Officials breathe easier after Washington trip

Smiles, optimism, and (maybe) money resulted from the Washington trip Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein and Plymouth Mayor Beverly McAninch took Wednesday (April 23).

Greenstein and McAninch were a group of five Wayne County supervisors and mayors who journeyed to the nation's capital with a handful of questions about the federally-funded block grant program, in which their communities are tentatively enrolled.

They talked with congressmen Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor), William Ford (D-Taylor), John Dingell (D-Dearborn), Lucien Nedzi (D-Detroit) and David Meeker, an assistant secretary of the department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and director of the block grant program.

"The answers we got were more satisfactory than we had even hoped for," said Greenstein. "We had a multitude of questions from our sister townships and the results we got were very pleasing."

McANINCH added: "I am most happy with the answers we got. There were an awful lot of bad comments before the trip and I am pleased to report that we got a lot of good comments."

"We were reassured, particularly by Meeker, that no community would be any more restricted by accepting the block grant money than they were when they accepted CETA funds and money from revenue sharing."

McAninch said the actual contract for the grant would be between Wayne County and HUD. "The county would be liable if anything were to go wrong and there's no way they could share that liability with us."

Plymouth, Canton and Plymouth townships are among 19 communities vying for the federal money. They have joined in an application with the county for the funds, currently estimated at about \$700,000. Plymouth and the two townships stand to receive \$33,000 apiece if they choose to remain in the program.

CANTON and the City of Plymouth have signed a cooperative agreement with the county and have until May 15 to back out, while Plymouth Township officials have been waiting for the results of the Washington trip before making any decisions about formally joining in the application.

The questions McAninch and Greenstein posed to federal officials concerned control of housing and the grant money. There was some trepidation over who would administer the funds, and what would be required of communities accepting funds.

Other fears concerned the relationship between first year grants and later monies, and who would have responsibility for enforcing EPA requirements.

"We discovered there were no hidden zombies or tricks in the closet," said Greenstein. "HUD is making a sincere attempt to help those commu-

Symphony band bound for Lansing

CANTON— The Plymouth Centennial Educational Park Symphony Band will add another honorary performance to its resume next Wednesday, when it treks to Lansing for one of the highest honors ever bestowed upon a Michigan band.

The 92-member group will perform April 10 before Gov. William Milliken and other top state officials at the third annual Michigan Governor's Concert in the Lansing Civic Center.

Before staging the performance at 8 p.m., band members will meet Michigan legislators and attend a banquet in their honor where each will receive the Governor's Medal.

"We're deeply honored and flattered, and we look forward to it with great anticipation," said band director James Griffith. "This is an extremely proud and happy moment for us."

The Plymouth Symphony Band was selected from more than 500 high school bands in Michigan on the basis of an audition tape recording and letter relating its background.

The selection committee which judged the tapes included such music educators as Kenneth Bloomquist of Michigan State University; Norman Dietz, Central Michigan University; Gene Salamony, president of the Michigan State Band and Orchestra Association; Frank Mills, director of the Saginaw Community Youth Band; and Edward Downing, director of the Ann Arbor Huron High School Band.

But Wednesday's performance will

not be the first honor bestowed on the Plymouth band.

THE BAND participated at the Orange Bowl Parade at Miami, Fla. this year as well as the 1973 Tournament of Roses Parade at Pasadena, Calif. and the 1973 J.L. Hudson Thanksgiving Parade in Detroit.

The band presented the finale concert of the 23rd Annual National Mid-West Band and Orchestra Clinic at Chicago in 1969 and presented a clinic concert for the 3rd Annual Contemporary Music Festival, sponsored by Western Michigan University, in 1971. In 1972, the band presented the final concert at the 16th annual Conductor's Conference, sponsored by the University of Southern Mississippi, at Hattiesburg, Miss.

The band has received 26 first-division class AA ratings in district and state festival competitions since 1959 and has presented five solo post-game shows in the University of Michigan stadium since 1965.

