

It's North vs Groves In Northwest Finale

North Farmington's basketball team has to be hoping Santa Claus arrives early around Farmington High territory tonight.

North Coach Ken Dean has only one item on his "list" ... the Northwest holiday tourney crown.

It will be a 6 - 0 North Farmington crew against highly rated Birmingham Groves which is sporting a 7 - 1 record, at Farmington High tonight (Friday) in the Northwest finale.

Tip - off is slated for 8:30 p.m.

Birmingham Seaholm and Walled Lake Central precede the finale in a 7 p.m. clash. Over at Walled Lake Western tonight it will be Farmington against Western at 7 p.m. and Suburban Eight foes Redford Union and Bentley doing battle at 8:30 p.m.

Dean's Raiders got by

Walled Lake Western in their opening round, 70 - 50, and knocked off Central, 60 - 53, to move into the finale while Groves blasted Livonia Bentley and crushed Seaholm.

First round action saw WL Central down Redford Union and Seaholm crushed Farmington, along with the North win over Western and Groves' victory over Bentley.

Second round competition had Groves and North Farmington sparkle into the finale while Bentley trounced Farmington, 84 - 26, and Redford Union nipped Western in overtime, 61 - 59.

North's opening 70 - 50 win over Western saw the Raiders hit 51 per cent from the floor, Jim Fredericks pop-

ping in 32 points. The Raiders led after one quarter, 18 - 14, and opened it up to 38 - 24 at the half with Western committing 14 turnovers in the second quarter with North's press on.

An oddity was that Western did not take one free throw as North was called for only eight fouls, four in each half.

The Central clash saw North jump to a 10 - 0 lead in the first four minutes and finish the opening quarter with a 20 - 11 lead, Fredericks and Dennis McCrary scoring eight each. It was 34 - 24 at the half and it stayed anywhere from seven to nine points the rest of the way.

North hit 23 of 53 for 43 per

cent and Central 23 of 66 for 35 per cent, Mike Imhoff high with 32 points for the Walled Lake club.

Now comes North's first "real" test of the campaign. North is 6 - 0 but not one of the six wins has been against a team with a winning record.

"Our record is a bit deceptive," stated Dean.

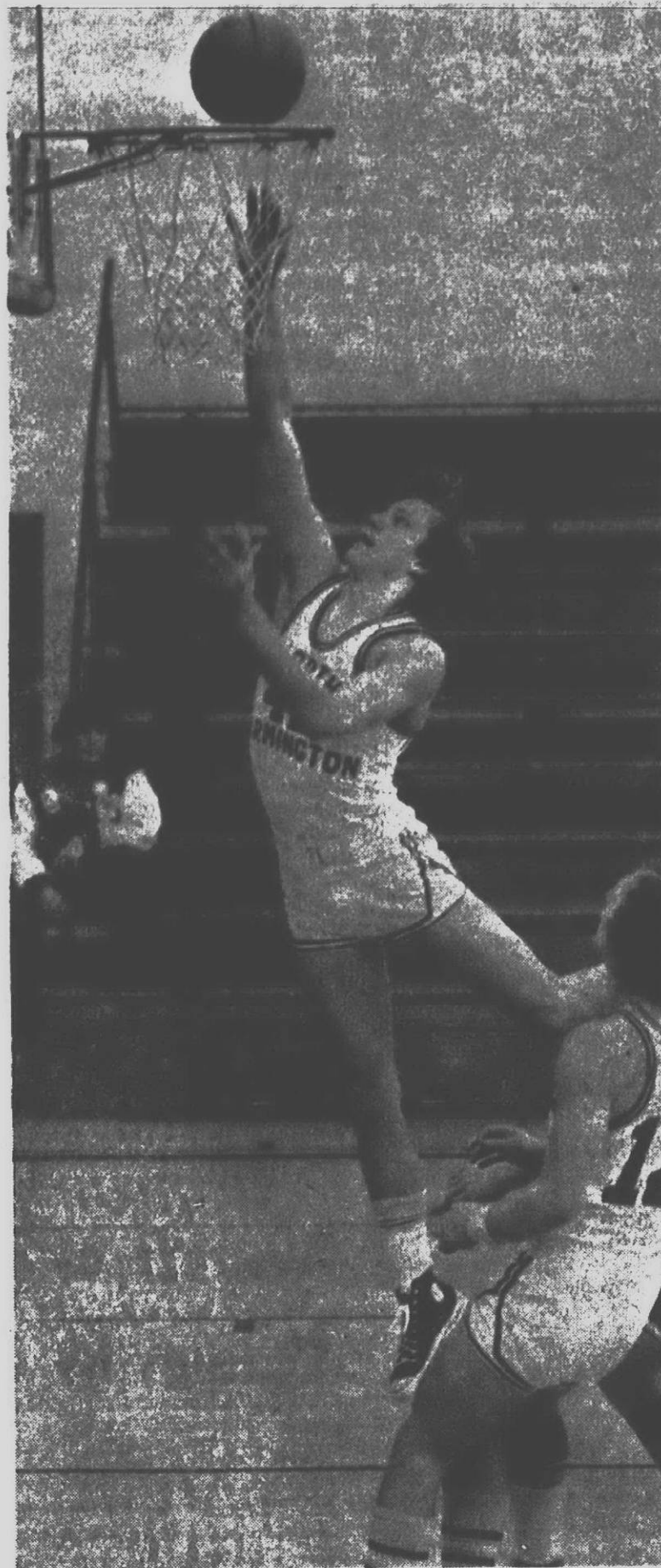
"We are going to have to press tonight and run and run and run," the North coach added. "This will have to be our top performance yet."

"Groves kicked us around in the summer program so maybe our kids will be out to show them something this time when it really counts."

Groves' front line is 6 - 4, 6 - 5, and 6 - 4 while North's checks in at 6 - 3, 6 - 3 and 6 - 0.

Stevenson Surprises Salem; Churchill Bombs Thurston

Victories by Livonia Churchill and Livonia Stevenson over Thurston and Plymouth Salem marked Tuesday's opening round of the Plymouth holiday basketball tournament as Churchill's Ken Landini set a school one-game scoring record with 30 points.

The 6-2 senior had been averaging 15.2 points per game for the unbeaten Chargers and his high mark of 30 paced Churchill to a 70-47 margin over Thurston. He broke a school scoring record

of 26 set by Mike Keeler in 1971.

Stevenson raced to a 21-6 first quarter lead over the ice cold host team from Plymouth. The Spartans were never headed as they handed the Rocks their second straight loss, 51-48.

The results left Churchill 5-0 for the season, Stevenson 3-3, Plymouth 4-2 and Thurston 1-5, with the winners meeting for the title.

Thurston made a real battle of it with Churchill throughout the first half,

leading at one point 21-20 and trailing at the intermission only 34-31.

