Miller readies for year-round school

PLYMOUTH — The first year round school program in the history of the Plymouth district will officially get under way July 22.

On that Tuesday 188 students, kindergarten through fifth grade, known on the planning charts as "Track A", will start the "45 - 15" plan at Miller Elementary School.

On Tuesday, Aug. 6, "Track B's" 234 students, will start. "Track C" starts Aug. 27 and "Track D," Sept. 23.

Each track will attend school for 45 days and be off for 15, so by the time Track D starts school, Track A will be out for vacation. Three of the four tracks will be in school at any given time except for two weeks in July when the school is shut down.

DR. EARL HOGAN, assistant superintendent says: "I'm really impressed with the way parents and staff have worked together to bring this along."

Hogan says there were only 60 fam-

ilies who decided not to participate in the program and those children will be bused to a school with a traditional program.

There will be 825 students enrolled in Miller school and three fourths or 650 will be attending at one time. The building capacity is 672.

Hogan says the prediction is that the "45 - 15" plan will handle the continuing growth in the Miller district for this year and the next.

"It will be at capacity in 1977," Hogan says. "I want to make clear this is not going to take care of all the building needs in the district, but is going to help. Districtwide we will still have to continue to build."

He says the plan sharply reduces the possibility of overbuilding.

AS A PILOT program, the activities at Miller during the next year or two will provide valuable information for the district.

Administrators will be able to determine if there is a cost savings in the plan, if it is educationally more desirable, and if it changes attitudes of those involved.

"The research," Hogan says, "is the reason we didn't rush headlong into the plan."

All Miller teachers elected to go with the plan and Hogan says they are quite excited about it. They will be taking in - service training before the plan starts in July and at various times during the year.

Each teacher will stay with the same group for the year. Hogan says there is a possibility that eventually some teachers may want to work more than the regular school year.

He says it can be done, but that it would require changing classes more frequently. This would, of course, just like the present plan, have to be worked out with the Plymouth Education Association (teachers' union), because the school calendar is negotiable.

UNDER THE 45 - 15 plan, there will be the same number of school hours in the day and the same number of school days in the year, but the vacation schedule is vastly different.

In the development of the Miller program, Hogan is particularly pleased about several things. One is that in planning the tracks, it has been possible to keep neighborhoods together.

Also, because drivers are usually on the lookout for children crossing roads to go to school during the regular year, but drop their caution in the summer, the children who live closest to the school have been scheduled for mid - summer.

Hogan is pleased with the work of the Miller steering committee, and the way everyone concerned has worked to make the plan a success ever since year round school was established by a survey last year as the number one preference by the community.

LWV supports school millages

PLYMOUTH — The Northville - Plymouth chapter of the League of Women Voters has issued a consensus statement supporting the building bond issue, the operating millage renewal and the safety millage propositions which will be on the June 10 Plymouth schools ballot.

The LWV is a non-partisan organization and does not endorse candidates. However, it does take stands on governmental issues chosen for

study and action. The league's statement says:

"The League of Women Voters of the Northville-Plymouth area reaffirms strong support of bonding proposals for building programs in the Plymouth Community School District to provide adequate classroom space needed immediately for burgeoning enrollments.

"The league strongly supports the continuation of at least the present

levels of taxation in order to provide minimal education for all children living within the Plymouth Community School District. We recognize that we cannot afford to allow a sizable portion of the district's revenues to be dropped without serious damage to the educational program.

"The league urges the Plymouth school board to press for effective tax reform. To meet immediate and pressing needs, however, we recog-

nize that millage increases may be necessary.

"The League of Women Voters of the Northville-Plymouth area supports a school millage issue for special safety related expenses, given the deplorable safety conditions that currently exist in the district. We urge the school board to press Wayne County and local units of government to fulfill their responsibilities in the safety area."

Tests over, Joey's home

PLYMOUTH — Young Joe Crissey, victim of a crippling muscle disease, is back home in Plymouth and very glad to be there.

Since the first of May, nine year old Joe, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Crissey, has been a patient in St. Barnabas Hospital, New York City. Joe and his family went to New York for observation of the lad's condition and probable brain surgery.

Mrs. Crissey said that two separate teams of specialists who examined Joe could not agree on what type of

surgery would be most beneficial. Joe has been suffering from the painful and crippling disease for about three years.

Until a decision is made, Joe is on a new drug that hopefully will do for him what El Dopa has done for those afflicted with Parkinson's disease — relieve a good portion of the trauma and the devastating symptoms.

"It is not a cure," says Mrs. Crissey, "and both teams feel he will still need surgery. One team favors a cerebellum stimulator which is a

much more serious operation while the other favors the cryo surgery as originally suggested.

Over the next four or five months, under the supervision of doctors at the University of Michigan Hospital, the dosage of the new drug will be gradually increased to the maximum.

With this in mind, Mrs. Crissey says she doesn't really expect any further action on Joe's case will be planned before fall when the effect of the drug can be judged.

All local legislators vote for 'open meeting' bill

LANSING — The House of Representatives has passed an open meetings bill for local government, but the chief sponsor voted against his own bill.

Rep. Perry Bullard (D - Ann Arbor) charged House Bill 4938 was so badly amended that local governments will be allowed more leeway for secret meetings than under current laws. The bill passed 96 - 2 with only Bullard and Howard Wolpe (D - Kalamazoo) opposed.

All six representatives from western Wayne County districts supported the bill. Five of the six are former local government officials.

Rep. William Keith is a former Garden City school board member. John Bennett is a former Redford Township treasurer. R. Robert Geake is a former Schoolcraft College trustee. John Markes is a former Westland city councilman. Thomas Brown is a former Westland mayor. Only Raymond Smit of Ann Arbor, whose dis-

trict includes most of Plymouth, never held local office.

DENOUNCING the final version of the bill, Bullard said:

"The public is defrauded by a bill which allows so many secret meetings. Florida's open meetings law, 'The Sunshine Law,' prohibits all secret meetings. Michigan citizens are entitled to no less government in the sunshine than are Florida citizens.

"I voted no because secret meetings would be allowed for discussing of hiring personnel, purchase or disposition of real property, potential or pending litigation and collective bargaining.

"In addition, at an emergency meeting, matters concerning severe threats to health, welfare or safety of the citizenry could be discussed in secret.

"With respect to home rule city councils, this bill may allow more secrecy than is permitted at present. The home rule cities act (MCLA Sec. 117.3 (1) requires 'that all sessions of the legislative body... shall be public.'

"In November 1972 the Michigan Court of Appeals held (in a Flint case) that the home rule cities act, because it is more specific, takes precedence over the existing general state open meetings act."

Bullard concluded: "Because the bill deals specifically with city council meetings as well as other governing bodies, the secrecy exceptions in HB 4938 may allow more secrecy in city council meetings than is now permitted."

REP. MARKES (D - Westland) says the one amendment which allowed him to vote in favor of the bill was that which requires a two-thirds vote to call an executive session.

From 12 years experience as a Westland councilman, Markes says it is awkward to get that majority unless the issue really warrants it.

"That protection allowed me to vote for the bill. The two-thirds seems like a reasonable safeguard."

Markes admits the bill passed is a watered down version of the original. He points out that the sponsor did have the right to send it back to committee, "which he didn't do."

"He preferred to vote against it and stand alone when he could have reported it back," Markes says.

The Westland legislator says he is satisfied passage of the bill is the first step to open the door.

"If there are abuses, it will quickly become apparent. Markes predicts that within a year there will be legislation to strengthen the bill.

"I think we'll be looking at it again before long."

Schoolcraft instructor

Ms. Stein given year to study Irish prose

"Sometimes I think life is very short, and I'd like to just sell all my belongings and become a vagabond," says Joanne Stein, an English instructor at Schoolcraft College.

But instead, she has chosen to take a leave of absence at Schoolcraft to study and travel in Ireland.

Ms. Stein, 35, of Plymouth, was recently awarded a nine month fellowship by the National Endowment for the Humanities. She could've chosen any area of study, at any college or university in almost any country.

She chose to study Irish literature, poetry, prose and drama at University College in Dublin.

ASIDE FROM just wanting to learn more about Irish literature, Ms. Stein wants to learn about the Irish people and explore the Irish countryside.

The reason she chose Ireland, she says, stems from a week she spent there two years ago.

"The people are incredibly friendly and the country is so beautiful — it really inspired me."

Ms. Stein says she is also impressed by the number of writers born and raised there.

"It's such a small country to have produced so many writers. I want to find out what fosters such creativity there."

Tax returns are coming

Gov. William G. Milliken says acceleration of the processing of state income tax refunds should assure regular refunds will be processed during this July.

When computer difficulties caused a backlog in the processing, Milliken directed the treasury department, the department of management and budget, and the central data center to recommend action to reduce the backlog.

To speed the process the computer manufacturer brought in technicians to monitor the computer system 24 hours a day, seven days a week to assure adequate performance. The department of treasury doubled its processing staff. The treasury department has given income tax refunds top priority.

Refunds are being processed at the rate of 30,000 per day.

She says many Irish writers, such as George Bernard Shaw and W.B. Yeats, aren't recognized as Irish because "most are just absorbed into English literature."

Another reason she chose Ireland is because of her Irish "chauvinist" mother.

