

Plymouthite Captured In Mideast

Hanna Strasen and Joan Flohr set out to visit the Holy Land three weeks ago with 100 Michigan Lutherans never expecting to get caught in a new outbreak of war in the Middle East.

They became front-page news for two tense days after their Greek cruise ship was abducted en route to Lebanon and Israel and forced into the Syrian port city of Tartus.

Their ship, the *Romantica*, had left Iskenderun, Turkey, and was heading for Beirut,

Lebanon, in the middle of a two-week tour when it was overtaken by a Syrian gunboat.

Several Syrians carrying machine guns boarded the ship at about 1:30 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 6 at first claiming that the ship had strayed into Syrian waters. Later they claimed the *Romantica* was forced into Tartus for its own protection.

Although the passengers never got to see the Holy Land, they got more excitement and a porthole view of the Middle East war.

Mrs. Flohr, a Livonia resident who teaches at Faith Lutheran Church, said she

watched the Syrians approaching the ship from her porthole.

The Syrians couldn't speak any of the languages spoken on the ship — Spanish, Italian, Greek, English, she said.

"They shouted and shouted and signaled and signaled and finally we knew we were not going anywhere until we did as they wanted."

Syrian guards remained on the ship while it was anchored in Tartus but passengers were prohibited from taking pictures either of the guards or the city which they could see from the deck, Miss Strasen said.

The guards "were very

pleasant and polite, unless someone moved too quickly," Mrs. Flohr said.

Their detainment wasn't as tense as might be expected and apparently caused more concern among friends and relatives of those on board than among the passengers themselves, the women said.

"We laughed an awful lot," Miss Strasen, a piano teacher said. She was traveling with two friends whom she had convinced to go on the trip and felt a little guilty about the abrupt change in plans, she said.

But the crew and passengers remained calm, she said.

The crew taught passengers Greek dancing and a Northville couple celebrated an unforgettable 22nd wedding anniversary complete with a cake and party.

"It was terribly confusing as to why they had taken us, but I guess we felt they wouldn't dare do anything to a ship full of Americans," Miss Strasen said.

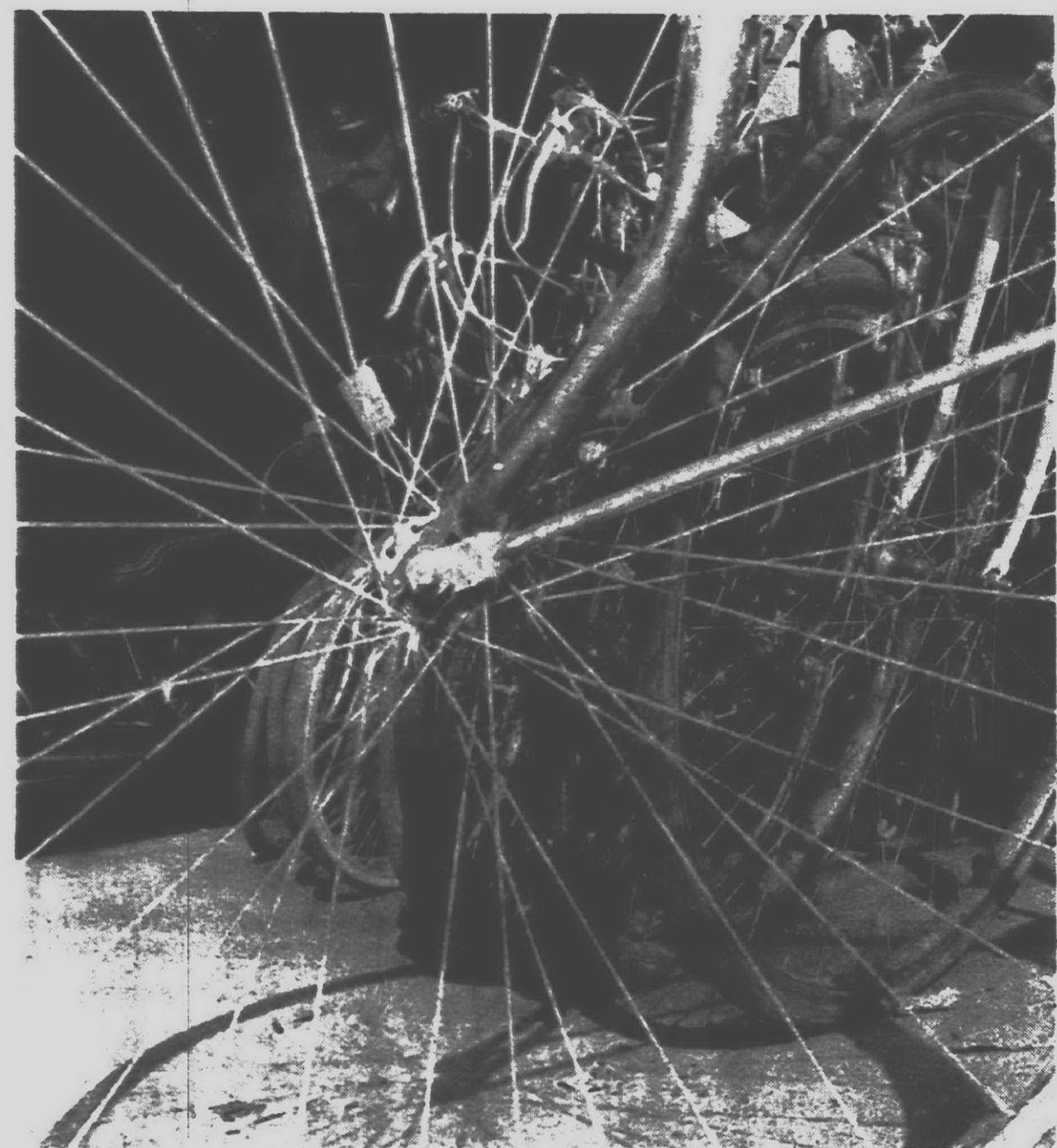
"I think we stayed so calm partly because of our faith. We knew all of our churches were praying for us."

"Our crew was just great. I can't praise them enough. They told us that if we had

UNICEF Youth Drive Helps World's Children

Halloween has come early this year when Plymouth and Canton youngsters once again are trick or treating for humanity with the familiar orange and black UNICEF collection cartons.

More than 300 local school children are participating in Plymouth's 1973 United Nations Children's Emergency Fund Drive (UNICEF) today (Wednesday) and Thursday, Oct. 24 and 25, as they go door-to-door seeking donations for UNICEF.

The young people will be out during the late afternoon and early evening hours and can be easily identified by their official nametags.

Mrs. John Culotta, drive coordinator, says every effort is being made to see that all homes are visited only once.

The children's efforts,

sponsored annually by the Community Council of Churches, will raise funds for vitamins, vaccines, antibiotics, food, school and vocational training supplies for needy children in more than 120 developing nations.

A five cent contribution to UNICEF can provide the medication to cure one child of trachoma's blindness; 25 cents buys enough vaccine to protect 25 children against tuberculosis; 65 cents supplies the sulfone to treat one leper successfully for three years and \$1 buys 50 cakes of soap or one stethoscope for a health center.

UNICEF was created in 1946 by the United Nations General Assembly to give emergency aid to young victims of World War II. Its emphasis shifted to meet the long range needs of children

in economically underdeveloped countries and in 1965, UNICEF received the Nobel peace prize for its efforts among the world's young.

According to the most recent United Nations statistics, children in the developing countries of the world are in dire need of UNICEF assistance. More than three-fourths of the world's 1.1 billion children live in nations where the average income per family is less than \$500 per year.

Four out of every five children in these areas receive no medical care whatsoever, either to prevent or cure illness. Three out of every four suffer from malnutrition and a full 50 per cent of these youngsters receive no schooling or must leave school before finishing the primary grades.

Schools Rejoin PAEEC, Name 3 Appointees

The Plymouth Board of Education has voted to rejoin the Plymouth Area Economic Expansion Commission.

Trustee Tom Turner was appointed to represent the board. Administrators will be represented by Supt. John M. Hoben and Asst. Supt. for Business Ray Hoedel.

Membership is \$5,000 annually. Also participating are the townships of Plymouth and Canton and the city of Plymouth.

"I can think of no other agency that serves the school district as well as this one," commented Board President E.J. McClendon, referring to the commission's primary task of recruiting industry to the area.

And the board's representative may ask for a name change — dropping the word "Area" in favor of "Canton."

Howard Oldford, chairman of the authority board, said, "It's possible that we (the recreation authority) could go on with a cooperative attitude from the other three."

He said the next step for the authority board would be to seek legal advice and then go back to the three governmental units still participating.

"If we go ahead," Oldford explained, "we're going to have to change the agreement."

Three other members of the recreation authority board, Larry Masteller, Gerald Burke and Brian Schwall, said they felt the authority could go on without the city's participation.

But School Supt. John M. Hoben said that in his view,

"It seems kind of hopeless without the four of them in it."

Hoben explained that while the decision of the school's participation rested with the school board, he felt the district's responsibility was "to analyze it (participation in the authority) from the standpoint of our entire district."

He did not, however, discount the possibility of the schools joining with the two townships to provide recreation.

But the school board may find it difficult to join in a program which does not serve its entire area and thus, without school support, the authority would surely die.

Phil Dingeldey, Canton Township supervisor, said he

was "disappointed" with the city's decision and that "possibly it (the recreation authority) could" survive without the city.

"I felt this way, Canton Township needed them as much as they needed us."

"That's why I wanted Canton to be a part. It kind of indicated that 'these communities were pulling together,'" he said.

Certainly the Plymouth Township board will have second thoughts about participating in the authority after the city's decision which was based largely on City Manager Fred Yockey's belief that the city's joining the authority could delay consolidation.

Yockey, as one of several reasons given for not joining the authority, said that by helping the township to pro-

vide recreation services to its residents, consolidation could be delayed.

If the issue simmers for a couple weeks, until after the Nov. 6 city commission election, recreation authority supporters may well consider making another try at gaining the city's support.

Since the city commission voted 4-3 against joining the authority and since four of the seven commission seats are up for election, the commission's direction on the authority could change.

But even if the issue waits until then and the new city commission decides to join the authority, the city can only be considered a reluctant partner.

If the authority ever recovers from the city commission's blow, it may never be well.

Stein, Ruland Resign Posts

Two members of the Canton Township Planning Commission — Louis Stein and Ellen Ruland — have resigned.

Named to fill the vacancies were Mrs. Flossie Tonda, safety program advocate, and Robert Simmons, a farmer and member of the Citizens Advisory Committee studying land use patterns in the township.

Stein, whose resignation was rumored several months ago, has failed to attend a planning commission meeting since June 5 although his resignation has never been formally announced.

Stein, a member of the planning commission since its inception 16 years ago, said that he expected to be out of the community a great deal during the coming winter and spring and felt he should be replaced on the commission.

He is also a former supervisor.

Mrs. Ruland, in a letter dated Sept. 25, resigned because "personal commitments and the further continuance of my education will no longer allow me to devote the necessary time which the planning commission demands and deserves."

Strychnine Now Called A Poison

Q. You have mentioned strychnine as being an ingredient in some street drugs. Is strychnine a psychedelic drug? Can you get high from it? What does it do to you?

A. Strychnine has been used in the past as a stimulant. Today it is best classed as a poison. It is a good, but inhumane, drug to destroy pests such as rats.

The basic action of the drug is to produce convulsions. Every muscle in the body tightens. Death is due to the tightening of the muscles around the chest - which stops breathing. The body may be bent into an arc in which only the head and the feet touch the floor. It is an effective means of suicide - but not the best; the victim is exquisitely aware of every agony right up to the time of death.

It's available around here (mixed with LSD) as "strawberry balls" or "speckled oz." It sounds insane, but there are a lot of "crazies" peddling drugs around this town.

Q. What is "hog" and what does it do? What is PCP? Is it like LSD? Does anybody know anything about phenylclidine? Is it really harmful?

A. Our column is in response to these questions and to other similar ones which have to do with the same drug: phenylclidine - also known as "hog" and PCP.

This drug, trademarked as Sernyl, was developed for legitimate medical use. It has been around on the underground, or "street" scene since at least 1968. It had been researched for legiti-

mate medical use at least 10 years before that.

The research was done on this drug, not as a hallucinogen but as an anesthetic. However, the side-effects were numerous and severe enough to make marketing of its for human use inadvisable. Its use since then has been restricted to animals. There are those who feel that it is less than ideal even for veterinary use; but animals have developed very little for themselves in the way of consumer groups so we have yet to "hear it" from the zoo population.

Phencyclidine is unrelated chemically to LSD, and its actions seem to be quite different. There is much to suggest that the effects produced are related to schizophrenia.

One of the undesirable side-effects is that of producing violent actions. This drug can be dangerous both to the user and to those around him.

Laws, Punishment, And Fat Cats: A Comment

No society can operate without rules. No rules can work without sanctions which certainly penalize the violation of those rules.

These seem like two elementary propositions, clearly understood by any parent who has told a child that 9 p.m. is bedtime . . . or else.

But it is the violation of these twin principles that has brought our nation to its present sorry state.

We have a system of laws (rules, if you will) which state with admirable clarity just what is permitted by the society and what is not; we also have a system of penalties (sanctions) including fines and jail terms which are visited upon those who break the law, partly to extract pain from violators and partly to encourage others to follow the law.

Unfortunately, the way the system is working in practice these days is that the ordinary guy who breaks the rules pays the price but the big shot who does it gets away with a wet noodle slapped across the wrist.

AS EXAMPLE, take the cases of two suburban politicians, Robert Sincok of Plymouth and Spiro Agnew of Baltimore, Md.

Bob is a distinguished citizen of Plymouth, a leading candidate for mayor after November's election, and a real estate man by profession. A couple of weeks ago, he signed the name of a client to a deed to help speed up a real estate transaction.

Sincok received no commission on the transaction,

but signing someone else's name on a deed constitutes forgery, which is against the rules.

The State Department of Licensing and Regulation heard about the case, asked Sincok about it, and got an admission of wrong doing. Sincok then got his real estate license revoked. He broke the rules, and he got punished.

Spiro is a distinguished citizen of Baltimore, was a leading candidate for the presidency in 1976, and is a politician/lawyer by profession.

According to the U.S. Justice Department, while governor he repeatedly took payoffs and bribes from Maryland contractors and engineers to help them get state contracts, and continued this practice while vice president of the United States.

Normally, bribery, conspiracy and extortion are serious violations of the rules, punishable by many years in jail and big fines. Because of the political situation involving Agnew, he bargained with the Justice Department, copped a plea and beat the rap, getting a suspended sentence and a light fine, in return for resignation as vice president.

You see how it works.

OTHER EXAMPLES abound.

The powerful Detroit teachers union is found in contempt of court and fined for failing to go back to work when so ordered. When a settlement is finally worked out, a key part is that the school board will not push the union to pay the fines.

A Michigan state senator and a judge were recently found guilty of taking bribes in a liquor license case, but they continue to sit in the Legislature and on the bench

even though the law forbids convicted felons from holding public office.

And so forth.

A Lou Harris poll released Monday reported that public confidence in performance of law enforcement agencies has dipped to an all time low. Sixty-nine per cent of those polled agreed with the idea that "our system of law enforcement does not discourage people from committing crimes."

It's not hard to see why people feel this way.

Is Information System Wrong?

Last week, in writing about vice presidential nominee Gerald R. Ford, I recalled that despite his high character, he gave answers to questions that seemed to have been cranked from a mimeo machine, and that he said nothing memorable in all the times I've covered him.

Marv Esch is a different kind of guy.

The 2nd District congressman from Ann Arbor was visiting the Livonia and Plymouth segments of his sprawling bailiwick, and we got to talking about whether it's fun, rewarding and productive to be a U.S. representative.

"We have a reaction-ary Congress," he said. He used the word not in a policy sense but because Congress "reacts to interest groups and doesn't think ahead."

Esch, a PhD who taught at Wayne State University and the University of Michigan, zeroed in on "our process of information gathering. It's outmoded."

"We need to have consultants to do detached research and analysis instead of what we're doing. Congressional hearings don't really provide information. They get across a point of view. You know pretty well ahead of time what the testimony will be."

