

Road patrol funding cut proposed

Canton and Plymouth townships may soon suffer a curtailment of police protection if the Wayne County Board of Commissioners has its way.

On Thursday of last week, the Ways and Means Committee of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners voted to fund the sheriff's operations in the townships for a full year. But the amount granted to the department for township patrols was reduced by 25 per cent from last year's \$470,000 to \$352,500.

At the same time, the Ways and Means Committee also decided to appoint a select subcommittee to study the problem further and develop recommendations on how to implement the activities of the road patrol in view of the cutback.

The subcommittee will report back to the board of commissioners no later than Dec. 31.

However, when the county budget was accepted by the county board two weeks ago, the commissioners "resolved not to cut back services to the townships."

"This is the crux of the matter," says Undersheriff Loren M. Pittman. "If the funding is reduced, how can we maintain protection for the townships without a cutback in service?"

The situation is not new, as the county has been trying to reduce service to the western parts of the county for the last four years.

In 1970, the board of commissioners determined that they no longer wanted to maintain protection for the townships. Consequently, they funded the police protection for nine months and

forced the township supervisors into complaining all summer before financing services for the last three months of the year. (Sept. 1- Dec. 31)

This August the supervisors didn't complain. Instead, they got a lawyer, Louis Wechsler, who filed for an injunction to prevent the county from withdrawing the sheriff's protection when funds expired at the end of August.

Wechsler went before Circuit Court Judge Thomas Foley and received the injunction on Aug. 28.

Five days later, the county allocated \$120,000 to the sheriff's department for the last three months.

But the seven supervisors (one each from Northville, Plymouth, Canton, Van Buren, Sumpter, Huron, and

Brownstown townships) were not satisfied.

They asked Wechsler to get a declaratory judgment from the court, which would in essence avoid a suit while getting a policy statement on the matter from the judge.

Attorneys for the county argue that there is no need for a declaratory judgment because the county has funded the sheriff's patrol. They contend the point is moot.

Wechsler's primary concern is the level of the funding for the patrol. The Wayne County Board of Commissioners agree that by law they must provide some protection to the outlying townships. It is a question of degree, and Wechsler wants the court to force the county to provide "a reasonable

level of service." He defines reasonable as no less than the current protection the townships receive.

Presently, the townships comprise a 200-square mile area. They are served by 28 Wayne County patrolmen. According to Undersheriff Pittman, they would like to keep four cars on the road during the day and a minimum of three at night. This is possible if the cars are manned by one officer during the day he claims.

However, due to sick leave, vacation and court time, this is not always possible. Admits Pittman, "Sometimes we only have two cars on the road."

The sheriff's department maintains a policy of "selective enforcement" by which they concentrate coverage

in areas hardest hit by crime historically. This way, they contend that they are able to do an adequate job.

Pittman claims that the department definitely would like to continue service to the townships. "We have a moral and legal obligation to the people," he explains. Like the townships, he remains apprehensive about the future after Thursday's meeting.

The problem is magnified for Plymouth and Canton because both areas defeated safety millages on Nov. 5. Should they suffer a reduction in service from the sheriff, it is not clear how and if they can bolster police protection.

For now, residents of Canton and Plymouth Townships will have to wait for the subcommittee's report or a court ruling.

Program would make elementary specialists

PLYMOUTH—Training each elementary teacher as a learning specialist—that's what Dr. James Leary envisions as a result of an in-service teaching program being studied as a joint venture by Plymouth, Northville and Novi schools.

The districts are studying a program developed by two English educators which would establish a teaching center.

According to board vice president Marda Benson, who is a member of the study committee, the center would serve as a base for in-service teaching, would offer alternative teaching methods and would serve as a clearing house for teaching materials.

"I'm highly enthusiastic about the program and think it would be the greatest thing for Plymouth," Mrs. Benson said.

Leary, assistant superintendent for curriculum, echoed Mrs. Benson, calling the program an "ideal set-up for promoting growth at the local level."

"We would start out by making a needs assessment," Leary said. "This would take place in an intensive summer workshop which would be followed by a program of carefully defined reinforcement so that the summer's work didn't fall by the wayside."

"We'd then be setting up workshops during and after school going from classroom to classroom until each teacher was a learning specialist."

Leary said that the districts will have to make a decision soon on whether to adopt the program in order to give the directors time to make arrangements.

"Right now the initial cost indication for hiring the directors and

clerical help would be \$50,000," he said.

The two, Gordon Hill and Malcolm McDonald, have worked together in workshops, in decentralization planning and for the Ford Foundation.

Hill is headmaster of a middle school and McDonald is a vice headmaster.

The districts must make a three year commitment to Hill and McDonald if they decide to implement the program.

According to Supt. John Hoben, the districts might be able to receive reimbursement from the state, county and federal governments.

"And we are thinking of possibly opening the program to teachers from other districts and charging them for the workshops."



'Winning' resolution prompts board debate

PLYMOUTH—What's more important—winning or how you play the game?

Apparently there are some differences of opinion in the Plymouth school board.

Over the objections of secretary Marcia Borowski and vice president Marda Benson, the board passed a resolution commending the Plymouth-Salem football team for "their outstanding season, not only in winning but in sportsmanship and for bringing recognition to the district."

The Rocks were undefeated this year and ranked first among Michigan high schools.

Mrs. Borowski, with support from Mrs. Benson, tried to amend the motion to include sending resolutions to all the district's teams telling them, "It's not whether you win or lose that counts but how you play the game."

The move to amend received no other support.

Trustee George Lawton, maker of the original motion, said he hoped that in the future the board would

pass a similar resolution for the Centennial Park band.

student in the district who plays a musical instrument," he said. His motion was approved 6-0 with Trustee Gary Mirto absent.

Counseling groups propose merger

PLYMOUTH—Two youth-oriented social agencies are planning to bridge the one city block that separates their facilities in a consolidation move.

Our House, a community crisis center and free medical clinic, and Plymouth Youth, Inc., which offers youth-oriented recreational programs, have agreed to the merger, according to directors of both, but fine details of the move have not yet been worked out.

"We're trying to centralize functions that are duplicated," explained Tom DeMott, director of Our House, 185 S. Harvey. "In the past, we've been seeing a good many of the same people they (Youth, Inc.) have. We'll be able to work with that kid all the way through now. That's the primary advantage I see—offering that comprehensive service, so a person doesn't have to go to a myriad of places to get what he needs."

Dale Yagiela, director of Youth, Inc., 271 S. Main St., sees the consolidation as a move benefiting the com-

munity and the two agencies.

"I think it will benefit the community, because it gives a broader base for involvement," Yagiela said. "It enables us to deal on a broader base with individuals."

"We also feel the consolidation will aid us in getting financial support from the community," he said. "In this community there's a lot of groups trying to raise money. It seems the larger units have more visibility, and it's easier to raise money. There's the potential to compete with Our House, but there's no need to."

AFTER THE MERGER, Yagiela hopes to expand the services currently offered by Youth, Inc. The center currently offers activities ranging from ping pong to pool to meeting places for art and photography clubs. Young persons are also encouraged to implement new projects.

On the drawing board, Yagiela said, is a tutoring center to help young persons in school and a job referral program, services which are currently offered on a limited basis.

Both Our House and Youth, Inc., face financial difficulties.

"The financial situation (at Youth, Inc.) has never been good," Yagiela said, "but we seem to find ways to continue on."

Funds are needed to pay salaries of Yagiela and a part-time employee and to cover the maintenance and utility costs of the rented building, owned by the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers.

Our House, which has for the past 18 months received 80 per cent of its funding from the National Institute for Drug Abuse, must now look elsewhere for financial assistance.

Our House dropped the grant in September, DeMott said, because of changed guidelines demanding that grant recipients be drug-oriented and counsel persons for long-term drug abuse problems.

But, DeMott said, only about 30 per cent of the problems the center encounters are drug-related. Two full time persons and trained volunteers counsel walk-in and telephone clients

for such problems as pregnancy and contemplated suicide.

OUR HOUSE also offers a free medical clinic, each Monday night, where a volunteer doctor and nurses test and treat patients for venereal disease.

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Vallier hits cities' apathy on transit

Arch Vallier, a Schoolcraft College trustee from Plymouth, suggested Friday that western Wayne County is being left out of mass transportation plans because of the apathy of municipal leaders.

Vallier, a member of the General Assembly of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) representing Schoolcraft, says he is miffed municipal leaders in this area have remained silent on SEMCOG's transit plan for 1990.

"Northwest Wayne County hasn't received anything in the plan, except for a token bus line," Vallier said. "In fact, when public hearings were held the meeting for western Wayne County was in Taylor. SEMCOG didn't see fit to schedule a hearing in our area — maybe because the plan had little to offer our residents."

VALLIER had protested to the general assembly before, but says a lone voice speaking as representative of a community college hasn't been effective. This weekend he was on the phone with city mayors pleading that they attend Thursday's general assembly meeting to unite and protest inadequate transit provisions for this area. The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. in the Northland Inn, Southfield.

On Thursday, the general assembly will hear a report on the results of public hearings held on the transit plan. "They'll probably hear a report that everything's rosy — but everything isn't rosy and our mayors ought to be there to say so."

"I just can't understand why our cities are so complacent about this area getting nothing in the way of transportation. They should be protesting loudly, but I haven't heard a whisper."

"The least SEMCOG could do is resurrect the old C&O railroad commuter line. But it won't do anything unless this area is heard from Thursday."

Schoolcraft 5th largest in county

Schoolcraft Community College ranks as the fifth largest institution of higher education in Wayne County and the eighth largest community college in the state, according to a newly published report of opening fall enrollments.

Enrollments, compiled by the Michigan Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers, of the 11 largest colleges in Wayne County are: Wayne State University, 33,032; Henry Ford Community College (HFCC), 14,162; Wayne County Community College (WCCC), 13,385; University of Detroit, 8,879; Schoolcraft College (SC), 6,992; University of Michigan-Dearborn, 3,970; Highland Park College, 3,432; Mercy, 1,926; Madonna, 1,399; Shaw, 1,233 and Marygrove with 1,049.

The 10 largest community colleges are: Macomb, 21,512; Oakland, 16,382; HFCC; WCCC; Lansing, 13,003; Mott, 9,917; Delta, 7,393; SCC; Jackson, 6,900 and Washtenaw, 5,216.

Enrollment tickets may be purchased in the lobby of the Administration Building, 5101 Evergreen at Ford from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays and until 5 p.m. on Fridays.

Spring semester classes will begin Feb. 3 and end June 4.

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She's a seamstress for dolls

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP—Mrs. Sharon VanDerGraaf of Plymouth Township will be loved by lots of children

this Christmas, although they won't know who she is. Mrs. VanDerGraaf makes clothing for dolls which will be

given to underprivileged children. She first got the idea when her 4-year-old daughter cried tears of joy

after opening a Christmas package containing a doll her daughter had so badly wanted. Mrs. VanDerGraaf thought it would be nice if an underprivileged child could shed these same kind of tears.

"I'm a softy," she said, "and I thought I'd enjoy doing it too."

In January of this year, she began collecting dolls from the Salvation Army, with a great amount of help coming from her mother who purchased most of the 100 dolls.

Mrs. VanDerGraaf noted that she spent on the average of three hours per doll. This included the scrubbing and cleaning of the dolls, the rolling and styling of their hair and the sewing of the clothes and shoes for each doll. Not all the dolls which she could have purchased could have been restored because of the lipstick and ink stains which marked some of the dolls, claimed Mrs. VanDerGraaf.

An outfit of blue denim trousers and a blue and white checked blouse was worn by a teenage doll with blond braids and typified a country girl. Another, dressed in an aqua chiffon gown, dramatized a fashion doll. Still another, cuddled in a baby pink bunting outfit, characterized a sleeping child.

All the clothes, from scraps of previous projects, or material given to her from friends, are machine sewn. The doll shoes, made of vinyl material, were made from a pattern her husband devised for her.

The 100 dolls were finished in seven months and were all she could handle

because of lack of space in their mobile home located in Plymouth Hills Mobile Home Park off of Ridge Road. Her husband, Bill, had stored some of the dolls at work.

"I had so much fun doing it; the dolls almost seem to acquire a personality of their own," she said.

The Goodfellows will distribute 50 of the dolls to underprivileged children, but the other 50 still need a charity service to distribute them.

Mrs. VanDerGraaf, who also sews clothes for her daughter and 8-year-old son, took four years of sewing in high school. Noting that she came

from a family of eight children, she said she learned and enjoyed to make her own clothes.

Aside from sewing, Mrs. VanDerGraaf crochets, babysits and teaches the art of quilting at the Busy Bee Craft Store located on Main Street in Plymouth.

Quilting is the creation of intricate designs using rolled strips of paper, yarn and a hat pin. Mrs. VanDerGraaf said her pride and joy is a flying balloon which hangs in her living room. It is made of yellow and orange paper strips and yarn and is set on a black background.

New supervisor says

Canton should rework zoning

CANTON—Increasing citizen input and controlling township growth were two of the mainstays of Robert Greenstein's campaign for his soon-to-be supervisor's job in the township.

And talking with him last week, Greenstein expanded on some of the ways he thinks his ideas can become realities.

"The first thing we have to do is hammer out a master land use plan and rework all of the zoning ordinances. We've got to change the direction of the growth that has taken place in the township.

WHEN HE TALKS about change, his main concern is the number of single family residential lots of 60-foot variety with an eye toward severely limiting future rezonings for multiple housing developments.

"We need to preserve more agricultural land and I think we can do that with a new zoning classification: industrial agriculture. This would place agriculture as the highest possible use of land as opposed to having it as a category that can be used as a land bank for future residential development."

Greenstein noted the zoning classification, if approved by the county and the rest of the township boards, would provide for assessments on farmland at the \$500 per acre mark, so the farmer would be able to economically keep his land in farming.

