School Millage Election Assured By Petitions

The petition drive to mandate a special school millage election for Aug. 20 has apparently been successful. As of Thursday morning, the Plymouth school board office reported some 2,250 petition signatures had been received and more were coming in.

The school board has said that the Aug. 20 election on a 1.5 operating millage increase would be canceled unless petitions bearing signatures of 10 per cent of the district's voters (2,177) could be presented by Monday, Aug. 13.

The count as of Thursday will apparently assure the election.

School Supt. John M. Hoben said he expects a total of perhaps 3,200 signatures to be certified by Monday night's school board meeting.

The board said it would determine whether to go through with the election at Monday's meeting. That meeting will be held at 8 p.m. at Plymouth-Canton High School.

The agenda for that meeting includes an item reading, "results of petition drive and confirmation of special election."

Hoben said the deadline for submitting petitions in time to certify them for the meeting is Monday and that the earlier they are turned in the

better the chances of certifying the signatures.

The only issue on the Aug. 20 school ballot is the 1.5 operating millage increase which would be for a term of five years starting with the 1973 school year.

After the same issue was rejected by the voters on June 11, the board voted to eliminate varsity athletics, performing music and other extracurricular activities from its 1973-74 school program.

The board has said, however, that it would not necessarily restore the program cuts the way they were even if the millage passes.

Also at Monday's school board meeting, the board will for the first time be able to see a list of candidates who have applied for the vacant school board seat.

The board last week agreed informally to open the appointment to the seat to any school district resident who applies.

The deadline for applications is 5 p.m. Monday.

Hoben said applicants should hand-deliver a letter of intent to Board President E. J. McClendon care of the school board offices.

The board has said it will keep the applications confidential and will make the appointment at a special meeting on Aug. 20.

State-Ordered Consolidation Vote May Follow Annexation Rejection

By rejecting a long-standing petition to annex a portion of Plymouth Township to the City of Plymouth, the State Boundary Commission has cleared the way for the consolidation issue.

Next in line behind the 1956 annexation petition, which was unanimously rejected by the Boundary Commission Wednesday, is a petition asking for the consolidation of the city and township. It was filed in 1970 by Dr. Gary Hall.

According to James Hyde, executive secretary of the Boundary Commission, the consolidation petition could be examined by the commission as early as the latter part of October.

The Boundary Commission's role is

first to determine whether the petitions are legally sufficient under the law. If they are, the commission sets an election in both communities on the issue.

It is at the discretion of the commission when to set the election and whether to include the election of charter commissioners on the same ballot.

That could mean a consolidation election this year.

Consolidation is the joining of two local governments to form a new city. A new charter must be written for which charter commissioners are elected.

This would mean that probably both the Plymouth City Commission and the Plymouth Township Board will soon examine the consolidation issue to decide what positions they will take

and whether they will contest the petitions at the sufficiency hearing.

At Wednesday's hearing on the annexation petition, Plymouth Township's attorney, Donald Morgan, argued that the petition was "inadequate" because of discrepancies in the property description, improper signatures on the petition and because the petitions excerpted several inapplicable portions of the Home Rule City act.

Morgan also questioned the Boundary Commission's authority to consider the annexation petition.

The Boundary Commission has maintained that a February State Appeals Court decision mandated that it consider the petition even though the township's Plymouth Heights incorporation issue is still unresolved.

Morgan maintained that appellate court decision would be overturned by the State Supreme Court.

Plymouth Mayor James McKeon spoke at the hearing and said the annexation petition — which was filed by former Plymouth City Manager Al Glassford — was "not germane to current times" and was "not in the best interest of the city or the township."

Herald Hamill, Plymouth Township's engineer, was also present at Wednesday's Boundary Commission hearing and testified that the property description errors in the petition were far larger than "allowable error."

