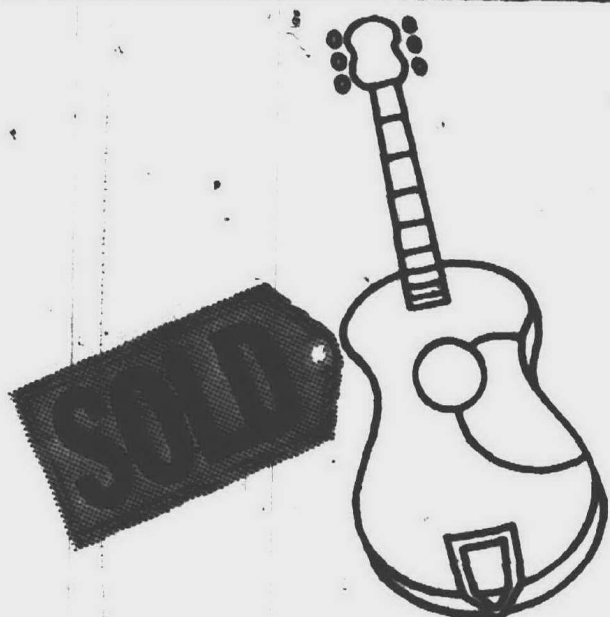

"Then go back and fill this out the right way. Now!" shouted the sergeant again.

"But this is filled out completely, Drill Sergeant."

"What? Do you see any first name there? Or a middle initial? Well, do you?"

"No, Drill Sergeant. But, you see, I have none."

"What? Let me see a copy of your

orders," spewed the drill sergeant grabbing the orders from the young man's hand. "Now, let's see. Well, I'll be..."

This has been a typical scene for Private First Class Bear since he enlisted in the Army last January.

## Old Village Celebrates Revitalization Program

Beer and sarsaparilla for 10 cents a glass?

Sounds too good to be true in 1973, but the Old Village Assn. will turn back the clock this weekend when they hold an all-day shindig Saturday.

Officially recognized by the City of Plymouth as Old Village, the older section of town along Starkweather and Mill Streets will host a "good old days" celebration, calling it "Dearie, Do You Remember When?"

The night before, the city will rededicate the Village Point Park (where Mill and Starkweather come together) following the refurbishing of the park through the efforts of the Old Village Assn. (OVA), the city and several civic groups.

All of this brings full circle a series of events that began several years ago. Before recent history, the area was known as "lower town." It was the other side of the

tracks, the oldest part of town, and the brunt of many local jibes.

"I think it's obvious the area was going to die," says Mary Childs, chairman of the Plymouth city planning commission. "But what the OVA has done can happen anywhere in Plymouth if people take pride in their neighborhood."

Mrs. Childs is very enthusiastic about the OVA leadership, directed by Mrs. Pat Hann.

"Pat and the others have things going great guns down there, and it's because they have put the time into it," Mrs. Childs added.

There will be dancing in the street (Liberty will be closed between Starkweather and Mill during the evening hours) and that's when the 10 cent beer will be on tap.

The city's portable stage will be set up, and entertainment will be provided.

Kiddie games, a dunk tank, booths of all kinds, arts and crafts displays, balloons and

giveaways will highlight the daytime activities, beginning at 10 a.m.

Gay '90s costumes, Keystone Kops and antique cars will add to the atmosphere. Outdoor haircuts for \$1.50 and eggs for 20 cents a dozen will also be offered.

In addition to the fun and special sales, the OVA fete hopes to draw attention to the revitalization of the area. Green flower boxes with geraniums have been placed outside by most merchants in the area.

The city's planners, Villanueva Associates, have drawn up plans for face lifting some of the area.

Last week, the city planners formally adopted a future land use plan for the area, which will be filed with the state soon.

"The future land use plan does not mean rezoning," Mrs. Childs said. "It's just that we hope the area will grow in a certain way."

The city's plans and architectural drawings for the neighborhood will be on display.

By EDWARD WENDOVER Interscholastic athletics, music and all other extra-curricular activities, as well as the monetary commitment to the area-wide recreation authority, will be cut from the 1973-74 Plymouth school budget.

In a tentative agreement reached by the school board at a workshop session Monday night, those items were among several programs earmarked to be eliminated officially from next year's school budget at the board meeting Tuesday night.

A large turnout to protest the cuts is expected at Tuesday's meeting which will be held at 8 p.m. at Miller Elementary School, 43721 Hanford Rd., Canton Township.

The cuts agreed on Monday night would save the school district \$371,200 and would balance the budget between estimated revenues and projected expenditures for the coming school year.

The items which will be eliminated include:

- High school and middle school athletics (saving \$100,000).
- High school and middle school performing music (saving \$11,200).
- High school and middle school extracurricular activities such as drama, forensics, newspaper, yearbook (saving \$19,800).
- All transportation of students except where required by law (saving \$50,000).
- Financial pledge to the Plymouth-Canton Recreation Authority (saving \$21,000).
- Reduction of custodial services (saving \$83,700).
- Eliminating some planned major maintenance (saving \$30,000).
- Sixth grade camp (saving \$11,500).
- Pledge to the Plymouth Area Economic Expansion Commission (saving \$5,000).
- Reduction of instructional supplies, and textbook purchases (saving \$18,000).

The board discussed the cuts for more than four hours Monday night, beginning with less controversial items and concluding with its decision to eliminate all athletic, music and extracurricular activities.

On July 5 the board voted to cut several programs (saving \$608,522) from next year's school budget but postponed a decision on the items considered Monday night.

Five of the seven school board members were present

at the workshop when the controversial items came up for discussion. They were: E.J. McClendon, Marda Benson, Fred Penar, Gary Mirto and Joe Gray.

John Graves was ill and absent from the meeting and George Lawton left the meeting before those items came up for discussion.

Of the five present, four (McClendon, Benson, Penar, Mirto) favored cutting the athletic, music and extracurricular programs. Gray opposed it.

This insures that there will be at least four votes at the official meeting Tuesday night and probably five if Graves attends, since he has indicated previously he favored cutting those programs.

Lawton's feelings are not known.

The board decided Monday to consider the athletic, music and extracurricular programs as a package and discussed either cutting them entirely or reducing their budgets across the board.

"Anything short of dealing with (them) across the board is discriminatory," Mirto said.

The board also weighed the possibility that by eliminating its financial commitment to the recreation authority, the other governmental units might bail out.

"I can't see supporting the recreation authority but cutting our own athletics," Mrs. Benson said.

Mirto said he did not see how the other governmental units could back out of the authority agreement "simply because we found it budgetarily impossible to participate."

The school board and school administration said the budget cuts are necessary to balance the 1973-74 budget in light of an anticipated student enrollment increase and the voters' June 11 defeat of additional operating millage.

School Supt. John M. Hoben is preparing information for another try at the operating millage increase on Aug. 20 -- a date the school board voted on July 5 to reconsider.

The board members reconvened Monday night, however, that they will not call the election unless the district's voters show a mandate asking for it.

The final decision on whether an election will be called is expected at the meeting Tuesday night.

## It's Easy To Return To College

Schoolcraft College can open doors for you - that's what the college claims and intends to prove to local residents Thursday, July 26, when it holds an information night at 8 p.m. in the gymnasium.

The college is located at 18800 Haggerty between Six and Seven Mile in Livonia.

The public is being invited to get information on the college programs and admission and registration procedures.

Representatives from the admissions, counseling, instruction, community services and student affairs departments will disseminate information and answer questions.

The evening is intended for people who are interested in taking a class for enjoyment or improvement of skills as well as those who are interested in enrolling in an academic or vocational program, according to Vice President for Student Affairs Edward McNally.

It will show people that "coming back to school is a simple thing," McNally said.

"Some people are fearful of taking college courses," counselor Robert Burnside said. "We'll show them that it's not that difficult and that there are others out here like them taking classes."

The program will start with a general presentation on the college. Then visitors will break into small groups for detailed information on admissions and registration.

Mothers can get information on the day care center which is open from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. Pre-school children can be enrolled in the center for a \$5 registration fee and 60 cents per hour while mothers attend classes.

A veterans counselor will explain GI education benefits to prospective students.

A growing percentage of Schoolcraft students are in the over-30 age range, and many are enrolled for a brush-up course or for their own enjoyment.

Barbara Geil, director of admissions, said that the former concept of college students being in the 18-25 age range is changing. Currently about one-third of Schoolcraft's students are over 30, she said.

Schoolcraft offers a wide range of one and two-year vocational programs as well as programs in health careers, business and liberal arts.

Catalogues and brochures with explanations on the programs will be available.

## Pond Life Course Topic

Area residents still have time to enroll in a class entitled "Michigan Wildlife - The Pond," which will be given at the Nature Center of Kensington Metropark near Milford from July 19 - July 28.

Classes will meet on Thursday evenings from 7 to 10 p.m. and Saturday mornings from 8 to 11 a.m., with four sessions conducted by Miss Patricia Eising, supervising park naturalist.

# Canton Land Use Study Expected Soon

Canton's citizens' land use study committee is beginning to "put it all together" — as the popular saying goes — for an August report to the township board.

When completed, the report is expected to have considerable impact on future zoning decisions in the township.

One immediate effect will be to end officially a six-month moratorium affecting all multiple housing requests that did not fall in the classification of planned unit developments.

The document is actually a month overdue, according to Michael Manore, Canton planning consultant who has been serving as committee

coordinator and whose job it will be to compile the group's final recommendations.

But there's a solid reason for the delay and he's personally pleased that it occurred, Manore added. It is an indication of the concern displayed by the citizens committee and its commitment to do the best job possible, regardless of the time it took, he said.

Lively discussions — termed by some as "hot and heavy" — and the group's refusal to be bound "by anything sacred" has prompted Manore to notify township officials that the study has been extended to include July.

The study, which began in mid-March, was originally intended to last only three months, he said.

Meeting twice a month at the start, the committee soon decided to hold weekly meetings because of the scope of the material to be covered.

Manore said he was personally pleased with the committee's enthusiasm and interest but even more impressed with the fact that "no one in the group was timid" about speaking out.

"In fact, everyone is expressing their views to the fullest extent," he commented.

So spirited have the discussions been, he said, that the committee also had to switch its meeting place from Plymouth-Canton High School to the Canton Center Road fire station meeting room.

"The school required us to be out by 10 p.m. (for janitorial purposes) and we found we weren't ready to quit talking, so we moved to the fire station where discussions continued until midnight and sometimes beyond."

Manore stressed that the committee's approach to

Canton's future zoning patterns was from an idealistic point of view — or how they would like to see the remainder of the township's open space developed.

The final report will not contain definite standards and will not deal with specific projects, he said.

"That will be up to the planning commission," he said. The commission could very well disregard the entire report, he admitted, although it isn't likely this will happen because at least four planning commissioners will have had a say in formulating the final decisions.

However, while there will be no recommendations on specific projects, the report hopefully will be a useful tool in updating the township's present master zoning plan.

The advisory group is hopeful also that it will provide new insights in solving some of the township's current problems, particularly the one involving a proposed regional shopping center at Joy and Sheldon roads.

Early committee sessions were informational, designed to acquaint the 25-member committee with facts and figures and to present views of special resource people Manore arranged to have speak to the committee.

Included in these sessions were three "public" meetings held in the high school and open to all Canton residents.

The last five weeks have dealt with regional shopping centers, over-all density and the neighborhood concept.

"Quite a few" sessions have been spent discussing "agricultural" zoning, Manore said.

The advisory group hopes to "wrap things up" in the next two weeks, he indicated.

Attendance at the sessions has been fairly good, Manore said, with about half of the 25 members attending regularly.

Canton's six members of the planning commission were automatic members of the committee. Membership was voluntary, however, he said.

Attendance records kept by Manore showed that commissioners Wes Kaiser, Bart Berg and Grant Campbell have attended all meetings; Ellen Ruland has attended most of the sessions; Joseph Kinnick has attended one or two of the meetings; while Robert Padgett attended none of the meetings because he is taking a class that night.

Ironically, Kinnick and Padgett are the newest appointees to the commission, replacing former chairman George Lawton and Lynn Wilson, who resigned in a dispute over township board approval of the six-month building moratorium last Feb. 27.

Canterbury Mews; Bob Miller, Northwest Homeowners Assn.; Dick Palmer representing the farmers; Cafol Schwall, Holiday Park Subdivision; Robert Simmons, represent-

ing the farmers; Andy Smith, representing the Chamber of Commerce; Thelma Thomas, Wagon Wheel Mobile Home Park; and John Thompson, Deer Creek Apts.

## July 4 Parade Broke Tradition

PLYMOUTH Tradition has been handed a real jolt.

And, of all places, it happened in the City of Plymouth that is steeped in history and where the home folks take pride in their Pilgrim heritage that dates back to the landing of the Mayflower.

For the first time since 1967, the Fourth of July parade didn't stop at City Hall for the traditional exchange of greetings between the British consul and the members of the city's official family.

