Drivers scaring off school crossing guards

PLYMOUTH—In the past school year 19 crossing guards quit their posts on Plymouth School District corners. Most were scared off.

"They left mainly because of the hazardous traffic," said Mrs. Flossie Tonda, chairman of the district safety committee, a volunteer group which coordinates the crossing guard program.

In less than a week, earlier this year three guards quit their corners when they were almost run over by speeding cars. One guard was actually hit near Bird School.

In the space of one month last fall

five different guards were hired to direct the crossing at Sheldon Road and Hartsough. Four quit within days after they started at the busy corner.

Although the new safety millage is slated to make the streets safer for school children, the root of the danger is the rising volume of traffic on streets near schools.

"Our main problem is that when you get a population increase you get a double increase in the number of cars," said Mrs. Phyllis Sullivan, secretary of the safety committee.

District crossing guards are on duty at 21 different intersections through-

out the city of Plymouth and in Canton and Plymouth Townships. Although a few of the 19 who didn't last the year quit because of illness or marriage or to take a better job, most were simply afraid for themselves and for their youthful charges.

"Motorists just aren't patient," Mrs. Tonda said, "when they yell and curse at crossing guards it doesn't help matters. The guards are there to help children, not to aggravate drivers."

Guards are paid \$2.50 per hour.

Mrs. Tonda thinks a raise is in order. "No amount of money can compensate for what they do," she said.

With a job that offers low pay and hazardous work under the worst weather conditions, replacements for crossing guards who quit are hard to find.

"We post the job at Schoolcraft College, Eastern Michigan University, and even call the social security employment office," Mrs. Tonda said. "We try to cover every area we can to get crossing guards."

Safety committee officials agree that the program would be more effective

if all area governments whose residents benefit from the service would take part. "Plymouth Township won't pay, although the City of Plymouth and Canton both do," Mrs. Tonda said.

Four Plymouth school children were injured this year crossing intersections en route to or from school. Two were struck in front of Tanger School and two in front of Bird School at the corner of Sheldon Road and Ann Arbor Trail.

"That is by far the worst intersection," said Mrs. Tonda. Various sig-

PLYMOUTH — The much heralded "45 - 15" year round school program has hit a snag — an unsettled teachers' contract.

A letter signed by 22 of the teaching staff assigned to the first track of the year round program at Miller Elementary School was delivered to school officials Friday afternoon stating they would not teach in the program until a contract for the 1974 - 75 school year is signed with teachers.

The first track of the program is scheduled to start July 22.

Dolly Carter, president of the Plymouth Education Association (PEA, teachers' union), said the action is being taken by the Miller teachers with the support of the PEA.

Negotiations on the teachers contract have been continuing since April and both sides now concede that the unsettled items are related mainly to economic issues and the elementary school day.

Norm Kee, administrative assistant for personnel for the district, termed the Miller teachers' letter and the PEA support of it as "unethical methods to force the school board into an agreement the board is not ready to accept."

He described the move as "black-mail" while Mrs. Carter called it "leverage."

The one paragraph letter signed by

the Miller teachers says, "This is to certify that the teachers of Miller School will not be willing to teach on a 45 - 15 program in July until a master agreement with extended school year language has been ratified."

Fifteen minutes after he had received the letter, "out of the clear blue," Kee said the school administration had continually kept the PEA informed from the start and we had an agreement there would not be problems.

"Although the agreements were not

in writing, we had a verbal agreement that these problems with the extended school year could be worked out," Kee said.

Mrs. Carter replied, "We were willing to go along with the (program's) implementation but the teachers want language to protect them and not just a letter of intent."

"The teachers felt the parents are behind them," she added.

Kee said the PEA was told during negotiations that the teachers participating in the year round school program would be paid on the basis of

the current contract with any increases negotiated in the new contract being retroactive for them.

Mrs. Carter denied there was any tentative agreement reached on the matter.

Kee said it was possible that other teaching staff members would be selected to participate in the program.

"Actually we're unsure of our next move," he said.

The teachers' letter will be discussed "in executive session" by the school board tonight, Kee said.

Chamber seeks director

Fred Hill, president of the chamber, explained that the Chamber's officers will propose to the board of directors that the chamber hire a full time executive director to run the chamber.

Such a person is needed, Hill explained, because most chamber members are too busy looking after their

own businesses and industries to devote themselves full time to chamber activities.

"We sit here with a lot of good ideas, but there's nobody to implement them," he said.

"We need somebody who'll be devoted to it. We need a person who's dedicated to community service," the chamber president said, adding, "but then we're not rich."

"We'll probably overspend our budget by hiring a director but if the chamber can prove it's doing more, it would attract more members."

"Of course we've done a few things this year that some people haven't liked," Hill smiled, "but at least we've let people know we're around."

"But I don't think we've made a lot of progress in the services we offer," he added, explaining that was why a director was needed.

It was a recent turnover in the office staff at the Chamber of Commerce that got the officers thinking about the executive director idea.

"But," Hill said, "we don't have an immediate problem."

"We're just waiting for the right person to surface—a person who's going to be on his own for the chamber... a person who can really be a leader."

The chamber president said the proposal would probably be discussed by the chamber board of directors at its June 20 meeting.

Plymouth's trolley car memories still linger

The new trolley car rattled reliably along the newly laid tracks pointing north from the town of Wayne. It was 1898 and the car was on its maiden voyage to the village of Northville by way of Plymouth.

The sight of the single car with its long electric finger holding on by a pulley to the overhead wires generated great excitement in the farmers and villagers along the route.

This was the modern way to go, they thought. This was "progress."

The trolley clattered up Wayne Road, through what is now called Westland until it came to Cherry Hill Road, whereupon it curved west to Newburgh Road.

Heading north on Newburgh it passed through what is now Livonia, and when it reached Ann Arbor Trail it turned again to the west. Entering Plymouth it continued its trip stop-

ping occasionally for whoever hailed it.

AT KELLOGG PARK it swept around for a northeasterly jaunt to Mill Street, then to Northville Road and at last to Northville.

Northville, it should be mentioned, was practically the end of the universe in those days—at least as far as trolleys were concerned.

This sleepy village had been using it as their main mode of travel since the one from Wayne had arrived in Detroit, arriving in Plymouth in 1898.

By 1904 the Interurban system had been extended to Northville, and the trolley car was no longer a novelty.

