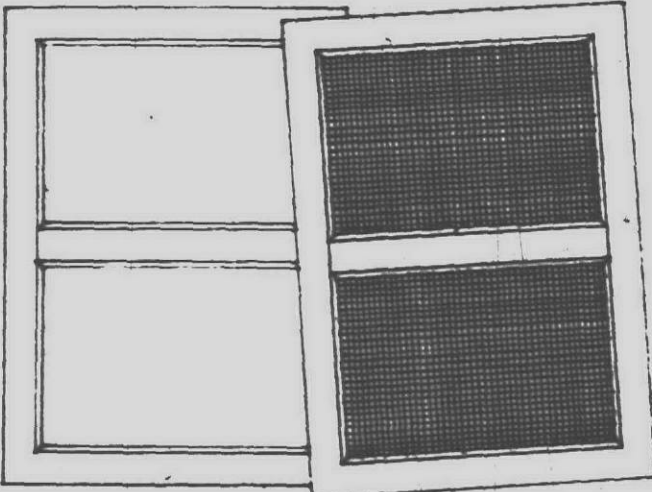

Will Advisory's Defeat Kill Unification?

How will Tuesday's clear defeat of the consolidation advisory question in Plymouth Township be interpreted?

Township officials had said passage of the purely advisory issue would indicate a need for a unification study.

Its defeat will most likely be used by the township board to contest the petition seeking consolidation of the township and city at the upcoming State Boundary Commission hearing.

In addition, the board will probably not now initiate a thorough unification study although it may consider updating the 1968 unification report.

Certainly Tuesday's result on the advisory question demonstrates that

pro-unification forces in the township and city have either failed to get their point across or have been overruled by the township residents.

If it could not garner a closer vote than 61 to 39 per cent on a purely advisory question, it is doubtful the pro-unification group could successfully campaign in a binding consolidation vote that will almost surely be ordered by the State Boundary Commission.

What the next steps taken by the township officials or the pro-unification leaders will be, remains to be seen.

The township board must officially decide whether or not to instruct its attorney to contest the consolidation petitions and the unification backers must consider adopting a new strategy before a binding consolidation election is ordered.

Looming over the township board's probable decision to have its attorney fight the consolidation petition, is the likelihood that the Boundary Commission would approve it anyway.

That may be the one reason the board would now consider updating the five-year-old unification study.

Faced with Tuesday's result of a last-minute campaign, the unification backers may change their approach to a hard-sell, full fledged battle but will

also have to wrestle with consolidation's "pros" and "cons" from the city's angle as well as the township's.

By the day of the Boundary Commission's hearing, both sides on the consolidation issue will have presented their strategies and a binding election on the matter will give voters in both the township and the city an opportunity to choose between them.

Festival Opens Expecting To Host Record Of 75,000

Fall Festival Section Inside

The annual Plymouth Fall Festival begins today (Thursday) in Kellogg Park with the famous German style dinner served by the Business and Professional Women's Club from noon to 8 p.m.

A complete schedule of the festival events and entertainment, as well as several features on Plymouth's largest fling, appear in a special section inside today's Plymouth Mail & Observer.

Our community is expected to host a record number of visitors over a four-day period beginning today (Thursday) for the annual Plymouth Fall Festival.

The weatherman appears to be cooperating, and festival groups are planning to serve a record number of dinners on each of the days, despite uncertainties about food prices and availability.

Plymouth Police Chief Timothy Ford estimates the city will host a maximum of 75,000 persons during the gala weekend. Between 10,000 and 15,000 persons will be in the Kellogg Park area at any peak period such as Sunday afternoon during the Rotary Club's famous chicken barbecue.

John M. Hoben, chairman of the Plymouth Fall Festival board, said, "Everything seems to be on schedule."

"Everything at the festival is just waiting to happen."

But the weatherman may not be as cooperative as the groups participating in the festival.

The five-day weather outlook released by the National Weather Service at Metropolitan Airport predicts a break in the recent hot spell with mostly sunny skies and temperatures in the 70s and 80s.

Earlier in the week, the weather service was predicting showers for today and cloudy, cooler weather for Friday.

But even rain couldn't stop

the festival, says Tony Flum, Fall Festival manager.

"I never pay any attention to the weather," he said. "If it rains, we'll still be there and I don't think it'll hurt our operation."

"Rain or no rain, we're going."

Even the weather -- if it did prove to be foul -- couldn't dampen the festival's spirit as much as the food prices and shortages did a week ago.

Most groups sponsoring festival dinners have raised their prices for this year in light of increased costs to themselves.

It seems that every year there is some obstacle assuming catastrophic proportions which is hurled into the festival's path; this year it was the food problem.

But as in every year, the festival has pulled through.

The major "if" this year was the Jaycee Saturday beef rib dinner, which was suddenly faced with no supply of meat two weeks ago.

But with a little help from Krogers, says Jaycee Project Chairman Paul Campbell, the group is waiting for a record number of hungry diners to show up Saturday.

Campbell said the grocery firm, although hard-pressed itself for meat supplies, has helped out to provide enough beef ribs for 2,700 dinners -- nearly 1,000 more than were sold last year.

The Rotary Club is also anticipating an increase in chicken lovers over the 13,500 whom they fed last year. Earl Merriman says his club has ordered enough chickens to sell 15,000 dinners this year.

One casualty of the food price spiral has been the Youth Inc. group which sold corned beef sandwiches last year. It's planning "meatless dishes" this year.

But festival goes generally can expect the same culinary attraction for the weekend.

Some last minute changes in the festival's entertainment schedule may also be of interest to the festival's guests, says Daisy Proctor, chairman of festival entertainment.

Additions to the schedule for the band shell are: the Plymouth Fife & Drum Corps which will perform from 6 to 6:30 p.m. tonight (Thursday); the RFD Boys, an Ann Arbor bluegrass band, playing from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m. Friday; and Ralph Manisto on the accordion following from 5:30 to 6 p.m.

A major event added to Saturday's entertainment lineup will be square dancing on Main Street in front of city hall from 7:30 to 10 p.m.

Once again the record number of individual events planned for the festival has meant an expansion of activities beyond the Kellogg Park Center.

This year's Plymouth Community Arts Council-sponsored arts and crafts show will be held at Plymouth Central Middle School on Saturday from

Schools To Levy All Voted Millage

The Plymouth school board has voted to levy the entire 1.5 mills approved in the special election Aug. 20, thus restoring athletics, performing music, extra curricular activities and bus transportation to last year's level.

The action came at the board's regular meeting last Tuesday.

The exact figures show the district will levy 34.32 mills for schools, including 28.55 for operation (day to day costs) and 5.77 for debt retirement (buildings).

The 5.77 mills for debt retirement is actually .18 mills less than last year so the net increase will not be 1.5 but actually 1.32 for 1973.

If you own a \$40,000 home with a state equalized valuation at about \$20,000 (half of true cash value, as required by state law) you will pay an additional \$26.40 in tax this year (\$20,000 x 1.32 mill increase).

The equalization factor which often resulted in higher taxes and which was imposed because of "unequal" assessment practices county- and state-wide now stands at 1.0 due to recent reassessments in the district.

Thus the average homeowner can very accurately figure his tax increase by multiplying 1.32 (1.5 new voted minus the small debt

decrease) times his property's assessed valuation.

The entire school district has a \$340 million state equalized valuation for the year, up from \$315 million last year.

The school board did not formally vote to add the items back to the budget but Supt. Mike Hoben said after the meeting that the board's intentions were to restore athletics, extra curricular activities, music and bus transportation.

Other items cut from the budget may be restored but the board has yet to decide on them. Mrs. Marda Benson noted that "it took five or six meetings to cut these things out so it will take some time for us to put them back in."

The board spent some time discussing bus transportation policies and agreed that the passage of the millage meant that last year's level of bus service had been restored.

However, trustee Fred Penar said he was unhappy that bus schedules had been sent out to residents before the board took official action.

Supt. Hoben reminded him that the board's "intent" had been followed in the matter in keeping with the millage vote last week, although the board did not get a chance to vote on the official working of the policy until Tuesday.

The bus policy includes provisions to bus all K-12 students who live more than one and one half miles from their school.

The exceptions include K-2 students who live one mile or more, and those who live in hazardous areas. Hazardous areas are to be determined by a district wide committee and the board.

The return to last year's level of bus services should cost the district about \$25,000, Hoben explained. An earlier figure of \$50,000 was broken down to exclude some other types of busing, such as that for athletic teams.

The board also agreed to consider a request from residents in the Miller School area, who want certain students bused who live within the limits because of hazardous conditions on Hanford Road.

The group's spokesman, Mrs. Judy Prince, 6745 Foxthorn, Canton, said heavy construction traffic and no sidewalks were the problem.

Busing cost Plymouth schools about \$350,000 last year, about half of which was reimbursed by the state. The exceptions the district makes for younger children and hazardous walking conditions cost about \$78,000, according to figures compiled by Ray Hoedel, assistant business superintendent.

NW Highway Hearings Set

Legislative public hearings are planned to gather opinion on the Northwestern Highway extension in Oakland County.

A special committee was formed to study allegations that the project proceedings were improperly influenced, and that the need and ecological impact of the extension weren't fully considered.

State Rep. Raymond J. Smit (R-Ann Arbor), whose district includes most of Plymouth, is a member of the committee.

Three hearings will be held at the Oakland County Board of Commissioners Auditorium in Pontiac at 2 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 25, and at 10 a.m. on Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 26-27.

Retirees To Get SC Benefits

Retirees residing within the Schoolcraft College district will receive special consideration for a selected number of programs and services conducted by the college effective this fall.

According to David Heinzman, director of college relations, this will affect approximately 10 to 15 per cent of the school district's population or an estimated 15 to 25,000 persons.

The Schoolcraft College board of trustees unanimously voted formal approval of procedures for the senior adult services policy at its Aug. 22 meeting.

The policy states that all

retirees or senior adults (living within the district) who have retired from full-time employment, including those who are retired because of disability, must apply for a special "senior student" identification card through the community services office prior to receiving any special consideration.

All senior adults possessing this card will be entitled to free tickets to all cultural and public affairs programs conducted by the college, free admission to all athletic events, free enrollment in special credit-free programs and full library privileges.

The card must be presented at the time of registration or admission to a program or activity.

Q. What is "ghetto weed?"

A. According to the information available, ghetto weed is an inexpensive street grass that is filled with stems, roots and other waste materials of the marijuana plant.

The program will operate out of the Livonia Aide Center at 33110 Five Mile and at the Westland Aide Center at 8068 N. Wayne Road. Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m.

A late registration period will be from Sept. 7 to 13 for students on the Orchard Ridge campus of Oakland Community College in Farmington Hills.

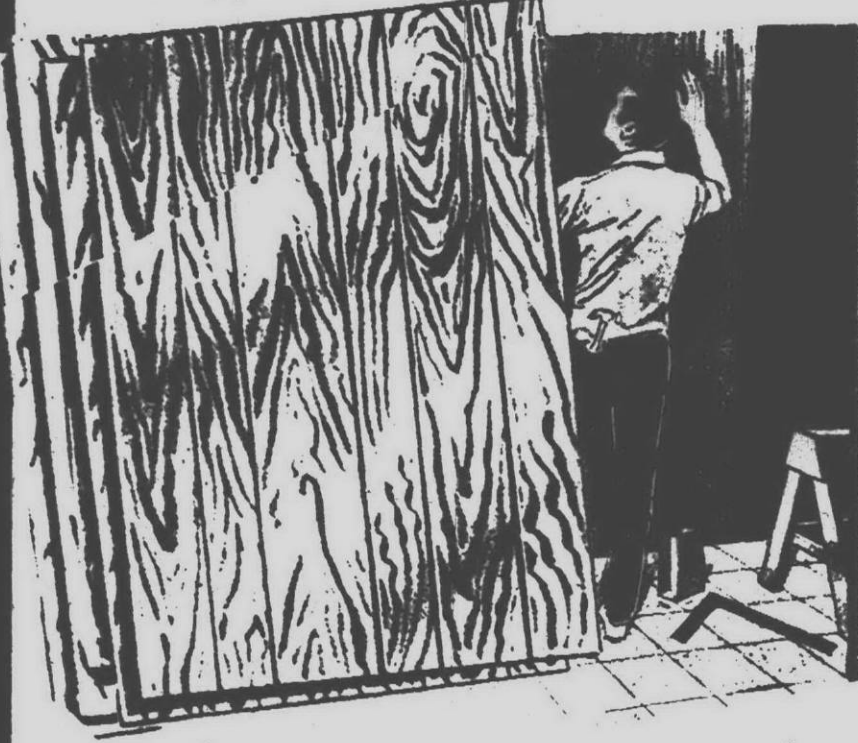

Schools Increase Milk, Lunch Costs

PLYMOUTH Because of increased food and labor costs and changes in legislation, the prices for lunches and milk served in the Plymouth School District school cafeterias have been increased with the opening of school.