The third quarter was a different story as Landini personally pumped in 11 points and defensively the Chargers limited the Eagles to eight points. After three periods Churchill led 51-39 and coasted in from there.

Also in double figures for the Chargers were Rich Van Wagoner and Don Braun, each with 10 points. En route to his record Landini netted

11 field goals and hit all eight of his free throws.

Plymouth coach Fred Thoman yanked his entire starting quintet after its poor first quarter showing. He found improved scoring punch in substitutes Jeff Ziel and Jim Ellinghouser, but the Rock comeback was too little, too late.

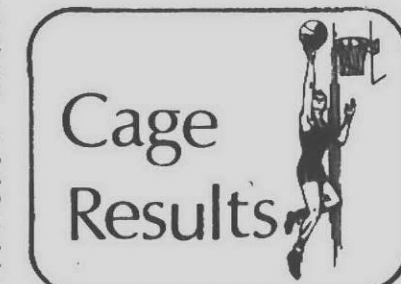

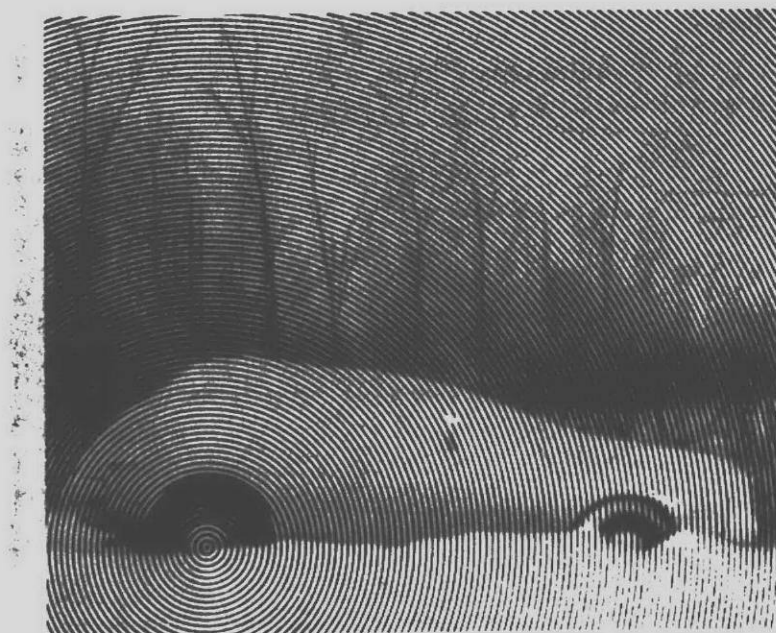
Schoolcraft is now 2-3 overall.

PEA Vetoes Extending Its Contract

Plymouth teachers have rejected an offer from the schools to extend their 1973-74 contract another year.

In voting Wednesday, the Plymouth Education Assn. (the teachers' union or PEA) vetoed the extension 210 to 146.

Following the vote, there was some controversy and heated exchange between PEA President Joe Henshaw and chief negotiator William Kloote over releasing an official statement on the contract vote.

Terms of the proposal rejected by the teachers included a one per cent raise retroactive for the current 1973-74 contract plus increment adjustments of between one and four per cent for next year.

The offer made by the schools was not an opening of formal negotiations for the 1974-75 contract and its rejection means the issue will now go into negotiations beginning April 1.

Increases proposed in the offer would mean that a beginning teacher with a BA this year would earn \$8,919 plus one per cent or \$9,008

and next year would earn \$9,098.

For a top-level teacher with a master's degree, the 1973-74 contract calls for \$17,697 but the proposal would add one per cent, meaning a total of \$17,874. The rejected offer would have raised that to \$18,678 for 1974-75.

Following the rejection, Kloote drew up a statement to be released to the press. Henshaw told The Plymouth Mail & Observer the statement was not official and demanded that it not be printed, although Kloote had not released it.

When the controversy arose, Kloote changed his mind and did not release the statement.

Henshaw met with other PEA leaders to draft the following a statement on the vote:

"The PEA rejected the non-negotiable Plymouth (school) Board salary proposal for the following reasons:

- Teachers felt they needed to negotiate language regarding many non-economic areas of the master contract.
- In light of the latest sta-

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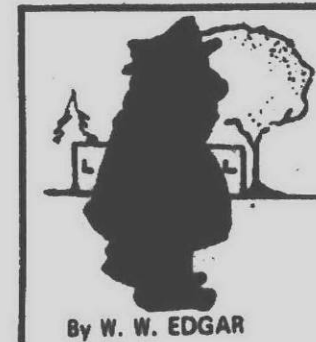

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East Nips Kennedy

Franklin Cagers Topple West

Non-league cage action this past week matched two on the area's top clubs with Livonia Franklin reeling off its fourth straight victory, a 76-67 triumph over Garden City West.

Other play saw Garden City East nip Taylor Kennedy at the buzzer, 39-37, and the winless Trojans of Clarenceville fall to Riverside, 73-44.

The Franklin win puts the Patriots at 4-2 for the start of the new year with West slipping to an overall 4-3 record.

Franklin jumped to a first quarter, 19-15, and was never headed, taking a 37-23 lead at the half, and 54-43 advantage into the final eight minutes.

The Patriots hit 29 of 52 from the floor for 55 per cent, Matt DeMars popped in 22 points followed by Kevin Kaseta with 17 and Jamie Knapp with 16. Ken Kinsvater hit for 21 points for West as the Tigers shot 43 per cent from the field, 23 of 54.

Kaseta's 20 rebounds paced Franklin to a 35-28 edge.

"This was by far our best ball game," commented Franklin coach Bob Visser. "Of our 29 buckets, we had assists on 27. I really think we are coming close to a complete game."

Garden City East, which plays tonight at Trenton, had a tougher time against Kennedy. East trailed after one

quarter, 12-6; 24-16 at the half and at one time in the third quarter by as much as 10 points.

Down, 30-22, heading into the final eight minutes, Billy Joe Young's Panthers came to life. With 34 seconds remaining, two free throws by Jim Riely gave East its first lead at 36-35.

Kennedy bounced back on a bucket to make it 37-36. Then with 20 seconds left, East sophomore Greg Emery hit on a short turn-around jumper and the Panthers had the lead. Bob Bills stole a Kennedy pass and Tim Gilligan was fouled, made one from the line and it was over.

East hit 33 per cent from

the floor but was out-rebounded 42-37.

Over at Clarenceville it was the same story with the Trojans taking in loss No. 5 at the hands of Riverside, 73-44. The Trojans hit only 19 of 59 from the field for 28 per cent as Riverside danced to a 22-8 first quarter margin and increased it every quarter.

Clarenceville hosts a holiday tourney next week with Lutheran West, Crestwood and Detroit Cody.

