Federal Funding Slowdown Snags Pilgrim Towers Housing Project

The City of Plymouth has agreed to help the senior citizens project, Pilgrim Towers, in a "holding action" aimed at keeping options on land available until a Federal moratorium on funds is lifted.

City fathers, in a special meeting last week, agreed to pay the interest for one year on land contracts signed by members of the Pilgrim Non-Profit Housing Corp. The contracts were issued by the National Bank of Detroit with "very favorable" interest rates, according to the president of the group, James Houk.

Houk is also executive director of the Plymouth Area Economic Expansion Commission and is a former mayor.

The Pilgrim Towers company, over the signature of several members of the group, borrowed the funds and sold two parcels of land needed for the project to the city. The city, under the agreement, will pay the interest on the contracts for a year. Pilgrim Towers retains options to the land, and the rental income from the properties will "pay a fair share of the interest," according to Houk.

The land involved in the arrangement is on the north side of Ann Arbor Trail at Hamilton Street.

Options on two pieces of property were secured a year ago and ran out July 10

and 11. The city stepped in July 9, giving the group a one-year reprieve.

The Pilgrim Towers plan called for 200 one-bedroom units for people who are over 62 and who live in the Plymouth school district, Houk said.

A spokesman for HUD told the Plymouth Mail & Observer that any project receiving federal funds "must meet all equal opportunity requirements as set down by Congress," - which means that applicants cannot be restricted to residents of a particular area.

The venture began after a survey of the downtown area revealed a need for additional senior housing, Houk said. The group incorporated in the fall of 1971.

At the first meetings were George Lawton, Chuck Heidt, Edwin Schrader, Rev. Robert Shank, Robert Utter, Houk, Dr. A.E. Van Ornum, Florence Gableman, Mel Blunk, and Ed Draugelis, chairmen of the Downtown Development Corp. That group made the original appointments to the Towers group.

Articles of incorporation were filed and Houk, Shank and Schrader were named to find a site for the project.

"Locating a suitable site was one of our toughest jobs," Houk noted. "The Federal government says we must buy and clear land at a cost of \$1,000 per unit." Shortly after the site was agreed upon, Lawton, Schra-

der and Heidt left the group for various reasons. Houk became president, following in Lawton's footsteps, and Cliff Tait joined the group.

J.A. Ferguson, Assoc. were hired to develop the project and Colt Weatherston was named chief architect.

Local realtor William Fehlig was asked to obtain the necessary options.

The first two pieces were signed for July 10 and 11 last summer. It was these two that were saved by the city's action last week.

The other property involved was secured by Aug. 15, and the group made out the necessary applications to the Federal government, Office of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Sen. Robert Griffin (R-Mich.) and Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) were of "the greatest possible help," Houk said, and the project received approval on Dec. 29.

But the Detroit HUD office, then under Director William C. Whitbeck, had failed to file the necessary certification papers and the project got caught in the Jan. 8 moratorium on HUD funds ordered by President Nixon.

"We made an immediate appeal and have been in contact with them ever since," Houk noted. "We have tried to get the funds released but

County Seeks Township Taxing For Road Patrol

There is "no way" Plymouth Township will agree to solicit more millage from its taxpayers to pay for continuation of the Wayne County Sheriff's Road Patrol coverage.

That sentiment was expressed by Supervisor J.D. McLaren on the heels of Thursday's decision of the Wayne County Commission's Ways and Means Committee to solicit a commitment from the county's townships that they will seek more millage to pay for law enforcement.

McClaren's sentiment was shared by Canton Township Clerk John Flodin.

McClaren told The Plymouth Mail & Observer, "No way are we going to go along with their (the county's) suggestion that we go to the voters for support of a service that we're entitled to."

The county had threatened an end to the Road Patrol by August because of budgetary limitations.

Since the county has threatened an end of the Road Patrol, the supervisors of the county's townships which rely on the sheriff department for police pro-

tection have banded together and maintain that state law requires the sheriff to provide protection to unincorporated areas.

Last week the county Public Safety and Judiciary Committee recommended that the county fund the road patrol through Nov. 30.

That action then went to the county Ways and Means Committee which voted Thursday to refer the recommendation back to the Safety and Judiciary Committee.

In sending the recommendation back, the Ways and Means Committee suggested that written commitments be obtained from the townships that they will attempt to solicit millages for the service.

Brian Arrowsmith, county commissioner for Plymouth and Canton townships, voted against referring the matter back, and spoke in favor of funding the road patrol.

The Ways and Means Committee must act on the road patrol issue before it is presented to the full county board of commissioners.

John Graves Quits School Board Seat

John C. Graves has resigned his seat on the Plymouth School Board effective July 31.

Graves, who was elected to the board in June 1971, gave "personal reasons" as being behind his decision.

In a letter to the other school board members, he cited his plans to work on a doctoral degree in East Lansing during the coming school year as his reason for resigning.

"With the time that I will be spending on these studies I do not feel I will have adequate time to represent the best interests of the school district," Graves said.

His resignation's effective date means Graves will remain on the board until the proposed budget cuts and special millage election decisions are reached.

In his letter, he wrote:

"I appreciate the opportunity given me to serve the schools, and I also appreciate the trust and support given me by the people of this school district during my two years of service.

"I believe this to be a good school district, one which has a great future depending upon the positive support of the community.