I suggested that because Congress is dominated by lawyers, committees conduct hearings the same way a court does, with members sitting on banc like a panel of judges. He agreed the analogy was apt, and went on to tell about a new kind of information gathering he and others are trying in the Science and Astronautics Committee.

"We have 15 or 20 leaders in for a one-day conference

that they ran; we observed. Then there was an interface between them and the committee members," he said. Out of that came legislative proposals.

Esch, it should be pointed out, is an expert in group dynamics and has been a consultant to business and labor in that area. Anyone who has ever been in a company with several departments of varied types of expertise can understand the critical importance of the storage, retrieval, coordination and application of information.

If you have a lousy system, employees who could have valuable input into the formation of company policy are ignored. The same is true of national policy.

Esch is saying, therefore, that we've been using an archaic, legalistic method in Congress of feeding information to the people who write our laws.

He went further. It's one thing for a Congress to pass laws, but it's quite another to evaluate how they actually work. Congress, says Esch, has been weak in overseeing the administration of our laws.

"We don't oversee the other branches of government. We're not capable of seeing how well, for example, the Office of Education is doing."

"We should have an oversight committee for each committee of Congress to ride herd on the administration and evaluate our programs," he said.

Esch has long opposed the seniority system whereby the ranking member of the majority party is automatically chairman of the committee, with tremendous powers as a result.

But he points out that "we are gradually taking away the power of chairmen. Committee members can now call up a bill." And he recalls that in 1968 he worked with then-Rep. (later Senator) Charles Goodell to open up nearly all sessions of the

House Education and Labor Committee.

You never hear imaginative ideas like that from a Richard Nixon or a Gerald Ford, the lawyers. They and Esch are all Republicans, but the intellectual approach of Esch is as different from Nixon-Ford as night and day.

Public Service Goes For Naught

We doff our hats today to Richard Dauch, manager of the Chevrolet Spring and Bumper plant in Livonia, for his fine cooperation when state officials investigated an oil slick on Newburgh Lake.

The oil apparently came from a sewer running along Amrhein Road, adjacent to the huge Spring and Bumper plant as well as three or four other plants that dump into the same sewer.

Apprised of the situation, Dauch immediately offered to make tests of all things coming from his plant and dumping into the sewer line.

He told the state Department of Natural Resources investigators of the numerous steps taken by Spring and Bumper to assure it was not guilty of dumping any oil residue that could cause pollution of the water.

He displayed the skimmer used by the plant to skim off all oils. He showed how it was in operation around the clock and all residue was skimmed off time and time again so that nothing but a clear liquid went into the sewer. No oily waste since it had been skimmed off and placed in a receptacle to be

removed to another place and then burned.

"We at Spring and Bumper want to make sure that we aren't guilty of any pollution," said Dauch to the investigators. "I'll have our laboratory send a crew of men to the lake to make some tests and ascertain if the oil on the lake is of the type we use, if so, then we'll pay the expense of the tests and also accept the penalties handed down by the courts."

"If it isn't our kind of oil, then we'll expect the state to pay for the tests and find which of the plants dumping into the same sewer line is guilty."

Dauch made the offer voluntarily to speed up the time needed for the tests. He did it as a public service and as such expected full

cooperation from the state investigators.

Almost two weeks have passed since the GM chemists and laboratory experts completed their tests and found it was not oil from the Spring and Bumper plant.

After receiving cooperation of that kind from a plant which was willing to take the risk of being guilty, one would think the state Department of Natural Resources investigators would expedite their efforts to find the guilty party.

However, such isn't the case. Either the state isn't interested or the workers are taking their good old time before acknowledging the report from Spring and Bumper.

It isn't often that a plant manager offers the services

of his experts to help resolve a case of pollution in which his organization could be involved. All know that a stiff fine could be imposed if the plant was guilty along with an order to correct the situation immediately regardless of cost.

In this instance Dauch was so certain Spring and Bumper couldn't be involved because of its precautions against pollution that he risked possible penalties against the skills of his laboratory technicians and chemists.

It appears Dauch has won but one wouldn't know as far as the state investigators are concerned. Perhaps they feel it better to hide their heads in the sand than to answer a report from a person interested in a public service.

Time To Think Impeachment

President Nixon has crossed the line, and the U.S. Congress is faced with the single alternative of beginning impeachment proceedings.

Nixon ought to be impeached for his actions of Saturday, Oct. 20 ("Sweetest Day"), and the prima facie evidence seems sufficient to provoke Congress to introduce a bill of impeachment, draw a bill of particulars, and send an indictment to the Senate.

It isn't any longer necessary for Congress to consider whether Nixon should be impeached for alleged prior knowledge of Watergate, or participation in the subsequent cover-up activities.

NIXON WAS ORDERED by the court to reach a compromise with Archibald Cox on how pertinent evidence in the tapes could be delivered to the trial court.

The President's response was to fire the man with whom he must compromise because Cox disagreed with the Nixon tape summary plan, and to dismantle the Justice Dept.

That compromise plan by Nixon shouldn't be viewed as a voluntary act on his part to resolve the tape issue, nor Cox's refusal to agree as defiance against the President.

Nixon was ordered by the U.S. Court of Appeals to produce the tapes. The stipulation was that a compromise would be accepted only if Cox was agreeable.

On Oct. 20, Nixon openly defied the Court and U.S. Senate. He now stands, in contempt of court and contempt of the Senate. He has dismantled the Watergate investigatory task force, seized the evidence, and fired those responsible to pursue a fair prosecution within our system of justice.

Nixon has placed himself above the courts, above the law, and above the U.S. Constitution. The nation cannot afford to leave the man in office, if the U.S. Constitution means anything at all, and if America is a nation of law, removal of the President is now mandatory.

Once done, we can get on with the proper handling of charges against Watergate participants, resolve that matter, and get on with the business of running the nation. But, we can no longer

run the nation with Nixon at the helm.

It's a far cry from the college that gained the nickname of "Haggerty High" in the early stages of development. From that description, it has developed into one of the foremost community colleges in Michigan and in the Midwest.

And predictions are that it will have a total enrollment of more than 20,000 by 1980.

Happy Birthday to President Nelson Grote and his staff. May the next 12 years be even more fruitful than the first.

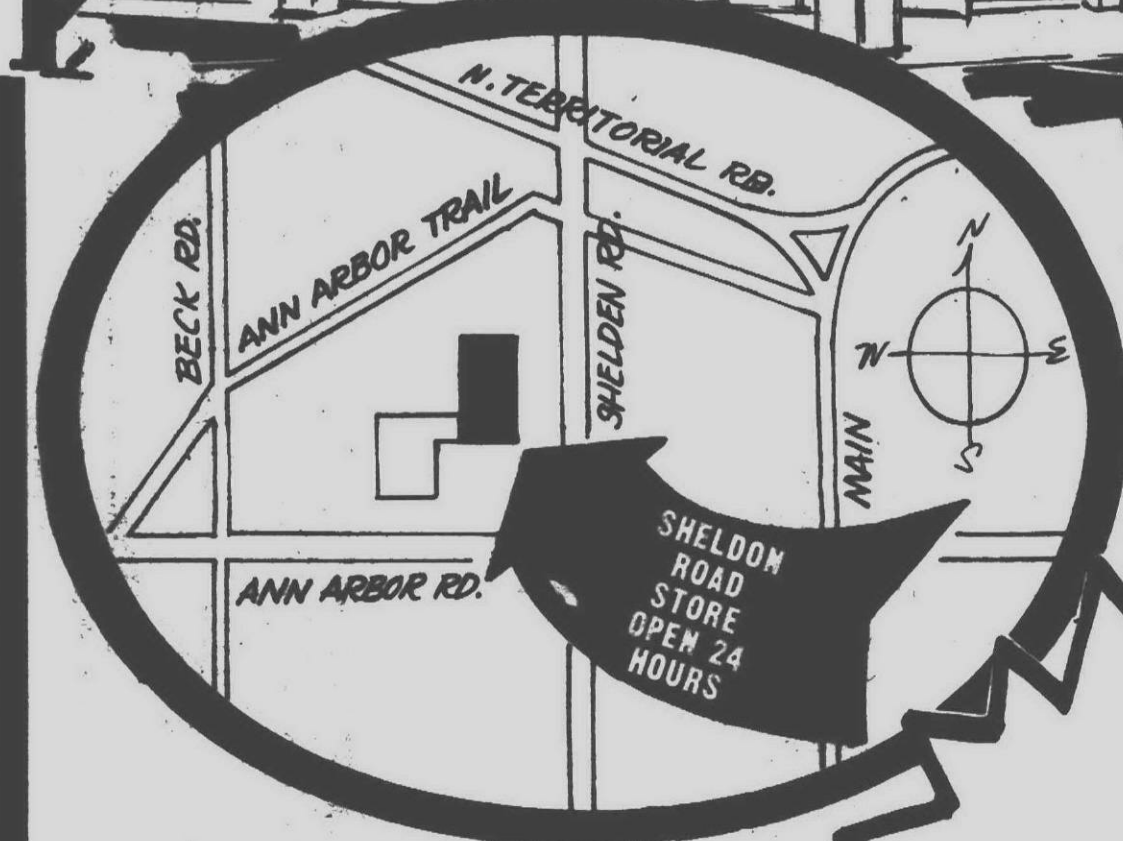
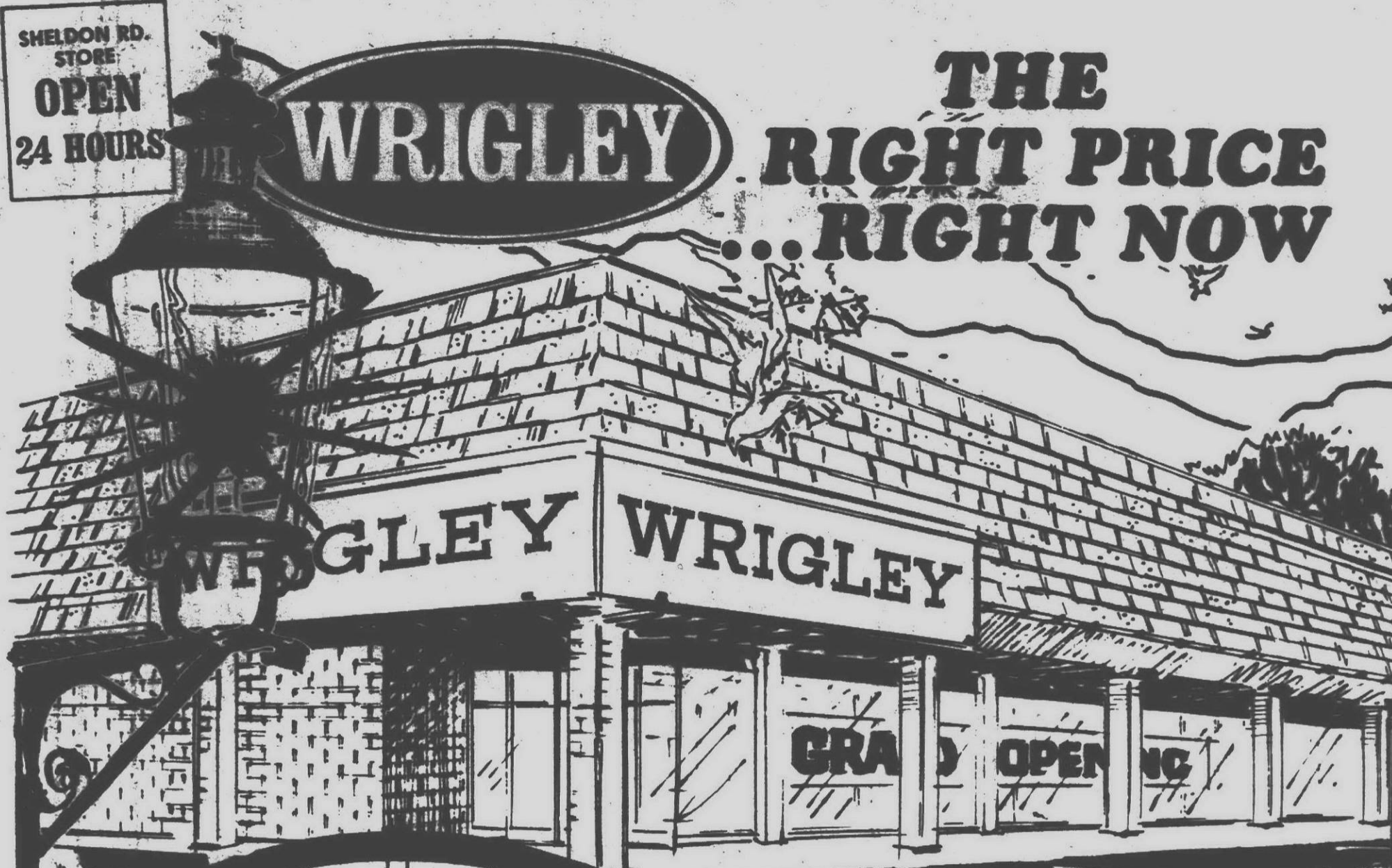

How Fund Helps To Fight Cancer

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is one of several articles in a series on organizations supported by the Plymouth Community Fund which is now conducting its 1974 drive. The Plymouth Mail & Observer presents these articles as a public service.

Louis Dely. "Particularly people who can help transport patients in need of therapy or medication."

Service is a major function of MCF. Hospital beds, wheelchairs, walkers, commodes and bedside stands are only a few of the major pieces of equipment on loan to local cancer patients. "These enable patients to remain more independent - mentally as well as physically - without incurring large debts," according to Mrs. Dely. "Gauze, petroleum jelly, talcum powder, alcohol and other supplies are also provided without charge."

The education and prevention efforts of the agency go far beyond the distribution of "How to Quit Smoking" brochures. Free pap and/or oral clinics, clinics, available to anyone making an appointment, were used by 670 and 740 persons, respectively, in Plymouth last year.

Educational programs including films and literature are presented to clubs, schools and other organizations free of charge upon two weeks notice. A four-day smoking withdrawal clinic is also sponsored within the schools upon request.

Another educational service is a home nursing course for persons who wish to become more knowledgeable in the care of cancer patients. Meeting two hours a week for eight weeks, this course utilizes the American Red Cross nursing book and is available without charge.

The most important role of the MCF is research. Mrs. Dely says. The completion of the Meyer L. Prentiss Cancer Center this year has enabled the foundation to significantly expand its service, education and research program in all phases.

Memorial donations and annual Christmas card sales lend support to the organization, but it is the contributions of the Plymouth Community Fund that make the MCF's local endeavors possible.

would have been under ordinary circumstances."

Miss Strasen said they had a vesper service on Saturday night which was "very effective" since it was held on deck and all passengers participated.

But after that, the ship was warned to keep its lights off or covered while in the harbor. Even the portholes were covered at night, she added.

The passengers were told repeatedly they would be released in an hour or two, so many didn't believe reports on Sunday that they would leave Monday morning.

The passengers awoke to hear bombing on Monday and saw Israeli planes bombing Tartus. The ship was released shortly after the bombing began.

"I still don't know why they released us," Miss Strasen said. "I think they had taken us to protect their harbor, thinking the Israelis wouldn't risk bombing Americans."

They were anchored next to a Russian ship which they believe is the one sunk by Israeli bombs shortly after the Romanians' release.

Because of the war, the ship had to go to Cyprus for refueling and water.

The passengers spent a day on the island of Rhodes, which Mrs. Flohr and Miss Strasen said was beautiful but no replacement for the Holy Land.

Mrs. Flohr describes her trip as "really a life-enriching experience."

"I'd do it again in a minute," she said.

But Miss Strasen said the excitement didn't make up for not seeing Israel.

"It was a once-in-a-lifetime trip, I saved for 10 years to go on it," she said. "It was exciting but I would have foregone that to have visited the Holy Land."

course of the day, but no major accidents were reported.

Along with the little old ladies were bike club members who made the 20 kilometer ride without even breathing hard.

Then there were little tots on tricycles, a daring young man on a unicycle and practically everything else you can think of.

There was even an editor of a local weekly newspaper pedaling along, trying to get in shape for an upcoming tennis match.

Markes commented it was great to see people from different communities, and even those from the same community, associating with one another.