Lunches served in elementary schools have increased from 40 cents to 45 cents

while lunches served in middle schools have gone from 45 cents to 50 cents.

The Plymouth school board, during its recent budget cuts, decided to add a nickel to the price of school lunches to cover the cost of noon supervision in the cafeterias.

The big price change will be found in the price of milk served in school cafeterias which results from the termination of the federal special milk program. No reimbursement will be received for milk in schools offering food service.

Milk prices will increase from four cents to 10 cents per carton and from five cents to 10 cents in the high schools.

Milk will continue to be provided as an integral part of the "Type A" lunch in the elementary and middle schools.

ABOUT 22 PER CENT of Plymouth Township's voters turned out Tuesday to defeat a referendum to extend Byron Creek Sewer into the western part of the township and a consolidation advisory question. They also overwhelmingly approved purchase of the Hilltop Golf Course by the township and narrowly favored an advisory question asking whether residents were satisfied with the current police protection. Precinct workers had the above unofficial returns compiled 10 minutes after the polls closed.

The department also would like to know whether there is sufficient interest to start classes, in dog obedience, men's open volleyball and basketball, women's volleyball and slimnastic, and after school gym activities for elementary school boys and girls.

Also under consideration are: lessons and league play in junior bowling for ages 6-13, adult bowling in mixed doubles, and a senior citizens

club to meet every Friday for cards, potluck, trips and fun. The club would be for those 50 and over.

Registration hours will be 9 a.m. - noon and 1-6 p.m.

Special classes will be available in freestyle, school figures, beginning dance and pairs as well as patch type lessons.

Cost of general figure skating lessons will be \$12 for residents and \$17 for non-residents. Residents are those living in the Plymouth Community School District.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free meals for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family, number of children attending school or preschool, and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school meals. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

In order to safeguard their identity, children receiving free meals will be treated in the same manner as full paying students.

Further assurance is given that children eligible for a free meal shall not be required to:

- (1) Work for their meal.
- (2) Use a separate dining room.
- (3) Go through a separate serving line.
- (4) Enter a dining room or serving line through a separate entrance.
- (5) Eat meals at a different time.
- (6) Eat a different meal than those sold to children paying the full price of such a meal.

Under the provisions of the policy the Building Principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. Mr. Raymond K. Hoedel, Assistant Superintendent/Business whose address is 454 South Harvey Street, Plymouth, Michigan has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the Assistant Superintendent/Business where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

We urge you to have your child or children participate in the program since it is to their benefit to eat well-balanced meals each day.

'Let Courts Decide If Plymouth Will Be Bused'--Hoben

PLYMOUTH Whether or not Plymouth schools will be added to the desegregation plan is "something for the courts to decide," says Supt. John Hoben.

But Hoben said he doubts that the courts would tack the outlying suburban districts on solely for the purpose of controlling school construction.

Federal Judge Stephen Roth said last week that he would add 31 school districts to the 52 which were originally encompassed by the plan.

NAACP attorney Louis R. Lucas has been quoted as saying the 31 districts may be added "to include the rest of Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties in the case so that new school construction in those districts will be controlled by the court."

The NAACP allegedly fears that growing construction in outlying suburban districts could encourage more white residents to move from districts included in the busing plan.

In the latest development in the Detroit school desegregation suit, the NAACP asked that Roth include details of the outlying district's building plans even though the districts may not be included in an initial metropolitan plan.

The Plymouth school system has been expanding at a fast pace because of the rapid development of Canton Township.

"I doubt seriously that the courts will up the number of school districts just to control school construction," Hoben said. "I don't see how you can control school construction in a district growing like Plymouth is."

He added that "whatever is the mandate of the law, we will have to follow."

Hoben said that until an order is issued "the schools will continue to operate the same as they have."

Perhaps you've been reading about the teachers' strikes in some of our neighboring school districts. If so, consider this as a "no-strike" story for the Plymouth School District.

Our teachers returned to work Tuesday under terms of a contract they signed last November.

The implications of that contract -- and the bargaining that brought it about -- are certainly being felt in light of the problems in some surrounding districts.

Joe Henshaw, president of the Plymouth Education Assn., said, "We're all happy to be working under a contract and we're looking positively at the future."

That means that while many school districts are wrestling with this year's agreement, Plymouth and its teachers are already eyeing the 1974-75 school year.

We shouldn't be over-optimistic however. Negotiations haven't formally started and they may wait until this year's contracts are settled in other districts.

But there is a definite glimmer of continued good feelings between the district and its teachers.

Norm Kee, personnel director for Plymouth schools, is even more optimistic. He's looking for an agreement to be reached

soon for the next school year -- "soon" meaning October or November.

"We're very hopeful of adding an additional year to our (existing) contract and tack on another year of an improved salary schedule."

Henshaw said that while it has not yet been formally discussed, "we're certainly open to (discussing) that."

The teachers union president said there has been some discussion among teachers about the rising cost of living and class sizes, and he added they may be topics of discussion for next year's contract.

Class size has been a major bargaining issue between the Farmington School District and its teachers and could be an explosive item in Plymouth, where the housing boom has caused great uncertainty about increases in the student population.

But the overall picture for Plymouth schools has to be one of "friendly cooperation" (those were Kee's words) as far as the teachers go.

Perhaps, with all the difficulties our school system has faced in the last nine months, we can be thankful that where other districts have recently encountered crisis situations with their teachers, Plymouth schools are open, the teachers are -- at least for the moment -- content and we don't have to have the kids in our hair.

Road Patrol Gets 3 Months More

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners has decided to continue free road patrol services for townships through this fiscal year, with future service depending on the "good faith" of the townships.

The board appropriated \$91,980 on Aug. 28 to continue the service from Sept. 1 through Nov. 30, the end of the county's fiscal year. The outlay will maintain 28 patrolman positions in the sheriff's motorized road patrol.

Observerland commissioners supporting the extension included Mary Dumas (R-Livonia), Tom Taylor (D-Westland) and Brian Arrowsmith (R-Wayne).

Commissioner Richard Manning (D-Redford Township) had to leave the meeting before the vote was taken but was said to support the extension. He is a member of public safety committee which studied the road patrol problems.

The 28 positions would have been dropped Aug. 31. The county board had financed the positions for only nine months in the current budget in order to back up its request that the townships assume the cost of their own police services, as do cities.

Funding for the balance of the year was approved after protracted negotiations resulted in written pledges from a number of township supervisors to seek millage for that purpose.

The Board of Commissioners has requested similar pledges from the various township boards by the time the sheriff's road patrol budget for next year comes up for consideration in October.

Township officials were told they could either provide their own police services or contract with the sheriff's department for services.

An indication of the position the Board of Commissioners might take with regard to funding next year was given by Commissioner

Paul Silver, of Detroit, in explaining why he voted for the appropriation.

"I voted 'yes' only because I intend to propose, along with a number of other commissioners, that the allocation for the next budget year be conditional and subject to review every two or three months," he said.

"Then if any of the township officials decide to play hanky panky, as they have for years in the past, this board of commissioners will be in a position to cut them off immediately."

Negotiations were conducted by the board's Public Safety and Judiciary Committee which reported to the board that it was told the townships planned the following actions:

The supervisors of Brownstown, Canton, Northville, Sumpter and Van Buren townships will seek to place millage questions on next year's ballots.

Plymouth Township put an advisory question on the ballot for a special election on Sept. 4.

Food Service Gets SC Advance

The Schoolcraft College board of trustees has agreed to advance \$4,000 to the college food service to cover

start-up costs and cash flow problems.

Kerith Lindner, vice president for administrative affairs, reported the food service is constantly facing cash flow problems. Cash is preserved to cover salaries, fringe benefits and other costs. Some vendor payments are delayed to guarantee needed cash.

Lindner said that at year end there is never enough money to pay all vendors from the food service account, and cash is provided from the general operating fund to pay all vendors invoices that are due.

Money advanced in this manner over the past seven years has accumulated to \$19,965 in amounts ranging from \$4,000 to \$7,500 annually, according to Lindner.

The board also agreed that the advance should be a short term obligation to be repaid to the general operating fund before June 30, 1974.

It was further agreed that not less than \$3,000 of the advances previously accumulated should be repaid prior to June 30, 1974.

Wayne Schools Can Get Free Library Films

Educational films to be shown during the 1973-74 school year in Wayne County's 36 local districts will be provided by the intermediate school district at no rental charge.

Effective Sept. 1, the intermediate school district will reimburse the audio-visual division of the library system for the cost of providing films to local school districts.

Each local school district will designate an audio-visual coordinator.

2 Way Players Key To North Attack

North Farmington head football coach Ron Holland is making his first step a cautious one as he prepares his Raiders for his 13th season at North Farmington.

North has the talent to win its fifth league title in the last nine years but Holland is picking rival Franklin to take it all, with his North crew. John Glenn and Garden City East fighting it out for second best honors.

Holland's teams have compiled an overall 12-year record of 81-23-3 which includes four league championships along with a 1970 state title.

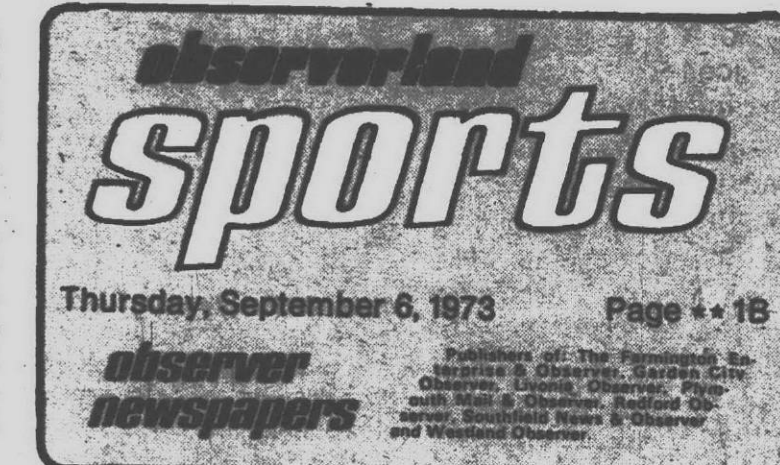
North has only lost to Franklin three times in 12 years and Holland already knows that the Oct. 20 battle this season with Franklin could be a real decider.

The North squad which finished 7-2 last season and second best to undefeated Garden City East in the Northwest Suburban Conference opens at home against Pontiac Northern on Sept. 15.

Graduation hit North 13 strong and for the "brown and gold" that is a bundle. North usually has a varsity turnout of about 28.

Holland had to see a lucky 13 sign in this season's turnout of 35 but things are still pointing to a two-way situation.

"We have some good talent



on this team but not a heck of a lot of depth," said Holland. "Depth is something we just never seem to overcome here at North."

"In 1970 I had 10 players going both ways. It was a one in and one out situation. This year will probably have eight players going both ways."

Ten starters are returning to the Raider ranks.

Mike Daley at 6-0 and 170 pounds has the No. 1 task of handling the quarterbacking chores. Daley was back-up

last season.

"The quarterback position has to be our main question mark because of his lack of experience," commented Holland. "Thus our entire offense is very questionable."

The fullback slot has been nailed down by 6-0, 180-pound Mike Combes who is noted more for his blocking than running, and a good share of blocking he will be doing.

Three-year starter, All Northwest and All Observer halfback Brad Pease could easily shatter all running

records at North this season. The 5-11, 185-pound Pease ground out 450 yards his sophomore year and 885 last season.

"Brad has picked up about 13 pounds and is a lot stronger," added Holland.

Alternating at the other half-back slot will be 5-9, 160-pound Dave Babcock and 5-7, 130-pound Dan Kramer.

Holland is very high on his ends in 6-3, 190-pound Jim Fredericks and 6-0, 170-pound John Patek.

"We will be throwing a lot," stated Holland. "We used to go something like 2/3 run and 1/3 pass. It should be about 50-50 this season."

The offensive line has Brian Chisholm (5-10, 215 pounds) and Gary Kelterborn (5-9, 165 pounds) at the tackle berths. At guard will be 5-11, 185-pound Joe D'Agostino and 5-8, 160-pound Todd Byrne. John Daubenmeyer at 6-2 and 190 pounds will be the No. 1 Raider center.

