

City Race Won By Bida, Moehle and Battermann

Joseph J. Bida, John W. Moehle and Norbert W. Battermann were elected to four-year terms on the city commission Tuesday in a 14 per cent voter turnout.

John Charles Cummings ran fourth in a close three-way race for the two-year term.

The three-way race for that seat brought extra excitement because of announcement late Friday afternoon that Bernard D. Schmitz had received a job transfer and would be leaving the community.

Schmitz ran 14 votes behind Cummings and Paul Muller ran 11 votes behind Cummings.

Had Schmitz won, it would have meant he would immediately resign and the remaining commissioners would have to appoint someone

one to fill that seat until the next election.

Schmitz's name could not be taken off the ballot even though he requested that it be done when he learned of his job transfer late Thursday.

Cummings led the three-way race in three precincts but trailed behind both Muller and Schmitz in Pct. 2 and the absentee ballots and tied Muller in Pct. 4.

Bida and Moehle also vied closely for first place with 13 votes separating them.

Pcts. 1, 3 and 4 went for Bida while Pcts. 2 and 5 favored Moehle. They tied with 33 votes each in the absentee ballots.

Battermann, the lone incumbent running, placed third in each of the five precincts but fifth in the absentee ballots.

Running in seventh place was Mahlon D. Green while

Donald B. Watkins finished last.

The vote totals for the candidates (all based on unofficial figures) were: Bida, 856; Moehle, 843; Battermann, 617; Cummings, 355; Muller, 344; Schmitz, 341; Green, 253; and Watkins, 230.

About 900 of the city's 6,241 voters braved the chill and wind to produce a 14 per cent turnout.

Two years ago in the commission election, there was a 26 per cent turnout.

Bida, who formerly served as public works director of both Plymouth Township and the city, is an auto salesman at Leo Calhoun Ford. This was his first election to office.

Moehle, a former Plymouth school board member, is director of facilities and planning for Booth Newspapers in Ann Arbor. He is an engineer.

Battermann, who had never run for public office, was appointed to the city commission twice to fill unexpired terms.

Formerly an aerospace engineer, he is now a project manager on a computerized industrial process for TECH-S Inc. of Livonia.

Cummings, making his first election bid, is president of Cummings Advertising Agency of Plymouth.

state some day and the opportunity arose unexpectedly. Schmitz said he regretted leaving the area and was particularly concerned about its coming on the eve of the election.

The new commissioners will be sworn in at the city commission meeting Monday, and the commissioners will then elect a new mayor.

Schmitz, a city planning commissioner, is an engineer for Michigan Bell Telephone Co. and received an "unexpected" job transfer to the Traverse City area late Thursday.

A resident of Plymouth for 23 years, Schmitz said at a press conference called Friday to announce his job change that he hoped to move to that area of the

Canton Seeking I-275 Injunction

Canton Township's battle with the State Highway Dept. to halt work on the Joy Road overpass of I-275 has gone to court.

William Sempliner, Canton's attorney in the case, said the township is presenting an injunction request to Wayne County Circuit Judge Benjamin D. Burdick.

"It was decided that since we were getting nowhere with the highway department, the only alternative to prevent them from continuing work on the project was to take it to court," Sempliner said.

The injunction request by the township stems from opposition to the overpass by the fire chief and engineers as well as township trustees.

At a meeting last week, residents of Holiday Park Subdivision and neighboring Deer Creek apartment complex vowed to fight the project.

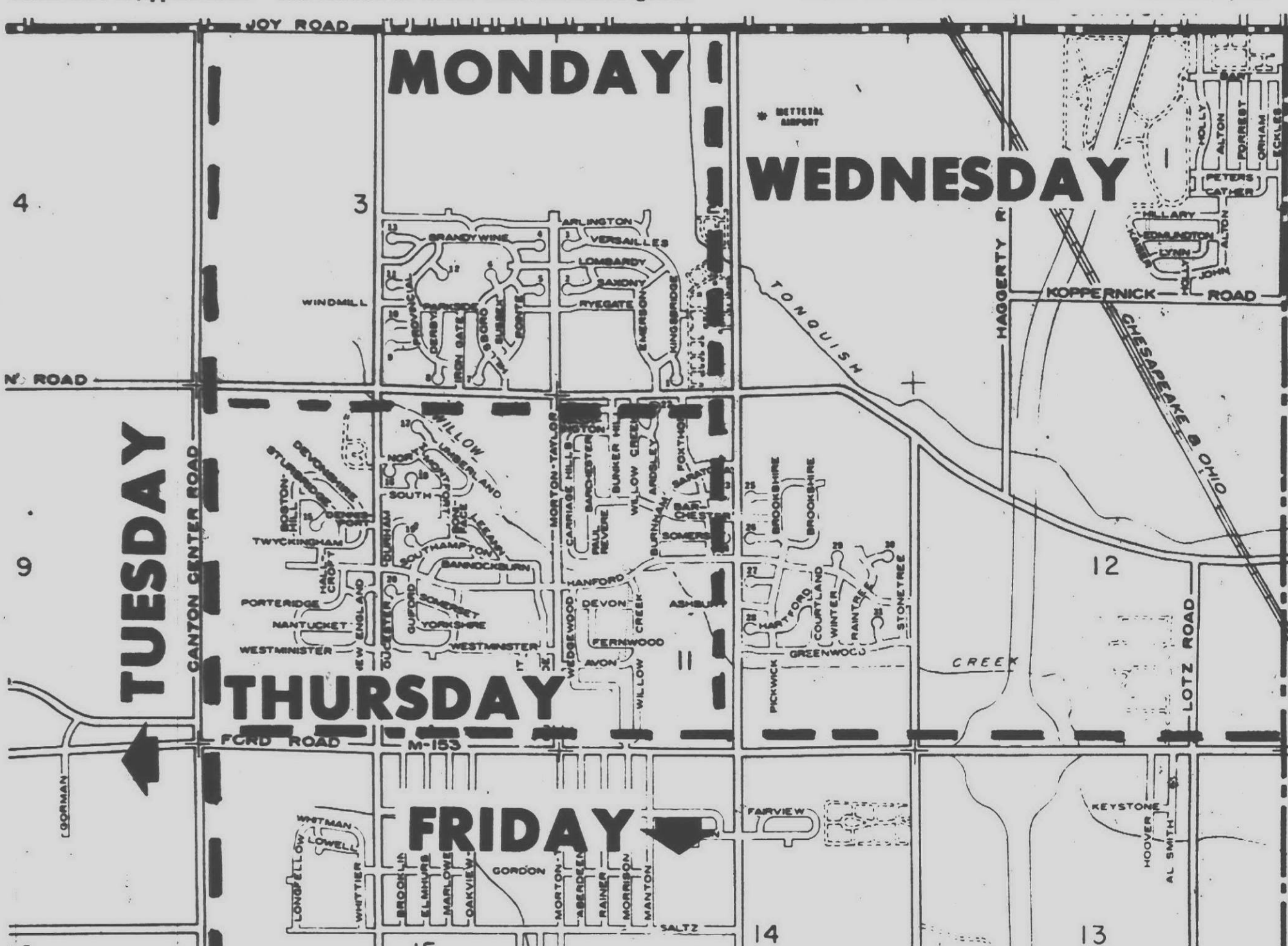
The apartments and Holiday Park are on the southeast corner of the intersection of Joy and I-275. The

groups are fighting completion of the overpass on the grounds the steep elevations present a serious traffic hazard and pose a constant threat to drivers as well as the school children who cross Joy to get to and from Fiegel Elementary School.

At last week's meeting, State Highway and Wayne County Road officials fielded questions from irate residents.

While generally defending the design of the overpass,

Canton Starts Rubbish Collection

Canton Township residents now are receiving free rubbish pickup at their curb.

Beginning Monday, the Municipal Disposal Service (MDS) of Inkster started its service under contract from the township at a cost to taxpayers of about \$80,000 annually.

MDS was low bidder of two firms vying for the Canton contract.

The pickup divides Canton into five areas - one to be serviced each work day of the week. (See map.)

Several rules have been set to cover the pickup. They are:

• All rubbish must be at the curb before 6 a.m. the day of collection for that area and empty receptacles must be removed the same day.

• All material placed at the curb or roadside must be positioned so as not to interfere with mail delivery.

• Wrapped garbage and combustible rubbish (paper, etc.) may be placed in the same container.

• Receptacles must be watertight and between 20 and 30 gallons in capacity, must have handles and lids and

must not exceed 50 pounds weight when full.

• Plastic bags, which are a minimum of two mill thickness, are also acceptable but must be tied shut.

• Cardboard boxes or paper bags full of rubbish or garbage will not be picked up.

• Loose garbage such as newspapers, flattened cardboard boxes and branches (not exceeding three feet in length) must be tied with cord into bundles not exceeding 50 pounds.

• Dead animals or offal of any nature will not be picked up.

Collection will not be made during bad weather or on Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Decoration Day, Independence Day or Labor Day. When bad weather or any of those holidays falls during the work week, collection schedules will be moved to the following day and Friday's scheduled collection will be made on Saturday of that week. (All routes will be back on schedule by Monday.)

township will provide pickup of special items on the second Saturday of every month beginning Saturday.

To have a special item picked up, residents must call the Canton Township office and give their address and the type of item to be collected. Items must be phoned in prior to the first Friday of each month.

Special pickups will include: discarded large appliances (stoves, etc.), hot water heaters, wood cut in three foot lengths and tied in bundles of no more than 50 pounds.

Items which will not be picked up include: auto bodies or parts, quantities of tires, building materials left from construction, alterations, demolition or repair of buildings.

Christmas tree pickup will begin the first week in January with the regular pickup and will extend for three weeks.

Residents are advised to call Canton Township Hall with any questions regarding pickup.

The new company will be called Suburban Communications Inc.

The agreement is subject to approval of the boards of directors and shareholders of both companies.

SUBURBAN COMMUNICATIONS will have four operating divisions:

DETROIT - which will consist of the seven Observer newspapers, headquartered in Livonia and with a total circulation of 106,000; the five Eccentric newspapers, headquartered in Birmingham and with a total circulation of 60,000; and Averill Press, a commercial printing firm.

The division will publish newspapers with mastheads of Rochester, Troy, Birmingham - Bloomfield, West Bloomfield, Southfield and Farmington in Oakland County; Redford Township, Livonia, Plymouth, Garden City and Westland in Wayne County.

EAST LANSING - which will consist of four weekly newspapers: East Lansing Towne Courier, Meridian Towne Courier, Williamston Enterprise and the Enterprise Shopping Guide, with a combined circulation of 22,000.

CINCINNATI - which will consist of four weekly newspapers: Western Hills Press, Price Hill News, News Express and Valley North Press, with a combined circulation of 110,000 west and northwest of the city, and a job printing company.

INSTRUCTIONAL FAIR, an educational publishing company headquartered in Grand Rapids.

The two principals will be co-publishers.

Hogan, 40, of Bloomfield Hills, was a state representative from 1961-64 and became publisher of the Eccentric newspapers in 1965. He is president of the Michigan Press Assn., a director of Suburban Newspapers of America and a former director of National Newspaper Assn.

Power, 35, of Ann Arbor, has been an editor in Fairbanks, Alaska, a foreign correspondent, administrative assistant to a congressman, and since 1966 owner and publisher of Observer Newspapers. He is president of the Michigan Foundation for the Arts and a director of the Foreign Policy Assn. and Suburban Newspapers of America.

Power and Hogan said the merger will bring three main benefits: an improved team management approach in a new industry that has had phenomenal growth, an overall marketing strategy in high income, high growth suburban markets, and more efficient use of such capital facilities as automated printing and typesetting equipment.

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Author Of 'Chariots' Erich von Daniken, Speaks At Schoolcraft

Erich von Daniken, who started an international controversy with his theories that the earth was visited in ancient times by astronauts from other solar systems, will speak next Wednesday, Nov. 14, at 8 p.m. at Schoolcraft College.

He will appear in the main gym on campus. Tickets at \$2 are available in advance from the college bookstore. The college is at 18600 Haggerty, south of Seven Mile Road in Livonia.

Von Daniken is author of "Chariots of the Gods?", "Gods from Outer Space" and most recently "Gold of

the Gods." His ideas were the subject of an hour-long television network program.

Born 38 years ago in Switzerland, von Daniken has been a critic of archeological explanations for such phenomena as the "fiery chariots" reported by the prophet Ezekiel. Although short on formal academic training, he has read extensively on his own.

His research has covered the biblical prophets, books of Tibetan lamas, stone relics of the Mayas and Incas, pyramids of Egypt, England's Stonehenge, Easter Island, cave drawings in North

Africa and unusual markings in Japan, Italy, Australia and other parts of the world.

"Chariots" was admittedly written to raise questions, but since then von Daniken has collected evidence to advance his own theory that astronauts from outer space visited Earth at about 500 BC.

Von Daniken's lecture is sponsored by the college's cultural and public affairs series. On Dec. 3, the series will present the Schoolcraft College Woodwind Quintet in concert in the Waterman Campus Center.

Madonna Enrollment Soars

At a time when most private colleges are experiencing declining enrollments, Madonna College in Livonia has a 48 per cent increase in its fall enrollment over one year ago, with an increase in freshman enrollment of 55 per cent. Registered for the current term are 1,026 students, 398 of whom attend part-time.

Currently in its second year of a five-year growth plan adopted in 1971, Madonna is 100 per cent ahead of the projection adopted then for 1973. The aim then was to enroll 516 students this fall.

The growth is attributable, said Sister M. Lauriana, dean of the college, to newly developed programs, special attention to adult students, and the fact that the college went coeducational last year. It is also in a rapidly growing area, served by the developing Jeffries Freeway.

The enrollment of men in this second year as a coed college has increased by 100 per cent, with 296 men registered this term as compared to 152 one year ago.

"Men are especially attracted to our criminal justice and radiologic technology programs," Sister Lauriana said. Both are relatively new and offer either achievement certificates for practical skills at the end of one year, an associate degree at the end of two years, or the bachelor of science degree at the end of four years. Some students are employed in the field and are taking related course work, preparing for advancement to managerial positions.

The largest enrollment at Madonna is in its four-year degree program in nursing with 216 full time and 103 part-time students attending this year. Another 57 full time and 13 part-time stu-

dents are enrolled in related health fields, medical technology, radiologic technology, and physical therapy.

The three-year-old criminal justice curriculum has 144 full time and 64 part-time students working toward degrees in law enforcement or corrections.

Proving that innovation attracts students, two new programs were introduced this fall. Fire Protection and Occupational Safety has 23 full time and 14 part-time students enrolled in the only such program in Michigan. Child Care enrolled 60 students for its first term.

Other students major in one of 36 subject areas at Madonna, may attend class as late as 10 p.m. and may be from 16 to 55 years of age.

Madonna has found that the students are still there. Innovative programs and flexibility attract them.

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EVERYBODY Learns At 'Kiddie Kampus'

PLYMOUTH The four-year-olds in Plymouth's "Kiddie Kampus" nursery school don't know that many people are watching them through the life size mirror window.

They're far too busy enjoying the growing peer friendships, the toys and games in the carpeted room and the story and song sessions.

A nursery school with two classes of 25 youngsters each isn't too unusual, but the fact that it is sponsored by the Plymouth Community School District and is located in the Plymouth Canton High School is.

While for the 50 youngsters involved, it serves as a fine way to spend either two mornings or two afternoons a week, for a good many others it's a learning experience.

Students who work in the nursery under the guidance of its co-directors, Mrs. Suzanne LaSota and Mrs. Gloria Hopfner, receive academic credit. Mothers and an occasional father and grandfather who work on a co-op basis find out a lot about four-year-olds.

Students and teachers who observe increase their knowledge of child development.

Kiddie Kampus opened last month. A new session will begin on Tuesday, Nov. 27 and run through Dec. 13. It will resume again the first week in January. The charge for two mornings or afternoons a week for 15 weeks is \$24.

Mrs. LaSota points out that amounts to about 75 cents an hour. The cost of utilities, maintenance and materials is all taken care of by the school district. Formerly the nursery program was held only during the summer.

Since it started as a year-around program, the response has been surprising to both directors. There is a long waiting list and Mrs. LaSota foresees the possibility of opening another session in January.

Both directors are strongly committed to the nursery school experience for youngsters. Mrs. LaSota, a veteran of many years in early childhood education with both the Detroit and Plymouth schools, has a master's degree in social studies. She is enjoying the location in a high school and thinks it benefits both the little ones and the older students.

Mrs. Hopfner started in a co-op nursery in Utica some 15 years ago. She has followed the lives of many of those students and the ones who came after.

She is convinced that youngsters with a good nursery school experience do better in school, and more than average go to college.

"I see such tremendous benefits and get such good reports on my nursery children. I really think this is the way to go for the schools. The difficulty is getting people able to run a program. Being a mother is not enough."

She mentions her 15 years experience and the fact that she is taking courses at Madonna College. Consistency, she feels, is one of the most

important qualities for nursery school teachers to have.

"Children are very aware of how consistent you are and they very quickly learn to depend on it. A rule is for everybody all the time and the kids have faith in this."

"They know for instance that they can climb and play on the ladders and the slide. They also know that they cannot climb on the window sills. That could be very dangerous. They know they must not leave and run into the halls."

"Sometimes a mother will be in a good mood one day and let the child do something he can't do the next day. We try to be consistent always," Mrs. Hopfner said.

About an hour and 15 minutes of the two-hour session is self-directed activity. This

means the children may choose to play or get involved in a number of different activities. After that there is a clean-up period and then singing, finger play and stories.

Mrs. Hopfner says the youngsters already have the impression that school is a fun place to come, they know they can relate to adults who are not relatives and each is being helped to build a strong self-image.

This latter she says, "is the most valuable thing you can give any child."

So, while parents, students, visiting groups and teachers are learning a lot about four-year-olds, the youngsters are learning a lot about themselves—and liking every minute of it.

Court Quashes Rossman's Suing Board Members

PLYMOUTH Wayne County Circuit Court has ruled that James H. Rossman, former Plymouth school superintendent, cannot sue as individuals the four board members who voted to fire him.

Rossman had filed suit against Esther L. Hulsing, George Lawton, Wilson Sick Jr. and John Hanskat plus the school district on two counts after he was fired from his post. The four were board members who voted to fire Rossman.

Circuit Court Judge James Ryan Thursday grant-

ed a summary judgment ruling that the four could not be sued as individuals since their action was as a governmental entity.

This means that while Rossman's suits are continuing, the school district will be the sole defendant.

Rossman is suing for libel, slander and breach of contract in relation to his firing. He is also appealing a State Tenure Commission ruling that he had no tenure as superintendent of the district.

