Loop road concept gets approval

PLYMOUTH—Acting on a resolution which Commissioner John Cummings charged was "rammed down its throat," the city commission Monday night approved by a narrow 4-3 vote the concept of the loop road.

It was the first time since the loop was introduced in 1958 that the commission has indicated its approval of the project.

The controversial resolution was offered by Commissioner Norbert Battermann and supported by Commissioners Harold Guenther, Robert Sincok and Cummings.

"We've never taken an official stand," Battermann told the other commissioners. "We've done things (such as extending Deer Street through Kellogg Park) to further the loop road and we have inferred to different people that we are in support of the loop. It's time this commission

either supports it or doesn't support it."

MAYOR BEVERLY McAninch and Commissioners Joe Bida and John Moehle opposed the resolution.

Prior to the meeting Battermann had sent copies of the measure to the other commissioners. The resolution followed a public hearing last week at which many residents demanded to know what the loop was all about and where the commission stood.

"I was shocked when I received this in the mail," said Bida, who opposed the proposal. "I'm not against the loop road—I never have been—but I, for one, am not sure what we're going to do. I'm not in favor of any resolution at this time."

Moehle charged that the commission had no business giving its approval to a proposal without knowing the mechanics of financing and construction.

"THE RESOLUTION is a beautiful platitude, but it does not put any dimensions on the program," he said. "I'm still not sure of the total cost."

"Some aspects of the loop could possibly have a detrimental effect," he added. "There are serious problems with regard to traffic flow. We have not had a traffic study. The loop would cut the visibility of downtown stores. It's very premature to be philosophically in favor of something that does not have dimensions attached to it."

"The argument that Commissioner Moehle puts up I listened to years and years ago," said Guenther. "It looks like we want to bless this thing to death in some kind of a negative way. We've got people down there (central business district property owners) who have stuck their necks out on this and all the commission can ask is 'what can you prove?'"

GUENTHER ATTACKED those commissioners who insisted on knowing what the ultimate details and effects of the loop road would be.

"In essence this is a business deal for the city," he said. "Is this all the imagination we have to say, 'prove it to me?'"

"I'll never vote for anything where the facts have not been revealed," Bida said.

"The point is," said Battermann, "are we going to proceed with the loop road or not? The resolution is the first step and it's about time it was taken."

"We are committed to endorsing it and not leaving these people hanging."

WHILE GUENTHER advocated starting out with a one-way loop that wouldn't require the costly rounding off of intersections, Moehle insisted that he would approve only the loop as a total package.

"One thing we do not want to do is take small steps," he said. "What has disturbed me is that we have made piecemeal approval of things without always identifying just what we were doing. Cutting our park (Kellogg) in two was in fact one of the first piecemeal steps toward the loop road. I don't want this commission to be in on further piecemeal actions."

Moehle argued that with regard to parking, access to which is one of the key reasons for the loop, existing spaces are "roughly in balance" with business needs downtown.

"If the loop road is successful we'll be out of balance as far as parking is concerned," he said. He warned that the loop was no good without the development of parking facilities and other improvements. "The price tag could be in multi-million dollar figures," he said. "We ought to be aware of the kind of commitment this

city is making if it approves the loop road."

BATTERMANN'S resolution read as follows:

"Whereas, the rapid development of growth in the vicinity of the city of Plymouth projects a probable reduction of existing business from the central business district; and

"Whereas, the Plymouth City Commission accepts the responsibility of taking positive steps to counter this degradation and potential loss of tax base; and

"Whereas, the city commission further desires to encourage development of the central business district without losing our unique identity of which we are proud; and

"Whereas, an access route consisting of the contiguous sections of Wing, Deer, Union and Church Street extension, Church and Harvey Streets

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Planner asked for more data

PLYMOUTH—Apparent discrepancies in the cost of the proposed loop road and a decision to visit neighboring cities where similar developments have succeeded or failed highlighted a city commission study meeting held Tuesday to clarify differing views among its members.

The discussion session followed Monday night's hotly-debated 4-3 vote to approve "in concept" the loop proposal.

The commissioners decided to grill city planner Jay Eldridge on seeming inconsistencies in his presentation of the loop.

According to the development program for the central business district which Eldridge submitted this summer, acquisition of property and construction of the loop—consisting chiefly in rounding off the corners of existing streets—carried a price tag of about \$550,000.

At last week's public hearing Eldridge told the audience that reports of that figure were mistaken and that \$346,000 was a truer cost of completing the loop.

Several commissioners also expressed confusion at Eldridge's conclusions on just what properties along the affected streets would have to be acquired to create the curves.

The commission further indicated that thorough traffic studies carrying either one or two-way traffic, would be justified.

Much of the discussion centered on the role of the city in encouraging commercial development in the central business district—and what sort of leadership role, if any, the city should take.

The commission decided to plan visits to neighboring communities where downtown developments similar to the loop proposal have been tried.

Among the cities commissioners are expected to visit is Sylvania, Ohio, where downtown development—using

an access road and complete with a harmonious redesign of downtown storefronts—has reportedly been highly successful.

The commission also agreed to visit other cities, such as Jackson, where a pedestrian mall and a curved thoroughfare around downtown are considered failures, unable to revitalize the business district.

One question still unanswered is how the loop road should be financed. The commission may set up a meeting with central business district merchants and property owners to sound out their views.

The property owners would be asked whether the loop road was actually the best or only way to stimulate downtown development and whether they would be willing to participate in financing the project by approving a special assessment levy to cover a portion of the cost.

Mayor Beverly McAninch appointed Mrs. Mary Childs of 1439 Ross to the zoning board of appeals. Mrs. Childs is a member of the city planning commission.

New lease on life

Fox Hills undergoes changes

PLYMOUTH—A bright new chapter is about to be written in the history of one of the oldest golf clubs in western Wayne County.

After two decades of activity under the ownership of the golfing Partridge family of Plymouth, the famed Fox Hills course on North Territorial Road, has been purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Dull of Dearborn Heights.

They are no strangers to public golf as they own the Shady Hollow Country Club in Romulus, and now plan extensive renovations to the Fox Hills clubhouse and several changes on the 18-hole course.

The passing of the course from the Partridge family marked the close of an interesting era of golf in the Plymouth area.

Started in 1925 by a group of 10 Plymouth businessmen, the club and course have had their ups and downs. But always, the course, designed by Wilfrid Reid, one of the game's best

architects, was rated among the best. Its clubhouse was built with the lumber and stone taken from the 240-acre property and was something novel when it opened.

At the time, it was known as the Plymouth Country Club and there were high hopes for its future. These hopes dimmed with the depression of 1929 when the banks closed.

With the close of the war, it was purchased by Forest Rambo and his family, but their efforts were marked with scant success.

It became little more than a patch of weeds until Melvin Partridge purchased it and his son, Casey, a popular pro, took charge of its operation.

Casey had been at Hilltop and was a regular competitor in the weekly pro-amateur events in the Detroit District. It was a nine hole layout at the time and he soon had it lengthened to a 18 holes.

With this addition the course took on added prestige and Casey changed it from a public to a private course with many of the leading golfing families in the community as members.

For a time the private club prospered, but with the beginning of the Vietnam War interest faded and Casey returned it to the status of a public course before he passed away five years ago.

For four years his widow, Mrs. Violet Partridge, ran the course with in-

different success. Then, a year ago, she leased it to Mr. and Mrs. Francis Lotte, and ended her official business connection with the game to which she was introduced 42 years ago.

The final articles of sale are to be completed on Nov. 15, when the renovations will begin and the famed old course is given a new lease on life for the 1975 season.

The one big change this year, how-

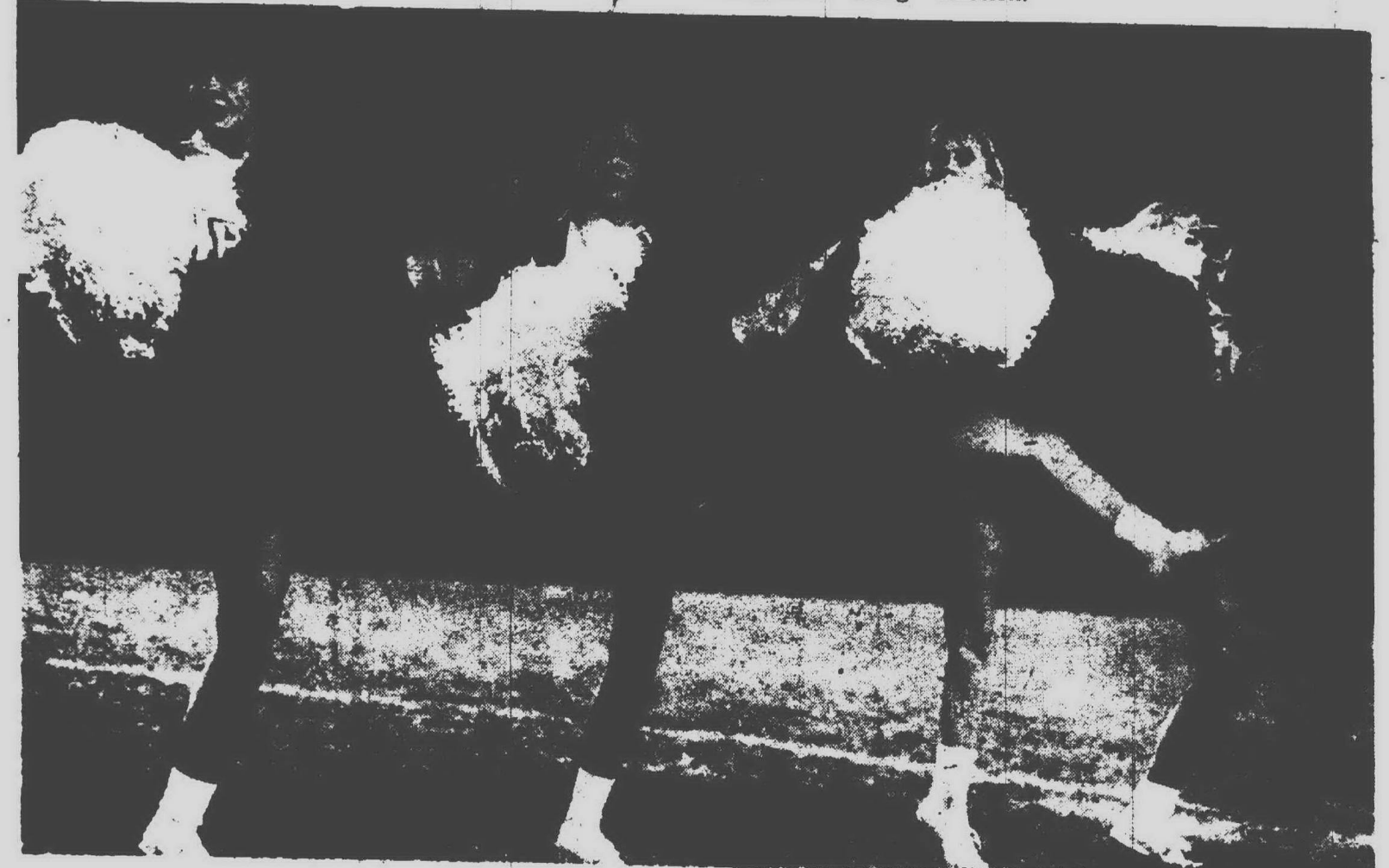

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Transit proposal must be people oriented — Ferency

Republican William Milliken and Democrat Sander Levin may be backing the \$1.1 billion transportation bond issue that will appear as Proposal D on the Nov. 5 ballot. But Zoltan Ferency says it needs to be revised to help people more and business less before he'll back it.

Ferency is the Human Rights Party candidate for governor who is a gadfly in the otherwise drab contest between Gov. Milliken and former State Sen. Levin.

Ferency spoke last week at a fund-raising effort of the HRP (\$15 a person, no discount for wives) in Livonia's Roma Hall. As the only experienced orator on the HRP ticket, Ferency is the star attraction of the "radical, democratic, socialist" group.

In an interview, Ferency cited two reasons for opposing the transportation package — financing and the use of the money.

"I'M NOT WILLING to buy the whole package," he said. "When you stop to think about it, what's in it for people?"

There's \$100 million for airport development and \$50 million for port development. If a major portion of the bond issue went to road beds and rail lines... to move ordinary people from place to place... then we would sup-

port it. We don't have to subsidize trade and commerce.

"Levin wants to cut welfare. Well, this is welfare for corporations.

"I'm not willing to buy the whole package. They should come back with some more realistic programs for people.

"I'm not for buses, I'm not for internal combustion engines, and I'm not for concrete. It's time to get away from that and admit we made a mistake," he said, referring to the \$362 million portion of the plan for "rail and bus systems" outstate and the \$440 million southeastern Michigan portion which would also include rapid transit and buses.

"There's not a dime in there for hydrofoils. Here, we're the 'Great Lake State' and no hydrofoil transportation. The Europeans have been doing it for years."

GOV. MILLIKEN says the bond issue will cost no additional taxes; that the water quality bond issue is being paid off; that the tax funds which supported it could be used to pay the transportation bonds; and that economic growth will provide enough tax revenue to meet the bond costs without strain.

Ferency dissents.

"One thing the public hasn't been told," said Ferency "is that this bond issue would terminate in 2016. By then it will have cost \$2.1 billion (when in-

terest is added onto the \$1.1 billion principal).

"I don't believe Milliken is correct that the natural growth of the economy will provide sufficient revenue. How can he say that when we're in a depression? How can he say that with the petroleum situation the way it is? Economists are predicting a no-growth situation.

"I'll predict right now: We'll either have to cut back other programs to pay for those bonds or raise taxes."

FERENCY IS "looser" to use baseball jargon, than in 1966 when he was the Democratic candidate for governor. His '66 battle against George Romney was on behalf of a major party and was an uphill fight. This time he has more freedom to be himself.

While HRP is considered the "fourth party" and may wind up with the ninth slot on the ballot, Ferency is entrancing newsmen across the state with his jibes at Levin, the man who ousted him as Democratic state chairman in 1969.

Ferency pokes fun at the baby pictures in Milliken's television commercials and at the imagery of Levin's TV trips down the state capital building steps. He blisters them both for lack of discussion of substantive issues.

He told the Roma Hall group the

HRP would be fortunate to get five per cent of the vote. That would make it the No. 3 party in Michigan and entitle it to conduct an August primary in the next election. (Only the Republican and Democratic parties are on the August ballot; HRP, the American Independent Party, Socialist Workers and others all nominate at conventions.)

While HRP candidates have won only a few council seats in the college towns of Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti, three of its top four state candidates are on the public payroll: Ferency as associate professor of criminal law at Michigan State University; the multilingual Reggie McNulty, a clerk in the Oak Park local court; and James McClure, political science instructor at Lansing Community College (and a former deputy secretary of state under James Hare until his opposition to the Vietnam war got him fired). The attorney general candidate is Clarice Jobs, partner in an all-woman Detroit law firm.

FERENCY DESCRIBES HRP as a political "coming together" of many sorts of radical activists — anti-war demonstrators, civil rights workers, persons attacking drug problems, grape boycotters.

One unusual characteristic, Ferency said over dinner, is that "the people here tonight are either in their 20s or their 30s. There's hardly anyone in their 30s or 40s."

An exception was the person responsible for the dinner arrangements: Jeaneane Havstad, a Livonia matron in her early 30s.

SC's Grote leads 'swim'

Udall prophesizes new day in world of limited wealth

America's troubles are of two kinds — cynicism and a sick economy — U.S. Rep. Morris Udall (D-Arizona) told 2nd District Democrats Saturday night in Plymouth.

Udall, mentioned as a presidential possibility, was keynote speaker for the John Reuther fundraiser in the Thunderbird Inn. Udall's challenge was to arouse the district's Democrats, plus Dems of statewide stature present such as Frank Kelly, Richard Austin, Neil Staebler, and Sarah Power.

"WHAT SHAKES people most today is the double-standard of justice — for the high and mighty, and for ourselves.

"And our other problem is the economy, which is sick. Something has gone wrong. The old economic rules don't work anymore."

Udall, brother of former Secretary of Interior Stewart Udall, has sponsored major legislation on environmental concerns and political campaign reform. His appearance in Plymouth drew a reporter from the Washington Post to cover his speech, an indication that the national press views him as a possible presidential contender.

"History will look back at our era and say 'These were the days my friend' of cheap oil. We must realize the age of cheap oil is now gone. During the last decade, we doubled our energy production with stabilized prices. In this period, 60 million acres of land were held back from production to keep food prices stable.

"Now we must decide what to do as we enter an age of scarcity. I describe my priorities as the 'Three E's' — environment, economic, and energy.

"Now we are being told to set aside our concern for the environment. The crunch is on to tear up the Rockies to get oil from shale. Well, we have some choices to make — tough choices."

Republicans will ask the nation to make sacrifices to save the economy, Udall continued, "but the sacrifices asked for won't hurt the stockholders. It will be day care centers, and similar programs, that will be sacrificed."

DEMOCRATS HAVE been accused of being unable to manage the economy, Udall said, while Republicans are supposed to be good economic managers.

"Looking back, that 1.5 per cent inflation per year under Lyndon Johnson looks good now compared to the GOP dollar's value and today's inflation rate.

"Yes, we have always thought Republicans were good managers. But do you know that one-fifth of the national debt has been run up during the past six years under Republican management?"

Referring to the national mood of today and years ago, Udall quipped: "My cynical uncle once said in the 1930s that what's wrong with the country was that it was being run by the Fords and Rockefellers. Maybe that's still true today."

THE ECONOMY today is at a great turning point, he continued.

"We must find new ways of doing things. Our growth will be slowed but it can be steady. We will have limited resources and might have to live a more simplified life — maybe we'll get better acquainted with our kids and neighbors.

"We must insist on one standard of economic justice and that means fair taxation."

"Harry Truman tried to give us national health insurance. We are the last industrial nation in the world without it and must catch up. We need decent housing, no fault insurance, lower closing costs for home purchases, and warranties that mean something.

"And we must insist on competition. Our economic system works best when we have competition. But there is no competition in oil, drugs, steel or beef. They can make a pill for four cents and sell it for 80 cents. It's time to get our priorities straight."

