## Teachers, schools at impasse; 45-15 program's death likely

PLYMOUTH — Negotiations between the Plymouth School District and its teachers apparently reached an impasse early Thursday morning which has sounded the death knell for year round school this year.

As of Friday afternoon no settlement with the Plymouth Education Association (PEA, teachers' union) was in sight and no bargaining sessions were scheduled for over the weekend.

The pilot 45-15 program for year round school was scheduled to begin today (Monday) in Miller Elementary School. But on June 14 the teachers involved in the program said they would not teach unless a 1974-75 contract were settled with the teachers.

PEA AND SCHOOL officials were hopeful a bargaining session late Wednesday, which ran into early Thursday morning, would be fruitful but no agreement was reached. The PEA said afterwards the board's final offer was not enough and the board said Wednesday's offer was final.

Both the PEA and the schools released statements to the Plymouth Observer & Eccentric admitting they had reached an impasse.

If the teachers do not report to Miller School today the 45-15 program will be scrubbed. Parents involved in the program may find out whether to send their children to school on Tuesday by calling the school's hotline number — 455-5000.

At a special meeting last Monday night, the board unanimously agreed to make Wednesday noon the deadline for a teacher settlement in time to implement the 45-15 program but later, unofficially, said the program would start if the teachers showed up for school today.

PEA President Dolly Carter said last week, however, that the Miller teachers were sticking by their earlier decision not to teach if a contract was not settled.

IN A TAPE-RECORDED message on the PEA hotline Thursday, Mrs. Carter said:

"The PEA bargaining team has made it clear to the administration that unless there is a change in the (settlement) parameters set by the school board" further negotiating would "be an exercise in futility." She also said on that message, "If the 45-15 program does not begin

Monday as scheduled, the onus of the program not opening rests squarely on the shoulders of the board's negotiating team.

"We sincerely hope the board will reexamine its parameters given to its team with the expectation an agree-

## Twp. candidates discuss issues

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP — The seven Plymouth Township candidates in races with primary battles have responded to questions posed by the Plymouth Observer & Eccentric.

Their statements appear in today's edition. The two township supervisor candidates were allotted three pages to respond to their questions while the township treasurer candidates were allotted two pages.

Since Township Clerk Helen Richardson faces no opposition in the primary or the general election and since the two township trustee candidates in each party face no opposition in the primary election, they were not asked to respond to questions.

A candidates' forum for Plymouth Township will be held at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday at Plymouth Township Hall under the sponsorship of the local League of Women Voters and American Association of University Women chapters.

Each of the candidates at the forum will be asked, "What are your prior-

ities for Plymouth Township? How would you implement them?"

Four minutes will be allotted to each candidate's answer and following all the candidates' responses, written questions will be taken from the floor.

For the candidates' statements appearing today as a public service of the Plymouth Observer & Eccentric, each candidate was asked to answer the following questions:

"How should the township meet law enforcement needs of the future?"

"Should sanitary sewer be extended westward into the township?"

"How do you stand on unification with the city?"

"What are your feelings, in general, about rezonings and future development in the township?"

In addition, the township supervisor candidates were asked, "Should the township consider implementing municipal refuse collection?" and the treasurer candidates were asked, "Will the township be able to operate at current service levels in the future without raising taxes?"

## Canton fire runs up 35%; safety millage sought

CANTON—In response to a sharp rise in the number of fire calls, the Canton Township Board of Trustees plans to hire six firemen and add two bays to the fire station if township voters approve a 10-year three-mill public safety levy Aug. 6.

According to Township Clerk John Flodin, the millage could be expected to produce an annual revenue of nearly \$400,000 in 1975.

At the township's current state equalized valuation (SEV), one mill completely collected would provide an income of \$114,000. Flodin estimated that in 1975 revenues from one mill would be about \$141,000, with a three-mill income of about \$400,000 at the usual rate of tax collection.

According to fire department figures, the demand for fire service in

the township has soared in recent years.

In 1972, Canton firefighters made 755 runs. Last year the total was 1,022, an increase of 35 per cent in a single year. So far this year the department has made 600 runs and Fire Chief Melvin Paulun estimates that before the year is out firefighting vehicles will have responded to more than 1,200 calls.

Paulun placed the cost of the two-bay addition, which would house a new tower-type ladder truck already on order, at about \$112,000.

Starting salaries for Canton firemen are about \$10,350, with an added 25 per cent of that sum going for fringe benefits. The cost of hiring six firemen would run about \$75,000 annually.

The township has applied for federal emergency employment funds to pay the cost of hiring new firemen for

the remainder of this year, but even if the grant isn't approved, the safety millage would allow the township to hire the six additional men.

According to Flodin, the board of trustees does not have to levy the entire three mills and very likely would not do so.

"The board has not made a judgment about whether it needs this much money or not," he said. "We're going to levy that portion of the three mills which there's need for. The feeling is that ultimately future township boards will need this revenue."

The two factors which could create a need for the rest of the millage, Flodin said, are a proposed second fire station at the corner of Haggerty and Warren roads and the possibility that the township may have to start its own police force.

Fire Chief Paulun estimated that the cost of the new station at current prices would be somewhere between \$225,000 and \$300,000.

According to Flodin, the demand for increased fire protection has been spurred in part by the February house fire on Arlington which killed all four members of the James Burnham family.

Flodin said that if the millage is approved, the board would have until Sept. 15, when the budget is set, to determine how the new funds should be spent.

The Wayne County Sheriff's Department has threatened to withhold police protection in county townships as of Aug. 31. The move would force Can-

ton either to start its own department or pay the sheriff's department to patrol.

He said that the township would "They have made that threat before," Flodin said. "If they do this, it will become this community's responsibility to provide police protection."

probably have the option of paying the sheriff's department to patrol the township on a 24-hour basis. The annual cost of this service could be as much as \$220,000.

"The cost of starting a police department is also substantial," Flodin said. "A decision would have to be made

about which is the best buy for the township. All of these monies would be likely to come out of the three mills."

Flodin said that the three-mill levy would cost a resident who owned a \$30,000 home assessed at 50 per cent cash value \$45 annually.

## Oversight delays Joy-Sheldon center rezoning

CANTON—Failure to notify Plymouth Township residents voided a public hearing scheduled for Tuesday night by Canton Township planning commissioners on a rezoning request involving a neighborhood shopping center at Joy and Sheldon Roads.

The proposed development would be at the southwest corner—directly across Sheldon Road from the controversial Mocerri Project site involving a regional shopping center. The Mocerri development was turned down by the township trustees, but the decision is being appealed in court by Mocerri.

The public hearing this week involved a request from Brookville Asso-

ciates of Plymouth to change to C-2 (general business) 20 acres along Joy.


The 20-acre site is part of previously approved Forest Trails planned unit development. The easterly seven acres were originally approved for restricted office development with 150 multiple-family units to be constructed on the remaining 13 acres.

After discussing the request for more than an hour, Canton commissioners discovered they had failed to comply with the law by failing to notify Plymouth Township residents living within 300 feet of the proposed development of the public hearing.

The commission then re-set Aug. 20 as the date of the public hearing.

## Governor backs transit bonds

Governor William G. Milliken recently said on Senate passage of HB 5677, the transportation bonding issue, "I am pleased the legislature has decided to let Michigan voters decide on meeting present and future transportation needs through issuance of \$1.1 billion in bonds."

"The overwhelming bipartisan vote in both chambers shows that legislators from all parts of the state support the proposal and further demonstrates the growing awareness that the proposal is geared to meet the

needs of all of Michigan—as well as part of Michigan," Milliken said.

Milliken said that he will immediately begin to confer with individual groups and organizations on the formation of a statewide blue ribbon Committee to lead the campaign for public approval of the bond issue which Milliken called vital to the transportation systems.