After traveling the route once it was time to return to your starting point to get revived for another try at it.

Refreshments stands were set up by the Livonia Jaycees, who also made arrangements for police patrols and rescue trucks from area fire departments.

Wayne County Sheriff William Lucas and officers from

Livonia, Westland, Garden City and Dearborn Heights were all present, though there were no disturbances of any consequence.

Many bicyclists brought their own lunches and stopped at various points along the road to revive themselves.

Markes and his wife joined our group after completing their bike ride.

"I'm certainly going to ask that this be at least an annual event because of the overwhelming enthusiasm of the people here."

Markes says it's definitely the kind of thing that should be done more often, maybe once a month. Although he doesn't think we'll see it happen again this year, he's already thinking ahead.

"Next year I'd like to see the starting point extended all the way to Northville." That would include the entire length of Hines Drive.

When asked why the deadline had been set for 3 p.m., Markes said it was based on the assumption that everyone would be out by 5 p.m. with

a 3 p.m. deadline.

Twenty-two "first ladies" will come to Plymouth Nov. 1 in a fashion show that's the first of its kind in the Observer area.

The fashions will be authentic reproductions of inaugural gowns worn by U.S. presidents' wives.

Modeling them, as stand-in first ladies, will be members of the Sarah Ann Cochran chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, sponsoring the show at 1 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church of Plymouth.

The sanctuary of the recently-built colonial style church will be the setting for the 22 intricate gowns of the Seeley-Deer collection.

"First Ladies on Parade" is the title of the event, which will include appropriate organ music by Mrs. Charles Lang of Plymouth and refreshments following the showing.

Tickets are \$3 and available from members of the DAR chapter. The church is located on North Territorial west of Sheldon.

The gowns, seasoned travelers because they have been in shows all over the country, are owned by Dr. and

Mrs. Edwin Deer of Birmingham.

This is the first time they have visited in the western suburbs, Dr. Deer said, and the first time that a DAR group has been the sponsor.

Sarah Ann Cochran members gathered last week at the church to be fitted into the intricate gowns by Dr. and Mrs. Deer.

"We all wondered if we'd be able to get into them," said Mrs. Virginia Bake, who will model Mrs. Sarah Polk's dress. "Thought we'd all be rejects. But they seem to fit very well."

The collection had its beginnings about four years ago when Mrs. Deer decided to reproduce 20 gowns as a fund raiser for the Republican Party.

She consulted dress designer Donald Nagel, and the GOP's national finance committee agreed to underwrite the project.

Nagel and his partner, David Zeese, were given permission to go into the Smithsonian Institute in Washington to sketch and photograph the 20 dresses selected.

Then patterns were made and materials selected. The work of recreating the gowns



was done by Margaret Remindino of Birmingham and Juan Horrax of Detroit.

After a year the Republican party decided to sell the gowns so "they came home to us," Dr. Deer said.

Since then they have been shown to dozens of audiences as fund raisers for hospitals, symphonies, and political parties. Copies of gowns worn by Mamie Eisenhower and Jackie Kennedy Onassis were added to the original 20.

Dr. Deer said the collection has been back and forth across the country three times and to Alaska twice.

Helen Taft's gown which will be modeled by Mrs.

D.H. Baumhart of Livonia, was described by Dr. Deer as the most expensive. Its heavy pearl beading was done by an 84-year-old woman, he added.

Mrs. John W. Armstrong of Plymouth, regent of the Sarah Ann Cochran chapter, is in charge of the event and her coordinating committee includes Mrs. Bake, Mrs. Donald Hiller of Northville and Mrs. Hugh Lafferty of Plymouth.

Mrs. Baumhart is in charge of models and Mrs. William Porter of Plymouth is heading ticket sales. Publicity chairmen are Mrs. Albert Heindryckx of Plymouth and Mrs. Donald Stobb of Livonia.

Hollywood Revisited Niven Sees New Day For Films...

Actor David Niven can look back to the glory days of Hollywood but he also looks ahead to a fine future for the movies.

"Entertainment on the screen is just so great when it's good that people aren't going to give it up," he told the Livonia Town Hall audience last week.

Despite the havoc that television caused the industry, and despite the current prevalence of sex and violence in films, the suave actor said, "I think it's going to be all right."

"People are sensibly turning to local control to keep the films they don't want out of their neighborhoods," Niven said.

"The best control is at the local box office. And theaters are making changes - they're getting smaller and I think soon they'll be offering baby-sitting, so people can continue to enjoy an evening out at the movies."

Opening the 1973-74 Livonia season, Niven gave the women a bird's eye view of "that piece of American folklore - ancient Hollywood" and then brought the story of movie-making to the present day.

He also gave a light history of his own career as an actor and had comments about an assortment of film luminaries who have been his close associates.

In the era of the 1930s with its huge studios and top moguls, Niven said, the system was "to find an actor or actress - not necessarily good but one who would appeal to the public - and give that personality a well-insulated buildup."



"LOVE THESE BEGINNINGS and endings" sighed Mrs. Norbert Dittmar, Livonia Town Hall president, when the debonair actor David Niven gave her a kiss at the start and finish of his lecture. Then he obliged one more time for our photographer, Bob Woodring.

"These people became gods and goddesses - they really did," he said.

"They were worshipped, put on a pedestal by the public. The studios had literally dozens of people working for each star to make sure he always showed to his best advantage."

Today, he said, we find many better actors and actresses, but their role is different where the public is concerned.

"There's no continuity of work that the studios gave," he explained. "It takes a long time to become well-known all over the country and without the buildup today's professionals have a problem."

He added that the big extravaganzas have to be a thing of the past.

"If you put 10-million into a picture you have to get 20-million at the box office - and no picture is going to make that much," he said.

Niven, a professional soldier in his native Britain before coming to Hollywood, said that in order to become a god or goddess of that era "you had to be an extra and get lucky."

"I got lucky when I was stark naked," he said, and then explained to the ladies that Douglas Fairbanks Jr. had mistaken him for an old friend and he had met producer Samuel Goldwyn in a sauna.

"Then when he saw one of

the many screen tests I had made he recognized me and put me under contract," he added.

Niven, who won an Academy Award for "Separate Tables," said he'd have to rate Deborah Kerr, his co-star, as his favorite leading lady.

"She's such a marvelous actress and so generous," he said.

He added that in over 60 pictures he shared stardom with "only one stinker - Gina Lollobrigida."

"She's an old-fashioned Italian actress," he said, "always an hour late and with an entourage of hair-dressers and the like."

"I only hope I'll never get so broke I have to work with her again."

Other film greats he mentioned were Errol Flynn and Mae West. Of Flynn, he said: "I knew him very well and you always knew exactly where you stood with him - he'd let you down."

Mae West, he added, "made me uncomfortable when I went for a job interview by having me take off my coat and then my shirt. I didn't get the part."

The Town Hall women who attended the celebrity luncheon in the Mayflower Meeting House kept Niven busy autographing copies of his recent book, "The Moon's a Balloon."

He told them he now lives in southern France with his second wife, a native of Sweden, and two adopted daughters.

"And I make one picture a year," he added. "We recently finished this year's - it's a joke version of Dracula and I hope it doesn't haunt me."

...Olivia Recalls Contract Row

Olivia de Havilland greeted her Town Hall audience saying "The years do pass and the pounds do accumulate. Thank you for recognizing me."

She was the opening headliner for the Farmington Town Hall series who came to Northland theater to tell the highlights of her career which stretched "From the City of Stars to the City of Light."

Her acting career started with a part in "Midsummer Night's Dream" that ultimately brought her to Warner Brothers Studio for a screen

test in the morning and a contract signing that same evening. She assumed she had been called to Hollywood because of her dedication to Shakespeare, but her very first picture with that studio was a slapstick comedy called "Alibi Ike" and starred Joe E. Brown.

She likened Warner's studio to "a well run model prison farm." She called her contract a "seven year term." She made reference to "serving my time," and "when they let me out on parole."

Her first real run-in with Jack Warner came when she was asked to play the part of

Melanie in "Gone With the Wind," the movie she still thinks of as the high point in her acting career, in spite of two subsequent Academy awards.

She was able to do this legally, "but as more and more rumors kept circling of the success of the picture, the madder Mr. Warner got." Their arguments over her parts eventually led to her suspension, which in turn led to a lawsuit, filed by her, that jockeyed back and forth in the courts with re-trials and appeals.

She ultimately won the suit in behalf of every contract player in the movie industry

that stands today on the law books as "The de Havilland Decision."

Of her friendship with Errol Flynn during this time, she said, "When I first met him I did what any one of you ladies would have done. I fell promptly in love with him." He in turn played jokes. On one occasion she found a long dead snake between the folds of her voluminous petticoats, fastened to the hoop under her skirt.

She mentioned ESP (extra sensory perception) and mental telepathy several times and said she had

But will this make mornings lighter or darker? Not so important to me as it used to be, since no one walks more than a block to school by the dawn's early light.

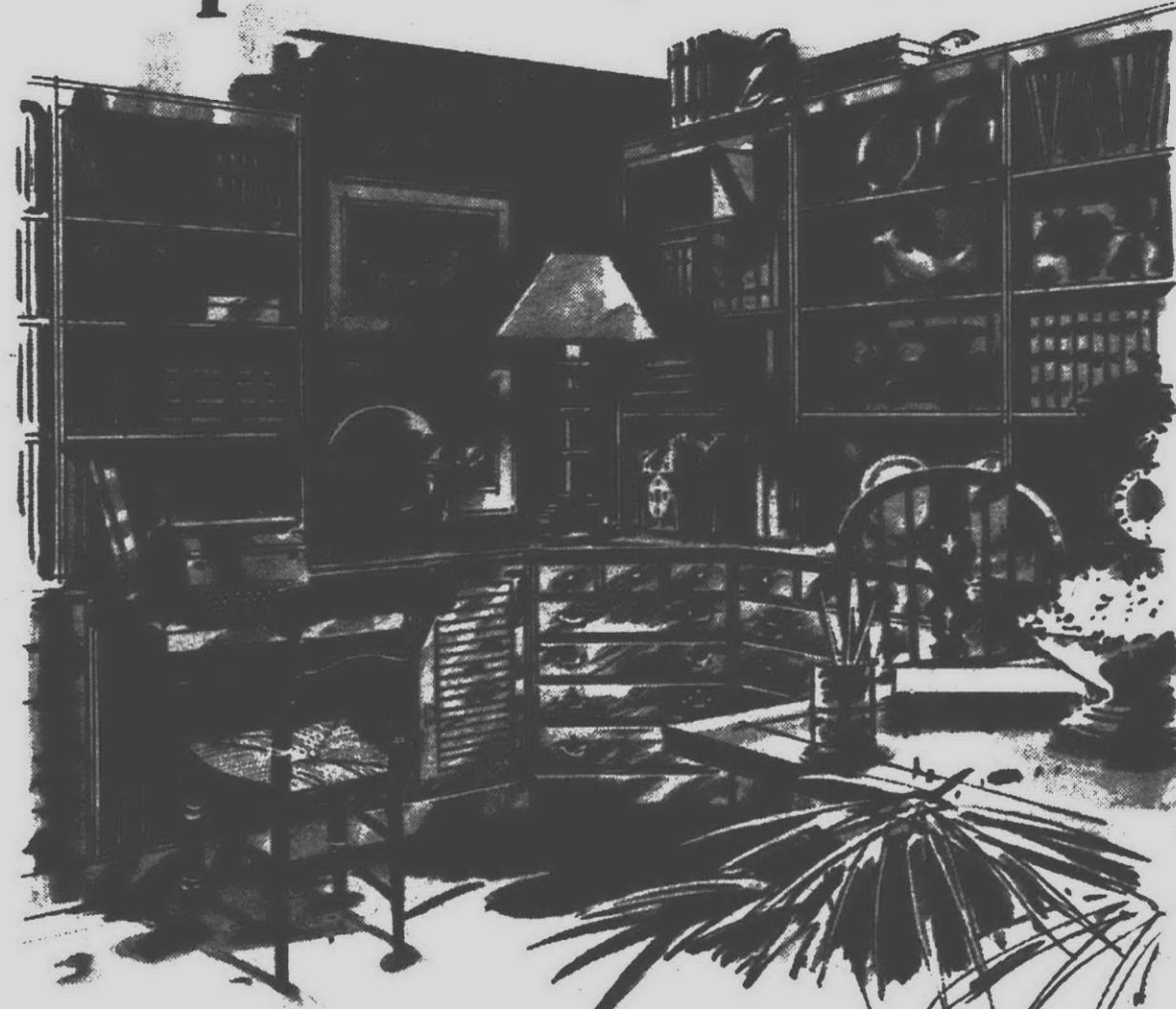
Will afternoons end earlier or later? More important - lots of after school activities.

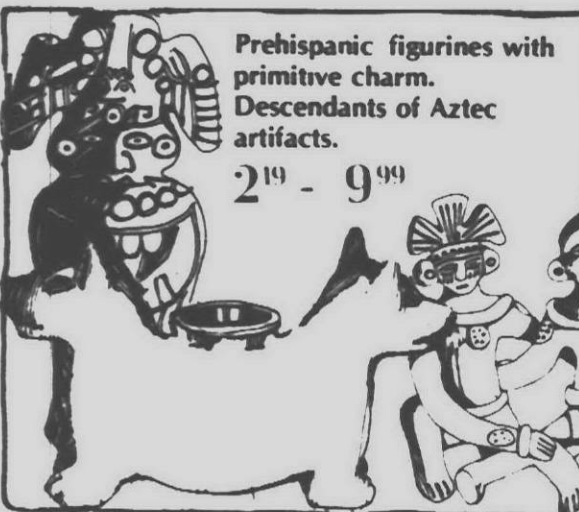

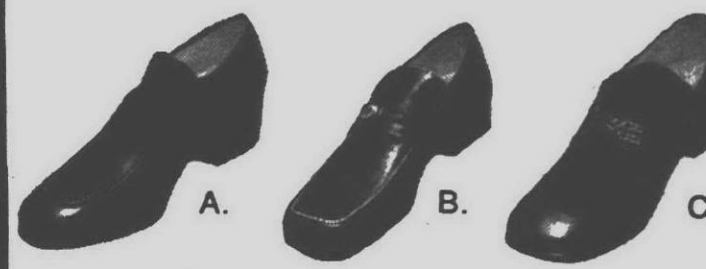

Miss de Havilland now lives in Paris, France, and has two children, Benjamin, now 24, working toward his degree in mathematics, and Gizelle, 17, who attends secondary school. Benjie lives with her, and Gizelle lives across the street with her father, from whom Miss de Havilland is separated.

GM's Diesel Tells Of New Expansion

The Detroit Diesel Allison division of General Motors has announced plans for a major expansion in Romulus which will surpass the division's facilities in Redford Township.

James E. Knott, GM vice president and the division's

general manager, said the expansion involves new construction totaling almost 780,000 square feet. It includes an engine parts manufacturing plant, warehouse and central core area for support facilities. The new division will be located on 370 acres of property.

"The new Romulus plant is expected to give us about a 25 per cent increase over current diesel engine volume, at our fully developed Redford location," Knott said, "and we expect to meet the market demand with a significant reduction in over-time."

"Demand for our diesel engines is at an all-time high," he said. "This expansion not only indicates our confidence in the continued growth of the heavy-duty engine market but also signals our determination to provide the future power requirements of our customers."

The development is between Van Born and Ecorse Rds. and is bounded on the east by the Chesapeake and Ohio rail line.

The division has a parts distribution center for storage, packaging and world-wide shipping in Romulus.

It is expected to result in 1,300 additional jobs when completed, Knott said.

U-M Dearborn Enrollment Up 45 Per Cent

Fall semester headcount enrollment at the University of Michigan-Dearborn stands at a record 2,938, a 45 per cent increase over last year's fall enrollment.

The registrar's office said a total of 960 more students registered for classes this fall than in the fall of 1972.

Chancellor Leonard Goodall attributes the enrollment growth to several factors, including:

1. A further increase in the freshman program, with a total of 829 enrolled this fall.
2. A larger number of late afternoon and evening courses being offered, attracting more part-time students, women, minorities and veterans.
3. A marked increase in enrollments in U-M-D's professional schools of engineering and management.

