Griffin's ill, Moceri decision tabled; board might make it referendum

CANTON — Due to the illness of one of its members, the Canton Township Board may postpone making a decision on the controversial "Moceri Project" until March 26.

According to Supervisor Phil Dingeldey, several of the Canton board members conferred on the matter Thursday night and decided it would be best to postpone making a decision until Bob Griffin, a trustee believed to hold the deciding vote, could attend a meeting.

Griffin, who is in New Grace Hospital, received two total blood transfusions Thursday. His wife told the Plymouth Observer & Eccentric he is feeling "very weak."

Because the other township board members appear to be split 3 - 3 on the proposed regional shopping center rezoning, Griffin is thought to hold the deciding vote.

But there may be a new wrinkle to the project controversy that has been raging for a year and a half. Some of the township trustees are considering putting the issue to a referendum vote on the August primary ballot.

The Windsor Park Homeowners Assn. has already prepared a petition drive to put the project to a referendum if the township board should approve it.

Trustee Jim Poole said Thursday, "I think it's such a hot issue that maybe the people ought to get to vote on it."

Poole has conducted a mail and telephone survey on the proposed Westland - type shopping center which, he says, has shown "overwhelming opposition" to the project.

Several Canton homeowners' groups have opposed the proposal and at two separate public hearings on the proposed rezoning, opposition has been overwhelming.

Poole said the referendum idea would be good since it could be put on the August ballot without any additional cost to the township.

Township Clerk John Flodin, who said he'd planned to put the project on Tuesday's agenda until Griffin's setback, acknowledged that the referendum idea was a "possibility."

Dingeldey said, "There's nothing wrong with a referendum vote."

Dingeldey said he had also anticipated having the proposed rezoning on Tuesday's agenda until Griffin's illness became serious.

"I'm sure there'll be people expecting it (to be on the agenda)," he said, adding there was also a possibility Trustee Don Korte might not return from vacation in time to be at the meeting.

Dingeldey, Korte, Treasure Grant Campbell, who already voted in favor of the Moceri rezoning as a planning commissioner, have been expected to vote in favor of the project.

Flodin and Trustees Poole and Brian Schwall are expected to vote against the rezoning while Griffin's vote is said to be undecided.

It was also mentioned Friday that Dominic Moceri of Grand Blanc, who is proposing the development, might withdraw the plans in favor of a smaller, local shopping center and a larger housing development.

Moceri submitted such a revised plan for the site on the southeast corner of Joy and Sheldon roads last fall after homeowner opposition appeared to be stalling his regional shopping center proposal.

At that time the Canton planning commission told him nothing less than a regional shopping center would be acceptable for the site.

Annexation petitions filed for Northville

NORTHVILLE — For the second time in exactly two years, petitions to annex Northville Township to Northville have been filed in Lansing with the State Boundary Commission.

The petitions, containing more than 1,000 signatures, were filed Thursday — two years to the day and the earliest time possible allowed by law after the last petition drive was culminated.

That drive led to the May 7, 1973 annexation election in which unification was defeated in the township by a narrow margin.

If the boundary commission finds the new Northville annexation petitions contain a legal number of signatures of registered voters in the city and township, it will call for a public hearing on the question.

Following that, the boundary commission will rule on the matter and then, unless petitions are presented to

call for an election, the commission's ruling stands.

Last time the commission ruled in favor of the annexation but petitions were filed to call for an election and that election turned annexation down.

That Northville and Northville Township election was watched with great interest by Plymouth and Northville Township which are currently gearing up for a consolidation election ordered by the boundary commission after a petition drive.

The Plymouth consolidation election will be held on May 7 — exactly one year to the day after the Northville annexation election failed.

Michigan State University, under the cosponsorship of Plymouth and Northville Township, is currently making a study of consolidating the two Plymouth communities. Its report is expected during the first week in April.

'City's donations illegal' --city attorney opinion

PLYMOUTH — The city's policy of donating money to community organizations has been found to be illegal.

Charles Lowe, city attorney, has notified the city that in his opinion, "under state law, cities are prohibited from making financial donations to private institutions."

His legal opinion could affect Youth Inc., Our House, the Community Band, and the Plymouth - Canton Development Commission — all of which have received donations from the city in the past.

Lowe said donations made previously probably would not be affected although "I think they could have been questionable."

"I don't think they would have to repay."

As for the future, Lowe says, organizations which rely on the city for help would have to contract with the city to provide services in return for their "donations."

"This doesn't mean the community groups won't get any money, it's just that in the future we're going to have to change the procedure," Lowe said.

The city attorney said he discovered this oversight of the city while researching other matters.

In his four - page opinion to the city, Lowe cites the state constitution and several court rulings and specifically applies them to the city's aid to Youth Inc. which has amounted to about \$8,000 annually.

Quoting a State Attorney General Frank Kelley's opinion, Lowe says, "City funds may not be used for contributions to pay operating expenses of a private, voluntary organization providing recreational facilities for the children of the city."

Concluding, he added, "In light of the aforementioned constitutional prohibitions, case law and opinions of the attorney general, the conclusion is inescapable that the proposed contributions by the City of Plymouth to Youth Inc., although admittedly set up for public purposes and directly incurring to the benefit of the people of the City of Plymouth, would be illegal as violate of state law."

"Moreover, the City of Plymouth is without power or authority to make the proposed contributions and any

contributions so made would, out of necessity, be void."

Officials of Youth Inc. — before hearing about Lowe's opinion — had asked for a workshop session with the city commission to discuss budget problems the organization has been encountering.

That meeting will be held at 7:30 tonight (Monday) in the city commission chambers at City Hall.

