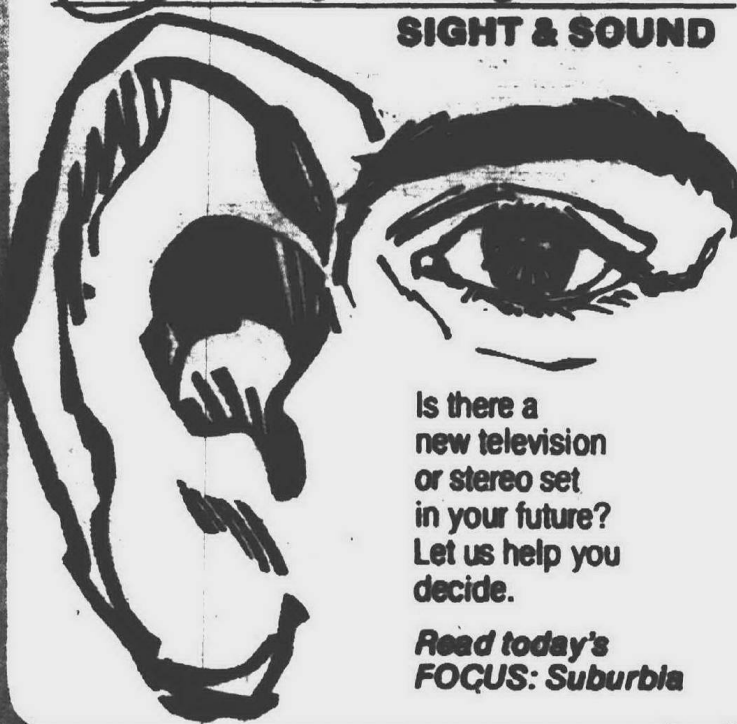

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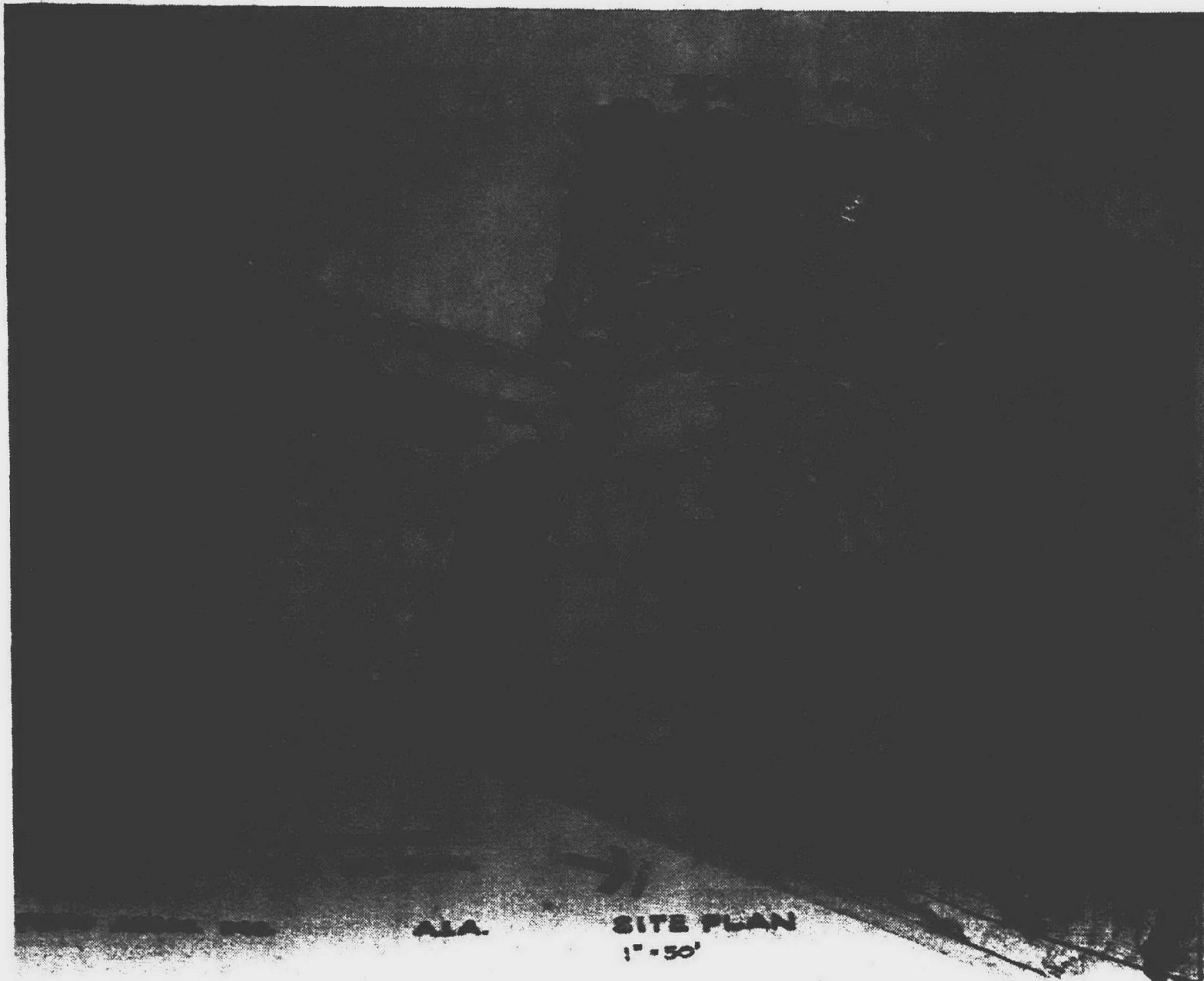

Police, FBI Follow Clues In 2nd Recruiter Bombing



THE TALLEST BUILDINGS in the Plymouth area will rise on the northwest corner of Plymouth and Haggerty roads if the town approves this proposed commercial-residential complex. It would be the township's

biggest construction project as well. The plan calls for erection of four eight-story-plus-penhouse apartment buildings behind a commercial shopping center.

\$20 Million Complex Proposed In Township

A 41-acre commercial and high rise apartment complex costing in the neighborhood of \$17 to \$20 million is proposed for the northwest corner of Plymouth and Haggerty roads in Plymouth Township.

The area lies between Haggerty and Edward Hines Park and runs north from Plymouth Road to the C&O Railroad tracks, taking in the former Burroughs Corp. parking lot.

The proposal calls for a 9.7 acre \$3-\$4 million shopping center fronting on Plymouth Road. Behind the center would be four eight-story apartment buildings housing a total of 852 one and two bedroom apartments and covering 31.4 acres. Their cost is estimated at \$14-\$16 million.

A public hearing on rezoning the area is scheduled for Wednesday, Aug. 29, before the Plymouth Township Planning Commission. The land now is zoned for heavy manufacturing.

The proposed complex is a joint enterprise of Hillside Building Co. and Realtex Industries, builders of both Diplomat Towers and Embassy Towers in Southfield and the \$5 million Michigan Bell Telephone Co. Fort Division headquarters in Livonia.

The group also is building Westland Towers at Wayne and Yale roads in Westland.

Tentative site plans allot more than 90 per cent of the residential acreage to landscaped open space.

"We're building not for cars but for people," said John L. Weeks of Realtex. His aim, he said, would be to blend with the adjacent parkside.

"We believe it is the best use of the property for all concerned," Weeks said.

Traffic from the commercial-residential complex should cause less trouble than the shift-change onrush from Burroughs or a manufacturing plant that might go up on the land if rezoning were denied, the developers said.

They expressed willingness to put in an additional lane of pavement along Haggerty to ease traffic conditions there.

They also mentioned a proposed widening of Plymouth Road from four to five lanes.

Eventual completion of I-275 and the M-14 expressway running about two miles north of the development site will draw away some of the present Plymouth Road traffic, Weeks said.

Sixty per cent of the residential complex, as now visualized, would be devoted to one bedroom apartments and the balance to two bedroom. Rentals would start at about \$200.

Immediate rezoning approval would permit start

of construction in the spring, Weeks said, and occupancy in about three years.

In asking for swift rezoning approval, the developers called time "an essential element" in their plans, primarily because of "deteriorating money market" and growing interest rates.

The FBI and State Police have joined the Plymouth Police Dept. in investigating Friday's bombing of Plymouth's U.S. Army Recruiting office for the second time in six weeks.

The bombing, which occurred at 4:02 a.m. Friday, caused some damage to back windows of shops in the northeast corner of the central municipal parking lot. The recruiter's office is upstairs at 819 Penniman Ave.

Plymouth Police Chief Timothy Ford and FBI spokesman Tom Robinson said they are following up several leads provided by witnesses to the bombing and the bomber's apparent getaway.

Investigation of a similar bombing on July 3 produced no suspects, police admitted.

"As differentiated from the earlier case, we've got something to work on this time," Ford told The Plymouth Mail & Observer.

Both bombings have been claimed by a group calling itself The People's Revolutionary Army of North America.

The group also claimed responsibility for a July 3 attempted bombing and a successful bombing Friday of a

Navy recruiting office in Jackson.

Letters from the revolutionary group were sent to the Jackson Citizen Patriot and the Detroit Free Press after each bombing attempt.

Since Friday's bombing in Jackson occurred at 4:30 a.m. and Plymouth's was at 4:02 a.m., this indicates that more than one person is probably involved, Ford said.

The FBI said Friday afternoon that pipe fragments from the July 3 and Friday's Plymouth bombings match. They indicate the bomb was a lead pipe which uses low yield black powder.

The bomb fragments are being studied at the Michigan State Police crime lab in Plymouth.

On May 26, 1971, the Plymouth Selective Service office was damaged by the explosion of a small pipe bomb. That bombing has never been solved.

The police are also studying the letter sent by the group in connection with the recent bombings.

The letter headed "People's Revolutionary Army of North America Communique No. 3" and received by Detroit Free Press

School Tax Vote Monday

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. for Monday's special school millage election.

A proposed 1.5 operating millage increase for a five year period will be the only issue on the ballot.

The proposed increase would cost the average taxpayer with a \$40,000 house about \$30 a year.

On Monday night, the Plymouth school board voted to restore the more popular programs -- which had been cut from the budget -- if the millage passes.

The school administration reminds voters to go to their school election precincts and not to those of their governmental unit.

