## Canton reappoints planners, cancels hearing

CANTON—Four members of the Canton Township Planning Commission were re-appointed Tuesday and an all-important public hearing scheduled for next week on the proposed master zoning plan was canceled.

Those are the latest developments in the township board skirmish following a recent charge by Trustee Brian Schwall that several of the planning commissioners were serving illegal terms.

On the advice of their attorney, the board of trustees re-appointed Planning Commissioners Flossie Tonda, Wes Kaiser, Bart Berg and Grant Campbell to specific terms—some-

thing which apparently was never done at the time of the original individual appointments.

This "flaw," according to Township Attorney William Sempliner, does not "adversely affect" past actions of the commission.

But because Schwall was still not totally satisfied with the opinion, the board carried the action one step further by directing the planning commission to cancel the July 30 public hearing on the master land use plan.

In the meantime, Schwall will meet with Sempliner to resolve the differences in the commissioners' terms as specified in the attorney's opinion.

Sempliner said that his research of the minutes shows that commissioners "were formally appointed by the board and the only flaw is that the terms were not specified."

He ruled that they "were commissioners de facto and the proceedings are valid regardless of the fact that there may be some question as to the commissioners holding office de jure."

Schwall, however, was not satisfied with Sempliner's letter. He said he felt Sempliner "was incorrect" in his conclusions and that "his (Sempliner's) findings do not agree with what I've found."

Schwall indicated that he was in agreement that the commissioners were members de facto, but disagreed with the terms of office assigned to them.

Schwall cast the only "nay" vote on the resolution by Trustee James Poole accepting the recommendation to re-appoint the four commissioners and calling for the delay of the public hearing on the master plan.

According to Sempliner, three of the seven-member commission apparently are not affected by Schwall's charge. They are the newest members of the commission: Robert Shef-

ferly, Robert Simmons and Joseph Kinnick.

Shefferly, according to Sempliner, is serving a term which expires Dec. 31, 1976; Berg is serving a term which expires on Dec. 31, 1976; Campbell, who is township treasurer and the board's representative on the commission, should serve to Dec. 31, 1975 and Kaiser's term ends on Dec. 31.

"It is our opinion that the failure to appoint these commissioners to their present terms will not adversely affect the actions of the proceedings of the commission," the Sempliner opinion stated.

Schwall said later he wished Sempliner had traced the actual sequence of the terms to show how he arrived at his conclusion.

Sempliner ruled that Mrs. Tonda is serving a term which ends on Dec. 31, 1976; Berg is serving a term which expires on Dec. 31, 1976; Campbell, who is township treasurer and the board's representative on the commission, should serve to Dec. 31, 1975 and Kaiser's term ends on Dec. 31.

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## Teachers refuse to work in 45-15; Miller empty as negotiations stalled

PLYMOUTH — The quiet hum of the air conditioning was the only sound to be heard at Miller Elementary School Monday and Tuesday.

The air conditioning was on in expectation of Plymouth's pilot year round school starting.

But the teachers scheduled to work in the program did not report to work Monday — having served notice that they would not teach in the '45 - 15' program unless a 1974 - 75 contract were settled with the teachers.

Both the teachers' union, the Plymouth Education Association (PEA) and school officials have described contract negotiations as being at an impasse and no agreement seems near.

So the teachers didn't report for work Monday as scheduled and the schools had to notify parents of the 150 students involved in the first 45 - 15 segment not to send their children to school Tuesday as planned.

Now school administrators are working out plans to implement the alterna-

### What a coincidence

PLYMOUTH — On Monday — the day Plymouth teachers did not report for work in the year - round school program because a teacher contract hasn't been settled — a press release arrived from the National Education Association (NEA).

Its title was: "The year - round school: should it happen here?"

The three - page release discusses some of the types of year round school programs and in particular mentions the '45 - 15' program which

was to have started in Miller Elementary School Monday but was scrubbed because teachers there — who were backed by the Plymouth Education Association, which is affiliated with the NEA — said they would not teach until a 1974 - 75 teacher contract were settled.

In its concluding sentence, the NEA release says, "Students, teachers and parents should be involved (in planning year 'round school), because their cooperation is necessary to the success of any change in the schools."

tive to housing the district's rapid student population growth, an alternative which the Plymouth School Board chose last week — establishing a new elementary school in the Middle School East building.

Families affected by the school attendance area change will be notified officially by the schools once the attendance areas are established by the school board.

(The change in attendance areas for the new elementary school at East, will not affect the previously announced decision to take the Miller attendance area east of the new expressway to Central Elementary School this fall.)

The decision to scrub the 45-15 plan came early Monday morning after a last - minute bargaining session between PEA and school negotiators Sunday night failed to produce any progress.

As of Tuesday afternoon, no further bargaining sessions had been set between the schools and the teachers, said Norm Kee, chief negotiator for the schools.

Several parents of children involved in the 45 - 15 program or the implementation of its alternative, spoke at Monday's school board meeting.

Jenell Powell, vice president of the Miller School PTO, said, "We urge the Miller teachers to come to work immediately with or without a contract in time to save the 45 - 15 program."

"We assumed that as professionals, they would stand behind their words," she said, referring to a PEA official's statement earlier this year that the year round school program would not be affected by contract negotiations.

Another parent, upset because her child may be one of those bused to the new elementary school at East, said, "This is my child's fourth school in three years. My son will not be bused."

Assistant Supt. Dr. Earl Hogan responded to that, saying, "The problem is getting progressively worse. If you think this year was bad, wait until next fall."

IN OTHER NEGOTIATIONS with school district employees, the school board Monday night unanimously approved a two year agreement with transportation workers which called for wage increases of 6.4 per cent the first year and 5.4 in the second.

The transportation workers voted 42-4 Saturday to accept the agreement and their chief negotiator, Loretta Olson, said, "We're very pleased (with the contract) because we received all of the contract language we wanted."

A state mediator is scheduled to meet today (Thursday) with negotiators for the schools and Local 547 of the International Union of Operating Engineers (maintenance workers).

The maintenance workers recently voted down a tentative agreement but have been working even though their contract expired July 1.

A one year contract with the district's cafeteria workers has been approved by both sides calling for a six per cent increase in salaries and the school board has approved a 2.4 per cent increase over a previously settled 3.4 per cent raise for the second year of a two - year contract.

## L&D ordered, 'remove more fill'

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP—By a vote of 4-3 Tuesday night, the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees voted to hold a hard line on its agreement with L & D Service over the proper grading of that company's property on Ann Arbor Road.

Though the service station had asked that it not be forced to remove two feet of fill from the site as indicated in an earlier agreement, a majority of the board felt that L & D, which has been subject to public criticism for the manner in which it dumped the fill dirt on the property a year ago, must be made to abide by the original plan.

Voting to stick to the agreement forcing removal of the fill were Trustees Russell Ash, Gerald Burke and Frank Millington and Supervisor J. D. McLaren. Voting to allow the deviation were Clerk Helen Richardson, Treasurer Elizabeth Holmes and Trustee Gene Overholt.

## Plymouth police continue Kellogg Park crackdown

PLYMOUTH—The Plymouth police department, in its continued crackdown on violations in Kellogg Park, arrested seven more persons last weekend.

Five persons, four of them juveniles, were arrested Friday evening. One of the juveniles was arrested by Plymouth's community service officer for carrying a concealed weapon.

Three other juveniles were arrested for consuming alcoholic beverages. A fifth person was arrested for reckless driving around the park area.

Two juveniles were arrested Saturday for illegal possession of alcoholic beverages.

The previous weekend, police arrested 12 persons, including two juveniles. Charges against this group ranged from consuming alcohol in a public place to violation of the Controlled Substance Act.

Police are withholding the names of all those arrested.

Police Chief Timothy Ford said none arrested this past weekend was a City of Plymouth resident.

"Two of them were from Plymouth Township, the others came from Livonia, Howell, Superior Township and Detroit," the chief said.

In the arrests the previous week, only one of the 12 was a City of Plymouth resident.

The chief said there were 75 to 80 young persons in the park between 10 and 11 p.m. Friday, but there were no serious problems.

"The majority of young persons just come to the park to enjoy themselves. There is no real serious problem in Kellogg Park, we simply are keeping it under surveillance to make sure the park remains a safe place," Ford said.

He said that making the arrests of persons violating city ordinances is all the police department can do to let persons know Kellogg Park will not be allowed to become a Hines Park.

"The police department is doing all it can. The real impact rests with the courts. If all are allowed to go scot-free, the arrests won't mean much," the chief said.

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## Schoolcraft names technical director

Fernon P. Feenstra, an instructor at Schoolcraft College and Livonia resident, has been appointed Schoolcraft director of technology. The appointment became effective July 15. He has been an instructor since the college opened in 1964 and an 11 year resident of Livonia.

Feenstra served as chairman of the college's insurance committee for five years, and has been a faculty negotiator and a grievance chairman.

He is a former member of the Schoolcraft College Foundation, the cultural affairs committee, and the scholarship committee. He also represented the Faculty Forum (teachers' union) to the Michigan Association of Higher Education for the past two years.

A JOURNEYMAN electrician, Feenstra holds bachelor and master degrees from Western Michigan University, and a specialist degree in vocational administration and supervision from the University of Michigan.

He is a member of the Livonia Board of Electrical Examiners and previously served as an electrical inspector for the city.

He belongs to the Livonia Jaycees, Livonia Hockey Association, National Fluid Power Society, and the International Association of Electrical Inspectors.

## Reserve police to graduate

Graduation ceremonies will be held on Thursday, Aug. 1, marking the end of the first area wide training seminar for reserve auxiliary officers.

More than 250 reserve and auxiliary officers, representing 30 police departments from Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties will take part in ceremonies in the auditorium of the Ford Motor Company's "Glass house" office complex at Michigan and Southfield in Dearborn.

Graduates who have successfully completed this 100-hour, 30-week basic law enforcement class will be honored.

Originally sponsored by the Redford Township Police Department, this seminar has resulted in the formation of a permanent training organization to be known as the "Southeast Michigan Police Reserve Training Council."

Initial plans call for the council to conduct seminars throughout the area at 18-month intervals.

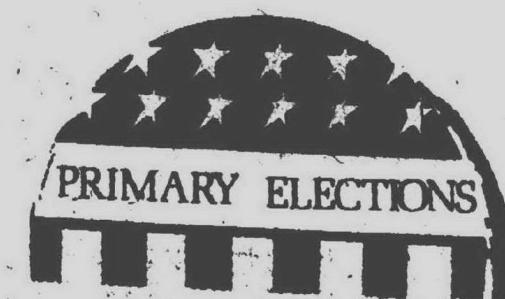
## Lacey seeks probate court judge seat

"I believe these juvenile offenders should be tried in the adult courts where both society will be protected more adequately and where the individual's constitutional rights will be guarded."



Before becoming an assistant prosecuting attorney, Lacey was a probation officer for Wayne County for six years.

WORKING WITH police officers daily in Recorder's Court, Lacey has tried more than 400 criminal cases. He has been endorsed by the Detroit Police Officers Association

(DPOA) and the Detroit Police Lieutenants and Sergeants Association. Lacey is one of two candidates in the probate race to receive a "well qualified" rating from the Detroit Bar Association.

Lacey is a graduate of the Detroit College of Law, John Carroll University, and University of Detroit High School. He is a lifetime resident of Wayne County.

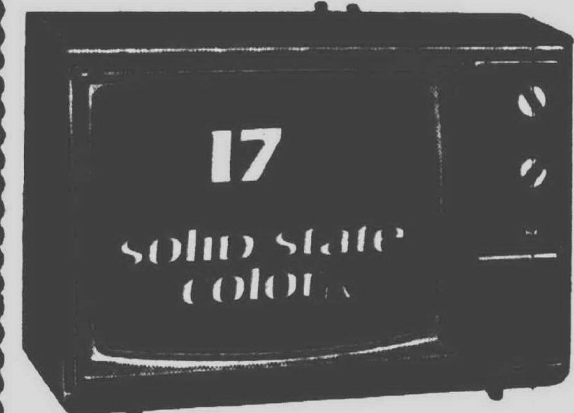

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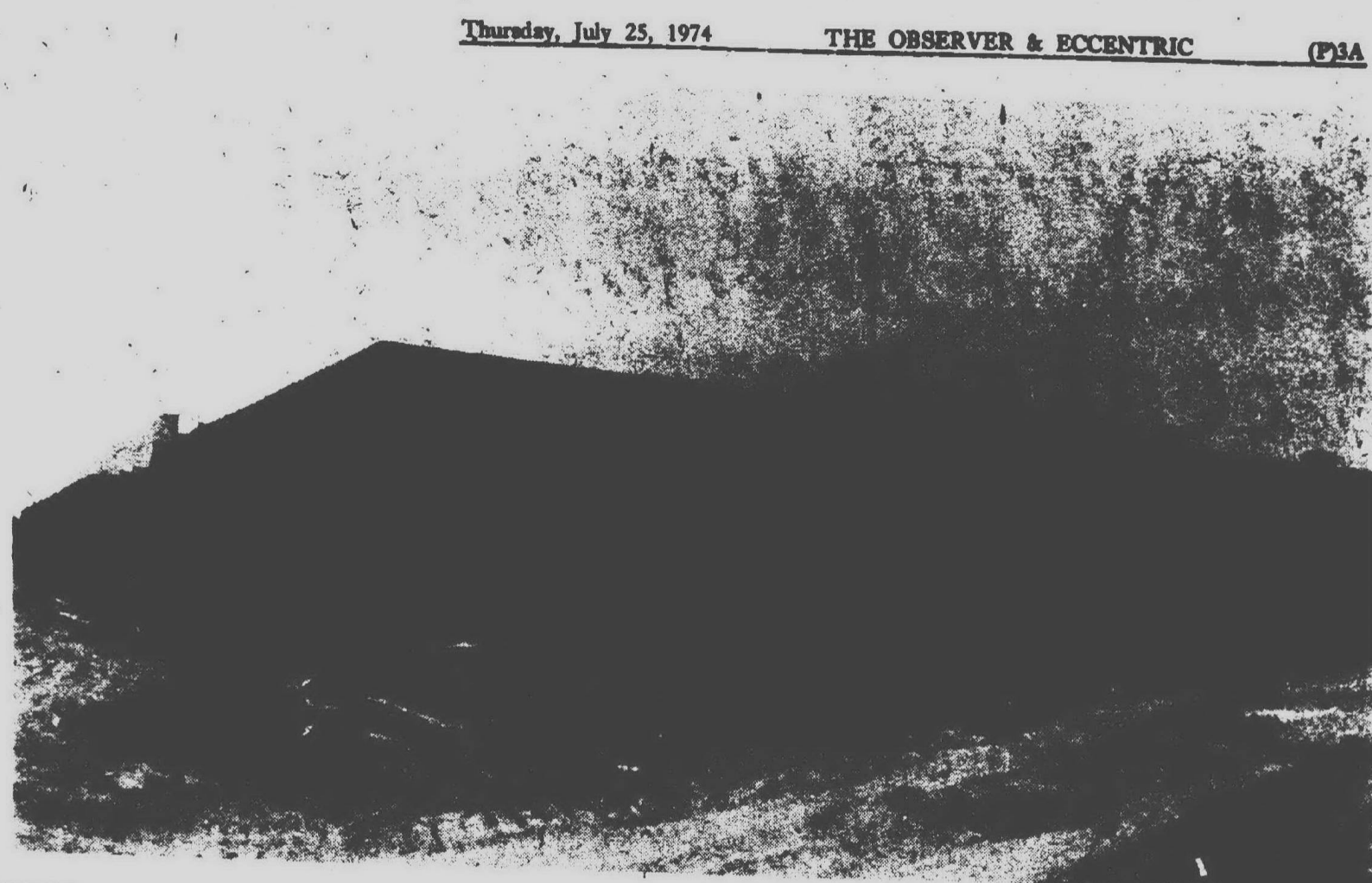
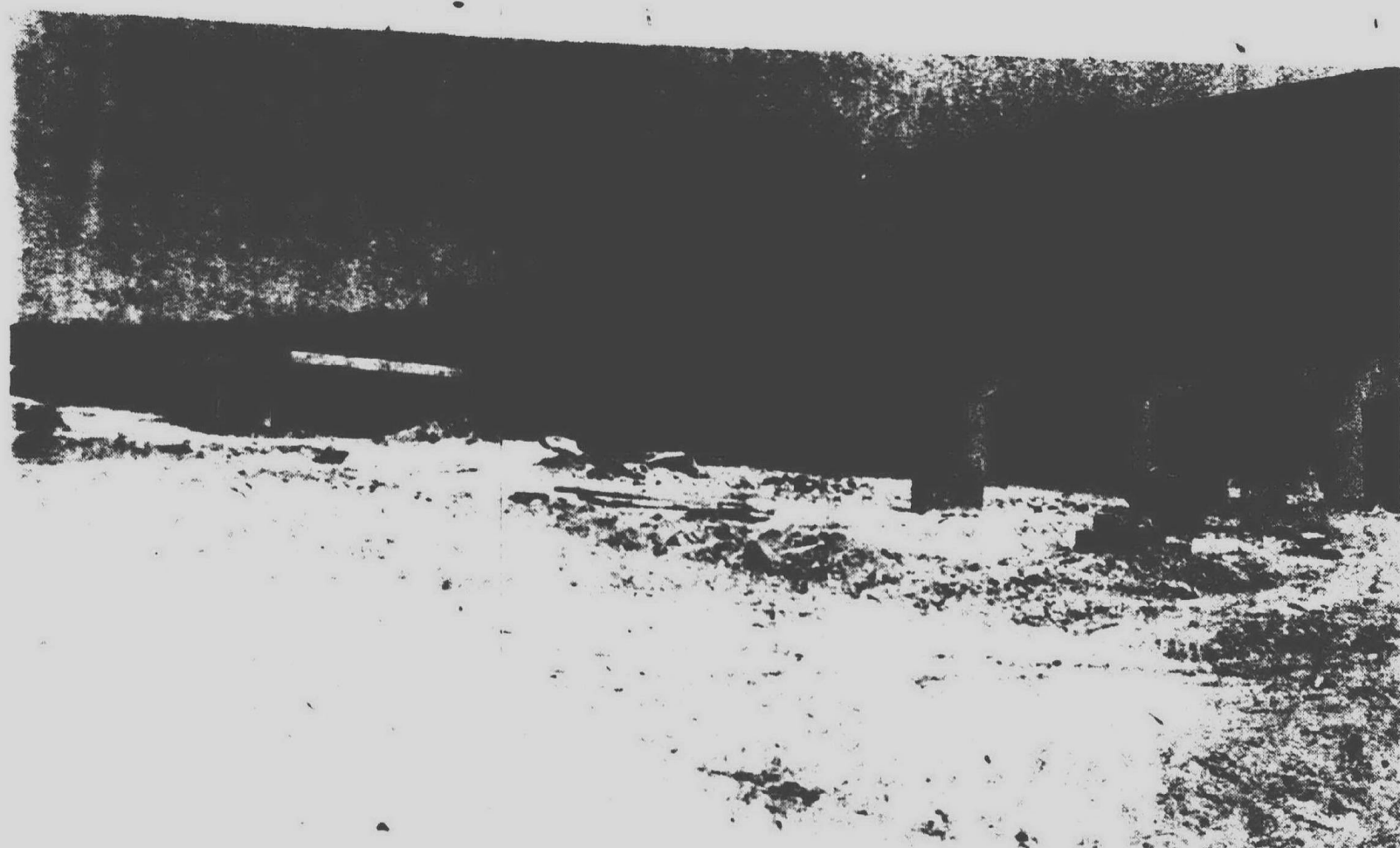
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## The great race --Meijer Thrifty Acres vs. K-mart

## AAUW: Vote 'no' on Canton cable TV franchise

CANTON—The American Association of University Women (AAUW), Plymouth branch, Media Group urges Canton Township residents to vote "no" on the Aug. 6 ballot granting a cable TV franchise to Canton Community Systems, Inc.

For the past year the AAUW women have been studying cable TV, viewing its concepts, potential, and development and analyzing how it might best implement better communication in the Plymouth-Canton area.

The group said it actively supports the development of cable TV as an important local communication media. However, it feels that the Canton Township Board of Trustees, "with

the good intention of bringing cable TV communication technology to Canton as quickly as possible, drew up the present franchise without sufficient research into cable regulation and potential."

Specifically, the AAUW Media Group cites the following provisions which render the present franchise unsound:

(1) "It is an exclusive franchise allowing for the operation of no other cable TV station in Canton, (ie. non-competitive).

(2) "It is issued for a period of 30 years. This is too long to let a franchise without review. According to communication experts, cable TV technology is developing so rapidly

that we cannot possibly judge now what community uses and regulations may be required of it in the future. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) will not grant approval to a franchise issued for 30 years. Ten to 15 years is the recommended duration.

(3) "As written, the franchise provided no guarantee that construction and operation of cable facilities will begin within any given period of time.

"Although Canton Community Systems, Inc. may plan immediate operation, with no financial obligation toward construction, setbacks could delay service indefinitely and legally they could hold the franchise for years with no service and then sell it

at a profit. Other franchises require cable operators to post bond guaranteeing construction within a given time after FCC approval.

(4) "The Canton franchise specifies only that the cable company offer at least eight channels. FCC requires at least 20 and the multiplicity of channels possible in the future (40 to 100) is one of the most promising potentials of cable TV.

(5) "The present franchise requires that Canton Systems pay the township only 1 per cent of its revenue for the first three years or until 50 per cent of its potential subscribers are connected, 2 per cent the next year, and 3 per cent thereafter. Most franchises require 3 per cent from the beginning,

and in some cases FCC will allow a charge of 5 per cent.

(6) "The franchise does not require a public access channel as is now specified by FCC. It offers no provision for aid in production or the cost of production on the educational and governmental channels provided, or for public service programming. For cable TV to serve community as well as corporate interests, some such provision would be wise.

"Assuming the present franchise is defeated," the AAUW Media Group suggests, "that the Canton Township board members prepare themselves for the consideration of future franchises.

"The Urban Institute, a quasi-gov-

ernmental foundation in Washington, D.C. will provide local governments with extensive materials covering important guidelines to follow in drawing up cable franchises and will even provide a consulting service.

"The Dunning-Hough Library has a variety of selected materials on cable TV. Before a cable TV franchise is granted in Canton, officials should consult these sources, and consider various cable operators at open hearings in which citizens may also participate. Then, armed with the legal knowledge and some cable TV background, the board should offer a new non-exclusive franchise to the most qualified bidder," the AAUW group said.

