Breathalyzer Now In Use By Police

City of Plymouth police have been given a breathalyzer from the State Police, ending a two year wait for the instrument used to test drunk drivers.

According to Police Chief Timothy Ford, the acquisition of the instrument will save the city \$25 to \$30 per arrest since before the new machine arrived Plymouth transported drunk suspects to Northville for the test.

Ford said six men in his department have been certified to use the breathalyzer, having taken a 40-hour course sponsored by the State Police and the Michigan Department of Health. Each operator must be re-tested once a year.

The city's unit will also be used by members of the State Police post on Mill Street.

The instruments became a policeman's tool several years ago when the implied consent law was passed.

Thus, those who refuse to take the test face a hearing before a Secretary of State appeal board, which almost always results in a 90 day suspension of the defendant's drivers license.

"They tend to uphold the officer almost 100 per cent of the time," according to Ptl. Robert Commire, one of the city patrolmen qualified on the instrument.

Under the state law, if a suspect "blows" .05 to .09 he is impaired; .10 to .15 intoxicated or under the influence.

The standard for under the influence was lowered from .15 last year to .10 this year in an effort to crack down on drinking drivers. Alcohol is involved in more than 50 per cent of all fatal accidents, according to national statistics.

The machine itself is small, measuring about one foot square. Two ampules or containers of an acid compound are set in balance between a light beam.

Breath from a drunk suspect will change the color in

one of the containers, break the light beam and be registered on the breathalyzer. Usually two tests are given. If a suspect refuses to take the test or does not give a full breath of air into the machine, he faces a license suspension.

Commire said most suspects are given about 20 minutes after their arrest before the test is given. Liquor in the breath from the mouth area may give a high, but often inaccurate reading. It is the "deep breath" from the stomach and lower lungs, that the machine must read.

The test, although simple, involves several cross checks so the readings will hold up in court.

Commire said that the machine must be tested by local police once a week using a flask of alcohol, and tested once a month by a State Police expert.

Drunk suspects have the right to a second test - for example, a blood test administered by the family doctor - but may only request it after they have taken the breathalyzer test, under the law.

There are several different machines on the market, including types that can be carried by the police officer in the car.

However, Commire noted, the state only recognizes the one issued by the State Police. The State Health Department issues the ampules of acid used in the test, and certifies their purity and air tight seal. The seal is not broken until the time of the test.

The machine cannot read the effects of drugs so it has no use for that type of offender, Commire noted.

A petition drive has been launched to show support for a special school election on Aug. 20.

At the Plymouth school board meeting Tuesday night, the board voted to tie the election to being presented with petitions bearing signatures from 10 per cent of the district's voters.

If not enough signatures are presented to the board before its Aug. 13 meeting, the board has committed itself to canceling the election.

Petitions have been prepared, asking that the 1.5-mill operating levy for five years be placed on the ballot. They are available from the Plymouth Board of Education office, 545 S. Harvey St., Plymouth.

The board voted unanimously to call the election after voting to cut some \$968,022 in programs out of the 1973-74 school budget.

Those cuts would include athletics, performing music and other extra-curricular activities.

Several petitions have been taken out from the board offices already and one was returned Thursday.

Mrs. Homer Clark of 41405 Greenbriar told The Plymouth Mail & Observer that she has been helping to coordinate the petition drive.

She said she may be contacted beginning Monday morning regarding the petitions' circulation in specific areas.

Deputy School Supt. Dr. Earl Hogan asked petition circulators to know which precinct they are circulating in because it will help the board offices to certify signatures when the precinct is given.

Hogan also urged that completed petitions be returned to the school board offices as soon as possible to aid the school election officials in certifying the signatures.

What Will School Cutbacks Mean?

In addition to the obvious ways the school program cuts will be felt in the schools next year, the Plymouth School District's budget problems will be felt elsewhere in the community.

Probably the greatest effect of the cuts will be felt by the area-wide recreation authority which had been counting on financial participation by the school district of \$21,000.

In light of that having been cut from the school budget, Howard Oldford, chairman of the recreation authority board, said, "We hope there will be another election and we hope it will be successful."

