## McLaren outstrips Breen

### Precinct totals delayed 2 weeks

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP — It may be several days before the local votes for U.S. Congress, state senator, state representative, county commissioner, the county-wide millage proposal and precinct delegates are known for the township.

Although the township race results were quickly called in by precinct workers Tuesday night, workers at three of the 11 precincts did not tabulate local votes in the other races before sealing the official envelopes that were then sent to the Wayne County clerk's office.

Candidates in close races which would be affected by the Plymouth Township vote were scurrying early Wednesday morning to find unofficial figures for the missing precincts.

Although the county clerk's office had total figures for all the races which included Plymouth Township (taken from unofficial county re-

turns), the township breakdown will not be available until the County Board of Canvassers meets.

Larry Verbeist, assistant county elections director, told the Plymouth Observer & Eccentric Wednesday morning that it could be as long as 14 days before the total county results are certified and released.

TOWNSHIP CLERK Helen Richardson, said that while the precinct workers were not required by law to pull the local figures on the non-township races, they had been requested to do so before sealing their precinct packages.

She said that since it takes so long to get results back from the county, she had asked her election workers to get the local breakdowns.

"I feel bad about this, but there's nothing we can do about it," she said. "Thank God everything else went all right."

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP — J. D. McLaren got a nice present for his 50th birthday Tuesday — another two years' as township supervisor.

McLaren overwhelmingly defeated Maurice Breen for the Republican nomination for the supervisor post and in so doing is assured of election in November since no Democrat is seeking the post.

Tuesday's vote was 921 for McLaren and 426 for Breen, according to unofficial results.

It was the second time in two years that Breen had been defeated by McLaren in the Republican primary. In 1972, McLaren beat Breen, who was then the incumbent supervisor, in the primary.

About 21 per cent of the township's 9,468 registered voters went to the polls Tuesday.

IN THE TREASURER'S race for Plymouth Township, Joe West won the Republican nomination with 519 votes. He beat out Weyona Lee Fidge (327 votes), Thomas Notebaert (251 votes), and Anna Milligan (231 votes), according to the unofficial returns.

Tuesday was also the birthday of West's wife.

West now faces Democrat Janet G. Pierangelino in November.

In the township clerk's race, Republican Helen Richardson, who was unopposed for her party's nomination to re-election and is unopposed in November, received 995 votes.

There were two candidates running in both parties for the two township trustee spots open—thus there was no battle there Tuesday and the fight comes in November.

In the Republican primary, incumbent Frank Millington received 943 votes and Richard Gornick, a planning commission member, got 808 votes.

Voting was much lighter in the Democratic party since there were no important contests there. In the trustees race, Tom Sullivan got 552 votes while Orville Tungate received 462 votes.

McLAREN and West thanked those who voted for them and their campaign workers.

"I'm very humble — highly honored," McLaren said. "I owe so much to so many people who worked so terribly hard for me. If ever the day comes in my mind and heart that I'm not doing the best job for the township," McLaren added, "I'll turn this

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## Greenstein, Poole, Cheske are Canton victors

CANTON—Democratic Club supervisor candidate Robert Greenstein and three of four members of his slate were nominated by wide margins Tuesday to represent Canton Democrats in the November election.

Only Clerk John Flodin, who was unopposed, and incumbent Trustee E. Brian Schwall won Democratic nominations without slate backing.

On the Republican side, Trustee James Poole soundly defeated Jack Foote in a race for the GOP nod to oppose Greenstein.

Greenstein, a Livonia attorney received more votes than all other supervisor candidates combined and topped all vote-getters in contested races, garnering 1,169 votes to 584 for his opponent, Jack Foote. Poole outpolled Foote 219 votes to 67.

In the race for Democratic nominee for township treasurer, slate candidate Carl Parsell received 993 to 524 for Incumbent Grant Campbell and 300 for Thomas Stevens. Republican Richard Wolfe Jr. was unopposed and received 209 votes.

Schwall and Robert Myers received Democratic nominations as candidates for two four-year terms on the township board of trustees. Schwall received 983 votes, while Myers had 965 votes and Joseph DeLauro 874.

On the GOP side, William Ryan and Warren Attwood were nominated for the four-year posts. Ryan had 174 votes to 153 for Attwood and 136 for Joseph Kinnick.

Democratic Club nominee Gerald Cheske will be unopposed in November after defeating two other Democrats for a two-year seat on the board of trustees. Cheske received 776 votes to 582 for Frank McMurray and 280 for Mrs. Irene Murphy.

Supervisor candidate Greenstein, expressed confidence that Democratic Club nominees would have little difficulty in the fall election, even though one slate member, Joseph DeLauro, was defeated in the primary.

"I don't think we have a weak area," he said. "I was impressed with the returns myself, but it (DeLauro's loss) means we all have to win in the fall."

Republican Supervisor candidate James Poole, a real estate salesman, isn't optimistic about his chances in November. "It looks like Poole has got to work harder," he said. "I don't see how we can beat the slate. There's no way, even with my votes, Marts' votes and Foote's votes combined, that we can do it."

"The people are going to be saddled with the slate," he said. "I wish I wasn't even in the race."

Incumbent Treasurer Grant Campbell, who has held the office since 1970, was defeated Tuesday by slate candidate Carl Parsell, former president of the Detroit Police Officers' Association and current executive director of the Michigan Police Officers' Association.

"I'm not sorry," Campbell said of the outcome. "If the people feel Parsell can do a better job, that's what they should get."

He cited his "yes" vote on the controversial Mocerri Project as a factor in his loss. "It had a lot to do with it," he said. "But if it came up again I'd vote the same way. It would have been a good thing for the township." After the November election Campbell will relinquish his seat on the township planning commission.

Incumbent Schwall, a teacher and coach at Plymouth-Canton High School, was the top vote-getter among all trustee candidates. "I knew I was going to win," he said, "but it's gratifying to know that people voted on the candidate's record, not according to a slate. It proves an individual can win on his own merits."

The slate's showing was "very impressive," said slate trustee candidate Cheske. Cheske, an editor with the Michigan Automobile Association, is unopposed in the general election. "We wanted five of five," he said of the slate approach, "but we thought that if we got four of five we would be winners."

"The treasurer's race will be a tight one," he predicted. Slate nominee Parsell faces Republican Wolfe, who is an administrator for the Wayne County Board of Commissioners and a recently-appointed township trustee.

"The guy has already gotten us \$25,000 for six more firemen," said GOP supervisor nominee Poole, a Wolfe supporter.

Poole's opponent, Greenstein, suggested that as treasurer Wolfe might have difficulty dealing with the county agencies for which he works. "You can't ask a man to fight his boss," he said.

In the 15th Congressional district, Republicans nominated Jack Underwood of Westland over Edgar Nieten of Romulus. The district covers Westland, Garden City and most of western Wayne County.

Underwood gained 2,860 votes, far ahead of Nieten's 1,034. U. S. Rep. William Ford, Taylor Democrat now in his fifth term, had 25,072.

Nearly 31 per cent, or 2,445, of Canton's 7,920 registered voters went to the polls Tuesday.

## Public safety tax, cable TV defeated

CANTON—Canton voters Tuesday defeated by 25 votes a proposed three-mill public safety millage and overwhelmingly rejected the awarding of an exclusive cable TV franchise in the township.

The public safety levy, which went down by a vote of 932 to 907, would have provided the township with funds to hire additional firemen, build a second fire station and if necessary provide residents with police protection.

"I'm rather discouraged," said Clerk John Flodin. "It seemed to me that there was some expression that the community wanted another fire station. The need still exists, but it's up to the township board to find another way to finance it."

Flodin said that there would not be

another opportunity to put the measure on the ballot this year.

"I'm extremely disappointed on the safety millage vote," said Robert Greenstein, Democratic nominee for supervisor. Both Greenstein and his Republican opponent, James Poole, said they would attempt to get the proposal on the November ballot.

A measure that would have awarded a private company an exclusive franchise to operate cable TV in Canton was defeated by 1,598 votes to 218.

The franchise to Canton Communication Systems has been under fire since it was awarded. Its defeat was recommended by the township board and a citizens study group on cable TV.

## Williams bound to Circuit Court

PLYMOUTH—Charles J. Williams, accused of first degree murder of his wife in Plymouth on May 29, has been found competent to stand trial and now awaits arraignment in Circuit Court.

A psychiatrist who examined Williams after he was arrested, reported that the defendant was sane and could stand trial. The defense attorneys did not dispute the ruling.

On Monday, 35th District Judge Dunbar Davis ruled that Williams was sane and could stand trial and set Aug. 20 as the date of his arraignment in Wayne County Circuit Court.

Williams, 38, was arrested May 29 by city police who said in district court Monday that they were called to the Williams' home at 167 Union St. on that date by Williams who phoned the police and said, "I've murdered my wife and I'm dying."

Upon arriving at the scene, police said, Jo Ann Williams was found "lying in a large pool of blood" in the kitchen dining area and Williams, bleeding from a deep cut on his left arm, was lying in the living room.

Police testified Monday that a broken glass pitcher was found near Mrs. Williams' body and two razor blades—one of them bloodied—were also found in the room.

Dr. Sukarnal Khasnabis, of the Wayne County Medical Examiner's office, testified in district court Monday

that the autopsy on Mrs. Williams' body showed several lacerations about the head, broken facial bones and jaw and that the entire left side of her face was depressed "due to extensive fractures of the facial bones."

The medical examiner testified that the injuries "could have been done by one blow," and that the resulting fall of the body might have caused further injury.

Khasnabis also testified that bits of broken glass were found on her clothing. He said the autopsy further revealed Mrs. Williams had not been drinking or using barbiturates and that "fresh" sperms were found in her vagina.

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## Downtown parking situation studied

PLYMOUTH—The concern of the business community over the parking situation in downtown Plymouth has been expressed in an offer from the Chamber of Commerce leadership to lend its knowledge and expertise to the city in an effort to solve parking problems.

Former Mayor James McKeon and Chamber President Fred Hill told city commissioners Monday evening that the chamber felt it could make valuable input to the city's efforts, but, McKeon added, "we're not here tonight offering money."

Any solution to the problem, he said, is "going to take some very hard dollars from the city."

The Chamber representatives told the commission that the business community had four major concerns about downtown parking and that the most recent change in the situation, the proposed increase in parking fees from five to 10 cents an hour, only touched one of those concerns.

McKeon listed those concerns as first, customer parking; second, parking revenue; third, employee parking; and fourth, traffic control.

The availability of customer parking close to business establishments at reasonable rates is of primary importance, he said, because of the ability of the large shopping centers with huge, free parking facilities to draw potential customers from the downtown area.

In addition, he pointed to the need

for some parking areas identified as employee parking areas to assure that employees of downtown businesses did not monopolize all of the best parking spots before the business day begins.

The businessmen also feel, he said, that lots are preferable to on-street parking because of the traffic congestion which parallel parking causes.

The chamber representatives agreed with commission members that the city has enough parking area "overall," but that the problem is largely one of the distribution and cost of parking.

"We have enough total parking," said City Manager Fred Yockey, "and somebody ought to get credit for that—it may, however, not be in the right places for today."

While the Chamber of Commerce is admittedly not happy about the impending increase in parking fees, McKeon told the commission, "We're not trying to mount a delaying action (against the fee raise). We're concerned and we're expressing our desire to work with the city." He assured the commission that the chamber could have some valuable, much needed input.

"On the surface," he said, "parking seems like a simple issue. But in a 100-year-old downtown, you get into complexities."

Thanking the chamber representatives for their "generous offer," the commission voted unanimously to designate Yockey as a liaison between the chamber and the city in order to



# 2 congressional races tight; legislators win

**A News Roundup**

Two congressional primaries turned into cliff-hangers in the suburbs Tuesday. All state legislators in western Wayne County survived, but the supervisor of Redford Township was defeated.

Wire services declared John Reuther a winner by as few as 197 votes over Dr. Ed Pierce in the 2nd Congressional District out of more than 40,000 cast. Winner of a certain recount will face incumbents Marvin Esch, unopposed again in the Republican primary.

In the 17th District, State Rep. William Brodhead of Detroit earned the chance to succeed retiring Martha Griffiths in a normally Democratic area. Brodhead had a 200 vote lead over Detroit school board member Patrick McDonald in the Democratic primary. Kenneth Gallagher turned back A.J. Goldenthal in the Republican contest.

The 17th includes northwest Detroit, Redford Township, and the Southfield and Farmington communities.

In the 15th Congressional District, incumbent William D. Ford was unopposed in the Democratic primary and will face Jack Underwood, winner of a two-way GOP contest, in November.

**IN STATE SENATE** races, the only western Wayne County contest featured newcomer Michael O'Shea of Redford Township, chairman of the county Young Democrats, upsetting Redford trustee Don Christie in the 14th District. Republican Carl Pursell was unopposed in his primary. The district includes Redford, Livonia, Plymouth and Northville, along with a small corner of Westland.

Democrat William Faust was re-nominated in the 13th District without opposition and will face Republican unopposed in the GOP primary. The district includes Garden City, Westland and Canton Township.

Election night gossip touted Faust as a possible running mate to Democratic gubernatorial nominee Sander Levin. The 1970 No. 2 spot went to Livonia Mayor Edward McNamara.

**FOUR STATE** representative nominations were contested, but incumbents won all.

Rep. William Keith (D-Garden City) easily won re-nomination in the 33rd House District, which also includes Inkster and a small portion of West-

land. Tim Tierney, son of a retired state representative, provided the challenge, and Arnie Lutz finished far out of contention. Mrs. Levaughn Wethington, a political unknown, won the Republican primary.

Veteran John Bennett piled up 6,000 votes more than his two opponents in winning the Democratic nomination in the 34th District, which includes Redford Township and part of Dearborn Heights. No Republicans ran in that district.

R. William Joyner, former administrative assistant to Livonia's mayor, turned back attorney Ernest Grant in the 35th House District Democratic primary. The Livonia-Northville seat has see-sawed between the parties in the last decade and is now held by Republican R. Robert Geake, unopposed in his primary.

The 36th House District, in southern Livonia and Westland, will see a rematch of the 1972 contest between Democrat John Markes, now the incumbent, and Ralph Miller. Neither had primary opposition.

Rep. Thomas Brown of Westland turned back Robert Erwin in the Democratic primary in the 37th House District and will meet Brian Kidston, unopposed in the Republican primary, in November.

In a political comeback, former Rep. Roy Smith of Ypsilanti was nominated unopposed in the Republican primary in the 52nd House District, which takes in part of the Plymouth community. Merian Frederick was nominated unopposed by Democrats. Incumbent Ray Smit of Ann Arbor dropped out after four terms.

**ONE WAYNE** County commissioner went down to defeat.

Brian Arrowsmith, youngest member of the board when he was elected as a Republican two years ago, switched to the Democratic column the day he filed for re-election and was beaten in the primary by Belleville Mayor Royce Smith.

Arrowsmith's switch left Republicans without a candidate in a district that includes Plymouth, Canton and the western fringe of Wayne County townships.

In the 18th county commission district, Democrat Richard Manning was nominated for a new term without opposition. Joseph Schmidt was unop-

posed in the Republican primary. The district includes Redford Township and the eastern strip of Livonia.

A long-time Democratic party worker, Barbara Johnson, got her own chance to run for office by defeating attorney Gerald Davis in the Democratic primary in the 19th county district. Incumbent Mary Dumas was unopposed in the Republican primary. The district includes most of Livonia and Northville.

Tom Taylor is ready to launch a bid for chairman of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners after defeating Westland Councilman Justine Barns in the Democratic primary in the 20th District. Mary Cesnick beat Joel Maxey Jr. by a dozen votes in the Republican primary.

**REDFORD TOWNSHIP** Supervisor Bill J. Robbins went down to defeat after two terms at the hands of Patrick McDonald, a 27-year-old attorney with the same name as a congressional candidate. In another surprise, Robert Brang, eldest son of District Judge Robert Brang, won a trustee endorsement without an endorsement from one of the township's Democratic factions.

Plymouth Township Supervisor J.D. McLaren easily beat former Supervisor Maurice Breen in a rematch of their 1970 Republican primary. No Democrat ran. Joe West topped a field of four for the treasurer nomination to succeed Elizabeth Holmes.

In Canton Township, where Supervisor Philip Dingley is retiring, attorney Robert Greenstein led his Democratic Club slate as he won the nomination for supervisor. He will face Trustee James Poole, winner of the GOP primary.

Carl Parsell, known statewide as former head of the Detroit Police Officers Association and now as executive director of the state association, won the Democratic nod for Canton treasurer.

Canton Township voters barely rejected a public safety millage by 25 votes but were heavily against a controversial cable television franchise awarded by the township board.

There were no school millages on suburban ballots. Those appear generally on the early June school district elections.