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## Williams calls for federal balanced budget

Theo Williams, candidate for the Democratic nomination to Congress in the 2nd District, called for a more balanced federal budget while speaking recently in the Monroe Bank & Trust Co. Community Hall in Monroe.

He charged the Nixon Administration with stimulating inflation by needless deficit spending. "With 12 per cent interest rates, two digit inflation this year, and the lowest stock market in four years, the Nixon people plainly and obviously do not know how to handle this nation's economic problems."

Williams urged a cut in taxes bal-

anced by a cut in federal spending — especially a large cut in the arms hardware budget. Such action, he stated, would stimulate the economy by the percolate-up method by putting money in circulation at the bottom immediately.

Williams described the trickle-down method as unworkable because the money, in practice, doesn't usually trickle down but stays at the top in the "hands of the special interests."

WILLIAMS ALSO stated the urgent need for a comprehensive, compulsory healthcare plan for all ages.

He noted a recent statement from a U.S. senator that in 1980 the nation may see a \$1,000 per day charge for

hospital costs if current trends continue.

He also talked about lack of ethics in government and invasion of privacy at all levels of government.

Williams noted Nixon's plan in 1971 to give some 1,000 government employees a lie detector test because of news leaks. Williams asked why Nixon himself doesn't take a lie detector test with regard to the Watergate affair and others.

Williams also raised the question as to "just who is being represented in this district, considering the reports of the incumbent Republican congressman's two \$100 a plate dinner parties held so far in the district with some \$50,000 being taken in from just those two parties."

## Reuther defines pension reform

John Reuther nailed down the four pillars of good pension reform legislation while speaking recently to a group of supporters at a Livonia house party.

Reuther, candidate for the Democratic congressional nomination in the 2nd District which includes Livonia and Plymouth, told listeners that in 1972 alone, some 20,000 retired workers had been cheated out of their pensions.

"It has been estimated that half of all workers supposedly covered by private pension plans will lose their hard-earned income through fraud and mismanagement."

REUTHER SAID the following provisions are a must in any piece of pension reform legislation:

Portability — each worker must be allowed to transfer his accumulated rights from one pension plan to another;

Vesting — each worker must be guaranteed part of his pension if he switches jobs;

Maximum funding — all pension plans must maintain sufficient assets to cover all present and future benefits; and,

Plan termination insurance — employers must be required to purchase pension insurance from a federally-sponsored program to cover benefit claims if companies go bankrupt.

WITHOUT THESE fundamental measures, Reuther said, pension legislation would be crippled.

Reuther also touched on the tragic dilemma faced by workers and their families when the plant where they work is closed.

He said he strongly backed the Ford-Mondale bill which would permit investigation of plant closings involving 50 or more workers if 10 per cent of the workers or their collective bargaining agent request it.

The bill would also provide adjustment assistance to affected workers plus grants and loans to communities suffering from heavy unemployment due to a plant closing.

## More doctors needed - Lansing

Congress must do something to end the critical shortage of doctors for family care in parts of the 2nd District, says Marjorie Lansing who is a contender for the Democratic nomination to Congress in that district.

Speaking at a meeting of the Monroe County Democratic Party, she said: "I see massive increases in aid to education at all levels as a top priority."

"Congress must allocate specific funds for new medical schools and provide financial assistance for students, particularly those interested in primary care."

She added that she agrees with the

Michigan Education Association (MEA) that 33 per cent of local school budgets should come from federal sources.

"Now local schools get only three per cent from federal funds. If the MEA goal is achieved, private property taxes could be reduced."

"I favor cuts in military spending, rather than increases in personal income taxes to produce the extra money needed to solve the many financial crises in education."

## Vote reform bill out of committee

"The House Administration Committee has finally agreed on an election reform bill and will be reporting that legislation to the floor of the House sometime in the next two weeks," according to Congressman Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor).

The bill, which has been in committee for over a year, will provide guidelines for candidates during election.

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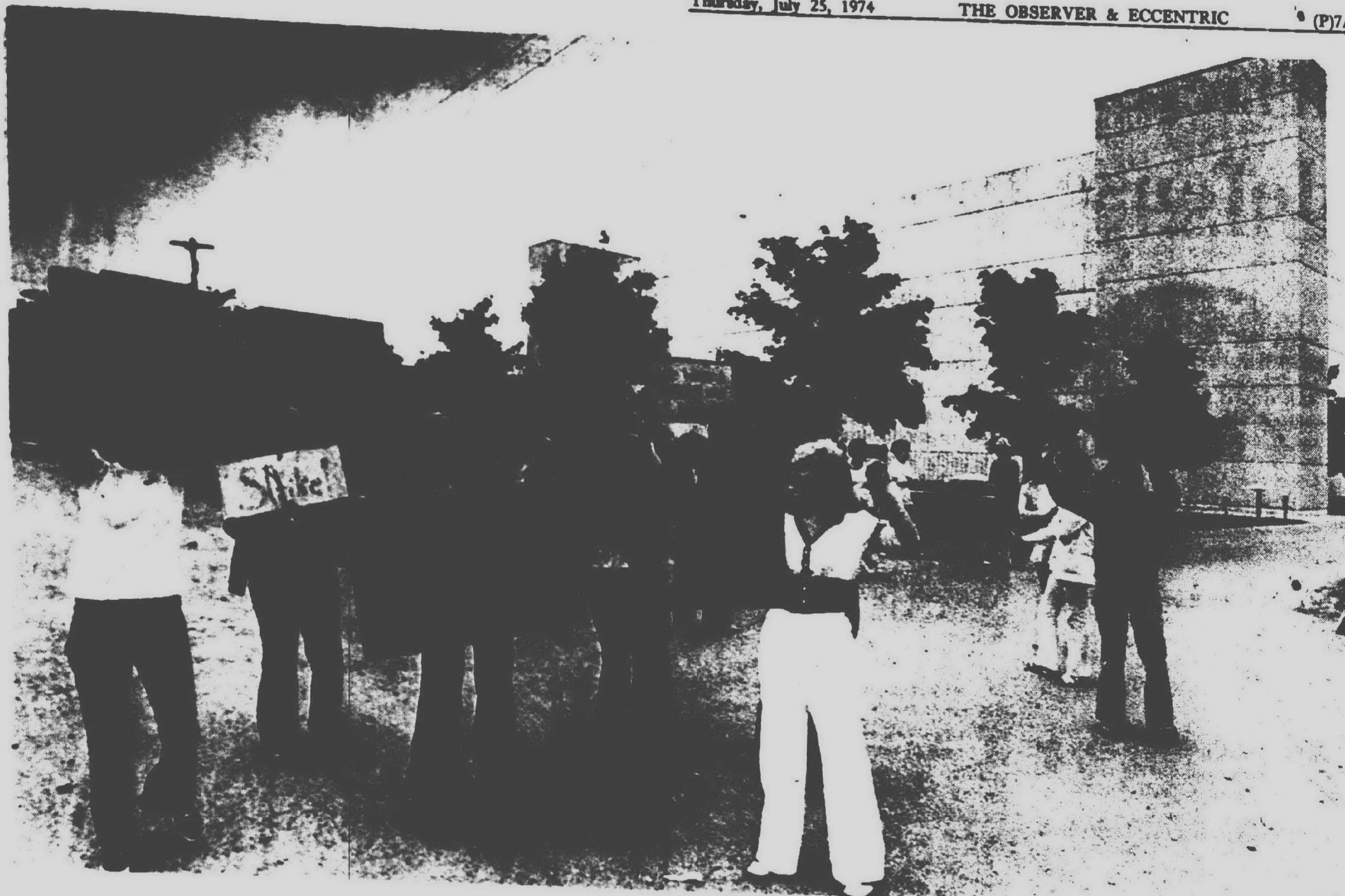
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## Ma Bell struck

## State land use law needed--Erwin

A state land use law is needed to assure carefully planned growth and insure protection of the environment for future generations, said Robert Erwin, candidate for the 37th District state House Democratic nomination in the Aug. 6 primary election.

Erwin, 31, of Westland, said he is "deeply aware of the need for leadership to provide incentives for commercial, industrial and residential

growth in Michigan to stabilize and stimulate our state's sagging economy."

But he added that "such growth must be carefully planned and regulated to insure protection of our environment for future generations. I intend to propose and support state land use legislation where needed."

ERWIN, ANSWERING an Observer & Eccentric questionnaire, said he

supports a proposed bond issue for public transportation improvements, on the Nov. 5 general election ballot.

He also suggested other methods of mass transit be explored "since there is a need for better rapid transportation in a suburban society."

The candidate feels that governmental business meetings should be held in public with fewer closed door meetings.

He favors amending the state home rule act for cities to prevent closed door meetings.

"I am sure no local unit of government has to keep anything secret because of 'national security,'" he said. "Since national security isn't a problem, there should be no reason for local governments to meet behind closed doors."

ERWIN WAS asked about housing segregation in the suburbs, its causes

and the state's role in solving the problem.

"I feel there is adequate state and federal legislation concerning segregation practices and definitely believe cross-district (school) busing isn't a solution for solving the problem," Erwin said.

"I feel enforcement of civil rights laws which we have, particularly in regard to block-busting, would be sufficient."

## Brown urges state rules on land use

State Rep. Thomas Brown (D-Westland) feels the state legislature should adopt a land use law.

"Land use is the business of the state," he said in responding to an Observer & Eccentric questionnaire. "Proper legislation must be adopted."

But Brown cautioned that any law "must protect the rights of private property ownership and the rights of local government to govern themselves."

Brown is seeking renomination in the Aug. 6 primary election.

ON HOUSING segregation blame in the suburbs and the state's role in solving the problem, Brown commented:

"The state has adopted fair housing laws. Where people wish to live is their choice."

What does Brown, seeking a third two-year term in the state House, feel about government business carried on

behind closed doors in "executive sessions?"

The candidate said he "accuses no one of carrying on unethical government business behind closed doors," and that "all meetings where final action is taken should be public."

BROWN NOTED that he supported combined state-local government roles in financing public transportation improvements when it was proposed three years ago.

When a bill was introduced in 1971 to raise the gasoline tax two cents per gallon for financing transportation programs, Brown favored a combined local and state government participation in a bond issue rather than raising the gasoline tax.

Brown said he supports the right of voters to determine the manner in which public mass transportation is financed.

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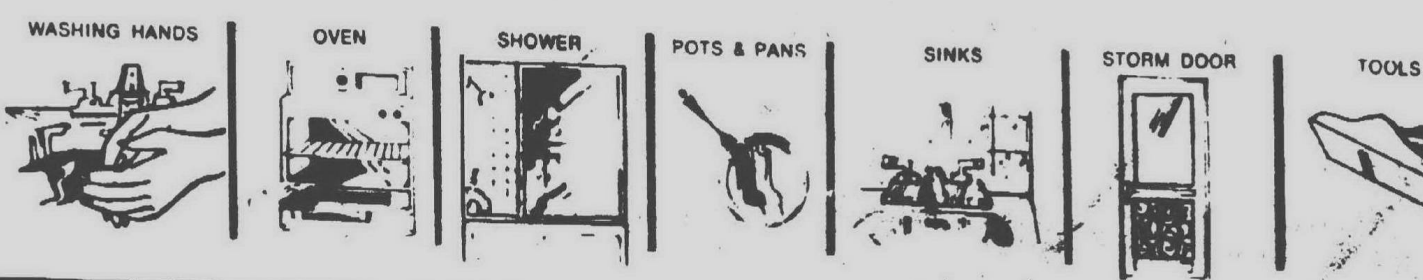
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# Is Soviet 'threat' sufficient to justify growing defense budget?

Is the Soviet military threat sufficient to justify present levels of American troops in Europe? That question takes on added significance when individuals debate whether to reduce the defense budget to allocate more funds for health, education or welfare.

In the 2nd Congressional District campaign, the Observer & Eccentric sought candidates' opinions on this issue as part of its continuing effort to evaluate the merits of each candidate. The specific question asked was: "How do you feel about cutting America's military troop commitment in Europe? e.g. Is the Soviet military threat over- or under-estimated?"

Following are the answers from the five Democrats seeking the nomination in their party Aug. 6 to face in-

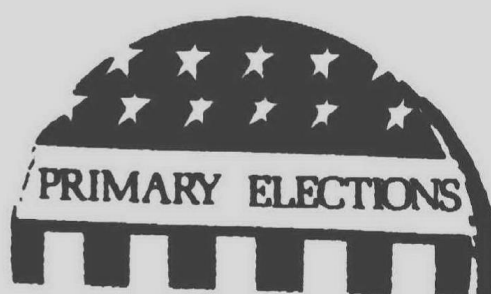
cumbent Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) in the general election. Esch is unopposed in the primary. The 2nd District includes Livonia and Plymouth, Monroe County and parts of Washtenaw County.

RONALD EGNOR states that maintaining tens of thousands of garrison troops on European soil is an "unconscionable waste" of the taxpayers' money.

"Make no mistake, I do not believe the Soviet leadership has turned into peace-loving lambs overnight — their eagerness to supply weaponry to the Arabs in the recent Middle East conflict attests to that.

"I do believe, however, a World War II style mass military invasion of Europe is not conceivable in an age of nuclear missiles."

JOHN REUTHER comments: "For



the last 30 years we have maintained a troop posture in Europe at the cost of several billion dollars a year.

"While western Europe has prospered, the American economy has been weakened by this tremendous drain of our resources. I favor a substantial cut in American ground troops in Europe.

"If the Soviet threat continues, European troops can assume the role now filled by American forces."

ESCH SAYS he has twice been chief Republican sponsor of a floor amendment to cut the number of U.S. troops deployed overseas. "My amendment has been a very flexible one providing that the Secretary of Defense should determine from where in the world cuts will come.

"I believe the amendment offers us an opportunity to move toward the achievement of several goals. With its adoption we can begin to cut the fat out of our military budget and contribute to an improved balance of payment situation.

"We can take a meaningful step toward the much talked about goal of reordering national priorities. Finally, we can contribute to an atmosphere of detente, an atmosphere that is supported and indeed is in great part created by this country."

EDWARD PIERCE says one of the important points he has made in this campaign is that the number of American troops in Europe ought to be cut by 90 per cent.

"It is nearly 30 years since the end of WWII, and there is no excuse for keeping 300,000 soldiers in Europe. It is an undue expenditure of hard-earned American tax dollars, the kind of unnecessary military expenditure this campaign is pledged to work against.

"I don't believe the Soviet Union wants to spend all its wealth on arms any more than we do, and this arms race we wage with them is senseless for both sides."

THEO WILLIAMS agrees with Sen. Mike Mansfield that the U.S. should cut back troops in Europe. "Those people have long since been able to carry their own military burdens.

"I think we have been sold a bill of goods by the 4,430 Pentagon 'information officers,' to say it politely, with regard to over-estimating the Soviet military.

"I well recall all the clever Pentagon propaganda we were inundated with regarding the former 'missile gap,' only to have us told by no less a military person than the late Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower that there 'was no missile gap.'

"It is high time the military-industrial complex was brought under control is how I feel about it. And I have noticed that even Sen. Barry Goldwater has made complaints about the terrible awful waste in the Pentagon and how 'we've got to stop it.'

MARJORIE LANSING also supports reduction of U.S. troops in Europe.

"They are a heavy expense representing a significant element in the defense budget as well as the cause of a serious deterioration in the balance of payments.

"There is little military justification for ground troops, given the possible military developments in Europe. European countries, such as Germany and France, should assume the cost of ground-defensive troops with the U.S. participation in European defense related generally to air defense.

"Whether the Soviet military threat is over-estimated depends upon the speed with which nuclear weapons proliferate throughout the world. Once even the smallest of nations has nuclear capability, the Soviet military threat will become the smallest of worries for world peace and security."

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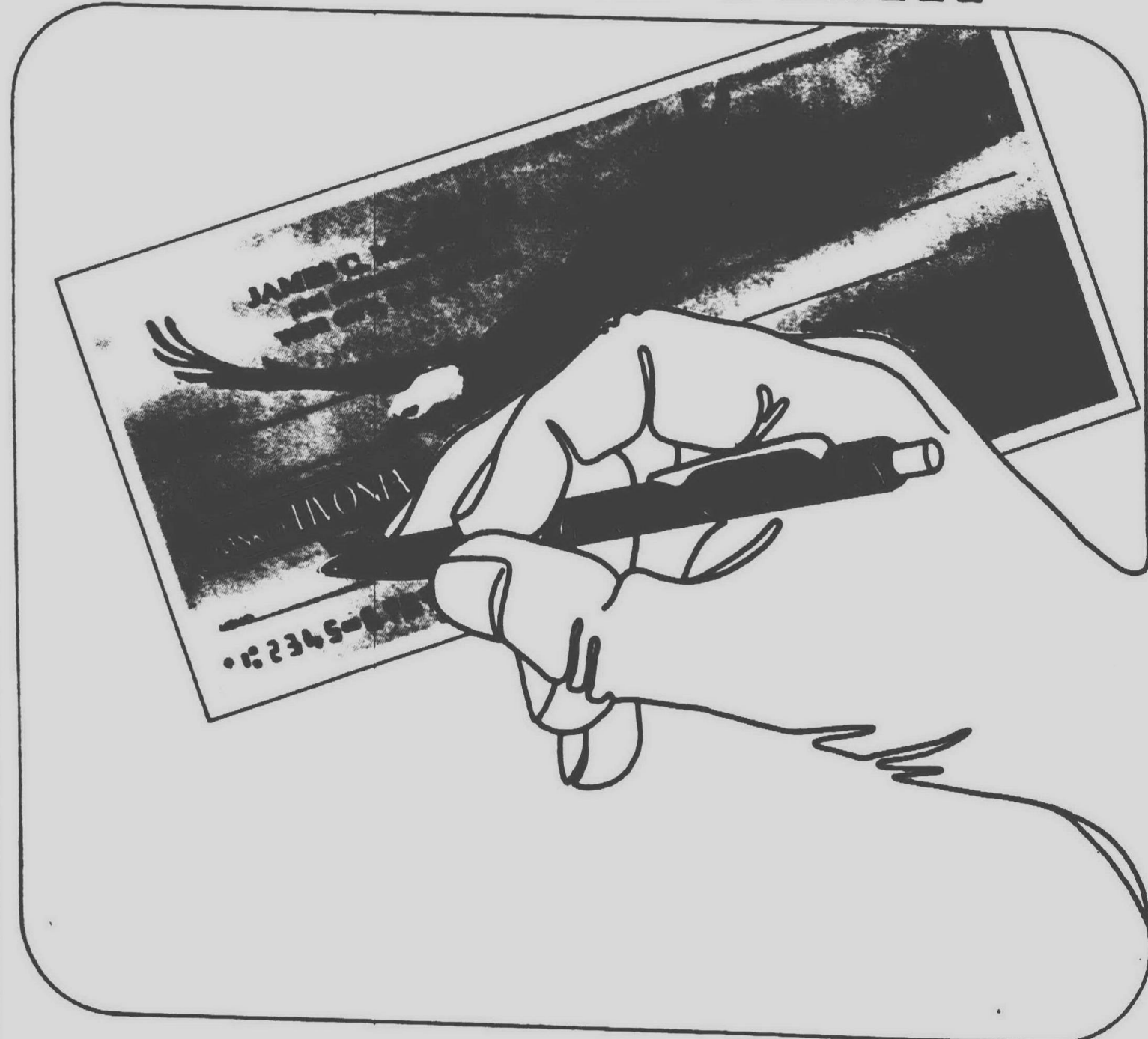
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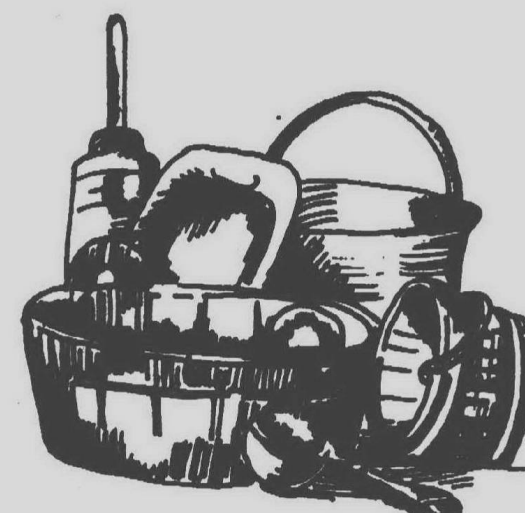
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# Right-side bicyclist has safety advantage in our No. 2 pastime

All of a sudden, bicycling has become a challenger for the nation's number one pastime. It ranks second only to swimming.

With this growing popularity, there also grows a need for ideas on how to guide the increasing number of riders to more enjoyable and better riding adventures.

Over the next couple of weeks, this column will give some insights on how to make your bike rides "more than just a bike ride," both for you as rider and potential repairman on your bike.

I plan to discuss the most recent trends and developments in the sport. Hopefully, I'll try to create some enthusiasm for bicycling as a viable tradition.

The first thing any rider should be concerned about before he even takes to the streets is safety. Today, many bicyclists start riding without having the proper safety equipment on their bikes or knowing the "rules of the road."

A study by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare reports that more than one million Americans a year suffer injuries in bike related accidents. A small percentage of these accidents are the fault of the bike. The major cause of most bike accidents is the fault of improper driver education.

During the past few years more than half of all the bicycles sold were for adults. So when you consider bicycle safety, it no longer just applies to children.

Before riding your bike, make yourself visible. Be sure the bike is equipped with front, side and rear reflectors. On the front there should be white reflectors and on the back red reflectors. Side reflectors should, preferably, be mounted in the spokes.

Reflector tape on fenders and a tall red or yellow flag attached to the rear axle is advisable when riding in traffic.

Avoid riding at night, but when you must be sure to use a light. If you do not have a light on your bike, attach a lightweight flashlight to either your arm or leg where it can be seen by motorists.

Inexpensive riding lights can be purchased at any local bike dealer.

If you stay alert while riding and follow these common sense rules, your adventures on wheels will be a lot safer.

The first and most important rule: Always drive on the right side of the road with traffic in a single file. Today, the major complaint of motorists is that many bicyclists drive

against traffic in groups. Many times these careless bicyclists cause accidents because drivers usually are unable to see them, especially at night.

Like motorists all bicyclists are subject to the same traffic regulations including lights and stop signs. Therefore, always assume that everyone else has the right of way.

The best way to make a left hand turn is to cross at the intersection first, walking your bike across the street.

Don't ride on sidewalks and never ride two on your bike.

Be especially alert at intersections and be on the lookout for cars suddenly pulling out of parking spaces. Watch for car doors opening unexpectedly and truck mirrors that stick out a few feet from the side of the truck.