The school board, after approving budget cuts totaling \$968,222 Tuesday night, voted to call a special millage election for Aug. 20 on the condition that the board be presented with petitions bearing 10 per cent of school district voters' signatures.

That election is regarded as crucial for the programs which the board has agreed to cut, although the board has said repeatedly that it would not necessarily restore

the programs as they were even if a millage increase were passed. The recreation authority, which was an idea originally given impetus by the schools, has been in the planning stages for some months now and had hoped to be operating by Sept. 1.

That possibility has probably been eliminated by the school budget cuts. Oldford told The Plymouth Mail & Observer that if the cuts stick, it would mean the already-hard-pressed townships and the city participating in the authority would have to contribute more money or see the authority become stagnant.

Another area where the school cuts will be felt may be at the Plymouth Area Economic Expansion Commission (PAEEC).

The board voted to eliminate its annual \$5,000 contribution to the PAEEC.

James Houk, PAEEC director, said that while the commission wouldn't be crippled by the cut, it does represent more than 25 per cent of the commission's budget.

"They're (the schools) cutting the thing that's the most advantageous to them," Houk said.

The area relating to school operation that will necessitate the most hurried analysis in light of the cuts may be transportation.

The board voted to cut back all school bus transportation to state limits. This means a new transportation plan must be worked out in the month remaining before school opens.

The district has already begun on that project.

But whether the program cuts will stick will not be known until the proposed 1.5 mill operating increase is passed and the school board determines how the resulting money will be spent.


The 1.5 mill would represent about \$20,210 - about \$440,000 short of the total budget cuts.

This would mean the board would have to prioritize programs to be reimplemented.

The total program cuts and the savings are:

Mirto 'Takes On' Crowd At Meeting

It's probably a good thing Gary Mirto isn't running in a popularity contest.

After Tuesday night's Plymouth school board meeting at which he took the microphone several times to defend the board's action to cut back programs, he probably couldn't place second in such a contest if he were the only one running.

Mirto's cajoling - and often arguing - with members of the audience who spoke against the cuts, developed at one point into a near-shoving match with Cameron Lodge Jr.

Supt. John M. Hoben and Board President E.J. McClendon came between the two, preventing any real physical exchange, but the incident was perhaps typical of the several instances during the meeting where Mirto took the floor as a self-appointed spokesman for the board's position on the cuts.

It was early in the meeting when Mirto and Lodge had

their first of several verbal exchanges.

Lodge approached the center microphone and was recognized to speak. He asked how much it cost the school district to run the school farm - one of the programs not cut by the board.

Hoben replied that it cost \$12,000 but that the hope was that the farm would become self-sustaining in the next two years.

Mirto then said that if someone wanted a program cut out of the budget he should explain why and what would be involved.

Lodge returned to the microphone saying, "I didn't say I wanted it cut out. I just asked how much it cost."

Mirto then took the floor again, saying that while he imagined many of the people in the audience were "ticked off" about the cuts, "we're (the board members) kind of ticked off, too."

Lodge replied, "If you're ticked off, perhaps your course of action is to resign from the board." That was followed by a round of applause.

After the applause died down, Mirto said that during his school board campaign his supporters had presented him with a recall petition to hang on his wall.

"If you are indeed serious about recalling the board members, go to it," Mirto said in reference to recent talk that a recall campaign would be launched against board members who voted for the cuts.

"Maybe recall is the point you should pursue," Mirto told the audience.

Throughout the meeting, Mirto often took the occasion to cajole the audience.

Cooke Earns Perfect Grades

"There are some people not being very honest here tonight," he said once.

During some of his replies to the audience, Mirto used the word "damn."

One man got up and shouted, "That's what we need. A school board member who swears at meetings."

It was during an intermission in the meeting that the confrontation between Lodge and Mirto took place.

After arguing, the two drew closer and it was at that point that Hoben and McClendon interceded.


"Who does that guy think he is?" Mirto asked aloud.

"He's a citizen, Gary," replied Deputy School Supt. Dr. Earl Hogan.