"The county would be willing to reduce the assessments on the property for a very simple reason: The money saved on not putting in roads and other facilities necessary for development, would more than make up for the loss in property tax revenue."

THE NEW supervisor's plan for increasing citizen input include some rather interesting innovations that might not set well with prospective developers.

"Right now procedures are oriented to suit the builders and developers' convenience. They should be oriented to protect the people; not suit the builders.

"We haven't had a great amount of citizen participation because of their lack of knowledge about items coming before the board."

He suggested a "zoning sign ordinance" in which the owner of a property who wishes a rezoning would be required to place a sign on the frontage of the property stating that the land is scheduled for rezoning, the date of the public hearing, and the name and phone number of the property owner "so that people can call the owner to voice their opinions about the rezoning."

"We could also use different cut-off dates for items appearing before the board. When we have items being placed on the agenda up until Friday before a Tuesday meeting, it's awfully difficult for board members or residents to put in the proper amount of time to consider the issue."

Greenstein's answer would be a cut-

off of from 11 to 14 days before the meeting, "except for emergency items."

Greenstein would also like to put the safety millage which was defeated last Tuesday, back on the ballot and do a better job of selling it to the voters.

"One of my pet projects will be to put the safety millage in front of the voters again and try to generate the proper amount of interest and support so the people will see the necessity. Our fire protection is grossly inadequate and we have no provisions for police protection.

"One thing that residents could be made aware of is that fire insurance rates are based on the availability of fire service. If the millage had passed, their insurance premiums could well have been adjusted downward."

LOOKING A little further ahead, Greenstein addressed himself to his political future.

"I didn't take this job for a lifetime career. I want to change the direction of this township and after that direction is firmly changed, when the laws and ordinances of this township are adopted to protect the people, then I can make decisions on whether I'm needed."

"I wouldn't call this a stepping stone, but perhaps a testing ground to see if I am effective in public service."

pregnancy and disseminate birth control products to women over 18.

"In the middle of our grant year, the government came in and said 'No, we don't want you to do it that way anymore,'" DeMott said. "We felt the new Institute guidelines were inappropriate to the needs of the people of Plymouth."

Denise Chandler, assistant director of Our House, added, "We'd have to concentrate our attention so much in the areas they wanted, that it wouldn't be feasible for us to get into other areas."

Our House has received a total of \$1,900 each year from the City of

Plymouth and Plymouth Township as well as individual contributions to finance salaries, rent and the cost of supplies.

DeMott said the center is searching for another grant to help finance Our House and Youth, Inc.

"I THINK the merger will help, because we'll be able to get a grant for the entire agency," he said.

In the meantime, Our House needs all the volunteer manpower and donated supplies it can get.

"We're always looking for volunteers," DeMott said. "Most are fairly young and tend to stay here about six months. The main thrust is to get

people to be paraprofessional counselors."

Our House currently employs about 35 volunteers, who have taken a training program at the center in drug, suicide, venereal disease and personal growth counseling, DeMott said. Patient advocates, who assist the doctor and nurses in the medical clinic, take an 80-hour medical assistance training program, in addition to the counseling training, from a certified nurse.

DeMott said the consolidation of the two agencies will probably be finalized by the end of this year.

Because of the success of the carry-out station, several more may be established next September, in various


parts of the downtown area.

It was by far the most successful barbecue since the event was started some years ago to purchase equipment for one of the city's playgrounds.




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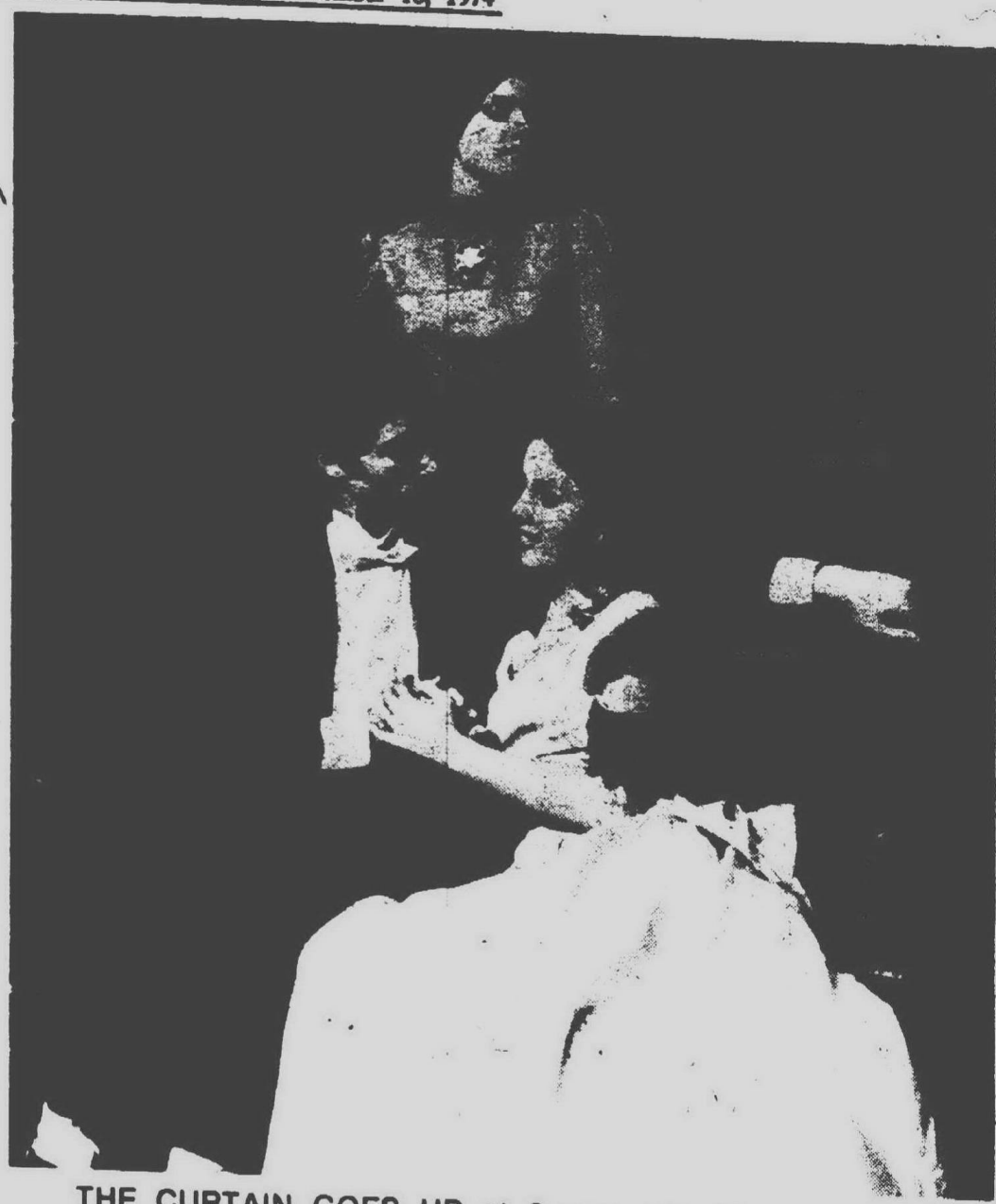
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Named to WSU team

He finds Detroit like Hong Kong

CANTON TOWNSHIP—Living in Detroit is a picnic? Well, not exactly, but if you ask Philip Ng (pronounced un), a student at Henry Ford Community College, it's no worse than home. Hong Kong is home for Ng and it appears that there is a great similarity between that metropolis and Detroit.
 Ng, who now lives in Canton Township, has been going to school here for three years, explains: "The transition to America from Hong Kong wasn't too hard. I came here right out of high school, but I had been in the English school system there for five years."
 The language proved to be no great problem even though his native tongue, Chinese, has no alphabet.
 When he got here in 1971 he enrolled in Cody High on the west side of Detroit where he freshened up his English. Then in the fall of 1973 he enrolled in HFCC where he is now a science major.
 Detroit held few surprises for the young man. Crime, dope and murder in the Motor City don't even rank with Hong Kong, he says. "Things were a lot worse in Hong Kong. It was a lot more crowded and the violence in Detroit isn't close to what it is at home," he says.
 Ng adds that there is a lot of American influence in Hong Kong. "I'm very westernized myself," he explains. His long hair and Levis suggest that is not far from the truth.
 Ng is 21 now, and his goals are not clear but he shows a quiet determination. "I wanted a college education most of all. Over there it would have been too hard. There are fewer schools and the competitive pressure is just too great."
 So Ng came to Michigan to stay with his sister Mrs. Leon Douglas, a naturalized citizen. Instead of going to Wayne State University as he had originally intended, he went to Henry Ford where he will finish his two years this spring.
 The future? Well Ng isn't too sure. He doesn't want to go back to Hong Kong and he's not positive he wants to stay in the states. He's thinking about attending optometry school in New York but money is becoming a problem.
 Ng has financed himself through school up to now, but he can no longer work in the states. The Department of Immigration has started to deny aliens work permits because of the rising unemployment among citizens.
 Oh yes, Ng has one other problem since coming to America—his name. It seems that everyone he meets wants to put a vowel in his name. Finally

Ng came up with a solution. "I tell them it's n as in nice and gas in guy. Now all my friends call me nice guy. No doubt in the future his friends will be calling nice guy—the optometrist."

Livonia chessmen rank third

LIVONIA—Livonia can claim the title of "Chess City, Michigan" and the number three ranking in the country.

The Livonia Chess Club has a membership of 150 and expects it to rise in the near future.

The club meets regularly in the Livonia Senior Citizens Activities Center at the civic center, Farmington near Five Mile.

The club hosted the opening recently of the new West Side League.

LOOKING OVER the boards at the opening league session, Stanley Hamilton, club president, confided that the club draws its members from many areas and all walks of life.

Among members are doctors, lawyers, industrial leaders, shop workers, who even have boards at the places of their employment and many others who are working on masters' degrees at college.

"We have an open membership," Hamilton stated, "and all chess players are welcome. Even those who want to learn the game are invited. We'll find a place for them."

Listed on the membership rolls are three chess masters: Paul Dupuis, Mark Pence and Leslie Simons — along with Dan Togasaki, a Japanese lad who holds the state junior championship.

THE CLUB sponsors the league as part of its activity.

This is considered unusual because most leagues are formed by promoters or directors. But the Livonia club took on the sponsorship of what is known as the West Side League and the league teams meet on the first Thursday of the month.

"The league helps to keep interest at a high pitch," Hamilton stated, "and it is an opportunity for our club to gain additional prestige."

Hamilton also explained that while the club has been going for 12 years, interest in the game started growing when Bobby Fischer won the world championship from Boris Spassky, a Russian, in their publicized title match a few years ago.

"We all watched that series with interest," Hamilton said, "and when Bobby won the victory seemed to lure many young people to the game."

He pointed around the room to the large number of young players engaged in matches.

"THESE YOUNG players are smart," he confided, "and are sharp as can be when seated at the boards."

To keep interest at a high peak, the members engage in "ladder" competition. Under this plan there is a struggle to climb the ladder.

To make it more unusual there are no divisions. This means the better players meet the others in a struggle for points and have what they term a circular top, so no one player is at the head of the list.

Aside from sponsoring league competition, the club also stages special events, the next of which will be Nov. 22 when the two masters—Pence and Simons—take on all comers in a simultaneous match.

Each of the masters will take on 40 players.

Later in the year the club also plans to have Paul Banko, a world master from Hungary, as an honored guest, although no date has been set.

Other officers of the club are: John Cielinski, vice president; Roger K. Beaton, secretary — treasurer, and two members large, Terry Griner, in charge of the West Side League, and Steve Andrews.

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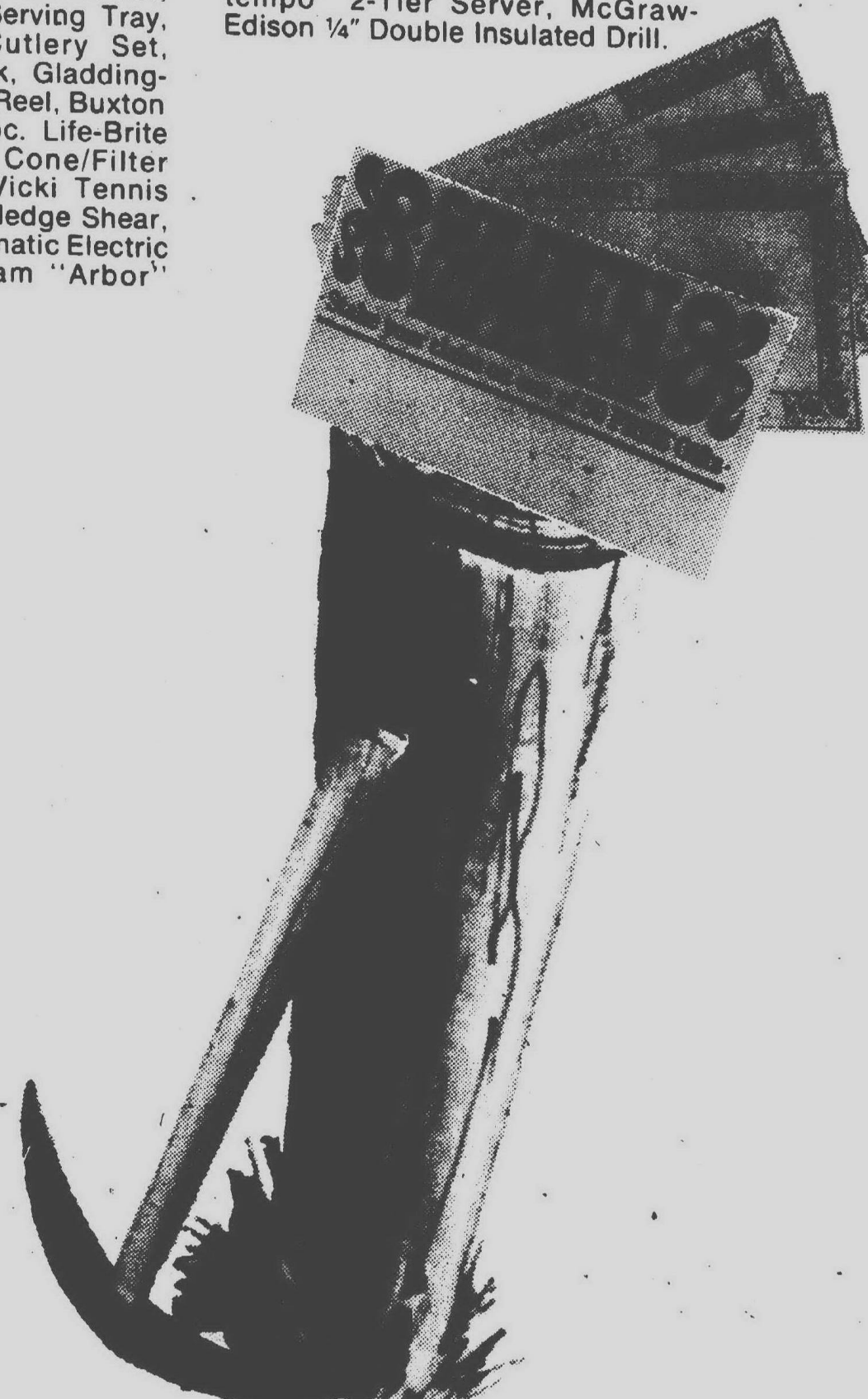

Township needs increased protection

Plymouth Township voters may think they saved themselves some money on Nov. 5 by rejecting the proposed three-mill police millage. But the action last Thursday of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners tentatively to cut back the Sheriff's Road Patrol funding for its coverage in the townships by one-fourth, could end up costing the taxpayers more than they bargained for.