A rider can completely wreck his bike and possibly seriously injure himself if he crashes into an opening door or truck mirror while cruising down any street.

One reality of life is that bikes, especially the more expensive ones, are attractive to bike thieves. A strong lock is a must. When you must park your

bike for any length of time, leave it where you can keep an eye on it. Leave it where other people can see it, too.

Since bike thefts are on the rise, take your bicycles to local police departments to be registered and licensed. This will aid the police in recovering your bike if it is ever lost or stolen.

When your bike is stolen, immediately report the theft to police.

Remember: Being a defensive bicyclist will increase your chances of enjoying your bicycling adventures.

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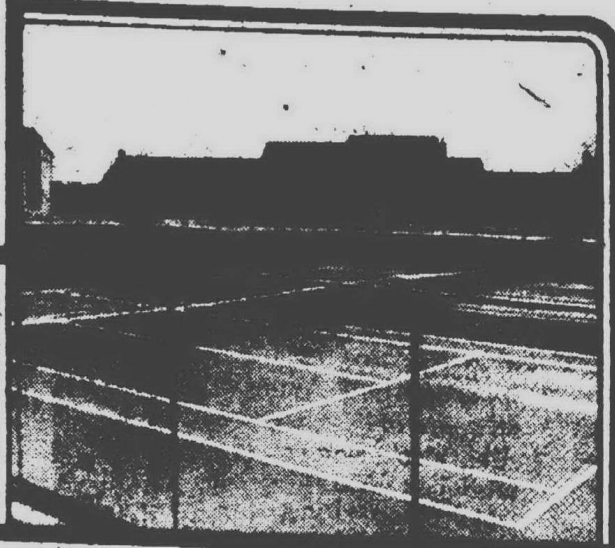
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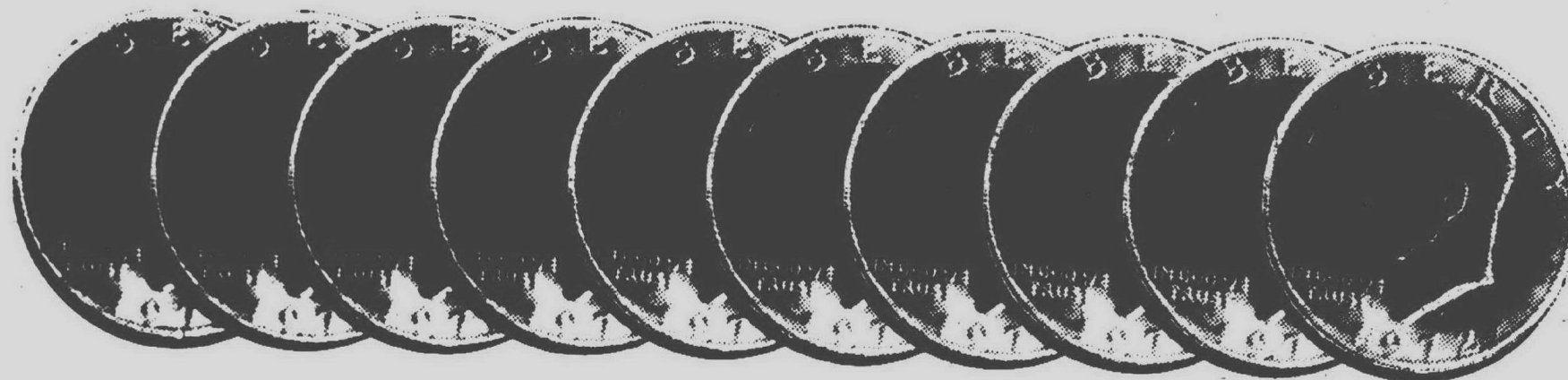
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## Esch asks monitoring of SSI aid

Government auditors have been asked by U.S. Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) to continue close monitoring of a new unified program of Supplemental Security Income (SSI), which has been plagued by problems causing hardships to the aged, blind and disabled.

Esch, whose 2nd District includes Livonia and Plymouth, says in a letter to Comptroller General Elmer Staats:

"Many more problems exist than those which I outlined in my letter to you of May 30, and considerable time and effort will be needed to unravel and decipher the snarls that have beset SSI since implementation last January."

ESCH ASKED that the General Accounting Office (GAO), congressional watchdog on government spending, continue to report to him regularly on its findings and, if warranted, conduct a full-scale audit.

"The eligibility of hundreds of thousands of handicapped persons cannot be compromised," says Esch, who has been meeting with the GAO and Social Security Administration since complaints about SSI were first raised by the Washtenaw Association for Retarded Children.

The meetings and GAO probe followed a preliminary report from Esch to Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) Secretary Caspar Weinberger in which the congressman warned of "widespread confusion and near hysteria" on a national scale among SSI recipients.

ESCH SAID he was pleased additional personnel and better procedures being used in the 2nd District had reduced the pending caseload and speeded up payments to eligible recipients.

In addition, a special strike force has been set up to work on the thousands of cases pending nationally.

In a report to the House recently, Esch said there apparently had been a "general breakdown of the entire SSI program, leaving thousands of recipients either without benefits or totally confused as to eligibility."

Esch published a complete copy of Weinberger's response to the problems and said efforts are now under way to clear up both the computer and procedural problems plaguing the program.



# When Sunday movie controversy split Plymouth

PLYMOUTH—Among the disputes which divided the community in the 1920's was the Sunday movie controversy. As in the case of the battle over the sale of liquor, local church leaders played an active role. "It was Kate Allen vs. the churches," recalls one resident who remembers the contest.

The efforts of church people to ban Sunday showings was founded on a time-honored tradition.

Sunday blue laws—as their opponents called them—came into being shortly after the settlement of the colonies. They date back to 13th century England and even before then to the time of the Roman Empire when Constantine the Great bade all Roman citizens rest on Sunday.

Religious motives were behind early laws in America which restricted Sunday activities. Those who opposed blue laws claimed the laws were Christian-oriented and violated the guarantees of separation of church and state.

The local disagreement began early in 1922 when Mrs. Allen, who owned the Penniman-Allyn Theatre, announced a new policy—movies, which had been shown on weekdays, would now be shown on Sunday.

The theater stood on Penniman Avenue across from the post office. Mrs. Allen had built it, and an adjoining dance hall, in 1918. The dance hall, which featured a balcony for the orchestra, was located where Minerva's dress shop and Bode's Restaurant were before the Penniman building burned in 1968.

Movies had been shown in Plymouth prior to the construction of the P & A Theatre—at the "Opera House" over the old City Hall, and in a building on Penniman, later razed, across from the new theater. The P & A, however, was Plymouth's first real movie house, and movie theaters enjoyed a patronage in the 1920's which cinema owners today would envy.

Shortly after Mrs. Allen's Sunday policy was announced, the village split into two camps. In one were church-goers and other conservatives who petitioned the village commission to ban the outrage. In the other were liberals and local merchants who petitioned the commission to do nothing of the sort.

Conservative leaders included: the Rev. S.C. Hathaway of the First Presbyterian Church; Mrs. Charles H. Bennett, a prominent club-woman whose husband was the well-known president of the Daisy Manufacturing Company; and village postmaster G. Hill. The village commissioners and the school board lined up with the conservatives. The superintendent of schools, George A. Smith, said he had 800 reasons—all pupils—why Sunday movies should not be shown.

The town's clergy preached sermons against Sunday movies, declaring them a violation of the Sabbath. To Rev. Hathaway it was a moral issue. "Sunday shows are a debasing influence on the community," he told a reporter. "They lure our children from Sunday vespers, and if we allow them it would be but a step to Sunday baseball and other public entertainment."

The liberals urged the commissioners to stand pat. Harry O. Robinson, the colorful livery stable owner and town auctioneer who was known throughout the State, told the same re-

porter he couldn't tell him what he thought about the proposed ordinance. "If I did, you couldn't print what I said," William Pettingill, the grocer, agreed. "If they close the show house they'd better hang crepe on that traffic sign."

Secure in her position as a wealthy socialite of long standing, Mrs. Allen minced no words. "If they close my place Sundays, they will find it closed every other day also. These reformers make me mad. I give them good, clean films and I keep their children in Plymouth on Sunday nights. Otherwise the youngsters would be scooting off to Ypsilanti, Walled Lake or Detroit."

The issue was put to a referendum. Voter registrations soared. The big day came on March 13, 1922. When the votes were counted, the liberals had won by 746 to 507 and

Sunday movies were here to stay. The winners celebrated by parading in the streets. "It was Plymouth's wildest night in the memory of the oldest inhabitant," reported the "Detroit News."

The controversy had been a ticklish one for local clubwomen. Mrs. Allen, daughter of Ebenezer J. Penniman, the only man from Plymouth ever elected to the U.S. Congress, was a key figure in Plymouth social circles. The Women's Club of Plymouth almost split over the affair. Mrs. Bennett made it clear that the fight was

not directed personally at Mrs. Allen.

When it was over, the Women's Christian Temperance Union published "An Explanation" in the "Plymouth Mail." They said their petition opposing Sunday movies was not a personal criticism and that they had "no thought whatever of hurting or offending Mrs. Allen, whose beautiful building is most assuredly an ornament to the town."

The "Detroit News" purposely played up the small town, "Blue Law" aspects of the controversy. The reflective reader of today, however, aware of the social problems which

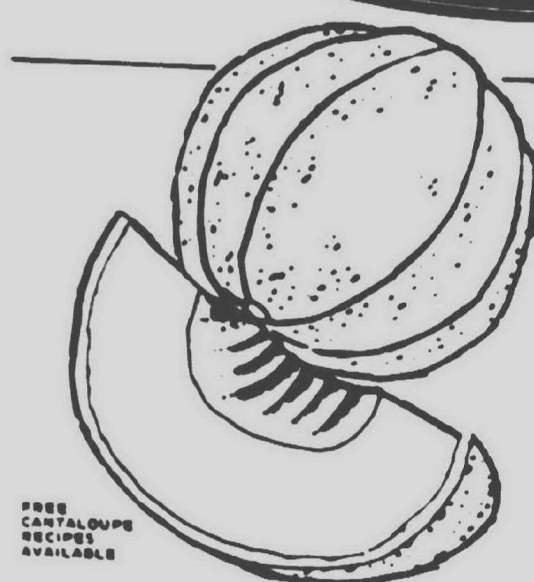
have developed since the 1920's, and sensitive to the current outcry against the caliber of movies now being produced, might well ask, "Who was right?" Were Rev. Hathaway and other conservatives narrow-minded "blue noses" or were they, like those who opposed smoking and intemperance, simply ahead of their time? Perhaps they took the long view that Sunday movies was just another in a long list of distractions which have continued to draw people away from the religious and educational disciplines of the past.

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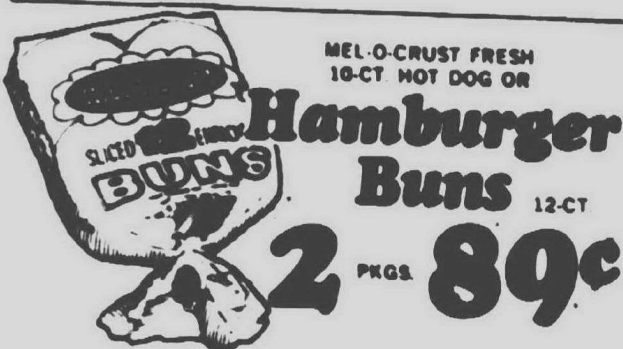
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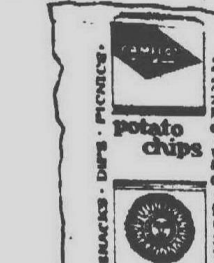
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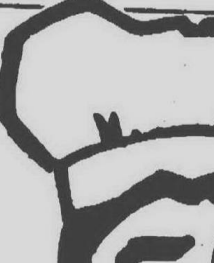

# Dizzy Dean's days in Detroit

To the younger generation he was just a name and not too familiar at that—even though his exploits are in the record books.

But those of us who were fortunate enough to see him in action in his heyday when he turned the City of Detroit upside down, emotionally, and almost single-handedly conquered the Tigers in the world series, never will forget Jerome Hanna (Dizzy) Dean

who became a legend with the St. Louis Cardinals when they were baseball's famous "Gas House Gang."

And "Dizzy" never forgot Detroit, either, as he often related in his pleasing southern drawl that it was here that he received the two worst insults of his athletic life.

It all happened back in 1934 when Detroit and the entire metropolitan area was just coming out of the deep,

dark depression and needed a good shot in the arm.

For months the banks had been closed, people were using scrip instead of real money, and things were in a rather sad state of affairs.

The only bright hope in these dismal days was furnished by the Tigers when Mickey (Black Mike) Cochrane piloted them to the American League pennant.

For 25 long years the fans had waited for a winner and when the pennant was clinched the entire community exploded like it never had before or since. The entire area went "Baseball crazy."

The daily papers carried stories of the players on almost every page—the streets were filled with pictures of the players and scenes of some of their battles.

Winning the pennant was only the beginning. Just ahead was the world series with the St. Louis Cardinals who had won the rough and tumble National League race in the closing days of the season.

But to the Tiger fans this was going to be taken in stride. "Our heroes" as one of the daily prints hailed them, were well nigh unbeatable.

Then, into the picture came "Dizzy" Dean, the gangling fast ball pitcher who had grown up in the cotton fields of Arkansas and Mississippi—and turned the entire town upside down.

At the time, The Stroller was toiling in the sports department of the Detroit Free Press and was watching the Tigers in their final practice before the big series when word came that the Cardinals were coming.

What followed was pure drama and one of the big moments of Detroit baseball history.

When the Cardinals entered the stadium a tall, gangling fellow with a big, white cowboy hat, leaped over the box seats and raced toward the plate in his street clothes, grabbed a bat and yelled "Throw me one."

He took one wild swipe at the ball and it landed far up in the stands. As it did, "Dizzy" turned to the Tigers and laughingly said, "You guys will be easy."

That was his introduction to the Tigers and he took much of the steam out of them before the series ever began.

He had a great time with them, winning his first start, and was all set for his second win when the real drama and "insult" came.

During the course of the fifth game he sneaked in while Manager Frankie Frisch wasn't looking and relieved the base runner on first. On the next play he started for second and in the run down was hit on the head with the ball. He lay flat on the ground and a great howl went up—as only the fans in those days could howl.

Dean was rushed to the hospital and the baseball world stood almost still to learn of his condition.

The newspaper offices were in a frenzy, especially the Free Press where the first edition was about to go to press. At the last moment before deadline came the word that Dean hadn't suffered a head injury.

In haste a headline was written that now rests in the archives, for the Free Press came on the street with this blazoned type—

DEAN'S HEAD SHOWS NOTHING!  
For years Dizzy carried the headline with him and regaled the young sports writers at the series each year with what he called the "worst insult in my life."

But he suffered another the very next day. Assigned to pitch, he had the Tigers baffled and was leading, 11 to 0, in the deciding game when Manager Frisch sent all of the pitchers out to the bull pen to warm up.

"And just imagine," Dean would chuckle, "we didn't have a game scheduled until the next spring."

"They were the worst insults in my life and I'll never forget Detroit."

No one ever had turned world series upside down as he did and even though he now has been called to his final reward, those of us who saw him do it, never will forget him, either.

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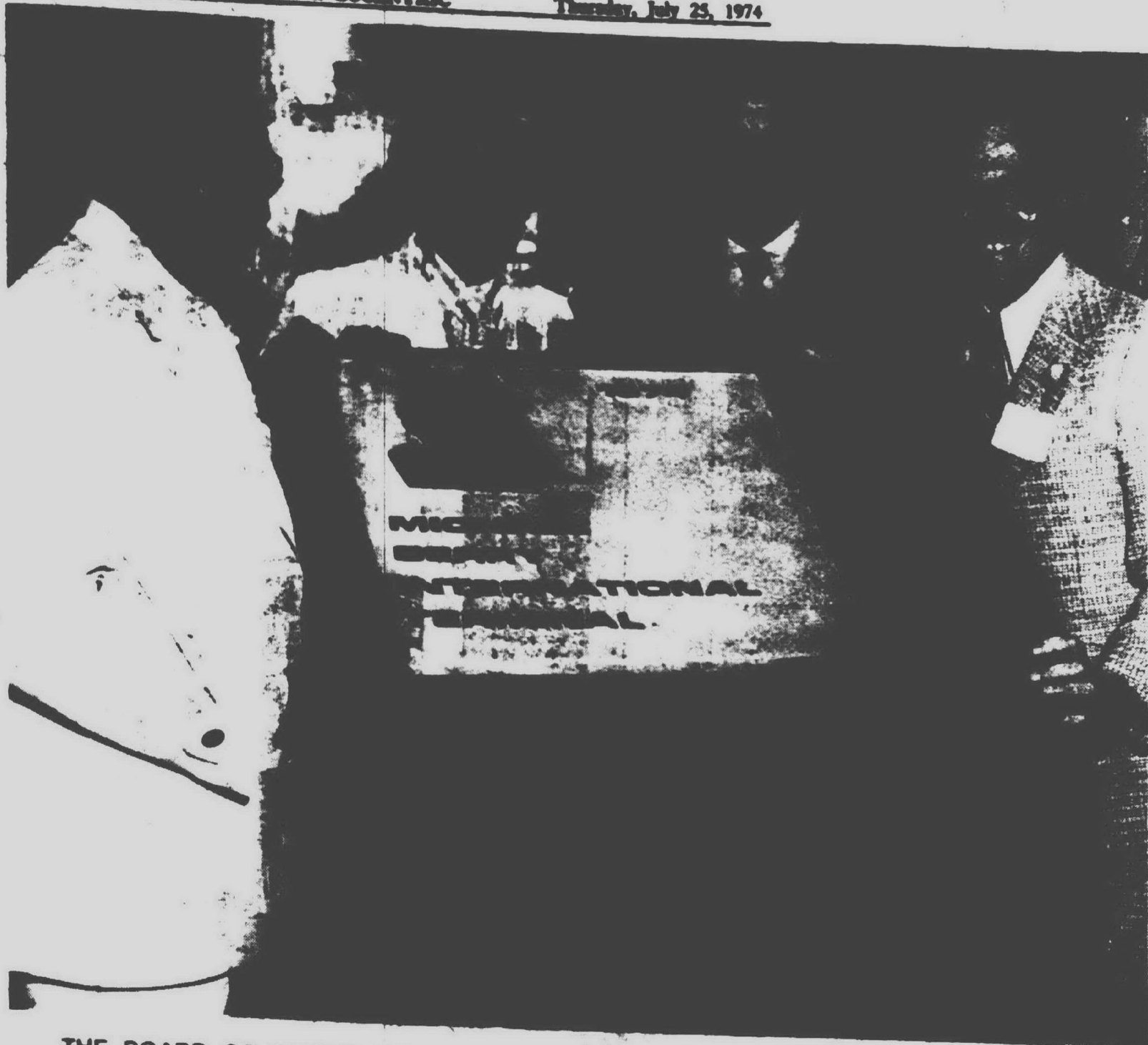

## New international air terminal begins service at Metro Aug. 1

The growing importance of the Detroit metropolitan area as a world travel center will be highlighted Aug. 1 as a new international air terminal begins operations at the Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport.

Under construction for two years, the \$11.5 million facility is named the Michael Berry International Terminal in honor of the chairman of the Wayne County Road Commission, which operates the airport complex.

THE NEW terminal, capable of handling nearly 10,000 travelers a day, will serve passengers of all international carriers.

Charter flights also will be serviced by the three arrival-departure satellites designed for simultaneous use by three jumbo jets or six smaller aircraft.

Forecasts show international air travel through the Detroit area will more than triple within the next seven years. The present level is about 315,000 passengers per year.

The new terminal is completely autonomous from other units of the Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport and offers complete facilities for immigration, public health, customs, agricultural inspection, passenger and baggage check-in, dining rooms, lounges and other services.

Visitors to the three-level structure will be greeted by a gracefully sculptured 400-foot long concrete canopy and 23 sculptured pillars. Besides the reception lobby, the first level will house check-in and baggage make-up and claims services as well as customs inspection.

THE SECOND level contains airline offices, immigration and public health inspection.

The third level, serviced by direct escalators from the check-in area, is devoted to the departure lounge, restaurant, bar and concessions. Access to aircraft will be through a concourse opening into the three satellites.

A unique operational feature in the concourse will allow the electronic opening and closing of a series of doors so the isolation of incoming passengers can be maintained.

The 320-by-136-foot terminal building, containing more than 100,000 square feet of floor space, is complemented by a 623-space parking

area with an overflow lot accommodating another 200 vehicles.

The new terminal is a major step in a \$90 million expansion program undertaken at the airport over the past two years.

Other facilities in the program include a 10,000-foot runway, improved lighting and taxiways on the airfield, expansion of baggage handling facilities in the two existing terminals, a new auto parking deck, and expansion of concourse to accommodate the increased use of larger jets.

The Economic Development Administration has approved a \$60,500 grant to help small businesses in Michigan conserve energy, according to U.S. Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor), whose 2nd District includes Livonia and Plymouth.

Esch said the program is aimed at assisting small firms in the reduction of fuel costs while maintaining productivity.

The program will include special studies on heat control and steam applications in small plants. Studies will be conducted on the maintenance of combustion equipment and air and cooling systems. It will consider alternate sources of fuel and methods of conserving energy in various production processes.

Michigan will provide \$73,657 to complete the \$134,157 for a year, according to the announcement by William W. Blunt, assistant secretary for economic development.

The program will be conducted by the Office of Economic Expansion of the Michigan State Department of Commerce in Lansing.

"This program can be of much-needed help to small businessmen because it provides the technical expertise that can result in decreased fuel costs and the conservation of energy," said Esch.

## Ford supports flooding relief

Congressman William D. Ford (D-Taylor) has joined in a drive to enact legislation which would ease flooding problems along the lower Detroit River and Lake Erie.

Ford, a sponsor of the bill along with 37 others has written to Rep. John A. Blatnik, chairman of the public works committee to which the bill has been referred, urging immediate action.

Ford represents the 15th District which includes Westland, Garden City and Canton Township.

The letter said problems in the Great Lakes Basin remain acute. Water levels remain close to the all-time record and flooding remains a constant threat as shorelines continue to erode at an alarming rate.

Ford said that the legislation provides that the increased water diversion take place only when Great Lakes water levels rise above their long-term seasonal average.

"The bill also stipulates that no additional water be released if it would contribute to flooding in the Illinois Waterway or the Mississippi River," Ford said.

"This is to make certain that we do not cause increased suffering and damages in other sections of the country while solving our problems."