"I hope this action represents the beginning of a new era of statewide transportation that meets human, social, business and industrial need."

## Beware of police fundraising events

In a letter released early this month, the Better Business Bureau of Metropolitan Detroit indicated it is becoming concerned with fundraising activities of many police groups who loan their names to promoters of circuses, grand old oprys, Easter — Christmas parties, track meets, safety and crime booklets, or organizational magazines in exchange for 15-25 per cent of the gross income.

The bureau says it is receiving "many expressions of irritation and protest," from these promotions, many of which are "illegal."

The Bureau in its letter titled "What Ever Happened to the Good Old Policeman's Ball?" stated:

"We are concerned that such reputable organizations, particularly in

the law enforcement field, persist in conducting these promotions.

"Such solicitations are a direct violation of the law in many Michigan communities which require filing of pertinent information and obtaining necessary permits."

Police organizations should take a position of leadership in this area, according to the bureau which writes, "If organizations of law enforcement people do not have to comply with the law, who does?"

The bureau explained it is "not criticizing those fund-raising activities in which police do the work and the money collected goes to the cause they expound," but the professional promoters and massive telephone appeals using the "name of some police organization in a rehearsed pitch."

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# Canton DPW Car 54, 'Where are you?'

CANTON—If the police departments of Dearborn and Pontiac, Jackson's department of public works and the State of Ohio don't mind, Canton may finally get a radio band frequency for its DPW and building department vehicles.

Township Clerk John Flodin has been trying without success for four years to find a place on the radio dial for the crews and inspectors of Canton Township. It's not an easy task in southeastern Michigan.

The area has so many radio-equipped governmental units that frequencies often overlap. Developing communities like Canton get caught in a squeeze on the crowded radio band.

By now Flodin has nearly memorized the tricky application route.

He first brought his case to Lansing four years ago. The township's first step was to file a request for a frequency with the Michigan Frequency Advisory Committee.

The committee's job is to find a place on the dial where there is a minimum of overlapping between governmental units. Letters are sent out to all governments on frequencies in the neighborhood of the one tentatively granted to a new applicant.

"All they have to do is call in and protest," Flodin said. A single complaint that the new frequency would interfere with an existing one is sufficient grounds to deny the application.

Last year Canton Township made it past this first hurdle.

If none of the communities with overlapping frequencies objects, the application is sent on to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) in Washington for final approval.

The FCC is responsible for determining whether the applicant's new frequency will interfere with a Canadian station. In that case permission must be secured from the affected Canadian government.

Canton's last try for a frequency all its own lost out when the city of Amherstburg, Ont., said the overlapping

would create interference with its own system.

If the FCC hears of no objections the application is granted.

Funds for the system, which could cost about \$10,000, were allocated four years ago. The radios cost \$500 per unit and would be placed in eight department of public works and building department vehicles.

Flodin noted that in an emergency, such as a break in a water main, DPW crews could be on the scene within minutes where now city officials might have to hunt them down by car at the other end of the township.

"There's a great advantage in being able to contact people in the field," he said. "The system can save you money, the departments can operate more efficiently."

He went before the Frequency Advisory Committee in Lansing again last month. The group examined the township's application and assigned a frequency. The only hitch is that the police departments of Dearborn and Pontiac, Jackson's DPW and the State of Ohio all operate on that frequency.

"I was kind of mad when I went up there," Flodin said. "But after I listened to their problems I had sympathy for them."

"It's not a question of their not

wanting us to have a frequency, the problem is coordinating the whole blanket of them." The area is too congested.

"If you wanted a radio frequency in the upper peninsula you wouldn't have any trouble," one advisory committee official told Flodin.

According to state statute, the communities who would be overlapped by Canton's new frequency must register their objections within the next few weeks. Flodin hopes to receive permission sometime next month to go ahead with the radio set-up.

If only Dearborn and Pontiac don't mind.

## Annexation gets Rozian abstention

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP — Irving Rozian, a Plymouth Township resident and member of the State Boundary Commission, has said he will abstain on the upcoming annexation question.

The boundary commission has set an Aug. 31 date for a legal sufficiency hearing on two petitions filed by the City of Plymouth which seek annexation of parts of the township.

Rozian endorsed consolidation of the

city and the township before the recent consolidation election, and was therefore criticized by Township Treasurer Elizabeth Holmes and Col. Joe Parisi, executive director of the Michigan Township Association, for "conflict of interest."

In a letter to the boundary commission, the city, the township and the Plymouth Observer & Eccentric, Rozian said he will not vote on the annexation matters when they come before

the boundary commission. "Although advised by counsel that no conflict of interest exists, I wish to avoid a procedural challenge to the actions of the State Boundary Commission," Rozian said.

"Therefore it is my intention to abstain from participation in the commission's proceedings on the Plymouth area annexation petitions currently on file."

## Spisak quits county race

Because Westland Police Lt. Andrew Spisak likes his job more than politics, the Democratic primary for the 27th county commission nomination has narrowed from four to three candidates.

With two weeks left before the Aug. 6 primary, Spisak, 39, announced his withdrawal and urged his supporters to vote for Royce Smith, Belleville mayor.

Spisak said Smith is "the most capable to serve the people of Wayne County."

THE OFFICER said his decision to pull out of the campaign was based on a feeling that he is "better suited" for police work than public office.

Spisak felt confident of winning the primary and serving as county commissioner in the district which includ-

es the south portion of Westland plus Canton and Plymouth.

The Democratic primary winner would automatically win the commission seat since there are no Republican candidates on the ballot for the Nov. 5 election.

If elected, Spisak said he would have felt "like a duck out of water."

"I love being a policeman and I always have," he said.

"I can best serve the community in doing what I do best."

SPISAK, A policeman for 14 years, said he would donate any unspent campaign funds to County Commissioner Tom Taylor, facing a primary fight in the 20th district, which covers Garden City and half of Westland.

Taylor, a former Westland police sergeant, and Spisak have been personal friends for 14 years.

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# Plymouth Township candidates discuss issues

**J. D. McLaren (Rep.), of 12815 Beacon Hill Drive.**

It is my personal feeling that there is nothing more boring and less read than a continuing run of statements, policies and promises made by candidates for office.

In this case, both candidates are in the same position in relation to their conduct of the office of supervisor.

The voters are most capable of comparing the months in office of each candidate in relation to how the job has been handled, and from their reactions will cast their vote accordingly. With this feeling, I would like to have seen no money spent by either candidate or by committees for either one, but rather an agreement between the candidates to contribute those monies to any church, charitable or other worthwhile cause.

As for biographical information: I have been a lifetime resident of the Plymouth community. A graduate of Plymouth High School (class of 1933), attended the Detroit Business University, Wayne State University and the University of Michigan. I am the third generation owner of McLaren-Silkworth Oil Company and McLaren-Silkworth Oil Company. A member of the Plymouth Community School District Board (1963-1967) and chairman of its Finance Committee. Member and chairman of the City of Plymouth Board of Review (1959-1970). Past president of the Smith School PTA married with two children. A daughter, Cynthia, a teacher in the Livonia school system, and a son, Dr. John, presently doing research work in Children's Hospital (UCLA) Hollywood, Calif. His wife Ning just gave birth to twins.

For your questions and in the order asked: Upon completion of an update from the police study committee, the November ballot will present to the voters of Plymouth Township a millage proposal for the establishment of a township police department.

In the foreseeable future I am confident that sewer and water will be extended to cover the entire township. The initial step has been taken by the township board of trustees to begin this program.

As to unification with the city, in view of recent events it would appear that we are in a "holding pattern" or a "cooling off period" and a great amount of "detente" is necessary.

Refuse collection is and will continue to be a problem of great concern to all units of government. It would be my hope that a township wide program can and will eventually be developed that would enable us to initiate our own refuse authority.