The commission is expected to discuss Lowe's opinion and the possibility of making a contract with Youth Inc. at that meeting.

Charged is Joyce Ruth Ziegler, 31, of 43552 Bannockburn, who police say ran a red light at about 8:55 a.m. in full daylight.

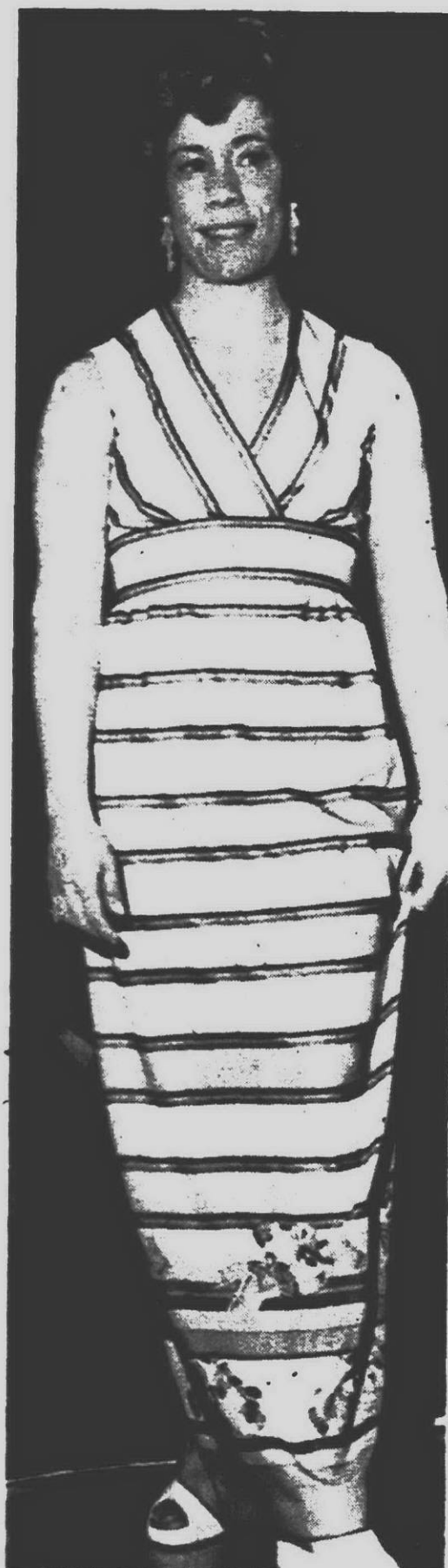
The youth, who had been listed in critical condition in University Hospital, was reported "improving" and out of intensive care.

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Controversy mandates Mocerí referendum

As it stands now, the fate of the proposed regional shopping center known as the "Mocerí Project" lies with the Canton Township Board.

Both Canton and Wayne County planning commissions have recommended approval of the project, which has been fighting its way through the planning and rezoning process for a year and a half.

Many community homeowner groups have been vocal in expressing their opposition to the project for a variety of reasons.

The Canton Township Chamber of Commerce has supported the project as has the Plymouth - Canton Development Commission. The Plymouth Chamber of Commerce has taken a stand against it.

Whether the issue will be on Tuesday's agenda for the township board hasn't yet been determined.

Trustee Bob Griffin, believed to hold the swing vote on the issue, was hospitalized last week after a long illness. With a 3 - 3 vote expected without him, the board is unsure whether to put the matter on the floor.

A tie vote would mean the proposed rezoning would come back on the table the first time there's a full board.

But in addition to the uncertainty of how the vote would go even if Griffin were there, other board members admit they have mixed feelings on the issue.

It boils down to the fact that most issues have their drawbacks but they have some merit as well.

One of the biggest drawbacks of the Mocerí Project is its timing. In an election year it is difficult to handle such a controversial issue without tremendous political overtones.

The Windsor Park Homeowners Assn., which represents the subdivision contiguous to the project's proposed site, has promised to take the matter to a referendum if it is approved.

In light of the controversy surrounding the Westland Center - type proposal, it is probably a sound idea to have a referendum that would settle, once and for all, how the people feel about the rezoning.

The township board should place a referendum on the issue on August's primary election ballot.

This should be done not because it would take the heat off the board or

because the homeowners have threatened a referendum, but because it is a sound idea.

Opponents and proponents to the project both claim to represent the majority of the population, although the project's backers must be "silent" if they are indeed the majority.

A referendum would place the issue in the voters' hands.

While it is not desirable, as a rule, to put rezoning matters to referendums, one that has created this much stir, deserves a decision by the people.

Neither the "pro" nor the "con" sides to the project can claim an at-large election would be unfair.

Of course, a project of this magnitude affects more than just Canton Township. Both Plymouth Township and Plymouth would be affected if the project were built at its proposed location.

It is impossible to call a regional referendum on the matter.

The best the Canton Township Board can do with the issue is to put it on the ballot — and let the township voters decide.

Readers oppose Mocerí

EDITOR:

I have followed with great interest the progress of the Mocerí project in Canton Township.

The project has already been withdrawn once by and large due to the great amount of public opposition.

Now it's back again — and at the request of the township planning commission no less.

I attended the meeting at which the planning commission approved the rezoning petition and heard a number of reasons why we should have the shopping center, ranging from an improved tax base to a nearby Santa Claus.

A number of reasons were presented as to why it shouldn't be there — roads incapable of handling the increased traffic, close proximity to other shopping centers — downtown Plymouth, Westland, and a lack of major announced tenants, etc.