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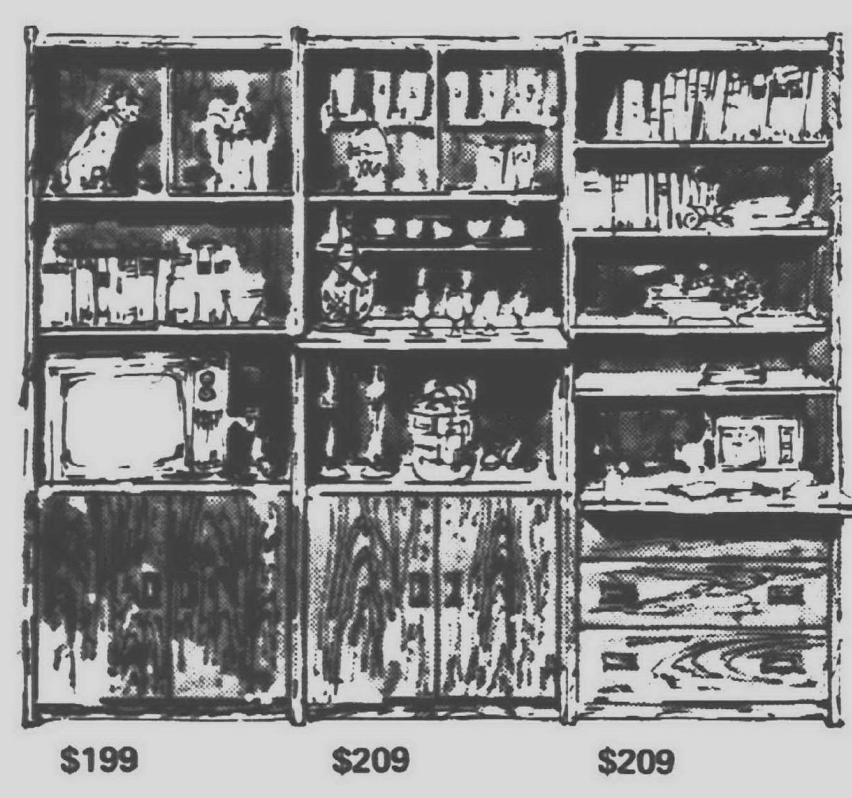
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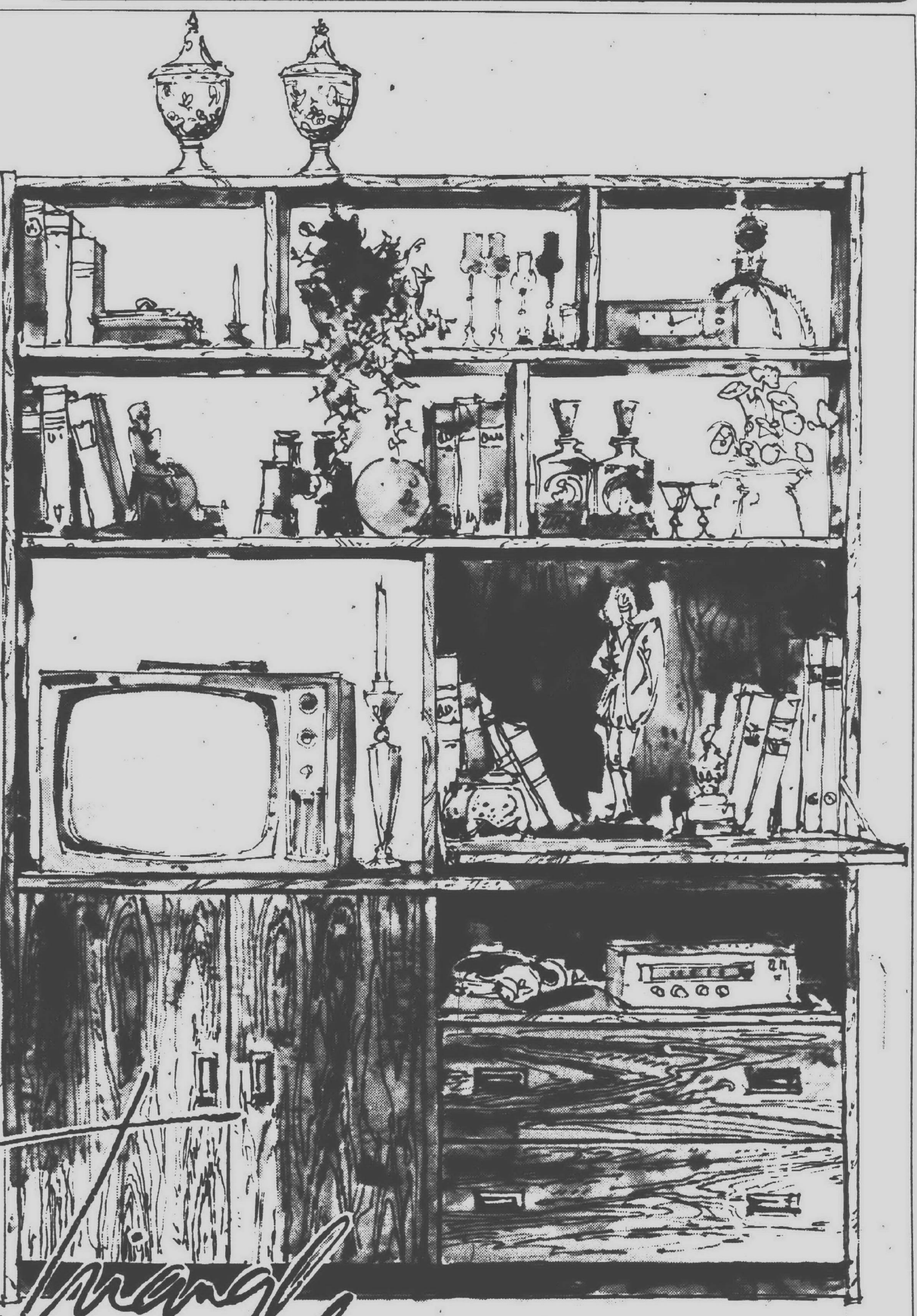
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# Illnesses drain family's \$80 week income

Jerry Olson, a machine operator at the Packaging Corp. of America plant in Plymouth, has always considered himself an ordinary sort of guy. He goes to work each day, loves his family, and tries to pay his bills.

Lately, however, Olson has had to cope with more than the average family man, and the bills-medical are multiplying faster than he can blink.

Olson's 12-year-old daughter, Leslie Ann, is in University Hospital, Ann Arbor, suffering from polyarteritis, a rare incurable disease that disrupts the blood flow to skin and muscle cells. Blood vessels become inflamed, causing blisters and painful swelling for the patient. There are only a few cases of it in the world, says Leslie's physician.

Doctors at U-M say the disease isn't contagious, and Leslie didn't inherit it. They don't know what causes it and worse, they have no cure.

"Right now Leslie is receiving medication to help relieve the pain and

swelling, and doctors are searching for a cure," says a hopeful Olson.

What makes it doubly rough for Olson is that his wife, Jean, has been a partial invalid for the last 20 years. She suffers from nerve tumors and has lost about 90 per cent use of her arms. Medication is her only relief.

"I can't do a lot of things a mother is supposed to do," says Mrs. Olson. "Leslie was literally my arms and legs, but now she needs help."

Leslie, a bright, perky, blue-eyed blonde is the apple of her parents' eye. They've been suffering, silently, along with her.

The Olsons have two other children, a married daughter, Mrs. Carolyn Williams; and a son, Bear, who is in the army.

Leslie entered the hospital last October. Doctors were puzzled about her condition. They started drug treatments and that helped for a while. The swelling flared up again in May so doctors increased the drug dosage with no positive results. Leslie was admitted to the hospital July 4.

"The pain and swelling got so bad she couldn't walk or feed herself," explains Olson.

Through it all, Olson manages to smile and tries hard to accept what's happening. But the strain and worry can be seen in his tired eyes and furrowed brow.

His day begins at 5 a.m. He works from 6 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. then goes home to clean and cook. He spends the evenings in Ann Arbor with Leslie. Mrs. Olson visits Leslie during the day with the help of friends.

Another struggle for the Olsons is the medical bills. Leslie and Mrs. Olson require expensive medication and Leslie's recent hospital stay has drained the family savings.

They've remortgaged their house, cashed in all bonds and pinched every penny they have. Olson's weekly paycheck totals \$130 but after a \$50 credit union deduction, he takes home only \$80. After household expenses are paid there isn't much left for medical bills.

"I never thought I'd be looking down such a dead end," says Olson. "We seem to be just existing."

The family is grateful for the help they've received so far. Neighbors recently collected \$56 and Olson's fellow plant workers chipped in and bought Leslie a television set.

"Friends often stop by and offer to help with housecleaning and driving me to the hospital," says Mrs. Olson. "People have been wonderful."

The Crippled Children's Society has paid a portion of the bills and Olson's medical insurance has covered a substantial amount, but the bills are still tremendous.

"We get a few dollars ahead and before we know it, it's gone," shrugs Olson. "We thought about selling the house but we couldn't find anything cheaper." The family lives at 15533 Portis in Northville Township.

The Plymouth American Legion Passage-Gade Post 391 and Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 6695 and auxiliaries have also aided. Olson says the list of helpers is so long he couldn't attempt to name them all for fear of forgetting someone.

"We wanted to buy everyone a little gift to show our appreciation but we

started adding it up and figured we'd go broke," explains Olson. "We hope 'thank-you' is enough for now."

Olson considered getting a better paying job but he couldn't pass the physical. He fell off a roof 21 years ago and damaged the vertebrae in his back. He was working for a heating and roofing company at the time.

The Olsons have one thing on their minds now and that's to have Leslie home and someday completely well.

"Once they control the pain and swelling, doctors say Leslie can return to school, but no strenuous exercise," says Olson. "That'll be hard because she's always been such a livewire." Leslie will be in the sixth grade at Central Middle School.

"She's such a brave girl, always cheerful, never complaining. She's got more guts than Carter's got pills. I ask her how she feels and she always says fine. I know darn well she's hurting," Olson said.

"We're hopeful,"

## Local residents hear tapes case

A local family got a 10-minute chance to watch history being made recently, when they sat in on the Supreme Court's oral arguments in Leon Jaworski's attempt to subpoena the famous Watergate tapes.

Mrs. Glenn Fredericks and her son Kirk, 12, of Plymouth, and her sister, Mrs. Stan Wickman and 11-year old Noreen Wickman, of Livonia, spent their vacation in Washington, D.C.

While there, they stood in line for more than two hours in an attempt to enter the Supreme Court building and hear the oral arguments by Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski and White House Council James St. Clair.

"We couldn't stand in line all night to be among the 150 persons who would have been allowed to stay for the whole three hours of arguments," Mrs. Wickman said.

The four local residents were allowed five minutes, including the time it took for the ushers to move them into the court chambers to hear the arguments. Mrs. Wickman and Noreen were so impressed that they returned to the long line in front of the court building for a second five-minute session.

In addition to sitting in on the oral arguments, the four managed to be in the right place at the right time and consequently met President Richard Nixon and his wife, Pat.

"We couldn't have planned it to work out the way it did," Mrs. Wickman said.

The Wickmans and the Fredericks were returning from a visit to Mt. Vernon when they decided to stop at Andrews Air Force Base and try to catch a glimpse of Air Force One, Nixon's official airplane.

The first guard they talked to at the base told them it would not be possible for them to actually enter the base area, but suggested they drive farther down the road where they might see the plane.

The guard didn't tell them that the plane was in Key Biscayne with the President.

Stopping at another gate, the guard there checked the two women's driver's licenses and allowed them to enter—also telling them that Vice President Gerald Ford was due to take off for Dallas within the hour.

While waiting for the vice presidential party, the local residents found out that the President was also due to arrive later in the evening, and they decided to wait.

When the President arrived that night, he took one of his infrequent walks to the fenced-in area to greet the well-wishers.

The Fredericks and the Wickmans were right in front.

"Meeting the President was one of the thrills of my life," Mrs. Fredericks said.

"He looked well, although a little bit under strain," she added.

Mrs. Fredericks and Mrs. Wickman were both impressed by the first lady, who was with the President.

"She is truly beautiful," Mrs. Fredericks said.

"She looks much younger in person than her pictures show her to be," Mrs. Wickman added.

Mrs. Fredericks has been spending her vacations in Washington, D.C. for the past four summers, but this is the first time she has met the President.

Both of the women say they voted for Nixon in 1968 and again in 1972. While they realize he is under pressure to resign, they say they're withholding judgment on his guilt or innocence until the trial in the Senate.

## Crowds gathering at Farrand

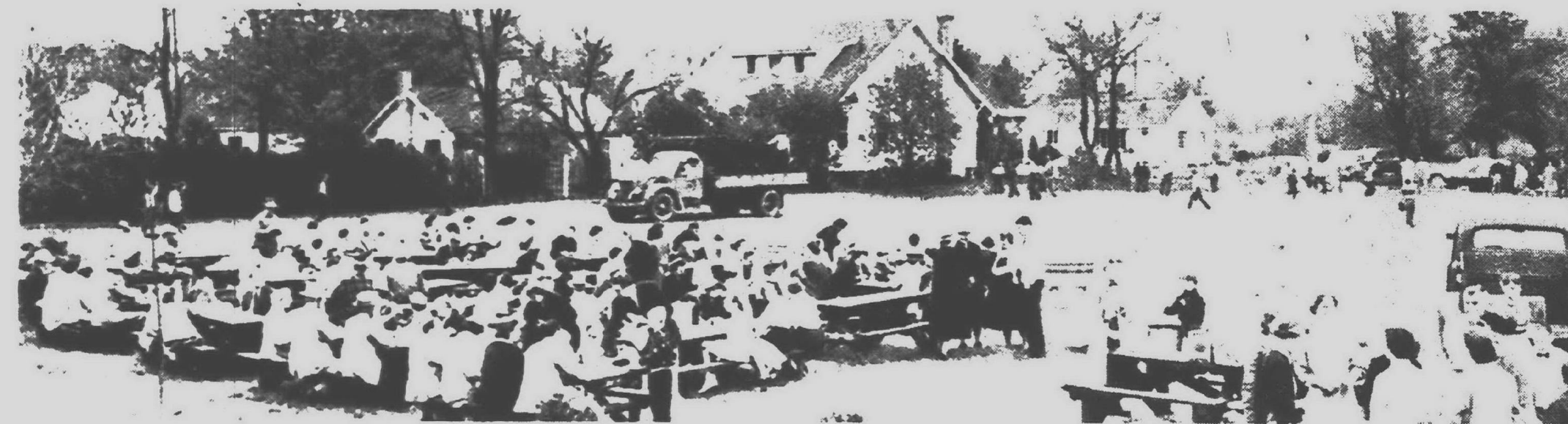
State Police and other law enforcement agencies have already made some arrests at the school and say they are continuing to patrol the area.

According to school officials, there has been a problem with that school for four years. Because it is unlit in the back, the school makes a gathering place for youths, they said.

Vandalism to the school — including broken windows, heating ducts, eave-roughing and damaged roof sections — have been reported by the school.

Neighbors have complained to the school board that the youths are using drugs and alcohol at the school.

School administrators say they are looking into the possibility of installing more lighting behind the school to discourage the night time gatherings.

PLYMOUTH—Calorie watchers had better beware, for the 1974 Plymouth Fall Festival is a virtual smorgasbord of culinary delights.

The movable feast begins on Thursday, Sept. 5, with a German dinner sponsored by the Business and Professional Women's Club, followed by the Lion's Club fried fish dinner Friday from noon on, the Kiwanis Club pancake dinner all day, the Jaycees beef rib dinner Saturday evening and the grand finale—the Rotary Club barbecued chicken dinner on Sunday.

Knackwurst, bratwurst, potato salad, rolls, and sauerkraut served up by native German cooks will bring the Rhineland to Kellogg Park along with the German dancers and band. Hot dogs will be available for those who don't like the authentic German fare.

Fish will be the star attraction at Friday's Lion's Club fish fry next to the Penn Theatre, but the dinner also includes French fried potatoes, cole slaw, roll and butter and a beverage.

The Masonic Temple is the place to be on Saturday when the Kiwanis Club provides hot pancakes, sausages, coffee, and milk until 7 p.m.

Saturday evening will feature a traditional American favorite, beef, at the Jaycee-sponsored beef rib dinner next to the Penn Theater. Corn on the cob, potato chips, a roll, coffee or milk, and ice cream will be provided as well.

Sunday is the day for the dean of Fall Festival service club dinners, the annual Rotary Club chicken barbecue.

Each year the barbecue grows in size and the Rotary experiences record sales. Last year alone 15,000 pounds of chicken were bought and ended up as 14,500 dinners.

But the barbecue's beginnings were more modest. The Joy and Wing playground was the scene of the first barbecue in 1956, which drew a crowd of 150, mostly Rotary members and their families.

In 1960 the barbecue expanded into a Fall Festival and moved to new quarters in Kellogg Park. Over the years the festival has expanded along with the barbecue, growing in length from a one to four day event.

This year the Rotary Club expects another record breaking crowd to sample its crowd-pleasing dinner, which includes corn, a roll, and of course the chicken.

Mrs. Williams died due to a head injury (of the left side of the head). Merlin Mowery, of the Michigan State Police Crime Lab in Plymouth, testified that Williams' right thumb print was found on the broken handle of the glass pitcher.

At the start of Monday's preliminary hearing for Williams, Robert Delaney, Williams' attorney, asked Judge Davis to sequester the Williams' children from the trial.

When the prosecution, after calling

the medical and police witnesses, sought to call the oldest Williams daughter to testify, Delaney agreed to allow the case to be bound over to circuit court without her testimony. Thus the defense did not attempt to have the charge reduced to second degree murder or less Monday.

Delaney indicated that the defense would probably seek a lesser charge when the case got to circuit court.

Williams' arraignment in circuit court is scheduled for 8:30 a.m. Tuesday, Aug. 20. He remains in custody until that time.

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# Suburban commissioners attack courtroom deal

A plan to move Common Pleas Court from the City-County Building to leased space in a downtown Detroit office building is under attack from two directions by a number of Wayne County Commissioners.

A proposed five-year lease, effective Jan. 1, was negotiated by the County Board of Auditors for four floors in the Lafayette Building without the board's knowledge. The agreement calls for \$287,964 annual rent.

Several commissioners from districts west of Detroit charged the lease agreement was a move to sidetrack their demands for out-county Circuit Court branches.

UNDER the proposed lease, nine Common Pleas judges and related offices would be moved to the Lafayette Building where the court's four-judge landlord-tenant division is already located.

This would make room in the City-County Building for five additional judges due on the circuit bench Jan. 1, plus circuit judges now housed in the old county building.

Commissioners from west and south of Detroit have been pressing to have at least two of the five additional circuit judges assigned to out-county locations.

The proposed lease also was attacked by other commissioners, including a Detroit-based one, assigning circuit judges outside downtown Detroit. They accused the Board of Auditors of exceeding its authority.

The issue was debated last month with Leonard D. Proctor, one of the three elected auditors.

Proctor argued that a state statute gives the auditors responsibility for ar-

ranging housing for the courts. He said there was an urgent need to secure space in time to have courtrooms built by Jan. 1.

The commissioners can refuse to appropriate the annual rent called for in the lease, said Proctor. He said the \$6.25 per square foot rental would be about \$2 less than at five other downtown buildings considered.

COMMISSIONER Edgar L. Harris (D-Taylor), co-sponsor of two resolutions calling for out-county Circuit Court branches, charged the auditors and court administrators were trying to "blackmail" the commissioners into keeping the courts downtown.

At Harris' request, County Corpo-

ration Council Aloysius J. Suchy said he would prepare a written legal opinion on whether the commissioners are "legally bound by leases negotiated by the Board of Auditors."

Public Works Committee Chairman John Lesinski (D-Dearborn) and Commissioners Mary E. Dumas (R-Livonia) and Ervin A. Steiner (R-Grosse Pointe Farms) attacked the leasing concept. They argued it would be cheaper in the long run to build or buy.

"This decision means we are unlikely to have out-county court facilities for at least another five years," added Mrs. Dumas.

## Oakway conductor to teach at Madonna

Francesco Di Blasi, conductor of the Oakway Symphony, has been engaged by Madonna College in Livonia to teach a course in conducting and performance techniques during the fall term beginning Sept. 3.

The course, open to musically advanced high school and college students, will carry two semester hours of credit. Registration should be completed before Sept. 3.

THE COURSE will consist of one lecture per week (Thursdays from 3-4 p.m.) plus 15-20 rehearsal-performance experiences.

Ten of these experiences will be with the Ladywood High School orchestra in Livonia on Mondays or

Thursdays at 10 a.m., with the remaining ones divided between the Madonna Chorale, community groups, and concert programs.

Tuition has been set at \$35 per credit hour for college students, and \$10 per credit hour for high school students. All students pay a course fee of \$10.