Finally, you ask about my feelings concerning rezonings in general and the development of the township. I think each re-zoning must be considered on its own merits and must be in harmony with the surrounding areas. The Township of Plymouth adopted a comprehensive development plan in 1966 which is long range in scope for the development of the township. The planning commission and the board of trustees are working toward the ultimate goal as outlined in this plan. The advent of two major expressways will, no doubt, have an impact on the plans for future development. I am confident that the township as a whole, will benefit greatly by the forward steps to be taken. The orderly growth of the township is and should be a major concern to all of us.



MAURICE M. BREEN

**Maurice M. Breen (Rep.), of 40921 Greenbrier.**

Maurice M. Breen, Age 41, married. Three children in the Plymouth schools. Wife, Mary, is a teacher. An attorney with governmental background as: former Special Assistant Attorney General, State of Michigan; former staff attorney, Wayne County Road Commission; member and chairman, Plymouth Township Planning Commission; member, Plymouth Township Board of Trustees; Plymouth Township Supervisor 1970-1972; chairman, Western Wayne Out-County Supervisors' Association; vice-chairman, Western Mayors and Supervisors' Association; member of executive committee of SEMCOG.

I am a township supervisor candidate because I am unhappy with the complete lack of leadership displayed by our current supervisor. A review of the period 1972 to present indicates the supervisor's propensity for absolving himself from debate of the issues by the establishment of committees.

The result is the lack of any responsibility for guidance of the township. Every positive program has faltered from this lack of leadership. The most glaring examples are the complete breakdown of city-township working relationships, a failure to properly implement the recreation program and the display of total ignorance of the financial and economic impact of following a policy of negativism respecting the installation of municipal services which have been voted by the township board.

The supervisor is supposed to represent all segments of the community. We have been subjected to an un-leading supervisor who has allowed himself to represent only the negative element in the township and who has failed to debate openly the pro and con of all issues.

More specifics as follows: Q How should the township meet law enforcement needs of the future?

Our current supervisor appointed ANOTHER committee to answer this. We have had committees ad nauseam as well as studies and cost projections. I assume we will now have a referendum on the subject. The result of the referendum will determine the future course of action.

The supervisor has not publicly approached this issue. My personal view, based on past studies, is that to have a viable police force over which the township would have control is to enter into an arrangement with an existing police department. The Wayne County Sheriff is under the control of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners and that body has already demonstrated that its paramount concern is money. A contractual arrangement with the City of Plymouth would allow township control of the police activity at the least cost. The start up of an independent township police force is not financially sound.

Q Should sanitary sewer be extended westward into the township?

That decision was made by the board of trustees in 1968 and the answer was "yes." The reasons were:

(a.) Sanitary sewer extension was an inevitable necessity and should therefore progress in a rational manner before costs were out of sight.

(b.) The M-14 expressway would cut up the township and sanitary sewers should be extended before the expressway arrives in order to cut the cost of the inevitable extension.

(c.) There was a demonstrated need for sanitary sewer in already developed areas in the west.

These conditions have not changed. The cost has jumped fantastically. The 1.5 million dollar project has a projected cost increase to two million (25 percent) before computing bond interest cost. Further delay will only increase the cost to the township.

There is no property tax increase necessary to construct the sanitary sewer. This is a revenue bond issue and will be paid for by the users of the system. The township has already paid more than \$60,000 for engineering costs; failure to utilize the plans now would be irresponsible.

A sanitary sewer will not be instant development. Present zoning and projected zoning will limit development to the present type of use.

Q How do you stand on unification with the city?

Annexation, consolidation, unification are emotional words which obscure the realities. During my term as supervisor we enjoyed a good working relationship with the city and we lost no autonomy. The last two years that working relationship has disintegrated.

I believe we should be working together to achieve better service to the township and not indulge in personal vendettas. This applies to city leadership as well. The latest annexation request by the city was ill-conceived and did the community a great disservice.

Q Should the township consider implementing a municipal refuse collection?

The township has considered this question and it should be pursued. Most of our residents now contract individually for this service. If a municipal contract will lower the individual cost then it would follow that it should be implemented.

Q What are your feelings about rezonings and, in general, what are your feelings about development in the township?

Rezoning should follow a realistic comprehensive development plan and should not destroy the residential integrity of existing neighborhoods. The entire township has a stake in replan-

ing. Those of us in established residentially-zoned areas resent the attempt to inundate our area with commercial, high rise and high density development. I have consistently followed this concept and will continue to do so. There is room for a variety of land use in the township but it should be mandated by comprehensive rezoning and not rezoning by the courts or on a parcel by parcel basis. We can not hide our heads in the sand and pretend that there will be no use put to vacant land.

**Weyona Lee Fidge (Rep.), of 49125 N. Territorial Rd.**

Married—two sons, Larry, 18, Jeff, 15, daughter Leslee, 7. Children have attended schools in the Plymouth school system. Plymouth Township property owner for 15 years, resident for 10 years. Graduate of Fordson High School, Dearborn, graduate and earned assoc. degree of science, registered nurse, Henry Ford Community College, Dearborn. Presently homemaker. Experience as bookkeeper for three firms. Elected officer and active member of PTA's, youth steering committees, charitable fund raising association, civic and community clubs, school and township election worker, and assisted League of Women Voters school study group.

(1) From delving into the area of taxation I have come to believe the township can operate at current service levels without increasing taxes if our SEV increases approximately 10 per cent per year to keep pace with the current inflationary trends.

(2) I believe that it is the sheriff's department's constitutional obligation to provide police protection for the unincorporated areas in the county. However, last fall's advisory vote indicates that the township board should consider the establishment of local law enforcement agency.

I feel that such a local police force would be of special value in dealing with township problems and the enforcement of ordinances.

(3) This past spring election on consolidation with the city is the main determinant for my opinion. After an analysis of the two governments and the availability of the study to the people, the proposal was defeated 4-1 in the township. If the electorate has a voice in this community as to the type of government desired, I feel it would be my duty as an elected official to abide by such decisions.

If at some future date the feeling of the community is in favor of some form of unification, it should certainly be given consideration by the government bodies involved.

(4) In order to safeguard the growth of Plymouth Township as an asset to meet the community's needs, the township government must update and adopt a zoning master plan. This will help prevent the pitfall of "spot zoning." Where planning is vague and subject to personal feelings or opinions decisions can often be influenced by mere expediency or economic pressure for development.

Uncontrolled growth in a community has far reaching consequences as: resulting higher rates for utilities, increased property taxes, overcrowded schools, inadequate transportation facilities, and careless loss of irreplaceable open lands.

(5) Sewer extensions to areas other than where present needs indicate can result in scattered, inefficient, and highly explosive growth patterns. Again for better planning, controlled development, and protection of the community's interests a master zoning plan including projected utility needs and traffic patterns is a vital necessity.

Thomas G. Notebaert, candidate for treasurer of Plymouth Township Born Aug. 9, 1922 in Detroit. Married to Rita and father of Craig and Michelle. Graduated from Holy Redeemer High School. Attended University of Illinois, school of engineering, and the University of Michigan, department of real estate appraising. Came to Plymouth in November 1945 as Dodge-Plymouth dealer, Forest Motor Sales. Sold out 1956 and joined Joseph L. Hudson to form J. L. Hudson Real Estate Company. Sold out 1967 to form Tom Notebaert Real Estate Company.

Through my efforts the Gould Industrial Park, Plymouth Estates Subdivision and the Hillcrest Apartments and various developments in the city of Plymouth became a reality. I believe my background of experience will be of help to the efficient operation of our township government.

As to the future costs for services now provided by the township, expansion of services will no doubt cause some increase in taxes. However, with planned growth these increases will be spread to a greater number of property owners so the burden will not be unbearable to a few.