Two very interesting points came to light at this meeting. One was the complete disregard shown the advice of the professional planners of both Plymouth and Canton Townships. The second was that following a show of hands in which 600 of the 650 or so in attendance showed their opposition to the LOCATION of the shopping center, the planning commission unanimously approved the zoning change.

Attendance at the planning commission meeting was definitely an exercise in futility.

Enough interest had been generated in the Mocerí Project to bring a representation of approximately 10 per cent (if we allow one member of a family attendance). Can one imagine 10 per cent of Detroit's households at a meeting of the planning commission? Can one further imagine a planning commission's unanimous approval of a zoning change disapproved of by 90 per cent of those in attendance, nine per cent of Detroit's population? Hardly.

'Let's pursue justice'

EDITOR:

I'm sorry in a way to have to be so persistent in my remarks on what I believe to be a malfunction of justice with regard to complaints against blocked railroad crossings, but I have another thought to add to my crusade.

There is nothing in the state law as I understand it, and as it was reported to me by District Judge Dunbar Davis, that says a railroad can be excused from prosecution or conviction and penalty simply because it had a breakdown which caused the overtime blocking of the crossing. Therefore, justice should be pursued strictly according to the law. An excuse which is not allowed in the law is therefore no excuse to escape the penalty of the law.

These are indeed valid objections: 1) Two - lane roads that will remain two - lane roads outside the immediate area of the shopping center; Sheldon north of Joy Road, Joy Road east of Lilley, Main Street into Plymouth. Morton Taylor is the only four - lane road which would serve the shopping center, and it ends in the ruts chuckholes and gravel of Warren Road Right on, planning commission, right on!

Does a shopping center really lower taxes? Why then is Westland's tax rate \$66.67 per thousand dollars of assessed evaluation?

And now we're told to build the shopping center to change the skyline! Lots of things change skylines — forest fires, even shopping centers. Does this mean they're good?

It's high time that township officials stop using the ostrich approach to planning and get their heads out of the sand. Read very carefully the Wayne County Planning Commission's report regarding over - development and the long range effects of the energy crisis. A vacant or distressed shopping center is good to no one.

I took many different routes to relieve the monotony of such a long ride: I could fill a book on the different roads I travelled and know the area well. In fact, I took interest in seeing the Southland Shopping Center being completed.

This downriver area has improved its roads tremendously. However, I think the J. L. Hudson Co. knew of this road building program before they purchased the land for their shopping center.

There can be no comparison in the shopping center proposed by Mocerí land - wise to the acreage Southland encompasses, plus the fact that it is to be built in the middle of a residential area.

Why certainly, I would be tickled pink to have a shopping center close by. I would just have to cross Joy Road and walk a distance of approximately 350 feet. That is, if I could get across Joy Road on foot without being killed!

I listen night and day to the police cars and ambulances going west on Joy Rd. and my heart is heavy and sad, always wondering who the victim or victims are.

There are never any articles in our newspapers of these accidents. I like to imagine that this is mainly because they are just too numerous to report. Like those in all suburbs, our roads are just not adequate to handle the increased amount of cars on them.

I can't help but wonder how you would feel if your property bounded Arlington or Joy Road. These residents have a sizable amount of money invested in their homes and they bought in this area because of our superb school systems and country environment. Personally, we have no children and our investment in our home is modest. If we are dissatisfied with our surroundings we can always sell and buy elsewhere. A lot of the newer residents could not do this.

What in the world would be wrong with "an apartment complex loaded with children," or even a "teenage hangout?" These youngsters do have to have a place to live and I think that they are what life is all about. Parents do try very hard to raise their youngsters in a good environment; they have high tax bills to show for this.

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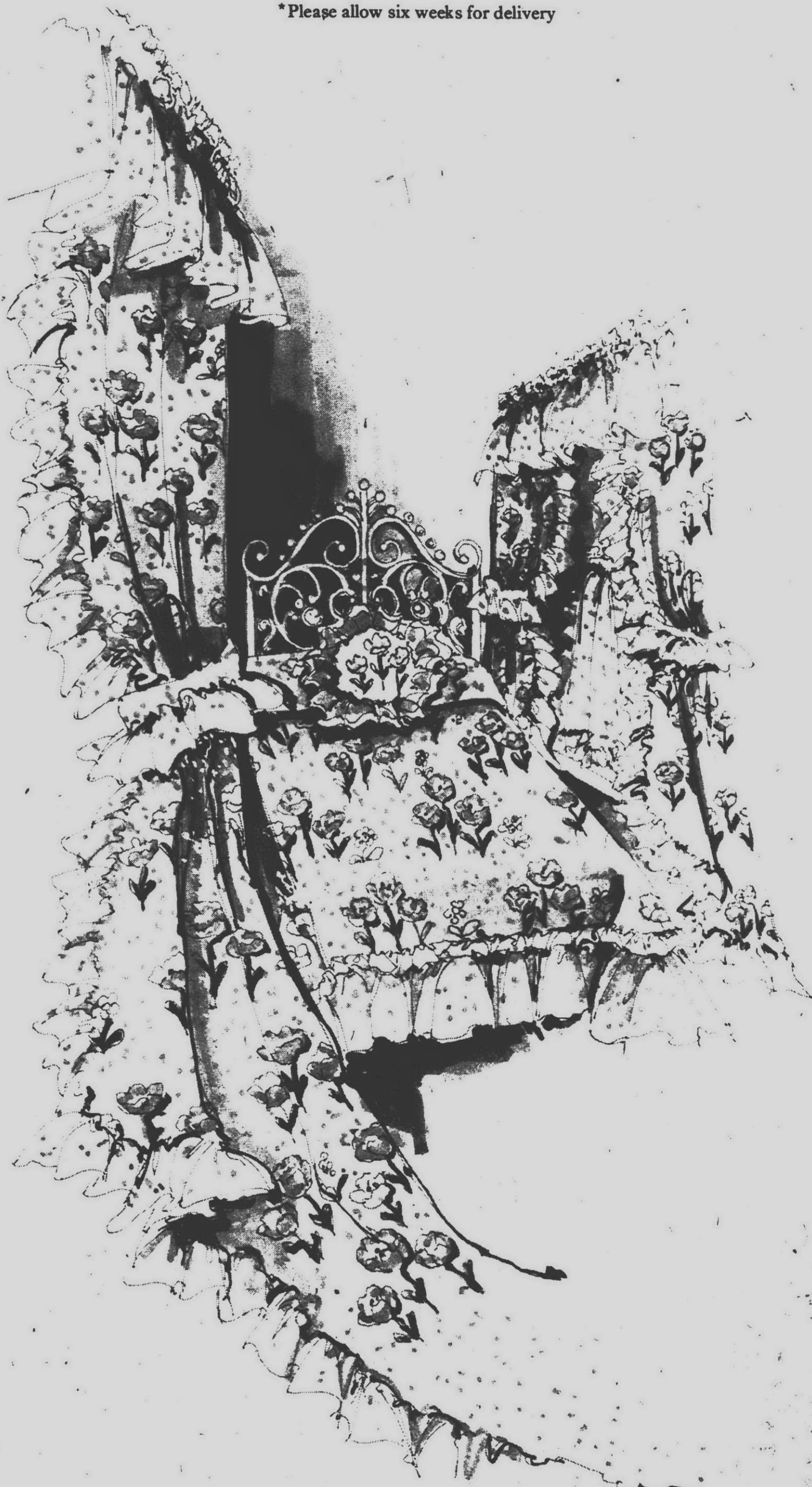