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OBSERVATION POINT

Winning-Is-Everything Mentality Louses Up Our Political System

Yesterday was election day here in the suburbs. The weather was cold. The lines were short in most places; the vote was light.

But the people spoke through the age-old method of the ballot. Mayors were re-elected; new city councils were picked; treasurers and clerks were selected. The performance of incumbent officials was weighed against the promise of new candidates, and power was confirmed and placed.

In this day of squalor and scandal in our national government, it was somehow heartening to see the processes of democracy working here at the local level. Most campaigns were free of last-minute irresponsible charges, and with a few exceptions campaign spending abuses were at a minimum.

Most local candidates seemed content to state their positions and outline their qualifications for office, and then to sit back and await the judgment of the people.

Nearly all the candidates interviewed by this

newspaper seemed to have a rational, balanced view of their ambitions: "Sure, I'd like another term," remarked one city councilman, "because I think I can help the city. But I've been around a long time, and if I don't win, well it isn't the end of the world."

THAT ATTITUDE seems to me remarkably healthy, particularly in the context of the recent excesses we have seen revealed at the national political level.

There are a lot of reasons for such indignities, but a major one stems from the excessively single-minded obsession with winning which seems to have afflicted national politicians of both parties in recent years. It's as though every person who even thinks about being a U.S. Senator, let alone President, somehow gets mysteriously brainwashed with Vince Lombardi's axiom about winning being the only thing.

If winning is the only thing that counts, then it's no real ethical problem to order bugging of the opposition's headquarters or to collect and disburse large sums of illegal campaign funds or to commit all the

other absurd shenanigans to which we have recently become so accustomed.

THE PROBLEM with this, of course, is that the process of politics is not the same thing as the game of football. In football, you can play the winning is everything game and get away with it partly because there are umpires and referees on the field who can spot infractions and who are never wrong in dishing out penalties and partly because once the game is over life goes back to normal.

In politics, there are no umpires who are never wrong and who have the power to dish out instantly a 15-yard penalty for bugging the opposition.

More importantly, in politics the event never ends at the 60-minute whistle. The campaign may end with an election, but the process of government is always continuing. That is why the suspicion and mistrust that the winning is everything mentality produces always circle back and consume the man who created them.

This is the situation in which Mr. Nixon finds himself, and this, too, is why so many national politicians are so despised by the public.

AND THIS IS why this week's local election can teach us so much.

In most cases, the issues at stake and the ambitions at contest were not so large that overall balance and perspective was lost. Instead of a group of insecure neurotics playing the winning is everything political game with every ounce of their being, most candidates ran as reasonable people - ambitious to be sure, but not carried to a nutty extreme.

I admire them all for running, in this year of cynicism and skepticism. The reward for the winners is simply to help try to make their community a better place to live; the solace for the losers is to have participated in the democratic process.

Winners and losers, they are all worthy of respect, in that they understood the other old axiom about competition: It isn't who won or lost, it's how you played the game.

Should Senior Residency Be Limited?

After a week of reading news stories on the central desk of Observer Newspapers, I find it refreshing to watch Archie Bunker on Saturday nights.

Archie is straightforward and honest. He doesn't like the "colored," thinks they have attributes inferior to whites, doesn't want them in his house and doesn't want to go to theirs. I respect Archie. I don't share his views, but I respect him.

He's a refreshing contrast to the mealy-mouthed euphemisms that are uttered at governmental and political meetings.

Like Archie, I will be specific.

In Redford Township, the

Panhandle Civic Assn. is fighting a proposed senior citizen housing complex in the Schoolcraft-Telegraph vicinity.

A chief objection is that state and federal funding will be needed to finance the 200 units. Joe McCullough, Panhandle president, points out the township would be unable to restrict residency to senior citizens from Redford.

Well, if you know anything about the suburbs, you know that 98 per cent of the people who die in Redford Township weren't born there. So what's the big problem about letting "outsiders" reside in a senior citizen dwelling?

I don't live in Redford Township, but I've shopped

there and applauded lustily its fine orchestra. No one has ever refused my money or kicked me out of the auditorium because I'm a non-resident. No real estate firm ever refused to show me a house there when I was shopping.

No, one must conclude that the objection to the senior citizen housing project is based not on the fact that persons from Farmington, Southfield, Garden City or Dearborn Heights might move in. It's because persons from Detroit might move in, and Detroit is 50 per cent black.

Let us turn now to Harvey W. Moelke, once the mayor of Livonia, now running for a

city council seat. Some background: As mayor, Moelke vetoed an open housing ordinance; he also emulated Dearborn Mayor Orville Hubbard's sinister "Keep Dearborn Clean" campaign.

Moelke says he's for senior citizen housing as long as it's controlled by the city and for Livonia residents only. "Outside ownership of senior citizen housing means persons from any community can move in," Moelke said at a meeting of the St. Edith Catholic parish altar society.

In 1950 Livonia had only 8,000 residents; in 1960, there were more than 60,000; today, more than 110,000. Obviously, most "Livonians" weren't born in that city. So

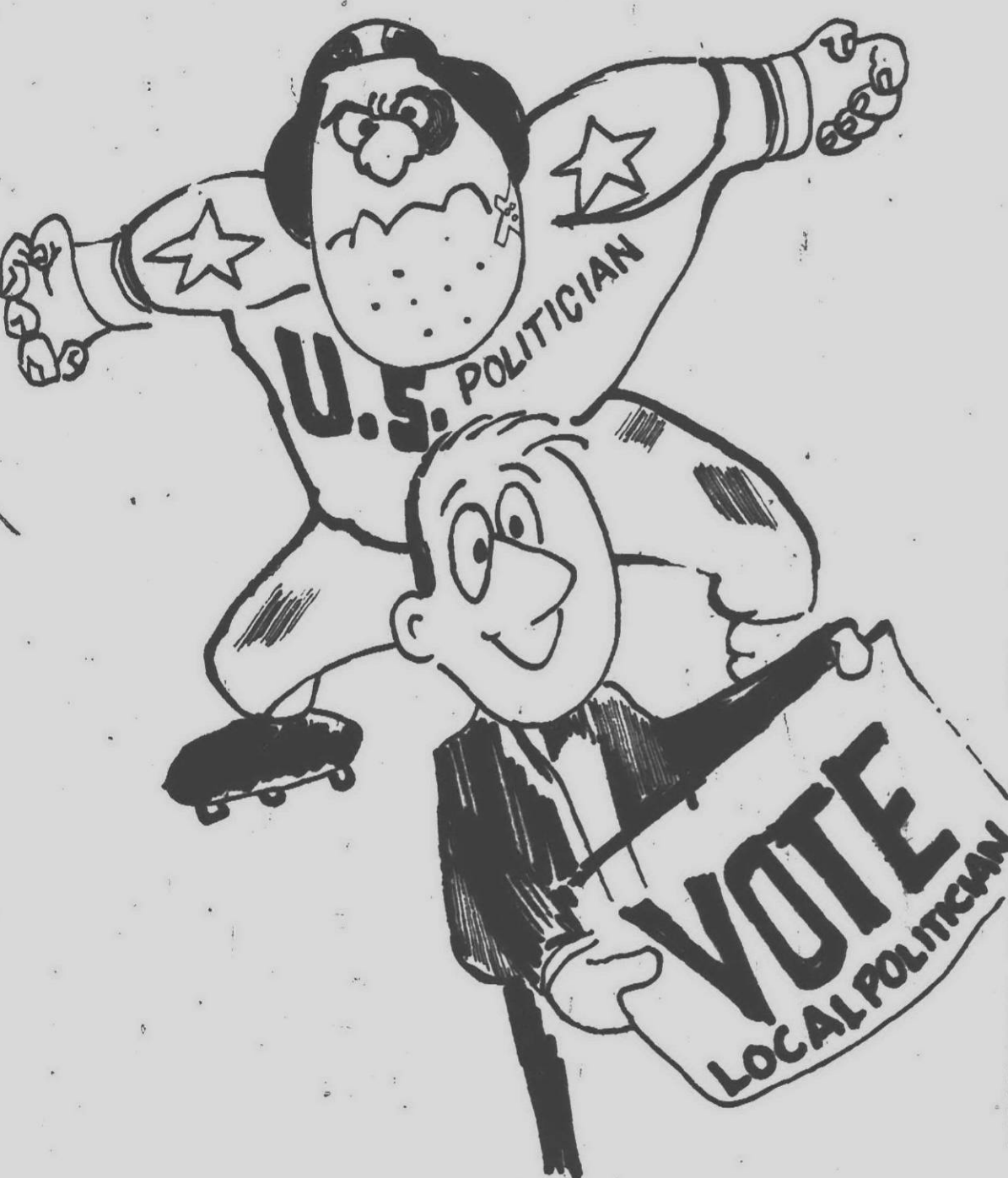
what's the objection to outsiders?

In the seven years I've lived in Livonia, I've never heard a Livonian say a bad word about anyone from Plymouth, Northville, Farmington, Southfield, or Redford Township, to mention just a few of the neighbors. Nor have I ever heard a Livonian downgrade a white Detroit. But a black Detroit ... that's another matter.

Let us be perfectly accurate: Joe McCullough and Harvey Moelke have never said they want Redford Township and Livonia to be racially segregated.

But the rest of us can read between the lines. We know what they mean, don't we?

One woman, whose property touched the alley, spoke up to urge the commission to close the alley because "I once saw a colored man walking down the alley looking into the yards."

The Friends of Bikelogy have recommended building public transportation stations where commuters can store their bicycles and then continue by bus or rail into the city.

There are now 80 million bicyclists in the United States, the Friends say, but only 16,000 miles of bikeways for about 13 inches per rider.

In 1972, some \$22 billion of our gasoline and property taxes were spent for highways, while less than \$1 billion went for public transportation. Practically nothing was provided for bikeways.

Traffic studies show that 43 per cent of all urban work trips made by autos are four miles or less and, in nine out of 10 trips, the driver is the sole occupant. Many of these trips could be made by public transportation, car pools or, the Friends point out, bicycles.

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Road Units Ask Larger Role

The newly elected chairman of the seven-county Inter-County Highway Commission (IHC) has asked that a larger role in transportation planning be granted the agency.

Michael Berry, board chairman of the Wayne County Commission, said that under new amendments to the Federal Highway Act, transportation plans can be reviewed or developed by a designated transportation planning agency.

"I'm not suggesting that the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) should be replaced, but perhaps the Inter-County Highway Commission can supplement or undertake development of a share of the trans-planning process," Berry said.

The objective of the IHC is to prepare and keep current a plan for a system of inter-county highways, super highways, and limited access highways in the seven counties of Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Washtenaw and Wayne.

Berry added that real progress is being made on acceptance of the master right-of-way plan and that it had been approved by just six of the townships and villages in Wayne County.

Deer Hunters' Outlook Bright

LANSING There is every reason to believe that a good Nov. 15-30 firearm deer hunting season is in the offing for Michigan sportsmen, reports the Dept. of Natural Resources.

DNR survey findings indicate that the state's deer range is carrying more whitetail this fall than in any autumn of the last five years, says David A. Arnold, DNR deer specialist.

Arnold points to the mild 1972-73 winter and the abundance of readily accessible, nutritious food - particularly acorns - accompanying it as major reasons for an optimistic deer season outlook. He says last winter's ample food and temperate weather helped result in good fawn carry-over from 1972 and in excellent spring fawn production this year.

Two other big factors working for Michigan white-tails, says Arnold, are various habitat improvement programs and burgeoning commercial lumbering operations, both beginning to make their mark in stabilizing the deer population.

With more deer in the woods this fall, he says, a hunter's chances of seeing one are much better than in recent years, even if he is not fortunate enough to bring one home with him.

"The sport of deer hunting is much more than shooting a deer," he believes. "Much of the thrill and excitement comes with just seeing them in their natural habitat."



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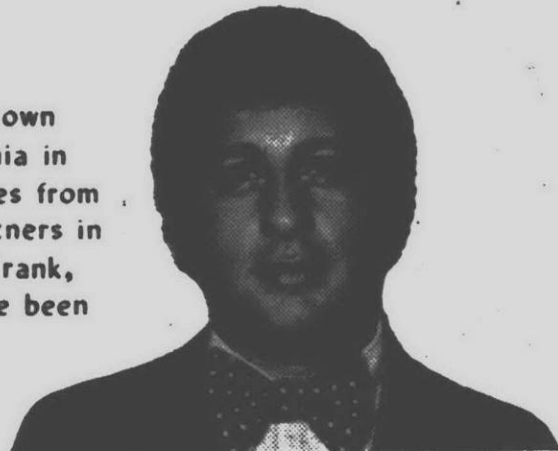

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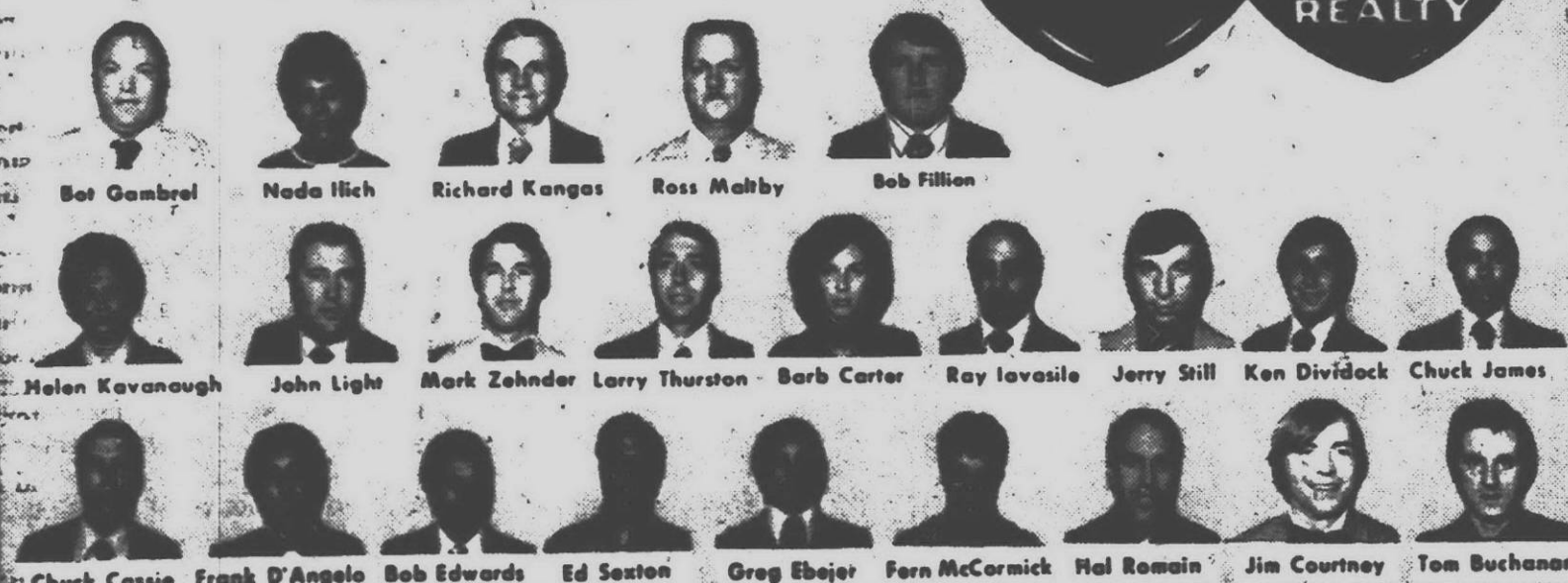
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One Of Those Mysteries Of Life

If you're lucky enough to have aluminum storm windows, you probably aren't faced annually with one of those sweet mysteries of life - that is, how wooden storm windows can grow a half inch wide each year.

While pondering that problem with my plane in hand last weekend, I was also thinking about another mystery of life.

How does the city commission and administration think up all these ordinances they're always passing or talking about passing?

Well when Fred Yockey came to town as city manager, he (like many of us) got terribly bored with the commission meetings lasting for several hours simply because the commissioners, while happy to argue about anything, were always waiting for a colleague to make the necessary motion.

Yockey, being more of a pro than the manager's office had heretofore seen, started including "suggested resolutions" in the commissioners' agenda packets.

These "suggestions" have proven to be a great boon to

those of us who like to get out of the meetings at a reasonable hour and to the commissioners who always seemed to have difficulty in putting their ideas into the form of a motion so that they could, at long last, come to a vote.

Yockey gets those "suggested resolutions" by evaluating the issue in his own mind as well as sounding out the commission informally on what stand it would like to take.

Not so though on the latest suggested ordinance for the city - a recommendation to license coin operated amusement and music devices.

The request for this throw-back to the tea taxes comes not from the commission or administration directly, but from pressure put on by a city businessman who doesn't like the kind of crowd the new pinball alley next door draws.

Need I remind readers that there arose quite a brouhaha when that complaining busi-



nessman applied for a liquor license in the city? There was talk then about the unruly crowds another liquor establishment would attract to town.

Now just a short while after he opened his doors, he's complaining about another business as being a nuisance.

When first proposed to Yockey to prohibit pin ball machines (as Garden City did), the city manager, in his wisdom, would have nothing to do with it. After all, the city could spend a lot of time and money unsuccessfully fighting the constitutionality of such a ban.

But even as its being considered - a "licensing"

- the ordinance is aimed at curtailing places which cater to a "longhair" crowd as well as gaining another revenue source from something which has never demonstrated a need to be regulated before this saloon owner complained.

In fact, the city has had pinball machines, itself, for some time in its Cultural Center. Now the city's going to tax its competition?

It's one of those sweet mysteries of life - like how you can start a column by talking about aluminum storm windows and end up talking about the commission's contemplated pinball machine ordinance.

Pinball Ordinance Gets 1st Reading

PLYMOUTH An ordinance to license coin operated amusement and music devices was given first reading by the City Commission Monday night.

Second reading of the ordinance and the final determination of its fate may come at any time since the newly elected commission takes office officially this coming Monday.

The ordinance, aimed at pinball - type machines and juke boxes, would not prohibit such devices, but would require them to be licensed and inspected.

The ordinance would also allow the police chief to limit the number of any such devices in a particular establishment.

highway officials said they were not aware of the problems until they were invited to the meeting.

Frank C. Skebensky, district engineer with the highway department, said he had turned over the whole matter to high level Highway Department officials in Lansing.

"The problem was presented to officials in Lansing this week. I expect to get some word on their decision about continuing with the overpass sometime later this week," Skebensky said.

State officials had first refused outright to halt construction.

During the meeting, however, Paul Riley, a state highway official, said he was "sympathetic with the residents" and told them the problems would be taken directly to deputy director of the Highway Department in Lansing.

