PLYMOUTH-Plymouth Community School's Board of education Monday adopted a \$14.9 million budget but not before it was challenged by a former superintendent and hotly debated by the board which led to the adoption of a new policy for future budget formulation.

James Rossman, who was dismissed as Plymouth schools superintendent on December of 1971. questioned business superintendent Ray Hoedel on the cash balance of the budget which is listed as \$80,000 in the printed budget.

Hoedel admitted that from June the actual balance was \$632,000 with Rossman consenting that the difference was due to an accrual or changing account rather than on an actual cash basis

Rossman was required by board president E. J. McClendon to limit his comments to the budget and not to dwell on previous budgets since the matter of Rossman's dismissal is pending litigation.

Rossman is seeking \$500,000 in damages from the district and is awaiting a jury trial in Wayne County Circuit Court to rule on his dismissal. Following Rossman's charges. board members engaged in a heated budget debate in which board member Gary Mirto questioned the integrity of the board.

Arnid the exchange trustee Marcia Borowski moved that that the budget be adopted in only the "broadest of terms" with the provision that the budget be received item by item in workshops Nov. 8 and 9.

Her motion passed with Mirto and board vice president Marda Benson dissenting.

Toward the end of the meeting. Mrs. Borowski presented a four point plan for the adoption of future budgets.

"After agonizing over this budget I have to believe there's a better way to build a budget besides the administration coming up with one." Mrs. Borowski siad.

The Borowski plan calls for a public hearing so teachers, administrators and the community can offer suggestions on budget priorities. The second step would be an evaluation by the board. from the community, and administrative input followed by a presentation of the budget, offering reaction from the input sources. Step four would be a final hearing at least one month before the budget must be submitted to the state.

The motion was unananimously approved.

The budget adoption controversy was touched off when trustee Thomas Yack admitted he had reservations about the budget and felt the three new trustees (Borowski, Carl Berry himself) were not as familiar and with the budget as the older mem-

Police millage sought in Plymouth Township

PLYMOUTH-Will Plymouth Township voters be willing to support a 15man police force of their own at an estimated cost of \$400,000?

That's the question that will be put to residents Tuesday as they vote on a three-mill police levy.

According to Township Clerk Helen Richardson, the decision to place the issue on the ballot follows as a result of last year's advisory ballot in which approximately 52 per cent of the voters expressed satisfaction with police protection which is presently provided by the county and the state.

Basically we're putting the issue on the ballot to see if people are willing to support additional police protection," Mrs. Richardson said.

"I wouldn't want to have to give my prediction of the outcome of the vote. as some people are perfectly satisfied with what we have and others really think we need the extra protection."

The suggestion of a 15-man force was the result of a study headed by Col. Fred Davids. former Michigan State Police commissioner, and committee members Robert Lawson, Kennegh Fisher. Clayton Foor and Paul Albright, all township residents.

According to Township Supervisor J.D. McLaren, the committee's plan calls for a department to consist of one lieutenant, four sergeants, one detective sergeant and nine troopers Salaries for the officers are expected to cost at least \$241,300 plus \$40.500 in pension plan costs.

An additional \$38,700 is figured to would be able to have better control cover telephone service. utility bills, building rental, travel expense and maintenance

Equipment, which includes five squad cars. a radio transmitter and miscellaneous items, is expected to run \$39.500 A contingency figure of \$40,000 to cover inflation has been added to bring the total cost of the operation to \$400,000

If the total three mills were levied, the township would realize \$535,000 in taxes, according to Treasurer Elizabeth Holmes.

But, she added, while the millage levied cannot exceed three mills, it can be less

"We never put on the entire millage unless we have to." Mrs. Holmes explained. "When we levied millage for the fire department it took us 10 years before we needed the entire millage."

A three mill levy would mean a \$3 tax on each \$1,000 of equalized assessed valuation. For example, a person whose home is equalized at \$20,000 will pay \$60 in taxes if the entire three mills is levied.

Mrs. Holmes emphasized that if the millage passes, the tax would not be collected until December of 1975, as it would take at least a year for the department to be set up

McLaren emphasized that the township police force. if implemented. would be a "full service" police department.

While we would still be expecting full cooperation from the county and state police. we think our own force

Lease agreement reached for Royal Holiday residents

CANTON-Representatives of residents in the Royal Holiday Mobile Home Park have reached agreement on a lease with the park's developer. Sheldon Futernick

Representatives met yesterday to sign the agreement that was ironed out by both parties after residents threatened a rent strike for Nov. 1.

Royal Holiday Park Association President John Robine said that after Futernick agreed to delete 13 sections of the developer's proposed lease, residents voted unanimously to approve the agreement.

"Eighty-five to ninety per cent of our goals have been reached." Robine said, "and the residents seem quite pleased with this."

The agreement will provide residents with a 12 month lease and insure a fixed price for fees within the park over that period. Rents will range from \$87 to \$92 per month for residents most of whom are senior citizens.

Residents began attempts at negotiations in late August, after rents were raised by approximately 38 per cent. Demands for a lease were ignored until Futernick's corporate sales offices were picketed early last month.

"This agreement will make this park a very pleasant place to live in now that we have a good relationship with the management." Robine said.

Provisions of the agreement include setting up a committee of five, with two representatives from the residents, two from management and one from the outside public, to rule on

whether a resident's coach meets park standards for resale.

Robine also noted that Futernick has agreed to make allowances for rent reductions in "hardship" cases. He added he was personally pleased with the negotiations that brought about the settlement.

"We seem to have been able to settle after bargaining in a rather good atmosphere. I think we now have a better understanding between management and residents of the park.

And Paulun feels he has cause to worry. More than any other person, he knows that the township firefighting facilities haven't kept pace with the tremendous growth that the township is experiencing.

And the activity keeps increasing. Take this past year "up substantially over last year,"Paulun says.

Jan. 1 to this past Oct. 25, in the area from Joy to Warren, the department answered 103 fire calls and 135 rescue calls. In that same period, from Warren to Ford Roads, 76 fire calls were recorded with rescue runs amounting to 73.

From Ford Rd. to Cherry Hill, the department answered 61 fire calls and handled 68 rescue runs. and from Cherry Hill to Palmer Roads, there Haggerty Roads area-much closer to were 46 fire calls and 51 rescue runs. In the Palmer-to-Michigan area, there were 50 fire calls and 75 rescue runs. In the Michigan-Van Born area, there were 51 fire calls and 98 rescue runs. And the year still has a couple of

Approval will enable future township boards to levy up to three mills (or \$3 per \$1,000 of assessed vaulation) to pay for fire and-or police improvements.

He discounts fears that repeal of the tax will cause serious budget problems and create a \$200 million deficit in the general fund. "It is definitely a necessary step." he said. "I don't think we can quote figures. We just have to wait and see what happens."

O'Shea said he would consider tapping the Michigan Lottery to overcome any deficit: "I'm not an advocate of earmarking funds. but that's perior one area where the money is just sitting there.

PURCELL disagrees: "If repeal of the sales tax becomes effective there would be an estimated loss of approximately \$200 million in revenue that would have to be replaced. Otherwise reductions would have to be made in such areas as school aid. hospitals and law enforcement.

'In my opinion there's not \$200 million of fat in the budget." he said. he said, "that's not a responsible posi-There is some fat there, but repeal of the sales tax might still call for replacement of lost revenue with more state income tax."

The candidates were divided on the potential of one additional revenue source that has been considered: offtrack betting

"I'm absolutely opposed to it." Pursell said. "If it's our responsibility to improve the quality of life in the community. I can't see how off-track betting is an improvement."

According to the second-term incumbent. Michigan's four tracks earned the state about \$25 million last year. compared to \$60 million from the state lottery

O'Shea, a 22-year old Redford resident, takes a different stand. "I'm in favor of it," he said. "It would help knock off the bookies you have now.