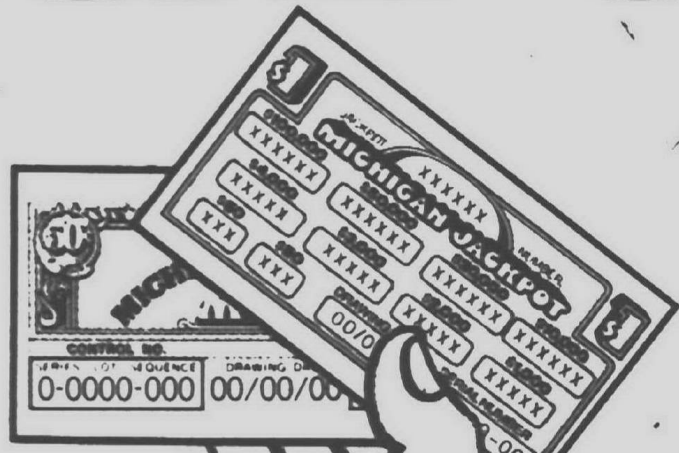

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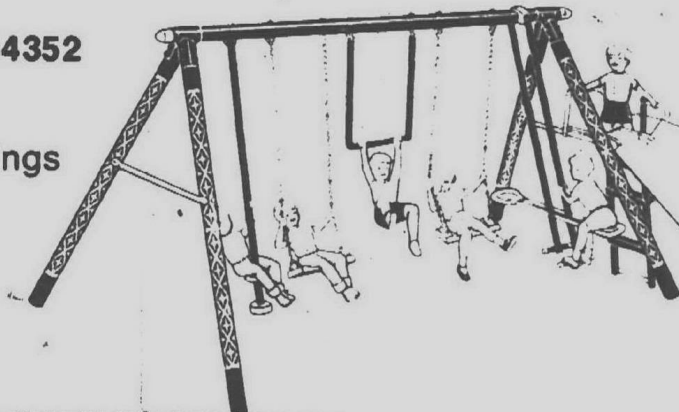
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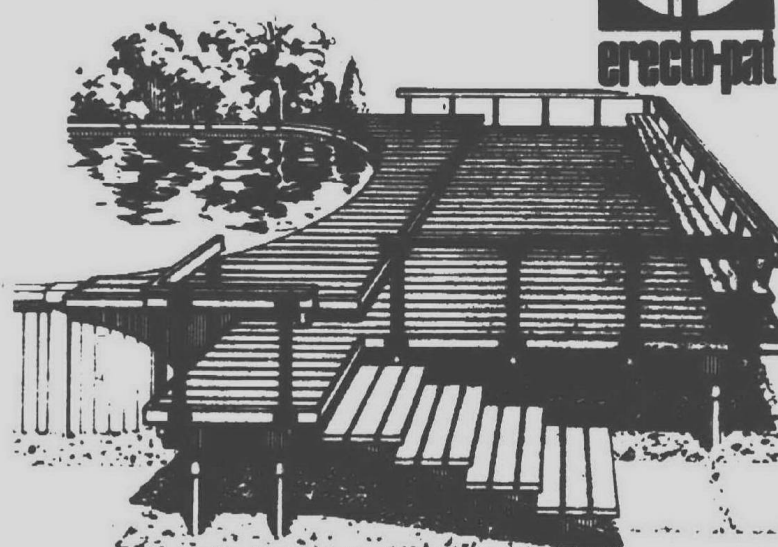
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# DUCK! — hunting season rapidly approaching

Because this was an outstanding year for birds — considering both numbers and variety — we expect it to be a horrible year for “hunters.”

Every year at this time, it seems that everyone who owns a gun takes to the fields to assert his otherwise unapparent masculinity by blasting away at trees, signs, mailboxes, sparrows, crows, and anything else that moves.

We residents of the “sticks” dread the coming of fall and anxiously pray for our children, pets, livestock, garage windows and cars — not to mention the wildlife which has delighted all spring and summer.

I’m not referring to the true sportsmen — those for example who would not even think of stalking deer with a bow and arrow — but rather I’m talking about the trigger-happy gun nuts who find it great sport just shoot up other folks’ property.

They shoot at anything that moves and a lot of things that don’t (like garages, cars, “No Hunting” signs, mailboxes and barns).

The “sportsmanship” of these inconsiderate boobies reached a new peak last weekend when two men (who must have fired 100 shots in less than two hours) blasted away at a pair of Great Blue Herons that — much to our joy — have just started nesting on our pond.

Herons are large, graceful birds. To be sitting quietly in the cattails as they fly over is quite a thrill. It’s easy when you hear their eerie squawks to imagine you’re in the Dinosaur Age and a Brontosaurus may

rear his head out of the rushes at any moment.

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources should ask the legislature to declare year round open season on these gun nuts who drive rural residents up a tree every fall and give true sportsmen a bad name.

### Bowling alley appeal tabled

WESTLAND—The Westland City Council Monday tabled a request for a bowling alley rezoning opposed by homeowners in Westland, Livonia, and the townships of Canton and Plymouth.

The attorney for Anthony Capaldi, owner of Westland Bowl, wrote the council to set a public hearing date but later asked that the decision be put off until its Aug. 15 meeting.

The developer owns 15 acres on the southeast corner of Joy and Hannan and plans to build a 50-lane bowling alley.

The Westland Planning Commission recently rejected the rezoning unanimously after hearing complaints from neighboring residents and the Canton Township Board.

They cited traffic and safety reasons for their opposition.

The Detroit Catholic Archdiocese is opposed since it owns six acres of adjacent land for a soon-to-be-built church.

The archdiocese also claimed that the developer misrepresents his intentions for the land when it sold it to him last month.

Capaldi said he told the archdiocese of his plans to build a bowling alley but the archdiocese attorney disagrees.

The land is currently zoned for single-family houses.

# The Stroller

## Good losers I have known

Perhaps it was the sight of the long faces, the keen disappointment and the bitterness of defeat noted in the camps of the losers that caused the conversation to turn to "bad" losers. This usually is the case in the aftermath of the ballot counting. More often than not the defeated candidate

is quick to alibi and place the blame on those whom he trusted only to find that they were not as loyal as had been expected. Finally, The Stroller, who has been around such camps for more years than most of the candidates, was asked:

"Did you ever see a good loser?"

It was a good question for you seldom see a 'good' loser at the close of a political campaign. But during his career along the journalistic trails, The Stroller has come across several 'good' losers—and they stick out very vividly in his memory.

One of the greatest was the late Frank J. Navin, onetime owner of the Detroit Tigers and the man for whom the stadium was named years ago. He was one of the coldest gamblers The Stroller ever encountered. For instance, there was an afternoon, years ago, when he was the guest of the

Tiger owner at the horse races in Windsor. AS THE HOURSE went to the post for the main race, Navin whispered to The Stroller who never had seen running races before, "I've got \$5,000 riding on No. 6 in this race." He said it so casually it stunned the young jour-

nalist who couldn't imagine anyone handling money so loosely. At long last the call "They're off" rent the air. Navin had his eye focused on No. 6 coming out of the starting gate, when suddenly, the jockey lost his stirrup and was automatically disqualified.

Instead of shouting criticism or letting out a string of oaths at the turn of events, Navin simply dropped his binoculars and asked the man seated next to him, "What do you like in the next race?"

He was one of the best losers The Stroller ever has seen.

Then there was the night in Philadelphia when Jack Dempsey, who had been considered invincible, lost his title to Gene Tunney in the rain.

Back in the dressing room Jack was asked, "What happened?"

"Just didn't duck often enough," came the reply.

No alibis, no lame excuses—just a simple statement that he was to blame for losing the most prized of all boxing titles.

In later years, long after he had been the victim of the long count in his second battle with Tunney, Jack gave another great example of being a "good" loser.

The Stroller happened to be sitting with him in his restaurant on Broadway when word came that Dave Barry, the referee who gave Tunney the long count had passed away.

INSTEAD OF recalling that the long count deprived him of victory, Jack said:

"He gave me the best break of my career. If he had counted Tunney out and declared me the winner, I no doubt would have stuck in the fight game until some young guy came along and knocked me out. When that happened I'd be just another washed up heavyweight. As it is, here I am on Broadway, still going strong."

To top off his feeling, Jack reached for the telephone, called Barry's wife and told her that he would pay all the funeral expenses. And he did just that.

Talk about good losers—Dempsey was the best.

The male of the species doesn't have a strangle hold on this rarity, either.

Well, The Stroller remembers a night in the big armory in Minneapolis, when Marion Ladewig, the bowling grandmother who was considered the greatest of all women bowlers, lost her all-star title to Merle Matthews, of Los Angeles, in the final frame.

Marion never had been beaten in the All-Star, but when defeat did come, she was a champion. She walked over to her conqueror, shook hands and wished her luck. No rancor, no alibi, no placing the blame on others.

Turning to the members of the press who were anxious for her statement, Marion simply said: "I needed that final strike and gave it all I had. The ball hit the 13 pocket, but the pins just didn't fall."

Spoken like the true champion she was.

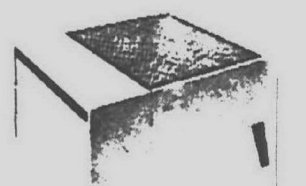

## Canton nixes PUD

CANTON—Township trustees have reaffirmed a planning commission denial to approve Warren Manor planned unit development (PUD) south of Warren, between Canton Center and Beck roads until the multiple units are withdrawn.

Appearing before the board were developers Gerald Richter and Robert Rosin. Both men argued that the planning commission action of Aug. 7 was unfair because the PUD met all the guidelines required by the township.

Denial was based on the fact, the two men said, that the planning commission felt there shouldn't be any multiples on the western side of Canton Center Rd.

A similar instance occurred when developers for the present Sunflower Village (formerly Mayflower Village) sought approval for a PUD directly to the north and later eliminated the multiples from the development.

Rosin noted that Warren Manor development had been approved by Planning Consultant Michael Manore.

Rosin argued that the development was "perfect" for a PUD because the multiples buttressed a commercial area from the single family units on the 105-acre site.

PLYMOUTH—Dr. Lee E. Feldkamp of Plymouth was named "family physician of the year" by the Michigan Academy of Family Physicians recently at its annual meeting in Traverse City.

Dr. Feldkamp, who is Michigan delegate to the American Academy of Family Physicians, moved to Plymouth from Detroit in 1952. He has been city health commissioner since that time.

The University of Michigan medical school graduate received a plaque citing his "unswerving allegiance to the medical profession as a whole and to family practice in particular."

# How Toastmasters function

PLYMOUTH—Have you a desire to climb the ladder of success? Perhaps you're a junior executive who would like to become a corporate president, or an editor who would like to become a newspaper publisher.

Whatever a man's professional desires may be, the Toastmasters Club can help him achieve them.

To many, the Toastmasters are somewhat of a mystery. Four members of the Plymouth Toastmasters Club—Sherrill Corey, Neil Smith, Bill Helsper and L.L. Lane—took the time recently to help clear up that mystery.

Toastmasters International is a non-profit, non-partisan, educational organization of Toastmasters clubs throughout the world. The first club was formed in October 1924, by Dr. Ralph C. Smedley of Santa Ana, Calif., now the world headquarters for Toastmasters International.

The purpose of Toastmasters is to provide its members a professionally-designed program to improve their abilities in communication and to de-

velop their leadership and executive potential.

Members have the opportunity to deliver prepared speeches and impromptu talks, learn parliamentary procedure, conference and committee leadership and participation techniques, and then to be evaluated by fellow Toastmasters.

Corey, Smith, Helsper and Lane provided a more detailed explanation of Toastmasters, focusing on the Plymouth club.

Called the Motor City Speakeasy, the Plymouth club was formed in 1953. Meetings are held the second and fourth Monday of every month in the Hillside Inn on Plymouth Road.

A social hour begins at 6:30 p.m. with dinner at 7 and the program at 8.

A 20th anniversary charter party is scheduled for October in Hillside and charter members are invited to attend. The club will announce details at a later date.

Programs consist of a prepared speech by a member and impromptu table talks. All members have a chance to participate at every meeting.

There are currently 27 active mem-

bers in the Plymouth club, with a maximum membership of 40 by charter rule. The club draws members from Plymouth, Livonia, Westland, Garden City, Redford and Northville. Club dues include the \$11 initiation fee and an annual membership fee of \$20.

Membership is open to anyone and although the international program has approved the acceptance of women into the club, it is up to the individual clubs whether to admit them.

The Plymouth club last year voted down a proposal to admit women, although there were no women applicants at the time.

Corey, Smith, Helsper and Lane say that if a woman were to apply, the club would have to take another vote on her acceptance. They were quick to point out, however, that there is a Toastmistress Club.

They urged interested persons to drop by one of the meetings at the Hillside. Procedure requires attendance at two meetings before signing a form to join. At the second meeting, the prospective member pays his initiation fee and first six months dues. At the third meeting he is officially inducted as a member.

There are two club manuals each member completes as part of his training. The basic manual consists of 15 assignments and requires about two years for completion. Members are allowed, however, to go at their own pace.

Assignments, which get progressively harder, cover various aspects of speech making, organization of thoughts, control of timing, etc.

Typical club programs give members the opportunity to pass assignments by delivering prepared speeches of five to seven minutes. Time for such speeches must be requested in advance, in order to give all members the opportunity to deliver speeches.

Following every speech, another member gives an oral evaluation of the speech. If the speaker has met the requirements and done a good job, he will be passed on to the next assignment. If not, he must try the same assignment again.

After a member completes the basic manual he is given a certificate and after he completes the advanced manual he is given the title of "Able Toastmaster." Smith is the only Able Toastmaster in the Plymouth club.

There is also a table topics time at every meeting which consists of impromptu speeches on subjects determined by the chairman. This gives

every member a chance to participate.

Toastmasters also provide community services. The Plymouth club recently completed a youth leadership program with Junior Achievement. The club has also worked with the Jaycees, Welcome Wagon, the Lions Club and the Livonia Mall arts and crafts exhibit.

Corey, Smith, Helsper and Lane agree that the most important problem the club faces is membership loss.

"Many members, particularly the younger ones, become so proficient in their jobs as a result of Toastmasters, that they're soon promoted."

This, in turn, may necessitate a move out of the area, or in some cases it means a promotion to the top and the member may feel he no longer needs Toastmasters. After all, how much higher can you go than the top?

Corey, Smith, Helsper and Lane feel, however, that Toastmasters is a continual program of self-improvement and that there's always something to be learned.

They invite interested persons to attend the next meeting at the Hillside, adding that they won't turn anyone away—including women.

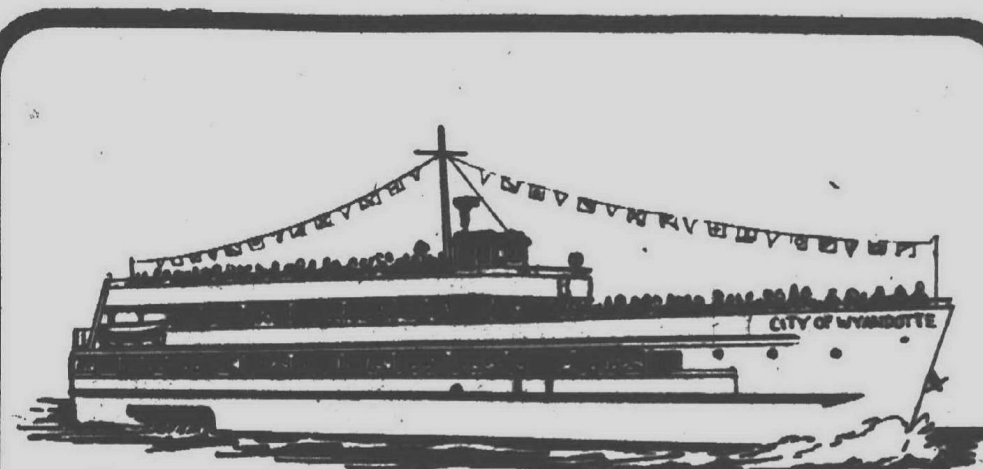

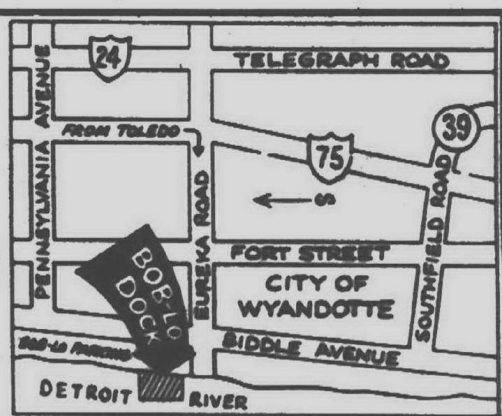
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# BINGO—a charming pastime for many

WESTLAND—They come with their cushions, markers, good luck charms and "doppers."

From all age groups, both sexes and every political ideology, they come to Westland's Wayne Ford Civic League hall three times a week with hopes of getting rich on a letter and a number in America's greatest participant sport—bingo.

They even let non-Catholics in.

THE OLD pros and the newcomers go at it on Monday and Wednesday evenings and Tuesday afternoons in the hall with proceeds aiding local pediatrics and geriatrics via the Civic League's Little League baseball and senior citizen programs.

Players range from the idle curious to the thoroughly hooked.

Philosophical, moral and social statutes are thrown by the wayside when

the golden haired caller pulls up the microphone to begin the day's opening "kwikkee" rounds.

The multitude hushes, pulls out its "doppers" (permanent liquid marking pens) and then it's strictly business for the next three hours.

Conversation is limited to dire physical emergency and an occasional muttered undeleted expletive when the round's dream is shattered by the distant familiar cry of another winner.

AMONG THE strangest caught up in the bingo mystique are those who depend on good luck charms to bring the winners in.

Mrs. Elizabeth Bradberry, who drives in every Tuesday from Ypsilanti, is one patron who uses synthetic charms to ward off the evil spirit of the wrong number.

Her two plastic green and pink gnomes resemble old memories of a bad nightmare or a worse morning after.

"They don't always work," she will admit in a weak moment.

But she does claim the two grotesque talismans come through often enough to keep her ahead of the game while playing six nights a week.

BUT THE real pro of the Westland circuit has to be Mrs. Marian Garzu who plays 30 cards at one time and plays nine times a week barring serious illness, severe injury or death in the immediate family.

"I have devoted my entire life to bingo," she says without as much as blinking an eye.

"I have a disease known as bingitis and there's no cure. But if there was cure I wouldn't take it."

Mrs. Garzu is nothing less than an artist at work when the numbers are called. Her eyes scan down the five rows of six cards each searching for match and never missing a number while other mere mortals struggle to keep pace with three rows of four cards.

As if she didn't have enough problems with the 30 cards, Mrs. Garzu communicates with a little green plastic frog in between calls. She keeps the frog front and center for pressure situations.

When it comes down to one number on one card in a big game, she snatches the frog from its perch and places it directly over the number on

the card, thereby increasing her chances for success.

"BINGO IS the greatest thing there is. I've made thousands of friends through bingo. I believe bingitis is a fine disease."

"I raised my kids and now I don't have that many responsibilities. My husband is glad to get me out of the house. So I play bingo. Is there anything wrong with that?"

Mrs. Dorothy Cornelius of Westland takes things less seriously but is just as consistent in her attendance at the Tuesday afternoon Westland game.

"I do this every Tuesday to get out of the house and relax for a while. The people here are really nice and the food is great. (A \$1 smorgasbord is the standard meal.) This really isn't gambling—it's pleasure," she says.

Mrs. Cornelius displays a few quirks of her own. She usually carries one half of a four-leaf clover to the bingo game. She also admits to once wrapping 24 four-leaf clovers in waxed paper for a game.

Although she claims to have made money at that particular game, apparently the profit margin was not sufficient to warrant a wholesale strafing of the lawn to repeat the experiment.

ONE REGULAR player who has gone the frog-gnome-clover route with-

out success is Mrs. John Brook of Detroit who has accepted the numerical facts against winning consistently in stoic tradition.

"I've sat next to people who have won a lot of money but I never have. Of course, I hope to win, but I'm not disappointed when I don't."

THE MASTER of the Civic League games is Mrs. Alberta Thomas who devotes fulltime to the bingo game on a volunteer basis. "This is a habit for many of these people. It is their only real form of entertainment. If we start running late, though, there's an awful rush of people when we finish who have to go to another game somewhere else. "We have to get here early on Tuesdays because they start coming in for the noon game at 8:30 a.m. and sit in their favorite chairs all morning just to make sure nobody else will sit there."

In spite of the obvious eccentricities of some of the patrons, Mrs. Thomas and her staff of 15 volunteers who keep the numbers rolling say they find the work rewarding.

Sure. Just don't sit in anyone's "reserved" seat, talk when the numbers are being called or mess with those nasty green gnomes and you'll fit in just fine.

# Recount looms in 2nd for Pierce, Reuther

A recount seemed almost certain in a down-to-the-wire race between Dr. Ed Pierce and John Reuther in the 2nd Congressional District Democratic primary.

Pierce, an Ann Arbor physician, rolled up such an overwhelming lead on his home turf that he wiped out the margins Reuther built up in the Monroe and western Wayne County portions of the sprawling district.

Republican incumbent Marvin Esch of Ann Arbor was unopposed in his party's primary. (From Washington, Esch Tuesday announced that because President Nixon "admitted to

an impeachable offense, I will cast my vote for impeachment.")