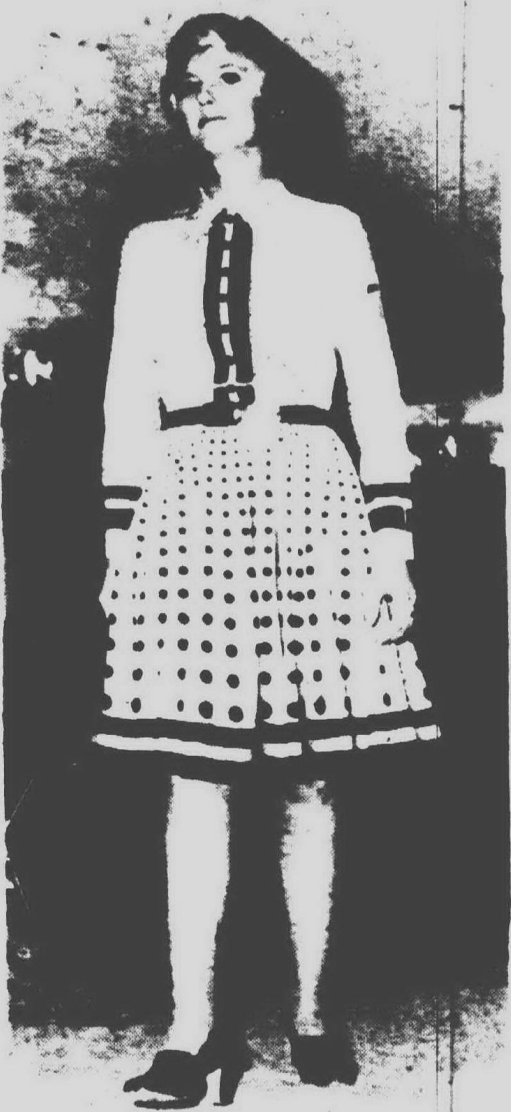

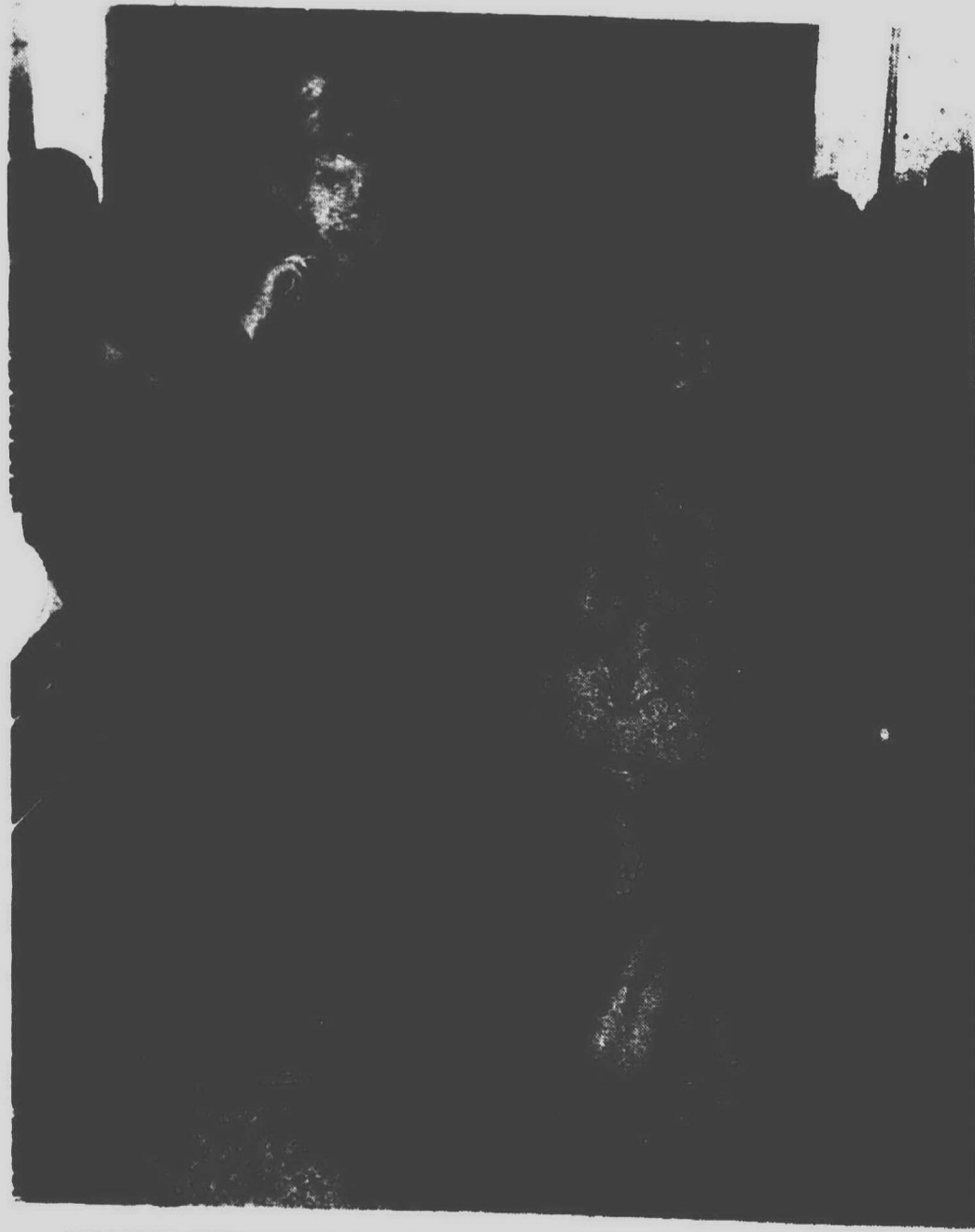

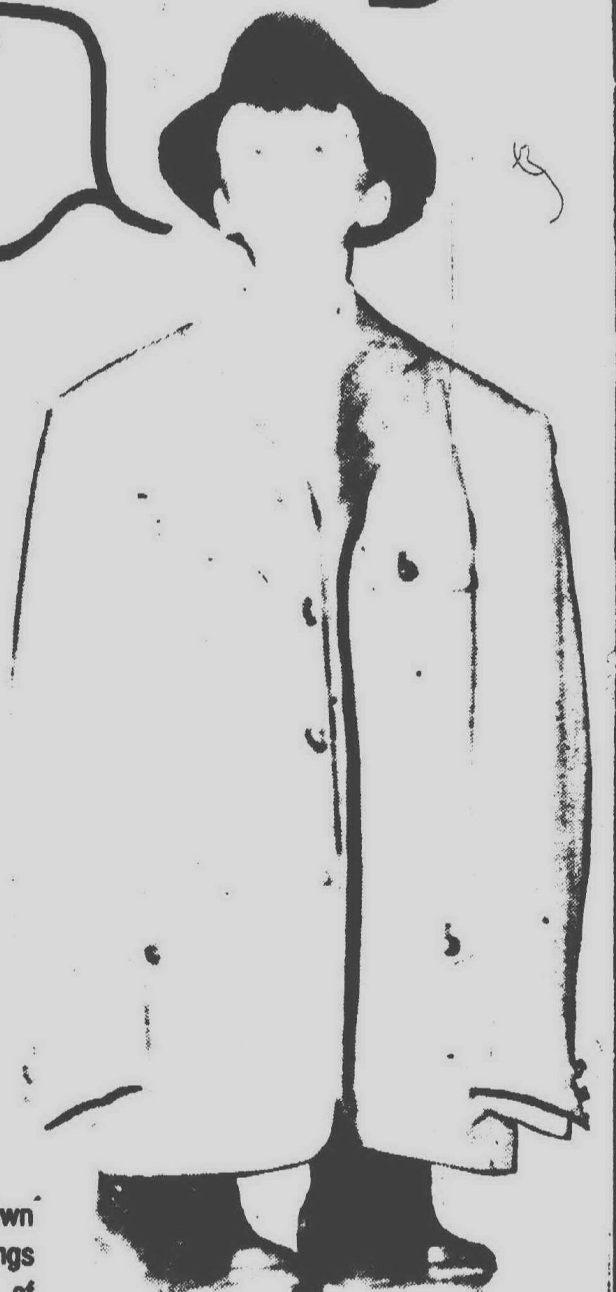

Downtown loop road finally gets approval

will permit accessibility to an expanded business district and thus encourage development; and

"Whereas, previous city commissions have already taken positive steps in implementing this access route.

"Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the Plymouth City Commission endorses implementation of the access route concept as described herein.

"Be it further resolved, that all land acquisition, construction plans and construction costs to build said access route be subject to specific approval by commission action."

Battermann termed the project an "access road," rather than "loop road," to suggest more clearly its intended purpose.

PRIOR TO VOTING on the resolution itself, a separate resolution was offered calling for an end to discussion so that a vote could be taken.

Mayor McAninch, Cummings, Bida and Moehle voted to close the dis-

cussion and a roll call vote was taken on the resolution to approve the loop road.

Charging that he had been "backed into a corner" by the wording of the proposal, Cummings voted to support the resolution. Also voting for the loop road were Battermann, Guenther and Sincok.

Bida said that his vote did not mean he was opposed to the loop road. "I just don't like to see a choo-choo train rammed down my throat," he said. "This could have been handled much better."

"There was no victory for anybody here tonight," Guenther concluded. He said that a proposal as important as the loop road required the strong backing of the commission, not a narrow, disputed endorsement.

"This might shame us into some concerted action to redress the complaints of dissident citizens," he said.

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Milliken defends transit bond

Gov. William G. Milliken stoutly defended his proposed \$1.1 billion transportation bond issue as a benefit to people and predicted he would do better among new voters than an early poll indicated.

The governor was in Livonia Monday at a fund-raising reception for State Rep. Robert Geake and then ended a long campaign day in Southfield speaking to the Detroit Police Officers Association.

Milliken, a Republican, was asked to respond to Human Rights Party candidate Zolton Ferency's contention that the airport and lake port portions of the transportation bond issue helped "corporations" and did nothing for "ordinary people."

"TO ME THE WHOLE meaning and purpose of this bond issue is for people," said Milliken, a six-year veteran of the governor's office who is seeking a new four-year term.

"This will provide jobs. It will bring higher economic standards. It will help develop inter-city and intra-city bus systems. It will improve the movement of goods."

The bond issue is Proposal D on the Nov. 5 ballot. About half the money would be pegged for southeastern Michigan's bus and rapid transit system. Milliken pointed out that only \$150 million (13.7 per cent) would go into airports and lake ports.

Milliken denied Ferency's charge that paying off the bonds from the general fund would require either an increase in taxes or cuts in other services. The governor said that as the earlier "clean water" bond issue is paid off, the revenues supporting it could be applied to the transportation bonds.

THE GOVERNOR called for a vote against Proposal A, aimed at freezing the proportion of the state gasoline tax that could aid the operations of bus and rapid transit systems.

"Emphatically I have said I don't propose to levy any more beyond what we have," he said. Michigan taxes gasoline at nine cents a gallon, with a half-cent going to public transportation programs.

"But it's a bad legal principle to freeze the allocation. It's a bad constitutional law. What may be applicable and pertinent today might be bad 20 years from now," he added.

A DISAPPOINTMENT to Milliken was the portion of a Market Opinion Research poll for The Detroit News which showed Democrat Sander Levin leading Milliken 79 to 21 per cent among the 18-20 year age group, although Milliken led overall.

Milliken was the first Michigan poli-

President Gerald R. Ford will make his first political appearance in Michigan Thursday, Oct. 10, in Cobo Hall.

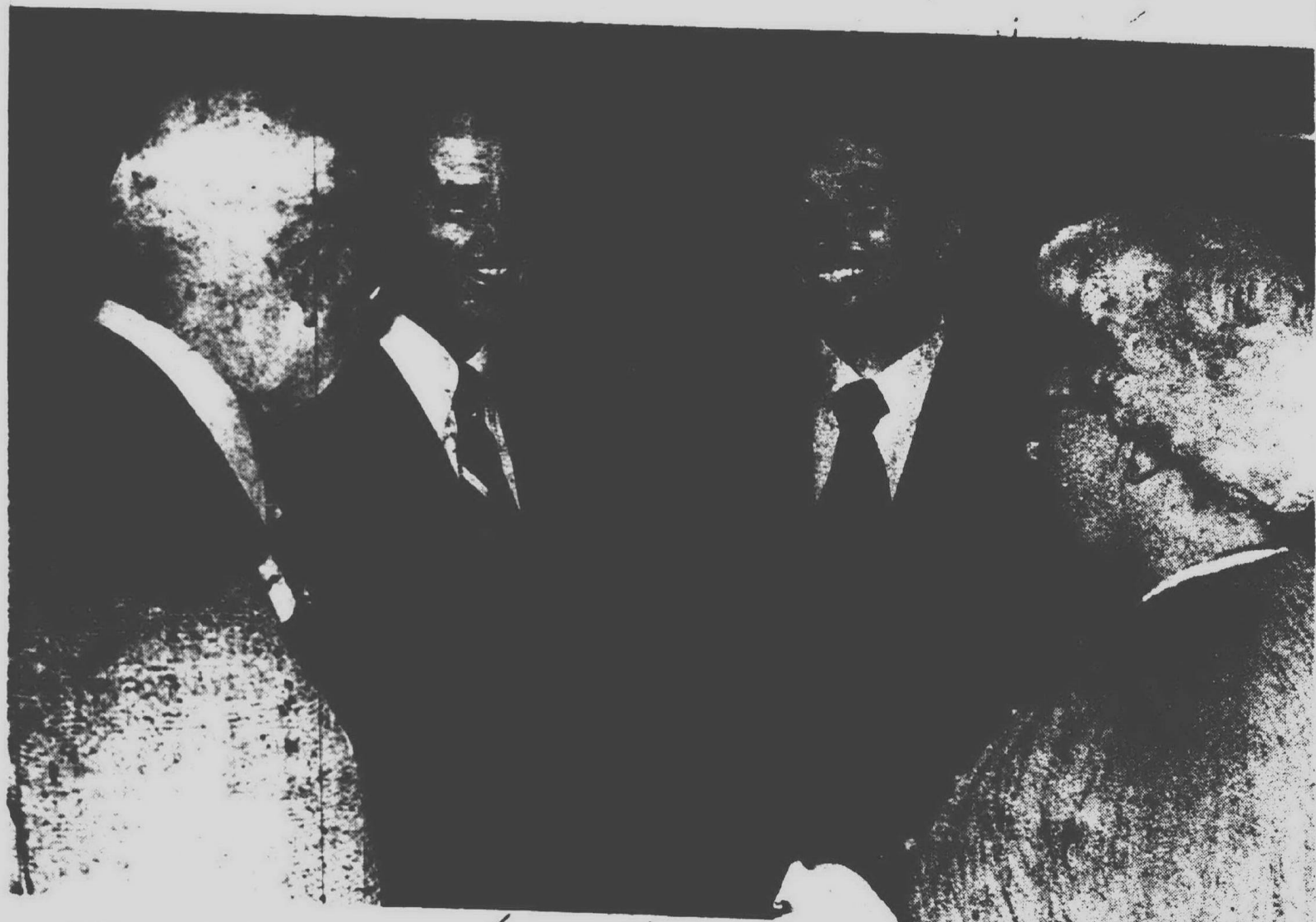
He will appear at a \$50-per-person fundraiser for Gov. Milliken which begins at 7 p.m. in Cobo Hall.

tion publicly to advocate lowering the age of majority to a uniform 18 years. The law applies not only to such rights as drinking and car ownership but to such legal responsibilities as debt payment and licensing for many trades.

The pro-Levin sentiment in the 18-20 age group disappointed Milliken. "considering what we've done for persons in that age category. I think correcting it is a matter of communication."

"The sampling may have been inadequate. The next poll will be based on personal interviews instead of telephone calls." He also suggested the sample may have been more heavily drawn from non-college persons, who other parts of the poll indicated as Levin supporters.

"We're organized on every college campus in the state," Milliken added.

The governor made no speech to the small gathering in the Schoolcraft College Waterman Center but with Rep. Geake milled about, shaking hands. Geake, a Republican (although his campaign literature doesn't identify him by party), is seeking a second term in the State House from the 35th District, which includes Northville and two-thirds of Livonia.

IN SOUTHFIELD, Milliken told the Detroit Police Officers Association the state has increased its crime-fighting funds by 100 per cent since he became governor in 1969.

"I have asked the Legislature for further measures which would give Michigan the tools to wage the most comprehensive anti-crime campaign in the state's history, including mandatory additional prison sentences for persons convicted of committing crimes with handguns."

"Last year, the increase in crime nationally was nearly three times as great as it was in Michigan."

"We hear a lot these days about the rights of defendants, and those rights of the people are important too...a right to walk the streets at any hour without being mugged or raped or killed...a right to go to school without being accosted by drug pushers or losing their lunch money to extortionists...a right to do business without constant harassment by members of the mob."

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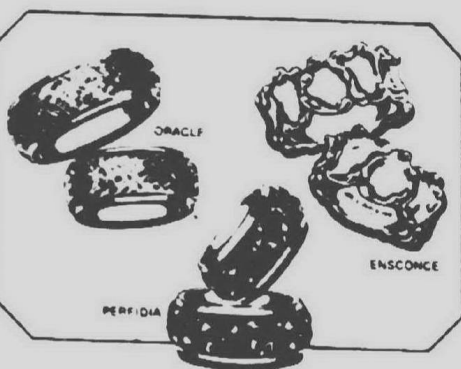
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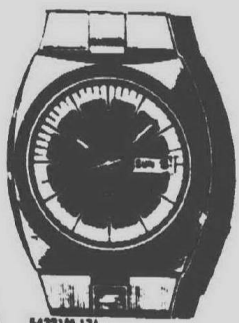
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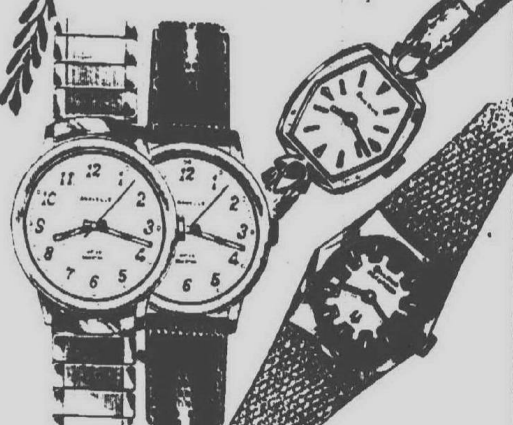


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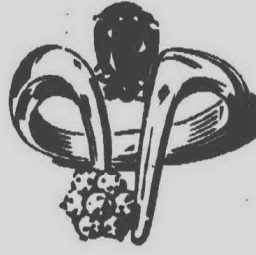

Oil to supplant gold and the dollar as medium of exchange—Rozian

Until a few decades ago, the world had long sought the means of trading in energy to ameliorate the uneven distribution of resources and demand. Crude oil and refined petroleum products provided that means. They are easily transported by pipeline, ship, railroad, truck and even airplane.

Electric power and natural gas can today be transported over continental distances, but neither yet spans the oceans. Natural gas is easy to transport overland but difficult to store.

THERE IS NO practical technology for storing substantial amounts of energy in electrical form without large losses and high capital cost.

However, right here in Michigan, we have a pioneering development in what amounts to short-term storage of electrical energy sufficient to smooth out the daily cycle of demand

on the generating capacity of a public utility.

At Ludington, Consumers Power Co. has built an artificial lake 300 feet above Lake Michigan. During off-peak hours, huge turbo electric pumps raise water from the big lake to the little one. During peak demand, the water is allowed to run downhill again.

Now the big turbo pumps become turbo alternators, generating electric power in the same way as those at more conventional hydroelectric stations. There is a capital cost saving compared with building coal or nuclear generating stations.

OIL, NEVERTHELESS, remains not only the primary source of energy for the modern world but also the only practical means of moving large amounts of energy in international trade. The consequence, not fully realized by economists:

Oil has become an international medium of exchange and a reserve of wealth. In fact, it is probably THE medium of exchange, supplanting both gold and the dollar.

Compare it with other exchange media in current use:

Gold is scarce and durable but not physically convertible to anything really used for man's survival.

Wheat is not durable but is directly consumable by humans or can be converted to meat.

The dollar is also symbolic. It represents several things to the world — our labor productivity, our capital wealth, our mineral wealth (particularly oil, coal, fresh water and topsoil), our gold in the bank, our wheat in the bins and (above all) the stability and credibility of our government.

Within a few short years, for good reasons or bad, we have depleted our gold reserve, sold our wheat at bargain prices, become an importer of oil, allowed our railroads and many other capital facilities to become obsolete, and partially discredited our government.

LOOK AGAIN at oil.

It is moderately scarce, transportable at a fraction of its cost, storable for years, in worldwide demand by large nations and small, and physically convertible to almost any other goods needed by man.

By the expenditure of energy, we can concentrate low-grade ores, irrigate and fertilize poor soils, build roads and cities, and so on to the limits of utilitarian imagination.

To produce his share of the gross national product, the average American uses 111 times the amount of energy needed to sustain an adult at a good nutritional level. Furthermore, a good deal of that energy is used in semi-automatic machinery requiring little direct human labor.

Therefore, I suggest that we are really operating on an "energy theory of value" instead of the classical "labor theory of value."

This explains in part how we can have persistent unemployment and neglect in the part of our population which has supplied general labor, while the rest is comparatively prosperous. This view certainly emphasizes our economic dependence on the supply and price of fuels.

WE HAVE YET to realize fully the terrible blow to the worldwide economy in general — and to industrialized nations in particular — of the sudden, arbitrary tripling in the price of oil. The initial shock and aftershocks are still rippling through the money markets and stock exchanges.

Even if oil producing states are sincere about their desire to industrialize as a hedge against the day their depletable reserves are gone, they cannot possibly absorb the extra dollar exchange now flowing into their accounts at a rate of more than \$100 billion a year. \$25 billion from the U.S. alone. Most of what they are receiving is already being reinvested in the U.S. and Europe.

This produces jobs here, but in 10 years they could buy a quarter of the United States' agricultural land and industry if they chose. Well before that, they could achieve controlling interests in key corporations and the economy of other western countries.

RUSSIA'S ROLE enters the picture at this point.

In an interview at the conference, the Russian minister of power and electrification stated that:

1. Russia is self-sufficient in oil and most other mineral resources.
2. They will continue their present small oil exports to western Europe.

but at the elevated world price.

3. They do not plan to assist the free market countries by expanding exports, nor by urging the OPEC countries to lower their prices.

4. They will continue international cooperation in nuclear research, environmental studies and other energy technology.

This means it will be very difficult for free-market countries to bring significant economic pressure on the Arab oil-producing states.

Any industrial goods, armaments or foodstuffs, we refuse to sell them, they can buy from Russia. In return, the Russians are eager for the dollars with which to buy grain and other specialized goods from us. If we refuse the Russians, we stand to lose their cooperation in Middle East peace-keeping and other fragile but important aspects of détente.