Murder Charges Lodged Against 3 In Beating Death

Two men and a woman are being held in Wayne County jail in lieu of \$10,000 each charged with second degree murder in the beating death of Karl Godina, 19, in a Plymouth Township restaurant Thursday morning.

Awaiting pre-trial examination in Plymouth District Court on Aug. 27 are Terry Lee, 18, Henry E. Peer, 25, both of the Plymouth area, and Phyllis A. Williams, 28, of Livonia.

Addresses of the suspects and the victim were withheld by Wayne County sheriff detectives.

Detective Richard Williamson said Godina was severely beaten in a fight at the Palace Restaurant, 1507 W. Ann Arbor Rd. at about 2:45 a.m. Thursday. He was pronounced dead at St. Mary Hospital.

Lee was arrested by Plymouth police as he ran out the back door of the restaurant when he saw sheriff deputies approach.

Peer was arrested by deputies in the restaurant.

Miss Williams was picked up in Livonia Thursday afternoon. Williamson said she

had called the sheriff's department Thursday to let them know where she was. She had been the object of a search by sheriff detectives and Livonia police.

Williamson said "there were about 75 persons in the restaurant at the time the fight took place."

"We still don't know what the fight was about," the detective said.

"In questioning the witnesses, we have gotten many conflicting accounts. Some of those in the restaurant refused to make statements."

Godina had recently returned from California and was living in an apartment with a friend in Livonia, police said.

Williamson said Godina had been kicked and stomped on during the fight. Exact cause of his death is expected to be revealed following an autopsy.

The three suspects stood mute when arraigned Thursday afternoon before District Judge Richard Valois of River Rouge.

Judge Valois is handling cases for the various districts while the district judges attend the annual state convention on Mackinac Island.

Firemen To Host Waterball Classic

CANTON at 1 p.m. Sunday at Canton High School.

The Canton Township Fire Dept. will be taking on several other western Wayne County fire departments in the annual Waterball Classic.

The three-year defending champions will again host the event that tests water pressure and accuracy as rival teams attempt to push a ball onto their opponents' territory with high pressure nozzles.

The teams square off for two three-minute bouts to a round, with each winner playing another until a champion is found.

Two years ago the Canton men defeated 11 teams to win the trophy.

The event, which will be held in the school parking lot, is free to the public.

Planning Commission OKs Initial Garber Farm Plan

PLYMOUTH The farmhouse at Plymouth Township's historic Garber farm will remain a local landmark, but the farm itself is likely to become Walnut Creek subdivision in the near future.

The Township Planning Commission Wednesday voted unanimously to approve and recommend to the township board a tentative preliminary plat for the development submitted by Thompson-Brown Realty, purchasers of the 55-acre site.

Ralph Garber's white farmhouse and red barn have been landmarks for decades.

The barn was site of the township's founding ceremonies.

Some 40 to 50 residents crammed the commission meeting in the tiny board room to demonstrate their concern about the fate of the farm and to insure that the development would complement the area. Most of the audience was made up of residents of the bordering Glenview and Beacon Hill subdivisions.

They were relieved to learn that no actual rezoning was being sought for the farm, and that density would correspond to that in surrounding area.

The site is currently zoned for single-family dwellings on half-acre lots, and the commission recommended granting a special residential unit development (RUD) option for that zoning classification, which will allow the developer to decrease the size of some lots in return for preservation of common areas of open space.

Representatives of Thompson-Brown said that approximately eight acres on the eastern side of the property would be dedicated as a common area, to be encumbered against any future development.

The area roughly corresponds to the flood plain of the Tonquish Creek which runs through the farm, and will be unchanged except for the addition of asphalt walkways and creation of a small creek-fed pond.

Under the RUD option, Thompson-Brown will be permitted to reduce by as much

as 20 feet the 120 foot frontage requirement on some individual lots in order to preserve the park area.

In addition to the undeveloped common area, the Garber house and barn and their site will be reserved from the development and left in their existing state. The exact method of preserving the property will be formalized when Thompson-Brown presents its final plat for approval. A larger barn and outbuilding further from the Garber farmhouse are slated for removal.

The seven acre woods in the southwest corner of the farm will also be developed for individual homesites, but the "overall wooded area" will be maintained by "selected cutting and trimming," according to H. Charles Cremin of Midwestern Consulting of Ann Arbor, an engineering consultant for Thompson-Brown.

Cremin said a variety of house styles would be used in the wooded area to fit in with the existing topography for a minimum of tree removal. Slides of existing Thompson-Brown developments were shown to illustrate the type of buildings intended.

A U-shaped roadway with entrance and exit on N. Territorial Rd. will be the only access to the subdivision, except for the extension of Bonnybrook Drive from the Glenview subdivision to connect with the Walnut Creek roadway. Asphalt walkways will be constructed throughout the project, corresponding to the road in many areas.

The extension of Bonnybrook was a main bone of contention for surrounding homeowners, who otherwise appeared calmed by Thompson-Brown's presentation.

Clement Bommarito of 12972 LeBlanc, a spokesman for the Glenview homeowners, urged that the driveway be dropped as a means of increasing lot size along the border between the Glenview subdivision and the proposed development.

The average width of lots on the eastern edge of Glenview is 160 feet, compared to approximately 100 feet for those in Walnut Creek.

William W. Bowman, executive vice president of Thompson-Brown, assured homeowners that the com-

pany would be glad to eliminate the through street if approval could be obtained from the Wayne County Road Commission. He urged the Glenview homeowners to seek vacating of Bonnybrook themselves, and was assured by Bommarito "you take care of those lots and we'll take care of the street for you."

Bommarito was among several homeowners to thank Thompson-Brown for its conservation plan and for not seeking a higher density or multiple family development, commenting that the developer "has saved us the trouble of another petition drive. We have had three or four already this year."

Commissioner James Griffiths' motion for approval of the tentative preliminary plat contained several conditions in response to suggestions from township planning consultant Norman Dietrich and the demand from Glenview homeowners that the lot width bordering Glenview be increased.

The resolution calls for Thompson-Brown to investigate the possible elimination of the Bonnybrook thoroughway and to reduce

"by at least one lot" the lot division along the Glenview border.

Thompson-Brown officials insisted on making up the dropped lot in another area of the subdivision, and Bowman told commissioners that the development was "very much marginal from our standpoint" in its current state.

"We have tried to work within your ordinance, which I think I can fairly say is a highly restrictive one," Bowman said, "and as far as I am concerned we have done our best."

"Frankly, I had expected a better reception from the neighbors than we have received."

Commission Chairman Russell Ash told Bowman that his reception was far from negative.

"Having been through a lot of these meetings," Ash reflected, "let me say that you should feel gratified at this audience compared to many we have seen."

Thompson-Brown must now prepare a final plat for approval by the commission before seeking final approval from the Township Board.

Historic House To Be Saved

PLYMOUTH

The old Amrhein house on the Plymouth Township Recreation site has apparently been spared from demolition, and will be moved.

After two weeks of maneuvering by a Plymouth Township man, Doug Cash, and Township Supervisor J.D. McLaren, the question of whether the house should be razed was brought before the township board Tuesday night.

The board had voted some time ago to have the buildings, including the house, on the recreation site demolished.

McLaren authorized a demolition company to proceed, and at that time Cash came forward asking to be allowed to move the house across Ann Arbor Trail to a lot he owns.

The township building inspector James Briggs was asked to inspect the house to issue a moving permit. He recommended denial of the permit based on his inspection and that of the building inspector from another community.

Cash claimed that he was being discriminated against. McLaren denied it, and said he was simply following through with the board's directive.

At a meeting late last week between Cash, McLaren and State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth), it was agreed to take the matter back to the township board.

At Tuesday's meeting the board voted 6-1 to allow the house to be moved providing Cash post a bond guaran-

teeing the building would be restored to "habitable" conditions within 1 1/2 years.

It is also expected that cost of the demolition to the township will be reduced because the quote had included the cost of tearing down the house.

Trustee Gerald Burke voted against the measure, saying he thought it was illegal for the township to sell property without a vote of the residents and that by getting a lower price for the demolition, the township was in essence selling the house to Cash.

Several persons attended the board meeting to support Cash's efforts.

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Canton Building Exceeds Last Year

CANTON More than 1,400 building permits were issued through July of this year. Last year, 646 were issued, and a total of nearly 1,000 were issued for the year.

This year, 529 of the permits have been issued for single family residences and 101 permits were issued for multiple housing with 610 units.

Last year, a total of 854 single family building permits were issued. Multiple housing permits totaled 126 with 893 units.

Soggy Yards Bring Complaints

CANTON A solution may be near for several Canton Township homeowners who have suffered with soggy backyards and leaky basements for over a year, but residents are skeptical about recent attempts to solve their problems.

A mistake in the initial grading is blamed for the sloping backyards that gather water at the boundary line behind homes on Point and Sussex streets in the recently developed Canterbury Woods subdivision.

A subcontractor for the developer, Windsor Park Homes, apparently was misled by a catch basin and ignored the survey plan, grading the property in the wrong direction, according to township building inspector Chuck Thompson. Thompson was called by angered homeowners and has contacted the developer in an effort to resolve the dispute.

One resident, Mrs. Barbara Reed of 7470 Sussex, told the Plymouth Mail and Observer she has been trying to get the problem corrected, along with

several others in her home, since she moved in a year ago.

"You're just chasing yourself when you try to work with these people," says Mrs. Reed. "We've got to catch them now or by next year Adler (William Adler, president of Windsor Park Homes) will be out of here and nothing will ever be done."

Mrs. Reed is among several residents in the subdivision who have put up with standing water and dying plant life since they purchased their modern homes. Another neighbor reports a leaking basement from water which seeps under the concrete patio, and yet another complains of the smell from stagnant water in her backyard.

"After a hard rain it takes a week of hot, dry, windy weather before the yard is dry enough for my children to play in," complained one resident who asked not to be identified.

At least two homeowners said they are contemplating legal action against the builder.

Despite reports from township officials that he appeared willing to help,

Adler was unresponsive when asked about the problem by the Plymouth Mail and Observer.

"I'm just not going to say anything about it to you," Adler said in response to a question about his plans. "You can print that if you want to."

Township engineer Glen Roberts says plans have been discussed with the builder for the installation of drain tiles which would carry the water into a main sewer line. The township has provided Adler with a sketch of where the tiles should be placed, Roberts said, and another meeting will be held soon.

Roberts said recent heavy rains have added "a lot of extra tension" to complaints about drainage problems, but that he has no reason to believe that the problem won't be repaired.

