Teacher strike closes schools as last-minute negotiations fail

PLYMOUTH—Plymouth schools were closed this morning (Tuesday) after teachers announced at 7 a.m. they would strike the district.

Negotiations between the Plymouth Education Association (PEA) teachers' union and the school district continued into the early hours this morning but failed to produce a settlement. The PEA contract expired Saturday.

Supt. John M. Hoben said that while school buses made their runs this morning "every precaution" was taken to see that the district's 12,600 students were returned home safely.

A special meeting has been called by the school board for 8 p.m. tonight (Tuesday) for the school board of files, 454 S. Harvey St. It is expected that the board may take some action relating to the strike.

The PEA general membership is scheduled to meet again at 9 a.m. Wednesday at the Penn Theater.

At a six hour meeting Thursday, the PEA general membership voted 316 to 226 to strike starting today (Tuesday) if a settlement on a contract was not reached over the weekend.

That vote followed a 410 to 140 vote to reject the Aug. 22 offer from the school board for a two-year contract calling for a 7 1/2 per cent salary increase this year and either a six per cent increase or a raise equal to two thirds of the cost of living increase for next year.

A motion to strike immediately Thursday was defeated by the PEA members by a 314 to 231 vote.

Thus the teaching staff worked Thursday and Friday in their in-service days scheduled to prepare for the students' arrival at school on Tuesday.

The press was excluded from Thursday's PEA meeting but was able to hear the proceedings from outside the auditorium. Several Plymouth high school students were

also listening to the meeting through the closed doors.

At the close of Thursday's PEA meeting, the 6 a.m. session for this morning (Tuesday) was scheduled for the Penn Theater and if the PEA negotiating team at that time had not agreed tentatively to a settlement, the strike was scheduled to begin immediately.

The meeting began Thursday with Dolly Carter, PEA president, saying there were three courses of action the membership could take then as a result of the negotiations status.

A settlement could be approved and if it were not the teachers could then either strike immediately, strike Tuesday if no better offer was made by the schools, or work without a contract while trying to negotiate a better settlement.

Teacher John Hopkins moved that the board's offer be rejected and the

membership voted overwhelmingly to support.

After lengthy discussions by individual teachers, Teacher Gary Hees moved they strike immediately.

After that vote failed, another motion made by Hees to strike as of today (Tuesday) if no settlement were reached over the weekend was made and carried by the 316 to 226 vote.

Mrs. Carter said that no further offer would be presented to the PEA membership unless the PEA negotiating team had tentatively agreed to it.

She told the teachers' union members that a PEA strike committee had already prepared for use of the Penn Theater and had rented an office at 320 S. Main St.

STILL AT ISSUE in the contract talks are the economic issues and planning time for elementary school teachers.

Mrs. Carter, in asking for the

offer's rejection by the membership Thursday, said the percentage of the school district budget devoted to teacher salaries has decreased from 63 per cent in 1969-70 to 55 per cent in the 1974-75 offer.

However, school officials later said this was not true. They maintained that along with fringe benefits, the teachers' share of the general budget was about 62 per cent in 1969-70 and would be about 59.6 per cent in the 1974-75 offer.

Ray Hoedel, assistant superintendent for business told the school board, which met informally to discuss the PEA negotiation situation Friday morning, there was actually a decrease in the percentage of the budget devoted to teachers since 1966-67 for four reasons. They are:

(1) The great increase in new teacher hirings to meet rapidly increasing student enrollments has meant younger teachers (who are paid less) have

been added to the teaching staff.

(2) The operations of new buildings added by the district to meet rising student enrollments has meant more money from the general fund has been diverted from staff salaries.

(3) Additional non-teaching staff has had to be hired for duties formerly performed by teachers (such as noon supervision, bus supervision, etc.).

(4) Fixed costs for the fringe benefits to teachers have more than doubled in the past nine years.

Hoedel also refuted Mrs. Carter's claim that district could borrow against its fund equity to obtain money that could be used for teachers.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT LEADERS at the high schools, who were listening in on the PEA meeting, said there would be a general meeting for all students scheduled for noon (Tuesday) in the Plymouth-Salem High School cafeteria.

PLYMOUTH—The longer it goes, the more interesting it gets and the 16th Plymouth Fall Festival could well be the most entertaining thus far what with the Bureau of State Lottery presenting the 93rd super drawings Thursday morning at 9:45 a.m. in Kellogg Park.

Thus the official kickoff of the festival starts Thursday morning, not at noon as in the past, and what could be better than to see the park filled with persons waiting to see how the lottery works and also to check their tickets to learn if they are among the lucky holders.

Then while the lottery crew cleans out its portable equipment, members of the Plymouth Women's Professional and Business Club will be preparing the tables for the annual German dinner starting at 11 a.m. and continuing through 10 p.m.

THIS WILL BE Plymouth's first view of the state lottery in action and what folks will see is a mobile unit which arrived on the scene several hours earlier and took all that time to set up.

The mobile unit shortens the time period required to set up the equipment but it doesn't solve the problems involved in sorting the 1,000 polyethylene balls used in the weekly drawing.

It takes two hours to arrange the balls in racks at the rear of the drawing platform and it takes 10 seconds for some dignitary to dump them back into a plastic drum for the drawings.

All the balls are visible as the drum rotates, but then a gate is opened at the bottom of the drum to release 10 balls into 10 receiving cups. These cups are numbered from one to 10 and two are selected to become the weekly winning numbers.

THE SELECTION process involves drawing of two envelopes from a nearby plastic globe, containing the results of previously run horse races.

The race results, provided and certified by the state racing commissioner, contain the name of a track, the date of a race, the winning horse and its post position. The post position determines which receiving cup is removed from the drum. The ball in that cup contains a three-digit number which becomes the first weekly winning number. The process is repeated to determine the second three-digit weekly winning number.

L&D fill fight goes on and on

PLYMOUTH—The Plymouth Township Board of Trustees voted last week to give the owners of L & D Service until Sept. 10, the date of its next regular meeting, to re-grade fill dirt on a site next to their station at Ridge and Ann Arbor roads.

Township officials directed the improvements in June after residents on Ridge Road south of the site complained that the fill was an eyesore and created drainage problems.

L & D owners Dennis Richardson and Lewis Hoffman were given 60 days to grade the fill away from the neighbors and slope it down to Ann Arbor Road. L & D plans to build a new station on the new site, but so far

no changes in the grade have been made.

After 60 days the owners were to bring in an engineering certificate stating the work had been completed. They haven't done so, but despite the board's most recent order, there may be no legal reason why L & D should re-grade.

Township officials had charged earlier this year the dumping of fill on the site was a violation of the township dumping ordinance, but according to Township Attorney Don Morgan, no violation exists.

Last week the board received a letter from a Lansing construction firm asking on behalf of L & D for more time to comply with board requests, with the implication that construction was in the offing.

"They're not really talking about grading and we're not talking about a building site," said Township Clerk Helen Richardson.

"I don't believe that the two actions are compatible with one another," said Trustee Russell Ash. He moved that the supervisor "communicate in writing the 60 days to complete the work have been exceeded and that L & D be requested to respond as to their intention of complying with the board's direction no later than the next regular meeting.

Attorney Morgan sent the board his opinion on the question last May. "Quite simply, there are so many ambiguities in the language contained in... (the zoning ordinance) that one could well argue that the dumping of dirt to a level equal to the abutting road is specifically permitted." (The fill is now level to Ann Arbor Road.)

"There exist no grounds," he concluded, "for the Township of Plymouth to take a stand either by way of criminal prosecution or civil law suit on one side or the other of the dispute."

Ann Arbor Rd. closed

PLYMOUTH—State Highway Dept. officials have announced that Ann Arbor Road (M-14) will be closed between Lilley Road and Main Street for 45 working days starting today (Tuesday).

Local traffic can enter from either direction as far as the Tonquish Creek bridge which is being rebuilt in anticipation of the road's widening.

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Bike theft ring believed broken up

The arrest of three Redford persons and recovery of 13 bicycles, 10 speed type, is believed by police to have broken up a bike theft ring that has been working in Redford, Livonia, Westland, Plymouth Township and Farmington.

Detective Sgt. Richard Ericson said members of the Livonia police saturation patrol have had the suspects under surveillance for some time and that the trio were seen by police in the process of taking two bikes in Westland shortly after midnight Wednesday.

Charged with the theft and released to appear at a later date in Westland District Court are Ronald Parrett, 24, of 15335 Wormer, Edward Barnum, 36, of 15944 Kinloch, and a 16-year-old boy.

"THE THREE suspects were spotted in the Cherry Hill-Merriman Road area by our officers," the sergeant said.

"Assisted by officers from Westland and Garden City, the trio was arrested early in the morning and the bikes confiscated," Ericson said.

Bikes were recovered from the homes of the suspects, investigation revealing the bikes had been taken from Livonia, Redford, Detroit, Plymouth Township, Westland, and Farmington," Ericson said.

One bike, he added, had been taken off a camper in Franhenmuth. According to Ericson, the suspects would canvass neighborhoods during the day, spot the 10-speed bikes, and return after dark to pick them up.

"Some bikes were actually left on the front lawns or in the driveways by their owners, making the theft easy," the sergeant added.

He said only one of the 13 bikes recovered had a license and, because some of the owners had not reported their loss, returning the bikes to them was difficult.

"If the bikes had been licensed by the individual's police department, it would have made it much easier to find the owners," Ericson said.

THE SERGEANT SOUNDED a warning to bike owners, urging them to lock them up at night and not leave them sitting "like an invitation" in front of the owners' homes.

County executive proposal defeated by commissioners

Suburban commissioners were outvoted Thursday when the Wayne County Board of Commissioners voted 13-10 against placing a proposal on the November ballot asking approval of a county executive.

Champions of the effort to seek voter approval of an elected county executive were Chairman Robert FitzPatrick and Commissioner Mary Dumas (R-Livonia).

JOINING THESE two Thursday in voting to place the question on the ballot were Tom Taylor (D-Westland), Richard Manning (D-Redford), and Brian Arrowsmith (D-Canton).

Mrs. Dumas, who had fought earlier to have the proposal on the August primary ballot and lost that battle, was on vacation when the item was scheduled for a vote but flew back from New Brunswick to vote Thursday.

FitzPatrick, who had been criticized as favoring the proposal only to gain the position for himself, commented after the vote was taken: "From my point of view, the issue is now dead. It appears the county will never have an executive branch."

Commissioner James DeSana then made a motion to place the proposal on the ballot in 1976. He urged that a commitment be made to begin an involved study process to determine specifics on the county executive position, such as salary and nature of job responsibilities.

DeSana's motion, however, was ruled out of order. The board's legal advisors said the motion was improper on two counts: because the board couldn't commit a future board to that action, and because the law states the proposal must go on the ballot within 180 days after being approved by commissioners.

ABOUT 100 persons attending the meeting, mostly UAW CAP persons, applauded when the motion for November balloting was defeated. In August, a coalition of labor leaders, blacks, and elected county leaders led a fight against a primary vote on the issue. That same coalition led the fight this month against a vote in November.

The debate lasted for about 30 minutes, but when it was over, the suburban commissioners and others in favor of a county executive found themselves four votes short of a victory. Fourteen votes were needed for passage.

Opponents had asked for a delay to allow the state enabling legislation to be amended for clarity and to prevent the need for a primary for the office to be held on the same ballot as the proposal to create the position.

Sen Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) was working on the clarifying amendments in Lansing and had given FitzPatrick assurances that the legislation would be changed to meet most objections of the coalition critics.

Financial aids director named

Schoolcraft College in Livonia has appointed John B. Tomey of Farmington Hills as director of financial aids.

Tomey's appointment was announced by Edward V. McNally, vice-president for student affairs, who said it became effective Aug. 12. He fills a vacancy created by the return of Keith M. Witmer to the college's counseling staff.

Tomey has had considerable experience in student financial aids, serving as director of the program at the University of Detroit since 1968. Before that he worked in U-D's adult education and registration offices.

A 1958 graduate of Redford St. Mary High School, he holds a bachelor's degree in finance and a master's in economics, both from U-D.