The Trojans play Lutheran West on Dec. 27 at 6 p.m. with Crestwood and Cody going at it at 8 p.m. Final tourney play is on Friday, Dec. 28, losers playing at 6 p.m. and winners at 8 p.m.

and the driveway and cut a patch through the garden for the dog to take its morning and evening walk? And he couldn't help wondering if he would have to do battle again with the snow - blower that has been the "monster" in the household for the past year or two.

It may seem strange, but there was a time when the task of shoveling the snow was enjoyable and all the neighbors used to call to each other. It was like a winter frolic to be out there in the evenings calling back and forth. Finally, the years started taking their toll. To meet the crisis, The Stroller purchased a snowblower. He was looking forward to the fun of blowing the snow all over the place, much to the envy of the neighbors. But it wasn't that easy.

It seems this snowblower, while working fine for others, balks at the job when The Stroller tries to take command. For some strange reason, it becomes most difficult to start. Once, twice, yes, 20 times, The Stroller pulls on the starting rope before the cussed thing gets going. Often it takes more than the pull of the rope. It requires a few words with the Man Up There.

Finally, when the job is finished, The Stroller heaves a sigh and hopes that it will be a long time before the

snow becomes deep enough to require the help of the blower. And if it doesn't snow again all winter, it will be all right.

It wasn't that way in The Stroller's youth. In those days, winter was a time for fun — bobsledding, hayrides and old-fashioned hoe downs at the country hotels.

Back home in our little town, we used one of the main streets for bobsledding. It was the steepest hill in the area. And because automobiles were few and far between, it wasn't too dangerous to come flying down the hill across the main intersection.

Each winter — at the time of the first snow — it was much like our auto shows of today. It was a time for showing the new models in bobsleds and each fellow tried to outdo the other in design and speed.

The old fashioned bobsled was steered by the manipulating ropes knotted into the frames of the runners. And they were built rather high to avoid any foot dragging at high speed.

So, you can imagine the looks on the bobsledders' faces the year The Stroller and two of his pals appeared at the top of Pine Street Hill with a bobsled that seated 10 riders. More than that, it was a low slung affair, and it had a steering wheel, just as our autos do today.

tistics for Detroit Metropolitan area's consumer price index (which indicates the cost of living has increased by more than eight per cent), the PEA considers the board offer inadequate.

Teachers, by the rejection of this proposal, express their desire that professional negotiations take place as provided by law.

Persuant to the agreement with Norm Kee, board negotiator (and personnel director for the schools), the PEA negotiating team will continue preparations for formal negotiations to begin April 1 as provided in the master agreement.

The PEA pledges itself to continue to bargain in good faith and to make all reasonable efforts to negotiate the next agreement.

The PEA president added that another issue involved was whether the local teachers' union would participate in the "coordinated bargaining" planned for all its districts by the Michigan Education Assn. — the PEA's state affiliate.

The MEA has set "minimum guidelines" as objectives for local negotiations, Henshaw acknowledged, but said, "I'm not at liberty to reveal what they are."

Henshaw also said that while the PEA executive

There were screams and hollering as people came rushing to the scene. Amid the screams and shouts there was a most painful moan. As we riders regained our equilibrium, there was one still lying in the snow.

Would you believe it? It was Montaina. She was grasping at her leg (the one The Stroller was holding at the start of the ride). When we finally got her to the doc-

tor it was discovered that her leg was broken.

The Stroller often has wondered what happened to her. But her misfortune that evening on the Pine Street Hill is only one of the lasting memories of the days when the winter snows provided all sorts of fun and experiences.

Yes, the passing years do funny things to a fellow. Now when the snow falls all The Stroller can think of is whether the d-d snowblower will start.

Oh, for the old days on Pine Street Hill.

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Joys of Christmas Past

The Christmas season is a sentimental one, but as each year rushes by it becomes more difficult to capture the charm of earlier holiday celebrations.

Time was when an orange in the toe of a child's Christmas stocking was a grand surprise, and most of the gifts under the tree were made by hand.

Americans had the time to enjoy the simple pleasures of holiday fellowship -- friends gathered around the parlor organ to sing Yuletide carols, families leisurely decorating the house with freshly-cut greens, or children pausing at the kitchen door to savor the aroma of steaming mince-meat tarts fresh from the oven.

There is one place where the old-fashioned joys of Christmas live on. Its traditions are faithfully re-created each year at Greenfield Village and Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn. This year, from Dec. 8 through Dec. 31, the Yuletides of yesteryear come to life once more.

In the village, December snow doesn't turn into just a slushy traffic snarl. It's a carpet for horse-drawn sleighs gliding along the streets, past historic homes decorated as they might have been when their original famous owners observed the holidays.

A Christmas tree festooned with American flags and candles in tin holders stands in the parlor of the 1860 Henry Ford birthplace.

Old-fashioned Christmas cards cover the mantel of Orville and Wilbur Wright's family homestead. The Wright tree is decorated with glass balls, popcorn and cranberry strings and colorful electric lights, first introduced in 1907.

The traditional Yule log, ready for the hearth, rests at the wellhead of the Cotswold Cottage, more than 300 years old. Inside, the rooms are decked with boxwood garlands and holly and ivy.

A festive pyramid of luxury imported fruits graces the dining room table of the 18th century Secretary Pearson House.

From the pillars and porches of historic Clinton Inn,

cedar roping proclaims the holiday season, while inside visitors warm themselves at the fire, relishing food and drink just as their travel weary forefathers did a century ago.

Across the village green, complimentary hot spiced cider and Christmas cookies await chilly guests in the Town Hall. Outside, carolers wander down the village streets, and the smell of freshly baked bread lingers near the pioneer cabin where it is baked in the hearth.

Along the street of shops in the museum, craftsmen blow glass Christmas ornaments, make holiday wreaths and fashion tin cookie cutters, hooked rugs, quilts and pottery and other items like those found in early American homes.

Nearby is a special exhibit of antique toys, where children peer into 19th century doll houses and wonder at toys their great-grandparents might have found under the Christmas tree -- carved wooden boats, Civil War drums and cannons, glassies, doll carriages and hobby horses.

In the Museum Theater, the classic tale of "Jack and the Beanstalk" delights children and parents alike, honoring the past tradition of holiday entertainment for the entire family.

The old-fashioned spirit of Christmas is alive and well at Greenfield Village and Henry Ford Museum.

Michigan's thoroughbred racing season finally grinds to an end Saturday when Hazel Park rings down the curtains on its early winter meeting. That will be all for the runners until mid-March when action will resume over the big mile track at the Detroit Race Course.

Meanwhile the pacers and trotters will continue through the end of the year and then start 1974 activities the following night in the Jackson-Northville meeting.

legs and generally rated the No. 1 contender for the championship.

The stake is listed as the eighth race on the card and could be one of the best of the meeting.