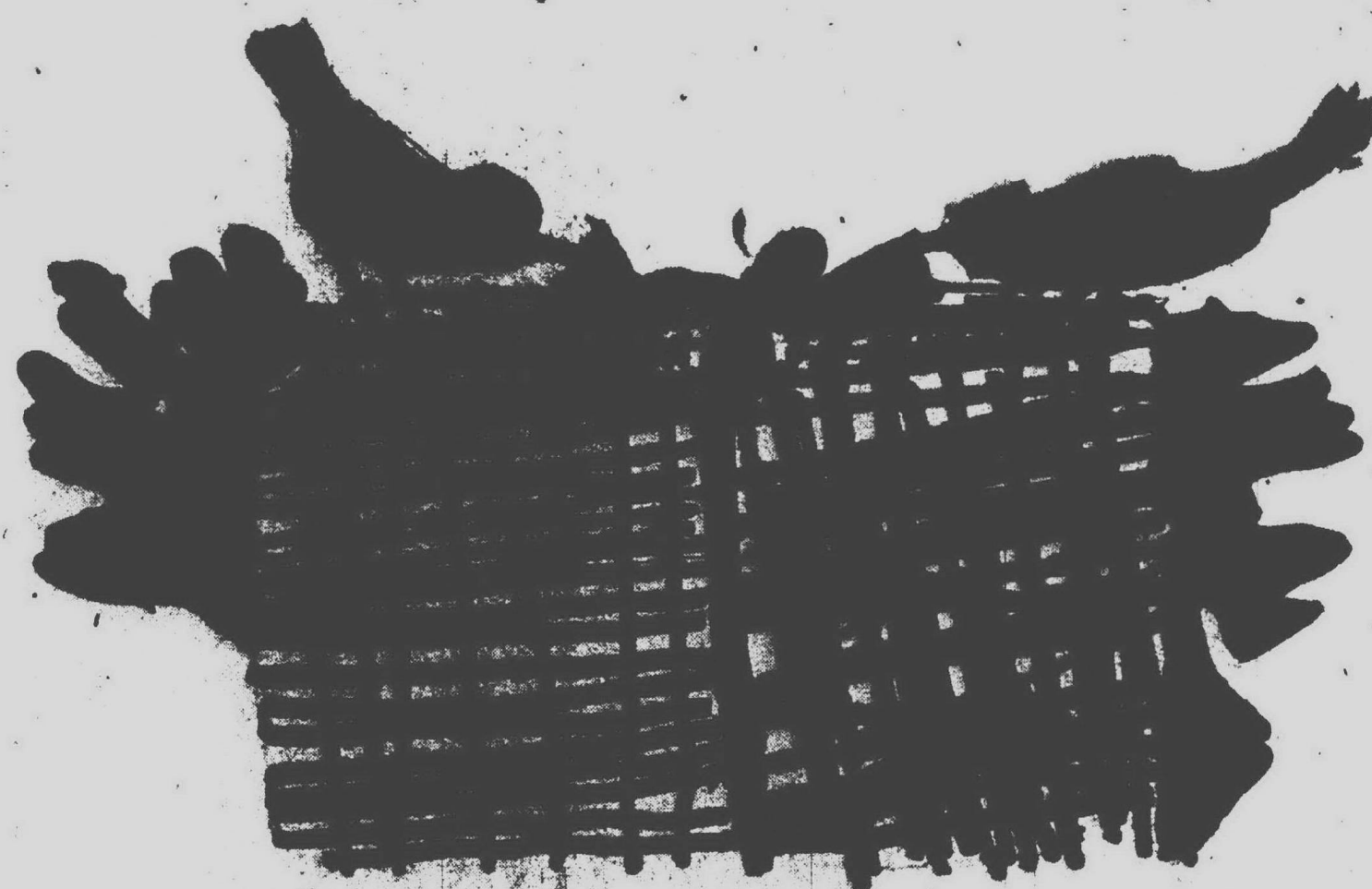

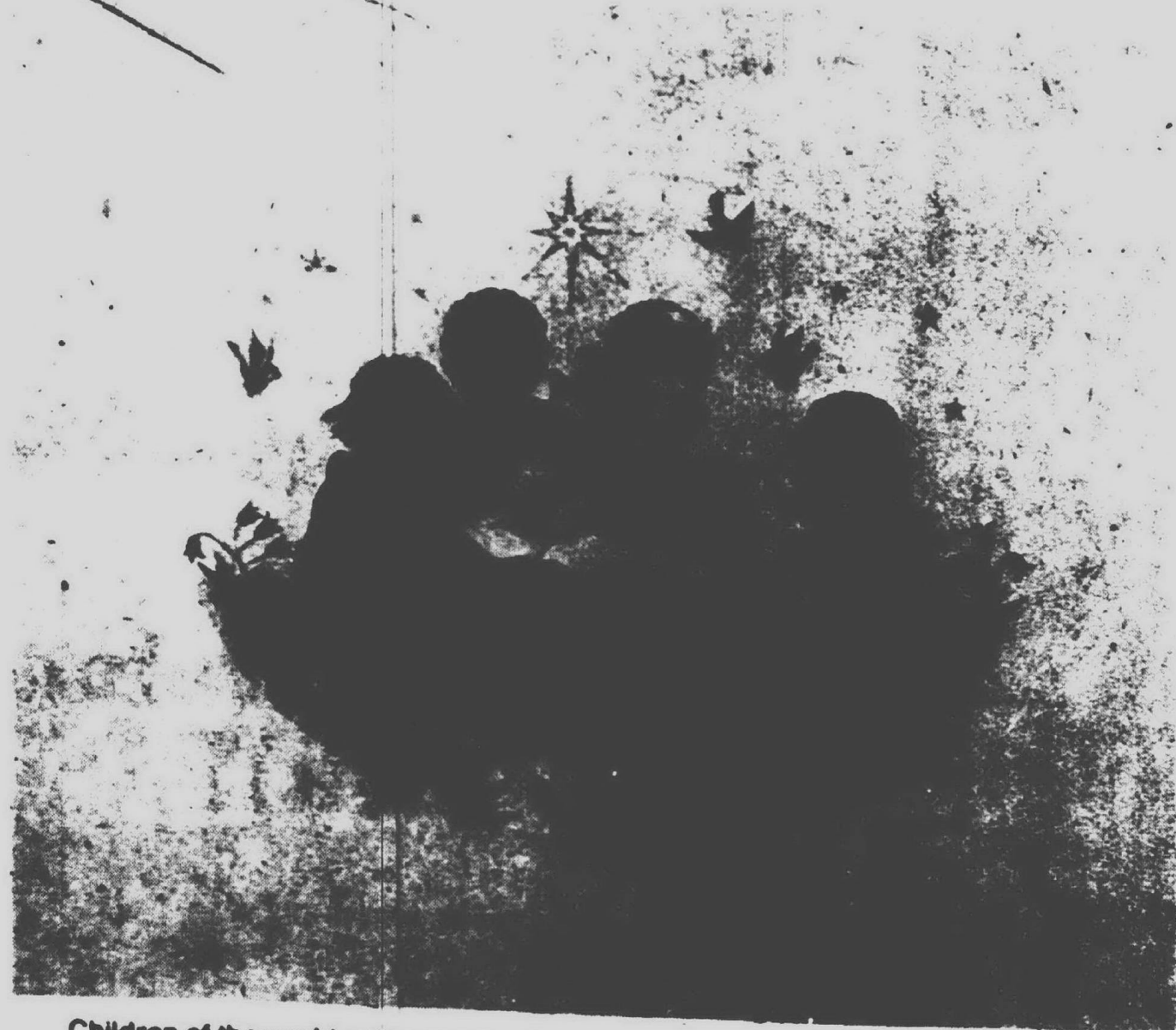

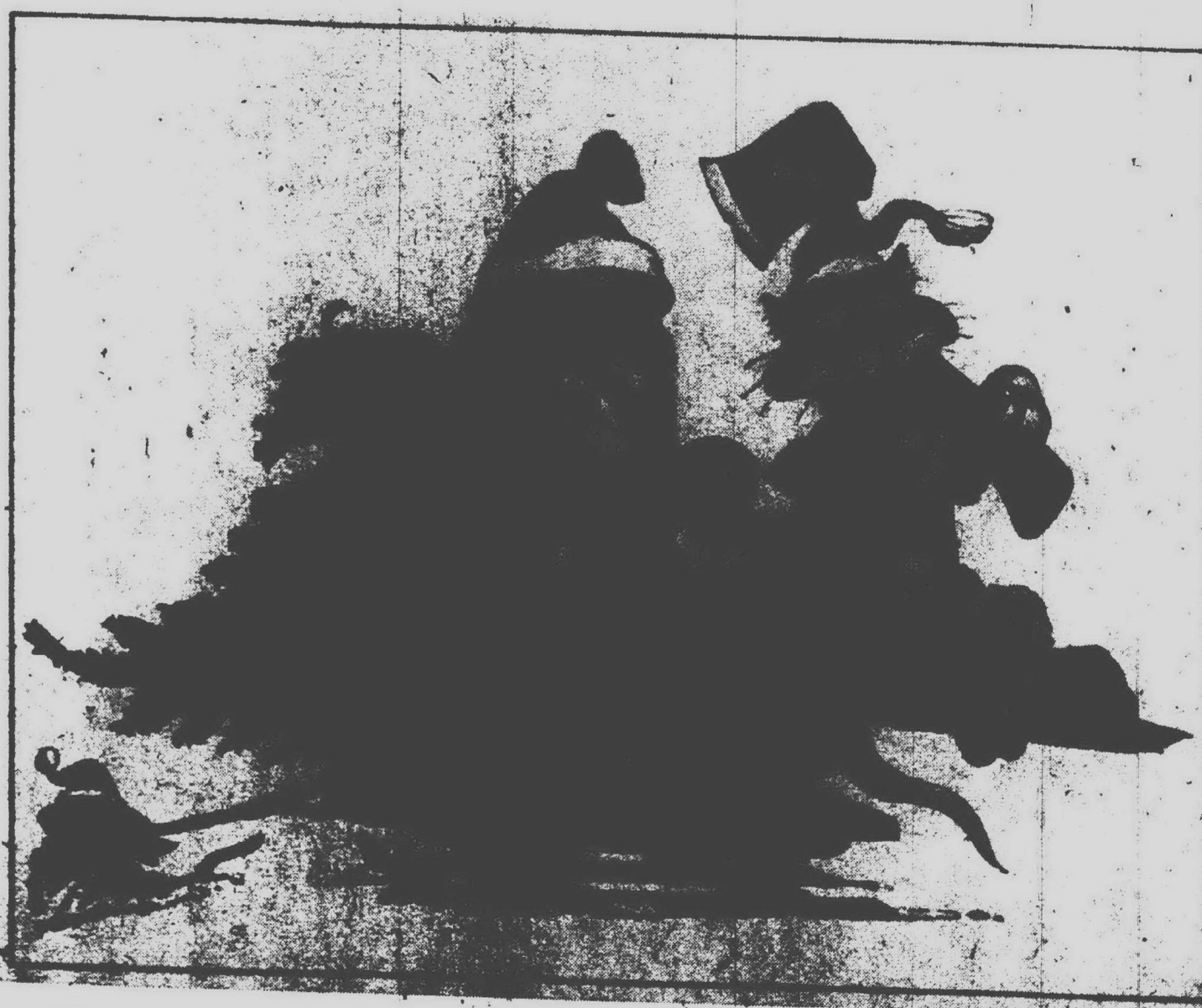

They came to this country two years later, going first to St. Louis where Mr. Abraham worked building railroad cars and then was employed by Anheuser-Busch.

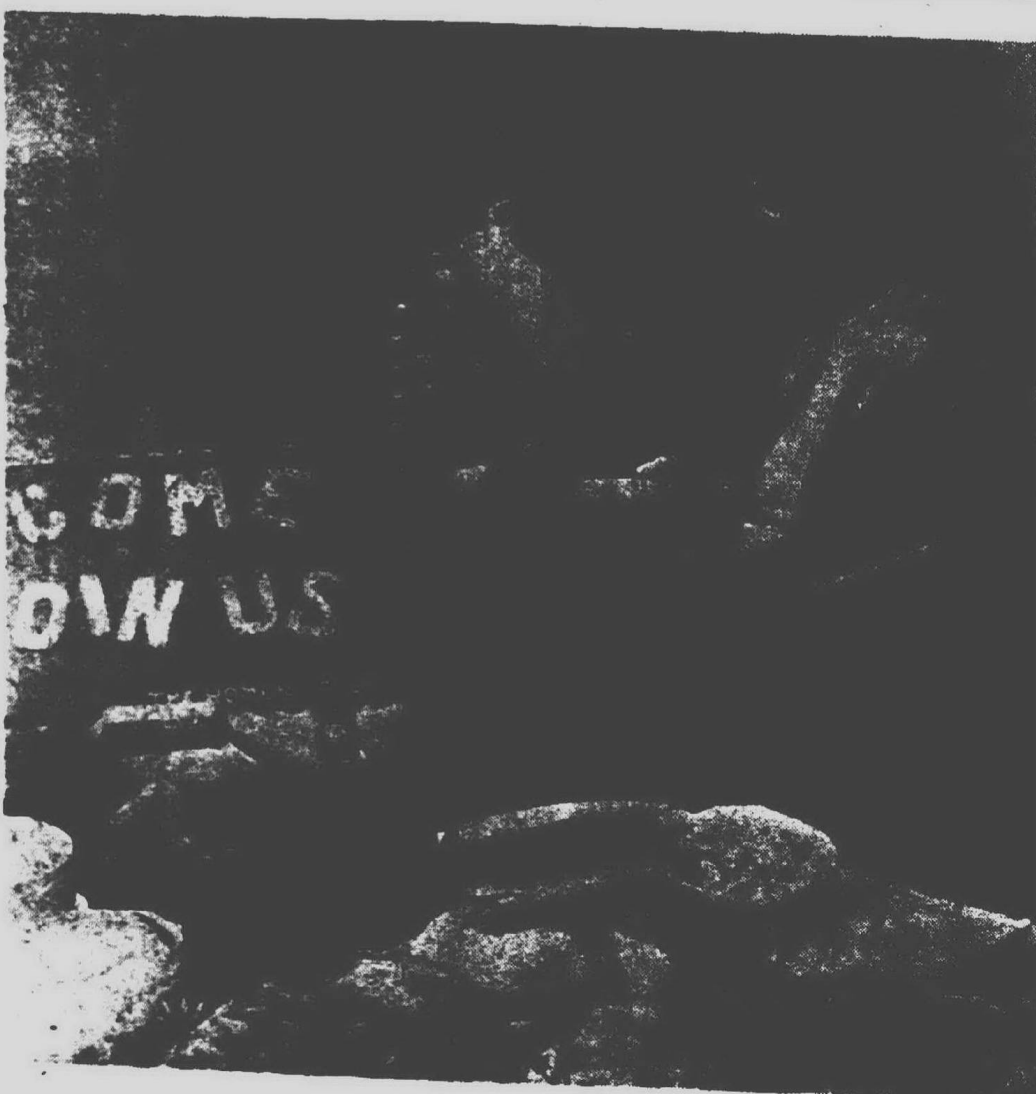
Hearing stories about homesteading in Montana, they tried it for a year but gave it up because, as they reported later, "there were more stones than dirt."

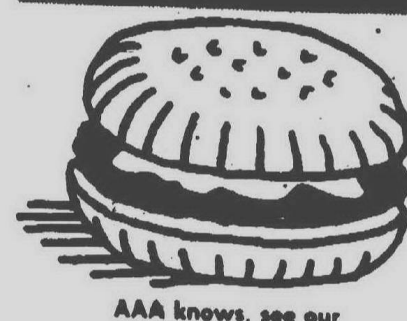

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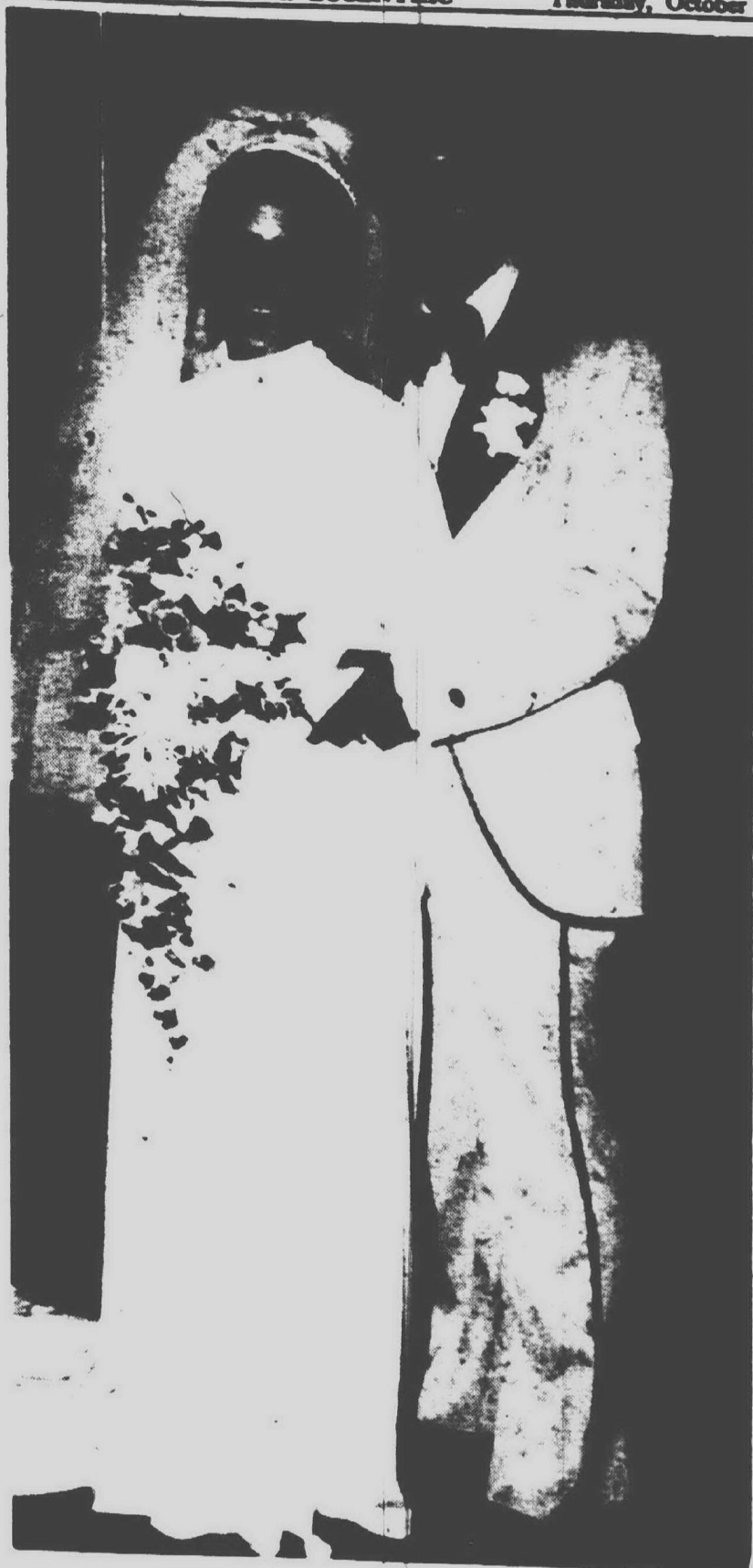

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Many wild animals once roamed entire area

PLYMOUTH - The arrival of settlers in Plymouth marked the beginning of the end for some animals and birds which once thrived here, and a new home on the cleared land for other species.

When the pioneers arrived, great numbers of wild animals roamed the area. John S. Tibbits, who came here in 1825 - about the same time as William Starkweather, Roswell Root, John Van Sickle and others - wrote that bear, wolf, lynx, deer, wildcat, fox, raccoon, badger, porcupine, woodchuck, rabbit, mink, weasel and fisher were abundant.

Tibbits' recollections are contained in a paper entitled "Wild Animals in Wayne County" read before the Detroit Pioneer Society in 1874.

Tibbits reported that the settlers considered bears and wolves to be destructive nuisances. The American black bear, a woodland and largely vegetarian animal, apparently developed a taste for the sheep and hogs the pioneers brought with them.

Settlers set traps and deadfalls to catch the bears. Tibbits describes "a novel mode of trapping the bear" which was then popular. A triangular-shaped hole was cut into a hollow tree, with the acute angle at the bottom. The cut was made about seven feet above the ground and just large enough for the bear to squeeze his head through. A piece of meat was suspended inside of the tree, about two feet below the hole. The bear, in his attempt to get the meat, would get hung in the acute angle of the hole.

Settlers were also bothered by wolves which, like the bear, destroyed domestic animals. Tibbits wrote that wolves were often "inveigled into the folds with the sheep and captured in that way. A large pen was made of poles, and so constructed that it was narrowed up at the top, leaving an opening only a few feet square. This afforded an easy ingress to the hungry wolf, but an effectual barrier to his escape."

but with little thought for conservation. "Little skill was required in killing them," Tibbits reported, "the principal qualification being a steady nerve. During the hot days in the summer, when the mosquitoes and gnats were troublesome, the deer would resort to the streams and ponds of water during the night to get rid of their tormentors."

Here they would fall an easy prey to the hunter, who, in his canoe, with torch at the bow, would row noiselessly about. The deer, seeing the light, would remain entranced, presenting to the unerring aim of the hunter two small bright globes of light, between which the fatal bullet was sure to be lodged."

Long gone from this area are the bear, the wolf, lynx, badger, porcupine and fisher. The clearing of the forests, the trapping and shooting for fur, and other manifestations of "civilization" were more than the beasts could stand. None of these species is now found in Wayne County. The badger, which was not plentiful even when Tibbits arrived, is now scarce all over the state, as is the porcupine.

