





Hines Park Rapist Aim Of Manhunt

couples in Hines Park and struck again Monday night in Redford's Bell Creek Park, is the object of a search by three police agencies. Livonia and Redford police, along with the Wayne County Sheriff Dept., are hunting the man who they believed assaulted five women in Hines Park. Sgt. Vi Mote, of Redford police, said a 23-year-old woman and her companion were approached about 9 p.m. Monday by a man wearing a ski mask and carrying a handgun. He tied up the man, and forced the woman to a se-

cluded area where he allegedly attacked her. She was then led back to where her male companion was. The at-tacker tied her hands and warned the couple he would kill them if they tried to get free.

The description of the attacker and his method of operation matched that reported by Livonia police and the sheriff.

Livonia policewoman Ann Dempsey said she received a complaint last Friday from two juveniles who said they were approached in Hines Park near Levan by a man who carried a knife and gun, tied up the boy and assaulted the girl.

Mrs. Dempsey said the girl told her the man did not put on his ski mask until he had tied her up and was leaving the area. The youths gave police a description of his face, the only one available from any of the victims. The man is described as







AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CITY OF FARMINGTON CODE BY AD-DING A NEW CHAPTER, WHICH NEW CHAPTER SHALL BE DESIG-NATED AS CHAPTER 41, TITLE V OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON. THIS CHAPTER SHALL BE ENTITLED MAINTENANCE OF COMMERCIAL PROPERTY. THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

5.331. Purpose. It is the purpose of this chapter to protect the public health. safety and general welfare of the citizens of Farmington and to prevent, reduce or eliminate blight or potential blight in the City by the prevention or elimination of certain environmental causes of blight or blighting factors which exist or may in the future exist in, on or about com in the City of Farmington. By the adoption of this chapter, the City of Farmington finds that such regulations are necessary to the public welfare.

5.332. Definitions. Commercial Properties shall mean any property in the City of Farmington zoned C-1 Local Business, C-2 Community Commercial, C-3 General Commercial or CBD-Central Business District. Person means any natural person, partnership, firm, corporation or other legal

Parking Lot means all areas set aside or designated for the parking of motor vehicles or the loading and unloading of motor vehicles on the premises or in

conjunction with a commercial property, and includes all drive-ways, aisle ways or other areas supplementary thereto. Proprietor shall mean every owner, lessee, tenant, or other person having the

right to possession of all or a portion of a commercial property. Where there are more than one such person, all shall be jointly and severally obligated by he terms of this chapter. 5.333 Buildings. The exteriors of all buildings located on any commercial prop-

erties shall be maintained so as to present a neat and orderly appearance. Windows shall be glazed, painted surfaces kept properly painted and all other appropriate measures taken to properly maintain the buildings. Where build ings located on commercial property are owned by separate entities, the obligations of this paragraph shall fall only upon those persons responsible for the particular building involved.

5.334 Parking Lots. All parking lots shall be provided with pavement having a permanent durable and dustless surface and shall be graded and drained so as to dispose of all surface water accumulated within the area. All cracks, pot holes or other breaks in the parking lot surface shall be filled and repaired promptly by the proprietor. The proprietor shall provide for the resurfacing of all parking lots at reasonable intervals. The proprietor shall provide for snow emoval services, in order that the parking lot will be reasonably available for use by the public.

5.335 Trash Removal. Each commercial or business establishment will be allowed six 20-gallon containers or their equivalent per twice a week pickup. All refuse to be collected is to be in containers having the capacity of at least five (5) and up to twenty (20) gallons provided with handles, in rubbish bags designed specifically for that purpose, or items of a size approximately equal to that of a container. Waste receptacles are to be collected weekly.