Quite a lot of business was done in the spaces for tracks and the trolley car was a familiar sight.

As for the people, who could blame them. As early as 1922 the road from Plymouth to Northville had been paved and residents of the area were then able to enjoy the heady experience of driving all the way from Northville to Ann Arbor on concrete.

Today the progress produced by the automobile has been somewhat jaded. Purchase costs are high, fuel is expen-

sive and traffic jams are infuriating.

Visionaries of the future are beginning to visualize sets of tracks linking up the suburban towns to each other and to Detroit. Just as the trolley did.

A Plymouth resident with fond memories of the old trolley is Louise Tritton whose home on Ann Arbor Trail is but a few steps from its former road.

From her childhood she heard the trolley's clatter and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Tritton, took her to the trolley car.

They had to wait an hour in the cold to get to the trolley car, but it was worth the wait.

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bits, chickens and even eggs," said Mrs. Isabelle Taylor, a Plymouth resident all her life. "We lived about a mile from the Newburgh stop and could go into Plymouth for a nickel."

GEORGE BURR, remembered that it cost 15 cents to go from Plymouth to Wayne and 10 cents from Plymouth to Northville.

He too seemed to enjoy the memory of those trips to the Western Market. "Sometimes the cars were so loaded, you couldn't make your way from one end to the other."

He added: "My father raised chickens and would tell me to go down to market and sell the eggs. Luckily there wasn't much breakage. I enjoyed the trip. It was a real family occasion."

Mrs. Mary Fillmore also recalled with enthusiasm the trips to market. "They were fun," she said.

She also rode the trolley into the Plymouth school which at that time educated what teachers today call K through 12 — all in the same building.

The area between Plymouth and Wayne was mostly farm country. "There were no apartments or condominiums then," she laughed.

"At about Newburgh and Cherry Hill there was a swamp," said Burr. "Certain times of the year it was wet and slippery under the tracks and the car had to go slow."

YOUNG BOYS SECRETLY admired the motorman and conductor of the trolleys, much the same way boys admire car racers and football heroes today.

"They wore uniforms and looked pretty grand to us," said Burr.

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HOLDING THE SIGNS that reminded the trolley motorman to have his trolley wait on a siding until another trolley passed on the single tracks are Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Tritton of Plymouth. The signs stood next to the farm owned by Mrs. Tritton's father, Sam Spicer. The rock on which, Mrs. Tritton is seated used to rest close to the tracks and was frequently used as a seat by those waiting to be picked up by the trolley.

Wheels roll for bike paths

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners has approved plans for a 20 mile parkway bicycle path.

County legislators earmarked up to \$50,000 for construction of an asphalt bike path along Edward Hines Drive through the Middle Rouge Parkway extending from Northville to Dearborn.

The eight foot wide asphalt path will run through or adjoin Garden City, Dearborn, Dearborn Heights, Westland Livonia, Plymouth, and Northville.

Construction is expected to begin this summer in Livonia.

The board's contribution is to be matched by up to \$50,000 from the county road commission plus up to \$75,000 each from the state and federal governments.

Commissioner Edgar L. Harris (D-Taylor) proposed that the \$25,000 outlays originally requested of the board and the road commission be increased to \$50,000 each.

The bicycle path program was proposed by State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Livonia), a former county commissioner.


Is it hard to quit drugs?

Canton investigation of Deer Creek urged

CANTON—Immediate closure of street gates linking Holiday Park subdivision and its neighbor, Deer Creek Apartments, is being urged by homeowners to alleviate what they describe as "unbelievable" traffic and living conditions.

The township board of trustees has agreed to act immediately after a group of irate subdivision residents appeared at the trustees' meeting last week to complain and also to remind the board that the problem of the open gates as well as several others brought on by the Joy Road overpass have not been resolved.

Residents pointed out that one of the stipulations in the November Circuit Court order was that the Deer Creek entrance lane would be opened for traffic simultaneously with the opening of new overpass.

This has not been complied with and the continued use of the subdivision streets by apartment dwellers is creating severe traffic problems, residents say.

But traffic is only half the problem, they add.

"Dragging, speeding and peeling out—especially of motorcycles—produce an extreme amount of noise. It's impossible to sleep," added Mrs. June Truax, who lives on Holly Drive.

Residents also told of abusive language from teenagers who use certain homes on Holly Drive as shortcuts to get from Canton Gardens to Deer Creek apartments.

"This includes property damage to fences, shrubs, flowers, etc.," Mrs. Truax said.

There have been threats to children, she continued adding that her six-year-old daughter was threatened with a gun if she told her mother that the "big kids" were using her yard as a short cut.

Even more alarming, residents say, is the large amount of dope being "pushed" in the apartment complex.

Several members of the subdivision's cleanup committee, in charge of the traffic island on Holly leading into the subdivision, reported an increase of needles thrown in the grass and into receptacles at the subdivision entrance.

Police are constantly being called to the apartments for "overdose" cases, the residents charge.

Other points in the court order still not complied with are the completion of the deceleration lane and the west-bound passing lane.

The residents, who have formed a "Holiday Park Safety Committee," also asked the township to open up Hamman Road on the easterly border, from Joy to Koppernick Road.

At the time of the confrontation last fall with state highway officials over

the design of the overpass, Supervisor Philip Dingley announced the township's willingness to open Hannan from Joy to Bart.

It was reported that a road design is presently filed with the Wayne County Road Commission for this portion.

However, the safety committee rejected the proposal, labeling it a stop-gap measure that will only compound

their present troubles.

The committee asked, instead, that the entire stretch of Hannan between Joy and Koppernick Road be opened up.

That way, the committee said, the subdivision will have three additional exits in addition to Holly Drive.

Township officials promised "to have some answers" for residents this week.

Roy Smith running for representative


PLYMOUTH—Former state representative Roy Smith has announced that he will seek the Republican nomination to succeed State Rep. Ray Smit in the 52nd district.

Smith was 52nd district representative for five years before his district was reapportioned and he lost in his new district to Gary Owen. For the last two years he has been an administrator in Saline.

He has held public office since 1959, when he was elected Ypsilanti Township supervisor, a position he held until his election to the Michigan House of Representatives in 1967. In 1966 he was chairman of the Wastewater County Board of Supervisors.

As a state representative Smith served on the House Appropriations Committee and launched a petition drive in 1968 to reform the property tax system.

