Rent strike planned for mobile home park

CANTON—A rent strike by residents of the Royal Holiday Mobile home park has been set for Nov. 1, unless the developer of the park can come up with a lease that is acceptable to the 432 mobile home owners.

Residents of the park, located on West Warren near Hix, voted last Thursday to reject a proposed lease drawn up by park developer Sheldon M. Futernick, after negotiations earlier in the day proved fruitless.

According to John C. Robine, president of the Royal Holiday Park Association, Futernick's proposal was "totally unacceptable" to the residents, a majority of whom are senior citizens. "Our main objection is that it (Futernick's proposed lease) takes most of our constitutional rights away."

The proposal by the developer, waives the right to a jury trial in a dispute, and limits the amount of time a visitor can stay with a resident.

Robine said he also feels that Futernick has attempted to bypass the law on notice of eviction by only allowing five days notice. The law currently entitles a landlord to give either a seven or 30-day notice of eviction.

Residents of the park picketed the corporate sales offices of the developer early last month, and at that time it appeared that an agreement

would be reached between the two parties. Robine said that a meeting earlier this month left him with the impression that Futernick was "agreeable" with a proposed lease drawn up by the residents' association.

At last Thursday's meeting, Futernick put forth his proposal, which was rejected by the park residents.

The battle between the two parties began when Futernick raised rents on the residents by approximately 38 per cent since July. Residents then demanded a lease with the developer. Futernick ignored the demands of the

residents until his offices were picketed.

Robine has carried his fight to the state attorney general's office and the Consumer Protection Unit. The association president said the residents are aware that their proposed rent strike is "illegal" but said he feels the residents have no other alternative.

"All we want is justice, and contentment to live our lives in peace," Robine added.

On Friday Robine said he was contacted by a representative of one of

the three other parks operated by Futernick, Holiday Woods in Belleville, who asked about a reported settlement at Royal Holiday. Futernick allegedly told residents at the park in Belleville that a settlement had been reached at the Canton Township park. Robine said he will be meeting today with residents from the Belleville park to discuss the possibility of a joint rent strike at both sites.

Futernick was not available for comment on his most recent proposals, or the possibility of a rent strike at the two mobile home park sites.

Annexation hearing set by boundary commission

PLYMOUTH—The State Boundary Commission will hold a public hearing Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. in Middle School East, 1042 S. Mill on the City of Plymouth's proposed annexation of the Burroughs Corp. parking lot on Plymouth Road in Plymouth Township.

The 30-acre parcel has been approved by the township as a site for commercial and residential development. A high-rise apartment complex and a major shopping center are among projects which have been mentioned for the property.

Petitions to annex this parcel, the Hillside Inn across the street and the entire township were filed with the boundary commission by the city in May on the day of the unsuccessful consolidation election.

IN AN AUGUST hearing on the two smaller parcels the commission rejected the Hillside petition because the legal description of the land was inadequate. The Burroughs lot petition was approved and a date was set for a public hearing date set.

Because the Burroughs property is

uninhabited, an election need not be held prior to its annexation.

According to Plymouth Township Clerk Helen Richardson the boundary commission could be expected to decide within the next two to three months on final approval of the annexation bid.

When the petition was filed in May, Plymouth City Manager Fred Yockey said annexation of the Burroughs land would "allow the city some potential growth which is so vital."

Mrs. Richardson said representatives from Burroughs and Township Attorney Don Morgan are expected to present arguments against the annexation. At the August commission meeting Morgan charged that the commission lacked the constitutional authority to rule in annexation matters.

Mrs. Richardson said the township would take the boundary commission to court if it decided to approve the annexation.

THE BOUNDARY commission must decide the fate of the Burroughs parcel before it can act on the petition to annex the entire township be-

cause the land in the first petition is wholly contained in the larger one.

The Hillside petition has been resubmitted, but a decision cannot be made on that parcel until the other two have been acted upon.

The Hillside Inn is included in the land described by the petition to annex the whole township, so a decision on that three-acre property would have to wait until after May 7, 1976, two years after the petition to annex the township itself was filed.

Water bills prompt complaints

CANTON TOWNSHIP—It takes three gallons of water per minute to flush a toilet.

It takes 12 gallons-per-minute to run an underground sprinkling system, and eight gallons for the conventional sprinkler.

When a particularly dry season hits

an area, water usage goes up.

That's what happened in Canton Township during this past summer.

Almost throughout the township, water consumption was 50 per cent higher than it was during the past summer season. And the water bills reflect this.

HOLIDAY PARK residents, always a vocal group, according to Doris Kelley, office supervisor of the township water and sewer department, have been the loudest in complaints about the high bills.

But the subdivision residents are not the only ones socked by the billing department.

A quick glance through the water and sewer department records showed that it was not unusual to have a \$50, \$70, or even \$80 water bill.

Mrs. Margaret Roy was one of those who received a bill almost double what she usually receives.

"We watered our lawn, but I don't think it was any more often than we did last summer," said Mrs. Roy. "It seems like a lot of money just for water."

CANTON TOWNSHIP gets its water supply from the city of Detroit water supply system, and uses the Rouge Valley sewage disposal system to get rid of the waste.

Cost of the water to Canton users is

\$3.37 per thousand gallons up to the first 10,000 gallons per quarter, while the cost for sewers is the same amount.

For the next 10,000 gallons per quarter, the cost is 32 cents per thousand, while for the next 80,000 gallons the cost is 29 cents for a thousand gallons.

The township also charges a \$1.25 meter reading fee which is applied to maintenance and replacement of the water meters.

Despite the number of complaints the water department has received, Mrs. Kelley maintains the accuracy of the meter readers.

"If there is a large discrepancy in the reading, we generally will send someone out to reread the meters," Mrs. Kelley said.

"And if a resident requests a rereading of his meter, we try to accommodate him."

But some residents are not pleased with the response they are getting from the township.

MR. AND MRS. PAUL Haremski took their bill to the Wayne County Consumer Protection Agency. The agency is currently investigating the problem the Haremskis are faced with, but would not comment on what, if anything, can be done about the high bills.

For the time being, residents are paying their water bills. If a resident falls six months delinquent with the water department, the local agency puts the bill on the resident's tax rolls, and the resident pays anyway.

But that doesn't mean that Canton Township residents are any happier. "We filled our pool in May so that the water cost would not appear on the summer bill," said one Holiday Park homeowner. "and we still got an \$80 bill."

"We took particular care to water less, and still got a high bill," said Connie Alonzo. "It seems no matter what you do, you can't win."