Officials had agreed not to pour any cement until meeting again with the residents which would be arranged after officials in Lansing review the case.

Canton officials, however, have decided to not wait on Lansing but seek the injunction from the court.

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Nixon Veto Override Predicted

WASHINGTON
Congressman Marvin L. Esch said there is a distinct possibility the House will vote today to override President Nixon's veto of legislation limiting the power of the president to make war without approval of Congress.

Esch, whose district includes Livonia and Plymouth, said "the vote will be close, but I am working with others in the House in a bipartisan effort to reclaim powers provided in the Constitution which reserves to Congress the right to declare war."

Republicans and Democrats have joined in a bid to muster the two-thirds vote needed to override Nixon's veto of the bill which would require the president to report to Congress with 48 hours after commitment of armed forces to foreign hostilities.

The measure, approved by a 238-123 margin on Oct. 12, would put a 60-day limit on a president's power to wage undeclared war without approval of Congress. An additional 30 days could be added on written certification from the President that the time is needed to protect withdrawing forces.

The compromise bill hammered out by the Senate and House was just three votes shy of two-thirds support when it passed the House Oct. 12. It provides that Congress can order a halt to military action within the 60-day to 30-day deadlines by passing a concurrent resolution which is not subject to a presidential veto.

Esch, an original sponsor of war powers legislation, emphasized, "A vote to override President Nixon's veto of the war powers bill should not be seen as a vote for or against the president. It transcends the current climate of crisis or partisan politics. It is an opportunity for Congress to ensure that the United States will never again become involved in a military conflict without wide public debate and without consent of Congress."

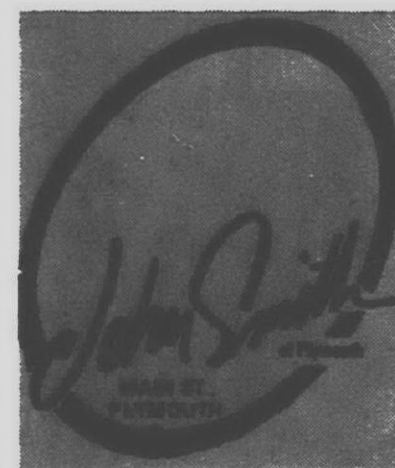
Clay Fechter serves as director of law enforcement programs.

"Jeff Lee" is not a bad stage name, even if you're a 10-year-old boy and it's your very own name.

Sitting at the kitchen table with chin propped on hands and elbows propped on table, his square, white teeth crunching on an ice cube while his gerbil, Lightning, tears open a purple package of Sweet Tarts, he looks for all the world like every boy you ever knew.

But Jeff doesn't rush home from school every day, change his clothes on the run, grab a cookie and his football and head for the nearest field for a game.

Instead he rushes home, grabs a cookie, reaches for his television script and studies his lines so he'll be ready for rehearsal on Saturday and taping on Monday.

Jeff has the leading role of Jerry in the television program, "Jerry in the Circus," seen on WXYZ-TV each Saturday at 11:30 a.m. and acting is what Jeff really likes to do.

While other kids idolize and idealize Gordie Howe and Al Kaline, Jeff gives this part of himself to Rex Harrison and Broadway with its bright lights, music, costumes, makeup and applause.

Reading from the script of an episode called "The Crazy Crate Caper," Jeff leans against his mother's shoulder and when he reads lines like, "I wonder if..." followed by whatever the script says he's supposed to be wondering about, you really believe he's wondering.

"I don't really like this script," Jeff says, "but it ends with me saying I like puppies and the next script is 'Jerry and the Puppy' and everybody in the whole cast brings me a puppy in that one."

In the plain, unabashed way of children, he makes it clear that he likes scripts best that give him the lion's share of attention.

He likes the idea of movies, too. "In the movies, you can go wherever you want and the camera will still be on you." The open pleasure of that happy thought brings a great smile to his face as he picks up a brownie which his mother says he can't have now because it's too close to dinner.

Jeff is the son of Tom and Marcia Lee of 16723 Old Bedford in Northville Township and is the second youngest of five sons, ranging in age from Tom, 15, down to Steven who is 4. Tim, 14, has written a TV script called "Jerry and the Burglar" for Jeff, and Mark, 13, is interested in baseball.

Jeff is in the fourth grade at Moraine Elementary School and his teacher, Mrs. Higby, says his classmates "love having him entertain - they are proud of him and a little envious too." As for Mrs. Higby, she's not always sure when Jeff is acting and when he's not.

Jeff's father says, "His mom has more starry eyes

about it than I do - I'm the stabilizing influence. I didn't think it would go this far, and if we ever have to push Jeff (for studying lines and going to rehearsals), then it's time to forget the whole thing."

Right now, nobody has to push Jeff to perform. If it were allowed, he would probably act 24 hours a day, and it's been like that for years.

It started because, "I thought it would be fun to act," Jeff says. "I saw the movie 'Scrooge' one Christmas and then I pretended I was Scrooge all the time - Mom said I looked just like an actor. I'd put on 'family night' down in the basement and everyone would come downstairs and watch."

He says the movies "Camelot" and "Oliver," and while his friends were outside playing ball, Jeff preferred to be by himself in his room with the record albums, listening, memorizing and working up pantomime routines based on his memory of the movies.

There have been programs and plays ever since he started school.

Texans Study Education Park

"It's all right I guess," he says as he dutifully uses the colored pencils to work on maps of the oceans and continents. It is clear that, for Jeff, the oceans and the continents lack the magic of show business.

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Ratio Of Teachers To Jobs Open Is 2-1

After investing four years preparing for their career, new teachers are graduating into a discouraging job market which isn't expected to improve.

Last spring, for instance, Michigan colleges and universities graduated 13,700 new teachers into a job market that was ready to accept only 6,150. The teacher surplus is growing even more with former teachers returning to their profession after having raised a family or left it temporarily for other reasons.

Overcrowding of the profession has forced a reckoning with related areas such as teacher preparation and evaluation and prompted a half-day conference at Madonna College Thursday.

Prospective teachers listened to varying views on student teaching, possible limitations on teacher educa-

tion, teacher evaluation and statewide planning from professionals in the fields.

The lack of statewide planning in the field of teacher preparation was seen in evidence that the market is flooded with graduates compared to the anticipated need.

The statistics show about 2.2 graduates per teaching job.

Overcrowded fields include:

•Health and physical education - 1,022 graduates for 148 openings or 6.9 graduates per job.

•Social science - 1,731 graduates for 302 openings or 5.7 graduates per job.

•Music - 355 graduates for 95 openings or 3.7 graduates per job.

•Art - 439 graduates for 123 jobs or 3.6 graduates per job.

•Business - 573 graduates for 186 openings or 3.1 graduates per job.

•Home economics - 365 graduates for 138 openings or 2.6 graduates per job.

"I think we are going to have to prepare teachers to be flexible," said Dr. Paul Carter of the University of Michigan-Dearborn.

"When a student comes to us for training as a teacher, we will also have to prepare him to be competent in other fields dealing with human beings," Dr. Carter, chairman of the Teacher Education Council, said.

He noted projections warn that people will have to be flexible and prepared to

change jobs as often as every 10 years.

Teachers could be prepared for careers dealing with the social services and people-to-people services, he suggests. Additional leisure time will create jobs in recreation related areas which people trained as teachers might be able to fill, he said.

Flooding of the teacher market also provides an opportunity to replace poor teachers with dedicated, professional teachers. But determining who is a "poor" teacher is the snag which has led to discussions on teacher evaluation.

Among the suggestions offered was one by Dr. Michael J. Deeb, secretary of the State Board of Education and director of planning at Mercy College.

He suggests that teachers might be re-tested periodically on their competency to renew their certification.

Several organizations are studying ways of testing for competency but haven't arrived at firm methods.

The Wayne County Teacher Education Council has taken a step in that direction by preparing a report detailing "common experiences for associate teachers."

The report is the first attempt at unifying student teaching experiences and is currently under study by various groups. It suggests that student teachers be involved in teaching as well as observing classes and that a uniform length of student teaching should be set in the state.

Dr. Joseph Maciolek, an assistant principal in Southgate who was on the committee which drew up the re-

port, says that "maybe we're way off base" but they are attempting to arrive at a way of guaranteeing proper preparation for full-time teaching.

Dr. Harold Oatley, assistant superintendent in Allen Park who chaired the conference, said there was general agreement that any limitations on teaching education should be enforced before the student is trained.

"I think there was a good deal of agreement that any limitations should be before the student enters the program," he said.

Madonna student Patricia Cybulski said that before "we limit those students coming in, let's get rid of the teachers who are there already and are not doing the job."

Some speakers urged that an emphasis be put on "quality rather than quantity" in the teaching profession, noting that most bargaining issues are monetary-related such as salaries and class size rather than quality-related.

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Day Care Scholarships Are Goal For Sister Annina To Aid Needy

Have you ever known a grandmother faced with the care of pre-school grandchildren 24 hours a day, seven days a week?

A young couple faced with a diagnosis of multiple sclerosis?

A single parent worrying about what is happening to little ones at home while working away from home for less than \$4,000 a year?

The questions come from Sister Annina, director of the Seton Nursery School and Day Care Center, whose job brings her into contact with people who have like problems every day.

To help alleviate the plight, she has started a scholarship fund that is presently helping to subsidize the day care for 11 children. "But the need is so great, so much greater than that," she says.

"Divorce is the big thing. There are more divorces than ever now, and at an earlier age. And unwed mothers are getting younger and younger. Seventy-two per cent of those at Marillac Hall (in the St. Vincent and Sarah Fisher Home complex) are under 17 and more than 50 per cent of those are keeping their babies. Many are still going to school."

She tells stories about fathers on drugs and ADC mothers struggling to work themselves out of the poverty cycle stymied by the day care costs she quotes to them.

"And where are the children put? Back to grandmother, who is more often than not physically unable to cope," she says. "We have a couple of children here who come one day a week just to give grandmother a rest."

Seton Nursery became independent of the St. Vincent

and Sarah Fisher Home on the Farmington - Southfield boundary at 12 Mile and Inkster Rds. about a year ago.

"We are a non-profit organization, but full care (for a five day work week) still runs \$33.50 a week. And that's out of the question for so many," she says. "If they make \$4,000 a year it disqualifies them for state payments. And no, if you're thinking about it, we do not get revenue sharing."

Her philosophy is not to give full scholarships. "We try to figure out what is reasonable for them and then supplement the rest. We were going to make that a rule, but even that changed with one unusual case. I couldn't refuse one mother who wanted to work as much as she did," she said.

Seton Nursery takes its name from Elizabeth Ann Seton, founder of the Sisters of Charity. "We hope she'll be

declared a saint one day, and if she is, she'll be the first American to be canonized," Sister Annina said.

The nursery is operated by Catholic Sisters, "but the beliefs of parents are respected and all children are welcome," she said. The nursery is licensed to accommodate children from 2½ to seven years of age.

The facilities are spacious, with large gyms, a water play room, activity rooms, extensive playgrounds and numerous class rooms to accommodate small groups. The personnel is made of state-certified teachers and experienced assistants.

There are 90 area children who visit the day center now for full or half days, or for

only one or two days a week. Sister Annina can accept 60 children full time, and hopes to fill out her roster "with those who need it."

She invites visitors on any weekday while the center is in session, from 7 a.m. - 5:30 p.m., and will receive donations addressed to her in care of Seton Nursery School, 29475 Inkster Rd., Farmington, 48024.

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For Maximum Comfort, Check Heating System

Before it gets any cooler system to be sure it is in Although you yourself can outside, check your heating proper working condition. make a preliminary in-

spection of your heating system, it is a good idea to have the system professionally cleaned and serviced once a year to be sure it is functioning safely and at maximum efficiency.

The information below is a guide when checking the heating system yourself.

Electric heating systems require very little upkeep other than keeping the baseboard units free of dust that may accumulate from time to time. You should also be careful that the flow of warm air is unobstructed by

curtains, drapes or furniture. If you have an electrified furnace or boiler, the usual maintenance of parts is called for at pre-seasonal intervals.

As with all heating systems, electrically produced heat is most efficient and economical when the house itself is properly insulated against heat loss. This is usually done during construction but can be improved by caulking and weatherstripping around windows and doors, by storm sashes and by other insulation, such as rugs and mats on concrete flooring.

In a forced warm air heating system, the filter, which cleans the air, should be checked at least twice a winter and either cleaned or replaced. Heating registers and ducts should be cleaned periodically. This is important to the maintenance of maximum heating efficiency.

The burner should be inspected and/or serviced, as well as the blowers, belts and the motor. Turn off the electricity while you work on the furnace so that it cannot start while you are working.

If you have a forced hot water heating system, the boiler and circulator pump

should be checked. Make sure the thermostat accurately registers the house temperature. The oil or gas burner should be serviced.

You should also ascertain that the pipes, heating coils, radiators or baseboard units fill properly with water. If any of the units fill with air, the heat will be drastically reduced.

Air valves should be clean in steam heat systems. They can be cleaned with a non-toxic solvent or rust remover or replaced for very little money. Clogged air valves will result in slower heating.

Fireplaces need quite a bit of maintenance for safe and enjoyable use. The flue and chimney should be periodically checked for cracks or leaks. Both the flue and chimney should be tight. Otherwise, gases or smoke can escape into the house.

Clean soot from the chimney to avoid further fire hazard.

Keep a door or window open when lighting a fire in the fireplace. Store firewood out of doors. Check sparks from flying out of the grate with a fireproof screen.

Never close draft before all embers are out and cold. To be entirely safe, it is a good idea to keep an approved home fire extinguisher handy for putting out small fires or for containing any larger outbreaks until help arrives.

Decorating Can Be Fun In Two-Story Rooms

Would you be willing to sacrifice floor space in your home for the luxury of a dramatic, two-story living room?

A great many home builders across the country are banking that you will.

Double-height ceilings are popping up in all kinds of homes, from single family houses to tiny apartments. Even the modular home comes with an extender that literally raises the roof in the family room.

Some floor space may be lost, but a high ceilinged room may be less of a space waster than appears. The design usually creates an open deck or gallery that can serve as a private den or guest room.

Decorating these newly proportioned spaces can be fun, but some traditional dec-

orating rules may have to be discarded.

First to go could be the wall-to-wall carpet, which acts as a blotter, dampening the light, airy effect of the room. Instead, why not an area rug or two marking groupings of furniture?

The exposed oak flooring will add a gleaming extra dimension to the room.

Designer Bill Bell took advantage of the extra wall space in a Norwalk, Conn., condominium to display a collection of early American harvest tools.

The effect is authentic Americana, with early American furniture and oak plank floors that create a timeless atmosphere.

A remodeled house in Cambridge, Mass., displays another approach to dealing with two story walls. The liv-

ing room tucked in a corner of the newly spacious main floor is entered through a dramatic two-story circular foyer covered with super graphics.

This heady entranceway leads to a serene living room. A collection of paintings and accessories leads the eye up to the high windows which provide a dramatic punctuation mark.

High ceilings, paradoxically, place greater visual emphasis on the floor. Exposed oak floors with area rugs fit in cheerfully where carpeting would be dull.

The gleaming hardwood floors also are ideal reflective surfaces, adding sparkle and a feeling of spaciousness wherever natural light is lacking.

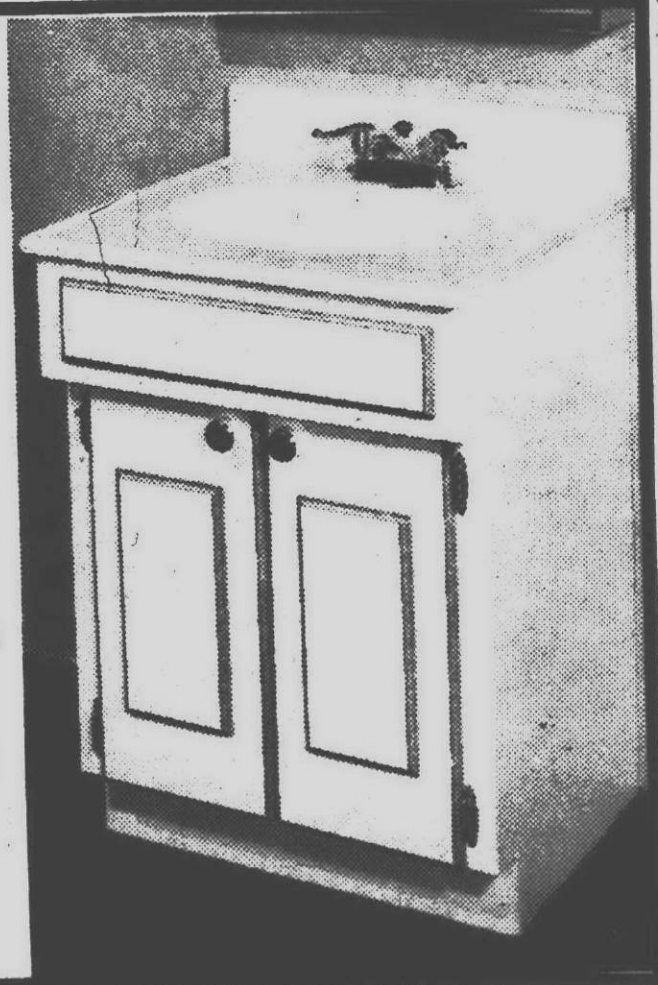

Pre-Fab Myths Debunked



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A number of myths about manufactured housing have been debunked: partly because the public has learned to separate present facts from past memories of "pre-fabs"; partly because manufacturers and builders are producing better homes.

But, say industry experts, this is no time for resting on laurels.

In some major "consumer areas" — holding down costs, design, environmental planning, energy conservation, and over-all housing quality — there's still a way to go.

To that end, about 14,000 builders, building manufacturers, materials producers, architects, engineers, equipment suppliers, financiers, and land and community developers are expected to attend the fourth annual IN-BEX Building Exposition, Nov. 27-29, in McCormick Place, Chicago.

They'll investigate — through seminars, and some 300 exhibits including a special Energy Conservation Center — ways to improve housing's marketability and the industry's profit margins.

Misconceptions about manufactured housing have not been confined to potential homebuyers.

Builders of conventional houses have also labored under some outmoded ideas about the technology.

Here are some of the "popular" fallacies — and facts — supplied by INBEX, 5 South Wabash Ave., Chicago.

Fallacy: Manufactured housing consists exclusively of modules.

Fact: Modular housing is only a small segment of the industry. Most of the market is made up of panelized, pre-cut, and "packaged" homes, and pre-built components such as roof trusses, wall, ceiling and floor panels, and plumbing and heating cores. The industry also includes mobile homes.