"I always used to tell her nothing good could come from Ireland."

MS. STEIN will be leaving for Ireland in October and hopes to rent a flat in Dublin.

The fellowship will provide \$1,250 per month for nine months to be used for tuition, room and board, etc.

Because she is taking a leave of absence at Schoolcraft, rather than a sabbatical, she will receive no pay.

She expects to attend one lecture per day, plus various seminars during her three terms there. She explains that more emphasis is placed on the students' own reading, rather than classroom work.

Her main interest is in the Irish Literary Revival which began before the turn of this century. This period includes the likes of J.M. Synge and W.B. Yeats. But she'll also study other periods in Irish literature and other Irish authors such as James Joyce. Joyce also attended University College in Dublin.

Ms. Stein is looking forward to traveling in Ireland, which she says she'll have at least three months to do.

"I'd like to spend a lot of time on the western coast, the Aran Islands, off the coast of Galway. It's a very rugged part of the country and that's where Synge got a lot of inspiration for his works."

She also hopes to attend many plays and concerts while in Dublin, which has some well-known theaters.

Ms. Stein admits she knows very little about Irish literature, which is another reason why she chose it.

"I enjoy learning. It opens up all kinds of new ideas and I keep learning for my own intellectual stimulation."

She says she has been a student for most of her teaching life and believes a good teacher has to be a good student.

"Getting a bachelor's or master's isn't the end of it."

IN PREPARATION for her study at University College, Ms. Stein will be taking Irish literature courses at the University of Michigan this summer.

She received a five - page prelimi-

nary reading list from University College, which lists books they prefer students to have read.

"That means I'll be doing a lot of reading this summer."

But she hopes to have some spare time for her other interests which includes contemporary glass art, opera, plants and photography.

Ms. Stein says she can't think of anything she'd rather do, professionally speaking, than teach. Her teaching experiences include five years in a high school, two years at Mercy College of Detroit, and seven years at Schoolcraft.

She has also been a student newspaper advisor, editor, writer and photographer of a college magazine and assistant director of public relations at Mercy College.

Her degrees include a bachelor's in English from Mercy College, a master's in journalism from Syracuse University and a master's in English language and literature from the University of Michigan.

Although born in New Jersey, she has lived in Michigan since age 12, and considers herself a native Michigander.

When Ms. Stein returns to Schoolcraft for the fall semester, 1975, she hopes to bring back a wealth of knowledge and experience from Ireland to share with her students.

For Ms. Stein, it appears being a vagabond will just have to wait a little longer.

Nature center staff ready

Two nature trails are open year around for self-guided hikes along the trails. Guide books are available free at the nature center and park office.

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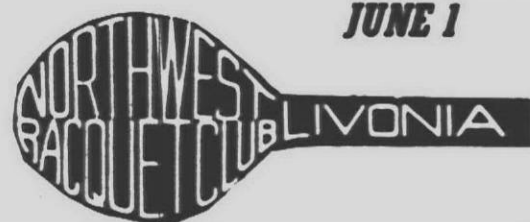

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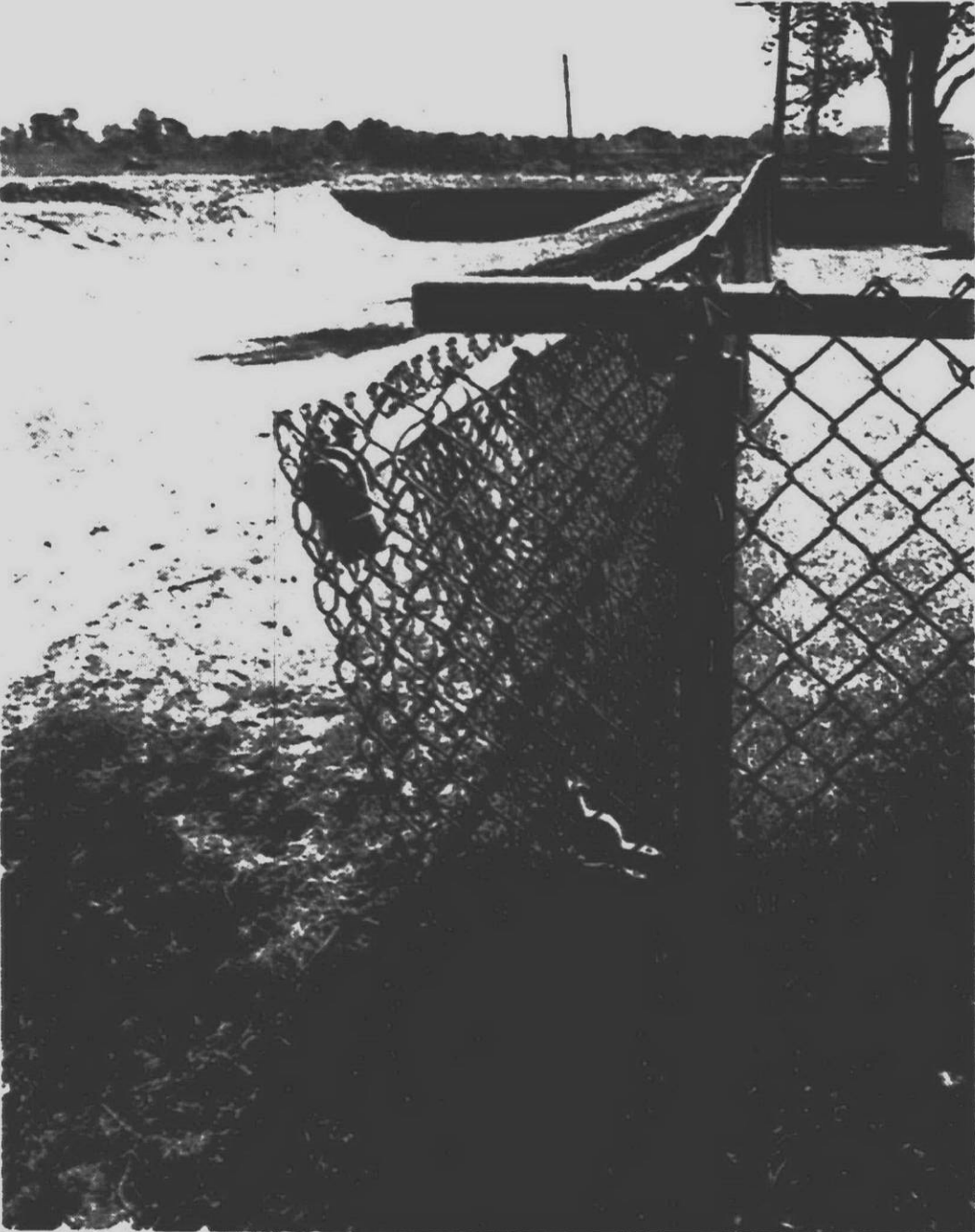
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Parents criticize Truesdell School conditions

CANTON — "They make you feel that it will take the death of a child before anything is done."

The speaker was Clara Nomecos, angry president of the Mothers' Club of Truesdell School in Canton Township.

She was standing beside a wide drainage ditch which is located about 25 feet from the front of the school. Her son, John, and 111 other kindergartners attend the school.

While the children of this two-room kindergarten school at Haggerty near Cherry Hill are blocked from approaching the ditch by a fence around their rear playground area, nothing stands between them and the water in front of the school.

"A child can drown in very little water," said Mrs. Nomecos. "The children are let off and picked up by the bus in the front of the school. It would be very easy for one of them to slip down there and meet disaster."

"THAT DITCH HAS no more than 10 inches of water at the present time," contended Donald Rank, principal of Truesdell. "It used to be much higher, but I called the Wayne County Drain Commission and had that fixed."

He added: "I can't turn the water off."

Rank said he was confident that the teachers watch the children carefully to keep them from the ditch. He explained, "I can't be out there every five minutes. I have another school to take care of."

Employed by the Plymouth school district for 29 years, Rank is also principal of Reer School on W. Ann Arbor Road in Superior Township. He will be retiring this year.

The ditch was by no means the only problem Mrs. Nomecos raised about her son's first school. Grievances burst from her like rifle bullets.

The wooden snow fence, part of the protection against a child reaching the drainage ditch, was in flimsy condition with slats missing or broken, she said.

There is no blacktop area for the children to use in developing muscle coordination bouncing balls, skipping and jumping, said Mrs. Aileen Brandenburg, another irate mother. She used the words "mud swamp" to describe the play area in the rear of the school.

"The path leading to this area is so muddy that rubber mats have to be set down," she said. "The holes made by children coming down the slides are usually ankle deep in mud."

"THIS IS THE FIRST day the children have been able to use the swings," Mrs. Brandenburg maintained.

The small parking area in the front of the school was further cause for complaint, the mothers noted. It does not have enough room for the teachers' cars, for the school bus and for the cars of parents who wish to drop off their children.

"If the parents let their kids ride the bus as they are supposed to do,

there wouldn't be this problem," countered Rank.

The mothers also found fault with a huge mound of dirt which occupies the school owned property behind the school. A present to the school district from the company which dug the drainage ditch, it occupies land once used as a play area for the school children, Mrs. Brandenburg said.