When you take away the right to strike you take away a very effective means of negotiation." O'Shea said. Technically, teachers have the upper hand in a strike. The man in the factory loses money; but teachers gain. not lose, in the long run- this is something that has to be changed.

Pursell wouldn't deprive teachers of the power to strike. "The only tool labor has is the right to strike." he said. "You have to give both sides tools to bargain with." He noted that of Michigan's more than 600 school districts, only a handful were struck this year.

AMONG OTHER issues. the Plymouth Township Republican stresses the need for property tax reform relative to school financing and more efficient use of schools, such as year-aorund classes.



SEMCOG OKs solid waste study

A \$41,500 regionwide solid waste disposal study was approved unanimously at a recent meeting of the executive committee of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG)

Money for the study is expected to be directed toward production of a preliminary report to be circulated among local governmental units for evaluation and comment.

"It is our feeling that it is not fair to develop a plan for solid waste before a report goes to the units of govcity level," said Delmont Chapman, chairman of SEMCOG's Council on Environmental Strategy (CES). He is also a Monroe County Commissioner

Plymouth Twp. buys **= Hilltop Golf Course**

PLYMOUTH TWP.-After more than two years of negotiations, Plymouth Township trustees have finally succeeded in purchasing Hilltop Golf Course.

Approval to buy the nine-hole course at Beck Road and Ann Arbor Trail came Tuesday night with all board members voting in favor of the. proposal.

Purchase price was announced as \$390,000 with land contract terms of 7.5 per cent interest.

The 63-acre site is adjacent to the township's recreational park and will give the township 130 acres of recreaional space. It will be kept as a golf course.

One of the stipulations of the purchase agreement is that it be called the M. Vollbrecht Park in memory of the late Margaret Vollbrechtt wife of philanthropist-inventor F.A. Vollbrecht, who purchased the property many years ago.

Handling details of the sale were Dearborn attorney James Thompson and R. G. Dannels, a certified public accountant, also of Dearborn. A last-minute hitch in the sale that

has been on-again-off-again for the past five years almost developed to throw it off again when Thompson informed Township Clerk Helen Richardson late Tuesday of a change he said had to be made in the agree-

Thompson said that Dannels would not agree to the sale unless the buyernot the seller-was responsible for \$8,000 in back taxes. "That seems rather unusual," commented Trustee Frank Millington. "Usually in land transactions, it's the seller who is responsible for having the land free and clear."

Other trustees concurred, but finally agreed to the contract change. "It leaves a bad taste in my mouth. but it's still a good deal," commented Trustee Gerry Burke.

Agreeing with Burke was Mrs. Richardson. "The price is reasonable for developed land," she said. "but I don't like it either," referring to the \$8.000 in back taxes.

School board approves three construction sites

PLYMOUTH-Triplets are in the future of the Plymouth Community School District.

But in this case the triplets are elementary schools-identical in structure but different in placement and perhaps in the color of bricks and mortar.

According to Dr. Earl Hogan, deputy superintendent of Plymouth schools, ground will be broken at the three sites in March of 1975 with completion slated for March of 1976

"We wanted to draw up plans which flexibility. There will be some walls emphasize flexability so that we would be able to offer either modern or more traditional kinds of programs.'

Typical of the flexibility will be re-locatable buildings which can be placed next to the the schools to handle potential overloads and then removed when the school enrollment declines.

"We didn't want to find ourselves in the same predicament of other school districts who built schools and now see them standing empty.' The heart of the school will be the learning resource center which will house books, tapes, filmstrips and other learning devices. The center will run through the central portion of the building.

but they will be kept to a minimum . Instead we'll be utilizing furniture such as cabinets as walls.

"By building this way we will have a comparably less percentage of building increases. For instance if we were building these schools at the same time Miller School was built the cost would have been less than Miller School."

THE SCHOOLS will also house features which meet occupational safety and health standards and the mandatory special education act. "These are very subtle things which you probably won't even notice. "But the thing is that we will have the facilities if we have to use them." Cost of the schools has been estimated at \$1.8 million each with the school at Haggarty between Ford and Cherry Hill costing \$100,000 more be-cause of site acquisition.

Board denies band bus fare to airport

PLYMOUTH-In administrative action Monday night the Plymouth Board of Education agreed to the hiring of consultant for the emotionally disturbed but denied free transportation to Metropolitan Airport for the Centennial Park Band when it leaves to play in the Orange Bowl Parade.

According to Supt. John Hoben, the need to hire a consultant for the emotionally disturbed was made necessary by a denial by the Methodist Children's Home to serve Plymouth children beyond the sixth grade.

While Hoben said he was unable to determine whether the hiring of a consultant would meet state special education standards, he said that he was assured by the Wayne County Intermediate School District office that the hiring "would be a show of good faith that we were moving in the right direction.

Board member Gary Mirto objected to the hiring, saying that the board should be complying with state law and not speculating that the move would place the district in compliance with the law,

"OUR CHILDREN will be footballs and I don't think we should be listening to the Wayne County district if it's going to be afraid to step on the toes of local school boards.

When pressed by Mirto for a "positive recommendation." deputy superintendent Earl Hogan termed the move as "taking the step to help the teachers who are dealing with these children.

"This will be an interim step," Hogan said. Mirto then chastised Hogan saying.

'It would be improvident for this board to act when we can't get any input from the PhD (Hogan) who is paid to give us information.

We're supposed to be dealing with the distribution of justice and not stalistics.

Board president E.J. McClendon appealed to the board, saying that the special education act is not entirely defined

"The law is new and the schools just don't know what is expected of them," McClendon said. "The state board is slow in developing guidelines because it's new to them, too, and they're going about it as logically as is possible

HOBEN ADDED that since the district isn't "over the hump." mid-year adjustments in the budget might have to be considered and that special education would be a prime consideration for the new budget.

The issue was then unanimously adopted.

Leader of the movement not to accept the band request for transportation to and from the airport was Marcia Borowski.

The YMCA sponsors a variety of family activities and services: Saturday Fun Club for second and third graders: Indian Guides for fathers and sons: junior and senior Hi-Y. a youth employment service. and special family parties on such occasions as Halloween and Christmas

ONE OF THE key emphases at the Y' is physical fitness.

The fall schedule typically includes a slimnastics class for women and football skills for six, seven and eightyear-old boys. Last spring. the 'Y' offered tennis, baseball and senior lifesaving classes, plus volleyball and basketball for men. Preschoolers even get into the act with Tiny Tot Gym.

It costs little to participate. since the 'Y' is subsidized by contributions to the Plymouth Community Fund.

The Community Fund also helps support the non-profit Plymouth Community Junior Athletic Association (PCJAA). This voluntary group provides wide opportunities for local boys and girls to compete in sports.

The Association was created by Junior Football in 1967. extending mem-

bership to Junior Baseball and Basketball immediately and adding Junior Hockey in 1970. It is open to all area young people. aged 6 to 20. regardless of athletic skills. Anyone who applies can "make the team."

Baseball has been the most popular of the four sports. with players increasing from 950 in 1973 to 1.400 this summer. The PCJAA is predicting an enrollment of -1.800 in baseball this vear.

Basketball participation approached 700 this year. while 340 players signed up for hockey and 250 for football. About 15 per cent of the baseball and football players, 20 per cent of the basketball players, and six per cent of the hockey players are girls.

BUT EVERYONE who participates in the PCJAA is not under 20. Adults donate an average of 10.000 hours each year to baseball, basketball and hockey, and an additional 6.000 to football. This includes coaching, administration. and other kinds of adult involvement.

By capitalizing on volunteer time and support from such sources as the Plymouth Community Fund. the PCJAA has kept registration fees to a fraction of the total cost per participant. Hockey fees were \$96 per player, due to the \$196 per person cost for facilities and equipment. But it cost \$10 or less to take part in football. basketball or baseball.

The PCJAA goals are to continue to keep fees low so more boys and girls can participate. In addition, the association will provide monetary assistance to youngsters who cannot afford their own fees or equipment.