Men continue to outnumber women by a two-to-one margin, a slight increase over last fall's figure of 64.6 per cent male to 35.4 per cent female.

Career Ed Conference Set At EMU

A conference on career education has been scheduled for Nov. 2 on the campus of Eastern Michigan University.

Sponsored by the department of curriculum and instruction, it has been designed to attract public school teachers and administrators, college and university counselors and other professionals in the field.

The day-long meeting will include guest speakers, discussion groups, demonstrations and a workshop on program development. A feature will be presentations of what are described as "exemplary programs" in Ann Arbor, Pontiac, Romulus, Royal Oak and Wayne-Westland schools.

All activities will take place in McKenny Union, where a special "browsing room" will be set up. This area will display a variety of materials dealing with career education.

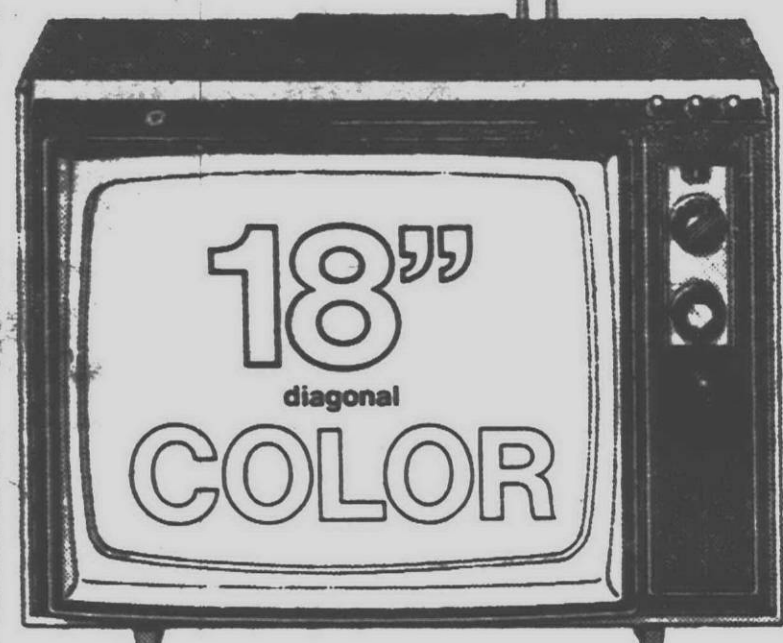

Can City Race Beat Blahs?

With less than two weeks to go, the city commission race has produced little excitement.

There have been no battles of ideologies and no shining superstars to emerge in the nearly five months since the eight candidates filed for the four vacant seats.

But the very fact that at least three — and possibly four — of seven commissioners will be novices could mean a major change in direction for the city.

The impact of the election could well affect the city's stand on unification and the areawide recreation authority issues.

If more than half the commissioners are neophytes, the commission could be stalled temporarily on policy decisions until the newer commissioners learn the ropes.

Norbert Battermann, the lone incumbent, voted against the city joining the Plymouth-Canton Recreation Authority. Taking just one example of what the election could mean, Paul Muller, another candidate for the commission, argued before the commission that the city should join.

If Battermann was not re-elected and Muller was, that would change what was a 4-3 vote.

Obviously the balance hinges on who gets elected, but with four seats up, a major change could be seen.

Certainly Battermann, Joe Bida and any two of John Moehle, Muller, and Bernie Schmitz have to be considered the most likely victors. But who knows?

Battermann, while having been appointed to the commission twice, has never been elected, so it is difficult to measure voter attitude toward the one incumbent as well as toward the other seven candidates.

The balance of commissioners determined by the Nov. 6 election will also have one other very important impact — selection of the mayor is made by the commission.

One of the three carry-over commissioners, Robert Sincok, has served in that capacity previously. He and Commissioner Beverly McAninch are frequently being mentioned as front-runners for the mayoral post.

But if Sincok's recent personal business difficulties have any impact with the commission, it could mean the city will have its first woman mayor in some time.

This doesn't rule on the possibility of a new commissioner being elected mayor (the school board picked E.J. McClendon as its president at his first official meeting), but that is unlikely.

The Stroller:

Recalling Exciting Races

As we head into the final weeks of another political campaign, it is interesting to look back and note the many changes that have taken place in these wild races for public office.

It seems a bit difficult to realize now that there was a day when these campaigns were centered for the most part in the volunteer fire company halls in the small towns throughout the land.

This was long before the women won the right to walk behind the curtain to cast a vote for the candidates of their choice. And the target of all office seekers was the man of the house.

The big question was—how to reach him.

Now every small town had a fire hall that was the predecessor of today's community center and the male population spent much of its off time in these fire headquarters—playing pocket billiards, or some sort of card game—while waiting for a fire call.

They were like flies on a block of sugar for the politician. So, as the various campaigns reached their peak it became the custom to visit the fire halls and provide a keg of beer for the "fire lad-

dies" to quench their thirst during the evening hours.

It always was a bit of fun when the politicians path crossed and two of them reached the hall with the same idea.

When these office seekers, who seldom made speeches, were not frequenting the fire halls they were visiting the various saloons in town. They'd walk in and speaking loud enough for all to hear would say, "Have one on me."

This all changed though with the coming of women's suffrage and the politicians were at a loss for a time—trying to reach the female voters.

It was then they started visiting clubs and even going to church gatherings to carry on their campaigns. Mean-

while, they dotted the landscape with all manner of signs—much more than they do today—and the area highways took on an appearance much like the midway at the county fair.

In those days candidates for national office travelled by train and the local politicians fought for the right to appear with them while they spoke from the rear platform. These were gala occasions.

The last major candidate to use the train was President Dwight D. Eisenhower. And his first venture into Michigan was one of the highlights of his successful campaign.

One autumn afternoon his train pulled into Saginaw to be greeted by a gathering of no small proportions. He was given a great greeting—but halfway through his speech, something unusual happened. His train started to pull away and he never did get to finish his appeal.

The late Frank Picard, then a federal judge and a very devout Democrat, went to his grave vehemently denying that he had anything to do with the early departure of the Eisenhower train.

No such things happen today. The campaigns have gone to two extremes—mud slinging contests or extreme silence.

Both are on display in Oshtemo where Garden City and Westland are in the throes of nasty battles in contrast to Plymouth, where one can walk the streets or visit public places and never know an election was in the offing.

It is a far cry from the old days when the volunteer fire halls furnished all the fun.

Krupa Brings Back Memories For Fan

I wouldn't go back into my old clipping file for very

many people. It is an agonizing experience to read my beginning journalistic efforts. But when I read last week

that Gene Krupa had died, I had to do it. He was one of my early stories. It was the first and only time I ever

pleaded to do an interview.

Krupa was in Detroit playing at Baker's Keyboard Lounge. As a favor to Southfield musician and teacher, Orin Ross, he played for the students at Southfield High with a couple of local musicians.

Many times during the early '40s, I had sat across the footlights watching Krupa behind that glittering set of drums. You could feel him working up and into a great drum solo before the members of the Tommy Dorsey band put down their in-

struments, sort of like a great storm coming in over the mountains. After that is was as leader of his own band.

His two hands and thousand jazz beats took over the whole theater. He had drama, he had rugged good looks, but over and above, he had talent — first magnitude all the way.

I got down to his motel room that day in April 1967 feeling like a high school

journalist overawed at meeting "my star." But this was no star; this was a friendly, easy going grey-haired guy in an old blue shirt.

He talked about giving free concerts for high school kids: "It's a kick for me to watch the reaction of these kids who, until the time they walk into the auditorium, have never heard of Gene Krupa. It feeds my ego to hear them say as they leave, 'Where has this guy been all my life?'"

It may have been the ego boost which got him there, but more than that was being with young people, wanting them to enjoy the talent he knew he had. He liked exchanging verbal and drum licks with the young rock rhythm men.

He knew the road these kids were traveling, for Krupa had started as a professional drummer at 13 in Chicago.

In 1966 he played with the Franklin Community Band at the village's strawberry festival. He had friends in Franklin Village and this suburban area.

He was a showman who knew how to share.

Quite a combination!

Usually, the public needs no help in cheating itself, culturally. But in this case, a few more performances might have brought them out

The cabaret-style presentation of the first production was a charming idea. For some it may be nice to be wined, dined and entertained from the same table, in the same room, the same evening.

But assuming the whole community got ambitious and came to the theater, where would they be seated with a dozen or so tables, capable of seating approximately 50, taking up the entire auditorium?

It reminded me of school lunches in that same auditorium a few years ago when it was a high school cafeteria — no place to sit and plenty of other places I would rather be eating.

I say forget the food, increase the seating capacity and extend the performance dates for a sometimes slow-witted public.

The PTG certainly has the talent to warrant those moves.

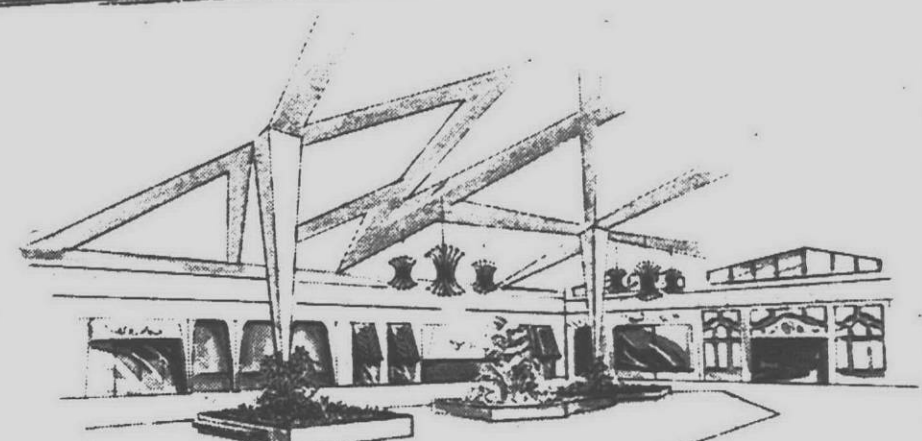

Time To Plant Deciduous Trees, Shrubs

Leaves on trees and shrubs blazing in glorious shades of gold and russet, crimson and scarlet signal the arrival of the fall planting season. Leaf-losing plants are becoming dormant now, and this is an ideal time for transplanting them.

However, before you rush out and buy any trees and

shrubs to add to your landscaping, decide what you need. Consider what you want the plants to do. Then choose plants that will accomplish your purpose.

There are literally hundreds of kinds of trees and shrubs from which to choose.

Consider the growing conditions. Choose plants that are hardy and can withstand our cold winters. Choose

plants that fit your soil type and moisture and drainage conditions.

If a plant can't stand wet "feet" it will die if you put it in a poorly drained soggy area. The same plant, though, might really thrive in a hot, dry, bank.

Some shrubs and trees need acid soil. Some need alkaline soil. A few are tolerant of a wide range of conditions.

Some plants can withstand buffeting by winds. Others die or become distorted. If winds may be a problem don't plant delicate specimens. Rely on rugged plants.

Consider also the size and form of the plant. There are trees that remain under 25 feet in height. Some of the loveliest of our flowering trees are in this "small tree" category. They can be used as an accent by the entrance

or corner of a house. They can be used to shade a patio or to form part of a screen or boundary planting at the back lot line.

If your yard is small, or if your house is low, a tree that is under 25 feet in height may be as large as you need.

Among the trees that remain relatively small are Japanese maple, gray birch, fringe tree, Korean dogwood, Russian olive, golden chain, magnolias, and many kinds of crabs and hawthorns.

Trees in the medium range, growing from 25 to 50 feet in height, include some kinds of flowering crabs and hawthorns, European mountain ash, flowering dogwood, redbud, and weeping willow.

There are many trees that grow over 50 feet in height. These include maples, oaks, ashes, sycamore, linden, and many others. Use these only

where space is ample. Not only will they get 80 to 100 feet or more in height, but their branches have a spread of 30 or 40 feet or more.

Before you plant a tree consider its mature size in relation to the size of your house and to the size of your yard. Of course, it takes many years before a young tree grows up to full size. However, some grow quickly. By the time a sycamore is 10 years old, it will be 35 feet tall, and sugar maples, locusts, pin oaks, green ash will be about 25 feet tall when they are 10 years old.

Shrubs mature much more quickly than do trees. Within five years they have attained maturity.

Among the low shrubs that remain less than knee high are dwarf barberry, dwarf flowering quince, shrubby cinquefoil, dwarf cranberry

bush and several varieties of cotoneaster. These shrubs are good for ground covers or as low borders or edgings.

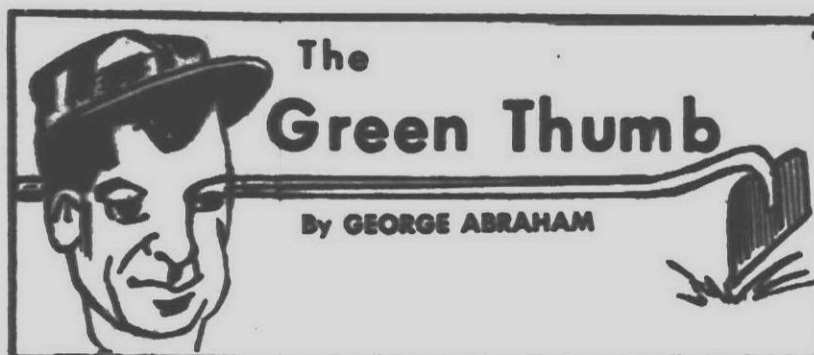
Medium shrubs grow to about four feet in height. They can be used as part of a mixed border or as specimen plants. They can hide low objects but are not high enough to completely screen a view. Since they are below eye level they can be looked over or across.

They are high enough, though, to screen people sitting or lounging on a patio. In this chest-high group are Japanese flowering quince, dwarf burning bush, Nanking cherry, fragrant viburnum, garland spirea and Chinese azaleas.

Tall shrubs that make good backgrounds and screens include forsythia, lilacs, beauty bush, honeysuckle, mock orange, red osier dogwood,

winged euonymus, and numerous viburnums.

Whether you are planting bare-root stock, balled and burlapped plants, or container stock, be sure to make the planting hole large enough. Dig the hole a foot deeper and at least a foot wider than is needed to accommodate the roots.



Right now you probably see black flies (fungus gnats) buzzing around your house plants.

You can get rid of the small black pests by making a suds of laundry soap (bar soap) and then pour 1/2 cup to one cup around the top of the pot. Some gardeners have been using this simple remedy for years. While any bar laundry soap will work, I like the Naphtha soap.

Another good solution is to soak cigar butts (or cigarette stubs) in water, then drench the soil surface with the solution.

Parents, teachers and service clubs looking for a good project for the young people can encourage them to survey streets in your community to see how many trees are dead or dying. Years ago when the trees were planted, streets were unpaved and roots had room to grow. With the advent of automobiles, factories, and more people, many of our giant trees are literally smothered, and our trees are dying of thirst, salt and old age.

Many villages are planting new trees, making it possible for each tree that's cut to be replaced by a new one. If your village or city doesn't have such a program, put a bug in the mayor's ear. Trees can get along without people, but people can't get along without trees. A tree's a treat to have in your lawn.

Those house plants you brought indoors might be a bit leggy now. Why not "slip" or take cuttings from these plants and make new ones for you and your friends?

You can root cuttings in plain water, sand, perlite, vermiculite, or a mixture of sand and peatmoss. If you want to make a good home "propagator" put a small clay pot (hole plugged) inside a larger clay pot, and fill the space between the two pots with sand.

The smaller inside pot is a reservoir - you fill it with water. Cuttings three to four inches long are inserted into the sand. Lower leaves are trimmed back so they won't rot. After the cuttings are inserted and watered, enclose entire pot with a plastic sheet to increase humidity and trap moisture inside.

Plastic bags which carrots, apples, etc. come in are good for this as they create just the right "greenhouse" atmosphere.

You can root gardenias, begonias, African violets, snake plants, ivies and hundreds of others with this method.

GREEN THUMB CLINIC: "We dug up a clump of parsley and brought it indoors."

Now the lower leaves are turning yellow. What's wrong?"

Answer: Parsley likes it cool, and bright. Check the soil moisture. It likes a uniform supply of moisture at all times. Move it to a brighter window and see if that doesn't make a difference.