Following the ceremony a reception was held at Behnan Hall in Southfield for 200 guests. During the reception

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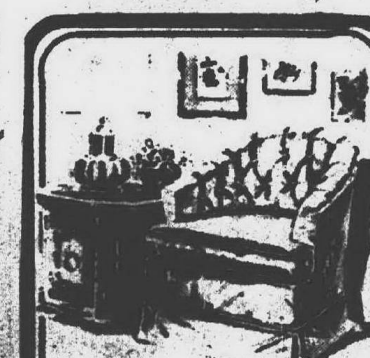

Postal Ruling Soothes Cantonites' Mail Gripes

CANTON
Residents of Windsor Park subdivision in Canton Township are temporarily satisfied with a postal ruling restricting their mail delivery to post boxes in front of each residence.

A group of residents from Windsor Park picketed the Plymouth branch of the post office last month protesting a ruling which resulted in part of the subdivision receiving door-to-door mail delivery and the other portion "motorized" delivery.

Originally, residents of the newest part of Windsor Park were directed by Plymouth Postmaster Gerald Mulligan to put mail boxes along the curb in clusters of four opposite the "firelane" side of the street.

After questioning Mulli-

gan's decision, the residents were allowed to put mailboxes in front of each residence but were told by postal

authorities that they won't receive door-to-door delivery.

The differences in mail delivery came after a postal ruling which prohibits door-to-door delivery to 60-foot lots built after November of 1972. The ruling was made in an effort to cut postal costs.

Since part of Windsor Park was completed prior to the ruling, those residents receive the convenient door-to-door deliveries while the newer residents receive mail delivered by truck.

"I can't say we are completely satisfied," said Betty Hamann, spokeswoman for the newer residents. "I think the ruling is an inequitable ruling. It is discriminatory and arbitrarily gives motorized service."

"If it's a question of the post office's own inefficiency,

and we're being made to pay for it, then it's wrong."

Mrs. Hamann said that she is writing U.S. Rep. William D. Ford (D-Taylor) to determine why the ruling was made.

She criticized Mulligan's handling of the Windsor Park service, saying he arbitrarily ordered mailboxes in clusters opposite the firelane side of the streets. Residents later were told that the subdivision doesn't have firelanes.

When asked why part of the subdivision won't receive door-to-door deliveries, Mulligan said, "I imagine for cost reasons. I don't know of any other reasons."

Although Mulligan said there are other Canton subdivisions with similar differences in mail delivery, he declined to name them.

Mrs. Hamann said Emil Asa, customer service director, personally came to the subdivision to investigate the problems before compromising and permitting mail boxes in front of each house.

"I honestly believe Asa treated us fairly, but I honestly believe Mulligan just wanted to get us out the door," she said.

Christian Day School To Open

By MARGARET MILLER

A new day school with "the principles of God and country" as its foundations will open Sept. 5 in the Forest Hills Church of Farmington.

Accepting 60 students for grades kindergarten through 12 and staffed by three full-time instructors and several aides, it will follow the curriculum of Accelerated Christian Education, a program developed in Texas five years ago.

Registrations now are being accepted. Interested parents may contact the church, located at 30623 W. 12 Mile.

Opening the school means fulfilling a dream long held by the Rev. Harold Beigle, pastor of Forest Hills.

He said he and others in his congregation, affiliated with the Missionary denomination, long have felt that "people need the principles of God and country, and our young people are not getting these in the public schools."

"We will teach patriotism and love and respect for country along with the ideas of Christian service," he added.

Rev. Beigle said he had been thinking about a school for some time when he was

first introduced to the Accelerated Christian Education program (ACE).

As he learned more of its aims and educational program, he said, he became convinced it was the program to use. ACE, he added, puts emphasis on individual attention to students, a non-graded class structure that permits progression according to the child's own ability, a Bible-oriented philosophy and family cooperation.

There are some 300 ACE schools in the country, he said, and by fall about 50 are



expected to be open in Michigan.

Assembling a staff, the pastor added, "came in such a way that we were sure the Lord was directing us."

Karen Jackman, who will be principal, lives in Durand, has taught in elementary school in Rochester and Co-runna for six years and has a master's degree in reading instruction and most of a master's in administration from Michigan State University.