Mrs. Nomecos also observed that school garbage sitting in plastic bags outside the school is not picked up regularly.

"Somebody has got to know that Truesdell School is here," said Mrs. Brandenburg. "When the people living in those expensive houses being built in this area go to school to register their children, they are going to be in for a shock."

But the catalog of problems was only half finished. Inside were more.

The boys bathroom that day was awash. It proved to be the result of a collapsed septic tank and caused the school to close for half a day.

"The septic tank in the front yard was broken by trucks bringing in dirt ordered by the mothers' club," said Rank. "It was fixed as soon as possible."

This accident was confirmed by Mrs. Nomecos, who said that the club had planned to haul in sand by wheelbarrows for the new sandbox built by the parents. The truck drivers insisted they could drive across the yard and only yielded in this contention after three of their trucks became stuck and one of them broke the tile of the septic tank.

Inside, Mrs. Brandenburg pointed to two brackets which had pulled from the ceiling. They had been used to hold up a water pipe which was now sagging.

"MUCH OF THE CLASS area is carpeted and has not been cleaned for three years," said Mrs. Brandenburg. "The vacuum cleaner is in a constant state of disrepair with the result that the rooms go several days without a vacuuming."

Mrs. Nomecos said that "the room capacity is too small for this number of students, according to state regulations asking for so many square feet per child."

Cleaning chemicals and oily rags are stored close to the furnace; class-

rooms and bathrooms, unlike most bright, colorful kindergarten facilities, are drab and unattractive, the mothers said.

"I have personally moved things that were flammable away from the furnace to a safe position," said Rank.

A further claim of Mrs. Brandenburg's was that the school furniture was "cast-offs from other schools and had been in the system for 20 years."

"I think the school looks like an outhouse on Belle Isle," said Mrs. Rosemary Zimba.

"I wish I had said that," added Mrs. Brandenburg.

She was of the opinion that "nobody seems to have heard of Truesdell School. No one even knows where it is."

To remedy this situation, the embattled mothers converged on the members of the Plymouth school board at its recent meeting, May 13.

Mrs. Nomecos spoke to the problem and the group left their long list of grievances.

Following this appearance, one problem was cleared up at the school, namely the odor of urine wafting from the boys rest room. Screens were placed on its windows so they could be opened to bring in fresh air without also bringing in insects.

For a time the cleaning rags and flammable material were moved away from the furnace, but members of the mothers' club reported that a few days later they were back.

"We had a real nasty deal at the board meeting and I have been on the pan ever since," said Rank. "But when you're principal, you're used to being on the pan."

HE ADDED: "I didn't know about all this ahead of time. The mothers went over my head. This burns me no end. I may sound cynical but I think if there are problems about the school they should come to me first. But nobody tells me nothing."

Ray Hoedel, assistant superintendent of business for the district, is preparing a report on the gripes of the mothers and will present it to school board members.

"Many of these concerns we did not know about," he said. "Had we known, we could have taken care of most of them right away."

He added: "It is our policy to maintain our schools in a clean, orderly manner so they can have a good atmosphere for education. We are as concerned with this as the parents."

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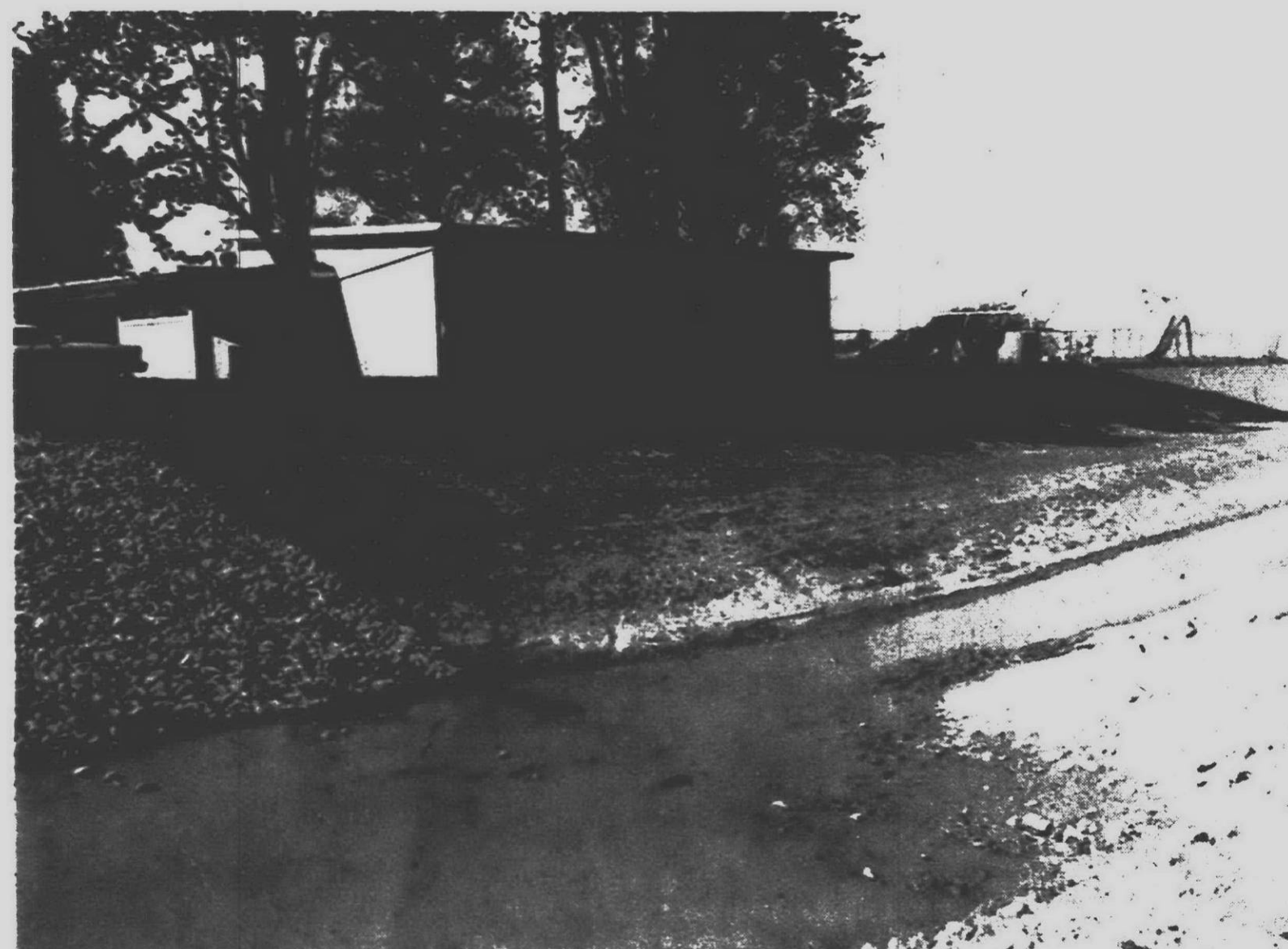
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ONLY 25-30 FEET separates the Truesdell School in Canton Township from the water of this drainage ditch. Angry parents want a

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Schools hear MACLD gripes, recommendations

PLYMOUTH — Emphasizing that a learning disabilities program is "not just a reading program," a group of concerned parents pressed the Board of Education for changes in the fall curriculum they feel will help correct an area that "has been too long ignored."

Recommendations for the changes came from the Plymouth - Northville chapter of the Michigan Association for Children with Learning Disabilities (MACLD) and may help the board chart a new learning disabilities program to comply with state standards.

The group made its recommendations in a study session attended by the school board members, administrators and at least 50 other persons, including several school board candidates.

But in making public their concerns, the parent group also said: "We want the community to know and understand that while we have serious concerns that prompted this presentation to the board, we wholeheartedly endorse the millage proposal and intend to work toward its passage."

After the presentation, Trustee Gary Mirto announced that at the next board meeting (Tuesday, May 28), he would ask for an evaluation from the administration to determine if the district has fallen short of meeting requirements set forth by the recently enacted Public Act 198.

That legislation, passed last October, makes it mandatory for school districts to provide special education programs and services to all students, including those with learning disabilities.

Children with learning disabilities (LD) are but a small portion covered by the special education act, noted Mrs. Frances King, parent advisor of the Oakland County chapter of MACLD, who was one of the speakers. More familiar groups are the mentally and emotionally impaired, speech and hearing impaired, vision, crippled and health impaired.

A profile of the Plymouth School District, prepared by Dr. Henry Gottwald, of Eastern Michigan University, showed that while most of the special areas receive some kind of service, LD students do not.

He estimated that 5.5 per cent -- or 683 students -- of Plymouth's school population will be found to have a learning disability and that .5 per cent will have a severe problem.

The presentation follows a recent citation by the State Board of Education charging the Plymouth school district with failure to comply with new state standards in the learning disabilities area. No specific charges were spelled out, however -- a fact that continues to baffle school administrators.

Plymouth was one of five communities cited. Others were Detroit, Dearborn, Dearborn Heights and South Redford. The complaint stems from a protest by Plymouth parents filed with the much larger Parents Advisory Committee of the Wayne County Intermediate School District.

The committee's chairman, James Eubank, of Detroit, calls the five citations "a test case."