Fewer than 100 votes separated Pierce and Reuther in the five-way Democratic tussle, but the incompleteness of some tabulations left the result in doubt. The total seemed likely to top the 1972 primary, which also was a battle between a liberal Ann Arbor candidate, Walter Shapiro, and Livonian Marvin Stempien, who won by carrying the rest of the district.

UNOFFICIAL TOTALS showed Reuther carrying western Wayne County by 4,233 to Pierce's 1,886. Reuther also won Monroe by 3,991 to 1,304, giving him approximately a 5,000 vote lead.

But Pierce built up his own 5,000 vote lead in Washtenaw County. The totals of both candidates were nearly 13,000.

Trailing were Mrs. Marjorie Lansing, an Eastern Michigan University political scientist; Ronald W. Egnor, Ypsilanti attorney; and Theo Williams, Ypsilanti engineer. Egnor's poor showing was surprising because his campaign was well financed.

Pierce, at first given little chance because of his liberalism and lighter financing, put on an astonishing surge in the final weeks of the campaign. The medical clinic chief and former Ann Arbor councilman had emphasized youth, poverty and minority group issues, which have never been known to charm suburban and rural voters.

Reuther, a political professional who had worked on the McGovern presidential campaign and as a congressional aide, was a newcomer to Michigan politics although he was born here and his family's name is revered in organized labor circles.

In Livonia, with 58 of 60 precincts counted, Reuther had 3,340, Pierce 1,066, Mrs. Lansing 883, Egnor 824 and Williams 225.

In the City of Plymouth, complete returns gave Reuther only 128, Pierce 305, Mrs. Lansing 65, Egnor 56 and Williams 21.

Plymouth Township returns were unavailable because poll workers sent their results to the county clerk's office without counting their own congressional and legislative totals.

A REPUBLICAN crossover seemed a strong possibility because more than 41,000 votes were cast in this off-year Democratic primary compared

The Nankin Mills Nature Center's iguana is back, says Mary Ellsworth of the center staff.

"We have been asked by many, many youngsters who come here if we got the pet back — and we have," she said.

The pet iguana made the news in July when it was found in Redford Township by two startled teenagers. It was returned to the center by Redford dog warden Max King.

The reptile had apparently been stolen from the center sometime in May and then turned loose. It was returned without part of its tail, which will grow back, Mrs. Ellsworth said.

The center is currently building a new cage for the reptile.

The nature center is located in the historic Nankin Mills building at 33175 Ann Arbor Trail, Westland (near Hines Drive). The center was once a grist mill, later a Ford Motor Co. factory and now a refuge for a variety of native animals.

Center hours are 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Sunday. The building is maintained by the parks division of the Wayne County Road Commission.

# Schoolcraft trustees to confer with state board on planning issue

Hoping to smoke the peace pipe, the State Board of Public Junior and Community Colleges has requested a meeting with the president and board of trustees of Schoolcraft College.

Dr. C. Nelson Grote, president of the college, has asked members of the state board to join his own board at a dinner Sept. 11 before the pow-wow.

"This is the first time the state board has met at Schoolcraft," said Dr. Grote. "We are pleased to host them. We think it will be to our advantage to have them on our campus to see what it is like."

Dr. Grote anticipates that the principal issue under discussion will be a desire on the part of the state board to have Schoolcraft plan and coordinate its academic program on a Wayne County basis, possibly having in mind there should be one community college system in Wayne County.

Were this to be done, the college would be doing its planning solely with Wayne County, Highland Park and Henry Ford community colleges. However, Schoolcraft is interested in doing its planning on a regional basis, which would include five counties in addition to Wayne.

"OUR BOARD OF TRUSTEES is dead set in favor of regional rather than county planning," said Dr. Grote, referring to a resolution passed by the board May 29 supporting the idea.

Reasons for its support are the fact that the Schoolcraft district lies within three counties and that it also serves students from other counties. These students then enter the labor market of the entire southeastern Michigan area.

In addition, the college has long supported such regional organizations such as SEMCOG and SEMTA plus the Southeastern Michigan League of Community Colleges (SEMLOCC).

THE MAY RESOLUTION asked that Schoolcraft's president "go beyond the recommendation of the State Board for Public Community and Junior Colleges and cooperate in the articulation and program development and implementation on a regional basis to include the counties of Genesee, Monroe, Macomb, St. Clair, Washtenaw, and Wayne, currently represented in SEMLOCC."

"We hope this meeting will give us a chance to build stronger ties with this group," said Dr. Grote. "Most of them don't know our board and we don't know them. Anytime you get better acquainted, you enhance the possibility for better communication."

Although pleased with the U.S. Supreme Court decision against cross-district busing in the Detroit area, Rep. William D. Ford (D-Mich) said he plans to continue the fight for legislation to prevent the issue from arising again.

"The court's ruling has apparently ended the threat of busing in the Detroit suburbs but it does not prohibit federal courts in Michigan or elsewhere from ordering cross-district busing in the future to achieve racial balance in public schools."

Ford, a member of the House Education and Labor Committee, served on a joint House-Senate Conference Committee which recently met for several weeks to iron out differences between House and Senate versions of education legislation containing anti-busing provisions. The conference report is now enroute to President Nixon for signature.

Ford noted the supreme court ruling had fulfilled a prediction he made in October 1971, shortly after the forced busing was first proposed in the Detroit area.

At that time he stated: "The only real answer to the anguish and concern about possible mass busing of their children will be found when the debate is moved from the heat of overcrowded gymnasiums into the cool of a courtroom where the Constitution and the rule of law will determine the outcome of the issue, rather than passion, hatred, fear or political opportunism."

Saying that, as he predicted, the supreme court applied logic and reason to the case, he concluded, "The court has not, however, ruled out the possibility of forced cross-district busing in other areas."

"That is why I will continue my fight to establish by law the concept of neighborhood schools under local control. At the same time, we must redouble our efforts to increase federal funding for local school districts so that we can ensure quality education

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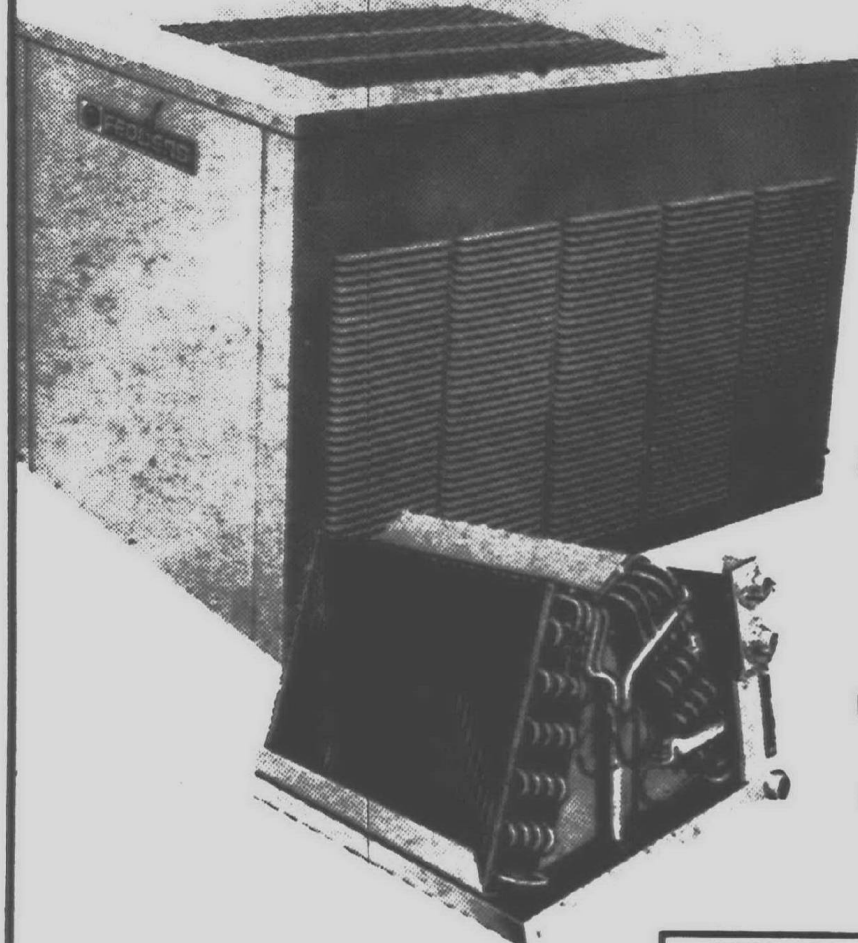
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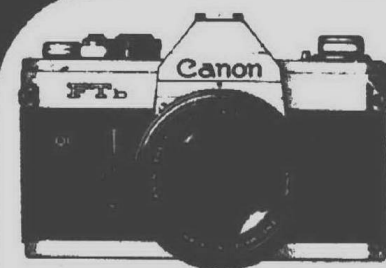
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# Rouge Parkway extension is fought by City of Wayne

A committee of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners is considering rules changes in two county parks and perhaps a complete halt in the development of another due to complaints about rowdiness.

Charges of unruly behavior and intoxication in parks in Belleville, Hamtramck and the City of Wayne are under review by the Board of Commissioners' public works committee.

The committee scheduled an Aug. 7 meeting between the sheriff, the County Road Commission and Belleville and Hamtramck police officials to discuss control of drinking in Belleville's Victory Park and the Hamtramck Veterans Memorial Park.

Both cities have asked for a ban on all alcoholic beverages in the parks. All county parks are administered by the Road Commission.

However, three of the six public

works committee members and the sheriff expressed concern about penalizing the law-abiding by banning alcohol in county parks. Sheriff William Lucas proposed stepped-up law enforcement instead.

THE COMMITTEE has also called for a conference between City of Wayne officials and county and state authorities to decide on a proposed extension of the Lower Rouge Parkway into Wayne.

Representatives from Wayne, the State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the road commission will meet "sometime within the next two weeks," said Commissioner Brian G. Arrowsmith (D-Canton Township).

Arrowsmith proposed the meeting during a Public Works Committee session on July 30, attended by Wayne Mayor Patrick Norton, six other city

councilmen and numbers of others opposing the parkway extension.

The proposed development was planned with \$250,000 of DNR recreational bond money and would be administered by the parks and parkways division of the roads agency.

Mainly because of alleged teenage misbehavior, Wayne citizens prefer that the intended development be dropped altogether, said Arrowsmith. "They don't want it; it's that simple." The proposed development is part of a master parkway plan paralleling Michigan Avenue through Wayne, Inkster and Van Buren Township.

TWO YEARS AGO, Wayne city officials approved the plan for additional baseball diamonds, a parking lot and restrooms. But since then, residents have grown unhappy with teenage congregations in another park adjacent to the proposed one.

Homeowners near the proposed site fear that another park would create one more unwanted gathering place for rowdy youngsters, said Mayor Norton. "The social behavior of teenagers has changed within the last few years," he claimed, referring to reports of drinking, drug abuse and other disturbances.

"We are finding it enormously difficult to control these youngsters," added Norton. "As our park system spreads, we must also spread our law enforcement, including our own police

force as well as the sheriff's department."

Norton and Edward Lecker, spokesman for about 25 Wayne citizens also at the public works committee meeting, said the community would now prefer the proposed site be left in its natural state.

"While we think the idea of a parkway was a brilliant idea when it was conceived, we believe now that roads should not be built through the few remaining natural areas," Lecker stated.

"We probably already have more park space per capita than any other community in Wayne County. We don't need more recreational space if it threatens problems."

COUNTY SHERIFF William Lucas proposed that his deputies first try to assist local police in controlling drinking problems before the parks rules are changed in Belleville and Hamtramck.

Also objecting to a ban on alcohol were Commissioners Michael E. Murray (D-Detroit), Paul Silver (D-Detroit) and Ervin A. Steiner Jr. (R-Grosse Pointe Farms). They said a ban on all alcohol would deprive the majority because of actions of a very few.

Others on the Public Works Committee include John Lesinski (D-Dearborn), chairman; James DeSana (D-Wyandotte), vice chairman; and Edgar L. Harris (D-Taylor).

## Commission allocates funds for seniors

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners has allocated \$45,000 for the first of a possible network of multi-service senior citizens centers.

The money was earmarked for renovation of a vacant, three-story building on the grounds of Wayne County General Hospital in Westland.

County Commissioner Tom F. Taylor (D-Westland), who proposed the center, hailed its approval as "the beginning of a new era of comprehensive services for the most neglected segment of our population."

TAYLOR, who presented the idea to federal officials, said he anticipated federal and state grants would help underwrite the estimated \$100,000 annual operating cost.

The center will be housed in Building J, which has 61,525 feet of usable space. The building has been vacant since the recent transfer of state mental patients to state hospitals.

Taylor is chairman of the board's human resources committee which oversees programs for the elderly. He said the center will serve as the model which, if successful, will be the forerunner of a countywide network as funds become available.

He emphasized that any senior citizen living in Wayne County will be welcome at the Westland Center.

THE CENTER should be in operation later this year, Taylor added.

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# When does it pay to draw benefits?

Recent increases in social security benefits, now tied to the cost of living, plus Congressional action to strengthen and protect private pension plans, have improved the outlook for America's elderly.

But in spite of the improvements, relatively few elderly people are so well fixed financially they don't have to watch their pennies.

**TO HELP THEM,** a panel of CPAs was assigned to compile the various benefits and options available to persons of retirement age.

Following are some of the panel's findings, assembled with the cooperation of various federal agencies.

The biggest single contributor to the average senior citizen's income is social security. For most men and women past working age, the monthly social security check goes a long way toward helping keep body and soul together.

You don't have to wait until you are 65 to begin drawing social security benefits. You can apply as early as age 62, in which case the benefits will be less because of the extension of time over which they will be paid.

Early retirement is advantageous up to a point, the point being age 77. That's when the benefits received by the person who retires at age 65 catch up with and pull ahead of those paid to the age-62 retiree.

Conversely, if instead of retiring early you continue working beyond 65, your ultimate social security benefits will increase one per cent for each additional year of work, up to seven per cent at age 72. At 72 you begin to collect the full social security benefits to which you are entitled, even if you go on working.

**MANY RETIRED** persons work part-time to supplement diminished incomes.

If you work throughout the year, you can draw full social security pay-

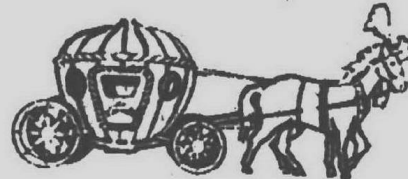

ments before age 72 only if your annual earnings are \$2,400 or less. For every dollar above that your benefits are reduced by 50 cents. Thus, if you earn \$3,000, your earnings are \$600 over the limit and your social security payments are reduced by half that amount, or \$300.

If you work only intermittently, the situation is different. Then the benefits are decreased only when monthly earnings exceed \$200. Thus it is possible to earn much more than \$2,400 for work performed during part of the year and still receive full benefits for those periods in which earnings don't exceed \$200 per month.

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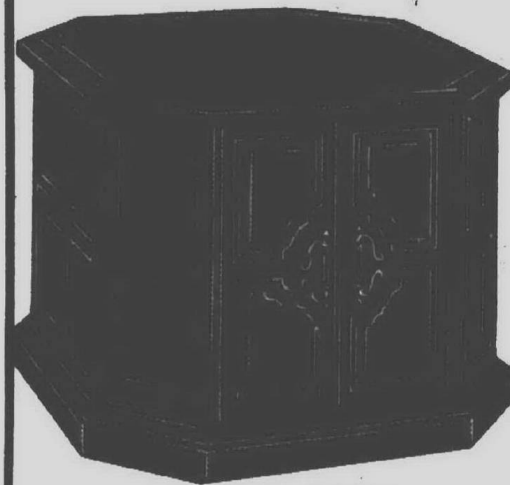
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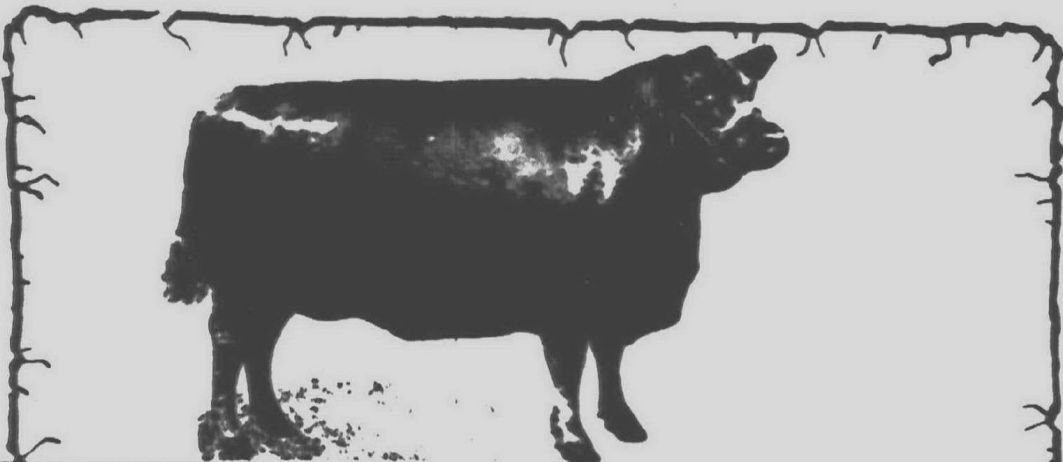

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# Bike size makes a big difference

Only two hours into our most recent bicycling adventure, a fellow cyclist, who was riding a borrowed bike too small for his 6-foot-2 body frame, was totally exhausted.

We were pedaling down Seven Mile Road on our way to Whitmore Lake, just north of Ann Arbor, when he stopped us. Unfortunately, his exhaustion brought our regular freewheeling adventure on a beautiful afternoon to a quick end.

Our friend, an experienced rider, would be the first to tell you that a proper fitting bike means maximum riding comfort and power.

To help you achieve that, just a few hints before buying or riding your bike.

Buy a bike that is the proper frame size. If you can comfortably straddle the crossbar, then it is a good fit. There should be no binding in this area. Preferably, when straddling the bike, there should be no more than two inches from inseam to the crossbar.

Before setting off on those longer trips, check your handlebars and seat for proper adjustment.

The straight touring handlebars do not afford maximum comfort during

the longer rides. The rider using these bars becomes tired more quickly because riding straight stretches out the cyclist's back.

On the other hand, when correctly adjusted, dropped handlebars allow a cyclist a maximum variety of positions depending on the various riding conditions.

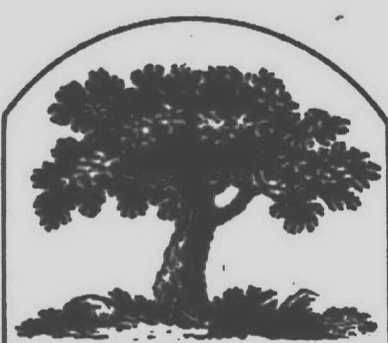
With this type of handlebar, steering control increases and breathing rhythm becomes easier because the rider uses the power in his shoulders and arms rather than his back.

The best position for dropped handlebars is just about level with the seat tip.

STRADDLE HEIGHT is also important and determines the height your seat should be.

Most riding experts say the perfect height is when you are able to sit on the seat, with the heel of your foot straight out on the down pedal, so that when you are riding with the ball of your foot on the pedal, your leg will not be quite straight.

If the seat is too low, there will be too much bending of the knees. If too high, there will be a strain on the legs. Riding with either of these improper positions creates more work to complete the pedal cycle, not allowing

you to attain full riding power and comfort.

Hand in hand with the proper straddle height is the proper riding technique. The best method of pedaling is called anking.

Once you cadence your riding with this method you will increase your pedal power and efficiency.