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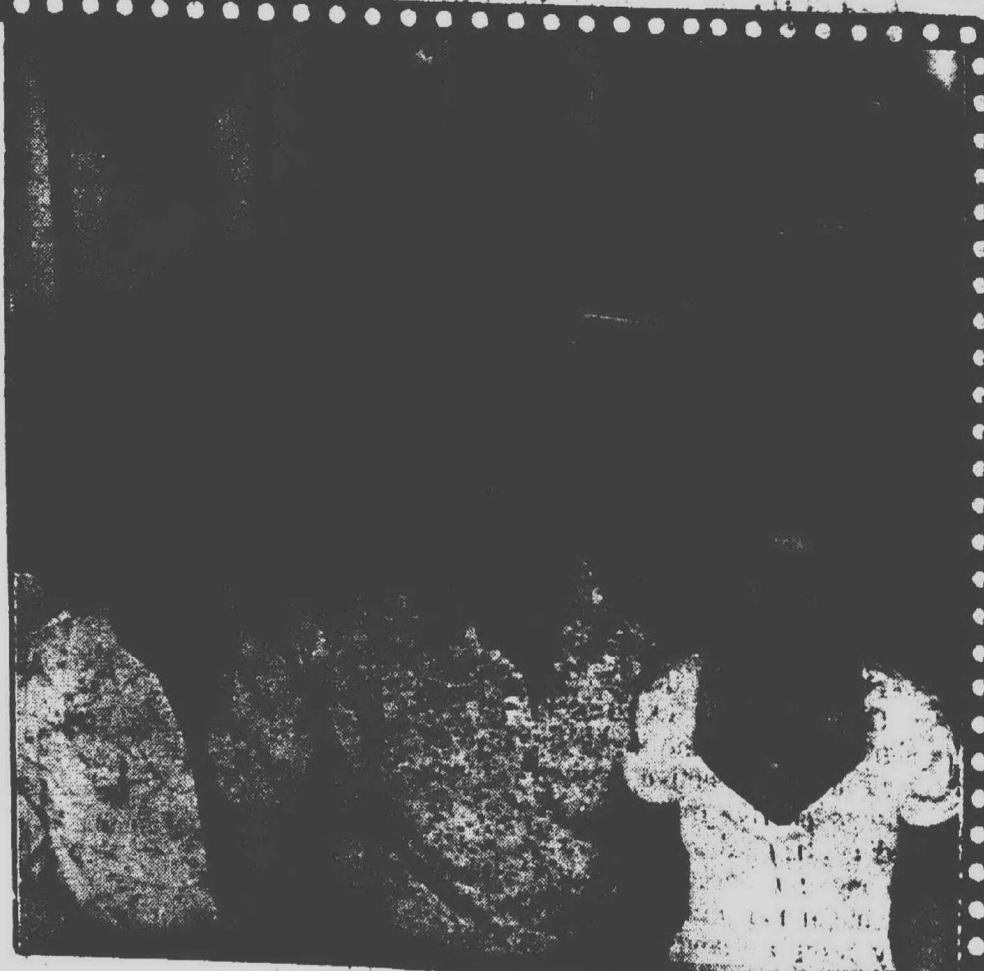
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# Madonna to train 100 reading teachers for 'problem' kids

Madonna College in Livonia, will train 100 prospective teachers to teach reading to behavioral problem children in a new two-year program funded for \$100,000 by "Right to Read" of the U.S. Office of Education.

Sister Mary Danatha, president, announced that Madonna will provide \$20,000 in scholarship aid to students entering the program.

Students, including transfers, who wish to be considered for the grant, should contact the Madonna education department.

Fifty persons will enter the pilot

project this fall and 50 more in the fall of 1975.

THOSE SELECTED must have the equivalent of one year of college or experience which would serve in lieu of such credit.

In the remaining three years of the competency-based program, student teachers will work in classroom situations with experienced teachers as well as take theory and methods courses at Madonna.

Emphasis will be placed on instructing and understanding pupils with various emotional, social, and managerial behavioral needs.

Student teachers will diagnose, plan

and prescribe individually designed lessons for teaching not only reading but for coordinating reading instruction into mathematics, science and social studies.

"Pre-service teachers do not normally acquire a high competency in teaching reading to behavioral prob-

lem children from varying backgrounds and cultures," said Dr. June Slobodian, chairman of the Madonna department of education and psychology.

"This results in many of the children becoming poor readers and a number of the poor readers becoming truant and delinquent," she said.

Dr. Slobodian explained that from the beginning, this program will provide the student teacher with "hands on" contact with problem and potential problem kids.

THROUGH THE cooperation of the Inkster School District exploratory and laboratory experiences will be provided in the Milton School, operated by the Juvenile Facility Network.

Madonna already operates a "Saturday Academics" program at the facility.

The "Right to Read" program at Madonna will be directed by Sister Mary Martina who has a doctorate in educational psychology and is director of Madonna's Psycho-Educational Center. Dr. Slobodian will serve as coordinator.

Because the program is based on competencies, Dr. Slobodian emphasized that maturity of the enrollees and their interest and concern for children would be significant factors in the selection process.

There are no age or sex restrictions. Further information is available from the Madonna education department.

## Botsford in deal with Blue Cross

Blue Cross of Michigan announced that it has negotiated a "prospective reimbursement" agreement with Botsford General Hospital in Farmington Hills.

Botsford General Hospital volunteered to join the nationally discussed prospective reimbursement pilot project, first announced late last fall by Blue Cross of Michigan.

Eleven other hospitals, chosen carefully to provide a variety of geographic, size and sponsorship characteristics, will also participate.

The 12-month agreement between the five million member Blue Cross of Michigan and Farmington Hill's 310-bed Botsford General Hospital means that the osteopathic hospital will provide services to Blue Cross members for an annual negotiated amount.

THE OBJECTIVE is to determine if lower costs for both Blue Cross (and its members) and the hospital (and its patients) are obtainable through this payment mechanism without adverse effects on quality of care.

The three-year experiment is designed to determine if the incentives built into prospective reimbursement offer a positive method to contain or reduce hospital costs.

Long considered by Blue Cross of Michigan and much discussed nationally in the last several years, prospective reimbursement has been extolled as the answer to frequent criticism of "retrospective reimbursement" based on "cost plus."

Retrospective reimbursement provides payment to hospitals after services have been provided. Prospective reimbursement centers attention on costs through a prior agreement to provide services for a negotiated figure.

Under prospective reimbursement, if a hospital's costs exceed those agreed upon, it must accept the loss. If it can provide services for less than the figure negotiated, it, in effect, collects a bonus.

Daniel J. Kehoe, vice president of provider affairs for Blue Cross, said: "In this ambitious, cooperative effort, Blue Cross and these forward-looking hospitals are tackling directly, through full disclosure between them of all operating costs, the problem bothering the public. That is, plainly, the increasing costs of hospital care."

"Instead of paying on the basis of audited costs, Blue Cross and the hospitals will negotiate an annual budget from which payments will be derived. If a hospital can increase productivity, it will benefit from its reduced costs."

"What we're all after, of course, is savings. We think this joint effort will produce results because of the built-in incentives for hospitals."

SPEAKING FOR Botsford Hospital, Administrator Seymour Cantor explained: "We're really delighted to be involved in this approach to cost consciousness."

"The Botsford board and I believe this will work. It will mean extra effort for the hospital and for Blue Cross, but, if the end product is high quality care more efficiently and economically provided to our community, then it surely will be worthwhile."

Both Kehoe and Cantor said the prospective reimbursement system depends on the free exchange between the parties of all financial data and on very careful budgeting and cost reporting.

Although simple in concept, the prospective reimbursement system developed by Blue Cross in cooperation with the hospitals requires financial, operational and planning expertise from the most modern business management practices.

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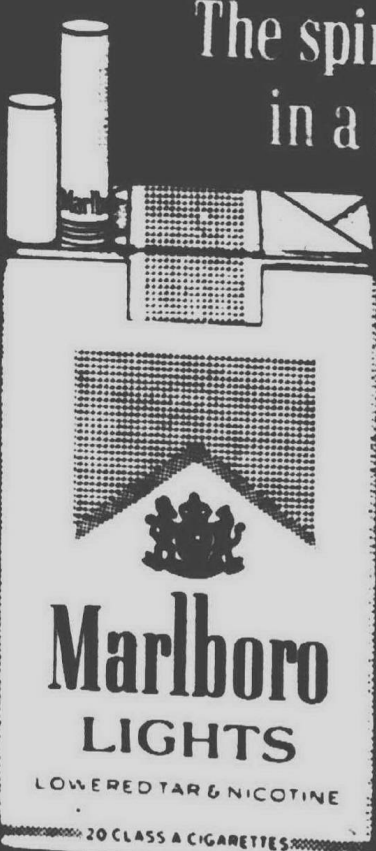

Visitors with little or no English will find a wide range of sightseeing services, including coach and individually guided tours available to them throughout the year, reports the New York Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Beginning in early April and continuing through mid-November, the Gray Line of New York conducts multi-lingual tours that take visitors to see the city's famous sights—Wall Street, Chinatown, the Empire State Building, Rockefeller Center, the shopping areas, museums and galleries, the theater district and the United Nations.

Every Monday, Wednesday and Thursday, tours are led in French and German. On Tuesday and Friday, the tours are led by an Italian and Spanish speaking guide (advance reservations are advisable).

WITH ADVANCE notice, the Crossroads Sightseeing Corporation accommodates tour groups of 25 or more, in any language—even Sanskrit. Short Line-American New York Tours and Times Square Sightseeing offer similar arrangements.

Non-English-speaking visitors, traveling alone, will find that there are resourceful tour planners who custom tailor tours for individuals or small groups of people.

The International Concierge Service, Ltd. provides interpreters chosen from among the hundreds of foreign-born graduate students studying in the city's universities.

They can help ease a visitor's way by making reservations at hotels, restaurants and the theater; by escorting shoppers to specialty boutiques or through the department stores, museums or galleries. Or, if a determined Dane (Frenchman or Swede) chooses to see the city solo—they'll make up a sightseeing plan and mark maps accordingly.

Command Performance, a group of professional actors and actresses, has formed a tour company that is a boon to foreign guests. The CP group assigns multi-lingual performer hosts, and it's on with the show. They'll entertain groups of all sizes, arrange luncheons or take visitors to an artist's studio.

New York's endless variety has given rise to a multiplicity of sightseeing approaches. My favorite aunt asks, "Habla Ud. Espanol? Sprechensie Deutsch? Parles-vous Francais? Parla Italiano?" Their answer is Si! Ja! Oui! They'll gladly help the foreign visitor from arrival to departure with all the personal concern of a dotting aunt.

AMERICAN ODYSSEYS, Red Carpet Associates, Gulliver's Trails, Tina Cummings, Inc., New York Experience, Inc., Newkirk Tours, Inc. and New York by Night, Inc. all offer the foreign visitor different plans imaginatively conceived to cater to different interests, schedules and price ranges.

The United Nations, high on the must-see list of overseas visitors, has a staff of multi-lingual guides who lead regularly scheduled tours in all

of the UN's official working languages—French, Spanish, Russian, Chinese and Arabic.

A group of 15 or more can make arrangements in advance for tours in more than 20 other languages. With the exceptions of Christmas and New Year's days, the UN is open throughout the year, from 9 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Tours leave about every 10 minutes from the main lobby of the General Assembly Building and last about one hour.

WITH A WEEK'S notice, Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts can accommodate a group (20 or more) with tours in French, Spanish and Italian at a discount rate. The tours leave from Avery Fisher Hall and last approximately an hour to an hour and 15 minutes.

Individuals can join an already organized foreign language tour, but it's best to call Lincoln Center a day in advance to be certain of the schedule. Efforts are being made to accommodate German and Japanese visitors, particularly in summer.

With help from volunteers, the Museum of the City of New York provides guided tours, on an irregular schedule, in French, Italian and Spanish. For bookings call the museum well in advance.

# Local singer stands up for Elvis

Will the real Elvis Presley please stand up? Probably not, but a lot of fans are willing to settle for Rocky Barra instead.

Barra, 28, of Westland, is one of many singers now using an Elvis Presley act. Off stage Barra bears little resemblance to Presley, but on stage he's the closest thing to the famous singer that many fans will ever get a chance to see.

The Rocky Barra Show, as it's called, consists of Barra, George Saul, Mike Collins and Steve Zoyes. The group performs all kinds of music with the exception of hard rock, including music of the 1950s and '60s. But Barra says, the Elvis songs are the most popular.

Barra and his group are now playing at the Chateau Orleans, Telegraph and Joy, in Redford, and will be there for at least two more weeks.

The group is also working on its third album which will consist of original material. They are also planning a western U.S. tour this fall.

Barra has had a hand since the age of 12. He played the drums accom-

panied by two accordion players; jobs frequently consisted of weddings.

Fortunately, Barra moved up from there, eventually formed his present band and even built a recording studio in his basement.

Barra has written about 200 songs, mostly pop and gospel. He says he frequently gets requests to do gospel songs during his shows, but he refuses to sing gospel music in a night club. He considers himself a Christian and takes it very seriously.

Aside from the drums, Barra also plays the guitar and keyboard instruments. He paid his way through college at Eastern Michigan University by playing with a band.

At EMU, Barra majored in education and was a substitute teacher for

a while in the Livonia School District. Before moving to Westland, Barra had lived in Livonia for 18 years.

Music was in his blood, however, and he decided to give up teaching to devote full time to his band.

Barra is also editor of a monthly magazine on Elvis Presley which is circulated in 38 countries. His wife Nancy, is a teacher at Cooper Elementary School.

Barra and his wife recently followed Presley on tour through such cities as Niagara Falls, Columbus, Louisville, Bloomington and Milwaukee. Barra will review the concerts for the magazine.

Music usually keeps Barra busy. Last year his group worked 48 weeks out of 52, and could have worked even

more. Barra says he likes to sleep when he isn't busy with his band. He also likes to play softball and is active in the church. He once tried to be a professional bowler, but says he is glad now it didn't work out.

Barra is also a collector of films of the 1950s and owns many Elvis Presley films as well as Amos and Andy and Burns and Allen.

Although Barra plans to make music his lifetime career, he insists on being realistic about it.

"I'm not out for fame and fortune. If it happens, it happens and if it doesn't, it doesn't. I'm just glad things have worked out good so far."

**ST. EDITH CATHOLIC CHURCH**, Five Mile and Newburgh, Livonia, will be the scene of a car wash Saturday, July 27 from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Young people in the church's summer program are seeking to raise funds to finance a trip to a Detroit Tiger baseball game and a day at the beach.

Five of the top executives of the National Council of Churches (NCC) were summoned, one by one, to the office of NCC General Secretary Claire Randall on Friday morning, June 14.

The Revs. David Hunter, Leroy Bringer, Allan Ranck and Donald Landwer, plus public relations director Fletcher Coats, have devoted more than a century of dedicated service to the NCC. But they were all fired by Miss Randall, a red hot women's libber who is the first female ever to hold the NCC's top post.

The Washington Post (hardly a right-wing newspaper) noted in its lead paragraph reporting this massive termination that Miss Randall had sacked leaders who are:

"All of them male, all of them white and all of them over 60."

What The Post overlooked is the fact that on that very same bloody Friday, in another part of the giant Interchurch Center on Riverside Drive, yet another, white, male, top NCC was being sacked.

## Rev. Lester Kinsolving's Religion Update

**JAMES McCracken**, one of the world's most knowledgeable and competent authorities on feeding and clothing the hungry, was fired as director of the renowned Church World Service. He was fired despite the catastrophic famine now raging throughout most of Central Africa.

But while an NCC press release saluted McCracken's competence and integrity, he was still sacked, by the same man who paid tribute to him. The Rev. Eugene Stockwell, head of the NCC overseas department.

Stockwell, a Methodist, is the only white man at the top level who has managed to survive Miss Randall's Friday Morning Massacre. This is understandable because he contends that Church World Service (a \$25-million operation) shouldn't be content to feed and clothe the hungry, but should devote itself to "support for systemic change" as well.

Stockwell is an alumnus of Chicago's Ecumenical Institute, whose leader, Methodist minister Joseph Matthews, has said:

"Let any church send us 30 laymen for a weekend and we will send back 29 awakened revolutionaries."

In his apparent adherence to revolutionary charity, Stockwell is strongly supported by the new center of NCC power, black militant Lucius Walker, a Baptist chieftain who heads the NCC Division of Church and Society.

Rev. Walker not only arranged the conference which produced the notorious Black Manifesto, but he has been a leading U.S. supplier of church money to African terrorist groups.

**THE BLACK MILITANT takeover** of NCC—with a white women's libber cleverly utilized as hatchet lady—is a rather ugly specimen of manipulation by terror.

Shortly after it was learned that Miss Randall had been mugged in her Manhattan apartment last winter, a gang of Harlem thugs proceeded to occupy the entire eighth floor of the Interchurch Center and rifled Miss Randall's files.

Rather than calling the police to remove these hoodlums (who NCC President Sterling Cary noted were risking the lives of everyone in the building by violating the fire ordinances), Miss Randall "negotiated" with them.

Miss Randall has since been accompanied by a bodyguard. For security's sake, she also conceals her hotel room number while attending conventions.

She may have momentarily managed to placate the black militants by her massive axing of white executives. But this could constitute the be-

ginning of the end for the already financially-plagued NCC.

**FOR THE SIX** fired executives would appear to have a solid case if they were to choose to appeal to the New York State Division of Human Rights because the State's anti-discrimination law applies not only to all races, but to sex and age as well.

The only black executive removed by Miss Randall was the Rev. Bernard Catchings, a communications officer with no media experience whatsoever, who was immediately rehired as a "minority communications" officer.

Moreover, the primary source of NCC income is the local churches all over the nation—the vast majority of which are pastored by white male clergy who are, or are approaching, the same age as the six white male NCC executives whom Miss Randall has just put out of work.

And even if some of these clergymen are so mesmerized by the ecumenical ideal that they ignore this atrocity—presumably their parishioners will care enough to protest the sending of any more money to Miss Randall's hatched NCC.

## Pastor Thompson accepts new post

After seven years as pastor of the First Baptist Church of Plymouth, the Rev. Paul S. Thompson has resigned to accept the position of senior pastor of the First Baptist Church in Augusta, Kan., a suburb of Wichita.

"God has made it very clear that I accept this new challenge even though I am reluctant to make the move," said Pastor Thompson when announcing his resignation to members of his congregation at recent services. His final Sunday service in Plymouth will be Aug. 18.

Under Rev. Thompson's leadership the church has grown from attendance of 130 to 400. It has been relocated from Spring Street to its new facility on North Territorial Road where plans are being made for further expansion.

Pastor Thompson has served as president of the Ministerial Association, co-ordinator of the Plymouth Evangelical Fellowship and was a member of the human relations committee for four years. He also cooperated with the Fall Festival program committee.

## Bible birds will give Plymouth performance

The Bible Birds will perform such feats as sitting on a chair and eating from a dish, talking, answering questions related to the Bible and singing a song during a performance at Plymouth Church of the Nazarene Sunday, July 28 at 10:45 a.m.

Presented by their trainer, Dr. Wendell Hansen, formerly president of Great Commission Schools in Anderson, Ind., the birds will also swallow a steel sword the full body length and ride airplanes.

Life magazine characterized these birds as "very smart." Lowell Thomas said, "This year about 250,000 persons will see the bird stars and not only be entertained, but also given a message of truth and happiness."

# Where does a minister go if he needs help?

Many people go to their priest, minister or rabbi when they are in trouble and need help.

But where does the clergyman go when he needs help?

Until the mid-1950s there was no place churchmen could go to receive professional help from people who had particular understanding and background for their problems.

Dr. Reuel Howe, a teacher in seminaries for 20 years, was aware of the growing need and decided to do something.

In a bold experiment, he opened the Institute for Advanced Pastoral Studies in the Cranbrook complex, Bloomfield Hills, in 1957.

In the 17 years since, some 5,000 religious professionals and church laity have attended sessions.

A year ago, Dr. Howe turned over the institute leadership to Dr. John E. Biersdorf. About the same time the Rev. Speed Leas joined the staff and program offerings were expanded.

Dr. Howe continues as part-time lecturer and consultant, but now has time for writing and seminar leadership around the country.

The institute's alumni card file has a section several inches thick just of names from Livonia, Plymouth, Birmingham and other neighboring communities. In total attendance Canada is very well represented, as are most of the states and many foreign countries.

Before the middle of August, the institute will have completed six summer sessions ranging from a weekend on leadership training to a two-week seminar on parish leadership and development. Other themes covered were: Releasing Our Powers of Communication; Conflict Management; Growing Your Marriage; and Meditation and Creativity.

Techniques as new as Gestalt and as old as Zen with many modifications in between are being used by the staff to aid church leaders in their attempts to cope with problems in a rapidly changing society.

There were 15 participants in the parish leadership and development seminar. Mostly they were clergymen from a variety of denominations such as United Church of Canada, Lutheran Church in America, United Presbyterian and others. Two women were in the group, a Catholic nun and the wife of a clergyman.

Represented were parish sizes ranging from one of 5,000 members in a major metropolitan area to a very small church from rural South Dakota.

The seminar was a rare instance of all three staff members working with the same group. Usually in the shorter sessions, there is only one staff leader.

Leas said of the group, "They come with special needs. We ask them to write us ahead of time with their concerns."

Even before the enrollees arrive, the staff has an idea of the kinds of

problems they may be dealing with.

The sessions start by focusing on and defining the problems. It often takes time to come up with a specific, clear statement of the problem, rather than an indication of general dissatisfaction.

Once this is done, objectives for the days ahead will be set and several days are spent on data gathering.

Early in the development seminar each member was tabulating how his church's money was spent, how volunteer time and energy was being used and attitudes in the congregation.

With this complete, the group gathered to consider a programming, budgeting system similar to the kind Robert McNamera used as United States Secretary of Defense.

In its simplest form it related dollars spent to goals and priorities.

Almost immediately several noticed that while their top priority was to attract new members, the expenditure in time and money was at the bottom of the list.

Leas commented, "The best budget is one which comes out of your own goal system."

Characteristically, the ability to cope with conflicts—within themselves, between factions in the church, between choir and congregation, between clergy and congregation—are needs listed by the applicants.

As he added up volunteer time, one minister in the development session said he had never realized how much time his choir spent together each

week. "No wonder they're a power group," he remarked, "they're together more than any other group in the church."

Leas said the three areas of emphasis in the session would be spiritual life, personal and professional life and organizational life.

During the sessions, techniques for developing self-awareness, understanding and personal growth, are offered.