"We have had other drainage problems out there and they have responded to the other complaints, although this is the most serious," says Roberts. "He has given us every indication that he intends to fix it."

For 125th Anniversary:

Whitman & Barnes Celebrates

PLYMOUTH James Polk was president and Queen Victoria still reigned when the parent company of Whitman and Barnes of Plymouth was founded in 1848.

The local manufacturer of cutting tools will celebrate its 125th anniversary this Sunday with a celebration at its Plymouth Road plant.

The guest list for the day-long celebration includes Gov. William Milliken, U.S. Sen. Philip Hart (D-Mich.), U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor) and Plymouth Township Supervisor J.D. McLaren as well as business and community leaders and representatives from the media. Fourteen retired staff members will be honored guests.

"Optimism for the future" is the theme of the anniversary, according to Vice President and General Manager C.L. Boring.

Whitman and Barnes, which produces cutting tools and drills for industry and employs some 400 persons in its Plymouth facility, is a division of United Greenfield, itself a division of Thompson-Ramo-Woolridge, a Cleveland conglomerate.

The company was born in 1848 in Fitchburg, Mass. when Albert Page established himself in the manufacture of knives and other cutting equipment.

Augustus Whitman joined in 1854, and Barnes came along as part of a consolidation in 1877. The firm con-

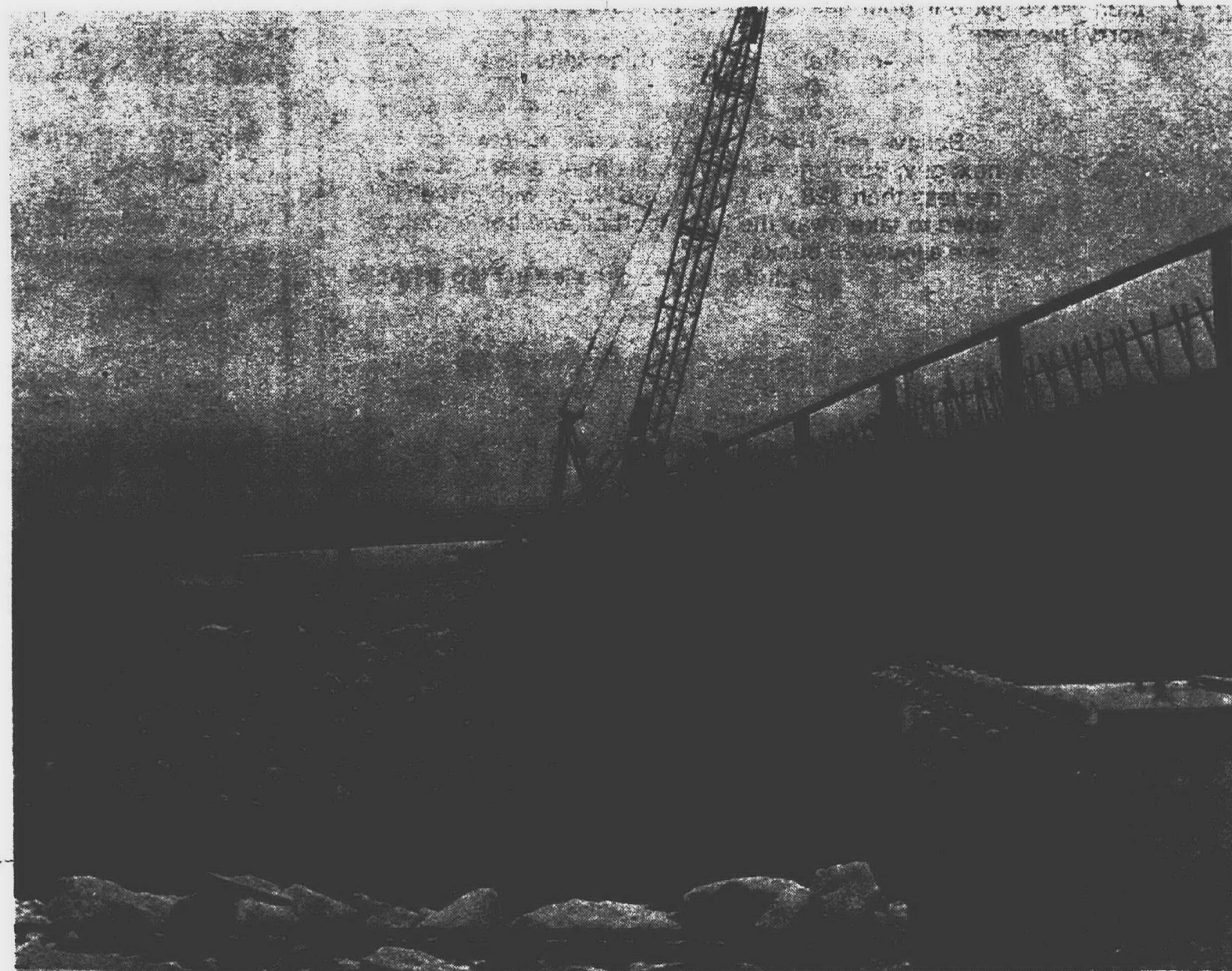
tinued to grow and went through a series of mergers and consolidations which led to a centralization of oper-

ations in Detroit just after World War I.

The Detroit plant on Fort Street proved too small for

the growing operation after World War II, and the present plant was opened in Plymouth in 1949. A quarter

million square feet on one floor comprises the base of operations at 40600 Plymouth Rd.

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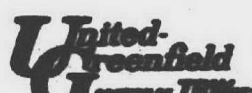

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'Right To Be Born' Offers Pregnancy Aid

A volunteer group, organized in February and centered in northwest Detroit, is offering help for problem pregnancies.

"Right To Be Born - Pregnancy Aid, Inc." may be reached through a telephone service listed in that name.

Leaders are Mrs. Richard Snyder and Mrs. Edward Snyder, both of the Gesu Catholic parish in Detroit.

A report on the group stated it was organized be-

cause "much of today's demand for abortion is based upon economic, medical, psychological and sociological difficulties encountered by pregnant women."

"To help alleviate these genuine human needs, Right To Be Born, Inc., was organized Feb. 26, 1973," the statement added.

Leaders said the group is non-profit and non-denominational and that services are available without charge

to all women with a problem pregnancy regardless of creed, race, color, national origin or marital status.

During its early months it processed more than 100 telephone calls, gave 20 pregnancy tests and opened case files on 38 pregnant women.

Some of these were given financial assistance, some referred to clinics and some placed in private homes.

Right To Be Born concerns itself with pregnancy confirmation, pre-natal care, confinement care, legal aid, financial aid, temporary housing or employment and educational aid, the statement said.

It said it does not dispense or provide contraceptive information.

The service is staffed completely by volunteers, and more are needed to continue the work.

Most volunteers work for three hours a week in the office and some handle night telephone calls from their homes, relaying them to the volunteer on duty at Mt. Carmel Hospital.

Other volunteer duties include speaking engagements, clothing and furniture collection, fund raising, publicity and driving.

Helping Catholic parishes in the Northwest Wayne Vicariate "move forward with both individuality and unity" is the aim of the recently installed vicar.

The Rev. John Edward Smith, pastor of St. Priscilla parish, 19220 Purlingbrook, Livonia, took over the vicar's post July 1 and was installed formally by Bishop Thomas Gumbleton July 17.

He is the third vicar for the area, following the Rev. Thomas Cain in the position. His term will run for three years.

"It's not a position of authority," he said. "It's rather one of leadership. The role of the vicar is to get people in various parishes working together and working with other groups in the community."

Each parish, Rev. Smith explained, has four commissions—administration and finance, worship, education and Christian service—and the same commissions exist at the vicariate level.

"Those involved in the worship commission work, for example, can work with the vicariate to learn about the variations in worship services available," he said.

"Then they can take these ideas to their own parish so that they are carried through in the right way."

"For those working in education, there are the possibilities of adult education with several parishes cooperating and also the possibilities for ecumenical Bible schools—different faiths can work together there because certainly the Bible is the same for all."

"It's a direct line of communication with the cardinal, giving him a chance to get his ideas to the people and

also giving them someone closer who can receive their ideas."

Changes in the Catholic church in recent years give the vicariate and its leader "a great opportunity," he said.

"What we are trying to do," he added, "is to try to make that move a realistic and reasonable one and to encourage independence but not autonomy."

"Parishes should work out the programs that suit their individual circumstances," he said, "but these programs should not cut them off from the central church."

"The Catholic church is, after all, concerned with unity. Catholic in one sense means oneness."

Change in the church, the vicar said, always is viewed in two ways.

"There always is a group that wants the status quo and feels uncomfortable with any new way of doing things. I don't discredit these people; they were trained that way."

"Then there are those who feel changes come much too slowly."

His own feeling, Father Smith said, is that "changes are coming at a reasonable rate."

"To those who want no change, I would point out that there are some things that must be different because our world is different," he added.

"And I urge those who

want to move forward faster to be patient."

In taking over leadership of the vicariate that includes Livonia, Plymouth, Northville and Redford Township, Father Smith has the backing of his own parish.

"I had considered it before," he said, "and the St. Priscilla Parish Council asked me not to accept. This time, when it came up, the

council thought it could be worked out well, even though we are preparing to begin building in about three weeks."

Vicariate work will take some extra time, he said, "but I'm signed up for a speed-reading course at Schoolcraft College to get me through the reams of papers I have to read."

Father Smith grew up in

Dearborn and studied at Sacred Heart Seminary in Detroit and St. Mary of the West at Norwood, Ohio.

He was ordained in May 1949, and has been at St. Priscilla since June of 1968.

Daniel Morrison, head of the lectors at St. Priscilla, participated in the installation service. Music was furnished by the church's organist, choir and guitar group.

Religion Update

It was without a doubt the most unusual church bulletin in modern ecclesiastical history.

How many other church bulletins have been printed on sandpaper?

It was mailed from the venerable (founded 1723) First Parish Unitarian Church in East Bridgewater, Mass., and it advised that minister Paul John Rich's Sunday sermon topic would be "The Abrasiveness of Life."

Rev. Rich, an elfin young Harvard alum, has an absolute genius for generally hilarious abrasiveness.

He had hardly arrived in 1962, for example, when he publicly proposed to a generally thunderstruck populace (8,000) that the town change its name, so as to honor early town father Miles Standish.