Each year the British consul brings a message from the lord mayor of Plymouth, England, telling the condition of the trees on the municipal grounds that were a gift from the residents of Plymouth, Michigan.

In return, he is told of the pride that is taken in the stone that was presented to the city in 1967 by the late lord mayor, Frank Chapman, when he and members of his cabinet were guests for the centennial.

This year, as usual, the British consul — James T. Hyslop — was on hand with a message and was ready to take part in the ceremony that had an extra touch in that he was being shown the two trees planted as a memorial to Chapman.

While hundreds of people lined both sides of Main Street to await the passing of the parade, the British consul, accompanied by his wife, walked over to the stone in company with Mayor James McKeon.

As the members of the press appeared, Hyslop handed the paper containing the message from abroad, to one of the newsmen.

"We'll get it after you read it at the ceremonies when the parade makes its usual stop," he was told.

"I've been told," he answered, "by your man (Mayor McKeon) that they are not going to take the time to stop this year."

With that he joined the Plymouth mayor in haste to get to the start of the parade.

And the parade didn't stop. Tradition was broken and the trees that had a rich sentimental value to many friends of the former Lord Mayor Chapman were not dedicated to his memory.

McKeon said the reason he had asked for the ceremony to take place before the parade, rather than during it, was that he felt the people along the parade route never knew why the parade was pausing in front of city hall.

"No one ever knew why it stopped," he said.

Their never ending duty is to alert their fellows when something has run amok. (We Scrabble enthusiasts love that word and use it whenever we can.)

Thus, as an admitted grumbler, I shall do my part, but unlike Priestly, without apology.

The city fathers have been agreeable, putting money and manpower into the area. Special problems like parking are being handled as they come up. For instance, Monday, July 29 the city will hold a hearing on the rezoning for parking of a lot behind Heide's greenhouse on Mill St.

"We have to help the smaller merchants. There is no way we can bring in a big store. The smaller shops are the answer. And a lot of them have asked to locate down there," Mrs. Childs said. Mrs. Hann looks at it another way:

"Everyone should know that the Old Village Assn. is not a merchants group but represents everyone here, residents included. All the money we have raised with events goes back to improving this area, not into advertising for a merchants group."

What once was "lower town" has become an important part of the city; still on the agenda: more improvement of individual businesses and homes and a solution to the future of the old C and O freight house - perhaps symbolic of the Old Village's proper place in history.

Frank Henderson from Rotary Club will present the OVA with a check to finance a sign identifying the park.

In preparation for Friday, the city, OVA, and other groups have labored in the park to improve it. Kiwanians and OVA members laid bricks, the Plymouth Garden Club planted flowers, the city provided sodding. The Mayflower Garden Club will add a special crimson maple for the park. Response from all circles has been very good. The OVA told the city planning commission recently that they like the Velican and Le-nan concepts for their section of town.

to the initial news by saying, "Son, you're just being ridiculous."

However, Bear says she has changed her mind since last fall and is almost understanding it now. Asked what his father's reaction was, Bear relates, "When we received news that Johnny Carson wanted me on the show, my father started calling me 'son' for the first time I can remember."

Bear related that all his life he had been known as "Bear." He added that the name really stuck when he and a friend called each other by their "pet" names in junior high school.

"It all started when this friend of mine whom I called 'Moose' because of his size, started calling me 'Bear.'"

Bear had been working as a volunteer social worker at Plymouth Youth Inc. before his induction. He plans on adding to his year of college while in the service and eventually becoming a social worker when he finishes his service obligation.

Among the reactions he has received are letters abhorring him for his childishness, phone calls admonishing

him for his apparent drug addiction and a great amount of letters and phone calls from girls wanting a date with a "Bear."

"Some people just don't understand that if they were always known by one name and had to use another for signatures, they would probably change theirs also," Bear said.

He added that when he finally looked into it and found that it would cost him only \$33.50 if he represented himself, he went down to the local probate court with the appropriate form and requested the change.

"The judge asked why. I told him why. He said he could find nothing illegal in one name and granted the change," added Bear.

Although the Army Finance Center in Indianapolis has had to reprogram its computer to handle the name, and although he still receives applications he submitted to various organizations with an "Incomplete Name" stamp on them, Bear says that he is happy with the one name he has had all his life anyway.

# Crash Critically Injures PHS June Graduate

PLYMOUTH  
Debra Troutman, 17, a June graduate of Plymouth High School, is listed in critical condition at a Muskegon hospital following a highway accident.

The car which Miss Troutman was driving was headed the wrong way in the northbound lane of US-31 when it collided head-on with an oncoming car, deputies said.

A passenger in Miss Troutman's small foreign car, Abigail H. Wolff, 19, of Water-town, Wis., was killed in the crash.

The accident happened about 2:30 a.m. Saturday.

The driver of the second car, Stacey B. Bueschel, 19, of Mt. Prospect, Ill., and her parents, who were also in the car, were released after treatment at Hackley Hospital.

Miss Bueschel told officers she saw headlights coming at her and slowed down, swerving to the left. Miss Troutman swerved the same direction, deputies said, and the two cars crashed head-on

about three feet from the left shoulder.

Miss Troutman was listed in serious condition in the intensive care unit of Hackley Hospital with fractures of both legs, left arm and jaw and face cuts.

Sgt. Orville Budd of the Muskegon County sheriff's department said it was not known how it happened that Miss Troutman was driving on the wrong side of the expressway.

He said the word "right" of an illuminated "keep right" sign was out.

The accident happened about eight miles south of where US-32 divides, he said, indicating Miss Troutman may have driven that distance in the northbound lane.

"They could have gotten on at the Fruitvale, White Lake Drive or Colby exits," he said, "but they all have red signs saying 'Wrong way.'"

"We have no way of knowing until Miss Troutman talks," he said.

The young woman's father, Harvey Troutman of Ann Arbor, said his daughter had gone to Traverse City for the summer and was working on a dude ranch. Her mother,

Troutman said his daughter had gone to Ludington to pick up Miss Wolff, and the two were headed for Muskegon to stay with friends.

The Troutmans lived for several years at 1345 Carol Street.

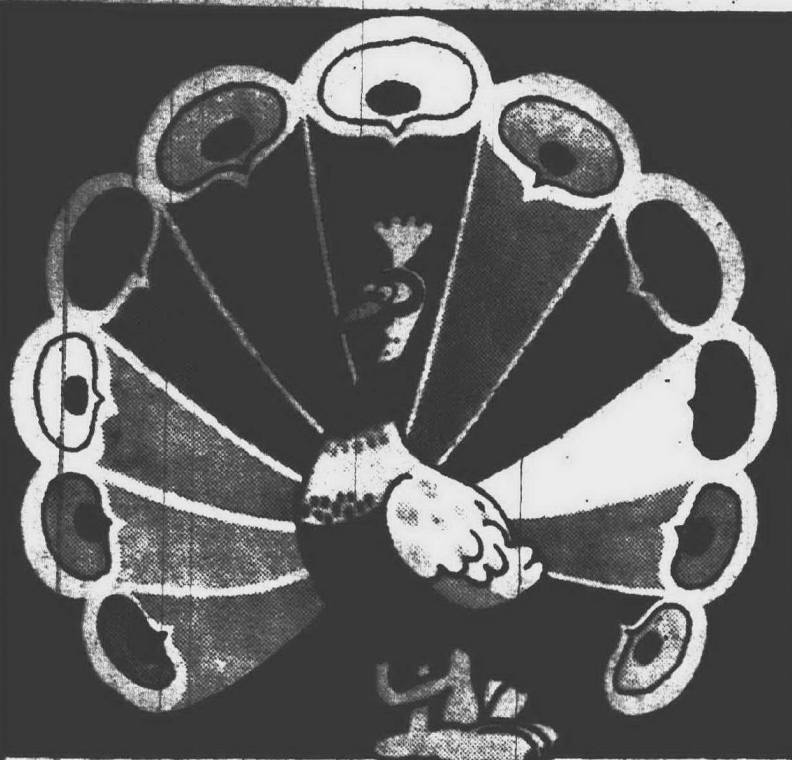

## Milky Way Rules Heavens In July

ANN ARBOR The Milky Way will dominate the heavens throughout July, according to University of Michigan astronomer Hazel M. Losh.

"Rising almost parallel to the horizon and extending as a giant arch from north to south across the eastern sky, this broad, hazy band comes into good view in the early evening hours," she says. It will rise higher and higher during the later night hours as the summer progresses, she adds.

Before the invention of the telescope, the U-M astronomer notes, the nature of the Milky Way could only be conjectured. Many saw it as a "starry path." Others as a glistening river or a heavenly snake. Some American Indians believed it was dust kicked up by a buffalo and a horse racing across the sky.

Today, Prof. Losh says, it is believed to be the projection of our galaxy. "It is thought that we are located roughly three-fifths of the way between the center and edge of our galaxy," she explains, "and during summer nights we are looking toward its farther border, and therefore through a greater - and brighter - number of stars than during our winter."

The constellation Cygnus,

the swan, appears to be flying south along the Milky Way, Prof. Losh says. Rising on its side in the northeast around sunset, the swan has its wings spread wide, its neck stretched out, and its feet, formed by fainter stars, trailing behind.

Cygnus, also known as the "Northern Cross," contains some of July's most beautiful stars, Prof. Losh notes. The brightest is the bluish-white Deneb, found in the swan's "tail feathers." Deneb also marks the top of the cross.

One of the most distant of the first magnitude stars, Deneb is around 1,500 light-years from earth and is approximately 10,000 times more luminous than our sun.

In the swan's beak, or the foot of the cross, is the double star Albireo. Blue and gold respectively, the twin stars comprising Albireo can be easily detected with a small telescope.

Flying toward the swan is Aquila, the eagle, the U-M astronomer says. This constellation rises slightly north of east. It contains Altair, a relatively close star at only 16 light-years away. Altair, Deneb, and a third bright star, Vega, form the "Summer Triangle" so crucial in navigation.

## Roads Get Priority As Top Public Issue

**BLOOMFIELD HILLS**—Oakland County residents are more than twice as concerned about road problems than school busing, according to a survey completed by the Traffic Improvement Assn. (TIA) of Oakland County.

That was the result of a survey of public concerns conducted for TIA by Market Opinion Research.

When asked "What do you think are the most important problems facing Oakland County at the present time?", 24.5 per cent answered highways and roads compared to 10.8 per cent answering school busing.

Other high areas of concern were: drugs (15.7 per cent); high taxes (14.5 per cent); crime (13.7 per cent); and, heavy traffic (10.8 per cent).

Areas of least concern, among the 502 licensed drivers surveyed, were: lack of recreation facilities (1.6 per cent); racial problems (2.2 per cent); inflation (2.4 per cent); sewers and drains (3 per cent); school financing (3.8 per cent); and, pollution (4 per cent).

Other areas of public concern reported were: traffic safety as related to speeders and drunk driving (7.8 per cent); educational problems related to overcrowding schools (7.6 per cent); and, planning future growth as related to planning (6.6 per cent).

A conclusion drawn by the TIA was that traffic safety is now an issue of greater public concern to Oakland County residents than it was one year ago.

Analysis of the interviews showed:

Many drivers have noticed an increase in traffic law enforcement and felt this was a good thing;

Forty per cent of the drivers still felt that there was too little law enforcement, and only two per cent felt there was too much;

A great many drivers believe law violations, particularly drunk driving and speeding, are an important cause of accidents; and that,

The TIA slogan, "We've Had It With Bad Drivers," and the frowning policeman picture is recognized by 76 per cent of those interviewed.

"Even before the slogan was shown to drivers," explains Fred Currier, president of Market Opinion Research, "it was the second-most mentioned safety slogan in response to an

unaided, open-end question about safety slogans.

"This level of awareness is unusual in our research experience for a message slogan which was introduced only six months ago, and hasn't had the benefit of a high-dollar media campaign."

The survey, conducted in April and May, is identical with one TIA had done a year ago.

The second survey's purpose was to measure the impact of a campaign designed to develop greater citizen awareness of the high cost of traffic accidents and support for enforcement as a means of reducing the traffic toll.

Dr. James Swinehart of the Highway Safety Research Institute at the University of Michigan says an important result of the TIA campaign has been the increase in agreement that "firm but fair" law enforcement can reduce accidents.

Bruce Madsen, TIA managing director, credits the success to the communications and advertising media who provided free work and space to the program.

The ranking of slogan awareness showed most county residents were familiar with "Buckle Up For Safety," with the TIA slogan ranked second.

Other familiar slogans by rank were: Don't drink while driving; Bring 'em back alive; Drunk drivers go to jail; Honestly now, what's your hurry; and, Slow down and live.

Market Opinion Research found it significant that the TIA slogan had replaced the long-standing AAA "Bring 'em back alive" as the second most recalled slogan.

The public ranked as top indicators that something was being done to increase traffic law enforcement as: (in order): more police on roads; radar and unmarked cars; the TIA slogan; speed enforcement; and through TV reports and newspaper stories.