Time To Thwart Fall Pest Invasion

Outdoor pests make poor pets indoors, so be ready for their annual invasion, says Don Cress, Michigan State University extension entomologist.

They are already looking for winter protection and food supplies.

The most common household invaders are ants, centipedes, roaches, spiders and crickets.

To keep them outdoors Cress suggests using a foundation spray instead of an indoor application.

Cress recommends the following six-step control program:

1) Caulk around the foundation, doors, windows, door vents, and other cracks where there are pests entering the home.

2) Make a two per cent spray solution by mixing 10

tablespoons of 45 per cent chlordane emulsifiable concentrate or five tablespoons of 72 per cent chlordane emulsifiable concentrate in one gallon of water. An average sized home requires about three gallons of a two per cent chlordane solution.

3) Spray the foundation all the way around the house to the point of runoff.

4) Spray up to a 10-foot band of soil alongside the foundation, especially the flowerbeds.

5) Spray behind concrete steps and other structures that adjoin the foundation.

6) Apply spray to cracks in the foundation and concrete slabs abutting the foundation.

Remember to read label directions carefully before using any insecticide.

'Inside Job' Ends Cupboard Clutter

When a supposedly modern kitchen begins to act like a wrap-around version of Flibber McGee's closet, it may be time for remodeling "from the inside out."

Deep, unreachable shelves in base cabinets can be res-

cued by putting half the storage on the door.

Lengths of 1x6-inch western pine attached on edges to sides and bottom and faced with lath allows filing of unstackables or lids on the door.

Shortening inner shelves accordingly makes everything easier to see and reach. For deep corner cabinets, lazy susan circular shelves swing everything around for easy access.

Tall pantry shelves mean leaning towers of canned goods that often end in disaster. Closing up shelves to six and eight-inch intervals (save one or two for a maximum 12 inches) gives more shelves and more convenience.

Strips of wood molding attached to the front of high shelves keep cans from accidentally being pulled off while reaching for something farther back.

Winterize Roses After First Frost

To protect your roses from the low and fluctuating temperatures of winter, follow these steps, say Michigan State University horticulturists.

• After the first killing frost pile soil at least six inches high around the base. (Dig from another part of the garden so you do not in-

jure the roots of the rose plants.)

• Draw the canes together and place a waterproof paper cylinder or special rose cylinder over each bush. Cut the plant tops off even with the top of the cylinder.

• Fill the cylinder with dry vermiculite, perlite, ground-up corn cobs, soil, or other similar material.

• Cover the top of the cylinder with polyethylene film and anchor it securely.

• Water thoroughly after two heavy freezes unless there has been a heavy rain.

• When the ground is frozen, cover rose beds with ev-

ergreen branches or straw. Do not uncover them in the spring until the danger of frost is past.

ORDINANCE NO. 73-9

CITY OF PLYMOUTH,
MICHIGAN

CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY
GAS FRANCHISE ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the CITY OF PLYMOUTH, WAYNE COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty years.

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. That wherever the word "Grantee" appears in this ordinance, it is hereby intended to designate, and shall be held to refer to the Consumers Power Company, a Michigan corporation, its successors and assigns.

SECTION 2. The right, power and authority is hereby granted and vested in said Grantee to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the City of Plymouth, Wayne County, Michigan, for a period of thirty years.

SECTION 3. In consideration of the rights, power and authority hereby granted, all of which shall vest in the Grantee for a period of thirty (30) years as aforesaid, said Grantee shall faithfully perform all things required by the terms thereof.

SECTION 4. No highway, street, alley, bridge, or other public place used by said Grantee shall be obstructed longer than necessary during the work of construction or repair, and shall be restored to the same good order and condition as when such work was commenced. No part of the highways, streets, alleys, bridges or other public places of said City shall be permitted to remain in a dangerous or unsafe condition by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by the Grantee, and it shall be liable for such damage as may be suffered by any person or corporation by reason of its negligence in the use of such highways, streets, alleys, bridges or other public places, and shall save harmless said City from all damage and liability on account thereof.

SECTION 5. The Grantee shall be entitled to charge said City and its inhabitants for gas, the rates as approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission. Said rates shall be subject to review and change at any time by the Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, upon proper application by either said Grantee or the City, acting by the City Commission, being made thereon, and the regularly filed rates as approved by said Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, as applicable to said City of Plymouth, shall at all times be the lawful rates.

All bills for gas furnished by the Grantee shall be payable monthly. The Grantee may collect the minimum charges as specified in said schedule. The Grantee shall also furnish and maintain commercially accurate meters to measure the gas so furnished, and it shall, by its representatives, have at all reasonable times, access to the premises of its customers, for the purpose of reading, inspecting, removing and replacing such meters.

SECTION 6. Said Grantee shall construct and extend its gas distribution system within said City, and shall furnish gas to applicants residing therein whenever the amount of gas to be furnished thereby shall provide an adequate and reasonable return upon the cost of making such extensions and providing such service.

SECTION 7. The rights and authority herein granted are not exclusive. Either manufactured or natural gas may be furnished hereunder.

SECTION 8. The franchise granted by this ordinance is not subject to revocation, and shall be and become valid and binding only upon its ratification by the affirmative vote of at least three-fifths of the electors of said City voting thereon at a regular or special municipal election to be held in the manner provided by law. This ordinance shall not be submitted to the electors unless the Grantee shall, within thirty days after the adoption hereof, file with the City Clerk its written acceptance, subject to the ratification by the electors of the City. Upon the acceptance hereof and the ratification by the electors as aforesaid, this ordinance shall constitute a contract between the City of Plymouth and the Grantee for the full term of thirty (30) years from and after the date of such ratification by the electors.

SECTION 9. Made, passed and adopted by the City Commission of the City of Plymouth, Michigan, this 15th day of October A.D., 1973.

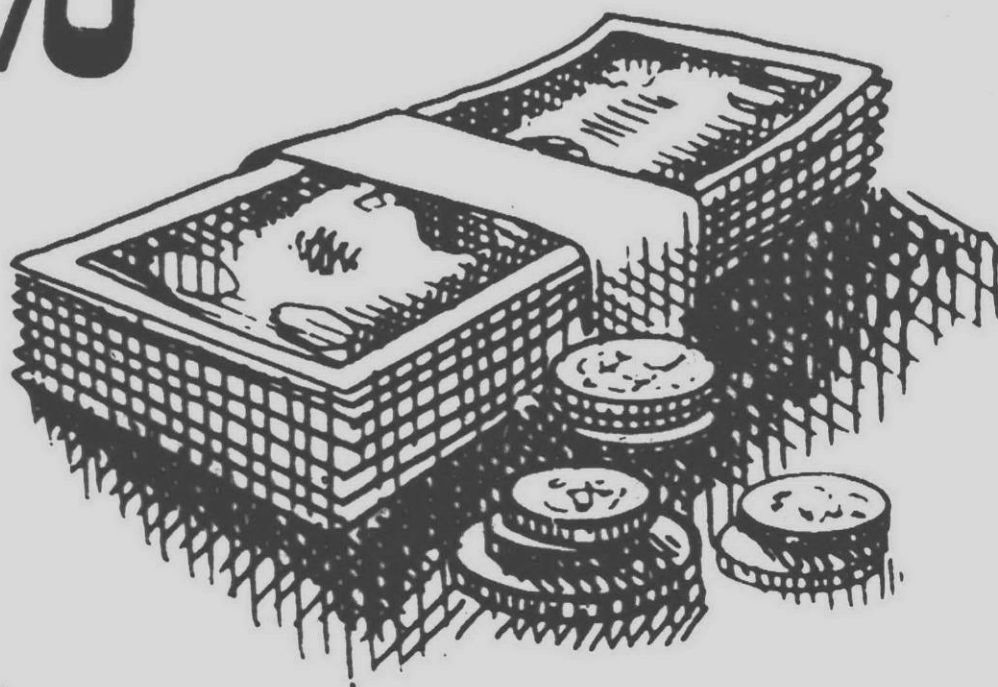

Persons who are motivated by ethical principles, without regard to religious denominations will be sought. An Admissions Committee, with the Executive Director, will decide all matters of eligibility.

He or she will be admitted without qualification and will receive all benefits to which residents are entitled.

4. May residents bring their own furniture?

'Disabilities' Plan Recognizes Kids

A "learning disabilities" center headquartered in the Livonia School District will be in operation soon and may start seeing referrals on a pilot basis as early as November.

Other districts already enrolled in the program are Plymouth, Redford Union, South Redford, Garden City, Wayne-Westland, Cherry Hill, Van Buren and Belleville. Inkster and Northville districts are expected to join, but have not yet taken formal action.

A budget for the Western Wayne County Learning Disabilities Center was approved recently by the Livonia School Board and is expected to be approved by the Wayne County Intermediate School District.

More than \$125,000 is being budgeted for the center which will treat those students who are neurologically impaired or "having trouble to the extent that they are really bombing."

Funding for the budget will come from the Wayne County Intermediate School district, which will in turn be reimbursed by the state and local districts affiliated with the program.

Under the special education act approved by the State Legislature last July, intermediate and local districts are responsible for educating multiply handicapped children.

"They've always been around, but for the first time they are legally recognized," explained Roland Montambeau, director of administrative services for the Livonia district.

He added that parent sponsored groups, such as the Michigan Association for Children With Learning Disabilities, have worked for a number of years for such a program.

"The problem is that money isn't provided, and I'm sure the parents didn't desire to take money away from general education," said Montambeau.

The approved budget includes costs for a director and staff, office supplies and

modification, instructional supplies, equipment and travel.

Montambeau is now beginning the hiring process for a director for the center. "The director will have to sit down with the districts and decide who will be seen," he added.

"We would like to start seeing kids by the first of the year and maybe sooner on a pilot basis in November," he added.

Although a site for the center has not been chosen, Montambeau said it will be located in one of the schools in the southern portion of the district. "We have a number of buildings with three empty classrooms," he said. "The southern part of the town is geographically centrally located for other districts."

Primarily a diagnostic center, the program will work with teachers as well as students.

"We'll be helping the kids, but we'll also be giving teachers the skills to help them," explained Montambeau.

"We want to encourage teachers to participate in group workshops to learn how to recognize a learning disabled student and know what to do," he continued. "It will be that much easier the next time a teacher refers a child to the center."

"Teachers who want to become learning disability specialists will be able to take university credit courses at the center which may be applied to such a degree," he said.

"The diagnostics of determining each kid's style of learning" will be handled by the center. Teachers will be guided in developing "what's missing and capitalizing on strengths" in each child's learning process.

"Instructional materials will be organized enough that kids can be self-supportive, but teachers are needed to be judgmental about what next steps to take," continued Montambeau.

This year the staff will include three or four learning disability specialists. Montambeau said the average

child referred will require 30 hours of service, 20 of which will be field service in the student's own building.

With 30 such teachers already employed by the Livonia district, Montambeau said Livonia won't refer many children to the center because the learning specialists will be able to handle most learning disabled children.

In any case the specialists will work toward improving the dynamics between the teacher and student. Montambeau explained, "Rather than remove the teacher from the picture, we find that many times the teacher can work with a learning disabled student."

She was kidnapped from their tent while they were in Montana camping last summer. A massive search following the abduction was unsuccessful.

A ransom call a week later was the strongest evidence their daughter is still alive, according to the Jaegers, since a description of a birthmark was given which was unknown even to the FBI.

A non-profit corporation was formed by several neighbors of the Jaegers.

The Jaegers are hoping the new fund will be more attractive to a tipster than the \$3,000 offered by a daily newspaper.

Any information about the kidnapping should be sent to the same address.

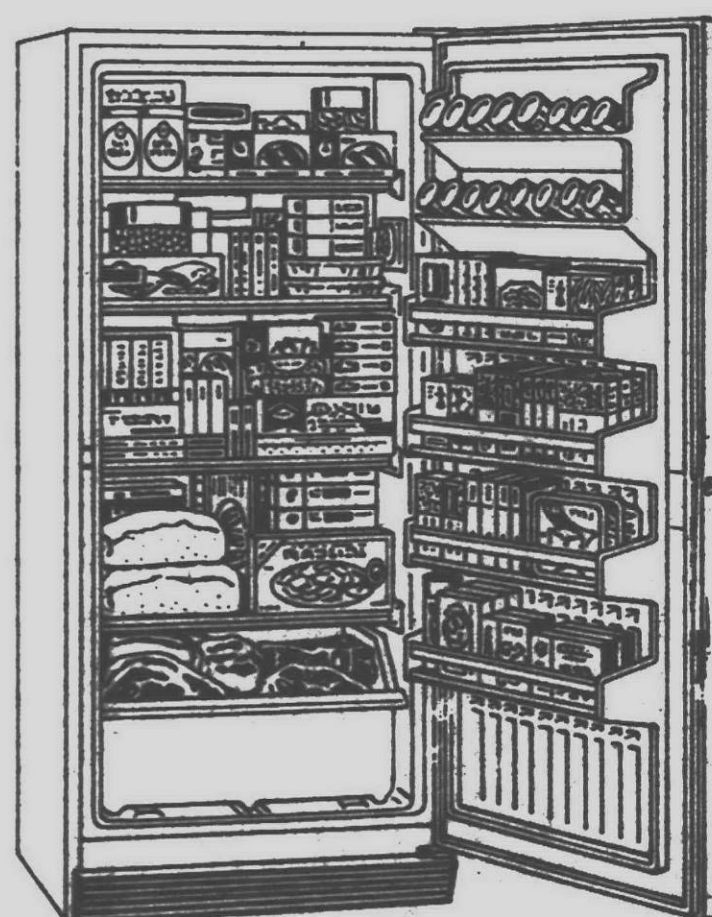
"The response has been tremendous," a backer said after opening the mail Monday.

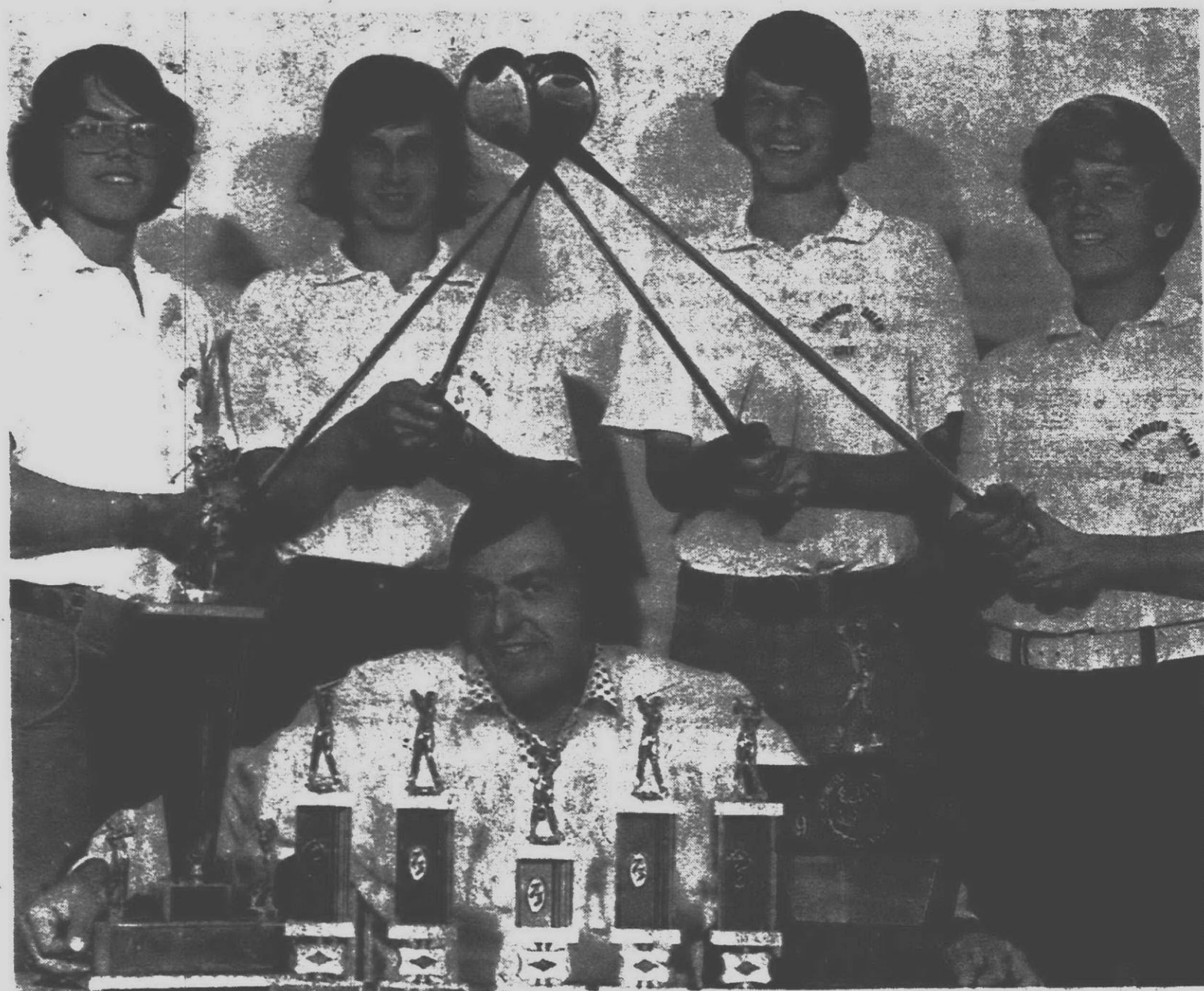

Salem Wins State Class A Golf Title

Chalk up state championship No. 2 for Plymouth Salem High.