"Our community should al-

ways be alert to not only its educational problems but its needs. It should always respond to these needs by keeping what is good for the children of the district in mind when making a decision."

Graves is employed as director of student activities at Livonia's Franklin High School.

School Board Meets Tuesday On Budget Cuts

The Plymouth School Board will officially consider several program cuts at its regular meeting at 8 p.m. Tuesday, in Miller Elementary School, 43721 Hanford Rd., Canton Township.

In a workshop session Monday night, the board agreed informally to a second round of budget cuts that would eliminate varsity athletics, band, orchestra and performing music, extracurricular activities, busing of pupils other than where required by state law and the school district's financial pledge to the Plymouth-Canton Recreation Authority.

A large crowd is expected at Tuesday night's meeting.

9-Year-Old Hurt 'Hopping' Train

A young Plymouth boy's day of adventuring along the train tracks ended in tragedy Thursday afternoon when he was severely injured trying to jump onto a moving train.

Jeff Cutler, 9, 787 N. Evergreen, tried to hop on a slow moving train, fell and was caught under the train wheels.

The boy lost his foot in the accident, according to a spokesman for Garden City Osteopathic Hospital. His condition was described by

the hospital as "stable."

The mishap occurred at about 4 p.m. Thursday along the Chesapeake and Ohio train tracks located on the northern edge of the city.

Firemen say that after the accident young Cutler was carried from the scene up a slight incline to the area near the city DPW yard, located at the end of Arthur St.

The accident is under investigation by C&O detectives and Wayne County Sheriff's Road Patrol.

It can't happen here? It's going to happen Tuesday night.

Athletics, band, orchestra, and all other extracurricular activities that cost the Plymouth School District money are going to be cut.

Those who say the cuts are only a bluff, because the school board is trying to get more operating millage, are going to be left standing out in right field all by themselves waiting for the 1973-74 baseball team to take the field.

Five of the seven Plymouth school board members are going to vote officially to cut the high school and middle school athletics, performing music and other extracurricular activities from the coming school year's budget.

It boils down to the board having cut all but \$150,000 of what it needed to balance the

budget. There was no other area to be trimmed.

There are those who say: •The school board will exercise its option to call a special millage election on Aug. 20 after having threatened the cuts.

•The board will abide with its decisions but accept donations earmarked to continue special programs. (Farmington School District residents slipped one like that by their school board a couple years ago.)

Those who believe either of those now-being-circulated rumors are going to find themselves sitting all alone in an auditorium waiting for the first band concert of the year.

School board members have said repeatedly that they don't favor a special election and that they won't accept earmarked donations.

What that boils down to is:

Unless the district's residents can convince the board to call the special election, or unless a successful petition drive can be organized, Plymouth schools are going to operate on a curtailed budget for the coming school year.

In Plymouth? In Plymouth. It could never happen here? It has.

The voters resoundingly defeated an operating millage increase even though a more than 10 per cent student population increase loomed for the fall.

It was - if nothing else - a mandate to operate the schools with more students

but with the same amount of money.

There will be no doubt quite a crowd at the board meeting Tuesday night (8 p.m. at Miller Elementary School) where the cuts will be officially sanctioned.

Everyone will have something to say.

But before they harangue the board, perhaps they should consider what alternatives the school board really had.

Without curtailing the educational program and without laying off school district employees, there is little margin for budget trimming.

Thus, what the board has decided is simply the price the district's students and parents must pay if the community refuses to support the school program with the money it takes to run it.

City Selling Lot Along C&O Track

The City of Plymouth has announced it will sell the vacant lot it owns on the northeast corner of the Starkweather Street and C&O Railroad intersection.

Sealed bids are being ac-

cepted on the lot with a deadline of 2 p.m. Monday.

The city tried to sell the property once before but both bids received were lower than the \$11,000 appraisal for the city.

The lot has been discussed as a possible location for the old Freight House which must be moved from its present location because the railroad has ruled it is a hazard being so close to the tracks.

'Don't Cut Programs'

EDITOR:

In the July 7 issue of the Plymouth Mail and Observer, it listed items that were either eliminated or cut back in the school budget. These items totaled \$608,522. This was \$210,478 short of the \$819,000 total cutback needed to provide a balanced budget.

In the July 18 issue of the same paper, the school board had further cut the budget by \$371,200 - \$160,722 more than needed to provide a balanced budget.

Through simple arithmetic

Readers Write

(through the figures provided in the paper) it is clear to see that athletics and music do not have to be cut from the budget. By allowing music and athletics to stay on, the budget is still cut by \$260,000 - \$49,522 more than is really needed to provide a balanced budget.

We don't need scare tactics, and the board can afford to keep our athletic and music programs.

I also strongly suggest to the school board to reexamine their reasons for cutting these two programs out.

The Junior Olympics have always been a popular test of skill for area youth.