The Pittsfield Township resident is a World War II veteran and a graduate of the University of Michigan.

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

Trolley car memories still linger

The conductor who made the greatest impression on all of those who remember the old trolley was Charley Thume, who later became a police officer in Plymouth.

"I remember when the early morning car was so packed with customers and their baskets that Charlie Thume had to make his way to the back of the car by walking over the seats," said Burr.

"Charlie would stop the car and wait if someone who was usually at a certain spot wasn't there," said Mrs. Tritton. "Sometimes he would stop and go buy some eggs. Other times he

would stop when he saw someone he knew out in a field and go over and talk with him.

"People moved much slower in those days," she said.

BUT THE JOB was not always easy. Frank Henderson, who has lived in Plymouth since 1901 and is still in the plating business, said there was plenty for the conductor to do passing through Plymouth.

"At three places where the trolley had to cross railroad tracks, the conductor had to get out, go to the tracks and throw some levers on the switches to put up a signal to warn the train that the trolley was crossing," said Henderson.

"Then after the trolley went over the tracks, he had to take down the signal," Henderson continued, "and run and catch up with the trolley. On snowy days he would wrap newspapers around his legs so his pants wouldn't get wet."

It took about 15 minutes to get from Plymouth to Northville by trolley or less time than it takes a five gallon can of ice cream to melt.

The Amblers Ice Cream Company in Northville used to ship down five-gallon wooden tubs of ice cream to Henry Murray's ice cream store, where I worked," Henderson said, "and it never melted even though it was not packed in ice."

The first trolley cars Henderson remembers were small ones with enough room for 15-20 people. "We called them the grasshoppers," he said, "and they used to turn around in Northville for the return trip."

LATER CAME old '76 and '77 with a motor in each end and reversible seats so that the car didn't have to turn around.

"After this came the larger cars we

called the Interurban," he added.

The cars were divided into smoking and non-smoking areas. But the division did not always work. "Even though not sitting in the front with the smokers I used to get sick," said Henderson. "Then I'd go out and stand on the little rear platform to get some fresh air."

Both Henderson and Burr recalled that the service was hourly. For the most part it was reliable although Mrs. Taylor remembers that in the ice storm of 1922 the overhead electrical lines became frozen and help had to be summoned.

Burr remembered seeing a car stalled all night on the curve a half mile east of Haggerty because of winter weather. A LIVONIA dweller for 54 years, Mrs. Gladys Ryder used to ride the Interurban into Wayne to high school every day. At that time she lived at about the same distance from the Wayne school as from the one in Plymouth.

"But it only cost five cents to ride from my home into Wayne," she explained, "whereas it cost 15 cents to travel into Plymouth. So I went to Wayne."

"The cars were heated in the winter," she said. Accidents were not common, Mrs. Ryder said, but they occasionally occurred.

"A car was derailed on Newburgh," she said. "It tipped over and a lot of people were hurt. But I don't think anyone was killed."

Mrs. Ryder is probably one of the few people in the area who can say, "I went to college by trolley."

"I took the Interurban to Wayne and changed to the limited," she said. "It took me straight into Ypsilanti to college without any stops."

DURING WORLD WAR I, she remembers seeing what she called a "double-header" coming down the track.

"The Ford plant in Dearborn arranged for two cars to be hitched together to carry to work all the men from out here who were working at Ford."

In those days there was a network of Interurbans throughout the state, she stated. "You could go to Cass Lake, Pontiac, Orchard Lake and Detroit," she noted.

There was also an Interurban running from Detroit through Farmington to Northville, linking up with the Plymouth-Wayne trolley.

"I wish it was still here," said Mrs. Ryder. "It would be nice to have public transportation again."

nals and traffic lights are helpful, but as long as there are reckless drivers, the safety committee is convinced that traffic guards are necessary.

"You've always got that one driver on Sheldon Road," Mrs. Tonda said. Francis Magreta has been a guard at the hot corner of Sheldon and Ann Arbor Trail for several months. "It's a race track," he said.

Sheldon Road is the most notorious of the district's thoroughfares. Every intersection is bad. "Crossing guards at the Ann Arbor Trail and Penniman corners counted five cars running red-lights each day while they were at their post," said Mrs. Tonda.

Plymouth police ticketed 12 motorists in less than an hour for moving violations at Penniman, N. Territorial and Hartsough intersections with Sheldon Road.

Mrs. Tonda noted that it took the committee three years to get a left turn signal installed at Sheldon and Penniman. In the two months prior to installing the signal last December, 32 accidents were reported at the corner. In the month following installation only one accident was reported.

Safety committee officials agree that one of the problems with properly policing Sheldon is that it forms the boundary line between Plymouth and Plymouth Township.

A brunch was held last Monday morning at the Mayflower Hotel to honor this year's contingent of crossing guards. One outspoken guard complained that a long-promised repainting of a crosswalk near her Sheldon Road corner has yet to be done.

"It's a damn shame. I think it's a disgrace," she told the group. "If they weren't a good bunch of kids I'd have had troubles."

Cleatus Schnegg, a guard on Farmer Street near Starkweather School, suggested that crossing guards be equipped with uniforms and empowered to ticket careless motorists.

According to Mrs. Tonda, the district provides yellow raincoats, but the plastic outfits are too hot to wear in warm weather. "The AAA promised us vented jackets, but we haven't gotten them yet," she said. "They want to help but they forget."

Six guards were honored for a year or more of service in the district. Cleatus Schnegg of Starkweather has been at her post for three years. Elizabeth Wilbanks and Jean Banasses have guarded crossings for two years, and Patricia Howe, Brenda Allen and

Caroline Lepkowski have all served one year.

The six are all who remain from the crew of 21 hired last fall.

Francis Magreta and Patricia Howe received special certificates in appreciation of their extra efforts in following up on accidents which occurred at their corners.

Barb Livingston, a guard at Sheldon and Hanford, also received a special award. When a storm knocked down a power wire right across her crossing earlier this year she was afraid the wires were hot so she carried the school children across the street one by one.

School athletic director and safety coordinator, John Sandmann, was given a "patience" award for his willingness to cooperate with the safety committee on a number of projects.



Sexism ends, but job ads will be harder to read

We have been subtly accused of being male chauvinistic pigs because we allegedly practiced discrimination in our classified want ads.

We have seen the light and no longer will the "help wanted" ads be segregated between male and female.