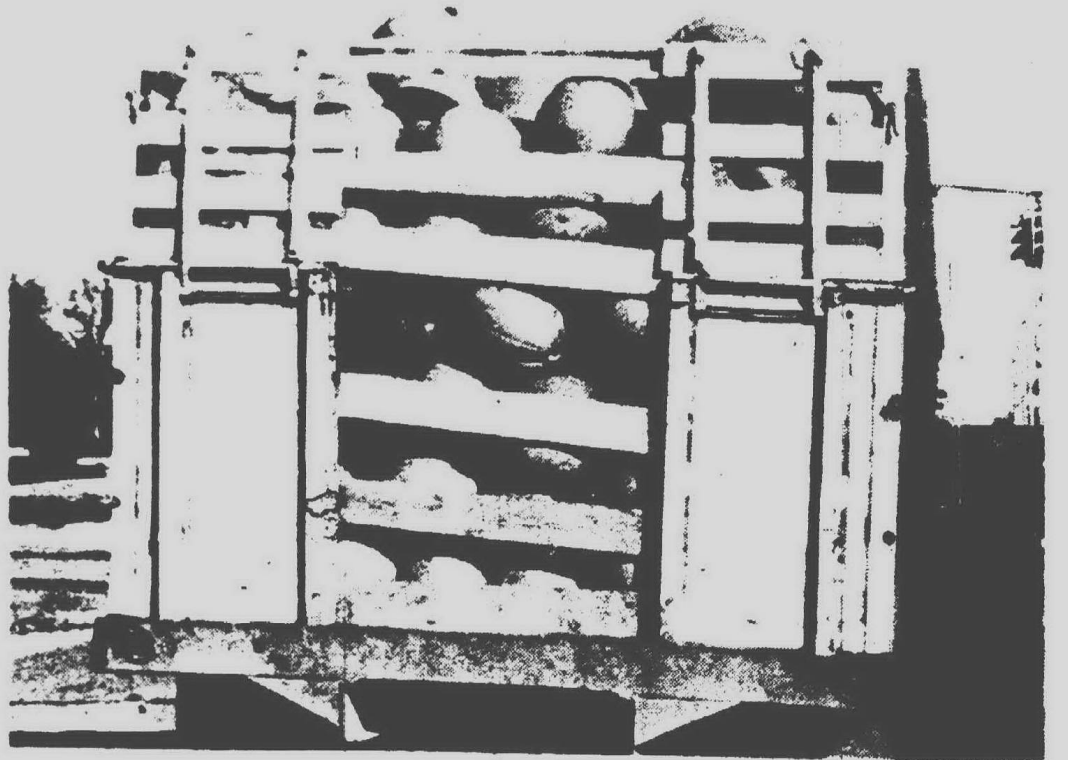

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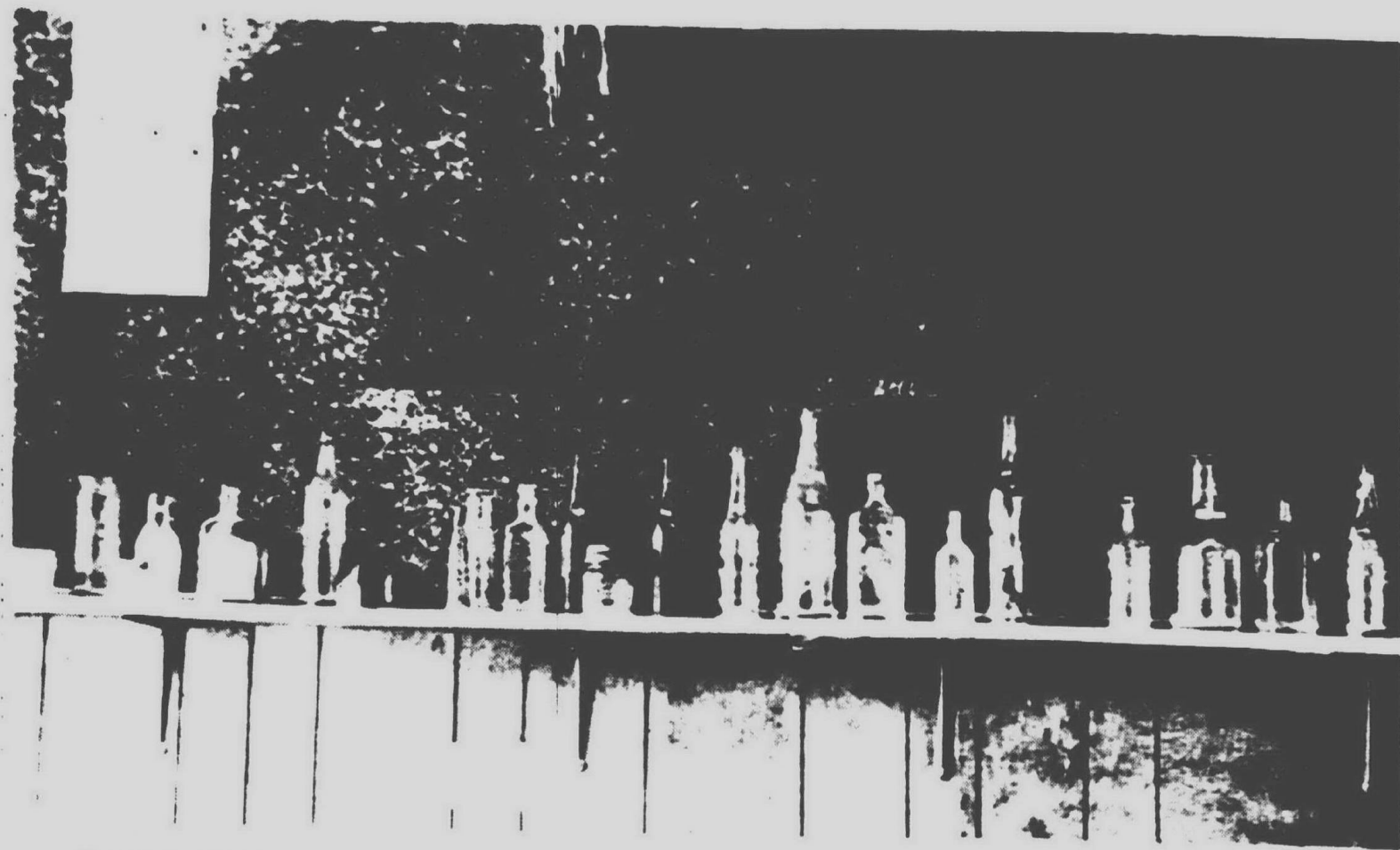


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Buried treasure lures him 'just for fun'

PLYMOUTH—If treasure hunting were a disease, Al Temple would have been dead a long time ago.

Temple, who runs a trailer storage lot in Plymouth, is a real treasure hunting nut. His unbridled enthusiasm for this hobby has led him recently to form a treasure hunting club.

Much to his surprise and pleasure, the initial meeting drew a good response, and there are now at least 16 full time club members. Temple noted that diverse array of people such as doctors, school officials, managerial people, factory workers, and lots of kids, attended the organizational meeting.

TEMPLE MAKES it clear that his avocation is not intended to be a lucrative proposition. "That's for the pros," he says. To him and his fellow club members, treasure hunting is a hobby, and it is the thrill of finding objects of historical significance that turns him on.

Temple points out that history was his worst subject in school. But now when he finds ancient artifacts, his imagination and interest in the past is greatly stimulated.

The club, the first of its kind in Michigan, is having a second organizational meeting tonight at 7:30 p.m. in East Middle School. They will plan an expedition at this meeting, most likely a trip to Beaver Lake, a ghost town in Oshtemo County, where they will search for relics of the past.

Temple's son-in-law, Bill Kennedy, owns a metal detector shop and antique store in Plymouth. He, too, is a treasure hunting fanatic. His shop carries all the apparatus for bounty hunters. Metal detectors of all kinds, special vacuum cleaners, and mountains of literature on where to go and how to search can be found at his shop.

THE METAL detector is the main tool of the treasure hunter. It is a battery operated device that creates a magnetic field and reacts to metal by emitting a shrill high pitched noise. The louder the noise becomes, the closer the detector is to metal. The higher quality detectors can locate small metal objects as deep as four feet in the ground.

The literature in the shop runs from monthly treasure hunting magazines (of which there is a surprising variety and abundance) to a historical book on ghost towns in Michigan. A two vol-

ume text, the book describes in detail the location and former activities of the now nonexistent towns.

THE GHOST TOWN that Temple's group intends to dig through is a former lumber boom town. Now, no indication of the town exists. All buildings are gone, and shrubs and grass cover what was once main street.

Temple hopes especially to find an old spring where water used to be bottled. The object of Temple's search at the spring will be the old two quart bottles the town used to put the spring water in. According to Temple, the bottles have turned a beautiful amethyst color with age, due to the manganese in the glass reacting with sunlight. Some of these bottles are quite valuable.