The fisher, to which Tibbits referred, is a tree-dwelling member of the weasel family. It is black in color and about 42 inches long. Also called Pekin, Pennant's marten, and black cat, the fisher was one of the chief controls of the porcupine. It has been trapped almost out of existence for its fur.

Keith K. Kreag, general curator of the Detroit Zoo, with whom I recently talked about the current status of animals and birds in Wayne County, told

me that the Michigan Department of Conservation is now trying to bring fishers back in the Upper Peninsula.

Although the ways of the settler were too much for some animals and birds, other species liked the new environment created by man and they moved in after him. Among these were the skunk, the opossum, the crow and the unwelcome rat. Tibbits wrote that "the crow, like the skunk and the rat did not make its appearance till a number of years after the first settlements were made."

THE SKUNK, which prefers open land to forests, found the manmade terrain to his liking. In addition to his usual diet of insects, mice and frogs, he was not averse to an occasional foray in the settler's hen-roosts. For well-known reasons, he had no fear of man or other animals. In spite of being trapped for their fur since Colonial days, skunks have continued to thrive in this area.

Another nocturnal animal, the opossum, moved here from the South as recently as 30 years ago. This cat-sized marsupial is an easy victim of

high-speed automobilists and is often seen dead on our highways today.

The now ubiquitous rat was not indigenous to the United States. The original home of this fierce rodent may have been central Asia. At any rate, it did not reach Britain until 1730, and it arrived in this country by boat. As Tibbits said, the rat was not found in this area until years after Plymouth was settled. I have seen only one rat here, and that was several years ago. When I reported it to the authorities, I was told that a few may have been brought into the area at the time some land fill was imported for use at a local school.

Along North Territorial Road, just outside the city limits, I continue to see possum, skunks, raccoons and rabbits run over on the road. Rabbits, squirrels and ground squirrels still compete with cardinals, blue jays, grackles, doves and sparrows for the seed we put out on our property in the township.

A woodchuck has made occasional appearances on our back lawn, and is probably responsible for the disappearance of all of the leaves from

some newly-emerging sunflowers this summer. I still keep a heavy weight on top of our garbage cans to discourage a foraging raccoon. Quail and pheasant are still occasionally seen in the area.

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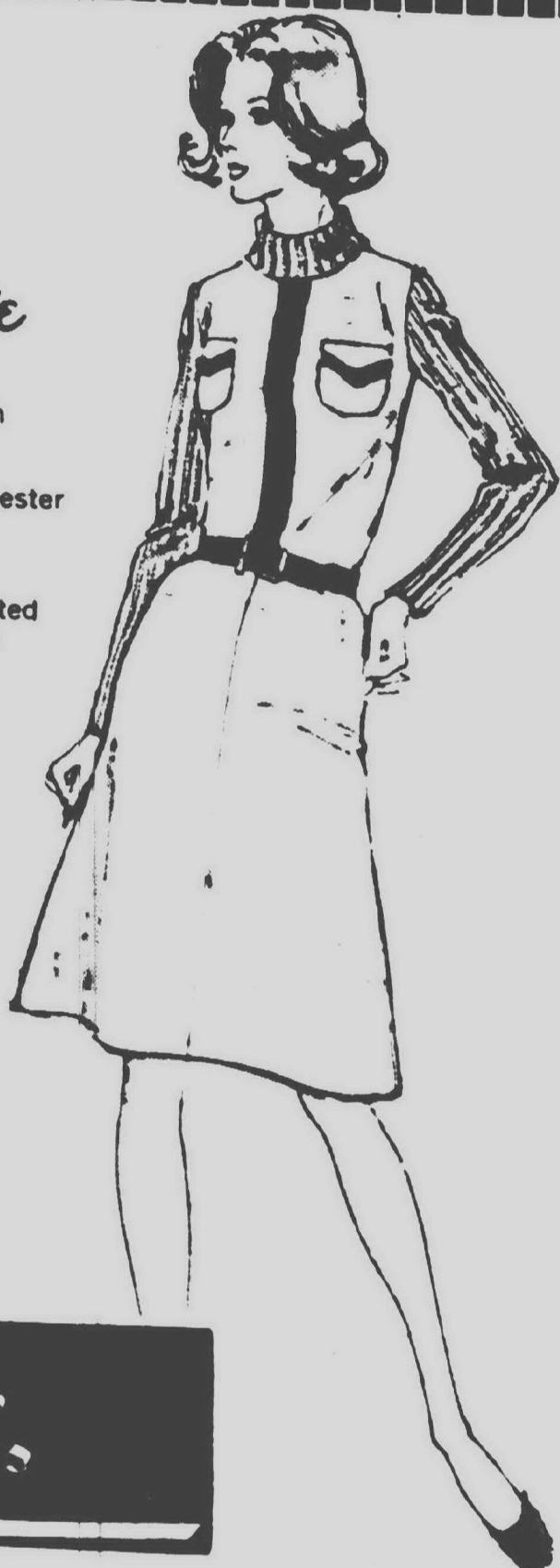

St. John Seminary marks 25th year with open house

St. John Provincial Seminary, a first-of-its-kind school for training Catholic priests and the pride and joy of the late Cardinal Edward Mooney, will hold open house Sunday, Oct. 13.

The event from 2 to 5 p.m. will be the first in a series of special celebrations to mark St. John's 25th anniversary.

Many of the 107 young men now studying for the priesthood there will be on hand to show visitors the spacious grounds and beautiful buildings, including the chapel and sacristy with its marble floors and oak pews, library and classrooms.

Also part of the tour will be the Crypt chapels where Cardinal Mooney is buried and some of the recreational facilities like bowling alleys and a golf course.

THERE WILL BE displays of liturgical vessels and vestments, rare and

historic books, a photographic history of the school's first-quarter century, and informative displays about the seven dioceses of Michigan served by the seminary.

Short organ recitals will be given throughout the afternoon in the main chapel.

ST. JOHN SEMINARY marked a first in the annals of the Michigan Diocese because it was established by the entire diocese instead of by a single religious order.

It was dedicated by Cardinal Mooney on the feast of St. Edward, Oct. 13, 1949.

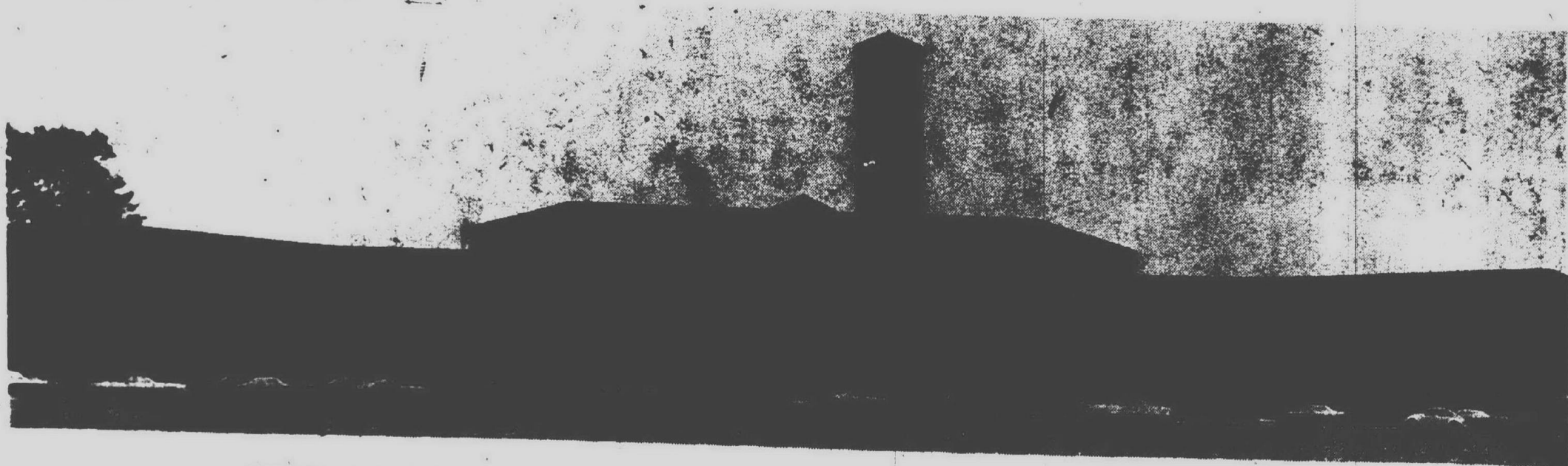
Catholics from all over Michigan have joined in contributions for the construction of the Romanesque buildings that house the seminary.

When the school opened, there were 71 young men enrolled. In the peak years of the early 1960s, enrollment hit 225, and over the years the seminary has graduated 759 priests, most of them now serving in Michigan.

WITH THE DECREASE in the number of students, a trend noted in clerical vocations in general, there has been some thought of converting St. John's facilities to theological study for all faiths.

One step in this direction has been a recent plan to offer library facilities to all in the state interested in theological studies. Clergymen in this area have especially been encouraged to make use of the books in the St. John library.

St. John was staffed originally by the Sulpician Fathers, who administer seminaries all over the world. In recent years control of the seminary has been vested in diocesan priests from different parts of Michigan.

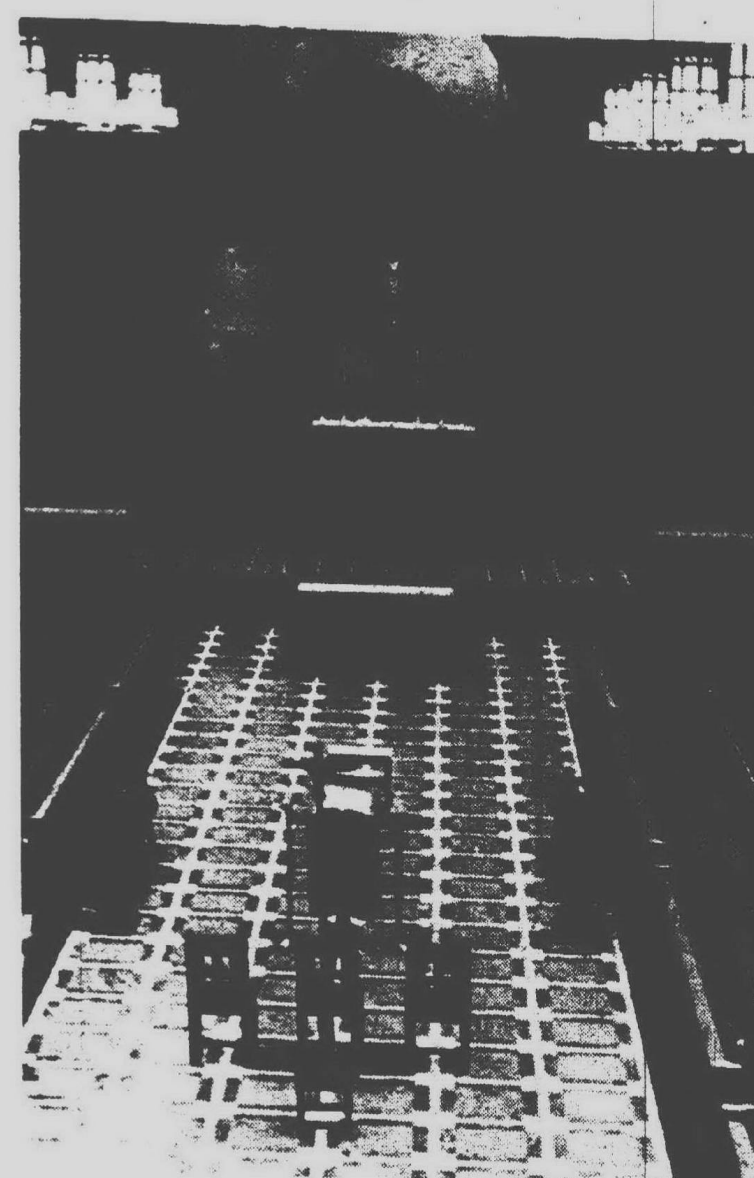

Clergy and laymen from five area churches affiliated with the American Lutheran Church are participating in the ALC general convention currently in session in Cobo Hall in Detroit.

The meetings began Oct. 9 and will continue through Oct. 15. About 1,000 delegates from all over the country are taking part.

Mrs. Marie Walck, a resident of Farmington and a member of St. John American Lutheran Church there, is general chairman for the convention.

Western Wayne county churches participating include Ascension Church, Sword of the Spirit and Timothy, all of Livonia, Prince of Peace of Westland and Christ Church of Redford Township.

WAINO AUKEE, a member of Prince of Peace, is serving as transportation chairman for the convention, taking charge of having buses and cars meet delegates at the airport and return them there.

The co-chairman for convention volunteers, who numbering about 150 for each of the seven days of the convention, is the Rev. Jerry Stroud, pastor of Christ Lutheran.

Other local pastors participating are the Rev. George Fleischer of Timothy, the Rev. James D. Beckham of Prince of Peace, the Rev. Arnold Jahr of Ascension and the Rev. Walter Dickinson of Sword of the Spirit.

Mrs. Betty Orr of Livonia, a member of Sword of the Spirit, is head

usher for the convention meetings.

CHOIRS FROM ASCENSION and Prince of Peace will be among 700 singers in a massed choir for a worship service at 3 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 13 in Cobo Hall.

All delegates will be attending that service, and all interested persons in the metropolitan area are invited to join them.

Also scheduled for Sunday is a concert by the men's choir of St. Olaf College of Minnesota and the glee club of Capital University in Columbus, Ohio.

The concert will be free and no tickets will be needed. "It's a gift from the American Lutheran Church to the Detroit community," Mrs. Walck said.

What's behind Ford's mercy?

God was cited four times and his conscience mentioned thrice on the Sunday morning that President Ford announced his explosively controversial decision to pardon Richard Nixon.

Earlier that morning, the president had attended the 8 a.m. service of holy communion (no sermon) in the "Church of the Presidents," St. John Episcopal Church, Lafayette Square, just across the park from the White House.

At 11:05 a.m. Ford delivered what is now known in many quarters as "The Sunday Punch" - the immunity-in-advance extended to his predecessor in San Clemente.

Ford's Episcopal rector, the Rev. William Dols of Immanuel-On-The-Hill in Alexandria, Va., was as surprised as almost everyone else in the nation - except the person who may well be the new president's number one moral guide.

PHILIP BUCHEN, Ford's life-long friend and now White House counselor who has been elevated to cabinet rank, spent Labor Day weekend in top secret legal investigations to determine, at his client's request, any possible precedence for presidential pardon prior to indictment.

In Grand Rapids, Dr. Duncan Littlefair, Buchen's pastor at the Fountain Street (non-denominational) Church, was quoted by the New York Post in describing Buchen as "one of the most influential members - one of the leaders in the church's philosophical search for world-wide humanism."

Religion Update

"He could sit down with any PhD and deal with him on his own level on morality, politics, religion and social concerns," Dr. Littlefair added.

Other parishioners of this church agree with this impressive assessment of Buchen's philosophical and theological prowess.

BUT COUNSELOR BUCHEN, despite these credentials, lamented he wished he were "a better student of the ethics for morality of mercy" when he was asked during a press conference about the morality of Ford's pardoning of Nixon.

"I don't think an act of mercy can ever be untimely," replied Buchen when asked about the fact that Ford, only 10 days earlier, told the press conference that just such a pardon would be "unwise and untimely."

Earlier, when Ford was a nominee for vice-president, he told the senate when asked about such a Nixon pardon: "I don't think the public would stand for it."

Hence I asked Buchen: "Was the president NOT merciful 10 days ago when he said this was untimely? Was the president lacking in mercy when he told the committee that the American people wouldn't stand for it? What caused him to be so suddenly merciful?"

Buchen: "I wish you could come up here and explain the theory of mercy. You can probably do a much better job than I can."

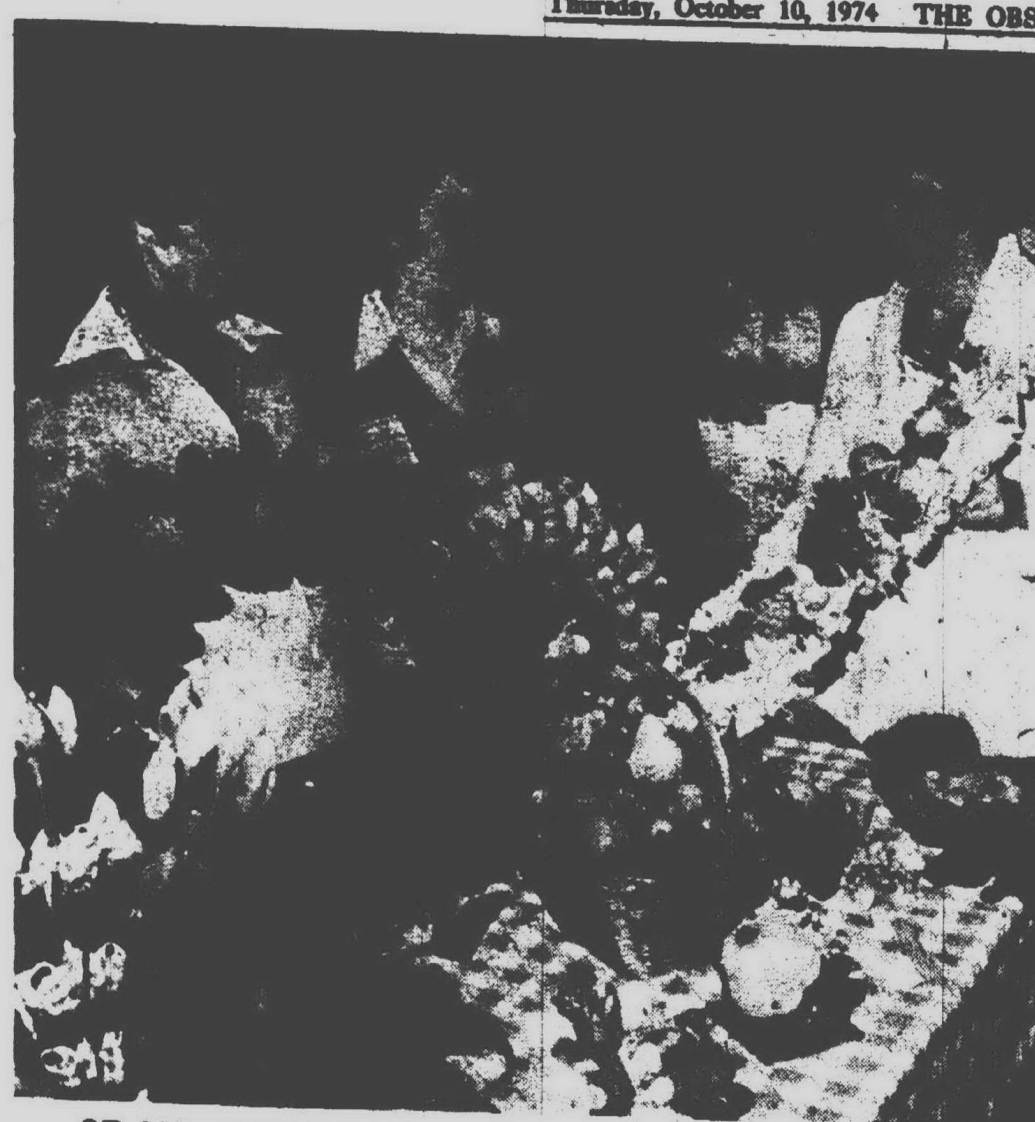

'Energy Act' is a maritime boondoggle

It is bad enough that the policies of the Arab governments have saddled the American consumer with higher price tags for petroleum and all of those things—such as electricity—derived from it. But now, believe it or not, our own Congress is getting ready to go the Arabs one better.

As of this writing, both House and Senate have passed "The Energy Transportation Security Act of 1974," which would require that by mid-1977 at least 30 per cent of all ocean-going petroleum products imported into the U.S. be carried in vessels built in U.S. shipyards and flying the American flag.

THAT'S JUST GREAT for U.S. shipyards—which already have so much business that the Navy is having trouble finding someone to build its ships. And it's great for the U.S. maritime unions, which long ago priced themselves out of competitive markets (a typical tanker crewman's pay is \$13,000 a year, of which \$10,350 is gener-

ously contributed by the U.S. taxpayer in subsidy payments).

It's not so good for everybody else. If this monstrous boondoggle becomes law, the increased transportation costs it will impose on the oil industry will come to about \$70 per year for the average American household.

THIS "ENERGY Transportation Security Act" would be better titled "The Consumer and Taxpayer Ripoff Act of 1974," or perhaps "The

Shipbuilding and Maritime Union Security Act of 1974."

The total bankruptcy of the official title is evidenced by the fact that the Department of Defense says it would actually threaten the security of the U.S. In addition to Defense, seven other federal departments have objected to the bill (State, Treasury, Commerce, Justice, Interior, Agriculture and Transportation). And yet it passed the Senate by 42-28, and the House by 266-136. One has to wonder what is going on here.