"This line has to be the most experienced we have ever had at North," added Holland.

The defensive setback sports two returning starters in Chisholm and Steve Trawick (6-1, and 235 pounds) with Steve Chase at 6-0 and 180 pounds and Randy Balzarini at 6-0 and 210 pounds filling out the front card.

An average weight of about 205 pounds tells the story of the Raider defensive front which is complemented by experience in the backfield.

Linebackers will be Daubenmeyer and D'Agostino, both returning starters at the position. Bill Lough at 5-11 and 180 pounds and Combes or Rob Haelterman at 5-9 and 165 pounds will handle the defensive end berths.

Holland couldn't ask for more experience in his complete returning secondary with Fredericks, Patek, Daley, Babcock, Kramer and Steve Kotecki set to do the job.

Plymouth '73 Assault Is To Rebuild And Win

Plymouth Salem head football Coach Tom Moshimer has tabbed the '73 season a "rebuilding one," but the Rock head mentor is far from writing it off as a losing one.

Salem, which finished 6-3 last year, was hit hard by graduation.

"We lost eight offensive starters and eight defensive starters," commented Moshimer who is in his seventh season at Plymouth. "We have 10 lettermen back but only five starters back of 22."

"This has to be a rebuilding year for us, but we will still be out after each game."

The Rocks wound up fourth in the Suburban Eight in '72 and have compiled an overall 23-24-3 record under Moshimer.

"Besides graduation taking its toll, the split in high schools isn't going to help our resources," added Moshimer, whose Rocks open at Bloomfield Hills Andover on Friday, Sept. 14 at 8 p.m.

The following week will have Plymouth pitted against Dearborn Edsel Ford on Sept. 21 in the Eight opener.

Moshimer is faced with slim pickings, having only five starters returning in Jeff Waller, Jeff Horton, Jim Mason, Rick Neu and Gary Baker.

Waller at 5-7 and 180 pounds will be at the offensive guard and defensive middle guard slots. At fullback is Horton, 5-10 and 175 pounds and honorable mention All-Suburban Eight last year.

Mason will be a tight end at 6-1 and 178 pounds, Baker a defensive halfback and split end at 5-10 and 150 pounds, and Neu the key to the Plymouth attack.

At 5-9 and 158 pounds, Neu, who was the back-up signal caller last season, has the No. 1 quarterback assignment.

"Rick is a strong runner and adequate passer," commented Moshimer. "If we go in '73, it will be Neu that will do it."

Backing up Neu will be 5-10, 157 pound senior Todd Buikema who Moshimer might call on in passing situations. A year away in the quarterbacking position is junior Tom Dillion.

A real battle is on in the halfback department between 5-11, 182-pound senior Mark Kraay and juniors Doug Ward at 5-8 and 153 pounds and Doug Tripp at 5-9 and 158 pounds.

Horton will be handling most of the fullback chores but Moshimer is counting on

junior Scott Agnew (5-9 and 162 pounds) to see a lot of action.

The center berth is a real problem.

Steve Goodwiller, the starting ball snapper, has come up with a bad knee and his back-up John Lynch is out with a leg injury. Sophomore Lance Rippee was to fill in but was injured and Moshimer has moved Dan Ross from tight end to center.

At guard will be Waller and Bill White with Joe Crowther, Andy Jones and Jerry Brink also to see action.

The tackle slots are where Plymouth "lost everything."

Russ Brink at 5-11 and 178 pounds is the lone experienced man with Rick Wilson, Gary Grey, Bruce Wotaszak and Rick Ward in contention.

Ward is just one of four transfers that Moshimer has happily accepted into the Rock lineup.

At 5-11 and 211 pounds, Ward is a junior from California.

Another tackle prospect is junior Mark Manthey at 6-3 and 213 pounds from Ohio. Ken Kelly is a senior end at 6-1 and 170 pounds from Ohio and Ted Kietzman a 5-11 and 147-pound defensive halfback from Massachusetts.

"I really don't know much about these four," added Moshimer. "But they can't do anything but help our attack."

Mark Klucka at 5-10 and 204 pounds is another tackle hopeful.

At ends will be Mason and Baker along with 6-2, 175-pound senior Charlie Heid and Pete Wiltse.

Defense has Waller at nose guard, White and Brink at tackles, Agnew and Kraay at linebacks and Mason and Buikema at ends. Baker, Neu, Ward and Scott Somerville (5-7 and 151 pounds) make up the backfield.

Neu will be handling the punting and Horton the place-kicking.

Wayne Sparkman, Gary Balconi and Ron Krueger will be aiding Moshimer on the varsity level, with Craig Bell and Dick Barr as junior varsity coaches.

"Trenton, Edsel Ford, Redford Union and Allen Park have to be the top four clubs in the Suburban Eight," said Moshimer. "The Eight coaches picked Trenton to win it."

"Bentley was tabbed for sixth with us seventh and Dearborn last."

with practically all of the top contenders for the recent Hambletonian in the field.

The Saturday stake headlines an all-star card that finds Racing Secretary Bill Connors staging nine paces and the rich stake.

The program for next week finds the \$30,000 Jug Pace on Thursday as the closing event of the Circuit schedule.

The two-year old pacers will clash in the \$42,000 Geers Monday night and the entry list may force Connors to schedule it in two heats.

Then follows the \$23,000 Tompkins Memorial for two-year-old trotters on Tuesday; and the climatic Brown Jug Trial on Thursday.

Coming to town for the week-long series are such drivers as: Gene Riegler of Greenville, O.; Dick Buxton

from Canton, O.; Billy Haughton, Frank Ervin, George Sholly, Stan Dancer, Herve Filion and Jim Simpson.

The DRC has a total of 42 nominations for the Michigan Mile but didn't receive any from the owners of Secretariat and Riva Ridge.

Racing Secretary Norris Gwinn scoured the east and Midwest for the better part of two weeks and believes the nominees could make it one of the best races in several years.

For instance, the list includes: Linda's Chief, victor in the \$100,000 Gold Cup in Chicago last week. Then there's Onion, who whipped Secretariat in his last start for one of the biggest upsets of the year.

King's Bishop, who shared in the divided stake last

year, is back for a second try in the rich stake.

Jack Van Berg, who vows he has the winner in one of his four nominations but won't say which one, has Ex Fakir, Canadian Jeff, Guitar Player and Dr. Patano.

Serendipity Farm, headed by Joe Nederlander, has Governor Max as its hopeful. The four-year-old is at the track and raced in a trial earlier in the week but wound up a distant fourth.

Then there's Our Native, one of the entrants in the Kentucky Derby who gave Secretariat fits for most of the race before fading back.

From the stables at the track are such standouts as Rod N Reel, Kilfoil, Master Ribot, Roman Scout, Salvo, Lone Bird, and Rule By Reason.

Canada gives the stake an international flavor with Windfields Farm sending in the name of Minsky.

The Canadian stable is not one to nominate for rich stakes unless the owners feel it has a good chance of winning.

The drawing for post positions is slated for next Thursday morning when officials will have the complete list of starters. As of this time, it appears there will be as many as 14 starters.

Churchill 9 Game Streak To Get Big Test

The 1973 prep football campaign is only eight days away from putting its nine-game winning streak on the line.

Churchill, which finished No. 2 in the '72 Observerland ratings behind Garden City East, also at 9-0, gave up only 20 points last season and at one time enjoyed a six-game shutout string.

This year's Charger squad is minus 21 graduated seniors and Churchill head mentor Ken Kaestner is the first to admit that they are not the club of last year. "We are far from being the team we were last year, we lost 21 good solid kids," said

Kaestner. "It wouldn't be fair to this year's team to put undue pressure on them to continue the winning streak."

"I pick Waterford Mott and Farmington Harrison to fight it out for first."

Churchill outscored its opponents, 155 to 20 last season. Thurston scored six points in the 7-6 Churchill opening win, Franklin managed eight in a 20-8 Charger triumph and Stevenson squeaked across six in the finale Churchill victory, 13-6.

Co-captains for the '73 unit are quarterback and defensive halfback Brian Kelly

and offensive tackle Kevin Murray.

Kelly at 6-0 and 175 pounds and Mark Roncoli at 6-1 and 170 pounds are the two Chargers fighting it out for the quarterback slot. The offensive line is headed by center Gary Ramsden at 5-9 and 160 pounds.

At the guard berths are 5-9, 190-pound Roger Hawraney and John Bechtel at 6-0 and 185 pounds. Rounding out the tackle slot with Murray is 6-0, 185-pound Bill Anderson to compliment Murray's 6-3, 195-pound stats.

Split end wide receiver will be Mike Gottschall checking in at 5-11 and 165 pounds with

the tight end featuring a three-way contest. Junior Jim Packard is up against seniors Craig Allen and Kurt Pitcher.

Churchill's backfield will be sporting one of each class in senior Phil LaFave, junior Bill Reardon and sophomore Matt Foster.

"We will be building around Reardon at fullback," commented Kaestner. "Bill gained 759 yards and scored nine touchdowns in only 5 1/2 games last year with the junior varsity. We feel he is ready this season."

Reardon checks in at 6-1 and 210 pounds and will be backed up by senior Tom Moore at 5-9 and 175 pounds.

LaFave at 5-7 and 150 pounds is probably the fastest man on the club, doing the 100 in :10.4 to nail down one halfback slot with 6-1 1/2, 195-pound Matt Foster the sophomore in the Charger backfield. Junior Perry Danver at 5-7 and 130 pounds is the back-up running back.

"We are missing a lot of talent," explained Kaestner. "Things are really spotty as we lost our aggressive quality ballplayers, seven off the offensive and five from defense."

Defensive Coach Roger Frayer has his toughest competitor back in nose guard Tim McMahon, senior at 5-11 and 190 pounds. Senior Dan Eckhout at 5-10 and 170 pounds is one linebacker with the other berth a three-way clash between 5-10, 170-pound junior Ray Fabian, Hawraney and Reardon.

The tackle positions have 6-4 1/2 Don Forest on the left side and either Bill Anderson or Mike Smith on the right.

Defensive ends are 5-9, 165-pound senior Marty Bay and 6-1, 194 pound Jim Sabadini.

The "monster-man" in the Charger defense is 5-7, 172-pound Jim Lamarand with Gottschall the invert back and Kelly the outside back. Al Leirstein at 6-1 and 185 pounds is rated one of the best backs in the area with seven interceptions to his credit last season.

Kaestner admits he is in search of a kicker with 6-1, 165-pound senior Wally Bills currently No. 1.

Rounding out Kaestner's coaching crew is Frayer with the defense, Dick Braun with the receivers and Jim Neuman and Robert Armstrong with the junior varsity.

Defense is Churchill's game but right now there are four question marks in that 11 man card, two defensive ends, one linebacker and one tackle.

Come Sept. 15 Churchill will be after its 10th straight against Thurston.

Sod Or Seed; Ground Work Pays Off

To seed or to sod? That is the question for many new homeowners.

There are advantages both ways, but either method can give good results. Seeding in-

volves more initial care but is less costly. Sod gives an instant lawn.

In either case you have to do some ground work first. The lawn you get will be only as good as the soil you grow it on. A lawn isn't just a mat that is spread over the sur-

face. Those grass plants have roots that extend down into the soil and draw sustenance from it.

Prepare the soil thoroughly, improving the texture and fertility, and you will have a good healthy lawn that will be relatively trouble free for years to come. It will really be less work in the long run.

There are about a half dozen steps that should be followed when preparing the ground for a new lawn.

1. Check the soil and decide what kind of soil you have. Is it clay that is sticky when it is wet but becomes like concrete when it is dry? Or is it sand that is loose and porous and dries out too quickly?

The ideal soil is a rich loam that is light, porous and spongy. It is loose enough to dig easily and roots can pen-

etrate deeply. It is porous so the soil has air in it so the roots can breathe. It is spongy enough to hold a good supply of moisture.

For heavy clay or light sand, a generous amount of peat moss, compost, or other organic material worked into the soil improves the texture. It is the rich supply of organic material in loam that makes it so satisfactory.

Although not essential, it is a good idea to have the soil tested. The Wayne County Agricultural Extension Service does this for a small fee. Tests will accurately determine if the soil is acid or alkaline, and what the fertilizer needs are.

2. Next step is grading. This is the process of contouring the land so water drains away from the house

and there are no low pockets in which water can collect. All slopes should be made as gentle as possible and ridges should be rounded off.