5.336. Loose Trash, Rubbish or Debris. The proprietor shall be responsible for seeing to it that the premises, including the parking lot and specifically in-cluding that part of any highway, right-of-way adjoining the premises and not actually used for the travel of motor vehicles, are kept free of junk, trash, rubsish, debris or refuse of any kind. The proprietor shall see to it that the premises are cleaned of such debris or refuse at least each day and shall take all reasonable steps to provide containers for discards and to order his employees

and encourage the public to use them. Publish: November 16, 1973

5.337 Landscaping. The proprietor shall install and maintain landscaping on all areas of the commercial properties not occupied by buildings, sidewalks, parking lots, driveways and similar surfacing. The requirement of landscaping also is specifically applicable to those parts of highway rights-of-way adjoining the commercial properties and not actually used for travel purposes. Landscaping shall consist at the minimum, of the establishment of sod or other material to hold the earth and prevent dust and the establishment of noxious weeds. The proprietor shall maintain the landscaping and shall see that all lawns are mowed regularly, shrubs are appropriately trimmed and noxious weeds are

eliminated. 5.338. Enforcement. This chapter shall be enforced by the Building Department. In the event of violation, the proprietor shall be notified in writing to remove or eliminate the violation within ten days after service of the notice upon him. Such notice may be served personally or by certified mail, return receipt requested. Additional time may be granted by the Building Department where bona fide efforts to remove or eliminate the violations are in progress. Such notice shall not be required in repeated cases of the same violation by the same proprietor.

5.339. Penalties. Violation of this chapter, including failure to comply with the notice of the Building Department within the time allowed, shall be a misdemeanor which shall be punishable upon conviction thereof by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 or by imprisonment not exceeding ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court. This ordinance was introduced and adopted at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on November 5, 1973, is declared to be an emergency ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and therefore will take immediate effect. GAMMON: The Game At The Top

By JUDITH BERNE

At the top of the current list of games people are playing is backgammon.

The "other side of the checker board" is enjoying a popularity among the gamy set unmatched since Scrabble sent us all scurrying to the dictionary and Labyrinth increased the hand-eye coordination of the multitudes who indulged.

One need only scan Christmas brochures sent out by major department stores to realize that buying a backgammon set must certainly be at the top of somebody's Christmas list.

DOLLAR SETS with cardboard boards and plastic checkers for men are pictured alongside hundred dollar all-cork boards. In between are traveling sets, sets with magnetic men and sets in varied color combinations -whichever blends in with your game room, my dear.

But topping the list of backgammon for Christmas ideas is the set shown in a spectacular catalogue. An elegant backgammon set is pictured enclosed in a colorfully printed case, and playing the game are a man and woman wearing matching blazers in the same colorful print. Its price -- backgammon set complete with blazers -- a mere \$470.

"Backgammon is flourishing," Howard Perlman, manager of Cavendish North -- a Southfield-based backgammon and bridge club located at 29200 Southfield Road, understated. "It has caught on." And Howard and his wife Linda are only happy.

"We opened Cavendish North as a duplicate bridge club just over a year ago," Perlman, a professional bridge player, related. "And truthfully we ran into problems.'

It seemed that there were already a number of established duplicate clubs in the Southfield area and players were reluctant to try a new arrival.

"There was just the inkling of the possibilities of

backgammon; we had a couple of boards and a few people played.

"WE BEGAN TEACHING both bridge and backgammon; and our teaching programs caught on. We were asked to handle backgammon clinics for J.L. Hudson and they were very successful. Then some of the country clubs asked us to give some classes.

"It turns out we are the only backgammon school in the midwest.'

Now primarily a backgammon club, Cavendish North has converted many bridge players.

"Both games have a tremendous intellectual attraction," Perlman stated. "But to be a good bridge player takes time, patience and a lot of practice. Backgammon can be learned -- and played decently -- in four lessons.'

Perlman listed these assets for backgammon: It's a fast game -- that attracts a lot of people. One

game can be played in five to 10 minutes. It's a flexible game – it can be played by as few as two or as many as five players.

It's a competitive game -- you can play at home for

your household allowance or at a club for prize money. **DOES THE SNOBBERY** associated with duplicate bridge rub off on backgammon?