He is a member of the committee on state planning of financial aid programs with the Michigan Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators.

Schoolcraft gets \$400,000 to expand satellite campus

The Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees has officially accepted a \$400,000 grant, for expansion of Garden City Instructional Services.

The administration of the college will develop and implement a budget based on an expenditure outline limited to the Garden City program.

The board later unanimously voted to spend a portion of that grant to enlarge the parking lot at the Instructional Center in Garden City.

The board's approval gave the administration authorization to award a contract to do the required work upon receipt of one or more satisfactory bids, for a sum not to exceed \$12,000.

BY A VOTE of five to three, the board also awarded the IBM Corporation a contract for the purchase of two IBM card punch machines at a total price of \$6,390.

The machines will be used for the data processing instructional program at Schoolcraft. In the past, the college had rented the two machines at an annual cost of \$1,700.

The approved budget under the VEA Grant for the purchase of equipment for on-going programs included the machines. Under the rental system, Schoolcraft pays the entire fee, whereas if the college buys the machines the state will pay 50 per cent.

IN OTHER expenditures, the board voted unanimously to authorize the administration to issue a purchase order to Bauer Foster of Wixom, for the installation of a new finish on the auto shop floor.

The expenditure, amounting to \$5,445, will be charged to the special maintenance fund.

The board also agreed to execute a purchase order agreement with B and V Construction Company of Novi, to extend the storm sewer line from the outdoor physical education and site development project, southeast about 350 feet and to fill and grade the surrounding area of about eight acres.

The costs, not to exceed \$5,000, will be charged to the building and site fund.

UNRA to open new headquarters

United Northwestern Realty Association (UNRA) and Western Wayne Oakland County Board of Realtors will open new headquarters Thursday, in Farmington.

The building, at 24125 Drake at the corner of Grand River, is triple the size of the previous Redford headquarters of the 3,400-member organization.

Besides general offices, the building will house UNRA computer and multi-list operations, credit union offices, classrooms and printshop.

BEGINNING AT 9:45 a.m., the dedication ceremonies, which precede a two-hour open house, will include cutting of a symbolic ribbon of UNRA property listing cards by UNRA President Lois C. Dicks and Robert Carey, president of the Michigan Association of Realtors.

Others taking part include: William Bowman, UNRA immediate past president; William Booth, president of UNRA's Past Presidents' Club; Jerry Rozema, UNRA vice-president; Theodore Zukowsky, secretary-treasurer; and Michael Samonek, executive vice-president.

The 2.5 acre site in the City of Farmington includes the former home of the Michigan Children's Aid Society, which was completely renovated and expanded to furnish almost 15,000 square feet in a two-level structure.

The building was designed by Lindhout Associates architectural firm with Gordon B. Hall and Sons as general contractor.

THE NEW OFFICES will be open to public inspection from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday, Sept. 6, with staff on hand to answer questions on the organization's operations.

Founded in 1920, UNRA was one of

the first multiple-listing real estate associations in the nation which, in effect, placed the entire sales staffs of member firms as agents for property listed with any member.

Gardner joined GM as a college graduate in training in Indianapolis in 1957. He was named a labor relations representative in 1958 and supervisor of labor relations two years later.

He became assistant personnel director at Chevrolet's transmission plant at Toledo in 1962. He came to Detroit in 1963.

SC enrollment to top record

Enrollment at Schoolcraft College this fall stands a good chance of reaching an all-time high, according to Edward McNally, vice president for student affairs.

As of Aug. 28, regular student enrollment was 6,391 with eight more days to the end of late registration. This excludes the 1,275 already enrolled in community services.

According to McNally, the current enrollment is already 21 more than last year at the end of late registration.

Teachers: a strike only hurts students

Plymouth schools' teachers will have faced a difficult decision by the time this appears in print — to strike or not to strike as a means of demonstrating they want more money than the school board is willing to give.

Even the fact that the teachers would consider this disruption of the school year is an a crime against our school children.

While the Plymouth Education Association general membership was meeting Thursday morning to decide on a course of action, several high school students were listening through the doors anxiously hoping, they said, the teachers would start school on time.

Possibly the teachers inside the high school auditorium didn't know their students were so interested in what was going on. It was ironic to watch the students discussing the teacher negotiation situation even while some PEA members were calling for a strike that would hurt these students.

A RAISE IS WARRANTED for our district's teachers. There is no question about that. The rising cost of living factor affects what our teachers can put on their dinner tables just as it affects the rest of us.

But what is at issue is how much is warranted and how much can be afforded.

The question of how much salary increase for teachers is warranted cannot be simply answered — we each have an opinion on that.

The question of what the district can afford is clearer, but still subject to interpretation.

The school administrators and board say their last offer was as much as could be given. Of course, they said that once before and then turned around and changed their minds.

PEA officials say the district could borrow against its fund equity. School officials say that's bad practice.

WHAT THE TEACHERS should remember in answering the question of what the district can afford to give is that in June, the voters approved an operating millage renewal, a safety millage (meaning an increase in taxes) and a building bond issue (which also means a larger tax bite).

The bond issue had failed twice previously, and last fall the school board had to threaten cutting programs before voters would approve a one mill operating increase.

If teachers strike and disrupt the school year, the very tenuous community support demonstrated in the June millage votes will be damaged.

As of Thursday, the school board was offering raises of seven per cent for the first year and six per cent or two-thirds of the cost of living for the second. (This does not include the annual increments as well.)

Should teachers decide a strike is necessary to air their demands, the community will weigh these factors.

"No contract, no work," seems to be the motto this year for the PEA. It's too bad those 560 teachers in the meeting Thursday couldn't see the students listening through the doors.

If they had, they might have decided that the obligation of educators is to educate. The can and should meet that obligation to their students even if negotiations haven't been worked out with the school district.

Remember, teachers — it's never too late to take that course of action.

Several years ago I was very active in school affairs relating to millage requests versus the S.E.V. of the school district. Lately I have remained quiet on this subject as I did not wish to become a second Ralph Nader, but, I have made a study and arrived at some things the public should know.

For the coming year the school district S.E.V. jumps roughly 15 per cent or approximately \$50 million, give or take a million or so. Yet we are asked to vote on additional millage for safety. We do expect an additional number of pupils which will use up some of this extra money. Also we probably will lose a little state aid. The big question is the budget of the school district. Why?

Now, it looks as though the teachers are planning a strike. Do you know what they are asking? Well, according to one official who should know, it is 13 per cent. This is on top of built-

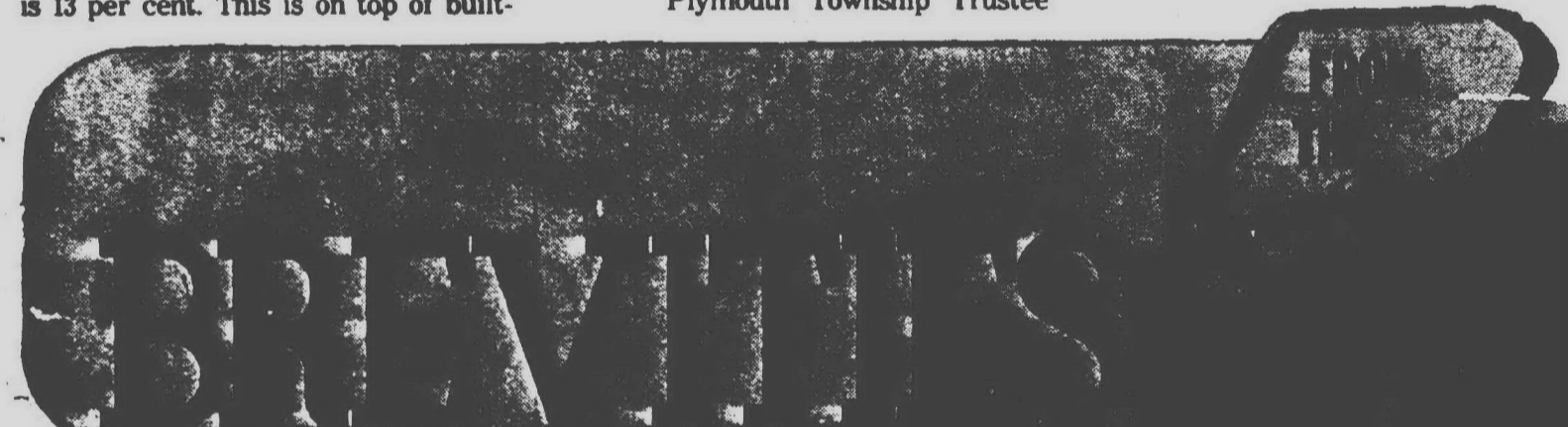
in increases of from 4.5 per cent to seven per cent.

Currently the Plymouth-Canton Development Commission is reviewing its responsibility of providing a non-residential tax base to support the schools and relieve the homeowner. Presently, in Plymouth Township, roughly 56 per cent of tax money comes from business and industry.

If it turns out to be the union we may as well give up. Why spend tax dollars to help the taxpaying homeowner if the help never reaches them?