WHAT MAKES a high school band so outstanding?

"The kids really work hard," said Griffith, "and we have a lot of parental support. We have a great middle school music program, and many of the students study privately."

The band learned of its newest honor about a month ago, Griffith said, and has been preparing ever since.

On the program for next week's performance are the "Purple Carnival March" by H. Alford; "Punichinello"

by A. Reed; "Prologue to Elsinore and the Court of Claudius" from music for "Hamlet"; "Buglers Holiday" by L. Anderson; "Mass and Aztec Dance" from "La Fiesta Mexicana" by H. Owen Reed; "Rag" from "Suite of Old American Dances" by R. R. Bennett; "Tambour" by Cavez and Werle; "Glory of the Yankee Navy March" by Sous; and "Broadway Curtain Time" by Krance.

The Governor's Concert is sponsored by McDonald Restaurants of Michigan, which feels outstanding high school bands should be honored and allowed to give command performances for the highest office in the state.

The Saginaw Community Youth Band lauded the Governor's Concert program in 1973, and the Ann Arbor Huron High School performed in 1974.

Suburban leaders force water rate change

DETROIT—An effort begun Feb. 28 by Livonia Mayor Edward McNamara, and aided by other suburban officials, finally had its impact on the Detroit Board of Water Commissioners.

It was Feb. 28 when McNamara called representatives of Western Wayne County suburbs to Livonia to urge them to band together in opposing what appeared would be a 35 per cent increase in suburban water rates.

A subsequent meeting was held in Southfield when suburban elected officials met with Detroit Mayor Coleman Young, who promised at that time suburban water rates would remain unchanged.

After that meeting, Young ordered Ernest Cedroni, director of the Detroit Water Department, to reconsider

the proposed rate increase. The matter then appeared settled.

THURSDAY NIGHT, however, the water board voted to rescind the water rate increase but the matter remains unsettled.

Before the water board met an opinion was issued by Assistant Corporation Counsel Darryl F. Alexander that the final decision on a water rate increase was up to the Detroit Common Council.

It had been assumed the water board had sole authority to set rates, but Alexander's legal opinion is that the new Detroit City Charter makes the Common Council sole arbiter of the rates.

CEDRONI later included the increase in a budget approved by four members of the water board within minutes after their suburban counter-

parts had left a meeting April 21.

But McNamara got quick revenge only three days after the four Detroit commissioners approved the rate hike, which would be passed on to the suburbs, dependent on the Detroit Water System.

In a bitter three-hour meeting April 24, McNamara, Oakland County's John Lamerato and Macomb's Willard Back barely gave Cedroni a chance to defend the rate increase as they argued his recently-approved budget point-for-point.

McNamara asked Cedroni why he brought a budget back to the board with a water and sewer rate increase when the budget formerly approved by the board, including McNamara and the suburban representatives, contained no water rate increase and showed a \$1.6 million surplus.

Lamerato wanted to have the resolution containing approval of the water rate increase, and passed in his absence, read to him. He was told minutes of the April 21 meeting were not ready but the rate hike was passed and public hearings would be held "concurrent" with the increase.

Back, McNamara and Lamerato were incensed because the four Detroit members had approved a five-year water rate plan that seemed to only increase the water department's surplus of funds.

"Did the Detroit commissioners meet with Mayor Young before they approved the water-sewer rate hike?" asked McNamara.

"No," replied Carrie Thompson, president of the board of commissioners, "but some of Young's staff had met with the Detroit commissioners."

"Was the meeting publicized?" asked McNamara. "I don't know," replied Miss Thompson.

"At the Monday morning meeting with Young, was the rate increase discussed?" asked Back. "Yes," replied Cedroni. "Then why," asked Back, "were the suburban commissioners not given that information before our meeting Monday at 2:30 p.m.?" "I don't know," answered Cedroni.

"The meeting with Young was not a formal meeting," said Miss Thompson. "We didn't agree to anything."