This course is for bachelors when they lose their buttons

CLARENCEVILLE — Can the fingers of the women's liberation movement be seen poking in high school curriculum and shaping a new course offering called "bachelor survival"?

Slated for the fall semester at Clarenceville High School, the class is designed to provide teenage boys "with the most basic and necessary competencies of maintaining a 'home away from home,' concentrating on such basic areas as cooking, sewing, washing and ironing, house cleaning and shopping.

Although the people responsible for the course, coop coordinator Ken Zornes and home economics department chairman Geri Moore, have planned it with bachelor living in mind, both agree that the same skills are applicable to marriage.

"My husband knows all these things," Mrs. Moore said.

Zornes, a swinging but competent bachelor until recently, said, "I tried to forget them, but my wife won't let me."

The idea for the course was actually a response to what Zornes was hearing from his students. "After the school prom last year, the fellows came in and told me they felt 'ripped off' when they took their dates to one of the nicer restaurants.

"We couldn't read the menu; we didn't know anything about the wines. How do you learn all this?" They wanted to know.

Zornes and Mrs. Moore took it from there, forming a course entitled "boys home economics" which struck both students and administrators as "blah."

According to Zornes, it became a case of what's in a name. When the two renamed the course, "bachelor survival" the response was tremendous.

Every day survival techniques such as "don't wash red and white socks together," the best cleaning products and how to read a lease will be in-

cluded along with some social graces," Mrs. Moore explained. "Most of it will be practical experience."

She plans to take the class to the supermarket to do a mock week's shopping, have them cook a breakfast, sew on a button and fix a zipper.

Zornes will come in to "guest lecture" once a week.

"We plan a follow up survey after they've been out of school awhile," Zornes said.

"We'll want to find out just how helpful it really has proven."

A further survey might be taken seven or eight years later. It could show that newly married Clarenceville male graduates hooked their liberated wives not because of love or money, but because of the sharing they could do as a result of skills learned in bachelor survival.

New child care center is a training ground

Five students from Livonia's Bentley High School are engaged in teaching even though they're still students themselves.

Sharon Broe, Connie Essenmacher, Debbie Huey, Amy Sedor and Robyn Jorgenson are all earning a half-credit per semester apiece by serving as aides at the newly organized Children's City Child Care Center.

This nursery school is in Memorial Church of Christ, 35475 Five Mile, Li-

von. It is directed by David Berg, now working for his doctorate in early child development at Wayne State University. His assistants are Josephine Donnelly and Joyce Ann Ward, both certified nursery school teachers.

At this center which is licensed by the state, the Bentley students and two assistant teachers from the early childhood development program at Schoolcraft College work with the youngsters brought to the center.

They might spend time observing a

child try on dresses in the bedroom area, and if the child steps inside the special TV set to pretend she is an actress, they will applaud.

Divided into interest areas, the center has something for every child. There is a kitchen section with a water table with water that changes color every day with the help of food coloring.

There is also a concept development room which to small minds means puzzles, a typewriter, a clock at a child's eye level and felt and magnet-

ic bulletin boards. These objects will do for the small muscles of small fingers what Vic Tanney will do for their daddies biceps.

A long workbench is the pride of the wood working area. Girls seem to enjoy working with the vise, plane and other tools just as much as boys, Mr. Berg said. They seem more patient than boys in finishing a sawing job, for example.

And what would a school be without books? If they become bored with reclining on a pillow with the latest

juvenile best seller, they can manipulate the cash register designed to teach them about the real facts of life — namely money. Berg has found that their interest in this object was heightened when they began to use real coins.

But the most popular objects at Children's City are part of its communication system. Wonder of wonders, they have telephones all over the place on which a child in the bedroom can phone another child in the kitchen and tell him about his new sneakers.