"Besides, some people refer to us as East Bilgewater!" he remarked cheerily and apparently oblivious to the massive Yankee resistance.

Then there was the matter of the mural, a 25-yard history of the town which was installed just in front of the church, adjacent to the town common (city square). This intrigued everyone - initially.

Then, someone asked about one of the scenes in the town's early history, which showed a young boy seemingly wrestling with a pig. "Oh, that was the boy that the town fathers burned at the stake for beastliness," explained history-buff Rich. "At least they didn't burn the sow!"

Almost immediately after

arriving here, Rev. Rich made the discovery that the town common had been owned by his church for 240 years. On this common is the large Civil War memorial in front of which the local American Legion post has for years been holding Memorial Day services.

On Memorial Day of 1972, however, the Legionnaires were rendered near - apologetic by the large granite tombstone which Rev. Rich erected just five yards from the Civil War memorial.

"VIETNAM...AN AMERICAN TRAGEDY... AN APOLOGY FOR WHAT WE DID."

Also enraged by this unique memorial was Boston's Admiral J. C. Wylie, who abruptly canceled a concert by the U.S. Navy Band, which was scheduled for the bandstand on Rich's Unitarian Common.

Undaunted, Pastor Rich substituted his church's own excellent 25 - piece brass band - which opened the concert with "Anchors Aweigh."

This rousing number, announced Rev. Rich, was dedicated to Admiral Wylie, because: "I guess after you've been told you're God for 20 years, you begin to believe it!"

Rich's congregation has grown from 10 to 200 and the church's property from one to 15 buildings, on 200 acres.

Most of these buildings are combination museums (including perhaps the world's most extensive Boy Scout museum) and residences for the elderly, giving the area the appearance of a cross be-

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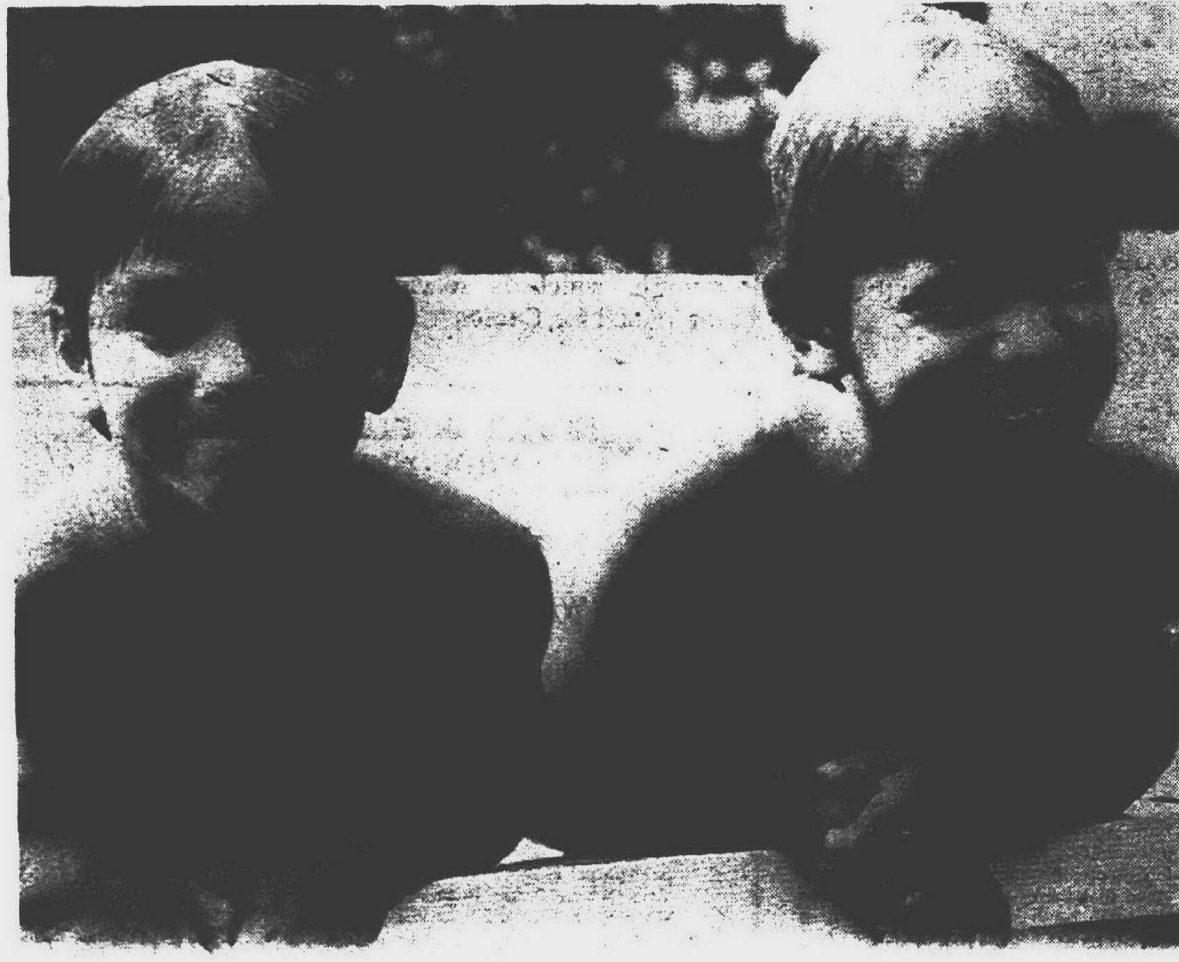

The Stroller: On Tipping

While the shouts of protest over the shortage of beef, the high price of gasoline and the spiraling cost of food-stuffs are reverberating across the country, it seems rather strange that no one has yet raised a voice against the old American custom of tipping that also has boomed to new highs.

Started as a minor reward for good service, tipping has become a way of life, and few persons now realize that every time they dine out or are given some sort of service, the tipping is raised automatically.

This old American custom of giving away your money is finally being recognized, and it may not be long until there is a revolt in our better establishments.

When it began as an idea of rewarding persons for a bit of extra attention, it was customary to make the tip five per cent of the total bill. From here it jumped to 10

per cent in the last decade and now, in the better social circles, the "unwritten law" is 15 per cent. And it is rapidly getting out of hand.

For a time, some of our better establishments didn't permit tipping of the help. In fact, suitable notices were placed on all dining tables that tipping wasn't allowed.

But when our economy changed and the minimum wage law went into effect, the "no tipping" placards were removed and tipping became a part, if not all, of the servant's wages.

The Stroller hadn't paid too much attention to this hidden drain on a fellow's purse until the other evening when a friend at the next table pointed to the figures on his bill and said:

"Imagine that. They charged me \$1.50 for a martini, then added eight cents state tax. Now, with the 15 per cent tip, the drink cost me about a buck, eighty.

This has got to stop sometime."

"What are you squawking about?" came the low voice from another table.

"I have just entertained a few friends for dinner and look what I got. The price of the drink was half enough, but the entire (with drink - when available - soaring the \$10 mark) seemed out of this world.

"Just a dinner for four and my bill is 40 bucks, plus tax. Now what do I do? Tip 15 per cent, and the so-called gratuity is six bucks at least."

The diner didn't raise his voice in protest, but the fact that the "accepted tipping policy" of 15 per cent amounted to \$6 seemed entirely out of line.

At the risk of having soup spilled down his neck at the next sitting, The Stroller can't help feeling that it is time to call a halt to these high gratuities.

Why should waiters and waitresses be given 15 per cent of your dining bill regardless of what type of service they give?

The present cost of dining out is high enough without paying someone an extra fee just to serve the meal.

Your employer— in the shop or in the office— doesn't boost your weekly check 15 per cent, just because you did your duty.

Why should the waiters and waitresses be in a special class?

There was a time when these persons in the black uniforms and white aprons worked for tips only. Then a fellow could reward good service. But when it became an accepted practice that a fellow paid five, then 10 and now 15 per cent, the custom is getting out of hand.

It's a funny thing, too, that when reasons are given for the rise in the cost of living, all things are mentioned except tipping. Yet, this custom raises the cost of living as much as anything else.

At least it should be recognized, and then folks would see how far out of hand what once was a nice custom has become.

Canton Township May Start Charge For Rescue Runs

CANTON Residents and non-residents alike may be charged in the future for rescue runs administered by the Canton Township Fire Department.

Following a monthly report by Fire Chief Melvin Paulun, the township board directed him to investigate the possibility of charging residents of Canton Township for rescue runs.

The township presently charges non-residents \$25. Such funds collected go into the township's general fund; however, Paulun said the department has difficulty in collecting the fees.

Other communities such as Wayne and Plymouth who charge residents also have difficulty in collecting the fees, according to Paulun.

Private ambulances would charge between \$35-40 plus mileage. "We couldn't put a price on our runs because some take more manpower," said Paulun. "The \$10 charged residents of some communities wouldn't cover the cost, though."

Although Paulun denied the charge would be a nuisance fee, he admitted the charge would "help in a sense from receiving more calls."

About 85 per cent of the runs are for township residents.

"It would help persons realize that they could go in cars if they weren't too bad," he continued.

The idea of charging for rescue runs arose during the township's last board meeting when, under questioning by Supervisor Phil Dingeldey, Paulun told the board many of the rescue runs made by the department are made for drug overdoses.

"It seems silly that we have to go around and pick these guys up," commented Dingeldey. "I think the board ought to put a little charge on this."

Trustee James E. Poole concurred with Dingeldey and added, "We should separate humanitarian runs from stupidity or their own lack of will power."

A member of the audience said a drug overdose was the same thing as a rescue run for drunkenness, and the board agreed.

"What is the difference in the cause of humanitarianism," asked Trustee E. Brian Schwall. "What if a guy didn't look before crossing the street?"

"If you were the one who hit him, you would still be guilty," replied Dingeldey.

Who's Afraid Of The 'Regionalism' Wolf?

EDITOR'S NOTE: This article is condensed from *Region*, a publication of Metropolitan Fund, Inc., a research and education foundation, and reprinted with permission.

The six counties of southeast Michigan have many problems which are regional in scale and must be solved at the regional level.

There is great economic and social interdependence of citizens within the six counties upon each other and upon many communities in each individual's life. Many citizens work toward the necessary decisions to pick the most appropriate alternatives for southeast Michigan. At the same time, there are citizens who are extreme in their opposition to the entire concept of regionalism.