After 12 lean years without a state title in any sport, the Rocks broke the spell by capturing the 1973 Michigan Class A golf championship.

The first and only state title before was a swim crown under Coach John McFall in 1961.

Now comes the '73 season and first year Coach Bob Waters shook off "rookie jitters" and directed his Rocks to the A title with a four-man score of 317 at Jackson Cascades Golf Course.

Bay City Central was just one shot behind with 318 followed by Muskegon Mona Shores at 319 and Brother Rice with 320.

The Rock state championship foursome was composed of seniors Jeff Rogers, Paul Szilagyi and Edwin Olszewski and junior Jeff Roth.

The victory for Coach Waters had to be extra sweet in his first season. The 26-year-old industrial arts

teacher graduated from Plymouth High in 1965 and has now come back to assist in winning a state title for his alma mater.

Waters went on to Eastern Michigan University after his prep days and played three years of varsity tennis there.

"This '73 Plymouth squad is really a Cinderella team," commented Waters. "This same winning foursome placed 12th in the Dearborn Invitational, 13th in the regionals and tied for fourth in the Suburban Eight last year."

Salem this year tied with Trenton for Sub Eight hon-

ors, placed second in the regionals to Walled Lake Central and came out on top of 20 schools in the state meet.

All-League golfers Roth and Szilagyi came up with a 75 and 83 respectively in the state meet with second team Sub Eight golfers Jeff Rogers and Edwin Olszewski shooting 77 and 82 respectively.

Rock captain Roth (the lone junior) had captured the Michigan junior golf championship before the varsity season opened.

"I thought it would take about a 315 to win the state," commented Waters whose

squad won it with a 317. "We didn't have the top natural ability of all the teams but we were prepared mentally and could not have been topped in the desire department."

The Plymouth state champions had finished 12-2 in dual meets, won the Dearborn Invitational, the Dearborn Invitational and placed third in the Plymouth Best-Ball Tourney.

In a fitting ending to a state title season, the Rocks wound up their '73 campaign with a 200-203 victory over Northville.

Thus was snapped a 53 consecutive dual win streak by Western Six champion Northville.

"You know, between Northville and us (Salem), we won every golf title that could be won around the state," added Waters.

Olszewski headed the Rocks with a one-over par 36 at Meadowbrook CC against Northville followed by Roth at 37, Rogers with a 41, Bill Gibson 42 and Jeff Lamirand 44.

Unbeaten Franklin Stuns North Farmington, 17-0

The Northwest Suburban football title was there to be won and Livonia Franklin went after it "tooth and nail," while North Farmington simply gave it away.

The clash of the unbeaten proved Franklin a 17-0 victor as the then No. 4 team in the state, North Farmington became a 10 turnover loser.

"This has to be the biggest win ever in Franklin football," commented Franklin head mentor George Lovich whose Patriot crew now boasts a 6-0 mark. "This was an entire team effort. Our defense really took it to them."

The Northwest title is now within a one game grasp for Lovich and his Patriots. Lovich can capture his first crown in six years this Friday afternoon at Oak Park.

Franklin, the new No. 1 team in Observerland with Churchill dropping to second, will be matched against the Chargers of Churchill on Nov. 2.

"Ours wasn't much of a performance," said North Coach Ron Holland. "We just didn't come to play."

Folding up their tent in the big game is fast becoming a habit for the Raiders of North. The Raiders lost the Northwest title last season in their finale with Garden City East, fumbling three times in losing, 7-0.

This Franklin showdown was almost another repeat with North choking in the do or die battle.

North's defense came to arms and the Raiders took over on their 13 after a

37-yard punt by Greg Battistone into the wind.

After falling six inches short of a first down, North moved into a punting position and followed was the play Franklin had been waiting for.

"We (Franklin) had scouted North for five weeks," said Lovich. "We noticed their center on punts would push the ball forward toward the line before snapping it back."

Franklin linebacker Randy Epley slapped the ball away from the North center after he pushed the ball forward and Epley fell on it, Franklin's ball on the North 22.

Larry Casey hit Dan Quinn for a first down inside the Raider 10 but North held and Lovich decided to go for three. With 4:51 remaining in the opening quarter, Quinn split the uprights and Franklin was on the board, 3-0, a 21 yarder good.

After two punt exchanges, Franklin had possession on the Raider 49, 8:35 left in the first half. Battistone ground out four yards and Casey hit Ray Cekauskas for a 27-yard pass play to the North 18.

Battistone, who finished with 59 yards in seven carries, then broke loose to the three yard line. Casey moved it to the two and 6-1, 224-pound Bob Dzikowski carried it over. Quinn made good the point after and Franklin was up, 10-0, 6:59 remaining in the half.

North's opening drive of the second half was cut short on play No. 3 with Tim Ninnis picking off a stray Daley pass on the Franklin 47.

Quinn ran for three, Battistone one and on third down, Battistone broke loose for 37 yards to the North 12. It came to a third and seven play and Casey lofted a pass to Dean Morrison who hauled it in on the rebound off a Raider defender. The point after was good and it stood 17-0, 2:52 remaining in the third quarter.

Franklin's Ron Geer halted the next Raider drive with an interception, Randy Stone the next on a fumble recovery and Morrison one midway in the fourth on another pass interception.

North's deepest and final drive came to a futile halt with one minute left on the clock when Epley pounced on a fumble after the Raiders had marched to the Franklin 10.

The Raiders did win the first down game, 10 to six, and took top billing in the rushing department.

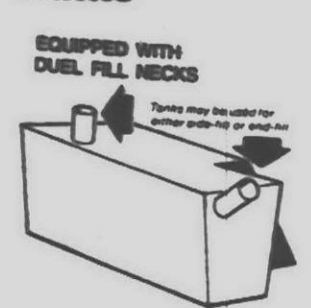

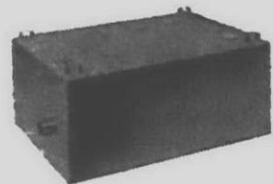

Churchill Gets By Northville For 15th Straight

Chargers Faced With Real Test Friday Against Mott

You have to believe this is another "Year of the Charger."

For the second time in as many weeks, Churchill High rallied its forces to bounce from behind and keep alive the longest current winning streak in Michigan Class A football.

Churchill scored in the final 15 seconds to top Farmington Harrison, 19-13, for victory No. 14 and stretched its two-season winning record to 15 with a come from behind triumph over Northville, 8-7.

After battling to a 0-0 half-time score, Northville jumped in front early in the third but Churchill's defense which has put more points on the board this season than its offense came up with a two-point safety in the closing seconds of quarter No. 3.

Then, with nine minutes remaining, Charger QB Mark Roncoli flipped a 17-yard touchdown pass to Don Forrest and Churchill made a believer out of Northville.

"You really have to give credit to Northville," commented Churchill Coach Ken Kaestner. "They were after us with a 3-2 mark. They ran 36 offensive plays and with our offense lacking the killer instinct, they should have beat us."

Now 15 and counting, Churchill puts its streak and Western Six championship on the line this week (Friday, 3:30 p.m.) at home against a club that along with the Chargers is also undefeated in the Six.

It will be homecoming at Churchill with Waterford Mott a 5-1 opponent overall. Last year Churchill

wrapped up its first Six championship in a 12-0 triumph over Mott, at Mott. This year it will be on Charger territory with the 15-game winning streak an added attraction.

Northville then free-punted and Churchill took over on its 45 early in the fourth quarter. It was third down and six on the Northville 17 when Roncoli combined with

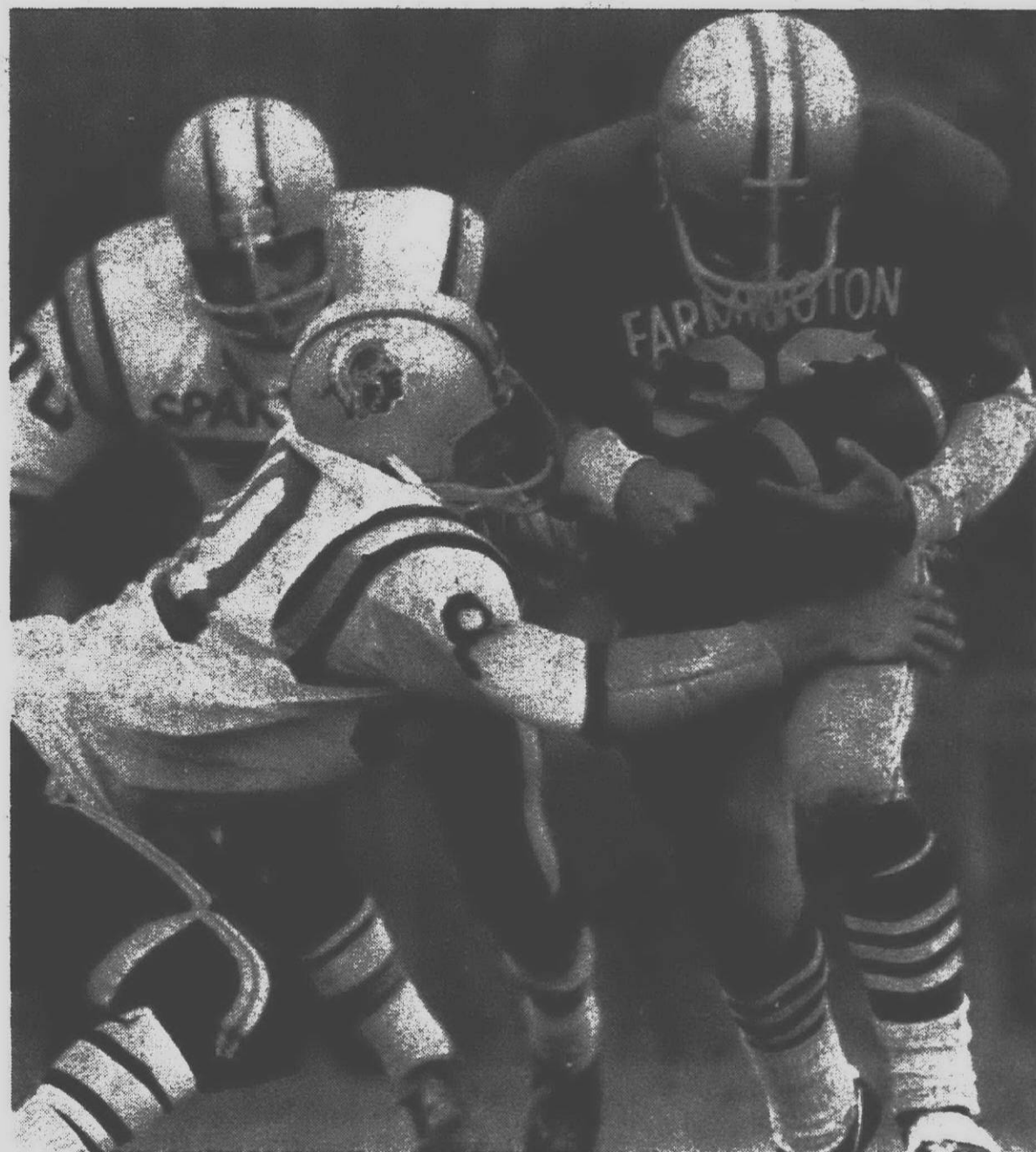
Forest on a post pattern six-point play.

Only Redford Union stands between Plymouth Salem and a chance for at least a share of the Suburban Eight gridiron crown, and through what is a scheduling oddity

for high school football the Rocks will have their opportunity to clear that hurdle Saturday night.

Plymouth pushed its record to 4-1 in the league and 5-1 overall by romping over Belleville, 34-18, as Mark Kraay and Jeff Horton each scored twice while pacing a ground attack which pounded out 279 yards to the Tigers' 90.

The Rocks held a 34-6

fourth quarter lead before feeling the scoring sting of Belleville's aerial superiority, marked by 16 completions in 37 tries, and by then the verdict was sealed.

Sub 8 standings now read: Trenton, 5-0; Plymouth Salem, 4-1; Dearborn Edsel Ford, 4-1; Allen Park, 3-2; Livonia Bentley, 2-3; Belleville, 2-3; Redford Union, 0-5, and Dearborn, 0-5.

Because Salem and Plymouth Canton of the Western Six share the same stadium, Salem will host winless R.U. at 8 p.m. Saturday after a Friday night battle there between Canton and Walled Lake Western.

Although it is a rarity for schoolboy teams to meet on a Saturday night, the scheduling may work to Salem's advantage because by then the Rocks will know the outcome of Friday's Trenton-Edsel Ford contest. The significance, of course, is in the fact that Salem itself will invade Trenton in the league finale Friday, Nov. 2 - perhaps with the championship riding on the outcome.

The Rocks have quite a score to settle with R.U., for the Panthers have whipped Plymouth three years in a row with last year's 12-6 victory snapping a five-game Rock winning streak.

At Belleville, where the Rocks were facing a team which had opened with three wins before losing to Edsel Ford and Trenton, Coach

Tom Moshimer's fleet troops were in full command as they piled up a 21-0 margin before the Tigers could get on the board.

Horton plowed for two- and five-yard touchdowns in the first quarter, adding one extra point, and then Kraay capped a 47-yard march in the second period by scoring from the four. He personally added a two-pointer on a sweep to make it 21-0.

After Hubert Rusesell of Belleville cut it to 21-6, Plymouth's Andy Jones, a sophomore defensive end, picked up a Belleville punt which had been blocked by Ted Keitzman and turned it into a six pointer, Horton converting to make the count 28-6.

Kraay, who sped for 113 yards in 19 carries, got the last Rock counter from two yards out in the final period, Belleville coming back for two consolation touchdowns against Salem second stringers in the waning minutes.

Mt. Carmel Rips Aggies, 34-18

Mt. Carmel exploded for three touchdowns in the second half to crush St. Agatha in a Second Division West football clash, 34-18.

It was loss No. 2 for St. Agatha in league action against one win. The Aggies now sport an overall 4-2 mark.

An 11-yard TD romp by Mark Duquette capped a 65-yard march with only four minutes gone to give St. Agatha an early 6-0 lead.

Mt. Carmel's first offensive test was halted by an interception by Aggie back Mike Rex but the Aggies lost possession on downs.