Most readers won't be happy to hear this, because it means that those looking for work must wade through all of the help wanted ads, pouring through available jobs in which they aren't interested.

You can see, by the way I phrased the beginning of this column, that I am not a great booster of the Women's Liberation movement. I believe that women should be paid the same as anyone else for the same work. This has been common practice in our industry for years.

I BELIEVE that women should have an equal career opportunity because of their abilities, which we practice in our company.

What turns me off in any movement are the extremes in points of view that come out of the woodwork and ask not for what should be expected but go one step further and push for actual reverse discrimination to make up for all those alleged past sins.

I guess I don't really believe there are past sins.

I am not sure who decided in a marital union who should go to work and who should stay home. It probably had to do with the fact that the man couldn't have children so he was sent out to bring home the bacon.

WHEN WOMEN joined the work force in large numbers, at women's urgings, discriminatory laws were passed to protect them - so that if they did work they were given more privileges than men.

Until very recently, in Michigan, women could not work more than 10 hours a day. They had to

be given two 15-minute breaks each day, which meant that they worked a half hour less than men, but were paid as if they had worked that half hour.

Employers had to put couches in women's rest rooms, but not in men's, and they could not ask women to lift more than 40 pounds.

These regulations went out when equal pay - equal work laws came in, but the equal pay - equal job laws have their problems.

A DETROIT WOMAN went to court to force the postal department to pay her the same as what she claimed her male counterpart was paid. The post office countered that the male was required to lift up to 70 pounds, which the woman wasn't and, therefore, the jobs were different. The court ruled in her favor and she was paid the same as men and was expected to do the same job.

She is now fighting a layoff because she became pregnant and said she couldn't lift 70 pounds. So, the post office said that she couldn't do her job.

I feel that we should treat people based on their ability, not on their sex. Sometimes a movement singles out unimportant issues that become the battleground and the whole perspective of what really should be accomplished is lost.

Eliminating male and female in classified ads is more of a detriment to our readers than what it accomplishes for the recognition of the role of women in the business world.

Now, just imagine what it would be if you were coming down I-75 after a sojourn up north for the first time and there were no billboards to tell you what lies ahead. It could be very frustrating.

Yet, such a thing happened to The Stroller—only it was on a long strip of new highway on a recent visit to the old hometown.

It so happens that the airport at home serves three areas—Allentown, Bethlehem and Easton. And there are all sorts of new routes in and out of the various smaller communities along the way.

It all seemed so easy when we started for a popular hotel in Bethlehem. We were doing fine until we came to a big green sign over head that read "22 East-Easton."

What now? We thought we were headed for Bethlehem, but the overhead sign said "Easton." There was nothing to do, but turn around at the next exit and head back to a starting point.

Fine. We thought we had the thing conquered until we suddenly found ourselves in the middle of the city of Bethlehem, with no sign of the motel we were seeking.

Stopping at the curb to ask a passerby the directions to the motel, he answered, "Go up three lights, turn left, and then right, and then down the road a bit."

What a help that was!

ABOUT THAT TIME we would have given anything to see the billboard along the road to tell us where to go. But there was no such thing.

Finally, the fellow up there who watches over all of us must have

taken pity for, just ahead, at the foot of the mountain, the red and green sign of the motel was discernable. But we weren't out of trouble yet. There was no sign of exit and we were just about to pass when we noticed a bit of a sign on the roadside telling us that this was the exit to the place we wanted to find.

Sounds funny now, but would you believe it, we got lost on the same highway two nights in a row. So fearful were we of getting too far off the path that we returned to our temporary place of abode each evening before darkness set in. If we had waited, we might be there yet.

So, anytime you hear folks asking for a ban of all billboards along our new, modern major highways, take heed.

Our new highways would be frustrating things without them.

A woman who was once known as "Fat Flo," discovered Weight Watchers and replaced a size 18 wardrobe with a size 10 in a matter of weeks, is still cooking gourmet dinners.

"I about drove the Raleigh House chefs crazy when we had 300 people there for a sit-down dinner at my son's bar mitzvah because I wouldn't have anything that wasn't legal," she said.

Another thing she's got on the horizon is a "Diet Bakery and Munching Company" she's opening in the Southfield Rd. - 12 Mile area. Basically a bakery, "it will be filled with everything from books to gourmet spices. Everything the dieter needs or needs to know," she said.

She has been the Mothers' March Chairman for the March of Dimes for the past three years, and plays an active role in the United Foundation, and Michigan Cancer Foundation fund drives.

GREEN BEAN PARMESAN SALAD

4 cups fresh green beans
4 ounces fresh onion, minced
2 tablespoons garlic flavored wine vinegar

1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash pepper
2 ounces grated parmesan cheese
2 tablespoons vegetable oil
4 ounces cooked turkey, sliced
Wash beans, cut off ends and halve lengthwise. Cook, covered in 1" boiling salted water until tender. Drain and cool. Toss with remaining ingredients except oil and turkey. Chill well. Divide evenly into 2 lettuce cups and top each with 1 tablespoon vegetable oil, then 2 ounces sliced turkey.
Makes 2 servings.

STUFFED ZUCCHINI

2 zucchini squash
1 1/3 cups cottage cheese
Dash pepper
1/8 teaspoon paprika

2 slices enriched white bread, made into crumbs

1 1/2 lb. ground beef or veal
2 teaspoons Italian seasoning (basil, oregano, thyme)
2 teaspoons dehydrated onion flakes
Salt and pepper to taste



With electric beaters, whip evaporated milk until stiff peaks form. Fold into gelatin mixture. Add remaining ingredients. Divide evenly into 6 serving dishes. Chill.

Churchill wins state 'A' title

Roger Frayer's Churchill Chargers are on top of the Michigan prep baseball world.

That dream, which only a handful ever get to experience, turned into reality for a group of high school kids that Coach Frayer tabbed "the greatest bunch ever assembled."

Churchill stumbled into the state districts, roared out of that and conquered all in the Northville regionals and took it all Saturday in the state Class A baseball finals at Pontiac Jaycee Park.

THE CHARGERS topped Flint Northern in the semifinals contest, 4-2, while Hazel Park nipped Grandville, 1-0, in 12 innings in the other contest.

Then came the state finale and it was strictly no contest. The Chargers scored twice in both the first and second innings, and poured in three runs in each the fifth and sixth to crush Hazel Park, 10-1.

