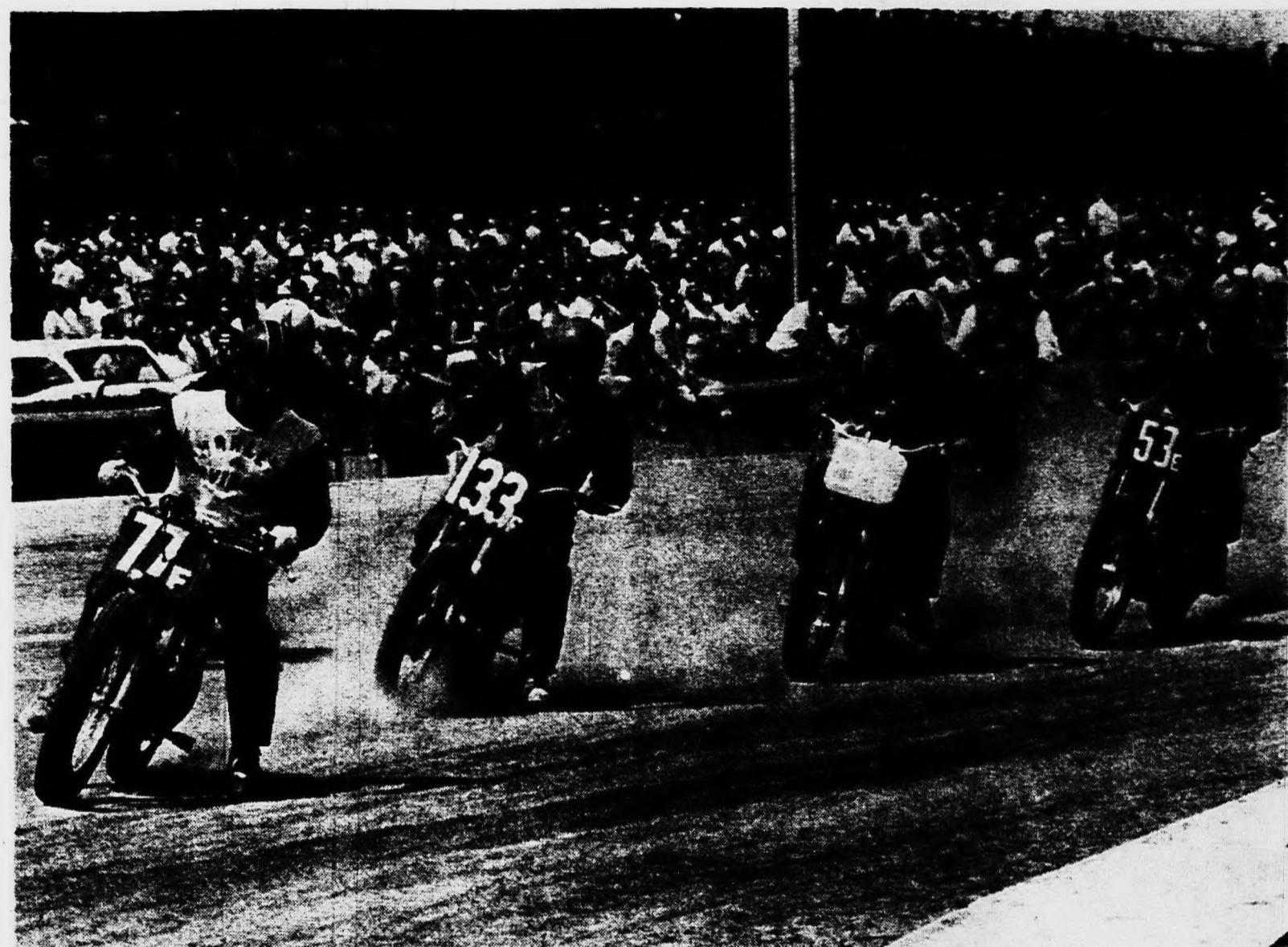
The third four-year-old is Armbryst Mystic, the Canadian owned son of Overtrick, who was a winner recently at Greenwood Raceway in Toronto in 1:59.2.

If this race doesn't come close to shattering the track record of 1:57.4 held by Kentucky then we'll be surprised. That is, provided the weatherman cooperates and the track is fast.

The second \$12,500 invitational matches the Saturday regulars plus Windy Way, a six-year-old from the Bob Williams stable who was the fastest at the recent Los Alamitos meeting in California where it won in 1:57.4.