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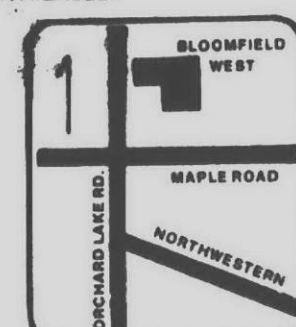
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Churchill Swimmers Win; Franklin Tops GC West

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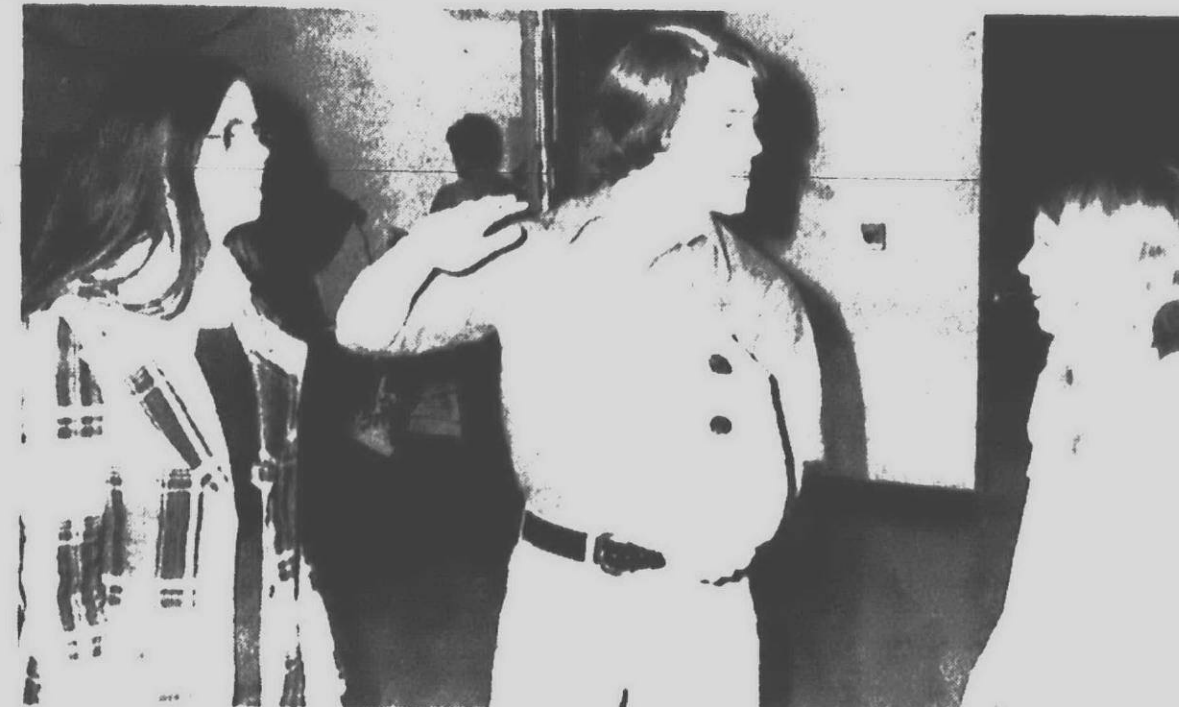

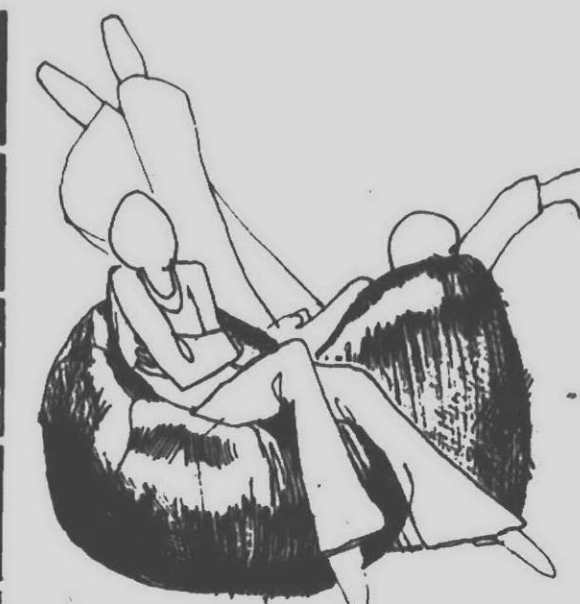

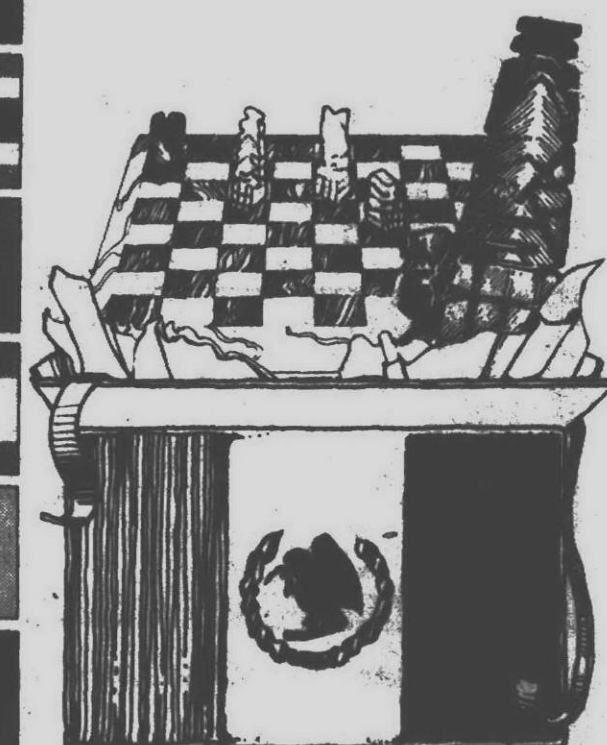

Rev. Lester Kinsolving's Religion Update

Just five years ago, Pope Paul VI issued his explosively controversial anti-contraceptive encyclical "Humanae Vitae."

Primarily on the basis of the immediate denunciation of this encyclical by some 800 U.S. Catholic theologians (not to mention what has been shown as a massive disregard for it by most U.S. laity), this column made a prediction. I suggested that within one decade the status of the papacy might well diminish to the same kind of powerless respect held by Elizabeth II in Australia.

The key to the real power of the papacy is the right to appoint all bishops. And in view of reported clergy rebellions in the Dioceses of Fribourg (Switzerland) and Bocatucu (Brazil), it seemed as if Catholic laity world-wide might be in the process of insisting upon the right to local election of their bishops.

Papal investiture in both cases seems to have weath-

ered the storm, and the holy father appears to have retained this key to international ecclesiastical power.

But another problem has arisen. The bishops themselves have begun, politely but quite definitely, to defy the pope on birth control.