Fallacy: Manufactured housing is new and relatively unused.

Fact: A recent market research study estimates that more than 2,150,000 housing units will be produced during 1973, and 90 per cent of the conventionally-built homes will use some form of

pre-built components. The technology, which has been making big strides in this country for the past few years, has been used successfully in Europe since the mid-1940s.

Fallacy: Manufactured housing is confined to boxy, look-alike designs.

Fact: Actually, manufactured units permit great design flexibility. Modules are designed to be "put together" in a variety of ways. Manufacturers of panelized package homes produce a wide variety of designs, from ranch style to Georgian, traditional to contemporary, single-family detached to multi-family.

Fallacy: Manufactured housing is suitable only for low-cost units.

Fact: As with conventional building, there are low, moderate, and high-cost manufactured homes. One large manufacturer has a custom-design series that sells for \$150,000. As for prestige features, many manufactured homes offer wall-to-wall carpeting, operating fireplaces, bay win-

dows, open-beam ceilings, even built-in bars.

Fallacy: Use of manufactured housing will put local builders out of business.

Fact: Mostly, it's local

builders who buy manufactured housing. They also develop the land, put in the foundations and utilities, handle on-site assembly, and rent or sell the finished homes.

Next Year's Weed Battle Won Now

The best time to fight lawn weeds is before they appear, and that means taking a few simple steps at the end of the growing season or before the next one begins.

Some suggestions offered by the American Association of Nurserymen can be helpful in your weed control efforts.

While there are different chemicals available to kill most types of weeds, the nurserymen advise they be used with great care, sparingly and only according to directions on the label or instructions you can get from your county agricultural agent or nursery garden center.

Never use a chemical just on suspicion, the nurserymen say, because quite often there is a better way to solve the problem.

The most effective weed control is with the maintenance of a good turf cover — few weeds can compete with a tight sod that is growing vigorously and kept mowed at the proper height.

If, in spite of this, weeds continue to be a problem and you are going to adopt chemical measures, advice from the nursery industry can make your effort more effective.

First of all, chemical weed

correctives should be used only on established lawns since some can be harmful to tender, new grass. By the same token, the material should be kept away from other plants. Even small amounts on certain plants such as roses can cause injury.

When only a few weeds are present, spot treat instead of treating the whole lawn.

It is a good practice to fertilize the lawn immediately before or after you apply the weed control material, to encourage the spread of grass to fill in any empty spaces which may have resulted.

The lawn should not be wa-

tered for at least 24 hours after the application of most weed killers.

If a rain should fall within that period, though, do not retreat the lawn immediately, but if no results are evident within 10 days to two weeks a second application may be necessary.

This final word from the AAN is highly important. Left-over chemicals should not be disposed of by pouring them down the drain. Be sure the container is marked clearly to identify its contents, then store it safely out of the reach of children and well removed from any seeds or fertilizers.



The Green Thumb

Sometimes home gardeners have seed left over or perhaps they want to save seed from their own plants. Is it advisable? In many cases, it is.

Keep in mind one fact, though: Flower and vegetable seeds are rather expensive when compared to other costs. Never save seed from a hybrid plant. Hybrids

are produced by crossing in-breeds which in many cases do not have the outstanding characteristics that you would like.

Seed from a hybrid plant (such as a tomato) when used the following year will revert back to some of these parents and the result will be disappointing.

From open-pollinated (non-hybrid) varieties select only the most desirable fruit from the best-looking plants. Be sure to allow the fruit or seed to develop fully before picking.

In most cases the seed will start to darken or become hard when it is mature. Pick and dry the seed as soon as possible. A good drying temperature runs around 90 degrees. Temperatures higher than this may cause the seed to lose viability or germination.

We dry our seed on a screen in a warm garage. A fan helps to dry the seed and prevent mold. If pulp is present, remove it from around the seed after it has dried. This is done by screening or winnowing (using air to separate the dried pulp from the seed of vegetables).

After the seed is cleaned and dried, store it at low temperatures and low humidity, in glass jars tightly sealed. Best temperature is between 40 and 50 degrees F. but the important thing is to keep it dry. Even at low temperatures seed will not remain viable if the humidity is allowed to remain high.

Next spring, when you get around to sowing seed, better check it about six weeks in advance to see if the germination is good. If not, better toss it out and buy fresh seed from a reliable seedsman.

GREEN THUMB CLINIC: "We have a Zebra plant which grows tall. Please tell us how to shorten it and make it bloom."

Answer: The so-called "Zebra" plant (Aphelandra squarrosa louisae) is a fine house plant, admired for its foliage and its spike of yellow, waxy flowers. Cut the tip out and root it in a glass of tap water, or moist sand.

This will make the plant bush out.

Give it a bright, or semi-sunny window, 72 degrees F. Good soil mix includes one part each of sand, peat and loam.

Incidentally, the popular shrimp plant also needs

frequent pinching to keep it from getting scraggly. You can cut the tops out anytime and start new plants in sand or plain tap water. Don't try to grow the plant indoors, if it's been outside all summer. It's too large and woody. Start a new plant for winter.

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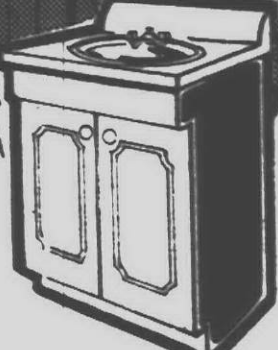
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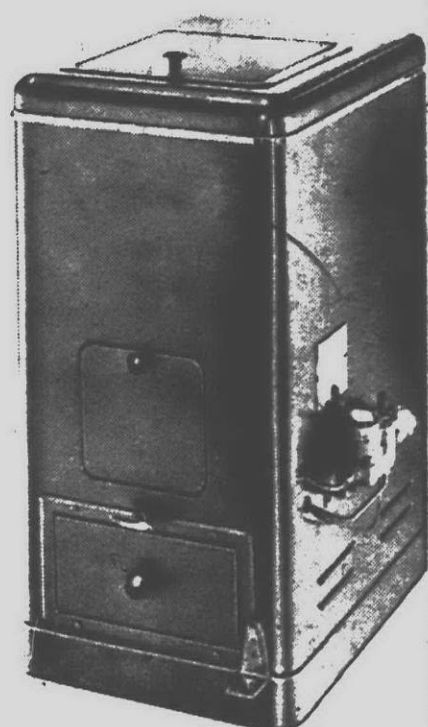
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Last Garden Chores Assure Brighter Spring

When November arrives, the gardener knows that the gardening season is over, at least until next year. It is time to finish up the chores and then turn your attention to indoor gardening.

Finish all planting that has been planned for this fall. Get tulips planted, covering them with about six inches of soil. All other bulbs should have been in the ground before this, but if you still have some on hand don't delay, but get them planted.

The small, early bulbs should be planted only about two inches deep. Daffodils and other narcissus and hyacinth bulbs get planted at the same depth as tulips, so that there is approximately six inches of soil over the top of the bulb.

Rather than planting all those bulbs in the ground, you might consider planting some in pots and forcing them into bloom for some cheerful flowers indoors. They need about eight weeks in a cool dark place to form roots before they are brought into a warm, bright place to make top growth.

Tulips and some varieties of narcissus are not difficult to force. Hyacinths are easy and can even be grown in a glass of water rather than in soil. Crocuses and other little bulbs are charming grouped in a small pot.

It is really too late in the season to be transplanting evergreens. However, if some just have to be moved this fall get the job done as soon as possible. If they are sprayed with a plastic coating, such as Will-Pruf it will help cut down on moisture loss until the roots get somewhat established.

This is really prime time to transplant leaf-losing trees and shrubs. They are dormant now. At least the tops are not actively growing, even though the roots will continue to grow until the ground freezes.

Because of this the plants will get somewhat established this fall and then next spring long before the ground is dry enough for any digging, the roots will begin to grow again. Thus, the plants will actually have two growing seasons before the leaves come out.

Incidentally, almost all deciduous shrubs and small trees can be moved bare-rooted.

Large trees and evergreens need a ball of earth around the roots. Plants that are growing in baskets or pots or cans should have the containers removed just before they are planted.

You need a tinshears to cut through metal cans, and if you can't do this yourself, have it done at the nursery before you bring the plant home. Leave the container

on, though until you have the plant in or at least near the planting hole.

Much of the health and success of next year's garden depends on things you do this fall. For instance, if you give all your evergreens a thorough soaking in late fall before the ground freezes they will look fresher all winter and will actually green up earlier and be livelier and healthier next spring.

Also, if Mother Nature does not supply adequate rainfall all trees and shrubs that have been planted at any time during this past year should have a good soaking, too. When you have completed the watering

chores drain the hose, coil it up and hang it on a peg in the garage, or better still, in the basement if you have one.

Leaves should be raked from the lawn. If they are allowed to stay on the lawn all winter they may well kill the grass beneath them. Besides, the lawn will look tidier and more attractive without those soggy leaves coming into view every time the snow melts away. Put those leaves on a compost pile and they will be converted to good humus and can be recycled back into the soil.

Also, the yard will look tidier if you get out the clip-

pers and edger and trim and edge the beds and along the walk and drive. This will save you from having to do it next spring when you will be very busy with a great many other garden chores.

For the sake of neatness give the lawn a final cutting before putting the mower away. This will be good for the general health of the lawn, anyway. Long tangled, matted grass is more prone to fungus infections.

Before you put the mower away, drain any remaining gas from the tank. Tuck a plastic drop cloth around the mower and it will stay dust free all winter.

Clean up the spreader and

hand tools, too. If you give them a once-over with a slightly oily rag the film of oil that remains on them will help keep them from rusting.

One of the most important things you can do for next year's flower and vegetable gardens is to do a good clean-up job this fall.

Remove all the old vegetable and annual plants. Cut back all perennials to within a few inches of the ground, except for the few that have a rosette of leaves that stays green all winter. It pays to put plastic labels in the ground to mark the spot where some perennials are that might get overlooked when you are working in the

garden early next spring. After the beds are empty, scratch up the soil around the perennials, and give the empty vegetable and annual beds a thorough spading, leaving the soil in rather rough clumps. This will turn up and expose many of the insects and insect eggs that may be in the soil, and exposure to freezing weather will kill them.

If the soil is left in clumps the moisture can penetrate better and the frost action will help condition and improve the texture of the soil.

Don't forget to clean up planter boxes and pots and window boxes. If evergreen branches are tucked into these they will look decorative all winter.

A winter mulch is not necessary on all plants. It is used not to keep the ground warm, but to keep it frozen. Alternate thawing and free-

ing is hard on newly planted perennials, so plan to mulch some of these after the ground has frozen. Evergreen branches or straw can be used.

Roses should be mulched, however. You can bring soil from another part of the garden and mound it in a cone six inches high around the canes, or you can use a collar that will hold leaves around the plants.

The garden can be pretty in winter and make a dramatic scene to view from a picture window. This is especially true if there are evergreens to catch the snow and bright berries and colorful stems to provide a cheerful accent.

Why not consider adding a few plants just to provide winter cheer. Also, put out a bird feeder to entice birds to the yard, and the garden will be lively all winter.

Plants Need Baths, Too

Nature's trees, plants and shrubs are the oldest "air purifiers" in the world, and, because of that, indoor plants appreciate a bath now and then to wash away the dust and other impurities they collect from the atmosphere.

In their publication on green survival, the American Association of Nurserymen points out that one major city, Los Angeles, frequently washes its street trees with a detergent solution for the same reason.

Clear water at room temperature is recommended for the plant washing, although a mild detergent solution may be used, and washing can take place every few weeks. The association recommends that plant surfaces not be shined with oily substances which can attract excess dust.

In addition to enhancing the air purification capability of the plants, the washing often produces welcome increases in growth.

Small Tree Needs Help

This is a time when you can plant or transplant trees. The newly planted tree needs some support for the first year in its new home.

The American Association of Nurserymen suggests that a small tree receive that support from a wooden stake about a foot longer than the height of the tree planted in the ground as close as possible to the trunk. Tie the tree to the stake with wire, using a small piece of garden hose around the wire to act as a cushion between it and the wood.

For larger trees, use three wires staked to the ground and attached to the tree.

Closet Needs 2-Foot Depth

When adding a closet, plan for a minimum depth of 24 inches from front wall to back, to prevent squeezing clothes on hangers.

The average height of a closet shelf is five feet, eight inches. The rod for hanging clothes is installed two inches below the shelf. In closets that will be used for coats and dresses, the rod should have at least five feet clearance above the floor.

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Why Dry Cleaners Tumbled 20 Per Cent

Men's double knit suits, double knit shirts and dacron ties, along with the ladies' latest fashions in colorful synthetic materials, are most pleasing to the eye - but don't mention them to the dry cleaners.

The fruits of man's ingenious mind that brought us such things as 'permanent press' and washable materials have cut heavy inroads into what was once a most profitable enterprise.

A recent survey through Observerland revealed the dry cleaning business has suffered a decline of more than 20 per cent in the last year, and the end is not yet in sight.

There was a time, not long ago, when dry cleaning outlets were numerous along any of the main highways. Now, one by one, they are falling by the wayside under the pressure of the synthetic materials.

Jean Webb, owner of the Webb Cleaners in Garden City, one of the hardest hit, cited three firms that went out of business in her area during the past year and a half.

"Our business is down considerably," she said, "and at a time when it should be booming. Folks are back from their vacations, and with the start of school, we should have been busy. We were not - and all because of the polyester, dacron and other synthetic materials."

The same story was told at the large Indian Village outlet in Livonia.

"We're down at least 25 per cent for the past two months," management stated, "and during the month of August, it was just terrible."

"I noticed the change coming about two years ago," said John Hogan, new owner of Tait's Cleaners in Plymouth.

"These double knits - both shirts and men's suits - have decreased the number of garments a person generally needs. And these fewer garments need even less care."

"We've been in a slump since 1969," said John Matteis, owner of Gould's Cleaners in Plymouth, and it has now reached a 30 per cent reduction in business in the past three years.

"Most of the business we

get is in women's wear, but even that is showing a decline as more and more women are washing their garments at home."

The slump is not confined to any one segment of Observerland.

Bill Gardner, of Farmington Cleaners, is quick to tell you that business is down between 15 and 20 per cent, and he traces it to the increasing use of the latest garments that are synthetic, wholly or in part.

"We've lost the pants pressing business," he said, "but the women's wear is where we are feeling it the most now."

Asked what effect the synthetic materials had on his business, Ernie Matasky, owner of the Ten-Tel Cleaners in Southfield, answered: "Just terrible. These new garments that are washable and the pants and shirts that are permanently pressed are knocking everything down."

"Women used to wear woolen skirts and sweaters, and we'd get them. But no more. They've gone for the new stuff - and we're hurting."

And it is all in the name of progress.

Deer Veto Gets Weak Backing

LANSING

Only two of Observerland's 11 state legislators backed Gov. Milliken's veto of a bill which would have banned antlerless deer hunting in the eastern upper peninsula.

The Legislature failed last week to muster the two-thirds vote in both houses to override Milliken, whose veto in effect upheld an earlier decision of the Natural Resources Commission.

The State Senate voted to override, 28-6. Among the yes votes were Sens. David Plawecki (D-Dearborn Heights), William Faust (D-Westland), Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) and Daniel Cooper (D-Oak Park).

The bill to reverse the NRC failed to get the necessary 74 votes in the House. It got only a 64-40 favorable vote.

Voting no - upholding Milliken and the NRC - were Reps. R. Robert Geake (R-Northville) and Ray Baker (R-Farmington). Absent was Raymond Smit (R-Ann Arbor).

Voting yes were Reps. William Keith of Garden City, John Bennett of Redford, John Markes of Westland, Thomas Brown of Westland

and Joseph Forbes of Oak Park. All are Democrats.

The argument pitted upper peninsula hunters, who oppose killing 3,500 antlerless deer, against biologists in the Dept. of Natural Resources, who say a harvest is necessary in order to control the herd size.

Dr. Gene Gazlay, director of the DNR, said, "It's difficult to make people understand that we have to harvest both sexes of deer in order to control the herd size."

"If the herd gets too large, many of them will starve in the winter and also do considerable damage to the range areas."

"Hunters have shot the 'last deer' in some areas of the state many, many times, but the herd keeps coming back."

"Selling the concept of harvesting does and fawns has always been a very difficult public relations problem for us. The local sportsmen in a hunting area won't accept that."

But every other state in the country has learned that you have to allow hunting of both sexes in order to control the herd size."

John W. Stauffer, president of the 215-member Eastern Upper Peninsula Sportsmen's Assn., threatened "armed

patrols" to keep hunters out of Luce, Chippewa and Mackinac counties.

"We're just going to make life miserable for anyone who comes up here hunting does," said Stauffer.

Had the override attempt been successful, it would

have been the first time since 1951 that the Legislature had overridden a governor's veto.

In that case, the Legislature overcame Gov. G. Mennen Williams' disapproval of a 1.5 cent a gallon hike in the gasoline tax.