The top means the public sees as methods to reduce accidents were (in order): stricter laws for drunk drivers; stricter law enforcement; more tickets; lower speed limit; and better testing of drivers for licensing.

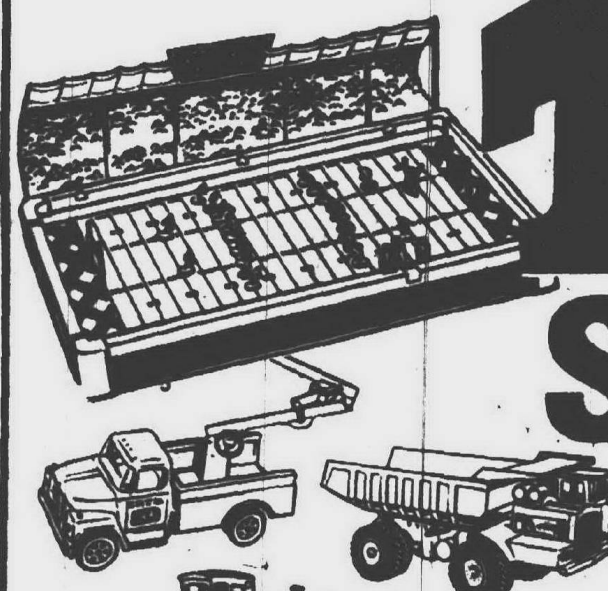

# Schools' Safety Committee Reports District's Problems

## Township's Newest Fire Truck Arrives

PLYMOUTH The Plymouth Township fire department will put a new \$40,000 fire truck into regular service this week, part of a continuing expansion program for the department.

The township took delivery on the American LaFrance truck last week. A fire department service company is putting the final touches on the truck which will carry an estimated \$27,000 worth of equipment, placing the total cost of the truck at \$67,000.

The truck, a pumper with a 2,000 gallon-per-minute capacity, replaces a 22-year-old truck currently housed at the township's station 2 on Schoolcraft in Lake Pointe.

The old truck will be held

in reserve, according to township Fire Chief James Gignac. The old truck will have to be stored somewhere else, possibly in Livonia at the Plymouth-Newburgh station.

The new truck was ordered in November 1971, but currently orders at American LaFrance take several months to fill.

The new pumper will stay at station 2, along with a 21-year-old tanker, and a Jeep used for grass fires. The main station on Ann Arbor Road, the department's headquarters, will house the new snorkel-ladder truck, a pumper and the rescue squad.

Gignac said the department would also take deliv-

ery on two new rescue ambulances later this month. These units will be at each station and the current rescue unit, bought in 1966, will be retired.

The ambulances are to be "Superior 61's", a Superior ambulance on a Chevrolet chassis.

The township's old tanker has been retained, Gignac said, because certain areas of the western part of the township still have no water lines. The tanker and the old pumper will go to the proposed station three.

"We hope to break ground sometime soon for the third station," Gignac said.

The department recently expanded from nine full time firemen to 12.

PLYMOUTH The safety problems facing the Plymouth School District, the goals set for students' safety and achievements reached are subjects of the District-Wide Safety Committee's annual report, issued recently.

The role of the committee is that of fact-finding and recommendation. Each school in the district has a safety representative appointed by the principal or the parent-teacher group. Tours of all schools were taken to familiarize the committee with their location and problems.

The boundary lines of the area studied by safety committee include the complete Plymouth Community School District, involving 18 public schools and two parochial schools.

According to the committee, the complexity of traffic-safety hazards within the Plymouth School District increase as the school enrollment increases. The report also says the four governmental agencies controlling the roads in the district don't have master plans to remedy the safety hazards.

"Most of the roads are the same as they were when constructed for rural western Wayne County and the construction of the expressways are only compounding traffic safety along with commercial and residential construction."

"Only select areas have been required to install sidewalks. On many miles of roads the child pedestrian is competing with automobiles and trucks for a route to school."

The report also says the increased traffic hazards on roads which were never designed to carry this volume of traffic, the various construction sites and a sporadic sidewalk pattern complicates the school district's safety work.

"Growing hazards affecting all the schools in the district are minibikes, motor-

cycles, motor carts, scooters, etc., whose drivers use the school grounds for a raceway. Automobiles are also parking on the playgrounds in the evening during Little League activities."

The following are committee reports on each of the schools:

•Allen - Surrounded by Ann Arbor Road, Ann Arbor Trail and Haggerty Road which have speeds of 45, 35 and 40 miles per hour successively, excluding the time when the flashing school speed limit sign is operating.

•Bird and West Middle - The location of these two schools at Ann Arbor Trail and Sheldon has been developed with heavy industry, business, apartments and residential subdivisions. Sheldon is a main artery with a posted speed limit of 35 miles per hour. Ann Arbor Trail is also a main artery and has a posted speed limit of 45 miles per hour passing the schools. Traffic hazards have caused the schools to change their arrival and dismissal times for students. This has helped the situation some, but the overtime patterns of industry have disrupted the continuity of the student pedestrians' safety. There are 450 students involved.

•Farrand - At the present time this school seems to have no serious safety problems.

•Fiegel - Located on Joy Road, the school is faced with the traffic problems and construction of the Joy pedestrian overpass. A survey in March showed 3,642 cars in the immediate area with over 5,000 cars anticipated by September.

•Gallimore - The main concern is the playground area with students going near the road to retrieve balls. The excessive speed on Sheldon Rd. has been controlled by the recent installation of the flashing school speed limit sign.

•Isbister - The chief concern is the opening of Eric Pass. This would eliminate

the need to bus approximately 129 students to Isbister. At present students living close to the school have to be bused because there is no walkway available.

•Miller - This is a new school surrounded by new subdivisions with residential construction still going on. There are delays in obtaining the necessary painted crosswalks and directional signs required to protect the pedestrian students. These directional signs would solve the confusion by informing the motorists which approach to use when entering and exiting the driveway and parking lots.

•Smith - This school is located on a residential street within a subdivision, but part of the attendance area crosses Main Street and Sheldon. The traffic in this school area is the same heavy, industrial traffic that is present in the Bird and West schools' area, but compounded by the shopping centers on Ann Arbor and Sheldon roads.

•Starkweather - Parked trucks along the street at this school's location impair the visibility of oncoming traffic for the pedestrian.

•Tanger - There is no appreciable change in the traffic hazards here. Tanger is plagued with the same hazards that are prevalent throughout the school district - main arteries with excessive speeds, narrow shoulders and no sidewalks. Because of these hazards the students in the danger areas have been bused.

•East Middle - This school's address is Mill Street, but is actually located several feet from that street. The main concern is the students who reside on the east side of Ann Arbor Road which is a very heavily traveled two-lane highway, at this point, with a dual posted speed limit of 35 miles per hour on the west side of the road and 45 miles per hour on the east side. The inter-

section of Lilley-Mill Street and Ann Arbor Road has no painted crosswalks and a light that is timed for cars to clear the intersection, but not for the pedestrian to cross safely.

•Pioneer - This school is located in a rural setting on Ann Arbor Road with a posted speed limit of 55 miles per hour. Because of traffic hazard patterns, excessive speed, lack of sidewalks and the fact that many students live so far from the school, busing will be the chief method of transportation.

•Plymouth Centennial Educational Park - Schools involved here are Canton and Salem High Schools. Problems include drugs, liquor, smoking, stealing from cars, reckless driving and bad conduct on the school buses.

The committee also reports the following achievements have been reached this past year: mileage for safety was placed on the election ballot; convincing state legislator to introduce legislation which would reduce speed limits in front of schools; temporary full-phase light on Joy Road at Fiegel School with installation promised by Sept., 1973, plus cost reduction of light; and reduction of speed limit on Ann Arbor Trail west of Sheldon Rd. from 45 miles per hour to 35 miles per hour to benefit Bird and West Schools.

Also, a flashing speed limit sign on Sheldon Road at Gallimore School; training program for the crossing guards to be in effect for September; Safe-T-Glo flashlights for the crossing guards to be used on foggy days and dark mornings; new flashing signs in the Bird and West Schools area; a painted turning lane for Penniman and Sheldon; elimination of dual speed limits; and designated no parking areas.

The most notable achievement this year, reports the committee, was getting commitments from the Wayne County Road Commission.

## Livonia Council Delays Mettetal Purchase Study

## Buzz Line To Train Volunteers

LIVONIA The Livonia City Council has delayed action on a request that the city conduct a study of whether to buy Mettetal Airport in Canton Township or some other airport facility to serve Livonia.

A committee has asked for \$5,000 from Livonia funds, which would be used for an engineering study of nearby airports. The city's \$5,000 would be matched by \$5,000 from state sources and \$20,000 from the Federal Aviation Administration.

A member of the committee said the study primarily would investigate possibilities of buying Mettetal, a privately owned airport which city sources say is for sale.

The council referred the matter to a committee-of-the-whole after councilmen questioned what the study would buy.

Councilmen Jerry Brown and Bob Bennett asked for more information about the airport proposal.

"I think prior to spending

\$30,000 we should have a more comprehensive report from our airport committee," Brown said.

"I'm told...airports make money, but I've yet to find one in that category," he added.

Brown said he had talked to the manager of the Detroit City Airport, which has lost about \$125,000 in the past three years.

In the future, Livonia might need an airport, Brown commented, "but right now it doesn't appear that way."

Brown said the city should ask local businessmen if an airport is needed for their enterprises.

"I've yet to hear a half dozen businessmen say 'Boy, I really need an airport.'"

Bennett called the request for funds for the study "premature." He said there has been no study of the need for an airport.

Bennett added that he is not opposed to the idea and "not saying it won't ever be needed."

PLYMOUTH The Plymouth Council of Community Concerns will sponsor a training program beginning July 18 for potential volunteer workers at Buzz Line, crisis counseling and drop-in center.

Training sessions for volunteers aged 16 and older will be conducted two evenings a week through August.

Two weekend seminars also are planned. One will concentrate on selected aspects of inter-personal behavior and the other will give basic instruction in first aid and drug help techniques.

## Canton Fire Dept. Runs Increase 40% In 1973

CANTON Fire department runs in Canton Township have increased about 40 per cent for the first six months of this year when compared with last year.

According to Canton fire chief Mel Paulun, his men answered 141 more calls the first six months of 1973 than they did during a similar period last year.

Paulun has been chief since 1965 but his records go back to 1962 when the department answered 23 fire and rescue calls.

So far this year, his department has gone on 294 rescue runs and 212 fire runs; for the same period last year the figures were 182 rescue runs and 173 fire runs.

"We are getting more calls all the time," Paulun said. "June was our biggest month ever and we had 117 runs."

Paulun said he is very anxious to expand his nine-man full time department by adding more full time men. The department is augmented by 17 volunteers and more of those are needed, particularly on the day shift.

He noted that it used to be much easier to get volunteers for the day time hour but that the Canton population had changed. There are fewer farmers and more professional men in the area now since the new home boom began in the mid-sixties.

Over half the departments

business is rescue runs; both the townships rescue units operate out of the station at Cherry Hill and Canton Center roads.

Paulun hopes the township will soon move on plans to build a second fire hall at Warren and Haggerty roads. The township owns three acres of land there.

The department will put a new \$74,500 truck in operation sometime next year - a American LaFrance aerial ladder truck.

"Our increases in fire and rescue runs are a direct result of a huge increase in population," Paulun said. "The population has doubled out here in the last two or three years."

# New Postal Service Is Called Not Good, Not Bad, But 'Fair'

Testifying during a congressional hearing on postal service, two Observerland officials gave a "fair" rating to the operation which used to brag that "neither rain, nor snow, nor black of night" delayed the mails.

Weather conditions still don't delay the mail, but Westland Mayor Eugene McKinney and Canton Township Supervisor Philip Dingeldey noted that lack of post offices in their areas and a rule prohibiting door-to-door delivery for lots over 50 feet do delay it.

Both officials testified Friday at a hearing conducted before the congressional subcommittee on postal service in the City County Building, U.S. Rep. James Haneley (D-New York), chairman of the subcommittee, conducted the hearing with U.S. Rep. William D. Ford (D-Taylor), a committee member.

Haneley said the hearing was "not to criticize the postal service, but to point out areas of weakness which should be improved."

He asked McKinney and Dingeldey to rate postal service as they think their residents perceive it. Both responded "fair."

"I would say in Westland

it's fair to poor," McKinney said. "I don't want to say it's poor," Dingeldey said. "I guess I would say it's fair."

In addressing the committee, McKinney traced the city's attempts to get a post office to serve its 100,000 residents.

"Westland's efforts to obtain its own post office date back to 1967, one year after city incorporation," he said. "Since that date there has been a continuous stream of 'yes,' 'no' and 'maybe' coming from Washington in spite of Congressman William Ford, who has led our battles diligently."

He said a site was obtained for the post office but construction has been delayed.