Presently, law enforcement provided by the sheriff's department and state police seems adequate. However, as we grow no doubt additional services will be required. There will be a greater tax base with which to work so that the individual will not have to pay as much as he now would if the additional services were to be provided at the present time.

As a long time resident of the Plymouth community, I'm sure that all the residents of both the city and the township alike want to maintain the atmosphere we presently enjoy. I realize we have a great area for growth and I am convinced that growth can take place without destroying what we now have.

I feel unification with the city of Plymouth should some time come about. With continued cooperation and sharing of services the merger could be painless and congenial.

As to the extension of sewers to the west of the township, there are some areas in need presently and with inflation what it is, we might save ourselves considerable monies by proceeding now, provided of course, that bonding is available for such a project.

Anna (Ann) Milligan of 42405 Schoolcraft Rd. Age 40. Education: High School, Cum Laude. Resident of the township 20 years. Married and the mother of one daughter. More than 20 years of business experience as office manager with the responsibility for bookkeeping, internal accounting, pay-

roll, supervisory control and coordination of inter-department activities. Presently employed at Enviro-Fab Inc., Detroit (formerly Plymouth Tank & Fabricating) as purchasing agent & receptionist.

1. As long as the township continues to operate at current service levels, I see no reason why the taxes should be raised in the future.

2. The future law enforcement needs of the township will mean the formation of our own police department. At the present, we do have the Sheriff and State Police, but how much longer can we depend upon their protection? That's the question. As long as we have outside assistance, I would like to see the township establish a police department even if it is with two or four men. This will give us a nucleus for a larger force as the township warrants it.

3. When it comes to my stand on unification with the city (and I'm sticking my neck out on this) I would rather see consolidation than annexation. If we did consolidate, the people of the township would have a voice in the new charter. If annexed, we would have no say and be more or less "slaves" of the city.

Consolidation would give additional services that we are going to require in the future with least increase in taxes. I can hear many of you now saying "more taxes?" Look at your tax bills, you will note that seven per cent of it is for township use.

Governments are like cars, extras do cost. At the present the township and the city work harmoniously together as a school district; then why can't we live and work together as one community? Petty feuds are not for adults.

4. Rezoning is a tender spot with me. It is one of the main reasons I became involved and ran for office two years ago. I realize rezoning is inevitable, but it should be done for the good and the majority of the township, not for a certain few. Offices and businesses should not be placed in residential areas. A place for everything and everything in its place. This should guide us in the future development of the township.

5. Sanitary sewers should be extended westward in the township as the need arises. My husband has more than 30 years as a construction and layout engineer, so I do have some knowledge of water mains and sewers.

The western part of our township still has to be developed, but this must be done with foresight and planning. As a closing thought, I BELIEVE that the word "planning" should be the foremost thought when it comes to the future growth of our community.

1. Taxation - I'm confident the township can operate the next year or two without raising taxes; if we operate at the current service level.

If it is the desire of the people of the township to increase police and fire protection, have additional services such as rubbish disposal and street maintenance it will probably be necessary to seek additional revenue.

2. Meeting law enforcement needs of the future - I suggest three possibilities of increasing our law enforcement:

(A) Enlarge the Wayne County Sheriff Department.

(B) Consider the possibility of a working agreement with the law enforcement body of the City of Plymouth.

(C) The township establish its own police department.

3. Unification with City of Plymouth - It is my hope that greater understanding of each others problems be discussed and resolved for the betterment of all concerned.

4. Rezoning and future development - In rezoning one should be familiar with the master plan and work closely with the township planning commission.

Rezoning generally should be approved only when it will be beneficial to future development of the township.

5. Extension of sanitary sewer westward - According to the information I've received this question has been resolved.

Age-36, wife and mother of three. Active in PTA and member of the Michigan Democratic Party.

The following is in response to your questions:

The township is capable of providing some services adequately in the future without a raise in taxes. We have a well-staffed fire department with up-to-date equipment for the most part.

Water and sewer service can be maintained without additional millage if the water rates are raised. (Present township water rates are much lower than in the city of Plymouth.) This would also help finance sanitary sewers presently being extended westward along main roads. The Wayne County Road Commission maintains our roads on a contractual basis. This seems adequate for the moment.

However, we have the great factor of population growth, and growth can mean progress only if we recognize that with it must come change. Certain changes will have to be made particularly regarding police protection and recreation.

This brings up the question of future law enforcement needs. I believe we should maintain our own police department, this would however, require additional millage.

Unification with the City of Plymouth is a strong emotional issue. I have found out. It shouldn't be. After reading the MSU consolidation report which was neither pro nor con I fail to see why Plymouth Township would get the "short end of the stick" as many believe. However, I do believe we can operate adequately as a township for some years to come.

On the future development of the township, we should not become shortsighted on recreational needs. Federal funds should provide for much of this and the present township government deserves praise for its recent purchases of recreational sites.

I was born and raised on a farm in the thumb of Michigan and I have lived in Plymouth Township for 13 years. I am a wife and mother of three children, and I am deeply concerned about providing recreational areas for all our children in the city and the township, and preserving some of the beauty of the western portion of the township for the benefit of all.

## Erwin wants leadership in state House

Robert Erwin, candidate for the Democratic nomination for the 37th state House district in the Aug. 6 primary, declared the state needs new leadership in the Legislature and said that incumbents are in trouble in this year's elections.

Erwin, talking to the Wayne-Westland Democratic Club of which he is a board member, said that the state "has been stagnating in the political pollution of Watergate for more than a year and the cesspool in Washington has infected not only our political system but also our economy, our employment and our entire way of life."

He cited recent Democratic Senate primaries in Ohio and Arkansas as examples that incumbents are not safe from defeat despite endorsements of the party and labor unions.

"The incumbency of candidates of either party is no assurance of reelection," Erwin said. Voters "will no longer be satisfied with representatives who are 'do-nothings' except during election campaigns."

The program will also include works by Milhaud, Ives and Schubert. Also featured will be the Faculty Woodwind Quintet and pianists Donald Morelock and Allen Shaffer.

General admission is \$2 for adults and \$1 for students and children.

## Milliken urges funding for urban transit

Governor William G. Milliken has urged Michigan's congressional delegation and others in Washington to help secure full funding for urban transit in Southeast Michigan in the pending Federal Mass Transit Act of 1974.

Milliken noted the Legislature has authorized placing a \$1.1 billion state-wide transportation bond issue on the November ballot which would benefit all of Michigan. It would include funds for transit in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, St. Clair, Washtenaw, Monroe and Livingston counties.

"This bonding initiative should be a strong argument for including Detroit among federal transit aid 'impact' cities eligible to share \$14.4 billion of a proposed \$24 billion, five-year federal appropriation," said Milliken.

The proposed legislation is before the House Public Works Committee. Present wording on the act, which was drafted before the Legislature acted on the \$1.1 billion Michigan program, gives funds to cities which have advanced urban transit system plans and sources of revenue. Included are Chicago, Washington, D.C., San Francisco, Pittsburgh, Baltimore and Atlanta.

"To assure sufficient federal funds for the SEMTA program at the earliest possible time, it is important to include authorization in the pending bill," the governor said.

"By including Detroit among the eli-

gible cities, it would help the entire SEMTA program."

Under SEMTA's 15-year-plan, the federal government would provide about \$3.2 billion, which is about 80 per cent of the total.

## Pines may ease paper shortage

Michigan's oversized Christmas trees may be one answer to the nation's paper shortage, according to Walter A. Lemmien, Michigan State University resident forester at the W. K. Kellogg Forest.

Lemmien said overgrown Scotch pine trees, intended to be Christmas trees, could be a new source of pulpwood.