Technicality nearly defeats suburbs' fight in rate battle

DETROIT—Livonia Mayor Edward McNamara got what he wanted—the Detroit Board of Water Commissioners rescinded its earlier approval of increased water rates—but only after a heated three-hour meeting, the conclusion of which was almost spoiled by Robert's "Rules of Order."

Angry because he and two other suburban representatives had been left out of the voting that raised water rates to Detroit and the suburbs April 21, Macomb County's Willard Back opened a special meeting April 24 by demanding that the board follow parliamentary procedure using Robert's "Rules of Order" as a reference.

Board President Carrie Thompson called for a vote on the matter, but it

"I heard Young supported a 30 per cent increase because he had additional information that convinced him of the need for the increase," said Back. Miss Thompson insisted that "nothing had been decided beforehand."

CEDRONI TRIED to continue his presentation to the board, insisting "the sewage fund is in trouble and the water fund is in trouble. We need revenues this year or we are actually broke."

"Your records show an \$8.8 million

surplus, don't they?" asked Lamerato. Instead of answering, Cedroni contended the rate increase to Detroiters and to the suburbs was "not significant."

Commissioner Charles Beckham, who had moved for passage of a water rate increase at the April 21 meeting, said he had worded his motion to get additional information.

McNamara then attempted to rescind the motion to increase sewer rates but was defeated, with the four

Schoolcraft trustees settle membership issue

The Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees again voted down a proposal to place an advisory vote on the July 9 ballot to obtain voter preferences on the composition of the board.

Trustee Nancie Blatt April 23 proposed that the question on the election of trustees (at-large or by district) and the number of trustees (seven or nine) be put to district voters, who will also vote to fill a seat on the board vacated by Trustee John LaRue.

Trustee Ron Cowden will seek reelection to the board, which is now composed of eight members.

MRS. BLATT'S motion was supported by Trustee Gerald Cox, but went down by a vote of 4-2. Five votes are required for passage.

Voting for the advisory question were Mrs. Blatt, Cox, and trustees Paul Kadish and Rosina Raymond.

Trustees Cowden and Leroy Bennett voted against it.

The same proposal went down to defeat a week earlier, at a special meeting of the board.

Cowden said he could see no reason to place the proposal before voters, when the board did not see fit to ask voter advice on a millage increase.

Mrs. Raymond replied: "There is a difference between an advisory vote and a matter of policy."

Cox, who voted for the advisory question, stated: "The more we get the interests of the people, the better."

Bennett said he was surprised at the turnaround in board sentiment since the matter of a seven or nine member composition was last discussed.

"We seemed agreed that we wanted seven. Now I find that this has changed," said Bennett.

The board was not in total agreement on whether the Legislature would take the district voters' wishes seriously, even if an advisory vote were taken.

The Legislature has the final word on how the board is to be composed, though it is assumed the feelings of board members would be considered.

IN OTHER business: •The board

was told by Ed McNally, vice-president for student affairs, that 20 graduating students were informed by letter that they would be required to pay outstanding traffic fines before they could graduate. Staff members were informed, too. •A petroleum technology course is among several new offerings being considered for the 1976-77 school year. Others are an emergency medical technology course and an auto body and collision technology course. •Applications for admission to the college are up, compared to spring and summer, 1974. For the spring session this year 606 persons applied and 490 were accepted. Last spring 480 applied and 374 were accepted. For the summer session, 88 have applied this year and 39 have been accepted. Last summer, 51 applied and 22 were accepted. •The board approved the installation of a traffic light on Haggerty at the south entrance-exit to the south parking lot because of frequent accidents there.

•Trustee Kadish was chosen to represent the college at a meeting of the Association of Community College Trustees May 22-24 in Milwaukee.

•The board accepted a gift of \$4,660 worth of engines and carburetors from Cadillac Division, General Motors. The equipment will be used in the auto service and management courses.