To use anking, squarely place the balls of your feet on the pedals and stroke with even down turns. On the up pedal the heel should be slightly lower than the toe. On the down pedal, the toe should be lower and the heel up.

Toe clips and rattrap pedals make pedaling easier because they prevent

the feet from slipping into an arch or flatfoot position.

TIRES ARE important during your riding adventures. Check your tire pressure and maintain them at the recommended pressures marked on the tires.

Riding on an overinflated tire can cause a blowout. Traveling over rough surfaces on underinflated tires can bend the rim or ruin the tire.

There are two kinds of tires: clinchers and tubulars.

Clinchers are heavier and more durable than tubulars. They are used on all kinds of road surfaces and consist of an inner tube and outer tire that fit right into U-shaped clincher rims.

A tubular is a round inner tube and tire sewn right into a tubular rim. These tires are preferred by many experienced touring riders because they are lighter and easier to change. In about 20 seconds, a flat tubular can be replaced: Pull off the old, flat tire, put glue on the rim and place in the new tubular. It is that simple.

Probably the best tires to use in the city and for all-around riding are clinchers. They can take the rougher roads and the commuting through city streets.

IF YOU ARE considering buying a bike, don't just go out and buy one without first looking around. Go to a

reputable bike dealer and tell him the price range of the bike you want. A good dealer will usually recommend a bike that will fit your requirements—from price and size to make and quality.

Getting the best quality bike for your money requires some technical knowledge, and he is the one who has it.

If you are leery of dealers, buy a copy of "The Complete Buyer's Guide to Bicycles" published by Service Communications, Ltd.

It is well worth the \$2 investment and contains reviews and specifications on almost all quality brand U.S. and import bikes from \$30 to \$750.

There are chapters on safety rules, regulations, touring, repairs, racing and accessories.

# Sipping and slurping the chocolate soda

Ever since I editorialized on the demise of the chocolate soda a while back, challenges have been forth coming to drop the other straw and test my premise.

Not exactly an unpleasant duty, but highly caloric. Many sodas and umpteen calories later, I can testify that there are good, bad and indifferent sodas.

The price ranges from 50 to 75 cents and quality and quantity are not one and the same.

Strohs ice cream parlor, 15 Mile and Lahser, has a charming atmosphere if you avoid times when there are several hundred kids ahead of you in line. Tables in the ice cream parlor are surrounded by posters, knick-knacks, penants and stuffed animals.

Strohs 70-cent soda is made with one large scoop of ice cream blopped into a liquid of about half a cup of chocolate milk and bubbly fizz.

Sodas made with chocolate milk are rated indifferent because the pleasant, bittersweet combination of chocolate, fizz and ice cream loses its piquancy with the addition of chocolate milk. Too much like an unstirred milk shake.

Farrell's Ice Cream Parlor is on Southfield between 12 and 13 Mile.

Nice atmosphere if you like having your slurping accompanied by a big bass drum. Didn't see the soda made, but it arrived with a large hunk of ice cream perched in the rim of the glass. The bubbles had fallen (as in cake) to about halfway down the inside. Too sweet, but I don't know why. Price for regular size is 75 cents, 95 cents for the supers.

CLOVERDALE Dairy in Plymouth offers the cheapest soda.

If economy is your bag, this one made with chocolate milk and two big scoops of ice cream is the winner. Not enough class to the atmosphere if you're trying to impress a date. Groceries are sold at one end of the store and hamburgers and onions fried at the other.

It doesn't hurt the soda flavor which wasn't there to begin with.

Howard Johnson, 10 Mile and Evergreen, makes a lot of sodas. In fact, the Sunday evening we were sampling, they were being turned out in a production line.

In the absence of a clean-up crew the overflow on the counter was testimony to the large number. Ours began right in front of us with a small dipper of chocolate in the bottom of the big funnel shaped glass to which milk and soft fizz was added. Next

came the harder fizz to bubble it up to the top. A big pyramid of ice cream is placed on the top of the glass covering the entire rim and slopping down over the outside.

Add whipped cream and a hand placed cherry and you have HJ's 75-cent special.

IF YOU LIKE your ice cream and liquid mixed early in the game, the challenge with HJ's soda is to squash the top into the glass. As any young physics student knows, mass added to total volume equals soda juice all over the table.

But my research did net one good chocolate soda.

At Sanders store, Newburgh Plaza, Livonia, the sign above the ice cream counter says, "the original chocolate soda, 70 cents."

Whether it is really the original or not, I can't be sure. But, soda lovers, it is without any doubt the best, and the store rates A for attractive atmosphere, too.

Things looked promising from the moment the young waitress grabbed a long handle spoon to stir a bit of coffee cream into the chocolate syrup in the bottom. She kept stirring as she added the bubbly and then one dip of ice cream. She pumped fizz to within

an inch or so of the top and added another scoop of ice cream.

Not as big as some of the others, but palatewise it walks off with the honors.

## Wide framing is inflation fighter

A \$10.3 billion program to pump new life into the sagging housing industry is under way. The effort is designed to aid middle-income Americans in securing mortgage financing for the purchase of new homes.

Of the \$10.3 billion in additional mortgage money, \$3.3 billion of Federal Housing Administration and Veterans Administration financing will be available under the so-called tandem plan at an interest of eight per cent.

Prospective home buyers fortunate enough to get a tandem plan mort-

gage will be paying interest charges well below the current rate of nine per cent or more.

ANOTHER \$3 BILLION will be used to provide 8.75 per cent mortgages for prospective home buyers not eligible for FHA or VA mortgages.

The remaining \$4 billion will go to savings and loan associations to increase their supply of funds for conventional home loans.

In announcing the program, President Nixon said, "These are positive

steps, but the best long-range solution to the housing problem is to conquer the inflation problem."

PROSPECTIVE home buyers may not be aware of its notes Western Wood Products Association, but there is a way to battle inflation when building a new home.

Ask your builder about Mod 24, a system that calls for spacing wall studs, floor joists and roof trusses at 24-inch intervals instead of the customary 16 inches. This method can trim up to \$400 from the cost of a new home.

If window and door openings are planned to fit the 24-inch modules, the savings are even greater.

These savings are achieved because less lumber, time and labor are required to finish a framing job using the Mod 24 system.

Home buyers need not fear about the structural stability of Mod 24.

Tests in actual houses have demonstrated that the use of western wood in 24-inch framing is structurally sound.

## Wayne County leads in farm accidents

Wayne County, the most urban county in the state, led Michigan in farm equipment accidents in 1973, according to State Police records.

And this week has been designated National Farm Safety Week to help promote farm safety, and all farmers are being urged by the Michigan Crop Reporting Service to become more safety conscious.

Police records show that 393 farm equipment accidents happened on Michigan roadways last year. Accidents involving farm equipment were more common in the southern half of the lower peninsula. About 92 per cent of farm mishaps occurred in this region of the state.

Motorists are urged to watch for slow moving farm vehicles on the highways while farmers are being asked to use caution when entering roadways.

The larvae of the elm leaf beetle are actively feeding on the leaves of elm trees in late July. They can weaken the trees and make them susceptible to serious disease attack, such as Dutch Elm Disease, Root Rot, and Verticillium. The adult beetle can become a nuisance in the fall and spring.

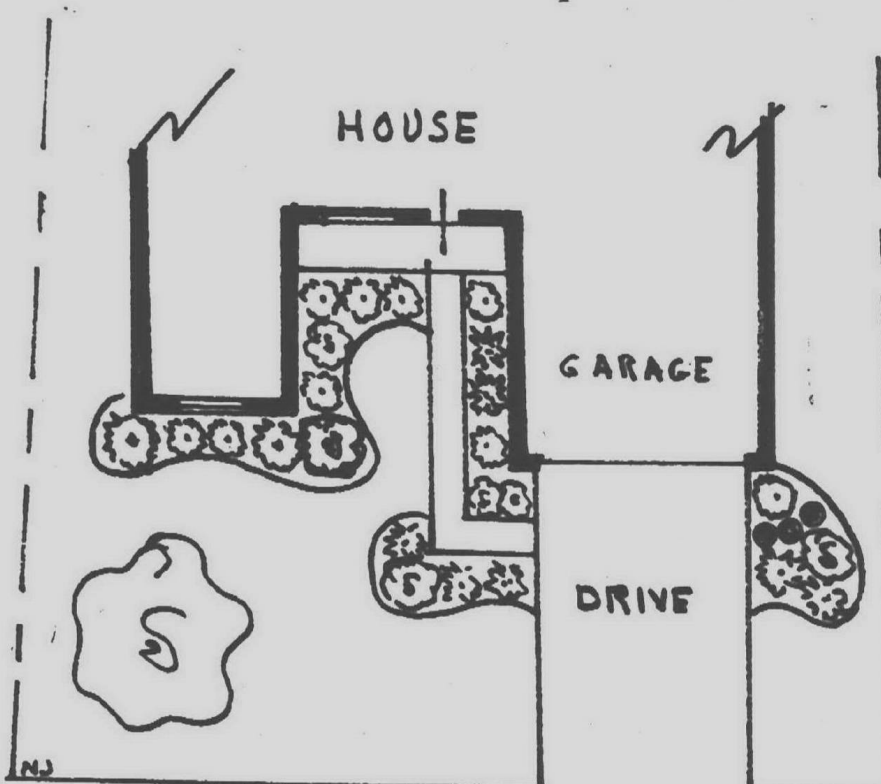
They move into sheltered areas in and around the home in the fall, through winter, and then in the spring, move to the trees, where they cut circular holes in the leaves with their feeding.

For control, spray the larvae now with 50 per cent Wettable Sevin.

# Do your own thing in interior decorating

## Home & Garden

"Considering the myriad products and numerous decorating options available in the home furnishings world today, creating an 'indoor world' can be one of the most exciting and satisfying experiences any home-maker can have," says Louisa Cowan. Mrs. Cowan, an interior designer for a manufacturer of floor and wall coverings, offers some useful advice to would-be home decorators.

**BUDGET**-Set up a budget for the complete decorating job with approximate cost for each product category. Consider how to use the furnishings you already own. Some items may be reupholstered or repainted to fit the new room design. Also, consider doing some of the projects yourself. There is an increas-

ing interest in do-it-yourself because of the number of high-style products available in a form you can install yourself.

**SCHEME**-Consider your lifestyle. To "do your own thing" so that you can live comfortably with it is the essence of good taste. A room must satisfy the eye, the psyche and practical living needs; and this means carefully evaluating things like where your family will be spending most of its time. Let your surroundings reflect your tastes, collections, hobbies and color preferences.

**COLOR**-When it comes to decorating, there is no tool that will overcome architectural flaws. Determine which colors in room won't be or can't be changed. Then as-

semble swatches of existing items and choose new colors based on your taste and courage.

Remember that color enlarges, contracts, unifies and harmonizes. With color you can call attention to almost anything in the room setting the stage for an important focal area or a treasured bibelot or accessory.

When you decide on a color scheme be sure to carry colors and fabric swatches with you.

**MINI FLOOR PLAN**-Experiment with furniture arrangements. This is the time to correct traffic lane faults and improve conversation areas. Make cutouts of existing pieces and the furniture you plan to buy. Place major pieces first on the room scaled to size on graph paper, then the auxiliary pieces. **CARPET**-You should choose a carpet based on the kind of performance you expect, which, in turn, is based on where the carpet is to be used.

The amount of traffic, the number of children and pets and the room's function should all be considered.

In considering performance, construction (shag, plush, level loop etc.) is just as important as fiber. If you don't know enough about the technical aspects of carpet to be confident, try to select a reputable brand name from a retailer you trust.

**FLOORS**-Now it's possible to be practical as well as beautiful. From a bright, shiny no-wax floor to a wide variety of do-it-yourself tiles, the right floor can spark the design of any room.

The larger scale patterns make snappy kitchens. Natural and crafted-look floors duplicate slate, tile, brick and pebbles. All are perfect for family or rec rooms.

Texture, too, has become an important addition to resilient floors, and many floors have patterns that are deeply embossed for design realism.

**CEILINGS**-The ceiling is an important part of your indoor world. Apart from the important acoustical value of ceilings in fighting noise pollution, there is the exciting decorator dimension in pattern on the ceiling.

Time was when a tiled ceiling meant an area of squares. Now there are tiles designed to achieve a monolithic look which are easy to put up yourself with several installation options.

There are patterns that fit any room's motif, from Mediterranean to Early American decor. Decorating, to a great extent, is

highly individualistic. It should be seasoned to personal preferences, and well executed to personal tastes.

How you approach the decorating dilemma depends a great deal on your attitude, according to Mrs. Cowan.

"A room that's prepared with love, care and imagination is what home decorating is all about."



**The Green Thumb**  
By GEORGE ABRAHAM

If your tomato plants or squash vines have tiny white flies on them, get out the dishwashing detergent and spray for this pest.

White flies are a sucking insect which congregates on the undersides of the leaves. At temperatures of 85 degrees F. the life cycle of this pest is about two weeks, which means a new batch can hatch out immediately after you kill off the adults.

Sprays have no effect on eggs or pupae (immobile stage), so when you spray you kill the young (nymphs) and adults.

**MANY USE THE** liquid dishwashing detergent as a contact insecticide at the rate of four teaspoons per gallon of water. Even the low-priced liquid detergents sold in supermarkets under their own brand names are suitable.

The detergent kills aphids, certain other bugs, cabbage worms, some thrips and white fly larvae and adults. Some gardeners who have used it claim that the detergent will also kill red spider mites, which is quite a feat.

Detergents are harmless to humans, well established plants, pets and wildlife. It can burn the foliage of tiny seedlings and may "scorch" some tender house plants such as African violets.

If you have been using dishwashing detergents for white flies, please write and tell us how you like it.

**WE USED TO THINK** that if you could fruit a strawberry patch two or three years, you were lucky. Actually, a strawberry bed can be made to fruit six years or longer. In fact, many commercial growers fruit their fields eight years or longer.

If your plants are productive and healthy, you can fruit the patch for several years. A strawberry planting is usually abandoned because of weeds, too many strawberry plants, winter injury, root diseases or nematode.

If you escape all these, your planting should be productive. Here's how some gardeners renovate their strawberry patch for next year's crop: First, they set their rotary lawn mower high, and mow all the leaves at a height of one to three inches. Next, they thin out rows to a width of 15 inches or less.

Don't hesitate to space plants by removing surplus. Space the plants so they are six to eight inches apart. Some people train the new plants so they resemble spokes in a wheel.

Feed your strawberry plants now, using a liquid plant food. If you use a chemical or dry fertilizer such as 10-10-10, scatter it over the plant row when the foliage is DRY. Water the plants if rain doesn't come. Remember, it's better to grow a few, well managed plants than a large, poorly managed planting.

**GREEN THUMB CLINIC:** "Please tell me how to grow the 'friendship plant.' What care does it need?" Answer: The South American friendship plant (Pilea involucrata) likes a bright semi-sunny window, but NOT direct sun. Best soil mixture is 1 part each of sand, peat and loam.

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# 'Dying people have wisdom to offer,' nun tells nurses

"We die before we learn how to live," said Sister Joyce Deschano to members of a seminar on aging at Madonna College.

She was quoting the words of a dying housewife, adding that her own association with the dying as a chaplain at Hutzel Hospital in Detroit has taught her that dying people have much to offer in the way of wisdom.

"They have taught me things that stagger me," she said.

To an audience primarily of nurses, her speech offered a touching blend of pathos, humor and profundity, its purpose being to give them insights on how to deal with the dying patients they will meet as part of their profession.

ONE OF THE FIRST STAGES of dying is denial, Sister Joyce pointed out, adding that "some patients deny they are sick, let alone dying."

"It would be one of the worst things that could happen to them for me to go in and try to get them into a state of acceptance," she said.

In the next stage they ask, "Why me?" This is really anger, she explained. "You would be helping by telling them that it is OK to be angry - it is so freeing for them to be able to admit they are angry," she added.

The dying also have to go through the bargaining stage, which Sister Joyce found the hardest to listen to. "They tell you they don't want much, just two more years to finish the rais-

ing of their children, to go home once more, or not to have pain," she said.

"But the worst part is that they know they can't bargain, she continued. "They know it is only a kind of game, so why not let them play it. The problem is not the bargaining but the fact that too often we don't let them do it."

THE MOST A NURSE can do during the depression stage that follows is to let the dying person know she cares, the speaker said. Sit down with them a while and ask how things are going, she advised.

The final stage of dying is acceptance, she said, adding that after 10 months of meeting the dying "I have only met one person who has accepted death."

In an effort to have her audience face the thoughts that a dying patient faces, Sister Joyce said, "Let's be personal: what makes death frightening for you?"

FEAR OF THE UNKNOWN was one of the answers.

"If you can get a person to say he is worried about the unknown, he is telling you what is on the underside of his feelings," said Sister Joyce.

"Then you have done him a greater service than anyone else."

Another student suggested, "If you don't know what is coming, you can't be on top of the situation and be in control."

"If anyone is out of control, it is a dying person," returned Sister Joyce. "You have to think about it to know what it is like to lose control of bodily function, to lose your senses."

"But let them know that you are confused and depressed about their dying," she said. "In a sense that puts you on their level - out of control too - and they will identify with you."

ANOTHER STUDENT BROUGHT UP the fact that for her the idea of separation from her loved ones was the thing she could not face in death.

Sister Joyce then explained that it was a person's personal experience with separation that would make her find it difficult in dealing with dying.

"Many people who move from one place to another find it is like tearing a part of themselves out, a little like dying," she said. "People who experience the loss of a loved one also have an indication of what dying is. Before going into the room of a dying patient you should try to remember how you felt over a death in your family."

MANY OF THE COMMENTS Sister Joyce made were aimed at making the nurses in her audience aware of

ways in which they could be useful to the dying patient. None of these ways is more important than listening, she indicated again and again.

"If you believe that listening is a valuable contribution to life you will be able to help the dying," she told them.

"The elderly have a great need to reminisce," she said, adding that one dying woman told her, "I hope you're not bored. I have to tell someone about this before I die."

"With an elderly person it is both a cross and a privilege to hear about their life as it passes across their

eyes," she noted. "They are trying to communicate their whole souls."

BUT SHE ADVISED her listeners not to allow themselves to be trapped by a patient asking if he is going to die.

"I don't think they want the question answered," said Sister Joyce. "What they do want is someone to talk to about dying. Instead of answering their question ask them what they think."

She added: "In a sense you will be freeing them to talk about what is most on their minds. If you are a nurse you may be the only one in the institution to be able to do this."

A nurse in the audience was worried about the final results of such a talk. "Often we are reassigned after having such a close talk with a patient," she said. "Are we doing good if we can't see results?"

To which Sister Joyce replied, "If I could only value my work by seeing its result on the patients, I should have to leave my profession tomorrow."

However, another nurse spoke up saying that many patients have stated that there was one nurse that they could open up to and that though they didn't see her again, they felt better for having talked with her.

AT THE SAME TIME Sister Joyce warned her audience that there will be many times you will not be the person the dying patient most wishes to talk to.

"In that case the greatest thing we can do for them is get them their significant person," she said. "They have a right to be with whom they want."

## State Fair judges offer some tips

You grew your own carrots this year and canned them. You're so proud of how they turned out that you've decided to enter them in the Michigan State Fair.

You received your application form and you've returned it.

Now you are an official entry in the competition. From here your future as a possible prize winner is in the hands of the judges.

But where do the judges gain this omniscience? And what's more, how does a judge learn to be a judge?

MARIE L. HARDING, supervisor of community arts for the Michigan State Fair, said:

"All our judges (food, needlework and flowers) are graduate home economists and have worked in their respective fields for years."

This year, the state fair offered a full-day workshop free to anyone interested in obtaining more information about judging. Mrs. Harding stressed it would be impossible to be a judge after only one session.