Temple talks of his fanaticism with humor. "You know, people think I am crazy out there in the dump on my hands and knees digging through trash—but I can't tell you what a thrill it is to find old objects with a real history."

Temple hopes to take his club's finds, and make part of his son-in-law's shop into a museum.

Family service provides counseling plus

PLYMOUTH—People seek professional advice on many happy occasions: to plan a wedding, decorate a new home, arrange a vacation or choose a career.

But the people who come to Plymouth Family Service are often confronting more painful uncertainties: an unwanted pregnancy, loss of a job, marital break-up.

"Challenges like these test the fiber of organizations like Family Service," says Executive Director James W. Brogdon. "The agency has withstood the test and continues to thrive."

Marking its 10th anniversary last February, the agency has counted some 2,000 local families as its clients. Last year alone there were 112 carry-over cases and 211 new applications for service, with family members numbering more than 1,000.

THE TOTAL NUMBER of cases increased five per cent from 1972 to 1973, but there were 65 per cent more adults requesting individual counseling and a 20 per cent increase in persons seeking marital counseling. They were accommodated, Brogdon notes, with a reordering of priorities

but no significant increase in staff

The agency conducted 1,813 in-person interviews last year.—134 more than the previous year. Yet they ended 1973 with only six cases on the waiting list, compared with 27 the year before.

How does one apply for counseling at the agency? Most are referred by schools, physicians, attorneys, clergymen, or other sources, but individuals may apply on their own. Because of Plymouth Community Fund support, the agency adjusts its fees to a family's ability to pay. No one is ever denied service because of his financial limitations.

Individual adults accounted for some 40 per cent of the cases last year, according to Brogdon. The rest were family centered, including marital problems (about 30 per cent), parent-child (about 20 per cent) and the rest, total family.

A BREAKDOWN of specific problems reveals only 18 cases related to child drug abuse and only nine related to alcoholism. Truancy accounted for 44 cases, however, and "running away" for 21 more. The bulk of the

cases are labeled "environmental or situational condition."

"Unfortunately, the statistics do not speak for the young man who said 'counseling made me understand my feelings a lot better; also, my parents found out they are not always right.' Or the young unmarried mother: 'I gained confidence in myself, and came to realize I don't have to feel downgraded because of my past,'" says Brogdon.

Nor do statistics describe the middle-aged housewife who overcame a daytime drinking habit; the 12-year-old runaway who says he can "communicate" with his father now, or the young parents who have canceled their plans for divorce.

THERE ARE MANY such happy endings documented in the 163 files (for last year alone) marked "case closed."

Brogdon hopes to expand the agency's efforts in substance abuse education and prevention and to reach a larger number of substance abusers who are willing to accept treatment. He also hopes to develop resources in Plymouth for homemaker services to

assist families when the head of the household is ill or absent.

"Finally, we hope to have sufficient

staff to engage in outreach services to community groups," he said. "These plans are dependent on the avail-

ability of funds, and that in turn depends upon the success of the Plymouth Community Fund drive."

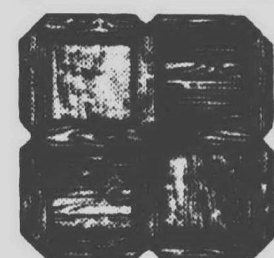

Chevy inventor refines Wankel

By HANK MELJER

If production of the GM Wankel engine ever comes to pass, John Bilobran's inventions may make the revolutionary rotor easier to build and more efficient to operate.

Bilobran, a Birmingham resident, is a master mechanic at Chevrolet's Livonia spring and bumper plant and one of only three Chevy employees nationwide awarded government patents this year for their new inventions.

Bilobran holds two patents, both aimed at improving the rotor assembly which is the key to the pistonless engine.

HE FIRST became acquainted with the rotary concept several years ago while working at the General Motors Technical Center in Warren and then with Chevrolet's forward planning staff.

The 57-year old engineer's innovations are a three-piece rotor assembly and an apex seal.

The rotor, a convex triangle about three inches wide and eight or more inches in diameter, replaces the pistons in a traditional engine. It is conventionally cast in steel or aluminum on a core mold which must be removed after casting.

Because the mold usually is surrounded by the casting, it is often hard to remove. Besides, the casting must be absolutely clean after the mold is taken out. The grooves in its surface, which are hard to mill, are particularly difficult to clean.

"It's one heck of a job cleaning out the sand," Bilobran said.

HE CONCEIVED of a three-part rotor assembly, with the sides of the rotor removable from a hollow-walled central piece. With the sides removed, the core is easily dislodged after the casting is made and the hard-to-mill grooves are formed at the intersection of the two sides with the hollow mid-section.

Before they were hard to mill. Now, as Bilobran says, "I have my grooves for nothing."

The apex seal, his other patented invention, allows air to flow through a groove in each point of the rotary triangle, creating an air cushion which prevents friction between the whirling rotor and its outer trochoid housing.

Bilobran didn't design his innovations with his eye on a patent — he just recognized a problem and looked around for a solution.

"AT THE TIME a patent didn't even enter my mind," he said. "When

you have a problem you can't help but take it home with you. You have the drawings and you take it from there."

The engineer devised a solution to his problem with the rotor assembly in only three weeks. He believes that the Wankel will eventually come to replace the common piston engine.

"There's a few problems that must be worked out that will make it go in the future," he said.

Now that GM has delayed its timetable for producing rotary cars, Bilobran's innovations may be incorporated into the introductory models.

"A few people have looked at this and they feel it has a lot of potential," he said. "There's a lot of testing to be done yet, but I think it will hold up."

BILOBRAN has worked for GM for nearly 30 years, and has been with Chevrolet for most of that time. He joined Fisher Body in Cleveland after two years of engineering courses at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore. In 1948 he switched to Chevrolet's Cleveland plant and he's been with the automaker ever since.

"From that time on it's been the school of hard knocks," he joked.

The Pennsylvania native is now die room superintendent at the Livonia plant and a master mechanic on superintendent Ed Chaffin's staff. Chaffin and Bilobran were reunited at the Livonia plant after working together for eight years at the Cleveland facility.

Bilobran has other patents pending, since he's been tackling bumper problems in Livonia. He and his colleagues are working on bumpers that will better absorb the impact of collisions.

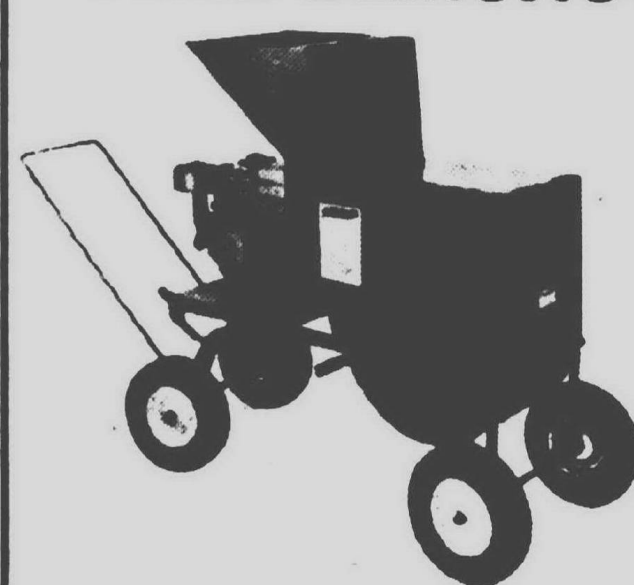
What's it like to be an inventor? "It makes you feel good," he said. "You just train yourself to look at things objectively — there's nothing you look at in life that can't be improved. I don't think there's a man on this floor who doesn't have a patentable idea."