Biersdorf likes to describe it as "fusing inner growth and outer change."

"We do a lot of work helping people get in touch or discover practical and alternative methods of spiritual growth," he added.

One plan suggested is keeping an intensive journal, and within this concept there are four approaches—a day to day log, a continuity of personal and parish history as it relates to the present, an image journal and a dialogue journal.

The image journal is a recording of the dreams and thoughts which pass in the mind in the transition period between waking and sleeping.

Dialogue is the written recount of an imaginary conversation between the author and the source of the con-

flict. It can be an organization or work as well as a person who gives the opposing point of view.

Using bio-energetics, which he describes as "movements to experience the flow of energy through the body," Biersdorf helps the students get in touch with religious experiences.

Meditation, sometimes using symbols, sometimes just relaxing and letting thoughts pass by, is another way to develop awareness, deepen spiritual feelings and at the same time keep in touch with reality.

Biersdorf said these experiences are provided, all within the Christian context, so those attending the institute "can find their own paths."

Dr. Howe elaborates on the needs which bring people to the institute courses.

"Lack of a sense of self-worth, inferiority, fear, lack of personal foundation for professional function" are some of the ones he mentioned, and added:

"Sometimes the more inadequate he is as a person, the more he is apt to use professional and religious ideas as a substitute for being authentic and real. Many may sense this, but don't know what the problem is. They come

looking for something for us to help them identify."

As he speaks about his particular field of interest, Dr. Howe mentions the need to correlate the psychological and theological aspects, to begin a synthesis, to help the clergymen see the religious dimensions in both personality and professional problems.

He speculates on the numbers who never come for help through the institute's continuing education programs. For many, unwilling to admit even to themselves that they have problems, the risk of getting involved in the courses is too great, he says.

"Maybe only 25 to 30 per cent of all ministers are willing to risk continuing education," he estimates. A lot come as a last resort before quitting—as a result many return to their churches to try again."

He feels strongly that having a strong faith and trust in God "doesn't relieve us of the responsibility of improving ourselves as much as we can."

He looks back on the years he struggled to fulfill the dream of a place where clergymen could come once they completed their education and had experience as religious leaders, and says simply:

"It is a most exciting experience." As a direct result of the seminars he has written two books, "Miracle of Dialogue," and another to be published this fall, about how to stay younger while growing older.

## Medical rights bill approved

A bill to guarantee hospitals and physicians permission to render emergency medical treatment to children in foster care has been recently signed into law.

The bill was introduced by State Rep. Robert Geake (R-Northville) and co-sponsored by 19 other legislators including Reps. John Markes (D-Westland), Tom Brown (D-Westland), and John Bennett (D-Redford).

According to Geake, foster parents and child care agencies are often faced with emergency medical situations that demand decisive immediate action. Present law, he says, often prevents this action, particularly when the emergency involves a foster child whose parents' rights have not been terminated.

In many cases the treatment cannot be provided until the parents' permission is obtained, a time consuming and often impossible process.

The bill, Geake said, provides assurance that emergency treatment can be provided to foster children, but does not intrude on the parents' right to consent or not consent to routine or elective surgery.

When even the most routine services are blocked because the natural parent or agency cannot be contacted for consent, the bill also provides for such routine non-surgical treatment to be administered upon consent of the foster parent or child care agency.

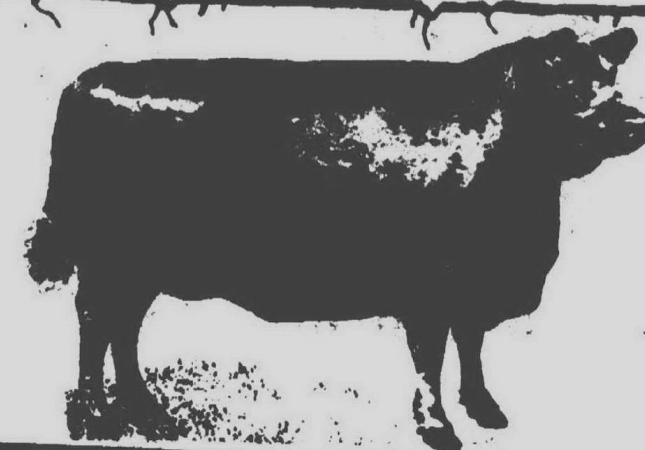
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# Positions on segregation, busing told by congressional hopefuls

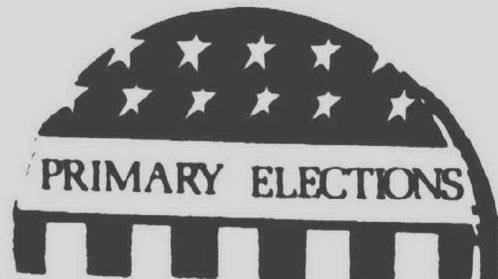
With the U.S. Supreme Court expected to make a decision on cross-district busing by this Fall, segregation will continue to be an issue in congressional races.

Although almost all candidates are opposed to busing to integrate schools, many have differing opinions on what alternate solution is best.

Knowing this issue is on the minds of our readers, the Observer & Eccentric asked candidates in the 2nd Congressional District "Who is to blame for segregation in the suburbs, and what should be done about it?"

The 2nd District includes Livonia and Plymouth, Monroe County, and parts of Washtenaw County. Republican incumbent Marvin Esch is running unopposed in the Aug. 6 primary. Seeking the Democratic nomination are John Reuther, Ronald Egnor, Mrs. Marjorie Lansing, Dr. Edward Pierce and Theo Williams.

EGNOR SAYS no one individual is to blame for defacto segregation in



much of the Detroit metropolitan area.

"It is a demographic phenomenon beyond the single individual. Though racism remains, the basic issue in the 1970s is economics, not color."

"Any ultimate solution will have to involve an upgrading of the lives of all Americans. One thing I do want to go on record as saying is I firmly believe cross-district busing of school children is not a viable solution."

WILLIAMS SUGGESTS that the high cost of housing is probably the main reason for segregation in the suburbs.

"Plainly this condition could be alleviated by subsidized quality housing in the suburbs as well as appropriate vocational training for minorities," Williams adds.

PIERCE STRESSES: "All of us, but especially the realtors, builders and political powers, must bear the responsibility for segregation in our society."

"Segregation is bound up in the entire economic system in this country, in which minorities have had less than an equal chance to attain the eco-

nom status necessary to live in our suburbs.

"Economic elitism must be overcome, and barriers which keep minorities from achieving economic equality must be broken down. At the same time, the federal government must be much more vigilant in enforcing laws which prohibit discriminatory practices in the sale of housing."

REUTHER BELIEVES segregation in the suburbs is the result of long-established living patterns that have existed in the U.S. for more than a century.

"Whether these patterns were reinforced or perpetuated by elected and judicial officials is now under investigation by the U.S. Supreme Court."

"I believe that the only lasting solution must come from the good will of the people and not from cross-district busing."

"Equality of opportunity in housing, jobs and education are goals to which this nation is dedicated. I believe that they are goals in which the people of this nation believe."

ESCH EXPLAINS that the social and economic matters of the last 30 years have developed segregation between the suburban areas and the inner-city areas.

"Certainly forced busing is not the answer," Esch continues. "We should continue to strive for equality of results in education, as well as strong job training and housing programs."

## Ford's birthday picnic is Aug. 3.

Saturday, Aug. 3, friends of Rep. William D. Ford (D-Taylor) will gather for his tenth annual birthday picnic.

The program, which each year draws upwards of 6,000 persons, will be held again this summer at New Liberty Park in Huron Township. The park is on Bredow Road, half a mile south of Sibley Road, between Middle Belt and Inkster Roads.

Mayor John L. Canfield, of Dearborn Heights, who is honorary chairman of the picnic, said that, as in past years, an open invitation is extended to all residents of the 15th District which Ford represents.

"While everything else has gone up in price, we are still keeping our admission price at \$5 per car — no mat-

ter how many people are inside," Mayorr Canfield said.

Once inside, Canfield said everything is free — hot dogs, Polish sausage, corn on the cob, popcorn, soft drinks and other refreshments. There is also music, dancing, games, contests and prizes for all ages.

A popular attraction is an old-fashioned steam engine which is used to provide steam for cooking the corn.

The park officially opens at noon, and the festivities continue until 6 p.m. Many veteran picnic-goers bring their own blankets or folding chairs, because the park's supply of picnic tables is exhausted by early afternoon.

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# Message of the future: This land now closed

To paraphrase Lincoln Steffens: I have seen the future and it's private property. No hunting. No trespassing. No anything.

What prompts this gloomy precognition is a report from the American Wildlife Association, confirmed by personal experience, about the amount of land available for outdoor recreation. Despite purchases by federal, state and local agencies, the amount of land available to outdoors lovers is actually shrinking.

How can this be? Well, publicly owned land isn't the only land available to the public. You see, private property can also be available to the public. The wildlife group, however, reports that in recent years, private landowners are closing off their acreages at a tremendous rate.

ONE CAN GUESS why. For one thing, farmers are tired of theft and vandalism to their fences, crops and livestock; riverfront property owners, notably on the AuSable, are tired of seeing their shorefronts turned into seas of mud and tin cans by fishermen and canoeists.

For another thing, landowners' attitudes are changing for the worse. A farmer friend who says he used to let hunters and off-road vehicle operators across his land without complaint, reports that the lakes he likes to fish on private property are being closed off to him. He blames city people — a new breed of owners who fence off their lake property the way they fence the yards of their city homes.

Remember the political uproar among West Bloomfield Township lakefront property owners a few years ago? The state announced it was considering purchase of public access sites on a number of lakes. Not parks or shooting galleries, mind you, but places where boaters could park their cars and land their watercraft. The landowners' philosophy seems to be: "We've got ours, and we

don't want anyone else near it — especially common taxpayers."

Or take a drive around the proposed Mill Creek Metropark site in western Washtenaw County. This observer's guess is that most of the land desired by the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority will be unavailable without condemnation because place after place is posted: "This land not for sale to HCMA."

THE BRITISH are doing something about it. They've actually reversed the trend — made more private land available for public usage. Here's how:

A hikers group calculated that walkers need very little space, fire no ammunition and need no beach houses or boat landings. It persuaded farmers to make hiking paths available along hedge-rows, fences and woodlots. A hiking path need be only a few feet wide, and after all, the farmer can't plow right up to the fence or hedgerow.

The ecological principle is that a hiker can enjoy the wide open spaces, the flowers and birds without actually using all the space — only the few feet of his hiking path. If hikers do no damage, farmers don't seem to mind letting them use a path.

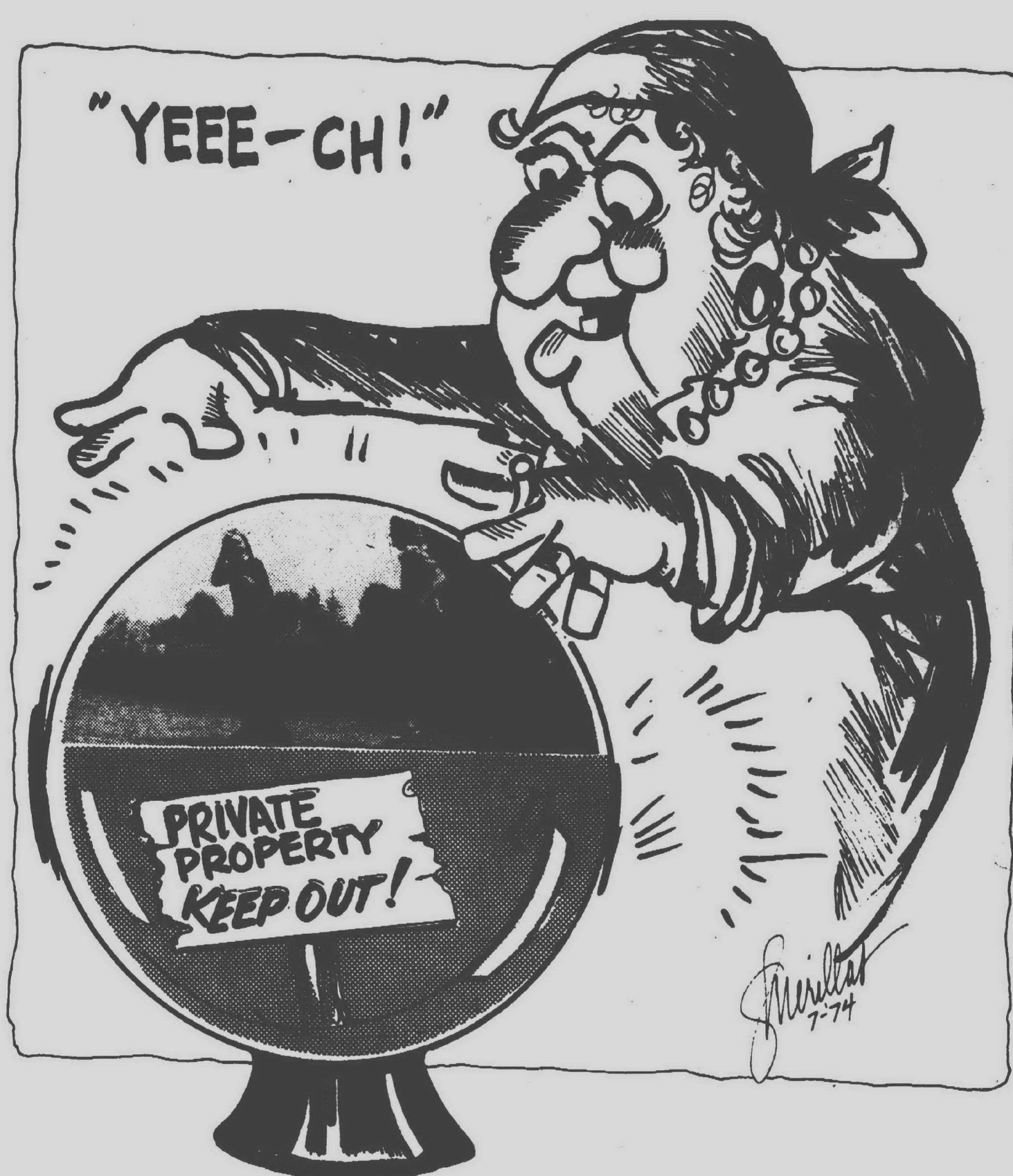
Such a system is workable in our nation and state, at least in theory. In practice, it's unlikely to happen because of our political system.

LET ME EXPLAIN the remark about the political system. Buy a rifle and you'll automatically be given a pamphlet on the National Rifle Association by the manufacturer; or check the leadership of the Recreational Canoeists' group and you'll find livery people and manufacturers financing it.

There's nothing wrong with that, but the point is that there's little money to be made off hikers. Can you imagine a shoe company bankrolling a hiking group?

I have seen the future and it's private property. Posted. Keep off. Violators will be prosecuted. Go inherit some money and buy your own land.

## Top primary issue: Apathy

The state primary election will be held on Tuesday, Aug. 6.

Up to this point, we have been overcome with many lackluster campaigns and the biggest local issue seems to be apathy.

What probably will happen is that the same old 19 per cent of the registered voters will go to the polls and elect our public officials. Then, for the next two to four years, the other 81 per cent, some of whom will get to the polls in November, will complain about the caliber of government. Yet they will be part of the cause of the state of government today.

In the State Legislature of 148 seats, less than two handfuls would be considered swing districts. The rest are either safe Republican or Democratic districts. That means the person nominated by the dominant party in that district in the primaries will almost automatically be elected in November. The same is true from the United States Congress down to our county commissioners.

SO THE GUY who looks around with his chest in the air and says, "I have voted in every November election in the last many years . . .", if he hasn't voted in the primaries he has had very little influence on the course government takes.

One of the unfortunate things about Michigan primaries is that they occur in midsummer when people are taking vacations and are less interested in what is happening in the world.

SINCE THE general election doesn't occur until three months after the primaries, voters are plagued with overlong, drawn-out campaign seasons.

Americans would do well to learn from other nations that the shorter the campaign season, the more people vote on the issues. Even politicians should appreciate the shorter campaign season because it would cut the cost of elections.

We have heard about Watergate, and we have heard that there is a great desire to turn the rascals out, and we have heard that there are many new, young faces that are idealistic enough to want to change the world. But none of these things will come to pass if only the party regulars turn out at the primary.

which is similar (competitive) with that offered by school districts and cities in the immediate surrounding area. This keeps districts competitive to attract the best employees, but isn't necessarily anti-inflationary.

The fault for inflation, of course, lies with the federal government — the administration, Congress, and Federal Reserve System (plus Wilbur Mills).

What must be accepted, though, is that some in-

flation will always be with us. We may slow the pace (to maybe four per cent a year), but will never rid ourselves of inflation entirely without accepting a terrible recession with massive unemployment.

But those who would leave the problem of inflation entirely to the federal government to solve are keeping the spiral from being eased. If we could set a national goal that inflation shouldn't exceed five per cent annually, then union leadership and management could agree on a five per cent wage hike annually. Unions are responsible enough, for the most part, to do this. What is needed is the national goal and clear leadership from the top.

## To be great, our nation needs many new leaders

Rev. Theodore Hesburgh is president of the University of Notre Dame. He is also a decently-instincted, tough-minded, articulate and challenging man.

His column in last week's Newsweek magazine went so much to the heart of our current problems of national leadership that I'd like to share some of it with you.

"We keep looking for a single leader on a white horse," Father Hesburgh writes. "It took more than a single leader to get America born. After the series of shocks we have undergone lately, it will take more than one man on horseback to get us back together as a nation that has to rekindle its pristine idealism, restore confidence and face its destiny with hope and renewed energy."

"My thesis is that what will be needed is a congeries of leaders, the very best possible from whatever source, to get America back on track."

"It is not that America lacks leaders — rather that most of them are avoiding Washington like the plague, and politics as well. Might not the next president — before he is elected and in order to be elected — let us know the kind of people he desires and can indeed enlist to share the momentous task that will await him on election?"

### HE'S SO RIGHT.

In times of trouble, people instinctively turn to the over-simplified, seemingly final solution. A single leader — to cleanse and inspire us — is such a simplistic answer to our problem.

But no one man runs America, or can. In part this is because America runs itself through its strong and ancient tradition of vigorous and competent state and local government. In part, it's because no one man can possibly know everything and make all decisions by himself. He needs a team around him, just as a quarterback needs a good defensive line or the president of a business needs a good organization.

The greatest damage that the tragedy of Richard Nixon's presidency has done to the country is to have driven away from public service the best and the brightest of our land. My sources in Washington tell me that there are more than 250 top level posts in the present administration standing unfilled, not because a decision is needed on whom to appoint but rather because people of stature and integrity willing to associate themselves with President Nixon cannot be found.

(This charge will not be in the bill of impeachment that the House of Representatives will soon

debate, but it is the real source for my own belief that the president should be impeached and convicted.)

FATHER HESBURGH set forth some criteria for the people he feels ought to be ready and willing to serve with our next president. They must be persons of unquestioned integrity and intelligence, imbued with the humanity that made this nation great, and not for the most part driven by overweening political ambition.

So, too, must be our next president, in order to attract such men and women. And our next president must also be free of the sordid preoccupation with the seizure of political power and paranoid terror of legitimate criticism that have so characterized the Nixon Administration.

There is a vast reservoir of talented, decent, honorable Americans, more willing than ever to serve in the great cause of public service. The next president will be the person who can tap that reservoir.

However, the voting machine levers were hardly cold before the losers, refusing to abide by the "groaners" decision, arranged another election, using the "groaners" tax dollars.

Thompson naively states "apathy is an excellent description for the way the voters performed on last election day. They just don't seem to care one bit about what's happening."

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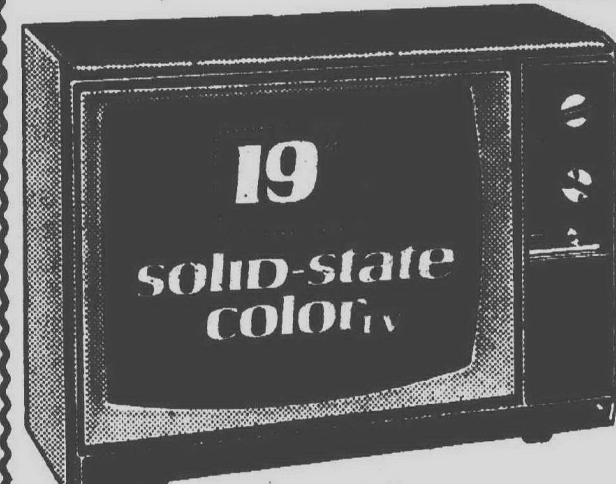

## Roof repair shysters are working in area

The Better Business Bureau of Metropolitan Detroit has issued a Public Alert warning all homeowners, especially the elderly, to be extremely cautious about paying out funds to itinerant driving panel trucks who pose to be home improvement repairmen.

An elderly woman has just reported to the bureau that two men made off with \$550 of her life savings after convincing her her roof was seriously in need of repair and they could do the work at a reasonable cost.

She agreed to the proposition. She was tricked into believing the pair

had done similar work in the area. She fell for a smooth pitch from two fast-talking veterans.

Within 30 minutes the work was completed. The pair demanded \$550 in payment.

They claimed to have used 50 gallons of asphalt on the roof in the repair job. They threatened to raise the price and charge for labor if she didn't pay now.

The \$550 in cash, hidden in the house, was handed over to the two.

The itinerants left in their white panel truck after promising to return to complete some work on the eavestrough and bring back a 20-year guarantee on the work.

The homeowner did not realize she had been victimized until two different repairmen came to her home advising her about repairs she needed completed on the eavestrough at a cost of \$160.

This is not the first case, but is a perennial problem. There is little help available for the elderly victim.

She received no receipt for her money. No contract or agreement was signed. The itinerant did not give her name or the name of the company, an address or phone number. Cash was paid. Only memories of two men in a white panel truck remain.

Bureau investigation has found that a new roof could have been installed by a responsible home improvement contractor for \$550.

An authority in the home improvement field states that asphalt coating should never be applied over shingles. The coating may crack and permit moisture from rain or snow to seep into the home causing excessive interior damage.

Examination showed the work was done carelessly and less than 10 gallons of coating was applied.

Thousands of dollars are lost yearly to fly-by-nighters, who operate out of unmarked cars and trucks, without business cards or contracts, often in direct violation of the law and without proper licenses.

Conducted by a real estate faculty experienced in license training, the license reviews will be a comprehensive review of preliminary study covering legal factors, finance, appraising, background of real estate license law and additional pertinent topics.