As a result of the complaint, the special education department of the intermediate school district was directed to visit the Plymouth district and review plans the district has made to comply with the new public act in relation to the 1974-75 school years.

The "visitation" was completed and some recommendations may be forthcoming in the next few weeks, according to James Griner, Wayne County Intermediate School District's director of special education, whose office conducted the interviews.

He said the Plymouth staff -- both teachers and administrators -- were "forthright and direct" in answering the questions regarding the program for next year.

"In what way are we deficient?" asked Mirto of the MACLD parents.

He asked for "specifics" on the charges that prompted the state board to intervene.

While the MACLD parents did not answer his question directly, they did outline some recommendations for consideration that may help shed some light on what the parents feel are shortcomings in the LD program.

Mirto's suggestion for an administration survey coincided with the recommendation of the parents also calling for a "district-wide self-study to determine the most appropriate steps for this district."

In making suggestions on how to implement the LD program, the parents group said it had "some reservations" about the proposed plan that would convert remedial teachers into LD teachers.

"We would like an opportunity to share these concerns with those making the plans for next year," the group asked.

Other recommendations are:

- Special consultants for learning disabilities should be hired for each of the schools to help the classroom teacher in working with the LD child.

- In-service teaching should be offered to the regular classroom teachers so they may recognize and help an LD child.

- Special gym classes for the improvement of the perceptual motor skills should be organized.

- Self-contained learning disabilities classrooms should be formed for those children who need it.

- Volunteer programs, such as the Bucket Brigade, should be instituted

district-wide in the elementary schools kindergarten through third grade for those who may not receive special education services. (Here, the group added: "We would be more than happy to assist you.")

- Expanded testing and detection programs are needed to find the LD child (as required in the state plan).

- Programs such as reading which already exist must not be eliminated. LD programs should be in addition to the overall curriculum because an LD program is not just a reading program.

It was noted in the presentation that "counselors and remedial reading teachers are not considered special education personnel."

Generally praising the presentation, board members asked Dr. Gottwald, head of EMU's special education department, for some examples of neighboring school districts that had good LD programs.

Admitting that it is hard to narrow the choice, Dr. Gottwald added: "I'd pick Wayne-Westland, for instance."

Mrs. King offered the Oakland County Perceptual Development Plan, piloted in 1962-63, as a model.

How coach helped learning disabled sports-loving boy

PLYMOUTH -- Monday night's study session on the Plymouth School District's learning disabilities program was a trifle emotional as well as very enlightening.

Probably one of the most stirring incidents involved the son of one of the speakers.

She told of her son who has a learning disabilities problem but who loves sports.

She said her son "has tried out for football and baseball and has always gotten on the team."

"However, he never seems to get off the bench. If he is lucky, he may get to play a few minutes once or twice during the season. I realize that

not everyone can be good in sports so I am not condemning the coach.

"This year he tried out for the swimming team. I would love to pin a medal on his coach for he did more good in one season than any teacher in all the years my son has been in school."

"My son finished last in almost every race he swam, but his coach always had a pat on his back and praise that would have made you think he won first place."

"At the end of the season he brought home a trophy with his name on it and the trophy said: 'Gut Award.'"

Isolationism blindness squeezes Youth Inc.

At yesterday's Memorial Day activities, Plymouth Township Supervisor J. D. McLaren appeared on the podium with City of Plymouth Mayor Beverly McAninch.

The two also exchanged pleasantries at last Wednesday's luncheon hosted by Burroughs Corp. They even posed for a picture together with Burroughs Chairman Ray Macdonald.

Possibly that doesn't sound very startling — but in one respect it is.

McLaren had at first declined to appear with Mrs. McAninch — or anyone else from the city — because, he said, he was personally very upset at the city's filing annexation petitions only a few minutes after the polls had opened in the consolidation election.

But he changed his mind and resolved that two wrongs don't make a right.

ALTHOUGH Plymouth Township officials have described the city's annexation move timing as "Pearl Harbor" and although some city officials were disturbed that some township officials quietly — but actively — campaigned against consolidation, we must all realize that the relationship built over the years between the two governments cannot be severed.

McLaren realizes it, Mrs. McAninch realizes it, City Manager Fred Yockey realizes it, and so must everyone else.

Certainly the city commission exercised bad judgment in its headlong rush to be first in line were consolidation defeated, but while that cannot and will not be ever totally forgiven nor forgotten, we must carry on.

Cooperation between the two governments is absolutely necessary to provide many of the services needed by residents in both units.

Even though the township — or at least McLaren — has resolved to do so, the city commission is still playing war games with its surrounding community.

JUST AS ALSACE - Lorraine took it in the ear when France and Germany were mixing it up in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, Youth Inc. seems to have been caught in the anti-township squeeze from the city.

Using all sorts of excuses such as legalities and a rumored but publicly

unmentioned "undercover" investigation by one eager-beaver city commissioner, the city commission cut its support of the youth agency in half because it felt the township should pay a matching share.

The feeblest excuse given by the commissioners who trimmed the organization's budget request (Battermann, Bida, Cummings and Sincock) was that there's only so much money in the budget and the city can't be giving out money to everybody. Poppycock.

The same commission just hiked the city's millage rate to pay for eight per cent raises for city employees, and it has found money in the budget to carpet the city manager's suite, install sprinkler systems around city hall and the library and a host of other items which are hardly as necessary to the city's residents as Youth Inc.

Possibly the Youth Inc. people can be blamed for not having drawn up a proposed contract (as Our House Crisis Center did), but if the commission were really dedicated to this town's youths, it could have taken that initiative.

The \$8,000 requested by Youth Inc. (which is the amount the city has annually given since the organization started) amounts to only four-tenths of one per cent of the city's \$1,860,465 budget.

There is hardly a better bargain to be found for the city.

IT IS TRUE that Youth Inc. officials have said from the start they'd try to make the organization self-sufficient. That's probably unrealistic because there are only so many car washes you can hold in a year.

The types of programs offered by the youth agency are the areas we look toward local governments to provide.

Because of its isolationist attitude, the city — particularly Messrs. Battermann, Bida, Cummings and Sincock — has made Youth Inc. into a pawn.

If J. D. McLaren can swallow a little pride to continue good relationships with the city, the commission ought to be able to see the parallel.

Certainly Plymouth Township should consider sharing in Youth Inc.'s funtling more than it has. After all, the library is funded by the total community based on its use by the residents, the township agreed to fund the recreation authority based on population, and there are lots of township residents who benefit by Youth Inc.

But that doesn't mean the city should be niggardly about its responsibilities.

Possibly the commissioners who fought for Youth Inc. — Harold Guenther, John Moehle and Mayor Beverly McAninch — can get their colleagues to reconsider and cough up the other \$4,000.

Memorial Day memory

Another Memorial Day has passed into history and while it may have left some fond memories for a lot of folks, none will surpass the Stroller's recollection of "Decoration Day" in the long ago when his maternal grandfather was both the hero and the goat of the annual exercises in the old cemetery on top of the hill in the old home town.

Nothing delighted him more than to walk, gimpy leg and all, in the parade and then take part in the solemn exercises on the steps of the little chapel next to the soldiers' plot.

Well, on this day in the long ago, the old gent had a special reason for feeling gay. During the year his fellow veterans had named him commander of the GAR Post and he was prouder of that honor than anything else that ever came his way.

On this particular day the sun was up real early and its bright beams cast a sort of golden glow on the entire parade route and the lane going up to the cemetery.

THE OLD GENT kept looking and hoping — hoping that the weather wouldn't change and mar the greatest opportunity of the year for him.

Finally, he started for the area

where the veterans were lining up for the parade. His well cleaned fedora hat (the official headdress of the Civil War), at just the right angle. He looked great as the family extended best wishes to him for a great day.

A few hours later, as the strains of the martial music rent the air, we all watched the parade with our eyes set for a good look at "Grampy."

In due time the parade came along the area we had selected to view the procession and what a sight it was to watch the old gent glory in the applause as he recognized friends along the way.

DURING THE STOP on the bridge to drop flowers into the river as the traditional tribute to the memory of the sailors who had made the su-



preme sacrifice. "Grampy" did an outstanding job. We were all so proud of him.

Then it was up the hill to the cemetery, where he was to take the spotlight as the commander and strut his stuff. The hour he had waited an entire year for, finally had arrived.

No commander ever did a better job of handling the assignment and paying tribute to those comrades who had fallen in "Lincoln's Army."

He spoke real well, interspersing his remarks with some of the memories he had of those who had fallen. Many in the gathering told our mother that it was the best Memorial Day they ever had enjoyed.

THE EXERCISES were just coming to a close when the skies suddenly darkened to herald an approaching storm. There were a few anxious moments as the rains came.

But the real shock came with the bolt of lightning that struck the old soldiers' statue in front of the chapel. It was the first monument erected to the Civil War veterans in the country. "Grampy" always was proud to show you his name carved in the granite. It was the 14th name down on the outside row.

And where do you suppose the lightning struck?

Right across the old gent's name. When he saw what happened the dark clouds faded and the air became blue with his favorite expressions when he gave vent to his feelings.

To his dying day, he'd always recall the day the lightning ripped his name on the statue — just at his greatest moment.

It truly was a Memorial Day to remember.