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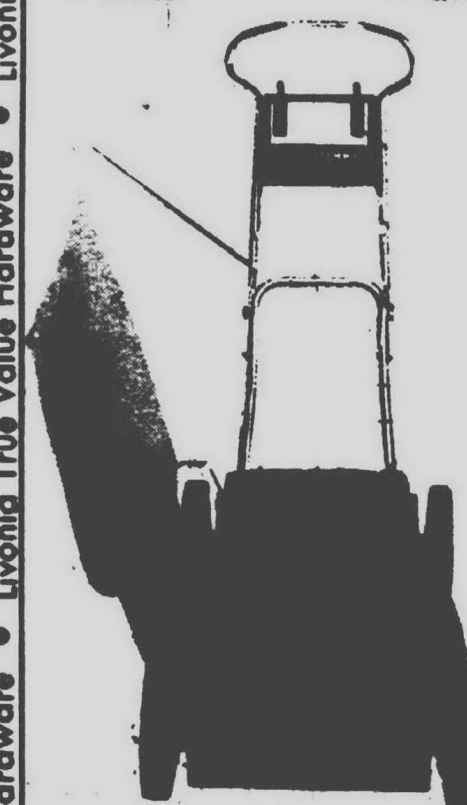

'Our House' has problems

PLYMOUTH—Our House, the community crisis center founded more than three years ago to provide assistance to persons with a variety of problems, has a problem of its own.

The counseling center which has received funds from the National Institute of Drug Abuse, will have to look elsewhere for financial assistance.

The institute requires that Our House be drug-oriented, and that it provide counseling for problems related to long-term drug abuse.

However, in recent years Our House has been getting away from drug-oriented problems, and into such things as counseling for venereal disease, pregnancies, and contemplated suicides.

THE CENTER OFFERS free legal advice, a free medical clinic, and a 24-hour telephone counseling service.

Our House rents its quarters, at 185 S. Harvey, from Judge Dunbar Davis for \$1 a year, and there are plans to remodel the house to provide a medical waiting room among other things.

Its present funding, which ends in five months, is used mainly for salaries and equipment.

There are now two full time persons

on the staff — Denise Chandler, director, and Tom DeMott—and several volunteer doctors and lawyers.

In addition, Our House has a team of patient-advocates, who must complete an 80-hour training program in basic nursing skills.

As is true with other similar agencies, Our House began by providing counseling to high school aged persons. But now the center is handling cases involving older persons as well as those in their teens.

Basically, we help our clients achieve value clarification," says Miss Chandler. "We don't actually tell them what to do, but instead help them develop a problem-solving approach that they can use to solve their own problems in the future."

A GROWING problem of the center involves mixing alcohol with barbiturates, and seems to include persons mainly in the 25 to 30-year old age group.

Our House has the basic medical facilities to deal with immediate symptoms, and then attempts to get at the sometimes deeply-rooted cause of the symptom.

The center provides assistance ranging from the gamut from birth control to

suspected pregnancy, to birth or abortion.

The center's treatment begins with the client. Tests are given for venereal disease or pregnancy and only after the immediate physical crisis has passed, does the center begin to provide in-depth counseling.

"But," says Miss Chandler, "We can't help someone if they can't help themselves. We try to clarify their feelings with them, and determine what pressures are being placed upon them from others. But the final choice is the client's."

WHEN THE CLIENT arrives at a decision, Our House leads him, or her, to the best possible professional agency.

If abortion is the step chosen by the client, then Our House refers her to the best possible abortion clinic.

"We will accompany her right there to the clinic for the abortion, if necessary," says Miss Chandler.

But Our House offers Plymouth-area residents help with problems that are not necessarily at the crisis stage. Routine pap tests, consumer information and legal advice, or just plain information about "substances" such as drugs or alcohol are available free from the center.

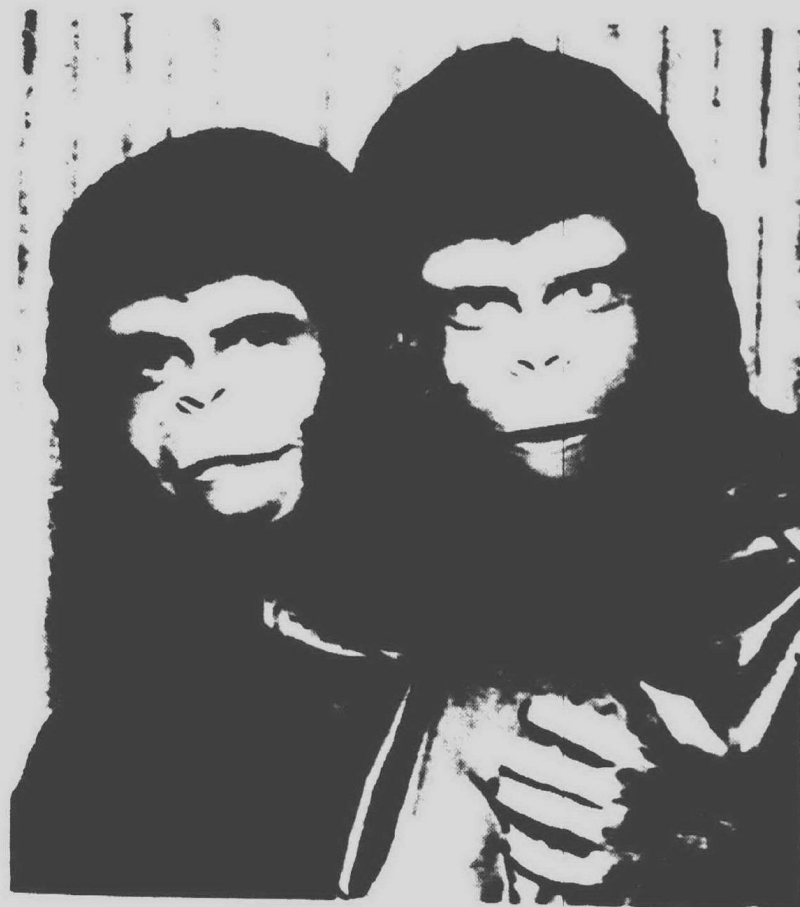

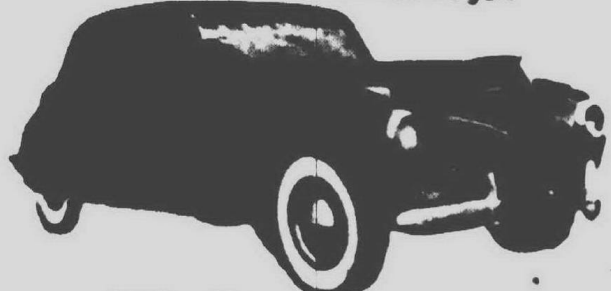

What Channel 56 shows may not be what you'll get

It's always good to see Channel 56, the public television station, conduct its annual pledge drive. The programming is so different that week with such interesting methods of appealing to potential donors.

During Monday of pledge week, the 7 p.m. program was a Duke Ellington special (the Duke was a pal of Richard Nixon, you'll recall) followed by the documentary on Julius and Ethel Rosenberg.

A week later at the same hour, normal Channel 56 programming gave us Accion Chicano (a rock group) and a film on a Mexican ethnic festival.

LATER MONDAY of pledge week, there was a tribute to George Gershwin, filmed in the Mormon Tabernacle, Salt Lake City. Regular programming a week later at the same hour gave us "Common Ground (discussion)" and "Thrival," described as a "televised workshop on behavior self-modification."

The 11 p.m. program is a continuing feature called "It's Your Turn." During pledge week we could see members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. At exactly the same time a week later, we got members of the Fifth Estate, which the TV Guide calls "an alternative newspaper." A more accurate appellation might be a radical, left-wing newspaper.

RACIAL THRUST is different when donations are being wooed.

Tuesday from 10:30 to 11:30 of pledge week, we could see ragtime pianist Max Morath hosting a show featuring Eubie Blake, who is about 85 years old and who, in another era, would have been known as "a colored gentleman."