THE INFLATIONARY effect of this legislation should be enough, by itself, to cause its rejection. But for those who want other reasons, there are plenty:

Such a law would violate more than 30 treaties with other nations, and encourage them to adopt similar laws in retaliation.

If the proponents get away with applying a cargo preference law to petroleum, they will soon

try to extend the principle to other important commodities, such as agricultural products, with a similar effect on prices.

The law would give the small but powerful maritime unions the means to interrupt our oil imports when they don't get what they want.

THE PRINCIPAL argument used in favor of the bill is that it will "create new U.S. jobs." Sure. A few thousand. Is that worth the price? And how many jobs will be lost in businesses that can't take the increased operating costs imposed by a new petroleum price hike?

By the time you read this, the bill may have emerged from the joint conference committee and received final passage through Congress.

At that point, a Presidential veto would be the only hope for the American consumer. You might urge the President to do just that. And then gently encourage your congressmen to uphold the veto.

'Service' station trap: The quick price change

It may appear like a gasoline war with a difference of two to six cents a gallon in the prices at service stations in the same immediate area, but a word to the wise for all motorists ... be sure and see which tank you are getting fuel from.

Why? Seems like a logical question, and the logical answer is to make sure you are getting gasoline at the prices advertised on signs in front of the stations.

It's easy to follow a sign that reads "49.9 for regular," get in line, order regular and then a few minutes later notice the attendant has the hose from a brand of regular for 54.9. And what are you going to say when this takes place? Are you going to order the attendant to drain the gas out of your tank? Are you going to raise a fuss over paying a nickel a gallon more than you had bargained for? Or are you going to do what most drivers do in a similar situation, swallow your anger, pay the higher price and then vow never to go back to that station?

WE DON'T KNOW how many others have been caught in this kind of a trap, which is caused by not watching which hose the attendant attaches to your car, but we have been victimized no less than four times in the last three weeks.

Ordinarily we would charge up to the station owner and demand an explanation but generally find he is long gone and the attendants are young high school boys and girls who seem to have been taught to make the switches if the motorist isn't paying that much attention.

Most certainly one knows the difference in the price when he forks out \$7 or \$8 when he figures he should be paying only \$6 or \$6.50. And then he kind of feels he has been taken in by a confidence game, the kind that has developed since the start of the energy and fuel shortage and the skyrocketing prices of gasoline.

TIME WAS, during the early days of the shortage, when a station owner would deliberately boost his prices on Sundays by as much as four cents a gallon and then drop back again on Monday.

That was just a case of out-and-out blackmail, not stated as such but there it was: "If I'm going to keep the station open on Sundays, then the consumer is going to pay the freight. And if you didn't like it, you just kept on driving until you came to another station and found the same policy in effect."

More and more station owners are irking customers with their superior airs when one comes in for anti-freeze or anything that's the least bit out of the ordinary these days.

There was a time when one drove into a station, he knew the windshield was going to get washed and the windows on both sides. Now one is extremely lucky if the attendant as much as looks at the windshield.

Sense And Nonsense

ON THE LINCOLN Day banquet circuit, Republican orators profess great pride in their party and its first successful presidential candidate. But this year it looks as if the candidates are running from the party label rather than on it.

Take a look at the posters and some of the literature of U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch, State Sen. Carl Pursell and State Rep. Bob Geake, just for starters. No party label.

DOUG FRASER, a vice president of the UAW, told Democrats in Plymouth recently his gut feelings after the pardon of Richard Nixon by President Ford: "The American people got on their honeymoon with Ford what people usually get on their honeymoon." (It takes a minute for that one to sink in.)

R. T. Thompson writes

HE MAY INQUIRE about the oil, but have you heard a single one ask if there was enough fluid in the window washers? That's a verboten question these days, and we don't know why. Folks are just as interested in filling the washers as they ever were but most forget all about it until they are long gone from the station.

Have you heard one attendant ask you to pull over to the air pressure line because he thinks your tires are low? We haven't for a long time, and we generally purchase our tires from our favorite "service" station.

These are things the owners of the station better start thinking about again. The one that does is the one most apt to have the most customers coming to his pumps.

You can bet folks don't soon forget the services they don't get and they long remember the ones they do.

Newsletter: Imagery yes, information no

Two years ago, I gave Democrat Marvin Stempien, a state representative seeking higher office, a bad time for using his legislative newsletter as a campaign vehicle.

And so my own impartiality and propensity to make enemies in both parties prompt me to give Stempien's successor, Republican Rep. Bob Geake, an equally bad time for the same kind of behavior.

Geake's newsletter, which was probably printed at state expense since there's no disclaimer, arrived in Livonia at the end of September and purports to give a "legislative update" as well as the results of his survey of the voters. It fails on both counts.

WE FIND, for example, that the Legislature passed a generic drugs law (Public Act 155), a modification of the no-fault insurance law (PA 72), an unemployed worker benefit law (PA 11), an occupational and health safety law (PA 154), income tax relief (PA 20), sales tax relief (PA 125), corporate tax reductions (PA 125 and 126) ... and so on and on.

Yet Geake's newsletter, which reports he attended 223 sessions and missed zero during his tenure, never says how HE voted! In four full pages, all we find is that he sponsored a burial allowance for survivors of veterans.

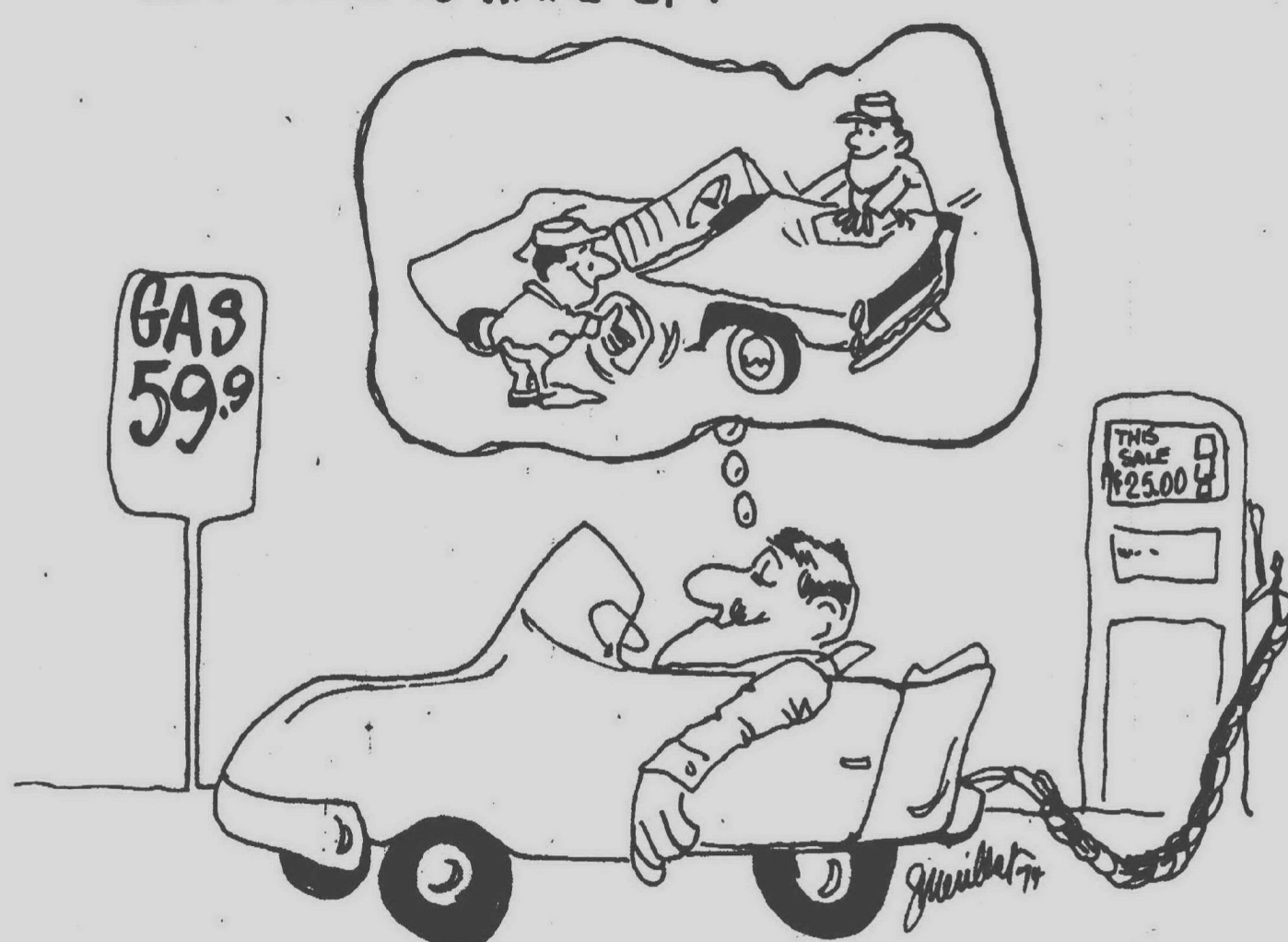
In fairness, let it be noted that other politicians from both parties also send out hordes of newsletters, newspaper columns and the like without ever saying how they vote. But it strikes me as a waste of money to send out an elaborate four-page report just before the election and never say how you voted. It smacks of image-building, not accountability.

THE GEAKE report also says that those who answered his survey are nearly 80 per cent in favor of "stop and frisk" crime laws, 98.9 per cent in favor of putting able-bodied welfare recipients to work if meaningful employment can be found, and nearly 91 per cent of them believe that there's widespread fraud in the welfare system.

Great! But what does Rep. Geake answer to his own questions? Well, he never gets around to reporting that.

One question on "victimless crimes" says that 50 per cent of us believe the state should eliminate criminal penalties on homosexuality and nearly 42 per cent want to de-criminalize prostitution. It would be interesting to see Rep. Geake (and other legislators and candidates) answer that question themselves—since it's appar-

ent that whatever they say, they'll have half the electorate sore at them.

Politician needs a neurosis to handle nosey newsmen

This week is National Newspaper Week, essentially a promotional observance designed to make the American public better aware of the various merits and strengths of the nation's newspapers.

This is probably a reasonable enough idea. But following my own grumpy annual custom, I shall utilize this National Newspaper Week column as a vehicle to criticize the press, on the ground that the best time for criticism is smack dab in the middle of self-adulation.

PERHAPS you remember the amusing little piece in Monday's Free Press to the effect that on the schedule sent out to the press on behalf of Mrs. Sander Levin (the wife of the Democratic candidate for governor) began: "Beauty Shop Appt., then return home."

Now this is perhaps an amusing item, although deficient in reportorial balance, since Mrs. Levin's schedule for the rest of the day was an arduous one. In fact, her schedule for this campaign is as tough as you can imagine.

But the story set me to musing about politicians, privacy and the press, and the irreconcilability of the three.

WHEN COMPARED with 30 years ago, today's reporters are incomparably more thorough and aggressive—and more intrusive into privacy—in their reporting the political scene.

While President Franklin Roosevelt was carrying on his extra-marital affair in the White House, most members of the press corps knew perfectly well what was going on. But no story ever appeared. The press respected the President's privacy.

Today, it's entirely different. We are regaled with cute items in the press about Mrs. Levin's schedule or breathless announcements that President Ford intends to sleep in the same bed with his wife.

The private lives of political families have somehow become common public property.

Which may be one reason why divorces are so common in political families. Or why children of politicians have such difficulty in growing up in a reasonably normal manner. And why so many

But why should he—or any other lawmaker—send out a four-page newsletter at the end of a session and just before an election, and never tell you how he voted?

The daily papers give the politicians hell for spending public money on these pre-election mailings. Actually, the newsletters' costs are trivial in terms of a \$3 billion state budget.

The real abuse of legislative newsletters occurs when the lawmaker fails to use that golden opportunity to give an accounting of his own stewardship.

wives of politicians have been forced into psychiatric treatment to deal with their anxieties and frustrations.

THE RUINATION of the privacy of the politician has had another, more subtle effect, on our nation.

Any person who considers making politics a profession today must know full well that to do so ruins all hopes of having a private, full life with a spouse and children. The new, aggressive code of press behavior—and the expectations of its readers—have enforced this conclusion.

Hence, in my view, many men and women active in politics today have personalities constructed such that they do not mind much the violation of their privacy or that of their families as long as it serves their political ambitions. Which is an elaborate way of saying that they are pretty neurotic.

My guess is that a lot of ordinary voters feel the same way. And further guess that the ordinary voter uses this feeling to conclude that politicians in general can't be trusted.

I do know that as long as the glare of publicity in a political career ruins any chance of a private family life, our system will tend to self-select neurotics to run for public office. And any political system which penalizes the ordinary, decent, privacy-loving, family-oriented person for getting into politics is doing itself a grave disservice.

I hope the press will learn not to contribute to this disservice by being more respectful of the needs for privacy of politicians and their families.

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Teachers' position defended

Strikes blamed on state law

The Sept. 26 editorial by R.T. Thompson is a perfect example of journalistic irresponsibility. Instead of berating teachers (in any bargaining situation, there are two sides), instead of implying that a strike is a "vacation" (the animosity and the emotional scars that are left as a result of a strike are hardly souvenirs of a holiday), instead of worrying about "how kids stow it away during the time they're not in school" (are we seriously believe that a major concern in a strike situation is how much more time a child has to eat when he's at home an additional three to six weeks?), Mr. Thompson might better spend his time finding

out what the real problem is in September school closings and where the real blame in school strikes should be placed. Public Act 379 is a badly written law. It is a law that gives public employees the right to bargain but denies them the traditional right to strike; it grants the right to negotiate but fails to provide the machinery necessary to solve an impasse when negotiations break down. Hence, in bargaining situations, school boards feel backed against the wall, and teachers in frustration strike. By its very nature, the law itself sets the stage for September chaos. The responsibility for that

chaos should be placed where it belongs, at the feet of state legislators. If Mr. Thompson were really concerned about "Mr. Average Worker" (instead of cleverly penned stereotypes) or about kids and their education (education is obviously secondary to Mr. Thompson: he devoted two paragraphs to summer vacations but never once mentioned the damage to kids' educations), he would lead the bandwagon in making the public aware of the problems inherent in the law so that citizens could exert pressure on their state legislators to get the law changed. And if a change in the law is too much for Mr. Thompson to conceive, then perhaps he could support an additional law — like the one in existence in New York — which allows for the docking of teachers' pay for each day they strike. That kind of law would make Mr. Thompson feel better, for then teachers would lose money. 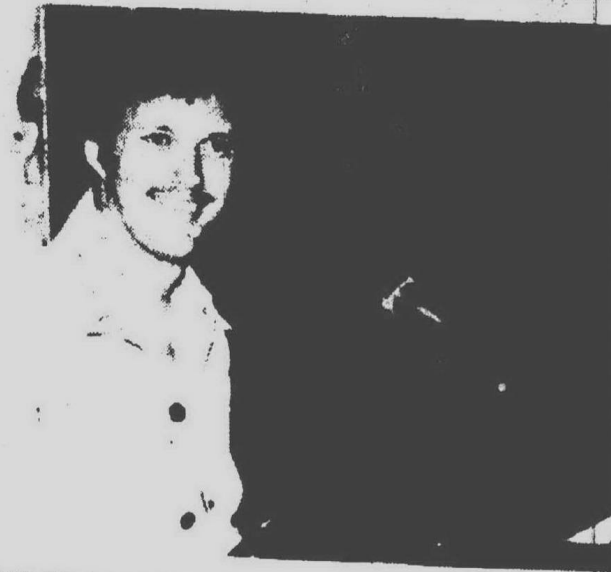

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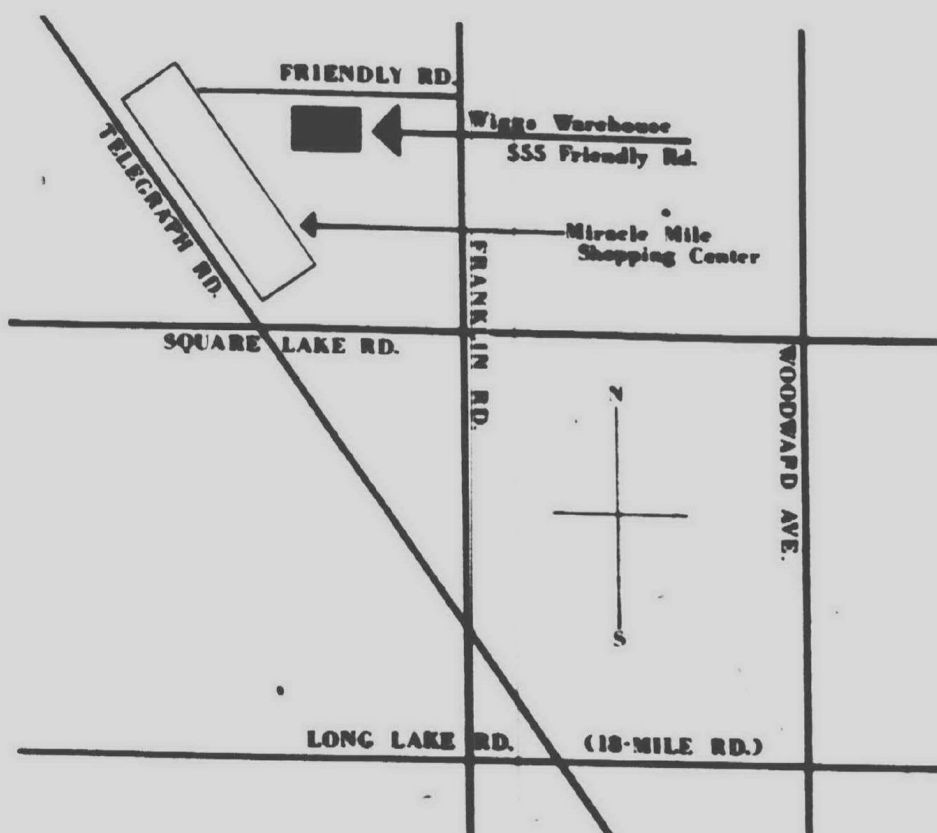
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'Year of Bulldog' fades out

Plymouth Salem stings Bentley, 16-0

The "Year of the Bulldog" faded quickly out of the '74 prep football picture in one 12 minute segment on the Plymouth Salem gridiron.

And lookout, Suburban Eight - the "Year of the Rocks" is readily upon us and picking up momentum.

Tom Moshimer's Plymouth Salem Rocks broke open a scoreless three-quarters of football with two touchdowns and a safety in the final 12 minutes to send the Bentley Bulldogs back to their Livonia doghouse, loop hopes shattered, 16-0.

It was loss No. 2 in the Suburban Eight race for Glen Goode's Bulldogs against one win.

But for Moshimer and his elated crew, it was victory No. 3 in the loop and fourth overall in the same number of outings where the Rocks have outscored their foes, 71-27, and have shut out now both Trepton and Bentley in league play.

"We are in the driver's seat now," commented Moshimer who in seven years of coaching has never won the league. His best finish came last year in second place with an overall 7-2 mark.

"Everyone has to catch us now," added the Salem head mentor whose Rocks are the solo unbeaten club in the eight team league.

"Hey, we gave up 20 pounds per kid on the line against Bentley and we stuck it to them."

"These kids are doing it every week. We are not big, but this group is quick, intelligent and do they ever adjust to the situation."

"Bentley is good sound ballclub and they are going to beat a few teams before this thing is over. Their defense gave us our toughest battle yet this year."

"They kept us bottled up in our own end the entire first half."

Salem finally moved out to midfield in the final quarter, started moving the ball wide and its defense, which has not allowed a touchdown on the ground yet in '74, took care of the rest.

Touchdowns by quarterback Tim Dillon and Scott Agnew and a safety recorded by 6-foot-1, 185 pound tackle Doug McCowan accounted for the Plymouth attack.

Salem collected nine first downs to Bentley's seven and picked up 170 yards net on the ground while Bentley was held to just 74. It wasn't much of a passing game with Dillon one of four for five yards and Bentley's Bill Deacon and Glen Stevens just one for 11 for two yards.

The first quarter saw both squads punt the ball away twice with a Bentley pass interception by Bill Winarski halting one Salem drive that had moved down to the Bulldog 23.

Bentley moved to the Salem 32 early in the second quarter but after missing on a third and eight play, Goode chose to punt.

Salem took over on its five, punted the ball away, Bentley had the ball on Plymouth's 44 and moved to the Rock 23 before a fumble was recovered by Plymouth's Jerry Brink.

Salem took over on its 26 and pick-

ed up only its second first down with Agnew cracking ahead to the 41 before another punting situation with Charlie Johnston called on to do his thing with the foot again.

Bentley's Deacon got the ball as far as the Rock 44 before time ran out in the first half with the scoreboard showing two big goose eggs.

After an exchange of punts early in the third quarter, Bentley took over on its 17. Deacon ran it to the 23. Bruce Boudnek was stopped for no gain, an illegal procedure call moved the ball back and Tom Schultz found himself in another Bulldog punting situation.

