Older buildings often have layer upon layer of poisonous lead paint on ceilings, walls and woodwork. Young children, especially those from one to three years old, oftenare attracted to the taste of lead paint chips and have a knack for finding them.

Children who eat large amounts of lead paint could suffer brain damage, mental retardation, and even death.

Symptoms to watch for in children who may have been nibbling on the poisonous paint are: Crankiness, temper tantrums, stomach aches and throwing up, headaches, poor appetities and drowsiness

Children may have these symptoms because of other illnesses. However, if the problems persist for more than a week, and no other reason can be found for them, HEW advises you to have the children tested for lead poisoning.

Sumac, Virginia creeper, dogwood and sassafras provide early fall color, followed by aspen, oak and ash which bring new hues to the hills surrounding Kent and Wildwing Lakes. Canada geese inhabit these lakes and Kingfisher Lagoon in front of the nature center and are often searching for a handout from park visitors.

Individual and family groups may take self-guided hikes along the miles of nature trails, which are labeled. Exhibits on display at the nature center help unfold the autumn story, and naturalists are on duty to answer questions from the many visitors. Exhibit hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays, with overflow parking at the west boat launching site.

Marshbank Metropark, lo-cated six miles southwest of Pontiac, is open weekends in the fall. It has an excellent view of Cass Lake and is a wonderful picnic spot, with some color throughout the park. Entrance to the 115-acre park is on Hiller Road, a quarter-mile north of Commerce Road.

Two Farmington sewing establishments, each with a different pattern...

To the west, at the intersection of 10 .Aile and Grand River, a modern, neon-lit store with bolt after bolt of knit fabric on display entices hundreds of local housewives to "S-T-R-E-T-C-H & Sew". A franchise operation owned for the past year by Hank and Edith Fonde, the shop combines the teaching of a new sewing method and the selling of materials.

To the north, at 13 Mile just west of Orchard Lake Road, a steady flow of men, women and children enters the cozy, dimly lit "Magic Thimble" to have their clothes altered by the Poolellos-Mary and Sam-who have more than 40 years sewing experience. In one-of-a-kind business, rack after rack of pinned and marked clothing attests to the quality of the work turned out.

In both shops, the art of sewing is practiced, though in contrasting fashion.

At Stretch & Sew, teacher Genny Kerutis declared that "after completing eight two-hour lessons in the basic sewing course, you will have a complete wardrobe.

"The patterns are basic, very basic," Genny explained. "Each lesson is devoted to making one item which becomes the foundation for everything else you can make.

As an example, the basic ragian pattern, which is taught in lesson four, can be a short-sleeved top, a long-sleeved dress, a three-quarter-sleeved sweater and many other combinations.

"One pattern can be used for sizes," Genny continued. "The woman with a figure problem need look no further. On the very same pattern sheet sit sizes 28 to 44. The

woman who wears a large size in the hips, but a much smaller size in the bust can easily get exactly the right fit. We also have a queen-size pattern for sizes 42 to 56."

According to Genny, S-T-R-E-T-C-H & Sew takes the detail out and "puts the fun into sewing." Most women who take the course have had some sewing experience. "but never have they sewn like-this!"

"There are no bastings, no facings, hardly any pinning. Once you have your 'doso''-the Stretch & Sew word for a transparent man-made fabric used for tracing patterns-the finished product is within your grasp.



"A pair of slacks can be made in an hour, a T-shirt in half the time, a pair of men's pants in an afternoon."

The store carries only knit fabrics, which do not ravel, eliminating the less creative, more time consuming parts of sewing. In addition, materials are color coordinated, so that the same color may be found in a twill, an alpaca or an orion, for mixing and matching outfits.

SAM POOLELLO of The Magic Thimble agrees that there are tricks to be learned in sewing. "But," he cautions, "sewing is not something to be learned overnight."

Sam started sewing at the age of 12 in his

native Italy. "In the old country, a tailor was respected, an artist. He wore a needle and white thread-so it should show up well-on the lapel of his coat. Everyone should know he was studying to be a tailor.

"When I came to this country, I spent four years apprenticed to a tailor. I was paid \$10 a week. After three years, I asked for a raise. You know what he said to me...'No raise, Sam, you are still learn-

"It was then, and it is now...the only people really know how to sew are foreigners." Sam and Mary employ four full-time seamstresses and one tailor--all born outside the United States. Occasionally, they will get someone part-time to help out.

"If I advertise for a seamstress, I will get a number of people who tell me they sew at home. I never hire them. Sewing at home and sewing for the public-they just don't go together.'

ON THE OTHER HAND, Stretch & Sew caters to the housewife who wants a part-time job. The nine sewing teachers have specific classes they are responsible for instructing and put in a minimum of four hours per week working in the store, so they stay familiar with the stock. Twelve other employees work part-time only in

"It's just the perfect job for me," Genny continued. "I hit the plateau for someone my age. My children were in school...I had done all the crafts, taken all the courses...I didn't want a full-time job.

"I was always hanging around the Stretch & Sew store, so when I was asked to teach I said, 'Yes.' Then I went home and panicked.'

Before she had time fully to realize what was happening, Genny was on a plane bound for Eugene, Oregon by way of San Francisco to attend a one-week course which all Stretch & Sew instructors must

"I had never been anywhere alone in my life." the Livonia mother of three related "and suddenly I was in Oregon!"

"I've sewed since I was 16. Before I learned the Stretch & Sew method, I just wasn't producing fast enough. I did it mestly to save money or because I wanted to wear something different from what everyone else had on. But I wasn't really enjoying it.

"Now I'm having so much fun with sew-ing and with this job, I think it must be sinning.[^]

Sam's and Mary's customers have followed them from the Detroit shop they had for 20 years at Seven Mile and James Couzens. "They come from Southfield and Birmingham, Lathrup and Howell, Sam said.

One of their customers came in to ask if she could have a dress to wear for church on Sunday, only a few days away. "What have you been wearing to church?" Mary asked, with a nod toward the racks of clothes waiting to be altered. "I haven't been going," the customer laughed.

Mary does most of the pinning, Sam the marking and their employes carry out the instructions. "When a garment comes out of here, it's perfect," Sam said with pride.' It is looked over with a microscope. Everyone who works here is an artist."

They fur-ther advised that they were sending copies of their letter to Bill Knapp's people defining Marathon's position and advising them that they must solve their present storm sewer problem independent of Marathon's site and its po-tential development. Mrs. Richardson further stated that due to the Township approving the rezoning for a Bill Knapp's Restaurant and them receiving a building permit for its construction, the Township should not hold up the Res-taurant's opening any longer, but should in fact, authorize the signing of the agreement as submitted by the Wayne County Road Commission. Mr. Milling-ton stated that if the Township signed the agreement and in the future, they constructed the sewer, they would undoubtedly never get their money from Marathon. Mrs. Holmes agreed with that statement, but also felt the Township should not hold up Bill Knapp's any longer. Mr. Overholt requested that the letter from Marathon be made a part of the record so that the residents of the Township will know the character and nature of the people they were dealing with and that it was not the fault of the Township that Knapp's restaurant had not been able to open.