"As suburbs crowd into one another out from the central city, as one city fades into another, individual community identity becomes of major importance," McKinney said. "Unless citizens have a 'hometown' feeling about their city, community improvement projects of every nature become difficult to implement."

"Thus, the impact of a postal facility not only relates to improved services, but to the concept of individuality of communities and bringing government closer to home, impacts that are in-

creasingly more important in an age where many citizens are beginning to wonder if government is listening or indeed cares."

McKinney noted that Westland is the fourth largest city in Wayne County. Currently the Wayne post office serves the 100,000 residents. Neighboring cities of Garden City, Wayne, Inkster, Romulus, Taylor and Dearborn Heights have their own facilities despite the fact that they have smaller population than Westland, he said.

"It should go without saying that local postal facilities should be based on need and should not be gifts from on high."

He said that most of the frustration related to getting a post office is finding a person who is in a decision-making position in the postal system.

Dingeldey noted that Can-

ton is one of the "fastest growing areas in the state" and anticipates needing its own post office by 1975.

"The fact that the township is now served from four different post offices, Plymouth, Belleville, Wayne and Ypsilanti, is confusing, especially to the new residents," he said.

"The citizens complain of slow delivery and are confused as to the community they live in."

"The fact that there is no delivery to any homes on over 50-foot lots means new homes in new subdivisions, will not receive door to door delivery."

Ford noted that an area

known as New Boston, which is in Huron Township, has its own post office and post master despite the fact that it isn't a city and "doesn't exist as a political entity."

Haneley said this points up one of the "fundamental problems, which is the need to continue with the postal facility building program."

John Canfield, mayor of Dearborn Heights, and Robert Marbel, supervisor of Sumpter Township, also complained about slow and dependable postal service.

Canfield said he sends important pieces of mail by personal courier rather than risk their loss or late delivery.

## Timber Jim's Quite A Carver - He Whittles While He Works

"Timber Jim" -- that's what they call him at work, at his new booth at Livonia Mall. And he's big enough to be a lumberjack.

Timber Jim is a heavy-set, crew-cut, 43-year old man who likes to whittle wood.

He likes to whittle so well that he's become a "carver," and he likes to do that so well that he quit his job so he could do it full-time and hopes to make a living.

Timber Jim is James R. Gray, and he hails from Harrison Township. There he has indulged his fascination for wood; his garage gave way to a studio-showroom and plaster has given way to wood paneling. His boathouse studio, still barely afloat, is stocked with more than 100 chisels and rasps and other tools more neatly arranged than in a hardware store display. He is a self-taught whittler -- which lends a primitive quality to his carvings.

Jim is both proud and ashamed of being self taught -- proud that he has become advanced enough in skill to accomplish much of what he wants, yet ashamed and fearful that a viewer might find fault with what he has done.

He explains that his love for art has been with him since he was a

child -- and that his father was an artist of sorts, taking up oil painting because of an interest in commercial art.

Jim absorbed the interest and some knowledge of art from his father, and has developed his skill upon this foundation. Much of his work is similar to German "bas relief" wood carvings, while other pieces are made to stand alone.

Timber Jim often uses color stains on what he has carved, especially human figures -- to achieve the right color tone, yet emphasize the grain of the wood. He has carried this ability through to the Urethane reproductions of his original works of art, which enables him to sell them inexpensively enough to meet any pocket.

He said he got his start whittling about the same time he got his start as a truck driver about 15 years ago. He noticed another truck driver scraping at a block of wood with a knife and decided to try his hand.

"It took about three years before I felt I had anything recognizable," he said. "When I did, I really became enthusiastic and have never been able to quit."

What does he try to achieve in his carvings?

"Perfection," he said simply.

"I try to bring out the details -- the humor, the sympathy, the pain," he admitted.

He works by drawing a sketch (on the wood) of what he has in mind. Then he cuts away large slices of excess wood and finally begins the long hours and weeks of "whittling."

He has moved part of his studio now to Livonia Mall and has opened his very first retail kiosk in the hopes that the public will like his carvings and reproductions and will give them as much satisfaction as they do him.

Joe Adamsky, the 37-year-old Ohioan who made patrons at Wolverine Raceway aware of his ability as a driver, came within a half-length of becoming the first reinsman to sweep both features at Northville Downs.

Joe did win two races and finish second in his third start of the evening Saturday... the second place came in the \$4,250 preferred pace where Whirlaway was closing fast on Erlana's Valley but didn't quite make it.

Erlana's Valley, top performer for Livonia auto dealer Bill Brown, overtook Whirlaway as the field turned into the stretch and then had to go all out to win in 2:03.3. It will be recalled that Erlana's Valley was a standout during the winter in the Jackson-at-Northville meeting, winning the \$10,000 finale of the late closing pacing series.

Whirlaway, coming off a 2:02.3 victory a week earlier, couldn't hold off the five-year-old in the drive to the wire.

The story was a bit different in the \$5,000 invitational where Adamsky had Ark Time flying in the final furlong to pass Prince Knox and stave off the late rally of Dave Butler to win by a long neck in 2:02.

It was Ark Time's second win in 11 starts this year after finishing fourth behind Easy Irv, H.T. Luca and Erlana's Valley a week before.

Prince Knox, owned by the late Anthony Alfa of Wyandotte, appeared headed for a victory when it duelled with

Ark Time for almost half of the mile.

Prince Knox actually was ahead by a neck on the final turn but swerved wide going into the short stretch and then enabled Ark Time to open up a length. Dave Butler was moving fastest of all in the drive but couldn't catch the leader. Ark Time's 2:02 clocking was the fastest of the evening.

Earlier, Adamsky found an opening in the middle of the track to guide Appearances Pride, a five-year-old Ohio owned gelding, to a 2:05.2 triumph in a handicap pace.

Appearances Pride was overlooked by the bettors and went off at better than 8-1 odds to pay \$18.80, \$10.40 and \$6.40 across the board.

Wally McMurray, the veteran pilot from Novi, had two starts Saturday and entered the winner's circle with both as heavy favorites.

Green Pasture, a three-year-old Amortizer colt owned by David James, of Windsor, was an easy victor in the third race with a 2:06.4 time. The colt went postward as the 3-2 favorite.

Then Wally had Lady Linette, a four-year-old mare owned by Cy Sartori and Robert Zoritz of Windsor, in the sixth race and won as he pleased in 2:05. The Lady was the even money choice and rewarded her backers with \$4.60.

With only two weekends remaining in the 36-night summer meeting, Racing Secretary Harry Peterson is hoping Driver Bea Farber has her pacers back in top shape

for the weekly featured Saturday events.

Bea had to scratch Emerald Scar Saturday and couldn't enter Easy Irv, the fastest horse at the track, in the invitational. Both horses came down with a virus and may not be back for the remainder of the meeting which ends on July 30.

**BIG MOMENT** came for Livonian Jack Richards and his wife Mary, last Friday when 14-year-old Livonia Boy won his second start of the year.

Jack has been holding the aged pacer out of competition until the summer weather was really hot.

The conditions weren't quite right when Livonia Boy faced the starter a week earlier. But everything was perfect Friday and the oldtimer had his tail switching and his ears cocked up when it took the lead midway through the backstretch and went on to win by three lengths in 2:07.

At the ripe old age of 14 Livonia Boy is nearing the end of his racing career since standardbreds are barred from racing when they become 15. That's why the Richards were so proud... the only horse they owned that won more than \$100,000 is still capable of beating those in his class in his final season.

**WITH THE DETROIT** Race Course announcing plans to have a post time of 2:10 p.m. daily and 1 p.m. on Saturdays, Hazel Park Raceway will have a nightly post of 8 p.m.

Announcement of the half-hour earlier starting time was made by General Manager Harold Duris.

A field of 12 is expected for the Stakes and track management is looking forward to the largest attendance of the meeting.

# Old Front Porch Converted To Sunroom

If you think of the old front porch with fondness, chances are your present home doesn't have one. If it does, you also know that open porches collect dust and debris, and are unusable most of the year.

However, there is a way to

have the charm of a porch with none of its problems. Enclose the area with windows and create a modern sunroom. You'll gain a substantial amount of living space, and be able to enjoy the outdoors in all kinds of weather.

Enclosing a porch is a pop-

ular home improvement. Certain essentials - a roof, floor, supports, and one wall - already exist. Additional walls, windows, heat and insulation will be needed.

Here are some remodeling hints: Porches generally have a

pitched floor for rain runoff, and open areas underneath. In remodeling, you may need to install new joists over the old floor, shimmed where necessary to make the new floor level. Install insulation before putting in the new floor. Sidewalls and ceiling need

insulation. Install at least R-19 insulation in the ceiling and R-11 in the walls to reduce heat loss.

Expansive views, sunshine and fresh air, and an outdoor "feeling" are what made porches popular. You can preserve these qualities by creating "walls" of windows that have large glass areas, good ventilation and welded insulating glass for year-round comfort.

If pipe and duct locations and furnace capacity permit, you may be able to extend your present heating system to the remodeled porch.

If not, there are several other possibilities: portable or permanent electric baseboard heating, gas or electric space heaters, a heat pump that cools in summer and heats in winter.

Or - for a suitably nostalgic touch - a woodburning fireplace.

# Mid-Summer Lawns, Respond To Simple Care

The lawn, which gave such pleasure when it first greened-up in spring, may not be such a joy in mid-summer.

It may have developed an anemic color or scruffy looking patches of brown grass, rough weedy areas, or just plain worn out spots - and the maintenance seems to go on and on endlessly.

Really, though, summer lawn care is relatively simple. Eliminate the procedures that involve lots of work but deliver few benefits. Use methods that keep

the turf healthy and good looking with a minimum of effort.

First of all it pays to remember that the lawn is not really a carpet, but is composed of a great many individual grass plants packed tightly together. Each plant has roots that extend down into the soil to absorb water and nutrients, and stems and leaves that make food for the plant. We lop off the leaves every week before they have a chance to amount to much.

It has been estimated that the amount of leaves and stems cut off each year can add up to 40 inches. If the

plants had been left alone they would have grown at least a couple of feet tall with spikes of tiny flowers.

Grass is naturally a cool-weather crop. It grows best in cool weather and slows down in hot weather.

Don't mow the grass too short in summer. It can take a little shorter cutting in spring when it is growing quickly, but in mid-summer a blue grass lawn should be cut so it is 2 1/4 to three inches high. It is not how high or low the grass is cut that gives that broadloom carpet effect, but how smooth and even it is.

Excessively close mowing results in a shallow root system and weakened turf that is susceptible to weed invasion. A high cut lawn shades the ground and keeps the grass roots cooler and moister. Also, it keeps crabgrass, which can't endure shade, from getting established.

Keep the mower sharp so it cuts cleanly. A dull mower chews off the grass leaving a brown, ragged edge on each blade of grass so the lawn has a dull color. Don't mow more often than is necessary, but cut often enough so no more than 1/2 the length of the grass blade is removed at a cutting.

It may not be necessary to mow every week. Also, if clippings are short they can be left on the lawn.

The deeper the roots penetrate, the healthier the grass will be, and the better it will be able to withstand heat and drought and also resist diseases and weeds. Roots in rich well-prepared, deeply watered soil can go down eight to 12 inches.

How you water the lawn has a big effect on how deep the roots are. If the lawn is watered so only a shallow layer of soil at the top is moistened, the roots will tend to grow close to the surface. If enough water is put on so it soaks down six or eight inches the roots will grow down that far.

How much water is enough varies with the kind of soil. Clay soil absorbs water slowly. It can't take it in fast but

it can eventually hold a lot of water. On the other hand, in sandy soil water soaks in quickly but drains right through. It isn't held in the soil.

If you have clay soil, water slowly and for a long time - until the lawn feels soggy. Then don't water again for a week or two. If you are lucky there will be a good rain by then.

Sandy soil is a different problem. You can put the water on faster, but it won't take as much. If you have sandy soil you will have to water more lightly but more often than the experts generally recommend.

Incidentally, sprinkler systems are a good investment. In the long run you use less water with a well designed sprinkler system, especially if it is an automatic one.

Also, it does no harm to water at night - if that is the most convenient time for you to do it.

If by any chance you are on vacation or there are water restrictions and your lawn doesn't get watered at all during a dry spell in summer, it will become dormant.

It will look dry and brown, but if it is good healthy turf with deep roots, it will green up and start growing again when cool weather comes and it gets watered or rained on.

It is better not to feed the grass in mid-summer. If it absolutely has to be done, use a natural organic fertilizer, and not a synthetic chemical fertilizer.

Also, although weed-killers are most effective in warm weather when weeds are actively growing, these chemicals are most apt to damage lawns then.

If you have a new lawn, it is better to ignore the weeds and just cut them down each week with the mower. Many weeds are annuals and they will not be around next year at all if you keep them from going to seed. If you pull them out you will remove good grass plants along with the weeds.

If you use chemicals you will injure the tender young grass. So just mow them down.