The license reviews run from 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m., Sunday, Aug. 4, for salespeople, and Monday, Aug. 5 for brokers. Enrollees must have previously taken an approved basic real estate course.

While tuition is payable at the door the day of the review, advance registration is requested. The fee is \$30.

Oakland University doesn't guarantee enrollees will pass the state examinations and plays no part in preparation the exams. However, any enrollee who fails may repeat the review in September at no charge.

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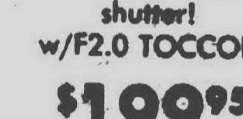
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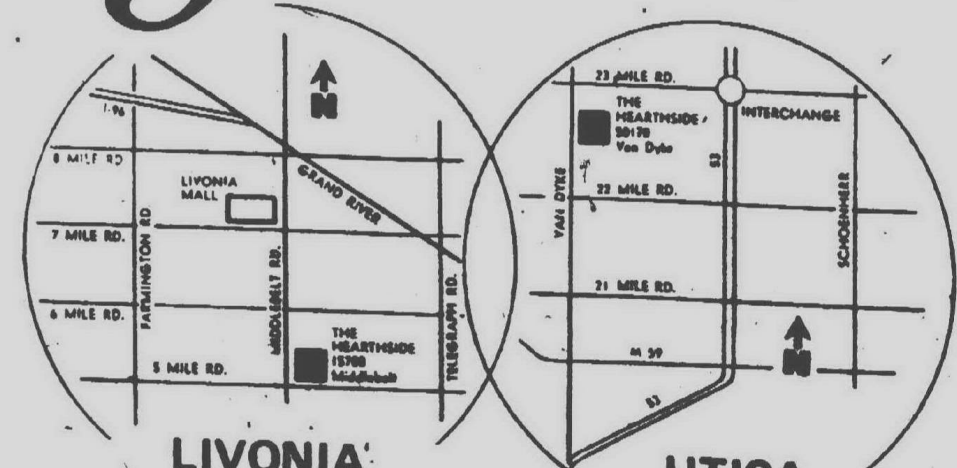
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## Day camp brings fun for inner-city children, Plymouth area families

The tiny boy looked wide-eyed and a mite apprehensive. He'd come by big yellow bus from the city, and now, in the parking lot of a church in Plymouth, a lady was urging him to go swimming at her home.

Her two children wanted him to come, too. He wasn't quite sure about the whole thing. Finally he grabbed the hand of an

older friend who had made the bus trip with him and they climbed into the bright orange compact car.

He had a good time in that swimming pool. Sister Hilda Manson of the Episcopal Church of the Messiah on lower east side Detroit, had been sure he would.

"They're always beaming when they come back after a day in the homes of the people here," she said. SISTER HILDA was talking about

the program, now in its fifth summer, that brings a group of more than 80 inner-city youngsters from her parish to Plymouth for day camp activities.

The original contact with the Detroit church was made by the Rev. Robert Shank of Plymouth's St. John Episcopal Church, 574 S. Sheldon.

St. John has served as the center for the activities, which have run two days a week for four weeks each summer, and families from a large assortment of churches participate.

THIS YEAR, as in previous summers, camp for the children will involve projects at St. John and the Youth, Inc., center on Wednesdays and visits to homes in the area on Thursdays.

The home visits are highlights for many of the young visitors as well as the families here.

SISTER HILDA, directing the program this year, said she realizes there has been criticism of this type of program in some circles.

"But if you're going to do anything worthwhile, you have to take criticism," she said.

"The kids love to come—they look forward to seeing their friends. And they've learned a lot. Other years we've helped with a garden out here. This summer we're not doing that. We've started our own garden right near our church in the city."

Sister Hilda, a church army sister, works in her parish directing youth activities and counseling families. She also helps run a day care center for the small children of working mothers, and helps operate a year-round day camp on Saturdays.

Some of the children who come to Plymouth, she said, have been part of the group for several summers. Others are here for the first time this year.

THAT'S TRUE, TOO, of the families inviting home visitors.

Mary Eggenberger, Betty Webber and Helen White are among the veterans in the day camp program.

"We've been doing it for four years," Mrs. Eggenberger said, "and it's been fun each year."

"We go to the farm and to the nature center and to the shopping center toy department. Then before we come back to the bus in the afternoon, we nearly always stop at the ice cream parlor."

She said she considered Mrs. Webber, who has had cookie-baking sessions, rather courageous, but Mrs. Webber said they always have gone well and everyone has fun.

MRS. WHITE'S YOUNGSTERS, Amy and Bill, cleaned out their toy chests before the first day of visiting this year so there would be plenty to play with.

"One little girl last year just fell in love with our small two-wheeler," she said. "She rode up and down the street all day. It was really too big for Bill, so we got it onto the bus when she went home."

Mrs. Joan Farrell, joining the fun for the first time this year, commented that on her street there would be five houses in a row with children visiting.

"Maybe it will seem like home to them," she said.

MRS. BARBARA CHURCH said she read about the day camp in this newspaper and thought participation would be a great project for her and sons Robbie and Jamie.

"It's a great opportunity—good for our children," she said.

"There's no question that we are segregated racially out here," and I want them to grow up knowing children are the same whatever their race."

"I was interested in getting to know these children on an individual basis rather than working with them in a big group," said Mrs. Nancy Kauffman, Plymouth mother of three.

That's why, after reading about the St. John Church day camp program four years ago, she initiated the home visit portion that has become such a part of it.

"I called Sister Hilda Manson to see if we couldn't work out some opportunities for closer and more personal relationships," she said.

AND, FOR NANCY KAUFFMAN at least, the move was extremely rewarding.

For four summers she had summer visits from small Nikki Russell, three when she first came out to Plymouth and seven now.

"Her mother was involved as a counselor," Mrs. Kauffman said, "and I became acquainted with her

too. She's now working and a social work student at Wayne State University."

The friendship developed in the summer held over through the year. Mrs. Kauffman said.

"I've received valentines and pictures from school and Mother's Day cards from Nikki, and I've sent her little packages and had her come out to visit and attended her church's Christmas program," she added.

THIS SUMMER, because of her mother's job, Nikki wasn't able to be with the group for the first two weeks of home visits, but both she and her Plymouth "mother" are determined to work in a stay before the day camp ends the first week in August.

"IT WASN'T THE SAME without her," Mrs. Kauffman said, but she still had home visitors. Sheila Bell, who also has visited in the Kauffman

home several times, was on hand, and she brought along a friend, Sherie Johnson.

Their first day they had time for a swim, and then they stopped at the Observer & Eccentric office to learn a bit about the workings of a newspaper and have their picture taken.

NANCY KAUFFMAN, like Sister Hilda Manson of the Church of the Messiah, knows that there are those who feel programs of this sort may do harm in creating desires where there are no means.

"But equal opportunity is on the increase, so such dreams are not impossible now," she said. "And just getting these children out to grass and parks and yards instead of the city streets makes a pleasant change for them."

## m.m.memos

With my home community marking its sesquicentennial in grand celebration, I have to make note of the small bit of Farmington history right where our family lives.

We succumbed to the charms and quality and setting of our old home 15 years ago and, though some of our relatives thought we had taken leave of our senses, bought it just in time for our first-born to start kindergarten in the community we had picked.

Our house indeed had character, but we didn't think of it as having any historical interest—there are many older houses in our neighborhood. We discovered, however, that we'd bought a landmark known to many older residents of Farmington by the name of the family that lived there many years.

THEN AN ELDERLY NEIGHBOR told us one day that our property was the site of the original Methodist church—one of the very first in the area. We looked again at part of our basement and decided it was different from the rest of the foundation and must have been part of that church.

The same neighbor told us about a large elm in

the front yard—one of the many tall trees that helped sell the location to us.

She said she remembered its planting and, though she couldn't place the exact date, she connected it with the church's destruction by fire. That, the records show, was 1920.

We knew the home had been built a few years after the fire by the architect who designed the replacement church down the street.

BUT IT WAS FAIRLY recently that a friend in Farmington's historical society unearthed an old clipping that told about the planting of that tree—in May of 1924 to honor the memory of the old church and Arbor Day and the 100th anniversary of the founding of Farmington.

The tree is gone now—victim of Dutch Elm disease. But we kept a bit of its stump and surrounded it with a garden that we thought made a kind of memorial too.

And blooming there, as our town celebrates its sesquicentennial summer, are zinnias and chrysanthemums and with them a couple of lilies—purchased originally for the Easter altar of the "new" church.

# Drama director finds happiness at C'ville

Theater didn't seem like a bad way to make a living to Bob Gregory of Livonia, but he decided to keep his feet on the ground and pursue a career in educational theater rather than professional theater.

Gregory is presently drama director at Clarenceville High School, a position he has held for the past seven years. For the fourth year and second consecutive year, Gregory has conducted a summer theater session for students at Clarenceville High School.

The program is open to all area students, although most are from Clarenceville. The sessions last for six weeks at a cost of \$25 per student. The students also get one-half credit.

The theater program gets no money from the school district. It is entirely supported by the Theater Parents Organization (TPO) and the Michigan Council for the Arts.

The TPO, which is made up of parents of students who attend the summer theater sessions, do such things as handling concession stands for various concerts and functions at the high school and donate the money they make to the theater program. The MCA gave the program a \$375 grant for this summer.

Gregory estimates it takes \$1,000 to run the program for six weeks. This includes his salary of \$240.

The program, which is patterned after the Cranbrook theater program, includes workshops and the production of one major play. Gregory directs the play and the students do everything else.

This year the students will also participate in the Farmington Founders Festival, doing various skits on the mobile stage July 22, 23 and 25.

Gregory believes high school is the best place to begin in theater, although he got his first start in that direction at the age of 12. He appeared on his brother's TV show.

"That did it," Gregory says. "That's when I decided theater was for me."

Gregory had intended to go into professional theater, but decided during his junior year at Eastern Michigan University that educational theater would be better for him.

During his years at EMU, he acted in and directed many plays including "Damn Yankees," "Plaza Suite" and "Guys and Dolls." He also spent summers acting and directing at the Dearborn Summer Theater.

Gregory says he has had offers to act professionally since college, but prefers for the moment to stay where his is.

"I stage manage all of the functions in Schmidt Auditorium and I work on a professional level there with such

guys as Don Ellis, Woody Herman, Maynard Ferguson, Count Basie, Stan Kenton and Buddy Rich."

Gregory also is active in the Farmington Players and has acted in plays for the Theater Guild of Livonia-Redford and Wayne-Westland Civic Theater.

He says he prefers to act in comedies, prefers to direct musicals, but has acted and directed in all types of theater.

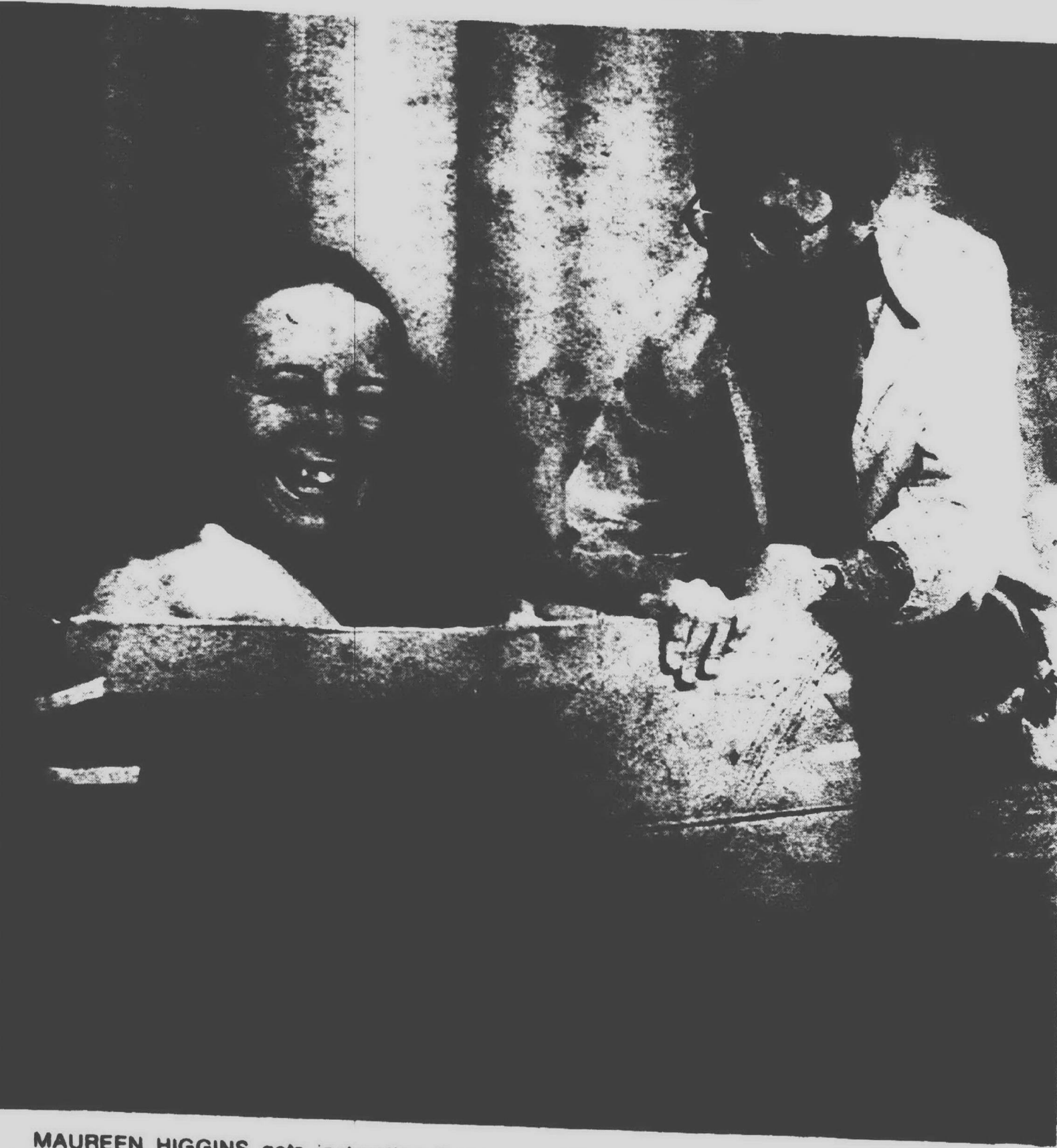
"I have more success in directing, I seem to get more satisfaction out of it. But I don't believe you can be a good director without keeping up in acting. It's like an athlete—you can't do a good job unless you keep in shape."

Although Gregory has a pretty busy schedule acting, directing, and teaching, he managed to find time to get married last Valentine Day.

His wife, Kari, is also involved in theater as a prompter for the Farmington Players. She also had a role in the Players production of "Plaza Suite," which is when Gregory met her.

### Degree tops varied honors

An honorary college degree has to top a lot of good things that have been happening recently for new Livonian Wynne Garlow.

It was awarded, complete with academic hood, by Cleary College in Ypsilanti, and about the same time Wynne also became vice-chairman of the Cleary board of trustees.

Recently this energetic public relations director of the Wonderland shopping center also was named chairman of the Livonia Arts Commission and a member of the Livonia mayor's committee for Friends of the Barn, Inc.

"SO MANY NICE THINGS have come my way I can hardly believe it," she said. "But I was floored and absolutely delighted with the honorary degree."

"We're taking a new look at the curriculum with a view to updating our business courses and maybe later adding more liberal arts studies and possibly doing something about campus housing."

She said Cleary presently has about 600 students and "we could handle twice that number with a minimum addition to the faculty, so we hope to get the new program under way by fall."

WYNNE'S HONORARY degree was a doctor of science in business administration and it cited her "public and professional achievements and contributions to American business and the free enterprise system and the services she has rendered to benefit her community, state and nation."

She is the first woman to receive an honorary degree from Cleary and it's her first degree of any kind. She attended Butler University in Indianapolis for a time and later was a student at the Detroit Society of Arts & Crafts, and the Concentrated Management Institute of California State Polytechnic University.

BEFORE COMING to Livonia and Wonderland, Miss Garlow had several advertising and public relations jobs, numbering E.W. Baker, Inc., of Birmingham, and Motor News and the Automobile Club of Detroit among her employers.

She recently has moved to Livonia and finds her first taste of suburban living completely enjoyable.

"I really love it here," she said. "It's peaceful and friendly and I've found Livonia a very well-run community. And with all my activities, I find I've made many new friends."

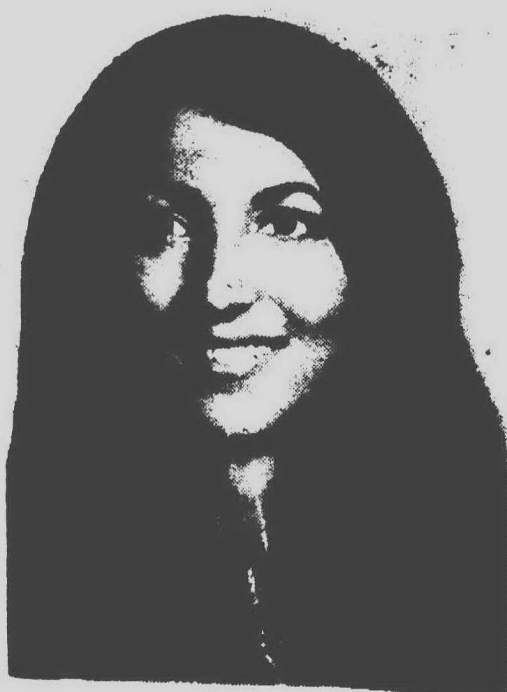

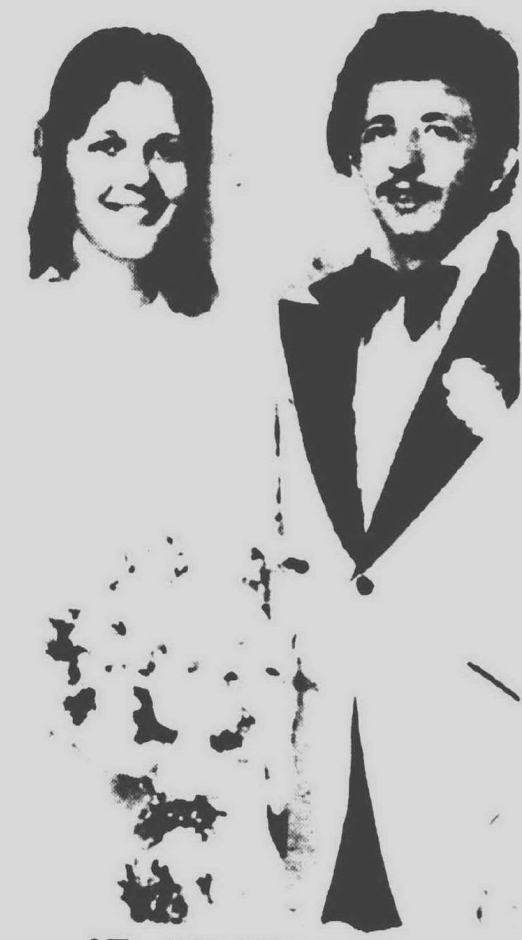

# Priority system being worked out for adoption studies

A priority system for completion of adoption family studies is being developed by the Michigan Department of Social Services, and should be in the hands of DSS adoption workers within the next several months.

The system is directed at giving priority to Michigan children in need of adoptive homes, an issue which has become a matter of concern in view of increasing numbers of waiting Michigan children in relation to demands for interstate and foreign adoption service.

The proposal calls for completion of studies in the following order:

• First, a family applying for a waiting child (by name or a child in general) in Michigan, or a related child from outside Michigan.

• Second, a family applying for a child from elsewhere in the United States.

• Third, a family applying for a child from a foreign country.

• Finally, a family applying for a baby or non-handicapped pre-school age child.

THIS PRIORITY SYSTEM represents one move toward resolving a problem facing the Social Services adoption staff. Since few infants and non-handicapped children below school age are available for adoption in Michigan, more families are asking for help in adopting children from other countries.

They frequently turn to DSS to provide this service because the Department does not charge a fee.

This has presented Social Services, as a public adoption agency, with a dilemma — increasing numbers of children being adopted from foreign countries while homes are still needed for Michigan children who are over 12 years old, handicapped or from a minority racial group.

In addition to the priority system, guidelines are also in the works that would designate an adoption within a

child's own racial and ethnic group as the "first placement of choice."

According to Emmett K. "Bud" Turner, DSS adoption services program manager, such a policy has been discussed for some time and reflects the direction taken by the Child Welfare League of America and other groups.

A THIRD TOPIC under discussion is the need for effective, relevant followup services, a subject which Turner describes as "the most crucial area in our adoption service right now."

One specific step toward strengthening followup services may involve ceilings on the caseloads of certain specialized adoption workers, almost on a special project basis. Such a plan may actually be implemented during the 1974-75 fiscal year.

"The need has become overwhelmingly evident," Turner says. "We see some of the special adoption workers and they really look whipped — the demands are tremendous."

"After a while, a worker doesn't take the 'minor crises' as seriously — crises that may be very important to the families involved. In the interests of protecting and assisting families we have helped to create, we just cannot allow this to happen."

ON THE LEGISLATIVE scene, House Bill 4466 calls for revisions of the existing adoption law. Several changes that had previously been introduced as separate pieces of legislation are included in the bill, which would:

- Permit adoption of adults by former foster parents or relatives.
- Clarify putative father legislation.
- Eliminate non-relative independent adoption placements.
- Change adoption subsidies from \$600 to an amount equal to the foster

care payment Social Services would make for the same child.

Social Services is also proposing that parental rights in adoption cases always be terminated by court order, even if the parents have voluntarily released the child for adoption.

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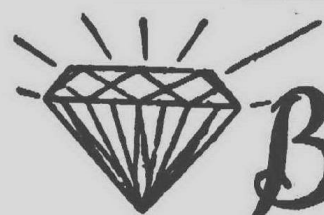


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## Foundation offers pamphlets

Children should never be scolded or punished for bed-wetting, advises a new pamphlet offered by the Kidney Foundation of Michigan, a United Way agency.

The new pamphlet and one on "Urinary Tract Infections" are offered in connection with the March observance of "Kidney Month."

"We do not punish children for not beginning to talk at a designated time, so why punish them for a delay in proper toileting?" asked Frank Wesley, PhD., in the pamphlet.

AUTHOR of the Good House-keeping article reprinted in the pamphlet, "If a Child Is a Bed Wet-

ter," Wesley is professor of psychology at Portland State University in Oregon.

He recommended that parents take a child who has a bed-wetting problem after age three to a physician for analysis and treatment.