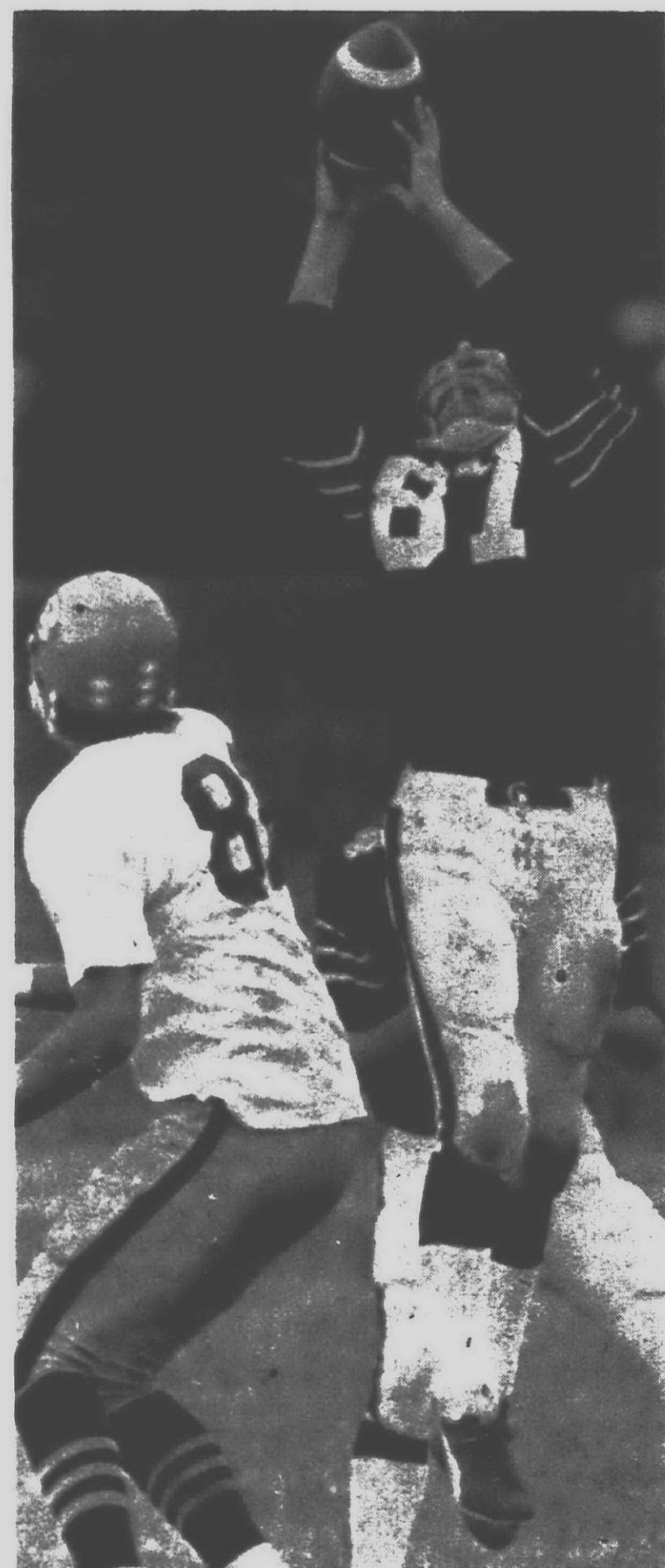

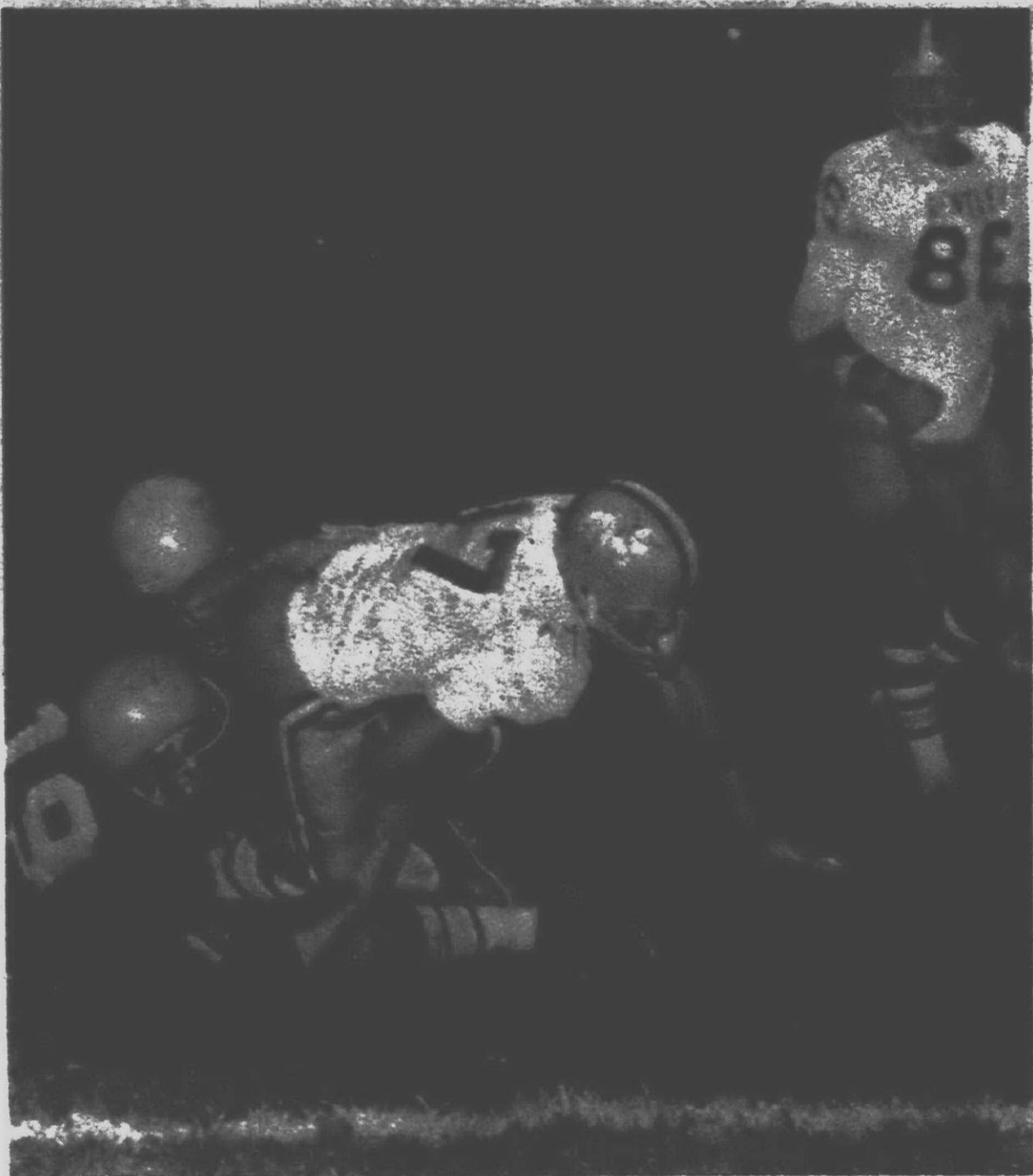

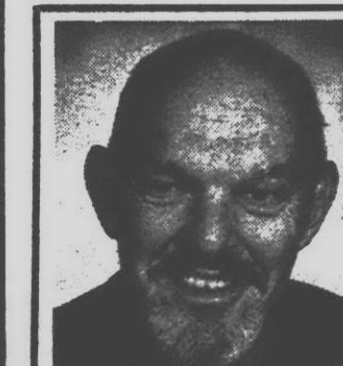

Ski Heil

It's that time of year again.

I'm deluged with mail from ski areas all over the country expounding on the number of improvements they've made, and how they're looking forward to a fantastic season. The one that caught my eye was a press release from the French ski resort of Flaine. Their big announcement was the installation of snow-making equipment.

If that isn't the last crushing blow, I don't know what will top it. Here is a resort in the French Alps situated at 10,000 altitude and even they can't depend on natural snow. What is the world coming to?

We all know that we're going to have a good winter. For the last several years, we've had a cycle of alternating one snowy winter with one mild winter. This has to be the good one! But you don't have to wait till the snow falls to get ready.

Here is my suggested priority list:

1. Yourself — are you in good physical condition? When was the last time you had a medical check-up? Have you been physically active this summer? Remember, you're a year older. Inactive muscles have a way of losing strength and elasticity. Why have sore muscles when you can do a few simple exercises to strengthen the key muscles in your legs, abdomen, shoulders and arms. (Our pre-ski conditioning class started this week at the Y).

2. Your equipment. Is it in good shape? Now is the time to have your bindings checked. If you've gained or lost considerable weight it will affect the release of

those bindings. Are the edges of your skis rusty and dull? Do you have adequate clothing? (Gloves and mittens seem to disappear each spring).

3. Where to ski? If you are entertaining thoughts of a ski week somewhere, now is the time to make reservations. If you don't know where to go, I'd recommend you attend the annual Ski Show at Cobo Hall, on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, Nov. 24. You'll find resorts represented from areas in Canada and the U.S.

If you have equipment you'd like to sell or used equipment to buy, the National Ski Patrol sets up a Swap Shop at the show. You'll find some excellent buys and a chance to get rid of your old equipment. Just bring it with you and they'll tag it for you.

Johnson pass being intercepted by sophomore line-backer Richard Graustein who scampered 40 yards for six points. Tom Dowdy converted and it was 7-0.

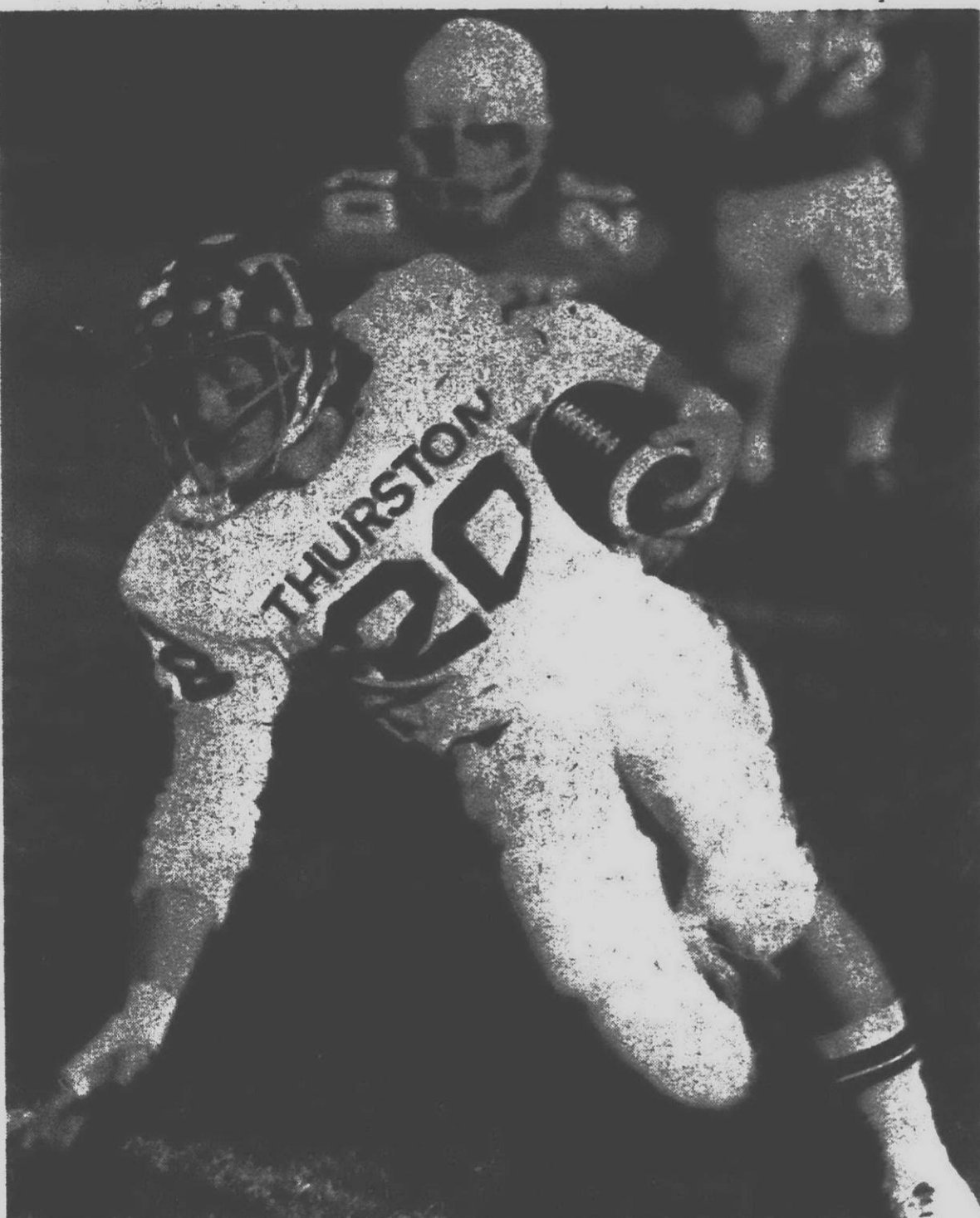
Gary D'Ascenzo made it 13-0 after one quarter when he completed a 70-yard scoring pass to John Roy on the Eagles' next drive.

Larry Snyder, the 31-year-old Arkansas jockey who has more luck at the Detroit Race Course than any other rider, set a record at the big mile track Saturday with his 133rd victory of the current meeting and now has 17 more racing days to establish a mark that could stand for years.

That is, it could stand for years unless Larry comes back and beats his own mark. He did it this time, shattering the 132 victory standard he set in his national championship season of 1969. He collected 132 of his 353 winners at the DRC.

Snyder is up with the national leaders again this year although he has little chance of recording a second national title. There are too many date lapses between now and the end of the year and Larry isn't one to go from coast to coast in search of more races to boost his total.

He likes to spend as much time as possible with his family just outside of Hot Springs, Ark. He flew down there over the weekend to help his six-year-old daughter celebrate her birthday and then returned to the track Tuesday.

"Good Ol' Times" day at the DRC didn't exactly set the world on fire but it did attract a crowd of more than 14,000 with a handle well over \$1 million. That made it worthwhile as far as management was concerned.

The kids will have a second time to attend the races this Saturday when the \$31,000 two year old futurity will headline the 10-race program. Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley gave the management permission to hold family days on two Saturdays and this week's card is the second.

As usual, all youngsters 12 and under will be admitted free when accompanied by an adult paying the regular admission charge. You can bet there'll be a lot of young ones on the grounds even though there won't be any dime hot dogs and nickel soft drinks, popcorn and ice cream bars this time.

SLATED TO END operations a week from Saturday, Hazel Park Harness Raceway is certain to shatter all state records for a fall meeting. In addition, it has a red hot battle going on for

the driving championship with no less than four pilots in the scrap.

At this moment, Hazel Park boasts a nightly mutual handle average of \$662,466 for 70 nights, an increase of 15.7 per cent over the record level of a year ago. It shouldn't drop too much in the remaining nights and practically assures the track of winding up with a better than \$650,000 average for the 82 nights.

Attendance is averaging 7,191 for a hike of eight per cent over 1972 figures.

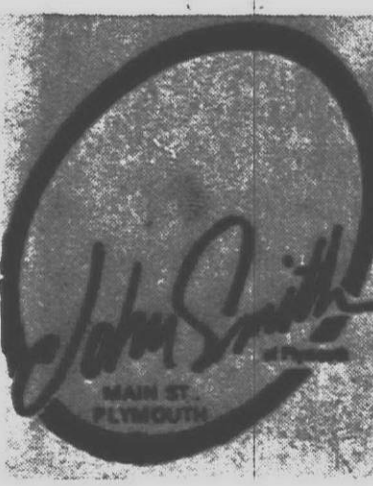

Esch Suggests Agency Control On Bargaining

EAST LANSING
U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor) told members of the Michigan Education Assn. that any legislation on collective bargaining for public employees would have to contain a provision for an independent agency to regulate collective bargaining.

Esch, who is a member of the special subcommittee on labor which is holding hearings on bargaining proposals, also said a bill would have to contain a mechanism to prosecute acts which are unlawful or which frustrate the process.

"The time has come - indeed it is past time - for developing an effective comprehensive system of collective bargaining on the national level for public employees, including teachers."

Society Is Bartender For The Alcoholic

The alcoholic's path to survival is blocked by a wall of denial built by society and reinforced by age-old myths about what is an alcoholic, according to John Parker, Greater Detroit Council On Alcoholism spokesman.

"The alcoholic is surrounded by innumerable influences that cater to his drinking instead of solving his problem. He not only denies he is an alcoholic, but everyone around him is doing it also."