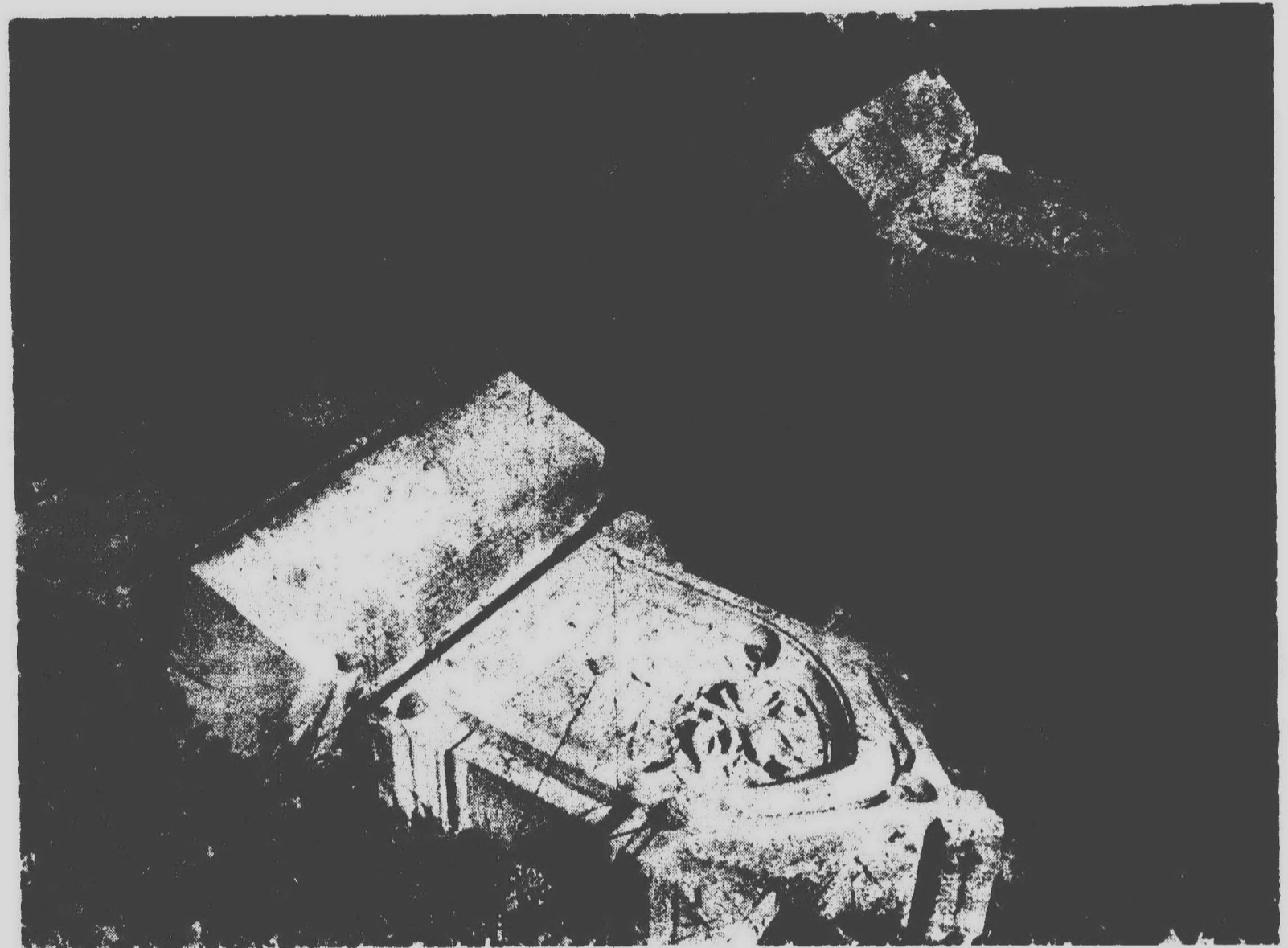

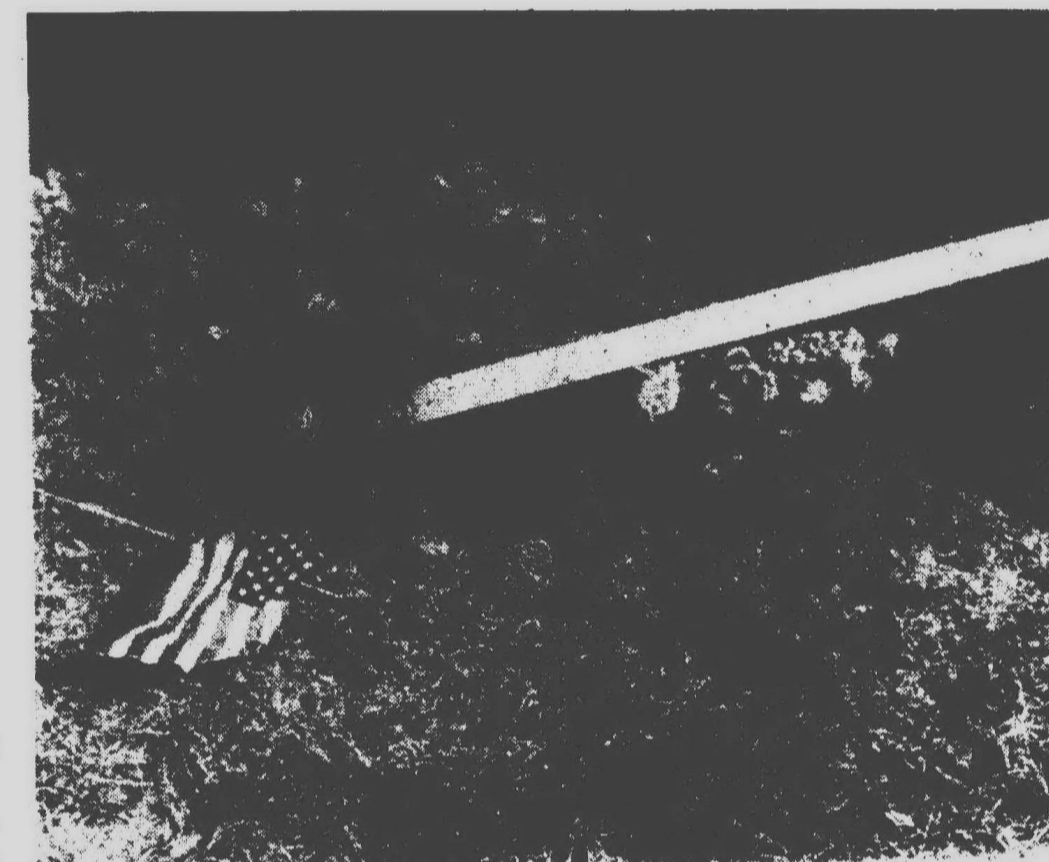

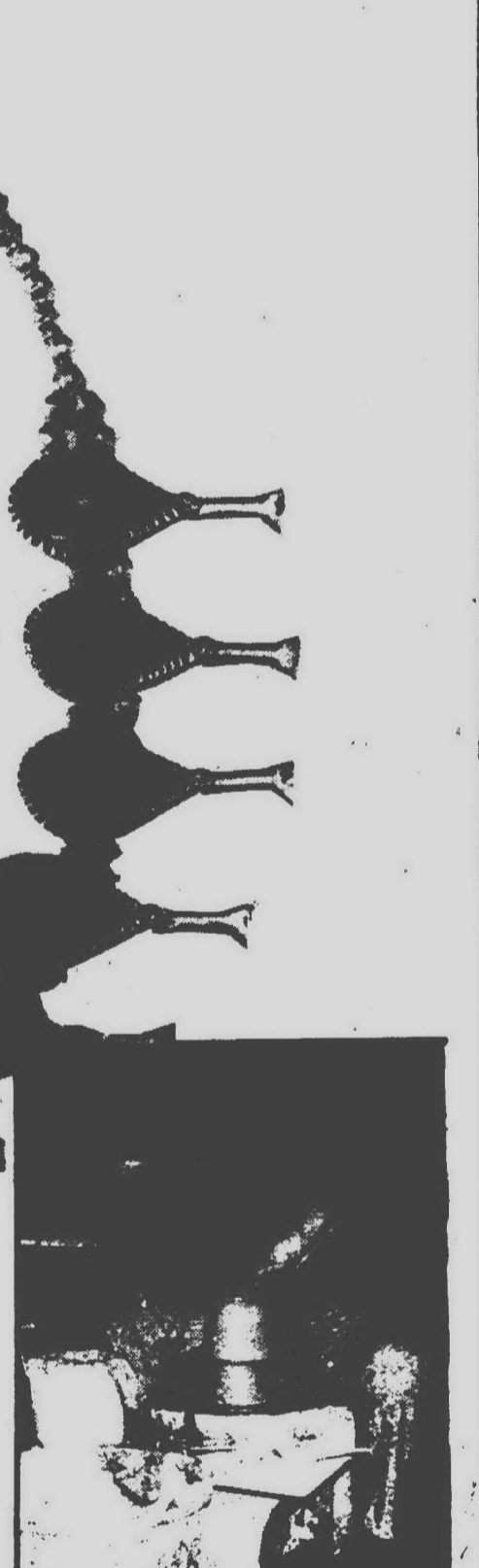

Carroll tells HRP issues for congress bid in 2nd

This is the first year that the Human Rights Party (HRP) is entering candidates in congressional races and its choice for the 2nd District is Philip S. Carroll.

Carroll, 40, of 1006 Lincoln Avenue, Ann Arbor, is a research engineer for the University of Michigan Highway Safety Research Institute. He was nominated at the state HRP convention and his name will appear on the November ballot under that party's designation.

CARROLL'S background includes involvement in the anti-war movement, United Farm Workers boycott, Ann

Arbor People's food co-op, former scout leader and PTO president.

He was a HRP city council candidate in Ann Arbor in 1973 and that same year was a delegate to the

World Congress for Peace in Moscow.

He says HRP's purpose is "to reach out to larger groups of people, and to demonstrate the need for a radical third party movement in America. Our candidacies will provide an alternative for those who can no longer support the capitalist parties, and who wish instead to join the struggle for fundamental social change."

Carroll explains the Human Rights Party is a democratic socialist peoples' party. "HRP is a democratic party because we believe everyone should have an equal voice in the decisions of society which affect our lives — starting with families, communities, schools, and workplaces — and always ensuring that political power flows upward from the people instead of downward from a centralized bureaucracy."

"HRP is a socialist party because we believe in economic equality whereby the resources of the world are shared by all according to their collective needs, rather than control by a powerful few who profit from exploitation of workers, corporate monopoly, and ownership of land."

"HRP is a people's party because we believe in full human rights for all people regardless of race, sex, age, sexual preference, or any other form of discrimination."

A KEY ISSUE in the campaign, Carroll says, will be ending U.S. militarism and imperialism, as a prerequisite to world peace.

"Eventually, we will need a world government which can guarantee peace by ensuring self-determination of all peoples of the world."

"Meanwhile, we need to cut our defense budget drastically, freeing billions of dollars for real human needs. Our troops should be brought home, and our interference in places like Chile, Indochina, Africa, the Philippines, and the Middle East should cease. HRP supports unconditional amnesty for all resisters of the Vietnam War."

POVERTY IN AMERICA is a national disgrace, Carroll adds.

"We are capable of solving the problem, beginning with programs of guaranteed income and employment opportunities made available by cuts in defense spending and steeply graduated taxes on income, wealth, inheritances, and profits."

"Those most able to pay taxes should pay most. Prices should be controlled but not wages."

"Energy, transportation, and other basic industries should be nationalized and run by elected consumers and workers. Free health care must be available to everyone."

The HRP consistently supports movements to end racism, sexism, ageism, and class discrimination, Carroll continues. "This campaign especially gives us an opportunity to support cross-district busing of students as one means of promoting racial integration — especially in cities such as Detroit where a representative biracial panel developed the court plan."

"However, we will not support busing when it is aimed at breaking up community control efforts of minorities who have been systematically denied their basic human rights."

Access, not cost, is transit problem

A majority of mobility-limited Michigan residents cite transportation access not cost as their chief problem, concluded a recent forum sponsored by the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation.

Participating in the forum were representatives from state social service, volunteer agencies, bus equipment manufacturers, local bus systems and Dial-A-Ride managers.

The representatives gathered to discuss the transportation needs of some 800,000 handicapped and elderly Michigan residents — or about one Michigan resident in 11 — who have mobility limitations to some extent.

According to the forum's conclusions, mobility-limited persons cannot take the first step from their door to a bus stop, or from a curb onto a conventional bus step, or recognize on sight when to get off a city bus.

Attempts are being made to meet these needs through special transportation programs, the forum concluded, but more effort should be made to integrate transportation for

the handicapped and elderly with public transportation used by the able-bodied.

Special equipment available include extendable bottom steps for buses which provide four-inch ground clearance and wheelchair hoists.

But panel participants said public transportation won't effectively serve the needs of the mobility limited until all city buses or Dial-A-Ride vans are accessible.