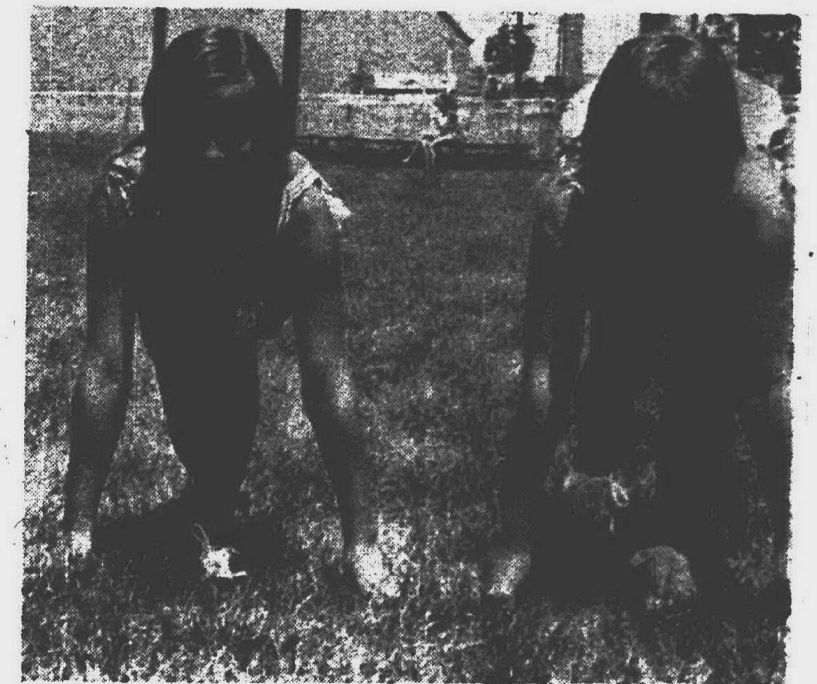

Doctors Schedule Move For Injured Debora Troutman

Debora Troutman, 17, was due for removal to Munson Hospital, Traverse City today (Saturday) for further treatment of multiple injuries suffered in an expressway auto crash near Muskegon.

Miss Troutman, a June graduate of Plymouth High School, has been under intensive care at Hackley Hospital, Muskegon, since the head-on early morning crash July 14.

Her mother, Mrs. Kenneth Thompson of Traverse City, said Thursday that her

daughter had shown "slight improvement" sufficient to enable doctors to tentatively agree to her removal to Traverse City.

Miss Troutman for a time was listed in "critical" condition at Hackley. She suffered fractures of both legs, left arm and jaw and face cuts.

Because of the multitude of breaks, her mother said, doctors have been unable to examine the young woman for possible internal injuries.

The accident happened about 2:30 a.m. last Saturday. The car which Miss Troutman was driving was headed the wrong way in the northbound lane of US-31 when it collided head-on with an oncoming car. Officers said they were unable to learn how the car got into the wrong lane.

A passenger in Miss Troutman's car, Abigail H. Wolff, 19, of Watertown, Wis., was killed.

The driver of the other car, Stacey B. Bueschel, 19, of Mt. Prospect Ill., and her parents were released after treatment at Hackley Hospital.

TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BOARD OF TRUSTEES REGULAR MEETING JULY 10, 1973
The meeting was called to order by Supervisor McLaren at 8:00 P.M. Members present were: McLaren, Overholt, Ash, Millington, Kenyon, (Deputy Clerk). Members on vacation: Helen Richardson, Elizabeth Holmes and Gerald Durke.
READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES-Regular Meeting, June 26, 1973. Mr. Millington moved that the minutes of the June 26, 1973 meeting be approved as submitted. Supported by Mrs. Kenyon and carried unanimously.
Executive Meeting, July 2, 1973. Mr. Ash moved that the minutes of the Executive Meeting on July 2, 1973, be approved as submitted. Supported by Mr. Overholt and carried unanimously.
READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF BILLS-Mr. Overholt moved that the list of bills in the Grand Total of \$15,400.00 be approved for payment. Supported by Mr. Ash and carried unanimously.
OPENING OF BIDS-Extension of Water Main on North Territorial and Ridge Roads.
(a) Closing of Bids. Mr. McLaren asked if there were any bids not as yet received by the Township. There were none. Mr. Ash moved that the bids be closed at 8:00 P.M. Supported by Mr. Overholt and carried unanimously. Mr. Hamill read bids from 17 companies, following which Mr. Ash moved, at the recommendation of the Township Engineer, that the bids be tabulated and the Township Engineer report back with a recommendation at the next regular meeting. Supported by Mr. Overholt and carried unanimously.
(b) Closing of bids. Supervisor McLaren asked if there were any bids not as yet received by the Township. There were none. Mr. Overholt moved that the bids be closed at 8:10 P.M. Supported by Mr. Millington and carried unanimously.
(c) Awarding of Bids - Bids from 11 agencies representing 18 companies were opened by Mrs. Kenyon and read by Mr. Ash. 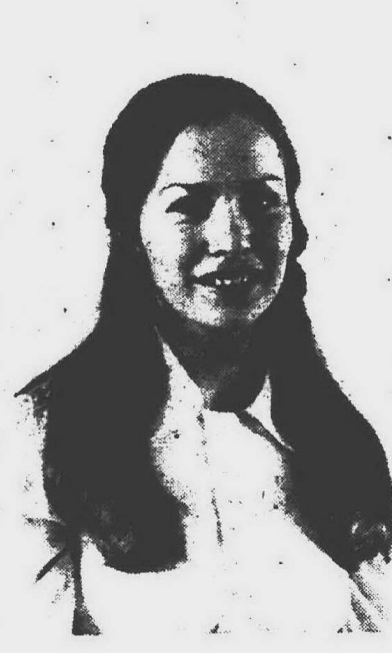

