Sunday's events center around the Rotary Club's famous chicken barbecue from noon to 6 p.m.



The Tartan surface is "glued" to the four-inch thick concrete floor. Below the concrete is an open space where some type of pressure apparently is forming and has no other escape than to seep through the concrete years," he said. and cause the Tartan to bubble.

After two letters to the Farmington-based contractor, a meeting was held last week between school officials, the contractor and architects of the school.

Alexander Ferguson, owner of the contracting firm, stated that a school district agreed to put vents into the report indicated that "the area below the concrete and floor appears to be in a state attempt to release the water or air pressure into tunnels

running below the school. If this relieves the pressure, the floor will be repaired and accepted by the district. If it doesn't work, Meeting Early Blunk speculated that, as a "last resort." a wood floor will be installed on top of the tartan.

When the school was designed, a Tartan Floor was recommended by the athletic department and school district, Blunk said. is not available, it could conceivably run into millions of dollars. Detroit's system cost between \$6 and \$7 million, and it has the advantage of one police and fire department and telephone exchanges which are mostly restricted to the city boundaries.

The Plymouth exchange's geographic area involved includes six fire departments, two police departments, the county and state since State Police and two sheriff's patrols would be involved, Gignac said.

The departments would have to forfeit some of their own identity because they would give up their own dispatchers in favor of a central dispatcher, he added.

"We discussed it as long as five years ago, and the problem we confronted is the number of areas involved." he said. "I'm 100 per cent for it, but how do you do it unless you have a magic fairy with a little wand to tap somebody on the head?" Ford said the system "requires an operator knowl-





Despite our own eyesores, he lauded the U.S. for its efforts to stem pollution. Other countries eventually must



Willow Lippert is a Southfield resident who is wholeheartedly dedicated to making those olden years truly golden.

As director of Southfield's extensive "Over 50" program, Mrs. Lippert takes an innovative approach in reaching the 10,000 residents of her city who are over 60 as well as many who are below that mark.

Last winter senior citizens and teens shared a ski'n sea weekend at Harbor Springs, enjoying the unaccustomed benefits of each others' company. "Parents are often frightened of teenagers," explained Mrs. Lippert of the program's success, "but people in the senior years react to them very differently."

A SEPTEMBER 9 COMMUNITY CONCERT from 2 to 6 p.m., hosted by Southfield's over 50 residents, will feature Tusco Heath, a folk singer with a decidedly country western flavor. Ice cream will be served by the senior adults to emphasize the feeling of an old fashioned get together. The concert will be held out of doors at the Civic Center.

A travel program provides senior adults with various opportunities to see the world. A 10-day trip to New England is scheduled for September 18; a 15-day trip to Hawali is planned for October 6 and a fourday jaunt to Chicago will take off on November 23.

So enthusiastic has been the response to the travel program that Mrs. Lippert says many participants do their packing a full three weeks before their trip and talk about their plans frequently until they actually take off.

RETIREMENT HOUSING: A MATTER OF CHOICE

Retirement housing is many things to many people. Because retirement involves a major change in life style, it usually necessitates a change in environment and in living quarters.

Experts point to a number of alternatives, all with strengths and weaknesses, that retirees can consider before finding a suitable place to settle down.

THE FAMILY HOME, because of emotional and financial factors, is for many older people a good choice. It is probably paid for and the memories that it contains can be a source of comfort for many people.

But because it was probably purchased at a time when children were all at home, it is often too big for just a retired couple. Such tasks as cleaning second floor windows and repairing upstairs gutters make maintenance a problem for many.

Renting an apartment can mean a carefree life for many elderly people. There's no maintenance involved, and there's a good deal of flexibility. Apartment dwellers can take off on worry free vacations as often as they wish; they can sublease their quarters or they can easily move on to another place when their lease expires.

IT'S IMPORTANT TO CHOOSE an apartment that is close to shopping and community facilities. One within walking distance of public transportation is a highly desirable point for many older people.

A happy choice for many people, apartment dwelling is not recommended for those whose pleasures lie in gardening and puttering about their workshops.

Trailer living, formerly considered to be a refuge for transients and people hanging on to a marginal mode of existence, has become very respectable, especially among retirees.