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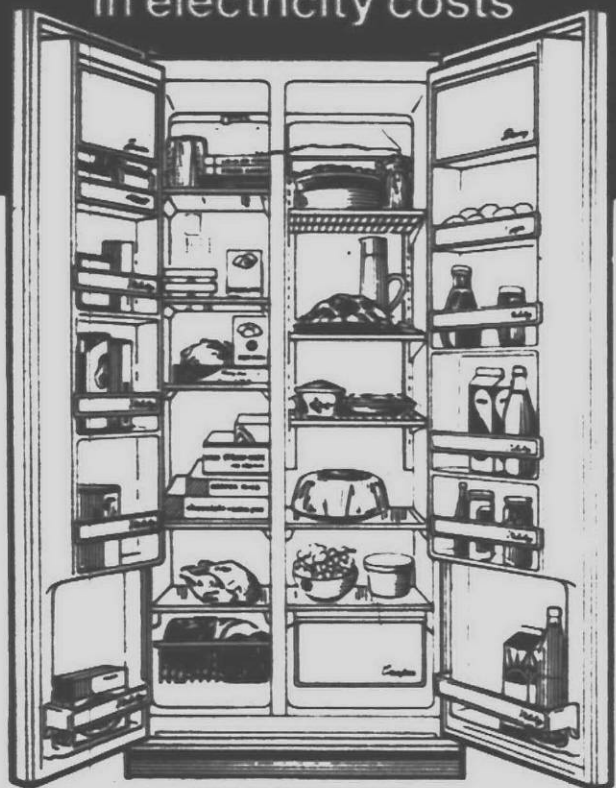
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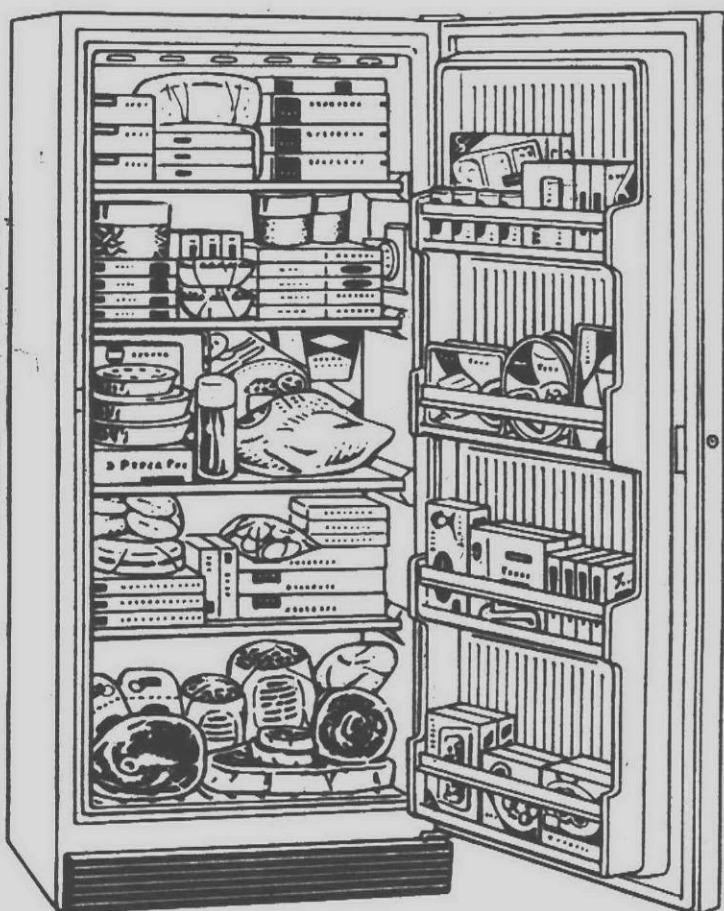
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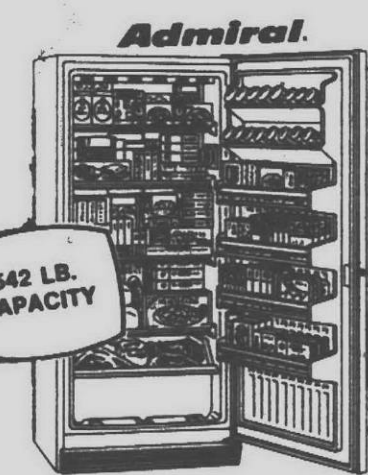
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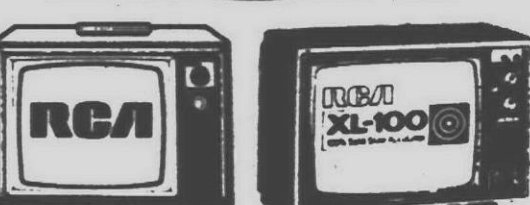
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
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
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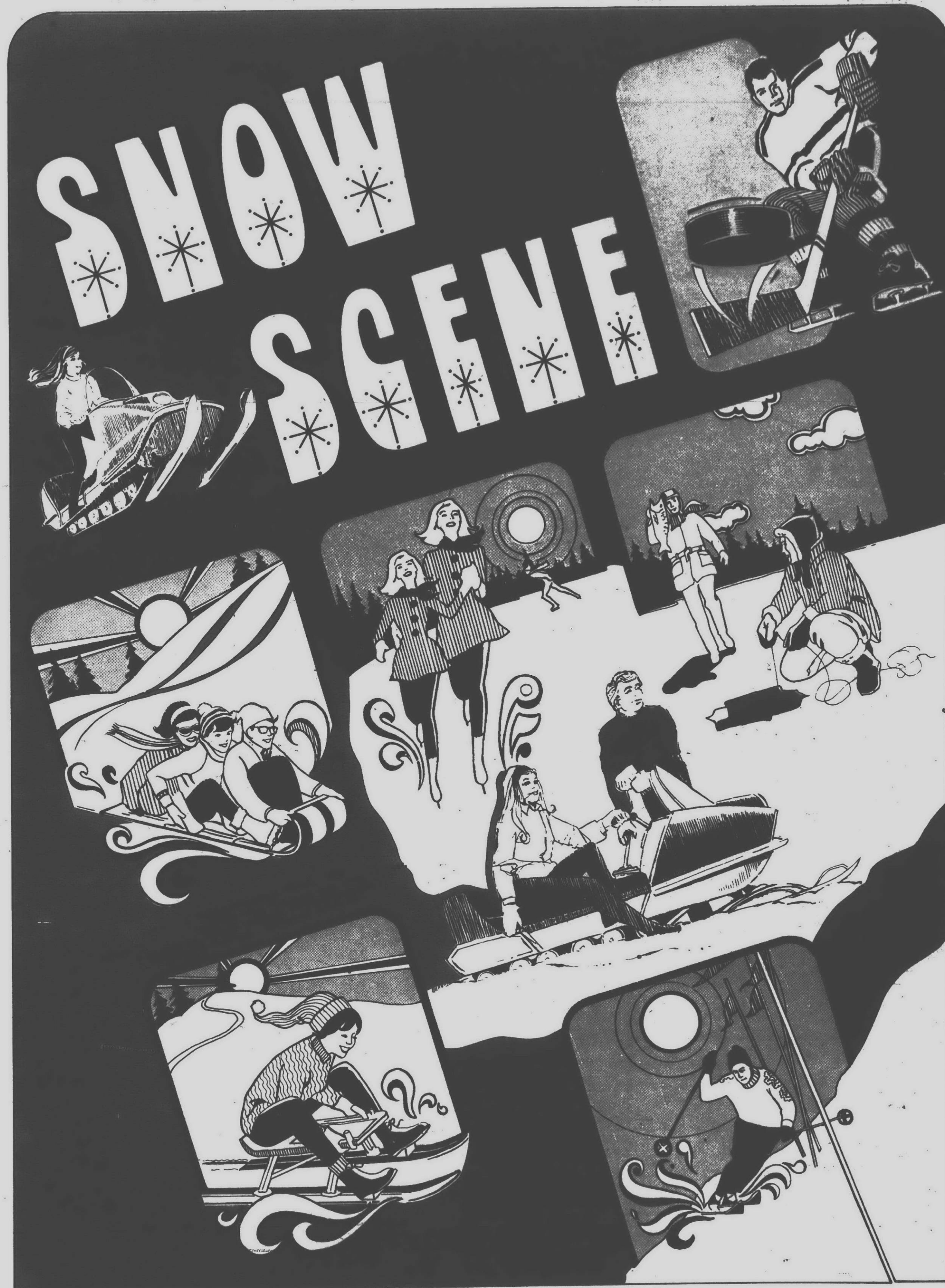

With all apologies to the skiers, skaters and snowmobilers of the country, the picture of a person trudging through the rutted snow of a parking lot, tennis shoes on feet, tennis racquet in hand is becoming a symbol of winter.

The sport of tennis has had a phenomenal growth over the past few years—a growth that can be directly traced to the onset of indoor tennis.

Throughout the country in general, and in The Observer area in particular, indoor courts are opening and expanding as people discover and rediscover the excitement, exercise, challenge and fulfillment that can come from a well-matched game of tennis.

Most tennis facilities are run by businessmen who, with an eye out for profit, are jumping in feet first, competing for the consumer dollar.

BUT IN LIVONIA, an interesting story is unfolding—its locale: the Livonia Family Y.

In just a few days, the Y will open a six court tennis facility, complete with pro shop, fireplace and all the amenities which make up, indoor tennis—the Grand Slam Tennis Club.

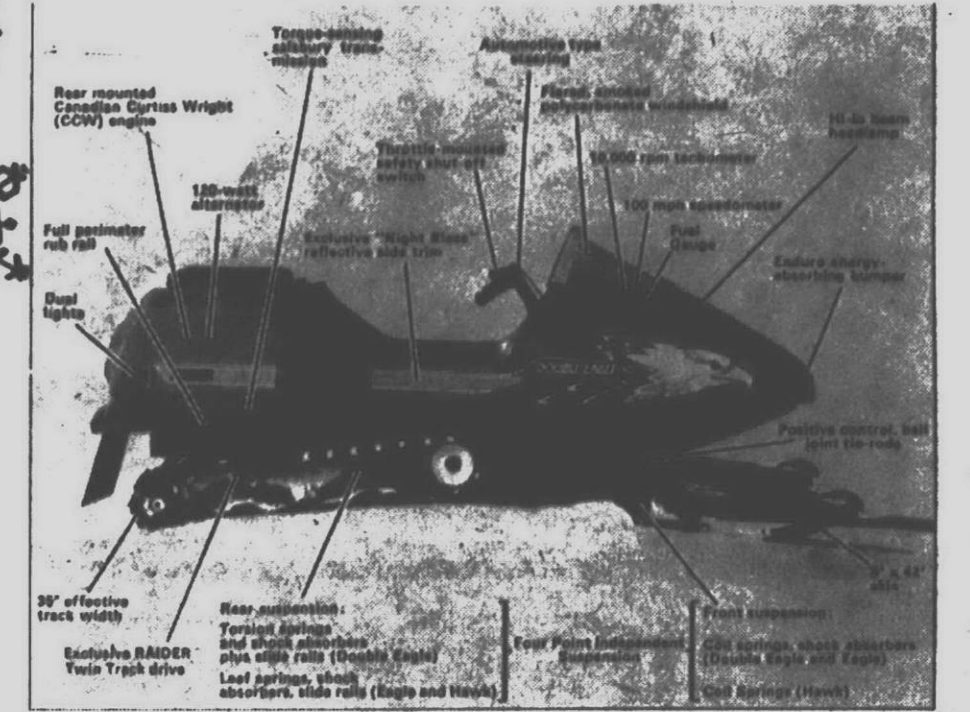
Profits will be used to finance charitable programs for the community.

While the ski areas mentioned have enough facilities for even the experienced skier, they are particularly recommended to the cautious newcomer, who may be leery of investing a lot of time.

What he wants is a quickie trip and just a little taste of it all to decide whether or not he's going to become really involved.

On M-59, 10 mi. west of Pontiac, 12 mi. east of US-23.

CIRCLE TNT SKI AREA - Including five slopes with five rope tows, beginners' hill, ski school, complete rental shop, lodge with snacks and fireplace, toboggan run and ice rink. Accessible from I-96, M-21, and US-25; six miles west of Lakeport.

IRISH HILLS --16 slopes, among them an 1,800-footer and one that is half a mile long. You'll also find a

chair lift, three T-bars, six tows, a lodge with a sundeck, fireplaces, food, cocktails, a ski shop, rental equipment, instructors, a 100-bed dormitory for groups and a toboggan area. US-12 at Towers, 10 miles west of Clinton

MT. BRIGHTON - Featuring 16 runs up to 1,500 ft. long with a 200 ft. vertical drop, Mt. Brighton also boasts three chair lifts, J-Bar, 12 rope tows, a lodge, dining room, cafeterias, 3 fireplaces, a cocktail lounge and 24 certified instructors. Exit I-96 at Grand River, 1/4 mile east to Challis Rd. Turn right, drive one mile to 4141 Bauer Rd. in Brighton.

MT. HOLLY - Fifteen miles north of Pontiac on Dixie Hwy., Mt. Holly offers 10 open slopes with extra long beginner and intermediate slopes. A ski shop, ski school and two rental equipment departments are available as well as a lodge, two restaurants and a cocktail lounge with entertainment.

PINE KNOB - With 14 slopes to 2,300 ft., new beginners' area, two chair lifts, nine rope tows, certified instructors, complete rentals, ski shop, lodge with cafeteria, cocktail lounge, restaurant, night club. Sashabaw exit from I-75, north to Clarkston Rd., then east.

Skiing

Top skiing is available to Observerland residents practically in their own backyards—even without natural snowfall.

"All we need are the right temperatures" said Sidney L. Baker, President of Southeast Michigan Travel & Tourist Association, the organization that promotes wintertime (and year around) activities in the eight county area surrounding Metropolitan Detroit.

"Local ski resort owners have had the foresight to install excellent snowmaking equipment that will

provide the outstanding skiing," Baker continued. All are lighted for nighttime skiing.

"As in past years skiers can discover what ski conditions are by calling the Southeast Michigan Snowline at 962-9010." Areas included in the reports for 1972-73 include Alpine Valley, Mt. Brighton and Mt. Holly.

"Everyday—sometimes even more frequently—participating areas report their conditions to us. Early reporting means skiers can make their plans for day, evening or weekend

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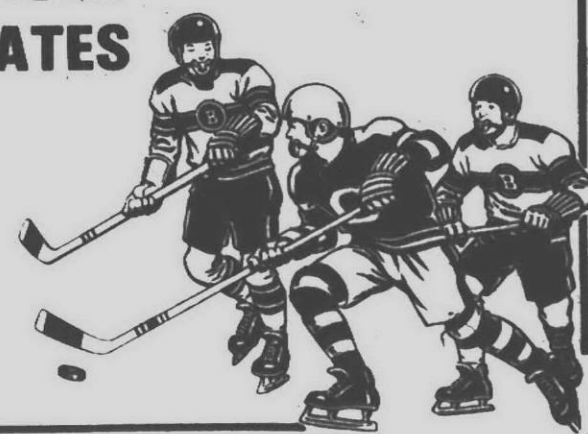

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"The YMCA has been a traditionally middle class, conservative organization ... from its inception," Cameron declared. "Up until five or 10 years ago, many Y's were still conducting the traditional gym-swim program for men and boys."

"We were dependent on United Fund support and annual fund-raising campaigns ... we were truly a 'non profit' organization."

But times have changed. According to Cameron, YMCA's are now working with inner-city youth, minority groups, street gangs, drug programs, the under and overprivileged.

"The indoor tennis club came to mind as we realized the United Fund support dollar was becoming more difficult to justify in the suburban areas as more money was needed in the inner city."

"In addition, the charitable donation given to needy organizations was being stretched thinner and thinner as tax laws change, the cost of living increases and more and more organizations seek that dollar."

"AN INCOME PRODUCING PROGRAM to offset the expenses involved in our community type programs seemed the only way," Cameron related.

At the time of planning, there was only one indoor tennis facility within eight miles of the Livonia Family Y. There are now three others under construction within a six mile radius.

How will the Livonia Y compete with the commercial tennis houses?

"We feel we have a uniqueness that sets us apart from the commercial operations," Cameron stated. "The YMCA has been in business for over 125 years. We have a highly trained full-time professional staff. Any profits we derive will go right back to the community in the form of subsidy programs. And we have the most complete facility of any tennis club in the state."

For \$150, families can join the Y's tennis

club, which will offer the facilities of private tennis houses. And, \$25 more, entitles them to the use of all the Livonia Family Y facilities—including two swimming pools, gymnasium, handball courts and health clubs for men and women.

"We plan to run 47 tennis classes a week—all levels and all ages," Director Cameron said. "This represents more tennis instruction than any club in the country."

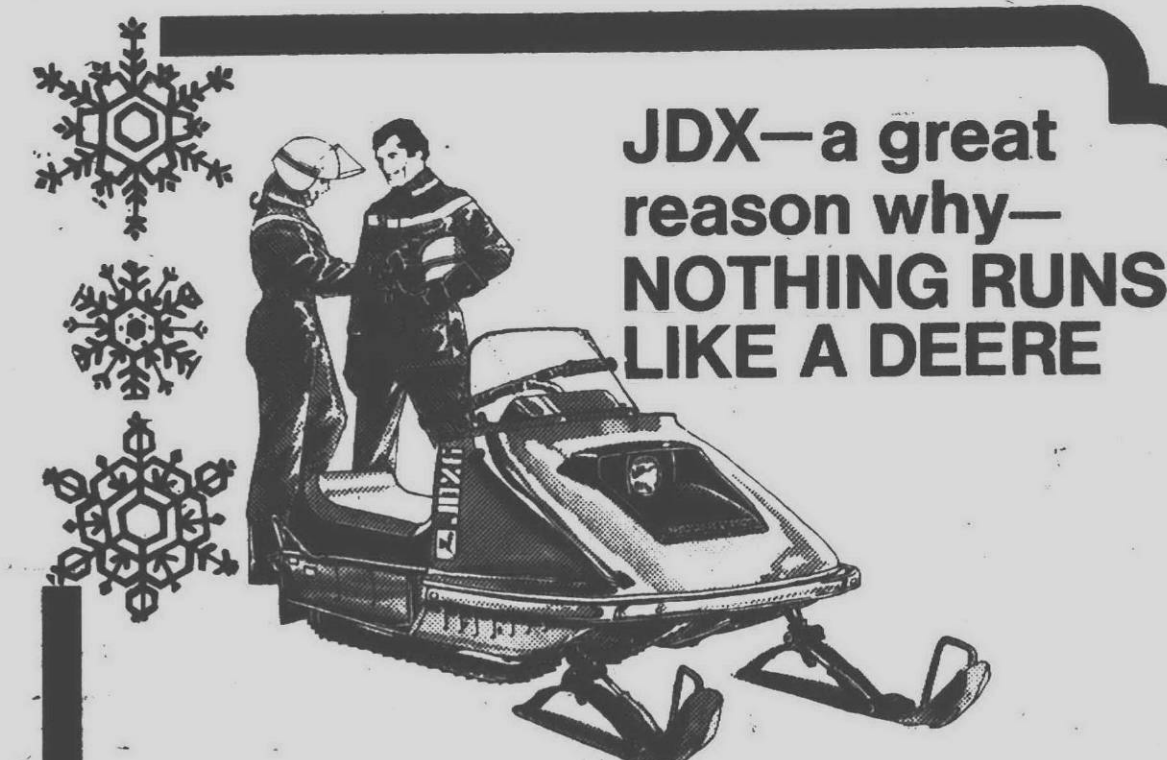
A "teaching court" in most tennis facilities is separated from the others by netting, and can be rented when no lesson is being given. Not so at the Y.

A court to be used only for teaching will be in an adjacent but separate building. The court may also be used for some of the Y's exercise classes when no tennis is scheduled.

The Y is veering away from tradition in another area. Instead of green, the six new courts will be blue in color. "I played on some blue courts in California," Cameron reported. "I thoroughly enjoyed the experience, and thought others would too."

Cameron will delegate many of his duties as executive director, so that he can give 60 per cent of his time to the direct management of the tennis program as well as serving as head pro. He will be assisted by Dean Snyder and Nancy Johnson.