"I was invited to take a position in an ACE school in Fowlerville last year," she said, "and turned it down. But in that year I followed the work of the school and saw such changes in its 52 students - in attitudes, dress and character as well as achievement" that I was sold on the program."

Mrs. Rose Hewett, a resi-

dent of Union Lake and a member of Forest Hills, and Mrs. Irene French of Flint will complete the staff.

Both are experienced teachers and both, like Pastor Beigle and others who will be connected with the school, have taken the week-long intensive training program given by ACE.

"We were a year and a half in search of the right staff," the pastor said. "That was important because we teach little by what we say, more by what we do but most by what we are."

The school will follow the Farmington School District school and vacation schedule, meeting each day from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., with a short day Wednesday. Classes will meet in a large room being readied at the church. Most children, from second grade up, will

have their own small "offices" for study, the pastor said.

Yearly tuition will range from \$500 for the first child in the family enrolled to \$150 for the fourth child. Kindergarten will be charged \$350 if they attend half days and \$600 for full days.

Physical histories and parental pledges of cooperation with the school staff are included in the application materials.

A dress code will be part of the school's policy, Pastor Beigle and Mrs. Jackman said. It will require skirts and dresses for girls and the

skirt lengths, the pastor said, will conform to the Biblical statement that "every genuine Christian should be modest."

The curriculum has been approved by the Michigan Board of Education, Rev. Beigle said, so entrance to college for graduates will be based upon performance in college board examinations.

"From what we have heard about the accelerated learning in other ACE schools," the pastor added, "we have reason to believe some of our students may be entering college at a sophomore level."

So far 30 definite enrollments have been received, the pastor said. The children come from all over the area and about half are from church families.

The curriculum will be largely standard with the most recent of educational aids used, Mrs. Jackman said. High school elective courses such as auto mechanics, Christian counseling, missions, typing and shorthand, Greek, German and music history will be offered.

There also will be competitive sports with other ACE schools in Oxford,

Brighton, Fowlerville, Highland and Lansing.

"The fact that our staff members are trained people who are cutting their salaries in half to teach here shows how much they believe in it," he added.

"Basically, we see a need to get back to the principles that founded our country. When the Pilgrims came, it was for the purpose of finding freedom, the liberty to teach their children in the way they felt was right."

"They did teach them - in home and school. That's what we intend to get back to."

Religion Update

Rev. Lester Kinsolving's

As if by fate, or, more appropriately, as if by epidemic, Hollywood has released not one, but two groovy gospels in the same summer: "Godspell" and "Jesus Christ, Superstar."

The former, "Godspell," according to America magazine's film critic Richard Blake, has "the veneer of religiosity" of a youth-cult Christ and his swinging disciples. Moreover: "This musical gospel is not Christ, but a nostalgic escape into lost childhood ... As for the resurrection, there is none ... According to this gospel of today, the memory of a dead Christ lives on only in the childlike spirit of his followers."

"Superstar" is a similarly tasteless travesty, which begs the question as to when the movie moguls will be fair enough to give Christianity a break by leaving Jesus alone.

They might, in fairness, consider producing such epics as "Mohammed The Swinger," or "Gautama Buddha Deserts His Wife and Children For A Bo Tree," which productions should market well in Saudi Arabia and Ceylon.

Hollywood's hippie Christ, however perverse, appears the lesser of two contemporary evils. The other: The current plethora of books, articles and even bumper stickers such as "Jesus: The Greatest Revolutionary In

History," which attempt to reintroduce the Prince of Peace as the Pancho Villa of Palestine.

For example, an Episcopal attorney named William Stringfellow has written:

"I say that Jesus was, according to the testimonies of the Gospels, a criminal ... the most dangerous and reprehensible sort of criminal ... so far as the established authorities and, in the end, so far as the people were concerned, the most loathsome of criminals ... Never has a man been apprehended, accused, tried, convicted, sentenced and executed of whom it may be more certainly avowed: He was guilty."