These pine trees are now serving only as a refuge for wildlife and erosion control. Without proper management, some of the wildlife will be forced to leave.

More than 300,000 tons of paper can be obtained from forest thinnings before the final harvest around 1990.

Lemmien said the trees should not be forgotten because only five per cent of the trees are unusable as pulpwood.

## Reserves organize unit for lawyers

United States Air Force Judge Advocate General Department Reserve has established a legal assistance program at Selfridge Air Force Base.

The program will result in development and greater utilization of lawyer members of the JAG Reserve, as was announced by Brigadier General Walter D. Reed.

This program is to provide professional legal training for lawyer reservists and provide legal counsel to eligible military personnel.

General Reed stated the mission of the program is to: supplement the Air Force legal assistance program; to provide legal counsel to the military commander, active duty and reserve of all the services now located at Selfridge; and to perform other authorized legal duties which will benefit the overall mission of the military units at Selfridge.

Reed noted that with the recent decrease in military appropriations for active duty personnel, a greater reliance upon reservists is required by all the military services.

The five Air Force reserve lawyers taking part in the program include four practicing Detroit lawyers.

The are: MAJ Charles R. Rutherford, local JAGAR coordinator; MAJ Norman J. Rice; CPT Michael V. Marston, and CPT Dale D. Ruohomaki.

Dearborn lawyer, MAJ Jack G. Burwell is also participating.

Each JAG reservist will perform his monthly training on a Saturday at Selfridge and will render legal assistance to active duty military personnel of all services and to more than 5,000 retirees and dependents residing in the greater metropolitan area.

Military people eligible for legal assistance can obtain an appointment by calling Selfridge Air Force Base.

## Sonny Elliott, Ernest Jones have guest roles with band

Radio-TV personality Sonny Elliott and advertising executive Ernest A. Jones will make guest appearances with the Plymouth Community Band at Thursday's 8 p.m. concert in Plymouth's downtown Kellogg Park.

A highlight of the 90-minute program will be the performance of an original composition by Jerry H. Bilik, "The Band Played On," that introduces the various instruments of the band to the audience. The narration accompanying the band in this number, with Jones as guest conductor, will be given by Elliott.

The band's regular conductor, James Griffith, also will yield the baton to Jones for the final number, "A Tribute to Sousa," a medley of marches which ends with the original arrangement of John Philip Sousa's "Stars and Stripes Forever."

While this will mark Elliott's first appearance with the band, it is the fourth successive summer Jones has accepted Griffith's invitation to appear in the role of guest conductor.

Chairman of the board of D'Arcy-MacManus & Masius, one of the world's foremost advertising agencies, Jones is a 1939 graduate of the University of Michigan and long has been active in music as a relaxing avocation. He has conducted in Carnegie Hall and on frequent occasions in Michigan Stadium and Hill Au-

ditorium, Ann Arbor.

The Plymouth Community Band is in its 16th year and its 1974 series of Thursday evening open air concerts will continue through Aug. 1. Last week's concert, featuring guest conductor Dr. George Cavender, director of bands at the University of Michigan, attracted one of the largest throngs of the summer.

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
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# 2nd District rivals give impeachment views

Impeachment is a household word which is also being banded about in political campaigns for the Aug. 6 primary.

In an effort to illicit attitudes of candidates about impeachment, the Observer & Eccentric included this topic while questioning candidates in the 2nd Congressional District which includes Livonia and Plymouth.

The candidates were asked: "Based on present evidence, how would you vote on impeachment of President Nixon? If you favor it, on what grounds?"

Responses were received from Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) and the candidates seeking the Democratic nomination — Dr. Edward Pierce, Theo Williams, Mrs. Marjorie Lansing, Ronald Egnor and John Reuther.

PIERCE STRONGLY asserted: "Evidence already in proves beyond a

doubt to me that Richard Nixon systematically and maliciously deceived the American people.

"I favor impeachment on several grounds that I believe to be indisputable: The president has admitted to authorizing a plan which included illegal wiretapping; he has admitted to withholding evidence concerning the Ellsberg break-in for more than a month; his own transcripts show that statements he had made previously to the press were untrue.

"Nixon has done his best to put himself above the laws of this country, and for that he deserves impeachment."

WILLIAMS EXPLAINS he is in favor of a fair trial for anyone, and impeachment is the only way to have a trial of a U.S. president by the U.S. Senate.

"For Nixon, it is not only the 'Watergate case' but also the plumbers, the Fielding break-in, the campaign funds, misuse of the FBI and CIA.

Most certainly Nixon should answer in full for his infamous approval of 'The Huston plan,' a secret police program in effect for five days in 1970 (July 23-28), though Huston himself states that authorization for it was 'never formally rescinded.'

"Briefly said, Nixon should be tried for gross misconduct in office."

ESCH CAUTIONS that it is essential that every congressman or senator (or would-be congressman or senator) in no way prejudice the guilt or innocence of the president before the investigation is completed by the House Judiciary Committee.

"I believe that any congressman who prejudices on this matter is himself irresponsible. A congressman should cast his vote on the facts uncovered by the House Judiciary Committee, determining if there is probable cause that the president committed high crimes and misdemeanors."

MRS. LANSING said that, based on present evidence, she supports con-

gressional action calling for impeachment.

"The evidence continues to accumulate through convictions, guilty pleas, jail sentences, fines, and probation for a growing number of Nixon administration officials and 1972 campaign workers indicates illegal acts were not performed accidentally.

"Instead, they were part of a well-financed, and clandestine scheme to defraud the American public.

"In addition illegal funds preceded the 1972 elections, illegal wire-tapping and burglary were used to promote Nixon's goals, and law enforcement and the independence of the judiciary were made suspect by those actions.

"Moreover, evidence implicated Vice President Spiro Agnew in criminal conduct of gross proportions and flagrant abuse of public trust. Agnew's resignation, the 'Saturday Night Massacre,' the public distortions with reference to bombing and the conduct of the war, are some of the other activities which justify

the application of the impeachment process to Nixon."

EGNOR BELIEVES Nixon must be impeached and stand trial before the U.S. Senate.

"It is important to remember here that impeachment is not a judgement of 'guilty' but a constitutional political process to determine there is probable cause for a trial.

"When more than a score of the Nixon assistants, including his two top aides, have pleaded or been indicted on a wide range of charges, then probable cause exists for a 'yes' vote on impeachment."

REUTHER COMMENTS that, under the constitution, the impeachment process is the only way to halt abuse of government power.

"The tapes and transcripts have raised serious questions about President Nixon's role in the Watergate cover-up. I favor impeachment by the House of Representatives leading to a trial in the Senate because it is the only way to legally determine the president's guilt or innocence."

## Egnor speaks on drug scene

A balanced program of efficient law enforcement and supportive social programs holds the answer to this nation's drug problem, says Democratic congressional candidate Ronald W. Egnor speaking Wednesday at a campaign rally in Monroe County's Frenchtown Township. He is seeking nomination in the 2nd District.

Egnor said many existing antidrug programs rely almost exclusively on the law enforcement and spend almost no time or money on drug abuse education, which, according to Egnor, is like "treating the symptoms while ignoring the disease."

"We do need efficient, well-trained law enforcement teams to protect law-abiding citizens, and to remove drug offenders from the streets. But, once off the street, if we continue to treat the addict as a criminal, rather than a sick individual in need of helping, we are doomed to failure."

Mark Stephens, a senior at Plymouth Salem High School, has been named one of the 10 outstanding soloists for 1974 by the music committee of the Youth Arts Festival of Michigan Week.

The selection was made at an audition held at Central Michigan University among 80 finalists from all over the state. The competition culminated a series of festivals sponsored by various music organizations in Michigan which began with over 25,000 participants.