In the process of their opposition, they have taken many liberties with truth, have dispensed distorted and twisted information, have created what they call "fact" where no such "fact" exists.

In an attempt to clear up the sorts of distortions, misinformation, half-truths and non-truths being spread by

some people in southeast Michigan, this newsletter will categorically respond to the points being raised by the more vocal anti-regionalists.

They say: "You want to create an additional layer of government."

Reality: To divide responsibilities among appropriate levels of government is not really creating anything new or additional, and certainly not creating more government, as inferred.

When the original colonies and states of this nation formed the United States of America, they formed that federal government to handle certain problems which were more logically to be handled by a larger level of government, problems which they could not handle as individual local governments. national defense, a monetary and currency system, a postal system, etc.

When states created, under the "home rule" concept, our cities, townships, and villages, school districts and counties, they did so in order that certain problems which were very local could be handled by the most appropriate level of local government.

Now we have problems which are regional in scale. In the best traditions of this nation's ability to respond to new dimensions of problems, the assigning of certain responsibilities to a regional agency, for dealing directly with regional problems, is not inconsistent in southeast Michigan.

They say: "Metropolitan government is a communist plot to take over this nation, beginning with the major cities and their surrounding metropolitan areas."

Reality: In the first place, "metropolitan government" is one extreme version of regional problem solving which some political scientists have talked about in the past. Under the concept of "metropolitan government," local government would be eliminated in favor of one, large single government.

Almost no one involved with the regional movement argues that such a system would be either desirable or feasible in southeast Michigan, or any other metropolitan area in this country. The attempt to make "metropolitan government" mean the same thing as regionalism is a typical propagandist ploy.

"Metropolitan government" is simply one of many, many alternatives for regional governance and is not, by any means, the only alternative considered.

The concept of automobile is not the same as "hot rod" any more than the concept of regionalism is the same as "metropolitan government."

As to the "communist conspiracy" argument, no evidence is ever offered by the purveyors of this theory, largely because no evidence exists, because there is no such reality.

They say: "Metropolitan government is an effort to steal power from black people in Detroit just when black people are about to gain control of the city government."

Reality: Again, the attempt to make "metropolitan government" synonymous with any regional problem solving process is badly distorting the circumstance.

Eliminating any local government, including Detroit, is not a logical way to deal with regional problems. Every local government, including Detroit, has its own local elected officials. A regional agency which could

take responsibility for specific and certain regional problems would, in fact, strengthen local government by allowing local governments to devote their full energy and resources to the providing of local services.

They say: "Regionalism is just a way to save the City of Detroit at the expense of the suburbs."

Reality: Nowhere in history can one find a good example of the survival of the metropolitan area when the central city died. The central city provides the heart of a region, and the region can no more survive without its heart than can the human body.

Regionalism is a concept which embraces the interdependence of all citizens in the southeast Michigan region upon each other and the interdependence of all communities in southeast Michigan upon each other.

It is absurd to believe that suburbanites may turn their back on the City of Detroit and literally let it die without paying tremendous costs as a result.

More than 220,000 suburbanites earn their living daily in the city...hundreds of

thousands of suburbanites travel into the city for cultural and recreational experience ... 110 suburban school districts sent busloads of children to the Art Institute and Historical Museum last year...

Many thousands of suburban citizens receive vital health care in the medical facilities located within the City of Detroit, and will continue to do so in an even more important way as the giant medical center complex is completed in downtown Detroit.

Regionalism is an attempt to define those services and facilities which are regional in scale and whose cost and support should be spread throughout the region, and not borne by any one community at the expense of other communities.

They say: "Planned communities and new towns are part of a conspiracy with state and federal government to move poor and black families into suburban communities."

Reality: A look at the real estate section of newspapers will show that there are more than two dozen "planned communities" de-

veloping in southeast Michigan.

Only a couple of those communities have made provisions for low-income housing in which poor people could live, either black or white.

There are many who believe that that is a weakness of those planned communities, that in fact, one appropriate answer to the housing problems of this region would be to make it possible for poor people, black or white, to live throughout the region, rather than being crammed into the central city of Detroit.

While many would consider the lack of such provision a weakness of those planned communities, it is obviously absurd to accuse the developers of those planned communities of being part of a plot to do exactly what they are not doing.

They say: "SEMOG is supposed to be a voluntary organization, yet when Macomb County decided not to join SEMOG, it was cut off from all federal funding as a penalty for not belonging."

Reality: Despite the fact that Macomb County is not a member of SEMOG, as

many believe it should be, in the year 1972 SEMOG reviewed positively 40 applications requesting \$5,264,113 for communities in Macomb County for federal funding and did not give any negative reviews to such applications.

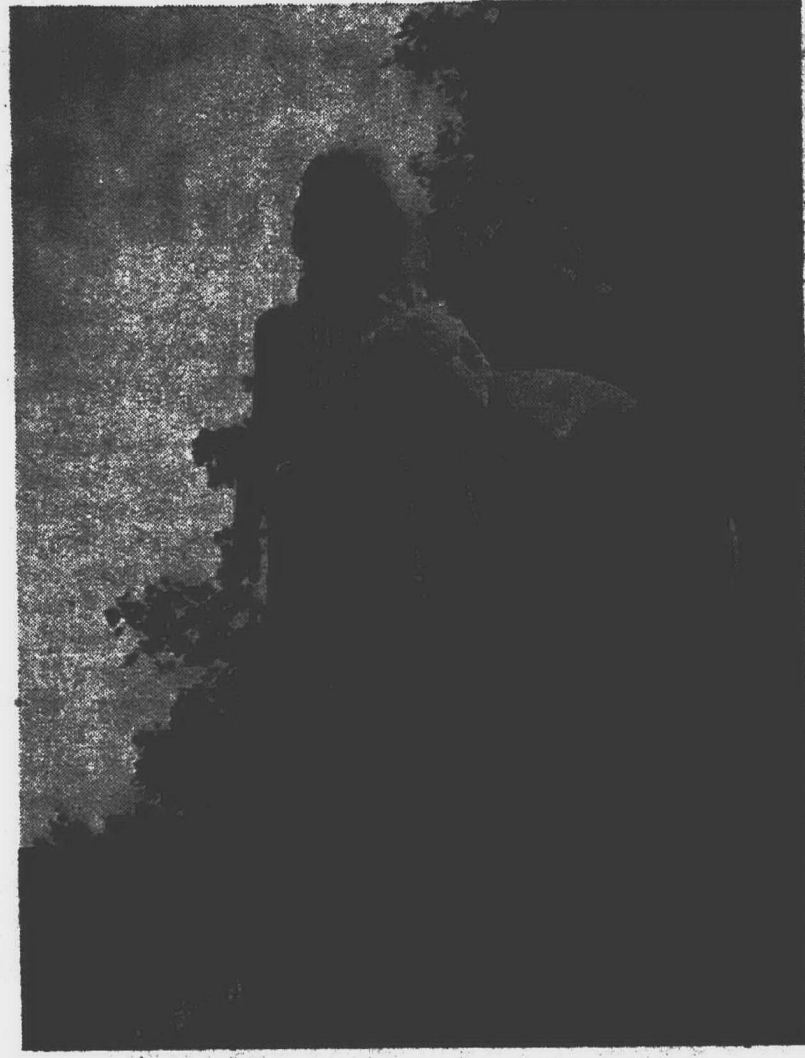
So far in 1973, nine applications requesting \$880,842 have been reviewed, again all positively.

They say: "We have nothing in common with the City of Detroit, so why should we and Macomb County be forced into a regional agency with Wayne County and the City of Detroit?"

Reality: In fact, 69,486 wage earners from Macomb County travel into Detroit and Wayne County each day to earn a living. That represents 32.3 per cent of the wage earners of Macomb County.

Those 69,486 citizens of Macomb County would apparently disagree with their county officials that they have nothing in common with Detroit and Wayne County.

Communities in Macomb County have worked hard to attract business and industry to their cities and townships for the resulting tax revenues.

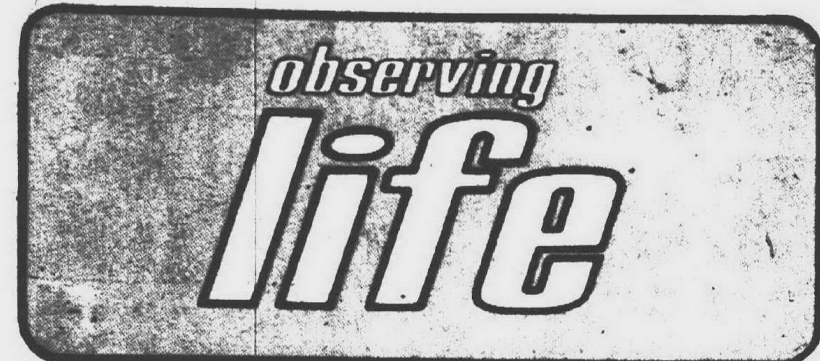

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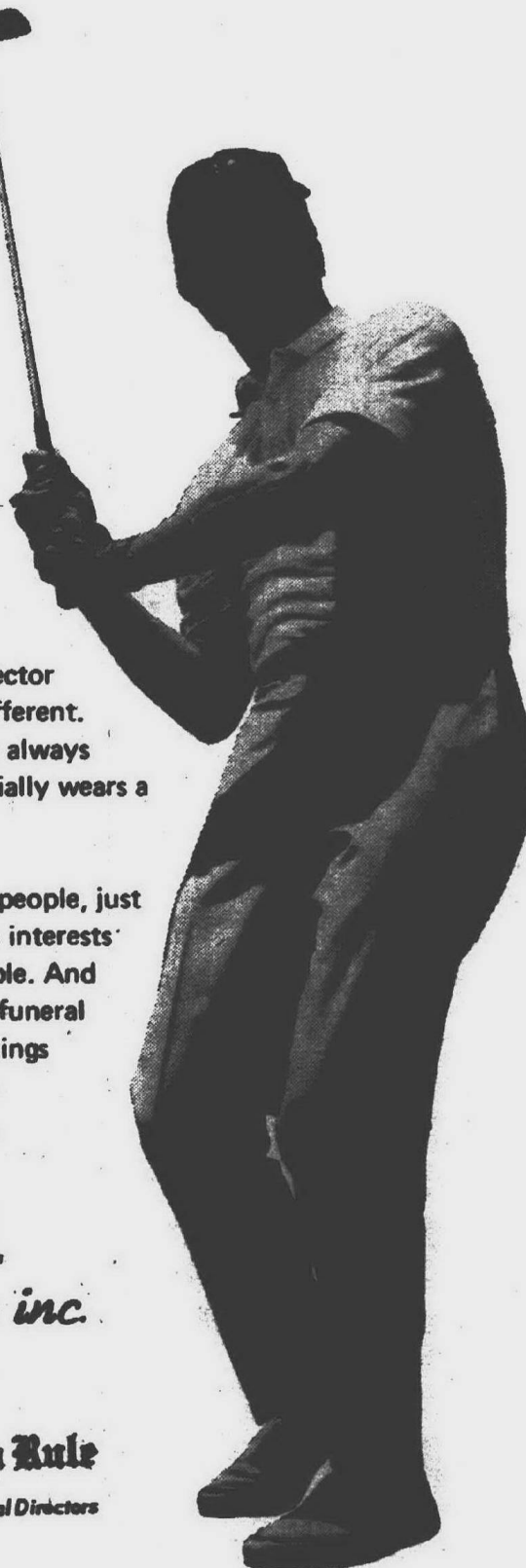
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Redford Adray Wins First 2 In Johnstown, Pa.