In the past, Mirto has told other board members he didn't feel they should argue with speakers at large meetings because it made a bad appearance for the board.

Why his change in heart Tuesday night?

"It was evident to me (in the caucus before the meeting began) that there might be some backbone giving way (among school board members)," Mirto told The Plymouth Mail & Observer.



If each signer lists his precinct it makes it easier to certify the names. The voting places of the seven precincts are: Pct. 1, Central Middle School; Pct. 2, Gallimore Elementary School;

Pct. 3, Isbister Elementary School; Pct. 4, East Middle School; Pct. 5, Allen Elementary School; Pct. 6, West Middle School; Pct. 7, Farrand Elementary School. Precincts 6 and 2 extend to the western limits of the district, separated by Joy Road. Precinct 2 also extends to the district's southern limits.

Canton Twp. OKs Its Largest Development

Final approval for what will be the largest home development Canton has yet known was given this week by the Canton Township board.

The "Mayflower Village" planned unit development of more than 1,300 homes will be built on 651 acres south of the high school site. The sections of land run from Canton Center to Beck roads, and south from the high schools to well below Warren Road.

The land is being developed by Sam Hechtman of Practical Homes, Oak Park. Hechtman told township trustees that he would build the models as soon as possible, and that underground improvements and paving would go in for the first part of the development during the winter.

The approval for the development, which will include open space and recreational facilities, did not come with-

out some debate from the trustees.

Trustee Brian Schwab was critical of the name "Mayflower Village" and at his urging Hechtman informally agreed to change it.

Schwab said he objected to

the Plymouth connotations of Mayflower.

"We are in the process of trying to gain some type of identity. When home ads say 'One mile from Plymouth' and 'Plymouth school' then the suggestion is this is Plymouth. This is what we are trying to avoid."

Trustee James Peole agreed, noting "every subdivision we have reflects Plymouth."

A letter from the Northwest Homeowners Assn., was read noting their approval of the development as planned. They had objected to some features of the initial development, which included 61 acres in apartments.

Trustee Robert Griffin reminded the homeowners' spokesman, Robert Greenstein, that the plans called for some 65 foot lots, a "possibly dangerous precedent."

Greenstein said they agreed with the current plans as a "compromise."

"It was a question of going along with a multiple precedent or a smaller lot precedent," he added.

The trustees also asked Hechtman to agree to have the development's recreation facilities completed before all the homes were constructed.

Hechtman told the trustees that the facilities would be built before 50 per cent of the homes were up, because "we want to use it as a promotional item."

The trustees also reached agreements with him on fencing of several existing lots.

The entire plan for the development calls for several acres of open space, a club house, tennis courts and swimming pool.

The purchase agreement will spell out the costs of these items for the first two years of home ownership, Hechtman said.

Drowning Brings Police Warning Of Water Danger

The body of a Plymouth Township man, who had drowned Tuesday while fishing in Waterford Lake in Northville Township, was recovered Wednesday morning by Michigan State Police divers.
Police said Lloyd Eason, 39, of 9404 Elmhurst, was fishing from an aluminum cement mortar pan approximately 30 feet from shore when he lost his balance and fell into eight feet of water.
His daughter, Tamey, saw him struggle and ran for help. She told police her father could not swim.
Three unidentified boys responded to the call for help but couldn't locate the victim.
Northville Township Police Chief Ron Nison asked for assistance from the State Police.
Divers Terry VanVerlan and Richard Schoenberger, of the Ypsilanti State Police Post, searched for about three hours Tuesday evening, calling off the search at 10:20 p.m.
The recovery attempt was resumed Wednesday morning, the body being discovered about 8 a.m.
State Police caution persons against swimming or going out into water to fish where the lake or pond is not supervised and no means of assistance is available.