At present, the county provides 28 men to cover seven townships and the State Police offer 12 or 13 men to cover three townships.

The most that means for Plymouth Township residents is two cars on the road. The least is none.

THE FACT that the state police are located in Plymouth Township increases the availability of a car when something happens, but the area covered by the state police includes everything in Canton, Northville and Plymouth townships. If the car is on Michigan Avenue, it takes more time to respond.

The situation with the sheriff's department is even less reliable with a maximum of four cars to cover everything from Brownstown Township near Flat Rock, up to Northville Township—a total of 200 square miles.

With the projected cutback (which is nothing new) of one-fourth of the funding, that service from the county would be still less reliable. Proposed FBI standards for "minimal" police

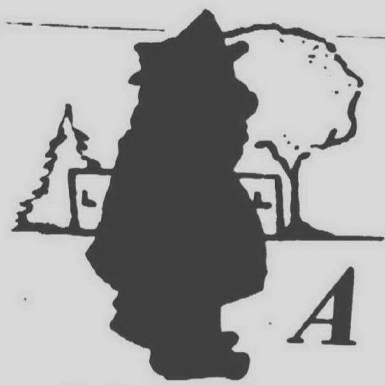
protection suggest one police officer for every 1,000 in population. With a population approaching the 20,000 mark, a force of 20 would seem appropriate. A rough estimate of the service the township can "count on" is about eight men, allowing for four from the county and four from the state police.

THAT PUTS the police protection of the residents in Plymouth Township at around one officer for every 2,500 residents—a condition which only welcomes crime and can hardly act as a deterrent.

We would urge that the township board consider going to the voters again with the question of providing funds for police protection. Passing the buck to the county may save money for the township now, but in the long run it will be the township's residents who suffer the losses without adequate police protection.

The cost of the millage, at the most, would have represented a \$60 increase in taxes on a \$40,000 home. While this is perhaps a little higher than the average home, that is roughly what the homeowner would have paid for a police force or police service double that which is currently provided.

While we cannot especially condone the action of the county board, we think it may help township residents to wake up to the hard fact that if they want to live in a safe community, they are going to have to provide the funds to pay for that safety themselves.

It matters not whether doctors, lawyers, engineers or industrial leaders are in the gathering, attention turns to the man who makes his living by placing one word after another in the public prints. He'll be bombarded with such sticklers as "Do you think we're licking inflation?" "Do you think Michigan can beat Ohio State and go to the Rose Bowl?" "Will the Lions make it to the playoffs?" "What's wrong with the Red Wings?" and "Do you think President Ford will run in 1976?"

After a while a fellow gets accustomed to this and takes the questions in stride. But the other evening The Stroller was handed a stickler by an unsuspecting friend.

We had been discussing the topics of the day when this chap turned and asked:

"In your long experience, what was the most unusual assignment you ever had and how did you fare with it?"

This was quite a question, but it didn't take The Stroller long to select the one that stands out in his memory even though it happened almost a half century ago.

It was back in the late '20s, shortly after he arrived in Detroit to join the Free Press sports staff. One evening the editor walked over to his desk and said very calmly, "I want you to cover the Port Huron-Mackinac sailing race next week." He didn't wait for any reaction.

FINE, EXCEPT THAT The Stroller never had seen a large sailboat and the nearest he had ever come to a boat was the old barges on the canal back home. He didn't know a schooner from a yawl or a ketch from a yacht, or even a cat boat.

So the next day he hustled out to the Bayview Yacht Club, sponsor of the race, and learned to identify the various craft.

Came the following Saturday and the start of the race. Through the kindness of Commodore "Gus" Schantz, the big Western States lake cruiser stopped at Port Huron early in the evening and took The Stroller aboard for the ride to the Mackinac Island harbor—site of the finish line.

The Stroller had managed to send his story of the race start to the Free Press and he was content to enjoy the evening on the big boat. But the joy turned to wonderment, then frustration, Sunday afternoon when he suddenly realized he was 200 miles ahead of the boats scattered out there on the

lake, and he didn't know which one was leading. What's more, all the families back in Detroit would be concerned about the welfare of their sail or husbands or boy friends and would depend on the Free Press to keep them posted.

Letter questions teacher transfer

EDITOR:

I am most concerned about the present problem in the fourth grade at Fiegel Elementary School. There is an excessive number of children in each of the fourth grade classes.

Apparently the school administration decided to regroup four classes of the fourth grade into three.

It seems that this decision was made because a teacher was taking a leave of absence in the second grade, and the administration did not wish to hire a replacement for that teacher. I assume this decision has been made in an attempt to save money. While such a motive is highly commendable it is my belief that such cost cutting efforts should not be made if such jeopardizes the quality of education of our schools.

Moreover it is my understanding that three other elementary schools were faced with similar problems but retained the same number of classroom teachers. If this is true the question then arises, why has Fiegel Ele-

mentary been treated differently?

A second question which needs an answer is, "What will happen to the children who are moving into the Fiegel attendance area who would be assigned to a fourth grade class?" If the administration intends on busing these children to another school, that solution is most unsatisfactory to both the children so effected and their families. If, on the other hand, it is the intention of the administration that these new youngsters will be added to the already bulging classrooms at Fiegel, that would be most unacceptable to everyone involved.

It is my opinion that the only viable solution to the class size problem at Fiegel Elementary is to reassign an additional teacher to the fourth grade and reorganize that grade into four classes. In this manner an adequate learning environment will be provided our children.

Antiquing to find hidden 'treasures'

If you happen to be an antique buff — and who isn't these days — there may be hidden treasures right in your suburban backyard, if you care to look.

Professional dealers feature every conceivable item from soup tureens to massive furniture pieces. Other supply outlets are estate and household sales, auctions, periodic antique shows, barn and yard sales.

There are decorators whose business is not only designing areas and selling ideas but acquiring furniture and accessories that harmonize with a given motif.

Birmingham resident Joan Jolgren of Creative Interiors runs a on-woman operation dedicated to

discriminating clients who yearn to exchange ho-hum settings for revitalized creative living.

AN INTERIOR design major, Mrs. Jolgren is a staunch advocate of quality, originality and authenticity.

Her home is her showcase. She has managed to keep it fluid and vibrant to match her personality by filling it with antiques purchased locally as well as objets d'art from Europe and the middle east where she travels extensively.

An English tea table and four Bentwood chairs in her dinette, are transplants from an area dealer.

They are highlighted by an overhanging Tiffany-style lamp in a

one-of-a-kind design that is the focal point of the room. A rug splashed with variegated color came from a Northwood Institute auction sale held at the Somerset Inn.

MRS. JOLGREN searches and researches, barter and bids, decides and creates. Then she comes up with settings like a stained bamboo corner chest accessorized with cast iron lamp and French Provincial wall clock, or a brightened pavilion table touched with clusters of dried floral arrangements.

For the amateur collector there can be personal gratification and a certain adventure in tracking down the unusual for hearth and home.

One Birmingham home owner who has amassed an entire household of elegant pieces thinks there is nothing as exciting as a find at a local estate or home sale.

Ten years of dedicated antiquing, museum-hopping, library research and lectures have prepared her for dressing her home with an enviable selection of originals and adaptations.

IN A CORNER living room setting are a Louis Quatarge-style desk with Windsor chair, samovar, music box, walnut chaise lounge and a fireplace grill circa 1847.

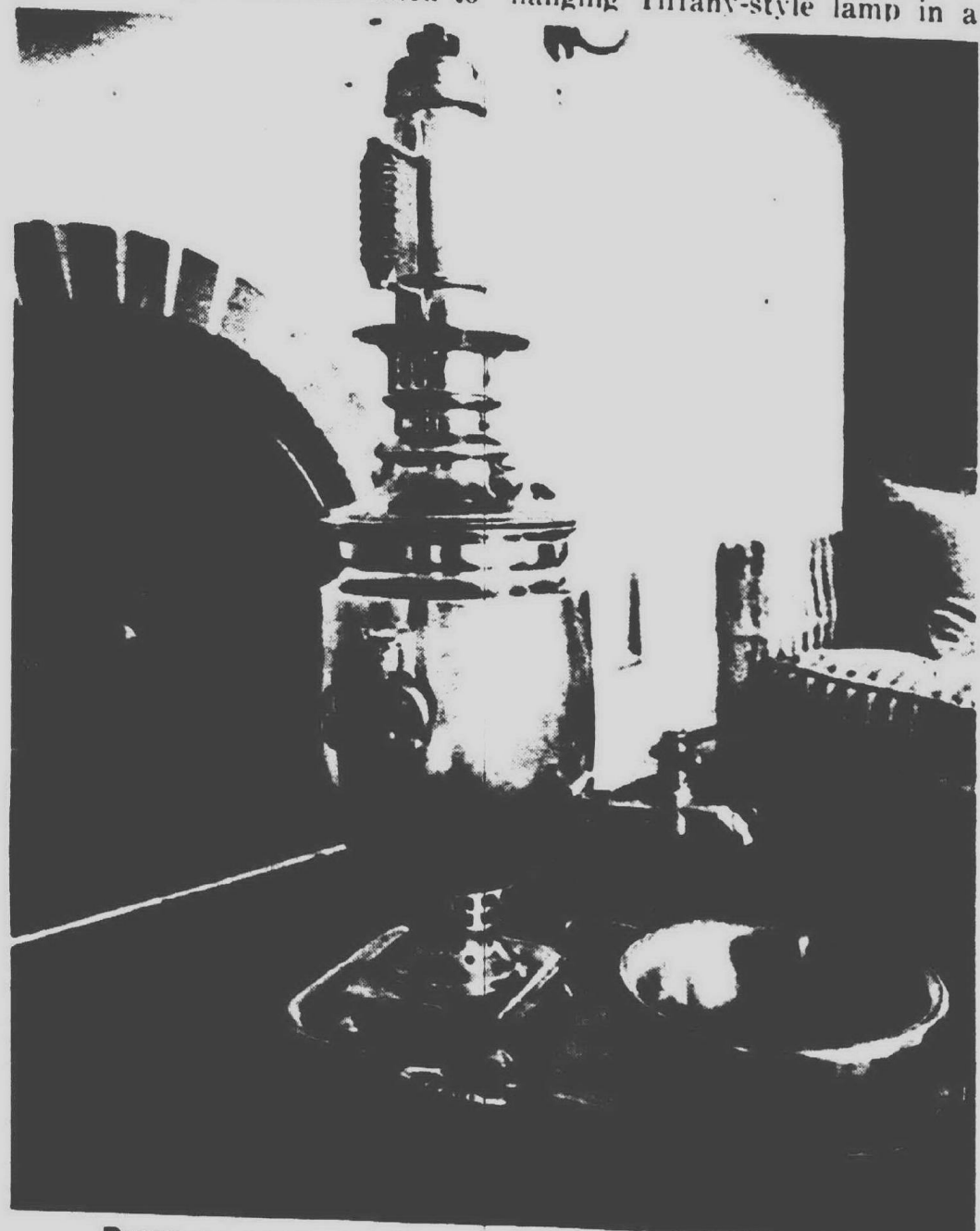
The brass samovar has Russian markings, a removable chimney and catch basin. It was purchased from a local decorator. Both the walnut music box and grill came from estate sales, and the chaise was discovered at a household showing. By removing a flounce and restoring the wood, the chaise was to become a treasure.

The desk, found in a barn at a country estate sale, is the most valuable piece in the home. Papers in a hidden drawer indicate that it is one of only 10 existing masterpieces of Charles Andre Bouille (1642-1732) whose designs epitomize the Louis Quatarge style of inlaid brass woven into slender wood pieces.

An exact replica is owned by Aristotle Onassis and was shown in Time magazine. Final verification of authenticity is currently under consideration at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

Memories of Thanksgiving--and turkey!