Still much less expensive than

houses, trailers have become ingeneous in design with nearly everything including range, refrigerator, beds and sofas, being built in. Housework in a trailer is very min-

Location, here, is especially important. Many trailer parks, while lovely in scenery and landscaping, are too far from the amenities of civilization -- doctors' offices, stores, recreational facilities -- to be a good choice for many older people.

RETIREMENT HOMES are usually regarded as a haven for elderly people with health problems or those no longer able to cope with the mechanics of daily life. There are senior adults, however, still in fine health, who prefer these homes above all other modes of living. Here daily needs, including meals and health care, are met regularly and, of course, there is built-in companionship with the other residents.

Newly retired persons are advised to keep their eyes on the better retirement homes in their community. When and if they decide to move into one, they'll have an idea as to what is available.

Living with children, while sometimes necessary for financial reasons, is usually not advised. Such a living arrangement, it seems, seldom works out well, although people who are doing it will try to paint a rosy picture of its joys.

Striving to please and to adjust to a different generation, retired parents often come to feel hampered in their daily living habits; soon enough they retreat to a bedroom or to the outdoors just to maintain their privacy and sense of independence.

There are many things to consider in deciding on a retirement residence. Children, friends and neighbors --helpful and well meaning as they are --will seek to give advice, but in the long run, the choice must



RETIRED PLYMOUTH COUPLE 'BUSIER THAN EVER'

For Steve Veresh and his wife Mary Ann, of Plymouth, life has always been a full to the brim experience. And now that they have reached the retirement years, it is even busier than ever.

The ranch style home which they built by hand over 20 years ago, functions as their center. It is in the garage that many of their artistic creations are born: here Mary Ann hangs and dries flowers and Steve collects a variety of objects which are later preserved in clear plastic and sold at art shows and exhibits.

A FORMER CLAY MODELER at Ford Motor Company, Steve retired 31/2 years ago at age 56. He's been busily pursuing a variety of interests ever since.

Although he began experimenting in plastic about 20 years ago, it wasn't until recently that he gained mastery of the technique of preserving objects in molded shapes of lucite, a process not unlike creating a jello mold.

inside the plastic cubes, rectangles and domes are a variety of objects, which Mary Ann arranges in artistic fashion. Dried flowers, butterflies, peacock feathers, miniature groupings of twigs and leaves are

some of the materials from nature that the Vereshes use.

Captured within a cube of clear lucite, the most ordinary sight -even a common housefly -- takes on a special importance. The observer is made to examine nature more closely than he normally would, and its beauty, strangeness and sym-



metry are dramatized and preserved forever within the specially molded shapes.

The Vereshes do not work only with natural objects, however. Some of their most arresting creations are intricate pieces from old watches whose delicacy and detail is set off very effectively within the lucite. They've even arranged rusty nails within one of their plastic designs.

Their work, which they exhibit at the Gallerie 12 in Plymouth and have taken to the Ann Arbor Art Fair, the Danish Festival in Greenville and the Plymouth Fall Festival, now supports itself.

OUTSIDE OF LUCITE, they're both interested in painting in watercolors and oil, and have taken ** classes in this direction. Steve looks ahead to sculpting in wood, and he's gone to Toldeo for special instruction in the craft of glass blowing.

"In art work there's never a time you feel that you're done," explains Steve. "Who could ever be finished with painting?"

"It's a joy to explore all avenues of creative work," Mary Ann emphasizes.

Their love of artistic expression is something they have passed on to their children. Judy, their married daughter who now lives in New Zealand ("It'll be another place for us to. visit," says Mary Ann) has done weaving and macrame work, some of which adorns her parents' home. Son Stephen, a research chemist,

does sculpture and lewelry making in his spare time. He's a member of the Scarab Club in Detroit.

THE VERESHES WORLD is not confined only to artistic endeavors. Steve still does some free lance clay modeling and finds time for sailboating and fishing.

His well cared for two acres of land occupies his skills as a landscaper and gardener.

"We're great followers of Ewell Gibbons, the natural food exponent," Mary Ann comments. They maintain an organic garden in which they grow leeks, chives, peppers, parsley and rhubarb.