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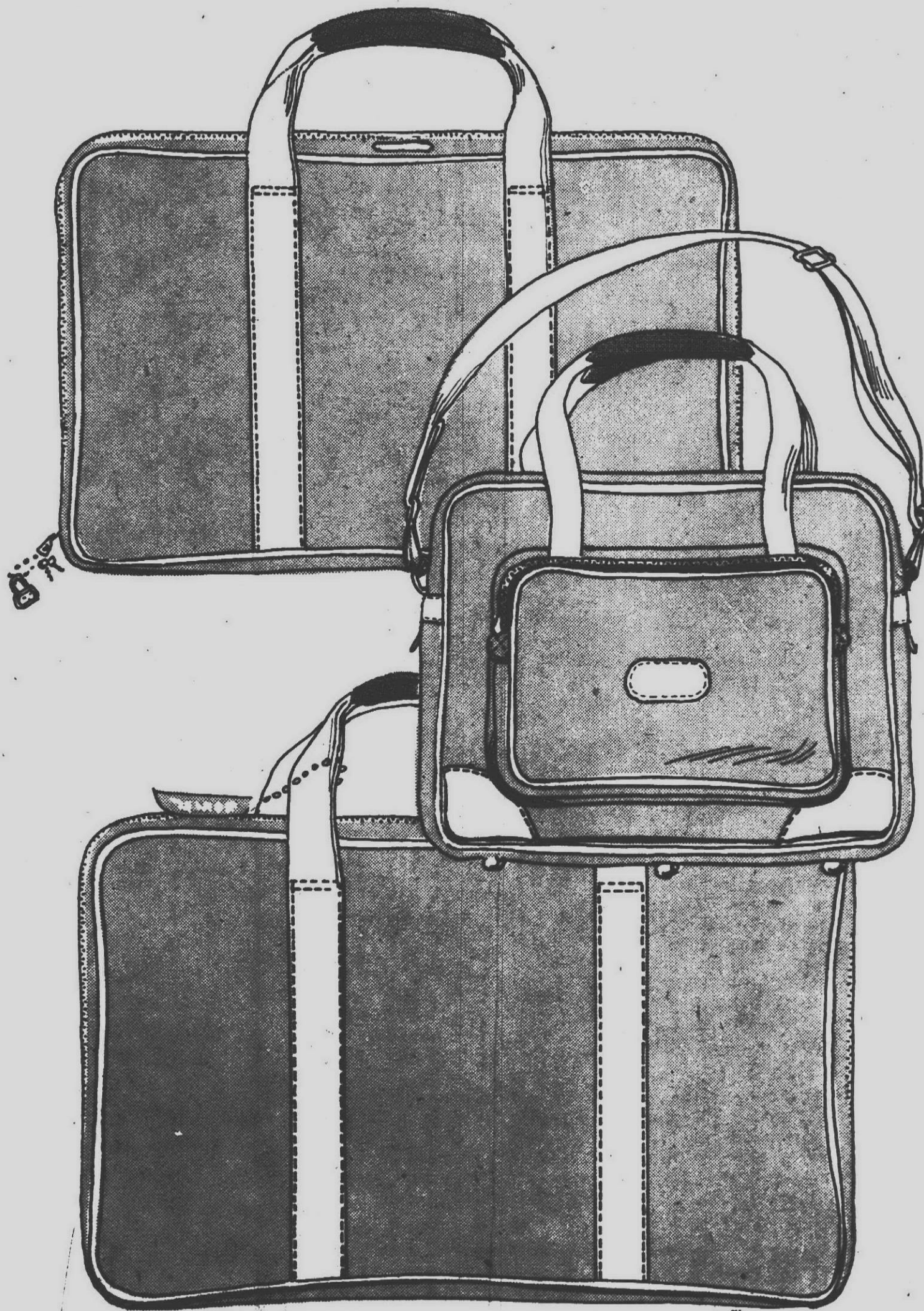

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Lest we forget — vet posts remember

Men who went off to war, never to return, live on in memory in these suburbs because of veteran organization posts that bear their names.

Edward J. Bova. Don Merrifield. Don Sherman Hubert. Myron H. Beals. Charles Kehrar. Al Harris. Donald Passage. Peter Gayde. Patrick Joseph Connors.

All are names you see frequently if you drive past Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion posts, or if you read the newspaper announcements of the doings of veteran groups and their auxiliaries.

And all belong to men who lived in this area and knew it well. Most have families still here. They fought for their country in wars ranging in time from World War I to Vietnam. Most died in action.

EDWARD J. BOVA was just 19 and a paratrooper in the U.S. Army Airborne when he died Feb. 6, 1968, in Vietnam.

"It was a terrible war," said his mother, Mrs. Patricia Bova, "but he was so proud to have made the Army Airborne and we were so proud of him."

R. Edward Bova, the paratrooper's father, was an early member of VFW Post 6906 when it was established in the new city of Westland in September 1967, and young Eddie joined when he went overseas.

"He was the first from the post to die in service overseas," said his mother, and that's why the name of the post, in March of 1968, became the Edward J. Bova post.

Eddie attended the Hall of Divine Child preparatory school in Monroe and Cabrini High in Allen Park. He was in the Army only eight months before he died.

His parents, who live in Wayne, continue as active members of the post and auxiliary. The post, located at first in the basement of a bar, now has a store-front headquarters at 35420 Ford, Westland, and property at Warren and Hix roads for future building.

A lot of the auxiliary activities are fund-raisers aimed at increasing the building fund, but Mrs. Bova said the

ladies also make cancer pads regularly and give parties in veterans' hospitals as well as supporting the national VFW organization in aiding Indian groups.

"We would like to see more people remember servicemen on Memorial Day instead of just taking a holiday," she said.

"Eddie was our only child, so we are pleased that they decided to name the post for him. Otherwise, his life might soon be forgotten."

DONALD MERRIFIELD was a Garden City boy who enlisted in the Army in World War II even before he was 18. He died in the Battle of the Bulge near the end of the war.

"We never knew the details," said his mother, Mrs. Gladys Merrifield, now widowed and still living in Garden City.

"He had been overseas just six weeks, not even long enough for us to get a letter from him, though he wrote every day and all letters reached us after we had heard he was dead."

"The last time he was home we thought he couldn't be shipped out because he was still 18. But then that policy was changed, and the next thing he called us and said he was going to Europe. He tried to get another home leave but couldn't."

"I'm just as glad. It would have been harder on him and on us if we had known the last time we saw him that he was being shipped out."

Because Merrifield was the youngest Garden City boy to die in World War II, his name was chosen by VFW Post 7575, located at 33011 Ford. His mother remains an active member of the auxiliary.

DON SHERMAN HUBERT was one of two brothers who left a family farm on Graham Road in Redford Township when their country entered World War I and needed soldiers.

"One came back and the other didn't," said Delbert Sprankle, a member of VFW Post 345, located at 25245 W. Seven Mile in Redford Township.

Don Hubert was killed in France, the first resident of his community to die in that conflict, so it was his name chosen by the post that had been organized since the early 1930s.

"He's buried in Grandlawn Cemetery," Sprankle said, "so that's where we hold our annual memorial services. Last Sunday about 10 or 15 members of his family were there to attend."

MYRON H. BEALS was a Plymouth Marine who was mortally wounded in the World War I Battle of Chateau Thiery, died two weeks later in a Paris Hospital, and has given his name to Livonia American Legion Post 32.

The contradiction has to do with the fact that the post, at 9318 Newburgh, is located on land that used to be part of Plymouth and later was annexed by Livonia.

Beals graduated from Plymouth High School in 1915 and worked in the office of the Daisy Manufacturing Co. before enlisting in the Marines.

A member of the Second Division, he embarked from Philadelphia aboard the USS von Steuben and held the rank of sergeant when he was killed.

Beals was buried with military honors in Sursene, France, and later his body was returned to Plymouth and buried in the Plymouth cemetery.

His mother, Mrs. Mariah Beals, became the first president of the Legion post's auxiliary. The first flags used by the post were donated by the Daisy company in memory of Beals.

CHARLES KEHRAR AND AL HARRIS are the World War I veterans for whom the Veterans of Foreign Wars post at 1055 S. Wayne, Westland, is named.

"They were the oldest and the youngest members of the group that organized the post," said Mrs. Gladys Kehrar, who now makes her home in Wayne and was a charter member of the post auxiliary.

Kehrar was a member of the famed Polar Bear division that fought in Russia, Belgium and France during World War I.

A native of Detroit, he was drafted in 1918. When he came home, he married the girl who was working for his mother, and they moved out to the area then known as Nankin Township.

His heart had been weakened by the hardships of foxhole fighting, Mrs. Kehrar said, and he died in 1935, "leaving me with seven little children."

The sons and daughters all live in this area and his widow, now a great-grandmother and recently in poor health, is planning soon to be reactivated in membership in the post auxiliary.

DONALD PASSAGE AND PETER GAYDE are honored in the name of Plymouth's American Legion Post 391, 888 N. Sheldon.

Passage, a soldier, and Gayde, a sailor, were selected because they were the first Plymouth residents in their respective services to die in World War II.

Both attended Plymouth High School, but that was one of the few things about their lives that was a common denominator.

Passage, son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenmore C. Passage, was a young draftee who was sent overseas to take part in the invasion of North Africa.