Girl Charged In Death Of Former Plymouthite

Darcy Ashman, 17, of Dundee, Ill., charged with negligent homicide in the death of a former Plymouth man in a two-boat collision on Mullett Lake, has been released on \$1,000 bond following arraignment in Cheboygan.
Judge Philip Tschirhart of 88th District Court set no date for preliminary examination.
Miss Ashman is charged in the death July 15 of Donald Pierce, 61, formerly of Plymouth.
Pierce and his wife, Ruby, have been traveling in a

camper since his retirement in September 1971. He had worked as a tool and die maker for General Motors of Ypsilanti for 23 years before retiring. He was a Plymouth High School graduate.
Officers gave this account of the accident:
The Pierces were anchored in calm water about 300 yards from shore reading a newspaper when the boat piloted by Miss Ashman struck the Pierce craft in the stern.
The boat tipped over, tossing husband and wife into the water. Miss Ashman and an unidentified passenger also were thrown overboard and their boat sank.
All four clung to the Pierce boat and they were given immediate help by nearby boaters. However, Pierce was dead when brought to shore.
Miss Ashman was quoted as saying the mishap occurred as she was waving to a friend.
Funeral services were held

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BY AMENDING THE ZONING MAP
THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:
PART I. That the Township Zoning Ordinance is hereby amended by amending the Zoning Map, by changing those areas indicated on the Amended Zoning Map, No. 70, attached hereto and made a part of this Ordinance.
PART II. CONFLICTING PROVISIONS REPEALED. Any Ordinance or parts of Ordinances in conflict, heretofore and heretofore enacted, are hereby repealed.
PART III. EFFECTIVE DATE. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety, and are hereby ordered to take immediate effect and to be in force from and after the earliest date allowed by law.
PART IV. ADOPTION. This Ordinance was adopted by the Township Board of the Township of Plymouth by resolution of July 26, of the Public Act of Michigan, 1973, at a meeting duly called and held on July 26th day of July A.D. 1973, and ordered to be given publication in the manner provided by law.

Religion Update

Rev. Lester Kinsolving's

"Christianity and pro football are very compatible."

—Tom Landry, Head Coach, Dallas Cowboys

This remarkable statement was made last fall, about a sport which opened its annual (and almost endless) season this week, with the College All Star Game.

Coach Landry made this statement shortly after Fleming Revell released a paperback book entitled "Supergoal - Great Football Pros On The Game Of Life, With Billy Zeoli."

Zeoli holds pre-game evangelistic services for various pro football teams. A photograph on the back of this book shows him with coach Landry, star quarterback Roger Staubach and a blackboard. Caption: "Billy Zeoli explains God's Game Plan..."

That's precisely what is says on that blackboard: "GOD'S GAME PLAN," complete with diagrams.

Not to be for one moment outdone, the frenetic mentor of the Washington Redskins, coach George Allen, has secured a team chaplain: Har-

lem - Gang - Leader - Turned - Evangelist Tom Skinner.

According to the Washington Star News religion writer Bill Willoughby:

"Skinner shows them the locker room Jesus, the man with hair on his chest and sweat on his brow and dirt under his fingernails. The man who needs a deodorant."

This theology of perspiration, as endorsed by such eminent jocks, was accentuated by a nationally televised Redskin prayer meeting in thanksgiving to God after the tromping of Landry's Cowboys. (There was no such telecast, however, when the Skins were subsequently swallowed by the Dolphins of Miami in the Superbowl.)

Yet this muscular faith very nearly came apart in December.

For a flanker back of one of these devout coaches (Lance Alworth of the Cowboys) virtually put out of the game a linebacker (Redskin Jack Pardee) belonging to the other - in what Brother Allen angrily charged was an illegal crack-back block de-

signed and repeatedly ordered by Brother Landry.

The holy gridiron heated further as Linebacker Pardee growled:

"That's what comes from the all-righteous Tom Landry who is holier than thou and all good!"

In response, Coach Landry announced "We didn't do anything illegal."

But meanwhile there was an additional detraction of the carefully nurtured aura of sanctified stadium turf. For the dean of St. Louis University's divinity school, Jesuit Father William J. Sullivan, writing in the national Jesuit magazine America, described: "The pro football mania... the fall war games conducted by the mercenaries of the National Football League."