Thus comes to a close the '74 prep baseball campaign and Frayer's Chargers wind up sitting on top of it all with a 22-2 mark and are the first Livonia team in any sport to win a state championship.

"Hey, this thing is just unbelievable," said Frayer after grasping the state trophy. "I guess we just wanted that state title more than anyone else. In fact, I know we did."

CHURCHILL TOOK to the offense in the top of the first off Hazel Park hurler Bill Trapani.

After one out, Brian Kelly, who blasted out two homers in the North-

ville regionals, ripped a shot off the right center fence for a three-bagger. Larry Lipa followed suit with another shot that hit on the warning track in right and Kelly was in with run No. 1.

Charger leftfielder Rod Hawraney delivered a shot to left and Lipa scored easily.

After Charger hurler Kevin Nelson walked the first man he faced in the last of the first, B.J. LaJoie, Kelly and Al Leirstein pulled off a doubleplay, and the Chargers took to the offense again.

LaJoie singled and after Jay Nelson grounded out, Kevin Nelson singled with LaJoie stopping at third after being balked to second.

KELLY LOFTED a short fly to right center that dropped between three Hazel Park players. Both LaJoie and Nelson scored and the

play seemed to take the spark out of Hazel Park which wound up letting three more flys drop in safely.

The Chargers kept Hazel Park off the board the next four innings with Nelson allowing just one hit, and that a single by Brian Carley in the third.

Meanwhile Churchill left three runners stranded in the third and fourth before breaking things wide open in the fifth and sixth.

The fifth saw Lipa single and Hawraney double him to third. After Leirstein struck out, Gary Condon lofted a fly to left that scored Lipa. LaJoie doubled in Hawraney and Jay Nelson singled to score LaJoie.

CHURCHILL KEPT pounding away in the sixth with another trio of runs on only two hits. Mike Gottshall walked, and after one out, Lipa singled for his third hit. Hawraney was

safe on a fielder's choice, Leirstein sacrificed in one run, Condon singled and an error accounted for the final tally.

Nelson's bid for a shutout was snapped in the sixth. Trapani doubled off Lipa's glove in right and scored on a hit by Mark Schmitz.

But Nelson got things back under control and finished with a four-hitter, walked only one and struck out two.

Churchill meanwhile banged out 14 hits to finish No. 1 in the state.

The semifinal victory over Flint Northern belonged to Charger ace righthander Dave Panzoff who tossed a five-hitter, struck out 10 and walked only two.

Jon Pines suffered the loss for Flint with the Chargers collecting seven hits.

Churchill scored twice in the first

when Gottshall walked, Lipa singled, Hawraney singled in Gottshall and Condon came up with a sacrifice to score Lipa.

A SINGLE by Jay Nelson, sacrifice by Panzoff and single by Kelly produced run No. 3 in the second for the Chargers.

Flint Northern decided to make things interesting in the top of the sixth on a single, three-bagger and another single but Panzoff got tough when it counted and pitched his way out of the jam.

Churchill added an insurance score in the sixth. Condon singled, stole second, was sacrificed to third by LaJoie and scored on a sacrifice by Jay Nelson.

Flint got two runners aboard in the top of the seventh but Panzoff finished off his chore with a strikeout and it was on to the state championship.

"You know, going unbeaten this year has really been unbelievable. Everyone has run for us. It has been just one heck of a season."

So now, in Holmberg's fifth track season, it all came together.

"I wasn't really sure what to expect at the beginning of the season," added the Stevenson coach. "But I did know that I did have the hardest working group of kids ever and they proved me right."

"Our key had to be the dedication showed by the seniors like Steve White and Ron Priesskorn. These are the fellows that carried us through."

"You know, we don't appoint team-captains around here," added Holmberg. "I did my first season in the spring and by the time track season came around, the kid quit."

"I have since developed the philosophy where natural leaders will emerge and the kids themselves will seek out their own leaders."

The seeking was there for Stevenson this '74 campaign and the man behind the search has been picked the No. 1 track coach - Paul Holmberg.

Mendoza is No. 1 trackman

"Bob is a leader by doing as well as by talking," said Churchill track Coach Fred Price on his co-captain hurdler Bob Mendoza. "He is our best."

The 18 year-old, 5-foot-8 and 150 pound senior Mendoza has been selected the area's trackman-of-the-year.

Mendoza was tops on the area charts in both the low and high hurdles, tied for second in the 220 yard dash and tied for third in the 100 yard dash.

"I guess you could say the hurdles

present more of a challenge than the dashes," added Mendoza who hopes to continue his track career at either University of Michigan or Central Michigan University.

Bob finished third in the state this year in the high hurdles in :14.5 and fifth in the state in the lows where he lost his balance on the curve in :19.7.

A tipoff to Mendoza who overcame a strained hamstring, two shin splits and two groin muscle pulls to take two regional titles at Farmington and give the Churchill thincad squad the push needed and the drive a "trackman-of-the-year" can provide.

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

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
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

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PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE NO. IV-E

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. IV, IV-A and IV-C OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH, BEING THE TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE GOVERNING THE CONTROL OF DOGS AND AMENDING SECTIONS VI, VII, IX, X, XI AND XII.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

PART I. That wherever in Section VI of Ordinance No. IV, as amended by Ordinance No. IV-A and IV-C, and Sections VII, IX, X, XI AND XII of Ordinance IV the term "Township Clerk" or "Clerk" appears those words shall be deleted and in the place and stead of the same the term "Township Treasurer" shall be inserted, and in all other respects the provision of the aforesaid section are ratified and approved.

PART II. REPEAL. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with any of the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

PART III. VALIDITY. Should any section, clause or provision of this Ordinance be declared by the Courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole, or any part thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid.

PART IV. EFFECTIVE DATE. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the Public Peace, Health and Safety and are hereby ordered to take effect JULY 1, 1974.



Bentley 880 relay crew is area solo All-State

Another set of track shoes have been worn out, a few high jump bars bent, a couple of poles snapped, a mass of hurdles broken, a stop watch shattered and a lot of string snapped.

Another prep track season has come to a close.

With the closing of the final 440 relay, comes the announcement of the 1974 all-area track squad selected by the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers and high school coaches.

This year's list has to be the most balanced ever with 10 schools represented on the 15 event first team.

Churchill, Stevenson, Bentley, North Farmington and Garden City West were the only schools to double up in first team selections.