One of the first to hit the beach just outside Casablanca in on Nov. 8, 1942, his 24th birthday, he was fatally wounded in that action. He was awarded posthumously the Distinguished Service Cross and the Purple Heart.

Gayde, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Gayde, enlisted in the Navy in 1924 and had seen several tours of duty when he met death in 1942.

He was serving aboard the Merchant Marine ship Atik, converted into a naval vessel, and was on a patrol off the coast of Virginia March 26.

The ship was torpedoed by a German submarine and all aboard were lost. Gayde was posthumously awarded the Purple Heart.

He left a wife, Bernice, and a son and daughter.

PATRICK JOSEPH CONNORS, a Marine killed in Vietnam Aug. 30, was chosen by the four-year-old VFW post 4034, located at 29475 Six Mile, Livonia.

He is believed to have been the first Livonia serviceman to give his life in the Vietnam conflict. A native of Detroit, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Edward Connors, who moved to Livonia after he graduated from Mackenzie High School.

Patrick, 21 when he died, studied two years at Michigan State University and was married just before going overseas.

LWV is asked to consider gun control as study project

"Seventy per cent of the homicides in Michigan were caused by people who knew each other," stated Mary Koch, a member of the Detroit League of Women Voters, in a speech before the LWV State Council in Mercy Center, Farmington. "Michigan has the biggest homicide rate of any northern state," she continued, "and 55 per cent of Michigan homicides are caused by hand guns." In an effort to urge league delegates to accept gun control as a study item for all Michigan leagues during the coming year, Mrs. Koch claimed that a pistol is 20 times more likely to cause death than a rifle or a shot gun. "Because of the size of the pistol it is easily concealed," she said, "therefore, it becomes conveniently available for angry family members or friends, curious children, untrained users and frightened citizens."

She added, "So as soon as someone is shot, the one who fired is a criminal even though the fit of anger or

anxious fear passed quickly. The trouble with present legislation is that it deals with the problem AFTER someone is shot."

Mrs. Koch referred to a statement by Professor Franklin E. Zimring of the University of Chicago.

"The handgun...accounts for about one - fourth of the privately owned firearms in the country, but is involved in three - fourths of all gun killings," the statement said.

She also referred her listeners to a study on gun control legislation prepared by Rhode Island league which pointed out that America now purchases between one and two million pistols or revolvers each year.

The study stated that the national Gun Control Act of 1968 passed following the assassinations of Rev. Martin Luther King and Robert Kennedy left vital gaps in effective gun control.

It did not stop importation of handgun components when it banned importation of cheap concealable handguns. Five U.S. importers quickly became manufacturers.

"They ordered huge quantities of foreign - made components, added them to frames made in U. S. and turned out 19 variations of cheap concealable handguns," the report stated.

The Rhode Island league report included statistics of the National Commission on Causes and Prevention of Violence which claimed that handguns were used in 74 per cent of all gun homicides, 86 per cent of all aggravated assaults with guns and 86 of all armed robberies with guns.

As far as world percentages of handguns per 1,000 people are concerned, the report stated that it was 135 in U.S., 30 in Canada and less than five in Great Britain and Switzerland.

The responses to the problems of handgun made by the National Rifle Association included the 30 per cent of the citizens involved in the fatal alterations between friends and relatives.

The association calls for mandatory extra penalties for crimes committed with deadly weapons. It asks revocation of parole or bail for any criminal caught with a deadly weapon.

It suggests that the bail system be strengthened to keep habitually violent criminals from roaming freely on nominal bail. It supports existing laws prohibiting ownership or possession of firearms by convicted felons, adjudicated drug addicts or drunkards, fugitives, and mental incompetents.

New laws to prohibit plea bargaining have also been suggested by the association so that criminals convicted of violent crimes cannot plead guilty to lesser offenses and receive lighter sentences.