He admits that "there are a lot of eyes around the country focused on the Livonia Family Y to see how its tennis facility works. With 1800 Y's looking for new sources of income, you'd better believe we're in the spotlight."

Looking for something different to do on an up-and-coming winter weekend?

How about a drive to Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, to board a train for a one-day winter wilderness scenic ride through some of Ontario's most rugged terrain.

The Algoma Central Railway takes weekend sightseers into the Agawa

Canyon on an eight-hour train ride. Begun in 1971, as a pilot project, the train carried 1200 patrons during its first season. Last year approximately 10,000 persons enjoyed the tour. This year, the Snow Train which had previously run only on Saturday and Sunday will also make the trip on Friday.

The train, restricted in length for safe winter operation, has 12 passenger cars carrying 60 persons each and makes the trip into the canyon complete with two dining cars.

Persons wishing to make the scenic train ride are advised to make advance telephone reservations with the Algoma Central Railway before leaving home. Phone: (705) 254-4331 between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. No deposit is required.

Starting point for the 240-mile round-trip journey is the Canadian Sault, just six hours drive from the Observerland area by car.

The trip as explained in a past issue of the Automobile Club of Michigan's Motor News states that the Algoma Snow Train "moves through virgin forests interlaced with lakes and streams disturbed only by a thin ribbon of steel."

AMONG THE MAJOR POINTS of interest are two waterfalls along the Agawa Canyon's 600-foot-high walls and the trestle over the Montreal River. The curved trestle carries the train 130 feet above the river bed and stretches 1,550 feet from bank to bank.

Fare for the snow train is \$10 for adults and \$5 for children and high-school students. Children under five years old ride free.

The train leaves the Canadian Sault depot each Friday, Saturday and Sunday at 8:30 a.m. (EST) and arrives back at 4:30 p.m.

Button ZIPPER UP

Whether you are a skier in the expert class or just ready to tackle your first mogul, your ski parka is an important part of your equipment.

And before you go shopping for skiwear, it's best to know what features to look for.

"A ski parka should be carefully designed for protection from the elements, comfort and convenience," stated Othmar Schneider, famed Olympic skier and member of the Sports Advisory Staff of a large retail chain.

Schneider stated several features to look for in a parka. They include zippered outer pockets plus an extra inside snap pocket, lift ticket tab and detachable hood with its own carrying pocket.

"The two-way zipper is important for all parkas over hip length," he said. "When on the chair lift, you can unzip the bottom of the jacket and still keep the top closed."

As for construction and fit, the parka should be roomy at the back and shoulders for the forward lean position. And sleeves should have ample room for bulky sweaters.

"To keep out wind and cold," he said, "make sure the sleeve cuffs

are either the knit cuff type, inner knit storm cuff or snap adjustable cuff. Any of the three types is suitable."

Schneider also added, make sure the parka is cut close to the hips. This preserves body heat and helps keep out the cold.

FAMILY TOBOGGANING at Stony Creek Metropark...

The four major parks of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority will offer the following facilities for winter recreation during 1973-74, with facilities open when Michigan's winter weather arrives.

METROPOLITAN BEACH on Lake St. Clair near Mt. Clemens is a good perch fishing site. Fishermen use the canals, boat basins, Black Creek and Lake St. Clair for ice fishing. Ice skating facilities include general skating and hockey rinks located directly in front of the food bar. The site includes a warming shelter, restrooms and wind-break. Weather permitting, the general ice skating hours are 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily; while hockey rink hours are 10 a.m. to dusk (with a one-hour limit) on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. Rinks are lighted and music is provided.

STONY CREEK METROPARK near Utica offers ice fishing, ice skating, sledding and hiking areas throughout the 3,500 acre recreation site. Panfish, bass and pike inhabit the Stony Creek Lake. Winter park hours are 8 a.m. to 10 p.m.

KENSINGTON METROPARK near Milford has facilities for tobogganing, skating, sledding, cross country skiing, ice fishing and picture taking. Catches of bluegills, crappies and pike are taken by many fishermen who enjoy fishing on Kent Lake.

Skating hours are 10 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. daily (weather permitting) and

the rinks are located in front of the Boat Rental Building, which is open 2 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. Saturday, Sunday, holidays, and during the Christmas vacation week (Monday, Dec. 24 --Tues., Jan. 3.) This building has a heated lounge with a fireplace, restrooms, food service and vending machines.

Ideal for sledding and tobogganing are the hilly slopes at the winter sports area which has an enclosed warming shelter with a fireplace and tables. There are five toboggan runs and a separate area for sledding. The area is open daily from 10 a.m. to 9:30 p.m., weather permitting. Park hours are daylight to 10 p.m. For ice and snow conditions, call 685-1561 (Milford).

LOWER HURON METROPARK near Belleville. This attractive site along the Huron River has its entrance on Hannan Road just 1/2 mile south of the Willow Run Expressway (I-94) via Haggerty Road Interchange between Detroit Metropolitan Airport and Belleville.

Three natural rink surfaces are provided at inter-connected ponds, located in a ravine where skating is permitted until 11 p.m. daily, weather permitting. Recorded music, light and wood for rinksides are provided. Nearby are heated restrooms. Moderate slopes provide some sledding and tobogganing. Park hours are daylight to 11 p.m. For ice conditions call 697-9181 (Belleville).

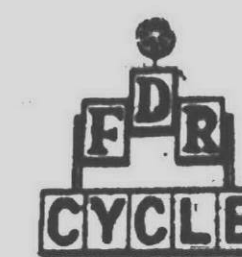

"Anything you can do I can do better!" That's a line from an old popular song but it's also a common challenge between two current day snowmobilers!

And why not? There seems to be no end to the kinds of challenges put to a snowmobile. And there seems to be no limit to the ways snowmobile enthusiasts use their versatile machines.

First it was simply 'over-the-snow' driving. Then longer excursions through woods and nature trails. Along came cross-country marathons and competition, camping and safaris for two and three days at a time.

THEN RACING at high speeds approaching 100 mph on tracks banked with snow to keep the speeds up. Jumping events were introduced. Now come snowmobile rallies, performance competitions and precision drill teams--on snowmobiles.

The latter follows the style of college marching bands and crack military drill teams. Groups of eight up to 80 snowmobiles perform intricate maneuvers in small open fields. In addition to the fun, snowmobilers learn the fundamentals of driving, timing, turning as well as competing.

Still the most popular use of snowmobiles is for traveling through remote country sections where Mom, Dad, and the kids can explore nature's winter wonders as a family unit. Today's machines provide a variety of dual seating on one machine as well as sled-tow arrangements so the kids can be towed behind one machine. But the range in cost of machines make some basic models ideal for younger family members to try their hand at driving.

A WORD OF CAUTION, however, Michigan laws are very definite on who can drive snowmobiles and where they are permitted. Check with the Secretary of State's office for the latest laws.

Snowmobilers should be aware of pending changes in the laws.

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Franklin Oozes By Churchill In Mud, 3-2

It had the ingredients of the annual rival mud-slinging gridiron affair and the results of a tight pitcher's battle in the heat of a pennant drive.

On a 100-yard field that was labeled sloppy, saturated, soaked, muddy, soppy and dank, Livonia Franklin scored five points to slosh past city rival Churchill, 3-2.

A 29-yard field goal late in the third quarter by Dan Quinn gave Franklin a 3-0 lead, and a Franklin safety giving Churchill two points late in the fourth quarter was all there was.

The lone unbeaten club in the Observerland remained so.

The Patriots of Franklin, who are out after their first undefeated season since 1964, thus rang up win No. 8. Another city rival, Bentley High is the only team between Coach George Lovich, his Patriot squad and a perfect 9-0 season.

A 3-5 Bentley crew invades Franklin territory this Saturday afternoon, kickoff slated for 2 p.m.

The battle of the unbeaten in the area was cut a week short when Waterford Mott ended Churchill's streak of 15 straight wins a week earlier.

Churchill Coach Ken Kaestner wasn't sure how his Chargers would react to their first loss in two years but one thing sure was that it had to be tabbed a battle of the defenses.

Franklin had given up only 43 points in winning the Northwest Suburban while Churchill had yielded 73, with 40 of those coming in the Mott whiplashing.

It started raining just before game time and Franklin Coach Lovich had to have visions of last season where the rain-soaked Patriot gridiron paved the way to a Churchill, 20-8 victory.

"Here we gave Churchill two points and they still couldn't beat us," added Lovich, who had his punter, Greg Battistone, kneel in the end zone and give Churchill a two-point safety and thus set up a free punt.

"The only way that decision could have been a gamble was if Churchill had someone who could kick a field goal. Otherwise, I knew our defense could stop them once we got away from the end zone."

The first half ended in a 0-0 deadlock.

With 5:26 remaining in the third quarter, Quinn booted his third field goal of the season in three attempts.

The 5-8, 165-pound junior split the uprights from 29 yards out to finish off a drive that started on the Franklin 35 and took 13 plays.

Churchill then started a drive from its own 32 and with 1:27 left in the third quarter, Franklin recovered a Charger fumble on its 30.

But the Patriots fumbled it right back on the following play and Churchill took over on its 30 to start the final 12 minutes.

Seven plays later Churchill moved to the 17 where the Patriot defense stopped Charger QB Mark Roncoli six inches short of a first down and Franklin took over on its 11.

Quinn picked up five yards and then was thrown for a loss back to the eight. Quinn then broke loose on a dash to the Churchill 40 but an illegal procedure call nullified that and Franklin found itself with third down and 18 on its three.

After a gain of one, Lovich elected to give Churchill a two-point safety instead of attempting to punt it out and risk a blocked punt and possible six points.

"I instructed the kids what to do. They wanted that shut-out and defensive captain Randy Epley didn't want to give them two," added Lovich.

Battistone took the snap

from center in the end zone, knelt down and it was a 3-2 game, 5:30 remaining.

The Franklin punter then free-punted from his 20 and cut loose with a 33 yard kick. Churchill started driving but sophomore Jim Casey ended all Charger hopes with an interception with 0:51 remaining.

Franklin collected six first downs to Churchill's five but the Patriots were outrushed, 51 yards to 25. Franklin's passing game netted 49 yards on four of seven attempts and Churchill's 74 yards on five of 12.

Churchill Coach Kaestner didn't agree with Lovich in the effect the rain played on the game.

"If a team like Franklin is quick on a dry day, they should be quick on a wet day," said Kaestner. "I am still proud of my kids the way they came back after that Mott game."

"It is now back to the drawing board for Stevenson this week," said Kaestner. "We have now lost the

league and our big rival clash. This one will be tough for us to get up for."

"As I look back, football has not been a lot of fun at Churchill this season," added the Churchill coach. "But I can't take anything away from Franklin. They played one heck of a physical game. Now they can enjoy the fruits of a streak."

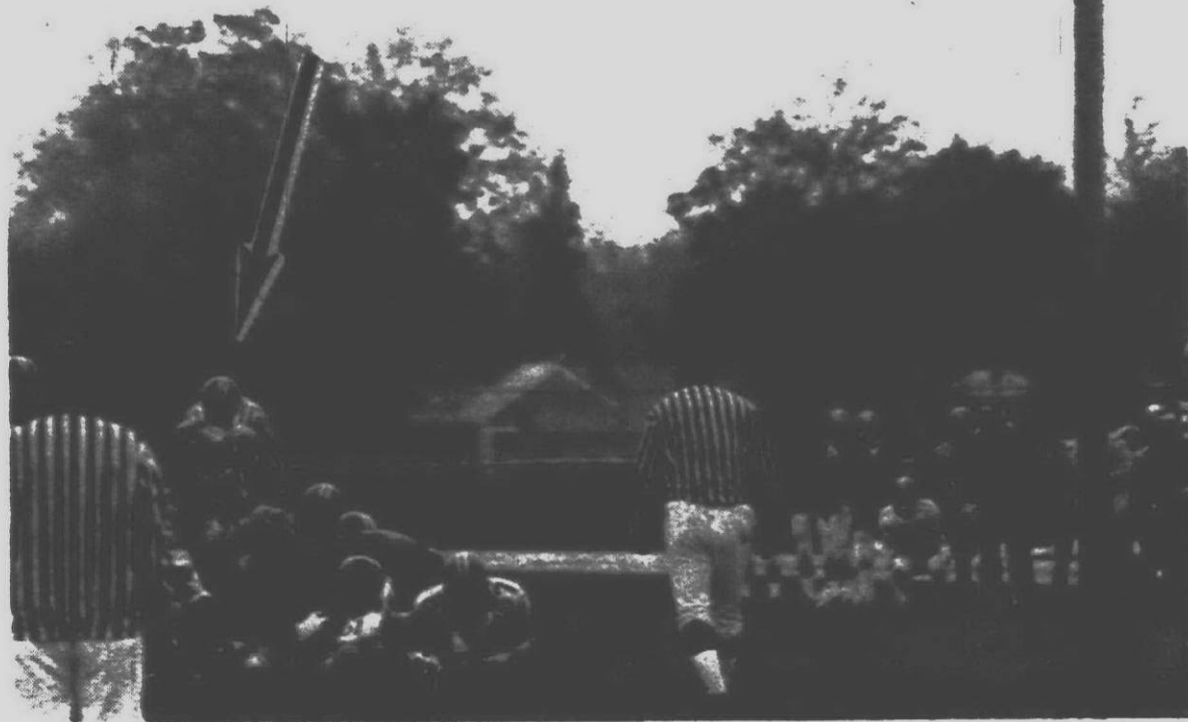
"This winning streak stuff is funny business," he added. "All of a sudden, the sisters of the poor will come up and hit you right smack in the face with a crutch. My wife is going to call George Lovich's wife and offer her condolences for what lies ahead in Franklin's streak."

"Everybody is out after you and you know that somebody will get you."

Lovich has taken on the responsibility of a streak with every smile he could possibly have. Now comes Bentley with Franklin holding a 5-3 edge over the Bulldogs. Five of those eight games have wound up in only a one point difference.

Trenton Stifles Salem's Sub 8 Title Hopes, 28-0

Plymouth's biggest football game in the last decade is over and Coach Tom Moshimer realizes better than anyone that he let the "big one" slip away.

It was the Suburban Eight championship clash with Moshimer's 6-1 Rocks pitted against the No. 3 team in the state, Trenton at 7-0.

Moshimer knew his defense would be the key and that his offense would have to total something like 60 plays to assure victory.

His defense came up with costly lapses, his offense ran only 39 plays and Trenton roared to the league title in an impressive fashion over Plymouth Salem, 28-0.

It was the Rocks' first blanking of the campaign and dropped them to an overall showing of 6-2 and 5-2 in the Sub Eight. They shared second place honors

with Edsel Ford, a team that edged Salem back on Sept. 21, 14-7, and Allen Park.

"We were just overpowered," commented Moshimer. "We just didn't do everything we thought we were capable of."

Even though the Rocks suffered a 28-0 lashing at the hands of a state power, Moshimer's squad still boasts the third best overall record in Observerland with what could be a Plymouth and Moshimer "milestone" coming up Friday night.

Salem hosts a 4-3 Farmington Harrison crew in the '73 finale. A Moshimer win would give Salem a 7-2 record, the top football performance it has come up with since the championship season of 1963.

Moshimer, in his seventh season, can top his best showing, which was 6-3 last year, with a victory over Harrison.

The Rocks have lost a

game and won one against Harrison the last two years. Harrison won in its championship season in '71, 28-14, but fell to the Rocks last year, 35-6.

The Trenton mishap has to go down as the big disappointment of '73.

"A few breakdowns in that first half really did us in," added Moshimer whose Rocks fell behind, 14-0, with Trenton adding another 14 in the final quarter.

"They (Trenton) took it to us and held us to just 39 plays while they ran off 60," explained the Salem coach. "We thought we could hurt them in the air but wound up hurting ourselves."

Salem had two passes intercepted but at the same time picked off all three of Trenton's passes. The difference came in the rushing game where Salem was held to 101 yards and Trenton pounded out 348, Bob Czarnecki collecting 126 yards

and Tim Whaley 111. Trenton finished with 15 first downs to Salem's six.

The closest Salem got to hitting paydirt was late in the second quarter. Trailing 14-0, Salem QB Rick Neu started moving his club only to have an interception halt the drive on the Trenton 18.

A one-yard burst by Whaley and five-yard spurt by Czarnecki gave Trenton a 14-0 advantage in the half.

"Our check-offs at the line hurt us with signals being mixed up," added Moshimer.

Trenton tucked away victory in the final 12 minutes on a 48-yard romp by Czarnecki and 34-yard sprint by Mike Baker. Baker's two-point run and a second quarter two-pointer by Czarnecki upped it to a 28-point margin.

Salem's passing game, which Moshimer knew had to be a key in upsetting Trenton, netted only 32 yards on two of nine passes completed and two intercepted.

McGuire-White Win Class A State Cross Country Acclaim

Despite Livonia Stevenson's and Bentley's poor overall showing in the State Class A cross country team final at Grand Blanc, Observerland did boast two All-Staters in Farmington High's Mike McGuire and Stevenson's Steve White.

Both are returning All-Staters.

Grosse Pointe North won the Class A title with 109 points and a squad that finished second in the state last year, Stevenson, placed eighth with 207 points. Bentley finished down the ladder at 297.

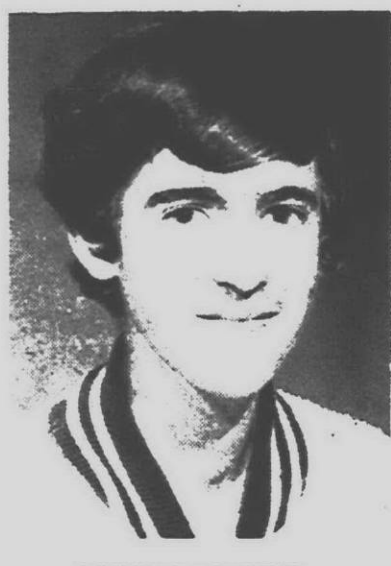
Individual honors went to Pat Davey of Brother Rice

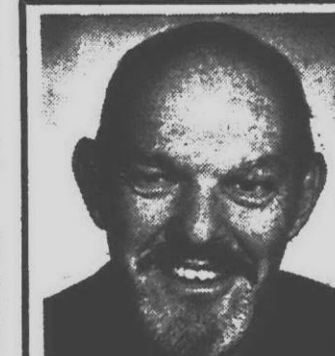

Although the crowd didn't come close to record proportions, President and General Manager Leon Slavin was more than satisfied with the gathering of 3,077 that showed up for the opening program of the 47 - night Jackson - at - Northville late fall and winter meeting Monday at Northville Downs.