But the participants, who were mainly working with 4-H groups or county fairs, picked up lots of valuable tips from the state fair judges.

Mrs. Arleen Arnold, a judge for more than 10 years in the food category and a consumer's marketing information agent with Michigan State

University, offered this tip: "Keep a poker face. If you make a comment you may hurt someone's feelings or you may influence the other judges."

ARE THERE OFTEN TIES? Kathryn Riney, director of residential consumer services for Detroit Edison and a judge of 20-some years experience, said: "You'll find that closeness in judging is at the low end rather than the top end...the good ones really stand out."

Can't anyone with a prize-winning recipe who can read, win a prize?

"Not necessarily," Mrs. Arnold explained. "Experience and technique do show in the texture and the taste."

Also, an experienced judge will know a box mix from a "scratch" recipe, she said.

Personal tastes are disregarded in the selection of a prize winner. "I may hate peanut butter, but I disregard that when judging peanut butter cookies," Miss Riney said. "I know how the texture should appear, how they should crumb and taste."

GERTRUDE CAPP, needlework judge put her students through a mock judging session. Ms. Capp said she considers originality, workmanship and good art principles (line, design, color) when judging.

# Youth fellowship goes west on helping venture

During the days of "Westard Ho," work caravans consisted of trains of covered wagons, with men, women and children all anticipating the day when they would reach their destination to begin a new life for themselves.

Today, work caravans consist of Youth Fellowship groups, piled into Greyhound buses, all anticipating the day they reach their destination to help others begin a new life.

It was "Las Vegas, New Mexico, or bust" for the caravan that 28 jean clad youths and four adult sponsors traveled on under the direction of The Rev. Donald Elly of the Rosedale Gardens United Presbyterian Church.

The annual work caravans, which began 10 years ago for Rosedale Gardens' Youth Fellowship group, are determined by the amount of money available and where the help is needed.

Rev. Elly explained that because the trip draws in a number of kids not belonging to the Youth Fellowship group, those who wish to go must raise \$75 by joining the group in car washes, pancake suppers and other fund-raising events. The senior-high fellowship makes the final selection on who goes.

Another \$75 must be provided by each youth going on the caravan.

"Last year, 25 kids went to Mexico and 17 went to North Carolina," Rev. Elly said. "After a rap session, we decided our work was needed in New Mexico this year."

The objective of this year's two-week caravan was to help restore a 103-year-old church which is being used as an old mission and alcoholic center, under sponsorship of the First

Presbyterian Church of Las Vegas.

The work was rough, but the knowledge and experience gained by the youth out-numbered the callouses on hands.

Charles Allen, 15, of 32016 W. Chicago, listed the work that was accomplished in the oldest mission building in the U.S.

"We built a rock garden, put up a flag-pole and basketball backboard, built a flagstone wall, cleared weeds and built a drop ceiling in an adobe room," Charles proudly said.

The group agreed all experienced new feelings.

It wasn't only a feeling of giving a helping hand to humanity, but as Cheri Prentise, 17, of 31331 Hathaway said, "For the first time in my life, I felt I was one of a minority in my own country."

She explained that Las Vegas is separated into two towns by a bridge. There is the old town, where the alcoholic center is located, and which is predominately Spanish-American in population, and the new town, a business district, where the First Presbyterian Church is located.

"It's a bit scary at first," Cheri said said, "but we were able to come in contact with people from both sides of town."

Members of the group said that they didn't realize until they got to Las Vegas what an old wild-west town it really was.

"It was pretty interesting," one member said, "but it didn't hinder our work at all."

Though the work caravan's activities were just what is implied, the youth group did manage to fit some free time in the schedule.

There was swimming at the Highlands University, a four-day-long

## 2clergymen clobber with words

### Rev. Lester Kinsolving's Religion Update

Neither Rabbi Baruch Korff nor the Rev. John McLaughlin, S.J., are felonious like the ex-vice president. But these two reverend gentlemen have managed the absolutely spectacular achievement of making Spiro Agnew's heyday speeches sound downright restrained.

Also restrained by comparison to these two gentlemen of the cloth are the toughest among the president's elite guard of press professionals, such as Ken Clawson (formerly of the Washington Post) and Patrick Buchanan (formerly of the St. Louis Globe Democrat.)

For while these purportedly heavy word merchants have, rather clumsily, launched an attack upon the entire house judiciary committee as an alleged lynching party lusting for the Nixon neck, the president's Jesuit and his pet, rabbi have made this verbal barrage look tame.

FOR THIS PRESIDENTIAL chaplains corps has used the strategy divide-and-conquer — by a double-barreled zeroing in upon the first member of the house judiciary committee

ever to offer an impeachment resolution.

Father McLaughlin has compared this congressman, the Rev. Robert Drinan, S.J., (D-Mass.) to the Sanhedrin — even though fathers McLaughlin and Drinan attended the very same Jesuit seminary.

Rabbi Korff, who is Father Drinan's fellow resident of Massachusetts, went Father McLaughlin one better — by describing the congressman as "a mad monk — like Rasputin."

GREGORY RASPUTIN (1871-1916) was an immensely charismatic Siberian monk who became involved with a sect called "Khlysty." The leading idea of this group was that salvation is attainable through repentance alone.

Rasputin applied one of history's most enormous human energies to giving a novel twist to this idea:

"Sin in order that you may be forgiven!" he preached — adding that his gigantic body contained "a particle of the Supreme Being."

"The manner of your salvation is thus: you must be united with me in soul — and body!"

THIS INTRIGUING idea, combined with an almost superhuman alcoholic capacity, enabled Rasputin to conduct — for serfs and Czar's Court alike — some of the most spectacular sex orgies in the history of the eastern hemisphere.

Hence, during a White House press briefing, I asked:

"Because the president has repeatedly been closely identified and photographed with Rabbi Korff (founder of the 'National Citizens Committee For Fairness To The Presidency'), does he agree with the rabbi's clear impli-

cation that Father Drinan is a gigantic boozier and a sexual athlete? — or will the president disassociate himself from this statement by the rabbi?"

But Deputy White House Press Secretary Gerald Warren cried "Next question!" — loudly and angrily, rather than to disassociate the president from this notable statement by his pet rabbi.

MOST OF THE NATION'S rabbis seem to be trying to ignore Korff. But this rabbi's growing national fame appears quite likely to be destined to cultivate even more outstanding pronouncements than his "Father Rasputin" bit.

His latest: requesting Vice President Ford to threaten not to succeed to the White House if Nixon is impeached — which astounding suggestion Ford wisely disdained.

Rabbi Korff, after all, is something of a late starter compared to Father McLaughlin, whom the highly respected Catholic magazine Commonweal finally felt obliged to describe as "Nixon's hired collar . . . the greatest living embarrassment to the American Jesuits."

# The political dog was there but didn't bark

This year's primary election campaign reminded me of the old Sherlock Holmes story about the dog that barked in the night.

"But, Holmes," interjected Watson, "no dog barked in the night."

"Precisely, my dear fellow, the whole point of the dog barking in the night was that no dog barked in the night," pontificated the smiling detective. (Not exact wording, but close enough to give the flavor.)

One of the big issues in Oakland County suburbs was the question of whether there was to be an elected county executive. Linked to this issue was the primary race between Democrats Eugene Kuthy and Daniel Barry for nomination for county executive, assuming the voters approved the whole idea anyway.

A similar proposal in Wayne County, backed by County Board Chairman Robert FitzPatrick, failed to reach the ballot, mostly because of powerful opposition by groups in Detroit.

IN SUCH a political environment, what would have been expected is considerable debate on the consequences elected county executives would have on the whole idea of regional government.

Instead, the subject of regional government never came up at all in the campaign -- much like the dog that barked not at all in the night.

This is too bad, for whether or not we like it, the time is steadily coming when we who live and work in the metropolitan area must take a long, hard look at our fabric of local and area governance to determine if it really is doing the job it should.

There is strong evidence that it is not. As Lt. Gov. James Brickley said at a Metropolitan Fund panel on regional government back in April, "If anybody brought in, as a proposal, a map with the kind of government structures that we now have, with all the lines drawn and some 400 units of government in the Detroit metropolitan area, we would probably quickly send him off to the nearest rest home. We should say, obviously, that it is ridiculous to cut up and balkanize a community."

## Local schools ignore year 'round success

Three years ago the Northville school system agreed to become a pioneer in the state of Michigan in starting and testing a year 'round school program.

For years there has been conjecture among board members of the numerous systems in the area covered by the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers about the use of the YRS. The big reason was to get more use of the school buildings during the summer months and perhaps design a workable program that would have the buildings in use throughout the year.

Such programs had been introduced in the far west and east, but none had reached the point where a school board could take a stand and say "we'd like to try that system."

Northville was one of several school districts throughout the state selected to inaugurate the YRS programs. It began on a rather limited basis in the first year since all enrollments were on a voluntary basis. It meant going to school 45 days and then having 15 days off. This was repeated around the calendar.

FOLKS IN Northville were still a bit lukewarm after the end of the first year, but even then the enrollment picked up quite a bit for the start of the second year.

There was a time last spring when the trustees had some ideas of making the YRS mandatory. However, they gave that up quickly when delegations appeared at the board meetings and made it known that voluntary enrollment was all right, but mandatory would bring a big battle.

So now a third year of the YRS has started with an enrollment of more than 1,100 students, indicating there is more than just a bit of interest in the program.

For the first time, year 'round classes will be held in every school building in the Northville system. To add to the statistics, nearly half of the elementary school population will be attending. In addition there will be students from the middle schools and the high school involved.

WHY ARE WE going into all of this background on the Northville schools? For the simple reason that many school systems such as Livonia, Farmington, Redford Union, Westland and Plymouth have manifested interest in the program but haven't had enough gumption to go ahead and try it.

Plymouth, of course, was going to be the second system in the area to join in, but the teachers de-

is that the astounding growth of the suburbs has provoked, piecemeal and without overall planning, the development of countless little units of local government, most without coherent power to accomplish their jobs. Simultaneously, in the minds of the average citizens, these congeries of local governments have come to be unresponsively out of touch with the people.

Of course, the reason all these layers of local government are unresponsive to the average citizen is that none in itself has enough jurisdiction to solve his problems.

It may be that some form of regional government makes sense; it cuts duplication, it makes jurisdictional boundaries sensible; it provides for planning; it accomplishes efficiencies of scale with authorities like the Water Board.

Equally, it may be that some form of regional government makes no sense; it superimposes yet another level of bureaucrats on an already top-heavy structure; it moves government too far away from the ordinary citizen; it saps the vitality of our vigorous, traditional system of local government.

Most likely, some kind of change is needed, one which simultaneously makes the lowest level of local government more human-scaled and more responsive to individual citizen problems and also allows coherence in planning and overall resource allocation.

The problem, for now, is to get the discussion (which ought to have taken place in the campaign) started. Then, at least, we would have the security of knowing that like the dog out there, barking in the night, there was solid, constructive debate on a pressing problem.

Teachers can successfully block a program one year with demands for negotiations, but you can bet your last dollar the contract will contain provisions for YRS the next time round.

Yep. I'm good at vacations.

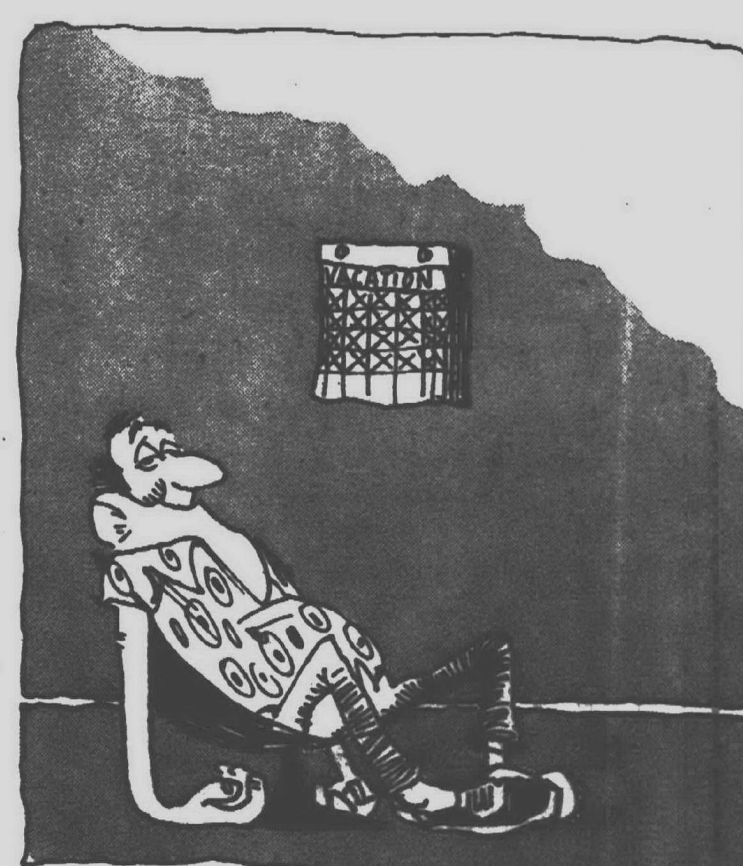
THERE'S A PRICE to pay, of course, when you get back to the office.

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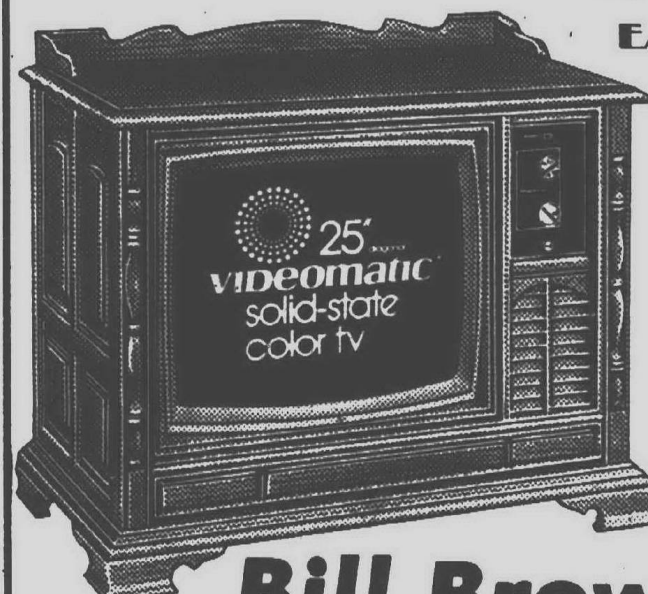
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## It's not bib; it's Bibb!

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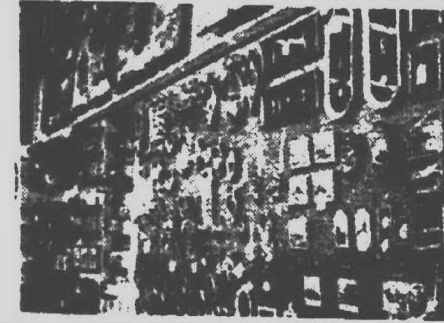

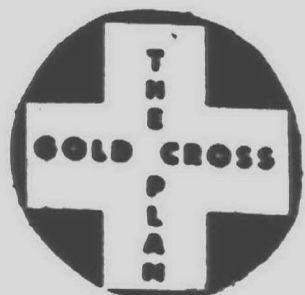

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# Local schools have 3 years to start '30 and out' retirement

With the statement that he intends to sign two bills directly affecting public schools, Gov. Milliken mailed copies of both to public school superintendents.

They concern non-contributory retirement funding for school employees and state aid.

The governor told the superintendents, "The retirement bill, a part of my recommendation to the Legislature, significantly improves retire-

ment benefits and incorporates a non-contributory feature.

"The state aid bill continues the second year of the yield equalizing concept and increases categorical funding. I am particularly pleased by the continuation of the membership formula which was enacted last August.

"It is the most significant step ever taken in Michigan school finance to provide the opportunity for an education to all our children without discrimination as to wealth."

WAYNE-WESTLAND superintendent Timothy Dyer, active in lobbying for the retirement plan, calls it "a good piece of legislation."

Under the law retirement contributions will be made by the school districts rather than being taken out of employees' paychecks. Implementation date is July 1, 1977.

This gives the districts three years to work it into contracts with the bargaining units.

Nicknamed the "30 and out" plan, it provides for retirement of teachers with 30 years tenure at age 55.

Dyer says the law requires the district's retirement contribution of five per cent of each salary be a part of the bargaining package.

"Whether that's legal or not, I don't know."

SCHOOL LEADERS haven't a doubt it will be an item at the negotiating table.

Dyer said the five per cent is tied to the total wage package because it means additional take home pay for employees.

As an example, he says, a two per cent wage increase plus the five per cent district contribution means seven per cent more money.

In practice it would be a shade more than seven per cent, because when retirement was taken out of the paycheck, income tax was paid on the full amount.

Now, since the five per cent is not a part of the salary, no taxes are paid on it. Also because it was never a part of the salary, it is not available except as a pension, and teachers who quit before retirement time can't retrieve the contributions.

DYER SAYS the possibility of teachers retiring at 55 could directly affect school budgets.

Since 55-year-olds would be retiring at the top of the salary scale and those replacing them would come in close to the bottom, there's a possible savings of \$8,000 or \$9,000 in each instance.

He gives a hypothetical example: "Say 50 of our teachers retired at age 55 and we saved \$8,000 on each we replaced—that's \$400,000."

He expects some won't want to quit at 55 and others won't be able to afford it.

DR. GEORGE GARVER, Livonia superintendent, says he supports the concept. "I believe it appropriate that teachers can retire after 30 years."

"Some people through the state offices have left me with the impression that this should be recognized by the employe union groups as a substantial pay raise."

He feels the implementation could have "a real impact" on the district's financial resources.

Livonia teachers get a three per cent salary improvement this year plus increment and cost of living.

"If we had to implement the non-contributory retirement this year, it would have been a hardship," Garver said.

DR. C.NELSON GROTE, president of Schoolcraft Community College which has five unions affected by the law, said before the bill reached its final form that he hoped the implementation date could be moved ahead a year, giving the schools a year to make budgetary plans for the contribu-

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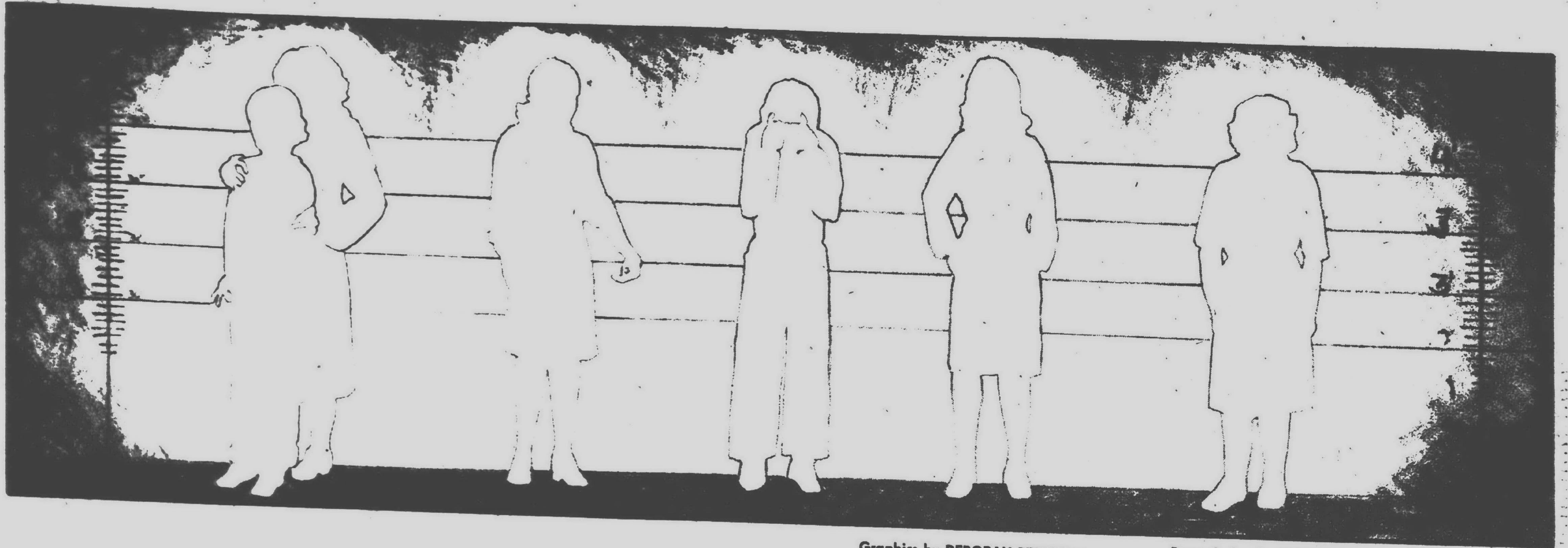

# RAPE: Victim's ordeal eased by revised rape laws

The hot seat that awaited the one-of-10 rape victims who pressed charges will cool off a little when new rape legislation goes into effect in Michigan Nov. 1. The new state law defines rape as sexual assault and precludes the introduction of testimony about the victim's prior sexual conduct with anyone other than the defendant. It also reduces the maximum sentence from life imprisonment to 20 years in the state penitentiary and includes sexual assaults on men as well as women under its coverage.