Stephens, a French hornist, performed "Concerto No. One" by Haydn. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harper Stephens of Plymouth. His music teachers are James Griffith and Michael Endres, Plymouth-Salem.

## Esch fiscal bill is approved

"Establishment of this committee is perhaps the most significant move in congress to reform its procedures during the last 20 years," says Congressman Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) about congressional passage of part of his Federal Fiscal Responsibility Act.

The bill established a "powerful budget committee" to oversee appropriations, review the president's budget and re-establish the fiscal year with the calendar year.

Deadline for implementation of the budget reform bill is 1976.

Esch says this bill "if faithfully implemented... would force Congress into more measured and timely action on budgetary legislation."

The new committee, according to Esch, would:

Require the adoption of a budget resolution setting target figures for total appropriations, total spending, tax and department levels;

Establish a detailed timetable setting deadline for floor action on various spending measures;

Shift the federal fiscal year to fit the congressional deliberations, to run from Oct. 1 to Sept. 30, providing an extra three months for congressional deliberation;

Place limits on backdoor spending programs, non-control tables, and presidential impoundment, and

Establish a budget office within the Congress to provide expertise.

Esch says "the implementation of this...bill depends on the approach taken by the house leadership to carefully follow its mandate, and it may all go down if the fight over membership on the committee becomes too embroiled."

## Pierce reveals personal assets

Dr. Ed Pierce, a candidate for the Democratic nomination in the 2nd Congressional District, has made public his tax returns for the past five years as well as a statement of his total personal assets.

Pierce said the information is being released "because I believe voters wish to know about the finances of their candidates for office."

"All my financial information, both personal and about my campaign, is open to public scrutiny so voters can be sure they are sending an honest, unought representative to Congress."

THE TAX returns show Pierce, a physician who gave up his private practice to open the Summit Medical Center in 1968, made an average of \$18,560 from the clinic in salary over the five-year period, roughly half of what he was making yearly in his previous returns.

The joint returns of Pierce and wife Mary Lee also showed that she earned an average of \$2,645 per year as a medical assistant in the center, and the couple had an average of \$1,146 in additional income for the period, for a total average income of \$22,199. On that income, Pierce paid \$13,023 in taxes over the five years, or \$2,605 per year.

His tax returns show total income of \$23,789 in 1969, \$20,834 in 1970, \$20,217 in 1971, \$20,652 in 1972, and \$25,505 in 1973.

A STATEMENT of the Pierces'

total assets showed \$43,000 which included savings, equity on their Ann Arbor home and a cottage, two automobiles and furnishings.

The assets statement showed \$4,000 in the Ann Arbor Bank, \$1,600 in Ann Arbor Credit Union, \$600 in Ann Arbor Federal, \$10,000 equity in land contract on a cottage, \$22,000 equity in home (\$16,093 left on mortgage), \$2,500 for a 1974 station wagon, \$300 for a 1967 VW and \$2,000 for furnishings.

## Senate passes Pursell bill on recycling

The Michigan Senate has passed a solid waste recycling bill described by recognized experts as a model for the nation.

The Resources Recovery Authority Act, SB946, was sponsored by Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) whose 14th District includes Livonia, Plymouth and Redford Township.

PURSELL PREDICTS: "I can foresee this law as a catalyst for recasting our entire concept of solid waste disposal.

"We have the foundation for making solid waste the raw material for thriving, beneficial industries, rather than an ugly burden to society.

"I am also enthusiastic about the fact we have structured the bill to give local governments the opportunity to play a pivotal role in this process.

"The key to it all is recycling technology and the concerted cooperation of local and state governments and private industry. It's my opinion industry and government can be successful partners for progress, rather than wary antagonists. My belief in that concept is the basis for the legislation."

PURSELL POINTED out that the effectiveness of the resource recovery bill hinges on determined intergovernmental cooperation between local governments.

The act provides a local government must give its approval before resource recovery efforts can be launched within its boundaries.

"We are trying to make the local units the leaders in this effort, rather than constructing a program which forces them to reluctantly go along with an imposed decision."

A four-member authority operating under the environmental protection agency of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) would be formed to provide coordination, planning and assistance to municipalities throughout Michigan.

# Schools back down at parents' expense

"The ABSOLUTE deadline for a teacher settlement that would allow 45-15 to start on time is noon Wednesday... er, maybe 2 p.m. Wednesday... possible 5 p.m. Wednesday... no, let's make it 8 a.m. Monday."

That, dear readers, is the "firm" stand the Plymouth school board is taking in the face of the Plymouth Education Association (PEA, teachers' union) attempt at using the pilot year round school program to make Plymouth a showcase for the Michigan Education Association.

Those parents who were in the audience at last Monday's school board meeting, where the board seemed to have things firmly in hand, will be surprised to know that not only did the board back down from its deadline, it increased its offer to the teachers after the deadline expired.

This is the kind of last minute negotiating where the store is given away. It's exactly what the PEA wanted in waiting until a month before 45-15 was to start to issue its demand for a contract settlement prior to the program's starting.

The Plymouth school board has apparently lost sight of the fact that the money it is giving away in a last-ditch effort to salvage 45-15 belongs to the taxpayers.

Now that the PEA knows how wishy washy the board is, it will carry on the timing and boycott threats until they get everything they want.

There was no need for the board to back down. It had offered to go to binding arbitration and the PEA turned it down.

When the year round school program was first considered, the PEA indicated it would cooperate with the board in implementing it.

## With Malice Toward None

Surely the parents of the Miller elementary school area, who were to be affected by the 45-15 program or its alternatives, knew then where to put to blame.

Now, by backing down, the board has allowed the PEA to put the school administration in the middle of the fight — caught on one hand by the PEA demands and the board's ever-increasing generosity on the other. How can administrators negotiate under those conditions and with board members becoming directly involved?

In the tape recorded PEA hotline message on Tuesday night, Union President Dolly Carter said the PEA was rejecting the board's offer at binding arbitration and thus "we anticipate at first some possibly damaging coverage in the press and want you to be aware this is to be expected and construed as pressure on their part."

Well, Dolly, here it is. The schools offered the Miller teachers a retroactive agreement that would allow the program to start and the teachers involved to receive whatever increases were later negotiated. Instead, the union chose to use the Miller students as pawns and appar-

ently the school board — at the last minute — lost its nerve in standing up against such tactics.

Why wouldn't the PEA agree to binding arbitration now? In the first place because it apparently wasn't very confident of its demands at the bargaining table and secondly because it felt that by waiting until September, even more could be extorted from the school board just before the opening of classes.

True, the school board desperately wanted a settlement in time to let 45-15 start, but the board members forgot that by delaying the deadline, children and parents affected won't know what's happening until the last minute.

What was gained by the school board's decision to back down? Apparently nothing.

The taxpayers of this district are going to be watching for the details of that settlement because they're going to have to pay for it.

Why has the board forgotten its constituents who rallied to pass three millage issues in June? That is another question the wishy washy school board has to face.

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
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# It's learning for everybody in Madonna clinic

Learning is the key word in the busy activity that goes on mornings at Madonna College during July.

Children taken there for a special reading clinic are learning—many in ways that for them have not been possible before.

Ten college students helping them are learning too. They are involved in a course designed as a practical experience in perceptual activities.

And the course itself is a growing thing. Where once it concentrated on understanding the printed word, it now recognizes that some children just can't advance by verbal signs alone.

"WE FOUND that our reading clinic was not enough," said Sister Mary Martina, the sprightly and knowledgeable Felician nun who has been at the heart of this program, now in operation 22 years.

"We needed to go the route of perceptual training, in the areas of visual, motor and auditory perception.

"We know now that you can't always separate reading problems from perceptual problems."

NOW MADONNA'S faculty includes Dr. June Slobodian, a Livonia resident well-known as a specialist in learning disabilities.