The snap to Schultz was high and the 5-foot-11, 160 pound Bulldog had no room to boot the ball. Schulz moved out of the pocket and got away a weak kick that was practically blocked.

The punt traveled only seven yards and with 1:35 remaining in the third quarter, Salem had the break it had been waiting for. Plymouth took over on the Bentley 24.

Joe Hibler was stopped for no gain and on a third and seven play, Hibler moved it to the 21 but a delay of game call pushed the Rocks back to the 27 to make it third and 12.

Dillon then tossed to Doug Tripp who pounded his way down to the 11 for a first down. On a third and one play, Dillon found an opening and spurred in. Tripp's conversion was good and with 10:22 remaining, it was Salem 7-0.

On the kickoff, Brad Bedell gave Bentley good field position with a return to his 33 but a clip pushed it back to the 18 and Deacon was dropped on the first play back on the 15.

Bentley was then detected for having a lineman down field on a pass play with Plymouth's Jim Anderson calling the infraction and the official picking up the call.

The Bulldogs finally punted themselves out of the jam and Plymouth took over on the Bentley 42 with 8:50 left on the clock.

Dillon picked up a first down on an option and Tripp pushed ahead to the Bentley 12. After Dillon moved the ball closer, Agnew exploded through the Bentley line, Tripp made good the point after and the Bulldogs were a beaten club, 14-0, 4:18 remaining.

Goode came in with a fresh QB, Glen Stevens, and the Salem line headed by Doug McCowan tripped him in the end zone for two more points.

Garden City East's unbeaten grid season and quest of a Northwest loop title ran into an unmovable force known as Ron Holland's Raiders of North Farmington.

"North simply outplayed us," commented East Coach Gary Humphrey whose now 3-1 Panthers play host to unbeaten Franklin tomorrow (Friday).

The Ocelots dumped University of Michigan-Dearborn in the '74 opener, 3-1, with Jorje Palmer scoring two goals and Tom Teeters one.

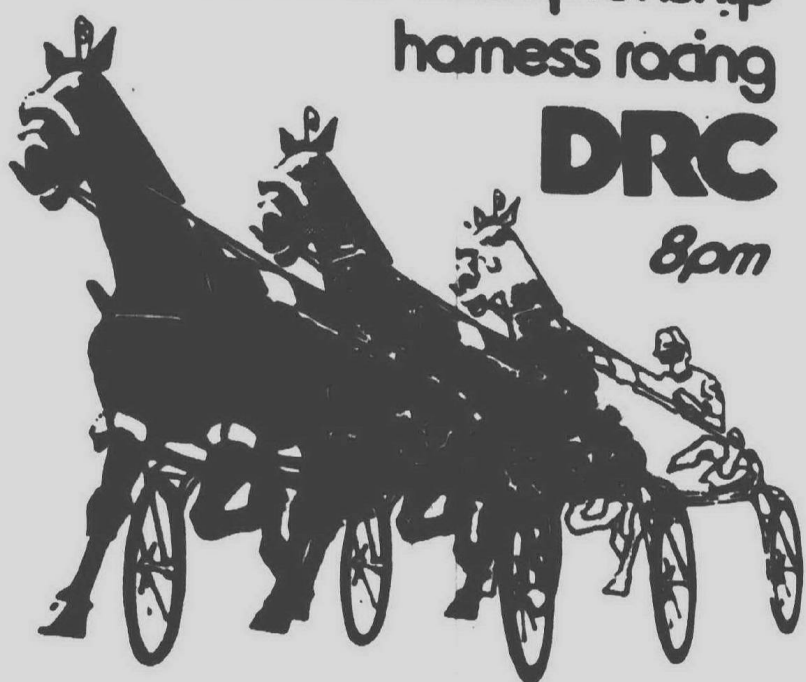

Borgess took the second half kickoff on its own 40 and in 14 plays, Heimbuch scored on a pass from Boisture that covered nine yards.

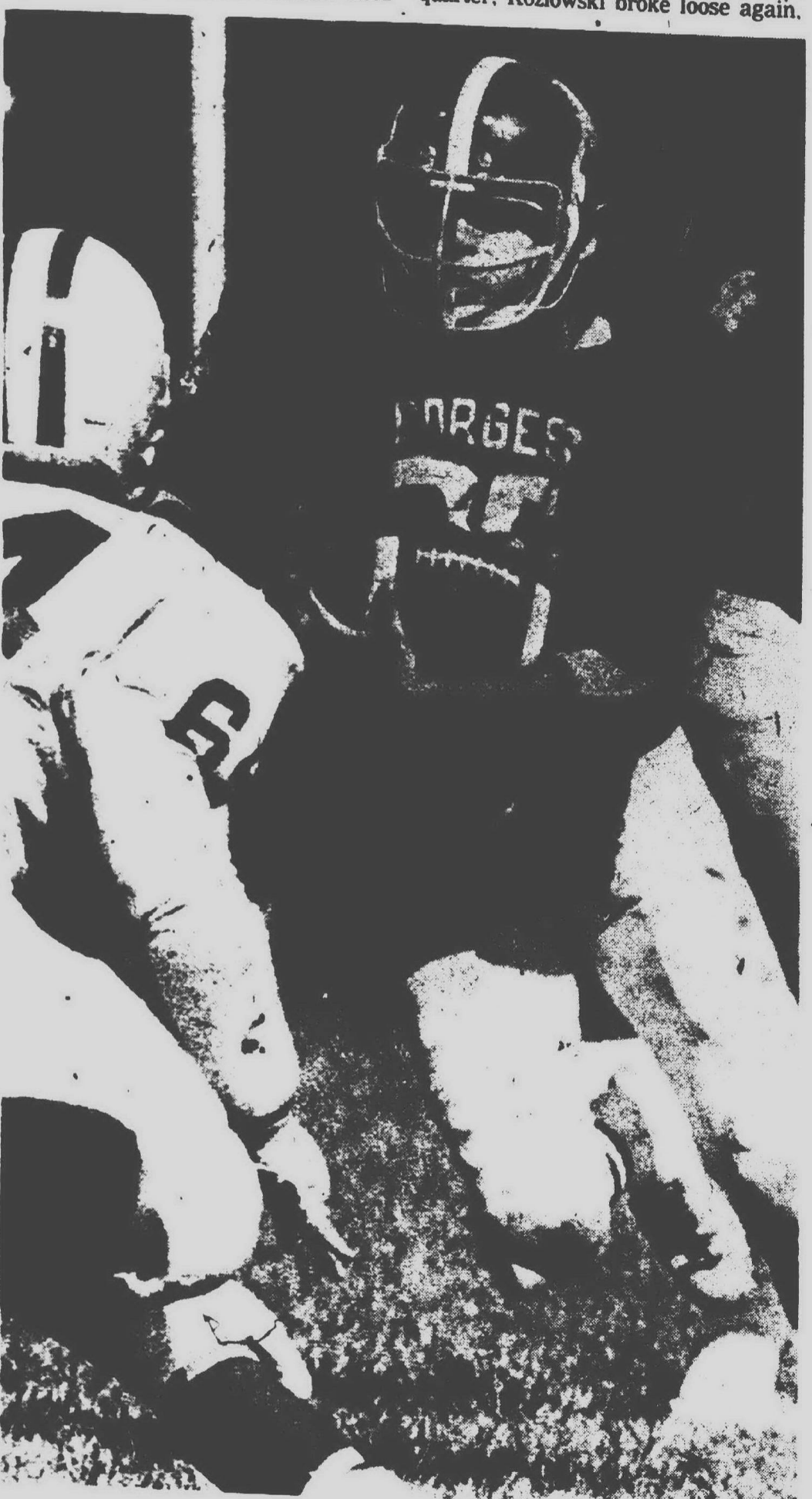
Kozlowski was at it again to open the fourth quarter as the Borgess back plunged in for six to finish off a

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Turf Tips, Quips

There isn't any question in the minds of those close to the thoroughbred racing picture that Hazel Park is headed for its best season since 1960.

Certainly Sunday racing has played a major role in the business surge, averaging more than 1,200,000 per program to date.

After 60 days of the 120-day meeting, Hazel Park wagering had hit \$61,592,765 for an average of \$1,026,546. A total of \$65,804 have passed through the turnstiles.

Of course there are still 60 days to go and both betting and crowds will show decided dips for the late October and November dates.

IT TOOK ALMOST 60 days before a girl jockey finally won a race at the meeting. Terri Broegman made it into the winner's circle when she guided Jack Van Berg's Disco Star home. After 39 starts, Teri shows one win, two seconds, and four thirds.

Sam Maple not only is the leading jockey at the eastside track but he also is the busiest. His schedule for a weekend recently had him in Cleveland on Saturday, back at Hazel Park on Sunday where he had two winners and then to Chicago Monday for a mount in a rich stake. He finished out of the money there.

HAVE YOU EVER wondered what happens to a thoroughbred racehorse

after it finishes a race?

If it's a winner or the "special" picked at random by the stewards, the horse must first make a trip to the detention barn before returning to its own stall.

The detention barn at Hazel Park is the fenced-in, blue-painted shed just past the main barn gates. It is there the urine or saliva samples are taken after each race to be sent to state chemists in Lansing for analysis and detection of any illegal substance.

Immediately following each race, a state veterinarian or assistant is waiting in the winner's circle to snap a blue tag on the winner's bridle and a red tag on the "stewards" horse which the vet gets over the phone from the stewards stand.

ONCE TAGGED, it is the duty of the groom or trainer to take the horse to the detention barn where a urine or saliva sampling must be taken by a state vet and witnessed by the horse's handler.

For a urine sample, a locked box containing a sealed jar is opened by vet Max Powell who is the only one having a key. The sample is taken, resealed and locked in the box. A form card is signed by the witness and the box is properly marked and ready to be sent to Lansing for final laboratory tests.

If the chemists receive a positive test, the state racing commission is notified immediately.

BEA FARBER, the comely driver-trainer from Brighton, ended her brief vacation with a victory Monday night when she drove Johns Rusty, a four year old Rusty Range gelding, to victory in a \$3,000 claiming race.

Bea had Johns Rusty out in front by a couple of lengths in the stretch and it crossed the finish line well ahead of second place Peacetree Parader in 2:05 on a chilly night.

Bea took about three weeks off and turned most of her driving assignments over to youthful Charlie Smith of Northville. Originally she had planned on taking off for the remainder of the Wolverine season but just couldn't sit still. Johns Rusty paid \$20.40 and was the key to a perfecta worth \$138.40.

MERRITT DOKEY, who has an outstanding stable, will move on to Roosevelt Raceway immediately after the close of the Wolverine season. Huff N Puff, the five year old mare who has been whipping the top pacers consistently, goes with him.

Dokey feels the competition is just as keen at the big mile track as it is in California and that's one of the reasons why he didn't take off for the west coast this year.

"Why go out there when you have just as stiff competition from drivers and horses here?" asked Dokey. "I don't think I'll go back to California for a long time as long as purses are as attractive as here at Wolverine."

The track makes its third purse hike in less than a month, effective last Monday, boosting purses from \$200 to \$1,200 across the board. Open classes have jumped from \$7,500 to \$9,500 since the start of the meeting and preferred from \$6,000 to \$8,000.

Shelley Goudreau, the 26-year old Canadian driver, who has 210 victories appears certain to take second place in the national standings this year. He is 26 wins ahead of third place Lucien Fontaine.

But way out in front is Herve Filion, the perennial champion from Canada, who is out of sight of all challengers with his total of 457 firsts.

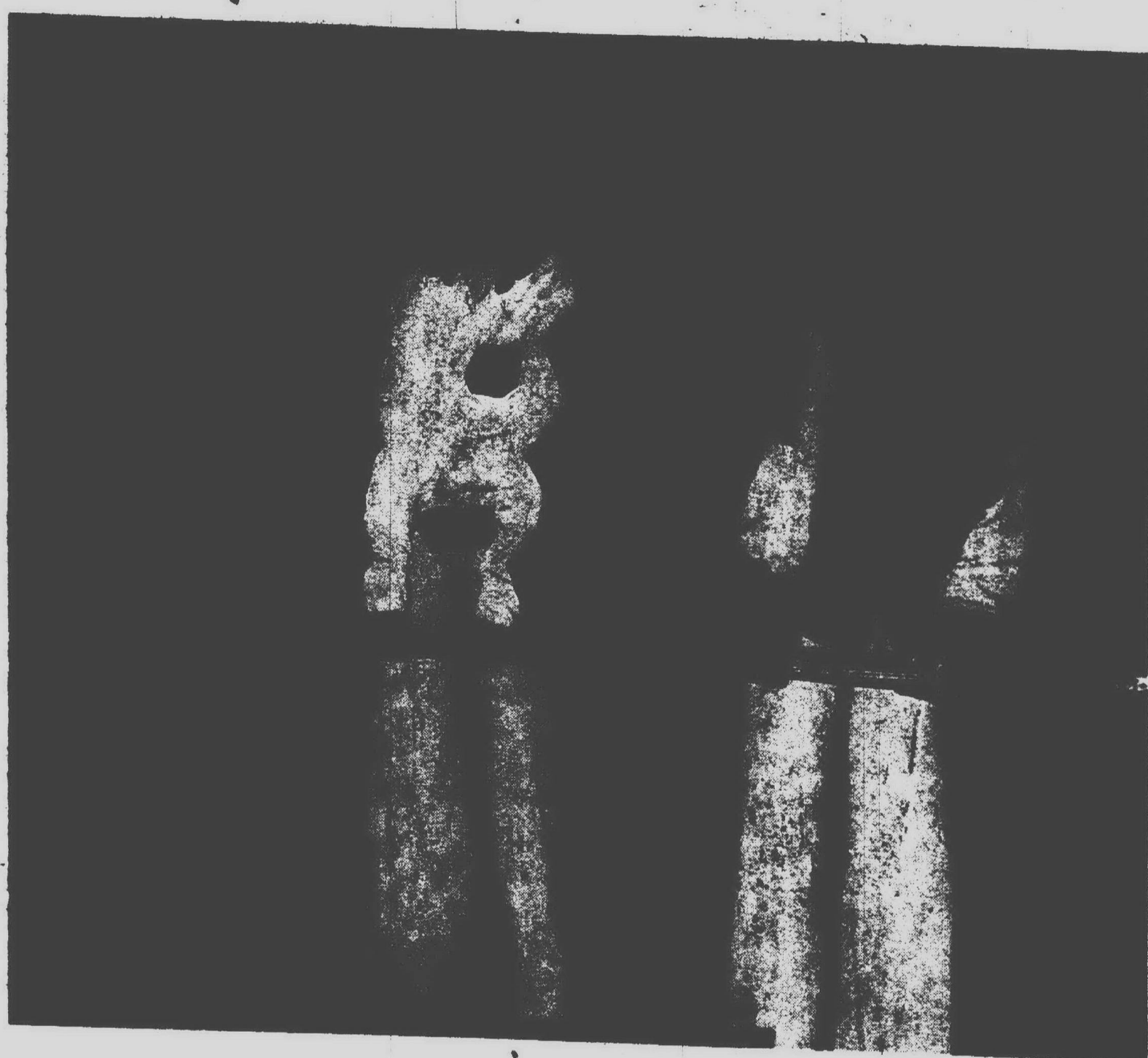

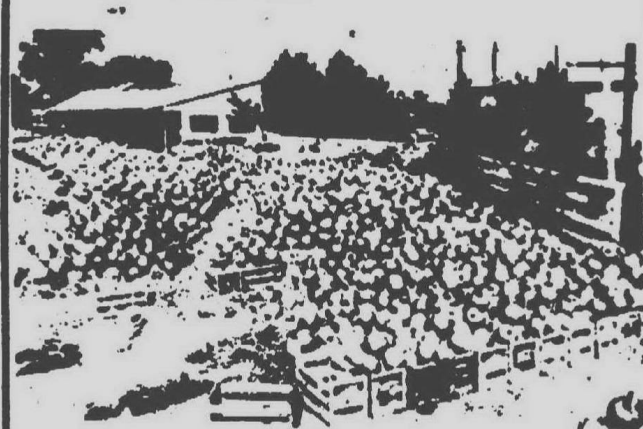

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Residents continue protest on bowling palace

WESTLAND—Residents from Westland and three neighboring communities will have to wait for the outcome of a civil court case before finding out the fate of a proposed bowling alley on Joy and Hannan roads.

The Westland City Council has unanimously voted to table the controversial zoning change request being made by Anthony Capaldi, owner of Westland Bowl, until the courts decide whether Capaldi or the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Detroit owns the 15-acre plot. Church officials claim they were unaware that Capaldi intended to build a bowling alley on a site adjacent to one on which they intend to build a church.

A public hearing was conducted Monday night at which residents from Westland, Livonia, Canton and Plymouth townships attended to cast their opinions on the project. The residentially-zoned land in Westland sits on an intersection of all four communities.

THE PLANNING COMMISSION has recommended the council deny the request for commercial zoning containing approval would constitute spot zoning which is in conflict with current planning policy. Spot zoning consists of zoning property for a different use than surrounding property. The plot is surrounded by single family dwellings on three sides with a vacant lot on the south side.

"The intrusion of a large commercial establishment in the midst of residentially zoned would create a deterrent to the anticipated residential development in the area," according to the commission's report to the council.

Although the Archdiocese presently owns the land, they have entered into a purchase agreement with Capaldi. City officials say the \$2 million building would raise \$65,000 in taxes, \$12,000 of which would go into city coffers.

CANTON TOWNSHIP trustees have sent a letter to the Westland Council asking the city to deny the request because of the traffic hazard it may cause school children at Fiegel Elementary School in the Plymouth-Canton School District. Also objecting was Plymouth-Canton Assistant Supt. for Business Ray Hoedel.

"Our concern is with the traffic hazard on Joy Road. Ninety-five per cent of the students walk to school," said Hoedel.

"We certainly go on record for a bigger tax base, but the board certainly doesn't make all of its decisions on taxes."

The school is about 2,000 feet from the site.

Capaldi denies the bowling alley would be a hazard to children, saying the prime activity hours are between 7:30 p.m. and 11:30 p.m.

"I don't see a big problem with a lot of traffic. We are building this for the surrounding community. I don't expect people to come from five or ten miles around," said Capaldi. "This is a good population for a bowling establishment."

RESIDENTS were split on the need for a new church which the Archdiocese plans to build on the northwest section of the property.

"This city is full of spot zoning," said one Westland resident in support of the bowling alley. "I just don't understand the Church's objection. I question the need of another Catholic Church in the area."

Another resident repudiated the argument, saying that surrounding Catholic churches were filled to capacity.

A parishoner from the Divine Savior parish, which is planning a church on the site, claimed the aesthetic beauty of the building would be ruined if abutting the bowling alley.

"The people of the parish went to great pains to match the building with the landscape. Fifty per cent of the building is glass," said William Furlong. "If the bowling establishment is built with a supermarket

type parking lot, it will nullify all of our work."

ALSO APPEARING to protest the project were officials from the Canton Township Holiday Park Civic Association.

"This zoning would be contrary to good planning practices. It would lead to further rezoning. It would be a dis-insensitive to building more homes," said a representative.

Another Canton resident said such development would lead to tearing down all the trees in the area.

"Today, you're lucky to have a tree on a lot. One of the selling points of moving out here was that we were only a few minutes from shopping centers. Perhaps the empty shopping center previously occupied by Topps could be used as a bowling alley."

Resident supporters say the project is important for development of Westland's tax base.

"If we can get any tax money, let's get it. I don't see any communities around here consulting us on their problems. We are the ones who have to pay the bills."

Other residents objected that if a church was built on the site, Westland would actually be losing tax money because such property is exempt from taxation. Presently, the Archdiocese is required to pay taxes on the property because it is vacant.

ROBERT GREENSTEIN, Canton Homeowners Association president, repudiated the argument that communities just should be concerned with their own problems.

"Canton borders Westland in many areas. Canton wants to cooperate. We

are a slumbering giant that is just awakening. In the future we will probably have to discuss such things as sharing utilities."

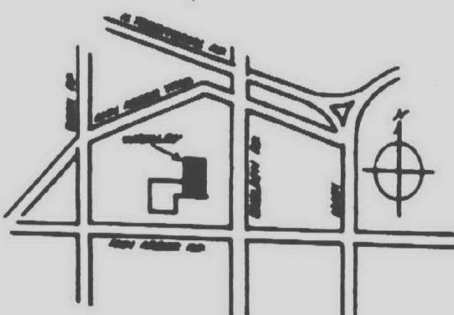
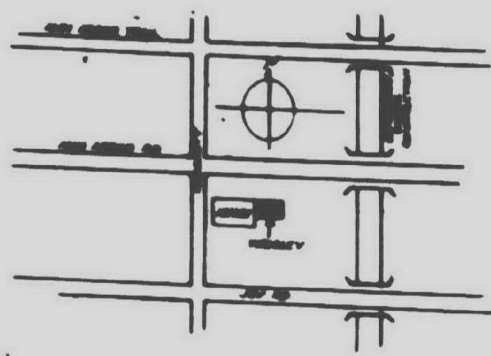
Larry Markowicz, a Livonia teacher and Canton Township resident, expressed reservations about the bowling alley saying it could possibly have an adverse effect on students.