If you are fortunate enough to have top soil on your land, this should be pushed off and piled out of the way before the grading is done. Top soil is too valuable to waste.

3. Remove stones and debris that have been turned up. Allow the land to settle for a week or two. A thorough watering will aid the settling process and help remove air pockets. Fill in any low spots that develop.

4. Spread the top soil back over the area. Spread a layer of peat moss, one to three inches thick over the area. If you have no top soil, add an extra thick layer of peat moss. Work top soil and peat

moss into the underneath soil to a depth of four to six inches. This will improve the texture of the soil.

5. To improve fertility, spread fertilizer over the surface and work it into the upper few inches of soil. Unless tests have indicated the need for special fertilizers, use a balanced fertilizer, such as one with a 10-10-10 formula, or else one that has a high proportion of phosphorus. Use approximately 10 to 15 pounds per 1,000 square feet of area. Most soils in this part of the state are not acid so lime is seldom needed.

6. Finally, rake the soil, making it smooth and even with a fine powdery surface. Roll lightly or tamp the surface to make it firm and even. Now the soil is ready to be seeded or sodded.

For most purposes, a mixture of seeds produces a better lawn. Some grass varieties thrive best in sun. Others prefer shade. With a mixture, there is a choice and the one best suited will dominate.

Bluegrass is preferred for sunny areas. In addition to common bluegrass, there are special kinds of bluegrass such as Merion and Fylking. One of the newest bluegrasses to be developed is Adelphi. In tests throughout the country it has performed very well, showing good color all summer and good disease resistance.

Another new development is perennial ryegrasses with blades as fine-textured as bluegrass. They sprout quickly and look attractive. Manhattan and Pennfine are two reliable varieties of perennial rye.

In shaded areas fine fescues, such as Pennlawn or Chewings, are more satisfactory than bluegrass. Perennial ryegrass can be used in shaded areas, too.

If you sod the lawn, keep over two inches tall. Early mowing will help thicken the turf.

Watering is very critical if you seed the lawn. Water frequently but lightly to keep the surface moist. This is the only time light sprinkling is recommended for lawns. Keep up the sprinkling after the seeds germinate until the lawn gets established. Then water less often but more deeply.

Begin mowing the new lawn when the grass gets over two inches tall. Early mowing will help thicken the turf.

The Green Thumb
By GEORGE ABRAHAM

We're getting letters asking us what causes leaves on shade trees to turn brown and drop.

This problem is lumped together into one term—leaf scorch. It's worse on newly planted trees and in dry areas. In many areas rainfall has been scarce and trees not taking up sufficient water develop leaf scorch.

Scorch develops when water is lost from the leaves faster than it can be replaced. As a result, the cells die and the leaves partially or completely dry up. Weather plays an important part in leaf scorch.

In some areas where there have been lots of rain, you are apt to get late summer leaf scorch. The reason: Roots could not develop because of the excessive moisture in the soil, or existing roots were killed. As a result some plants were not equipped to face hot, dry weather. Their

first response to it is leaf scorch.

Most often, scorch is a result of drought conditions, but overwatering can also bring about the same symptoms. Girdling roots may also cause scorch. These are roots that lie at the base of the trunk, and as both the root and trunk increase in size, they press against each other until the root cuts off the flow of sap up the trunk.

The girdling roots act like a boa constrictor, choking the tree. If you see girdling roots at the base, take a chisel and cut it.

Best way to help a tree overcome scorch and other problems is to feed and water the tree to build up vigor. If water is scarce, don't hesitate to use laundry or bath water around your ornamentals.

In September, if there is little rain and temperatures are quite high, you will need all the water you can get for your trees and shrubs. Fall feeding improves plant vigor

for better growth for next season.

SALT FOR ASPARAGUS: Is salt helpful in keeping down weeds in the asparagus bed? Many oldtimers still use salt in the asparagus bed, but we doubt if it does any good. Tests show that this old idea has been pretty much discredited. I hope some of our readers will write and tell us if they use salt to kill weeds.

GREEN THUMB CLINIC: "We have lots of white fly on our house plants and garden vegetables. Is there a control?"

Answer: Not an easy one. There's a parasite known as Encarsia which is effective and you can purchase it from certain firms which rear it. In some areas there's a natural infestation of the parasite, and the "black" white fly you may see on leaves are parasitized.

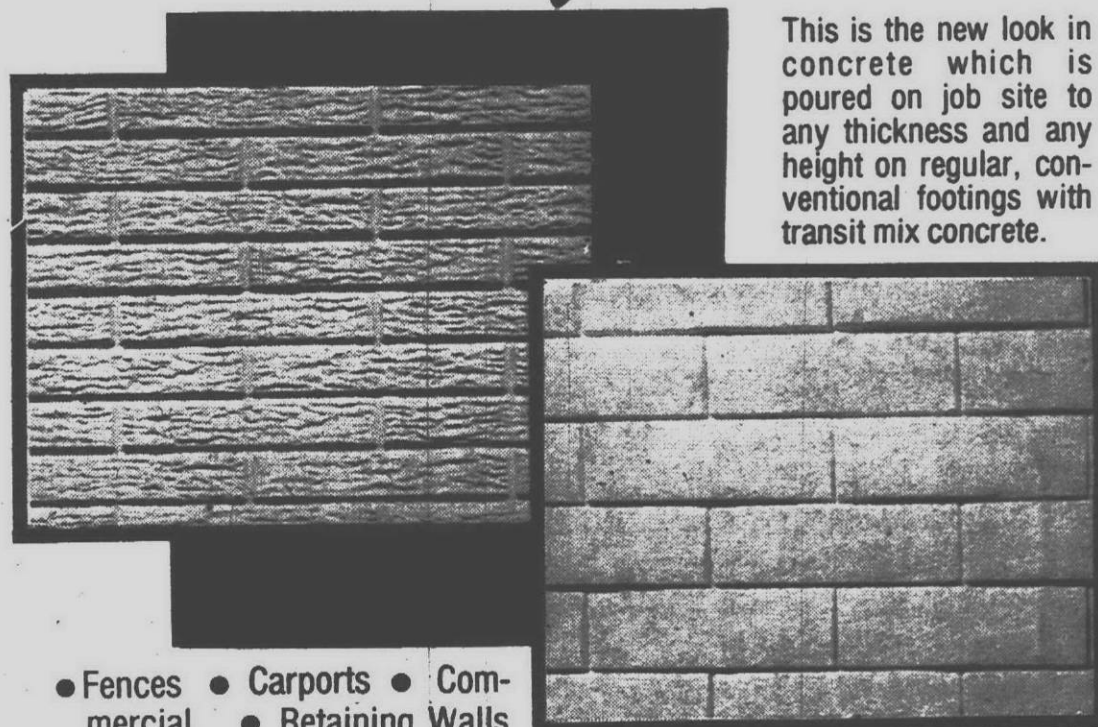

Elm On Honor Roll

Many years ago a young Detroit couple bought some property in the Rosedale Gardens area of what is now Livonia.

The finest feature of the W.H. Rolens' "piece of land" was a great elm tree. They used to travel out from the city to have picnics in the shade of their tree.

Thirty-eight years ago Harold and Laura Rolens built a house on the property. They and their three young daughters took up residence at 9615 Melrose.

That was back-in the days when residents of Rosedale Gardens sent their children to Plymouth High School. The two older girls, Caroline and Mary, graduated from PHS. Julie, the youngest, graduated from Bentley High in Livonia.

The children grew up, moved away and Mr. and Mrs. Rolens, their gardens and the elm tree stayed on.

And they took good care of the old tree. For the past 20 years they have had it sprayed twice a year.

In the May 3, 1972 issue of the Observer Newspapers they read an article about elm trees. It said:

"If you have an elm tree in your area which measures 10 feet or more in circumference at eye level... the tree could be designated as an historic landmark to be preserved for the enjoyment of future generations. It would be entered in the honor roll of elms."

The Rolens went out, tape measure in hand, and their grand old elm qualified by more than 12 inches.

The circumference, six feet from the ground, was 11 feet.

The Rolens sent the statistics to the Elm Research Institute, a volunteer non-profit organization with the sole object of saving the American elm from extinction.

In time the plaque was carefully attached to the tree by a representative from the Greenridge Nursery, the company which had sprayed the tree over the years.

An official from the institute estimated the age of the elm at more than 200 years and the height at between 65 and 70 feet.

"There are white and red elms," Mrs. Rolens said. "Ours is a red. When they examined the bark it was red - just like mahogany."

Because of the care it received, the Livonia tree withstood the Dutch elm disease menace and is entered in the national honor roll of elms.

The Rolens agree with the Observer article which said:

"If you have on your property a single American elm, you have a specimen of what botanists have described as the most beautiful thing that grows in the Western hemisphere. No other tree is comparable to the unique American species that rises to more majestic height, with more gracefully architected branches than elms in any other part of the world."

"It is an ornament to your home and property that adds unequaled dignity and charm. Its loss would leave a scar that would never completely heal."

Autumn Seeding For A Carpet Of Green

By far the best time of year to seed cool-season lawngresses - the Kentucky bluegrasses, fine fescues, bentgrasses, and perennial ryegrasses - is autumn.

Good weather, a promising season ahead, and a more relaxed job schedule, then, combine to make autumn ideal for both new lawn seedings or for bolstering thin turfs.

All of these grasses thrive on the bright, crisp weather that usually prevails during autumn. The soil should be dry enough to cultivate nicely, making a good seedbed.

Cultivating the soil before seeding helps the new lawn to a good start.

Mix fertilizer amply into the soilbed, at the rate recommended on the bag (typically

10-20 pounds/100 square feet. Acid soils may need liming. A mechanical spreader distributes seed neatly. It will be useful later for maintenance fertilization and spreading of pesticides.

A surface mulch to prevent drying rounds out the new seeding. Only time (and enough watering to keep the soilbed moist) then stands between you and a cheerful carpet of green.

If soil cultivation is not feasible, perhaps your tired turf can be renovated merely by scuffing its surface ahead of overseeding. Powered turf thinners or scarifiers make rather light of this task. They can be rented in many urban areas.

In some states knock-down chemicals are procurable. Best are types that leave no toxic residues in the soil.

Killing unwanted vegetation before seeding ups the odds on survival of new sprouts. Just as with a new lawn, renovation requires regular watering to bring up the seedlings.

Planter Adds Patio Charm

Planter boxes full of flowers, shrubs or evergreens bring form and color to a deck or patio, and are easily built of western wood in sizes scaled to the area of use.

A large planter, four feet square and two feet high, is built of 2x6-inch tongue and groove decking set on a base of 4x8s, with sheet metal liner and gravel drainage.

Lawn Pests Resist

Just as resistant strains of the housefly developed after DDT was used everywhere, so have some lawn pests, such as webworm and Japanese beetle grubs, acquired immunity in certain areas to chlor-dane or other insecticides.

In some cases the resistant strain experiences a population explosion, the pesticide killing predators but no longer the pest.

A similar situation seems to occur with turf diseases, some of which are no longer controlled by formerly effective fungicides.

Apparently fungi, too, compete, and when a susceptible fungus is controlled another resistant to the fungicide may flourish better than ever. As useful as the long-lasting systemic fungicides are in stopping stripe smut and dollarspot, leafspot disease frequently becomes more severe where they are used!

One of the safest as well as most effective means for fighting lawn diseases is to use grass varieties bred for disease-resistance. Aside from good looks, disease-resistance is the characteristic most sought for in lawngrass breeding programs.

It all began with Merion, which, even after many years of widespread planting, still does not succumb to leafspot.

More recent highly-touted bluegrasses tolerant of most diseases are Adelphi, Baron, Bonnieblue, Fylking, Galaxy, Nugget, Pennstar, Sodco and Sydsport. Others such as Arboretum, Arista and Prato are momentarily attacked but recover well.

Starting a lawn with today's handsome, disease-resistant varieties should reduce up-keep. Sod of such selections will not ordinarily require fungicidal sprays.

'Stun Gun' Gets Trial In County

A handful of specially-trained Wayne County sheriff's deputies will be equipped with pellet bag-firing "stun guns" for a six-month trial period under a program approved by the County Board of Commissioners.

The board unanimously approved a proposal by Commissioner John C. Hertel that six of the devices, designed to stun rather than kill their targets, be purchased.

Under the plan, selected deputies will undergo two weeks of training and then carry the weapons in their patrol cars in addition to their firearms.

The devices, variously called "stun guns" or "stinger sticks" by their manufacturers, fire pellet-filled canvas bags with enough force to knock a man down and stun him.