In established lawns, unless there is a real invasion, it is better to cut out the weeds. A notched tool designed for cutting asparagus works well for getting at dandelions, plantain and others with fleshy tap roots.

If you feel you really must use a weed killer put it just on the weeds. Don't make a blanket coverage of the entire lawn and be sure to keep it far away from areas

where trees, shrubs or flowers are growing.

Melting out, fading out, and rust are the main diseases apt to occur on bluegrass lawns during the warm weather in July and August.

The melting out and fading out can be controlled with Acti-dione-theram, Captan,

or Dyrene. Zineb or Acti-dione-theram will control rust, but water and feeding to keep the grass actively growing is the best control for rust.

When any disease situation occurs remove grass clippings from the lawn. Good sanitation is essential in disease control.

## Could Be A Lot Worse

## Average Consumption Is 60 Gallons A Day

Did you know that you use an average of 60 gallons water a day?

Sounds like a lot, but it's true, according to the nation's water utilities recently surveyed by a maker of water works products.

The average shower takes up to 25 gallons. A nice warm relaxing bath takes about 35 gallons.

It takes 12 gallons for a load of dishes, and about 50 gallons or more for washing a load of clothes.

Each toilet flush takes six gallons, and Dad's morning shave can consume 15 gallons or more.

Then there is lawn-sprinkling, car-washing, backyard swimming pools, cooking, washing, and so forth.

Actually the nation's water utilities figure that each person in a community requires not 60, but 150 gallons of water per day per person.

However, that figure takes into account all the needs of industry and business in your town or city.

An average community of 20,000 today requires a water supply capacity of six million gallons of water a day.

It's hard to envision a

quantity that large, so just picture six million gallon-sized bottles lined along a road. They would stretch for some 560 miles in single file.

Public water, of course, is transported through water mains. A single main, 18 inches in diameter, with water flowing through it at the rate of five feet per second, will transport some 5.6 million gallons a day.

It's obvious that the nation's water utilities have to be concerned about quantity as well as quality in making certain we have the water we need.

# Regional Teacher Strike Plan Is Ill-Timed, Ill-Conceived

Publication over the weekend of a secret battle plan calling for area-wide teacher strikes in Wayne and Oakland County suburban districts has raised the hackles of local school officials, teachers, and especially homeowners.

The plan submitted to the Michigan Education Association called for a \$64,900 publicity budget "to create an atmosphere of grave urgency," staff efforts to whip up enthusiasm among teachers, regional teacher strikes beginning October 1 if favorable contract settlements have not been reached, and a legislative drive giving teachers the legal right to strike.

Main targets for the drive are two loosely connected groups of school boards mainly in suburban districts, the Council of 28 in Oakland County and the Task Force of 36 in Wayne.

Subsequent to published reports of the planned areawide strike plan, MEA President Keith Geiger, who lives in Livonia, stated that every responsible decision making body in the MEA had rejected the regional strike part of the overall MEA battle plan.

"The news stories containing reference to areawide strikes are simply inaccurate," Geiger said.

Evidently, the MEA plan came in reaction to past failure to achieve its objectives at the bargaining table and the consequent irritation of its members who pay more than \$7 million in dues annually.

The immediate sore spot is the existence of the school board groups, which have supposedly set overall guidelines for settlements for negotiations this year, including a 5 per cent limit on salary increases and no limitations on class size.

IN EXAMINING this ill-con-

ceived, ill-timed battle plan, a number of things seem clear:

1) Area-wide teacher strikes are, quite simply, nearly impossible to pull off.

If teachers in Livonia figure the deal they can get at the bargaining table with the Livonia board is adequate, they just are not going to lose a big chunk of income to help out their colleagues who are still negotiating at Redford Union.

2) Rigid county-wide guidelines for boards of education are equally implausible. Local millage support varies; school calendars are different from one district to another; local class load requirements differ.

If the Southfield school board figures they have a settlement that meets, Southfield's needs, they'll settle on that, regardless of what the Oakland Council of 28 says.

3) How the MEA can scream bloody murder over information-sharing and goal-setting on the part of area school boards when that's just what the teachers have been doing for years is beyond me. The MEA battle plan itself recognizes this problem: "Denounce boards for banding together in secret and unholy coalitions. . . . We must be ready to handle the obvious fact that the MEA locals have done it since 1965."

4) The net effect of planned regional teacher strikes will only be to increase local taxpayer resistance to passing millages, thereby jeopardizing funds available to school boards to meet teacher demands. That's what folks call cutting off your nose to spite your face, and everybody loses when that happens.

5) If the MEA figured a \$64,900 PR budget was enough for the effort, they'd better think again.

The bad press the present battle plan has already produced will cost twice that to overcome.

THE REAL PROBLEM behind all these shenanigans is that schools, teachers, and financing are gradually moving away from local control into a massified state pattern.

State financial support for education has developed as a method of dealing with local taxpayer revolts and the inequities of the property tax. If financing is on a statewide basis, then school boards are going to get together to present their side of the argument, and so, too, will the teacher unions.

One highly placed MEA official says he expects teacher bargaining will be on a county-wide basis in four or five years, and I wouldn't be surprised to see a statewide pay scale for teachers emerge in a decade.

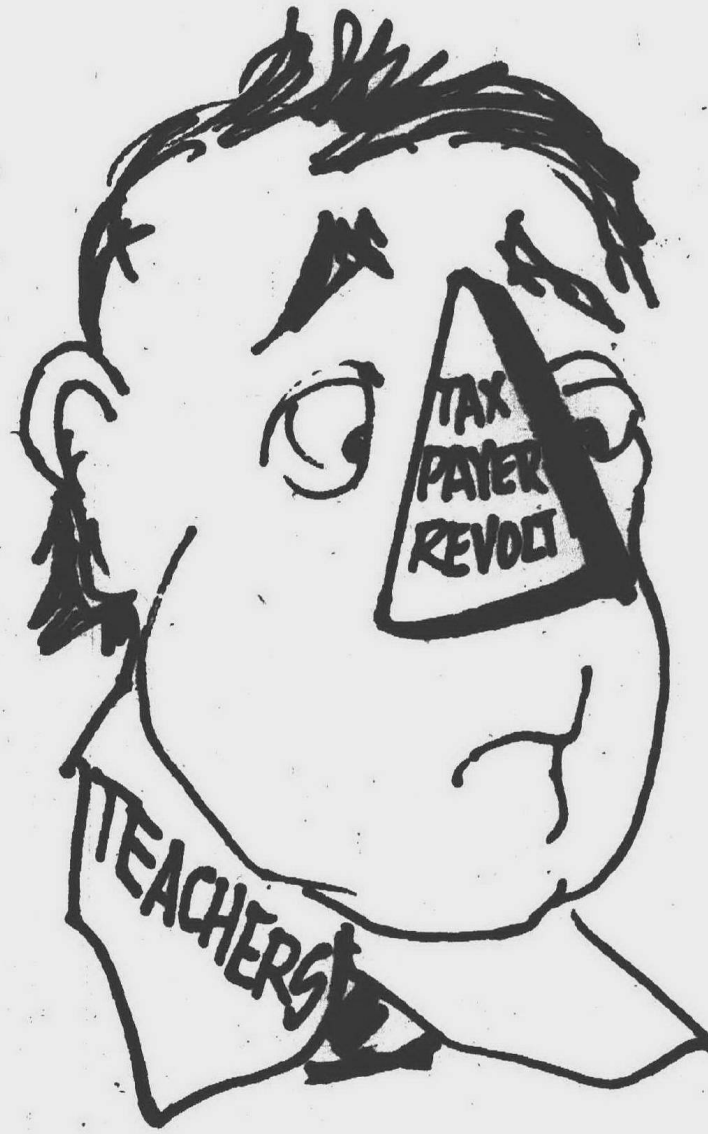
Seeing these developments, the MEA had little choice other than to do some overall planning; hence the battle plan.

I can't get over the feeling, however, that while the MEA and the school board groups and the state legislature all are engaged in elaborate power-bloc politics over the issue of who gets how much for education, the real loser is the guy who owns a home, pays his taxes, and has kids in school. With all the mass politics going on, he's likely to say, "Ah, the hell with it," and then go out and vote against any taxes for education in sight.

And the ultimate losers in that case are the good MEA-member teachers, the concerned school administrators, the involved school board members - and the kids, in whose benefit education was supposed to be before it got mixed up in power politics.

## Suggests SEMCOG As Agency To Watchdog HCMA Spending

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, sometimes accused of being blandly inactive, has a glorious chance to exert some leadership in the park site controversy between the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority and Wayne County.

SEMCOG, after all, is the voluntary association of local governments that's supposed to do the macro-planning of the six-county region. It's also the closest thing we have to a regional government that answers, through the elected officials who serve on it, to the people.

On one hand, Huron-Clinton wants to develop three major Kensington-sized parks on the outer reaches of Washtenaw, Oakland and Macomb counties.

On the other, Wayne County commissioners insist they're getting short-changed in terms of the tax funds they provide HCMA and the funds HCMA spends in Wayne. County Board chief Robert FitzPatrick suggests HCMA pump some money into Belle Isle. He and other county officials have held several meetings with HCMA officials.

I submit that HCMA, a five-county agency, shouldn't be answering to Wayne County on how and where it spends its funds. But if HCMA doesn't

answer to Wayne County, to whom should it report? HCMA's reports are addressed to the governor, but in actual practice no one really watchdogs the agency.

SEMCOG is the logical agency to make HCMA justify its plans for (say) the proposed Mill Creek Park on the western end of Washtenaw County.

An HCMA spokesman, board secretary Robert Bryant, told the SEMCOG executive committee recently that the parks agency's plans conform to SEMCOG's recreational land use plan.

That's not quite true, as this observer found in reading SEMCOG's 1972 revised plan. SEMCOG's new plan, probably given routine rubber stamp approval by the general assembly, proposed an "inner ring" of regional parks, including several on the fringe of Observerland.

SEMCOG needs to set aside some time and listen to a full scale debate between HCMA, its multiple opponents and SEMCOG's own planning staff over several questions:

- Locations - SEMCOG needs to focus explicitly on the question of whether Mill Creek and HCMA's other outlying sites, the "inner ring" or Belle Isle should get top development priority.
- Size - HCMA is saying re-

gional parks should be several thousand acres; the Mill Creek site, for example is 4,900 acres. SEMCOG's existing plan says 500 acres is a minimum size for a regional facility.

- Water - HCMA's policy has been to develop parks along lakes or rivers. Some critics bitterly assail this policy as short-sighted. This needs a thorough discussion.

- Belle Isle - Should HCMA entirely take over Detroit's park in the middle of the river? Should HCMA, as FitzPatrick suggests, relieve the pressure on the Motor City by pumping in funds for some specific programs? Or should Belle Isle remain a Detroit responsibility?

- Taxes - HCMA failed when it asked voters for an additional quarter-mill of the property tax in August of 1972. Should it try again? Would SEMCOG, Wayne and the other member counties be willing to give HCMA all-out support the second time around?

SEMCOG has a tremendous potential power in its ability to recommend or oppose federal and state grants for HCMA projects. It would abdicate that power if it either let HCMA go its merry way or allowed FitzPatrick's troops to bludgeon HCMA into spending money in Detroit.

## Are Service Stations Honest With Customers?

After viewing a bit of hanky-panky last week while filling the gas tank at a Plymouth service station, we came away with the thought that many of the stations are not being entirely honest with customers . . . especially to those who are not regulars.

It may be that we ran into one of those operations which had little respect for the general public and cared only about those who patronized the station.

What happened and apparently has been happening was that customers were informed the station only had the highest priced gasoline. Take it or leave it was the tone of the young man in charge.

We had to take it and then just as we were getting ready to pull away noted the car in back was

getting served out of the much lower priced tank.

We realize that most stations are out to make as much as possible during the shortage but to have one price for one customer and another for the next isn't exactly honest.

We would hope that such isn't the general practice but similar incidents have been reported in Farmington, Southfield and Westland.

In fact it might be wise for the stations in the area to get together and stamp out such practices. Customers have a strange faculty for remembering such incidents and could well avoid such stations and also advise friends and relatives to stay away.

It would appear since gasoline

stations are public service operations the owners should do everything possible to inform the public about the daily schedule of opening and closing.

Ever since word of the crisis became public knowledge, motorists have no idea where they can get gasoline in the evenings and after 7 o'clock, on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays.

We made a round of the seven communities in the Observer circulation area, hoping to get information for readers as to where stations are open on weekends.

Sad to relate we discovered stations closed in every one of the communities, few open on Sunday and didn't locate one telling the public it was open 24 hours.

This is the point where the operators can help themselves and do a great service to the motoring public by gathering the information and making it available to community newspapers, such as the Observers, and to the various police departments.

The Observers have tried to make such information available but have received no cooperation from the operators.

Naturally a car owner can't drive without fuel, but he most certainly shouldn't have to submit to a snarling attendant's caustic remarks.