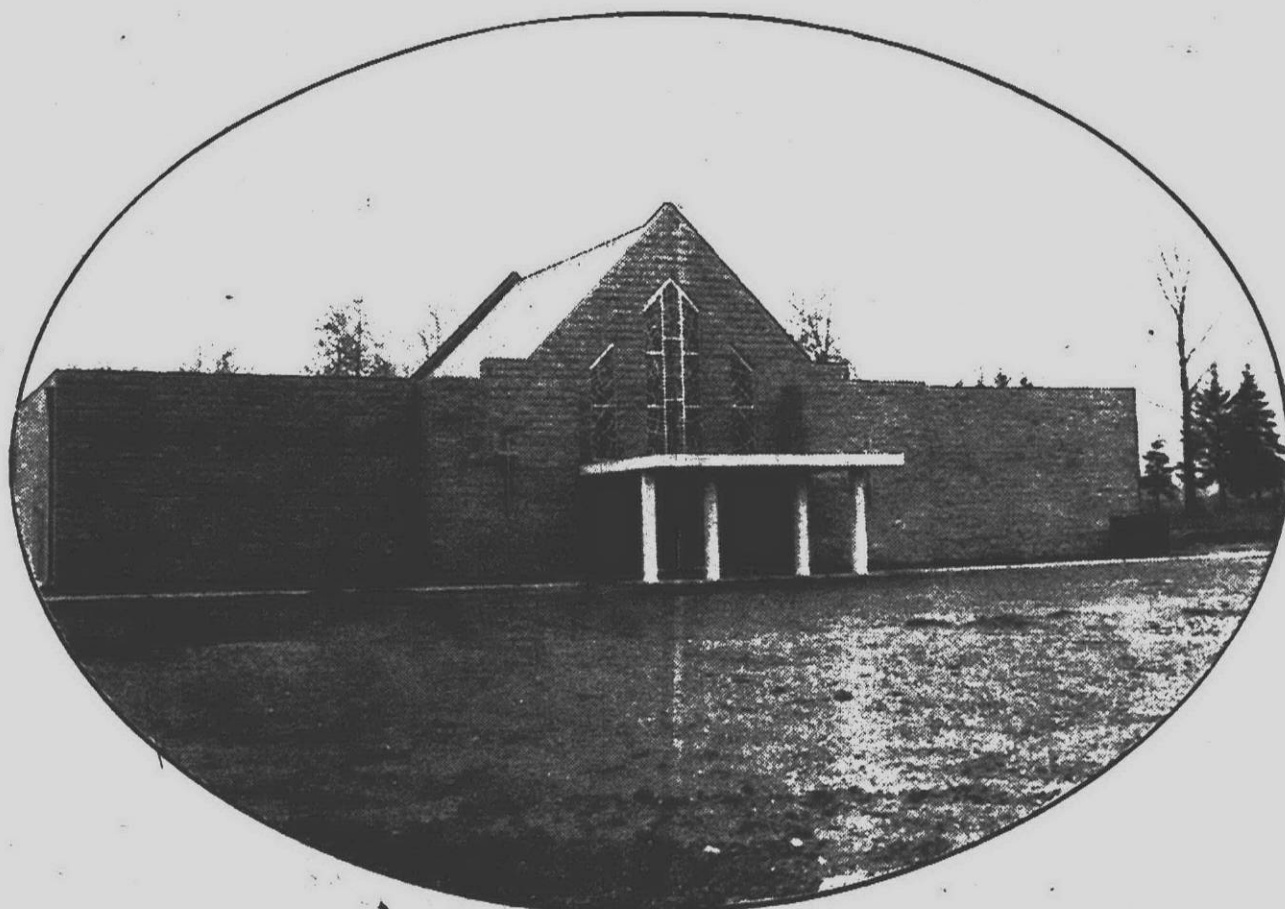

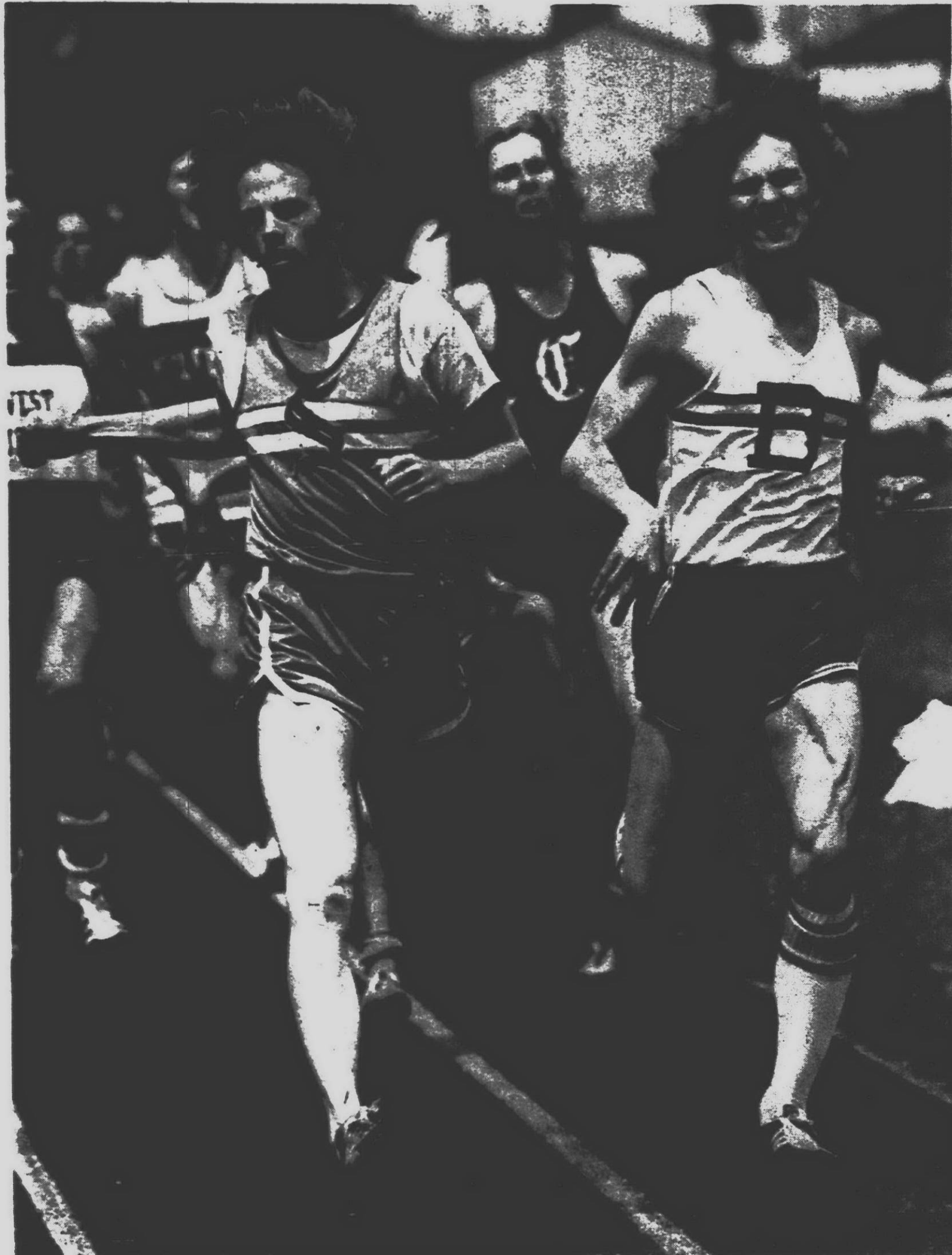

Stevenson half-miler gunning for state title

When Stevenson half-miler Ken Brown set a new school record in the 880 recently in the Shaefer Relays at Southgate he didn't win the race, but his 1:56.5 clocking is the best in the Observer & Eccentric area this year.

"I was just dragged along," he said. "I couldn't have done it on my own."

Maybe last year he couldn't, his best time was a pedestrian 2:02.3, but that was before the Spartan junior went out for cross-country.

"I cajoled him into it," said his coach, Paul Holmberg.

Now he has one of the top times in the state and a good shot at the state championship. Ken is passionate about his running. "I have to do well

in the state meet or I'll choke," he said.

When he went out for cross-country last fall, the 5-10 amateur photographer weighed 147 pounds. When the season ended he'd lost 22 pounds and gained immeasurable endurance.

"It's a crappy sport," he said, "but it's great."

Even in track season, when he may

run 20 440 intervals in a single workout, he still tries to find time for over-distance roadwork.

"I do it to keep relaxed. If you don't stay relaxed, you die," he said.

That's not Ken's whole formula for beating tension during a meet. "Sit-ups keep you from getting gut aches," he said.

According to Ken, Holmberg still holds the state class B record in the 440. That's all the persuasion he needs.

"If he runs 48.8 I'll do sit-ups," Ken said.

Ken's pre-race diet rejects the old custom of consuming beef protein before a race. "I don't eat any meat," he said. "I told my mom not to pack any meat loaf sandwiches." He prefers peanut butter and jelly.

Right now he hopes to study den-

istry at the University of Michigan, but so far he hasn't heard anything about scholarships there. "I just get letters from dinky little colleges," he said.

As a middle distance man, Ken divides his practice sessions about equally between running with the sprinters and distance men on Stevenson's squad.

When he runs a distance workout he trains with Steve White, Stevenson's ace mile, whose time of 4:17.9 is the fastest around over that distance. "They're invaluable to each other," Holmberg said.

His parents come to his meets whenever they can, but Ken survives and even flourishes without the inspiration of a steady girl friend. "I don't want to get married young," he said.

In addition to running the 880, Ken also competes in the 440, where he has clocked a 50.3 this year, and anchors Stevenson's mile relay team. He can't afford to burn out all his energy on the half when he has to come back strong for the other races.

"If I'm winning by a lot I take it easy to save myself for later," he said. He hopes to reach 1:55 in the 880 yet this year, and plans to eventually break 1:50.

"We want him to give it all in the half, and if he comes through in the 440 that's gravy," Holmberg said.

"If we ever had the luxury of a meet where he could run just the half or 440 he could get a better time in either," the coach concluded. "There isn't anybody in the state right now who's out of his class."

Smith farm Shangri-la for plant lovers

The land of eternal spring is not far away. Anyone can get there by driving along Newburgh to the Clyde Smith farm south of Joy Road.

Rain or wind or cloudy skies, spring is inside the big glass roof building — the color, the warmth, the fragrance, it's all there.

Including the main building there are 15 greenhouses filled with plants to please the crowds of dedicated green thumbs who will, before the planting season passes, buy most of the 100,000 geraniums and the more than 5,000 flats of tomato plants.

THE MAIN building is a veritable supermarket of growing things. The rows and rows of flowers in full bloom, begonias, geraniums, many varieties of verbena, hydrangeas, marigolds, petunias and impatiens dazzle the senses. Baskets of trailing geraniums, impatiens and an unusual Peruvian verbena which comes in brilliant red and pink, hang from the rafters.

Walking along the rows of greenhouses to the rear of the main sales area is an impressive experience. One is completely filled with marigolds, another is all petunias, a third is solid geraniums and another houses tomato plants that stretch like a lush, green carpet from one end to the other.

Everett and David Smith now run the family business. Their parents, the Clyde Smiths who will soon celebrate their 51st wedding anniversary, live in the brick house on the north side of the farm. Clyde Smith was born in the farmhouse to the south.

The centennial farm has been in his family since his great grandfather, Stephen Smith, bought the land in 1836. For many years 250 acres were cultivated and long before the retail business, local people came to the farm for butter and eggs.

About 16 years ago, Everett Smith remembers, they had more number 1 tomatoes than they had customers for. They piled them in peck baskets and put them on the back of a truck beside the road 65 cents a peck. He remembers that even in those days it was a good buy, a little less than 5 cents a pound.

The road sales were expanded and flowers were added to the fruits and vegetables when Newburgh was paved. The seasonal business gets underway about a week before Easter and continues until the first week in October. About 40 acres are now under cultivation and all annuals, but none of the perennials, are grown.

IN A TIME characterized by mobility, the Smith family has managed to stay close to their point of origin. Mrs. Smith was born and raised not far away on Plymouth Road.

Besides sons Everett and David, the elder couple have two married daughters, Mrs. Joyce Tomlinson of Plymouth and Mrs. Marilyn Gray of South Lyon.

The Everett Smith's daughters, Debbie and Dianne work at the che-

ckout counter in the business. The David Smiths have two daughters, Carol and Barbara and a son, David Jr., a student at Michigan State.

By mid-summer fresh vegetables and fruits will be displayed all across the front of the main building and the carts going into the check out will be

full of apples and corn instead of geraniums and petunias.

While the cold spring has hurt business, rain or shine those who have been making a spring pilgrimage to buy, look and catch a breath of spring for many years, come back no matter what.

State surveys flood threat

PLYMOUTH — Legislation recently passed by the state may aid future flood victims in the state's shoreline areas.

The bill, sponsored by State Rep. Raymond Smit (R - Ann Arbor), whose district includes Plymouth, directs the state to begin an inventory of areas susceptible to flooding.

Once the potential problem areas are designated, the local communities along the shorelines will be eligible to continue receiving federal funds.

The Federal Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 requires local communities in shoreline flooding danger areas to have a shoreline protection program ready to implement by July 1, 1975.

Smit said, "By Michigan getting a head start in helping the local communities comply with federal regulations, I hope we will convince the Department of Housing and Urban Development that the state is prepared to run the flood control program along our Great Lakes shoreline."

He said more than \$8 million in private property damage has occurred in the last 15 months, which has cost taxpayers about \$46 million.

"The problem here is that development has occurred along our shorelines since the 1950s that just should not have been allowed to occur," Smit said.

"With as many as 9,000 homes and nearly 12,000 people being affected by a single storm, it is time we begin to place greater protection and control over our shoreline areas susceptible to flooding damage."

Cultural Center ice arena converted to indoor tennis

PLYMOUTH — The Plymouth Cultural Center has come through for those tennis fans who can't play outdoors because of inclement weather or at night because of non-lighted courts.

The cultural center has converted its ice arena into four tennis courts as part of its summer recreation program.

The courts are scheduled to be available for use June 3 through July 26. The courts are open to anyone and the cultural center expects to start taking reservations today Tuesday. Reservations for a court should be made in advance.

Court fees are \$8 per hour for prime time (6 p.m. to midnight) and \$4 per hour for non-prime (noon to 6 p.m.). The fees apply per court and not per person.