Hertel, whose proposal was supported by Sheriff William Lucas, said the stun gun would give deputies an alternative to use of firearms in appropriate situations.

"I believe the stun guns could preserve the lives of both police officers and suspects in some situations," Hertel said after his proposal was approved last week.

"As of now, a deputy must decide whether to use his gun, which is a very final thing, or risk hand-to-hand combat in a dangerous situation. His life is in danger while he is making that awesome decision," Hertel explained, adding:

"I am also concerned about the fact that an officer has no alternative to his gun if he wants to stop a fleeing suspect who may or may not be guilty of a serious crime or any crime at all, for that matter."

Hertel said he believes the device also will be useful in crowd situations. The pellet-filled bags are covered with dye which marks a suspect for later identification.

"If the national guard had been equipped with stun guns

at Kent State, Ohio, the lives of those students almost certainly would have been spared," he stated.

Lucas said deputies to be equipped with the devices will be chosen from among volunteers who are "mature and cool-headed under fire." They will be given two weeks of training in the use and "psychology" of the devices, Lucas added.

He said he will establish a review board to evaluate each use of a stun gun during

the trial period. He said several models will be tried.

The sheriff said a stun gun was used successfully by the Clark, N.J. police to subdue a knife-wielding drunk who was slashing at anyone that approached him.

Hertel and Lucas acknowledged that the stun gun could be lethal in some circumstances, such as close range.

"But that is true of a night stick, a black jack, a fist or review board to evaluate just about any object you can name," Hertel said.

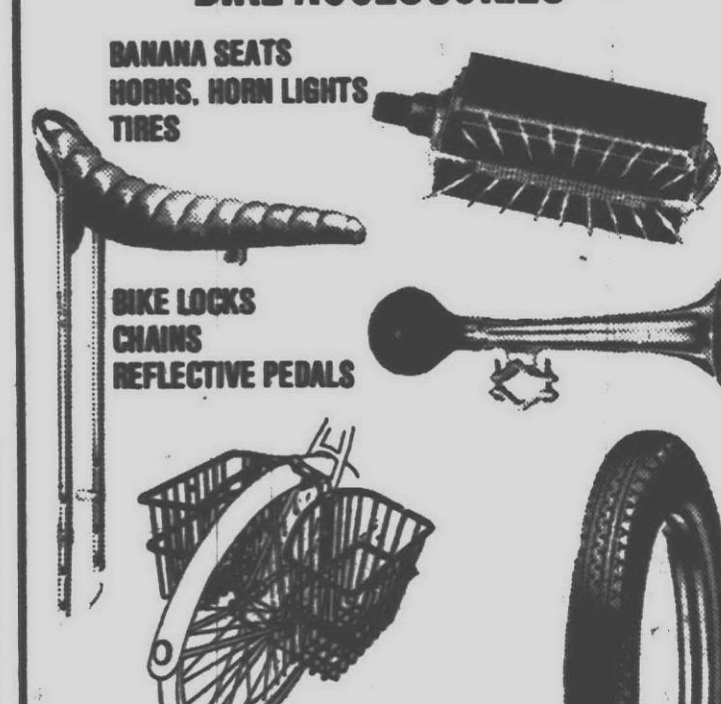

I-96 Still 3 Years From Completion

It will be another two and a half to three years before highway construction is completed and the M-14/I-96 Jeffries freeway will be open to traffic, according to Michigan State Highway officials.

Also known as the Schoolcraft expressway, the six-lane highway begins in Detroit's east side and terminates north of Ann Arbor.

Its suburban route takes it down Schoolcraft Rd. through Redford Township, Livonia and Plymouth Township.

"This expressway will be able to handle traffic adequately for at least the next 25 years," says Ed Boucher,

of the Michigan Highway public information office. "A six-lane highway of this type should be able to handle 150,000 cars in a 24 hour period."

Presently, the eight mile section between Telegraph and Haggerty Rd. handles between 30,000 and 40,000 automobiles in a 24 hour period. The amount of traffic decreases to about 8,000 west of Plymouth, according to Southeast Michigan Council of Governments statistics.

Planning for the 43-mile freeway was begun in the '50s and the six mile section running north of Ann Arbor was completed by 1965.

Actual construction of the

travel surface will begin in the Redford - Livonia area in mid-November. One of the first sections in the link to be completed will be that running between Beech Daly and Inkster, costing more than \$3 million in construction cost.

Cost for the entire project is financed 90 per cent by the federal government and 10 per cent by the state. The final estimate of completed cost is undetermined because of the rising cost of labor and materials since the project began.

Construction costs may vary mile by mile depending on the number of overpasses needed and the money paid

for right-of-way; that is, money paid for acquisitioned land, according to Boucher.

For the 12 mile section between Ann Arbor and Plymouth Township, more than \$5 million was spent on acquisition for 193 parcels of land.

Road construction costs are estimated to be more than \$17 million for the same section, with costs for overpasses and interchanges being about \$7 million.

"Aside from right-of-way costs and environmental considerations, road construction costs have risen 42 per cent and bridge costs 74 per cent in the 1956-69 period," says Boucher. "I imagine they have risen another 20 to 30 per cent since that time."

Construction costs of a mile long section vary between \$3 million and \$10 million.

Completion of a mile section, according to highway officials, takes the coordination of five contracting companies, with anywhere from three to 40 men working for each contractor. Those using the most manpower are the sewer and excavation companies.

Other contractors are paving, sodding and electrical.

"To minimize noise, the entire freeway through Livonia is to be recessed," says Ken McLenon, Wayne County district office engineer.

The freeway will be recessed until reaching the interchange at I-275 and Haggerty Rd.

The 'Almost' Capital

Marshall Opens Homes

MARSHALL

Historic Marshall, a rallying place for those who love 19th century homes and buildings, will greet visitors for its 10th annual historic home tour on Saturday and Sunday Sept. 8-9.

Three private homes never before open to the public and three that haven't been shown for several years are featured this year. Marshall is along I-94 about 60 miles west of Ann Arbor.

The event, sponsored by the Marshall Historical Society, also highlights Michigan's "almost" Governor's Mansion (1839), Capitol Hill School and Children's Museum (1860) and Honolulu House Museum (1860).

The nine buildings, all older than a century, include outstanding examples of Greek Revival, Gothic Revival, Italianate and Italian Villa styles. All are beautifully maintained and decorated.

Tour hours will be 9 to 5 on Saturday, and 10 to 5 on Sunday. Tour tickets at \$3 are available at booths as one enters the town.

As Michigan was being organized as a state, the existing cities jockeyed for preference as the sites for various institutions - a university at Ann Arbor, a prison at Jackson, a mental institution at Kalamazoo.

In this scheme, Marshall was to become state capital. For reasons the history books fail to make clear, however, the Legislature by a one vote margin gave that honor to Lansing Township.

Adding to the atmosphere of the last century will be church luncheons, bake sales, antique sale, arts and crafts fair, a band concert, an ice cream social, a Civil War encampment, barber-shop quartet singing, and a tintype photographer.

Some 30 civic, religious and fraternal organizations

and more than 1,000 private citizens work on some element of the event.

Large free parking areas have been set aside. Free shuttle busses make continuous trips from the parking areas passing within 20 to 100 yards of all eight buildings on tour.

Houses on tour this year include:

- C.W. Brooks House (1841-42) - This Greek Revival "Cottage Temple" contains many Hepplewhite, Duncan Phyfe and Sheraton originals as well as products of early Marshall furniture makers.
- Berry House (1843) -
- Wilcox House (1840s) - An early Marshall farmhouse, restored by Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Clyde H. Wilcox, it has a collection of early New England furniture and post-revolutionary American China. (Also on tour for the first time.)
- Perrett House (1860) - A

This Gothic Revival was owned by a politically prominent family in the early 20th century. President William Howard Taft, several Michigan governors, U.S. senators and congressmen were entertained here. (On tour for the first time.)

particularly beautiful example of the Gothic Revival style, this brick structure features one of Marshall's most attractive parlors and numerous family heirlooms, antiques and portraits.

•Thick House (1869) - This Italian-Villa home was built by an early clothing merchant. At the turn of the century, it became the home of William Wallace Cook, prolific author of Buffalo Bill, Frank Merriwell, Deadeye Dick and Nick Carter dime novels, for some 33 years.

•Greer House (1871) - Mabel Cooper Skjelver in her "19th Century Homes of Marshall" describes this as "a late Gothic Revival, more vertical in appearance" yet noting that the center second-floor window and the main entrance are arched in the Italianate manner. (First time).

•Michigan's first "Governor's Mansion" (1839) - This Greek Revival - style home was built by James Wright Gordon, an early Michigan lieutenant governor and governor, on speculation that Marshall would be state capital.

•Capitol Hill School (1860) - One of the last of the "little red schoolhouses" in existence, this building features a restored 19th Century Classroom and a Children's Museum. Restoration was done with proceeds of earlier tours.

•Honolulu House (1860) -The most unusual building in Marshall, it was built by a former U.S. consul to the Sandwich (now Hawaiian) Islands. Judge Abner Pratt is said to have modeled it after his residence in Honolulu. It's the headquarters of the Marshall Historical Society and also contains a museum of 19th Century furniture and artifacts.

Campsite Deal Offered Buyers

Pigeons Prove To Be Good Sports

It all started 20 years ago for Gerald Beller of Farmington when he paid a boy 50 cents not to kill a pigeon. Beller, who raises pigeons for racing, recalled the incident which started him in the hobby.

"I was walking through an alley in Detroit and saw a kid shooting at a wounded pigeon. I paid him 50 cents not to kill it. I took it home and

tried to nurse it back to health, but the cat got it." Beller has come a long way since then and now owns 68 birds. But he explains only 38 of these will be kept as he weeds out the undesirable ones.

And of those 38, Beller explains, only 20 will be used as flyers and the rest will be used for breeding.

The different strains of pigeons Beller has are dordain, sion, stassart, bekharis, des-



met, corrians and vanheck. All are homing pigeons.

Beller says a good pigeon will cost anywhere from \$10 to \$50. He said a pigeon was sold in Belgium, where pigeon racing is a national sport, for \$9,600.

As far as expenses, Beller says it's only expensive if you make it so.

"The average person can

do just as well with 20 or 30 birds as 100."

He did say that the price of feed for the birds has increased the past year.

"Last year I paid \$10 per hundred pounds of feed. This year I pay over \$12 for the same amount."

Beller figures it costs \$10 to \$12 to feed 20 to 30 birds over a period of six weeks. He spends an average of \$150 per year on feed.

Other expenses include

grit, medication, a loft for the birds and carrying cages. Beller estimates he has invested about \$2,500 in his pigeons over the past 10 years.

Although his pigeons have won a total of 22 trophies for him, there's very little prize money in it.

"I'm not in this for the money. You have to love it to do it."

Beller, a member of the Northwest Pigeon Flyers, Club which is part of the Northwest Pigeon Racing Assn., says all birds must have a band on their leg before they can race.

He begins training his birds at about 2 1/2 to three

months old. He begins by taking them a few miles from home, releases them and they return to their loft. He increases the distance from home each time he takes them out.

The furthest one of his birds has ever flown is 700 miles. The bird is a vanheck, one of his favorites which is now used only for breeding. The average flying age of a bird is six months to eight years.

According to Beller, a pigeon can fly 500 miles in one day, depending on weather conditions. For a 90-mile race on a fair day it would take a bird two hours at 30 to 60 miles per hour.

The birds sometimes undergo many hazards during a race, such as broken legs from running into utility wires.

"I've had several birds break legs or get caught by a hawk. But otherwise they're pretty healthy birds. They don't often get sick if you keep their loft clean."

Beller says pigeon racing is becoming a popular sport, with an estimated 2,000 participants in Detroit and the surrounding area.

He says his wife Jackie, 11-year-old son Jerry and seven-year-old daughter Kathryn have also become interested in the sport and often help him during the racing season which runs from April to October.

Tim Richard writes

Our Trash Could Heat Factories -- No Dream

Imagine a heating plant in the industrial corridor of Livonia and Plymouth that could serve:

Chevrolet's Spring and Bumper plant, the Ford Transmission plant, National Can Corp., Observer Newspapers, Burroughs Corp., Associated Spring, Evans Products, perhaps even Madonna College and St. Mary Hospital.

Imagine further that this plant burned neither coal nor oil or gas but trash — the tons of solid wastes that homes and businesses place at their curbs and alleys to be trucked away and buried.

It's possible, says Arch Vallier, who prides himself on being a practical engineer and man of business, and not a pie-in-the-sky visionary.