Going against the coast star are: Mighty Fire, Bramble Hall, Skipper Gene Marx, Key Creed, Big Kahuna and Shiway Lad.

Another race that will have the fans cheering all the way ... try to pick a winner, Connors couldn't.

## The Court Jester

Today's column is devoted to the beginner - beginner.

This particular breed is the youngster, the teen-ager, the adult, seen on every tennis court in the area. He or she decides it would be fun to go to the tennis courts and get some exercise. They generally haven't the foggiest idea of what they are doing.

If you're unfortunate enough to be playing on the next court, you'll find them running onto your court to pick up balls while you're in the middle of a point, or else they are chasing stray hits in back of your court, and in general making a nuisance of themselves.

What bothers the serious tennis player is that these people are taking up space. Most of the time the beginners are playing singles, while the advanced players end up playing doubles because there aren't enough courts available. But let's not forget, we were all at that beginner stage at one time. Much of the criticism that is leveled at beginners is due to ignorance on their part.

No one has bothered to tell them that you don't run onto another court while play is in progress. No one has told them that all you have to do is to call the attention of one of the players on an adjoining court that their ball is there.

We call this court etiquette, or to put it simply, good manners. Players or spectators shouldn't walk behind a court while play is in progress. They should wait and then run. (My pet peeves are the football players and soccer players who cut across the tennis courts, not only tracking mud but interrupting play. I don't think they'd appreciate a group of tennis players cutting across their playing field in the middle of a game.)

We, as tennis players, have an obligation to educate the beginner. Patience is a virtue. Some day the city fathers will realize that there aren't enough tennis courts in Overland. Instead of building one or two, they may realize that a battery of five is more practical. I'd like to see everyone taking lessons and enjoying the game. Let's not discourage, but encourage.

## Pistons Wind Up Setting 9 Marks

Nine Detroit Piston records were smashed during the 1972-73 season, official team statistics have disclosed.

The team itself accounted for two of the marks -- 26 home victories and 48 assists in the season's final game at Cleveland.

In the individual department, Dave Bing, Bob Lanier and Curtis Rowe shared in the record - breaking. Bing set a single - season total assist record of 637 and also topped his Piston all-time career records to 12,216 points and 3,165 assists. He's the first Piston ever to eclipse the 10,000-point mark and the first to go over 2,500 assists.

Lanier set three Piston rebounding records: his 1,205 total for the season, his 33 in one game against Seattle and his 19 for one half in the same game against Seattle.

Rowe, with a shooting average of .519, topped the former mark of .516 set by Bailey Howell a decade previously. Terry Dischinger twice hit at better than .520 clips while with the Pistons but neither time qualified under the league's minimum standards for a number of field goal attempts.

The Pistons also tied a team record by beating Kansas City - Omaha by 44 points in a game on Feb. 18. Lanier figured in the tying

of another mark when he made his final 10 shots from the field against Houston at San Antonio on Nov. 4 and then made his first two in the Pistons' next game against Golden State. The 12-in-a-row matched the team record set by George Yardley in 1957-58. However, Yardley made his 12 straight in one game.