The same time frame during the normal week gives us "Canada at Chataqua" (classical music, comparable programming), but followed by "Martha Jean the Queen's Blue Collar Workers of America" on a visit to the Wayne County Jail. From Eubie Blake to Martha Jean the Queen is quite a jump.

On Wednesday at 9:30, potential donors could see Charlie Chaplin in "The Cure." A week later

at the same hour, normal programming gave us "folk artist" John Bassette, a black whose songs have an urban air about them.

Thursday gives us another racial contrast. At 8:30 of pledge week, we can see Oscar Wilde's "Salome." The regular program in that time slot is "Detroit Black News."

If you wanted to put on a music program and get affluent folks to donate, what would it be? On Thursday at 10 p.m. of pledge week, Channel 56 offers Erich Leinsdorf conducting the Boston Symphony rehearsal. A week later, the same time slot has "Tim Weisberg... jazz rock."

ONE COULD conclude that Channel 56 puts on one type of program for the better-off folks who are likely to pledge money and another as its standard fare.

Station Manager James Christianson replies, "The examples you cited might lead to that conclusion. However, there wasn't any design." It's just that Channel 56 is "showcasing" during pledge week, he said — just audience building.

The reason "Black Journal" was dropped during pledge week, he said, is that it's a local program and easier to replace with a showcase substitute. Such local programs may have been rescheduled to other-than-prime time.

Christianson did say that Channel 56 mailed solicitations go to high-income areas — the same ones that have indicated an interest in the Detroit Symphony or Meadow Brook.

Nevertheless, this viewer can't escape the conclusion that Channel 56 programs for one socioeconomic and ethnic group when money is needed and another socioeconomic and ethnic group during normal weeks.

During pledge week, to paraphrase Flip Wilson, "What you see ain't what you get."



The Stroller A brief study in human behavior

If you are interested in the study of human nature there are no better classrooms than the meeting rooms of the legislative bodies in the suburban areas — especially when public hearings are on the agenda.

There you'll find neighborhood groups gathered to "fight City Hall" or file verbal protests over some phase of changes planned for the street on which they live.

You'll hear them rant and rave about the plan to install sidewalks, on the plea they want to retain the rural atmosphere that attracted them to their present homes.

You'll hear them argue against installation of street lights especially where special assessments are concerned. And you'll hear neighbors on the opposite side, telling the legislators that they approve the plans.

It all becomes very interesting to the spectators, but it provides many a headache for the members of the city council or commission sitting in judgment.

Just the other evening The Stroller had the pleasure of attending a study session of the Livonia City Council and couldn't help recalling some of the bits of humor that were intertwined in these study meetings when he was a member of the council.

AT THE MOMENT the various groups were discussing installation of street lights in their subdivision and it was almost laughable as they expressed three different points of view.

One group favored the lights — provided they were not in front of their homes. Another segment didn't want the lights at all, claiming the residents in their area would install their own gas lights in the front lawns and

they would be sufficient.

And a third group argued that the land beyond them was a park that was in utter darkness.

"We don't want lights," one of the protesters exclaimed, "because they would only spotlight our homes for the vandals. We are alright just as we are."

This three way discussion was reminiscent of the night, some years ago, when the city had lights installed in a new section and one of the residents stormed city hall.

"I am a hard working man," he said, "and I want to raise my children to be good citizens. So, I have to arise early and need all the sleep I can get."

"That light shines right in my bedroom window and disturbs my sleep. I just can't stand that."

One of The Stroller's colleagues on the council who had been listening attentively, finally spoke up.

"Young man," he said, "I sympathize with you whole heartedly, but as I see it, you don't have much of a problem."

He hesitated for a moment as the protester stood silent in utter amazement.

"All you have to do," the fellow councilman explained, "is to sleep with your head at the bottom of the bed."

There were plenty of snickers throughout the room — but that ended the protest.

THEN THERE WAS a night when The Stroller sat in on a session of the Westland City Council and a request was entertained for the erection of a church.

No sooner had the request been made than one of the council members spoke up and to the surprise of all concerned, said "We have enough churches on that street now. There is no need for another one."

Imagine that! No room for a church because there are too many now.

It could only happen when the taxpayers get going at public hearings in legislative chambers.

It may seem difficult to believe, but the residents in one section of Livonia turned down paved streets that would have been installed, free of assessment.

It happened in the early days when this area, one of the few densely settled, was in dire need of improved streets.

CITY COUNCIL then agreed to use the "race track money" and provide a new surface for the roads.

The contract was let and the work begun by cleaning out the chuck holes. The contractor neglected to close the street, however, and the residents stormed the council chambers protesting that their auto tires were being ruined by the sharp edges of the holes.

Quickly a call was placed and the contractor filled the holes with gravel, only to learn that the residents stormed again, this time claiming that the gravel was sent flying onto their lawns — and ruining their lawnmowers.

That was enough. Council immediately canceled the entire project.

What a study in human nature. Such things could only happen in the suburban legislative halls.

And, ironically, the streets in that area were blacktopped 22 years later.

It took half a century to get the word out about the woman who wrote the column that has made her a household name. But now it's time again when Erma Bombeck is back in the news.

At the Livonia Town Hall last week, she sat down to talk with Verna Lee Stewart, president of the town's women's association.

Erma Bombeck, 52, is a well-known humorist and author of the column "Erma Bombeck's Life" in the Phoenix.

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Learning to talk again in a St. Mary clinic

Jim Currie of Livonia has had a lot of physical problems and setbacks in his life. But none of them have been enough to keep him from reporting to the speech clinic in St. Mary Hospital when he is needed.

Currie had his larynx removed 10 years ago, and since then hasn't been able to speak.

But after many hours of hard and frustrating work he learned to communicate with what is called esophageal speech. He learned it so well that he is occasionally asked to help St. Mary patients who are beginning to learn this process.

Under direction of Dale Freels, head of the speech and language department, Currie has been encouraging Arthur Gleed of Farmington to learn the swallow method of talking.

"AFTER A LARYNGECTOMY, a patient no longer breathes through his nose and mouth," said Freels. "When the larynx was removed, the windpipe was directed toward the hole in his throat. This is the way he breathes."

"Normally he would use the larynx as a sound source. Without it the patient must use the esophageal method to speak. He takes air into his mouth and forces it into his stomach."

The reason he does this is to build up pressure to make an air pocket. Freels stated. Then he belches up the air which produces a sound which

can be heard and understood.

It is very hard to learn," said Freels. "We can give a patient a glass of water or pop to try to build up the pressure to make a belch. But for him belching is a continual process if he is to develop speech."

FREELS EXPLAINED that the patient starts with a sound like "ah." Then he goes to small one-syllable words like one, two, please, and after that, two-syllable words and then sentences.

"We give them instruction here in the office, then they practice at home," he said. "It takes patience to perfect this especially with a family around. It is important the family understand and become involved in what he is doing."

For Currie the process was very discouraging. "I kept at it because I was gassy," he said in his new voice. "I had a pretty big job and if I couldn't talk I was out."

Currie, who quickly indicated his interest in a good joke said he could only communicate by notes when he returned to work after his operation. He thought it pretty funny when his questions would also be answered by note.

And I'm not deaf," he laughed.

SPEECH FOR THOSE with laryngectomy is a series of belches modified into words. Freels pointed out. "The patient cannot speak very fast until he gets the belches perfected into a kind of rhythm," he said. "He will say a few words, inject more air

and say a few more."

For many it is frustrating to lose their voice. But it is something they

have to accept. We have Currie come in to give confidence to new patients and to be a sort of an example of

what they will be able to do."

Currie also makes use of an artificial larynx, which he holds next to

his throat. Run on batteries, this instrument supplements esophageal speech when the patient becomes tired. It gives volume to his words.