This extremist nonsense was published by a magazine called Christianity and Crisis, originally founded by famed theologian Reinhold Niebuhr. Of late, it has become so far left and so pro-Arab and anti-Israel, that Niebuhr's widow Ursula recently asked that her husband's name be removed from the masthead.

A refreshing antidote to this Jesus As Gunninger guerrilla theater has been provided by Prof. John T. Pawlikowski of Chicago's Catholic Theological Union. Writing in Christian Century magazine, Dr. Pawlikowski notes:

"That the theory of a General Jesus leading an armed resurrection in Jerusalem is hardly new - being been

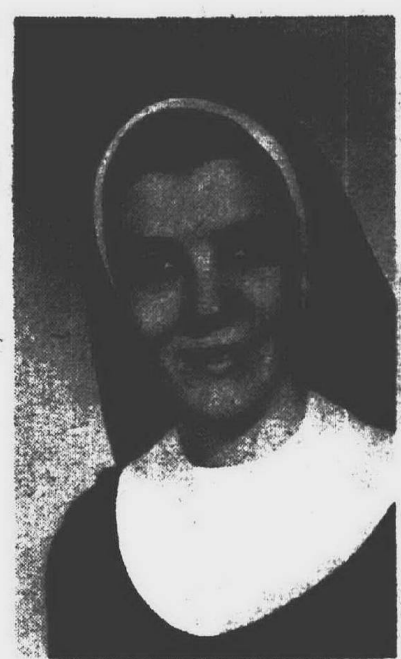
advanced by an Austrian scholar named Eisler, 44 years ago.

"That while Jesus may well have been mistakenly executed by the Romans as a supposed revolutionary, Jesus was dedicated not to the hopelessly impractical task of rebelling against Rome, but to reforming Rome's subordinate authority, the Temple priesthood of the Sadducees which he called 'a total religio-political system which oppressed the common man.'"

"That Jesus can hardly be imagined (and quite definitely not proven) as among the violent revolutionaries called Zealots, who 'were slitting Roman throats in the alleys of Jerusalem as the forerunners of a new, humane society.'"

Prof. Pawlikowski's contentions appear plausible in view of the fact that the only violence ever attributed to Jesus (which is mentioned in all four of the Gospels) was beating (not killing) of Sadducean Temple money changers - not Roman soldiers.

Moreover, Jesus does not appear to be remembered so much for wielding a whip as in being nailed to a cross. Here most of his followers believe that he won an eternal battle over the fear of death, rather than trying simply to win an ephemeral victory over one of the many, and comparatively humane, conquering armies that occupied the Holy Land.

CYO Alcohol Project Needs Volunteers

U-M's Yost Field House Recasting Into Ice Rink

Generations of Michigan athletes have used the facilities of Yost Field House but a new group will move in this fall as the 50-year old structure is undergoing a startling transformation. Starting in November, the nation's oldest fieldhouse will become an ice rink.

The renovation is all part of a several million dollar construction program which will eventually see a new fieldhouse, two intramural buildings and the conversion of the former ice rink into an intramural facility.

But the big story is Yost-as the Michigan hockey team's new home will hold 8,000 people, making it the largest college-owned rink in the country.

While the conversion of the fieldhouse heralds a great change, it will only add to the great tradition of Yost. The legendary Fielding Yost began construction on the fieldhouse in 1923 and the first event was held on Jan. 11, 1924.

The opening attraction was a basketball game between Michigan and Michigan State and the Wolverines triumphed by the "huge" score of 23-19.

Basketball was to become the main attraction in Yost but the facility also housed the Wolverine track team for 50 years and the wrestling team worked out there for many seasons.

Crisler Arena was built in 1967, track was left in the

venerable building by itself, except for periods when the baseball team would work indoors.

Strangely enough, while track established the longest tradition in Yost, there has never been a truly shattering performance in the fieldhouse.

No world records, no American records, just many Michigan marks and even not as many as would be expected. What makes that so ironic is that many of the nation's greatest Olympians, including Jesse Owens, DeHart Hubbard and Eddie Tolan, competed in Yost at one time or another.