The PCJAA needs lots of help to continue these efforts, however. They use contributions for defraving or combining insurance programs. supplying equipment, defraving ice time costs. and financing printing and reproduction of information and publicity mate-

Besides that, they have openings for some 300 to 400 volunteers. and are constantly on the lookout for boys and girls who can benefit from their program. PCJAA wants to continue to grow with the community. not turn away youngsters because it lacks sufficient money or space.

A successful Plymouth Community Fund Drive will help insure this objective.


According to Mrs. Sullivan, diclining school enrollment was given as the reason for the move.

"Instead of four fourth grade classes we now have three with an average of 33 students in each class." Mrs. Sullivan said.





THE GRANT will be used by Schoolcraft to fund one WATTS line for the placement office. one rented terminal, one paraprofessional part-time employe, and one part-time clerk.

The addition of terminals at all placement centers will enable the banking and dissemination of job opportunities among all nine community colleges.





Voters guide gives ratings Civic Searchlight and The Oakland Citizens League has released their voters guide for the Nov. 5 election

listing the ratings given candidates who have been evaluated through a systematic procedure. The ratings range from "no rating"

given to candidates who did not supply information or do not measure up to the group's minimum standards of qualification to "well qualified" given to candidates with special qualifications for the offices sought.

In addition, a rating of "preferred" is used to indicate an outstanding candidate when two or more are rated "qualified" or "well qualified."

CANDIDATES for the U.S. House of Representatives from the 15th, 16th, and 17th congressional districts who are rated preferred and well qualified are incumbents William D. Ford (D-15) and John D. Dingell (D-16), and William M. Brodhead, a democratic state representative in the 17th District.

Incumbents William Faust and Carl D. Pursell also received preferred and well qualified ratings in the 13th and 14th state senate districts respectively.

in the races for state representative, the incumbents also got the organizations' nod: William R. Keith (D-33), R. Robert Geake (R-35), John F. Markes (D-36) and Thomas H. Brown (D-37), all got preferred and well qualified ratings. Incumbent John Bennett (D-34) was not rated because he is unopposed. State Rep. Ed-ward E. Mahalak (D-38) received a well qualified rating.

In the 18th, 19th and 20th Wayne County Board of Commissioners dis-tricts incumbents Richard E. Manning (D-18), Mary E. Dumas (R-19) and Tom F. Taylor (D-20) have all been rated preferred and well qualified. Royce E. Smith, a democrat in the 27th district, was not evaluated because he is unopposed.

Both are running for a regular term ending Jan. 1, 1961.

Also on the first district bench but running for two new terms are four judges: Henry Heading, Richard M. Maher, Joseph A. Sullivan and Nathan J. Kaufman. All were rated well qualified but Kaufman did not receive a preferred rating as the others did.

Incumbent Judge Willis F. Ward is running unopposed to fill a vacancy whose term ends Jan. 1, 1979 on the Wayne County Probate Court.

For the two new terms on the probate bench the organizations have rated Y. Gladys Barsamain and Samuel L. Simpson as preferred and well qualified.

THERE ARE five new seats on the Wayne County Circuit Court.

The organizations have rated three candidates preferred and well qualified: Irwin H. Burdick, Richard D. Dunn and Roman S. Gribbs. Others rated well qualified are John J. Conley, of Bedford Township, Andrew Di-Maggio, Joseph B. Sullivan and Daniel J. Van Antwerp. Three others were rated qualified.

All nine incumbent judges on the circuit court running for terms ending Jan. 1, 1981 are rated preferred and well qualified. They are: Victor J. Baum of Livonia, James N. Canham, Neal Fitzgerald, Charles Kaufman. John R. Kirwan, James Montante. John D. O'Hair, Thomas Roumell and Peter B. Spivak.

. In the race for Wayne County auditor, incumbent Richard T. Kelly, a democrat, is rated preferred and well qualified.

JAMES R. McCARTNEY has been rated well qualified in the District 7 race for Wayne County Community College trustee.



Schoolcraft records increased enrollment

Fall enrollment figures at Schoolcraft College indicate the student body is continuing to grow while the average number of credit hours per student has decreased, according to Edward McNally, vice president of student affairs.

The official count shows 8.924 students. in credit programs and community services, enrolled in fall 1974 as compared with 8.157 students in fall 1973.

Students taking career education courses totaled 60 per cent of the student population this fall. up from 54 per cent last year.


THE AVERAGE number of credit hours per student during the fall term is 8.36. a slight decrease from 8.54 last fall

The resident student enrollment increased from 71 per cent last year to 73 per cent this year. There also more part-time students-up from 66 per cent last year to 68 per cent this fall.

There are 51 new part-time instructors this fall. 22 are men and 29 are women.

McNally pointed out that Schoolcraft employs more part-time faculty members than full-time. Reasons for the increase in the number of parttime instructors included sickness. leaves and resignations of full-time faculty members: employment of part-time faculty for the new child



Years ago, when The Stroller was looking for an escape from the long night hours and the boredom of a machine shop with its muck and grease. the editor of the home town newspaper- a little four page weekly- invited him to join in a stroll along the river of printers' ink.

"You'll find it most enjoyable," he said. " and you will meet many interesting people."

The old editor, a fellow named Chaylie Weiser, was an interesting character himself. He was one of the last of the brown derby boys and had travelled enough to be wise in ways of newspaper work. So The Stroller accepted the in-

vitation. He knew most everyone in the little home town and he couldn't help wondering how he would meet many other interesting folks.

It didn't take very long. In a year or two he followed the old editor to a daily paper in the city only four miles away.

In the half century that has passed since those days. The Stroller has had a most enjoyable stroll. He has had the good fortune to walk with the kings and queens of the sports world. He was at the ringside in Comiskey Park in Chicago when Joe Louis. whom he had a part in developing. had his hand raised in victory and was proclaimed the heavyweight champion of the world.

FROM COAST TO COAST he watched football games. met the coaches and was no stranger along the political front. He had the rich experience of presenting bowling trophies to members of Congress under the dome of the nation's capitol- and was with Gar Wood when he established a world record of 124.85 miles an hour in his famed speedboat.

One would think that after a half mara's office to talk of the future and century of this stroll it, too, might become boring. Just the opposite is true. And each day provides its enjoyable moments and chats with interesting people.

The old editor would have smiled had he been able to accompany The Stroller through a recent week for here is what he would have heard and the people he would have met.

First, we had a chat with Carl Wagenshutz, the oldest elected official in Livonia who is celebrating his 30th year as treasurer of the community. Carl traced his career back to the days when Livonia. now a city of more than 110.000 persons, was farm country and cheese was its main commodity.

It was interesting to learn the history of the area and the many changes that have taken place. Next. a stop at Mayor Ed McNathe plans for making Livonia a model for other suburban communities to follow

Then over to the Plymouth City Hall to discuss the boosting of residential assessments advised by the country and how it may be handled. There is nothing more important to the residents than their taxes and the assessments are always interesting subjects.

STROLLING along we reached the home of Mrs. Arnell Everett, president of the Annapolis Park Garden Club in Westland. for a most interesting chat on the part beautification of one's neighborhood plays in every day life and how it serves as an example for the youth to strive for clean minds, bodies and environment.

Then to lunch with District Judge Richard Hammer, in Garden City. The judge is a friend of long standing.


He had just returned from a trip to Russia and his comments on the Soviet Union and the people he met were most enjoyable.





Authorities question legal void on obscenity

By DARLENE STINSON

Hazel Gibson does not act, feel or think like a criminal. Yet, as owner of Plymouth Book World in Forest Place Mall, she fears she may face a court battle one day.

Mrs. Gibson's fears are based on the uncertain state of anti-pornographic legislation in Michigan, where strings of local ordinances fill the void left by the absence of a state anti-obsenity statute and a Michigan Supreme Court ruling on obsenity.