The Catholic bishops of Mexico, for example, recently issued a public statement which should provide considerable moral relief to devout Catholics -- even as it raised eyebrows and fevers in the Vatican:

"This decision of husband and wife -- to have another child or not -- implies the right and responsibility to decide upon the means. The decision they take regarding the means, following with sincerity the dictates of their conscience, must leave them with peace of mind, since they have no reason to feel that they are, drifting apart from divine friendship."

The Catholic bishops of Indonesia have further stated:

"Catholic medical institutions do not perform evil if they responsibly advise and aid the requests of parents who desire to avoid a new pregnancy by employing other methods than total or periodical sexual abstinence."

The daring of these groups of bishops may well have been inspired by one of their fellow prelates who dared to speak out on this subject a year before the pope's encyclical.

The Most Rev. Thomas Roberts, retired archbishop of Bombay, has charged that the arguments for "Humanae Vitae" were "quite unconvincing," and a form of what he called "papal fundamentalism." He continued to say: "The pope would lose credibility if he permitted what other popes did not."

A year before the encyclical, Archbishop Roberts told a Cambridge University Catholic audience that individual conscience should dictate a Catholic's conduct regarding

contraception, as well as celibacy and abortion.

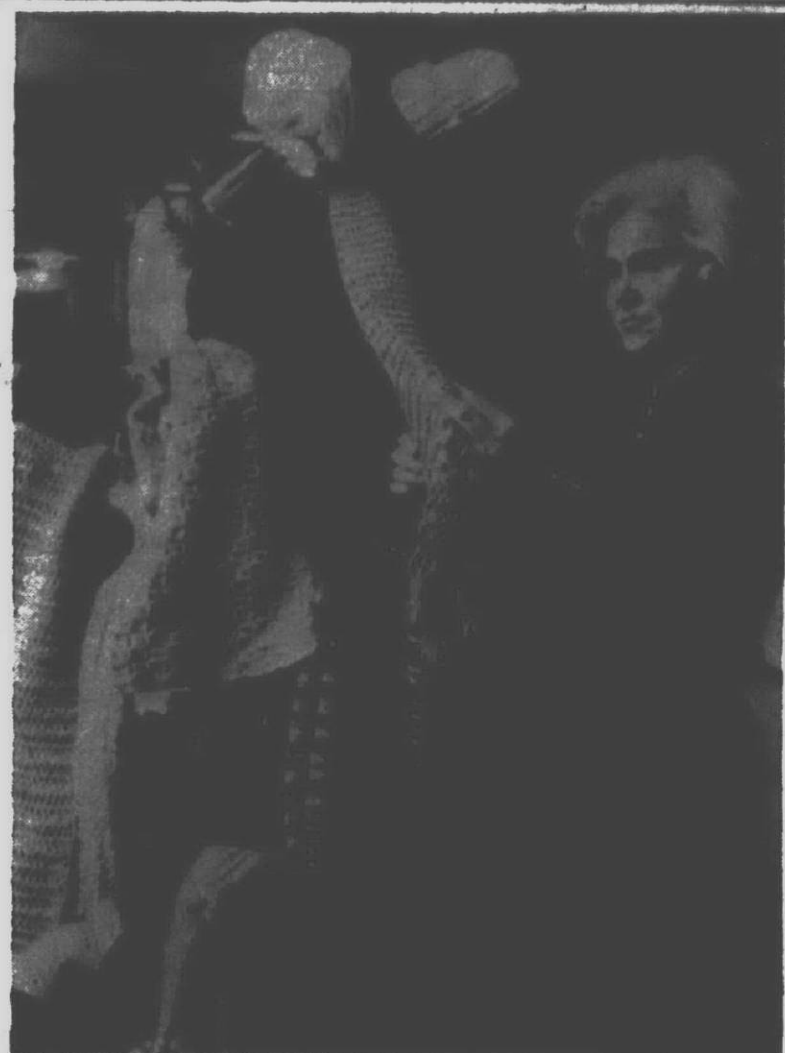
The university's acting Catholic chaplain, a rash fellow Jesuit named Joseph Christie, actually disrupted the archbishop's lecture, because, in his words:

"The archbishop was preaching heresy under my roof, and I wasn't going to stand for it!"

This reaction and the archbishop's trenchant response was heard around the world by Catholics who noted that Roberts was head of his peer in both ecclesiastical rank and his ability to reason.

Hence for most Catholics, it seems that the pontiff's denunciation of contraception on the grounds that it is artificial is regarded with all the enthusiasm of an encyclical condemning artificial respiration.

This opposition includes the inventor of "the pill," Dr. John Rock, a Catholic, who recently predicted that the next Pope will approve of both birth control and abortion.

He's Coach, Tutor, Ref And Psychologist

Former Olympic basketball coach Julius (Goldy) Goldman of Southfield didn't decline to be interviewed. But his first words were, "Why me? There are a lot more important people."

A longtime athlete and coach, Goldman is now one of the most popular math tutors in the individualized programmed learning labora-

tory at Oakland Community College's Auburn Hills campus.

"I can't wait to get here," is the way Goldman feels about his three-year-old job. "I've even given up days off during Christmas vacation to come back and tutor. I just love it."

Goldman is a grandpa, and he coached the Canadian Olympic basketball team in the 1936 games at Berlin.

That should put him in the 60-year-old range, but he's still in terrific shape.

Goldman played with the Canadian team when it won the championship. But he couldn't be in the Olympics because he isn't a Canadian citizen.

"They wanted to take me to the British embassy to become a citizen of Canada. But I said when the games were over, I wanted to be

turned back into an American citizen. It was no dice, so I went along as a coach."

A four-letter college athlete, Goldman established state basketball records. He still keeps in shape golfing, playing handball and jogging around his Southfield apartment. He's a regular referee at local high school football and basketball games.

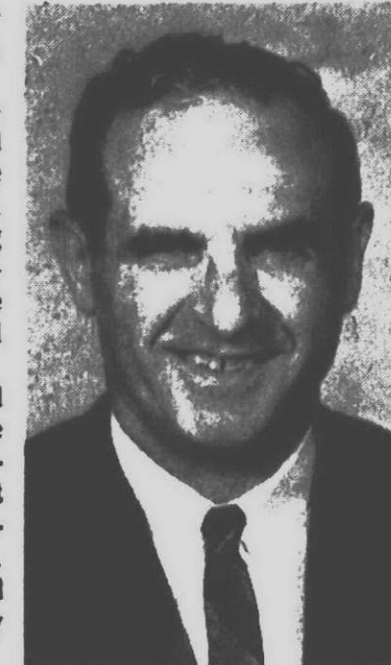
Before joining the Oakland Community College staff, he taught math at Detroit Institute of Technology night school and doubled as basketball and football coach. He also has taught applied management and technology at Wayne State University.

A registered professional engineer, Goldman has a BA from the Detroit Institute of Technology and an MA in business engineering. He has done post-graduate work in accounting and finance.

