\$20 Million Complex **Proposed In Township**

A 41-acre commercial and high rise apartment complex costing in the neighborhood of \$17 to \$20 million is proposed for the northwest corner of Plymouth and Haggerty roads in Plymouth Township.

The area lies between Haggerty and Edward Hines Park and runs north from Plymouth Road to the C&O Railroad tracks, taking in the former Burroughs Corp. parking lot.

The proposal calls for a 9.7 acre \$3-\$4 million shopping center fronting on Plymouth Road. Behind the center would be four eight-story apartment buildings housing a total of 852 one and two bedroom apartments and covering 31.4 acres. Their cost is estimated at \$14-\$16 million.

A public hearing on rezoning the area is scheduled for Wednesday, Aug. 29, before the Plymouth Township Planning Commission. The land now is zoned for heavy manufacturing.

The proposed complex is a joint enterprise of Hillside Building Co. and Realtex Industries, builders of both Diplomat Towers and Embassy Towers in Southfield and the \$5 million Michigan Bell Telephone Co. Fort Division headquarters in Livonia.

The group also is building Westland Towers at Wayne and Yale roads in Westland.

Tentative site plans allot more than 90 per cent of the residential acreage to landscaped open space.

"We're building not for cars but for people," said John L. Weeks of Realtex. His aim, he said, would be to blend with the adjacent parksite.

"We believe it is the best use of the property for all concerned," Weeks said.

Traffic from the commercial-residential complex should cause less trouble than the shift-change onrush from Burroughs or a manufacturing plant that might go up on the land if rezoning were denied, the developers said.

They expressed willingness to put in an additional lane of pavement along Haggerty to ease traffic conditions there.

School Tax Vote Monday

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. for Monday's special school millage election.

A proposed 1.5 operating millage increase for a five year period will be the only issue on the ballot.

The proposed increase would cost the average taxpayer with a \$40,000 house about \$30 a year.

On Monday night, the Plymouth school board voted to restore the more popular programs -- which had been cut from the budget -if the millage passes.

The school administration reminds voters to go to their school election precincts and not to those of their governmental unit.

Murder Charges Lodged Against 3 In Beating Death

Two men and a woman are being held in Wayne County jail in lieu of \$10,000 each charged with second degree murder in the beating death of Karl Godina, 19, in a Plymouth Township restaurant Thursday morning.

Awaiting pre-trial examination in Plymouth District Court on Aug. 27 are Terry Lee, 18, Henry E. Peer, 25, both of the Plymouth area. and Phyllis A. Williams, 26, of Livonia.

Addresses of the suspects and the victim were withheld by Wayne County sheriff detectives.

Detective Richard William son said Godina was severely beaten in a fight at the Palace Restaurant, 1507 W. Ann Arbor Rd. at about 2:45 a.m. Thursday. He was pronounced dead at St. Mary **Hospital**

had called the sheriff's department Thursday to let them know where she was. She had been the object of a search by sheriff detectives and Livonia police.

Williamson said "there were about 75 persons in the restaurant at the time the fight took place. "We still don't know what

the fight was about." the detective said.

"In questioning the witnesses, we have gotten many conflicting accounts. Some of those in the restaurant re-

fused to make statements." Godina had recently returned from California and was living in an apartment with a friend in Livonia, police said.

Williamson said Godina had been kicked and stomped on during the fight. Exact cause of his death is expected to be revealed following an autopsy.

Canton Building Exceeds Last Year

CANTON

"Canton Township, A Planned Community," says the sign in front of township offices located at Canton Center, and Cherry Hill Roads. If building permits are evidence of planned growth, the township has already this year exceeded the total growth of last year.

A building department report shows that total building permits through the month of July have exceeded building permits for all of last year by more than 100.

More than 1,400 building permits were issued through July of this year. Last year through July, 646 were issued, and a total of nearly 1,000 were issued for the vear

This year, 529 of the permits have been issued for single family residences and 101 permits were issued for multiple housing with 610

units. Last year, a total of 854 single family building permits were issued. Multiple housing permits totaled 126 with 893 units.



CANTON

A solution may be near for several Canton Township homeowners who have suffered with soggy backyards and leaky basements for over a year, but residents are skeptical about recent attempts to solve their problems.

A mistake in the initial grading is blamed for the sloping backyards that gather water at the boundary line behind homes on Point and Sussex streets in the recently - developed Canterbury Woods subdivision.

A subcontractor for the developer, Windsor Park Homes, apparently was misled by a catch basin and ignored the survey plan, grading the property in the wrong direction, according to township building inspector Chuck Thompson. Thompson was called by angered homeowners and has contacted the developer in an effort to resolve the dispute.

One resident, Mrs. Barbara Reed of 7470 Sussex, told the Plymouth Mail and Observer she has been trying to get the problem corrected, along with

several others in her home, since she moved in a year ago.

Soggy Yards Bring Complaints

"You're just chasing yourself when you try to work with these people," says Mrs. Reed. "We've got to catch them now or by next year Adler (William Adler, president of Windsor Park Homes) will be out of here and nothing will ever be done."

Mrs. Reed is among several residents in the subdivision who have put up with standing water and dying plant life since they purchased their modern homes. Another neighbor reports a leaking basement from water which seeps under the concrete patio, and yet another complains of the smell from stagnant water in her backyard.

"After a hard rain it takes a week of hot, dry, windy weather before the vard is dry enough for my children to play in," complained one resident who asked not to be identified.

At least two homeowners said they are contemplating legal action against thé builder.

Despite reports from township officials that he appeared willing to help,

Adler was unresponsive when asked about the problem by the Plymouth Mail and Observer.

"I'm just not going to say anything about it to you," Adler said in response to a question about his plans. "You can print that if you want to."