In the field events we have Scott O'Grady of Redford Union at high jump; Churchill long-jumper Phil LaFave; Bishop Borgess shot-putter Steve Jaremski and pole vaulter Mark Yassay from Garden City West.

The solo all-state representative is in the relays with a Bentley Bulldog foursome of Bill Brown, Rich Hammill, Darrel Ditzhazy and Brian Murphy selected the top 880 medley crew.

It was a North Farmington group, Dan Kramer, Steve Kotecki, Steve Barth and Brad Pease that took honors in the 440 relay and a team of Jeff Ziel, Tom LeGault, Brian Smith and Mark DeMeritt that won a berth for Plymouth Salem in the mile relay.

In the distance events it is Stevenson's Steve White in the mile and Farmington's "Mr. Runner" Mike McGuire in the two-mile.

The dashes have North's Dan Kramer in the 100, Bentley's Brian Murphy in the 220 and Thurston's Rick Westphal in the 440 with Stevenson's

Ken Brown tops in the 880 run.

The hurdles have Garden City West's Paul Collins No. 1 in the 180 yard low hurdles and Churchill's Bob Mendoza, who has been selected the "trackman-of-the-year" tops in the 120 yard high hurdles.

The 22 man team sports 17 seniors, four juniors and one sophomore with Salem's 6-foot-1, 160 pound Jeff Ziel No. 1 in the grade point department with a perfect 4.0 GPA.

The team averages out with a 3.18 GPA.

At high jump we have RU's O'Grady who made the second team in the low hurdles last season. O'Grady was tops in the jump this time around with a leap of 6-feet-5, was third in the low hurdles in :20.0 and has been considered by most coaches as the top point-getter.

Churchill's LaFave was picked as the long-jumper of the campaign with a distance of 21-feet-2. The 5-feet-9, 150 pound senior checks in a with a 2.5 GPA. At shot put, we have Steve Jaremski of Bishop Borgess who paced the area with a toss of 54 feet.

The 6-foot junior at 198 pounds boasts a 3.56 GPA.

Garden City West's Yassay rounds out the field events. The 18 year-old 6-foot-3, 170 pound senior with a GPA of 3.1 was tops on the area chart with a pole vault of 14-feet-1.

It's on to the Bulldog all-state crew of Brown, Hammill, Ditzhazy and Murphy that won the state in 1:29.0. Hammill is only a sophomore on the senior dominated quartet which shows Ditzhazy with a 3.4 GPA, Brown and Hammill with identical 3.0s and Murphy with a 2.5.

Murphy also copied an individual honor berth in the 220 yard dash with a clocking of :22.5.

Plymouth Salem's mile relay team

of Ziel, LeGault, Smith and DeMeritt sports a 3:24.0 time along with with a 3.7 GPA combined.

In the 440 relay, North's team of Kramer, Kotecki, Barth and Pease was first in the area in :43.4. Kramer also captured an individual berth in the 100 yard dash.

The 18 year-old, 5-feet-6 150 pound senior clocked in at :10.1 and sports a 3.0 GPA.

The 440 yard dash and two mile run sport two individual performers who ventured forth to excell in the first tri-state meet held in Fort Wayne, Ind. last weekend.

All-area 440 man Rick Westphal of Thurston took a second in this meet with the best from Indiana, Ohio and Michigan in competition and ran a leg of a winning mile relay team.

Westphal clocked in at :48.8 in the 440 and ran a :47.8 in his leg of a winning 3:15.5 mile relay crew.

The other athlete to venture out of state was Farmington's Mike McGuire who finished second best in the state meet behind Pat Davey of Brother Rice.

McGuire's best time was 9:03.7 ran in the state meet and he hit the 9:07.7 mark for an easy first in the tri-state.

The high hurdles belong to Garden City West's Paul Collins who had a top showing of :14.9. The 18 year-old 6-foot-2, 145 pound senior sports a 3.1 GPA.

Churchill's Mendoza is the pick at the low hurdle spot. The Charger senior at 5-feet-8 and 150 pounds was a double winner in the Farmington regionals and clocked in at :19.2 in the lows and :14.5 in the highs.

Stevenson High sports two runners in miler Steve White and half-miler Ken Brown who copped a third in the state meet. Brown shows a 3.8 GPA and a 1:55.8 in the 880.

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Plymouth schools annex Salem corner

PLYMOUTH—For at least the past 25 years, the residents living on a small loop of Napier Road in southern Salem Township have been paying school taxes to the Northville district but sending their children to school in the Plymouth district.

BOARD OF EDUCATION MINUTES

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of the Plymouth Community School District, Wayne and Washtenaw Counties, Michigan, was held on Monday evening, May 28, 1974, in the Multi-Purpose Room of Gallimore Elementary School, 5375 Sheldon Road, Plymouth, Michigan.

The meeting was called to order by President McClelland at 8:15 p.m., following an informational agenda meeting.

Present: Members Benson, Lawton, McClelland, Mack, Mirto and Turner. Member Gray arrived at 8:30 p.m.

Absent: None.

Administrators present: Sup't. Hoben, Deputy Sup't. Hogan, Assistant Sup't. - Business Manager, Adm. Assistant - Personnel Koe, Director Masteller, Supervisors Abbott and Symonds and Principals Dodson and Lutz.

Others present: Representatives of the PEA, the Transportation Committee, the Safety Committee, Custodians, MACLD, teacher representatives from Truesdell School, E. Wendover, Plymouth Observer & Eccentric; M. Borowski, J. Brown, Mrs. Bertha Green, D. Trent and about 20 citizens and parents.

Member Benson was excused from the beginning of the meeting.

Additions to the agenda were called and approved.

It was moved by Member Turner and seconded by Member Mirto to approve the minutes of the regular meeting of May 13, 1974, as published for the Board of Education, with the following corrections:

Page 1, last paragraph, line 2: change "who must be retired" to "who choose to retire"

Page 5, paragraph 5: correct spelling of "Francis"

Ayes: Members Lawton, McClelland, Mack, Mirto and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

Mrs. Barbara Leffler, representing the MACLD (Michigan Association of Children's Learning Disabilities), rose to inquire as to whether the CCC would be ready before late fall with their report on Learning Disabilities for the Board. She requested that the Board look into this matter and make a recommendation so that this could be looked into and dealt with before that time. This matter was deferred for discussion under the Instructional Administration Agenda items.