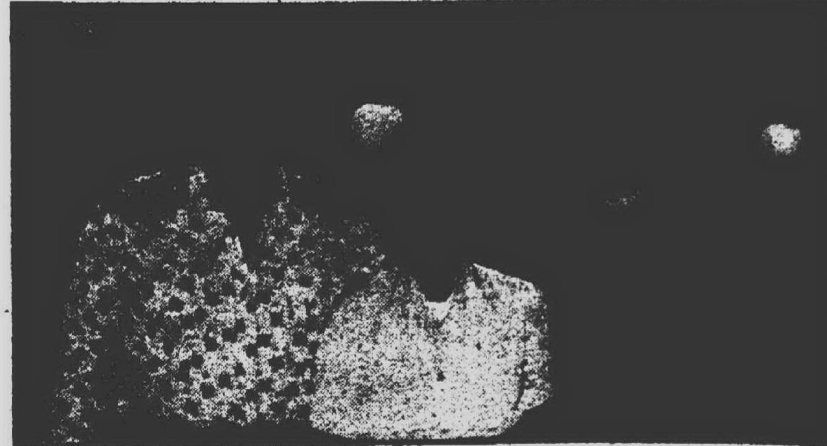

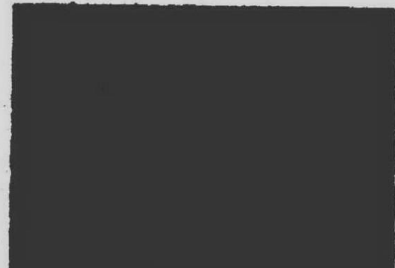

6 win special honors at S'craft commencement

"The traditional commencement address," said Schoolcraft College commencement speaker Sarah Goddard Power, "assumes you're still wet behind the ears."

"You are not wet behind the ears," she told the 235 graduates in blue in gold academic gowns Sunday in the college gym. "You have experience in the world."

Indeed, the age range of persons receiving associate degrees from the two-year college ran from 20 to 65, many of them military veterans and working women who attended evening classes.

Nearly 2,000 persons jammed the building to capacity to see the traditional ceremony. The college this academic year awarded 777 degrees—333 in the arts and sciences and 444 in applied sciences. Many who earned their degrees in the 1974 spring, summer and fall semesters, however, were unable to attend the ceremony because they are already in four-year colleges or on jobs outside the community.

The official list of graduates will be published by Observer & Eccentric Newspapers when it is officially tallied by the college—in about four weeks.

THE 10TH commencement was the largest ever for the 13-year-old college which enrolls 9,000 students and serves the school districts of Clarenceville, Garden City, Livonia, Northville and Plymouth.

Six honorary degrees were presented this year, the largest amount the school has ever bestowed in a single school year.

Commencement speaker Sarah Power, a recently elected University of Michigan regent active in many civic organizations in western Wayne and Washtenaw counties, was awarded an honorary associate in arts degree.

Mrs. Power, the wife of Observer & Eccentric co-publisher Philip Power, was recognized for her work with such groups as the Institute for the Administrative Advancement of Women; the U.S. National Commission for UNESCO and National Endowment for the Humanities. She was born in Detroit; earned a bachelor's degree in history at Vassar College and master's degree at New York University.

Richard T. ("Tommy") Thompson received an honorary associate in arts degree posthumously for his "exceptional press coverage and support to the establishment and development of Schoolcraft College" and "giving unselfishly of his time and talents in this constructive effort."

Thompson, who until his death of a heart attack two weeks ago was on

the editorial board of the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers and Plymouth managing editor of the group after serving as executive editor, came to the O&E in 1962.

Thompson, declared the college, "earned the praise and recognition of readers and his fellow journalists" and "devoted 48 years to his life's work of newspapering, a craft whose demands place it among the hardest things men and women can do."

Thompson was a Redford Township resident. It was Thompson's first degree of any sort. In the depression, he was forced to drop out of Ohio State University when he was maneuvered out of a dishwashing job.