He was formerly employed as corporate secretary for Federal Engineering Co. and designed artillery ammunition during World War II.

It isn't easy to get Goldman to talk about his social contributions. When he was coaching, he took his teams to the blood bank to donate plasma. He figures that during and after World War II, he has donated 135 pints of blood.

He has produced 40, hour and a half tapes for recording for the blind. "Well, you do your bit," he shrugs. "They needed someone to read text books for blind kids. They wanted someone who was familiar with the subject matter, so I volunteered to make tapes on

math, physics and electronics."

When Goldman, who has always loved teaching, decided to take his present job, he worked under his daughter for two weeks at Oakland Community College's Orchard Ridge Campus. Goldman's daughter is in the individualized learning program. When she took a day off, her dad would pinch hit.

"In teaching and refereeing, you have to be an amateur psychologist," says Goldman. "When a player is sore at me about a call, I tell him to get in line. There's 100 gripers ahead of him. You've got to be firm with students and parents, too, but you've got to keep a sense of humor."

The individualized programmed learning lab where

Goldman tutors offers a self-teaching method for students who want to improve their skills. Last week, Pontiac Motors sent a group of employees to the college for individual math.

"Some of these employees have been out of school at least 50 years and they're rusty," says Goldman. "Some are having difficulty with basic math. Others are ready for trigonometry."

Students are given diagnostic tests and then embark on their own program at their own pace. They use self-teaching "prescription" books and are assisted by Goldman.

"Students aren't given credit for the individualized program," explains Goldman. "But it prepares them for the classroom and reduces the drop-out rate."

Besides Oakland Community College students, veterans come to the lab to build their skills. Housewives who like to work algebra problems or want to get more proficient at balancing their checkbooks drop in for a course. Other university students who get stuck come in for help. There is also a summer enrichment program.

Goldman, who works closely with students, says there isn't a bit of trouble with cheating. Everyone comes on his own. They can stay eight hours a day if they like.

"Two female students came back to see me after they had completed the program. One got 92 per cent on her classroom math test, and the other got 85 per cent. That's all the thanks I need."

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 6-223 OF CHAPTER 2 (TAXICABS) OF TITLE 6 OF THE LIVONIA CODE OF ORDINANCES, AS AMENDED.

THE CITY OF LIVONIA ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 6-223 of Chapter 2 of Title 6 of the Livonia Code of Ordinances, as amended, of the City of Livonia, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 6-223 Rates for Taxicabs. The rates to be charged and collected by a licensee for service rendered by a taxicab shall be as follows: 80 cents for the first one-sixth (1/6) mile or fraction thereof; and 10 cents for each additional one-sixth (1/6) mile or fraction thereof. The council may increase or decrease the rates herein established and no charge shall be made except as fixed by ordinance. No charge shall be made for extra passengers. For each forty-five (45) seconds of waiting time, or fraction thereof, a charge of 10 cents may be made. Waiting time shall include the time when the taxicab is in motion, beginning with the arrival at the place to which it has been called, or the time consumed while standing at the direction of the passenger, but no charge shall be made for the time lost by reason of the inefficiency of the taxicab, or its driver, or time consumed by premature response to a call or by traffic delays. There shall be posted in a conspicuous place in the inside of the taxicab a card on which shall be printed in plain legible type the rates of fare provided for in the ordinance, the meter rate of the taxicab and the reference to this ordinance by number. Flat rates for taxicab trips beyond the corporate limits of the city shall be determined by the licensee hereunder; provided, however, that such rates shall be revealed to the passenger or passengers prior to the commencement of such a trip.

Section 2. Ordinance No. 894 is hereby repealed as to the effective date of this ordinance and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3. Should any portion of this ordinance be held invalid for any reason, such holding shall not be construed as affecting the validity of any of the remaining portions of this ordinance.

Section 4. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency ordinance necessary for the protection of the public health, safety and welfare and shall take effect immediately upon publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 1115

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 5-1203 OF TITLE 5, CHAPTER 12 (ANTI-LITTER ORDINANCE) OF THE LIVONIA CODE OF ORDINANCES, AS AMENDED.

THE CITY OF LIVONIA ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 5-1203 of Title 5, Chapter 12 (Anti-Litter Ordinance) of the Livonia Code of Ordinances, as amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 5-1203 Litter in public and private places. It is unlawful for a person knowingly, without the consent of the public authority having supervision of public property or the owner of private property, to dump, deposit, place, throw, or leave, or cause or permit the dumping, depositing, placing, throwing, or leaving of litter on public or private property or water other than property so designated and set aside for such purposes or in receptacles provided therefor. The phrase "public or private property or water" includes, but is not limited to, the right-of-way of a road or highway, a body of water or watercourse, or the shore or beach thereof, including the ice above the water; a park, playground, building, refuge, or conservation or recreation area; and residential or farm properties or timberlands. It is unlawful for a person who removes a vehicle, wrecked or damaged in an accident on a highway, road, or street, to fail to remove all glass and other injurious substances dropped on the highway, road, or street as a result of the accident.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3. Should any portion of this ordinance be held invalid for any reason, such holding shall not be construed as affecting the validity of any of the remaining portions of this ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. 1110

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 1 OF TITLE 4 (GENERAL LICENSING PROCEDURE) OF THE LIVONIA CODE OF ORDINANCES, AS AMENDED, BY ADDING SECTION 4-121 THEREON.

THE CITY OF LIVONIA ORDAINS:

Section 1. Chapter 1 of Title 4 (General Licensing Procedure) of the Livonia Code of Ordinances, as amended, is hereby amended by adding Section 4-121 thereto to read as follows:

Section 4-121 Alarm systems, devices; requirements.

(a) No person shall install or maintain an alarm system or device connected to the Police and/or Fire Dispatch Board without first having obtained a license therefor from the City Clerk as provided in this ordinance and paying an annual fee of \$12.00 per alarm unit.

(b) No alarm shall cover more than one business place and/or one residence, meaning that buildings with more than one business must have a separate alarm for each business located therein, provided they have separate entrances. No single alarm shall cover a grouping of houses, apartments, or condominiums which have separate entrances to each living quarters.

(c) No alarm device shall be installed within the City unless such device is "Underwriters Laboratory Approved" or equivalent, as approved by the Chief Building Inspector.

(d) To defray the cost of responding to false alarms, the licensee shall pay to the City the sum of \$25.00 for each occasion that the alarm system is activated and responded to by the Police and/or Fire Department, and by way of example but not limited to, such additional fees shall be required in any of the following cases:

(1) no evidence of illegal entry;
(2) no evidence of fire;
(3) a malfunction in the system;

(4) activated by mistake;
(5) alarm activated by persons working on the alarm system, where the Police and/or Fire Department was not previously notified;

(6) alarm activated by weather conditions; and
(7) any other occurrence except that which the system was designed for.