"Has anyone checked into the effects on junior high school students," he said. "I'm talking about incidents of skipping classes and crime."

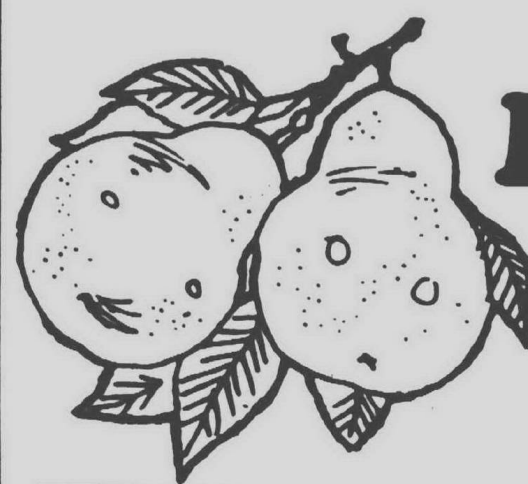
Councilman Paul Tavana countered the argument, saying bowling alleys were better places for children to be than street corners.



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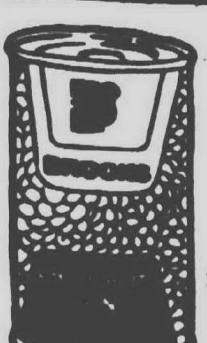
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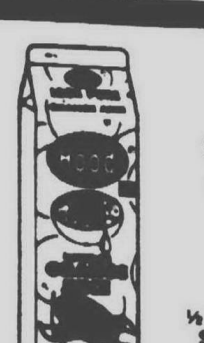
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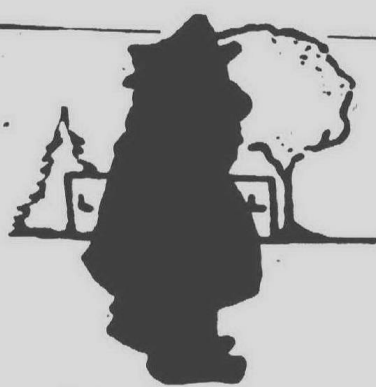

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Bond issue sessions set

Two area briefings have been planned by the State Highway Commission to publicly discuss the proposed \$1.1 billion statewide transportation bond program.

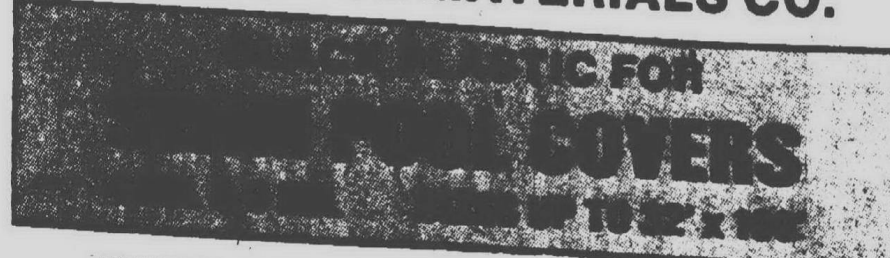
The program will go before Michigan voters as "Proposal D" in the Nov. 5 election.

Sessions conducted by John P. Woodford, director of the Department of State Highways and Transportation, are scheduled for 9:30 a.m. Oct. 24 in Ann Arbor City Hall and 10:30 a.m.

Oct. 25 in the Detroit Common Council Chambers in the City-County Building.

If the proposal is approved, the state would be authorized to issue general obligation bonds totaling up to \$1.1 billion over the next 15 years for expansion and modernization of railroads and bus systems, airports, Great Lakes seaports, urban transportation, non-motorized facilities such as bicycle paths and for new-technology transportation systems.

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Floors respond to a little extra care

What can the average person do to fight inflation?

Just as "charity begins at home," the struggle against inflation should also begin at home. One way to stretch the family budget is to apply the twin principles of proper care and preventive maintenance.

With proper care, cars, clothes, appliances and home furnishings will look better and last longer, thus cutting down on major household spending.

Floors are a prime example of what a little extra care and forethought can accomplish.

IF THE FLOOR is near an outside door, place a mat or throw rug at the entrance to keep the soil from tracking in.

It should not have a synthetic foam backing that can cause the floor to become discolored.

Floor protectors should be used under the legs of furniture to minimize scratches and indentations.

When moving heavy furniture or appliances, slip a scrap of carpet face down under each leg to avoid damaging the floor.

PREVENTATIVE maintenance requires regular sweeping or vacuuming, sponge mopping with warm water, occasional washing, and polishing (except in the case of no-wash floors).

SWEEPING: To prevent soil build-up and scratches, sweep, dust-mop, or vacuum floors often.

Sponge-mopping: Dip the sponge mop into a bucket of warm water, wring it out well, and push the mop across the floor, pressing enough to loosen the surface dirt. Do not flood the floor.

Washing: Prepare a cleaning solution with warm water and a general purpose liquid detergent. Do not use soap-based products which can leave a dulling film.

Use one sponge mop and a bucket to wash the floor and another mop and bucket for rinsing. Floors should always be rinsed thoroughly because detergent left after washing will hold dirt.

DIP THE SPONGE mop into the cleaning solution, and without wringing it out, spread it on a small area of

the floor about (three by three feet). Relax for a minute while the detergent attacks the dirt, then go over the area with the saturated mop, scrubbing hard enough to clean the floor thoroughly.

Stubborn marks can be removed with a nylon pad. Wringing out the mop, soak up as much of the cleaning solution as possible.

Next, take your rinse mop, dip it into clear water, wring it out, and proceed to remove the cleaning solution from the floor. Repeat this procedure of washing and rinsing an area at a time over the entire floor. Be sure to change your rinse water often to avoid redepositing any dirt or detergent.

WAXING: With the exception of no-wax floors, all floors should receive regular applications of a protective floor polish to prevent scratching and to provide a bright shine.

Always apply the wax to a clean surface, and strip off accumulated layers of wax after six or seven applications.

Follow the steps for washing, then allow the floor to dry. Apply the polish in a thin uniform coat. Move the applicator in all directions to assure even distribution. Let the polish dry completely before using the room.

No-wax floors should have a bright, shiny appearance to begin with and should keep that shine without waxing

far longer than ordinary vinyl floors. To keep that shiny, new look, no-wax floors must be swept, sponge-mopped and washed—but not waxed.

EVENTUALLY normal foot traffic may begin to reduce the gloss of a no-wax wear surface. A special finish, available from flooring stores can be used from time to time to touch up the shine. This finish is not a wax or

polish; it's a substance like the original factory-applied wear surface.

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The Green Thumb

Hundreds of readers who entered our giant sunflower contest tell us they have bumper crops of sunflowers, but find that the seeds mold or mildew.

What causes this? The main reason is that the seed has not dried properly before storing. Here's a method we use for drying our own sunflower seeds to be stored for winter use:

(1) Cut off the heads when they start to bend over.

(2) Take a stiff wire brush and remove the seeds. A curry comb works great and you can usually find one in any store that handles supplies for horses.

(3) Scatter the seeds on a window screen, or any kind of a wire screen which allows air to circulate between the seeds. Don't stack the seeds too thick.

(4) Each day stir the seeds to prevent molding. Some gardeners use a small fan for stirring up air circulation.

(5) Seed will dry in about 10 days in a garage, basement or attic. Store it in a tin or plastic garbage can. Just make sure the seed is NOT stored while moist. Store it dry, always.

INCIDENTALLY, we have a sun flower stalk which is 13 1/3 feet tall, and has a head 18 inches across. We'd be pleased to know if any reader has a larger sunflower. Let us know.

WHAT'S THE BEST way to keep geraniums over the winter? We've mentioned several methods, but here's a sure-fire method a reader feels is the best of all:

"I take them out before the first frost, shake the dirt from the roots, cut off any remaining flowers, put them in a bushel or box, one plant on top of the other. Then I put them in a cool, dark place in the cellar and forget about them.

"In spring, I bring them up, cut them back and plant them in a pot of

good soil. Keep them watered and watch them take off."

Green Thumb note: our own method is to place the potted geraniums in a tub or box of peatmoss and set it in a basement. The peat is kept slightly moist during the winter. Then in late February, the plants are brought up, cut back to within two or three inches from the pot, and allowed to grow in a bright window.

GREEN THUMB CLINIC: "We have a rubber plant which does not do well. What care does it need?"

Answer: The fig or "rubber" plant does best in a semi-shaded room, out of direct sun. They do not like wet feet and will develop brown spots on leaf edge if overwatered, or if soil is poorly drained. Use soil mix of one part each of sand, peat and loam.

GREEN THUMB CLINIC: A reader writes: "Our geranium plants in the planter have leaves which are turning yellow. What makes this?"

Answer: Check the soil to see if it's soggy or wet. Poor drainage or excess water will cause foliage to turn yellow. Loosen up soil with tines of a fork, and if soil is too wet, let it air out.

Sometimes cemetery pots, planters and tubs are poorly drained, causing leaves to turn yellow, almost overnight. Excess watering shuts off oxygen to the roots.

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Special levy to pay for Sheldon widening

CANTON—Improvement of Sheldon Road south of Ford became virtually certain this week when Canton trustees agreed to a county proposal for a special assessment district. Agreement over the improvement was preceded by a meeting last week with county officials to discuss the project, which involves the intersection as well as 180 feet south of Ford Road.

Included—and paying most of the costs—will be the Harvard Square Shopping Center. Minimal assessments will be levied against nearby church property and a private residence, trustees reported following the meeting.

Township officials also reported that a traffic light at the highly-traveled intersection is sure to come with the improvement.

City purchases TV to watch prisoners

PLYMOUTH—The city commission Monday night approved the purchase of a \$1,995 closed circuit television system for the city jail.

Omni Systems Inc. of Plymouth submitted the low bid for the project, which will enable the police to keep prisoners under surveillance.

The commission also voted to contract with Graphic Communications of Plymouth for the printing of 5,000 copies of the city calendar and annual report. The \$2,395 bid was lower than what the city paid last year.

"YOU'LL BE HAPPY to know too," Trustee James Poole somewhat humorously told the audience at this week's board meeting, "that the county has finally agreed with us that a light is needed there and also at Lily and Ford Road."

Township officials have tried for months to convince the county of the need for traffic control lights at both intersections.

Still to be decided in the Sheldon Road improvement is whether or not a fifth or turning lane will be included. Trustees indicated this week that they are definitely in favor of it and will communicate their feelings via a resolution passed this week.

In other related matters, township officials reported that at the same meeting with county officials an attempt was made to secure an emergency lane over the Joy Road bridge

at I-275 to help partially landlocked Holiday Park Subdivision.

A COUNTY ENGINEER met with Fire Chief Mel Paulun late last week, but no suitable solution for using the bridge could be worked out, according to Township Clerk John Flodin.

The construction work involving a 45 foot tunnel makes the bridge unsafe for even one lane of emergency traffic, Paulun said. The bridge has been closed for a month and is not due to be opened until Nov. 15.

"The county then gave us permission to use the unopened expressway if we could get clearance from construction company officials," continued Paulun.

"This didn't work out," he added. "There is just too much heavy machinery to contend with. We made a mock run and came up to a cement truck and had to turn around and go back."

PAULUN SAID the fire department has a new route to the rear of the subdivision using Warren Road to Koppnick. Residents, however, are reportedly not "overjoyed" with this route.

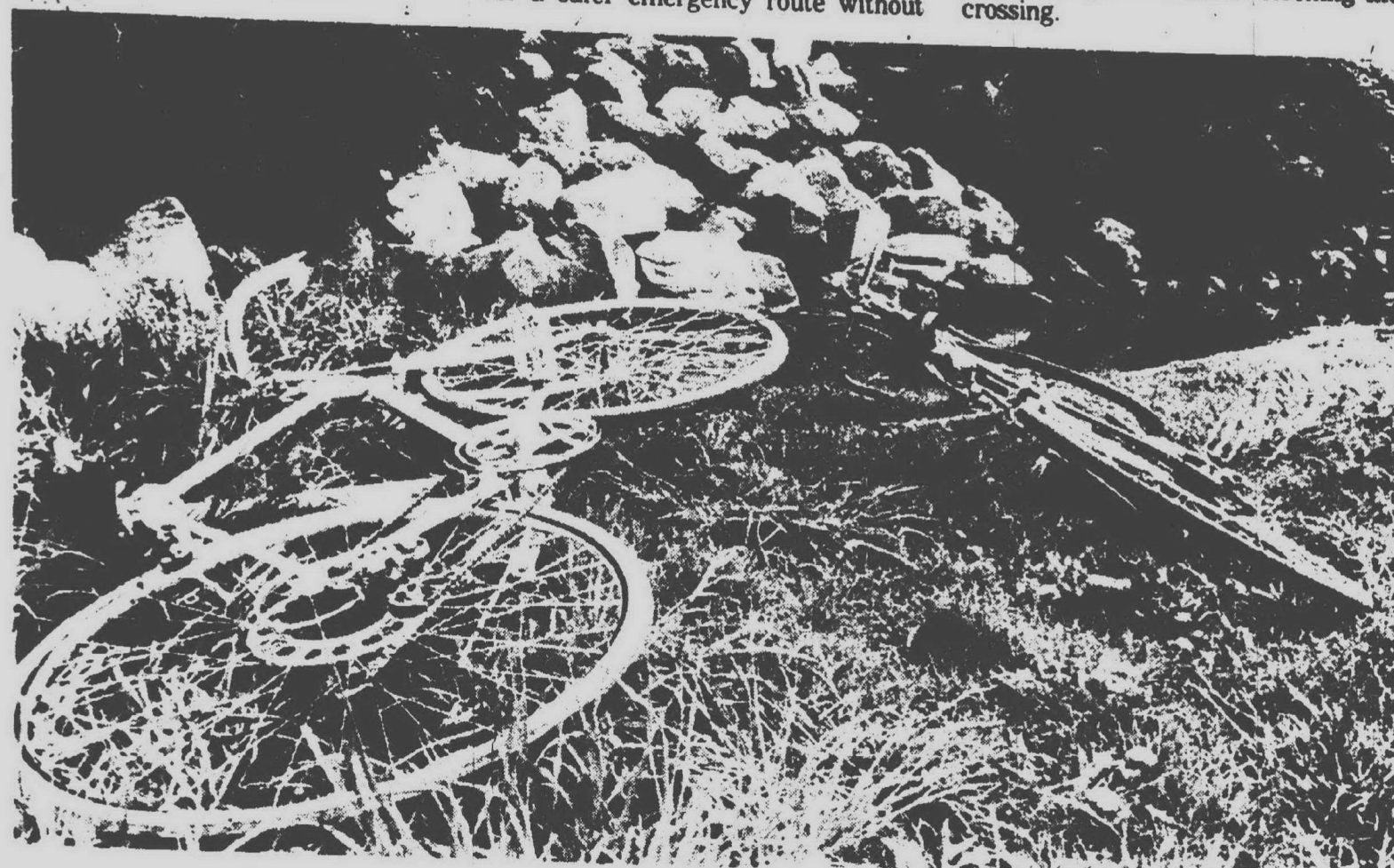
"You still have to cross an unguarded, blind railroad track. What happens if a train is coming?" questioned Trustee Brian Schwall, a resident in the 525-single family subdivision in Canton's northwest sector.

Holiday Park residents have requested help from the township to

have at least one lane of the bridge over the expressway open in the event of fire or serious accident.

Still pending is an attorney's opinion on legal action the township can take for a safer emergency route without

using badly rutted backroads and having to worry about trains blocking the crossing.

County commissioners vote to split court locations

Butting heads with the Michigan Supreme Court, the Wayne County Board of Commissioners has decided to place five new circuit court judges in a downtown office building rather than relocate nine judges and 200 Common Pleas Court employees.

On a 19-1 vote, the board decided Oct. 3 to overturn the high court's plan to lease four floors in the Lafayette Building for five years at a cost of \$1.4 million and instead authorized a three-year lease for \$554,750.

SUPREME COURT spokesmen declined to predict what action the high court might take as a result of the board's action.

In past conflicts, the court has contended it has the power to compel the county to meet what it sees as the "reasonable needs" of the courts.

In conjunction with its decision, the commissioners also established a special committee, representing all interested parties, to explore long-term plans for housing all courts, including out-county branch courtrooms and a downtown courts building.

THE SUPREME COURT'S PLAN to consolidate the circuit court in one building and common pleas in another ran into stiff opposition from common pleas judges and employees, a number of commissioners and leaders of the county employees unions, the Metropolitan Detroit AFL-CIO and United Auto Workers CAP, the UAW political arm.

Despite the Supreme Court's contention that the plan would be more efficient than having the circuit court in three locations and the common pleas in two, opponents charged the facilities would be inadequate in elevator capacity and lack of near-by low-cost parking.

A JUNE 1 DEADLINE has been set for the special committee to prepare a long-term solution for the space requirements of all the Wayne County Courts, with specific references to City of Detroit and out-county locations.

The special planning committee is planned to include representatives of out-county communities and bar associations; representatives of the board

of commissioners and the County Board of Auditors; all the courts; organized labor; Detroit Mayor Coleman Young and the Detroit Common Council; representatives of the UAW and Teamsters unions and the Detroit Building Trades Council; the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce and the American Institute of Architects-Detroit chapter.

Barnum & Bailey comes to town

Students told alternative must be found to auto

Want to take in the fall color change in Petoskey but the thought of driving that distance puts you off? Or does your driving schedule conflict between taking your mother to the doctor and chauffeuring your youngster to choir practice?

The answer to such transportation dilemmas may lie in the \$1.1 billion transportation bond issue proposed by the state on the Nov. 5 ballot, according to Kevin McKinney, manager of railroad programs for the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation.

SPEAKING TO A FUTURES Week lecture group at Schoolcraft Community College Tuesday, McKinney said alternatives to automobile transit must be found to alleviate problems caused by pollution and energy shortages and to serve more than 25 per cent of the population which lacks access to autos—the poor, young and old.

If approved by voters, the \$1.1 billion will, over a 15 year period, provide: \$540 million for urban transportation; \$362 million for rail and bus systems; \$100 million for airport development; \$50 million for port development; \$25 million for nonmotorized facilities and \$20 million for new transit systems.

The major thrust of this money, 49 percent, will be allocated to the seven-county Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA)

for development of rapid transit and intercity express and local bus service.

The rest of the bond money will be used in a number of outstate projects, primarily for intercity passenger and freight railroads.

WHILE \$1.1 BILLION may sound like a lot of money, McKinney said it is "a modest step long overdue."

He explained gasoline taxes have long been allocated to highway development and maintenance—this year amounting to \$500 million. Only since 1972 has there been one-half cent of the nine cents per gallon gas tax diverted to nonhighway purposes, generating about \$23 million annually.

McKinney emphasized additional taxes for the bond issue will not be required because of decreasing debt requirements for present Clean Water Bonds and anticipated growth in state revenues.

THE AIMS OF THE PROGRAM are two-fold: To provide high-frequency, easily-accessible passenger and freight transportation and to grab the state's fair share of federal aid dollars.

While the need to provide inexpensive and fast transportation for people is easily understood, the critical need for up-to-date freighting is misunderstood by many taxpayers, McKinney said.

Under a federal program to update the railroads nationally nearly 38 per cent of the existing railroad track in Michigan is slated to be abandoned. This track, now in a deteriorated state

is vitally necessary to the state's industries and to more than 60 per cent of the farmers who ship produce out of the state.

TO SAVE about 90 per cent of the railroad track from demolition, Michigan must come up with funds to subsidize and upgrade the rail systems in the state.

Much the same is true for other passenger and freight services such as airport and waterway facilities.

If the state cannot come up with funds to expand its transit systems federal aid will not be forthcoming, McKinney explained.

With the bond money Michigan will be in a position to get its fair share of federal tax dollars, he said, adding that Michigan is the seventh largest state in the nation now ranks only 17th as a federal aid recipient.

Without transportation funding for the future Michigan residents will have to contend with deteriorating public transit and increasingly congested automobile travel, McKinney said.

"We can't depend in the future on the automobile. Even if we can, we shouldn't."

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Challenge

John Reuther running uphill to catch Esch

With less than a month before election, opinion polls from his own party give John Reuther 5-3 odds he will be defeated in his first bid for elective office. That's why he is running such a hard campaign now in Livonia, Plymouth and other parts of the 2nd Congressional District.

Reuther, a 30-year-old Democrat, is challenging Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) for U.S. Congress and is determined to win to join a group of congressmen dedicated to congressional reform, campaign financing and tax reform.

With the odds against him, Reuther is putting in full days on the campaign trail throughout the district which stretches to the southernmost points in Monroe County north to Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti areas in Washtenaw.