It was moved by Member Turner and seconded by Member Mirto that the Plymouth Community School District make final payment to Wakely-Kushner Associates, Inc./Architects for architectural services on Phase II of Plymouth-Canton High School in the amount of \$794.43.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, Lawton, McClelland, Mack, Mirto and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

Assistant Sup't. Hoedel noted that it would be his policy never to bring a final payment recommendation to the Board until all other payments to other contractors had been made.

Bids were reviewed by Mr. Hoedel for chain link fence at West Middle School, as follows:

New Hudson Fence Company	\$4,787.00
Industrial Fence Company	6,976.00
Crown Fence Company	5,271.00
Grunwell-Cashere Company	5,500.00

It was noted that the Industrial Fence Company bid was made on different specifications.

It was moved by Member Turner and seconded by Member Gray to award the contract to the low bidder, New Hudson Fence Company, in the amount of \$4,787 to provide chain link fence as specified in Bid No. 1014 as follows: Six-foot chain link fence along the West Middle School west boundary line and a four-foot chain link fence on both sides of the easement walk between Lot No. 3 and No. 4 of Trailwood Subdivision; and further, that this contract be paid from monies allocated in Building and Site No. 1 Fund.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, Lawton, McClelland, Mack, Mirto and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

Member Turner requested that the Business Division prepare a status review of monies in the Building and Site No. 1 Fund for the Board.

Mr. Hoedel reviewed the following bids for sidewalk along right-of-way near West School.

Bill's Cement Company	\$4,725.00
Apollo Asphalt Company	4,584.25
Grunwell-Cashere Company	3,500.00

It was moved by Member Turner and seconded by Member Gray to award the contract to the low bidder, Grunwell-Cashere Company in the amount of \$3,500 to provide for the sidewalk as specified in Bid No. 1013, as follows: a five-foot wide sidewalk along the right-of-way from the east drive in front of West Middle School parallel to Ann Arbor Trail to a point at the west property line of the Red Bell Nursery, there to join the walk at Trailwood Subdivision; with the understanding that the net cost to the School District will be approximately \$1,875 and the remaining balance to be paid by Red Bell Nursery, as stipulated in their letter attached to the recommendation; and further, that this project be paid for from monies allocated in the Building and Site No. 1 Fund.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, Lawton, McClelland, Mack, Mirto and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

Member Turner asked Mr. Hoedel what his thoughts were regarding increases in cost of construction materials and labor. Member Mack commended Mr. J. Symonds, Supervisor of Maintenance, for working with the Red Bell Nursery to reach an agreement on the sidewalk at West Middle School.

Superintendent Hoben and Supervisor of Purchasing Abbott called the Board's attention to the cost effectiveness of the plan for Central Warehousing which is now being established. They pointed out several specific instances where substantial savings have been realized through bulk purchasing. Mr. Hoben also noted that units of government have been offered the opportunity to order through the Central Warehouse as well and that Plymouth Township has used the facilities to great advantage up to this point.

Deputy Sup't. Hogan reviewed the Curriculum Coordinating Committee's Exceptional Child Study Group in response to the MACLD request for more information. He stated that nothing could be done until the study can be completed and given to the Board in late September or October. He reviewed the present status of the programs on Emotionally Impaired, Social Work, Mentally Retarded, Gifted Area, Speech and Language and Learning Disabled. (Member Benson requested exact figures on those officially diagnosed as mentally retarded and whether there are any on a waiting list.)

Dr. Hogan pointed out that two classrooms will be opened for learning disabled children. Reading specialists have been requested to become certified by September of 1975 in Learning Disabilities as well. He reviewed the Western Wayne Center for Learning Disabilities and its functions to date. He felt that the CCC study upon completion should follow the regular channels as set up by Board policy. He noted that another psychologist will be added to the staff in the fall.

Member Benson asked whether the administration could mandate that reading specialists become learning disability specialists as well. Dr. Hogan pointed out that additional staff and funding would be necessary if they are to be kept separate. Wayne County Intermediate School District has evaluated the program as adequate for this year. Sup't. Hoben suggested that the entire matter be referred to a workshop study.

Mrs. Leffler rose to point out the legal implications of a learning disability teacher teaching a child with only a reading disability. She also stated that no parents have been consulted by the CCC regarding programs for their children. Mr. Bonmarito felt that a dual purpose for teachers would mean that the District would no longer be legally eligible for added funding.

Member Turner suggested that Dr. Hogan (1) put in writing his plan for the upcoming year and (2) make a cursory comparison with the Wayne-Westland School District. Sup't. Hoben stated that at this time no district in the State is in complete compliance with the law because of funding and that this district intends to comply as fast as possible. He pointed out that Lincoln Park, Trenton, Livonia and Taylor School Districts now use combination learning disability and reading specialists. Member Mirto asked that a complete report be made at a Board Workshop so it can be studied in a substantive manner since funds cannot be committed until all issues are known.

The consensus was that a workshop would be set up as soon as possible.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, Lawton, McClelland, Mack, Mirto and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

President McClelland noted the Certificate Award received from the Michigan State Police and the State of Michigan for 100 per cent inspection Standards for the District's school buses. He accepted it with a great deal of pride. Assistant Sup't. Hoedel pointed out that Mr. Cal Hurd, Chief Mechanic, should be commended for his part in making this award possible.

It was moved by Member Mirto and seconded by Member Gray to adjourn this meeting to a brief executive session.

Ayes: Members Benson, Gray, Lawton, McClelland, Mack, Mirto and Turner.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

During this time, the Plymouth district has been educating these students without any school tax return.

Finally, after two years of struggle with legal red tape, the situation has been corrected. The Plymouth Community School District has officially annexed the Napier Road section of Salem Township into its district.

"IT ALL STARTED two years ago when someone moved into that area and tried to register to vote," said Plymouth School Supt. John Hoben.

"We found out he was a non-legal resident in our school district. If we let him send his children to school in Plymouth, the district would have lost one state membership for each student."

A state membership refers to the amount of tax dollars the state allocates to a school district each year to educate one student. This year, that membership of \$193 plus the local Nine students from the Napier Road loop went to Plymouth schools this year. If the legal procedure to correct the problem is not completed, the tax loss to the Plymouth school district could be more than \$5,000.