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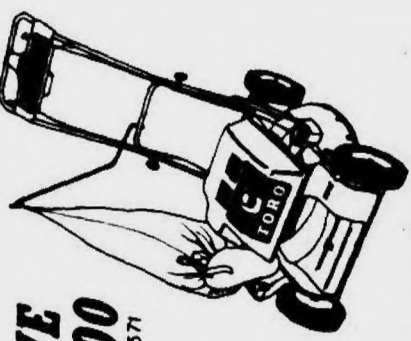
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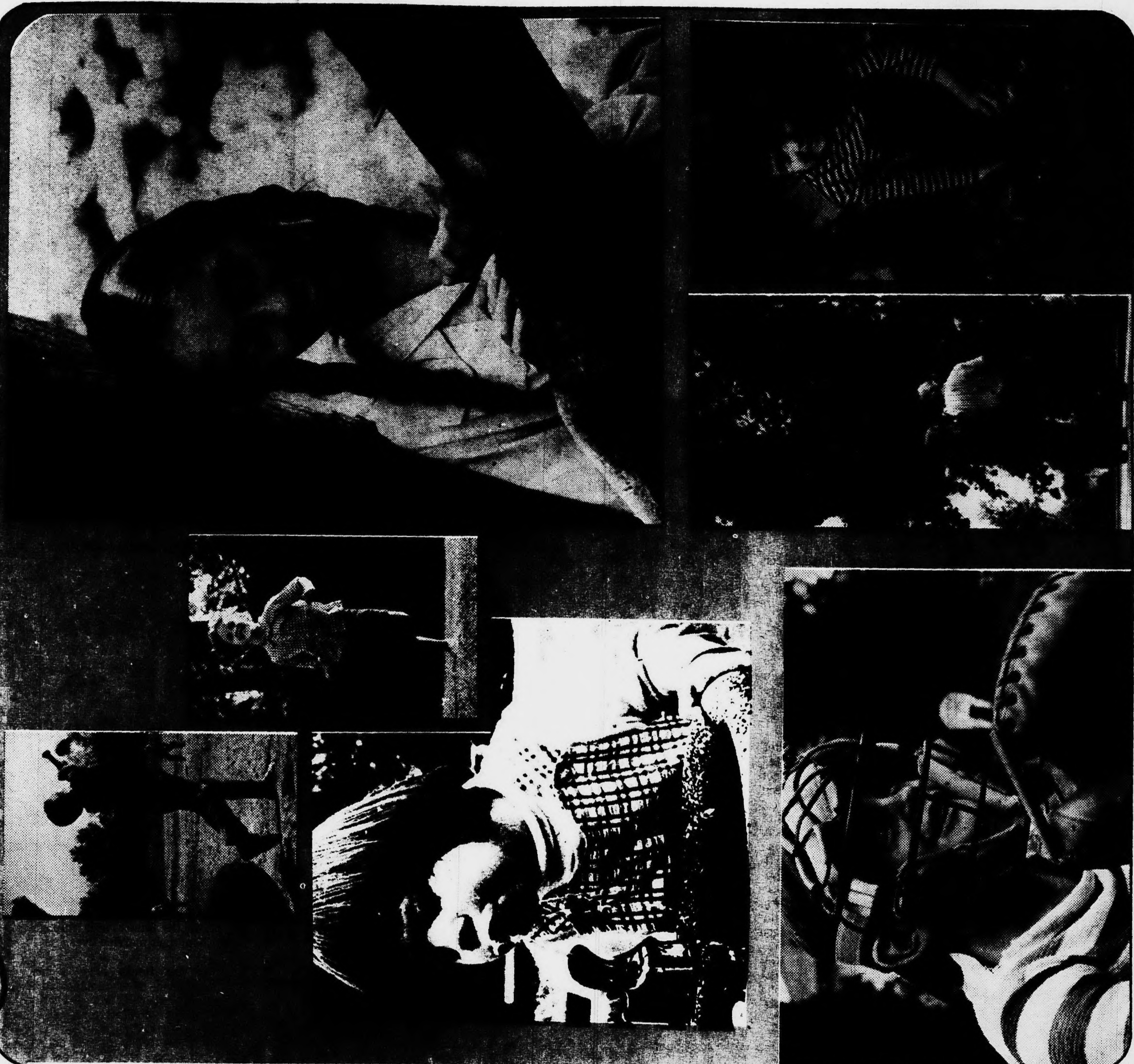
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# Huron-Clinton Parks Fill Recreation Needs

Three major parks of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, a five-county regional park agency serving the citizens of Wayne, Macomb, Oakland, Livingston, and Washtenaw Counties, are within easy driving distance for most Oberlin residents.

These include Kensington Metropolitan Park near Milford, Lower Huron Metropolitan near Belleville and Willow Metropark near New Boston. Here is a summary of facilities and additional details are contained in the Metropolitan Guide Map, available free by writing Dept. TR, c/o Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, 600 Woodward Avenue, Detroit, Michigan 48226 or phoning 961-5665.

**KENSINGTON METROPARK** covers 4,500 acres near Milford. Swimming is available now at Maple Beach, while Martindale Beach will be open week-ends only until completely staffed on June 9 and then both sites will provide swimming along Kent Lake through Labor Day.

Both beachhouses have heated showers, dressing rooms, coin-operated lockers for clothes checking, first aid station and food service. Swimming is permitted only at the beaches when lifeguards are on duty. County Health Department officials test the water weekly to insure that it is safe for swimming. Kent Lake is also popular with boaters,

park and there is a 10 mile per hour speed limit on Kent Lake. No water skiing is permitted and gasoline and bait are not available in the park.

Refreshments are available when the buildings are open at both Martindale and Maple Beaches, the golf course starter building and boat rental building. For additional information, persons may phone the Kensington Metropark Office: 685-1561 (Milford).