ON A RECENT campaign swing through Livonia, Reuther squeezed into one day two appearances before political science classes at Schoolcraft College, an appearance at a local shopping center for handshaking, more handshaking with senior citizens in McNamara Towers, Livonia, and a coffee with Livonia housewives.

The day in Livonia began 9:30 a.m. with political science students of Dr. Larry Vandermolten at Schoolcraft. He began with a lesson in civics, telling students the congressional system is archaic.

"The reforms candidates promise each election year aren't really possible until we change the seniority and committee system in Congress, and change the way we finance elections."

Reuther then told how well-meaning legislation is gutted in committee, amended to death on the floor, and watered down before it's passed.

In a diverse district such as the 2nd, he continued, the one thing persons of all political leanings can agree upon is that congress must be made more responsive to the people.

AS AN EXAMPLE, Reuther pointed to the need for tax reform—citing the oil depletion allowance.

The oil depletion allowance was originally intended to provide an incentive to encourage the oil industry to explore for more oil, he explained. But instead, oil firms have invested profits in shopping centers, which have higher return, or in foreign countries with jobs being created outside the U.S. "Oil profits have skyrocketed, while consumers have suffered."

But, he cautioned, if a reform bill to lower or eliminate the depletion allowance is introduced in Congress, it will be assigned to the ways and means committee chaired by Wilbur Mills.

Mills can delay action on the bill, Reuther told students, or have unfavorable amendments unattached to ensure a "no" vote when reported to the floor. Or Mills can attach a rule to the proposed legislation, which bars any debate on the floor or bars any amendments.

"He has this power to determine the fate of legislation merely because he's been in congress 36 years—not because Mills is super-qualified but be-

cause he's survived election after election."

A MINORITY of congressmen are making an effort to eliminate the seniority power and have a committee chairman elected every two years with a limit that he cannot chair a committee for more than eight years. "I want to join that minority."

Reuther said reform is possible this next term because a number of freshmen representatives will be elected. "The freshmen congressmen, for the most part, will join for reform. This is our best chance to reform Congress."

THE CIVICS continued with Reuther telling how his opponent votes one way in committee and another on the final "visible" roll call for the public's benefit.

Seventy-five per cent of the time Esch supported Nixon legislation, Reuther claimed. "He says he supports consumer issues but did all he could to make them less effective in committee and voting for amendments on the floor of the House."

There was a bill to establish a department to look after the interests of consumers, Reuther explained. "Esch voted for the bill on final passage but also voted for all the gutting amendments to weaken the legislation."

"I think this is wrong," Reuther declared. "Esch should have the courage of his convictions and fight all along the way for whatever he believed in on this bill."

Esch also fought against public service employment programs and pushed legislation with "token" federal funding to train the unemployed, Reuther said. "Then five weeks before election, he introduces his own bill which is similar to the one he fought earlier. Again, a lack of courage and conviction."

"In a district like this, with such diversity, it is important to know where your congressman stands."

REUTHER WAS ASKED if he would vote his conscience or according to his constituents' wishes.

"About 90 per cent of the time, my convictions and constituents' wishes will align. When they don't, I will fight for what I believe in and try to convince my constituents I am right."

"At those times you feel the strongest, you must follow your conscience. They can vote you out of office, but I wouldn't want to stay in office if at each step I had to compromise on my beliefs."

Often it is hard to tell what the majority wants, he explained. "Those against something will be outspoken and visible. Those who support that proposal are most likely to remain silent. Letters and petitions alone don't indicate what the majority want."

Questionnaires are unscientific, he added, because those who respond are those who feel strongest about an issue at that particular time. "Esch sends you a survey form but never says how he feels on those issues he wants your opinions on." Reuther injected here that Common Cause has estimated that an incumbent's advantage amounts to \$300,000 a year in free mailing privileges, stories in newspapers on legislation, and weekly

columns. "Remember that 98 per cent of all legislation introduced never goes anywhere."

ON INFLATION: "The type now being experienced can't be explained by looking at our economic texts. "Oil price increases are being externally imposed. We must use our diplomatic powers and group with other nations and force prices back down. And we must conserve our fuel."

"The administration is trying to respond to traditional inflation by reducing the budget and raising interest rates. But excess demand isn't the cause of this inflation."

"My suggestion is the administration should bring down interest rates so people can afford new homes to put the construction industry back to work. This will stimulate demand so the massive industries now under-producing can operate efficiently and economically. Inflation won't result if

we work more effectively and economically."

Another anti-inflation measure Reuther proposed was to strengthen the anti-trust division of the U.S. Justice Department which he said is "so understaffed and under-financed that it can handle only 23 cases a year. If staffed properly, this division could save the American consumer \$90 million a year."

ON DEFENSE: "About 15 years ago when Khrushchev visited America, we talked about cutting the defense budget, which was then some \$40 billion a year. Today, it is about \$90 billion."

"There are some areas that can be cut that won't weaken us. Overseas, there is a 10-1 ratio between support troops, such as clerks and cooks, for each combat soldier. Russia's ratio is 3-1. If we just reduce this ratio to 9-1 we can cut \$2.5 billion from defense,

which is more than we spend on the anti-trust division."

"We can save \$1 billion a year just by reducing unnecessary troop transfers."

NEXT REUTHER stopped by his Livonia headquarters on Five Mile across from Bentley High School and then to a Livonia supermarket to distribute literature and shake hands with voters.

The supermarket visit was effective. Housewives exiting with food carts containing fewer bags of food than a year ago seemed receptive to meet a challenger who "might" do something new to handle inflation.

Here he received two negative responses—from an elderly man who said "I won't vote for any Democrat" and from a Republican who also refused to accept his literature. He complemented both for their honesty.

BEFORE HEADING for McNamara Towers, Reuther stopped off at Livonia headquarters again and took 10 minutes for a sandwich and glass of milk, and discussions with staff members between bites.

He told senior citizens a gas tax increase, if proposed by President Ford, would penalize those on fixed incomes. "Rationing would be much better than a gas tax hike."

Reuther then asked residents if McNamara Towers had a waiting list for occupants (which it does)—bringing home to them the need to construct more housing facilities for retirees.

"I think people with a fixed income have a great interest in government, and will certainly want to vote Nov. 5."

After McNamara Towers, Reuther returned to Schoolcraft to address the afternoon political science class. He told this class that Esch ranks ninth out of 435 congressmen as receiving the highest contributions from business, agriculture and industry.

"We must have public financing of presidential, senatorial and congressional races to eliminate their dependence on special interests groups to finance campaigns."

He told students he recently changed his position on amnesty, a change he announced to a VFW group in Ann Arbor. "I wanted conditional amnesty with six months—not two years service. Amnesty means forgetting and is not punitive."

"There is so much injustice in Ford's amnesty plan that I would now have to support unconditional amnesty. One injustice is when the Vietnam War veterans return and cannot find jobs while resisters return with two years work guaranteed."

TO HOUSEWIVES on Norwich Street near Seven Mile in Livonia, Reuther said he supported repeal of the food sales tax. "The food tax is the worse way to collect revenue. The low and moderate income families pay a larger percentage of their budgets on food. Instead, we should close the federal loopholes."

He discussed the need for lower health care, suggesting a training program for paraprofessionals to provide medical help where it's now unavailable.

"Everybody as a right should have access to health care," he said while advocating a national health insurance program. With such a program, he explained, all persons could get early checkups. "Preventive medicine will bring down the cost of health care. The plan should keep people healthy, and not wait until they get seriously ill before paying medical bills."

On his UAW backing, Reuther said if he receives \$3,000 from the union, that means he received 3,000 contributions of \$1 each from individuals.

Speaking again for campaign finance reform, Reuther said Americans paid \$500 million in higher milk prices because of lobbying influence the dairy industry had on those to whom it gave heavy contributions. "In this case, we paid for campaigns through higher prices. Let's pay through the income tax return and know we are contributing."

"I also gained from exposure to new music and techniques, and from the opportunity to study new editions of major composers."

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Plymouth Symphony strives for musical balance

"I try to conceive of the whole season as one giant symphony with distinct movements heading toward a climax."

That is how Wayne Dunlap draws up the programs for the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra, which is beginning its 29th season and has played nearly 1,000 compositions.

The opening concert Sunday, Oct. 13 at 4 p.m. in Plymouth-Salem High School auditorium, Joy west of Canton Center Road, is an example of the Dunlap style of balance and relationship.

Four works represent four nationalities of composers. Two of the works feature the piano soloist and composers with similarity of styles.

THE ORCHESTRA will open the season with the "Academic Festival Overture" by Johannes Brahms, a German Romantic.

Brahms wrote it in 1881 when he received an honorary degree from the University of Breslau. "It's full of German university tunes and ends with a familiar song everyone will recognize," says Dunlap. "It's one of the most popular works in the orchestral repertoire."

Another orchestral work on the program is Maurice Ravel's "Rapsodie Espagnole." Dunlap explains: "Ravel was French but lived near the Spanish border. It's strange how the French are able to capture Spanish colors and rhythms better than the Spaniards themselves." Bizet's "Carmen" is an obvious example.

The Rhapsody has four movements based on Spanish tunes. The movements are entitled "Prelude of the Night," "Malaguena," "Hobanera" and "Feria."

Pianist William Doppmann, a familiar figure to Plymouth, Oakway and Schoolcraft College audiences, will be heard with the orchestra in two

works—Mozart's piano concerto No. 24 in C minor (K. 467) and Stravinsky's "Capriccio for Piano and Orchestra."

Mozart wrote more than two dozen piano concertos, but only two were in minor keys—C minor and D minor—and they are considered his best. "Anything in C minor is usually something special," says Dunlap, pointing to this work and Beethoven's fifth symphony.

The C minor concerto is dark and moody in contrast to the light, clear tone of most of Mozart's works. It was a major influence in Beethoven.

DUNLAP NOTES that Mozart was rarely played in the 19th century and began to make a comeback about 25 years ago. Today Mozart has more listings than any other composer in the Schwan record catalog.

Igor Stravinsky, a 20th century Russian, went through as many "Periods" in his musical compositions as

Pablo Picasso in painting and drawing.

Dunlap notes Stravinsky was emerging from a "severe classical period" in 1929 when he composed the "Capriccio." It corresponds to the period in which Mozart was paving the way for the Romantic era in the C minor concerto.

Dunlap, as director of fine arts at Schoolcraft College a few years ago, juxtaposed Mozart and Stravinsky as his featured composers during one summer concert series.

Concert tickets will be available at the door. Admission is \$3 for adults and free for K-12 students. Season memberships, tax deductible, are available at prices generally below season tickets.

Free babysitting will be done by girl scouts. Senior citizens will be given free rides on a Salvation Army bus from Tonquish Creek Manor residence beginning 45 minutes before concert time.

Big business boom looms in Canton

The chamber has initiated plans to hold a spring trade fair in May, 1975 at the Belleville Fairgrounds in conjunction with the Belleville Area Chamber of Commerce.

The newsletter also notes that both Meijer Thrifty Acres and K-mart are planning November openings for their Ford Road stores.

According to the newsletter, Meijer is expected to employ about 800 people, while the K-mart unit will employ about 150.

At the recent UAW-CAP convention in Cobo Hall, Fraser had issued an appeal for healing and support for President Ford. The following Sunday, Ford announced his pardon of Richard Nixon.

"The honeymoon ended," declared Fraser, "and we found out that the American people got on their honeymoon with Ford what people usually get on their honeymoon."

"I don't believe a deal was made. It was an act of arrogance, insensitivity and showed a lack of respect for the American people. It reminds me of the act of Nixon when he fired Archibald Cox."

"Well, I suggest we teach the administration on Nov. 5 to respect the American people. We need a referendum on the conduct of the presidents of the last six years."

IN 1968, Fraser continued, the albatross around the Democrats' neck was the Vietnam war.

"We lost and should have, because of LBJ's behavior on this issue. We accepted responsibility for LBJ's actions in the 1968 election. Marvin Esch must also accept responsibility for

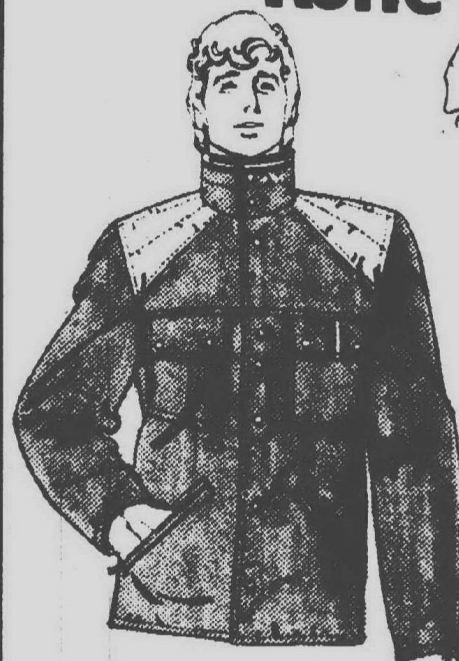

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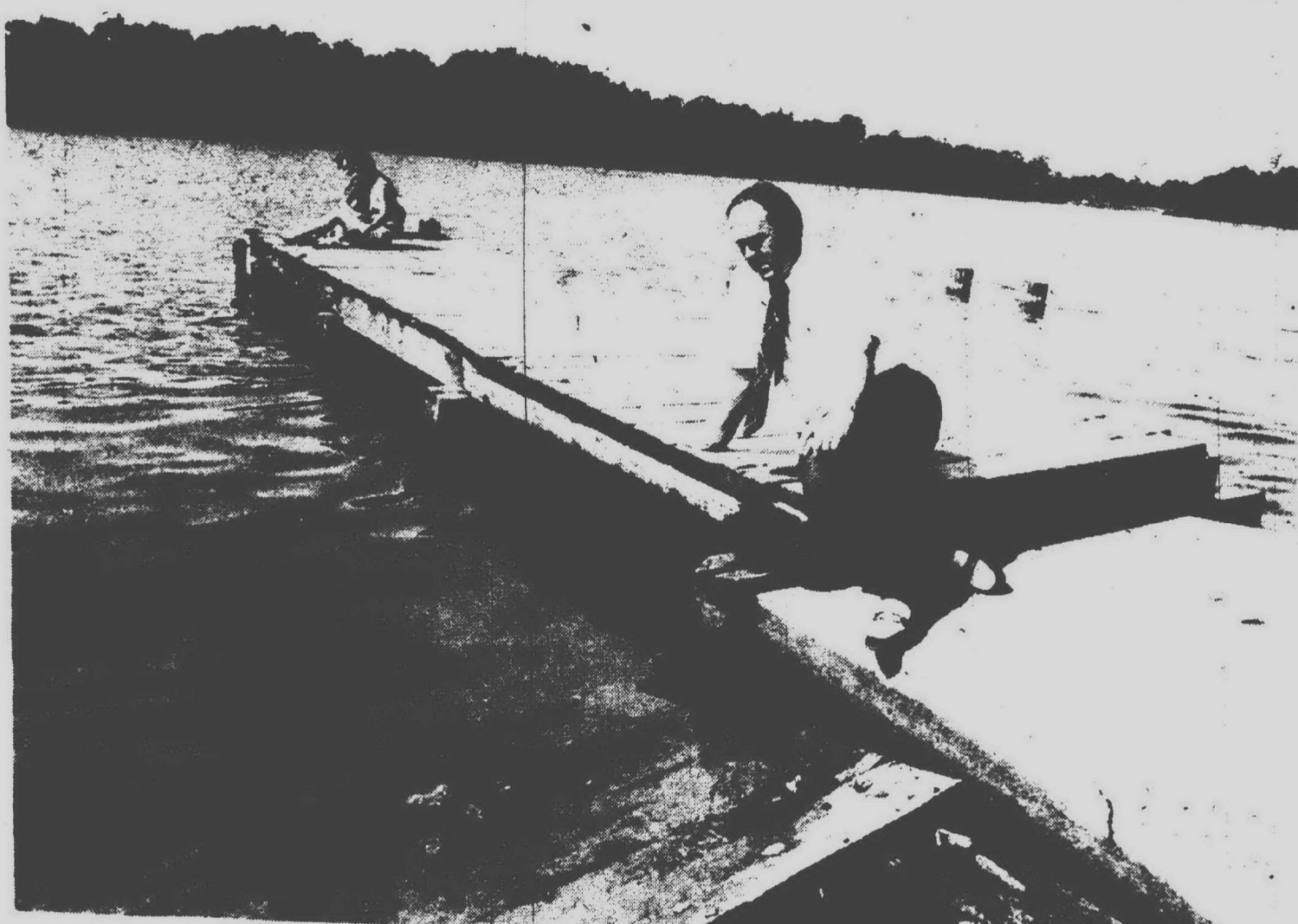

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Bank clearing house becomes automated

An automated clearing house which will enable banks to electronically transfer funds without the use of checks has been formed by the Michigan Bankers Association.

The announcement of the new corporation, the Michigan Automated Clearing House Association (MACHA), was made by Robert M. Perry, executive vice president of the state association. MACHA will be owned by member banks throughout the state and will be headquartered in the Federal Reserve branch office in Detroit.

The officers of the new corporation which expects to begin operations some time next year are: Bruce R. Gibson, vice president and cashier of Detroit Bank & Trust, newly elected president of MACHA; Alastair Carlyle, senior vice president of Manufacturers National Bank of Detroit, secretary; and J. Paul Sheridan Jr., vice president of City National Bank of Detroit, treasurer.

"Use of an automated clearing house is not expected to end the use

of checks," noted Perry, "however electronic funds transfer systems such as we plan here are expected to help reduce the growth of check-writing volume."

Last year Americans wrote about 25 billion checks and at present growth rates check volume would increase to more than 44 billion checks by 1980.

MACHA has asked the Federal Reserve branch in Detroit for permission to use its computer equipment and to operate the new automated clearing house. This would follow a precedent already established in cities such as Atlanta, Boston, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Although MACHA will be designed to handle electronic funds transfers between banks throughout the state, it will also be able to perform certain electronic services for customers including automatic payroll, deposits and a variety of automatic bill payment services.

GEORGE R. BRUMER of Livonia has been appointed manufacturing manager of Ex-Cell-O Corporation's XLO Tool & Abrasive Products plant in Dearborn. Brumer, who joined the firm in 1970 as a tool engineer, was superintendent of the metal division at the Dearborn plant. 35 Realtors unite forces at Century 21

"A small firm can't compete with the big real estate firms. Yet we're neighbors," says James A. Courtney of the new Century 21 real estate franchise organization headquartered in Southfield.

Almost overnight, Century 21 has become one of the biggest names in real estate by affiliating 35 local businesses under a common heading.

Courtney, marketing director, displayed training devices and salesperson aids that wouldn't be available to a small firm as he talked in the firm's divisional (Michigan) headquarters on the second and third floors of Heritage Plaza, overlooking Northwestern Highway in Southfield.

"WE'RE LIKE McDonald's restaurants and Holiday Inn," he explained — a group of small, independently owned businesses meeting a national franchise organization's standards and displaying both names.

He listed the advantages to the members:

"First, we start with a \$12,000 advertising budget. They're all getting \$12,000 worth of advertising.

"Second, we can have training for pre-license persons. Small firms can't afford to do that. We have our own school on the second floor. We can also offer 60 hours of advanced training.

"Third, there's the image of size and success.

"Fourth, the brokers are in a nation-wide referral service. Nationally we have more than 900 offices in 22 states.

"Fifth, we have mass buying power — signs, stationery, brochures, letterheads."

RICHARD CUTRIGHT, regional director, predicts 350 to 400 offices will be hanging out the Century 21 shingle in Michigan in the next five years. How do they get in?

A local firm invests \$4,500 for a franchise. Century 21 officials check the office sites, office capacities and reputations before granting the franchise.

A member must be a licensed broker, a member of a multi-list service and a member of a real estate board. Courtney says Century 21 is represented on every board in the metropolitan Detroit and Ann Arbor area.

Members pay six per cent of gross revenues to the central organization. Each member can send one representative to a brokers' council that makes decisions and swaps ideas on advertising and training. Much work is done through a committee system.

Everyone in Century 21 headquarters, every salesman and broker in the member firms, wears a gold blazer with the company logo. While it suggests uniformity, Courtney points out that the color is neutral enough to go with blue, green, brown, dark red or almost any color slacks or skirts, as the case may be.

THE MEN WHO run the divisional franchise are best known to the general public from their previous affiliation with the Hartford Realtors companies in Livonia, Redford Township, Northville, Plymouth, Canton Township, Garden City, Westland, Farmington, Farmington Hills and north-west Detroit.

Cutright was president of Hartford. An 18 year-veteran of real estate, Cutright is a past treasurer of the United Northwest Realty Association. He lives in Livonia.

John Light, of Dearborn, is administrative director. A five-year veteran of the business, three of those years with Hartford, he was a vice president of that firm.

In charge of training is Al O. Viorel, formerly a national speaker for Browsers. He has done pre-license training and managed sessions for local boards, including the UNRA. Viorel is strong on motivational work.

Courtney, a Plymouth resident, started with Hartford eight years ago, rose to a vice presidency and managed the Plymouth office as his last assignment.