THE QUESTION originally was whether Northville would accept these students and educate them or to change the boundaries of the Plymouth district to include that section of land. The Plymouth School District decided to take them into its boundaries.

"First, we needed the residents' approval before we went ahead with the district change. It would have been foolish to change the boundaries if the residents were against it," said Hoben.

A public meeting was held with all the residents involved and only one family wanted to stay in the Northville district. Everyone else wanted their children to remain in the Plymouth school system.

The next step was to petition both school boards to transfer the land.

"We had to petition three times because each time there was something wrong with the previous petition," explained Hoben.

IN THE FIRST petition there was a problem concerning the legal wording of 'real and personal property.' The second petition corrected that legal language but later it was realized two lots in the area were not included on the petition. The third petition corrected both problems.

To transfer the land to the Plymouth district, both districts had

to file a petition through a major intermediate at a public meeting held in all counties involved. Since the Plymouth district is in Washtenaw and Wayne counties, and the Northville district is in Wayne and Oakland, all three counties agreed to let the Wayne County Intermediate School District conduct the hearing.

At the joint public hearing held May 20, the Plymouth, Northville and Wayne County Intermediate School Districts acted to transfer the land to the Plymouth Community School District. The Wayne County district ruled in favor of the petition.

LAST YEAR, the Michigan Legislature granted the two districts one year to settle the boundary transfer. Since it was not completed by May 1, the final day of the time limit, the school districts had to go through the entire legal procedure again in order to avoid the penalty of losing school tax returns.

"This was originally an omission error, not an administration error and we should not be penalized because of it," emphasized Hoben.

The districts received one year relief from penalty of losing the school tax money but it did not complete the transfer within that period. "We thought we would get the transfer done within one year, but it took longer than we figured," he continued.

State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth), lobbyist Gerald Dunn and other officials have played an important role in the struggle. In Lansing, they have been working with the Legislature to intervene on the penalty problem of losing school tax returns because of the incomplete legal procedures.

"THIS WAS A monumental mistake," said Hoben, "and I wonder how many mistakes there are like this throughout the state. For at least 25 years these students have been coming to the Plymouth School District and we were educating them without any tax return."

Hoben said some of the 1947 graduates from that area went to Plymouth schools, but they paid tuition. In 1969, students from the Napier Road loop were taken into the Plymouth School District, but the membership problem was never legally taken care of.

"Now, with the help of the North-

ville School District, we have taken care of the problem. We still have to go through the legal procedure again," he said, "but I do not have any qualms about it being passed by the legislature. I am most happy to finally get this problem solved."

At midnight, June 9, 10 days after the ruling by the Wayne County Intermediate School District, the Napier Road loop legally became part of the Plymouth Community School District and the residents legally were able to vote in the Plymouth district elections the next day.

Hoben pointed out that one advantage of the district transfer of land for those residents will be a one mill reduction in school taxes.



Members of the mutual clerks' union decided that in a vote Thursday when they crushed any hopes for Sunday racing at time and a half by a

290-35 margin. Unless we received the wrong information the vote was whether to work on Sundays for time and a half or not.

Inasmuch as Vice President and General Manager Dick Wilson, of the DRA, restated the track's position that it couldn't pay more than time and a half, then it would seem Sunday racing is a lost cause at the track this year.

HOWEVER, THERE'S always the possibility the DRA might change its mind and consider double time on Sundays with two dark days or a total of five days of racing each week. We do not think that will happen in 1974.

On the east side of the city, Hazel Park management is starting negotiations on a new contract with the union and Sunday racing is expected to be a major item. It will be interesting to see what happens there during the six weeks left before the start of the 120 day meeting.

In Wilson's thinking was the fact that the DRA has only a limited number of Sundays left and no clear idea of the value of the Sunday programs could be made in such a short time.

Most racegoers freely predict Sunday racing would bring a handle of well over a million but suppose a crowd of 7,000 showed up and only \$700,000 went through the mutual machines. With double time for all union members, it could mean the track had in effect two \$350,000 days with all on a normal pay schedule. Should that take place, then the track would find itself deeper in the hole than it is.

Perhaps it might be wise for all to take a look at the picture and see if Sunday racing will be the bonanza all predict but none actually knows from experience.

IT WILL BE interesting to see what names go into the entry box Thursday for the 26th renewal of the \$100,000 Michigan Mile and an eighth on Saturday at the Detroit Race Course.

Racing Secretary Tom Dorsey announced the weights for the handicap event earlier in the week and it appears almost a foregone conclusion that Forego, the nation's leading handicap horse, may not be in the field. Dorsey allotted weight of 130 pounds to the eastern star.

Next in line is Prove Out with 120 followed by Tri Jet 118, Forage 117, Arbes Boy 116, Big Whippendale 116, Prince Dantan 116, Everton II 115, Tom Tulle 115 and Royal Knight 115.

Golden Don, surprise winner a year ago, was given 113 pounds and two standout three-year-olds Heir To The Line and Rube The Great get in with 110.

For the local standouts, Dorsey allotted Lone Bird 111, Canadian Jeff 110, Dr. Pantano 110, Master Robit 110, Kilfoil 109, Ace Commander 108, and Road Man 107.

sioner he reported the information to State Steward Frank Meharg.

The commissioner's report indicates Dilworth took a polygraph examination given by the Michigan State Police and passed it.

Champion, a licensed driver in Michigan in 1972, currently racing in Kentucky, denied the statements of Dilworth. However, the commissioner's report shows he refused to take a polygraph examination.

Huntoon also denied the testimony of Dilworth. In examination he told the racing commissioner he had no arrest record. The commissioner's report of the hearing indicates Huntoon had four convictions in violation of the Drunk Motor Vehicle Law and one for reckless driving.

In his final analysis, the commissioner reports it was concluded that Huntoon did pay \$300 to Dilworth for the purpose of inducing Dilworth to finish out of the money in the race.

WITHOUT COMMENT, the commissioner ruled the 1974 suspension of Champion in view of his testimony. The ruling on Dilworth was made in view of his admissions, testimony and mitigating factors during the hearing of the Huntoon matter.

Thus ends what could have become a real black spot in the Michigan harness racing picture. Perhaps the com-

missioner did take a year and a half before making a ruling but better he made a final decision than to have the matter hang unresolved.

It should serve as a warning to all others with similar inclinations that such incidents do seep into the open and can be dealt with severely after the proper investigation.

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
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


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