**LOWER HURON METROPARK** near Belleville, covering 1,200 acres, is one of the most popular parks in western Wayne County and offers many recreational facilities for the summer of 1973.

The swimming pool is open daily through Labor Day. Pool hours are 9:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Monday through Friday, with hours from 10:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday, Sunday and holidays.

There is a charge of 25 cents per person for use of the pool, including heated showers and bathroom, because all patrons are required to

shower prior to pool use. Coin-operated lockers are available for clothes-checking at 25 cents per locker, with individuals in the same family or group permitted to share a locker.

Lifeguards are on duty for all swim periods. The site also includes a first aid station, restrooms and food service, with food bar hours the same as the swimming pool schedule. Facilities also include a large paved parking lot, the Woods Creek Picnic Area, shuffleboard courts and Tot Lot, which is designed to entertain the small fry from ages 2 through 6 with a large sandbox and play equipment.

Lower Huron Park also has an 18-hole "Par 3" golf course, nature trails, seasonal nature center, several large picnic areas with tables, stoves and play equipment. Picnic groups of 50 or more persons are requested to register in advance at the park office although reservations for picnic areas are not available.

The park entrance is on Hannan Road via the Haggerty Road Inter-

change along the I-94 (Edsel Ford) Freeway, between Metropolitan Airport and Belleville. Park hours are sunrise to 11 p.m. Phone 697-9181 (Belleville).

**WILLOW METROPARK**, covering 1,500 acres, offers scenic drives, picnicking, shelters, playground equipment and water and sanitary facilities.

This is the newest site developed by the Authority and a games-swimming pool complex is slated to open in 1974 or 1975. Park hours are sunrise to 11 p.m. The entrance is on Willow Road, near the Village of Willow, between Walz and Huron River Drive. For detailed information, phone 697-9181 (Belleville).

Other parks of the HCMA include Metropolitan Beach near Mt. Clemens, Stony Creek Metropark near Utica, Marshbank Metropark near Pontiac, and three parks located west of Ann Arbor along the Huron River: Hudson Mills, Dexter-Huron and Delhi Metroparks. Each site has exceptional standards of maintenance and operations and are popular attractions for residents of southeastern Michigan.

## COUNTY TO BUILD BIKEWAY ALONG HINES

If things go as planned, bicycle riders will be cycling along Hines Drive on a bicycle trail just for them within a year's time.

A proposed \$50,000 grant from the state recreational bonding program will enable the Wayne County Road Commission to begin construction of the bicycle trail which will commence at Newburgh Road and proceed north and west along Hines Drive.

The state will finance the entire cost of construction, while Wayne County will pay for the maintenance and operation of the trail.

**MAX HILTON**, landscape architect for the Parks and Forestry Division of the Wayne County Road Commission, said that "construction of a six foot wide, hard surface bikeway, probably made of asphalt, running parallel to the Hines is imminent."

"There are some complications in Lansing at the moment," he reported. "But this is a problem common to all bonding programs. Although we had hoped to have the trail by this summer, I am hopeful that it will be built within a year."

We have had many requests for cycling, he continued. As a result, State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) became interested. He initiated the program and is responsible for getting it through.

**ARCHITECT HILTON** reported that the length of the bikeway is uncertain at this time. "We are guessing that it will run somewhere between three and three and a half miles. We still need more information."

Although it would seem that \$50,000 should pay for more bikeways than the three mile estimate, Hilton cites a number of problems in the construction.

"We will have to get through underpasses, and in several instances

there will have to be guard rails constructed between the bicycle path and the roadway. It is more complicated than merely laying three miles of asphalt."

He noted that the Bicycle Institute cites bikeway construction costs to be approximately \$10,000 a mile.

"**WE DID CONSIDER** using the road itself," Hilton continued. "But the Board of the Wayne County



Road Commission was concerned about the safety factors, and directed us to remain off the right-of-way of Hines Drive except for bridges and underpasses. Safety engineers insisted that we use a guard rail wherever the path and the Drive were adjacent."

Hilton emphasized that the proposed three mile stretch is only a start toward a more extensive bike trail. "We are hopeful that we will get additional funds by one means or another to extend it."

"We will proceed to the west, then to the east. When it is completed we hope to get individuals and cycling clubs to motor in specifically to use this trail."

Facilities to handle parking will be available at either end of the trail.