Other tennis activities planned are: ladies day from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. at \$3 per hour, lunch time tennis from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. at \$3 per hour and a tennis party when all the courts may be rented for \$30 per hour.

Ken Garner, acting manager of the cultural center, says the tennis program is an effort to serve the community's needs.

Bill Zirblis, director of Plymouth

Parks and Recreation, says that besides utilizing a space that wouldn't otherwise be used during the summer, this will provide the city with its only lighted tennis courts.

Zirblis and Garner estimate that it

will cost the city less than \$50 to initiate the program. The center already had nets and the only equipment to purchase includes paint for court lines, timers and fishnet for one side of the courts.

Pierce assails Esch's hedging

Dr. Edward Pierce has assailed U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch (R - Ann Arbor) by asserting the congressman "may be attempting to thwart the political process."

Pierce, a candidate for the Democratic nomination in the 2nd District which includes Livonia and Plymouth, told the Monroe County Democratic Executive Committee, recently that Esch may be hedging his decision whether to run for another term in an effort to avoid a Republican primary contest for his seat.

"I'm sure our Republican congressman is having many doubts about whether he can win re-election this year," Pierce declared. "But it is quite important to know if Esch is running, and there is less than a month until the final filing date."

"What I suspect is that Esch and the Republican leaders behind him are trying to control the Republican primary by not announcing until filing

date his decision not to run. This way, Esch's hand-picked candidate would be the only one with petitions ready to file for the seat, and a Republican split would be avoided."

Pierce cited a disclosure by an Esch aide that the congressman would seek re-election, followed by a speech made at a Plymouth high school May 17 in which Esch claimed he still "hadn't made a decision as yet" whether to run.

Esch and the Republican leadership in the 2nd District, Pierce suggests, are trying to play it one way in Ann Arbor and another way elsewhere in the district.

"They know that they are closely associated with the Nixon administration by voters of this district and want to keep their party closed by catching the dissatisfied anti-Nixon Republicans off guard."

The grand old game of bowling, second oldest sport known to man, now is making an impact in many communities from an unexpected source.

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Some parts can be stubborn

Agencies formed to seek answers of aging problems

Gov. William G. Milliken announced recently that the state commission on aging has established 10 area agencies on aging.

"These agencies are the first attempts in this state to plan programs for aging on a regional basis, with local persons participating in the process of planning and funding," Milliken said.

AREA AGENCIES on aging are designed to provide programs for senior citizens through a planned and coordinated approach.

An area agency will have to submit to the state office of services to the aging a plan to spell out how aging

programs within its region are to be set up and funded, said Judge V. Robert Payant of Orion Mountain, chairman of the commission.

The area agency also will be responsible for coordinating the efforts of present agencies serving the aged, planning future services, and coordinating resources which are not presently utilized for aging programs.

C. Patrick Babcock, director of the office said "this will be the first full-scale attempt at having senior citizens themselves become involved in the process of planning programs for them."

THE AREA agencies will receive funding through the state office and will in turn contract with local agencies for these services.

Funds for the staff and the service programs will come from Title III of the federal Older Americans Act, and on a matching basis from the local level.

Reduce arms budget—Pierce

Dr. Edward Pierce, a candidate for the Democratic nomination in the 2nd Congressional District, told a gathering in Northville recently that less money should be spent for military arms and more on medical care and education.

Pierce, the Ann Arbor physician who founded the Summit Medical Center seven years ago, was hosted in the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Bennett of Northville. The 2nd District includes Livonia, Plymouth, Northville and Northville Township, parts of Washtenaw County and all of Monroe County.

During the two and a half hour session, Pierce told the 39 persons present his reasons for seeking the congressional seat and answered questions.

"Americans have had it with taxes that border on being confiscatory," said Pierce. "Good figures indicate that most of us worked until early May this year just to pay our taxes."

"It wasn't until the middle of the month that we began to realize some money for our families, our savings and our obligations."

"There is a lot to do in this country and it is going to cost money," Pierce continued. "But none of us can pay much more. Our present arms budget represents about \$450 per year for every adult and child in this nation. We are simply going to have to stop playing world policeman and understand that we must begin to attend to our needs at home."

Cough, choke, sputter. . . Trouble shooters doctor cars

With their wrenches flying, 78 teams of crack auto mechanics students fought for top honors in the annual Plymouth Trouble Shooting Contest May 22 at Oakland Mall in Troy.

When it was all over, the winning time belonged to Dan Cowie and Arnold Baron, seniors at Fitzgerald High School in Warren.

The winners will compete in the National Trouble Shooting Finals June 16-18 in Dallas.

Top national mechanics will each take home a \$2,500 college scholarship, a large trophy for their school and, appropriately, a set of tools.

Errors on the written exam are computed on the basis of time, then combined with actual working times on a fleet of Plymouths specially prepared for the contest.

NATIONWIDE, more than 165,000 students will compete for the right to represent their schools in 100 local contests. Local winners then go on to Dallas.

Only high school seniors and post-high school students studying auto mechanics are eligible.

Both the local and national contests are divided into two parts: a written examination worth 40 percent of the final score, and a mechanical competition making up 60 percent of the total.

Finally, an inspector rates the quality of workmanship and issues additional time demerits if necessary.

SPECTATORS at Oakland Mall Wednesday were amazed by the speed and quality of the students' work. "They can fix my car any time," said one man who watched most of the contest.

The malfunctions deliberately installed in the 78 Plymouths were identical. The students were required to check the electrical, starting, ignition and fuel systems, and body hardware to restore the cars to normal operating condition.

The contest has been held annually since 1962 by Chrysler-Plymouth division of Chrysler Motors Corp. and the Plymouth Dealers of America.

Every year, about two-thirds of the contestants are subsequently offered jobs as auto mechanics or in related fields, Chrysler officials said.

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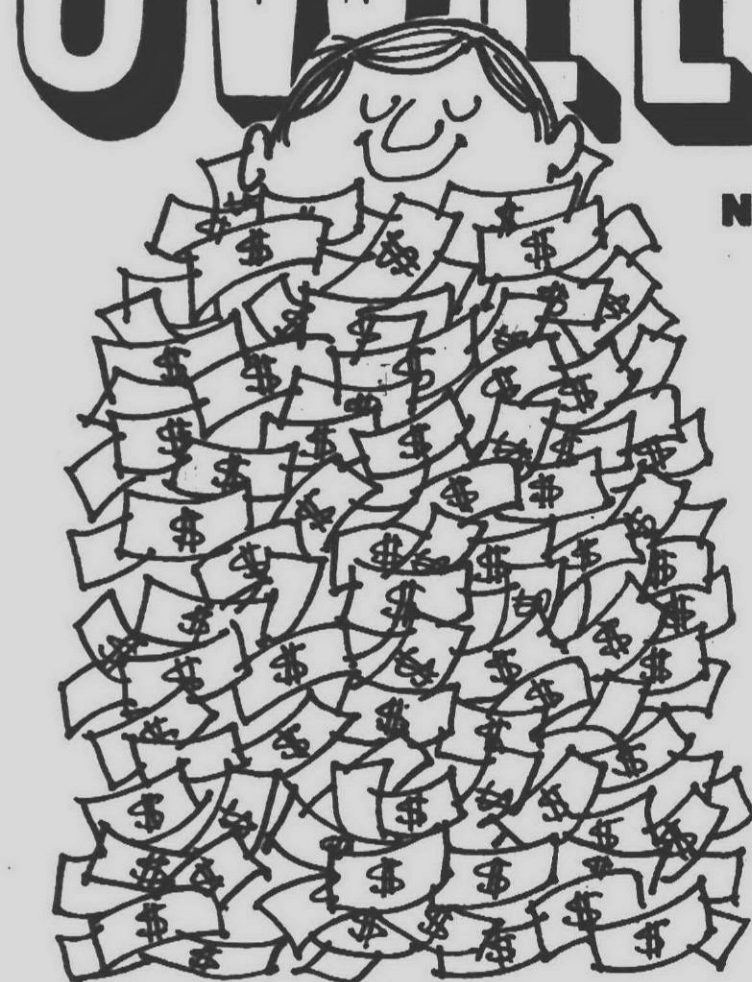

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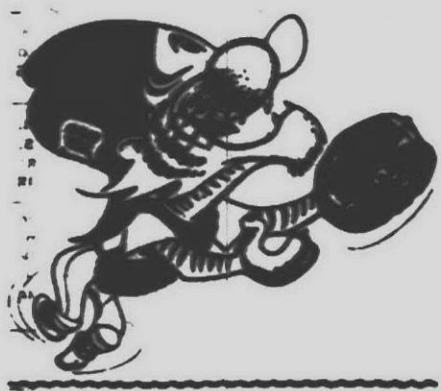

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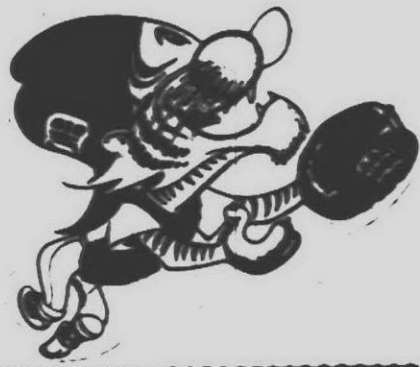