Under a recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling, under which local communities can determine what is obscene. and Plymouth's anti-obscenity ordinance. Mrs. Gibson fears she could be taken to court for selling such materil as Kurt Vonnegut's Slaughterhouse Five." if a complaint were brought against her

SUCH WORRY and confusion about pornography prompted a recent forum on Michigan anti-pornographic legislation, sponsored by the Livonia League of Women Voters, Schoolcraft College Bookstore and Mrs. Gibson. at Schoolcraft College

Speaking at the forum were State Rep. John Markes (D-Westland), who reviewed legislation and Supreme Court decisions concerning poronography: Sheridan Holzman. an attorney representing the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), who blasted all forms of censorship and anti-pornography legislation. and Leo Dinnan, director of the Wayne County Federated Library System, who believes anti-obscenity legislation will solve nothing.

Markes told the small but enthusiastic group that a U.S. Supreme Court decision in June 1973 brought a flurry of anti-obscenity bills into the Michigan Legislature. Only one of those bills has passed from the Senate into the House, and no bills originating in the House have met House approval.

THE U.S. SUPREME COURT decided in June. 1973. that obsenity is to

isn't in another." Markes explained after the forum. "What is needed in an agricultural community isn't in an industrial community I'm for as much uniformity as possible, but where people want to be more lenient. it should be possible

"WHILE A REASONABLE case may be made for the framing of statutes to prevent, the thrusting of obscene materials and performances on unwilling audiences." Markes said. 'such statutes should be narrowly drawn so as not to affect the access of those who willingly seek out such displays.

Most of the legislation offered frequently infringes on the first amendment guarantees of free expression." he said "Frankly, I think an overreaction caused by the Supreme Court ruling has taken place

Markes said a statute prohibiting the distribution of obscene material to minors would be a good starting point for a state anti-obscenity statute

The ACLU however, opposes all anti-obscenity laws, according to Holzman,

"THE ACLU of Michigan opposes any restraint of free speech or press." Holzman said. The right of free speech and the press is the first of the Bill of Rights, and it was placed there for a reason. The cornerstone of democracy is in the right of free press and speech. Once we begin to place restrictions on that we endanger all our other liberties There are many other things that are as dangerous and offensive as pornography

Holzman said, however, that freedom of expression should not impose on a person's right to privacy. He favors legislation that would prohibit drive-in theaters from showing obscene films or require drive-ins to construct a wall aound the screen.

People shouldn't be compelled to lock themselves in their houses." Holzman said. "Restrictions could be placed on this type of situation, but they'd have to be narrowly drawn"

DINNAN OFFERED a different view. claiming legislation can provide no solution to the obscenity issue. Pornography. like pollution and Watergage, he said, are only symptoms of other problems.

These things are not the causes. but the symptoms of moral degeneration." Dinnan said. "The solution to the problem cannot lie in legislation. The legislation can just drive the producer underground. That has never worked in the past, although we in America have the naive confidence that, if you have a problem, pass a law

Pornography is with us. because we collectively want it." he said. "It won't go away as long as there's people who profit from it and want

Only a moral commitment will eliminate pornography. Dinnan said.

State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) and State Rep. R. Robert Geake (R-Northville) were scheduled to attend the forum, but cancelled their appointments because of other commotments, according to Margaret Thomas of the Livonia League of Women Voters.



tistic, political or scientific value. The term "community" was not explained until June 1974 when the Supreme Court said states may define ommunity as state-wide. Local juries can determine their own communitys' standard of obscenity in the absence of a state statute or when the state statute does not define community

The Supreme Court directed the states to review their anti-obscenity statutes, which did not conform to the new decisions, and sent back a Michigan obscenity case to the Michigan Supreme Court

The case pending before the Michigan Supreme Court has not yet been decided.

"THOSE RULINGS dictate to me that a review of all proposed legislation regarding the regulation of obscenity is in order." Markes said. "Further. any revision of the state's obscenity laws will have to await the settlement of litigation in this area now pending in the Michigan Supreme Court. so that all relevant issues will be apparent.

Markes said some bills. like that recently okayed by the Senate. define the state as the "community Others, like one he is sponsoring. would allow local communities to enact their own anti-obscenity ordinances.

The college now reserves 13 spaces for wheelchair students, a number Wrenbeck considers ample at this time







The editorial urged a "no" vote on the Nov. 5 ballot Proposal B.

If approved. Proposal B would authorize the state to borrow \$205 million to pay Vietnam war veterans a lump sum of \$600 each. Other veterans who served between Jan. 1. 1961, and Sept. 1 1973. would receive a service bonus of \$15 for each month they served.

"SINCE THESE veterans were not employes of the State of Michigan, we believe that any bonus to them should be paid out of the federal coffers." the editorial maintained.

We are not saying that we should not honor the veterans who have served us in the armed services. Nor are we making a judgment on the morality of the Vietnam war by saying its veterans should be treated differently from the veterans of other conflicts.

We are saying, basically, that this is a federal question which should be taken care of by the federal government and should not be an excuse to raid the state treasury."


Don Ringsred. spokesman for the protesters. whose numbers varied from about 50 to 15 during the course of the morning, disagreed.

What does a girl do when she's scared, 15, and pregnant? Should she



marry, or abort the child, or offer it for adoption? Will delivery be painful, and what will she tell her parents?

Those are typical questions that swim though a young pregnant girl's head. She can drop out of school and brood or self-consciously face the stares of classmates.

Or, she can enroll in a continuing education program for pregnant girls. sponsored by the Garden City School District, where the problems of teenage pregnancy are squarely faced and the companionship of other pregnant girls offers comfort and helpsrelieve the turmoil of her mind.

The program, now in its third year. is available to all school-age pregnant

Three teachers in the state-funded program offer individualized academic attention to the students in the rented classrooms in the First United Methodist Church. Merriman and Maplewood, Garden City. A social worker deals with emotional problems while two nurses deal with the physical aspect.

Program coordinator Elwin Sack describes he program's two-year history as successful.

"A LOT OF THESE girls would just quit school." Slack said. "This program keeps them in school. The people I've talked to were very pleased because of the individualized attention. These girls are in close contact with their teachers, and you can take better care of their health."

Maria Carey, who teaches home economics to the girls. added. "There isn't as much pressure, because all the girls are pregnant.

Pregnant girls were tutored in their homes before the program was instituted. Slack said.

"Sometimes you'd go in the home in very tense situation." Slack said. with the mother mad at the girl.



Local women help CG rescue work

Boating enthusiasts who have found themselves hanging onto an overturned boat in Lake St. Clair would probably be surprised to learn that the women who aided their rescue came from such land-locked towns as Westland. Livonia and Plymouth.

These women often go on search and rescue patrols. They are members of All Women's Flotilla 12-7 of the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary.

"I have been on many patrols with my husband and others," said Mrs. Charlotte Adams of Westland, whose husband John recently retired as dean of applied sciences at Schoolcraft College.

"We have brought in people whose boats have gone on the rocks. It is a good way actually to help someone." Mrs. Adams 'has belonged to the group for five years, joining after the purchase of a 25-foot cruiser.

"I THOUGHT I should know what boating is all about. Then I got interested in boating safety and in teaching it. We flotilla members do a great deal of teaching, which is very rewarding.

"The youngsters are little sponges in soaking up information and seem more concerned than their elders about safety. They are not allowed to run a boat without a state certificate if they are 16 and under."

The members of the women's flotilla will be teaching such subjects as boating language. principles of safe boating, aids to navigation and rules of the road at a class in the community room of the Livonia Mall Thursday evenings through Oct. 24.

The women also hold winter classes in such locations as Schoolcraft College and Bentley. Redford Union and Stevenson high schools.

While their uniform is soon to be changed, they now wear a skirt and jacket of dark blue with silver buttons. In summer they dress in blue and white seersucker. Their work unitorm consists of navy blue slacks, a white shirt, blue tie and a navy blue overseas cap.