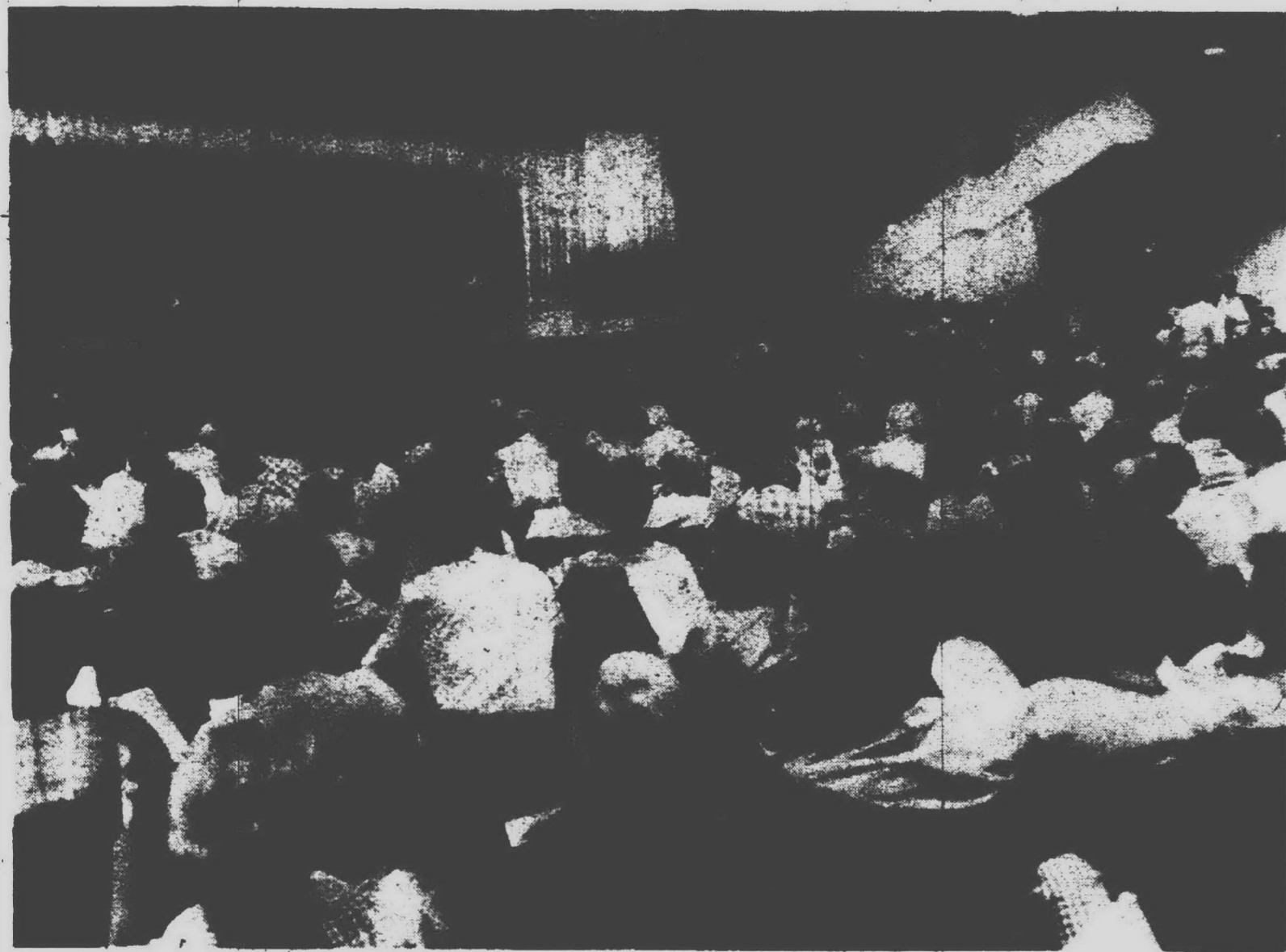

Woman joins Crime Lab

PLYMOUTH—"Something new" has been added to the Michigan State Police crime laboratory in Plymouth. For the first time in the history of the Michigan State Police, crime laboratory system, a woman has been hired as a laboratory scientist.

Kathryn Vandenberg, a 32-year-old former teacher and a resident of Redford Township, is working with other specialists in this satellite laboratory. Mrs. Vandenberg, who taught as a substitute teacher in both the South Redford and Redford Union school districts, works under the supervision of Detective Sgt. Marvin Szumlinski in the narcotic and dangerous drugs analysis section of the laboratory.

Born in Nebraska, Mrs. Vandenberg earned her bachelor of science degree from the University of Nebraska and obtained her masters in biology from Virginia Polytechnical Institute.

"MY HUSBAND and I came to Redford in 1968, and from 1969 through 1971, I was a substitute teacher, at all levels, in both Redford school districts.

"I taught part-time also at Schoolcraft College, Wayne County Community College and at Henry Ford Community College," Mrs. Vandenberg said.

It was at Schoolcraft College, where she had numerous law enforcement officers in her class who were working toward degrees, that she became interested in police work.

There she met Lt. Eugene Weiler,

the recently appointed commander of the Plymouth crime lab.

"I was looking for full time work, and Lt. Weiler told me the State Police were taking applications for laboratory scientists," she said.

As is the case of other "civilian" employees in the crime lab, "Kit," as her friends call her, actually has on-the-job training in police work.

Although specialists hold degrees in science, police crime lab work is something new and has to be learned under the supervision of Michigan State Police experts. This knowledge the scientists get while working at the crime lab.

To be considered as a crime lab technician, a person must have the minimum of a bachelor's degree, Sgt. Szumlinski said.

MRS. VANDEBERG is one of 19 specialists working in the Plymouth lab of a staff of 25. Although she is the first woman to be hired as a laboratory scientist, the Michigan State Police have hired a second woman to work in the crime lab in East Lansing.

"It's fascinating work, and there's so much to learn," she smiled. "This is an entirely new field from teaching even though the courses I taught were primarily human anatomy and biology."

Even though her job keeps her busy, she is still busy at home in Redford where she has a husband, who is a teacher at Wayne State University, and three sons, ages 11, five and three.

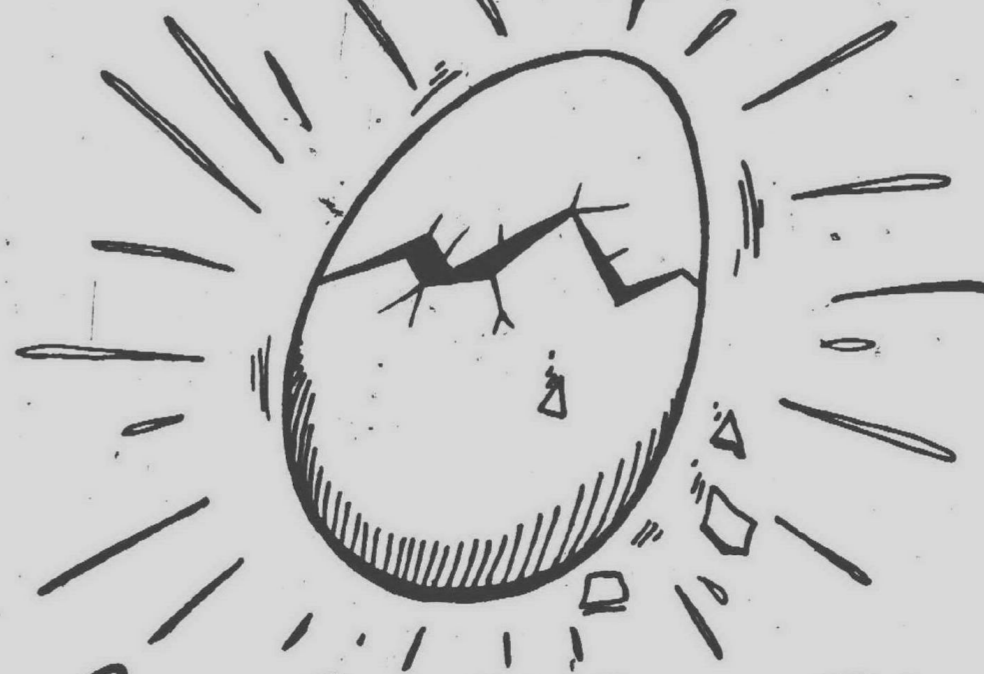

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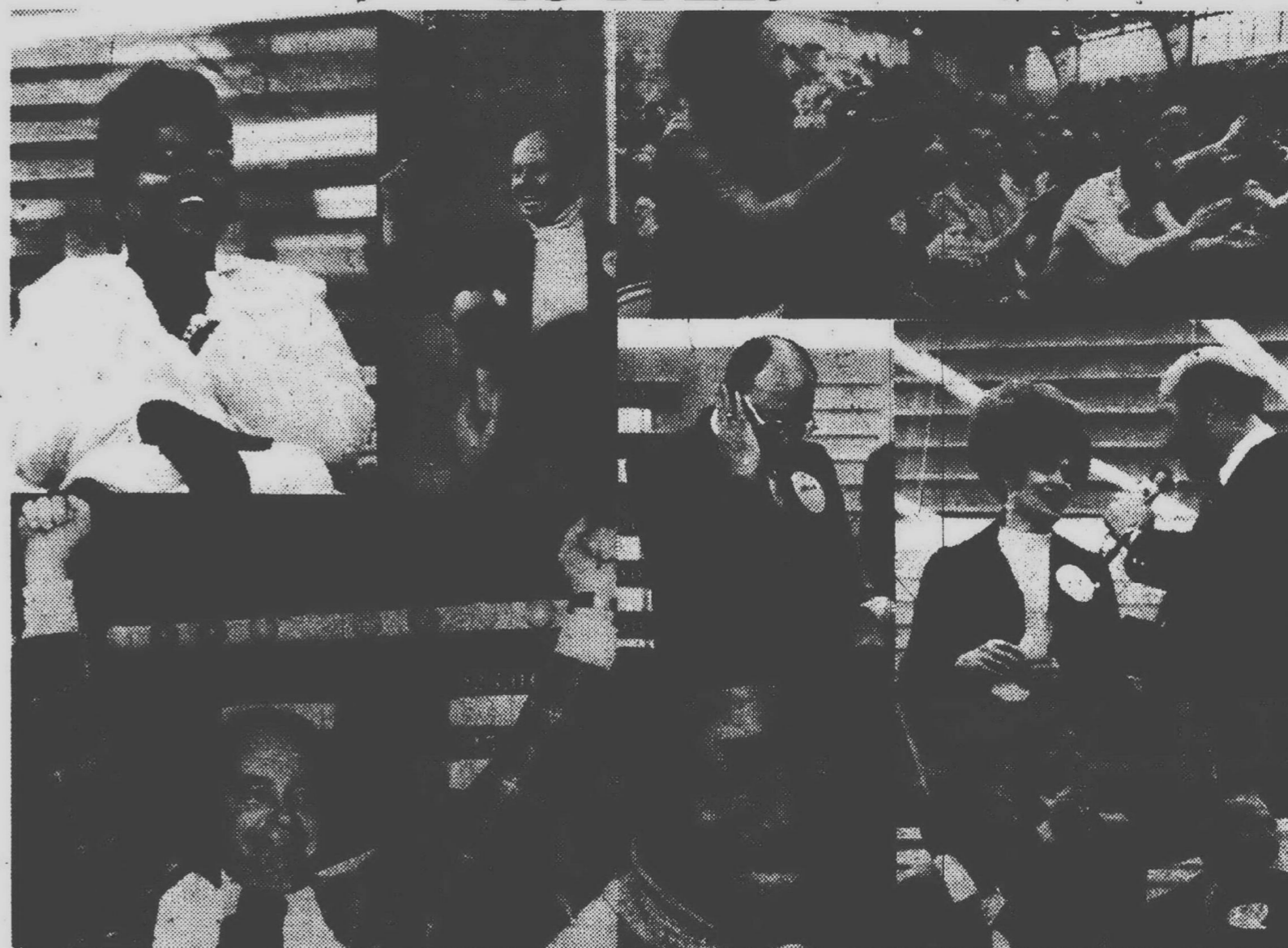
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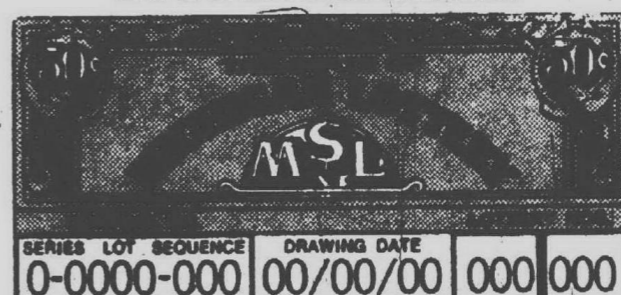

Wayne County will stay back in the 19th century

Members of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners looked at the galleries Thursday and saw they were full of United Auto Workers CAP political workers. They were there to demonstrate their opposition to placing a county executive proposal on the ballot.

"We should have given county employees the day off, too," said the county legislator. "At least their union was supporting the issue."

The UAW politicians deserve their knocks, of course, although they weren't the only pressure group fighting against reform. Power-hungry groups in Detroit's city government can take a portion of the blame for their paranoid fear that a county executive will overshadow the mayor. A few suburbanites of less than progressive impulses went along with the 13-10 vote against the county executive proposal.

POLITICIANS DON'T always do bad things. When they vote right, they deserve a pat on the back, and such pats go to Mary Dumas (R-Livonia), Dick Manning (D-Redford), Tom Taylor (D-Westland) and Brian Arrowsmith (D-Canton).

Under great pressure from the negative bloc and at the cost of great frustration, the local commissioners fought to give voters a chance to bring Wayne County government into the 20th century.

It was unfortunate that in recent days the personality of Board Chairman Robert FitzPatrick got dragged into the issue. FitzPatrick championed the cause and has done more than any other leader to make county government a dynamic public servant instead of a hydra-headed, legalistic bureaucracy.

FitzPatrick was frankly interested in running

for the county executive job, and he was unfairly accused of trying to create a position for himself.