I remember...when I was a boy of seven in Detroit, anxiously awaiting the day when my grandmother and I would set out on an early morning sojourn for the big city on the DSR's chic Hamilton River line.

We traveled through that maze of soiled brick wall with glass windows ablaze, which reflected the fancy fa-

acades of neglected buildings and electric streetcars sizzling about the town. The bonging of the clock, in its vale of years striking noon, could only mean that it was time for lunch, usually at a Kresge counter with my all-time favorite: Apple dumplings with vanilla sauce.

I remember coming home from

school on a Wednesday noon, the smell of bread and the scent of cinnamon sugar baking in the oven.

"Hey, Mom," I said, "When I grow up, someday will you show me how to make pate-a-sucree? A dish very common in the Grech household with left over pie dough and sugar."

I REMEMBER the autumn harvest of leaves crisp piled high by my brother Ken into a fortress that I would soon plow through, knowing that I shall have to face the inevitable punishment from that six-foot-one all-American brute.

With all my childhood memories behind, I remember most of all Thanksgiving!

It was snowing that year and all my brothers and sisters were bundled up to motor down to the big parade in our 1936 Ford coupe with a rumble seat to boot. Leaving behind the seductive scent of turkey roasting with fresh apples, pears and onions and, of course, Mom, preparing a very special dinner, for her very special family, in her own special way.

Our house on Prest Street was of modest taste and the rooms were adequate for our family of six plus a cat called Ricky and my dog named Shep. We did not have a fireplace but the old European charm of my parents and the devoted love they had for their children gave off enough warmth and character to our house to last a lifetime.

IT WAS SURE a treat to come back through all the snow that had fallen during the day and transformed our street into a Christmas card of long ago and to see the holiday spread of hot cranberry crumb cakes, sweet potatoes a l'orange, whipped snowy potatoes wedged in creamy fondue butter. Boy, oh boy!

The piece de resistance centered in my Dad's place was roasted to a golden brown, sometimes overdone. But when you are seven going on eight, perfection of the bird isn't very important when pumpkin and mincemeat pie with that new squirtem stuff would soon follow. Yes, sir, I remember most of all, Thanksgiving!

TURKEY TIPS:

Raising turkey has become a big business and highly specialized. Most birds are fed on wheat, rice, corn, and soy which is the main reason they cost so much.

Hen turkeys weigh from 10 to 15 pounds. The Tom cock turkeys start at 16 pounds and can weigh up to 50 pounds.

He is too large to have any sort of relationship with a nearby hen so good ole Tom is artificially inseminated, says poultry expert and Michigan distributor Tinny Martin of McInerney-Miller Bros. Turkey poults are baby birds 18 weeks and under and are not usually considered for the table until they mature into a 22-week-old bird.

Most turkeys are brought into the city frozen. However, if you live near a poultry market and are willing to spend a few more cents for a fresh one, certainly it will be to your advantage, even though the frozen birds have come a long way in taste and texture.

Color of skin should be off-white. Roasting time: 10-15 pounds, 300 degrees, 20 minutes to a pound. 15-18 pounds, 300 degrees, 18 minutes to a pound.

18-20 pounds, 300 degrees, 15 minutes to a pound. 20-24 pounds, 300 degrees, 13 minutes to a pound.

METHOD:

Thaw and season with seasoned salt inside and outside. Stuff with your favorite dressing, then secure entrance in any fashion you so desire.

Place turkey in a shallow pan that has apples, white onions and pears (fresh) all cut up in large pieces. This prevents the bird from burning on the bottom and releases moisture and lots of flavor.

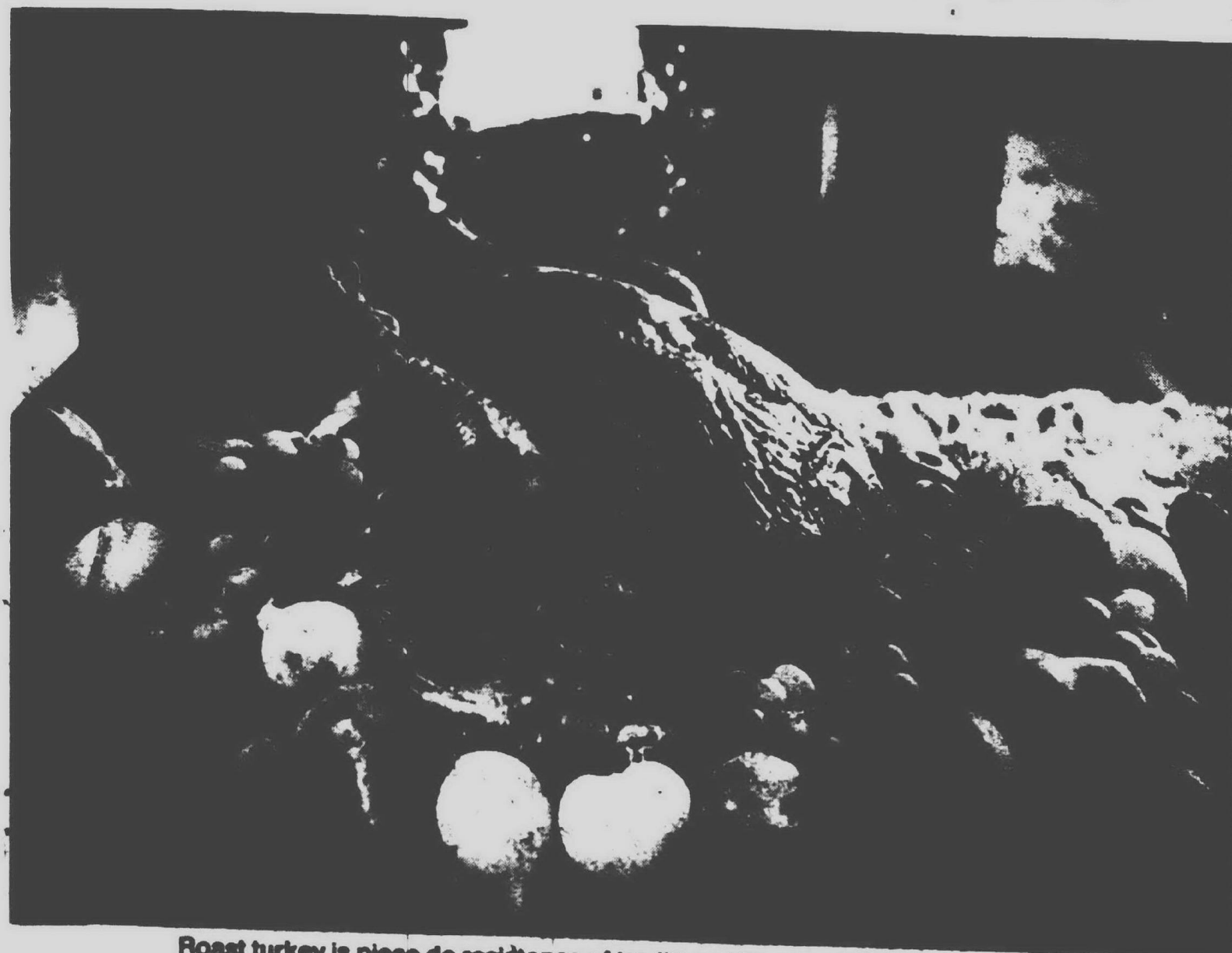
Place in the oven for desired baking time. The first half hour should be dry. Then add fondue butter (melted), and baste well. Continue this every half hour using the drippings until the turkey is done. Let the turkey sit 20 minutes before carving.

LA SAUCE

Remove bird from roasting pan, transfer fruit and drippings to a heavy sauce pan and whip to a puree. Add enough flour to absorb oil. It won't take much, a tablespoonful or so.

Add warm water. Boil for a few minutes until sauce thickens to a consistency of whipping cream unwhipped. Strain into another heavy pot, put on simmer, add a little caramel color. In a small bowl add: 1 egg yolk, 1/2 cup sour cream, 3 jiggers of brandy, stir. Then add 1/4 part hot mixture to liaison (a very chic term for gastronomy) and whip until smooth. Then pour into remaining hot liquid called a sauce.

Please do not call it gravy. It took too much of your time and deserves much more. Just before serving, whip 4 tablespoons sweet butter into La Sauce.

THE RESTAURANT has a sophisticated setting, with trees and skylights. Its menu is hearty, and there's a salad bar paired with a your-choice-of bread bar.

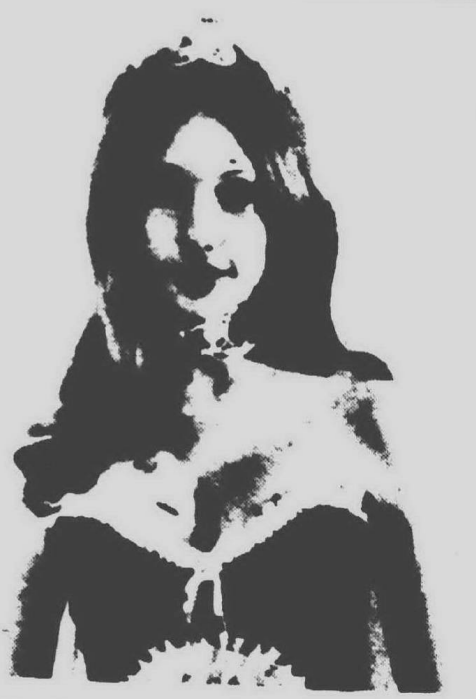

Other entrees at the picturesque dining spot, which has been drawing big crowds, range from Crabmeat Troy to Veal Piccata.

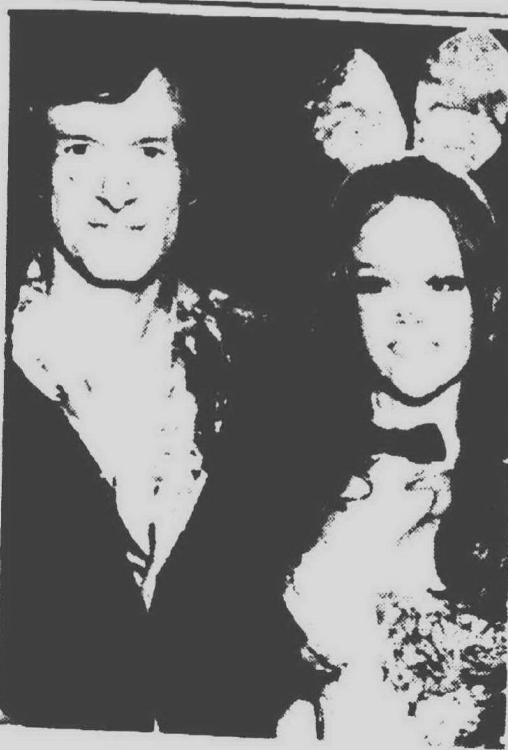

The new club sets a mood of intrigue, and that's not all bad. There are comfy sofas, mirrors, a combo to listen to, food and drink.

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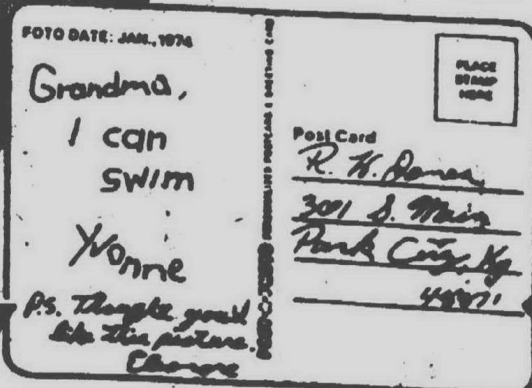
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Montreal—what has it got Detroit hasn't?

Detroiters should feel at home in Montreal. After all, both cities were founded by Frenchmen, both are located on the banks of great rivers and each has a population of 3.5 million or so.

There the similarities end.

While Detroit has tried and tried to become the host of the Olympic Games, it has never succeeded. Montreal has and will host them in 1976, an event all Canada is gearing up for.

Montreal also has what Detroit probably should have — an efficient mass transit system. Called the Metro after Paris' famous system, it was spurred into existence with the announcement that Montreal would be host to a world's fair — "Expo '67."

(TWENTY-SIX Expo pavilions remain open weekends from May 4 and then daily from June 15 through Labor Day.)

The Metro is a story in itself. It is a 16.1-mile system with 26 stations. The City of Paris gave Mon-

treau a gift of one of its famous wrought iron art nouveau Metro entrances for one station.

Plans for expansion will stretch its length to 42 miles.

Shopping-hungry visitors and natives have 500 boutiques and three major department stores from which to choose — and all are accessible from the Metro. So shopping sprees in the dead of winter (and Montreal winters get frigid) can be a warm experience.

THERE IS a splendid contrast

between the old and the new in Montreal. While there are your modern Monsieur Mufflers and Le Petite Colonels (the Kentucky Fried version . . .), there are also places where a man can have an entire wardrobe made to order for him and the ladies can have underwear similarly made to order.

Architecturally speaking, the time between the old and the new serves as one of the best living descriptions of the development of the art since the city was founded in 1642.

Decidedly French, the early architecture appears charming and geared to slow and elegant caleche (carriage) life. (Seen throughout the city, these horse-drawn carriages can be rented for about \$8 an hour.)

Oldest building in the city is the Sulpician Seminary on the Place d'Armes.