Her students are working with 45 of the 85 children in the reading clinic—extensive tests determine which ones are in need of this kind of attention.

However, says Dr. Slobodian, though the course is operating in conjunction with the reading clinic for the first time this summer, that doesn't mean this is the first recognition of that aspect of learning help in the clinic program.

"Sister Martina is a very perceptive educator. She has known all along the interplay between perceptual problems and reading problems," Dr. Slobodian said. "She has been pirating our methods for years."

THE PURPOSE of the reading clinic, which involves children from all over this area, is to find out why they are not reading well and help them improve their skills.

But sometimes they don't read well for a reason that has nothing to do with actual word recognition.

"Perhaps a child does not recognize shapes well," suggested Sister Martina, "and if he can't do that how can he understand the complicated shapes that make up letters."

"Or maybe he isn't able to put things in sequence. Or he can't differentiate between right and left, so he may be trying to read backwards."

A small difficulty, each one of these, but enough to keep the child from the reading skill he needs to advance in school.

Dr. Slobodian's students have turned a large classroom into a clinic where problems in perception can be spotted and treated.

ANDREA WITKOWSKI, a graduate student working on certification as a teacher consultant in learning disabilities, has set up a number of teaching helps—a set of hand and footprints for coordination of large muscles, color charts, a board to use in sequencing, a set of charts and blocks to help children recognize space relationships.

"We never assume a child can do a given thing," she said. "We have to consider that he cannot, and that may be the spot where his difficulty lies."

Also in the clinic is a Craig reader, a device that flashes words on a

screen and advances them as fast as a child is able to read them.

DR. SLOBODIAN, who joined the Madonna staff May 1, had before that worked on setting up a master's program in reading and learning disabilities at University of Detroit.

She said she got into this field of education because one of her children has learning problems, and added she was glad to be at Madonna because the school's programs have a fine reputation among educators.

"Students here are able to get the work they need," she said, "because there is a flexibility in our course structure."

"It's necessary to prepare students for teaching in today's educational structure; and our students are being placed."

THE FLEXIBILITY she mentioned is evident in the reading help program and learning disabilities clinic.

The students work with certain children several times a week, becoming proficient in the use of the learning tools while the youngsters advance toward better reading comprehension. Different tools are used for different children.

The reading clinic, which includes a week of interview and evaluation and then four weeks of intensive work with both Madonna faculty and the students in Dr. Slobodian's class, will continue through July.

Then there will be follow-ups on the children's progress through the year, and Sister Martina already has a waiting list of children to join it next summer.

They, and the students who take the college course next summer, may find still more changes as understanding advances in the field of learning problems.

## MSU now has fellowship funds for older women

Tuition funds for at least 15 "mature" women will be available at Michigan State University by this fall. The women will be the first to receive the newly created Mildred B. Erickson Fellowships in support of lifelong education for women. The recipients will include those starting or resuming undergraduate and graduate studies and perhaps others who want to begin with a non-credit course in the MSU Continuing Education evening college. The fellowship program is taking shape through the dedication and encouragement of a number of MSU and community people. They have prom-

ises of support from the university's graduate school, development fund and individuals on and off campus. MSU President Clifton R. Wharton, Jr. is a strong supporter of lifelong education. In 1972 he appointed a task force to investigate options for lifelong university programs. The report, strongly backing such activities, was released in 1973. Women wishing to apply for fellowship funds should contact Mrs. Mary L. Jackson, supervisor in the MSU comptroller's office, before Aug. 15. The applications will be processed by a selection committee and the fellow-

ships awarded by a board of directors. Mrs. Jackson, who was a prime mover in the fellowship program, is also one of the "mature" students on campus. She is working toward an education specialist degree in administration and higher education. Mildred Erickson, for whom the fund is named, knows about the problems of women. She was a late starter for a PhD in education after the death of her husband, dean of education and then provost at MSU. She teaches in MSU's University College where she is also assistant dean

for continuing education. She has been counseling older women for many years and teaches noncredit evening college classes for and about women. Someday she hopes to write a book of counsel and advice for women who may be hesitant to start or return to college. Mrs. Erickson is aware that many women want to study but can't decide what area is best for them—or they may need moral and financial support. She knows some women may be on the verge of abandoning some personal goals or are confused about transferring credits from one university to another.

Others, she knows, aren't sure if they can get back to studying and learning and wonder how they will compare with younger students. Persons who wish to contribute to the program may send donations to the MSU Development Fund in the Stephen T. Nisbet Bldg. on campus. Contributions should be earmarked for the Mildred B. Erickson Fellowship Fund and are tax deductible. Donors prior to July 1, 1975, will be designated as founders. Fund directors include: John N. Winburne, professor emeritus of education; Mrs. Erickson; Mrs. Jackson; Russell J. Kleis, professor of higher

and continuing education, and Laurine E. Fitzgerald, professor of education and associate dean of students. Others are Mary V. Moore, professor and chairman of business law and office administration; Sandra D. Huggins, assistant director of the MSU personnel office; Charles A. McKee, director of the MSU evening college, and Clarence W. Minkel, acting dean of the MSU graduate school. Directors representing the community are: Robert A. Fisher, senior vice president of Michigan National Bank; Dorothy C. Rozan, social worker, and Robert L. Overholt, East Lansing dentist.

ment can be reached before the anticipated start of 45 - 15."

In her taped message, Mrs. Carter said that while the school board wants the 45 - 15 program, the schools' administration has found it would be more costly than expected.

**THURSDAY AFTERNOON** Mrs. Carter amplified her taped message saying:

"The PEA team will not submit to an early, unfavorable settlement at the expense of 535 teachers in order that a program be implemented that does not seem to be of great importance to the administration."

In its statement released by Norm Kee, chief negotiator for the schools, the board said: "First of all the school board and the administration want to emphasize that we are ready to negotiate at any time for a settlement that would save a program that has been initiated by the parents,

teachers, the administration and the board.

"The board wanted a settled contract so badly it was willing to put a greater percentage of the annual school budget towards a settlement in hopes of reaching an agreement with the PEA.

"This was done even to the verge of sacrificing other programs and the hiring of as many staff as originally planned for the coming school year."

**THE BOARD'S** statement said the death of the 45 - 15 program will cost the district money because an alternative plan must be implemented.

It estimated this would amount to one percentage point of the last offer made to the teachers' negotiating team.

It also criticized the PEA for yielding "autonomy to its state affiliate's goals and objectives."

The board statement also criticized the PEA for waiting until just after three millage issues were passed by the voters in June to announce its demands relative to 45 - 15 and a contract settlement.

"The quality of education for the children of the Plymouth School District is resting on the negotiating table," the board statement concludes. "The board feels it needs a teacher settlement which is fair not only to the teachers and the community, but also to those school children."

Gerri Guzik, president of the Miller PTO, and Cindy Monks, a member of the 45 - 15 steering committee, told the Plymouth Observer & Eccentric Thursday: "We at Miller will not stand behind the PEA in seeing it down 45 - 15.

"These are our children they're playing with. When we wanted 45 - 15 they (the PEA) said, 'No problem.' "We feel they're using our children as tools in negotiations."

## Local girl drowns while on vacation

**PLYMOUTH**—A 13-year-old Plymouth girl died early Thursday 12 hours after being pulled unconscious from a swimming pool in Overland Park, Kansas.

Kathleen Elizabeth Koperski of 11216 Russell, Plymouth, was pronounced dead at a hospital in Meriam, Kansas at 6:45 a.m. Thursday.

According to a police spokesman in Overland Park where Miss Koperski had been vacationing, she had been swimming in a motel pool when other swimmers noticed that she had not surfaced following a dive. The spokesman said that she had been underwater for three to five minutes when she was pulled from the pool.

