





Consolidation vote April 2

Voters in the City of Plymouth and Plymouth Town ship will go to the polls April 2 to decide whether to consolidate their two governments.

That date has been tentatively set by the State Boundary Commission for an election requested by the 1970 petitions filed by Dr. Gary Hall.

Their charter would have to be approved by the combined voters before the new city could officially be


To qualify for the ballot, commission hopefuls would need the signatures of 20 registered voters from

Officials from the two governments can run for the charter commission, but must resign their city or township job if elected to the charter - writing body. Residents of the two units have never had an op-

portunity to decide the unification issue although township voters turned down an advisory question on consolidation by 61-39 per cent last September.

Should the consolidation issue fail April 2 in either the city and township or both, the drive started by the Hall petitions would end there. No election for charter commissioners would be held.