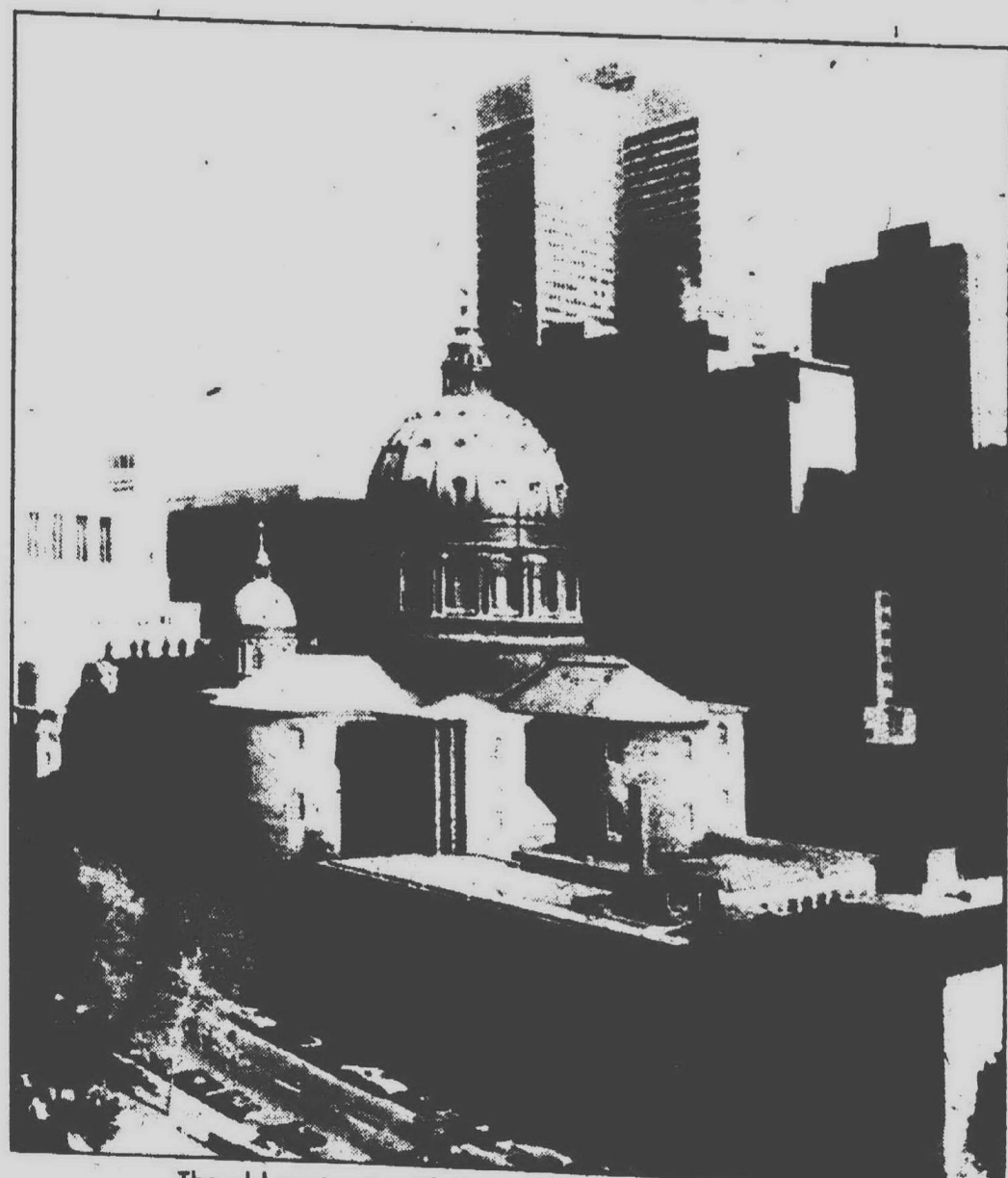
ALSO THERE is a magnificent church, Notre Dame de Bon Secours, on the same square. Still in the old city is the Place Jacques Cartier, a section noted for its intimate restaurants.

Les Ramparts, one of the oldest and most famous in the district, is named for the building in which it is housed.

Also interestingly situated is the restaurant Le Festin du Gouverneur in the old fort on Ile Sainte-Helene (the island named for Champlain's wife.)

Aperitifs are served in the fort's parade grounds after which guests are led into a grand stone hall for dinner and singing 1691 style.

DURING THE planning of Expo, it became apparent that the

City of Montreal would need an official reception hall and restaurant.

It acquired the Helene-de-Champlain restaurant, also on Ile Sainte-Helene, and turned it into a culinary experience for all the foreign visitors who arrived during the Expo year.

The restaurant is open to the public now. Diners are greeted by costumed servers, priceless contemporary and antique Aubusson

tapestries and an antique armoire used as a closet for coats.

IN A MORE contemporary vein, the architectural excellence of the Radio-Canada complex provides interesting contrast to the rest of the city.

Situated on 25 acres of land, it has a 23-story hexagonal office tower with pods of studios in a circle surrounding it.

While two languages, French and English, are the official languages of Montreal, Radio-Canada speaks in 14 different tongues.

All the people who speak these languages live around or near Mont Royal, the high hill from which the city derives its name.

THE PARK on Mont Royal was designed by Frederick Law Olmsted, the man who designed New York's Central Park. From the standpoint of landscape architecture it is wonderful, if you don't have acrophobia . . .

The tallest building in Montreal is the Stock Exchange which stands 50 stories. Besides the structure, one of the main attractions is its four-story \$225,000 chandelier.

A 'good cook' must experiment, says chef

Are you a good cook? You probably won't be until you learn to experiment.

Michael James, a professional chef from San Francisco, says, "Cooking can be as simple or complicated as you want it to be. At some point you have to try something new."

"What I teach is not being reliant on recipes. I never teach by a recipe. If the spinach is bad, and there's a good buy on artichokes, use that to stuff the chicken."

The soft-spoken James, who has

cooked as assistant to the great French chef Simone (Simca) Beck, believes, "When you've had disasters and successes you can branch out. A great talent to develop is not panicking when you have a disaster. Every chef does. That's how some great dishes come about."

JAMES AND his associate, Billy Cross, were in metropolitan Detroit for two weeks recently teaching sessions of week-long "dinner classes."

"You make a dinner and serve with a California wine," James explains the course.

The classes were held in an apartment kitchen in one of the twin North Park Towers in Southfield. The idea for the classes was suggested by a hairdresser who loaned her apartment.

She was the hairdresser in residence last month during sessions offered by Michael James' Cooks in California's wine country.

LOOKING BACK, James recalls, "This in the Napa Valley was the

most lavish cooking school ever held. It was a serious cooking school—cooking, living, eating together."

Simca, who was in retirement, came to teach.

"No one believed it would work," says James. "People came from all over. Texas and Connecticut and Detroit (including Carol Worsley from Birmingham)."

The recent cooking school here was adapted from the California classes.

James says he teaches a lot of Simca's cooking.

SOME OF THE dishes prepared in class were a cold chicken dish molded in lemon aspic, parsley boned and stuffed chicken en brochette, "Simca's glorious chocolate mousse called the Marquise," "her famous mayonnaise without egg—a low-cholesterol mayonnaise, potatoes baked in clarified butter, potatoes Anna, a hot lemon soufflé with cognac for dessert, and a 30-second omelet."

It is our feeling that before December 31st the prime should be out of the two figure range and continue its slide to approximately 8% by June 1975.

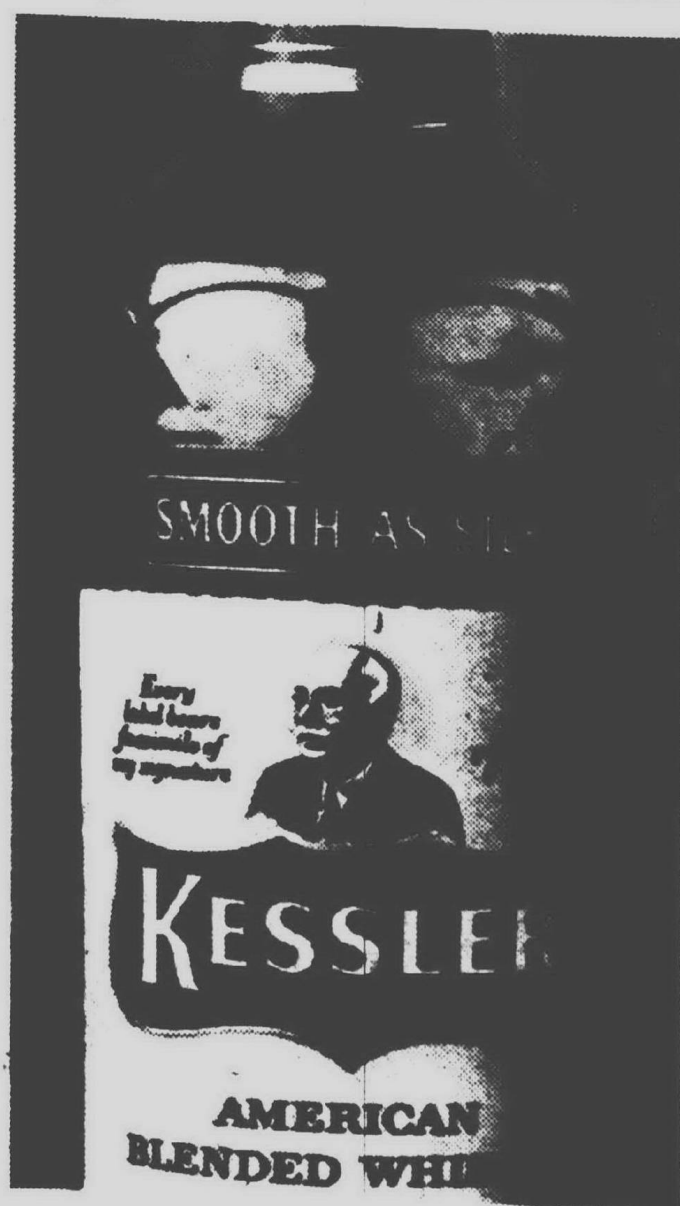
This has been the Bank's goal since mid-September when it became apparent that anti-inflationary activity was cooling the economy too fast. We feel the banks hold the catalytic power to support recovery if they are willing to "bite the bullet" and accept the first loss of income and again make borrowing attractive to stimulate the factors of production.

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A fireman's lot may be a domestic one

The family experts who these days are telling men there's nothing un-masculine about household tasks must realize our firemen are way ahead of their time.

For the guys who can leap off a fire engine while it's still moving are the very ones who regularly cook, clean and wash dishes at the fire station.

And when they've roared out of the station—in less than 60 seconds—and extinguished the blaze, it's not unusual to them to sit around and discuss their favorite recipes.

ELOQUENT IN SIMPLICITY is the way you'd describe those recipes. None of the teaspoon and a half of parsley powder stuff for these men. Ask them about their favorite stew and they tell you they "put in about two or three dollars' worth of ground chuck" and then "simmer until eaten up."

Their food is hearty and simple, and sometimes the cook is subject to heartbreak when the fire bell rings and the diners spring from the table, leaving the meal to grow cold.

"THE HOUSEKEEPING isn't so bad because everybody joins in," said Jim Vawter of the Redford Township Fire Department, who four years ago gave up working as a licensed electrician to become a fireman.

Vawter is a pipeman who helps carry the hose to the fire. He became a fireman because "I wanted to do something I liked."

"My favorite housekeeping job is cooking," he said. "I'm one of the two cooks here. We regard these jobs as part of the daily duty. They teach you to respect your firehouse."

Ed McVicar, for five years a fireman for the Redford department, puts kitchen duty at the bottom of his list of favorite jobs.

"But that doesn't include cooking." What he doesn't care for is the regular Tuesday job of cleaning the kitchen, taking apart the stove and cleaning the oven.

"We also take everything out of the refrigerator. Dishwashing can be tough because six or seven people eat here. The job I like best is cleaning the engine room floor."

"But we don't have any trouble with anyone about these jobs," he noted. "Nobody here looks on housekeeping as a woman's task."

EVERYBODY COOKS in the central station of the Westland Fire Department, even CPT Warren Robinson, who has been 30 years on the job. In mentioning his years of service the captain added, "I have been married 33 years but have lived with my wife only 15 years."

This statement proved to be a fireman joke based on the fireman's work schedule of 24 hours on duty followed by 24 hours off, followed by 24 on duty, and then three or four days off duty, depending on the department.

Robinson thinks 99 per cent of the firemen like this one-day off and one-day on schedule. "Most families find they can make it. In fact, in all the years I've been here, there haven't been more than three men who have left because of the schedule."

Nor does he think the firemen mind housekeeping chores.

"Every day the men make up their own beds with their own sheets and blankets. The following morning they strip down the bed to make way for the next man."

CHIEF ROBINSON noted there had been some inquiries from women lately about becoming fireman.

"I read where three women in New York fire departments complained about the combined sleeping quarters. But the judge told them they knew the deal when they started and would have to live with it."

"My favorite task is watching the other guys work," he laughed, adding a minute later that while firemen josh around a lot "we get very serious when the phone rings."

Firehouse stew plus five is one of the recipes favored by Robinson when he takes his turn at the stove.

"There is never any left, but then there's not much left whatever is cooked."

THE WESTLAND FIREMAN, coming on duty in the morning, gather around the kitchen table to discuss food plans for the day.

"A bowl of soup and a sandwich is the usual thing for lunch," the captain said.

The grocery shopping is done every day, with the fireman who does the honors keeping in touch with the station by walkie-talkie.

That may explain a mystery for employees of supermarkets near fire stations, not only in Westland but in other communities.

"Many a time," said Capt. Robinson, "a fireman has had to leave the grocery cart with the groceries in it. When he gets a call on the walkie-talkie, he has to run off to the fire, even though this means leaving a gallon of ice cream melting in the cart."

AT THE LIVONIA firehouse on Farmington Road, Tom Tokar is the main cook for a month at a time. He said the various firehouses in Livonia have reputations for specializing in different kinds of cooking.

"At headquarters there are the hamburger experts, and at Station Six they make a lot of kielbasa, stuffed peppers and pigs in blankets."

Tokar, who works on the emergency rescue truck, said "some days I feel like going out and making a big meal."