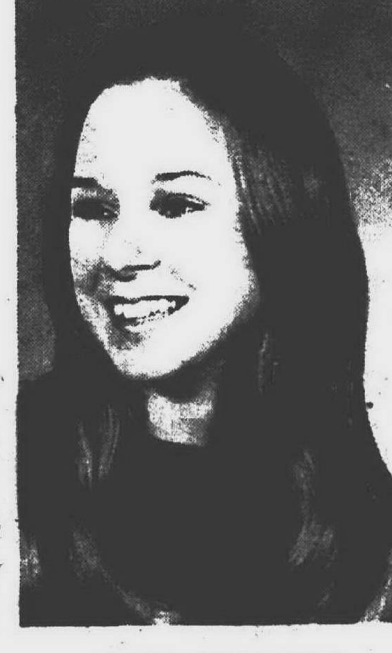

Pastor Charles Irwin Leaving St. Michael

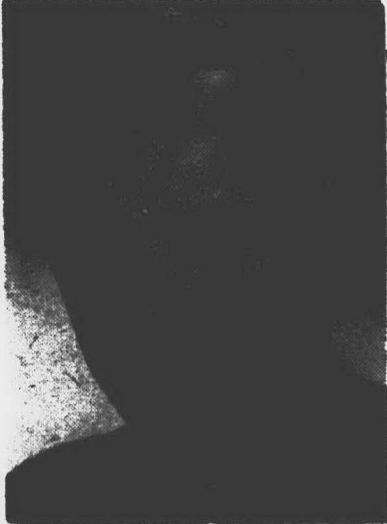
The Rev. Charles L. Irwin, founding pastor of the new St. Michael Lutheran Church in Plymouth, has announced he will leave the church this summer.

Religion Update

Rev. Lester Kinsolving's

"The United Presbyterian Church pays a national mission employe as little as \$6,000 per year and a General Assembly employe as much as \$37,500 per year," observed a petition ("overture") to that denomination's recent General Assembly in Omaha.

"All servants of the church are important and deserve to be equally treated on their dedication to Christ, as opposed to a secular system of values," contended this overture, from Alabama's Birmingham Presbytery.

A similar, if more conservative, overture came from the Presbytery of Philadelphia, which asked that headquarters salaries be limited to 250 per cent of median clergy income.

Both of these provocative petitions were submitted for further study (virtually killed) by the General Assembly - understandably, because it is rare indeed that anyone but headquarters staff and other high paid personnel can afford to take ten days in May to attend General Assembly.

Yet, it is significant that

this proposal for a 250 per cent limitation should come from the Philadelphia Presbytery, because this area is the residence of both of the denomination's \$37,500-a-year men, Stated Clerk William P. Thompson, and Mission Council Director Leon Fanniel.

On a lower level, there are three men at headquarters who are paid \$32,500, including the Rev. Oscar McLeod. Rev. McLeod took a leading part in the \$10,000 Presbyterian donation to the Angela Davis Defense Fund.

Just how much this \$10,000 gift (or, as the Presbytery of San Francisco concluded, the headquarters' highly questionable attempt to conceal it) had to do with the United Presbyterian Church's present and desolate condition is conjectural.

It must, however, be particularly galling to the \$6,000-a-year missionary who is musing in the Arctic or sweating in the jungle to know that upon the Biblical criterion ("Where the heart lies, there will lie the treasure also") he or she is worth only one fifth as much as McLeod.

Moreover, the present desolation of the United Presbyterian Church (a loss, since 1971, of more than two per cent of its entire membership - the worst of any denomination) is surely more the fault of national headquarters than the missionaries.

For the missionaries have to live down the actions of the national headquarters infinitely more than vice-versa. And while total giving to all local Presbyterian churches is up by

eleven million, giving to the national headquarters is down by eight per cent, or two million.

There is, however, some hope in sight. General Assembly elected to its highest post, Moderator, an apparently good man, the Rev. Clinton Marsh of Omaha.

Among other things, Rev. Marsh:

- Promised that he would seek to find out just how the controversial \$10,000 Presbyterian donation to the Angela Davis Defense Fund was spent, which information the national headquarters has not heretofore been disclosing.

- Expressed fervent hope that his race, Negro, had nothing to do with his election.

- Told the General Assembly just before they elected him (and decisively defeated another candidate, retired World Council of Churches General Secretary Eugene Carson Blake): "There are little people all over the nation who feel that those at our national headquarters are not colleagues, but a vague 'they'."

Understandably. Look at the salary differential.

DRC'S RACING SECRETARY, Norris Gwin, finds himself with the mathematically impossible, yet highly satisfying, task of assigning 1,500 available stalls to the over 3,100 horses for which stall applications have been filed for the upcoming race season beginning Monday, July 30, at the Livonia track.

Gwin reports that Michigan will be very well represented with over 500 Michigan-bred horses on the grounds and with 90 per cent of all the horses being owned and/or trained by Michigan people.

Healthy competition with the home-based horses and stables will be supplied by the likes of Jack Van Berg, whose Nebraskan based stable made him the top trainer nationally in races won in 1972.

Time, in the \$5,000 invitational, for a length and a half victory in 2:02 after the odds-on favorite H.T. Luca broke gait on the backstretch and couldn't catch up.

It was the second straight invitational triumph for Ark Time who will go after three in a row.