Resuscitation efforts managed to restore vital signs, but complications de-

veloped shortly afterwards, and she died in the hospital.

Miss Koperski is survived by her parents, a brother and two sisters.

Flying a chopper from Toledo to Detroit City Airport, Dunbar, 47, experienced mechanical problems over Detroit and negotiated a safe landing next to a Lodge Freeway entrance ramp Thursday night.

He was carrying a special-order auto parts delivery for Chrysler Corp. and was piloting one of two helicopters with the parts.

The other craft was handled by Westland's Barney Stutesman who didn't know of Dunbar's problems until he landed at City Airport.

Stutesman, 45, president of Hi-Lift Helicopter, Inc., of Westland, was fly-

ing several hundred feet ahead of Dunbar when the crash happened. Dunbar was treated at Receiving branch of Detroit General Hospital for cuts on the hand, leg and chin but managed to walk away from the damaged craft.

Dunbar said he lost directional control from the helicopter's rear and was forced to circle the area, just west of downtown Detroit, several times before finding a spot to land safely without hitting cars on the freeway.

"I guess I was awfully lucky to get away with the minor injuries I did," he said.

His copter hit a light pole just before hitting a grassy strip adjacent to the Bagley entrance ramp.

## Swim death termed accident

**WESTLAND**—Westland police termed the death of a Canton Township woman in a private swimming pool an accident.

Inspector Fred Dansby said the department's preliminary conclusion following an investigation into the July 16 mishap ruled out suicide and homicide.

Victim was Mrs. Elizabeth Young, 43, who lived in a trailer park at 39500 Warren.

She was found face down in the Hines Park Apartments' pool about 2:30 a.m. by Ronald Shelton, 30, who

lives in the apartment complex.

Mrs. Young was wearing a bra and underpants. About 15 feet from the pool's edge was Mrs. Young's clothing.

Officers reported that Shelton initially said he didn't know the victim but later that morning admitted that he and two others, Richard Kardos, 29, Hines Park Apartment resident, and Bernice Lawrence, 43, a neighbor of Mrs. Young, were swimming at the time of the incident.

Dansby said the case is still under investigation.

The gradually increased dosages have apparently had no beneficial effect either.

The St. Baranabas team has requested that Joe return to the hospital Nov. 12.

Mrs. Crissey suspects that they will operate at that time.

She says, "We try not to speculate on what they will do. They change their minds. We're corresponding regularly with them, but it's pretty much 'wait til you get there' for us."

In the meantime, she says Joe is the "same old Joe, the same cheerful self."

He swims at the swimming club where the Crisseys belong almost every day. His mother reports he loves the water and swims fairly well. He is presently working on his side stroke. Other times, he is reading, playing with his friends and indulging in his favorite spectator sport—watching baseball on television.

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## Erwin urges new centers for public

Robert Erwin, candidate for the 37th State House Democratic nomination in the Aug. 6 primary, has proposed three "citizens' centers" to improve communications with the public.

The three would be in Westland, Wayne and Canton Township, the three communities represented in the district.

Erwin said "there is a definite need for new leadership that is willing to open channels of communication with the people. I believe a state representative must be accessible and willing to be involved in the problems of the people of his district on a full-time basis."

ERWIN, 31, of Westland, commented that "it has been the lack of regular established channels of communication between citizens and elected officials that has led to corruption in government and to representatives being influenced by special interest groups rather than fulfilling their moral obligation to be truly and totally responsive and responsible to the people."

Erwin said that elected officials tend to "close" themselves in Lansing except during election years.

If elected, he promised to issue weekly newsletters to local newspapers and make his voting record available at the proposed centers.

He also promised to be more available and visible to the public.

Erwin, speaking before voters in recent public meetings, said the proposed centers would have the advantage of improving communications among local, state and federal officials who represent Westland, Wayne and Canton.

HE NOTED that the three communities are also represented in two congressional, and two county commission districts in addition to two cities and two townships.

He has talked to residents about the centers and received support, Erwin said.

Examples of local problems needing better communication with a state representative are Canton Township complaints of builders failing to complete promised work and inadequate land use restrictions and Westland's plan to improve the Norway subdivision in the Palmer-Venoy area.



# Turf Tips, Quips

There is only one thing certain in Michigan's fouled up racing scene and that is Northville Downs will close its bottailed 24 night meeting Tuesday. From then on the future appears rather dark as this column is written.

It all began when the Hazel Park Racing Association, which was supposed to open a 120-day meeting Monday (today), didn't tell one single stable quartered at the Detroit Race Course it was going to have stall space at Hazel Park.

So the horsemen sat around awaiting developments, none making any effort to move to other tracks in case they weren't welcome at the east side plant.

Thus when the mutuel clerks decided to reject Hazel Park's final offer and picketing appeared imminent, the horsemen began to get nervous and decided they better do something.

But did they do anything and take any action against the track which had them sitting around on their duffs... no chance, they decided to vent their ire on the Detroit Race Course by doing everything possible to keep management from stripping the racing strip for the arrival of the pacers and trotters.

They wanted to keep Wolverine Raceway from opening its season Wednesday night and thus blackout

all racing in Michigan. The idea seemed to be if the union pickets Hazel Park and keeps us from getting stalls, then we'll keep the union members from working. A sort of tit for tat type of thinking.

But at no time was there mention of the fact that Hazel Park hadn't offered any stall space to DRC horses. Ordinarily, in such a case the horsemen make arrangements to go elsewhere and cross Hazel Park off their list of possible racing spots in the future. For some reason, the horsemen decided to wait and see what was going to happen and they learned Friday the answer was absolutely nothing.

They were still sitting around making threats to keep the track equipment off the big mile strip so the workers couldn't change the surface from the soft cushion for the thoroughbreds to the hard base for the trotters and pacers.

Apparently the feeling was "if we can't race, then no one else is going to go in Michigan, runners or trotters". There wasn't any question but that they meant every word of the threat.

Meanwhile, Bud Sears, director of racing at Hazel Park, called off his crew that planned to make the draw for post positions for Monday, the scheduled opening day.

The situation was a bit different at Wolverine Raceway where Racing Secretary Bill Connors held the first draw at Northville Downs. Bill had no

idea whether there would be racing or not but he was prepared for Wednesday's opening program.

For Wolverine it will be the silver anniversary season and Vice President and General Manager Dick Wilson believes it will be the best ever.

The big mile track plant will have a new early post time of 8 p.m. and 10 races nightly with a nitely double, two trifectas and a perfecta.

The Wolverine mile annually attracts many of the nation's best stables whose horses perform better over the big raceway. Among the strings of pacers and trotters scheduled to compete at Wolverine are those of Shelley Goudreau, currently the second leading driver in North America and his fellow countryman, Greg Wright, who set an all-time Hazel Park record last spring with 70 victories.

Joe Adamsky, Wolverine's defending champion, also will return, as will Bobby Williams, Gene Riegler, Chris Boring, Tom Merriman, Merrit Dokey, Wally McMurray, Don Hall, Tom Harmer and the nation's top lady driver, Michigan's own Bea Farber.

Wilson said the always popular Old Times Night has been set for Friday, Sept. 6, final night of a week long Grand Circuit racing program.

Illinois racing set new marks for 1973 according to the annual report of the Illinois Racing Board. Tax revenue from parimutuel wagering totaled \$56.3 million, up \$8 million over 1972 with nearly half of the figure derived from harness racing.

Combined standardbred and thoroughbred wagering hit a high of \$685.9 million, up \$94 million or 14 per cent over 1972.

Average daily handle and attendance were up 13.5 per cent and 6.2 per cent respectively at Illinois harness racing ovals. The wagering figure decreased 3.7 per cent and the daily attendance dropped 3.1 per cent at the state's thoroughbred tracks.

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