**AUTHORS OF** the bill say they hope the elimination of courtroom questioning about prior sexual conduct will encourage victims to report rapes. One prosecutor said the reduction of the maximum sentence should encourage more guilty verdicts from juries. Another section of the new law provides that if a husband and wife are separated or have filed for divorce or separate maintenance, one can charge the

other with sexual assault should that be necessary. The new legislation focuses the juror's attention on coercion used by the defendant. Under the old law, passed in 1857, attention often centered on the extent of the victim's resistance. It required a woman to "resist to her utmost." Said one attorney, "A lot of jurors, especially men, figured if she survived the rape she hadn't resisted enough."

**UNDER THE NEW** law, sexual assault need not involve the actual use of force — threats of force or retaliation are enough to support a guilty verdict. The new statute provides for four degrees of sexual assault.

First degree sexual assault is a felony carrying a maximum sentence of 20 years. It involves sexual penetration and serious injury to the victim when accompanied by force or threats of force or retaliation

or by the use of a dangerous weapon. It applies to forcible assault on an adult or child less than the age of 13 or on a relative between the ages of 13 and 16. **FIRST DEGREE** sexual assault may also take place "when the victim is exploited by drugs or medical examination."

Second degree sexual assault is a felony with a maximum sentence of 15 years. It differs from first degree sexual assault by referring to "sexual contact" rather than "penetration." Sexual contact is defined

as "touching . . . a person in a way that may reasonably be interpreted as being for the purposes of sexual arousal or gratification."

**THIRD DEGREE** sexual assault, a felony with a 10-year sentence, involves "penetration, whether voluntary or involuntary, with anyone under the age of 16." Fourth degree sexual assault, a misdemeanor punishable by one year imprisonment or \$500 fine, involves forcible sexual contact where no serious injury to the victim was involved.

## TRIAL: 'You have to spell it out for us'

Rape trials will continue to be ordeals for victims despite reformed legislation. Victims still face explicit questioning about the nature of the sexual assault, often in a courtroom filled with a predominantly male audience. The interrogation described below took place in a local court on the afternoon of Wednesday, July 31, 1974.

She was 16, she was small and she had been raped.

She settled into the witness chair, tugged at her shapeless yellow jacket and fidgeted with her hands. The court clerk handed her a microphone.

The prosecutor disposed with the preliminaries quickly, walked

past the defense table and asked if she saw her attackers in the court. One by one, she picked out three men at the defense table.

"Him. In the burgundy sweater." Her voice was low, almost inaudible despite the public address system. "He was first, then those other two."

**BURGUNDY** Sweater leaned over, whispered to the tall, gangling defendant to his right. They grinned at each other, then slouched back in their chairs. The third defendant sat solid and straight, filling his chair.

The victim said she met them at her brother's and agreed "to go partying with them at a friend's place."

"When they got me upstairs,

there wasn't any party." Far back in the courtroom, a man stage-whispered, "If I'd been there you'd of had a party, baby."

She shifted in the witness chair and brushed her hair back from her eyes.

She wrapped the microphone cord around her hand, then unwound it. It lay in her lap.

"One of them grabbed me and held me down and hit me and hit me again. He told me to take my clothes off and he ripped off my blouse and skirt."

"Which one?" the prosecutor asked. Burgundy Sweater grinned again as she pointed at him.

"**WHAT THEN?**" At one side of the courtroom, someone snickered loudly.

"He — uh, well, you know — he did it." More snickers from men in the audience. Burgundy Sweater grinned widely.

"You'll have to spell it out for us," said the prosecutor. His voice dropped. "I know it's rough, but we have to know exactly what he did to you. For the record."

She spelled it out for them.

**HER VOICE** was so low she had to repeat it twice for the court reporter. There were no snickers in the courtroom. The prosecutor's voice was soft. "You'll have to tell us about the other two. Did they do anything to you?"

"They did the same as he did." Her knuckles were white, her hands tight around the micro-

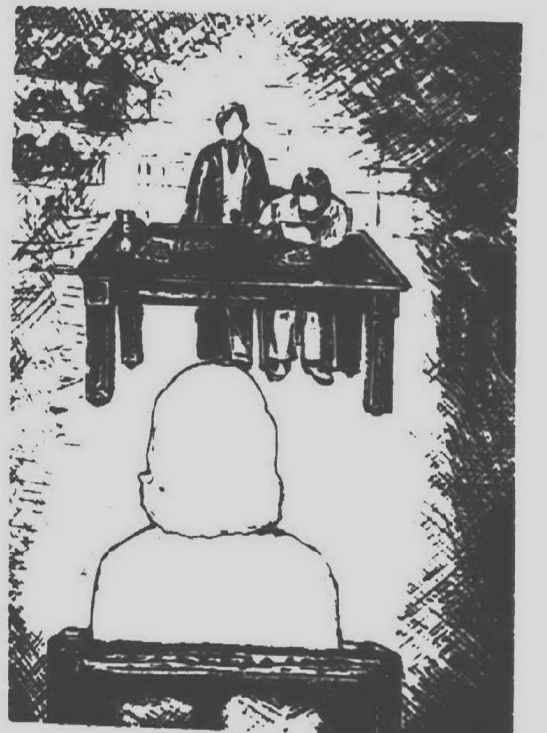
phone. She turned her eyes away from the men in the room.

"**THAT'S NOT** enough," the judge said. The prosecutor leaned closer to her, touched her shoulder. "It's my last question. Try to tell us — spell it out again."

She did. Twice.

When she finished, the prosecutor sat down. No one snickered. Burgundy Sweater did not grin. Defense attorneys cross-examined for less than five minutes. She left the stand and the courtroom.

Later, she sat alone, huddled at the end of a bench in the court hallway. Across the hall, on another bench, sat a policewoman. Inside the courtroom, the all-male jury that would decide if her story was true listened to more testimony.



## ASSAULT: 'Please, God, help me'

This is one rape victim's story, in her own words. It is unchanged except for spelling and grammar corrections.

I am a resident of the City of Southfield. The act of rape didn't happen here. It was in a new neighborhood near a school in Oakland County.

I was in a vicinity where men were working at a construction site earlier that day. The man who later raped me owned the construction company.

I was introduced to this man by a neighbor and had gone out with him once before. He gave me no indication at any time that he would harm me. He merely kissed me goodbye and asked if he could see me again. I agreed because we did have a nice time.

**TWO WEEKS** later he pulled up in my driveway with a business associate and asked if I would go out with him for a few drinks. I agreed to go, but I said I'd have to be back to cook supper for my four sons. My live-in baby sitter said she would prepare dinner.

I changed into a red turtleneck shirt and a jumper that zipped in the back. My date, his associate and I went to a bar and most of the talk was about busi-

ness. The associate left and my date said he had to check the men at the construction site before driving me home. When we arrived at the site, there was no one there. I insisted I had to go home but he pulled his car up on a hill, grabbed me and started smothering me with kisses. The more I pushed him away, the more persistent he became.

**HE BECAME** angry and pushed me down toward the steering wheel. "Oh my God," I thought, "he's going to rape me." I struggled but I was locked down by the steering wheel and his body. He couldn't get my jumper off so he began ripping the front of it. I began to scream and beg him to please let me go. It was hopeless. He became crazier and crazier and I hit him in the face with my fist. He swore and I saw his fist come at me. I turned away and he cuffed the edge of my chin. Now I was afraid for my life.

I kept screaming and pushing at him. My brain made sudden waves. I must make sure when they find me dead, I've got his hair, his skin, his blood and, oh yes, my ring's in his car.

I beat the horn and each time I hit it he grabbed my arm to tuck it under me. "Please, God, help me," I screamed over and over again.

**A KNOCK** came on his side of the door and I recognized a boy I had seen earlier that day working at the construction site. My captor told the boy to go away and he would talk to him later.

I beat the horn again and kept on screaming. The man grabbed my neck. Just when it seemed my strength had given out and I was doomed, I saw flashes reflecting around the car.

The next thing I knew, the police busted open his side of the door and pulled him off of me. Another officer gently helped me out of the car. I was shaking and crying hysterically.

At the police station they gave me coffee and a dress to put on. Then they took me to the hospital. I had a sperm count and nothing more. When I came home and called my doctor, he was shocked that I hadn't been given a penicillin or hormone shot or a morning-after pill to prevent pregnancy.

I was handed a sheet of paper after I got out of the hospital. I had to make a statement in my own words and my hand was still shaking.

They let my attacker go the next morning, perhaps to mingle with witnesses, get a lawyer and work out a deal to protect himself.

**I WASN'T** sure I was protected from him and I frantically called the police department and asked why they let the rapist go. The police said they told my attacker not to come near me or bother me and he would appear in court. That's the procedure, I was told.

I was told I had to take a polygraph test. Four police officers saw my attacker in the act of rape, a witness saw him attacking me and heard me beg for help and a neighborhood was aroused by my horn blowing. But that's the law. That's procedure.

## Women on the Go

### New superintendent will miss Plymouth

The new superintendent of the Michigan School for the Blind is looking forward to the challenge of a big job but can't help feeling a tinge of regret over leaving Plymouth.

Dr. Nancy Steele Bryant was named recently to be the first woman ever to head the state school that was established in Lansing in 1879.

So she and her husband, Ron Bryant, and teen-aged son, Tom Steele, have put their Plymouth home up for sale and soon will head for the State capital and the school that has been serving sightless children in Michigan for nearly a century.

But this educator, now 38, won't leave without some words of praise for the community that has been home while she served two years as program director for the Plymouth Center for Human Development and then for a year as special education consultant and supervisor in the Wayne County Intermediate School district.

"PLYMOUTH IS SUCH a friendly community we know we're going to miss it," Dr. Bryant said. "We've especially appreciated the fact that it is a fine, safe place to bring up a boy."

The family will have a home that goes with the school in Lansing and Ron Bryant, a plumber at Metropolitan Hospital, here, will relocate his work too.

"He's been really great about the move, so there's no problem about accepting this post," Dr. Bryant said of her mate of two and a half years.

"We met while I was on the Florida State University faculty, and he's said he chased me half-way around the world so he doesn't mind this move."

THE AROUND-THE-WORLD reference was to India, where Dr. Bryant served for a year as a consultant to the Indian government, developing education programs for blind children in New Delhi under auspices of the American Foundation for Overseas Blind.

When the Indian government took over the program she had set up, Dr. Bryant heard about the opening on the Plymouth center staff and came to Michigan.

Her appointment to succeed Dr. Robert Thomas, retiring head of the Michigan State School for the Blind, was not unexpected.

"I had been asked to apply," she said, "and I know I had a little more experience than others being considered. Michigan does have affirmative action in the matter of seeking

women for administrative posts, but with my background I can feel comfortable that I wasn't named just because I am a woman."

DR. BRYANT is a native of Miami, Fla., and graduated from Florida State intending to teach mentally retarded children.

But the first job opportunity available was in a Florida school classroom for preschool blind and partially-seeing children, and that changed the direction of her career.

She earned a master's degree in special education for the visually handicapped, qualified as an education specialist and eventually completed work on a doctorate at George Peabody College for Teachers at Nashville, Tenn. Her dissertation was on learning by blind children of low ability.

Interspersed with the degrees were

positions in the Peabody demonstration school, an elementary school in Donelson, Tenn., and in the state residential facility for the mentally handicapped and the Tennessee School for the Blind at Donelson.

Dr. Bryant also has served on the faculties of Wisconsin State University and Fisk University and the Alabama and Kentucky Schools for the Blind. Before going to India she was director of graduate studies in visual disabilities at Florida State.

HER WORK AT THE PLYMOUTH Center for Human Development was as a unit director, and with the intermediate school district she was responsible for coordinating diagnostic and prescriptive services to children in the district with more than one handicap.

"I've been most pleased to be working in this state," Dr. Bryant said. "While I was at Peabody, Michigan always was mentioned with New York and California in the matter of services to the blind."

She also was delighted that work in the Plymouth center brought her into contact with the staff of the Michigan School for the Blind.

IN HER NEW ROLE she sees the need to develop new programs to meet changing needs of blind and handicapped people.

"That's one of the most exciting parts," she added. "We have to take a look at our way of giving services and spend our allocated money wisely."

The school always has maintained high academic standards, Dr. Bryant said, but now the make-up of the student body is changing somewhat.

"For a while the enrollment was going down," she said, "because as state law required complete service to all handicapped, more school districts were offering programs for blind children."

"But there will always be some, especially from small school districts, who do best in a boarding school situation. And another element is entering the picture—because of our improved life-saving techniques, we are getting more children with multiple handicaps, perhaps blindness with retardation. You don't teach Braille to a retarded blind child—for him, talking books may be the answer."

"A big part of my job is going to be to meet—in fact to anticipate—evolving needs."

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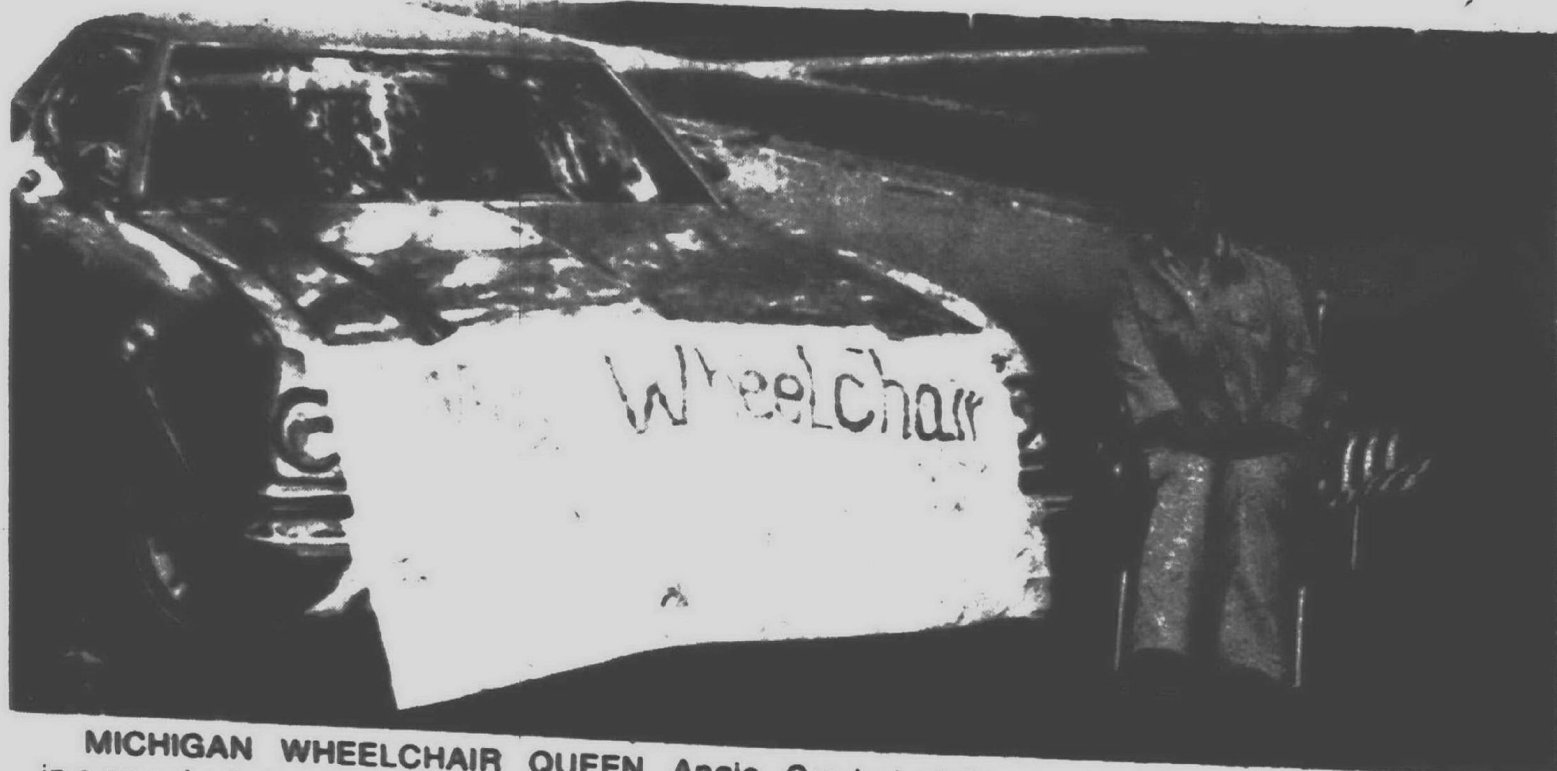
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MICHIGAN WHEELCHAIR QUEEN Angie Corrieri of Plymouth just before participating in a parade during her 1973 reign.

The pageant finals will begin at 8 p.m. Aug. 10. Madonna College is located at 36600 Schoolcraft, Livonia.

The new titlist will represent Michigan in the Miss Wheelchair America Pageant, to be held the weekend of Sept. 6 in Columbus, Ohio.

## Madonna program helps teachers explore careers

The growing idea that children should start thinking about careers even before high school years is to be implemented in a new program for teachers at Madonna College.

A series of courses on career education will be launched in September for pre-service and in-service teachers. Sister M. Danatha, Madonna president, said the Livonia school is a year ahead of the requirements of Public Law 97, requiring that career exploration be taught in all grades from kindergarten through 12 by September of 1975.

"THE ACT REQUIRES," Sister Danatha said, "that the state board of education, a career advisory commission, and teacher training institutions create a plan for professional development."

"We have already worked with the state department of education on our curriculum."

The program involves six courses to enable teachers to begin, in the earliest grades, giving their pupils understanding of career options. Those who complete the sequence will receive certificates of achievement as in-service specialists in career education, said Sister M. Lauriana, dean.

THE FIRST COURSE, to be offered in the fall term beginning Sept. 3, will be Introduction to Career Education. It will explore means of initiating career education into elementary and secondary schools. Objectives and elements will be established and self-awareness, educational awareness and the decision-making process will be discussed.

The winter term at Madonna will offer the second course, Orientation to the World of Work. It will allow teachers, many of whom have not had other work experiences, to gain firsthand knowledge of the business and industrial labor force in the community.