Sometimes these instruments are

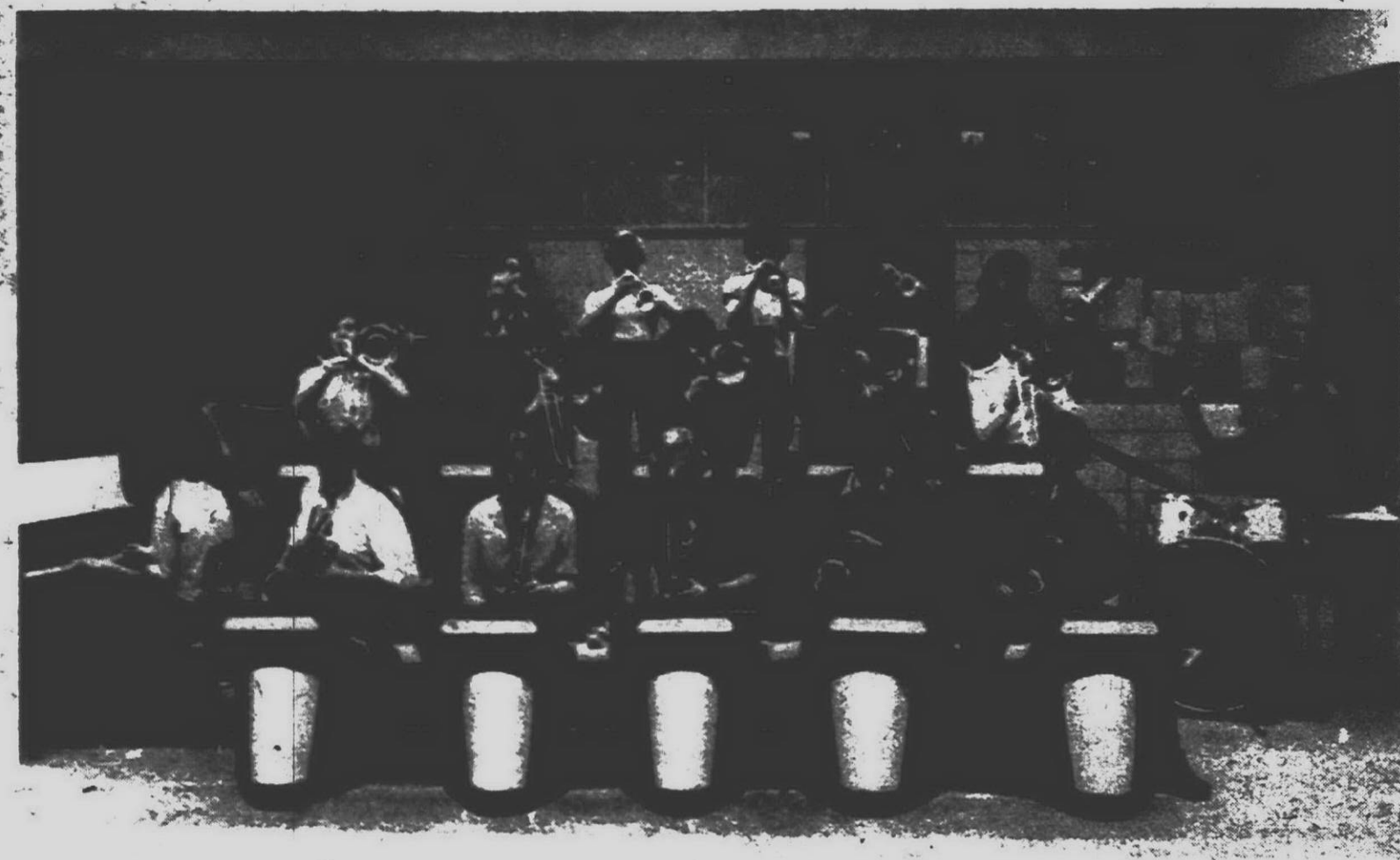
used for pretend conversations in which the child really tells mom or dad a thing or two. There is even a real telephone for calling grandma or dad at their home or office. This experience is intensely exhilarating to the three children who are old enough to do this, reported Berg.

Franklin High's "wants" are readily transforming into basketball wins. "If you think we wanted Churchill in that district finale, wait until you see how bad we want Plymouth Salem in this regional opener," commented Franklin Coach Bob Visser after his cagers nipped rival Churchill on two free throws by Jamie Knapp in the closing seconds, 59-58.

Franklin, champions of the Northwest Suburban loop, now sports a 20-3 record and will be up against the champions of the Suburban Eight league, Plymouth Salem, in a regional state clash set for Franklin High this Wednesday (March 13). Tip-off is at 8 p.m.

Salem is boasting an overall 21-2 mark and Visser and his Patriot crew have not forgotten one of their three losses came at the hands of the Salem Rocks back on Dec. 4, '73.

Franklin had a six point lead with 1½ minutes remaining but wound up on the short end of a 48-67 score.

"Our kids just sat down and bawled after that loss," added Visser. "We haven't forgotten that loss and the way the officials took it away from us."

Visser and his Patriots wanted Churchill in that Stevenson High district finale, wanted the Chargers so badly that Visser said could taste it.

The taste, after 32 minutes of close knit basketball came out sweet but what a battle it was.

Churchill, the area's No. 1 club all season, closed it all out on a 20 win and two loss note.

"This was just about the type of game we expected," said Visser whose Patriots defeated Churchill earlier in the year, 65-59, the only club in the 1973-74 campaign to get the best of Montano's Chargers.