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Turf Tips, Quips

With business and attendance showing daily gains, management of the Detroit Race Course is looking forward to one of the biggest Saturdays in Michigan this year when it presents the \$10,000 Michigan State Fair handicap today as the top event on the 10-race card.

A week ago the big mile track handled almost \$1.4 million with a crowd of more than 14,000 in the stands. That was one of the top days of the Michigan season which began in mid-March.

It also was very promising to DRC officials who inaugurated a 1 p.m. post, earliest ever in the state, and have been watching the public reaction for the past two weeks.

From the way things have been going to date, it appears as if patrons are strong believers in the early Saturday start but are still a bit skeptical about the 2:30 p.m. post on week days.

Be that as it may, the turnstile count has picked up each day of the past week and wagering is inching up towards figures of two and three years back.

Last season was one of the most disastrous in DRC annals and led Vice President and General Manager Dick Wilson to decide some radical and major changes would be needed to revive interest in the track's programs.

Nothing could have been more drastic than the decision to advance the post time from 3:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. on week days and from 2:30 p.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturdays.

Traditionally the Detroit tracks had twilight races on week days, going back to the middle '30s when folks became accustomed to attending programs after finishing work at the automobile plants in mid-afternoon.

This time schedule was maintained through World War II and for some reason it wasn't changed. Thus patrons never did get a taste of early afternoon racing and just took it for granted that programs started at 3 p.m. and later and ended at dusk and in late fall and early spring under the lights.

Now, after only two Saturdays, they have had a touch of the 1 p.m. Saturday post and they like it. For instance, just a week ago, the final race was over before 5:30 p.m. and thousands were on their way home for dinner in plenty of time to attend other events in the evening.

THE PACERS and trotters open Thursday night at Jackson Raceway but in the typical style that has marked his operation over the years, President and General Manager Leon Slavin will start activities a few days early with an open house Sunday afternoon.

"We had open house programs annually until a couple of years back," said the genial Jackson boss. "We are reviving it again to show fans the improvements we have made during the summer."

"There'll be activities for those from 9 to 11 and a program that should hold the interest of all throughout the afternoon."

Slavin has arranged some exhibition races with Phil Mauger handling the mile. Members of the Jackson staff will be on hand to explain the fine points of racing. The starter and starting gate will be available for the exhibition races which will be used by drivers and trainers to qualify horses for the regular programs.

All in all it figures to be a big day and a big boost for the Jackson races starting the following Thursday.

EARLY "UNOFFICIAL ODDS" on the Hambletonian classic for three-year-old trotters slated for Aug. 29 at DuQuoin, Ill. show Clarence Gaines' Gold Cup and Dexter Cup winner Knightly Way as the 2-1 choice.

There isn't any wagering on the \$137,000 stake but those in charge came up with early odds.

Castleton Farm's Colonial Charm, a standout contender earlier in the season before going off form, is the fourth choice at 6-1. The filly dominated several stakes early in the summer but hasn't been able to stay on gait in recent starts.

The filly Florida is rated at 4-1 and the gelding Flirth at 5-1. Honeysuckle Rose is rated at 6-1 for the most prestigious Triple Crown and Big Five trotting stakes.

The sea-saw battle for the North American harness racing drivers leadership finds Herve Filion, the defending champ, locked in a deadheat with Buddy Gilmour at 198 victories each.

Still in the thick of competition is Joe Marsh Jr. with 182 firsts and Walter Paisley with 176.

Greg Wright, the Canadian star who has been a standout at Windsor and also drives at Wolverine and Hazel Park Raceways, ranks ninth in the top 10 with 142 triumphs.

Bea Farber, the Brighton driver who became the first woman to win a driving championship at a major harness racing meeting at the recent Northville Downs season, will campaign at the Jackson meeting.

Bea and her husband, Charlie, ship in and out from their Brighton farm, to all of the Michigan tracks. On this basis she'll have some of her horses racing at Hazel Park and others at Jackson.

Incidentally the outstate track is one of her favorites. She started her racing career there four years back. Bea will be on the open house program Sunday.

She'll be interviewed by Announcer Phil Mauger and also will drive in the qualifying races during the afternoon.

In addition she'll try for her first major victory at Hazel Park Saturday night when she has Easy Irv in the \$7,500 invitational pace.

The field of seven includes: Shaway Lad, Final Decision, Blu Fireball, Shady Mile, winner of the invitational in the past two Saturdays, Banner Ranger and Skipper Gene Marx.

The program also lists a pair of preferred paces with eight going for \$6,400 and nine for \$6,000.

Whitener will announce the rules and regulations, set the entry fee for both meets and begin accepting entries next Wednesday.

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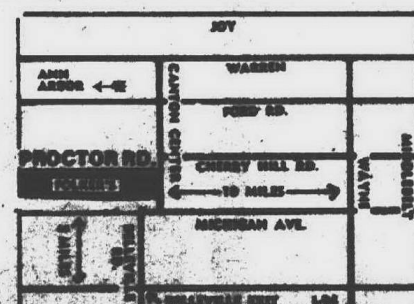
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Michigan's place in the bowling spotlight was emphasized again during the past week when both the professional women's association and the men's top competitors stopped off on their annual tour.

Emotions Are Jilted In 'Graffiti' Movie

There's a line from an early '60s song that proclaims "life could be a dream." The new movie "American Graffiti" examines in a fun, yet painfully nostalgic script why it could be if everyone remained a teenager in 1962.

Written and directed by George Lucas, the film cleverly chronicles a night's events for a group of teenagers who are about to step into the unknown world of adulthood.

Because of the wild antics, it is an enjoyable movie for anyone, but should be especially enjoyable for those who were young and in love with the whole world in the early '60s.

Full of slang, souped up cars (even an Edsel) duck tail haircuts, and all the "cool" sounds of the day, the film reveals a world of teenagers who were yet to experience the assassination of a president and a controversial war.

Lucas magnifies this innocence throughout until dropping in the subtle remin-

der of what happens when teenagers step into that very real world of adulthood.

There are enough real characters so the viewer will be able to identify with someone. The story is woven around Richard Dreyfuss, Ronny Howard (Opie from the old Andy Griffith TV show), Paul Le Mat, and Charlie Martin Smith.

Howard and Dreyfuss are confronted with the decision of whether to stay in the little "turkey town" or go east to school to find fortune and fame. Dreyfuss takes on the role of the heavy intellectual, while Howard portrays the all-American letterman.

Le Mat is the most convincing as the 22-year-old who drives the fastest car on the strip, but realizes under all of the bravado that he really doesn't belong. This point is enunciated by the contrasting figure of Mack-

enzie Phillips, who portrays a 14-year-old brat who burns a ride for the night to go cruising through the drive-ins and the streets.

The funniest of the group is Smith, who portrays the typical young guy of the group. He admires everyone older than himself and consequently finds plenty of trouble in his attempts to emulate his friends. Sidekick Candy Clark does a magnificent job as the flaky blonde who initiates Smith into the fun life.

Viewers will be delighted to watch this very untypical first date. Smith's borrowed car is stolen, his attempt at buying liquor is squelched, and he is soundly beaten by the town toughs. All along, Miss Clark keeps reminding him of what fun it is to be a teenager.

The peripheral characters woven into the story are just as interesting as the main characters because of their

success at revealing this age of innocence. There are the sock-hop fans, car freaks, street gang members, and even a few adults and police.

The music is cleverly woven into the plot through an old time West Coast disc jockey favorite, Wolfman Jack. Coming on with that strange disc jockey style so popular then but now extinct, he plays the favorites all night long. Fans of that time will enjoy hearing tunes they haven't heard for years such as "Sixteen Candles," "Teen Queen," and what else but "Good Night, Sweetheart."

Unlike "Summer of '42," there won't be a sequel. Lucas has wisely chosen to reveal in dramatic fashion the fate of his players. But, the message is written on the wall when Howard proclaims at the beginning of the movie, "You can't stay 17 forever."