The second pamphlet, "Urinary Tract Infections," explains that nearly all can be controlled with proper medical treatment. If untreated they can lead to irreparable damage and possible kidney failure.

## Moral perspectives

# New world view needed by humanity now

Monduras charged the United States with stealing its rain and causing drought last year. Denying the charge, made in connection with efforts to modify hurricanes, didn't diminish this as dramatic evidence that we live in one world.

There are no secure barriers at the edge of any country or even any person. We influence others and their response has an impact on us: the human family is a family and we live with our relatives.

The United States consumes one third more calories per capita per day than India. We eat three times as much animal protein as people in most nations and up to eight times as much as those in several nations. Yet, 100 calories fed to an animal produces only five calories on our table.

SOME 400 MILLION children are severely malnourished. In our country,

12 million children are not getting health care. In Detroit, 70,000 children and pregnant women are malnourished.

In 1949, we used 11 per cent of our federal budget to aid poor nations and last year only 1.5 per cent. Brain and

psychological damage to the young now means in 20 years a citizenry with little promise of living in peace.

The energy crisis shocked us into seeing ourselves as a have-not nation dependent on others. Some claim we could be using solar power widely as quickly as two years from the time we fund efforts to develop the technology. But we first have to learn to think in new ways so we can start.

SELF-SUFFICIENCY IS a mockery in an interdependent world. Calories for food or fuel or health are matters of broad policy. We need decisions by statesmen.

Private citizens are also involved. Voluntary organizations such as the Red Cross or local aid programs suffer from inadequate contributions. We need a new view.

We have thought of being self-sufficient and viewed our nation as the home of rugged individualists. But there is no self-sufficient community and no autonomous individual.

WHEN WE THINK of mutual responsibility we become persons in community. A person is a self in relations. When we realize the fact that humanity is one family we will work for a world where nobody will steal another's rain or food or health or peace because these are common property.

## Institute wins approval

The Merrill - Palmer Institute of Detroit can now award its own degrees.

The State Board of Education recently authorized Merrill - Palmer to award a master's degree in human relations to graduate students who successfully complete its program.

State Supt. of Public Instruction John W. Porter told the state board that members of his staff who reviewed Merrill - Palmer's application were "deeply impressed by the school's long standing record of excellence and its outstanding history and tradition."

He added, "After spending many hours with Merrill - Palmer's staff and members of its board of trustees, our staff said it was apparent there is no need for the establishment of a committee of scholars to review the school and its program. I concur in that recommendation."

Normally a committee of scholars is named by the state board to visit schools requesting approval of major new degree programs.

For 53 years the institute has helped students obtain degrees at other colleges and universities. ## ARROZ CON POLLO

(Makes 8 servings)

Two 2½-pound frying chickens (cut up)

1 quart water  
Salt and pepper  
¼ cup oil  
¾ cup (1 small) red or green sweet pepper strips

1 cup chopped onion  
2 crushed cloves garlic  
2 cups raw rice  
1 tablespoon seasoned salt  
½ teaspoon pepper  
½ teaspoon paprika  
½ teaspoon cumin  
1 crushed bay leaf  
¾ cups (28-ounce can) Contadina round peeled tomatoes

10-ounce package partially thawed frozen peas

PLACE CHICKEN necks, backs and giblets in saucepan. Add water. Bring to boil; simmer 20 minutes. Sprinkle the remaining chicken pieces generously with salt and pepper.

Brown a few pieces at a time in medium hot oil in 5-quart Dutch oven. Remove pieces as they brown.

Drain off all but 2 tablespoons oil from pan. Sauté red or green pepper, onion and garlic. Stir in rice, seasoned salt, pepper, paprika, cumin, bay leaf, tomatoes and liquid. Break up tomatoes.

Remove necks from broth; pour broth and boiled chicken into rice mixture. Top with browned chicken. Bring to boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 25 and 30 minutes. Remove cover; sprinkle peas over chicken.

Cover and cook 5 to 10 minutes longer or until rice and chicken are done and liquid is absorbed. Mixture should not be dry. Add more water as necessary to cook rice.

# HEW grant given for EMU program

The nurse training program at Eastern Michigan University has been awarded a \$262,927 grant from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

To begin in July, the grant will provide funds over a three-year period to increase the faculty, buy library and audio-visual materials and provide funds for consultant services.

There are presently 39 students and four faculty members in the nursing program which began last fall. Sixty more students are expected to enter this fall.

Gudrun Burtz, director and professor of nursing, is project director for the grant.

Three other HEW grants and one from the Exxon Education Foundation were also accepted by the EMU board of regents along with the nursing award.

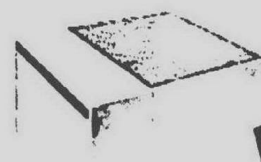
The other HEW grants will be used in student aid programs, the national

direct student loan program will receive \$486,116 and the college work-study program will receive \$491,286. The educational opportunity grants will get \$366,581.

All three awards are for the July 1, 1974 to June 30, 1975 period.

Bruce L. Warren of the sociology faculty is the project director of the \$6,000 Exxon grant. The money will be used to assist students in developing research skills for the study of population.

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# Pears: how to freeze or can them

## Home & Garden

It is pear canning and freezing time in Michigan and here are some practical tips on how to handle this fruit. Use pears while still firm but not hard. Pears ripen from the inside outward, so don't keep pears until they've softened on the outside—by then they may be too soft and tasteless.

When picked green and ripened off the tree, pears have a smooth texture. Tree-ripened pears are often coarse and gritty.

Don't be misled by scars, minor surface blemishes or coarsening of the skin—that's nature's way of protecting the delicate pear from too cold weather. Russetting, too, is a pear characteristic—it's a brown overcast on the skin and doesn't affect the flavor.

Avoid pears that look wilted or shriveled; they were picked at such an immature stage that they'll never ripen properly.

Handle pears gently and, if necessary, ripen them at room temperature in a paper or plastic bag with damp sponge or cloth to supply humidity. There are many pear varieties.

**BARTLETT:** Most widely used. White flesh; sweet; large; bell-shaped; smooth yellow skin; juicy. Use for fresh-eating, canning, drying.

**KIEFFER:** Oval; pointed at both ends; greenish yellow with red blush and large russet dots; flesh is gritty, juicy, tender. Poor for fresh-eating, fair for cooking, good for pickling.

**BOSC:** Pronounced "bosk." Large with tapering neck; dark yellow with

russetting; slightly acid flavor. For fresh-eating and cooking.

**Comice:** Pronounced "comeese." Large, roundish with uneven sides; greenish yellow with some red; fine texture. Tends to bruise easily when ripe. For fresh-eating only.

**Anjou:** Pronounced "anjo." Large chunky thick shape with short stem; greenish yellow, often russeted; fine texture; winelike, rich spicy flavor. For fresh, cooking, canning.

**Clapp Favorite:** Looks like Bartlett but somewhat smoother; frequently has clubbed stem. Ripens rapidly; flesh softens quickly. For fresh-eating and canning.

**SECKEL:** Small; symmetrical bell-shaped; dull brownish-yellow overlaid with russet and blushed dull red; somewhat grainy; juicy. For fresh-eating and pickling.

**Flemish Beauty:** Medium large; roundish; thick-necked; yellow with red blush. For fresh-eating and canning.

For best frozen pears pick pears that are well ripened and firm but not hard or gritty. Wash in cold water, remove peel, cut in halves or quarters as you prefer, and cut out the cores.

Heat pears in boiling 40 per cent sugar syrup (three cups of sugar for every four cups of water) for one to two minutes, depending on size of pieces. Drain and cool.

Pack cooled pears into containers and cover with cold 40 percent syrup. Add ¼ tsp. crystalline ascorbic acid to each quart of syrup for better results.

For frozen pureed pears, choose well ripened fruit, firm but not hard or gritty. Peel or not, as you like. Puree by pressing through a sieve. This is easier if you first heat the cored fruit for four minutes in just enough water to prevent scorching.

Mix one cup of sugar with each quart of fruit and add ¼ tsp. crystalline ascorbic acid. Pack into containers, leaving head space as above. Seal and freeze.

Pears for home canning should be washed, peeled, cut in halves or quarters and cored, then packed by either hot pack or raw pack method.

Pack raw pears into jars to ½ inch of the top. Cover with boiling syrup—thin, medium or heavy, depending on preference—leaving ½ inch head space at the top. Adjust jar lids and process jars in a boiling water bath, pints for 25 minutes and quarts for 30 minutes.

Complete the seals if necessary as soon as you remove the jars from the canner.

Hot pack canning pears should be peeled and cored and heated in hot syrup. Pack hot fruit into jars to ½ inch of top. Adjust jar lids and process in a boiling water bath, pints for 20 minutes, quarts for 25 minutes. Complete the seals as soon as you remove the jars from the canner.

Use the following recipe for pickling Seckel pears:

Sugar.....2 qts.  
Vinegar, white.....1 qt.  
Water.....1 pint  
Stick cinnamon.....8, 2" pieces  
Cloves, whole.....2 Tbs.  
Allspice, whole.....2 Tbs.  
Seckel pears.....8 lbs.  
(4 or 5 qts.)  
Yield: 7-8 pints

Combine sugar, vinegar, water and stick cinnamon. Add cloves and allspice tied in a clean, thin, white cloth. Bring the mixture to a boil and simmer, covered about 30 minutes.

Wash pears, remove skins and all the blossom end. Leave the stems on or remove them, as you like.

To prevent pears from darkening during preparation, put them into cold water containing two tablespoons each of salt and vinegar per gallon. Drain just before using.

Add pears to the boiling syrup and continue simmering for 20 to 25 minutes. Pack hot pears into clean, hot pint jars, adding one piece of cinnamon to each jar. Cover with boiling syrup to ½ inch of top.

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Adjust lids and process in a boiling water bath for 20 minutes. (Remember to start counting processing time as soon as the water in the canner returns to boiling.) Remove jars and complete the seals if necessary.

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## Pest Of The WEEK



### Invading moths harmless

Tremendous numbers of the spruce bud worm moth invaded southern Michigan last week, brought into this area from Canada by the severe storms of Sunday, July 14.

Pest experts from Michigan State University said that the adult moths will not cause any damage and should disappear within a few days. The moth is rather nondescript - about one-half inch long, gray, with irregular markings.

Damage from the moths will occur next year, however, when the larvae emerge to feed on trees; they will do the most damage in large stands of spruce trees.

For control apply either Diazinon, Malathion, Sevin, or Lindane. For homeowners bothered by the moths around doors and windows, spray with any recommended aerosol.

## Outdoor lighting: beautiful, functional

Outdoor lighting can have the same kind of effect on your outdoor living area that proper illumination can achieve inside, says Joe Cox, extension landscape architect at Michigan State University.

"Outdoor lighting doesn't have to be elaborate or expensive in terms of money or energy," Cox says. "Sometimes a single bulb in just the right place can transform your grounds by night. When not needed, a simple flip of the switch will save electrical energy needed elsewhere."

**LIGHTING CAN** make an area more beautiful as well as more functional, Cox notes. Outdoor lighting can make an area safer and more usable for entertaining and family fun.

"If the aim of lighting your grounds is to discourage prowlers, be sure to

place light switches in bedrooms and other convenient places so you can turn them on quickly," the specialist advises. "They won't do you much good when you need them if you have to trot out to the garage to turn them on."

Lighting that's intended to serve a functional purpose can also be decorative. For instance, you can place lights to accent the more interesting spots in your yard or garden, and you can hide the less attractive areas by leaving them dark.

**SIDE OR BACK** lighting is generally more dramatic than front lighting. Cox notes. "Create patterns with lights, reflections and shadows and make use of varying brightness to add interest."

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# The Green Thumb

Ever wonder why a big husky tomato plant will sometimes set only a few tomatoes?

The answer is temperatures, especially at night. When night temperature remains above 75 degrees or drops below 55 to 60 degrees F you get a poor set on your tomato vines.

For some reason, tomato flowers exposed to one or two nights of temperatures below 59 degrees will not be fertilized properly. About a week after the flowers have been opened, the old blossom drops off, leaving a stub with no tomato.

SOME VARIETIES (such as Fire-

ball, New Yorker and Springset VF, plus a few other early ones) seem to set at lower night temperatures and that's one reason why there are fairly consistent early types.

Peppers and eggplants have similar requirements for fruit set. There are other factors involved which might effect poor pepper set. Hot drying

winds during pollinating time is one of them. Some peppers still will set fruit in spite of temperatures and drying winds. Penn Wonder and Vinedale are two peppers which set fruit consistently, regardless of temperatures.

HOW ABOUT "too rich" soil or "too much nitrogen" you often hear about? Will these prevent fruit set on peppers, tomatoes and eggplants? Excess nitrogen will cause extra growth, but seldom does it cause blossom drop when night temperatures are just right. If tomato plants are in a rich soil and fruit set is poor, the plants grow fast and luxuriantly. A good set of fruit can slow down this rank growth, regardless of the amount of nitrogen there is in the soil.

ONE BIG PROBLEM with birches is the borer, a tiny pest which causes the top branches to start to die back.

Adults lay eggs on the twigs or under the bark during late spring and early summer. The eggs hatch out into tiny grubs or larvae which bore into the tree and girdle it, cutting off the flow of food and water from the roots.

This causes yellowing of the leaves at tips of affected branches, premature leaf drop and eventual death of affected branch.

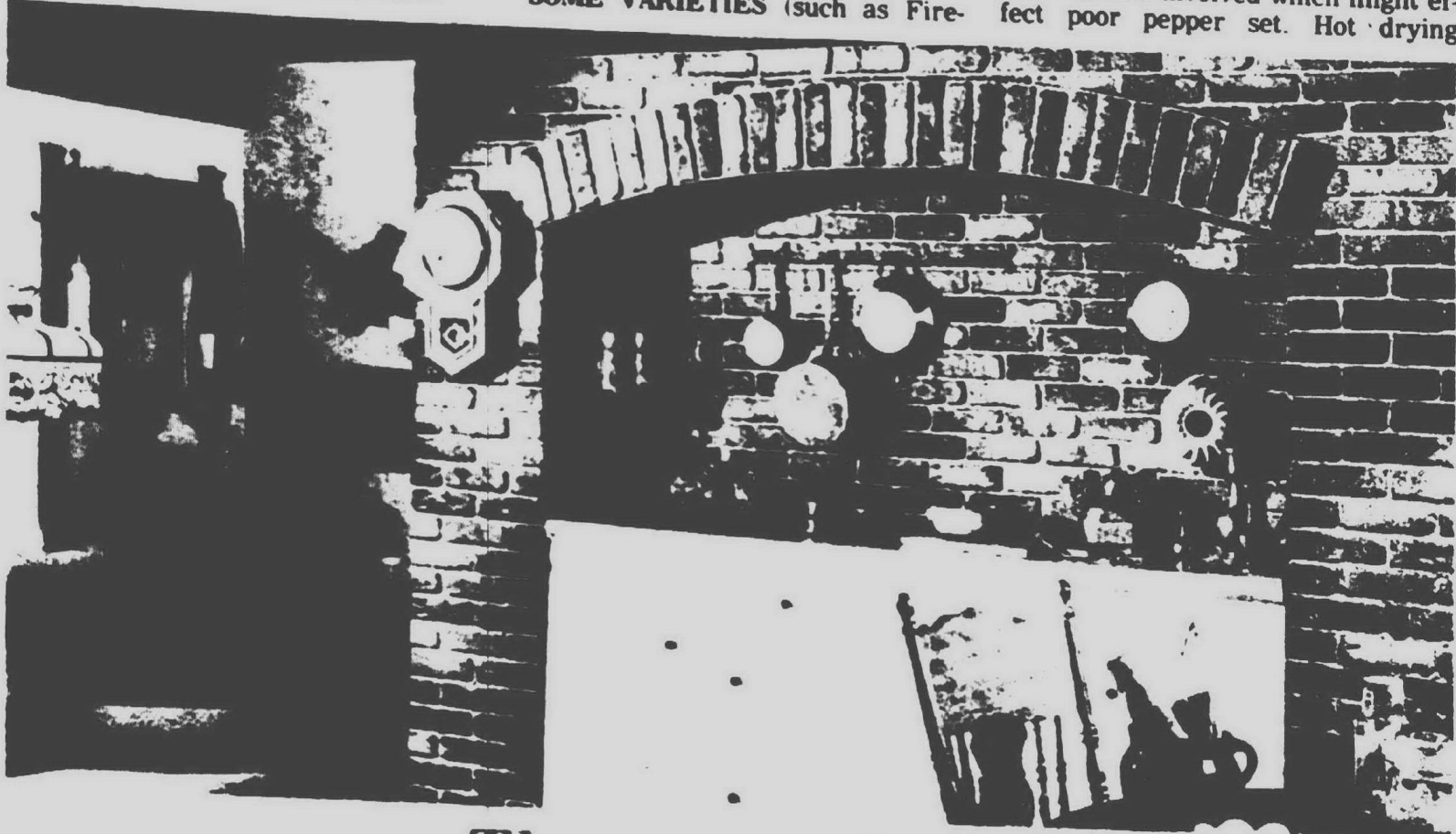
NOTE: The leaf twig dieback always begins in the uppermost parts of the tree and works its way downward in successive years.

Take a look at your birch limbs now and see if you can find a water-soaked stain. If present, take a penknife and probe the brownish stain and you'll see a small white grub (about 1/4 inch or so in length). This is the villain which kills the handsome birch.

CONTROL: It's not easy, but here are some tips for preventing birch borer infestation:

1) Keep tree well-watered and fed. Solutions of lindane or dieldrin should be sprayed around the first of June and again around the 10th of June—times when the adult insect is active. Spraying will not control insects already inside the tree, but it will prevent reinfestation. Systemics, applied into the tree, or in the soil, will not kill the borers.

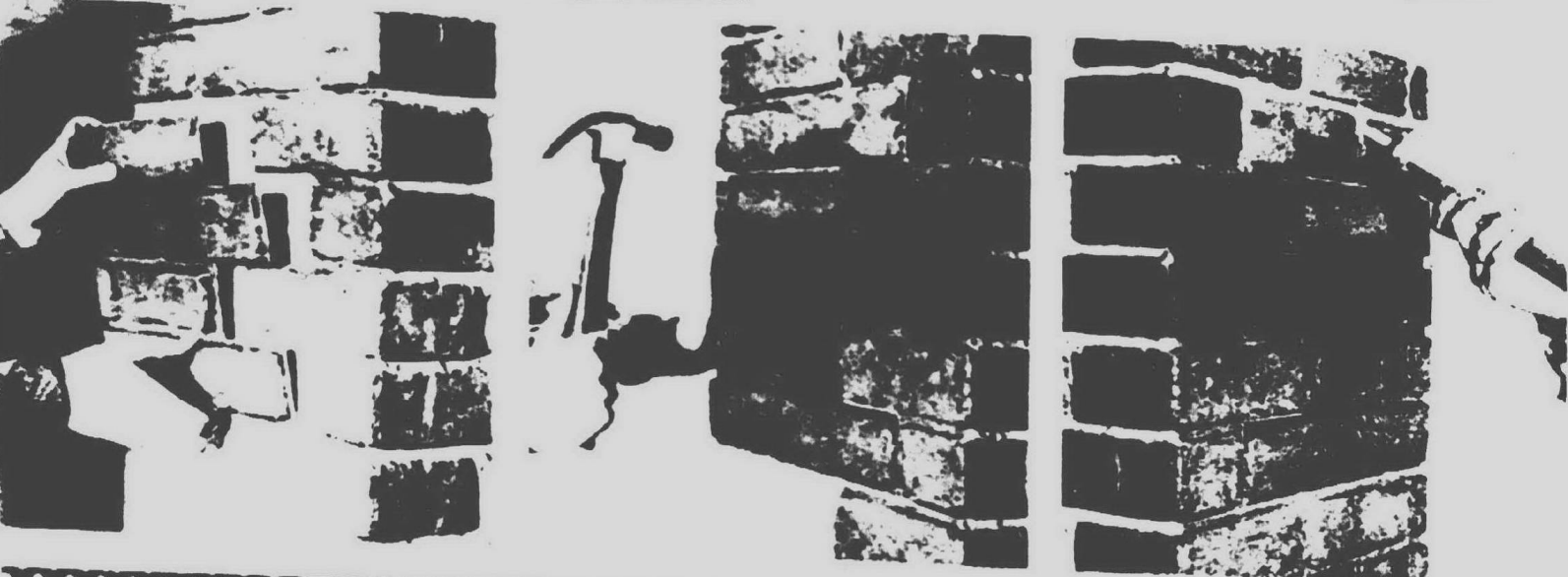
2) For trees already infested, prune out all infected branches and burn, if possible. Don't use infected wood in fireplace, as it harbors the pest.



## The country look

## 4-H Club's orientation changing

The Wayne County 4-H Club, long associated with rural activities has been quietly reaching out to help youngsters in the crowded inner-city of Detroit and the populated suburban divisions in western Wayne County.

To many, the 4-H movement triggers an image of youngsters from farm towns learning to ride horses, care for pigs and cows and growing crops.

Nothing could be further from the truth in 1974 as youngsters under 4-H leadership are being organized in a variety of programs in the western Wayne County suburbs of Westland, Plymouth and others.

PURPOSE OF the new 4-H movement is to involve more kids in the inner city and the growing suburbs, said Ron Smoker, 4-H Club youth agent.

There are more suburban clubs formed under 4-H under the group's aim to "involve youth in skill-related activities and leadership development activities since a number of suburbs lack a good youth activity," he said.

Through those activities, many youngsters take on leadership roles and teach others, Smoker added.

These activities include: macrame, candle making, ceramics, leather craft, woodmaking and jewelry making, all tools to develop confidence in young people and help them take on a task and develop responsibility and learn to share skills and experiences of finishing things, he said.

These skills and experiences are given to others with many products donated to friends or relatives, Smoker said.

Another new program started recently is the motorcycle-bicycle safety activity.

BUT DON'T get the opinion that 4-H is giving up on farm-related activities, Smoker said.

There are still horses and pigs to exhibit, although these things are new to subdivision youths since many developed cities prohibit animals other than household pets in subdivisions.

The national organization was formed in 1919 with the "h's," standing for head, heart, health and hands, Smoker said.

The activities and projects are designed by 4-H as tools to let youngsters between seven and 18 learn about themselves and others and hopefully lead a more productive life, Smoker said.

To meet that goal, Wayne County 4-H is moving beyond the traditional

rural experiences for members.

There is also a general direction in the state and nation to expand 4-H programs to non-rural activities in urban counties.