In the first place, FitzPatrick was only one of many progressives favoring reform. In the second place, he was probably the best qualified person for the job. In the third place, even if someone else were to be elected, the post is still worth creating. In the fourth place, FitzPatrick has enough going for him in the business world where he doesn't need to featherbed at county expense.

SO HERE we are, right back where we were in the 1850s with a bunch of obscure people like a drain commissioner and a register of deeds constituting our executive leadership.

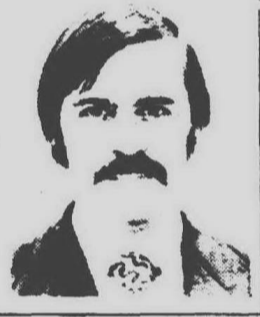
The county budget — or less than half, to be precise — is drawn up by a three-man board of auditors. We elect them. Do you remember whom you voted for as county auditor last election? Have you ever heard of a county auditor facing a service club or a civic group and explaining his governmental priorities? We haven't either.

And the majority of the county budget will continue to be spent by a group almost as invisible: The County Road Commission whose members are appointed for staggered terms and who never have to face the electorate.

The county executive proposal that we're prohibited from voting on wouldn't have eliminated those anachronistic auditors and road commissioners, but it would have been a step in the right direction.

Here's hoping the League of Women Voters, the Jaycees and some other citizens groups feel the same way and start a petition drive to place the county executive proposal on the ballot in 1976.

The big dreams aren't the same as the little ones, the tax write offs or hobbies you can afford. Middle class priorities are reversed, and the

kids understand this better than anybody. First comes the hyped up, gut-aching need, the total desire to be immersed in something that roars around, moves, and glistens. Later for money, the job, and the payments.

Stretch this a bit and it isn't confined to adolescent fantasy. But Ernie didn't think much about things like that.

Ernie had backed off a long time ago. Saturday night he bought the beer, and when he could, he liked to be able to reach into the insides of an engine, turn an adjusting screw, listen to the sound, and then amble off.

A lot of truck drivers knew you could get him out of bed in the middle of the night, and he would get their bread and butter going again in time for deliveries.

In return, he had more work than he could handle, and did it at his own pace.

THE LAST TIME I saw Ernie he was wiping his hands off, looking at the half-finished chassis of a "chopped T" roadster, the kind of teenage fantasy that rolls onto the street with one chrome wheel and three plain ones, always a couple of paychecks away from completion.

"Yeah," he grinned with a look of secret amusement. "Pretty soon that thing will be rolling down the road."

What Ernie knew, that the kids didn't, was there really wasn't much place to go.

What to do about ragweed

Ragweed season is here.

If you have noticed nasal stuffiness, runny nose, sneezing, or itchiness of the nose, throat or eyes since Aug. 14 or 15, especially in the early morning hours, chances are you are allergic to ragweed pollen and have ragweed "hay fever."

Asthma with coughing, wheezing, and chest congestion will sometimes occur either alone or in combination with hay fever. Symptoms of either hay fever or asthma may vary in severity from a minor nuisance to being completely disabling.

Billions of dollars are lost each year due to loss of work time and efficiency related to allergic disease. Personal discomfort and suffering is immense.

WHAT CAN one do to remedy ragweed allergic disease?

An attempt could be made to eradicate the ragweed plant, but this is impossible. One plant may produce a million pollen grains, and the wind can carry these grains as far as 400 miles from their source.

An easier solution would be to move west of the Rockies, to Northern Canada or to Europe, all places where ragweed pollen isn't prevalent.

One could stay in the house in air conditioning until the season ends in early to mid-October and get some relief. One can take antihistamines or decongestant tablets—there are hundreds of brands available by prescription or over-the-counter, all more or less equivalent and interchangeable.

Antihistamines may afford temporary control of symptoms, but have undesirable and even serious side effects in some patients, and don't affect the basic disease process of anti-ragweed antibody-ragweed reaction.

which occurs in the body of allergic persons. Nasal sprays or drops should be generally avoided. Cortisone has serious long-term side effects and is a drug of last resort and not recommended.

FINALLY, ONE could wait to see if he will "outgrow" it.

This plan is recommended at times even by doctors. However, chances are slim (probably 20-25 per cent in childhood asthma, and even less in hay fever, and practically zero in adult onset of hay fever or asthma.

All of us, of course, have known people who have suffered from hay fever or asthma throughout their childhood and early adulthood and gradually improved. It's like skipping your whole life so you will enjoy retirement. It's like pointing to the 80-year-old who has smoked all his life and doesn't have cancer or emphysema and saying: "He made it-let's try."

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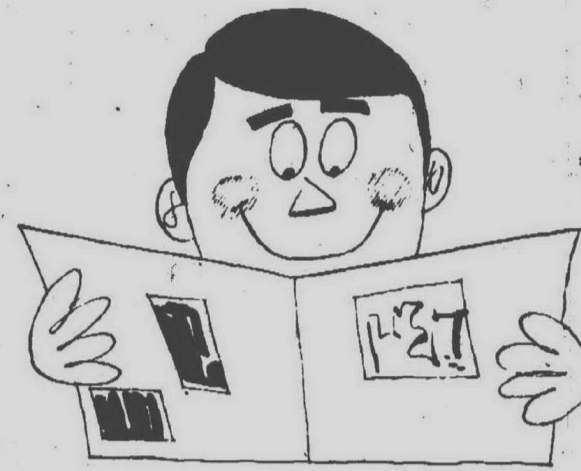
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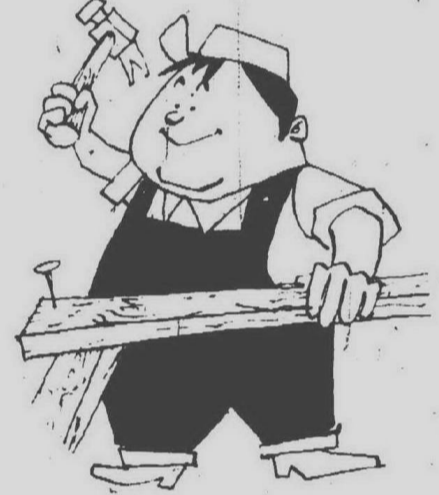
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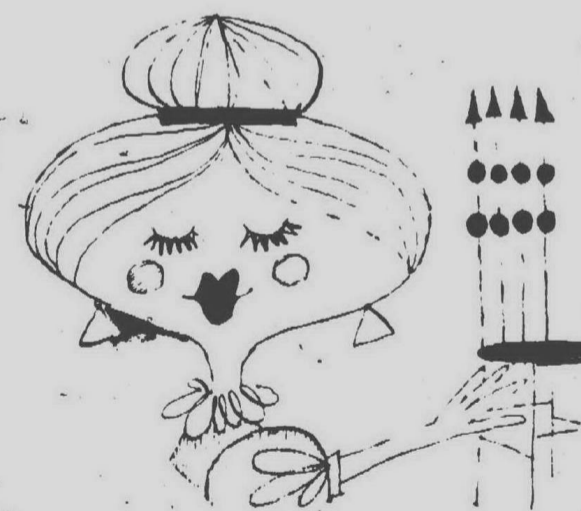

Child abuse hurts kids and parents

"Child abuse is everywhere," said Mrs. Gwen Jansma, who conducts a program for abusive parents at Newburg United Methodist Church in Livonia.

"It involves parents on ADC as well as junior executive types and includes rich and poor," she said. "Social strata, race, educational or economic levels are not factors in child abuse." "She added: "Parents who abuse children in almost every case were abused themselves when they were young."

Very often just one child in a family is the abused one, noted Mrs. Jansma, who is a psychologist. He or she is a special child in some way or other, maybe born during a family crisis such as a death or divorce, maybe resembling a hated mother. If the parent hates males and the child is male he may be injured for this reason.

PARENTS ANONYMOUS is a group that has been formed to deal with this problem.

"A few years ago a child named Lisa Drake was lost in Dearborn Heights," said Mrs. Jansma. "It was then discovered that she had been murdered by her mother. As a result of the publicity about the case, social workers in the area contacted a woman who called herself Jolly K."

"An abusive parent herself, she had started Parents Anonymous in California to help parents who had the same problem. Jolly K. came to Detroit and from that event, a chapter of PA started in Michigan in March 1972."

"Now there are about 100 PA groups nationwide," said Mrs. Jansma. "We have 22 of them in Mich-

igan. We are a self-help organization not attached to any social agency. We are not funded by anyone and we don't have any money."

IN THE GROUPS of about 10 people who come together for help there is one professional person present. A volunteer, Mrs. Jansma serves that purpose for the group at the Newburg church.

"The first thing that is done in these group therapy sessions is to see that actual abuse stops, especially if physical abuse is involved," said Mrs. Jansma.

Taking a leaf from the notebook of Alcoholic Anonymous, the group has established a telephone chain of all its members.

"We try to teach them to recognize

signs in themselves that they are going to be out of control," Mrs. Jansma continued. "When they feel that something is coming on they run to the telephone and talk with a group member rather than taking out their feelings on their child."

"This almost always works during the first few months," she said. "The parents doesn't always love the child but the abuse stops."

THE NEXT STEP is to work on the mother's or father's self concept and see how to improve how the parents feel about themselves.

"Usually they don't like themselves at all," said Mrs. Jansma. "Until that changes they are not going to accept the child."

PA is anonymous, so the members use only each other's first names. Mrs. Jansma also knows only their first names.

"The group draws many people who want to tell their story and admit their feelings in a place where they will not be judged," explained Mrs. Jansma. "Some parents anticipate that they are going to be abusive and come before it happens."

"Those are the ones we like to get," she said. "Once a parent starts abusing, the whole family is in turmoil. But if caught early the child is still in good mental health and it is not so big a job to unravel the whole matter."

She added: "Our organization would like to be a preventive organization rather than a mopping-up one."

MRS. JANSMA ENCOURAGES members to bring crucial problems to the group so they can find out what happened and see how it could be prevented.

"We try to build self-esteem by focusing on their strengths rather than

their weaknesses," she said. "All of them have real strengths but they have only been seeing the bad side. The group gives them feedbacks on their good points and they find they are good, worthwhile people."

"There is a great deal of love, concern and care shown by our members."

In what way?

"The ex-husband of a group member tried to rape her," said Mrs. Jansma. "She needed time to pull herself together from the incident, so she called another member who has four children and looks after two others and asked if she could also take care of her four children for two days. The woman agreed. That meant 10 children she was looking after."

"Now if that isn't an act of love, I don't know what is," said Mrs. Jansma.



SHE FEELS A PERSON is improving when he can go a whole week without any incident of abuse, or when he can help members who come in, or when he begins to be good to himself rather than doing destructive things to himself.

"Anyone who feels himself capable of an unspeakable act will consider himself as a non-person," she stated. "Such people think of themselves as not worthy of being human."

Mrs. Jansma is pleased that the whole matter of child abuse is coming out in the open.

"Now it is no longer so unspeakable and we can talk about it," she said.

"Parents come to PA because they want to stop abusing their children. Many have prayed that it won't happen to them but it will. As children, they never learned how to get rid of their feelings of hatred and anger."

Mrs. Jansma became interested in working with a PA group through the request of a friend who was an abusive parent.

After two years of work she has begun to receive letters from former members of PA. "They tell me they've gone back to school, found a job or they mention some nice incident concerning the child they once abused," she smiled.

Mrs. Jansma works primarily with women. "Women generally come for help more easily than men because men feel they are too strong to need help."

She concluded: "It is a tremendously rewarding experience to see a person come into the group feeling she is totally worthless and see her uncover the beautiful person that is inside."

Kids are people at New Morning

School is different things to different people. To three youngsters who attend public schools, the best part of school is recess. But to one student, the best part of school is learning about the rockets.

Tyler Heaven attends New Morning School in Northville, a place that is dedicated to the belief that children should have the opportunity to find joy, challenge, success and excitement in learning.

The school has almost doubled its enrollment in the year that it has been in existence. The first year 11 students attended this alternative school. This year the enrollment stands at 16 students between the ages of five and 11.

One full time teacher and two part-time teachers have the main task of teaching the children, but the parents also have a responsibility to the school.