West, Tungate: new faces for the township

Two races hold the attention of Plymouth Township voters. The first involves picking two members of the township board, and the second is to name a successor for Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes, longtime treasurer and trustee who elected not to rish for an additional term.

(R), and Mrs. Helen Richardson (R), veteran clerk, are unopposed. In a Republican stronghold, where Democrats

often have trouble getting any candidates to oppose GOP nominees, it seems strange to see in-clumbent trustee Frank Millington and his co-Republican Richard Gornick facing opposition in their bids.

Millington, who at 73 is the dean of the township board, has done his work well during his term. Frank isn't always right in some of his stands, but he always has reasons for thinking the way he does and isn't a bit reluctant to let one and all know.

We feel he should be returned to the board for another term. He has been a stable force in most issues but, as indicated above, he isn't always right but has reasons for his position.

We recommend Orville Tungate for the second trusteeship. Long a leader in Democratic politics in the township and a candidate on several occasions, we believe he could give the board some new thoughts and new ideas in conducting the business of the township.

Gornick, a member of the township planning commission, president of homeowners groups and member of a citizens committee opposing consolidation of the City of Plymouth and the township. appears to be well qualified.

However, we believe a change is in order. and it's about time the township voters thought of getting a new voice from the Democratic side on the township board.

Thomas Sullivan, a Democrat, also is a candidate. But from this angle, we recommend Millington and Tungate with Gornick as well qualified.

Then there's the race for treasurer between Joseph West, a Republican, and Janet Pierangelino.

This can be summed up in a few words. West has 40 years experience in accounting and has been active in civic duties in Canton Township, Plymouth Township and the City of Plymouth. He has the know-how and he should be elected.

Mrs. Pierangelino, a Democrat, is a housewife and mother but does not have the experience necessary for a township treasurer. Let's let it ride with that.

Challenge to Greenstein

New order in Canton

Canton Township voters are facing the first election which will bring a majority of new faces onto a township board that has been perhaps overwhelmed by the meteoric growth of the last four years.

Democratic nominee Robert Greenstein's experience and background as an attorney, plus his knowledge of the area, make him best qualified to meet the challenge of growth as township supervisor. Important land decisions must be made, and his legal expertise will be an asset in meeting the needs of those residents who make up the "new majority."

Concern for the consumer marks Myers' campaign. His ideas are sound, and he appears to be a reasonable addition to the board. As he gains experience, we would hope he would learn to stand politically on his own.

The remaining race is for a two-year trustee seat. Democrat Gerald Cheske is unopposed, and his involvement with various groups of new residents should assure their voices, will be heard. He, too, shows promise of being able, in time, to stand on his own and make his own decisions.

Reuther has enthusiasm

The 2nd Congressional District is a tough one to represent. Covering Livonia, Plymouth and Morthville in this area, Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti and all of Monroe County, its people are farmers and in-dustrial workers, villagers and academics, women's libbers and housewives, commune dwel-lers and white-collar suburbanites.

Perhaps because of their diversity, voters have two excellent candidates from which to choose next Tuesday.

Incumbent Rep. Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor) is running for a fifth term with a solid record. Independent without being a maverick, Esch has managed to be opposed to the Vietnam war and irritated with President Nixon without losing friends in his own party. Esch has sought imaginative solutions to labor and manpower problems, and he has moved promptly to serve effectively the needs of people in Livonia when most of the city was' added to the district.

The major problem with Esch has been his tendency to try to be all things to all people. For suburban consumption, he authored legislation prohibiting cross-district school busing; simultaneously, he presented himself to Ann Arbor liberals as an advocate of integration. He sometimes votes one way in committee and in preliminary floor votes, only to change his position when the more visible vote on final passage comes up.

John Reuther, the Democratic challenger, is young, thoughtful, sometimes painfully honest and knowledgeable about Washington. The son of Victor and nephew of the late Walter Reuther, he has brought to the campaign the family's traditional concern for social justice, coupled with a pragmatic recognition that his name helps overcome the diversity of his district.

He is particularly impressive in arguing that his positions may not be popular from one part of the district to the other, but that he has honestly thought them through and tried to present them accurately.

Reuther's liabilities include his relative inexperience in the district (he moved to Ypsilanti less than two years ago) and (for those inclined to worry about such things) his close relationship to the UAW.

Both men are credits to their respective parties. On balance, we give the nod to Reuther's imagination and enthusiasm.

Ford good for his area



Time to vote police millage

Voters in Plymouth Township will be asked to approve three mills for police protection, a proposal that has had pros and cons for several years and never been resolved.

In the past there were those who said the pro-tection provided by the Sheriff's Dept. road patrol and the Michigan State Police has been sufficient. But now there is a question of whether the Sheriff's Dept. will be able to continue the road patrol, in fact there are moves in the direction of eliminating such services for all townships.

This decision has been on the minds of county commissioners for several years in that they are threatening to withdraw the funds that provide for the road patrol and place the matter of police protection in the hands of the individual townships.

It has never been made clear that Plymouth Township could survive with only State Police patrols. Neither has it been resolved that the township should form its own police force or join with the City of Plymouth unit.

However, it is clear that three mills are needed for some sort of police protection if the road patrol is eliminated. We feel Plymouth Township should have its own police protection and thus support the millage.

Kidston offers fresh outlook

ft's time to seek a new face and fresh ideas in the 37th State House District, which includes southeastern Westland, Canton Township and the southeastern corner of Plymouth Township. Incumbent Tom Brown (D-Westland) is receiv-

ing a stirring challenge from Republican Brian Kaliston, a Plymouth school administrator. We believe Kidston has the kind of innovative philosophy and independent ability to judge issues on their merits rather than because of special interests to better serve the area in Lansing.

Kidston grasps the necessity of cooperation be-tween communities. He strongly believes the economic survival of southeast Michigan depends on an efficient transit system.

Kidston also takes a sensible view of the utilities' rate problem, supporting stronger regulation by the Public Service Commission but not state ownership.

In short, Brian Kidston is the kind of bright newcolner state government needs.

Our only hope is that Greenstein's followthrough is as good as his swing.

His Republican opponent, Trustee James Poole, will remain on the board, win or lose. A Greenstein victory will leave Poole to serve the remaining two years of a four-year term as trustee. Poole's continued presence on the board will provide well-rounded input into decisions.

Incumbent Clerk John Flodin is unopposed. His presence on the board and in the township offices will aid the transition from the old tone to the new. His lack of competition points to his competence.

In his short time on the board as an appointed trustee, Republican Richard Wolfe Jr. has shown initiative and leadership qualities, and he deserves a promotion to treasurer. Wolfe's background in finance should help the efficiency of township operations. His first-hand knowledge of the inner workings of county government can be a valuable tool in a township so strongly affected by county-level decisions.

In the four-year trustee seat races, Democrats Brian Schwall, an incumbent, and Robert Myers stand out.

Schwall's performance shows he's an independent thinker who's not afraid to ask questions or seek new solutions. Because he's his own man, he would add balance to insure that decisions are carried out rationally. His board record is impressive, and he warrants strong support.

Canton needs safety millage

With the continued effort by the Wayne County board to cut or eliminate the sheriff's road patrols in the townships, it's more important than ever that Canton Township voters support the proposed three-mill levy for public safety.

The ballot proposal Nov. 5 would allow the township board to levy up to the three-mill limit to support either fire or police protection within the township. Intentions, at this point, are to use a portion of the millage to construct and staff a fire station in the vicinity of Haggerty and Warren Roads.

In a township approaching an estimated 40,000 residents, additional fire service is a high priority item. With so many residents and fine homes, police protection is even more seriously needed. A minimal patrol of the township by both state police and sheriff's road patrol is by no stretch of the imagination adequate assurance of safety and law enforcement.

Whether by contract with the county or through its own efforts, Canton needs greater police protection. A "yes" vote on this proposal Tuesday will provide the financial means.