"We have two ragout and noodle experts here—Denny James and Bob Rynicki. They make the ragout and we put it on anything we have left in the refrigerator."

"We pay in \$3 a day for food per man. Somedays you eat good and sometimes average, depending on the manpower. If you have six people eating then you have more money to work with."

According to Tokar the junior man at the station has it the toughest as far as housekeeping goes.

"He's got to make the morning coffee, put up the flag, clean the lavatory and do dishes at noon and night, take the flag down and clean up the lounge."

TOM KEITH, at the same station thinks there is nothing to cleaning the refrigerator. "We just take out the food and clean it up," he said.

"That's how we find our leftovers," said Tokar.

The two men also reported an occasional lapse into kitchen horseplay. It

turns out the men who frequently deal with water in their working hours sometimes resort to pouring water on each other and chasing each other around the kitchen.

One of the favorite meals of the the group is Tom Keith's meatloaf. They also enjoy a special hamburger called a ghoulerberger by Tokar.

Made by the "Gold Dust twins" (James and Rynicki), the ghoulerberger is a summer day treat cooked outdoors which is a meal in itself. It consists of a half a pound of hamburger with a big slice of onion.

"It takes four hands to handle a ghoulerberger," claimed Tokar, which may account for its name.

As for the other housekeeping duties around the firehouse, from washing windows inside and out to cleaning all the apparatus, it is all part of the job to both Keith and Tokar.

"It's what you're getting paid for," said Tokar, "and it helps to make the day go fast."

OUTSIDE THE GARDEN CITY Fire Department, tomatoes, beans, corn and peppers are flourished last summer in a garden maintained by the firemen.

"You should have come when we were canning," said Robert Lepak, who has been with the department a little more than a year. "We put up 41 quarts of tomatoes and three quarts of tomato juice."

Jerry Mellon added: "We put 20 bags of our corn into the freezer and Chuck Robertson put in 10 bags of green peppers. We still have more tomatoes. Today I'm going to use some of the beans in bean soup."

Mellon said they try to keep their menus simple "because around here the cook has to leave on fire and rescue calls."

The Garden City men receive a food allowance and chip in if necessary.

"HOUSEWORK IS PART of the job and we accept it," said Richard Sajewski, who added that "it is a fantastic job — the best in the world."

"It is exciting and educational. We learn about people, everyday living, and communication."

"We hate to do dishes around here but we do them," said Lee Ashley, on

his way out with a bag of garbage. "I like to cook," he declared. "I make stuffed cabbage, pork chops and chipped beef on toast."

"We eat pretty simply," said Sajewski. "Sometime on somebody's birthday we plan a fancy dinner. But we are often called out in the middle of it."

Ashley believes "fires seem to know when we are cooking steaks because we often get interrupted."

Sajewski pointed out he dislikes stripping floors and waxing them but likes cutting grass. Ashley was not exactly wild about window washing. But both were proud of the looks of their kitchen.

"Housewives are usually impressed when they come in," said Ashley.

LT. PAUL SANDERS, who for 19 years has worked for the Plymouth Fire Department, confessed he was a failure as a window washer.

"I always streaked the windows," he said. "However, I liked the cooking — I cook quite a lot at home."

He thought the men didn't much mind their household chores.

"They complain a little but I always said that when a guy bitches, he's happy. When he doesn't, he isn't."

The men at Station One live in quarters attached to Plymouth City Hall. There, in addition to the big room for the pumper, the ladder truck and the emergency truck, there is a room for sleeping and another for cooking and eating.

BOB DEGAN, official cook for that Plymouth firehouse, likes his job and might be a real gourmet cook except for an unfortunate incident he'll describe at the drop of a firehat.

Seems he decided to make bread, and had the dough mixed and rising in a pan on top of the stove when a general alarm sounded.

When our promising chef returned, his dough had overflowed its pan and was dripping noisily onto the warm stove.

And in the doorway stood members of the Plymouth police department, housed in the same building, who had heard the strange sounds. They had come with guns because they were sure some strange animal was loose in the building.



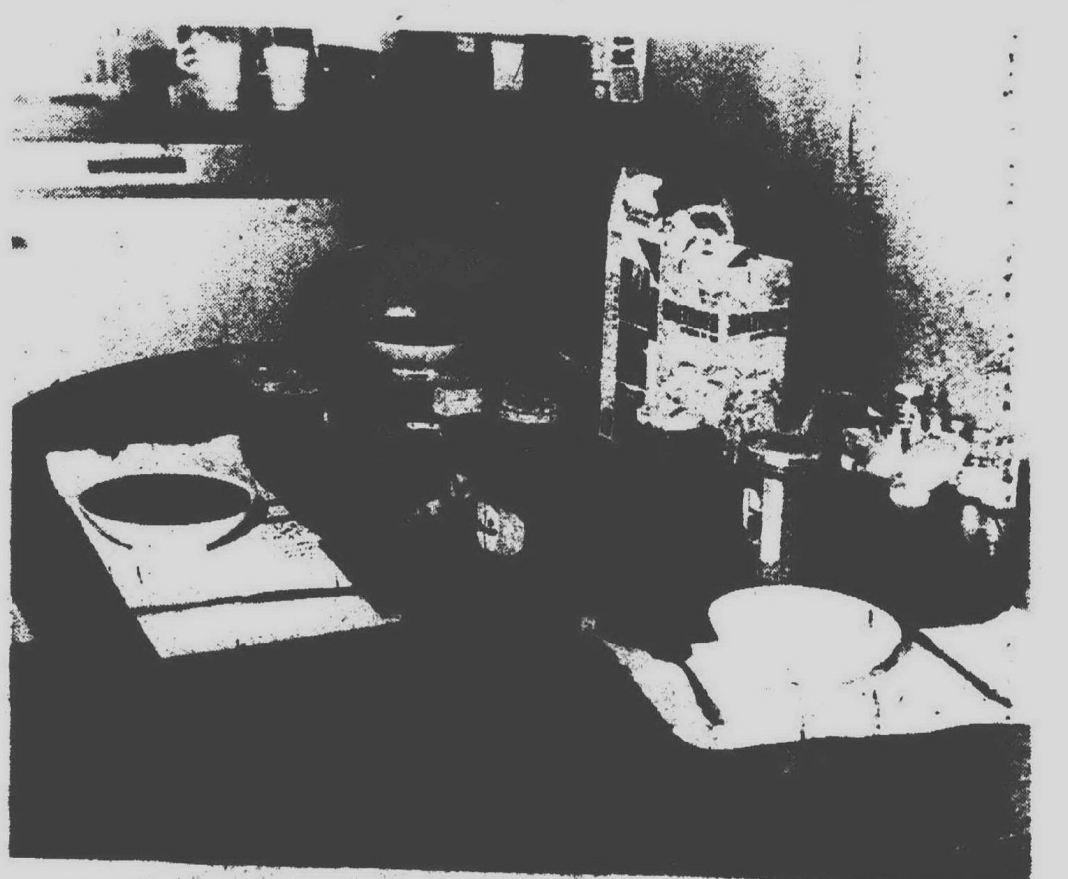

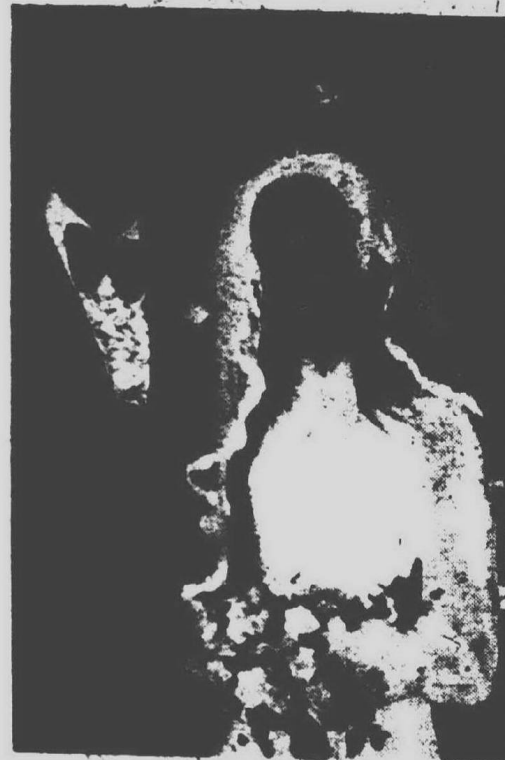

'Two Gentlemen' offers basic but amusing Shakespearian play

To love or not to love, that's the question Shakespeare poses in his whimsical comedy, "The Two Gentlemen of Verona," presented by the National Shakespeare Company (NSC) as a part of Schoolcraft College's Cultural and Public Affairs Series.

For the audience it was a question of what actors were portraying Shakespeare's starstruck lovers as a printer's deadline left the viewers without a program.

While certainly not one of Shakespeare's best, Two Gentlemen offers the audience, who may not be well versed in the Bard, the chance to see why his work has lasted through the years.

As usual the plot is complicated as the tale of two friends, Proteus and Valentine, one of who embraces love and the other who rejects it.

Not only did NSC offer the audience one of the basic Shakespeare comedies but gave it quite a lesson on Shakespearean acting. And at the same time threw in for good measure a few of the more modern techniques from slapstick to melodrama.

S. Lockhart Fryer gave us a Proteus who was a mellow lover and a cunning betrayer of friendship while Mark Blum offered a skillful rendition of Valentine, the late-blooming lover.

Two Gentlemen is a perfect play for offering some of the history behind Shakespeare's writing. The NCS stuck with Shakespeare with the early scenes intended to amuse the groundlings and maintained a script of double meanings, a classic Shakespeare invention.

Actors doubled as propmen and the Bard himself sat on stage to signal the entrance of actors and the changes of scene. Perhaps the biggest change NCS offered us was in delivering a limp-wristed lover of Silvia in the person of Ronald Klein portraying Thurio.

For more serious Shakespeare you may want to travel to Stratford but for an introduction which touched all the bases catching the NCS is well worth the price.