"PARENTS HAVE to take some role in the school," said Sheila De John one of the part-time teachers.

Parents serve as administrators, janitors, secretaries, curriculum planners, treasurers, carpenters, and whatever else needs doing at the school.

Students at New Morning come from all over the area—some from as far away as Inkster. There is a current maximum enrollment set at 20 students in an attempt to treat the children as individuals.

"We start with what the child is interested in learning, rather than what the teacher thinks the child has to learn," said Rita Heaven, another part-time teacher.

"The child and his teacher work out a contract. Sometimes it is a daily contract, and with the older children it can extend to a week," Mrs. Heaven added.

THE CONTRACT is jointly talked out with the student and his teacher, and tells both exactly what the student intends to accomplish during the period of the contract.

New Morning meets all the requirements of the Michigan State Board of Education, and is certified to instruct students up to the eighth grade.

Despite the freedom given to the children, they still learn the basics—with a special emphasis on reading skills.

The diverse age groups also allow the students a chance to share knowledge and experiences.

"It isn't at all uncommon for the older children to read to the younger children," said Mrs. De John. "And the younger children will also read to the older ones," she added.

THE SMALLER classroom situation also allows students the freedom to move around when they desire. It is not uncommon, according to the two women, for a student to go outside to play and then finish the work required on the contract.

But the most important function of the school is to develop the child's self-image as an individual. Toward this end, the students work out any problems that might arise in a group discussion.

"We try to find creative solutions to all problems," said Mrs. Heaven.

The school also does not place an exclusive emphasis on the physical building where the school is housed. Field trips are often the rule rather than the exception, and last year's trips included visits to the Detroit science center, a train ride to Jackson, and a visit to the planetarium there.

In addition, students also visited a dairy, and a meat packaging plant.

Although the school must be in session for the 180 days required by the state, some flexibility is available at New Morning. On one of the field trips last year, the students attended school for half a day on Friday, and spent Saturday on their trip.

"THE SATURDAY trips are often supervised by the fathers, who also take an active role in the school," Mrs. De John said.

The teachers at the school are also willing and even open to change. "Although there were no major overhauls in the curriculum," Mrs. Heaven said, "as the year progressed, we kept the things that worked and threw out what didn't."

One of the things that has been kept is the emphasis on community resource people. "We are going to try to have either someone to come and speak to the children, or plan a field trip at least once a week," Mrs. Heaven said.

Safety commission wants volunteers

Each year an estimated 20 million Americans are injured by products used in and around the home; 110,000 are permanently disabled; and 30,000 are killed.

In order to protect the public against unreasonable risks of injury associated with consumer products and to assist consumers in evaluating the comparative safety of the products, Congress passed the Consumer Product Safety Act.

The act created an independent federal regulatory agency with a goal of reducing injuries associated with consumer products.

UNTIL NOW, most safety standards have been developed on a voluntary basis by industry groups and government safety personnel. Most of the people from these groups typically came from the technical side of product testing and were scientists or engineers.

But while technical expertise in testing is important, the safety of a product can also be judged on a daily basis by the people who use the product—mostly to determine how people use and misuse it.

In an effort to better understand the "people" side of consumer usage, the Consumer Product Safety Commission is asking for volunteers.

Volunteer names will be placed on the commission's rosters, and contacted by the commission.

Although no special expertise is needed, there is a demand for women with specialized technical training.

PRIMARILY, however, the commission is looking for women who know how a product is used at home; for women to ask questions of the people in the laboratories on safety; for women who know how a child might use or misuse a product; and for women to determine whether the price of safety features is excessive.

People from all over the country

are invited to volunteer by sending a letter to the commission with their name, address and telephone number. In addition, volunteers may list interests, volunteer work, and accident-safety experience. The most important qualifications are interest, and common sense.

Safety standard activity testing is beginning on architectural glass, swimming pool slides, extension cords, book matches, television sets, tents, and playground equipment.

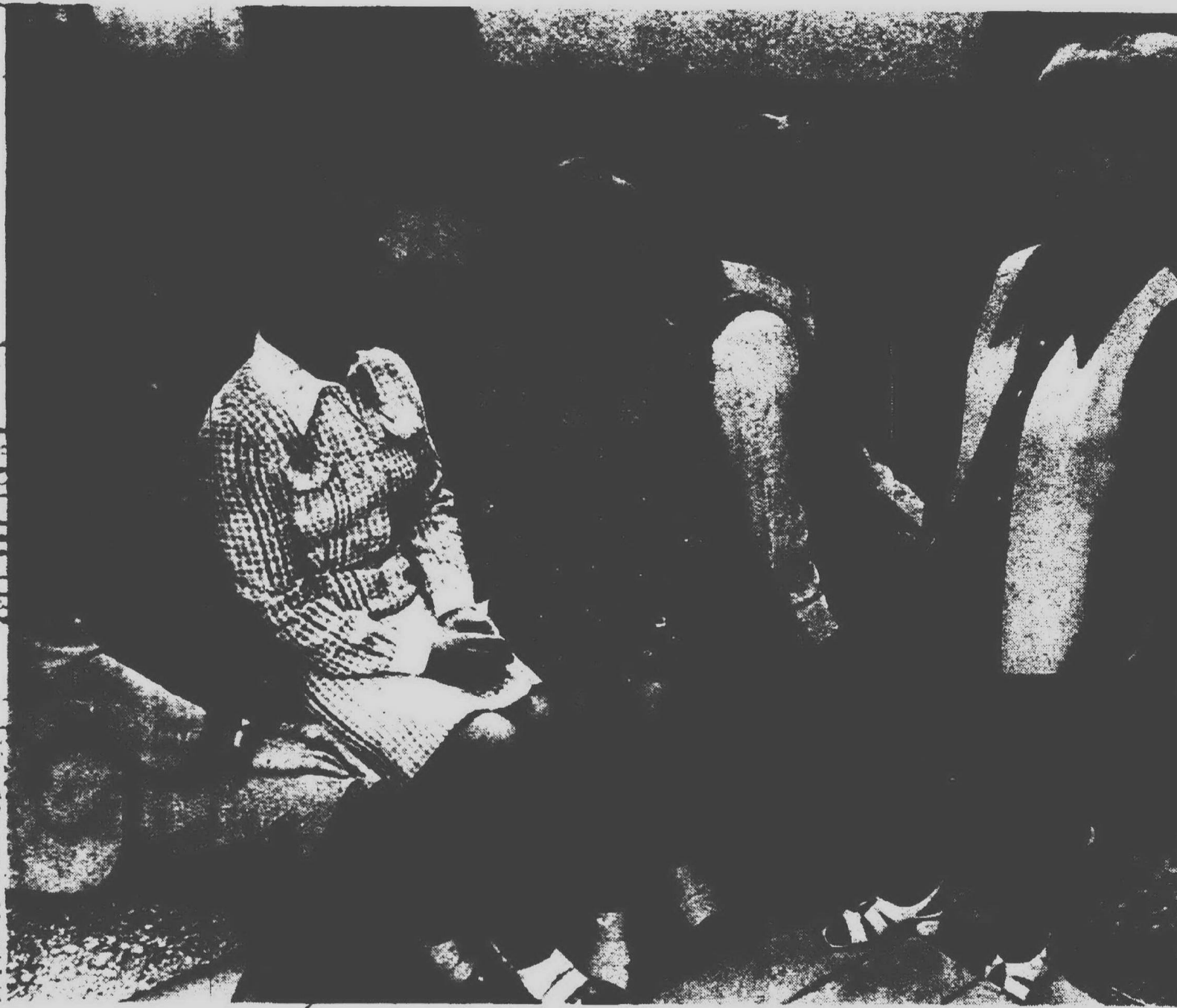

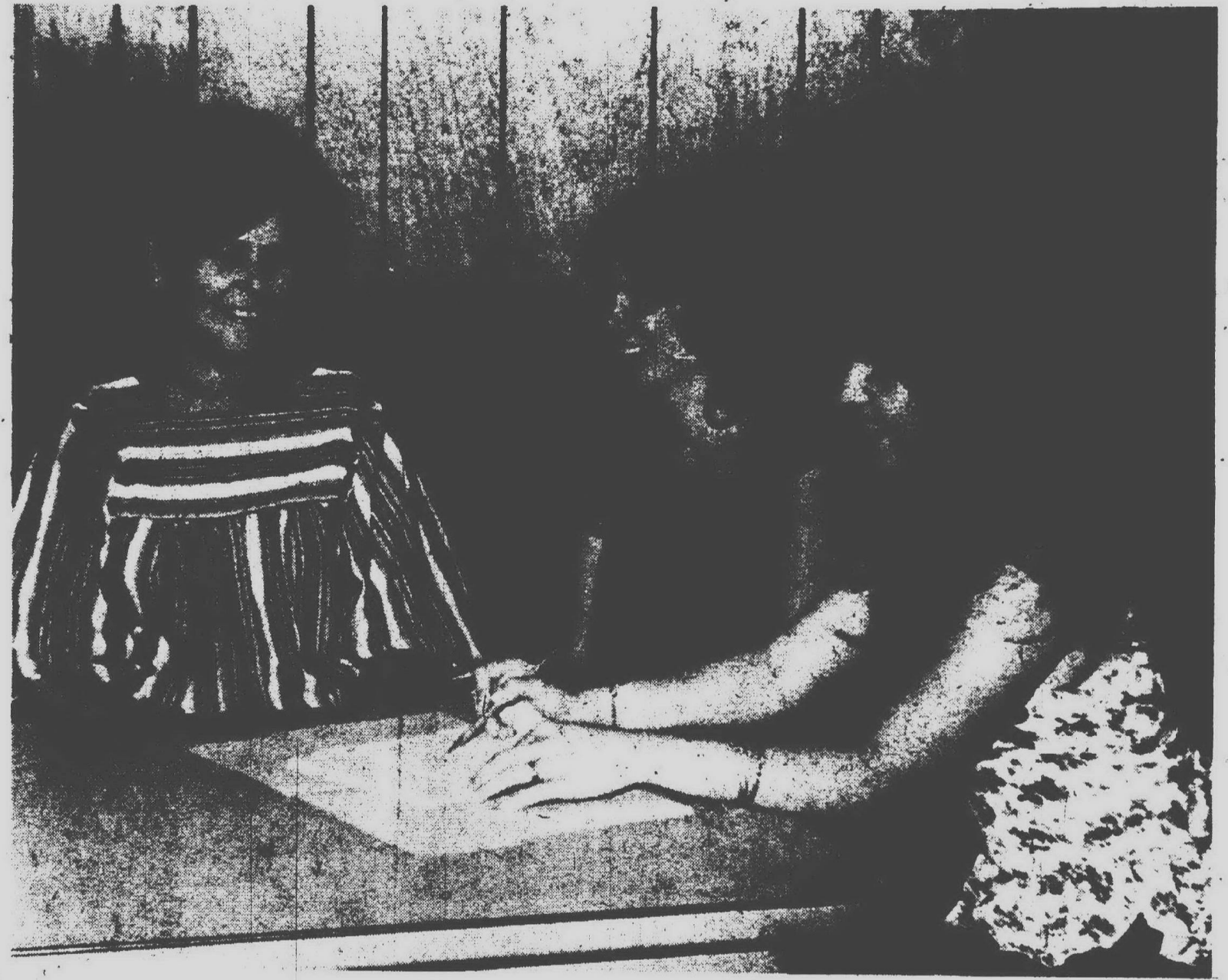

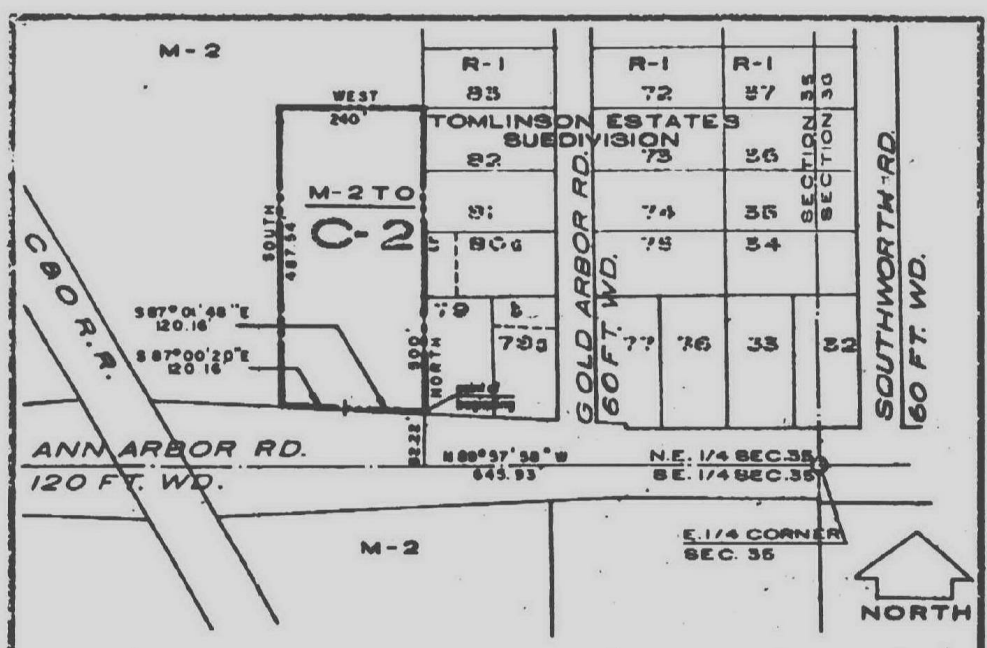
THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

PART I. That the Township Zoning Ordinance is hereby amended by amending the Zoning Map, by changing those areas indicated on the Amended Zoning Map, No. 80, attached hereto and made a part of this Ordinance.