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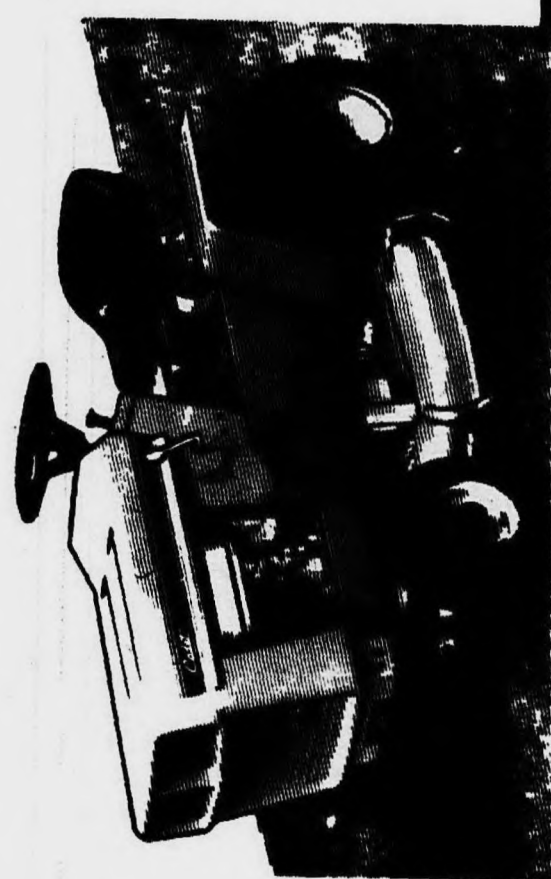

The corps has been invited to historic old Fort Wayne in Detroit, to give a concert between 2 and 4 p.m. today (June 2). It is being featured as part of Pioneer Days celebrations. This is its second invitation to appear at the fort.

The group is also lining up a busy schedule for the summer, highlighted by a much coveted invitation to participate in the Deep River Muster on July 21 at Deep River, Conn. Community support will be sought to assist in underwriting costs of this.

On June 17, the corps will be playing at the Jackson Rose Festival and June 23, it will be in Bowling Green, Ohio.

July 4 should also see a busy scheduling, including Plymouth and Northville parades.

While in Indiana, the corps played in such distinguished company as the Tippecanoe Ancient Fife and Drum Corps of Lafayette, Ind., and

the Old Guard of the 3rd Army from Washington, D.C.

The Old Guard was originally created by Gen. George Washington as a morale builder for his troops. It was reactivated in 1960, and serves as the official Presidential Honor Guard and ceremonial music group.

The Old Guard is attired in beautiful red coats, and white breeches and features music for fife, bugle and drum.

The Plymouth Corps was established in 1971 by Mark Petty, percussionist who has tutored the Plymouth High School drummers since 1968.

From a small beginning, when the drummer boys asked some flutists to come to a rehearsal, the group has grown to involve 50 young people from elementary age through college.

The Plymouth Corps has adopted an 1812 nautical theme. Its members are attired in sailor hats, neckerchiefs, striped shirts and white breeches, and play sea songs in addition to the usual 18th century martial music.

In 1972, a group of parents saw that Petty and his new bride, Carol, needed some help in arranging details of travel, chaperoning and fund raising, and so the Plymouth Fife and Drum Corps Assn. was formed.

Presently, membership is limited to corps members and their parents, but plans are under way to accept interested persons and groups as non-voting sponsors.

During the 1972 summer season, the corps earned enough (through membership dues, parade fees and parental generosity) to replace the inexpensive (\$1.50) metal flutes with new wooden 10-hole instruments.

The 1973 goal is to earn enough to pay for the beautiful maple shell, rope and leather-trimmed drums which arrived just in time for Michigan Week appearances.

Contributions from interested persons or groups are welcome and should be sent to the association at 7904 Thornwood Drive, Plymouth.

The association's officers are Donald F. Tripp, president; Bob Krieg and Roxanne McTurner, corps representatives; Leonard Garfat, treasurer; and Dr. E. J. McClendon, Jack Krieg, Mark Wehmeyer and Earl Dryden.

According to Tripp, the corps "hopes to provide a catalyst for the reawakening of interest in our American heritage and local history."

"The young people of the corps have already experienced many exciting re-enactments of historic moments in other locales, and are looking forward to contributing a musical note to the Bicentennial observance in Observerland."

Tippecanoe and Plymouth are among the very few groups outside New England States offering this type of entertainment.