U.S. Rep. William Ford (D-Taylor) should be returned to Congress for a sixth two-year term to add to his excellent record. The 15th District includes Garden City, Westland, Canton Township and a small portion of Livonia.

Ford, who has represented the district since it was created 10 years ago, will win a new term on Nov. 5 almost by default because his Republican opponent has failed to mount a visible campaign.

Despite a lack of campaign debate. Ford's re-cord has paralleled the district's feelings on such economic, budget and social spending programs as increased federal aid for public schools.

Ford was an early leader in the House impeachment drive - long before the public sensed that Richard Nixon would have to resign as president a year later to avoid impeachment and conviction.

The 10-year congressman was also on the right side of the emotional issue of busing in urging the public to remain calm while the matter is resolved in the courts.

Faust helpful to education

State Sen. William Faust (D-Westland) deserves a third term in the Legislature. Faust's district includes all of Garden City and Canton Township and most of Westland.

The former Nankin Township supervisor has served eight years and has compiled an enviable record of serving his district, one of the state's largest before the 1972 reapportionment.

As a member of the Senate Education Committee, Faust has had an important role in perfecting the Bursley Bill, which provides a three-year financing plan for public schools. School offi-cials have been crying for that for at least a decade.

Faust has made it a point to keep in touch with local officials and leaders of private institutions to see what's on their minds and incorporating their ideas into needed legislation.

Roy Smith suits a rural district

In the 52nd House District, voters may choose between experience and dedication.

On the surface, there's little difference. Both candidates express concern over governmental reform, spending and education. The proof will lie in performance.

Serving from 1967-72 in the House, Republican Roy Smith had a chance to learn the ins and outs of getting things done. Running in 1972 in a re-drawn district, he lost to a Democrat. He had earlier experience as a township supervisor. Smith's strength lies in that experience. His weakness is his reliance on campaign platitudes about "sound" legislation and being "fair." His opponent is Merian Frederick, a political newcomer, full of ideas but short on the experience required to see those ideas bear fruit. Her sincerity is unquestioned but borders on political innocence. The district is largely rural and small town, taking in much of Plymouth and eastern Washtenaw County exclusive of Ann Arbor and Ypsilant! Roy Smith, on balance, better suits the character of the district.

Good things with Pursell

The old school of political science says there are different levels of government and different branches, and each should mind its own business.

Carl Pursell's specialty, in this intricate world, is getting administrators, legislators, federal, state and local government, politics, service groups, business, labor - getting everyone togeth-er to tackle a problem simultaneously.

Pursell has done this as a Plymouth community leader. a Wayne County commissioner and for the last four years as a state senator from the 14th District, which covers Plymouth, Livonia, Redford, and a corner of Westland.

Without Pursell, there would have been no financing for public transportation — he guided that bill through the Senate. Without Pursell, there would probably be no chance for county gov-ernment reform through elected executives or pro-fessional managers. Without Pursell, there might have been no pilot program aimed at cleaning the Middle Rouge chain of labor. Middle Rouge chain of lakes.

Without Pursell, there would have been no new state maps for canoeists. Without Pursell, there would be no legislative thrust toward new solid waste legislation. Without Pursell. . .well, you get the point.

Although a freshman, he has clout on the Senate Appropriations Committee. Although a Re-publican, he has the respect and support of organized labor. If he had been picked as the candidate for lieutenant governor, Gov. Milliken might not be in such a jam right now. Pursell should be re-elected to the Senate. Too

many good things will stop happening if he isn't.



With the Jackson-Northville meeting opening with the largest first night handle in history, it appears that harness racing is headed for its biggest year in Michigan.

Naturally, one would have thought Jackson would have had a good handle for the opener but when slightly more than 3,600 wager \$396,000, then its time to take a look. That's a per capita of well over \$100 and makes it look like folks still do have money for recreation and leisure even though the business leaders are predicting a recession in the not too distant future.

Wolverine Raceway. one of the area's two major harness operations. ended its 82-night season Saturday with wagering at an all-time high for a fall meeting. Attendance dropped from the figures for the spring meeting of 1973, but then one can't compare the business of the spring sessions with those of the fall. Spring will have a big the all the way.

Wolverine attracted 619.977 fans during the season for a nightly average of 7.561 in 1973. This year, for the same number of nights, the turnstile count was 590.564 for an average of 7.202, a dip of 4.2 per cent. Everything considered it was quite remarkable how well the attendance held up during the latter part of September and through October.

Wagering totaled \$57.898.349 for a nightly average of \$706,077 and that was more than \$50,000, higher than any other fall harness racing meeting in Michigan history.

In addition, betting on the final night was \$882,765. most ever for a closing program at Wolverine. Rather amazing when one considers the final night was in the last week in October when the weather is always questionable. This time it was perfect but the crowd of 9.083 didn't come up with the per capita wagering that marked most of the weekends during the campaign.

A year ago Wolverine wound up the spring meeting with an average handle of \$667,000 and Hazel Park had \$665,000 in the fall.

This year Hazel Park climbed to







Ms. Rakieten is state's 1st woman racing GM

How does it feel to be the first way meetings from nothing to the woman general manager of a race track in Michigan?

That was the question asked Ms. Na-" nette Rakieten, who Monday stepped into the post left vacant by the death of her father Leon A. Slavin, in mid-September. Ms. Rakieten is the new general manager and president of Jackson Raceway which opened a 51night meeting at Northville Downs this week.

Ms. Rakieten makes it emphatic that she is not a Mrs. nor a Miss. She recently was divorced and is the mother of three children.

"If you don't mind. I would prefer to be known as Ms. Rakieten." explained the personable Nanette. Since the divorce. I am not a Mrs. and most certainly not a Miss." So in violation of the newspaper policy of the Observer & Eccentric newspapers, we decided to go along with the daughter of a longtime friend. "I plan to carry on all of the policies of my father." says Ms. Rakieten." He had built the Jackson Racepoint where they were showing figures in the black and that's what we all want.

"It isn't that I am taking over this position as a novice, which isn't quite true. I did serve as secretary of the Raceway for a period of six years and have had some experience in all phases of the operation through that work.

Then. too. Ms. Rakieten was carefully schooled in taking over by her father during the winter and summer months when it became apparent that Slavin face open heart surgery and a

long period of recuperation. All during those months he went over his race track plans and policies very carefully with his daughter since he already had decided that she had the necessary interest and could acquire the needed know-how

Even though Leon had said for years he would never ask for dates at Jackson going against competition from Wolverine Raceway but would go against Hazel Park, he changed his mind during the sessions with his daughter. He requested and received back-to-back dates that have Jackson going against Wolverine next fall and then shifting activities to Northville Downs.

We had a disastrous meeting last spring at Jackson," smiled Ms. Rakieten, "And sick as he was Daddy decided then never to ask for spring dates again. That's when we talked it over and he requested the fall dates at Jackson.

Nanette, as we prefer to call her isasmuch as we first met her as a child with her Dad and Mother at the Jackson Raceway, isn't exactly a novice in the race track business.

A graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a master's degree from Western Michigan, she is working toward her doctorate now in Philosophy. During a meeting of the publicity director of harness racing tracks in United States and Canada. she presented a paper on harness racing and received a great deal of praise from the PAs for her mastery of the field

"We expect to have some problems before the end of this meeting" she said, "Principally because my father didn't have enough time to explain everything to me and probably there were a lot of things he didn't remember because he was so sick.

"However. we do have a hard core of top executives who were with him for years and they'll stay: with me. Bob Matthias. our controller; Rollo Sims, in admissions and programs; Ed McCarthy, mutuel manager; racing secretary Tom Smith Mary Parlato in charge of programs; these are the persons my father leaned onand they are the ones I will go to when I need help."

Ms. Rakieten will continue the early winter pacing series that proved so popular last year. The first of the eight qualifying legs is carded for this Saturday and the series winds up up on the final Saturday of the meeting with a championship that is expected to go for more than \$10,000.