Ark Time faces a stiffer assignment this time with five challengers. The seven-year-old figure to be the favorite although H.T. Luca, with career earnings of \$158,913, could wake up and take it all.

The five-year-old son of Henry T. Adles has been close in all six starts this year but hasn't been able to win.

The remainder of the invitational field lists: Prince Knox, who broke gait just after turning into the stretch following a head and head duel with Whirlaway; Tricky Dale, Spook Time and Erlana's Valley.

Whirlaway's competition includes: J.R. Rocky, Major Jay, Mike A Breeze, Tiger Jet, Saratoga Dale, Tijuana Time and Mr. Shadow.

NORTHVILLE DOWNS is making a test of whether fans like the trifectas better than the perfectas after going with a nightly double and three perfectas up to this time.

Executive Manager John Carlo, who candidly admits that he doesn't have any score for gimmicks, decided earlier in the week to test the trifectas for the final 10 nights of the meeting.

"We have been receiving complaints from fans about lack of the trifectas," said Carlo. "So we decided to test it for 10 nights and check the results at the end of the campaign. The final statistics will go a long way in determining what we do at Northville come another season."

THE RUNNERS are coming and with opening day little more than a week away on Monday, July 30, stables began checking into the Detroit Race Course Friday when the track was opened for workouts for the first time.

There'll be a new look when folks start pouring into the big mile track then for the first of 90 programs.

Vice President and General Manager Dick Wilson expects to have the new outdoor paddock completed well in advance of the opening. It is being installed in front of the grandstand on the site of the winner's circle.

Present plans call for 12 stalls under a roof but still visible to persons seated in the grandstand and the new clubhouse. Naturally there'll be plenty of space for spectators to walk around the paddock where they'll be able to watch the horses walk around the exercise ring prior to the order to mount up.

In addition the exterior of the stands has had a completely new paint job to brighten up the outside even more than the inside.

"We expect to have most of the stalls filled by mid-week," said Tom Dorsey, assistant general manager and director of racing. "Our fig-

ures show that almost 90 per cent of the stables allotted stalls are from Michigan and only 10 percent are from elsewhere.

"This will assure us of good racing stock from the start to the end of the meeting in mid-November. At this point, we believe we have the best class of horses to race at the DRC in a couple of years."

Dorsey recently returned from a tour of the tracks in the east and midwest in search of nominees for the \$100,000 Michigan Mile in mid-September. He hasn't given up the thought that perhaps Secretariat will be on the list.

"I have been told that Secretariat is a horse that has to be kept busy," Dorsey explained. "He is apt to rip up the stall if not worked out. His trainer told me they had to get him out on the track the day after the Belmont and again after the match race in Chicago. I hope he continues those tactics and we just might convince them the Michigan Mile would be a good spot."

Meanwhile, track officials are busy making it known that post time for week days and Saturdays will be much earlier than in the past.

The daily post will be 2:15 p.m. contrasted to the 3:30 post of past years and on Saturdays and holidays the field will get away at 1 p.m.

These starting times have been successful in all Canadian tracks, along the Atlantic seaboard and in the mid-west and DRC management believes they will become popular in this area if properly tested.

"The thought behind the earlier post times," related Wilson, "is to get fans into the plant earlier and on their way home much earlier than ever before in Metropolitan Detroit. We're going to give it a thorough test and see if it will be accepted."

PCAC Boon To Kids

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the last article in a series of three describing the operations of Observerland's three Community Arts Councils. They are Farmington, Plymouth and Southfield.

By BETTY MASSON
"The time to start building an audience for the arts is when they're young, and the place to start is in the schools."

This is the theory upon which the Plymouth Community Arts Council was launched in the spring of 1969. The idea was that of dynamic Jo Hulce, then a member of the Plymouth school board. She realized that if school board budgets had to be cut, the arts would be the first to go.

With this in mind, she got together a group of about a dozen women to formulate plans on how volunteers could help out.

And, "So far as I know," said Mrs. Hulce, "we are unique in the U.S. in that we started under auspices of the board of education."

The "auspices" have not involved money, but have involved close cooperation with the principals and the teachers.

Early funding came from Parent Teacher Associations, and from service clubs and individuals.

Now two of its operations (performing arts and crafts) are self-sustaining. The big money-making project for the others is sale of arts and crafts at the Plymouth Fall Festival.

The group now has about 75 volunteers, and has done what it set out to do, broadened its operations every year.

Through the PCAC, a lot of Plymouth children are being introduced to the joys of creating things for themselves. This is done by the arts and crafts program, headed by Dorothy Magee.

Starting with demonstrations in the schools, the committee now offers instruction in a wide variety of crafts. There is a charge for the classes, and money is slowly being accumulated for an arts and crafts center.

This is still a dream of the future, but not "an impossible dream" if some individual comes along with a building or money to donate, notes Mrs. Hulce.

In the realm of art, the PCAC also offers volunteers who take reproductions of fine works of art into classrooms and briefly discuss

each picture with the students.

Behind the scenes are researchers who come up with interesting information about the various artists and their work.

Volunteers also look after the Russell Isbister Memorial Collection, an outgrowth of the Artrain visit to Plymouth in 1972. This is a permanent collection of works by local students and adults. It is being shown in various community buildings, and PCAC is hoping to add to the collection through donations from individuals and clubs.

Art displays and exhibits, provided through the Michigan Council for the Arts, are shown in the high school and Dunning-Hough library from time to time, and there are art displays in the middle schools.