What an increasing number of critics describe as "America's new religion," is, writes Father Sullivan, "A human demolition derby... a business that masquerades as a sport."

Father Sullivan quotes Joe Namath's description of pro football's image ("brutality") as well as Los Angeles Ram Merlin Olsen's statement: "By the end of the game, you're an animal."

Despite this, pro football will probably play religion for all it is worth this fall - probably because this kind of far-fetched holiness is bought by many - including those simple enough to rationalize that watching a team with a locker-room Jesus is a sufficient surrogate for worship at one's church or synagogue.

Fortunately, college football appears to be outgrowing this shoulderpad religion, as indicated by the statement of Notre Dame's Ara Parseghian: "A football team is certainly not a religion."

Mark's 23 And A Senior Pastor

"I'm really not much of a talker," insists a young man who has to be one of the youngest senior ministers you can find in or out of Observerland.

But Mark McGilvrey, who turned 23 the Sunday after he was named officially by the congregation of Memorial Church of Christ of Livonia, admits he does have a few things to say on the first day of each week.

"I talk myself out then," he grins, "and then listen for the rest of the week so I can lay it on them again."

The youthful preacher was called to head the church, located at 35475 Five Mile, after a congregational vote July 8.

He had been filling the job of senior minister since March, when Max Copeland left to accept another call. McGilvrey came to Memorial in May of 1972 as associate minister.

The vote for the action was "overwhelming," the church's parish bulletin reported, and the pastor responded in his weekly column, "Mark's Remarks."

"I want to thank you for the confidence you have shown in me... I know very well I cannot lead Memorial on my own strength but will rely on the strength and guidance of the Lord to see me through."

He sees as a major task in the coming months and years adding more members to the roll of 350 and bringing more people to worship in the sanctuary that seats 400.

Memorial conducts regular house-to-house canvasses in the neighborhood, but McGilvrey is convinced that "basically any church's membership increase comes when people in the congregation get excited about their faith."

"I'm trying to get the people sold on salvation - our church is founded on the idea that every person is a minister."

McGilvrey has launched a search for an associate minister for the congregation, consisting mainly of members a generation older than he.

"There's a lot to be done here," he said. "I started working with the young people, but haven't been able to do as much as is needed in that area."

"And I haven't really had a full day off since Max left."

Mark McGilvrey, son of a preacher, was born in North Carolina and grew up in Jelliet, Ill.

He has a bachelors degree from Cincinnati Bible Seminary and has compiled plenty of credits toward a master's degree but no time to write a thesis.

His training and his personal beliefs lead him to a

fundamental position that "if the Bible says it, I believe it."

Churches of Christ, McGilvrey pointed out, form a brotherhood rather than a denomination, because each congregation is an entity in itself.

"We have no creed, no specific beliefs," he said. "Each congregation is its own boss and we hope that people can come to God through the Bible."

The brotherhood, he added, dates back to the early 1800s when several men in this country began preaching the idea of getting back to the church of the New Testament.

"Michigan isn't exactly a strong area for our churches," McGilvrey added. "There are 17 churches of Christ in the Detroit metropolitan area - in the Cincinnati area, with a smaller population, there are more than 200."

From these ideas sprang many churches, and as time has passed they have remained separate, cooperating mainly in the establishment of colleges such as Great Lakes Bible College in this area.

"Lift Off" is the theme of the vacation Bible School to be conducted July 30 to Aug. 4 from 6:45 to 8:45 p.m. in the United Assembly of God, 42021 E. Ann Arbor Trail, Plymouth.

The program will feature a recreation staff, a craft center, and learning sessions for children four to 12 years of age.

They'll Be Off Monday At DRC

The cry of "They're Off" will echo and re-echo through the vast grandstand of the Detroit Race Course Monday for the inaugural program of the Detroit Racing Association's 90 day meeting and there'll be a brighter, new look for the new season.

Determined to make 1973 a successful year in contrast to the sad meeting last year, Vice President and General Manager Dick Wilson has taken several steps to turn drab, darkness into what he hopes will be a bright future. With its face renovated and the daily racing program moved up an hour each day and to 1 p.m. on Saturdays

and holidays, the big mile track opens its 24th annual thoroughbred season with predictions of a banner year.