Parker appeared before a group of Garden City residents Wednesday night at a seminar sponsored by the Jaycees.

"Alcoholism is the number one drug problem in the United States today, but most people are denying it. The image of the alcoholic has been restricted to the stereotype skid row bum. It starts much sooner than that stage," says Parker.

He explained that the alcoholic goes through three stages of development, beginning when the victim suffers loss of memory, misses work occasionally, or smashes up the car. This is where the problem should be recognized but is avoided by most people involved with the alcoholic, said Parker.

County Studies Passing Salary Issue To Panel

Wayne County Commissioner John C. Hertel's plan to have a panel of voters recommend the pay of county commissioners in the future will be studied by a committee of commissioners.

The county board has referred the proposal to its General Government Committee for study and a recommendation.

Hertel has proposed that the board establish a "citizens assembly" of voters selected at random to meet before the final election for each new two-year term of office and decide whether or not the commissioners should have a raise.

One member of the assembly would be chosen from the voter list of each of the 27 commissioners' districts in much the same manner that trial jury panels are assembled.

"This proposal, if approved, will eliminate political interests and influence from the decision-making process, since the decision will be made by an independent group of citizens rather than by elected officials or an appointed board of compensation," Hertel stated.

Hertel, a Democrat, is serving his first term on the county legislative body. He represents District 2, which encompasses Harper Woods and part of northeast Detroit.

"In our society, drinking has gained a degree of acceptance so that the alcoholic is rewarded and encouraged. We drink for every reason imaginable from getting hired to getting fired and for every holiday on the calendar."

"The person who drinks the most at a party and remains standing is patted on the back, while the guy who passes out is derided. Society is saying that the more a man drinks, the more of a man he is," said Parker.

Some people rationalize that beverage consumed determines whether a person is an alcoholic, says Parker.

"It doesn't matter whether you are drinking a shot of whiskey, a bottle of beer, or two ounces of brandy; it all contains ethyl alcohol."

Parker also attacks the entertainment media for making a drunk someone to laugh at.

"Entertainers have made millions off the stereotype drunk. This conduct lends acceptability to drunkenness."

Another denial problem arises among parents who refuse to admit that alcohol is a drug.

"Every day you can hear parents say they would rather have their children drink instead of taking drugs. They don't even realize that alcohol is a drug - a drug which kills."

Blame should be laid on schools and other public institutions that don't disseminate information on alcohol says Parker.

"Nobody seems to be reaching the public with the needed information. Experts sit in conferences and wisely nod their heads in agreement over what they know about

alcohol. Schools don't dedicate anywhere enough time to the subject."

Other professionals are also derided by Parker.

"Doctors are given only three hours of training in alcoholism. Many tend to reject the treatment of alcoholics. It must be realized that alcoholism is another illness that should be treated along with cancer or diabetes."

Jails and businesses are also guilty of neglecting the problem, says Parker.

"Jails are simply interested in incarceration, while employers are primarily interested in motivating their employee to produce. Nothing is done to face the underlying problem."

Twelve to 15 years may pass before the alcoholic show gross neglect of his job, says Parker.

"Families are also involved in denial. People don't want to admit that their family member is an alcoholic. Some people have seen family members drink heavily for seven or more years before

realizing that the person is an alcoholic."

Parker suggests a subtle approach in revealing the alcoholic's problem to him.

"Point out behavior. Don't try to tell him he's an alcoholic or about alcohol. He could tell you more about alcohol than you'll ever know."

"Keep a list of things the alcoholic does while he is drunk and tell him about it afterwards. Let him figure out why he did it."

Parker warns against threatening alcoholics with things that can't be followed through because it will put him on the defensive, making him deny there is a problem.

"It is a matter of zeroing in on the behavioral problem and learning to accept that there is a problem. This admission is hard for many people to take."

Some relatives are unknowingly in collusion with the alcoholic, says Parker.

Many people enjoy the role of the martyr or taking over the responsibilities left undone by the alcoholic," says Parker.

"I talked to one woman who eventually admitted that after her husband stopped drinking, she missed him. She inwardly enjoyed the role she was able to play while her husband was an alcoholic."

Riegle To Talk

U.S. Rep. Donald W. Riegle Jr. (D-Flint) is the featured speaker at the 2nd Congressional District Democratic fund-raising dinner Saturday, Oct. 27.

Democrats from Livonia, Plymouth City and Township will attend the dinner beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the Michigan Union in Ann Arbor. The 2nd district also includes parts of Washtenaw and Monroe Counties.

Riegle was a Republican until he changed parties earlier this year. He was first elected to Congress in 1966 where he is a member of the Committee on Appropriations. Riegle was named one of 10 outstanding young men in the nation in 1967 by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

He was a consistent opponent of the Vietnam war and has been mentioned as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senate in 1976 if Sen. Philip Hart retires.

Barton-Malow Chief Thought 'The Top' Was Beyond Him

When Ben Maibeck started as a construction worker for Barton-Malow Co. in 1938, he couldn't imagine the twists and turns his life would take, eventually making him president and chief stockholder in the company.

And if he could have peeked into the future then, he probably wouldn't have believed it.

Maibeck, a Redford Township resident for 32 years, had to climb a steep ladder before becoming president of the construction company in 1960.

The firm will celebrate its

50th anniversary next year. It can count among its satisfied clients Detroit Edison, General Motors, Ford Motor Co., Federal Mogul and Jones & Laughlin.

The company built the Observer Newspapers modern plant in Livonia and is completing reconstruction of the Packaging Corp. of America's Plymouth plant which was destroyed by fire last winter. Barton-Malow also was awarded the construction management contract for the \$30.2 million Pontiac stadium.

Maibeck can boast that in its brief history, the company has completed 40,000 contracts. Its sales volume has hit as high as \$80 million in a year. He also is proud that more than 75 per cent of Barton-Malow's business are repeats from satisfied customers. The company averages about 80 jobs per client.

Maibeck's history with the firm began one year after it passed the \$1 million mark in sales volume.

The route from construction laborer, time keeper and engineer helper to the leather chair in the president's office in Oak Park is marked with a series of "lucky breaks," says Maibeck, now 53.

He didn't have time along the way to pick up something he considers essential — a college degree — but he had the good fortune of learning the business first hand from its founders, Carl Barton and Arnold Malow.

"I feel very definitely that God has been good to me and put me in the right place at the right time," says Maibeck, who is also a bishop for Apostolic Christian Church.

"The opportunities that were offered to me along the way were through no fault of my own."

Maibeck's steady climb becomes intriguing when he says he lacked ambition and never considered rising to the top of the company's hierarchy.

"I thought it was beyond me," he said.

He attributes his success to the people he met along the way — and one of the first was the company's toughest foreman.

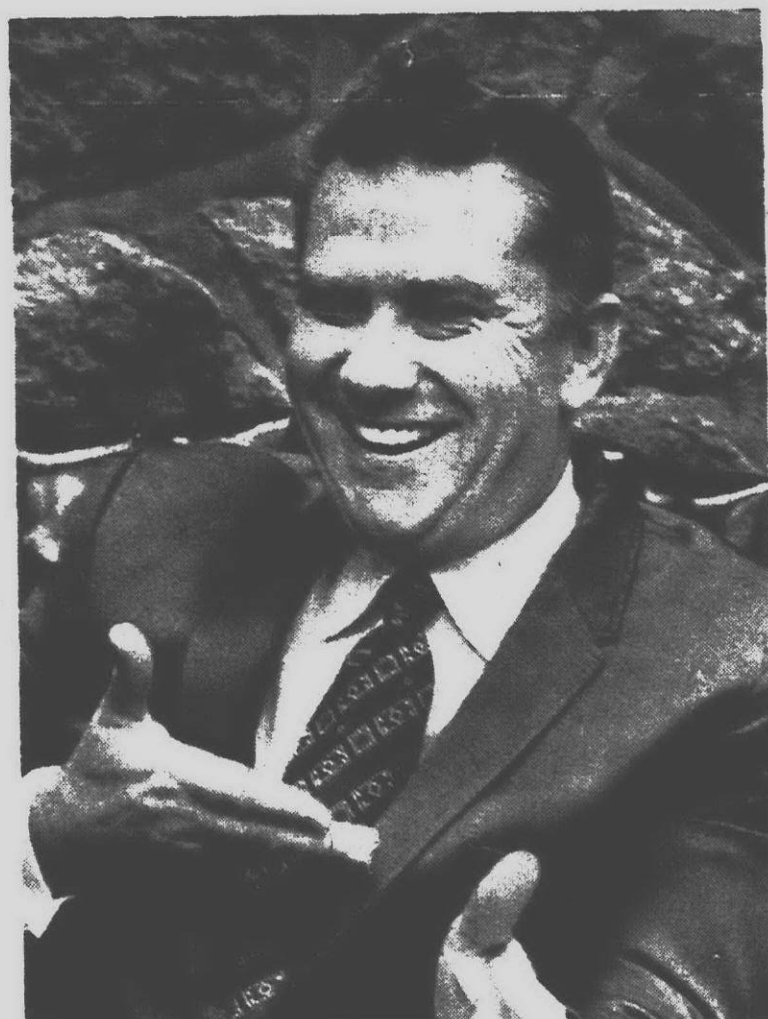
Maibeck started as a laborer in 1938 and entered the carpenter apprenticeship program in 1939. He was a journeyman six months later, a process which now takes four years.

He worked for his father, also named Ben Maibeck, who was a construction superintendent. The young man soon learned his father was reluctant to advance his own son. So he went to work for "one of the toughest superintendents in the company."

"My father helped me out but he (the tough superintendent) is the one who escalated me and pushed me up."

Maibeck was carpenter and general foreman for two years and then was named a project superintendent by a man who "I knew questioned my age but was afraid to ask me."

Maibeck was 21 at the time

and supervised an addition to Gar Wood Industries.

"I just didn't know all the facets to the business then but the other carpenters helped carry me through."

When World War II broke, Maibeck moved up to general superintendent as the business began to spiral.

He tried to join the quartermaster division in the Army but was told he could be more effective in his work with Barton-Malow.

He remained general superintendent during the war and came to the attention of Barton and Malow, who wanted to spend less time with the company but didn't want to disband it.

"They were looking to take it easier but felt strongly that the business should be continued. They didn't want to liquidate and leave the employees without jobs," Maibeck said.

"Since neither of them had sons, I became the focal point. They took a shine to me and arranged for me to buy stock in the company."

Maibeck was elected vice president and director in charge of field operations in 1949 and was made executive vice president in 1953 when Barton went into semi-retirement.

Two years later, Barton sold his shares and not long after, Malow was forced to cut back his activities after a heart attack.

"Even when I was vice president, I said the last

thing I wanted was to own some stock in Barton-Malow and stay a vice president," Maibeck said.

But in 1960 he became president. Since then he has directed the company's expansion into industrial, commercial, institutional, environmental-related and various other areas of construction.

The company has purchased Mead & Mount Co., one of the most noted construction companies in Colorado. Maibeck also is its president and director for Colorado and Wyoming as well as Cloverdale Rental Co. in Oak Park. He founded the latter to utilize and rent out the company's heavy expensive equipment.

He can look out the full size windows in his office and watch repairs being made on the heavy equipment and savor a taste of the business' outdoor activity.

Eventually, Maibeck will turn his business over to his son, Ben Maibeck III of Livonia, who was just elected a vice president.

His second son, Alan, is operating a waste disposal plant in Redford which the company built and ended up owning when the original owner defaulted. A third son, Doug, is only 10 but talks of following in his father's footsteps even though Maibeck hasn't encouraged his sons to enter the construction business.

He and his wife, Lorene,

also have five daughters — Kathleen, Connie, Beverly, Cynthia and Sheryl.

Maibeck was first attracted to Redford Township when he was in high school. He would drive through Lola Valley Park as he made collections from a Redford grocery store.

He built his first house on Kinloch at the age of 21 when Redford was largely rural. His two lots cost \$400. At the time, all he could see from his home were fields, he said.

Now he lives on Fox, near Western Golf and Country Club.

How To Halt Plea Bargains

Nature Center Begun For Oakwoods Park

The recent sentencing of Spiro Agnew has given rise to renewed discussion on the validity of plea bargaining in the system of justice.

In 1972, plea bargaining was one issue used by L. Brooks Patterson to get elected Oakland County prosecutor.

And this month the Traffic Safety Assn. of Michigan

suggests that much of the sentence reduction or avoidance for driving under the influence of alcohol, is the result of plea bargaining by prosecutors to reduce the backlog of cases and avoid jury trials.

Thus, there was great interest in the legal profession in a conference held in October at Oakland University, Rochester, on just this subject.

Among those present were Michigan Supreme Court Justice John B. Swainson, Secretary of State Richard Austin, and State Police Director John Plants.

Also joining the high-level conference were representatives of district courts, National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, Traffic Safety Assn. of Detroit, Automobile Club of Michigan, State Bar of Michigan, Sheriff's Assn., Traffic Improvement Assn. of Oakland County, Police Chief's Assn., and Michigan Women for Highway Safety.

Their conclusion was that "lesser" traffic offenses should be "decriminalized," taken out of the criminal law and handled expeditiously through an administrative

arm of the existing judicial system.

Some felt a better alternative would be to handle such offenses in a purely administrative setting, such as the Secretary of State's department.

The conference discovered, however, there was a lack of evidence in the nation to support either alternative.

Advocates of decriminalization argue it would eliminate the need for jury trials and the necessity, by Supreme Court mandate, of providing free legal counsel to anyone claiming to be indigent.

This would blend with the other alternative of reducing court backlogs, such as no-fault insurance and no-fault divorce.

Some conferees felt systems to rehabilitate bad drivers should be left with an administrative agency such as the Dept. of State, which already has some programs in effect.

Austin asked for more liaison between his department and the courts in pre-sentencing review of driver records. He said many judges are lax in reporting convictions of bad drivers.

Austin said his department is trying to become more skillful in detecting problem drivers before they get into serious trouble.

Computerized driver records, Austin added, show 75 per cent of all accidents involve drivers with two penalty points or fewer.

Recreational opportunities will soon be increased because of a ground breaking ceremony held last week at the future nature study site of Oakwoods Metropark near Flat Rock.

State, county, township and park officials participated in the event marked by a spadeful of dirt "turned over" to mark initial construction of a new \$240,277 nature center building which is expected to be in public use sometime in 1974.

When completed, the 6,800 square foot building will include separate rooms for exhibits, lectures by park naturalists, observation room, aquarium, indoor turtle pond,

lobby and restrooms. Special features include a small auditorium and a combination lunch - classroom to aid school groups using the center.

The nature study area covers 350 acres bordering the Huron River and backwaters of the Flat Rock impoundment. This water feature has several bays, wooded islands and marshlands inhabited by frogs, muskrats, turtles, fish and ducks.

Several flowers are uncommon, and hopefully new species of waterfowl will be attracted to the area. The site, rich in American Indian history, was originally a part of

the Huron Reservation in the 1800s.

Realizing that the natural features of the area would make this site an outstanding natural interpretive area, more than 10 years ago HCMA planners included this nature study area as a major facility for "Oakwoods Metropark."

Land acquisition over the last 15 or so years has cost \$1.3 million, and recent projects have cost about \$663,000.

"The nature study area is expected to be especially beneficial to the residents of the City of Detroit, down-river area and western Wayne County," said Kreger.

Pressmen Ratify New 2-Year Pact

A new two-year contract between Observer Newspapers Inc. and Local 13 of the International Printing Pressmen & Assistants' Union of North America was ratified Sunday by the local's membership and executive board.

Covered by the contract, which has an economic reopener at the end of the first year, are some 50 bargaining unit members of ONI composing and press rooms.

The new pact culminates bargaining talks which began in June and includes employee wage adjustment provisions, as well as increased fringe benefits. It is retroactive to July 3, which marked expiration of a previous three-year contract.

Local 13 represents the IPAU throughout southeastern Michigan. This ratification followed internal approval voted by the union's Observer chapel, co-chaired by Tom Kneffel for the pressmen and George Willard as representative of the composing and camera personnel.

Publisher Philip H. Power expressed his pleasure at the harmonious conclusion of the extended bargaining period, hailing the contract as assurance of uninterrupted service to the seven communities served by ONI.