Traveling, too, is a highlight of their busy life together. They began traveling extensively seven years before Steve retired and have gone to an exotic variety of places throughout the world, from Istanbul to Pongo Pongo.

Separate bank accounts -- one for saving, the other for traveling --allow them to pursue both endeavors to their satisfaction.

The Vereshes may be "retired" in the technical sense of the term, but their many interests, developed over a long span of time, have given their lives a rich fullness that many an employed person might well envy.

ONE OF THE SECRETS to their success lies in a wise use of time. They're conscious of not idling it away and try to run their household on a schedule that is flexible but consistent. "We have the same 24 hours a day as everyone else," explains Mary Ann.

For the Vereshes life offers a never ending range of possibilities, best summed up in a story that Steve likes to tell about Woodrow Wilson, the 28th President of the United States.

Author Offers 'Complete Guide To Retirement'

The nostalgic picture of that sweet little elderly couple placidly whiling away their time together in side by side rocking chairs doesn't exactly tell it like it is.

In real life the situation is more complex. The loving wife of 40 years suddenly has a full time husband underfoot at all hours, and the loving husband, suddenly confronted by limitless leisure, can get to be a pain in the neck to her as well as to himself.

In his book "The Complete Guide to Retirement" writer Thomas Collins advises couples on marital survival during retirement.

For husbands he outlines the following points:

 Help your wife with some of the housework. "A wife has the same right to retire that a man has," says Collins. Try to divide up the chores so that each person is finished at about the same time and so that neither one can annoy or boss the other.

 Arise together and maintain similar sleeping habits. A day of togetherness will never come about when one stays up late and the other retires at early evening time.

 Don't assign tasks to one person that are ego squashing. A husband, for example, shouldn't have to hang up sheets in the yard, even if there is no dryer.

• Don't assist your wife in meal preparation. She's been head chef for too long to want someone at her elbows. A husband may solo from time to time with various specialties, but for the most part, he should stay out of the kitchen unless specifically invited.

• A retired husband should maintain his personal appearance, even when he's lounging around the house. Wear shoes except when in bed and wear something over your undershirt when you're in the living

• Assist in setting up a retirement budget for the household that gives your wife a set sum of mad money per month -- the same sum you get yourself.

• Give your wife full freedom to have her daytime friends visit her on any reasonable basis during daytime hours.

 Resolve to give yourself no more than six months of rattling around the house before you find a personal interest to occupy part of your time and to get you out of your wife's hair.


Wives, according to Collins, should approach their retired husbands from the following guidelines:

Tolerate him. During those first few weeks of retirement, he'll probably make a lot of false starts on things he thinks he may want to do. Be patient.

Wean him. The umbilical cord linking a man to his career must be cut for good, and it is only the wife

who can do it by gently prodding and encouraging her man into new directions.

One retiree, encouraged by his wife, set up a small tool renting business right from his garage. His neighborhood was full of young couples who couldn't afford the equipment that he had accumulated over many years; he found that renting such items as electric floor polishers and other power tools was a good way to provide neighbors with a service they needed, as well as keeping an active hand in the world around him.



Charity work, politics and genealogy can also be absorbing interests for a retired man.

Wives must also "housebreak" their husbands. Man will be happiet if he has a role in household chores, and it is the wife's responsibility to indoctrinate him in this --as gently and tactfully as possible. A wife should never make her husband her flunky.

A man must be taught that the household will run on a reasonable schedule, with meals and clean-up details at about the same time every day.

Re-socializing their men is another task for wives of retirees. Most likely a man's social contacts until retirement have been connected with his former employment and now that he's no longer working these old friends will drift away.

If a wife knows other women who have retired husbands, she might suggest that they all come by for coffee to meet her husband. The chances are that they've got as big a husband problem as she has -maybe even bigger!

Finally, wives are advised to remarry their husbands. Retirement can represent a second marriage for both man and wife with the emphasis this time on just each other, rather than the distractions of new mortgage, babies, the job, ambition, debts.

"Rededicate yourself to this husband who has at last come home to live with you," commands author Collins, "to squeeze out of your closeness with him all the goodness that should be stored up in a union that has lasted so long. It is in the close communion of a man and wife after 65 that the greatest happiness for both will lie."