"We believe this will be the best of our five meetings at Northville Downs," said Slavin after noting that wagering for the opener was \$346,441.

"That is an indication folks in Michigan aren't going to go to Canada as long as we have good racing here at the Downs. We believe we have perhaps the best group of horses in several years and expect attendance and wagering to hold up."

The much discussed and often cursed single shaft sulky was used in practically every race and six times it went into the winners' circle.

Bea Farber, the Brighton housewife who is one of the nation's top feminine drivers, used the single shaft to win with Clipper's Comet in the seventh.

Slavin, who introduced the single shaft to Michiganders during the recent Jackson Raceway meeting, said "horsemen who don't want to compete against the single shaft and won't use it can go elsewhere. As far as I am concerned, it has been accepted by our drivers and they are free to use it."

The Detroit Race Course rings down the curtain on a thoroughbred racing season that probably will be much better than the disastrous 1972 campaign when the final figures are available.

One thing is certain, the final six days will have a happier ring than those of a year ago when track management was feeling the pangs of the worse season in years.

Vice President and General Manager Dick Wilson, who is not one to allow his real feelings to show, arranged a big give-away program for the final week.

Actually it started last Monday and will end on Saturday, the closing day. There was free admission to the grandstand on Tuesday and Wednesday and there will be on Thursday. The reason...the state lottery act provides for no admission charge when contests are

held for prizes. It might be better said free gate when drawings are held for prizes.

The track gave away an automobile Tuesday and Wednesday and follows with a third on Thursday.

That's only a small part of the giveaways slated for the week. Prizes slated for Saturday, closing day, include a 1,000-pound steer, 200-pound hog, 12 turkeys, 100 record albums and a chance to meet some of the area's top disc jockeys.

Meanwhile, Jockey Larry Snyder continues his march towards the most victories ever recorded by a rider in the Detroit area.

Snyder shattered the track record more than a week ago and had a total of 157 firsts going into this week.

There's a distinct possibility he'll go well past 160 before the end of the 90 days.

Then the runners will switch to Hazel Park where racing will be resumed next Wednesday and continue through Dec. 22.

Michigan's second best harness racing meeting ended Saturday night when Hazel Park Raceway closed the doors on its 82-night campaign.

The east side track wound up with a nightly betting average of \$656,030, highest ever for a fall meeting in Michigan and second only to the Wolverine Raceway spring session which terminated with a nightly average of \$667,000.

All of which makes one wonder what the tracks would average if Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley decided to give the big two back-to-back dates next year.

Saturday's Hazel Park crowd of 10,209 poured \$931,367 through the mutuel machines, third highest single night of the fall.

The nightly average shattered the previous high for a Hazel Park meeting, the \$642,887 former mark was established in 1972.

When the final figures for 1973 were tabulated, they showed wagering up 16 per cent over 1972 and up eight per cent in attendance. Total turnstile count was 575,620 and the total mutuel handle soared to \$53,794,504.

Mike Novick Jr., won the Universal Driver Racing title with a winning percentage of .408. He had 197 starts with 54 firsts, 30 seconds and 29

thirds. Chris Boring was second with a .312 percentage.

Joe Adamsky won one race Saturday and tied with Novick in the race for the most winners in a single meet. The victory gave Adamsky a total of 54, same as Novick who was blanked on the final program.

Canadian Greg Wright was third in the final standings with 52 firsts and Boring took down fourth honors with 51.

All four shattered the previous high of 50 set by Joe Marsh Jr. several years back when Hazel Park had only 60 nights.

Now followers of the pacers and trotters will have to wait until next spring for the Hazel Park campaign to see if the east side plant can better the numerous record set by Wolverine Raceway.

For instance Hazel Park has never hit the million dollar mark for a single night where Wolverine had six such programs last spring. Chances are better than even Hazel Park will do likewise when it opens in 1974. It appears when one of the two major plants - Wolverine or Hazel Park - gets the spring and summer dates, records fall.

We reiterate, it will be interesting to see the 1974 dates when Commissioner Shirley gets around to announcing them next month.

Especially after John Carlo, executive director of Northville Downs, made application for 82 nights, all in midsummer. Hazel Park asked for late spring and early summer dates and Wolverine for midsummer and early fall.

There'll be things hitting the fan when Shirley publicly announces his allotments and perhaps a couple of lawsuits. Especially if back-to-back summer meetings are given to the two major tracks.

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Borgess Loses Scoring Marathon

Bishop Borgess head football Coach Fred Mushinski couldn't have been more pleased with his Spartans' offensive showing in their '73 finale with Centerline St. Clemens.

It was his defense's showing that ended Borgess' campaign on a sour note.

In a real donnybrook where 12 touchdowns and two field goals were scored, St. Clemens got the best of Borgess in overtime, 47-40.

It was a tough road for Borgess to go out on after almost upsetting Divine Child midway in the season, finishing second in the Catholic Double A and winding up with a 5-3 record.

The Borgess offensive show did produce two milestones in the running of Dan

Kelly and the passing of Greg Drypen. These two now hold every record possible in their respective talents at Borgess High.

The 5-10, 175-pound Kelly rushed for 108 yards against St. Clemens to push his season mark over the 1,000 yards. It is 1,003 yards to be exact, along with 14 touchdowns.

The 5-11, 175-pound quarterback Drypen hit on 13 of 20 passes to conclude his '73 aerial assault at 61 completions in 116 attempts for 1,193 yards, 10 touchdowns and only six intercepted.

Borgess scored the first time it got the ball on the fifth play of the game with Devan McCarthy hauling in a

23-yard pass from Drypen and Tom Birney converting, 7-0 Borgess.

St. Clemens came right back on a 30-yard TD run by Dennis Kieleszewski and a conversion by Terry Delamilleure to make it 7-7.

After an exchange of fumbles, Birney faked a field goal and tossed a five-yard touchdown pass to Mike Milosch. The point after was blocked and with 15 seconds remaining in the first quarter, it was Borgess 13, St. Clemens 7.

Greg Chrzanowski climaxed the next Clemens drive with a one-yard plunge making good a 60-yard march. The conversion again pushed them by Borgess, 14-13.

Borgess then took over on

its 37 and in seven plays scored with a 41-yard pass from Drypen to McCarthy setting up a two yard burst by Kelly. A Drypen to Kelly pass was good for a two-point play and Borgess was up, 21-14.

But St. Clemens bounced back with an 80-yard march in five plays with Chrzanowski scoring on a 40-yard spurt. The kick after was wide to make it 21-20, Borgess still on top.

Birney split the uprights from 35 yards out to increase the Borgess margin to 24-20 at the half.

St. Clemens again spurred ahead early in the third on a 39-yard run by Delamilleure, 27-24. Birney then missed on a 50-yard field

goal attempt and Clemens came back with Chrzanowski scoring on a one-yard plunge. Birney batted down a two-point pass attempt but Borgess found itself down, 33-24, the widest margin of the contest.

Kelly capped a 63-yard, 12-play drive for Borgess early in the fourth on a two-yard burst to slice it to 33-31. Borgess defensive end Tom Kerr then caused a fumble with Birney scooping it up and dashing 26 yards for another Borgess score. The conversion was blocked but the Spartans were back on top, 37-33.

A Chrzanowski to Dave Sussin nine-yard TD pass highlighted a 10-play 52-yard drive by St. Clemens to put

them back on top, 40-37, 2:20 remaining.

With 18 seconds showing on the clock, Birney did his thing, split the uprights from 33 yards away to tie it at 40-40. His was Birney's seventh good kick of 10 attempts for '73. He has also made good 21 of 25 conversions. The four missed were all blocked.

Borgess won the toss in overtime and elected to go on the defense first. St. Clemens scored on a third down and seven pass play from Chrzanowski to Delamilleure.

Schoolcraft Opens 2 New Classroom Additions

As a fitting climax to its 12th birthday celebration, Schoolcraft College officially opened two new wings to its sprawling facilities.

The first is an Applied Science wing of 25,000 square feet and the other a Liberal Arts wing that covers 5,200 square feet.

Combined, they make a valuable addition to a college that has shown phenomenal growth in the past few years.

The Applied Science wing, built at a cost of \$1,045,638, which was equally divided by state and local funds, fills a long felt need.

It provides 13 teaching stations, including classrooms, laboratories, work rooms, study areas and storage areas for accounting, automotive, biomedical technology, business, civil technology, occupational therapy, office machines, physics medical laboratory technology and typing.

The new wing also contains two general classrooms, offices for 24 faculty members and an administrative office with secretarial station and a small conference room.

Among special features in the civil technology section is a separate facility with humidity control for simulating curing conditions for concrete and asphalt. There also is a separate weaving

room that functions in conjunction with the occupational therapy assistant program.

The new Liberal Arts wing was built at a cost of \$225,000 in local funds. It provides six general purpose classrooms, offices to accommodate 10

faculty members, an administrative office, secretarial stations and an instructional storage area.

The architectural firm of Ballis, Hamill, Becker, Carne, Inc. of Livonia, designed both wings. The contractor for the Applied Sci-

ence wing was the Arthur O. Misch Co., of Detroit, while the H.F. Goode Building Co. of Taylor was the contractor for the Liberal Arts wing.

Members of the Schoolcraft Board of Trustees and friends made the official opening tour last Saturday morning.

Mental Unit Plans Voted

After two months of development, the Wayne County Board of Commissioners has approved a plan for major renovations in the psychiatric division of the County General Hospital.

The plan, approved Oct. 18, will correct all building deficiencies cited earlier by the State Department of Mental Health.

The plan calls for complete modernization of Building "D" at the Westland facility. It allows 120 days for selection of architectural and engineering consultants and approval of corresponding schematic drawings.

Following a "Facility Evaluation Report" in January, the State Mental Health Department ordered the county to submit plans for correcting plant deficiencies in the psychiatric division.

Under the board plan, Building "D" will become a completely modernized intensive care facility for 100 acute psychiatric patients.

The plan to renovate the building for acute cases is also consistent with a recommendation by a board - appointed hospital task force that the county concentrate on intensive treatment of acute cases.

Care of chronic mental patients is a state responsibility by law.

The plan was developed with assistance from the Washington, D.C. government consulting firm of Lin-

ton, Mields & Coston, Inc., and accepted upon recommendation of the board's human resources committee.

Mobile Home Fire Protection Target Of Faust Proposal

LANSING

Mobile homes will become a little safer if legislation introduced by Sen. William Faust (D-Westland) is enacted into law.

Faust's bill would require all mobile homes sold or purchased in Michigan to be equipped with a multipurpose fire extinguisher approved by a nationally recognized independent testing laboratory.

"The legislation we now have requires the management of a trailer park to supply a fire extinguisher in the caretaker's office and in all service and recreational buildings within the park," said Faust.

"The purpose of this law is to encourage mobile home residents to purchase their own fire extinguishers and not rely on those supplied by the park management."

Developer Concedes Homeowners' Suit

Consent judgments totaling \$50,000 have been filed for 21 homeowners in the Cambridge Green Subdivision against Kaufman and Broad, a real estate development firm.

The original suit, focused on the case of James M. and Antoinette Trudell, claimed that the homeowners were not informed the new I-275 highway would be placed so close to their property line and at grade level.

In some cases the expressway will be within 75 feet of the owners' property.

The suit was filed in August, 1972, and District Court Judge Dunbar Davis rendered his opinion on May 7.

"We alleged that Kaufman and Broad sales personnel fraudulently misrepresented the facts relating to the location of the expressway to the purchasers," said Edward Drangelis, of the law firm Drangelis, Ashton and Scully, which represented the homeowners.

"In the test case the court

agreed there was fraudulently and that damages were due," continued Drangelis.

Attorneys from the firm Bodman, Longley, Bogle, Armstrong and Dahling, who represented Kaufman and Broad, then filed an appeal in circuit court. Several motions were also made in an attempt to delay the case, according to Scott H. Dodge of the Drangelis firm.

A motion to take further statements of the homeowners before a court reporter was denied.

A second motion, filed in both district and circuit courts and denied each time, would have delayed the trials of the other 20 complainants. The trials were scheduled to begin Sept. 28.

"Then the negotiations as to a settlement got serious," said Dodge.

Trials for the other cases were adjourned, and a settle-

ment was filed last week. The appeals case before Wayne County Circuit Court Judge James Montane was dismissed.

The original suit asked for \$100,000 refund from Kaufman and Broad; however, the homeowners settled for half that amount with individual judgments ranging from more than \$1,200 to \$3,000.

Kaufman and Broad have one year to pay the judgment which is due Nov. 5, 1974, at six per cent interest for a total of about \$53,000.

"Kaufman and Broad, in consenting to the entry of the judgments, is like throwing in the sponge," declared Drangelis. "We regard it as almost a total victory."

"On the basis of the Trudell test case, we decided to agree to the consent judgments," said James Buschman who is with the firm of Bodman. He declined further comment.

Member Lawton questioned whether the Board should provide necessary funding for such a study but Member Penar stated that administration came to the Board with requests for added funds since the cost is not known. It was announced that the Workshop session of October 1, would further study the Extended School Year. Consensus was that emphasis of such a study should be made on planning and less of study and would give information needed to make a decision. The question was called.

The Superintendent's Report was presented to the Board through the Superintendent and the Curriculum Coordinating Committee. Member Benson asked Superintendent Hodel the purpose of the report. He replied that it would be distributed to the kindergarten teachers and adopted as the kindergarten philosophy of the District. Member Benson felt that any kindergarten teachers now employed or hired in the future by the District should certainly be aware of these items covered in the report - indeed - they would be expected to have a much greater knowledge of kindergarten curriculum and child development principles than those covered in the report. Member Benson felt that there was a real need for an in-depth study of current kindergarten

philosophy before any such generalizations as presented in this report are adopted as the kindergarten philosophy of this District. Both Member Mirto and Member Benson expressed the need for more facts and direction within the report. Dr. Hodel pointed out that no such complete report on kindergarten curriculum has been published in the District before this time. Mr. Lutz introduced Mrs. Jean Engel and Mrs. Ellen Gross, members of the Committee, and he commended the entire committee for their thorough report.

It was moved by Member Mirto and seconded by Member Turner to receive and authorize use of the Kindergarten Curriculum Report by kindergarten teachers.

It was pointed out that only 1.5 positions remain to be filled as allocated by the Board at this time. PEA representative Dilly Carter inquired about ratio of staff to students and how it is figured, (including librarians, counselors, etc.) and also number of teachers now included in the PEA bargaining unit (that being 325.5 including those above hired).

It was moved by Member Penar and seconded by Member Gray to accept resignations from Helen Hopkins, on leave of absence from Smith School and from Maxine Packer, English teacher at Plymouth-Canton High School. It was indicated that this would amount to no decrease in staff.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, Lawton, McClelland, Mirto, Penar and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

It was moved by Member Turner and seconded by Member Penar to approve salary scales as revised and presented by administration for submission to the Plymouth Community School District, with no change in fringe benefits.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, Lawton, McClelland, Mirto, Penar and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

It was moved by Member Lawton and seconded by Member Penar that the Board approve the recommendation of administration and authorize employment of Mr. Thomas S. Abbott as Supervisor of Purchasing for the Plymouth Community School District.

During the discussion of this above motion, Member Mirto expressed the feeling that Board members should have more time to study qualifications and recommendations than had been given in this case. Member Turner felt that the Board could accept recommendation of administration and should have confidence in his choice. Assistant Sup'l. Hodel explained the method whereby Mr. Abbott had been chosen and the length of time and thought which had gone into such choice. Member Penar was excused from the meeting during the discussion on this motion at 9:55 p.m. and did not vote on further motions. The question was called.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, Lawton, McClelland and Turner.

Nays: Member Mirto.

The motion was carried.

Mr. Gerald Conrad was asked to express his opinion regarding the Erik Pass pathway at this time. He stated he was not against such a path and could accept his children walking to school. He felt his grievance was the safety of the path, pointing out the following:

- Gravel is 99 per cent effective.
- Needs weeds cut in places where weeds are taller than the children.
- Limbs need cutting (has been done).
- Understood fencing was planned in a note from school when pathway was first considered.
- First on machinery only 3-4 feet off path.
- Drainage ditch now empty which is full of water at other times.

He generally felt that safety conditions need to be improved since it is not possible to see children on the entire path.

President McClelland felt that he could not support voting children to inhibitor School from Erik Pass area. Safety Committee representative Phyllis Sullivan pointed out that two rotating and two stationary Patrol Boys are in attendance on the path. President McClelland also felt the District was glad to have the opportunity to use such a path to help with a safety problem.

It was moved by Member Lawton and seconded by Member Gray that the Safety Committee recommendations regarding use of the pathway over private property be adopted and continued use of the path be made; and to ask Consultant Blank to work with property owners to alleviate any problems.

The motion was carried.

It was moved by Member Mirto and seconded by Member Turner that the recommendation of administration be adopted and that a stipend be paid to Mr. Charlotte Root for her continued services at the Rural Life Center, in the amount of \$4,000, paid in quarterly payments of \$1,000, and is retroactive to the first quarter of 1973 - July 1, 1973 to September 30, 1973.

It was moved by Member Lawton and seconded by Member Mirto to authorize three (3) community solicitations during the coming year for advertisements for the 1973-74 yearbook.

The motion was carried.

Member Lawton pointed out to the Yearbook Committee that they should work through the Chamber of Commerce or some such organization so as not to annoy any companies and all be given an opportunity to advertise.

It was moved by Member Gray and seconded by Member Lawton that Member Marda Benson be appointed Board representative to Metropolitan Association for Improved School Legislation meeting on the second Thursday of each month at 7:30 a.m., and that other Board members should be encouraged to attend.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, Lawton, McClelland, Mirto and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

The PEA was asked to invite a member of that organization to attend the PEA meetings as well.

President McClelland read a letter of resignation from Mrs. Shirley Mack, Co-Chairwoman of the District-Wide Safety Committee, and expressed the deep gratitude of the Board and the Community for the many hours of dedicated and sincere work which Mrs. Mack has contributed toward this job over the past two years. Member Gray commended the excellent work that has been done by Mrs. Mack, especially since it has been a burden not to drive and stay on as long as she has.

It was moved by Member Gray and seconded by Member Lawton that a letter be written by the Superintendent to Mrs. Shirley Mack expressing the appreciation of the Board and the District for her services.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, Lawton, McClelland, Mirto and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

Mr. J. Henshaw was asked to speak to his concerns regarding policies as established by the Board. He again reiterated his request that copies of new and revised policies be sent to the PEA, especially such policies as might affect PEA members such as the high school attendance policy. This specific revision PEA members should be in violation of the master agreement, since the representatives should be given an opportunity to make comments on revisions which are part of the master agreement. No notice of such change had been sent to the PEA.