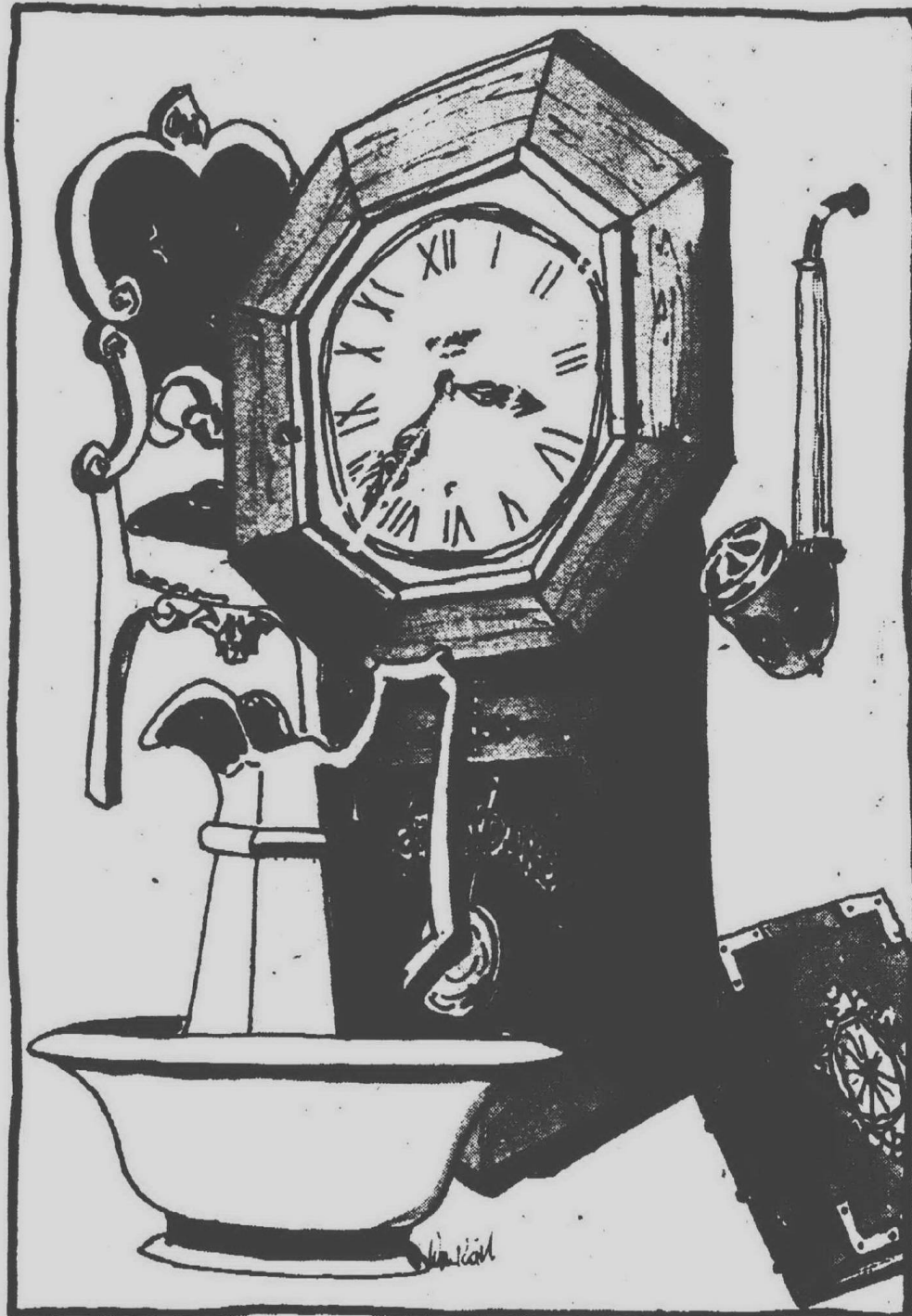

Patriots lose 35 gridders via graduation

Franklin's '74 story -- rebuild and hope

When a prep football team loses 35 players via graduation, there is only one word that can describe the following season.

And that one word around Franklin Patriot territory is rebuild.

The No. 1 football squad in the area last year, Livonia Franklin, graduated 35 gridders from an 8-1 team that allowed just 59 points and scored 155.

"This can't be anything but a rebuilding year for us," commented Franklin Coach and recently named athletic director George Lovich. "We are going to have 19 new faces on offense and defense."

Lovich's three returning starters are seniors Joe Pollard and Dan Quinn and junior Jimmy Casey.

"Needless to say, we will have more kids going both ways than ever before," added the Franklin coach. "We could have seven kids performing double duty."

Franklin's 47 man grid roster includes 15 seniors and 32 juniors compared to last year's 35 seniors and 11 juniors.

"We won't be able to afford even little mistakes this season," commented Lovich. "Things are just going to have to go our way."

Lovich's two big question marks are right up the center in the quarterback and center slots on offense.

Seniors Jo Jo Scarpace and Paul Downs are the two Patriots contesting for the quarterback assignment. Scarpace is noted for his quickness but stands only 5-foot-9 and 150 pounds while Downs is 6-foot and 188 pounds and stands out as the better passer.

"This QB question has to be our No. 1 problem," said Lovich.

"There might even exist a possibility of platooning."

At center Franklin has three candidates in Marvin Sobodash at 6-foot-1 and 172 pounds and Jim Morgan at 5-foot-11 and 200 pounds, both seniors, and junior Mark Eddy who checks in at 5-foot-10 and 158 pounds.

Franklin's offensive backfield boasts three-year starter Dan Quinn

at 5-foot-8 and 155 pounds. Following Quinn at the tailback berth is Casey at 5-foot-9 and 165 pounds, Pollard at 5-foot-9 and 170 pounds, Terry Allen at 6-foot and 180 pounds and Jerry Pollard.

The flanker slot finds 5-foot-10, 163 pound senior Andy Dallas and 6-foot-2 and 175 pound Rick Varterasiam in contention.

William Gunter and John Sames are the split-ends. Both are juniors, Gunter checking in at 5-foot-7 and 145 pounds and Sames at 5-foot-11 and 150 pounds.

At tight end, Lovich will be sporting Sam Williams, Jr., the son of ex-Detroit Lion Sam Williams who was a member of the "Fearsome Foursome" during the winning days in Detroit. The junior Williams checks in at 6-foot-3 and 190 pounds.

John Genrich is also at the tight end position. Genrich is a junior at 6-foot-2 and 166 pounds.

The tackle slot finds 6-foot-2, 200 pound junior Tim Hollandsworth heading up the list. Three other juniors in 6-foot-4, 200 pound Bob Suarez, 6-foot-1, 210 pound Bob Picard and Greg Morgan at 6-foot-4 and 190 pounds complete that list.

At guard will be John Turel at 5-foot-11 and 185 pounds; Scott Mapes, a junior at 6-foot and 178 pounds and senior Martin Schmidt at 6-foot-1 and 165 pounds.

Franklin's 4-3-4 pro defense contains Lovich's one plus factor for the '74 campaign in the experience of his defensive secondary.

"Casey and Pollard are going to be the real backbone of our defense," added Lovich.

The other secondary berths have

Todd Mapes, Dallas, Gunter, Bruce Ward, Al Acton, Larry Urban and Jerry Pollard all battling for a starting assignment.

Hollandsworth and Williams head the linebacker list which also includes seniors Joel Williams (6-foot-1 and 175 pounds) and Tim Neuman (6-foot-2 and 180 pounds) and juniors Bob Gabel, Dave Key and John Genich.

Armand Vigna's defensive line has Picard, Suarez, Turel, Scott Mapes, Chuck Bartolo (5-foot-11 and 170 pounds), Greg Morgan, Joe Fry (6-foot-2 and 180 pounds) and Gary Pansosian at 5-foot-10 and 190 pounds.

Last year's backup punter in Jo Jo Scarpace will take over the No. 1 assignment and Quinn will again be handling the place-kicking chores. Quinn was four for four in the field goal department in '73. He booted one for 39 yards against Garden City West, one for 29 yards in the 3-2 win over Churchill, one for 17 yards against North Farmington and finished up with a 21 yarder against Bentley.

Armand Vigna, Gerry Cullin, Dale Rothenberg and Tom Tucker will be Lovich's assistants in the coaching ranks-a test that is sure to be tried in this rebuilding stint.