"But I really thought we would pull away from them. This had to be

Churchill's top performance of the year."

Churchill wound up shooting 50 per cent from the field, hitting on 24 of 48 field goal attempts. Don Braun scored 23 and Ken Landini 22.

Franklin on the other hand connected on 25 of 62 for 40 per cent.

The key for Franklin had to be in the performance of all-state candidate Kevin Kaseta. The 6-foot-8, 195-pound senior was coming off a badly sprained ankle and suffered through ice packs and taping but he just bit down a little harder and grinned himself and his Patriots to victory.

Kaseta pumped in 22 points and hauled in 12 rebounds with Franklin winning in that department, 35 to 29.

"This is my biggest win ever as a coach," added the Franklin coach who is just waiting now for Plymouth Salem, winners of the Farmington Harrison district. "Churchill just didn't want to drive on us."

Twenty-seven seconds into the contest, Churchill went up, 1-0 on a free throw toss by Ken Landini.

And it was followed by 32 minutes of basketball that would see the lead exchange hands 11 times. It was all tied up on eight occasions and the difference did not exceed six points at any stage.

That six point spread was enjoyed by Churchill three times in the second quarter when the Chargers showed signs of pulling away with Franklin caught looking down the whistle of the officials.

Buckets by Braun and Landini upped Churchill's lead to 5-2 after a basket by Franklin's Matt DeMars and two free throws at the close of the quarter gave Churchill a 12-11 margin.

It was back and forth early in the second with a charity toss by Don Forest breaking a 16 all deadlock. Braun then popped in a two-pointer. Chuck Wayne hit a free throw and Braun made good two of two at the line to push Churchill to a 22-16 lead.

Two buckets by Kaseta and a 12-footer by Knapp at the buzzer sliced it to three points for Franklin at the half, 33-30.

Churchill again took the lead in the third but hit a span of two minutes of failing to score. Kaseta scored six straight points and a bucket by Keith Blazaitis at the end of the quarter gave Franklin a 44-43 margin. This was the first time the Patriots had the lead since 1:18 into the second quarter.

A bucket by DeMars and a free throw by Kaseta quickly upped the Patriot lead to 47-43 before Braun sliced it back to 47-45 and tied it up at 47 all.

With four minutes remaining, Rich VanWagoner tied it up for Churchill at 51 all and Landini put the Chargers up, 54-51 on a three-point play with 2:34 showing on the clock.

This is when Churchill's turnovers cost them a district title. Franklin jumped on three fumbles with DeMars scoring twice and Blazaitis once to turn the tables and give Franklin a 57-54 advantage, 1:31 remaining.

With 1:20 left, Braun cut it to 57-56. Franklin then lost the ball in a scramble and with 14 seconds left, Braun missed a 12-footer. Franklin got the rebound and VanWagoner fouled Knapp.

Knapp made good his first toss and did a leap into the air to make it 59-56. The second charity toss made good upped it to a three point difference with nine seconds remaining.

VanWagoner drove the length of the court. He missed on his layup but Braun tipped it in. The margin was back to one but time had run out on Churchill. Franklin now wants Plymouth Salem and you have to believe Visser and Co. want Salem even more than they wanted Churchill.

Over in Churchill territory, Coach Montano said after the game. "No excuses, both of us were at about 95 per cent and we gave them our best shot and it wasn't enough."

"I have to wish Franklin well and I don't see Salem any better than them. That regional game ought to about as close as our district contest and you just can't get any closer."

"Franklin is going to be tough on its home court."

"This loss was a real heart-breaker. The turning point had to be those two quick baskets by Blazaitis over Forest in that fourth quarter."

"No excuses. Franklin proved the better team," finished Montano, closing the pages on a 20-2 season. Box score:

From Lansing comes word the dog racing bill is out of committee in the Senate and discussion can be expected in the not too distant future.

Some senators thought the bill had died for this session when it was turned back to committee for additional study but they apparently underestimated the opposition who now have the bill back on the floor.

It wasn't so many weeks ago this column predicted the dog racing bill had a good chance of passing if it ever got out on the senate floor. Well it is out on the floor and we reiterate, there is an excellent chance that it will get the approval of the Senate.

What will happen in the House is anybody's guess. We seem to recall the bill received favorable support in the House a year ago and was defeated in the Senate. Now it appears the Senate vote is so close a few changes would make it official.

One would be surprised to know what groups are supporting the dog racing bill which would establish as many as 10 such plants in various sections of the state. Our information is that several leading harness racing figures are very much interested in landing one of the permits if the bill passes.

Strange how one can switch from staunch support of harness racing to a vigorous backer of the dogs when there is a possibility of great personal, financial gain. Money certainly speaks loud these days.

There'll be more on dog racing as the action gets hotter in Lansing. We hope area legislators take a good look at the situation in the metropolitan Detroit area and do everything they can to defeat the bill. Race tracks in the district are having enough trouble cracking the financial nut now without the additional competition of dog racing at night.

From Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley comes an announcement of the appointment of Ralph Matkin, formerly an officer of the original group that operated Hazel Park track, to a position of consultant.

The appointment comes out of a study of racing by a committee more than a year ago. That group made a

recommendation that the track officials, including those in the judges' stand, should be reviewed, periodically.

That's the role Matkin will have for the next two or three months when he'll make weekly, monthly and a final report to the commissioner of his recommendations. He is covered by Civil Service Commission provisions and is working under a contract.

Matkin, who is on the job already, will observe the work of the stewards and judges as well as all other officials connected with the daily operation in the paddock and the barn area.