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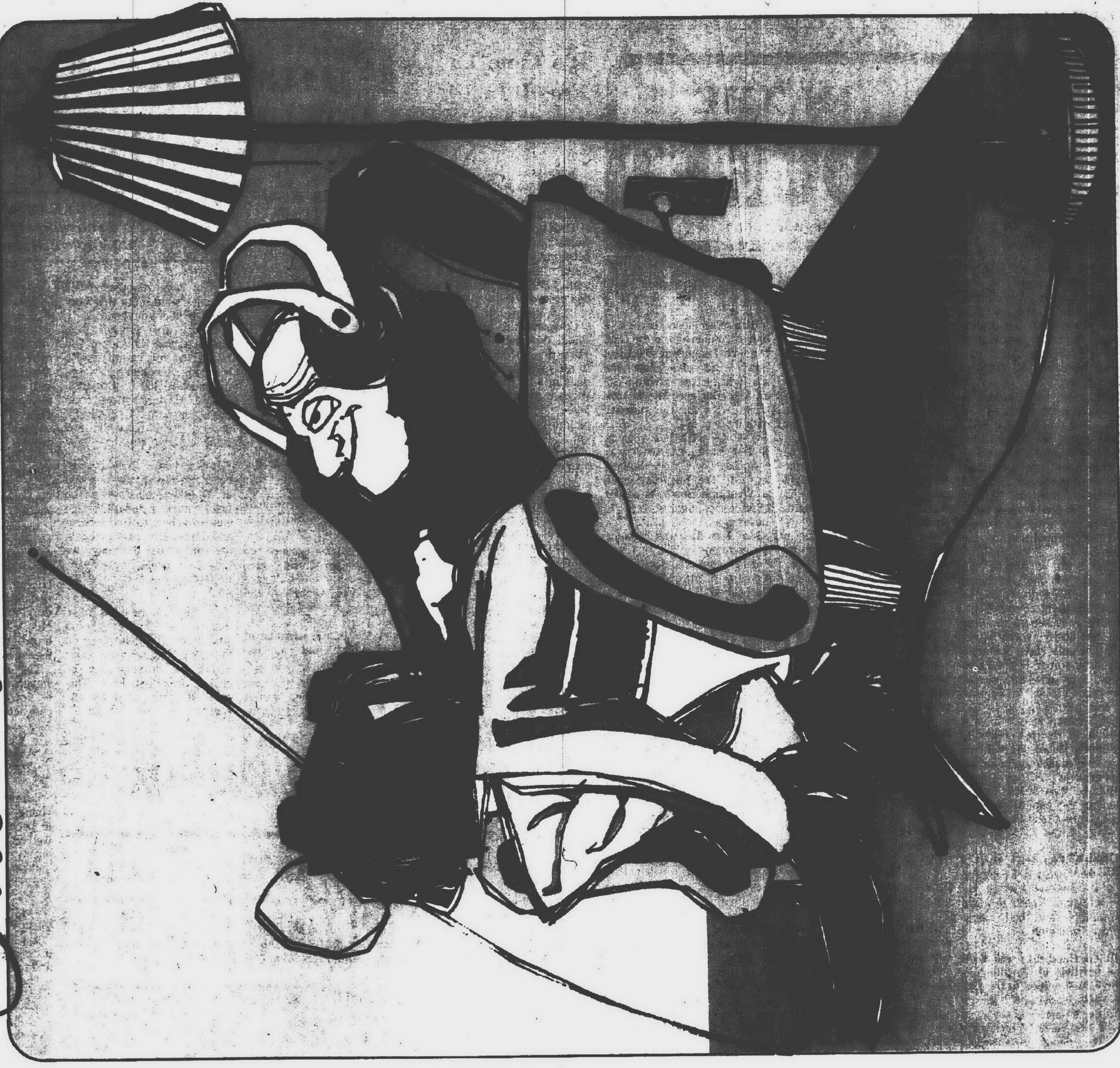
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SPECS HOWARD:

Former Disc Jockey Trains Students In Broadcast Arts

Near-sighted Specs Howard made a far-sighted decision when he decided he didn't want to be "a teeny bopper disc jockey" all his life. When he took over what is now the "Specs Howard School of Broadcast Arts, Inc.," just under four years ago, admittedly "broadcast schools were not looked upon with wide favor."

Specs and the two men he works with -- Dick Kernan and Richard Barnes -- are helping to dispel that image with the attuned, knowledgeable graduates they are turning out at their Southfield-based school. In a recent article by Detroit Free Press columnist Bob Talbert, a reference to the school was made as: "How do you tell if the school is as reputable as the Specs Howard School of Broadcast Arts is reputable among broadcasters?"

DEEPLY DEDICATED to giving his students "in-depth background to the art of broadcasting," Specs is turned off by the applicant who is interested in becoming "a cool jock." "We just won't take him," the warm, enthusiastic director warned. "We want our students to gain full knowledge of all phases of radio station operations."

Last year the school graduated 218 students. Specs reports that during the first six months of this year, they have accepted 107 students of 736 making inquiries. "We narrow the applicants down to the ones we believe have potential. We're not speech therapists. Those we accept must have a good

normal speaking voice, good basic intelligence and a great desire to succeed.

"In broadcasting, particularly radio broadcasting, your product is in your head," Specs continued. "Once the students have mastered the course material, they are limited only by their creativity, imagination and self-confidence."

"We work very diligently to build confidence and ego factors. We tell students that unless you believe in you, no one else will."

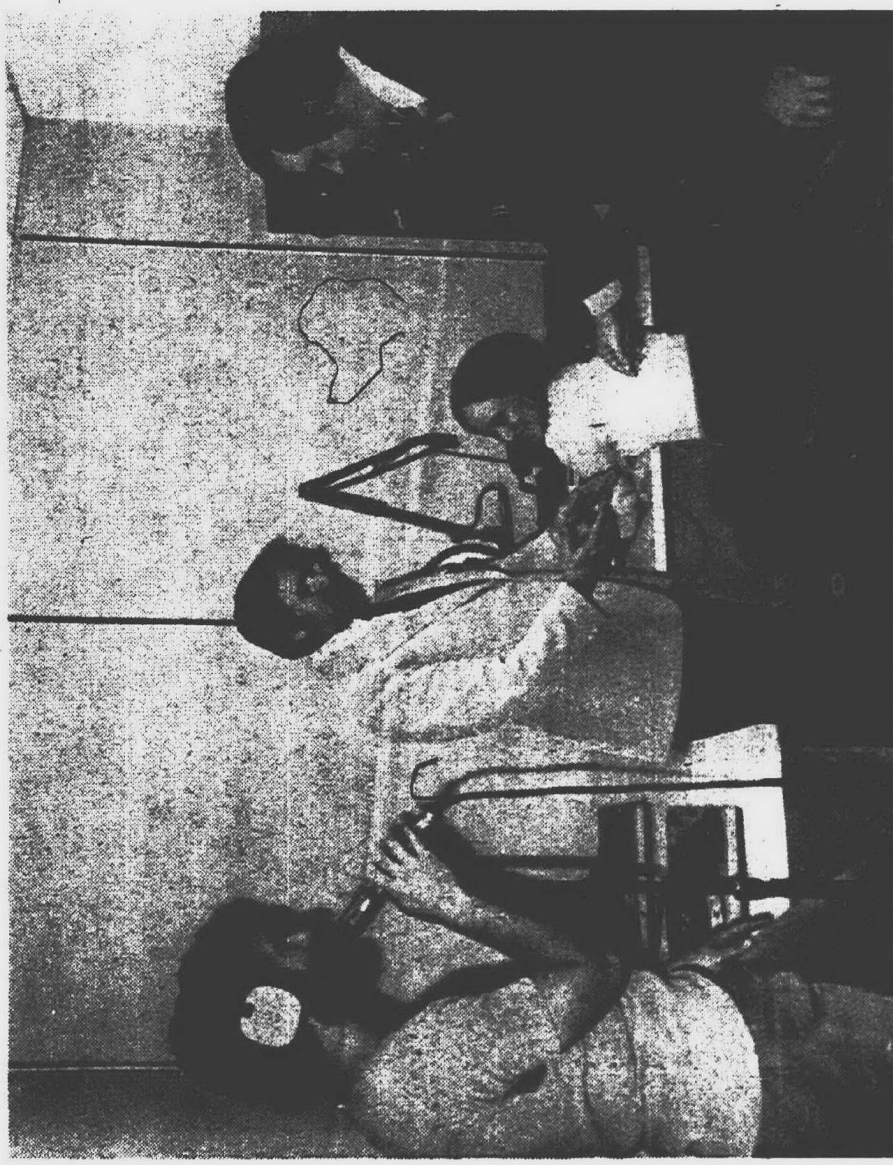
The course, which runs six months, is 20% theory and 80% practical. According to Specs, this is diametrically opposed to college and university mass communications courses which are 80% theory and 20% practical.

"When our students graduate, they've been through the fire."

What he refers to is "Project" in which students spend the last 13 weeks in a workshop where they must do everything required to put a show on the air. The grand finale is an actual full day of programming where "the tape never stops running."

"If there's dead air, then that's what there is," Specs said. When Project is finished they are totally aware of what a regulation radio station is like.

"Broadcasting is a people-to-people business," the affable Specs went on. "Personalities are important. We teach our kids to talk with people, not down to them. In a small town, where the radio station is integrally involved with the people and happenings, it is particularly important to establish a meaningful

CONSOLE STEREO makes a contribution as a major furniture piece in the home. There's a wide-ranging choice available in cabinet styles, performance features and add-on-later-if-you-like options. Basically, what you are looking for in stereo is an instrument that will reproduce the full range of sounds pleasingly -- through quiet passages and full orchestral effects. Audio engineers call this dynamic range. Your ear will clearly recognize it as add-on-later-if-you-like options.

GOOD GIFTS...

Stereo instruments and radios are "sound" gift-ideas.

Variety and a broad range of prices offer a choice that is not only easy on the budget but one that is especially right for a particular location or situation.

NEW AND PARTICULARLY POPULAR with young adult listeners is four-channel sound. It produces dynamic realism and a "you-are-there" presence by the addition of a special adapter to either a modular or modern console system.

But regardless of which radio or stereo system you prefer -- don't let talk of amplifier wattage, woofers, tweeters, balance and the like confuse you. Get the facts and then let your ear determine if the sound is right. Your eye can be the judge of design.

TO TEST a battery powered portable radio inside a store, listen to the set for rich, full tone with the volume turned low and check around the dial to see if the set will tune out-of-town, distant stations.

These should be useful in helping you make your final choice of radio as an entertaining gift item... for him, for her, or for...yourself.