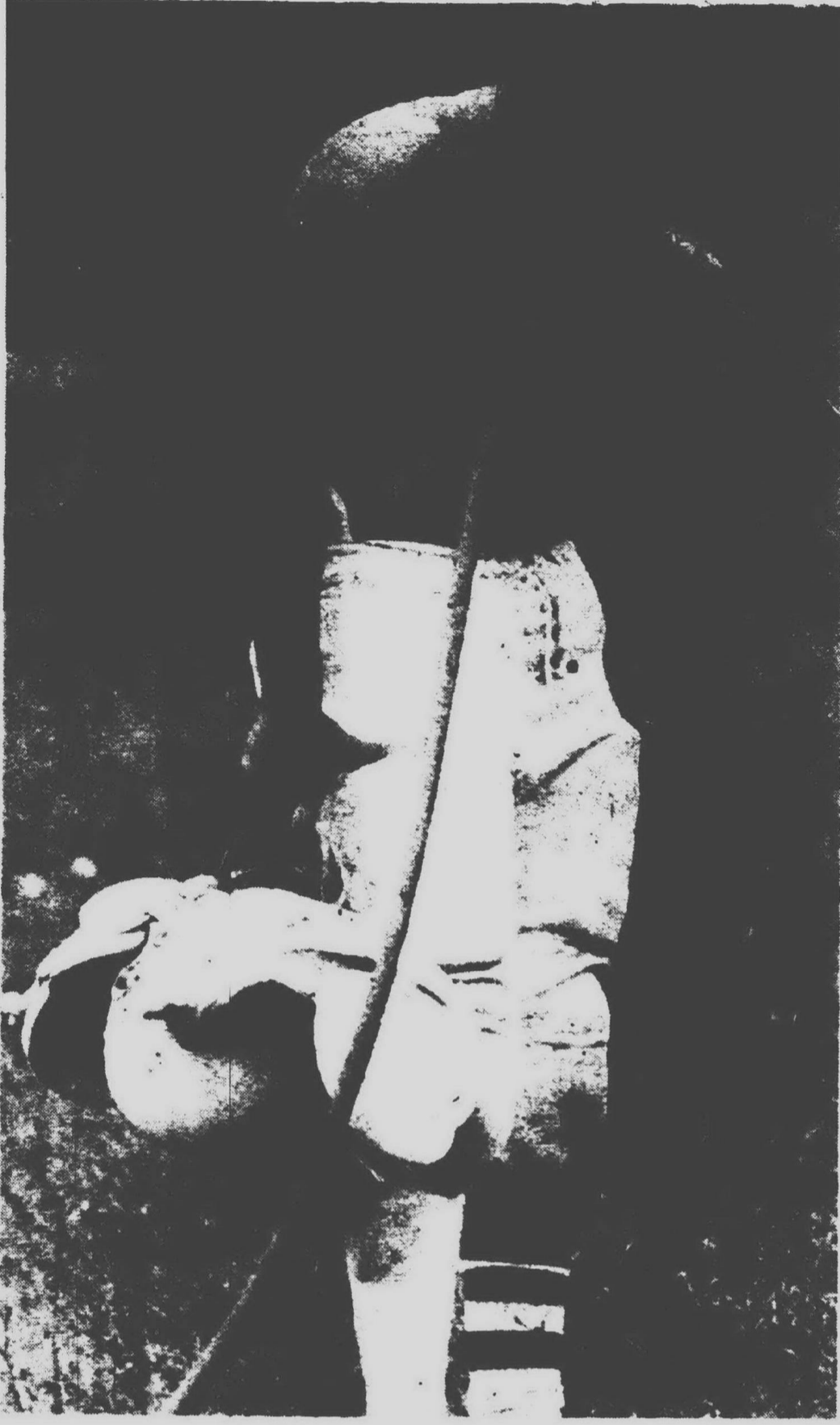
This is season No. 7 for Lovich, a Patriot career that has seen his squads reel off a 40-9-1 mark. The most the Patriots have lost in a season was three and in that 50 game span, the Patriots have recorded 17 shutouts and have not given up more than one touchdown in 16 other games. Franklin also has never been shutout during this span - a Lovich span which will end after this '74 season because of his duty of director of athletics.

"The quickness of the kids to pick up that experience is going to our key," Lovich said.

"North Farmington and Garden City East are going to have to be the favorites this year in the Northwest and John Glenn could be the sleeper. As for Franklin, well, there are just too many question marks now to say," commented Lovich.

Franklin opens its '74 season home against Garden City West on Saturday, Sept. 14, at 2 p.m., and travels to Livonia Stevenson on Sept. 20 before jumping into Northwest action with Oak Park on Sept. 28.

Franklin upended West in last year's opener, 23-18, but a Patriot senior card has now transformed to a junior one and Lovich can be seen walking around Patriot territory with a big ? hanging over his head.

Now it's the first week in September and the annual appearance of the Grand Circuit's standout two and three year old trotters and pacers at Wolverine Raceway.

Matter of fact the week long series of rich, early closing stakes actually got under way on Labor Day with the running of the Matron two year old colt trot.

Two events are slated for tonight (Tuesday) in the Matron two year old filly pace and the Matron two year old filly trot.

The first big feature of the week is slated for Wednesday when the top contenders for the Little Brown Jug championship, two weeks hence in Delaware, O., tangle in what could well be the final major test before the three-year-old championship event.

As usual there are several standouts in this year's three year old crop including George Sholty's Boyden Hanover and Armbro Omaha, who have been taking turns whipping each other in the major stakes.

BOYDEN HANOVER was tagged the two year old of the year in 1973 and on occasion has looked like the colt that should take all of the honors in the division. Then just when it appears all Boyden Hanover, up comes

Armbro Omaha for a surprising win.

In recent weeks it has been Boyden Hanover again on top and that's what makes Wednesday's clash so important. Each is eligible for the \$40,000 added stake here and indications are that each will be on hand.

Inasmuch as this column was written well in advance of the draw, we have no idea of how many will be in the field for the pace which could have a value of up to \$60,000.

So there's a double consideration for the owners of the top stars, a final tuneup for the Little Brown Jug and an opportunity to pick up the winner's share of one of the richest stakes offered at a harness track in Michigan this year.

FANS WILL hardly get over the thrills of the three year old pace, which always is one of the best of Grand Circuit week, and they will have another big night in the Matron two year old pace on Thursday. It will be presented along with the Matron three year old colt trot.

Remember last year's three year old pace where Keystone Smartie owned by Don McFarlane and associates of Hazel Park Raceway, came streaking along the rail to win in 1:57.4, equaling Wolverine's record

for the big mile track:

Would you like to believe the track record may be in danger on Wednesday in the three year old pace again and in the two year old pace on Thursday.

Boyden Hanover and Armbro Omaha have been under 1:57 on several occasions and they may do it here if the track conditions are right.

AND IT COULD happen in the two year old pace Thursday if Billy Haughton's Broadcaster B gets the kind of competition that will make him go at his best for the entire mile. The precocious juvenile has been caught in 1:58 already this year and has won more than \$75,000.

Which leads folks to wonder what will happen if Broadcaster B tangles with Paul Jensen's Skipper Don. The last mentioned had the crowd gaping last week when it won by more than 19 lengths in 2:00.2 with Doug Ackerman in the sulky.

There isn't any question the colt could have gone faster had it been pushed, but when a horse is so far ahead it looks like two different races, one can hardly expect it to do its best. It appeared that Ackerman had the colt eased up in the final

strides but still won by a half a block.

THE BIG EVENT of the year for the kids comes on Friday when the track celebrates its annual "Good Ol' Times" program. Prices are turned back to the turn of the century with 50 cents admission to the grandstand.

This is the night when the kids can really load up with dime hot dogs, nickel pop, popcorn and peanuts ... and you better believe they do it in grand style.

Children under 12 will be admitted free if accompanied by an adult and a Dixieland band will provide pre-race and between the races entertainment.

Just to make the evening entertaining for the older folks, the ones that like to wager a bob or two at the mutual windows, there'll be the Matron three year old filly pace and the traditional Friday features matching all of the best trotters in an invitational event.

Metropolitan Detroit's army of 250,000 bowlers has gone to the firing line for another long campaign that could rank with the greatest splurges of the past.

Of special interest is the fact that the Parke-Davis league one of the oldest in the country, will be starting its 72nd year.

For a time there was some question regarding the oldest league hereabouts, but the Parke-Davis claim now has been recognized by the Greater Detroit Bowling Association.

Next in line to the Parke-Davis group is the City Lutheran League that will be starting its 62nd second season.

It is interesting to note that the Parke-Davis group has bowled in 14 different establishments since its inception.

And just in case, the question may arise, the oldest league recognized by the American Bowling Congress is the New York City Bakers League, which is now opening its 84th season.

One of the most fascinating year-books ever assembled is the latest volume released this week by the Greater Detroit Bowling Association in con-

junction with the Detroit Woman's Bowling Association.

It contains the averages of every sanctioned bowler in the metropolitan Detroit area, and this number passes to the quarter million mark.

Every league in both the men's and women's associations is represented, and it is the largest and most complete yearbook offered anywhere in the country.

The volume is of special benefit to those conducting tournaments because every bowler's average is now on record and no longer will there be a need to hold up prize lists until averages are verified.

Aside from averages, there are some interesting facts in the book.

For instance, would you believe that 8,415 members of the men's association bowl left-handed. That leaves more than 137,000 bowling from the right side of the lane.

You'll also find this interesting fact in the volume—the "mean" average of the entire membership of close to 2 quarter million is 155.66 for the right handers and 154.39 for the lefties.

The records also reveal that of the great number of league bowlers 1,674 were in the age bracket from 66 to 70 years while there were 1,011 who had

passed the three score and 10 mark.

The latter figures are most interesting for they substantiate the claim that bowling is for all ages.

One question most often asked concerns the absence of any Detroit bowlers on the pro tour. This was asked often at Hartfield Lanes over the past weekend when the pros were strutting their stuff.

Bob Hart, winner of the ABC and All America all-events crowns during the past year, gave the best explanation when he stated it would require the winning of \$30,000 on the tour to break even and that no family man can take that sort of a gamble.

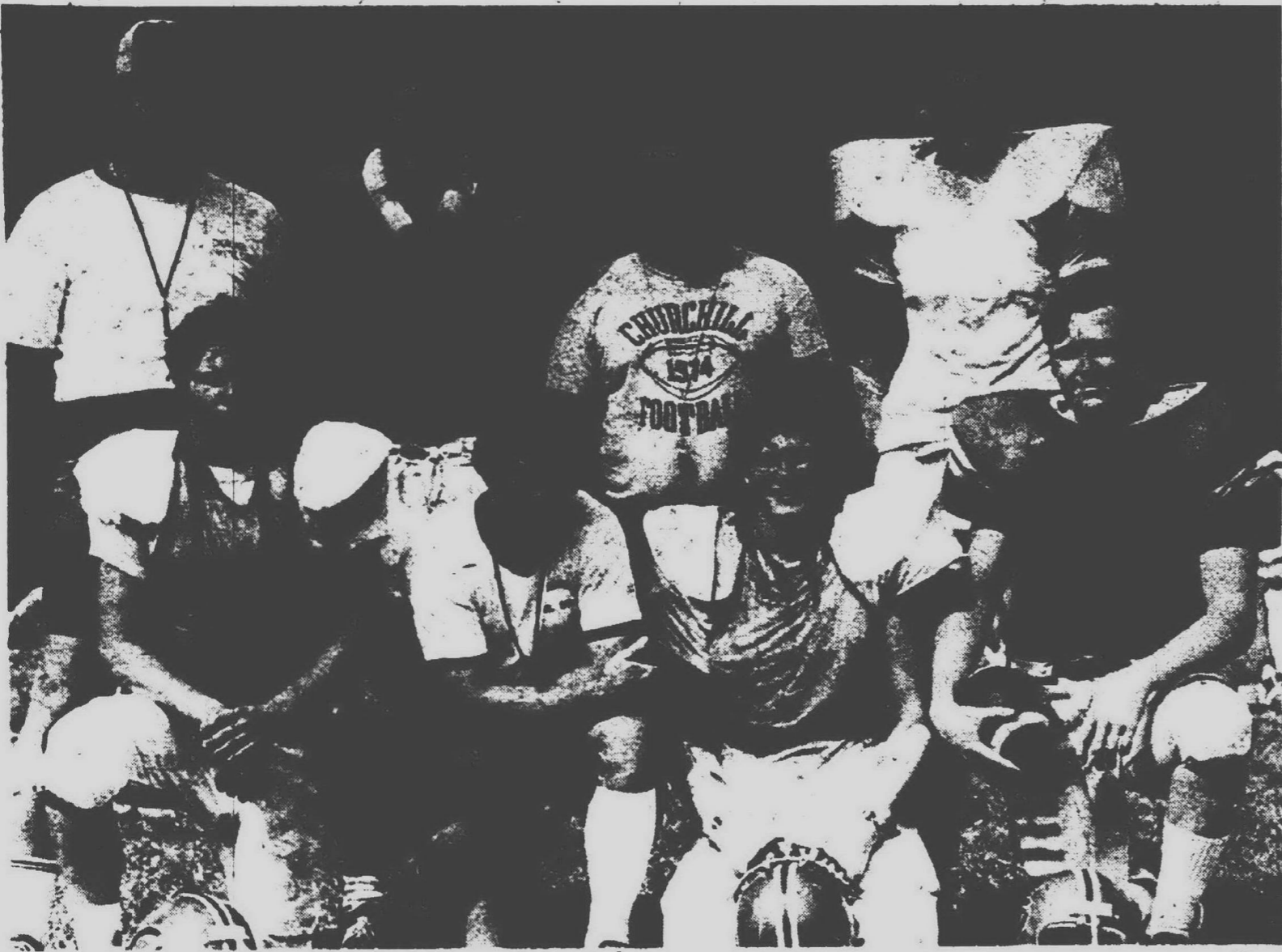
Dale Seavoy was the last of the Detroiters to tackle the long grind of the national tour. He gave up after one year, claiming it was too tough to make expenses.