He will also review the current state laws and statutes, compare them with those adopted by other states and make a full report at the end of three months.

Shirley hasn't anything to report on the recent hearing on the subject of allowing minors on the grounds of race tracks regardless of age. At the moment none is allowed under the age of 12.

PLYMOUTH - Long after the echoes of cheering crowds have died, the lights remain lit in the Plymouth-Salem gymnasium. Though the clock is nearing midnight, a lone man is pushing his broom across the Tartan floor.

The waste piles of paper airplanes, confetti, pom poms and wrinkled programs are not new to Joe Holman, afternoon supervisor at Plymouth-Salem and a three-year school employee. He spends a minimum of eight hours overtime every weekend Salem or Canton has a home basketball game.

He is one of many persons behind the scenes at sporting events.

Joe's Saturday evening starts around 4:30 p.m. A minimum of four man-hours is required just to set up and tear down for every home game. Thus, he has to arrive early to prepare the building for the junior varsity ball game.

Because Plymouth has only one high school with a gymnasium, conflicting schedules require two home games at that building on some weekends.

That's when it costs overtime pay. Joe has to spend one hour and 55 minutes, supporting a 40 pound machine over his head to crank up 22 baskets. He has to pull out all of the bleachers, set up chairs and tables.

check the heat, unlock doors, stock bathrooms...

The list is endless. That's just the work required before a game. During the event, crowds of fans eat candy, throw confetti, blow their noses with paper tissues and chew gum.

It all seems to get thrown on the floor.

After the athletic event, as the gym is emptying, Joe gets out that heavy machine and repeats his procedure of cranking baskets down for nearly two hours.

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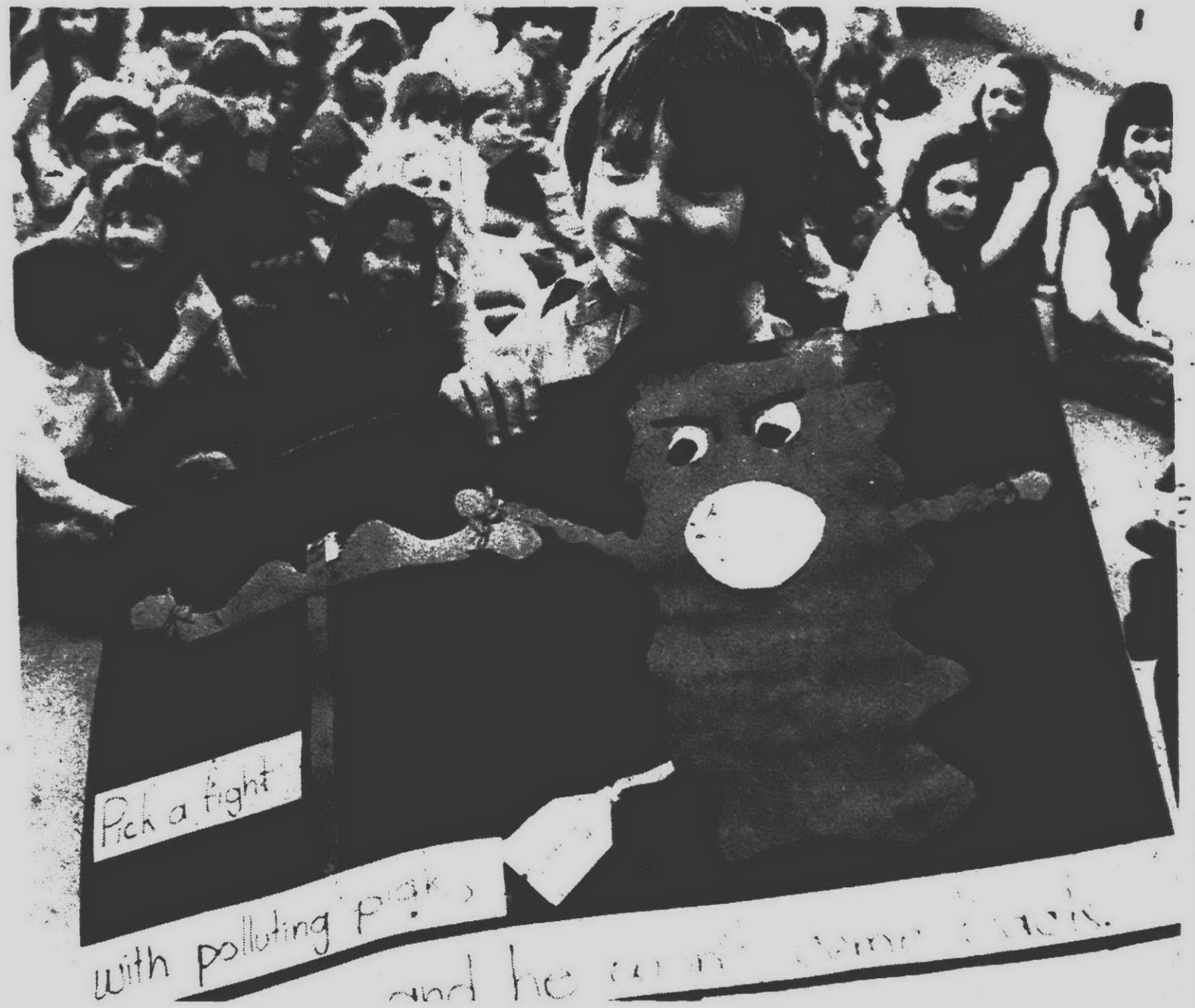
Doors are locked (but only after students give Joe a merry chase through the halls while he tries to lock up).