Last week the executive committee of SEMCOG (Southeast Michigan Council of Governments) gave Vallier another go-ahead signal for a project that may be 10 or 15 years away.

In Observerland, Vallier is known as a retired engineer, former Plymouth city commissioner and current member of the Schoolcraft College board. But Vallier is also chairman of a SEMCOG advisory body called the Council on Environmental Strategy.

A couple of months ago, SEMCOG received an engineering re-

port from the consulting firm of Metcalf and Eddy, Inc. which Vallier denounced as "politically unsalable." He said it failed to recognize the interests of local governments and business in disposing of solid waste.

SEMCOG's new action, taken at Vallier's request, was to set up a Solid Waste Committee of policy-makers rather than engineers.

"Our stress will be on a long-range program of energy recovery," said Vallier when I interviewed him. "We want to turn waste into some kind of useful products. We'll have two meetings a month and offer some policy plans by the end of the year."

The Solid Waste Committee is to make recommendations on:

- "The establishment of the responsibility for the disposal of all types of solid wastes generated in the region.

- "The administrative framework...

- "Legislative proposals" to accomplish those tasks.

- "A configuration of facilities" to dispose of solid wastes that will have (a) minimum negative effect on the environment; (b) maximum resource recovery and (c) least cost.

- How to finance the capital costs and pay operating costs.

Two familiar names on the

committee will be State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) and Oakland County Commissioner Lawrence Pernick (D-Southfield).

Other members are expected to come from auto companies, a bottling firm, the state Dept. of Natural Resources and local government.

That's why Vallier calls it a policy committee rather than an engineering group.

But about that giant heating plant in the Observerland industrial corridor: "No more of this burying trash," Vallier told me, although landfills will have to be the short-term solution to disposing of solid waste.

Trash can be burned and used for heat. Vallier notes that GM's Pontiac truck and coach plant plans to do just that, and reduce its consumption of coal by 40 per cent next year. He has also studied with enthusiasm Nashville's new project to heat and cool 20 major downtown buildings from a trash-burning thermal plant.

Trash can be a source of materials.

Trash can even be a source of oil. Vallier wants to find out more about a reported Connecticut project to do just that. It's not as wild an idea as it sounds, he says, because "oil is just trees and garbage under high temperature and pressure."

Official Acts Are Legal, But Public Has Doubts

From the State Supreme Court in Lansing to the local city halls in the suburbs, ethical conflict of interest issues have been raised about public officials' actions.

The aftermath of the Watergate disclosures created an attitude of super cynicism among voters and the press.

Another element of pressure is the political axes some public and private persons want to grind at the expense of elected officials.

But the most serious flaw in past and present conflict of interest issues is the lack of vision possessed by public officials caught in the middle of controversies.

This lack leads public officials to ask attorneys or legal advisors if there is any "legal" conflict of interest in a pending issue they are involved in.

In all cases, the conclusion has been there is none, and those officials are free to pursue their proposed course.

But they fail to see the ethical conflict which is obvious to many other persons familiar with the facts.

The only legal barrier against an elected official being directly involved with a rezoning issue or contract or related issue is whether the official has a direct financial interest.

There are numerous other factors entering the situation which make it clear — actually crystal clear — that the legal definition of a conflict of interest leaves much to be desired from public officials.

The most recent conflict issue in Lansing was resolved last week when Supreme Court Justice Thomas Brennan announced his resignation to work fulltime for his private law school.

The school was partially supported by donations generated by a mass solicitation of lawyers. While lawyers are free to contrib-

ute funds or ignore the financial plea from the law school, it takes no professor of political science to determine the plea for funds stands a better chance when the man making it is a State Supreme Court justice.

There is an unspoken threat made by the justice who solicits funds from lawyers who stand the possibility of appearing before the court.

On a more local level, Westland City Councilman Glenn Shaw Jr. saw no legal conflict of interest in supporting a rezoning petition in which his employer was a partner.

Shaw changed his mind a day later, but recall petitions drafted by homeowners opposed to the re-

zoning are still being circulated against Shaw.

Public officials in other suburbs display more discretion about potential conflicts.

In Berkley a councilman employed by Detroit Edison Co. refused to vote or discuss any matter involving Edison. He left the council chambers while the matter was being debated so his presence would put no pressure on his colleagues.

That kind of vision toward future consequences and what the public might think if the opposite actions were taken is what elected officials need.

If they lack vision, ethical conflict of interest issues will continue to plague suburban officials.

We, Too, Are Caught By Newsprint Shortage

Our readers may be wondering why some of their favorite features appear to have vanished from the Observer Newspapers columns in the past two editions.

No, it isn't true such articles have been dropped; the truth of the matter is the Observers, like newspapers in every section of the land, have been caught in the newsprint shortage and are doing everything possible to conserve use.

The strikes of eight Canadian newsprint mills have made the situation critical for most newspapers in the United States. Two of the mills shut down by labor difficulties are Price Co. pulp and paper plants.

Realizing that the strike may continue for some time, the Observers are tightening up at every possible point, cutting corners wherever possible to make the available supply of newsprint last as long as possible.

That's why some things may be missing from your editions. The news and editorial space have been reduced. There may be restrictions on some kinds of advertising. Everything will be tightened to conserve newsprint and assure readers of getting their newspapers delivered as usual until the situation eases.

We hope you'll bear with us during a trying time. It could well be that additional reductions will have to be made in editorial space, but the Observer staff is geared to turn out the same bright, spritely product as always.

Will SR Voters Follow Plymouth's Lead At The Polls?

Do voters in the South Redford School District care whether extra-curricular activities continue, or are they going to take the attitude that such things are so much nonsense and should be dropped as soon as possible?

Basically, that's the question that will be answered in Saturday's election when electors will either approve a request for three additional mills for operations or turn it down.

The same question was asked in June, and it went down to a resounding "No."

If it is rejected for the second time in three months, then school officials will be forced to make cutbacks of \$790,000 in services.

And among the items slated to go would be all varsity sports. This is taken to mean all sports at Thurston High, including the recently introduced programs for girls.

Strangely enough, the marching band is not listed among the proposed cuts... but one wonders just what a well trained group of musicians will do this fall if there isn't a football team to attract crowds.

What will the bandsmen do during the winter if there isn't a basketball program? We wonder how many folks would walk out to the football field on the cool days of the early fall to see the band go through its maneuvers.

We guarantee the stands would be quite empty except for the parents and relatives who showed up to see what their sons, daughters, nephews and nieces had planned for the halftime show at the games.

We would like to make a head count of those attending a band concert during the winter on the basketball court in place of the regular game.

One concert, perhaps two, might have a crowd but for 10 programs? ... Well, we believe there would be plenty of other attractions in the area that would be most interesting.

We can't quite believe voters in South Redford can be that hard-nosed to reject the millage request. However, if they do tell the school board to go ahead and make the cuts by nixing the request, then the trustees should make the cutbacks and FORGET ABOUT additional millage for this year.

Drop the programs, drop everything it said it would, and when

the complaints start pouring in, just tell the voters: "This is what you voted for, and we'll let it stand for this school year."

Plymouth was faced with the same kind of decision recently when a second request was made for new school millage after it failed in June.

The question there was: Who cares about the proposed cutbacks? Is it only the parents of participants who want the programs continued? Does the community as a whole care that much?

The answer, judging from the second vote in Plymouth, is parents of the participants and friends.

They want to see their children perform; they believe in the value of extra-curricular activities and want to give their youngsters every chance to perform.

Whether the parents can work the same miracle in South Redford that happened in Plymouth remains to be seen.

In the first Plymouth vote in June, the vote was 2,697 AGAINST and 1,889 for, with a scant 20 per cent turning out.

In the balloting three weeks back, the story was 2,283 for and 1,917 against with a mere 18 per cent at the polls. It proves that more parents turned out the second time while fewer of the anti group bothered to vote. Would you want to believe only 4,200 took time to go to the voting booths for such an important issue?

Perhaps that's what the South Redford board hopes will take place Saturday: The parents and friends vote, and the "no" group finds other things to do.

What other reason could there be to hold an election on a millage increase on a Saturday? We haven't heard of a Saturday election in this area for a long time. Maybe the trustees know what they are doing, but just suppose they guessed wrong and the anti-anything group as far as tax boosts are concerned does get to the polls. It will be interesting to see what the final count is come Saturday night.

Sense And Nonsense

A former Observerland city manager who resigned under pressure was seen recently driving with a bumper sticker on his car touting the famous free fair held annually in the Michigan city he's been eyeing for a new job.

The alternatives are (1) for the Legislature to revise attendance and public employee strike laws, or (2) for teacher and pupil to meet in the pokey.

School truancy is against the law but can be justified because the law hasn't thrown errant pupils into jail. Thus, the reward of escaping boredom is greater than the punishment.

Teachers who disagree with this rationalization ought to consider their position of breaking the law by striking for economic advan-

tages, knowing well that the law won't throw errant educators in jail.

An Observerland service club member commented recently at a luncheon meeting that the Detroit News traditionally criticizes large firms, such as the Auto Club and American Motors, for moving offices from Detroit to the suburbs and thereby "abandoning" the central city.

The club member then noted that nothing was said about The News moving all of its production operations to its new Sterling Heights plant.

In a fine gesture of non-partisan support, Farmington Councilman John Allen insisted on equal privileges when the Oakland County Republicans came before the council for a permit for fund-raising.

"I think that when the...what's the name of that other party? Well, anyway, we ought to give them the same privilege in the resolution."

In Teaching, Quality Counts Most

EDITOR:

I am writing in reply to Ronald Jones of Plymouth. I am 28, married, a resident of Farmington Hills, formerly of Livonia and Detroit. I am now on maternity leave after teaching and substituting for 5½ years (not in Plymouth). I feel that it would be a sad situation if residency were to be the main criterion for employment with any school system. Quality, not location, should be most important. The Detroit Federation of Teachers, of which I am a member, has been fighting this very attitude in Detroit.

As to Mr. Jones' argument that a teacher should have a knowledge of the community, that can be gained by dil-

gent reading of local papers such as the Observer, not necessarily by living there. A board of education should hire the most qualified people, not on the basis of residency alone.

Forty and 50-year-old ladies are not old, nor would they be better off at home. Many of the older lady teachers that I have talked to must work; they also have families to support (they are widows, or never-married, or divorcees, or have unemployed or ill husbands, or their husbands are still in school). Also, should not seniority (and familiarity with the individual schools) be considered, not just who has a family to support?

I also have been a sub and know of others who sub. Most are listed on the sub rosters of several communities, not just one, so they can work a full week more easily. The high school where I taught had a staff of over 150 teachers, yet there were many days when only five teachers were absent. What training does Mr.

Jones have and in what fields? Social studies and English are extremely over-supplied. Many systems prefer a master's degree for a high school position and some impoverished systems prefer hiring bachelor degree people with no experience because of the lower salary involved.

If Mr. Jones has been substituting, with an application for a permanent position in for 1½ years, perhaps he should be being this to the attention of his local union or the local branch of the MEA. The Detroit board was recently ordered to give contracts to many subs who were filling vacancies after the DFT argued on the side of the subs.

Has Mr. Jones gotten any letters of recommendation from administrators in the Plymouth system that he has worked for as a sub (department head, principal, assistant principal) or have they been unhappy with his service? In Detroit, any sub working in any school over five days in a row is rated by

his superior. A good subbing job could influence a particular administrator to contact the board about hiring Mr.