In building youthful theater audiences for the future, the PCAC has worked closely with the Detroit Institute of the Arts. Shows which are booked for the Saturday Youth theater program are brought to Plymouth school

amusements

children during the week.

This year, all the programs will be in Central Middle School for elementary school students.

The 1973-74 list includes the Rod Rodgers Dance Company, in October; a mime performance of "Pinocchio," in November; a performance by "The Little Theater of the Deaf," in January; Marshall Izen in a program of Aesop's Fables, in February; "Everything You Wanted to Know About Poetry, But Were Afraid to Ask," in March; and "My World," a program on the environment, in May.

The various elementary schools usually collect 25 cents apiece from the students for the performance. The plays can be taken to individual schools, but this costs them more.

"We book, schedule, entertain, contact the schools and press, advertise, sell tickets, type and file," commented one of the performing arts committee volunteers.

Another volunteer is looking into the possibility of bringing in amateur groups,

from nearby colleges and universities.

The organization also makes outstanding use of local amateur talent. Many schools take advantage of this free opportunity to enrich their programs.

This amazing group may well be doing more. It's almost impossible to keep up with its activities and its organization.

Many members claim they were "drafted." But however it's done, Mrs. Hulce's idea seems to be working very well in Plymouth.

In the fall and spring of 1973-74, the group's performing arts committee is sponsoring three programs which should have appeal throughout Observerland.

They have booked for performances in Plymouth's Salem High School country-music star, Jimmie Rodgers, in "Untamed Land," a new musical; "No Sex Please, We're British," a comedy; and "The Fantasticks," another musical.

no room for that corner chess game? "We make money when we don't play," was the firm reply.

Both Nick and his barbers are in accord when it comes to extending a full welcome to women customers. "It changes the scenery for the better," Nick reported, eyes a-twinkle. "It's more pleasant without all males," barber Jim Felix agreed.

They feel that the state law that barbers may cut both women's and men's hair, but that beauty parlor operators may cut just women's hair is a fair one. "Barbers are taught strictly cutting hair," Nick declared. "Beauticians spend a lot of time on other subjects."

Nick, who has been a barber since 1935, would rather not chronicle the changes in barbering over the years. Although he learns the newest hair styles by taking refresher courses, "my heart still isn't in it." He much prefers what used to be a "common, ordinary haircut."

HIS YOUNGER BARBERS, three of whom sport beards, generally enjoy both wearing and cutting longer hair. "Men have become more vain about the way they look," Barber Felix believes. Hair styling is probably here to stay.

Do men confide in their barbers as women are said to do in their beauticians? "Sure, our customers talk to us," Jim Felix reported. "But it's generally not about personal things. Right now the conversation is about Watergate, baseball or the best place for fishing."

tional system," Mrs. Hoyer continued.

"What we'd really like to see is a school which combines the teaching of barbering and cosmetology."

"Give all students an opportunity to learn the skills. Everyone would be truly capable. Then, if they wanted to specialize in one kind of customer, that could come in an internship period."

The barbers claim that cosmetology schools do not concentrate on hair cutting, so that graduates are not qualified to work on men's hair. "But barbers receive only a small amount of training in coloring and permanent waving," Mrs. Hoyer reported. "Yet they are still licensed to do it."

Although Mrs. Hoyer received warnings from the state on two prior occasions, she was not prohibited from operating. "If the licensing and the law was really important, why didn't they try to stop me then?" she wonders.

She believes that it was the barber's board which finally pressed the warrant -- "although it's a cosmetology law I broke. The barbers are unionized and a strong force," she added.

"There are a lot of different organizations for hair dressers, but they are mainly social. We need an organization that can work for us."

RYAN AND MRS. HOYER are fairly confident that when all is said and done, the law will be changed.

"Our lawyer and others we have talked with are quite confident."

Meanwhile the two shops continue to operate as before, as does Mrs. Hoyer. Ryan is actively seeking an Ann Arbor location for a third operation, and plans on opening two additional hair clinics in the near future.

If parlor and pole ever meet in the state of Michigan it may be as a result of efforts by a Livonia man and a Union Lake woman.

John Ryan and his employee Minnette Hoyer have decided to challenge a 46-year-old state law which

prohibits cosmetologists from cutting a man's hair while allowing barbers to cut the hair of either a male or female.

Ryan, who owns two "Family Hair Care Clinics" -- one in Farmington, the other in Keego Harbor -- is of the firm conviction that "hair has no sex." "It's true," echoes Mrs. Hoyer. "You utilize the same knowledge and the same methods of hair cutting, regardless of whether the subject is a man or a woman."

ON **JULY 6**, Keego Harbor police arrested Mrs. Hoyer as she was cutting the hair of a male customer. She was arraigned on the charge that she was cutting a man's hair without the proper license. When Ryan appeared to drive his employee home, he too was arrested and arraigned. The charge was operating a barber shop without the proper license.

The problem is that the Michigan law has not kept up with changing times, Mrs. Hoyer stated. "In 38 states the law has been changed to allow a cosmetologist the freedom to cut anyone's hair -- man or woman."

"The state's really dragging its heels," she continued. "They've got a nice thing going for them up in Lansing. They don't want their boat upset." She noted that 70,000 cosmetologists pay yearly registration fees to the state along with about 9,000 barbers.