(e) The payment of fees prescribed herein shall constitute a condition for the right to continue use of an alarm system.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3. Should any portion of this ordinance be held invalid for any reason, such holding shall not be construed as affecting the validity of any of the remaining portions of this ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 5-506 OF CHAPTER 5 (SEWERS) OF ARTICLE 1 OF TITLE 5 OF THE LIVONIA CODE OF ORDINANCES, AS AMENDED, OF THE CITY OF LIVONIA.

THE CITY OF LIVONIA ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 5-506 of Chapter 5 (Sewers) of Article 1 of Title 5 of the Livonia Code of Ordinances, as amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 5-506 Connection Rates for Buildings. (a) There shall be paid on behalf of each premises capable of connection to the system, for the privilege of making such connection, a sanitary connection rate in the amount of \$1.00 per 100 square feet of sanitary use factor units assigned to such premises, in accordance with the following schedule:

(b) The foregoing schedule shall be subject to compliance with the following:

ORDINANCE NO. 1111

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2 (FINANCIAL ORDINANCE) OF TITLE 2 OF THE LIVONIA CODE OF ORDINANCES, AS AMENDED.

THE CITY OF LIVONIA ORDAINS:

Section 1. Chapter 2 (Financial Ordinance) of Title 2 of the Livonia Code of Ordinances, as amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

CHAPTER 2 FINANCIAL ORDINANCE

Section 2-201 Title.
Section 2-202 Purpose.
Section 2-203 Construction.
Section 2-204 Accounting system; forms.
Section 2-205 City treasurer; duties.
Section 2-206 Independent auditor; designation.
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Section 2-216 Duly certified vouchers.
Section 2-217 Finance and insurance committee; creation; composition, function, quorum.
Section 2-218 Control of funds.
Section 2-219 Expenses.
Section 2-220 Utility services.
Section 2-221 Transfer of funds.
Section 2-222 Executive emergency fund.
Section 2-223 Title. This ordinance may be known and cited as the "Financial Ordinance."

Section 2-202 Purpose. The purpose of this ordinance is to provide on behalf of the city procedures for accounting for the purchasing of property and services, the making and approval of contracts, the approval and payment of accounts, and the control of receipts, cash and expenditures.

Section 2-203 Construction. This ordinance shall be liberally construed in such manner as to best effectuate its purposes.

Section 2-204 Accounting system; forms. The accounting system of the city shall conform to such uniform system as may be required by law. In the absence of a state law or city ordinance providing a uniform system of accounting, such system shall be established and maintained under the supervision of the director of finance according to generally recognized rules of municipal accounting. The director of finance shall prepare all forms and rules of procedure necessary or incidental to the complete operation of said system of accounting.

Section 2-205. City treasurer; duties. The city treasurer shall have custody of all monies of the city and shall pay all claims against the city, including: sums due on purchase orders and contracts, only on presentation to him of duly certified vouchers. The treasurer shall also keep and maintain in his office all records and books as are necessary and incidental to his prescribed duties.

Section 2-206 Independent auditor; designation. The term "independent auditor" as used in this ordinance shall mean a certified public accountant experienced in municipal accounting and engaged by the city to make the annual audit required by Section 12, Chapter VII of the city charter, and other audits as may be required by the city council pursuant to such charter provisions. The city council shall at least once a year designate and enter into a contract for the service of an independent auditor, which contract shall fix his duties and responsibilities, and determine the compensation he is to receive for such services.

Section 2-207 Audit of accounts; claims; city clerk; duties. The city clerk shall be the internal auditor of the city and shall examine and audit all accounts and all claims against the city and countersign all vouchers for payment.

Section 2-208 Department of finance; director of finance; duties. The department of finance shall be under the general management and control of a director of finance. The department shall consist of the division of accounting and the division of budget. The director of finance shall be a certified public accountant, and the appointing authority for his department. Each division head shall be under the direction of and directly responsible to the director of finance. The functions of the department of finance shall include:

- (1) Supervision over the administration of the financial affairs of the city;
- (2) The keeping of accounts and financial records of the city and all departments and agencies of the city government;
- (3) Supervision and responsibility for the purchase, custody and distribution of all the supplies, materials, equipment and other articles used by any office, department or agency of the city government;
- (4) The preparation of the annual budget(s) for the mayor.

The director of finance shall have the authority to do all things that are necessary and incidental to carrying out the functions of the department of finance.

(b) Director. The director of finance shall be responsible for and shall be required to:

- (1) Submit to the mayor and the council a monthly statement of all receipts and disbursements in sufficient detail to show the exact financial condition of the city;
- (2) Prepare for the mayor and the council within sixty (60) days after the close of each fiscal year a complete financial statement and report;
- (3) Provide for the examination and approval of all contracts, orders and other documents by which the city government incurs financial obligation, having previously ascertained that monies have been appropriated and allocated and will be available when the obligation shall become due and payable;
- (4) Keep a system of accounts which shall conform to such uniform system as may be required by law;
- (5) He shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by him by state law, city charter, the ordinances of the city, the mayor or by the council.

Section 2-209 Division of accounting; chief accountant; duties. The division of accounting shall be under the supervision of a chief accountant. The chief accountant shall keep and maintain the control accounting records and detailed accounting records of the city and pre-audit all expenditures and invoices. The chief accountant shall be responsible for the preparation of all financial statements and reports needed to show the financial condition and financial operation of the city as directed by the director of finance, and as subject to the provisions of Section 2-206 of this ordinance. The chief accountant shall also keep and maintain excerpts of all ordinances, resolutions, contracts, communications, proceedings, and other matters pertaining to accounting.

Section 2-210 Division of budget; budget officer; duties. The division of budget shall be under the supervision of a budget officer. The budget officer shall be responsible for and shall be required to:

- Assist the director of finance in the preparation of all budgets, and the analysis and administration of these budgets;
- Act as purchasing agent for the city and, pursuant to the rules and regulations established under this ordinance, shall contract for, purchase, store and distribute all supplies, materials and equipment required by any office, department or agency of the city, and shall establish and enforce specifications with respect to supplies, materials and equipment required by the city, inspect or supervise the inspection of all deliveries of supplies, materials and equipment and determine their quality, quantity and conformance with specifications, transfer to or between offices, departments or agencies, or sell surplus, obsolete or unused supplies, materials and equipment, and delegate to any director or department head, or a representative thereof, such authority of purchasing agent to the extent and under such conditions as the budget officer may determine;
- Prepare all forms and rules of procedure necessary for the purchasing of property and services as provided in this ordinance, and for the performance of his duties as budget officer, all of which forms and rules shall be subject to approval by the director of finance; and
- Perform such duties as may be required of him by ordinance or the director of finance.