SOME ACTIVE western Wayne County leaders are Plymouth's Tom and Charlotte Root and Robert Stottlemeyer of Westland.

The Roots have been in Plymouth for only two years but have been honored by the county 4-H for developing the Plymouth Towne and Country 4-H club as one of the biggest in Wayne County.

The parents of two children, the Roots run the Plymouth Rotary School farm.

Stottlemeyer works with the county's 4-H service club as advisor.

# Inflation's cause is seen as over use of resources

WASHINGTON D C—Explicit over-commitment of our economic resources is the basic reason for inflation, Prof. Paul W. McCracken of the University of Michigan told the American Bankers Association Symposium recently.

The former chairman of President Nixon's Council of Economic Advisers said "our problem, in short, is not the technocracy of managing economic policy although the instruments can always stand improving."

"Our problem is that in quite explicit ways we have over-extended ourselves in obligating our economic resources. If the managers of economic policy are to pursue a more orderly course, these imbalances between explicit and programmed claims on resources and what we can reasonably expect the economy to deliver must be redressed."

ON THE restoration of this balance, the U-M economist warned, "may well depend not only a better price level performance, but our free society itself."

McCracken emphasized that "heavy demands on the economy, many of them requiring financing, have been so inexorable and insistent that a Federal Reserve policy adamantly limiting the rate of monetary and credit expansion to, say a five per cent pace (instead of a rate in excess of seven per cent), would have risked a real financial crisis."

"The key question, therefore, now becomes evident. Why do we have demands in the economy so omnivorous that explicit claims on output seem so persistently and inexorably to outrun our productive capability?"

"While such things as the oil embargo, poor crops and artificial shortages from price controls have played a short-term role, a more basic problem has been building for some time."

"The fundamental problem," McCracken continued, "is that we have been making explicit commitments for the future use of economic resources with inadequate or no cost-benefit analysis and with inadequate or not adding-up to see how it matches against our productive capacity."

"And these explicit, large, and growing commitments involve financing requirements that have our credit markets floundering."

SUGGESTING the Federal budget is "out of control", the U-M economist noted that during the last two decades we have had only four fiscal years in the black.

From 1968 to first quarter 1974, he said, the rise in nondefense government expenditures (federal, state, local) was equal to 43 per cent of the rise in national income.

"The political process has tended to vote programs with large and rising future outlays with the reassuring thought that 'now' is no time to raise tax rates."

"Through the legislative process, large commitments of future economic resources are made that often do not show up in the budget as such."

He also is a board member of the Downriver Federal Savings and Loan Association. A former mayor of Wyandotte, Kregar is vice president of the Great Lakes Coca-Cola Bottling Company.

He cited the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 which declared a national policy of building 26 million dwelling units in the ensuing decade, the \$600 per car mandated safety and emissions equipment by the next model year, and high outlays for environmental and safety stands in industry.

McCracken suggests that a program for regaining a reasonably stable price level must move in three directions, seeking: a more realistic rate of monetary and credit expansion and stronger fiscal policy; higher operating rates for the economy; and, programs that deal with the inequities of inflation.

"Because the basic relationship between money supply and gross national product (GNP) is fairly stable, and our capacity to increase output is growing at not over four per cent, this monetary requirement for price stability can be put in fairly specific terms."

"Our objective should be to work the rate of expansion in the money supply down to the four-five per cent zone as rapidly as it is prudent to do so."

"A steadier and stronger fiscal and expenditure policy is obviously essential. The normal target for the budget should be a surplus equal to about three per cent of federal outlays."

THE PUBLIC sector, he added, "has an obligation to be candid with citizens about the full economic costs of its program decisions, whether they are in the budget or as private outlays imposed on people and to be paid directly by them. This is essential not only to good management of economic policy, but for that public confidence without which democracy itself is in peril."

"Second, we must explore ways to achieve higher operating rates for the economy, and lower levels of unemployment, without unacceptably severe upward pressures on the price level."

He suggested evaluation of "a vast array of public projects and arrangements that impede the mobility of resources and impart, therefore, an inflationary bias to the economy."

"People have far more understanding about these matters and far more discipline and courage about facing these pains than the emissaries they sent to Washington fear, if people have the feeling that government is leveling with them."

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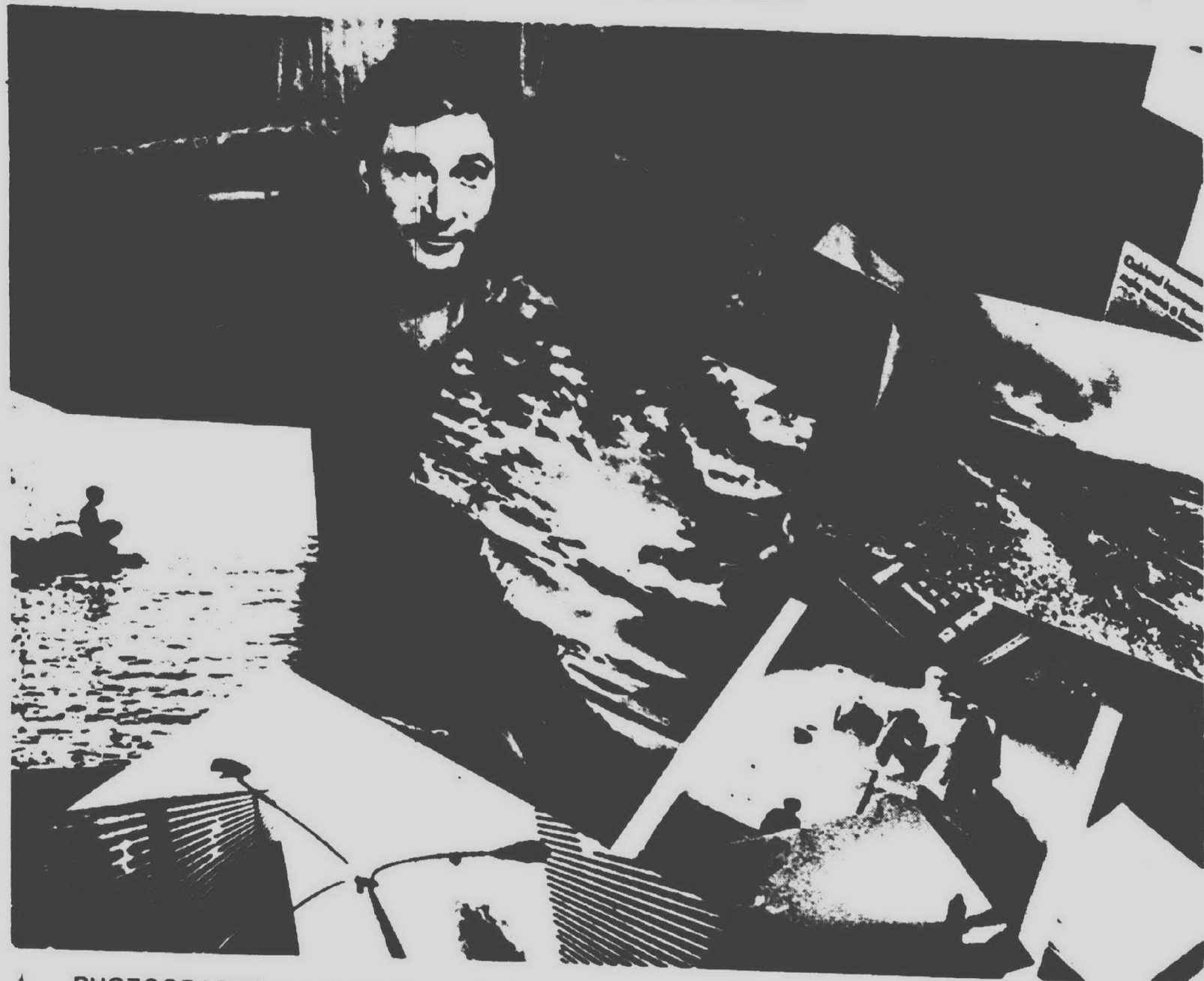

## Broken camera leads to snapshooters' win

The hand of fate works in mysterious ways. For Monte Nagler, who dominated the recent Livonia Mall Snapshooters Contest, it took a broken camera for him to build up even more than a passing interest in the field at which he now excels.

## Erwin urges OK of veterans' bonus proposal

Robert Erwin, candidate for the Democratic nomination in the 37th state House district in the Aug. 6 primary, is urging voters' approval of the Vietnam Veterans' bonus bill on the Nov. 5 ballot.

"As a Vietnam veteran myself," he said, "I am well aware that while the men who fought in World War II and the Korean War returned as heroes, Vietnam was a war nobody liked and everyone now wants to forget."

Erwin noted that unemployment rates are high among Vietnam vets because they lack education and training "yet without a job to supplement inadequate GI benefits, the veteran can't get either."

Erwin made his comments at a workshop on the bonus bill sponsored by the Committee to Support the Vietnam Veterans' Bonus Bill.

The district includes the south half of Westland, part of Plymouth Township and all of Canton Township.

## Canton spending U.S. share

CANTON — Canton Township trustees have agreed to spend Canton's 1974 - 75 revenue sharing funds amounting to \$73,600 for public safety projects and possibly some recreational projects.

Specifically, the board said the money would be spent on additional fire fighting equipment and the construction of a new fire station in the northern portion of the township.

# Lush Irish Hills a summer magnet

The lush, rolling Irish Hills in southeastern Michigan's Lenawee County is one of the state's most picturesque and historic areas and has much to offer the tourist.

At the peak of summer, up to 10,000 cars travel through the area on an average Sunday, attesting to its popularity among southeastern Michigan attractions.

AT THE EGDE OF THE Irish Hills, Saline and Clinton are among the area communities well worth a visit to view examples of 19th century architecture. Saline was settled in 1824 and Clinton in 1838. Both are communities removed from the tensions of a big city and visitors will find the people there genuinely friendly.

West of Clinton is the central part of the Irish Hills, so named by the Rev. William Lyster because the gentle slopes and sparkling lakes reminded him of his native land.

The Irish Hills is an area of about six square miles, with Cambridge Junction at the intersection of US-12 and M-50 considered the hub. Most of the things to see are along US-12 or M-50, between Clinton and US-127.

The area was settled in the 1830's by families who had left "the Auld Sod" of Ireland because of recurrent famines from potato crop failures.

They found this to be a lush area for farms and made their first permanent mark with St. Joseph's Shrine, a stone church started in 1854 which has drawn uncounted multitudes of worshippers to its Outdoor Stations of the Cross overlooking a small lake. In the old churchyard are graves of Irish pioneers.

There are 52 lakes in the Irish Hills and most of them are visible from the twin 64-foot observation towers that have been an area landmark for many years.

Seven miles west of Clinton on US-40 is Bauer Manor, a roadhouse dating to 1834 where stagecoach travelers bound for Chicago over the bumpy Sauk Trail could stay overnight. It is still a restaurant.

ANOTHER OLD roadhouse is Springville Inn, six miles west of Tip-ton on M-50, now an antique shop.

Four miles away is Walker Tavern in Cambridge Junction, once the junction of Michigan's old Chicago and Monroe turnpikes. Built in 1832, the inn's onetime notable guests included statesman Daniel Webster and James Fenimore Cooper, American novelist. Cooper spent considerable time here and the locale appears in some of his books.

Now under state supervision, Walker Tavern is now undergoing restoration and is closed to the public. However, an interpretation center and a restored barn will be open daily 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. starting July 4. Both will exhibit stagecoaches and pioneer artifacts.

Strung out in other areas are a score of other attractions, ranging from a "Prehistoric Forest" of dinosaur and Triceratops sculptures to gravity-defying "Mystery Hill," where water runs up and people can't fall down.

W. J. Hayes State Park, nine miles west of Clinton on US-12 and M-124, covers 654 acres in Lenawee, Jackson and Washtenaw Counties, and capitalizes on the beauty of the Irish Hills.

MOST EXTENSIVE of all the at-

tractions is "Stagecoach Stop," an 1880-vintage Wild West town now in its tenth season which has been expanded to include early Americana and Old West displays.

It's also on US-12, three miles east of the M-50 and US-12 intersection, across from Hayes State Park. There's enough here to keep most visitors occupied for several hours.

Cedar Point, Inc., of Sandusky, Ohio, has announced plans to develop an amusement park on the site of Frontier City, on M-50 about a mile south of Cambridge Junction. Construction will begin next year and the park is scheduled to open in 1976. Cost will be around \$15 million and facilities will include, rides, camping facilities and a children's playground.

The Hidden Lake Gardens, at Tip-ton, is comprised of 620 acres of rolling Irish Hills. The original owners, Mr. and Mrs. Harry A. Fee, of Adrian, gave Hidden Lake Gardens to Michigan State University in 1945 and set up trust funds to insure future maintenance and development. Hidden Lake Gardens attracted 221,000 persons last year.

A visit to the Irish Hills might be summed up as fun for the entire family.

So the mediator called all parties back for additional talks Sunday afternoon and an accord was finally reached in early evening. The union negotiators indicated they would recommend approval by the membership.

**ACTING ON THAT** assumption, Hazel Park immediately opened the barn area to horses from the DRC and Wolverine began the task of changing the racing strip from the soft cushion needed for the thoroughbreds to the hard clay base for the pacers and trotters.

Meanwhile, Wolverine Racing Secretary Bill Connors held a draw at Northville Downs and filled the 10-race program for the opening card with what he termed as quality races.

Racing Director Bud Sears, of Hazel Park, called his crew together Monday morning and it quickly wrapped up a program for Wednesday to get the 120-day meeting off the ground.

So everything was back to normal by Thursday with the mutual clerks winning most of the points they figured they needed. For instance, post time at Hazel Park will be 3:30 p.m. daily and 2 p.m. on Saturdays. There will be racing six days each week for the first 90 days with Monday as a dark day.

The controversial pay scale for Sundays was resolved with clerks to receive double time if the handle is \$1.2 million or more and 1.75 time if the handle is below \$1.2 million.

The contract calls for time and a half on Saturdays for all union members on the first seniority list.

**THE HAZEL PARK** meeting continues through Dec. 8 unless Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley decides to give the track a couple of extra days for those lost this week.

Incidentally, the racing commissioner was conspicuous by his absence all through the negotiations. Many thought he should have stepped in and insisted that Hazel Park release its stall allotment to the DRC horses much earlier than it did. The horsemen were not notified of the allotments until the day before the end of the DRC season...that's one of the big reasons why there was so much trouble on the weekend.

Many of the thoroughbreds would have been shipped to Hazel Park had the owners and trainers known how many stalls they were going to get and had Hazel Park officials permitted them into the barn area. But they didn't know and track management refused to allow any horses on the grounds for security reasons. Thus there were 1,400 thoroughbreds in the DRC stalls when normally there would have been no more than 200 by closing day.

As it was, thoroughbreds were being vanned to Hazel Park Monday as fast as vans were available and Wolverine was awaiting for the area to clear out so they could "fog" the barns before pacers and trotters were allowed to ship in.

It was a bit hectic for a while but like everything else, it straightened out in a matter of a single day. Matter of fact the Wolverine track crew had the racing surface changed within a matter of 16 hours.

They did get a break from the weatherman who didn't order out showers until late Monday night and the job had been completed by then. A bit of rain didn't figure to hurt the track at all.

**THURSDAY'S CARD** (tonight) is headed by a \$4,000 trot that attracted a full complement of 10 starters topped by such swift ones as Miss Redwood from the Bob Kalish stable of Southfield, Joe B. Abbe, Portfolio and Potent Freight.

The secondary feature is the ninth race, a \$3,600 pace, with 10 starters and a mixture of horses from Windsor and Northville, Downs.

Heading the cast is Erianas Jane, Justagame, Regal Rhonda, Lady Linette and Two Below.

Charley Federman, Southfield attorney, who decided to take a leave from the law practice and try his hand at driving and training standbreds, guided D Js Annie to a surprising victory at Northville Downs Monday in the next to last program of the track's 24 night season.

The 11-year-old mare was rated no better than a third choice by the bettors and appeared out of the running entirely as the field turned into the short stretch.

**THEN FEDERMAN**, who has a provisional driver's license, took the whip to the mare and she responded by coming through the middle of the pack to win by more than a length in 2:12.1 over a slow track. She paid \$8.80, \$3.40 and \$2.40 across the board.

The strange thing about the race was that Miss Redwood, a five-year-old chestnut mare owned by Bob Kalish of Southfield, led all the way and appeared headed for an easy victory. That was until Annie made her move and moved right past the leader and under the wire for the win.

It will be interesting to see how Federman fares now that harness racing has switched to the big mile track at Wolverine. It will be his first taste of the big time on the big oval and it could mean an entirely different type of strategy in each race.

In answer to one of our readers' questions received the other day, Joe Scribner, the big blond from the East Side, was Detroit's first national match game bowling champion.

Joe won the crown in the mid '20s on lanes 9 and 10 at the now defunct Palace Recreation on Gratiot Avenue.

Joe was a novel champion in that he was a three-step bowler and used a two-finger ball.

And, incidentally, the Palace Recreation, was the first bowling establishment in the country to have 24 lanes without a pillar or post.

Leave it to the bowlers to keep up with the times. There is a summer league at Westland Bowl called the

Watergate Mixed League, with a team called the wire-tappers in first place.

Bob Baker was the high man during the past week with a 633 on games of 221, 232 and 180. And Jean Essa was high among the ladies with a 210 in 549.

One of the oddities of the week happened at Westland, too, when Tony De Podesta, a 176 average bowler, turned in a 149 triplicate. This is odd because he will get an ABC award for bowling well below his average. And speaking of oddities, Ken Douschat converted the 7-10 split.

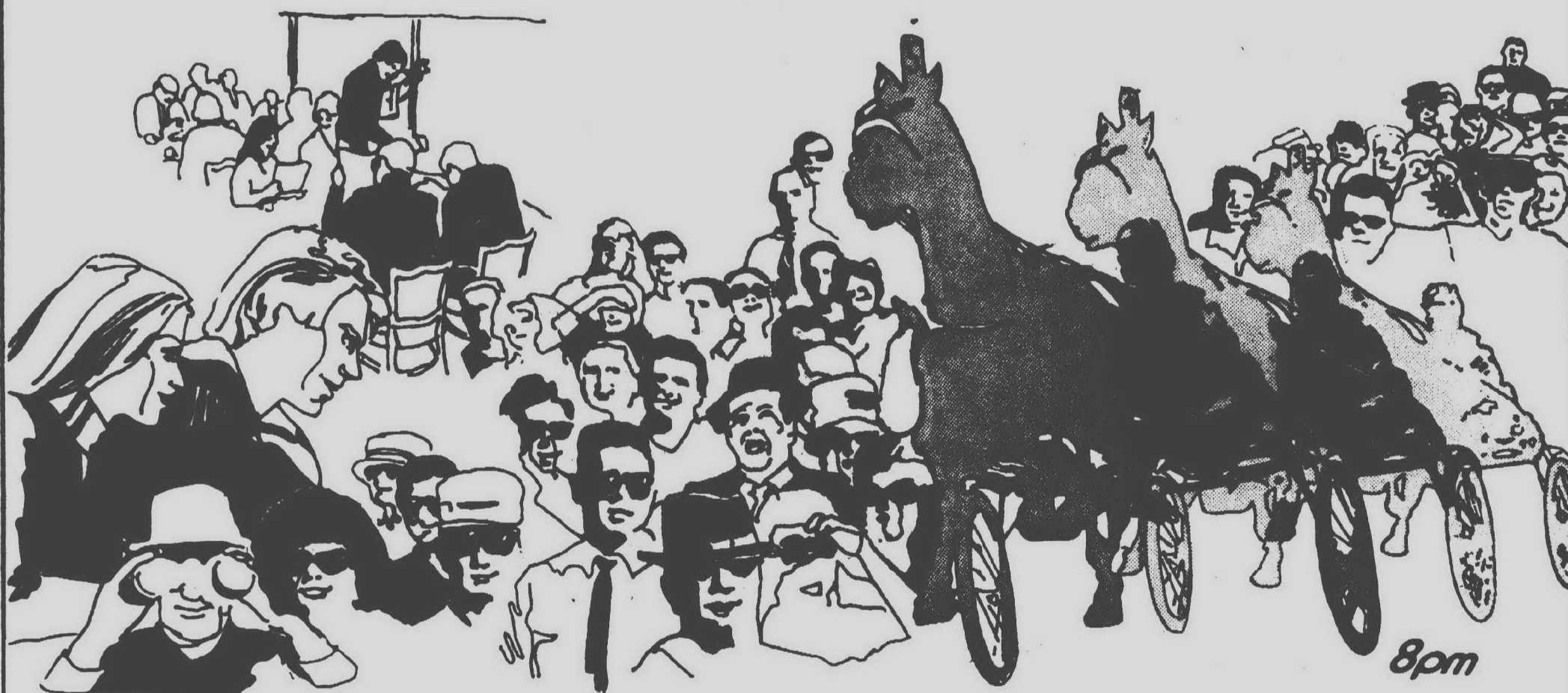

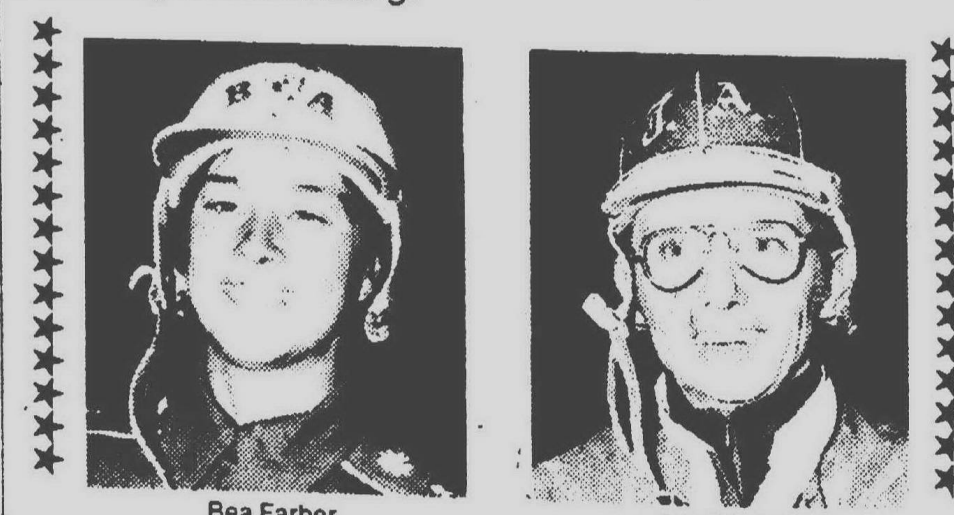