Each of the Saturday features will

have a value of \$5,000 and from all indications more than 50 of the top pacers in the midwest will be nominated.

"We're hoping the business boom in harness racing in the Detroit area will continue at our meeting." said Ms. Rakieten. "We realize Jackson will be competing against Windsor Raceway but we believe our programs will induce patrons on this side of Detroit to attend the races here and not across the river. They don't have to pay that extra charge for going through the tunnel or over the bridge and we feel our racing will be just as good as that in Canada.

"Naturally we will have practically all of the stalls filled with Michigan horses. We expect the full co-operation of the horsemen since we have promised to do everything we can for them.

"If business warrants it, and we hope it does, then we'll try to raise Slavin.



HAROLD M. RYAN **Ex-legislator** eyes court

A former state senator and congressman from eastern Wayne county is seeking election to one of the two newly created seats on the Wayne County Probate Court.

Harold M. Ryan said he is running for the probate court because that is "where the openings are" and because it would be difficult to upset a circuit judge in an election.

Ryan, a practicing attorney, said he has collectively more experience in probate work than in other areas of the law to qualify him for the post.

HE ADVOCATES a change in the juvenile delinguency laws, so that youths who are home and school truants would be classified differently and would receive different treatment than those charged with a criminal offense. He stresses that the juvenile division of probate court should retain jurisdiction of these cases.

Ryan is a seven-term democratic state senator from the 1st Senatorial District. During his 14-year tenure his colleages elected him Senate Democratic Leader.

He also served two terms in the U.S. House of Representatives during the terms of Presidents Kennedy and Johnson. Ryan remained in office until the merger of two eastside congressional districts. then resumed his

Women lawyers endorse judges

The Women Lawyers' Association of Michigan has endorsed selected candidates for judicial office in Wayne. Oakland and Macomb counties.

The association, the only statewide bar group for women atforneys in the state, established the Public Advisory Committee (PAC) last year to screen judicial candidates and advise voters of those who have demonstrated an interest in advancing the cause of women in general and women in the legal profession.





But don't feel trapped by tradition when you pick your foyer floor. With a careful eye for color coordination and common sense. exotic patterns duplicating the elegance of hand-tooled leather and Italian or Dutch glazed ceramic tiles can be used tastefully in the fover.

SOME PEOPLE feel that carpeting the fover creates a "lush" atmosphere and helps keep tracked-in dirt out of carefully cleaned living rooms. But to retain that plush appearance, a fover carpet requires vacuuming almost daily, especially during bad weather, as well as frequent shampooing Most residential carpeting won't hold up under prolonged exposure to: heavy fover traffic





Lack of humidity shocks house pets

A proper amount of humidity in your home during the winter months does more than protect your furniture, please your philodendron and promote your personal comfort.

promote your personal comfort. It also makes your dog and cat more comfortable throughout the cold weather season.

According to the Air-Conditioning and Refrigeration Institute (ARI), the average American home during winter is drier than the Sahara Desert (about 13 per cent relative humidity versus 25 per cent in the the desert).

Your pet spends much of his time in this environment, said ARI, adding that many careful cat owners never let them outside at all. In these bonedry conditions, it's harder for your pet to stay in tiptop health and appearance.

Dry indoor air is a factor in the buildup of harmless but annoying static electricity in the home, said the institute. Long-haired animals build up static electricity charges in their fur because of dryness, causing a spark and a shock when you reach to pet them.





Beginning in the 1930s, Daisy advertisements carried the name of Plymouth throughout the world. An aggressive promotional program introduced by Cass Hough was one of the factors which contributed to the firm's continued growth. Daisy ads featured scouting's Dan Beard, aviation's Eddie Rickenbacker, and western movie's Buck Jones. Comic strip characters Red Ryder; Buck Rogers and Superman exhorted readers of "Boy's Life," "American Boy" and a variety of comic books to "Get a Daisy with your Christmas Cash!"

Plymouth's dominant position in air rifle manufacturing came to an abrupt end in Nov. 7. 1957 with a startling announcement by Cass Hough. Daisy would terminate its 75-year connection with the community and move its entire operation to a new plant to be built in Rogers, Ark.!

"A quiet search for a new location" had commenced in 1954 after Daisy's board had voted 2-to-1 not to build a new plant in Michigan. (Governor "Soapy" Williams' economic policies were given as the reason.)' Ground was broken for the Arkansas plant in 1957 and the Plymouth operations came to an end April 30, 1958.



Commission provides historic keepsake

By SUE ROSIEK

Many of the old, out-dated buildings that Livonians and visitors pass daily often go unnoticed, yet most are rich in historical significance.

In an effort to preserve a portion of local history the Livonia Historical Commission has launched a campaign to move and renovate six of the city's oldest standing structures to Quakers Acres Historical Village Museum at Seven Mile and Farmington roads.

The six buildings are: Shaw House and Quaker Meeting House (already at the village site): the Old Newburg Methodist Church. Newburg DUR Depot and Newburg General Store. all on different corners at Newburg and Ann Arbor Trail; and Judge Blue's Courthouse on Merriman Road between Schoolcraft and the railroad tracks.

"WE HOPE to have at least five of the six buildings at Quaker Acres in time for the nation's bicentennial celebration in 1976." says Jim English. commission president.

Moving and renovating the landmarks has already proved to be a costly venture. "The Shaw House cost about \$5,500 to move. and a good portion of the work was donate." says English.

To help finance the project the commission is selling a portfolio of six sketches of the six buildings. The limited edition of 200 sets. illustrated by Edward Farhat of Westland. is available for \$35. "We plan to move the buildings as soon as the property and funds are available." explains English.

When completed the historical village will serve as a museum where residents can learn about the area first hand.

The six structures have an interesting background as English explains:

"The Shaw House, originally located at Six Mile and Newburgh roads, was built in 1832 by Thomas Shaw. The family had just emigrated to America and staked their claim on the land im Livonia. The house is noted for its circular staircase. Shaw's daughter mentioneds the staircase in a letter to relatives in England.

"THE QUAKER Meeting House, built in 1846, is the oldest meeting house in Michigan. It was used by the Quakers for about three years then sold to a family. The Quakers have continued to use the house periodically.

"Judge Blue's Courthouse appears on maps dating back to 1860. The judge was known locally as the "hanging judge."

"The Old Newburg Methodist Church, which some say was built by the Congregationalists and others say the Presbyterians, was originally located on land across from the Newburg Cemetery. It was moved to its present location when a Methodist group purchased the building.

"The Newburg DUR Depot dates back to 1898. The depot in the only one known still standing. It was one of several waiting stations provided for passengers traveling on the Detroti Urban Railroad.

"The Newburg General Store was built about 1900 after the orginal building was destroyed by fire. It's a reminder of the typical country store."

The idea to provide sketches of the historic sites was the result of an accidental meeting between English and Farhat.

English spotted Farhat drawing the Shaw House last July and was impressed with his detail. After a series of preliminary drawings Farhat was commissioned to sketch the six historic sites.

Farhat, who has been painting for 25 years, works for Ford Motor Company in Dearborn. He earned a BFA degree from Wayne State University and has exhibited nationally and locally in various media.


BESIDES the actual artistry. Farhat spent a great deal of time researching each building's history.

"The assignment was more pleasure than work." recalls Farhat. "I enjoy drawing nostalgic things like streetcars. I also think it's important to record historic sites before progress takes its toll."





Court considers cheaper jail bonds

Officials of the State Supreme Court have promised quick consideration of a plan for cheaper jail bonds which would help lower the population in the overcrowded Wayne County jail.

The plan, a proposal of Recorder's Court Judge George W. Crockett, was upped upon the Supreme Court by a egation of Wayne County officials who met with Chief Supreme Court adminsitrator Einar Bohlin in early Octo-

Under Crockett's plan, defendants in minor criminal cases would be allowed to post a cash amount equal to 10 per cent of the bond that has been

THE PLAN would apply only to persons charged with offenses carrying a maximum penalty of less than 14 years, and would not include those suspected to be potentially dangerous.