Township engineer Glen Roberts says plans have been discussed with the builder for the installation of drain tiles which would carry the water into a main sewer line. The township has provided Adler with a sketch of where the tiles should be placed, Roberts said, and another meeting will be held soon.

Roberts said recent heavy rains have added "a lot of extra tension" to complaints about drainage problems, but that he has no reason to believe that the problem won't be repaired.

"We have had other drainage problems out there and they have responded to the other complaints, although this is the most serious" says Roberts. "He has given us every indication that he intends to fix it."

Is Anybody Out There?

Is anybody out there?

You know, sometimes you feel like you're knocking your head against a wall.

This paper, as far as I know, has historically supported each request for school millage renewals and increases -- not because we think the schools should have a blank check - but because it takes money to educate our children properly.

I don't think that our support has ever been automatic. We review the proposals and the needs and weigh them to see if an additional dip into the taxpayers' pockets is really justified.

Thus far they have been:

We endorsed the 1.5 mill increase for operating purposes that will be on Monday's ballot back on June 11 when it was defeated.

It was obvious then to us - after studying the situation - that the increase was needed.

Now, in light of the more than 3,000 petition signatures which followed severe program cutting by the school board, at least some of the voters have reached the same conclusion we reached a while back.

But where were they on June 11? And more importantly, where will they be Monday?

The school administrators say they're optimistic about Monday's election.

But they said the same thing on June 11.

I'm not so sure that Monday's election will be a snap.

So we endorsed the millage increase again on Wednesday. But will it do any good?

School Board Member Marda Benson asked us Thursday to remind voters about the recent tax reforms approved for senior citizens a that would relieve much of their current property tax burden.

made a far-sighted decision when he decided he didn't want to be "a teeny bopper disc jockey" all his life. When he took over what is now the "Specs Howard School of Broadcast Arts, Inc." just under four years ago, admittedly "broadcast schools were not looked upon with Specs Howard Near-sighted wide favor.

Wide rayor. Specs and the two men he works with -- Dick Kernen and Richard Barnes -- are helping to dispel that image with the attuned, khowl-edgeable graduates they are turning out at their Southfield-based school. In a recent article by Detroit Free Press columnist Bob Talbert, a ref-erence to the school was made as: "How do you tell if the school is as reputable as the Specs Howard School of Broadcast Arts is repu-table among broadcasters?"

DEEPLY DEDICATED to giving his students "in-depth background to the art of broadcasting," Specs is turned off by the applicant who is interest in becoming "a cool jock." "We just won't take him," the warm, enthusiastic director warned. "We want our students to gain full knowledge of all phases of radio station operations."

Last year the school graduated 218 students. Specs reports that during the first six months of this year, they have accepted 107 stu-

year, they have accepted 107 stu-dents of 736 making inquiries. "We narrow the applicants down to the ones we believe have poten-tial. We're not speech therapists. Those we accept must have a good

succeed. "In broadcasting, particularly ra-dio broadcasting, your product is in your head," Specs continued. "Once the students have mastered the course material, they are limited only by their creativity, imagination and self-confidence. "We work very digently to build confidence and ego factors. We tell students that unless you believe in you, no one else will."

The course, which runs six months, is 20% theory and 80% practical. According to Specs, this is diametrically opposed to college and university mass commu-nications courses which are 80% theory and 20% practical. **"When our students graduate, they've been through the fire."** What he refers to is "Project" in which students spend the last 13 weeks in a workshop where they must do everything required to put a show on the air. The grand finale is an actual full day of programming where "the tape never stops run-ning."

"If there's dead air, then that's what there is," Specs said. When Project is finished they are totally aware of what a regulation radio aware of whis station is like.

If you choose extended range cassettes -- a "low-noise" tape --you should have noise-free results without that annoying hiss that sometimes mars an otherwise ex-cellent recording. HOW MANY CASSETTES to take? That depends on how much recording you are likely to do. Make sure that there is a blank cassette in the machine ready for use when you leave, and try to have at least three spares in the luggage. It is better to take more than nec-essary rather than find that you have run out of tape just as the most interesting sounds present themminutes, thirty on each side; a C90 has forty-five minutes a side giving an hour and a haif in all and a C120 gives a full hour's program time on each side. Some form of simple table stand is necessary. These are usually sup-plied with the equipment and they enable the microphone to be sup-ported on a table or other surface leaving your hands free. If lost or forgotten, a make-shift stand from a piece of bent wire or stout card-board will do. **TAKE SPECIAL CARE OF THE MICROPHONE.** It should be pro-tected from dust, so slip it into a small polyethelene bag. If a sepa-rate container or wallet is provided for carrying it, make quite sure it cannot become detached and lost. There is nothing more useless than a recorder without a microphone. This is an adjustment that can easily be forgotten in the excitement of the moment. But you will soon find out why many people feel that sound recording is much less trouble than taking photographs, and much more interesting. to keep the microphone well away from the recorder itself. If they are too close together you will pick up the mechanical noises of the ma-chine as well as the sounds you really want. Some recorders have a facility called an "automatic gain control." When this is present you do not have to worry about the intensity of the sound as the recorder looks af-ter itself, on other machines the "recording level" has to be adjusted by hand so as to avoid distorting the WHEN PLANNING next year's vacation try putting "cassette recorder" high on the list of things to take. Easy to use and light in weight, the cassette recorder offers the means to take an endless succession of "sound snapshots" of the family, the friends one meets, the local in-habitants, the band on the beach or the singer in a bar, the voice of a guide, the cries of vendors in the street market, aircraft taking off, Another precaution when trav-eling out of the country is to insure that you have a plentiful supply of quality blank cassettes and extra batteries with you. Both these items can be surprisingly expensive in some overseas countries.