There always is a day of reckoning and we betide the station that has taken such an attitude. We have learned a few things about consumer boycotts . . . they can be disastrous for the sales outlets, stores, gas stations, butcher shops etc.

We would hope that those guilty will take a bit of advice and become a public service again . . . not a price boosting operation that takes full advantage of a situation over which the consumer has little control.

## High Grass, Weeds Along Road Pose Problem Along Schoolcraft

One wonders which is worse, the dust storms arising from the work on the Schoolcraft freeway or the pollen laden weeds and grass that now grow on several sections.

It seems that earlier in the summer the windblown dust rose in clouds over the highway as crews carried truckload after truckload of dirt to other places.

One could see the dust as high as two and three hundred yards in the air while approaching the area under construction from the east and west.

That was bad enough but now the weeds and grass have been allowed to grow so high in sections in Redford and Livonia that a driver can't see approaching traffic when trying to go from the westbound lane to the eastbound at the crossovers.

All of which means it is time for the contractor or the State

Highway Department, which ever has the responsibility, to start cutting down the weeds.

There is an area in Livonia, from Middle Belt to Farmington Road where the weeds have been cut down and a chemical installed to keep them down.

There is a section between Telegraph and Inkster where the foliage is so high one can't see from one service drive to the other.

There is a crossover near the Observer Newspaper plant where a motorist takes his life in his own hands when attempting to go from the westbound lane to the eastbound.

It's easy enough to turn from the westbound and go over the crossover but then getting on the eastbound lane is a different story. A driver almost has to get into the traffic before he sees whether any cars are approaching.

The area is so dangerous that

we're surprised there haven't been more accidents.

It doesn't appear to be much of a job to clear the foliage from both sides of Schoolcraft instead of a spot here and there.

## Sense And Nonsense

It is ironic that when state officials toured the Wilson barn at Middle Belt and W. Chicago in Livonia for possible placement on a national registry of historical landmarks, they identified it as a "bank barn" because an earth slope leads to an entrance.

Would-be developers, Detroit Federal Savings and Loan, however, have a slightly different version.

Four local legislators have taken issue with what they call an "irresponsible, inaccurate and misleading statement" made by Rep. R. Robert Geake (R-Northville) regarding the school aid bill.

The legislators include Reps. Thomas Brown (D-Westland), William Keith (D-Garden City), John Markes (D-Westland) and John Bennett (D-Redford Township).

Geake had criticized the four for switching their votes and helping pass a Democratic school aid plan. Originally, the four representatives were among 10 suburban lawmakers who didn't support the plan but changed their votes after a Democratic caucus produced changes in the bill. It passed on a party line vote, with Democrats for and Republicans against it.

The school aid bill was sent to a conference committee because of major differences between the House and Senate versions. It is not expected to be reported out of the committee until fall.

Geake had criticized the bill as being \$79 million over

the Senate version, adding that the Democrats attempted to balance the budget by striking \$53 million in retirement money.

The four Democrats said that "according to House Appropriation Committee figures, the total cost of the House version of Senate Bill 110 is actually \$1.3 million less than was passed by the Senate."

"In view of the fact that the House was able to make reductions in other areas so as not to exceed the total Senate cost of the package, we consider the allegation (by Geake) misleading and inaccurate."

Markes criticized Geake's statement which "suggests that we have given the school district of the City of Detroit an unduly large sum of money which it did not deserve."

"That is, in fact, not the case. As the House passed Senate Bill 110, it provided that low millage districts—that is, districts with less than 22 mills for school operations—would be able to compute debt retirement and capital outlay in the comput-

ation of the district's millage rate for purposes of state reimbursement.

"If Rep. Geake had taken the time to compute Detroit's present millage rate-based on legislatively imposed millage, plus a local school district income tax—he would realize that Detroit's actual millage rate is 24.76 mills and that this provision of the school aid act does not even apply to Detroit."

Bennett noted that Redford Union will receive an additional \$210,000 under the House version which will allow the district to reduce property taxes.

Clarenceville will be able to reduce its millage by nearly a mill because of an additional \$69,000 it will re-

ceive under this version, Keith added.

Brown said that Livonia will receive the same amount under both the House and Senate plans and that Westland will receive \$635,100 which will allow it to reduce millage by 1.65 mills.

The four stated in a press release that the House version "at least takes into account the problem which many suburban, as well as rural districts, face in terms of high or low operating millages."

"It is our hope that in the future we will be able to provide further relief for those districts."

"We in no way can accept Rep. Geake's statement that we have 'sold out' our school districts."


### Beach Stench Reduced

### WSU To Have 40th Birthday

**EDITOR:**

For many years Wayne University gave special attention to adult students. I am planning to write the story of the non-matriculated student at Wayne University, from the early 1930s to the late 1950s. It would be very helpful for me to correspond with some of the old "non-matrics" about their recollections of Wayne University during those times.

I would also like to remind your readers that on Aug. 8 of this year we should recognize the 40th anniversary of the creation of our municipal university, in an act of personal bravery as well as of civic good judgment.

On that date in 1933, the Detroit Board of Education passed a resolution establishing a university to be known as "The Colleges of the City of Detroit" — the name Wayne University came a year later.

It was a brave act for the members of the board to take as it was for Supt. Frank Cody to recommend: With sharply declining revenues, the board could well have left the several municipal colleges to operate on fee-income alone — literally to sink or swim. It was fortunate for our community that they took this step, as their action assured many citizens the opportunity to invest part of their under-employed hours gaining additional higher education.

All appropriate materials collected in my research will ultimately be deposited in the Archives of Wayne State University, as a sincere and I hope useful gift in remembrance of the 40th birthday of our university.

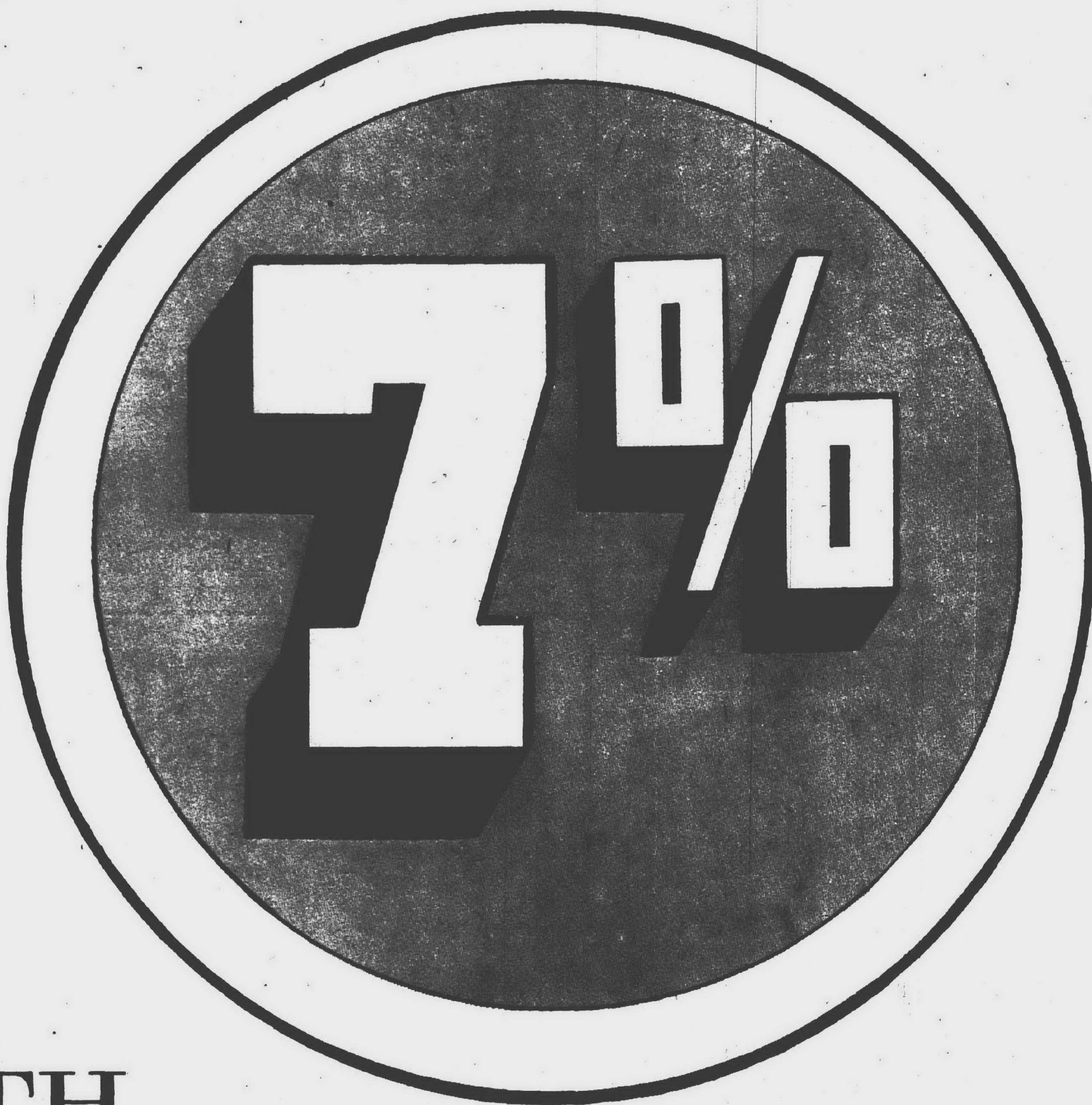

# Plymouth Is Last Friend Of Meters

When Carlton Cole Magee invented the parking meter and had it installed in Oklahoma City in 1935 as a means of collecting a "painless tax" in the dark days of the depression, he had no idea he had developed one of the most controversial mechanical devices that has come along in years.

Designed as a means of helping cities and all other communities raise the money so scarce in those days, it has become both a "pet" and a nuisance to government officials through the years.

One of the first to balk at the installation of meters along the curb to control what had become a parking problem was the late Edward J. Jeffries Jr., then mayor of Detroit.

"Our streets belong to the people," he stated, "so why should they be made to pay to use them?"

And so long as he was in office there were no parking meters lining the curb.

It is a significant fact that all cities and townships in Observerland have followed the Jeffries argument with one lone exception — the city of Plymouth, — where they

have been a bonanza to government but a headache to the merchants.

The city of Plymouth has 428 parking meters in operation. Of this number 222 are street meters and 206 are installed in parking lots.

During the past year the revenue has amounted to \$22,972.49 with \$15,164.82 coming from the street meters.

This bonanza has become an integral part of the city budget — but a source of strong opposition from the merchants.

Listen to the shop keepers along Main Street and they tell you that the "monsters" are driving shoppers away from the downtown area and straight to the outlying shopping centers.

Meanwhile, the City Fathers go merrily on defending the plan that puts meters on downtown streets and in two parking lots.

Much the same condition existed in Farmington and Redford Township until 10 years ago when they were declared a nuisance and removed.

"We got rid of them in 1963," Robert Deadman, Farmington city manager, explained, "for two reasons. First, we wanted to help our merchants in the downtown

areas to increase their business in face of the growing suburban challenge. And, secondly, we found them to be a nuisance.

"With the necessity of maintenance and the added manpower to read them and collect the money," he continued, "it wasn't worth while."

Strangely, while Farmington was getting rid of the meters, and stressing private parking, Redford Township was doing the same.

"We took them out in 1963," said Cpl. John Brodie of the Redford Traffic Division, "and we never had a demand for their return."

"When it comes to parking on the streets," he said, "we follow the state law and do not permit parking on the streets for more than 48 hours — unless otherwise posted."

The city of Southfield has

eliminated the need for street parking meters by use of a stringent code under the commercial and professional areas must furnish the parking conveniences.

"And our streets have been constructed in a way that we have no place to put them," City Clerk Patrick Flannery commented.

Mayor Eugene McKinney of Westland is quite frank in his attitude toward the parking meter.

"We don't have any now," he said, "and we don't have a municipal parking lot. I see no reason for getting involved with them. All of our parking is private and it has proven satisfactory."

The city of Livonia has shied away from street meters and is using a special assessment formula to handle the only pressing problem — on Plymouth Road.

"Most of our parking is private," City Attorney Harry Tatigian explained. "Our major shopping centers and super-markets provide their own."

"Our one problem was on Plymouth Road between Merriman and Farmington Roads and that is being handled by a special assessment of the business and professional men."

In Garden City there never has been a thought given to the installation of parking meters. The greatest concern there is finding places to park.

"We never got to the point where we could get accustomed to metering street parking," William Opper, the city clerk, said.

Asked how the city made up the budget without the potential funds of metering, he stated, "We make up our tax money from various sources,

but never a thought about parking."

"What parking we have is free parking on private lots — and at the moment there is no demand for a change."

The newest city in Observerland — Farmington Hills — also is without street metered parking.

"We don't permit parking on Grand River," said acting city manager Floyd Cairns.