It allows for faster speech because speaking softly, the user would not have to inject air so often.

"I LIKE THE WORK very much," said Freels, who came to St. Mary in August of 1973.

"There are so many varieties of speech disorders with which the department works. It is a rewarding experience to help people gain or regain their speech."

The speech center operates under the umbrella of rehabilitation medicine which includes speech pathology, plus physical and occupational therapy. The director of the department is Terry Heaton.

Besides working with patients who have lost their larynxes, the speech clinic provides broad-based therapeutic help to people with many communication disabilities.

Future seminars will concern lung cancer, Oct. 30, and facing the reality of cancer, Nov. 6.

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

Plymouth hunter designs new rifle scope mount

Now it can be told: the city of Plymouth can lay claim to the grandiose title, "Rifle Scope Mount Capital of the World."

The title can be laid to the success of the J. B. Holden Company, 603 Amelia, as the result of a design innovation developed by the firm's owner and founder, Jerry Holden.

In case you didn't know it, a rifle scope mount is a device that connects a rifle's telescopic sight to the top or side of a rifle.

UP UNTIL 1986 Holden, an avid hunter, found that he was having difficulty firing at moving animals when he used his telescopic sight. Just as he located his quarry in his scope

sight, the animal started to move, and if Holden tried to follow the animal by moving his rifle and scope, all he saw was a blur.

Although every rifle is equipped with an "ironsight," a protruding piece of metal at the end of the barrel, the scope blocked the hunter's view of the ironsight.

Then Holden hit upon the idea of providing a space between the scope and the top of the rifle, through which a hunter could see the ironsight if the animal moved.

HOLDEN, an engineer, designed the new type of scope mount and applied for a patent. As it turned out, however, his patent was about 75 years too late.

It seems a German inventor had come up with a similar device as far back as 1890, so Holden's idea was not as radical as he thought.

Rifle dealers, whom Holden met when he was a sporting goods salesman, convinced him that the mount would sell. So he went ahead with production, setting up an office in his Livonia home, and subcontracting the machining work to an Ann Arbor firm.

Last year, the company had sales of \$4,000, and this year sales have passed the 50,000 mark. When Holden introduces some other new ideas in the future, he will be "shooting" even higher.

Theater group reaches kids

Eastern Michigan University's Theatre of the Young hopes to reach out to more than 15,000 children in southeastern Michigan with an expanded 1974-75 program.

Theatre of the Young's touring companies will perform three plays this season in Project DO (Dramatic Outreach).

"We're taking a terrific leap in the scale of our operation," says Virginia Koste, professor of speech and dramatic arts and director of Theatre of the Young. "We want to give theater experience to as many children of as many ages as possible."

The touring company includes the Caravan Players, whose performances are geared toward children of later elementary grades through high school. This season two Caravan companies will perform "My Brother's Keeper" and "How To Succeed in Medicine Without Really Trying."

Another company is the Little Theatre of the Young, which directs itself to the youngest audience, usually kindergarten through fourth grade. The company will perform "dancing tales" this season.

"Our theater groups serve children who would otherwise be completely deprived of these experiences," says Mrs. Koste.

She notes that "people theater" experience is not only beneficial to the young audiences, but is excellent experience for the student performers.

This season's expansion of the group is due, in part, to a \$1,000 grant from the Michigan Council for the Arts. Mrs. Koste hopes the touring companies will now come even closer to meeting the needs of schools in an approximate 50-mile radius from the university.

Besides presenting plays, Project DO also sends storytellers, improvisational drama leaders and actor-teachers to schools, libraries, hospitals and community centers. For further information contact the Theatre of the Young at EMU, Ypsilanti, 48197.

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3rd straight loss for East

Glenn Rockets dazzle GC East, 22-21

An eight-yard touchdown pass with just 31 seconds remaining tells it all for the Rockets of John Glenn.

Lloyd Carr's Rockets, who crushed Churchill in their opener and then fell to two powerhouses in North Farmington and Franklin before handily taking Oak Park, thrilled their homecoming crowd and scored the win that can turn things around in 22-21 style over Garden City East.

And after getting bounced by Thurston, 31-13, in his first homecoming last year, Carr was smiling ear to ear.

"This was a crucial win for us," said Carr. "I would hate to think what would have happened the rest of the season if we had lost."

A Garden City victory wasn't that far off as the Panthers who had broken for two punt return scores, led 21-14 and had control with six minutes remaining.

But a fumbled snap on a punt gave Glenn a two-point safety with 5:43 left and then came the pass from Terry Johnson to Bob Scibiorki with 31 seconds remaining and the Rockets had pulled out a one-pointer.

IT WAS GLENN'S second win in the Northwest against two losses and its third overall in five outings.

For Gary Humphrey's East Panthers, it was loss No. 3 after winning their first three games. East had dumped Riverside, Bishop Borgess and Thurston and was warming up for greater things.

Then stepped in North Farmington, 21-14, and Franklin followed up, 14-0, and now the Rockets had their say.

"This was one heck of a game for us from scrimmage," commented Carr whose club takes on Thurston Saturday, Oct. 26.

The kicking game almost destroyed us. East had two long punt returns and we fumbled away a punt that gave East another score.

The two clubs exchanged punts to open the 48 minutes and it quickly changed to giveaway time with Glenn recovering a fumble on the East 37.

JOHN SULLIVAN then intercepted a Johnson pass for East and Jim Barnyak returned the favor by picking off a Britt Ponte pass for Glenn and returning it to the East four yard line.

Fred Shoemaker spurred in for six

points and Todd DeLuca converted to give Glenn a 7-0 lead, 3:37 left in the first quarter, wound up punting it away. Garden City taking over on its 12, 9:06 left in the half.

Sixteen plays later, Ponte connected with Bob Hudson for six and John Barnstable converted to tie it at seven-all.

Glenn received the second half kickoff and punted the ball after three plays and almost punted the game away as Joe Becszelko dashed 63 yards for six. Barnstable made good the kick and with just two minutes

gone in the second half, East had a 14-7 lead.

But the Rockets never said die and started a drive from their own 43. Shoemaker picked up a first down and Johnson hit Jim Hawkins on a key fourth down pass play for a first down on the East 17.

BOB EISIMINGER finished off the drive with a one-yard burst and DeLuca's first conversion attempt was wide. An East offside call gave the East kicker a second chance and DeLuca was on target this time and it was tied at 14-all.

After another exchange of punts, Becszelko got inside the East "wall" and danced from his own 17 to the Glenn two for an 81 yard burst.

On a fourth down and one call, Lou Willoughby plunged in on the first play of the fourth quarter. Barnstable split the uprights again and the Rockets found themselves down, 21-14.

Again the Rocket offense took charge but Shoemaker fumbled the ball away on the East 15. Chuck Klaska recovering for East.

But then came the break that Carr had been hoping for.

After the Glenn defense pushed the Panthers back, East punter Wally Krol bobbled the snap and Glenn's George Roberts was the first to pounce on him in the end zone. It meant two points for Glenn and now a 21-16 contest.

Glenn eventually had to punt after the free-kick from the 20 and East did the same with Glenn taking over on its 34, 2:49 remaining.