Jones when a vacancy occurs in his building. I wish Mr. Jones luck in finding a position in

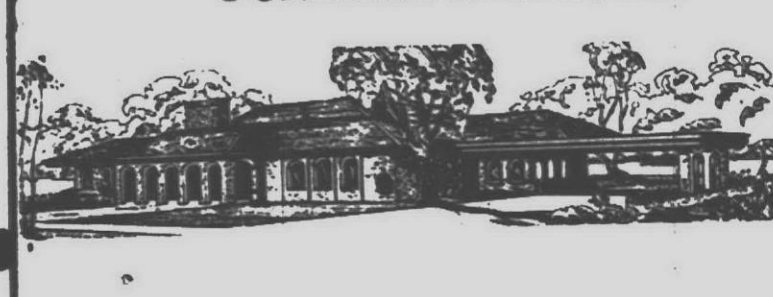

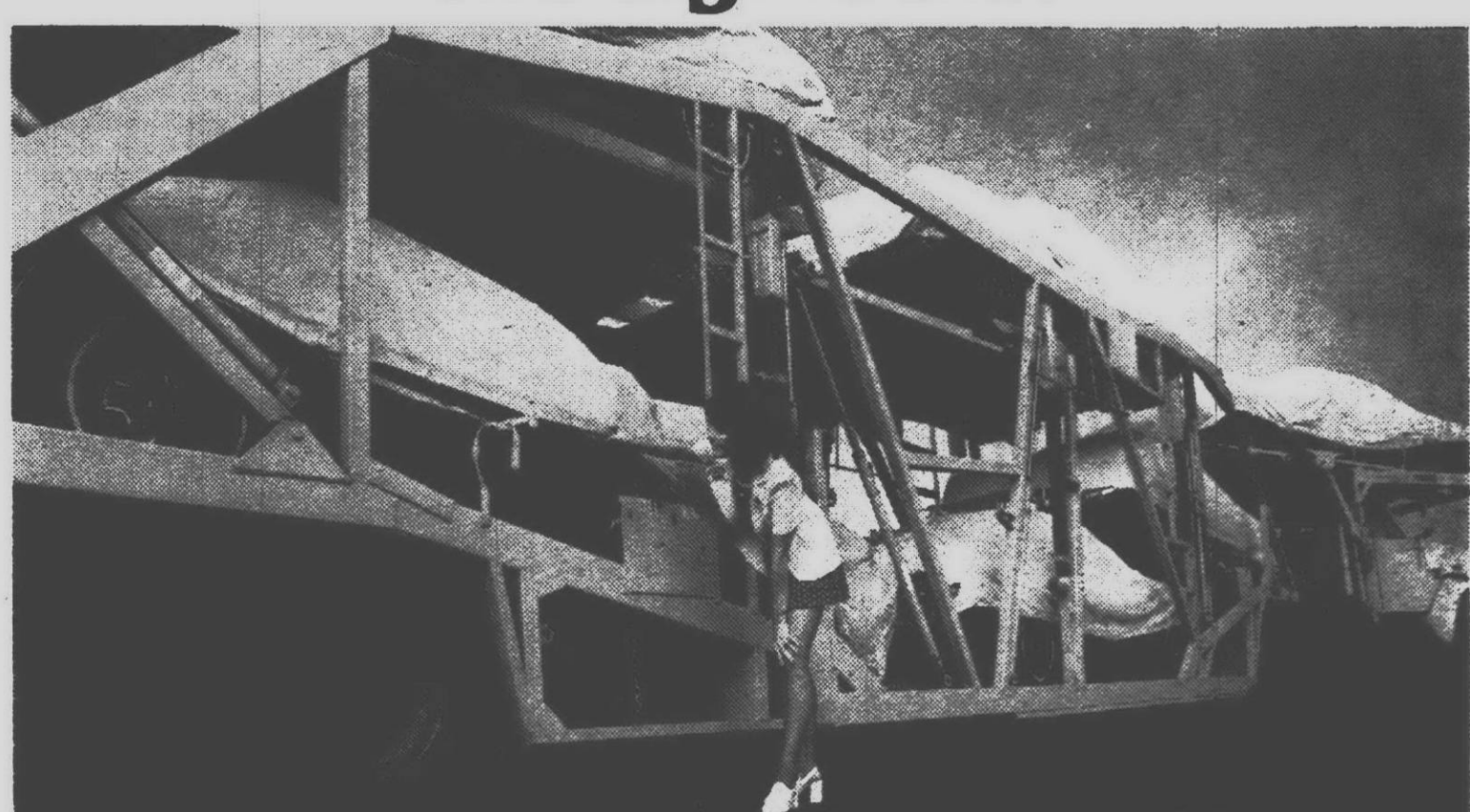

An Observer Roundup

Teacher strikes delayed school opening this week in

Strikes Hit 3 School Districts; SR In Mediation; S'fld Settles

three Observerland districts - Livonia, Farmington and Garden City.

Pay hikes were an issue in all cases.

Elsewhere classes began on schedule.

Clarenceville and Redford Union teachers reported for work without new contracts but with negotiations continuing.

Plymouth and Wayne-Westland teachers went to work under terms of the final year of multi-year contracts.

Southfield reached agreement of a new pact before scheduled start of classes.

Bargainers in South Redford, where school was slated to begin Sept. 10, were

reported still haggling over non-economic issues at mid-week with economics still to be discussed.

Supt. Joseph Rzepka said he was "optimistic" with negotiations going on around the clock. A state mediator was asked to join the talks.

The teacher walkouts in Livonia, Farmington and Garden City were the first ever in those districts.

School administrators in each district notified parents to keep their children home until otherwise advised.

Major issues in Livonia, whose 1,600 teachers reportedly voted "overwhelmingly" to strike, were pay increases and cost of living allowance.

The Board of Education offered a 2.3 per cent pay boost but without a cost of living allowance provided in the expired contract. The district also sought to replace total medical insurance coverage with partial coverage.

Salaries and class size were the issues which put Farmington's 800 teachers on the picket line.

The Farmington Education Assn. (FEA), representing the teachers, sought a six-plus per cent wage increase while the district offered five per cent.

However, class size was ranked even higher than salary as a teacher demand, according to Roger Allen, FEA executive director.

The FEA wants a pledge of no more than 30 students in any one class. The school administration wants to continue current practice of staying within a building teacher-student ratio.

Pay was the single issue in the Garden City strike. Teachers turned down an offered eight per cent salary increase including "increment" or five per cent without "increment."

"Increment" refers to automatic wage hikes based on length of service and in-

creased education.

Southfield negotiated the first two year contract in the district's history. It provided a five per cent pay hike this year and a three to six per cent cost of living allowance next year.

The Southfield Education Assn. (SEA) failed to obtain binding arbitration but did get increased hospital and life insurance, reduced K-6 class size and improved longevity pay of an extra \$250 annually after 15 years. It also secured released time for teachers to work on curriculum development.

Plymouth teachers received an approximate 4.5 per cent increase in pay under the second year of a two year contract negotiated in November 1972. Administration officials said they were hopeful of early negotiation of next year's pact.

Class size has not been an issue in Plymouth, despite a school population boom which could cause problems. In both Clarenceville and Redford Union, economics were said to be the main issue still unresolved. Precise offers and demands were undisclosed.

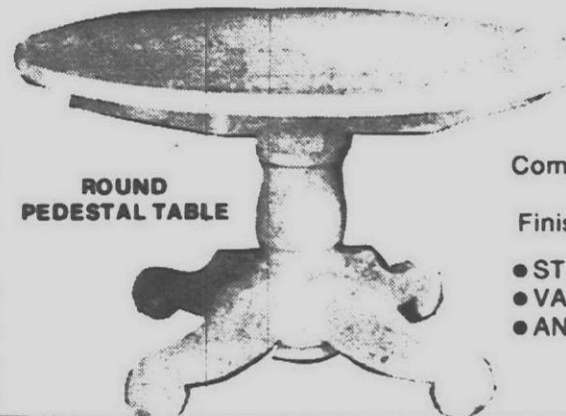

Meeting Teacher: An Exciting Time For First Graders

Hundreds of Observerland children are about to meet a person they'll remember the rest of their lives—their first grade teacher.

And if some of the kids aren't anxious to start that acquaintance, the teachers are, local teachers' strikes notwithstanding.

"It's an exciting time," said Mrs. Nancy Simanek, who begins her ninth year of teaching first graders at Farmington's Fairview School this fall.

"I can hardly wait for school to start. I'm anxious to meet my new first graders and to see how the children I had last year have grown."

Mrs. Garnet Hoover, long-time first grade teacher at Livonia's Jackson School, has taught every grade from first through eighth, but "the first grade is the one I love," she said.

That love is returned, both by the children and their parents.

One hundred of them got together a few years back and gave her a banquet billed as starring "the best teacher in the world."

She's had "orchards of apples" as gifts from her children in the 35 years since she began teaching in a one room schoolhouse in West Virginia.

Mrs. Hoover, who frankly is stout, tells the children she shouldn't eat candy, so they bring apples instead.

"Apples, yes," laughed Mrs. Simanek, "and dead mice and flowers they've picked from along some other family's fence on their way to school."

Mrs. Hoover, who is thinking of retiring at the end of this year, has spent 25 of her 35 teaching years with first graders. Mrs. Simanek began teaching 20 years ago in Birmingham.

Both women see their jobs as "fun" and a "challenge." They also are aware of the responsibility.

They are the ones who form a child's attitude toward the rest of his school years. And they furnish him with the basics on which the rest of his education is built.

"They start from nothing and go up to something," said Mrs. Simanek who was 1971 Michigan Teacher of the Year. "The rate of growth is phenomenal."

The children arrive in first grade as "babies," and "you can see the growth as they begin thinking, working, reading, gaining in self confidence," the women said.

"It's the place where you have to work the hardest, but where you get the greatest rewards," Mrs. Hoover observed. "There's never a dull moment. And they come up with the cutest remarks. They tell us things they never would say at home."

Mrs. Simanek calls first grade "the toothless year."

"It's when they have these gaping holes between their

teeth and the year they're supposed to learn sounds," she chuckled. "They just can't form the sounds without teeth."

Mrs. Hoover, a buxom, motherly woman, has no children of her own "but I try so hard to understand other people's children," she said earnestly. "Maybe some of them come from a big family where there is no time to give each one understanding. They are seeking love, and I try to respond."

"I don't believe in under-rating myself," she went on firmly, "and I don't believe you could find a child who would say he didn't like me."

Mrs. Hoover says she's strict with the children in some ways, but she lets them "have their say."

"They know I may not agree with them, but I let them express the way they feel," she said.

Children are "more outspoken today and question a lot more" than 35 years ago, Mrs. Hoover said. They're more difficult to handle because children used to fear the teacher, "which was really wrong," she said.

But basically, "kids are kids and have been since time immemorial," she smiled.

"Teaching is more interesting now than it was then because we have so many things to teach with," she said, "but the kids don't learn any better."

"Anyone who is determined to learn will learn," she said.

Mrs. Hoover also thinks that in some ways the older system of drilling lessons was good.

"You can only learn spell-

ing by drills," she said. She drilled her pupils in math facts last year, and "a few didn't get them, but only a very few."

Mrs. Simanek sees children as "more knowledgeable" now than they were 20 years ago. They are better traveled and have gained from educational programs on TV.

"Sesame Street is more valuable than years of nursery school," she declared.

But she sees television as "not all a good influence," as well. "Unlimited TV viewing and violence are very bad," she said.

Mrs. Simanek thinks the biggest change in teaching is in "the way we look at a child now as an individual instead of just one of a group."

"In Farmington, especially, we dig deeply into the individual child," she said.

She's happy, too, about growing parent enthusiasm and involvement in education.

"Newspapers, magazines and television have contributed greatly to parent understanding of the schools," she said.

And if people remember their first grade teacher, the teachers remember them, too.

Mrs. Simanek said she still gets wedding announcements and notes from her former first graders.

She keeps informed about others from teacher friends still in Birmingham where she started.

"Then there are some you worry about the most who move and you never hear any more," she said. "You keep wondering about them sometimes many years later."

The group will meet the first and third Thursday of each month and will read and discuss 16 selections over a nine-month period.

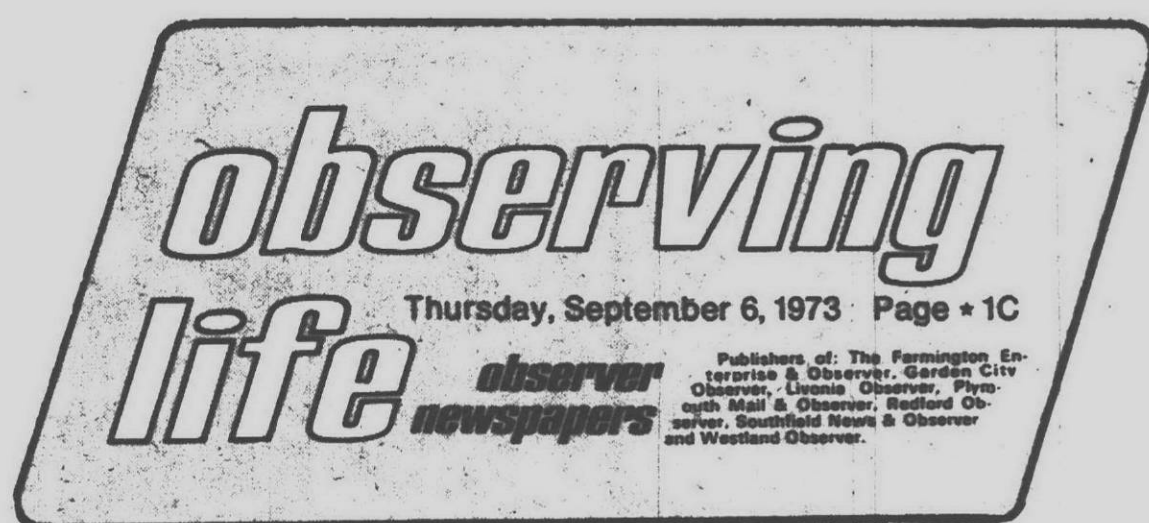
A reading list and schedule can be obtained from any Livonia library, the Plymouth library or the Northville library.