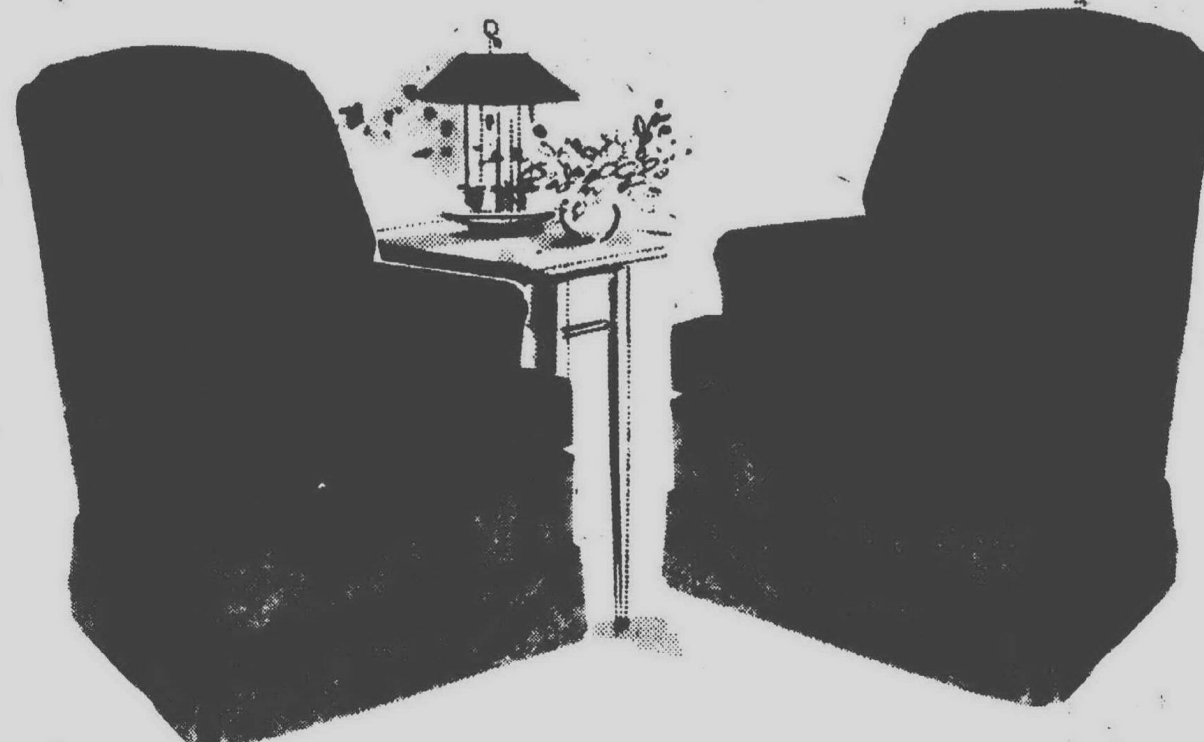

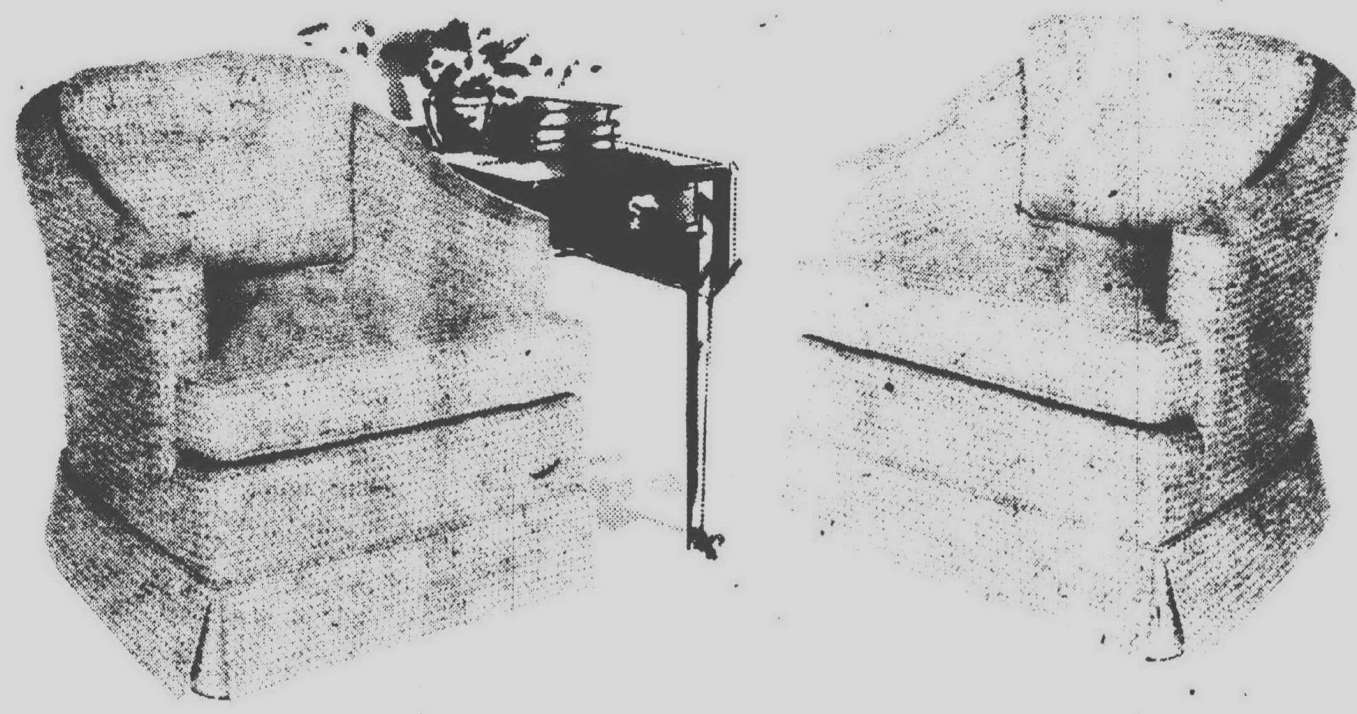
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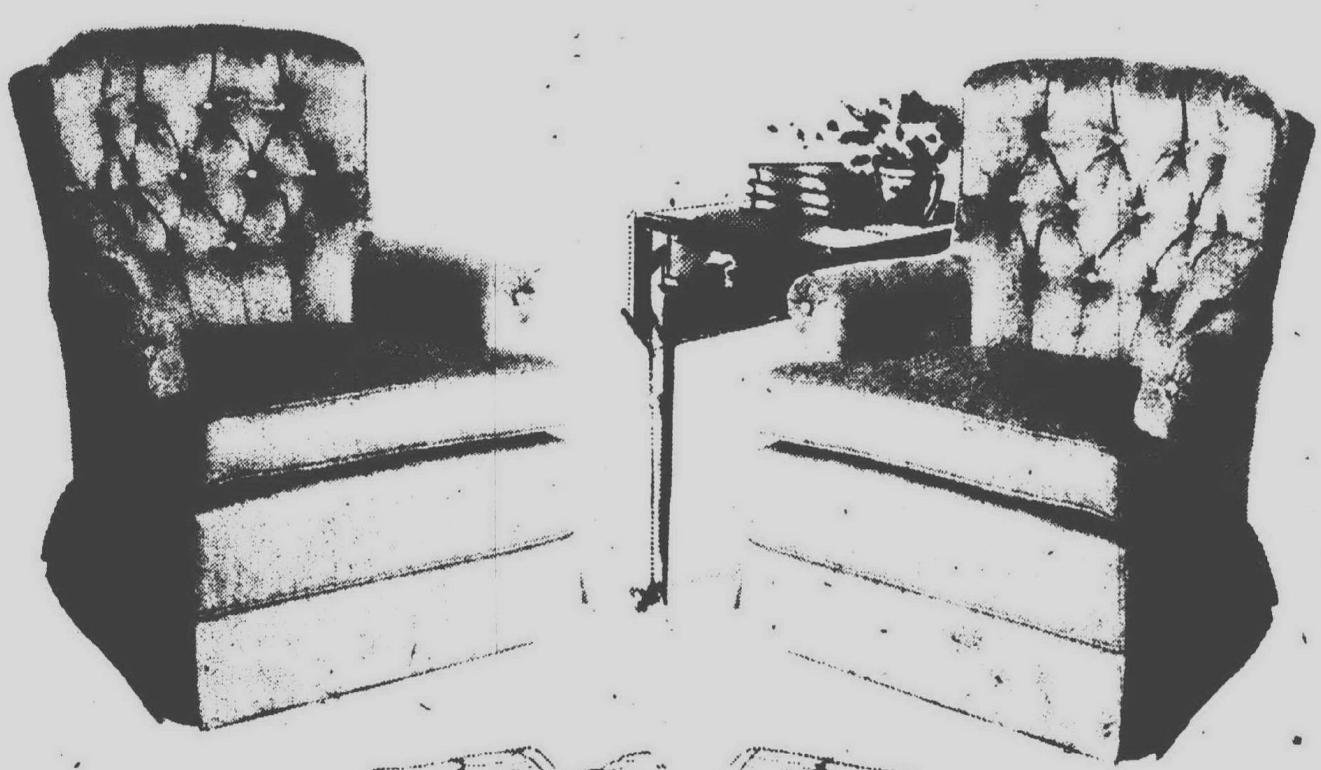

Engineers received an average salary offer of \$12,287 per year, while business administration graduates received an average of \$10,753 and liberal arts grads, \$10,400.

Electrical engineers report the highest average offer of \$12,688. This reflects a change from December 1973 figures which show mechanical engineers receiving the highest average offering of \$12,240.

For 1974 mechanical engineers, the average is \$12,120, and industrial and systems engineers report an average of \$12,000.

AVERAGE SALARIES offered to 1974 graduates in all fields are up over those offered in 1973.

December 1973 engineering graduates were offered an overall average of \$11,718; business administration, \$10,401 and liberal arts, \$10,400.

UM-D graduates compare favorably in terms of salary with college students across the nation. The 1973-74 national average for engineering is

\$11,863; for business administration, \$9,980 and for liberal arts, \$9,372.

OU does not guarantee enrollees will pass the state examinations. Any enrollee who fails to pass may repeat the review in January at no charge.

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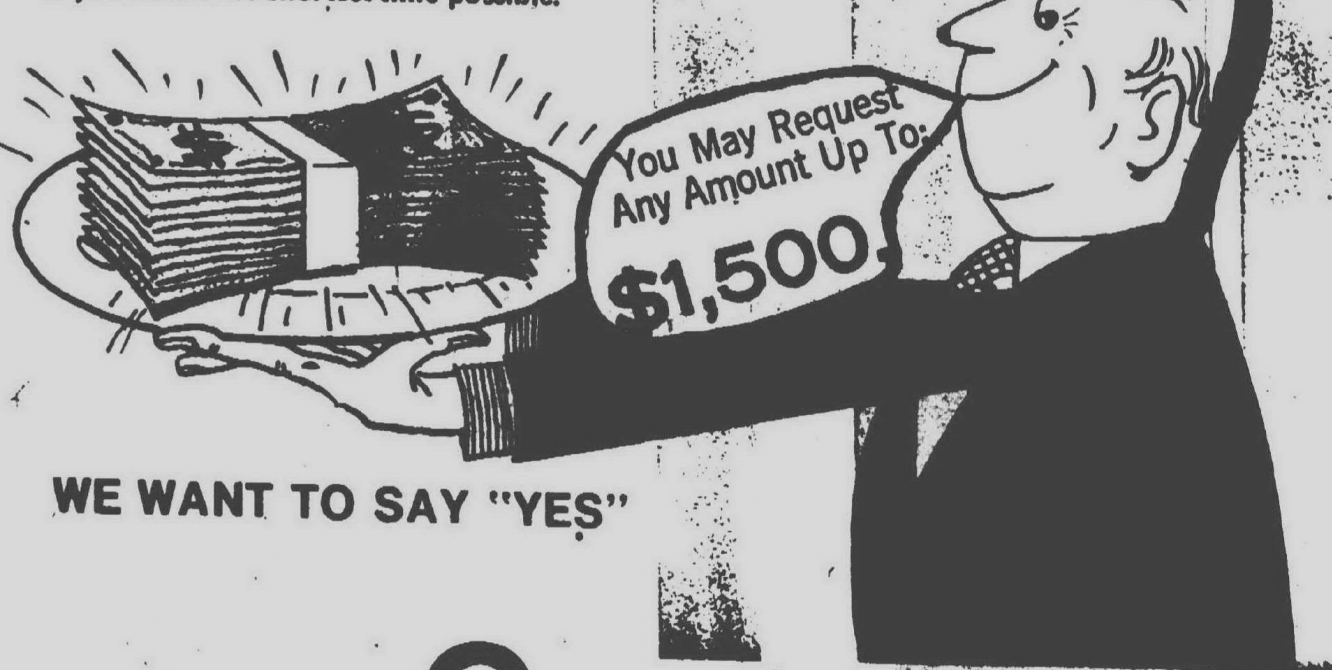

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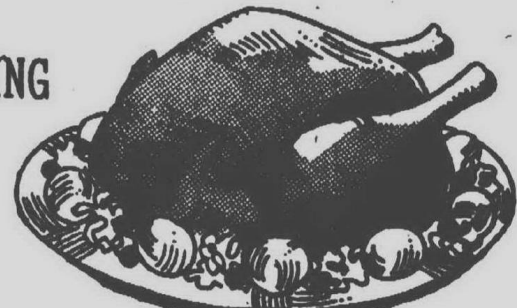
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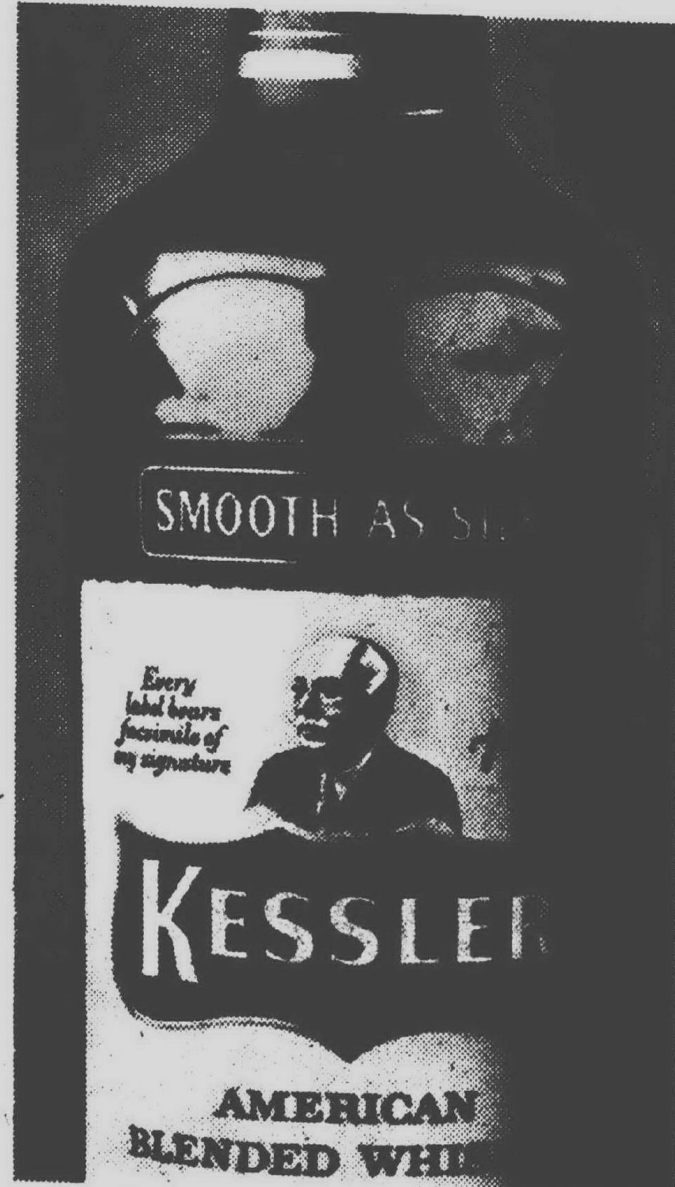
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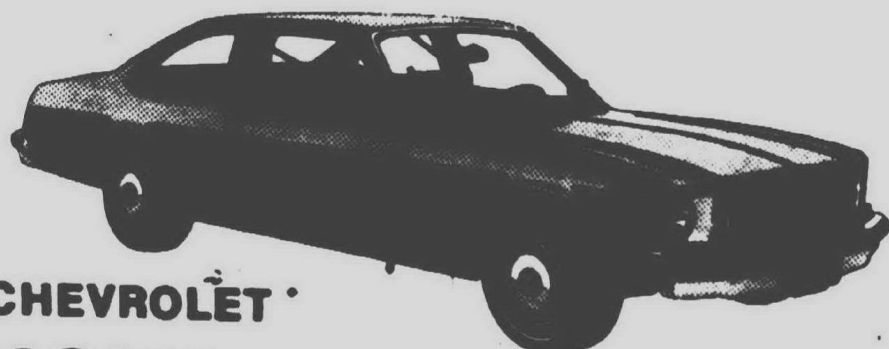
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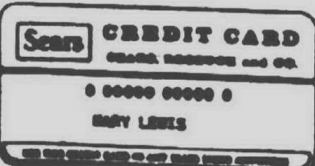
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Stevenson gals win 14th

'Our Eddie' makes Hall of Fame

W.W. Edgar, dean of the editorial staff of the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers, will receive a birthday present Wednesday... one day after his 77th celebration but it could well be one of the happiest moments of his lengthy newspaper career.