To say that Yost had even considered using it for hockey

some day would probably be going too far. But the building is perfect for conversion to a rink. He was the same man who built Michigan Stadium with plans to increase its capacity to 100,000 and he was the man who built the first intramural building in the county.

In any case, Yost probably would be pleased with the change. Construction, change, new ideas and renovation were part of his makeup and he would have been delighted to see the great tradition of his building carried on beyond its first 50 years.

Spartan Football Work Beginning

Michigan State's football machine is warming up for a high gear start of fall drills on Monday, Aug. 27.

Coach Denny Stolz and his assistants have just moved back into an enlarged and redecorated suite of offices. Vacations are ending and those coaches here now are involved in daily meetings.

Spartan athletes are busily engaged in meeting requirements of a rigorous conditioning program laid down by coaches. Better than a dozen - Charley Baggett, Mark Niesen, Bill Simpson, Dave Brown, John Shinsky, Diamond Mays, Bob Mills and Clayton Montgomery, among them - are working on summer jobs in the Greater Lansing area and working out on campus in off hours.

The athlete ticket office reports sales are going well and an increase in attendance over last season is expected. State in 1972 averaged 66,443 people at its six home games, ranking it eighth in the country as a collegiate draw.

A major item of business for coaches right now is finalizing the roster of athletes to be invited back for early drills. The first event will be the annual Press Day in Spartan Stadium on Friday, Aug. 24.

There isn't any question that Dick Wilson, vice president and general manager of the Detroit Race Course, will try everything possible to better the economic conditions at the big mile track.

Wilson was convinced during the Wolverine Raceway harness racing season the introduction of the superfecta, which involves picking the first four finishers in a race in exact order, would help boost wagering.

It did exactly that and was one of the reasons why the track had the best season, handle and attendance, in the history of Michigan harness racing.

He thought the same gimmick would have a similar effect on wagering at the thoroughbreds but quickly learned those who follow the runners are a different breed from those watching the trotters.

In less than two weeks, Wilson noted the superfecta wasn't doing a thing for the thoroughbred meeting. So, he discarded the gimmick, placed the popular trifecta on the final race and added several perfectas.

Matter of fact, the DRC now has the daily double on the first two races and perfectas on the third, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh and a trifecta on the last race of the day.

"We made a fast check of patrons and discovered they liked the perfectas best of all and the trifecta next," said Wilson. "There never has been any question about the popularity of the daily double, so the answer is to give folks what they like—that's what we have done."

The change became effective Friday and will be the policy for the remainder of the 90-day meeting which ends in mid-November.

Spy Game A Failure For Newman's Newest

It's a shame that such a great talent as Paul Newman has let himself fall into mediocrity, but this seems to be the case in his latest film "The Mackintosh Man."

After doing such a fine job over the years in such films as "Hud," "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof," "Hombre" and "Hombre," Newman has opted for the cliché spy film with a weak script.

A John Huston production, the film is typical of other films where Newman plays the befuddled, easy-going spy who, in the end, solves the mystery singlehandedly. Although similar to "The Prize," this film lacks the impact of a surprise ending.

The viewer has discovered the crux of the plot before the film is half finished.

Also starring James Mason, Harry Andrews and Dominique Sanda, the film exploits Newman's blue eyes and sly quips ad nauseum. It hardly seems necessary to have anyone else of import included in the cast.

Mason, although a main character in the plot, appears infrequently. The same can be said for Andrews who plays Mackintosh. Andrews, a fine British actor, is best remembered for his role as the second mate to Captain Ahab in "Moby Dick."

Miss Sanda does an incredibly bad job of acting, continually maintaining a poker face whether it be in romanticizing with Newman or being threatened with death.

The story line revolves around Newman, who is intentionally put in prison by British intelligence in order to break up a spy ring. He participates in a break-out and ends up in an undisclosed hideaway for communist spies where his true intentions are discovered.

The rest of the movie results in a very typical chase scene naturally ending in death for the evil pursuers. All the time, Newman maintains his cool by making suave and cute remarks.