"We plan to obtain some apprentice-type placements for teachers in a wide variety of work situations so they will know the qualifications, demands and satisfactions of individual jobs," said Sister Lauriana.

FOUR ADDITIONAL courses are being planned for the program.

They will include work on information systems, curriculum development, integration of career education into other course materials and value clarification.

Registration for the fall term at Madonna, 36600 Schoolcraft, is now in progress.

MEANWHILE, Wolverine Raceway isn't exactly allowing moss to gather on its big mile track and the facilities

of the DRC as it swings into the third week of its 82-night meeting.

Business has been booming at the Livonia plant also, not quite as much as the Hazel Park trots did in the spring but much better than any other Michigan track has been able to do with the late summer and fall dates.

Would you believe that all of the state's million dollar harness racing nights have been in the spring and none in the fall.

Well mark it down now that we predict Wolverine will become the first and within the next weekend or two. The big mile track just missed a million last Saturday when the handle soared to \$995,000. Just five thousand from the magic figure and we would be willing to make book that more than that was shutout at the mutual windows by bettors arriving too late to make wagers.

COMING ON TOP of a fat \$800,000 Friday night, we would have to say

that Wolverine is moving in the directions of records again.... something its counterpart in the afternoon couldn't come close to this year.

Once again Racing Secretary Bill Connors has succeeded in getting some of the top stables from the east and midwest to race over the big mile track and the quality of the competition does make a big difference in the interest at the turnstiles and the wickets.

Area owners are coming in for their share of the purses with several from the circulation area of the Observer & Eccentric newspapers getting into the winner's circle.

TED TAYLOR trains the trotters but he wasn't on hand Saturday when PeeWee Welch drove Worthy Dean to an easy victory in a \$4,400 trot in 2:04.1. The trotter is owned by Earl Forsyth of Bloomfield Hills.

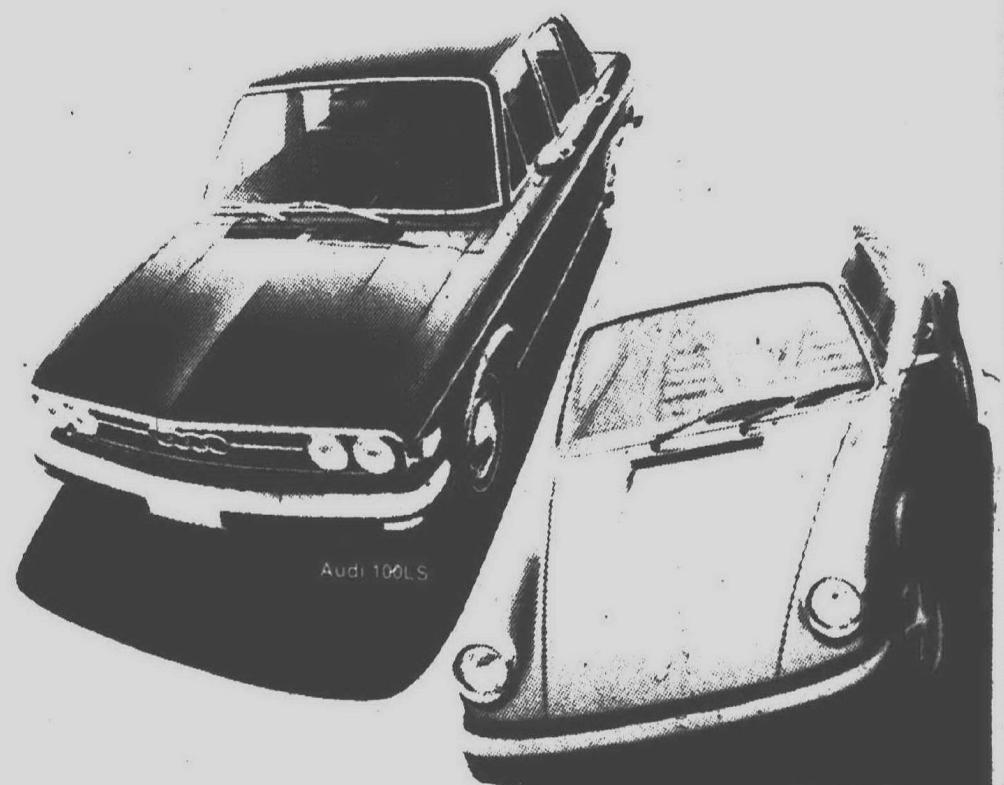
Livonia auto dealer Bill Brown had his big moment when Erlana's Valley

took the \$5,600 handicap pace in 2:00.2, bettering its previous record of 2:00.4.

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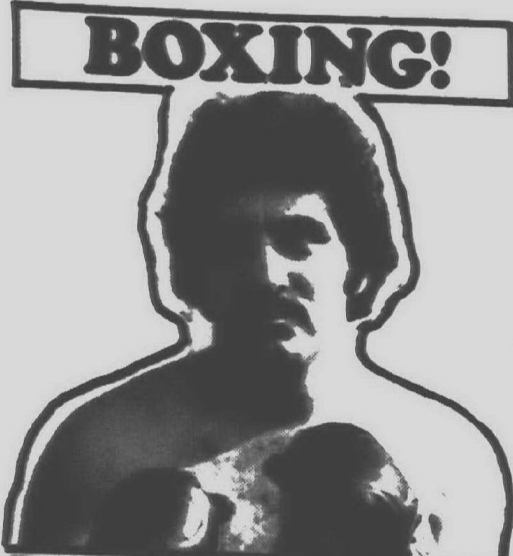


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## Friday is Motor City Pace

With a pot of \$45,400 up for grabs, a field of 21 of the nation's better pacers will compete in the two divisions of the historic Motor City Pace Friday at Wolverine Raceway.

Racing Secretary Bill Connors had visions of at least 30 entries from the 102 nominees but many of the eastern and midwest eligibles dropped out of contention when they discovered some of the big names were going to be in the field.

As it was, the field of 21 is the largest in several years and the total purse of \$45,400 makes it one of the richest stakes offered thus far this year in Michigan.

THE ENTRY LIST forced Connors to split the field into a division with 12 horses in the first heat and one with 11 in the second. The first division which goes as the fifth race of the 10-event program includes several top

stars and actually is the better of the two. The second division is scheduled as the seventh race.

Terms of the stake are that the winner with the fastest time will receive the coveted trophy and will officially be recognized as the 1974 champion.

Judging from the draw in the divided stake, there is a distinct possibility of the track record of 1:57.3 going by the boards. Especially in the opening division where at least five standout performers are entered.

BRAIDWOOD, rated as one of the fastest and best in Chicago with several victories in less than 2:00; Rin Tim Tim, which has been red hot in recent starts in the east; Solar Storm, winner of the Northville Downs leg of the Can-Am pacing series with a string of four in a row at that time; Country Road, one of the better pacers in Doug Ackerman's large public stable; and Speedy Mon, from the Gene Riegler group in Greenville, O.

They're all in the first division and that makes one believe it could crack the track record and most certainly better the existing mark for the stake.

In addition there are a couple of sleepers in the first heat who could surprise all. Buddy Gilmore, who never moves a horse from one track to another unless he has a good reason, has Sokeys Tiger entered and Del Cameron, who has unusual luck at Wolverine, will be handling Linden Bye Bye.

TARPORT EFFRAT, the six-year-old owned by Del Miller of Meadowlands, Pa. which paced to a 2:00.1 victory in its season debut Monday, will have to be considered the early favorite in the second division.

Miller, the balding millionaire who also happens to be one of the nation's better drivers and trainers, won't be on hand for this one. He turned the driving duties over to Bobby Williams and from Monday's race it appears he picked the right one.

It isn't going to be a case of Williams tossing his helmet onto the track and all of the other drivers playing dead. Far from it, but from this angle it appears as if Miller has his pacer in top shape for its second start of the season.

There's plenty of competition and most of it will come from Michigan drivers and owners.

THE STARTERS include: Run Blue Run, handled by Jackie Cobb; Gunsmith with Doug Ackerman in the sulky; Mullett Street, the star of the Nicholas Rothe stable of Howell who paced the fastest mile of the early season under the guidance of Merritt Dokey; and there's Tiger Jet, one of the state's best as a three year old.

Also in the second heat are: T.K. Counsel, Larry Bonner; Little Star Trick, Marc Ferguson; Just Far, Clayton Faurot; Speedy Spinner, Carl Allen; Smashing Don, Jerry Graham; and Frutar Hanover, George Wilcox.

The Motor City traditionally is the opening stake of the Wolverine series and historically is one that usually winds up with a major upset.

It goes all the way back to the turn of the century when it was one of the Blue Ribbon Classics staged in the Detroit area back in the period when all of the better horses appeared in the Motor City.

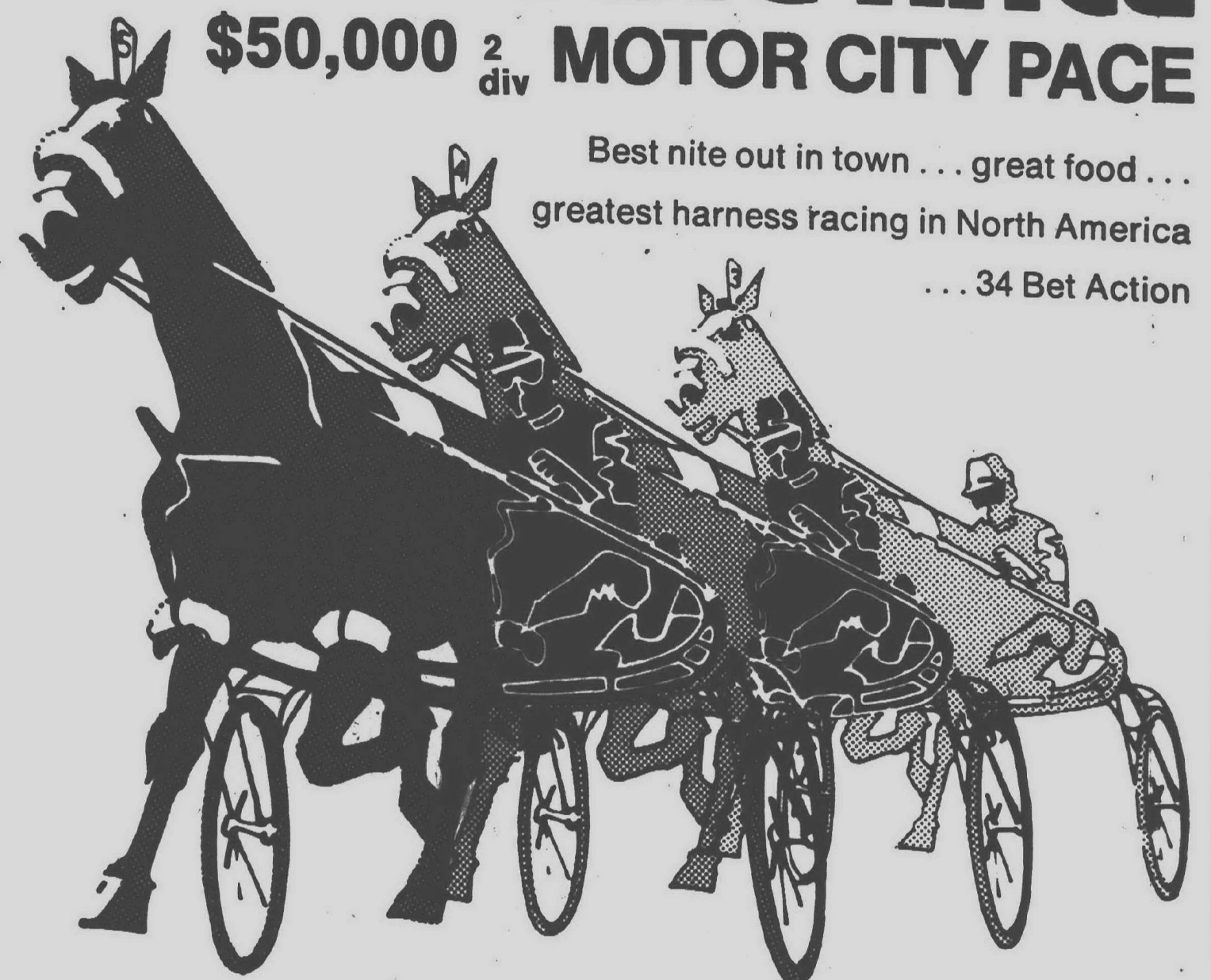
THAT WAS BACK in the days when Oscar Webber, one of the founders of the J.L. Hudson company, was a driver in many of the races.

Then it was allowed to fade out of existence only to be revived by Wolverine President Frederick Van Lennep in 1950 when he took over the harness racing operations at the Detroit Race Course.

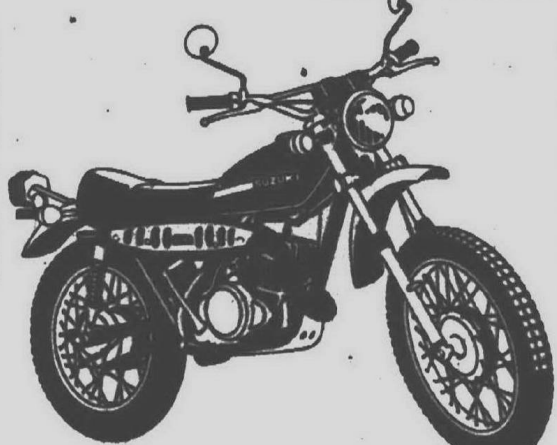

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# From murder to tennis

## Trial lawyer's ordeal is over

The curtain closed on a tragic and gripping courtroom drama last week. The long weeks of testimony are over. The three men accused of murdering two young Detroit boys, Keith Arnold, 6, and Gerald Craft, 8, have been convicted.

Assistant Wayne County Prosecutor Stephen Boak of Plymouth can relax and talk about the events of the longest courtroom battle of his career. He took a day off last week to play tennis with his wife, Sandy, and enjoy his daughters, Christy, 3, and Katie, eight months.

These elements of his life—tennis and his family—provided the calm during the eight stormy trial weeks.

TESTIMONY WAS heard each day before Circuit Court Judge James N. Canham beginning at 9 a.m. and ending at 1 p.m. As the weeks dragged on, the judge changed the court hours to 8:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

After that, Boak and his one assistant made their preparations for the following day.

He was assigned to the case the night Byron Smith, Geary Gilmore and Jerome Holloway were arrested, Dec. 5. He was the prosecutor for the preliminary examination held in Romulus.

At that time, Boak says, the defendants were talking, laughing and acting as if the whole thing were a big joke, a sharp contrast to their reactions to a verdict of guilty and the mandatory life sentences they now face.

The actual trial started June 4. It had been scheduled earlier, but the defendants asked for an adjournment, an action that was responsible for removing the only doubt of a conviction.

IN THE INTERIM Boak learned of a conspiracy being carried out to threaten witnesses.

"If the conspiracy had been successful, and there are indications it could have been if we hadn't found out

about it, we would have been in trouble," Boak comments.

But it was discovered, and the members of the defendants' families involved will go on trial next December with Boak as prosecuting attorney.

"The defendants did us a favor asking for an adjournment," he says.

But other than for this plot, Boak had little doubt that he would get the convictions he was seeking.

"I took it pretty determinedly. I was convinced early in the game that those three did it and no one else," he says. "To this day, I can't imagine what happened in that field in Romulus."

BECAUSE OF THE nature of the trial and the conspiracy plot, elaborate precautions were taken in the courtroom. Each day everyone entering was searched with a metal detector.

Boak says, "Several potentially dangerous items were taken from people."

At least six detectives were in the courtroom in plain clothes and the day of the verdict the number was doubled.

To protect his witnesses from threats and physical harassment, Boak shipped them out of state, brought them back to testify and sent them out again.

In the midst of the tension and uncertainty, Boak could always be sure as he drove to Plymouth in the early evening that his pretty wife, Sandy, would be waiting anxiously to hear the day's developments and there would be a set or two of tennis to help unknot the tense muscles.

Mrs. Boak turns to her husband as he talks about the long trial and says, "You never showed any outward sign of emotional strain."

She smiles as she explains that he doesn't smoke, doesn't drink, but did play a lot of tennis during the eight weeks.

He responds, "I guess I take all my frustrations out on a tennis ball."

THE COUPLE PLAY regularly at the Farmington Racket Club. They took up tennis this year after finding it was more physically demanding than golf and a better tension reliever.

Even before tennis, however, Boak would tell his wife the news from the courtroom.

"I couldn't wait until he got home to hear what happened. I'm his number one fan," she says.

On four occasions including the final day of the verdict, she was in the courtroom as a spectator. "I am very interested in court proceedings—the semantics, the psychology, the strategy. I think every person should sit in on a criminal proceeding. It's frightening, but fascinating."

She labels the time the jury deliberated "the longest 2½ hours of my life."

The night before he made his final statement to the jury, Boak rehearsed it for his wife.

She says, throwing her hands into the air, "I kept telling him that it was just fantastic."

He refers to her as "my sounding board."

BOAK JOINED the prosecutor's staff in 1968 after being with a large Detroit law firm which handled mostly corporate problems. He had had no previous trial work and planned to stay with the prosecutor's office for "a year or two."

Time stretched on, and the years

brought many challenges. He was the prosecutor in both Alfred Glancey trials, the first when Glancey was still alive after being beaten and the murder trial held after his death from the injuries.

It was preparation for the trial of the person accused of shooting Plymouth businessman Charles Finlan which originally brought Boak to Plymouth.

He and his wife lived in St. Clair Shores. Being from a small town in Pennsylvania, he says, "Coming to Plymouth was like coming home."

The family has lived in Plymouth for a little more than a year, and they are as sure now as they were at the beginning that it has the charming, friendly kind of small town atmosphere they both appreciate.

He will carry many memories of the dramatic events—the 50 witnesses, the faithful court watchers who lined up early every morning, a remark by one of the defendants, "You aren't losing any sleep over this are you?" and his reply, "No, I'm not, I didn't kill those boys."

He will remember the jury as one of the most attentive he has ever encountered and Judge Canham as "doing a terrific job." Time won't erase his concern for the safety of the witnesses and whether fear would prevent them from relating the grisly events of the tragedy.

It was an important case for Boak. He was convinced from the beginning that he was right and he, like Linda Ellis, Keith Arnold's sister, feels that justice has been done.

## Careers courses set by Madonna

Madonna College, Livonia, has established a program of career education courses for pre-service and in-service teachers in response to a new law requiring that career exploration be taught in all grades, kindergarten through 12, by September 1975.

Sister M. Danatha, president, said that Madonna is ahead of the state timetable for implementing the act.

"The act requires that the State Board of Education, a career advisory commission, and teacher training institutions create a plan for professional development," she said. "We have already worked with the state department of education on our curriculum."

"INTRODUCTION to Career Education," scheduled for the fall term, will explore means of initiating career education into elementary and secondary schools. Objectives and elements will be established. Self-awareness, educational awareness, and the decision-making process will be discussed. "Orientation to the World of Work"

will be offered during the winter term and will allow teachers, many of whom lack other work experiences, to gain first-hand knowledge of the business and industrial labor force in the community.

"We plan to obtain some apprentice-type placements for teachers in a wide variety of work situations so that they will know the qualifications, demands, and satisfactions of individual jobs," Sister M. Lauriana, dean, said.

FOUR ADDITIONAL courses are planned to follow this initial core. They will cover information systems, curriculum development, integration of career education into other course materials, and value clarification. Madonna will present a certificate of achievement as an in-service specialist in career education to those who complete the sequence of courses, Sister Lauriana announced.

Registration is currently in progress for the fall term which begins Sept. 3.