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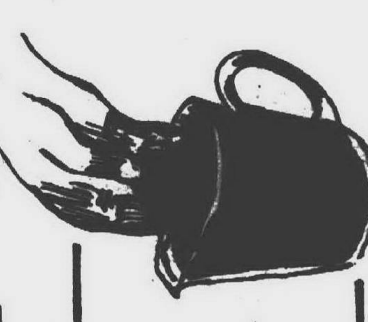
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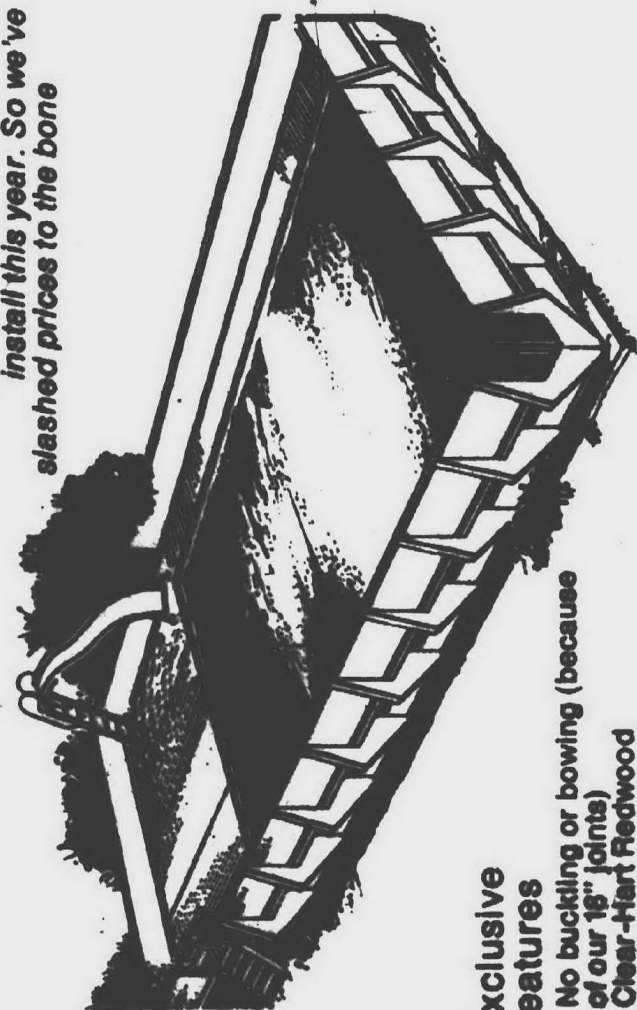
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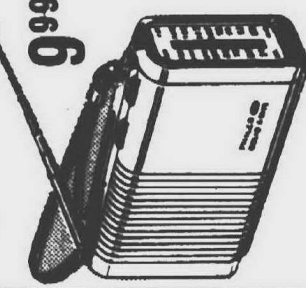
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TV GUIDELINES

The color television set is high on the list of "most wanted" items for the home.

It is also a product with a cost that has dropped drastically over the past 20 years or so while its value has soared. New developments such as brighter screens... remote control... solid state components... integrated circuits... transistors... simplified tuning and others have contributed in making the modern color set even more attractive.

TO HELP MAKE your gift selection of a color TV easier, here are some guidelines:

First--do your shopping in a store that displays brand name merchandise with a reputation for quality and value.

Next--determine where the set will be located. In a spacious home, average size house or small apartment, is space for the TV plentiful or limited? Is the set primarily for large... average... or small group viewing? Will it be a stay-put? Or will the set see service in more than one room in the house?

With answers to these questions firmly in mind, then match your requirements to what is available in the dealer store.

Sets range from portables and table models to a wide array of furniture-styled lo-bays, credenzas, full-door consoles, plus 3-way combinations.

AMONG IMPORTANT IMPROVEMENTS to look for as set features are:

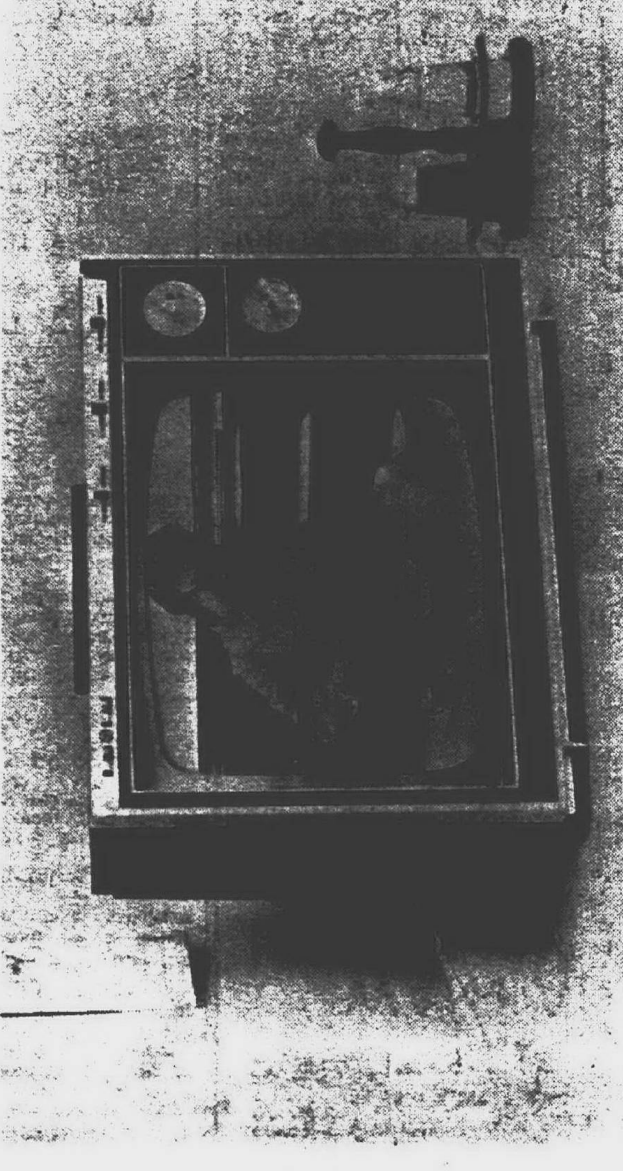
- The super-bright picture tube. Chromacolor, which led the industry's long-term efforts to improve the color TV tube, provides a brilliant, high contrast, sharply detailed picture in 25", 23", 19- and 16-inch diagonal screen sizes.
- AFC (automatic fine-tuning) is a desirable control for viewer use. It locks in the TV channel and keeps it from drifting.
- ATG (automatic tint guard) regulates flesh tones to overcome variations in TV station transmission.
- Remote control. This lets you switch from one favorite program to others around the dial without moving from your chair.

WITH TV often the most looked-at item in the home, cabinet design is also important. Portables and table models are generally smartly modern. In consoles and combinations, all the most popular furniture styles are represented.

With the basic requirements of the new home in mind, compare screen sizes, quality of picture and sound, features, and cabinet styles. Then, with value and quality as guides, make your final single selection from the color TV receivers you have seen demonstrated.

NEXT YEAR... Record Your Vacation

"Your vacation sounded absolutely great!" said an envious friend when listening to the recordings we brought back last summer.

It sounded great because we all had such a good time, and the only way to really convey the atmosphere and the spirit of that memorable couple of weeks was through the most modern communication medium of all--recorded sound.

Few would dream of going on vacation without taking a camera. Yet how many seriously consider slinging one of the small but efficient tape cassette machines on the shoulder before leaving home?

Easy to use and light in weight, the cassette recorder offers the means to take an endless succession of "sound snapshots" of the family, the friends one meets, the local inhabitants, the band on the beach or the singer in a bar, the voice of a guide, the cries of vendors in the street market, aircraft taking off, continental trolleys clanging their way down cobbled streets, the party on the last night... The list could go on and on.

However good a photograph might be it is dead and lifeless compared to the re-creation of living sound through the miracle of the tape recorder. Not only does it give you the chance to live your holiday all over again but it gives your friends at home a sense of participation. All the excitement and adventure will be shared with them as sound follows sound; you will imagine yourself to be back enjoying those carefree vacation pleasures.

There is no need to be afraid of taking a cassette recorder abroad in Europe, although it might be a wise precaution to carry some proof that the machine was purchased in the United States. Without this, the Customs might question you on your return.

Another precaution when traveling out of the country is to insure that you have a plentiful supply of quality blank cassettes and extra batteries with you. Both these items can be surprisingly expensive in some overseas countries.

IF YOU LEAVE HOME with a new set of batteries in the recorder, a spare set should be sufficient to meet all normal requirements. Remember that continually playing back takes as much power as recording. So, if you are not sufficiently strong-minded to resist hearing what you had just recorded, it might be as well to carry a second spare set.

The blank cassettes contain tapes of various lengths giving different recording times and this is indicated by their code numbers. A C60 cassette has a total playing time of sixty

minutes, thirty on each side; a C90 has forty-five minutes a side giving an hour and a half in all and a C120 gives a full-hour's program time on each side.

If you choose extended range cassettes--a "low-noise" tape--you should have noise-free results without that annoying hiss that sometimes mars an otherwise excellent recording.

HOW MANY CASSETTES to take? That depends on how much recording you are likely to do. Make sure that there is a blank cassette in the machine ready for use when you leave, and try to have at least three spares in the luggage.

It is better to take more than necessary rather than find that you have run out of tape just as the most interesting sounds present themselves to you.

TAKE SPECIAL CARE OF THE MICROPHONE. It should be protected from dust, so slip it into a small polyethylene bag. If a separate container or wallet is provided for carrying it, make quite sure it cannot become detached and lost. There is nothing more useless than a recorder without a microphone.

Some form of simple table stand is necessary. These are usually supplied with the equipment and they enable the microphone to be supported on a table or other surface leaving your hands free. If lost or forgotten, a make-shift stand from a piece of bent wire or stout cardboard will do.

WHEN RECORDING remember to keep the microphone well away from the recorder itself. If they are too close together you will pick up the mechanical noises of the machine as well as the sounds you really want.

Some recorders have a facility called an "automatic gain control." When this is present you do not have to worry about the intensity of the sound as the recorder looks after itself; on other machines the "recording level" has to be adjusted by hand so as to avoid distorting the recorded sounds when they are very loud.

This is an adjustment that can easily be forgotten in the excitement of the moment. But you will soon find out why many people feel that sound recording is much less trouble than taking photographs, and much more interesting.

WHEN PLANNING next year's vacation try putting "cassette recorder" high on the list of things to take. You will then be able to bring back living sound that will conjure up that vacation again and again in the years to come.

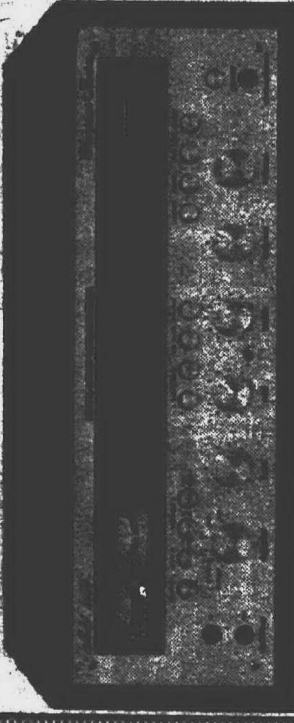
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