BUT A CHANGE in the law is not the only thing Ryan and Mrs. Hoyer are pushing for. "Both sides need a complete revamping of their educa-

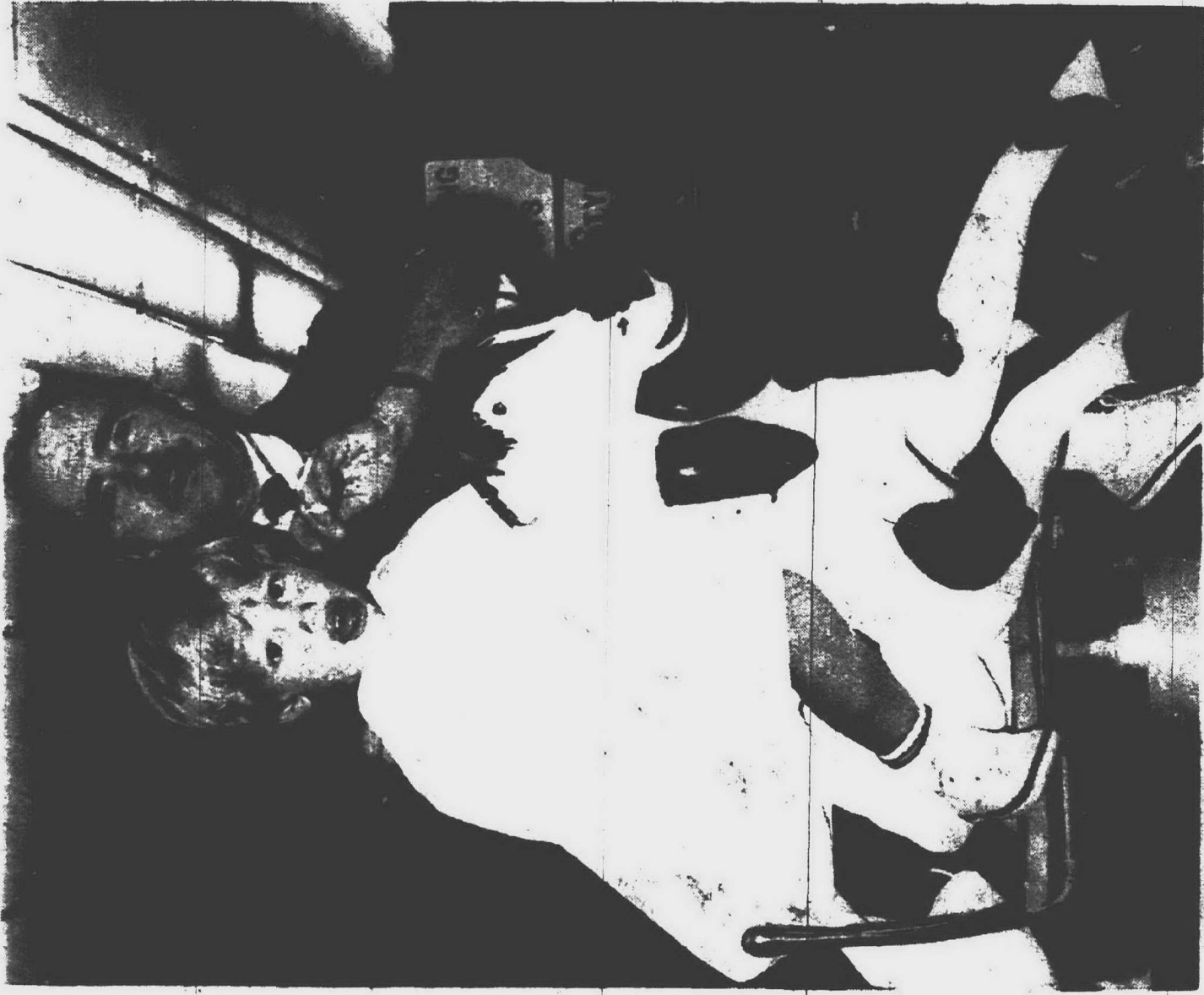

The new malt-enriched products are excellent, Friedman says, to counteract split ends, hair dried out or suffering from excessive heat from electric hair appliances or damaged from rough brushing. When you use a drier, Friedman cautions, don't hold it too close to the scalp. In using spray, keep it on the hair surface, lightly spraying from above.

The malt-enriched products are also recommended if your hair simply feels "stripped dry" after shampooing -- to restore normalcy and bounce.

Whether you use an electric appliance or not, Friedman suggests dividing hair into four sections and drying and brushing against the grain to encourage more body and fullness for a well-groomed, masculine look.

Men's clothes are calming down and so are hair styles, according to Leonard A. Lauder, president of the Estée Lauder companies.

"Subtle understatement is the ideal now in both clothes and hair styles," says his colleague, George Friedman, executive vice president of a Lauder subsidiary specializing in men's toiletries.

THE FLAMBOYANCE of the costume period is over. Clothes reflect a return to the classics. So hair should look less "gimmicky," still longish but neither scraggly or unruly, Friedman says. Edwardian bangs and shoulder-length manes are out. Hair is worn shorter in front but it needs to be thick, full, healthy, natural-looking, honest and uncontrived.