This would provide an alternative to the present system involving bail bondsmen who require collateral valued at the full amount of the bond. which many defendants cannot furnish.

Another effort is a recorder's and circuit court review of cases where bond was set below \$1,000, according to George Cross, assistant county corporation counsel.

these bonds can be lowered if the defendant is a first offender and no violent crime was committed." Cross added.

Crockett outline his proposal in a meeting called by the County Board of Auditors to discuss the recurring problem of overcrowding at the jail. proposal by the County Board of Commissioners to borrow state funds to finance additional jail facilities is still pending in Lansing.

Wayne County Sheriff William Lucas said at the meeting that the jail housed 859 prisoners or 60 more persons than the lawful capacity decreed in a circuit court decision.



Halloween--trick or treat on parents' pursestrings?

BY SHERRY KAHAN

Candy may be dandy, but this year it is the real villain in raising the price of Halloween celebrations.

While the cost of apples, pumpkins, cider, doputs and Indian corn are all up in price, they don't touch candy in their percentages of cost increase.

The result will probably be lighter bags for youngsters out trick or treat-

"The high price of sugar is the big factor," said Geene Meisnitzer, manager of the candy department at Montgomery Ward in the Wonderland Shopping Center.

'The cost of some of the bags of trick or treat candy has risen 89 cents over last year." he explained. "Last year a pound of Three Musketeers sold for 77 cent. This year they are going for \$1.27."

BUT SUGAR is not the only product responsible for the rising cost of candy. In Central and South America. in the East and West Indies and in West Africa. they grow something called the cacao bean.

the bean behind the bar. Chocolate lon. comes this small bean and currently its price is rising like an elevator in a high rise.

"The cocoa used in chocolate has gone up tremendously and is hard to get," said Meisnitzer. "Some people are beginning to use substitutes for chocolate, calling their products chocolate flavored. But we don't have that in any of our candy."

Meisnitzer believes that old fashioned slow pokes. made without chocolate, are good buys for Halloween. While up to 79 cents from their 57 cent cost of last year, their price has not equalled candy made with choco-

Candidates describe

Several area store managers believe there is no shortage of sugar to cents at this produce stand. cause the price to quadruple.

Jack Crawford, assistant sales director for A & P Food Stores, claims a world-wide increase in demand lies behind the high price of both sugar and chocolate

"In both cases there has been a normal crop.," he said. "But because there is more affluence in the world. there is a greater demand for it. When such a demand occurs, manufacturers can name their own price."

PUMPKINS CAN justifiably, wear smiling faces this year. "Their price is up just a little from last year." said Mrs. Nancy Schmidt of Schmidt's Farm Market in Plymouth. "We purchased them early in the year in order to have a good supply."

At her store small pumpkins are going for 39 cents this year, and larger ones cost between 75 cents and \$1.25

Gourds and Indian corn. as far as I know, are in good supply, but their cost is also up a little from last vear." she said. "Our cider is running What will concern you is that it is the same as last year - \$1.85 a gal-

As I recall they were two for 25 cents last year." said Guibord. This is a seven cent increase per apple. Indian corn goes for three for 39 cents, the same as last year, according to Guibord, while a peck of the MacIntosh. a delicious variety of those things a few people still bob for. are \$1.79. up 10 cents over last year. Apples at Foreman Orchards in Northville vary in price according to their size.

"Most apples are up in cost because of the cost of gas for the tractors and other supplies. Spray material has jumped 30 percent." said Ralph Foreman Jr. "Help is also higher."

FOREMAN, however, noted no falling off in business because of higher prices. "Our taffy apples, because of the increase in the cost of sugar are up considerably from last year when they were 25 cents each," he continued. "This year they are 35 cents."

Popping corn also costs more, he said, because of droughts,

Donuts in Foremail's cider shop sell for \$1.50- \$1.65 this year. Last year they were 1.25. Cider from Foreman's own apples is still 15 cents a glass as was in 1973. 11

However, the price per gallon is up maybe 20 cents a gallon over last year." Foreman said. "It is \$1.85."



GARDEN CITY-So you need an operation to have your tonsils removed. Or you've just received word your ap-pendix must be extracted. Or you're an admitted alcoholic and seeking

There's no need to pack a suitcase and drive out to Ann Arbor and check in at University or St. Joseph Hospital. The facility you need is the commanity hospital.

"The community hospital is that institution providing a community with 85 to 90 per cent of its medical needs." says Allan L. Breakie, executive director of Garden City Osteopathic Hospital.

"It provides all the basic health care services. The university hospital (such as University or St. Joseph in Ann Arbor), besides providing the basic services to its community, is also equipped to handle the rare and unusual cases."

Garden City Hospital handles about 50,000 patients a year. Breakie notes. It also boasts the largest emergency room service in the area (larger than Botsford in Farmington, Annapolis in Wayne and St. Mary in Livonia).

"We are able to meet the medical, surgical, obstetrical, orthopedic and pediatric needs of the community." Breakie says. This includes operations such as hysterectomies. appendectomies and tonsilectomies.

"But though we provide a full scope of service to the community, we cannot, for example, perform brain or open heart surgery." Breakie adds. "Operations such as those are done where the volume warrants the specific facilities and staff that are needed.

"Garden City Hospital may get one such case every 11/2 to two months. The Ann Arbor hospitals perform about 25 such operations every month. It just is not economically feasible for a community hospital to staff the specialists for those operations."

THOUGH GARDEN City Hospital operates on an annual budget of about \$18.5 million, the funds are provided by the billing of services rendered, The operating budget covers payroll. supply and food costs and does not take into account improvements and expansion.

"University hospitals can provide services for rare conditions because the hospitals' specialists double as faculty members for the medical programs at the universities. Breakie continues.

In this way, medical students are offered the opportunity to specialize under the instruction of gifted physicians in their fields. The consolidation of doctors at the university enables the local hospital there to seek their services creating the university hospital, he says.

ANOTHER FEATURE of the university hospital is its research programs. Breakie adds.

Because all the specialists are centered in the university locale, it facilitates the research. Community hospitals lack the sophisticated staffing and the university funding to undertake this type of research.

"But Garden City Hospital, because of its standing as a community facility. seeks to strengthen its ties with the community by offering programs that university centers, because of their size, are sometimes unable to undertake." Breakie says.

"For example, we provide 12,000 to 14,000 doses of methadone a month to area drug prevention clinics. We offer prenatal classes. a diabetes testing


Gas tax resumes down trend

Gasoline tax revenue in Michigan during September fell more than \$1.5 million below September a year ago, according to the Department of State Highways and Transportation.

September gas tax collections resumed the downward trend, broken only once this year, when August collections were up slightly over the previous August.

September collections are based on August gasoline sales, which totaled 392.6 million gallons. This was a 4.3 per cent decrease over sales for August 1973.

Wayne County studies expansion of '911'

A plan to include all cities and townships in Wayne County in the "911" emergency telephone dialing system is being studied by a special committee of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

Under the "911" system, residents dial only these three digits for assistance with any emergency police. fire or medical need. The calls are received by a central communications center where specially trained operators screen and then direct the calls to the proper agency.

The system is being used in the cities of Wayne. Detroit and Highland Park in Wayne County and Southfield in Oakland County. among other communities.

The idea has been studied by local overnments in Livonia. Westland and Garden City but met with the problem of different phone exchanges within a single community. Michigan Bell Telephone Co. has encountered that problem in Oakland County and is considering alternate solutions.

COMMISSIONERS Jarrette Simmons and George Killeen comprise a subcommittee of the county board's public safety and judiciary committee which is considering the feasibility of adopting a countywide emergency telephone system.

Killeen and Mrs. Simmons were among a group of county officials who recently inspected facilities of both the Detroit control center and the Genesee County headquarters in Flint.