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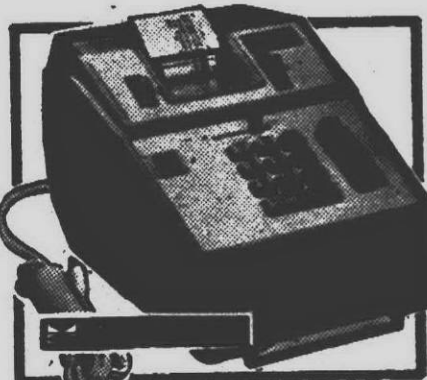
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Pursell isn't campaigning (yet) for state No. 2 spot

Although he's probably a front-runner, State Sen. Carl Pursell isn't planning to campaign for the Republican nomination for lieutenant governor.

"My plans are to run for the Senate again," said Pursell (R — Plymouth) who is in the last year of his first four-year term. "I think Gov. Milliken will announce his choice before the state convention."

For months it has been common knowledge that Lieut. Gov. James Brickley was less than happy in the post for which Milliken tapped him four years ago, and last week Brickley made it official that he won't seek a new term.

Under the Michigan constitution, lieutenant governor candidates are nominated by state conventions of the political parties. These occur following the August primary for governor, Congress and Legislature.

But in practice, the gubernatorial nominee picks his running mate and the convention gives it approval. That's what happened in 1970 when Milliken made his choice a month or more before the convention delegates met.

Pursell is a front-runner, but he is by no means the only possibility. State Sen. William Ballenger III of Lansing, one of the Jaycees' five outstanding young men in the state, is a

contender. Rep. Dennis Cawthorne of Manistee is another.

A new name in the last week has been Congressman Philip Ruppe of Houghton. Ruppe piles up big Republican majorities in an upper peninsula district that is nominally Democratic. He is known to be interested in a Senate race in 1976, when Democrat Philip Hart is due to retire. A race for lieutenant governor as Milliken's running mate, win or lose, would give Ruppe the kind of state exposure he needs for a fling at the Senate.

Pursell thinks he has advantages over the field, however, and he isn't shy about mentioning them matter-of-factly. He's the only potential running mate from the southeastern Michigan metropolitan area. He moved quickly into leadership positions in the Senate. He has friends in organized labor. He was a champion of public transportation long before the energy crisis made it fashionable. On the Senate appropriations com-

mittee, he has had a chance to make friends around the state.

He has championed metropolitan cooperation through such agencies as the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments in much the same way Brickley has. Pursell has also served on the Wayne County board as did Brickley when he was a Detroit councilman.

Pursell's 14th District as of the forthcoming election will include the Plymouth community, Livonia and Redford Township. Prior to that, it covered Livonia and Plymouth in Wayne County and Farmington, West Bloomfield and rural townships in Oakland County, so he has friends up that way. In fact, Pursell even carried West Bloomfield, the home town of George Kuhn, the incumbent he dislodged in the 1970 GOP primary.

As a politician, Pursell's strong point is getting officials at all levels — state, county and local — together for a cooperative venture.

"Things are moving quickly," said Pursell, noting that Milliken announced his intention of seeking reelection, met with congressional district leaders and heard Brickley bow out all within a couple of days.

"They're moving much quicker than anticipated," he said. He expects Milliken and his staff will accept a lot of input from party people in the coming days and weeks, then make a decision. He adds, with a gleam in his eye: "I'm honored I'm being considered."

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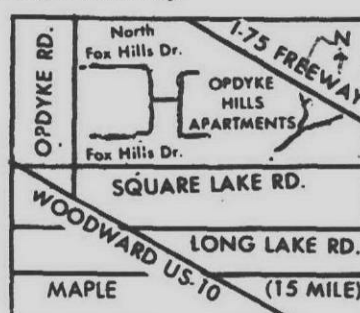
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Senior citizen center hearing is March 13

"I would like to see a comprehensive center with medical, nutritional, recreational, information, referral and legal services for seniors," says Taylor. He said the county is also looking into the possibility of state assistance.

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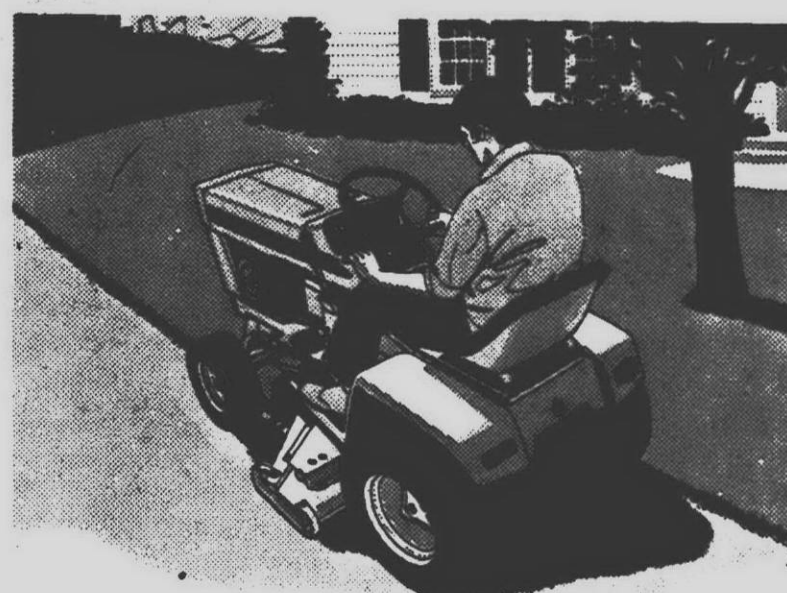