Post time for opening day will be 2:20 p.m., contrasted to the 3:20 p.m. start last summer. That's brand new. Then there are a new racing surface, a new outdoor pad-dock in which fans will be able to see the jockeys mount up, a team of championship Belgian horses will haul the starting gate from one post to the other and a brand new atmosphere probably most important of all.

"We hope to eliminate the dead period between races and to have something interesting going on at all times," said Wilson. "A good many of the trainers have ex-

pressed a desire to work out their horses between races instead of in the early morning.

"We believe this is the first time a track has presented the regular workouts during the daily program. It should keep patrons interested in what's going on. They'll have a chance to see new horses 'blowing out' in preparation for races later in the week.

The big mile track will present nine races daily with 10 on Saturdays and holidays.

The meeting will be highlighted by the 25th anniversary running of the \$100,000 added Michigan Mile and an eighth. The classic is listed for Saturday, Sept. 15.

Wrestling Clinics Set At Eastern

The seventh annual Huron wrestling clinics for high school students will be given at Eastern Michigan University from July 29 through Aug. 3 and from Aug. 5 through Aug. 10. Erik Pedersen, wrestling coach at Eastern, will serve as director of the clinics.

Students in grades eight through 11, are eligible. NCAA rules do not permit enrolling of graduating seniors. Students, grouped according to size and experience, learn and improve basic wrestling techniques.

A health form must be submitted with the application. An experienced athletic trainer is available at all instructional sessions.

Coaches are encouraged to participate and a limited number of board and room scholarships are available.

Complete cost of the clinic is \$70 which covers room, board, instruction, and insurance. Commuters may pay \$40 which includes lunch. Register with Director of University Conferences, Division of Field Services, Eastern Michigan University, Ypsilanti, Mich. 48197.

The big move of the runners and trotters gets under way next week in the Metropolitan Detroit area with the trotters moving from Northville Downs to Hazel Park Wednesday and the Detroit Race Course opening its 24th season Monday for the thoroughbreds.

Thus those residing in Detroit's east side will have their first view of the standardbreds and fans on the west side will have their initial chance to wager a bob or two on the runners.

At the moment more than 750 horses are quartered at the big mile track plant in Livonia and pacers and trotters are checking in from the

east, midwest and south for the Hazel Park opening.

There'll be a new post time at the DRC where Vice President and General Manager Dick Wilson has decreed that the daily nine-race program will start at 2:20 p.m. and the Saturday and holiday cards at 1 p.m.

The track started an early post for the daily races last summer but gave up after two weeks when wagering and attendance hit all-time lows. Despite that experience, Wilson has a firm belief that Detroit area customers will accept the earlier start.

He plans on following that policy for the entire 90-days but has to report to his board

of directors after a month and they may order a change back to the later daily post of 3:20 p.m.

"We realize we're taking a big gamble," says Wilson. "But anything will be better than last year. It is my firm belief that the early post will be accepted. It means patrons will be getting home in time for dinner on week days and they'll have plenty of time to get home and still go out for dinner on Saturdays and holidays.

"The early post has been in vogue at Canadian tracks for a long time and management there reports no complaints from its fans. Mich-

iganers are accustomed to the late afternoon start which started in the late '30s and then continued during World War II to give factory workers a chance to relax.

"There isn't any need for such starting times any more. Practically all get to the races in their own cars. With our new post, all can get home earlier and avoid the nightly complaint of the wife about having to hold up dinner."

Today (Saturday) finds Hazel Park closing its meeting with attendance down but wagering at a near record pace.

Heading the finale is the \$15,000 Au Revoir handicap with nine starters including two entries from the Basso stable and the P. L. Grissom and Son barn.

Ace Commander, with Larry Snyder, is the early choice in the mile and a 16th event. Ace Commander, trained by Pat Milligan, won earlier in the season against better competition over a distance.