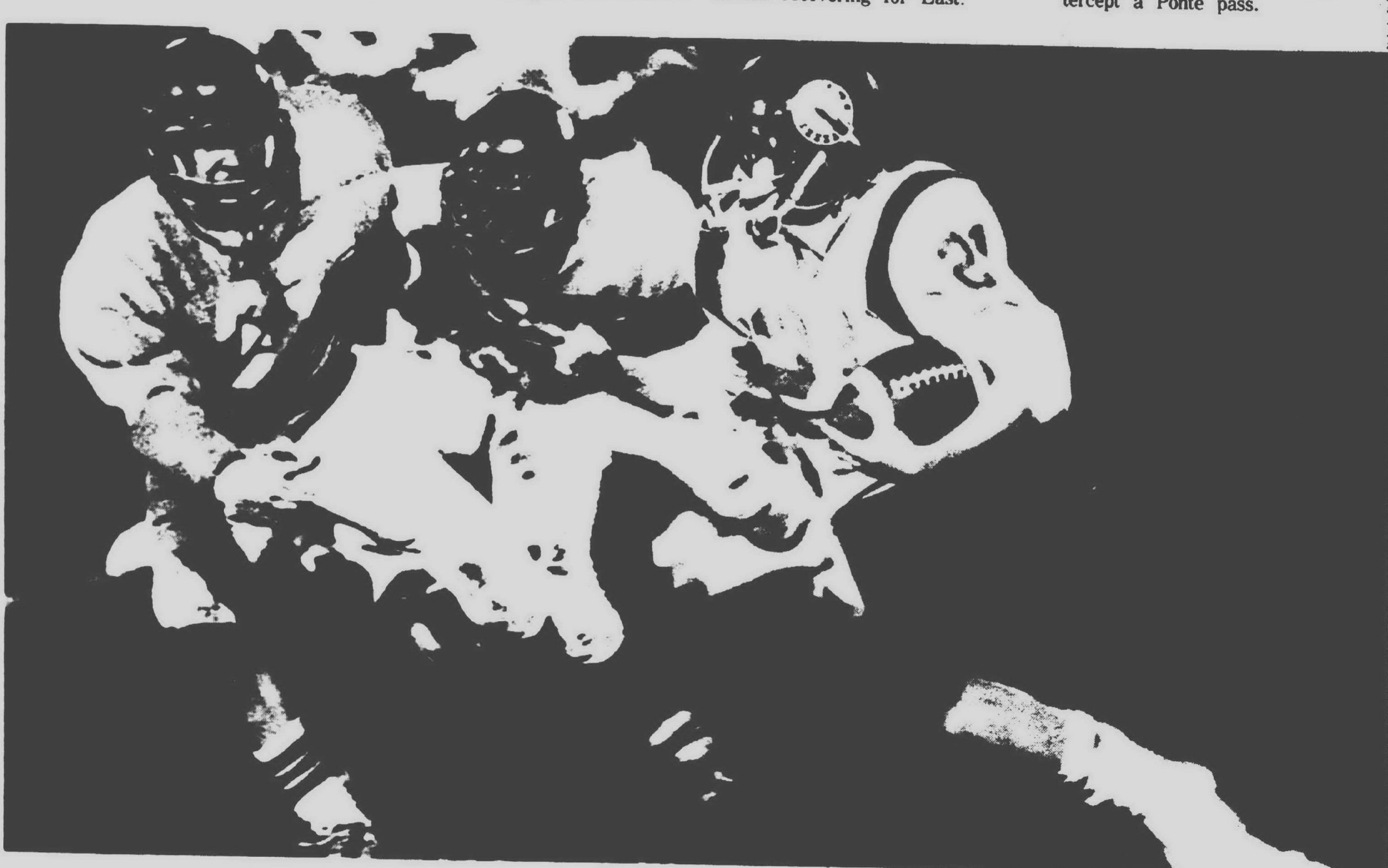

Unbeaten Salem Rocks crush Allen Park, 34-0

Plymouth Salem's Tom Moshimer has had a vision — a dream, the past eight years.

That dream just about became a reality Friday night on the Allen Park gridiron.

Moshimer's Plymouth Rocks crumbled the once highly rated Allen Park Jaguars, 34-0, for their sixth grid victory of '74, and their fifth straight in the Suburban Eight race, a race that is theirs now for the taking.

"Now all we have to do is play football and we have the league championship," commented Moshimer who has never won the Suburban Eight.

In fact, Plymouth's last conquest in the loop was back in the '63 season. Moshimer took over the head coaching duties in '67 and his best showing was last season where the Rocks finished second to Trenton.

Trenton is the only club that can catch us now," added Moshimer. "They have one loss and all the rest have at least two and Trenton has two tough games left in Edsel Ford and Bentley."

ALL SALEM has to do is win one of its remaining two games to at least cop a tie for the title. The two Sub

Eight opponents left on Moshimer's trail are Belleville this week and Redford Union on Nov. 1.

The 6-0 Rocks host Belleville Friday, Oct. 25, and it will be homecoming at Salem High.

"Allen Park scared me before this one," commented the Salem coach. "They were picked to win it all."

Win it all they haven't done. Allen Park lost to Trenton by one touchdown and got bounced by Edsel Ford, 15-0, before the Plymouth clash. And to make the conquest even sweeter for Moshimer and his staff, the 34-0 slaughter was at Allen Park

and the Jaguars' worst defeat ever on home territory.

IT ALSO MARKED only the third time since '58 that Plymouth defeated Allen Park at Allen Park.

"Our front line is just doing it all," he added. "We knew before the season started that our inexperience on the line would tell it all."

"I guess our 6-0 mark tells just how quickly they have gained that experience."

"Our option play with Tim Dillon directing the team just keeps doing it

week after week. I would go as far to say that Dillon runs the option better than any quarterback in the state."

Salem scored against Allen Park the first time it put its hands on the ball and upped it to 12-0 at the half before breaking things open with two scores in the third quarter and capping it with a six-pointer in the final stanza.

Salem's defense also came to play. Wayne Sparkman, the defensive coach, has to be beaming these days as his crew recorded its third shutout in the Suburban Eight and has now given up 33 points in six games, 20 coming in game one.

Allen Park got as deep as the Salem 30 in the first half and down to the 20 late in the fourth quarter.

Meanwhile, the Rock offense which has piled up 122 points did its thing.

After stopping the Jaguars on their first drive, Salem took over on its 38 and in 13 plays, the Rocks were on the board. Scott Agnew carried it in for six from three yards out, the point-after was wide and it was 6-0, seven minutes gone.

Two plays later, Allen Park fumbled and junior tackle Charlie Johnson fell on a loose ball in the end zone and it was 12-0 Salem. Doug Tripp missed on both conversions, the first wide and the second boot blocked.

The second quarter saw the two clubs exchange the ball three times and it was Salem, 12-0 at the half.

The Rocks wasted no time in reveal-

ing that once again they are a second half ball club as they marched 47 yards in eight plays. Agnew scoring on a three-yard spurt and Tripp making good a two point conversion.

ALLEN PARK Allen Park ran three more plays and Salem took over on its 47.

Tripp ground out five yards and Dillon then broke loose on an option, kept the ball for 20 yards and around the 28, pitched to Johnson who sped the remaining yards to paydirt. Tripp converted and with two minutes left in the third quarter, Salem was on top of the Sub Eight world, 28-0.

The Rocks' final tally came midway in the fourth with Tripp capping a 38 yard drive on a one-yard burst. Mike Telekesy's conversion was blocked.

Salem collected 13 first downs and Allen Park mustered seven.

The Rocks rushed 47 times for 256 yards and the Jaguars 31 times for 112 yards. Tripp headed up the Salem ground game with 80 yards in 12 carries. Dillon followed with 59 yards in six carries. Joe Hibler had 56 yards in 13 carries. Johnson 39 yards in six carries and Agnew picked up 38 yards in eight carries.

The Plymouth passing game was three for three for 29 yards while Allen Park hit on six of 20 for 91 yards, two intercepted by Salem's Dillon and Joe Scott.

Now come Belleville and Redford Union and that Moshimer dream.

The third period brought more of the same. Mott dominating with its third scoring drive. Again it was Treas who got the counter, this time from 13 yards out. The attempted point after was blocked and with a 19-6 lead Mott appeared on the way to its first Western Six win of the season.