Section 2-211 Contracts; appropriation; authorization required. No contract for the purchase of property or services, or for any other purpose, shall be binding on the city unless and until a proper appropriation has been made by the council sufficient to satisfy the city's current fiscal year financial obligation under such contract, and unless such contract has been duly authorized as hereinafter provided.

Section 2-212 Contracts; approval. Where not prohibited by law and where otherwise permitted by this ordinance, contracts on behalf of the city for the purchase of personal property or services involving an obligation on the part of the city less than \$1,500.00 may be approved by the budget officer under the provisions of Section 2-213 after his receiving a proper requisition from a director or head of the department requiring such property or services without first obtaining approval of the city council. All other contracts shall not be binding on the city until approved by action of the council.

Section 2-213 Bids; requirements. (a) Where the obligation of the city under a contract is \$500.00 or less, no bids shall be required prior to the making of such contract. Prior to the making of any contract imposing an obligation on the city of an amount greater than \$500.00, the director or department head of the particular department involved, or the purchasing agent, if the contract is to be procured by competitive bids in writing, shall provide, however, that less than three bids may be procured where the director, department head or purchasing agent certifies in writing the reasons why three bids cannot be procured.

(b) In determining whether or not the amount of any purchase requires the taking of bids for materials or services, the total estimated expenditures for the next succeeding twelve months shall govern.

(c) The council at its discretion shall have the right to reject any and all bids. No contract shall be awarded other than to the lowest bidder except by authority of the council. Where the obligation of the city under a proposed contract is \$1,500.00 or more, the contract shall be awarded by advertisement in the official newspaper by the director or head of the department, and such advertisement shall reasonably state pertinent information concerning the proposed contract and fix a period of at least seven days following the date of publication within which bids shall be received. Wherever possible the plans and specifications for the items to be bid upon shall be drafted so as to allow at least two bids to be received. Where drafting of the plans and specifications in such manner is not possible the director or head of the department shall submit proper documentation establishing that such is the case to the city council. All advertisements for bids shall be approved as to form by the city attorney, by the budget officer as to an existing sufficient appropriation, shall require the bids when submitted to be identified and marked "sealed bids" and shall be addressed to the City of Livonia.

All bids requiring advertisement shall be presented publicly unopened to a bid committee consisting of the city clerk or his authorized representative, the budget officer and the representative of the city shall be selected by advertisement and placed on file in the office of the city clerk. All council members shall be ex-officio members of this committee and shall be notified of bid committee meetings. The bids shall then be referred by the bid committee to the requisitioning authority for report and recommendation to the city council. All advertisements for bids shall also provide that bids may be received prior to the specified time of the public opening of such bids.

(d) Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this section, no bids shall be required prior to the making of a contract in the following instances:

- In the case of an emergency which is fully explained in a written memorandum, approved by the mayor, filed with the city clerk, and transmitted to the council; and
- In connection with contracts for engineering, legal, accounting, architectural, insurance, or other professional services which are approved by resolution of the council stating the reason or reasons for not taking bids; and
- In connection with all contracts for the acquisition and construction of projects by the city under the provisions of Act 62, Public Acts of Michigan, 1963, as amended; and
- Where the subject of any contract does not exceed \$5,000.00 and the city council, upon written recommendation of the mayor, authorizes the execution of such contract without competitive bidding; and
- Where the subject of the contract is a product or material not competitive in nature, the purchase of which would result from requiring competitive bidding, and the city council, upon written recommendation of the mayor, authorizes execution of a contract without competitive bidding.

(e) All bids, regardless of amount, shall constitute public records and shall be preserved in the office of the city clerk for a period of six years following the date of opening.

Section 2-214 Requisitions; purchase orders. All purchases of property and services shall require the issuance of a requisition. Purchases of property in excess of \$10.00 shall require the issuance of a requisition and the approval of such requisition by the budget officer. No requisition shall be approved nor purchase order issued by the budget officer until there is filed in the office of the budget officer a written requisition prepared in quadruplicate and signed by the person requesting the purchase order, approved by the director or department head, giving full particulars as to the proposed purchase and appropriation to be charged, and until the budget officer shall have approved the proposed expenditure as having been authorized by the budget, or a special appropriation. Before approving any requisition, the budget officer shall determine that there is a sufficient balance in the budget account to meet the proposed expenditure. Whenever bids are required by Section 2-213 of this ordinance, copies of such bids shall accompany the requisition for purchase order.

Section 2-215 Payment of claims; approval of general payroll. All vouchers shall be prepared and certified and one copy shall be left in the office of the city treasurer as provided in the city charter, and authority to pay each claim; provided, however, that where it is impossible to leave such voucher in the treasurer's office, there shall be deposited in such office, in lieu thereof, a duly certified list of such vouchers. Payment of such claims shall be made by warrant on the proper fund which shall be in the

- In lieu of square footage, twenty (20) fixture units equal one (1) sanitary use factor unit, which produces the lesser cost.
- For a multi-story or multi-use building each floor shall be computed in accordance with the unit factor applicable.
- (a) Each addition to an existing building (except residential) already connected to the sewer system shall be subject to a \$500.00 minimum charge or the appropriate unit factor charge, whichever is greater.
- (b) Each addition under 1,500 square feet to an existing building already connected to the sanitary sewer system with no additional plumbing fixtures added to existing facilities, the sewer fee is waived.
- (c) Each addition over 1,500 square feet to an existing building already connected to the sanitary sewer system with no additional plumbing fixtures added to existing facilities, a fee of \$500.00 will be charged.
- On industrial or commercial land where the sewer laterals have been constructed by a developer and dedicated to the City, a credit will be allowed toward the connection charges. The percentage credit shall be the ratio of the length of developer-built sewer to the parcel frontage but in no case shall the credit exceed 80% of the unit charge and in no case shall the charge under this paragraph be less than \$500.00 for each connection. If a new commercial or industrial building is to be constructed on a site where there is an existing sewer lead, the following will apply:
 - Figure cost on type of building being built.
 - Give credit for fee paid on original building.
- In single family residential and multiple residential developments, where the sewer laterals have been constructed by a developer and dedicated to the City, a credit will be allowed toward the connection charges. The percentage credit shall be the ratio of the length of developer-built sewer to the parcel frontage but the minimum charge after the credit has been applied shall not be less than \$500.00 for each sanitary use factor unit.
- (a) If a residence is destroyed (by fire, windstorm, etc.) and the same type of structure as originally existed is to be built, and the sewer connection fees have been paid in full, there will be no additional charges for sewer fees.
- (b) If there is a sewer connection fee balance, payments on the contract can be suspended until such time as a new residence is constructed.
- For any connection not specifically covered in the above schedule, the connection charge shall be determined by the Water and Sewer Board at the time of application for any such connection.

Section 2. Ordinance No. 973 is hereby repealed as of the effective date of this ordinance and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3. Should any portion of this ordinance be held invalid for any reason, such holding shall not be construed as affecting the validity of any of the