This time the Ace faces such distance stars as: Master Ribot, Swift Passage, Tattle Mar, Toolin Around, Chief Cochise, Te V. Frolic, Sing Gold and La Song.

A crowd of more than 15,000 is expected for the "get away" program and wagering may better the season high \$1,700,000 of a week ago.

Out Northville Downs way, it appears as if harness racing fans will see history in the making since Mrs. Beatrice Farber, of Brighton, appears to have the driving championship all but wrapped up.

If she succeeds, it will mark the first time in North America that a woman driver has won a major championship. Bea has been the leader since the start of the meeting and appears to have cemented the title with three more wins during the week.

She did have a bit of bad luck when Easy Irv, the speedy four-year-old from the Farber stable, became ill with the virus and has been sidelined for the past three weeks. Easy Irv was only a fifth of a second off the track record in his last victory.

Tonight's program is topped by a \$5,000 invitational pace that could develop into one of the best events of the meeting.

It only drew six starters but the group includes all of

the fastest horses on the grounds.


Prince Knox, a seven-year-old which has been close in all recent starts, is the early choice. The Prince was nipped last Saturday by Ark Time in a tight duel.

"THIS GOOD EARTH"

Land use is possibly the most important segment of the ecological circle which surrounds us today.

While conservationists have been shouting about preserving forests and wild life, boating and fishing enthusiasts complaining about the quality of the waters and all of us who breathe criticizing the character of the air, the key to it all—land use—has largely continued unchecked.

"If the land is abused, those interested in ecology are not served," according to Fred Donner, a member of the board of the Citizens Council for Land Use Research and Education (CLURE). The Citizens Council is currently questioning the proposed extension of Northwestern Highway and has called for a halt in land acquisition until a proper environmental impact statement has been filed by the State Highway Commission.

"PROPER LAND USE controls the quality of land and water, the quality of the air, topography and the growth of flora and fauna. Obviously, if an expressway covers 100 acres of land then it is no longer ecologically sound," Donner said.

Donner, a resident of Franklin, recently headed a successful drive by "Mission Possible"—a group of Franklin residents—to get citizen authorization to buy four acres of land in the center of the village which was slated for development. By the required two-thirds majority plus 12 votes, 900 Franklin citizens voted to pass the ballot proposition.

posals which would mean an increase in taxes for all Franklin property owners.

The acreage, a sort of village green, is composed of a large hill which in winter is covered by sleds and in summer the romping play of small children. There is a ball field and a naturally wooded area. An historic house, the Hunter's Whip, Wellington Smith and is optimistic about buying the rest.

"While no one knew exactly what would be built there, some people had seen plans for condominiums on the hill; at one point a super market was proposed in place of the Hunter's Whip," Donner reported. Recently the Franklin Village Council purchased the major portion of the land from owner George Wellington Smith and is optimistic about buying the rest.

"UNTIL RECENTLY the ordinary citizen looked no further than his backyard fence," Donner believes. "Improper land use is caused by unrestrained developers, irresponsible city government and unconcerned private citizens.

"And the laws have not helped. One law requires notification of new building to owners who live within 300 feet of the property. Sophisticated planners as well as neighboring citizens know that the impact of a structure extends far beyond 300 feet, often for miles."

Donner points out that the recent defeats of the proposed Taubman shopping center in both Farmington and West Bloomfield were cases where citizens fully realized the tremendous impact such a center

would have upon their cities. "It further shows that citizens dedicated to responsible planning can make a difference."

"If we can have responsible planning in the suburbs, it may force the developers back into the cities where new building is needed," Donner continued. "A beautiful Taubman shopping center would be of tremendous benefit to the city of Detroit."

"When Southfield was built, it helped cripple the city of Detroit. Both SEMCOG (Southeast Michigan Council of Governments) and the Oakland County Planning Commission have reported that massive development further out would cripple both Detroit and Southfield."

"There is a 15 per cent rate of unoccupied office space in Southfield now," the CLURE board member continued. "More building such as along a proposed expansion of Northwestern Highway is absolutely unwarranted. If there's such a thing as planned obsolescence, that's it."