"Eddie" is one of three residents of the circulation area of the Observer & Eccentric who will be inducted into the Michigan Amateur Hall of Fame Wednesday in a dinner presentation program at the Warren Chateau, 6015 E. 10 Mile Road in Warren.

A total of 24, representing 14 sports, will be taken into the Hall of Fame. The list is headed by the late H.G. Salsinger, longtime sports editor of the Detroit News.

The others from the Observer & Eccentric area are: Byron Krieger of Southfield and Michael Ilitch of Bloomfield Hills.

Edgar, who carries card No. 1 in the Michigan chapter of the Baseball Writers of America, was sports editor

of the Free Press and started that newspaper's track and field program and the Golden Gloves boxing tournaments that developed Joe Louis in the early '30s.

Later, as Michigan moderator of bowling, Edgar inaugurated a high school and junior bowling program that since has spread across the nation.

Ilitch was best known for his promotion and sponsorship of amateur baseball, softball, handball and hockey activities.

Krieger, a high ranking official in the district offices of the Internal Revenue Service, was long one of the outstanding fencers in the Midwest. He was a member of the 1952 U.S. Olympic team and is honored for his numerous victories in 20 years of competition as a player and coach.

Byron was a member of the 1957 national fencing championship team and has won 34 national and state titles during his long career.

Charley Justice of Detroit, generally considered the brightest star in local softball history and one of the all-time national greats, was slated for induction but died last week at his home after a long illness.

Others scheduled for honors are: the late James Standish Jr. and Charles Kocsis of Royal Oak, in golf; Mary Hernandez of St. Clair Shores, and Edward and Inez Frazier of Detroit, for tennis; Olga Madar, Detroit, for her contributions to softball; Dave Sayne of Allen Park, softball.

Others are Doris Travani Mulligan, Detroit, in cycling; Clair Young, Detroit, cycling; Ollie Craven, Flint, bowling; Chuck Burns, Detroit, table tennis; Al Arbury, Grosse Pointe Park, rowing; Nap Ross, Westland, and the late Frank Palmara of Wyandotte, baseball; the late John Short and John Colin Snedded, Detroit, lawn bowling; James Tennant, Wyandotte, water polo; and Tom Syme, Warren, soccer.

Northville fights Shirley on dates

Making good on his threat to take Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley to court because he failed to give Northville Downs any summer harness racing dates in 1975, John J. Carlo, executive manager of the track, and Northville Downs has filed suit in the Michigan Court of Appeals in Lansing seeking an order for a summer meeting next year.

In announcing the harness racing dates in mid-October, Shirley awarded the much sought summer nights to Hazel Park and Wolverine

Raceray and gave Northville Downs 83 nights in the winter beginning on Jan. 1.

The suit, filed by Arthur G. Brauer, a Detroit attorney acting for Northville Downs, charges the commissioner was arbitrary and unreasonable in not allotting summer dates to the Downs.

THE PETITION and brief alleged there are substantial reasons why Northville should have 54 nights of summer racing. It further charged the reason given by the commissioner for eliminating summer dates to the suburban half-mile plant is not sufficient to justify his decision.

The suit points out that Northville Downs pioneered night pari-mutuel betting harness racing in 1944 and has a tradition of 30 years of summer racing. It is an established race track licensee with the right to equal consideration by the commissioner.

Northville Downs charges the commissioner arbitrarily reduced its summer dates from 54 to 36 in 1971, then down to 24 in 1974 and now to zero in 1975. It charges such action constitutes a piecemeal and now complete revocation of Northville's race meet license.

THE SUIT claims the commissioner failed to consider the \$9.5 million investment in the track or the recently completed \$3.5 million improvement program or the financial damage that will result to Northville Downs and the City of Northville if the commissioner's action is allowed to stand.

It says that meetings between Northville Downs and the commissioner and others in 1968 resulted in the multi-million dollar expansion program which included a costly air conditioning unit for the clubhouse and grandstand. It states the commissioner not only knew of the expansion program but urged and encouraged it—even requested it—and promised not to alter Northville's 54 summer dates if the expansion plans were carried out.

The suit charges that in carrying out his desire to race Hazel Park and Wolverine Raceway back-to-back in the summer, the commissioner is unreasonably and unnecessarily damaging Northville Downs.

It also challenges the commissioner's announcement that the elimination of Northville Downs from summer dates was commanded by a 1974 legislative act. Northville says the same act was passed last year (1973) and declared unconstitutional by Attorney General Frank Kelley and this new act is not different and will also be found illegal.

Brauer indicated the City of Northville will be asking the court for permission to file a brief in support of the Northville Downs law suit.

Turf Tips, Quips

We wonder how long it will take area thoroughbred tracks to realize that neither of the plants is actually set up to take care of winter racing as it should be.

We are referring to the comfort of the patrons, who after all, are the ones who pay the freight and keep the track operating. For instance, Hazel Park has the thoroughbreds going at the present time and one wonders just how long the average racing fan will put up with improperly heated grandstands and clubhouse.

It seems like someone is stealing when a customer pays \$3 for entrance into the clubhouse and then has to stand around in the cold to watch the races. At the Hazel Park clubhouse there isn't any way for those on first level (not the ground level) to view the races except on the closed television circuits. It isn't possible to walk out to a spot where one can actually watch the progress of the races.

That first level is enclosed but very poorly heated with the result that most of the customers are gathered under heaters near one of the tv sets. That isn't our idea of giving the fans some value for their \$3.

The story is much the same at Wolverine where customers are given some heat but if they want to see the races they have to go out in the cold or stand under a tv set.

Hazel Park does have a chance to make one improvement that will meet with the approval of fans, employees and those at the concession stands. That is to glass enclose, heat and air condition the Roaring 20s area.

This is popular with patrons since it gives them a chance to watch the progress of the race and an opportunity to reach the betting ring in a few strides. It probably is the most convenient area in the entire plant and one that should be improved as soon as possible.

It isn't much fun to be standing in the Roaring 20s as many have done in the past two weekends when the weather is cold outside and just as cold inside.

It appears to us that Detroit area tracks could take a few tips from the

large Canadian thoroughbred plants in the Toronto area. There, the customers have all the comforts of home and they enjoy the races.

The thoroughbred track managements should take a good look at their plants and seek out things that need improved rather than have the public complain.

The thoroughbred tracks started it and now President and General Manager Ms. Annette Rakietan, of Jackson-Northville, is continuing it. She has made arrangements for a series of lessons and instructions for newcomers to harness racing on Tuesday mornings at Northville Downs.

The lessons will be taught by Driver-Trainer Bobby Conn and will consist of instructions on how to read a program, how to enjoy the races, what is the difference between a pacer and trotter, how to make a wager and then a tour of the barn area to meet many of the drivers and trainers and watch them go through their morning chores.

Ms. Rakietan, thus is following in the footsteps of her late father, Leon A. Slavin who died in September, in doing everything possible to create more interest in the sport.

She also plans to continue the annual Thanksgiving Day dinner at the track with a special serving for the track colony early in the afternoon at reasonable prices.

There will be a complete buffet spread in the early evening for patrons in the grandstand with all tables

cleared away well in advance of the appearance of horses for the first race.

Thus Nanette is continuing the policies of her father. He was a go-getter from the opening word and his daughter is rapidly picking up that same knowledge.

Livonia auto dealer Bill Brown has one of the top contenders in the pacing series now underway at the Jackson meeting. The pacer Erlanas Valley has won each of the first two legs and could go all the way.

The Royal Valley speedster seems to reach top form at the Jackson-Northville meet and was one of the leading contenders in the rich series last year.

The teams which represent approximately 80 high schools will be di-

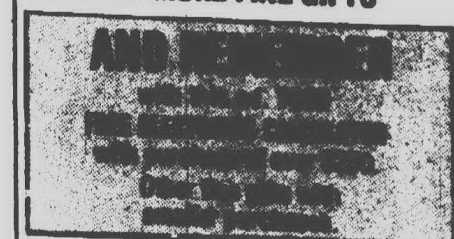
vided into two tiers for tournament classification purposes with a special committee placing the teams in one of the two based on hockey experience.

The finals will be held as a single session doubleheader, with tier one playing at 3 p.m. and tier two at 5 p.m. at Yost.

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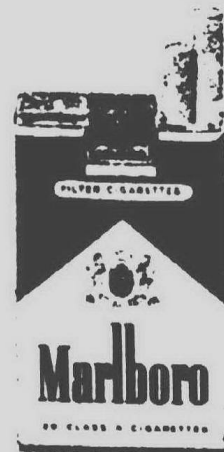

Senate Dems select Faust 2nd in command

Sen. William Faust (D-Westland) has been selected by his colleagues for the second command position among Senate Democrats for the coming term.

Faust, whose 13th District includes Westland, Garden City and Canton Township, will be assistant Senate leader under Sen. William Fitzgerald of Detroit.

The Westland Senator started as a journalist in western Wayne County, and served as Nankin Township (now Westland) Supervisor before being elected to the Senate.

Republicans in the Senate and Democrats in the House are expected to elect their leaders sometime this week. Committee chairmanships are also expected to be decided this week.

OTHER SENATE Democratic leaders elected were:

Daniel Cooper of Oak Park, Senate floor leader; John Bowman of Rose-

ville, president pro tem; Basil Brown of Highland Park, majority whip; and John E. McCauley of Grosse Ile, caucus chairman.

The House GOP has picked Dennis O. Cawthorne, 34, of Manistee, as its leader. Other Republican leaders picked were: John Mowat Jr. of Adrian, assistant leader; William R. Bryant Jr. of Grosse Pointe Farms, floor leader; James E. Delfabaugh of Birmingham, assistant floor leader; Harry Gast Jr. of St. Joseph, caucus chairman; George A. Prescott of Tawas City, assistant caucus chairman; and Dan Angel of Marshall, Republican whip.

Those choices came as a mild disappointment for Rep. Thomas Brown (D-Westland), whose 37th District includes part of Canton Township. Brown was unsuccessful in a bid for chairman of the House Democratic Caucus.

Rep. John Markes (D-Westland),

whose 36th District also includes part of Livonia, said he wasn't seeking any leadership positions this term but is content to remain on those committees in which he has an interest. Markes is interested in becoming chairman of the House Policy Committee, on which he now serves as vice-chairman.

KEN. CARL PURSELL (R-Plymouth), whose 14th District includes Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Livonia, Redford Township and a small part of Westland, is seen by many as a contender for a Republican Senate leadership post.

He improved his chances by pulling off a wide victory margin in an election which saw many traditional GOP areas swamped by Democrats.

Not only did Pursell buck the trend, but received 62 per cent of the vote in his district which political observers rated as a 50-50 toss up.

SEN. WILLIAM FAUST

Pursell won with a solid majority in Redford Township, primarily a Democratic area, and in other areas gained 75 per cent of the vote.

Area scouts begin metro clothing drive

A "Good Turn" clothing drive will be held Nov. 23-Dec. 7. The drive is sponsored by the Detroit Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America to provide training and employment for handicapped men and women at Goodwill Industries.

Considered to be one of the largest one-day collection drives ever attempted, the drive will cover all of Wayne County, southern Oakland and southern Macomb counties.

About 400 scout troops will participate involving an estimated 15,000 scouts, scout leaders, other volunteer workers and cub scout packs, in many of the areas.

Starting Saturday, Nov. 23, scouts will deliver clothing bags to 300,000 homes in the metropolitan area. Householders are asked to fill the bags with repairable clothing, shoes and other small articles which can be repaired by the handicapped workers

at the Goodwill Industries Division of League for the Handicapped.

Scouts will return to collect filled bags on Saturday, Dec. 7. Householders are asked to have filled bags on front porches by 10 a.m.

A total of about 50 trucks will be involved in the drive including the entire Goodwill fleet and about 40 trucks loaned for the day by trucking and industrial firms. Drivers will include

members of the Teamsters' union locals in the area.

Goodwill Industries, one of the largest agencies devoted to vocational rehabilitation and employment of the handicapped, provides work for about 200 handicapped employees through collection, repair and sale of discarded articles. Sales are made through 10 retail stores located in the metropolitan area.

Hilbert, Smith named to national health posts

Two Wayne County officials have been elected to top posts in national health organizations.

Morton S. Hilbert, member of the Wayne County Planning Commission, is the new president-elect of the American Public Health Association (APHA).

Symuel H. Smith, executive director of Wayne County General Hospital, has been elected to the Governing Council of the Public General Hospital Section of the American Hospital Association.

The 50,000-member APHA elected Hilbert, during its national conference in New Orleans recently.

HILBERT has held the health seat on the county planning commission since 1967. A former Wayne County health department official, he presently is chairman of the Department

of Environmental and Industrial Health at the University of Michigan School of Public Health.

Smith was elected to the governing council of the AHA's public hospital section by council members. The section's executive director described Smith's election as "an overwhelming expression of confidence."

Smith was appointed executive director of Wayne County General Hospital in September as part of a long-range effort by county commissioners to modernize and improve the hospital. He formerly headed one of New York 19 city hospitals.

3 men take food honors

Three men in Schoolcraft College's culinary arts department have earned special certification by the American Culinary Federation.

Robert Breithaupt, director of culinary arts and food service, has been certified as an executive master chef. He is the only Michigan chef to achieve the rank, and one of just six in the nation.

Richard Benson and James VanVuren, both instructors at Schoolcraft, have been certified as executive chefs. They are among seven in Michigan and 124 in the nation.

Persons qualifying for certification must have 10 years experience in the field and meet judging criteria. Certification entitles them to use the initials "CEMC" and "CEC" after their names as evidence of professional attainment.

Chefs Breithaupt and VanVuren have been at Schoolcraft since 1966. Chef Benson joined the staff a year later.