Like many of her communities, Farmington Hills offers plenty of free parking at the major shopping centers spread through the area.

"There really is no need for meters on our streets," Cairns concluded, "and I don't know if we ever will have a demand for them."

So, Mr. Magee, you might have had a great idea back in the depression days, but in Observerland your parking meters are on the unwanted list.

# Ever Try Picking Dinner In The Woods?

By JAN WILLIAMS

I have always wondered what the green, leafy stuff in won-ton soup was. It bears a striking resemblance to the water leaf, a wild plant which grows in abundance in Plymouth Township's Miller Woods.

And sure enough, Dr. Florence Wagner says it can be made into soup. The true test, of course, is to taste it — a feat I haven't accomplished yet.

One who has is Dr. Wagner, wife of University of Michigan botanist Warren H. Wagner. As a botanist and a U-M research associate, she loves the study of plants.

She also loves cooking and has managed a successful combination of the two — she cooks what she studies.

"I enjoy going out and collecting food. It supplements the super market menu and there is a tremendous variety."

Dr. Wagner says he has taken several field trips to Miller Woods to collect edible plants such as spring beauty, trout lily, spring cress, violets and nettles.

Wild leeks can be used like onion, water leaf can be made into soup or soufflé and wild ginger can be candied.

Dr. Wagner stresses that plants shouldn't be collected unless they are extremely abundant.

"And you have to be careful. Many plants, such as the bloodroot, are poisonous."

She admits she doesn't prepare these wild plant dishes at home too often.

"It takes much more time than ordinary food preparation. First you have to collect them and some have to be cooked in several different waters. It's very time consuming."

But when she has the time, she does enjoy it. One of her

menus consisted of creme of nettle soup, spring cress cheese sandwiches, water leaf casserole, winter cress casserole, wild ginger truffle for dessert and sassafras tea.

**Some of these plants are very high in vitamin content," she said. For instance, dandelion greens are higher in vitamin A than carrots, strawberry leaves are higher in vitamin C than any cultivated plants and nettles have more protein than any leafy vegetables, specifically seven grams per 3 1/2 oz.**

Dr. Wagner says her family, which includes her husband and two children, is very critical about the plant food.

"Some they like and some they don't. They evaluate it as they would any new vegetable."

Dr. Wagner says everyone

should sample plant food, even though some is lacking in flavor.

Dr. Wagner also teaches courses in edible wild plants at the University Center for Adult Education and gives lectures in universities throughout the state in wild plant food preparation.

Maybe I'll have to attend one to find out the secret of won-ton and the water leaf.

## Women on the Go

### 'Pride In Schools' Board Member's Goal

"You can do a little bit and it takes a long time—but if you keep working you see a little progress, and that's better than none."

That's how the most recent feminine addition to the Farmington Board of Education views her job—and the jobs of all interested in good education.

Mrs. Emma Makinen traveled the Parent-Teacher Association route to win one of the most decisive victories in the recent history of Farmington school voting.

And the former PTA council president credits her successful bid for one of two school board posts to a broadly-based interest in the schools—"and the help of a lot of people."

Although, pretty much an unknown in the race, she feels she hit home with voters with a list of objectives for schools she distributed just before the June voting.

These aims included pushing the community school concept so that school buildings can serve the whole community, expanding vocational education, providing boys and girls with an equally wide range of career training options, defining responsibilities of the board of education and the school superintendent and improving communication between board and community.

"After that," she said, "I had calls from many people—people who were working for other candidates in the race and said they were going to support me too."

"I felt sure they were convinced I will represent the whole district to the best of my ability."

Emma Makinen, mother of four, moved from Redford Township to Farmington with her family in 1945 and

immediately found herself in the middle of PTA activities at the Woodale elementary school.

She became the school's representative to the PTA council and then president for two years.

"I began attending school board meetings regularly," she said, "but when it was first suggested that I run I didn't think I could do it."

"Then I came to feel that someone should make the race, and the more I talked to others involved the more I felt that maybe I could. But it took a lot of soul-searching."

Her main aim, as a board of education member, is to see more "feeling of pride" in Farmington schools.

"There are students and

parents and teachers in every one of our schools who feel deep concern for them and deep pride for the things they have going there," she said.

One way to help the feeling spread, she said, is to make the schools more useful to the whole community.

"When the schools are used year-round and by parents groups—for sports, craft activities, discussion groups—then the parents start knowing the schools and enjoying them."

"And the kids start enjoying school more when it's a family thing."

Mrs. Makinen also is interested in seeing some changes in the parts of education that helps young people think early about careers.

"We have to consider more carefully the fact that about a third of the Farmington students never start college and about half of those who do start go only a year or less," she said.

"That means two thirds of our young people need good career education in high school."

Community women will have an opportunity to learn more about occupations and job-hunting techniques in two workshops at Schoolcraft College this summer.

They are being sponsored by the college's Women's Continuum Office, and will consist of six-week discussion group sessions led by Mrs. Nancy Dufour.

They are entitled "Let's Take Another Look at Occupations" and "Job Hunting Techniques."

Persons wishing to register should call the Women's Continuum Office. There will be no charge.

The series "Let's Take Another Look at Occupations" will be held Wednesday mornings from 9:30 to 11:30, July 25-Aug. 29, in Room L181 of the Bradner Library on campus, 18000 Haggerty, Livonia. Membership will be limited to 15.

The series will give women an opportunity to review 30

or more occupations in the health fields, the professions, human relations, business, sales, technical areas and government.

Emphasis will be placed on the tasks involved in doing the work, the kind of skills and abilities necessary to go into the field, the training required, the outlook for women in the area and earnings and working conditions.

Participants will be invited to discuss their own experiences in the work world and their knowledge of the experiences of others in specific fields. They may be asked to interview someone employed in a specific occupational field and share their findings with the group.

Occupational materials will be provided.

The workshop series, "Job Hunting Techniques" will be held on Tuesday mornings from 9:30 to 11:30, July 24-Aug. 23, in the same location. The number of participants in this session will be limited to 12.

This series will give women who are ready to look for work an opportunity to participate in exercises designed to better prepare them for this step.

Participants will outline their goals in seeking employment, complete resumes and practice interviewing. They will be asked to apply for a couple of positions and report back to the group on their experiences.

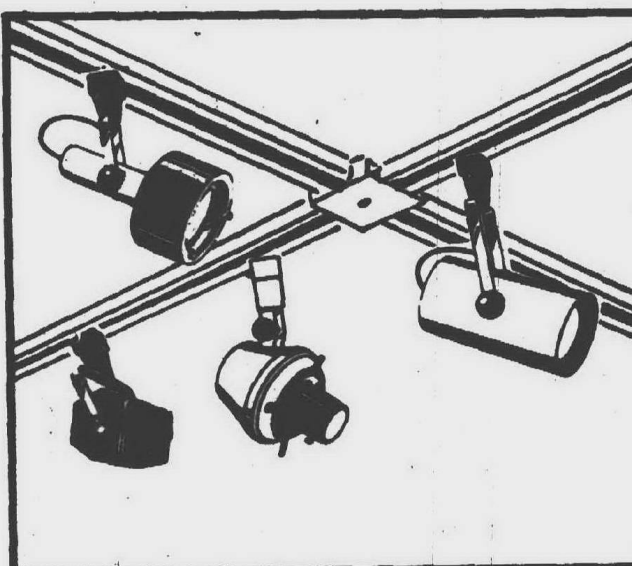

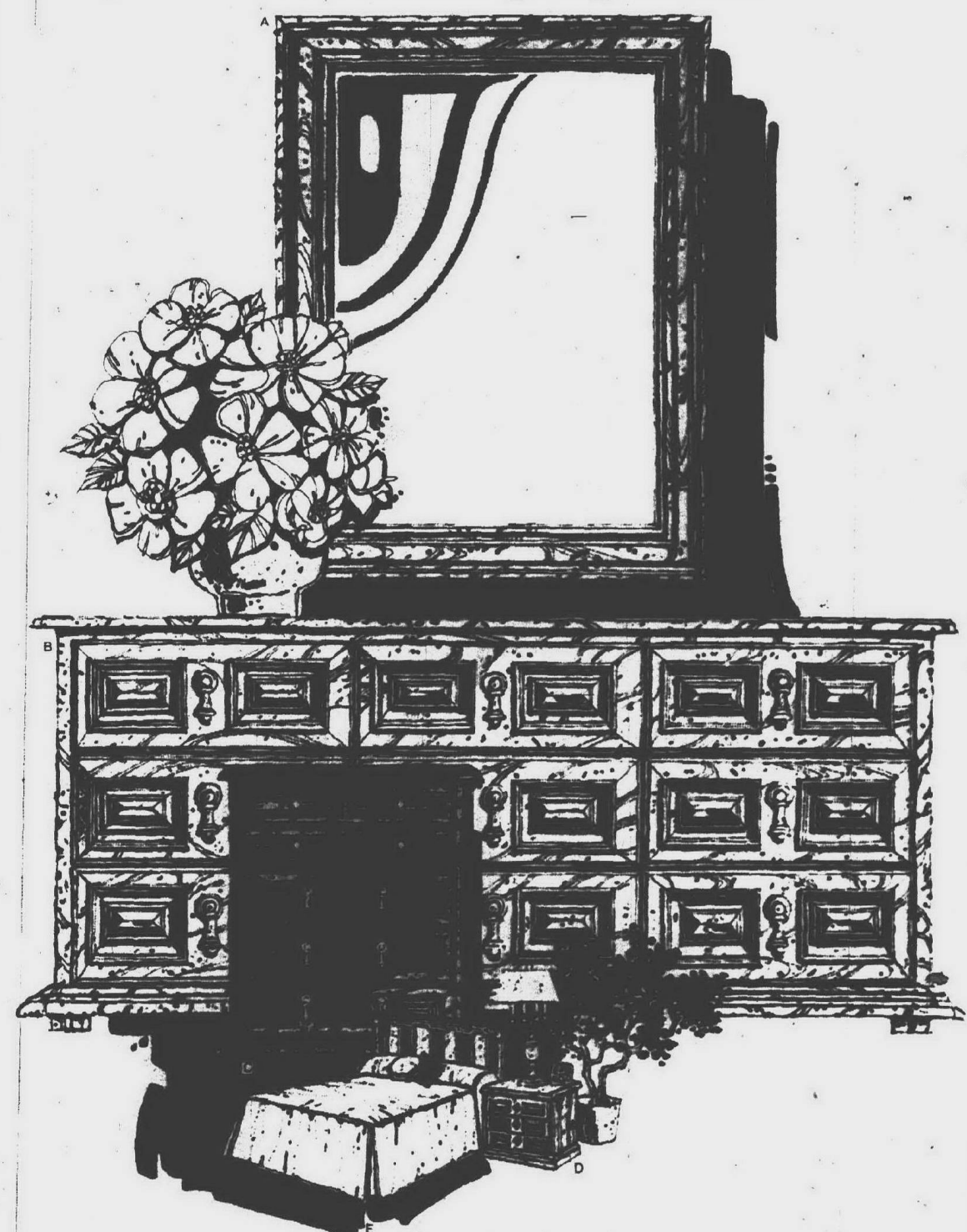

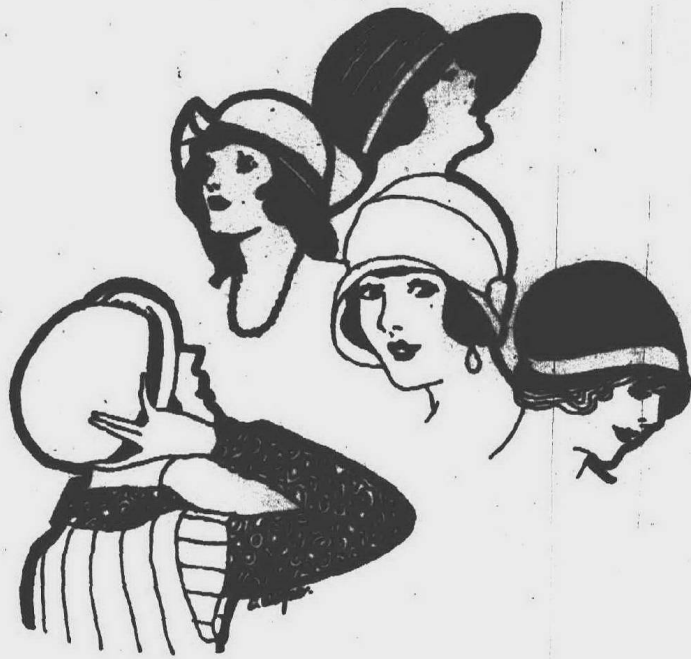
Bobby Nicols, says it's a very traditional look that turns him on and adds, "The less you show, the more to be desired."