"While the basic premise of hair care is to keep hair healthy, today this is interpreted to mean clean and manageable, too, and most men are also concerned about maintaining style," Friedman asserts. One of the best ways to encourage the look of a full, thick, healthy-looking head of hair and at the same time discourage a dandruff condition is by frequent shampooing with the right shampoo.

How often should it be used? As often as necessary. There's no such thing as shampooing too often. For most men, two or three times a week is sufficient. Very oily hair should be shampooed daily and rinsed thoroughly. "Don't be afraid to massage the

INSIDE A BEAUTY SCHOOL

Whether you have your hair done at the posh salon of a downtown department store, a modily decorated suburban shop or a cozy one or two person operation, your beauty operator has spent a minimum of 1500 hours learning how to beautify YOU.

At beauty schools, such as the State College of Beauty on Pennin in Plymouth, women and a few men from the ages of 16 to 62 learn the theory and practice of cosmetology as prescribed by the Michigan State Board of Cosmetology.

THE FIRST FLOOR of the beauty school is operated as an actual salon, where students who have had 350 hours of instructor's theory and practical training by working on mannequins can get their hands on the real thing -- live customers.

tical student," according to Madeline Johnson, who owns and manages the Plymouth branch of the beauty college. "And no appointments may be made in advance." Still, the customers are ready and willing to serve as the students' guinea pigs, many on a regular basis.

Rates are lower at the student-staffed shop, according to state regulations. Although no instructor is allowed to actually do a customer's hair, she may help a student out if there is something he has done wrong or doesn't understand.

"Some of our customers feel that the students are more conscientious than regular beauty operators," Miss Johnson said. "We have had many of the same people coming to our shop for years."

Full-time students at the college come five days a week, and work seven hours per day. There are also programs for those who want to attend part-time.

JAN HODGE of Livonia and Anita Laub and Mary Cutlip, both of Plymouth, are three of the newer students at the school. They are in training on the second floor of the school under the tutelage of instructor Pat Ibeugh.

A typical day for them consists of one to two hours of theory on the subject for the day, plus several hours devoted to practicing what they've heard preached -- each on her own favorite mannequin.

According to Mrs. Ibeugh, Tuesdays are devoted to finger waving, Wednesdays to facials or manicures and scalp treatments. Thursday will mean a day of permanent waving or bleaching and tinting; Friday, hair cutting and styling and Saturday, bleaching, tinting or permanent waving once again.

The textbook for the course, "Standard Text Book of Cosmetology," has chapters which run the gamut from professional ethics to bacteriology, sterilization and sanitation to how the beauty operator should care for her feet. Other chapters deal with chemical hair relaxing, electricity and light therapy, beauty salon management and personality development.

MRS. IBEUGH is quick to agree that customers often confide in their beauty operators. "You have to be a little bit of a psychologist," she said. "You also have to know when to open your mouth and when to listen."

"I tell my students to make their lady feel like she's something special. No matter how pressed for time you are, make her feel relaxed. If you treat her as you would want to be treated -- you'll do well."

Instructor Ibeugh feels that though men make up only a small percentage of her classes that they still will have the advantage in job placement and probably in the salary they command.

"The men learn just as quickly as the women," she reported. "Generally they've had some interest in doing hair. They don't come in completely cold. The female students like having them in their classes. It adds interest."

According to state law, cosmetologists may not cut men's hair professionally, though barbers may cut

hair on both men and women. "I do feel its discriminatory in a way," Mrs. Ibeugh admitted. "If a man prefers having his hair cut in a beauty shop, he should be able to. After all, he's paying for it."

WHEN THE TIME comes to "graduate" to the first floor of the college where they can try out what they have been learning on mannequins, the students have become somewhat bored with classroom techniques. "Still they are pretty nervous when they come down here for the first time," Miss Johnson said. "They soon find that most customers here are really nice. They understand they are still learning."

"We rarely have a really bad mistake made which can't be remedied somehow. A lot of what they are learning down here is how to pick up

their speed so that they can accomplish more quickly."

When they have put in the required hours and passed the college's final examination, graduates must take a State Board Exam to receive their license.

Then the Plymouth College will find a job for them. "We always have shops that need operators," Miss Johnson advised. "As long as we turn out good operators."

"One of the nicest parts of being a beauty operator is that there are a lot of part-time positions," instructor Ibeugh said. Many women leave their jobs completely when they begin raising a family just because its an all or nothing situation.

"A good beautician should always have a job -- the full or part-time can be up to her."

Changing Hair Needs

Going away to college?

If you're going off to hard water territory, like most of the Midwest and Southwest, you'll need a shampoo that fights dryness and is especially formulated to rinse out easily.

If you hail from a humid area and you're headed for a dryer one, you might think your hair worries are over. While the frizzies and floppies won't be plaguing you, the effects of dryness on skin as well as hair are going to surprise you.

Your hair will seem dryer and duller than ever and you'll need products to correct these situations. A good way to deal with the subversive effects of dryness, and extreme sunshine if you're going south, is a

deep penetrating conditioning treatment; not the 60 second type you've been using, but a real corrective product.

AND HERE'S ANOTHER TIP if you've chosen a school in Texas, Florida or another highly humid area, you should introduce yourself to hair spray. There are now alternatives to stiff products of old that made hair feel like straw and didn't really hold anyway.

Going to college means going through changes of all kinds. Some you have to deal with on the spot. But when it comes to climate, at least you can be prepared. Best rule for coping: No matter what the problem, keep your head together!