Dr. Hodel stated that he would like to make a checklist of "who gets what" for Board packets which are distributed two or three days before each meeting. This would preclude the PEA not receiving notice of any such change.

It was moved by Member Benson and seconded by Member Mirto to defer action on the high school attendance policy until such time as the PEA can receive a copy and respond to it.

Member Gray felt that a delay could cause more problems at the Plymouth Community School District on attendance since principals need the direction of the Board to act. The Student Senate president rose to ask that copies of such policies also be sent to that group to be beneficial for public relations at least so that Student Senate could review and inform. Mr. Henshaw said his request is only made because passage of such policy at this time would be in violation of the master agreement. The question was called.

It was moved by Member Mirto and seconded by Member Lawton to approve policy on Board of Education Standing Committee which would only review recommending.

It was moved by Member Mirto and seconded by Member Benson that the President and voting delegates of the Board to the Michigan Association of School Board convention be directed to stand in opposition of the resolution at that convention to extend the probationary period for evaluation of teachers from two to three years for beginning teachers and from one to two years for transfer teachers.

The motion was defeated.

It was moved by Member Lawton and seconded by Member Mirto to approve as previously passed in December Policy No. 238.22, "Regarding to Parents: Complaints on This 1; and Policy No. 238.25, "Drug Abuse."

The motion was carried.

It was moved by Member Mirto and seconded by Member Benson that the meeting be adjourned at 10:30 p.m.

BOARD OF EDUCATION MINUTES

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of the Plymouth Community School District, Wayne and Washtenaw Counties, Michigan, was held on Monday evening, October 8, 1973, in the Little Theater of Plymouth-Canton High School, 8415 Canton Center Road, Plymouth.

The meeting was called to order by President McClelland at 8:30 p.m. following a meeting on information items which had convened at 7:15 p.m.

Present: Members Benson, Gray, McClelland, Mirto, Penar and Turner.

Absent: Member Lawton.

Administrators present: Deputy Sup'l. Hogan, Assistant Sup'l. Business Hodel, Admin. Assistant-Personnel Koe, Supervisor Symonds, Principal Smith and Coordinator Merria.

Others present: Representatives from the PEA and from the District-Wide Safety Committee: Marie McGee, Plymouth Mail & Observer; and citizens, parents, students and teachers.

Additions to the agenda were called and presented for approval. It was announced that Superintendent Hodel's mother had passed away suddenly in Adrian and he was not available for this meeting.

It was moved by Member Mirto and seconded by Member Turner to table the minutes of the regular meeting of September 25, 1973, until the next regular meeting.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, McClelland, Mirto, Penar and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

It was moved by Member Turner and seconded by Member Gray that the following correction be made in the minutes of September 10, 1973: Page 5, last paragraph, 1. Change "present" to "preempt."

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, McClelland, Mirto, Penar and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

It was moved by Member Penar and seconded by Member Turner to approve the request of Administrative Assistant-Personnel Koe to attend the American Association of School Personnel Administrators Meeting on October 16-18 in Minnesota.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, McClelland, Mirto, Penar and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

Member Turner questioned the appropriateness of the Board sanctioning out-of-town trips. He felt that this was a function of administration.

It was moved by Member Turner and seconded by Member Benson to approve the request of Principal Bill Brown for reimbursement to Mrs. Churchill for attendance at a college entrance examination board annual meeting (Advance Placement) in Chicago.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, McClelland, Penar and Turner.

Nays: Member Mirto.

The motion was carried.

Members, Mirto and Van Deven, representatives of O'Dell, Hewlett and Lockwood, Architects, explained the background of the problems with the Plymouth-Salem gymnasium tarmen floor. They indicated that it had certainly been a very difficult problem to cope with, an almost impossible situation as to reasons for problems. They made a recommendation that repairs continue on about 1/4th more of the floor than has already been repaired by the subcontractor, Baum-Potter Floor Company, and that the cost of replacement of the entire floor including a complete new concrete base would be prohibitive and difficult to accomplish. They also recommended that the guarantee on the tarmen floor be continued for a period of time, although it now expires on November 13, 1973.

Member Penar expressed appreciation to the architectural firm for their work in behalf of the Board of Education and felt they should be allowed to try to get together with the sub-contractor and contractor to indicate the floor is not acceptable as installed, and to negotiate a guarantee extension, stating the contractor has an obligation to the Board and to the Architect to repair the floor correctly. Member Gray questioned the possibility of installing a wooden floor over top of the present tarmen installation.

It was moved by Member Mirto and seconded by Member Benson that, notwithstanding the offer of the architects to negotiate for the Board, the School District's legal counsel get in touch with the J.A. Ferguson Company on the matter of the gymnasium tarmen floor at Plymouth-Salem High School and bring them into line on this matter to receive a statement from J.A. Ferguson regarding a memorandum of understanding between this District and the Company of a memorandum of understanding between this District and the Contractor that their liability is directly dependent upon the satisfactory completion of the repair, or the installation of a wooden floor over the tarmen floor, and that the contractor has a responsibility to comply with the contract regardless of liability time.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, McClelland, Mirto, Penar and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

It was the consensus that the contractor had not honored his contract in the matter of the tarmen floor and it was understood that the architectural firm would still deal with the subcontractor, Baum-Potter Floor Company, to repair correctly.

It was moved by Member Penar and seconded by Member Mirto that the Plymouth Community School District refund school tax to the following taxpayer as directed by Mr. Louis H. Funk, Wayne County Treasurer, said refund resulting from a reduction in the assessment by the Michigan State Tax Commission:

"No excused absences on the day prior to or following a vacation period." Two citizens expressed the opinion that they should be considered as unexcused absences. Member Benson felt the School Board and the teachers were responsible for the absences but rather the airline company that caused the delay in return flight. Member Penar asked that the granting of 6-personal business day of absence be considered. A roll call vote was called.

Mr. Joseph Henshaw, PEA, rose to speak to the clause in the Master Agreement which states that policy changes are negotiable items (Article 18, paragraph 2). He felt the PEA had not been given a chance or opportunity to negotiate and that teachers at least in part had been expected to operate under this new policy since the beginning of school. The Board inquired of administration what mechanism has been set up to get feedback from the PEA. Mr. Koe replied that the Board negotiators and the PEA negotiating team are planning to meet monthly (starting October 10, 1973) and the subject matter in this policy is a matter of negotiation.

Member Benson stated she had several points directly concerning the subject matter of the policy that she would wish to raise at the appropriate time. Member Penar felt that the Board was getting away from the Master Agreement in not making a smooth method of consultation for the policy and it should not have been presented until feedback had been received from the PEA.

It was moved by Member Penar and seconded by Member Turner to table the motion.

The motion was carried.

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How Kids Learn To Like Reading

PLYMOUTH There is complete silence in the room - no movement, no conversation, not even a whisper.

It is Room 9 at Gallimore Elementary School and there are 26 persons, Mrs. Carol Trembath and her fourth grade students.

They're in the midst of USSR which, to the uninitiated, is "Uninterrupted, Sustained, Silent Reading."

Before the 15-minute silent reading period starts, each student chooses something he really wants to read - a book from either home or the library, a magazine, a periodical, whatever pleases him.

Someone hangs a sign on the hall side of the door, "do not disturb, USSR in progress," and the program begins.

Mrs. Trembath initiated the idea two weeks ago as an offshoot of a class she is taking for graduate credit. The class, Foundations of Reading Instruction, is given at Amerman school in Northville, under the auspices of Oakland University.

"It is pleasure reading," Mrs. Trembath says, "and the students are ready and sitting there with their books even before we begin."

"We started with 10 minutes and worked up to 15, and we'll probably stay at 15 until after the first of the year. The idea is to gradually increase the reading time to maybe even 30 minutes."

Not only has the USSR program helped increase the attention span of the fourth graders, but Mrs. Trembath already sees evidence that many youngsters who are accustomed to turning on the radio or television for entertainment are finding a very special pleasure in reading.

When the timer buzzes, signaling the end of the session, there is invariably a chorus of disappointed comments - "It was just getting interesting," "I'm right at the best part," "Do we have to stop now?"

Police Offer Winter Tips

PLYMOUTH Getting ready for winter driving involves much more than a cold weather change of oil and a tune-up, according to Plymouth's police chief, Timothy Ford.

To illustrate his point, the chief listed winter emergency items that should be carried in the trunk of every car. These include:

- A first aid kit. One of the commercially available auto first aid kits will prove useful in treating minor cuts and bruises of any origin.
- Flares or reflectors. At least four long-burning, 20-minute flares should be carried. If you should break down or be involved in an accident, mark both front and rear of your car with flares, or at least, reflectors. (Flares should not be used when spilled gasoline or oil is present, Ford said.)
- Tire chains. Both the National Safety Council and the International Assn. of Chiefs of Police recommend carrying reinforced tire chains for use in severe weather. (Tire chains provide from four to seven times the traction of conventional tires in heavy snow and glare ice.)
- Battery cables. An essential item in case your battery should fail or you inadvertently leave your lights on. Cables should be of heavy gauge. They should be long enough to connect to your battery and reach at least four feet beyond the outside edge of your fender.
- Other items. Carry a flashlight or battery lantern (with fresh batteries), a pair of gloves and a small rug or piece of coarse matting in case you have to change a tire or do other work on your car - day or night. (The matting also can be used as a quick traction aid beneath the drive wheels. Be sure a tow chain, sand or rock salt and a shovel are also included, the chief advises.)

Canton To Pay Half Of School Guards' Cost

CANTON The Canton Township board has agreed to pay half the cost of school crossing guards employed in the township by the Plymouth School District.

Plymouth also pays for half the cost of school crossing guards who work in the city.

School Supt. John M. Hoben, in a letter to both Canton and Plymouth townships, asked them to join in funding the crossing guards.

Bulldog Defense Fails, 33-26

Edsel Ford Rally Tips Bentley

The Bentley Bulldogs won the first half, 26-7, lost the second half, 26-0, and wound up on the short end of a 33-26 score.

It was Edsel Ford that rallied from behind to upend the Bulldogs in the Suburban Eight finale. Bentley stands at 3-5 overall and finished 2-5 in the league.

"It was like two different ball games," said Bentley Coach Glen Goode. "The kids performed better in the first half than in any game I have ever coached at Bentley. But it all turned around the second half. The kids did just the opposite and we got blitzed."

"Three dropped passes all but did us in," added Goode, who now has an 8-0 Livonia Franklin squad on tap Saturday afternoon. "I still maintain that we are a winning football team and far from being a 3-5 club. The Franklin game should be a good contest between two good teams."

"Sure, Franklin might have more going for them but I really think we can move the ball against them. The fur is sure to fly."

Goode has never beaten Franklin. His Bulldog teams lost to Franklin in '69, '72-26, and '73-14 last year.

But the Bentley coach does have one thing working in his favor. It will be his second Saturday afternoon clash since taking over the Bulldog reign. His first Saturday afternoon contest at Bentley was his first game ever at Farmington in '69 where his Bulldogs won, 19-0.

"If we can take Franklin Saturday, I will be thinking seriously about changing all of our games next year to Saturday afternoons," added Goode.

"We have to be the underdogs. They are unbeaten and we are at 3-5, but we will be out to snap a three-game losing streak."

The Bulldogs outmaneuvered Edsel Ford in

the first down department, 17 to eight, but fell short in total yardage, 335 yards to 317. Bentley rushed for 160 yards and Bob Wasilewski hit on eight of 18 passes for 157 yards in the air, three being intercepted. Wasilewski also was the Bulldog's leading ground gainer with 96 yards in 18 carries.

Edsel Ford jumped on the Bulldogs in the opening moments. With 1:03 elapsed, Joe Wyderko baffled the Bentley defense with a 64-yard spurt. Carl Ziomek converted and it was 7-0.

Bentley bounced back on the following drive with Wasilewski hitting Bruce Boudnek on a 48-yard pass to the 23. Two plays later, Wasilewski broke loose for 30 yards and six points. A two-point pass attempt failed and it was 7-6 after one quarter.

A Bill Brown pass interception set up the Bulldogs' next score with Phil Lawlar taking it in from seven yards

out and Wasilewski hitting Kevin McGee for two points to make it 14-7.

Another Edsel Ford turnover paved the way to TD No. 3 in the Bulldog assault. Dan Reum pounced on a fumble on his 30. Seven plays and 70 yards later, Wasilewski hit McGee on an 18 yarder to up it to 20-7, with 4:50 remaining in the half.

Wasilewski's passing set up that score with the Bentley QB hitting Brown on a 38 yarder and Jerry Lacy on a 17 yarder.

Edsel Ford fumbled away the following kickoff on its 30, and five plays later, McGee went in from one yard out to push it to 26-7, only 10 seconds left in the half.

But the winds of fate changed direction the second half with the Bentley offense failing to come up with the big play while its defense blew a 19-point lead.

"The breakdown in our punt coverage set up Ford's

first two scores of the second half," commented Goode.

After an exchange of punts, an Edsel Ford punt return placed it on the Bentley 40 where Dan O'Dell took over and ran it in from two yards out. A conversion was good and it stood at 26-14.

The next Bentley punt saw Ford return it to the Bulldog 37. On the third play, Jeff Fanto hit Ralph Plummer on a 17 yarder for six points with a conversion making it 26-21.

The Bulldog offense again failed to click and Ford took over on the Bentley 47. On the first play, Fanto hit Plummer on a 47-yard toss. The conversion missed but Edsel Ford had fought back to take the lead, 27-26.

With 55 seconds remaining, O'Dell scored from nine yards away to ice the Ford victory.

Now comes Franklin and Goode's final opportunity to show that his Bulldogs are a winning club in '73.

Plymouth Canton Chiefs Scalp Woodhaven, 34-14

After dropping five straight, the Plymouth Canton Chiefs finally decided to put on some war paint and dance into the victory column.

Canton mentor Jim Muneio gave the right war cry and Canton romped by Woodhaven, 34-14.

It was Canton's second win in 1973 against six setbacks which included an 0-5 last place finish in the Western Six.

Canton, which is without a senior class, tallied twice in the first quarter, once in the second and two more times in the fourth.

"Sure, we have had some disappointments this season but if we can finish on the right track it will make it all worth while," said Muneio, whose Chiefs wrap up the season at Dearborn Friday afternoon. "Our 2-6 mark has

been a learning experience for all of us."

"Our defense has been the biggest letdown. The offense has really jelled," added Muneio whose club has been outscored, 220 to 140.

It was sophomore fullback Mike Ogden's day to shine against Woodhaven. The 6-0, 165-pound back went over the 100 yard mark the first time in his prep career with 129 yards in 14 carries along with scoring two six-pointers.

Canton's rushing game averaged 6.29 yards per carry with its total offensive attack averaging 7.51 yards per carry. The Chiefs collected nine first downs in grinding out 239 yards on the ground and collected 114 in the air with Tom Close hitting on five of nine.

Meanwhile, Woodhaven picked up 10 first downs and netted 79 yards on the ground and 76 in the air on seven of

13 passes. Two were intercepted by Canton's Scott Dunagan and Kevin Parmenter.

Other rushers in Canton's attack were Jim Tiller with 60 yards in four attempts, Dunagan with 41 yards in six rushes and freshman Mark Hutton with 10 yards on one carry.

Canton's first drive lighted the scoreboard with a 60-yard pass from Close to

Rick Thom moving it to the 15 where Tiller carried it in. Kimmy Hammonds ran in a two-point conversion to make it 8-0.

Ogden scored on a 27-yard romp the second time Canton had possession and split the uprights on the point after to up it to 15-0.

Woodhaven sliced it to 15-6 at the close of the first quarter when QB Close was hit attempting to pass and Doug

Smith scooped up the fumble and dashed 38 yards to paydirt.

Tom Broadbent and Mike Vendure came up to halt a two-point running attempt.

After Greg Barnes recovered a fumble for Canton, Close hit Thom on a 15-yard scoring toss and Ogden converted to up it to 22-6 at the half.

There was no scoring in the third period with Wood-

haven striking early in the fourth to cut it to 22-14 on a 17-yard scoring toss and a two-point run.

But Canton came back with a 69-yard drive, Ogden capping it with a 22-yard burst to push it to 28-14.

A 19-yard pass play from Close to Doug Lloyd climaxed an 80-yard march in the closing seconds for the Chiefs and a five-game losing streak had come to a halt.

Trojans Roar In Finale, 44-8

The 1973 Clarenceville High football story closed like it opened, with a victory.

It was the middle chapter that baffled Coach Ralph Weddle. His Trojans won the opener over Crestwood, 18-6, but then fell victim to three straight shutouts before tipping Milford, 8-6.

Losses to Clarkston and Andover preceded the season's finale which was Clarenceville's most impressive showing. The Trojans roared past Springport, 44-8.

Clarenceville was to have played Brighton but the team backed down from its commitment, and Weddle picked up Springport and along with it, a 36-point victory.

"It was a funny season," commented Weddle whose Trojans finished at 3-5 over-

all and 1-4 in the Wayne-Oakland League. "In the two games prior to Springport, if we make both extra points we win and wind up with a 5-3 season."

"Instead we lose the two games to Clarkston and Andover by a total of three points and finish 3-5 overall."

It was Tony Phillips' day against Springport as the 6-0, 160-pound junior picked up 197 yards in 23 carries along with scoring four touch-

Thousands of the football fans who sat in the stands

last Saturday watching Michigan crush Indiana to remain undefeated are still wonder-

ing why the Hoosiers were denied the second touchdown late in the second period.

Little did they know that the Hoosiers were the victims of one of the most unusual calls ever seen in the stadium at Ann Arbor.

Here is what happened.

Trailing in the scoring, the Hoosiers gained momentum for a few minutes and connected for a touchdown. Then, almost before anyone realized, they completed another in the end zone.

But wait! One of the officials, who possibly read the rule book just before coming to the game, called what he chose to say was "offensive pass interference in the end zone."

As a result, Indiana was denied the touchdown, lost possession of the ball and field position when Michigan took over on the Hoosier 20-yard line.

Oldtimers in the press just stared at each other. They never had seen that call before. Finally, the officials stated that they had invoked Rule 71 which gives the offended team a choice when offensive passing interference is called in the end zone.

Under this ruling the Wolverines could have asked that the penalty for pass interference in the end zone be inflicted or they could have taken the touchback which the rules provide.

It seemed like a costly mistake for the Hoosiers who not only were denied a touchdown, but lost the ball and field position on a completed pass into the end zone.

"Too bad for those Hoosiers," Wally Weber, wizard of words and an authority on Michigan football declared. "But it's in the book."