Perlman emphatically says "no" -- and gives examples of more experienced players sitting down with club newcomers to give them a sense of the game.

"Most regular backgammon players feel personally involved with the club. They want it to succeed. They know that more members can only make it more fun."

Now part of the newly formed World Backgammon Association, Cavendish North recently held its first club tournament and by the first of the year hopes to be awarding master points -- similar to bridge master points.

Backgammon is no new arrival, having just been conceived by a games man (or woman) at Parker **Brothers** or Mattel.

It is played throughout the world, sometimes under different names and variations. Game historians trace backgammon's oldest ancestor to 5,000 years ago in Mesopotamia (now Iraq).

A number of early versions were known in China, India, Greece, Rome and Egypt.

In Britain, it dates from Anglo-Saxon though its popularity grew during the Crusades. Called "tables," it spread from the upper classes through the medieval society in Europe.

HISTORIANS HAVE EVIDENCE that innkeepers used it to attract customers, providing them with boards, men and dice.

The Church, opposed to any and all gambling, attempted to outlaw the game. But by the end of the 15th century, many countries again permitted "tables" -though they were still forbidden to university students and apprentices learning their trades.

In the United States, backgammon has been played since the 17th century. Interest in the game peaked in the 1920s when "doubling" was invented -- giving an opponent the opportunity to play for doubled stakes or to refuse -- the game then ends at the original stakes. "Redoubling" followed shortly after.

WHETHER THE NEWEST backgammon revival will make the game a permanent part of the American games scene, or whether it will fade into oblivion remains a question.

According to Cavendish North manager Perlman, "it will never take the place of bridge, but it may make a nice companion to it.

He hopes to direct more people toward the game by holding ladies day luncheons and backgammon at the club on Mondays; by having couples' backgammon tournaments on Saturday nights; and by continuing the club's 1 p.m. to 1 a.m. hours for drop-in backgammon play.

The club offers a series of four group lessons as well as private lessons for interested persons.

More than 250 new '74 automobiles, both

domestic and imported, will be displayed in combined exhibit halls A, B, and C.

Sprinkled among them, the spice of bygone eras will be represented by vintage automobiles of the 20's, 30's, 40's and 50's.

Each of those decades will reign during separate days of the show: the 20's on the first Saturday and Sunday, the 30's on Monday and Tuesday, the 40's on Wednesday and Thanksgiving Thursday, and the 50's on the last Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Dance contests on such back - bogglers as the Charleston, Jitterbug, and Twist and maybe even a waltz will be open to all, with attractive prizes for the winners. Local disc jockeys of present and bygone days will emcee the contest.

Vintage Auto Auction

That first car you ever owned could be yours again, as one car from each of the four decades is auctioned off at the show.

Auctions are set for: 20's on Sunday evening, 30's on Monday evening, 40's on Wednesday evening, and 50's on Friday eve-ning. Also on Friday evening a 1957 London Taxi and a 1974 Cougar Coupe will be auctioned.

New Cars Given Away

Five new cars will be given away as attendance prizes, one each weekday, Monday through Friday. Show goers need only fill

out and deposit their ticket stubs to be eliwin. The new cars are: Mor Mustang; Tuesday, Vega; Wednesday, Dus-ter; Thursday, Gremlin; and Friday, Datsun 210.

"Community involvement and action are new thrusts for the Detroit Auto Show this year," said Boyce Tope, executive vice president of DADA, and perennial general manager of the show. "And one way we're developing this is by involving groups and organizations in vari-

ous contests." One example, the Miss Detroit Auto Show contest will involve entries from each car division of the Big Four auto makers and each car company involved in the show. Plans call for each to hold their own in-

ternal contest or search for their loveliest lady to represent them. The winner from each will be present at their respective ex-hibit areas and on stage the first Sunday afternoon, Nov. 18, when a panel of judges will select Miss Detroit Auto Show.

Another beauty contest, this one for the professional models working at the show, will also be held. Called Miss Deluxe Model, the winner will be announced the week of Nov. 12.