1 sliced lemon  
1 c. sliced carrots  
6-8 small, whole partially boiled potatoes (boil for about 10 minutes)  
2 small (8 oz.) cans tomato sauce  
2 T. brown sugar  
Salt and pepper to taste  
1/2 c. sliced (or whole) fresh mushrooms  
1/2 t. poultry seasoning  
4 T. bacon drippings  
Salt and pepper chicken.  
Brown chicken in bacon drippings - until golden.  
Place in shallow baking dish with remaining ingredients - bake in 350 degree oven for one hour and 30 minutes, or until tender. Add water or additional tomato juice if necessary.

### BUSY DAY BEEF

2 1/2 lbs. to 3 lbs. choice stewing beef (good quality, cut into pieces)  
1 can cream of mushroom soup - undiluted

1 pkg. onion soup mix (dry)  
2/3 c. sherry wine

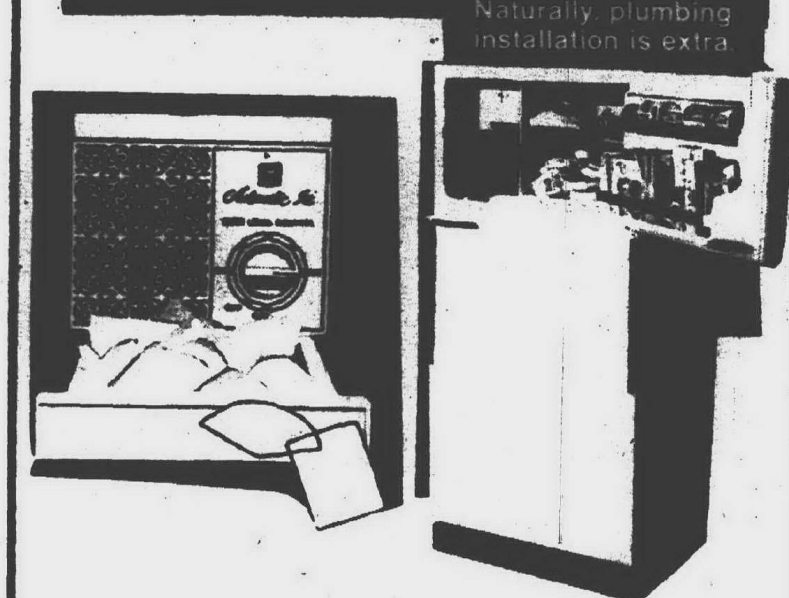
Place beef in a casserole, cover with mushroom soup, onion soup and sherry. Cover with Reynolds wrap, do not seal. Bake in a 350 degree oven (three hours). Serves 6.

# State Grant To Schoolcraft OK'd

The final version of the community college appropriations bill cleared the State Legislature last week without changes to Schoolcraft College's anticipated \$2.8 million state income.

A special \$100,000 grant remained intact in the final version of the appropriation bill. College officials had been fearful of losing the grant which has been used to support the women's continuum, senior adult affairs program and extension campus in Garden City.

These programs will continue because of the special grant but their future will be debated again next year.

The state appropriation figure could change in the course of the school year because it is based on Schoolcraft's anticipated enrollment.

The appropriation is based on the number of students enrolled and number of credit hours taken. If Schoolcraft experiences a drop in either,

its income from the state will be reduced. The largest portion of the college's expenditures is for salaries, a total of \$5.95 million or 85 per cent of the budget. Another nine per cent is for fixed costs such as rent, utilities and insurance.

The final college appropriations bill was supported by local senators and representatives. Voting for it were Sens. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth), David Plawewski (D-Deerborn Heights), William Faust (D-Westland) and Daniel Cooper (D-Oak Park).

Also voting for it were Reps. William Keith (D-Garden City), John Markes (D-Westland), R. Robert Geake (R-Northville), Raymond Smit (R-Ann Arbor), John Bennett (D-Redford Township), Raymond Baker (R-Farmington), Thomas Brown (D-Westland and Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park).

## Esch Asks Overseas Cutback

U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor) plans to introduce an amendment which would require the Defense Department to cut back forces by 200,000 with at least 100,000 from overseas next year.

"I very strongly feel that from both an economic and political point of view this cutback in overseas troop commitments makes sense," said Esch.


"The international era of detente and cooperation argues strongly for reduced military confrontation, and passage of my amendment would reaffirm the policy of detente."

With 600,000 troops stationed overseas, Esch estimates that deactivation of one overseas mechanized division and its support troops would result in an annual savings of \$500 million.

"Contrary to some recent statements, I do not feel that a reduction here (Western Europe) will endanger our alliance credibility or deterrent strength."

## Tocco Wins Piano Contest

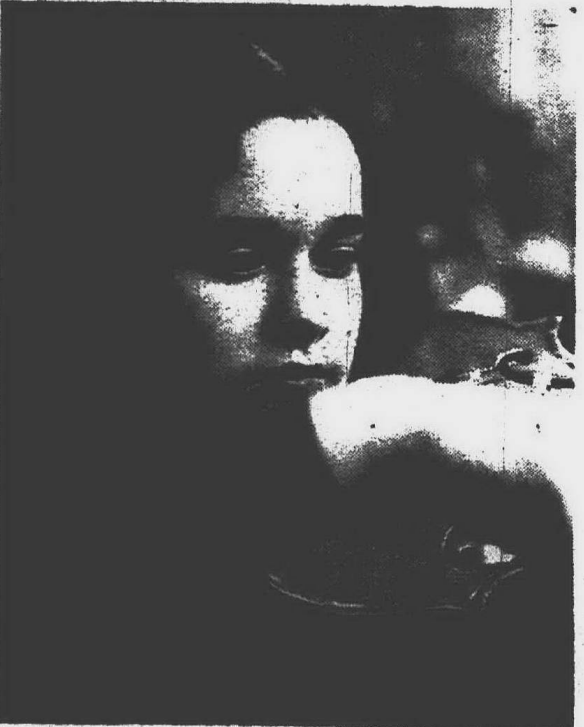
Pianist James Tocco, who is well known in Observerland through guest appearances at Schoolcraft College, won first place this month in the "Piano Contest of the Americas."

# Musicians Visit Farmington GC Student Is At Disneyland

One of Europe's outstanding youth music organizations, the 76-piece Leeds (England) Youth Orchestra, will make a five-day visit to Farmington July 23-28. The group will present two concerts.

The first will be at 8 p.m., Wednesday, July 25, in the auditorium of Harrison High School, 2005 12 Mile Road, Farmington.

The second will be at 6:30 p.m., Friday, July 27, in the Farmington Downtown Shopping Center, Grand River and Farmington Roads. It will be a feature of the Farmington Founders Festival.

Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp, through its international exchange program, is the host sponsor for the orchestra's tour.

An 84-member Blue Lake International Band is now

making a 30-day tour of The Netherlands, Belgium, Germany and Denmark.

Farmington is the first stop for the Leeds Orchestra in its three-week tour of Michigan. Its itinerary also includes Rosecommon, Grand Rapids, Montague, and the Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp, near Whitehall.

The Farmington Community Center is sponsoring the visit, and Dick Pryor, 29680 Gilchrist, Farmington, is chairman of the host committee.

Musical booster clubs from the three Farmington high schools are assisting with arrangements. Host committee members include Al Benden and Barbara Hughes of North Farmington High School; Harry Williams and Robert Kelly of Farmington High School; and Mary Murphy and Pryor from Harrison High School.

The Leeds Orchestra and 11 staff members will arrive in Detroit from England at 6 p.m., Monday, July 23. They will then take buses to the Farmington Community Center where they will meet their host families. Two are assigned to each home. Host families will house, feed and entertain the visitors, and take them on tours in the Detroit area.

are between the ages of 13 and 18 for the most part, but a few up to 25 continue to play with the group.

The orchestra was organized in 1965 by its present conductor, Bernard Armour, a woodwind teacher.

The group's sponsor is the 150-member Friends of the City of Leeds Youth Orchestra. Each student is paying \$300 to make the trip. The balance of the cost was raised through concerts and fund raising projects during the past two years.

# Suburban Judges Fear State Control

## An Observer Roundup

A recently-revived proposal to put Michigan's district court system under state control has met a generally negative response from both judges and municipal officials in Observerland.

Only Southfield has formally taken a position in favor of the plan, which is embodied in a bill currently under study in the House Judiciary Committee.

Although several local members of the bench acknowledge the potential benefits of the bill in terms of efficiency and uniformity, they also expressed reservations about too much centralization of government.

Among city officials, the cause of both negative and positive reactions was firmly rooted, in most cases, in economics.

The State Supreme Court has been pushing the idea of state control for two years, and Chief Justice Thomas M. Kavanagh renewed the call at an appellate conference in Traverse City last month.

The bill currently under study would rest overall control of the district courts in the Supreme Court, which would act as a board of directors responsible for management, budget control, setting minimum standards for court employees and other organizational functions. It is

viewed as a step toward a unified state system for all courts.

Although the high court currently plays a major role in setting rules of procedure for practice before the state's courts, it has no influence over the practical management of budgets and facilities. The day-to-day

In Plymouth, as in many districts, local control is the issue causing opposition to the plan. The township now has its own branch court, and officials are fearful that branch may be lost in a consolidation along with state control.

"We are losing money," says Mayor James McKeon, "but I would very definitely like to see local control." Since a major role of a district court is the enforcement of local ordinances, the mayor said he prefers a system where the three branches of government — legislative, administrative and judicial — function as a unit.

Local control is also the issue in Westland, but District Judge Thomas Smith takes the opposite viewpoint.

"The cities should get out of the court business," says Smith. "They don't know enough about courts."

Westland stands to profit considerably from the shift in financing. Smith estimates that the city's revenue could increase as much as \$100,000 under the proposed plan, a tripling of present income.

Garden City's Judge Richard Hammer says the plan is "unquestionably a means of promoting a better and more unified judicial system," but questions the idea from a "philosophical" standpoint.

"This is really a constitutional question," Hammer argues. "It goes right to the heart of democracy which calls for a decentralized government."

From a practical standpoint, the change would have little effect on Hammer's function, because he estimates that the city would realize about the same profit under either system.

Officials in both Livonia

and Redford Township have expressed opposition to state financing for the same reason. Both could stand to lose a source of income in the form of fines and fees.

Livonia posted a profit of around \$122,000 from operation of the 16th District Court, partly because many city ordinances which duplicate state laws create a direct source of income, according to Mayor Edward McNamara.

The city owns the district court building on Farmington Rd., however, and could make up the loss of revenue through the rent the state would have to pay for the facility.

Redford Township Supervisor Bill Robbins says he is against the plan "from an economic point of view," since the township now profits to the tune of \$170,000 from court operation. District Judge John M. Dillon expressed opposition for the same reason, and added that he has doubts about the role the Supreme Court will play.

"My main objection seems to be that it makes the supreme court into budget people instead of jurists," says Dillon.

Livonia's District Judge James Mies also believes that local judges should control their own budgets, or at least have input into budget decisions made on a state level. He adds, however, that most of the members of the Michigan District Judges' Association, of which he is vice-president, favor state control.

The Southfield City Council has voiced its support for the plan, and city officials estimate that it could result in an annual savings of some \$150,000 in the budget. Be-

cause of high rental and computer costs, the 46th district court operates approximately \$10,000 in the red, according to Judge S. James Clarkson.

Clarkson has joined the city in support of the plan, but hesitatingly. He wants a guarantee that a promised new police-court facility for Southfield will still be a reality under state financing.

business of running a district court is the affair of the court itself and the city or cities in which it operates.

The state pays part of a district judge's salary under the existing system, with the balance assumed by local governments. The cost of housing the court and paying employees' salaries is also the responsibility of the municipality.

On the other side of the ledger, all fines collected under local ordinances go directly into the coffers of the local government, and fines under state laws are split between city and state.

And, although Garden City District Judge Richard Hammer comments that a court's profit is "incidental to justice," the fine collecting business more than covers expenses in most of Observerland's communities.

Under the state financing proposal, traffic and civil fines and probation fees would be forwarded to the state, which would in turn return one-third to the local unit.

The Supreme Court would be advised in its management function by a judicial council to be composed of the chief justice, regional superintending judges, and judges from the Supreme Court, Court of Appeals and others.

The state would be divided into regions, with the board

day-to-day administration of each region.

At the local level, those courts with several judges would select one to serve as board chairman. Most actual authority will remain with the local judge, although he will operate within the framework of rules established on a state-wide basis.

Judges salaries would be a uniform \$33,000 under the centralized plan, and local supplements would be prohibited.

The primary beneficiaries of the proposal would be those district courts in less populous areas of the state where the budget sources are often split among two or more government units. Judges in those areas are frequently paid less, and must spend larger amounts of time justifying expenditures to competing local "bosses."

In Wayne and Oakland Counties, by contrast, most courts are financed by, and return income to, a single municipality.

Plymouth is the primary exception to that rule, since the 35th Judicial District encompasses the city of Plymouth, Plymouth Township, and the City of Northville. Auditors' reports show that all three governmental units lose money under the current system, yet sentiment among Plymouth officials is against any change.