Then, after Mott had punted to the Plymouth 34 on the first play of the fourth quarter, the Chiefs came alive.

DUNAGAN AND TILLER combined for a first down at the Mott 48 and three plays later the 5-9, 145-pound Til-

ler broke loose for 30 yards to the Corsair 14. Dunagan got five more and on an inside handoff Tiller went the final nine yards, Risti Mihailovich converting to bring Canton within a touchdown at 19-13.

Twice on the first series after the ensuing kickoff, tackle Dave Edwards threw Mott quarterback Treas behind the line, and the Corsairs punted out to their own 49.

Rusty Lindman slammed for seven and then Dunagan popped through the middle for his second touchdown to make it 19-19.

That left it up to placekicker Mihailovich and his kick was perfect.

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

Now that the automatic scorer has been accepted there no longer is any doubt that the grand old game of bowling, founded away back in 5200 B.C. is now the most automated of all sports.

Through the years baseball has seen the advent of the "rabbit ball" and the fielders gloves have become something just a bit smaller than shopping baskets. With that, the powers that be changed the shape of the football so that it would help the passer instead of the punter, and the uniforms were changed from bulky old pads and staved pants and shinguards to aid the runner.

Even golf has undergone many changes. First, there was the reduction in the rigid requirements for wooden shafted clubs. They gave way to steel shafted implements and even the ball was enlarged so it could be a better target.

Despite all of these changes none equalled the overhauling of bowling equipment.

Gone are the days when the pinboys in the pits set the pins on pegs. They have given way to the automatic pinsetter that was introduced in 1946. Many bowlers today, don't recall bowling against anything other than the automatic spotter.

Next came the automatic foul judge. In place of the old bowlers who used to sit in special little cages on the side walls, we now have lights that flash anytime the bowler slides over the line. And the mechanical device has proven much more efficient than the old judges whose eyes sometimes were failing.

Now we've got an automatic score keeper that is something to see. It not only registers the score of a single bowler, but can be set to handle teams across four lanes. And at the end of a series it provides a typed slip of your performance.

All the while the league secretary still had a job of keeping averages. That's gone, too, as the scores are now fed into a computer and the league sheets are tallied and provided in a matter of minutes.

Even the yearbooks, published by the men's and women's groups this year, were products of the computer with myriads of fine information that never before was registered.

So, all in all, bowling has emerged from the crudest of all sports to the most automated of any game engaged in by the general public.

In the past most of the better stables and drivers took off in mid-September for the lucrative racing dates in California and the pickings were a bit thin during the closing nights of the fall meeting be it at Hazel Park or Wolverine.

THIS YEAR Connors managed to keep practically all of the better local and Canadian stables here and the result is excellent racing in the final week.

Bill isn't saying much but there's an even chance Huff N Puff, the fast-moving mare who has whipped all of the other pacers during the season, may be on hand for the final program.

For sure Bea Farber, the driving queen from Brighton, will have Easy Irv ready to go. She still thinks he'll be able to shoot for a mile in less than 1:58 even this late in the season.

Doc McBean, the flashy trotter who won a pair at Wolverine earlier in the season, is gaining new friends among sometimes cynical eastern fans.

A product of Ohio's Amish country, the seven-year-old pure "Ohio Dutch" trotting gelding, won Yonkers Raceway's \$17,500 closing night feature over such metropolitan stars as Savoir, Elesnar, Noble Wejover and Oleos Speedy John.

For Doc, bred by Amish farmer Simon R. Miller of Millersburg, and owned and trained by coal mine truck driver Bob Brokaw of Cadiz, it was victory No. 13 this season, seven in a row with the last five coming at different tracks.

Doc, who raced in 1:59.1 for regular driver Charlie Williams earlier in the year at Scioto Downs, now has lifetime earnings of \$125,649. That's not bad for an Amish farmer who's religious beliefs forbid him from betting or even going to the races to see his prized star perform.

THE BIG GUNS of harness racing, preparing for Hollywood Park's six major events, three of them \$100,000 affairs, are having their own world series.

Three-year-old Dream of Glory, who was a three-time winner at Wolverine Raceway, whipped Colonial Charm, Killbuck Mary and Spartan Hanover in a \$15,000 free-for-all, trotting the mile in 2:00 flat. It was his 17th victory in 22 starts this year.

Meanwhile, Invincible Shadow, who lost his only start at Wolverine, became the third different winner in California among the elite free-for-all pacers battling for fame and fortune this fall at Western Harness.

Invincible Shadow scored in 1:56.3. Two weeks ago Armbrone Nesbit won in 1:57.3 while Sir Dalrae clicked in 1:58.1 in the first of Hollywood's FFA features.

ALTHOUGH out of sight of the leading Herve Filion, Shelly Goudreau, the 26-year-old Windsor driver, still ranks second among the nation's leaders with a total of 217 firsts in 908 starts.

Filion, who recently became the first North American driver to win 5,000 races, is leading the pack this year with a total of 500 victories in 2,330 starts. He is well on his way to winning his seventh consecutive dash championship.

Now the 34-year-old French-Canadian has his sights on five more harness driving championships. According to USTA statistics here are his latest goals:

He needs but \$165,368 to become the first driver to win \$3 million in purses in a single year.

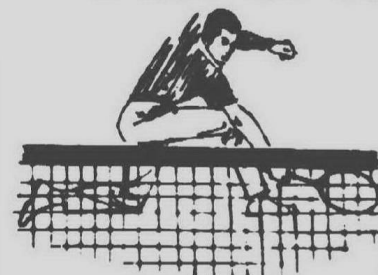
He has won 500 races this season, just 105 short of his own single season world record of 603 established in 1972.

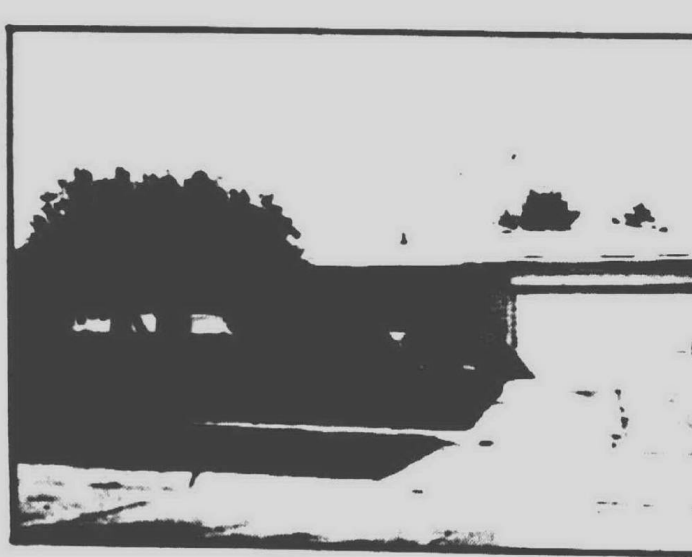

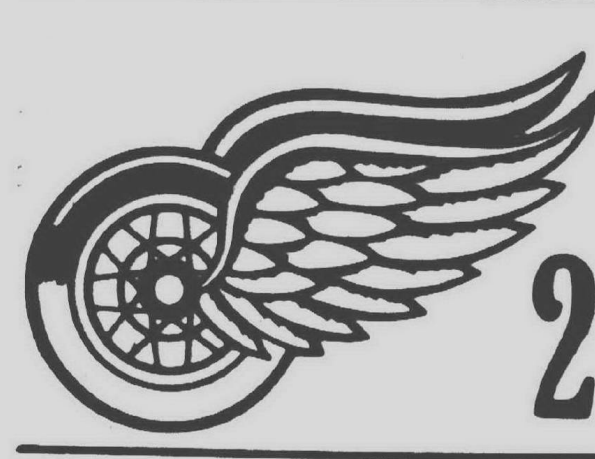