Theresa has received assistance from the Children's Leukemia Foundation of Michigan, one of many agencies that benefits from the United Way.

She was chosen to symbolize the thousands who benefit from the work of all the agencies.

Her selection as poster child was announced during a press luncheon in Lansing hosted by William C. Marshall, president of the Michigan AFL-CIA and a member of the UWM board of directors.

In the poster, Theresa appears with three union members to convey the spirit of working, living and giving together.

Theresa lives at 27883 Independence with her grandmother, Mrs. Dan McDonald, her father, Dan McDonald Jr., and her five-year-old sister, Kathy.

Her sickness was diagnosed two years ago, and at that time the Leukemia Foundation began its assistance, providing medicine, blood and counseling services. It offers such services to patients suffering from many serious blood diseases.

Mrs. Harry Brown of Farmington, executive direc-

tor for the CLFM, took Theresa to the Lansing luncheon, where the little girl received a scroll from Speaker William Ryan of the Michigan House of Representatives.

While Theresa's future is clouded, foundation members point to encouraging statistics.

A few years ago, they say, the life expectancy of a child with leukemia was two weeks to six months. Today it's not unusual for a youngster to live for five to 10 years, even longer.

"And who knows," one official added, "in five or 10 years a cure could be found. That would save Theresa and all the others."

Theresa has progressed remarkably in the two years she has been in treatment. For a while she was listless and refused to eat, but now she's as pretty and lively as any child of three.

"Theresa couldn't be happier than she is now," her grandmother said.

And while continuing her happy life, she gives encouragement through her appearance on the poster to gifts to the United Way campaigns.

Dry Milk Dishes Thrifty, Nutritious

By ELLY

According to nutritionists, the best protein buy available is nonfat dry milk solids.

The amount necessary to provide the number of grams of protein your body can use in one day costs half as much as cottage cheese, 1/3 as much as turbot, 1/6 as much as cheddar cheese and

1/20 as much as lamb chops.

Hospital dietitians add extra quantities of nonfat dry milk to the food consumed by accident patients. The high calcium content of the dry milk hastens the healing process of broken bones.

A result of the decrease in milk consumption over the past 15 years has been a corresponding increase in calcium deficiency diseases and teeth and gum problems.

So in spite of inflated food costs, there is no need to deprive your family of required protein and calcium. The addition of nonfat dry milk can boost the quality of many dishes without boosting the calories.

FRENCH POTATO SOUP
4 green onions, sliced
1/4 c. (1/2 stick) butter
2 c. thinly sliced potatoes
2 c. chicken broth
2 c. reconstituted milk
Salt and pepper to taste
Chopped parsley

Cook green onions in butter for three minutes; add potatoes and chicken broth. Simmer until potatoes are tender, about 15 minutes.

Sieve mixture through a food mill. Add dry milk, salt and pepper. May be served hot or cold. Garnish with chopped parsley. Serves four.

CHICKEN MUSHROOM CASSEROLE

3 c. diced cooked chicken
2 pkgs. (10 oz. each) frozen chopped broccoli, cooked
4 ounces (about 2 c.) noodles, cooked

1 jar (4 oz.) sliced mushrooms, drained
1-quart envelope instant dry milk
3 T. flour
1 1/2 c. water
2 T. butter

1/4 c. whipping cream, whipped
1/4 c. salad dressing
1 t. Worcestershire sauce
2 T. sherry
Salt and pepper

1/3 c. grated Parmesan cheese
Combine chicken, broccoli, noodles and mushrooms. Spoon into buttered 1 1/2-quart baking dish. Combine dry milk and flour in a saucepan; blend in water. Cook on medium heat until thickened. Add butter, cream, salad dressing, Worcestershire sauce and sherry; season to taste. Spoon over chicken mixture; mix well. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 375 degrees for 25 minutes or until heated through. Place under broiler until lightly browned. Serves six.

BAKED MEAT LOAF RING

3 slices soft bread, cubed
1 egg, beaten
3/4 c. water
3/4 c. instant dry milk
3/4 lb. ground beef
1/2 lb. bulk pork sausage
1 medium onion, chopped
3 T. catsup
1 T. horseradish
1 t. salt
1/8 t. pepper

Combine bread, egg and water; add remaining ingredients. Mix well. Pack firmly in a well-greased one quart ring mold. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. Let stand a few minutes. Pour off liquid. Turn onto heated platter. Fill center with creamed vegetables. Makes six servings.

BEEF VEGETABLE SOUP
1/2 lb. ground beef
1 T. butter
1/2 c. chopped green pepper
1 medium onion, chopped
1 medium potato, pared and cubed
1 medium carrot, thinly sliced
1 quart water
2 T. butter
2 T. flour
2 t. salt
1 quart envelope instant dry milk

Brown beef in one tablespoon butter in saucepan. Add green pepper and onion; cook five minutes. Add potato and carrot. Add one cup water; cook over medium heat until vegetables are tender. Melt two tablespoons butter; stir in flour, salt, remaining water and dry milk. Heat until hot. Stir into beef vegetable mixture; heat and serve hot. Makes 1 1/2 quarts or six servings.

LEMON RICE PUDDING
1-quart envelope dry milk
2 1/2 c. water
1/2 c. uncooked rice
1/2 c. sugar
1/2 t. salt
2 eggs, beaten
1 1/2 T. lemon juice
1/2 c. seedless raisins
Chopped pecans

Combine dry milk and water; add rice. Cook in top of double boiler over hot water until rice is soft, about 50 to 60 minutes. Add sugar, salt and eggs; cook until slightly thickened and mixture coats a spoon. Stir in lemon juice and raisins. Cool. Spoon into individual dessert dishes. Serve warm or cold, sprinkled with nuts. Makes six servings.

MOCHA MILK SHAKE
2 c. reconstituted dry milk
2 eggs, beaten
2 t. instant coffee powder
2 T. light cream

Combine ingredients; mix well. Chill. Pour into chilled glasses. Two servings.

Festival Promises To Be Best Ever

Every year the Plymouth Fall Festival is said to be "the best ever" -- and this year is no exception.

The popular event where a quiet colonial town opens its doors to thousands of visitors for four days grows larger and broader with each season.

It was back in 1956 that the tradition began when the Plymouth Rotary Club held a chicken barbecue and corn roast. About 125 persons turned out for the event.

Last year, more than 60,000 persons enjoyed the festivities. The growth of the Fall Festival has been a tribute to the hard work of the many volunteers and service groups that pitch in to make it possible.

But the growth of the event hasn't taken away the friendly, home-townish atmosphere even though, as festivals go, it's one of the state's biggest.

Four days of fantastic home style "dinners" begin Thursday with a German style knackwurst dinner, followed on Friday by a fish dinner.

On Saturday a pancake dinner runs all day and a beef rib dinner is featured in the afternoon and evening.

This year the Rotary Club chicken barbecue, the mainstay of the festival, is expected to serve 15,000 dinners.

In addition to those major dinners, several smaller concession stands will offer a variety of national dishes and popular American foods.

But food isn't all there is to the fall festival.

If you visit town during this weekend, be sure to see the Antique Mart and the Arts and Crafts Show. There's even a double decker bus that will provide rides from Kellogg Park area, where most events occur, to the city's Old Village area.

More than 60,000 persons are expected to take in the wide array of events and entertainment which is provided free almost continuously at the bandstand by Kellogg Park.

The festival is the culmination of a year-long effort for the Fall Festival Board, whose usually-monthly meetings become more frequent (weekly or more often) as July and August pass and the event is at hand.

The board handles the overall festival details including table and chair rental, publicity, entertainment, scheduling and arranging for the necessary auxiliary services.

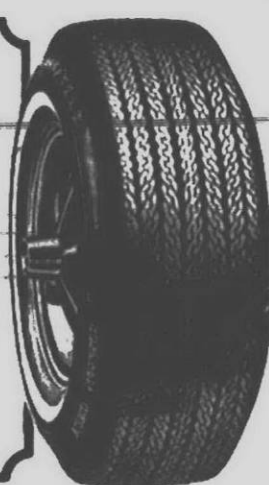

Festival Is Golden For Shutterbugs

Most people have always thought of the Fall Festival as being the largest "family" reunion around, because you always meet and talk to people you haven't seen in a year. There are other favorites: the men flipping pancakes at the pancake festival;

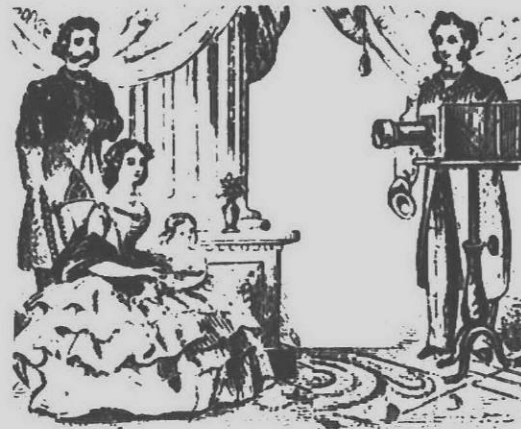
Rotarians laboring on the chicken barbecue spits; the people dressed in costumes.

Want color slides! The festival can be very colorful, and again the pet show tops our list. But the chicken roast on Sunday, the art show, the old cars, the costumes, and the orange booths offer possibilities.

AT THE barbecue Sunday, there's plenty of color -- and steam. There's a steam engine that makes a great color picture -- early, mid-day or late and the man who tends the engine will give you a rundown. He might pose with the giant relic of bygone days, too.

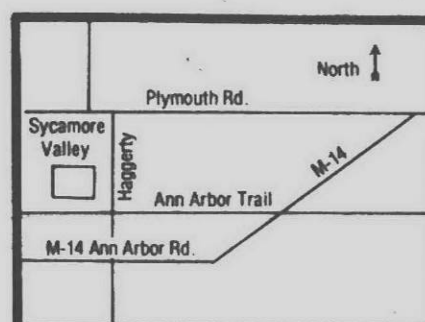

Plymouth Leads Festival Boom

We are witnessing a festival boom in this state as almost every community has some sort of annual fair or festival.

The festivals seem to have the right combination of down-home warmth, good food, and fun for the family to make them successful.

In the Oberverland area, Plymouth, Farmington, Livonia and Southfield all have festivals of one kind or another.

Attendance at all of them has been literally unbelievable.

In Southfield the Arts Council this year launched the city's second festival and were overwhelmed when 15,000 people turned out for the three-day event.

Livonia is the johnny-come-lately in the festival business.

Fairs in the older towns of Plymouth and Farmington are a bit more sedate but are drawing big crowds every year.

The Farmington Founders' Festival is held at the end of July every year. Mer-

chants take the opportunity to put on big sales but there are lots of events for the service clubs so they can raise money.

The parade in Farmington is a big event and it moves down old Grand River. The YMCA holds a marathon race.

A pigeon race is a publicity gimmick used to launch the festival.

And there is food all over -- available at the Elks Club ox roast, as well as the good dinners at the Masonic Temple.

Now the Founders Festival is gearing up for a big year in 1974 as the city celebrates its 150th anniversary.

In Plymouth, the Fall Festival seems to be as strong as ever, with record crowds eating all the chicken the Rotarians can cook.

The Fall Festival remains unique in Plymouth in that commercial vendors are kept out of the Festival area so you don't have "flea market" type booths selling those awful bright colored paintings on velvet or grasshoppers blown in thin glass.

All the festivals are great fun and after attending the events in Southfield, Farmington, Livonia and Plymouth I must admit to some hometown pride when I say Plymouth's the best.

There still remains in Plymouth that "family get-together" atmosphere that is missing in the other events.

Fair rides and carnival booths are fun but nothing really can beat the local pet show and those cookies made by the ladies of the Grange Hall.

Nowhere else do you see the superintendent of schools in a white apron, his face beet-red, working on a line of chickens grilling over hot charcoal.