Robert Breithaupt, Livonia, was awarded an associate in applied science degree. He is one of the nation's six executive master chefs and director of food services at Schoolcraft College. Breithaupt founded a gourmet club at the college and was faculty advisor in team competition that earned several "best in show" awards for the school.

Philip Ogilvie, Northville, was awarded an honorary associate in arts degree. Active in community and youth-oriented endeavors including the Boy Scouts, Presbyterian Church and Rotary Club, Ogilvie has served as Northville's city attorney since 1953. He helped establish a probation department for the municipal court and was also a member of the Schoolcraft College Foundation.

Charles Kirkpatrick, Birmingham, was awarded an honorary associate in applied science degree for his participation in Livonia scouting, church, civic association and school matters.

A former Livonia resident, he was elected to the first board of trustees of Schoolcraft College and served as

its first treasurer; he was a member of a citizen's study committee for the college.

Miriam King, West Bloomfield, received an honorary associate in arts degree for active leadership roles in youth activities in Livonia; she has been a rehabilitation consultant with the Oakland County Intermediate School District for the past 10 years and was appointed by Gov. Milliken to the Michigan Commission on the Employment of the Handicapped.

She is chairperson of the committee for a Barrier Free Environment and was chairperson of the Livonia Citizens Action Committee advocating passage of the initial property tax in support of Schoolcraft College.

MRS. POWER'S theme was "the movement for a partnership (of men and women) for a better world," a phrase she prefers to the "women's movement."

"Things are still grim, but they're getting better," she said, noting that 80 to 90 per cent of the world's 700 million illiterates are women but that "at least educated equally with men."

"The legal position of women has vastly improved since 1945," she said, "but it's a drop in a vast ocean."

Mourning the defeat of the equal rights amendment to the U.S. Constitution in the Florida Senate, Mrs. Power said, "Ponder this: As the 20th century draws to a close, we are still debating equal rights for women."

She praised Schoolcraft programs benefiting women, notably biomedical technology, special workshops, the women's resource center and flexible class hours.

nities in the program upgrade their housing stock and assist in the rehabilitation of housing. They are also making an effort to assist communities in the aid of senior citizens."

McAninch said: "I think one of the prime motives behind this program is to get communities to take a good look at their housing situation and then act on it."

Although the county has completed the application, it has not been submitted to HUD. Gordon Rutan, a county employee involved in the application, said it has undergone the necessary reviews. "SEMOG has gone over it and it is ready for submission, but we are going to wait until the advisory council meets again on May 7 before we submit it. Our deadline is May 15, and if we get it in by then, there's a good chance we will know whether we get the money by July 4."

RUTAN SAID there is a 75-day limit on processing applications but

the average time has been about 41 days. "That's a whole lot better than the 700 days it took for urban renewal grants."

The advisory council, a committee established by the 19 communities involved in the grant application and the county will reconvene May 7 in Plymouth City Hall to discuss the results of the Washington trip.

Several municipalities have been awaiting the outcome of the trip before making a final decision about joining the application. Among those communities is Plymouth Township.

The Plymouth Township board empowered Supervisor J. D. McLaren to withdraw from the application at his discretion. "I haven't talked to anyone about making the trip. I'll have to wait until the next meeting before making a decision. If the answers are good, I'd say there's a 50-50 chance we'll stay in the program."

ALTHOUGH THE APPLICATION has undergone the necessary reviews before submission to HUD there is

still a question about whether the funds will be granted.

The county needs cooperative agreements from enough communities to represent an aggregate population of 200,000 to be eligible for the grant. According to Rutan, the county has secured agreements for 138,000 and is waiting for the other communities to respond to the results of the Washington trip.

Commented McAninch: "I'm most optimistic. I think there's a good possibility we'll get it."

"My understanding is the grant will double next year to \$1.3 million and will be up \$2 million in the last years."

Plymouth has proposed to use the money for a housing study, while Canton will use the money, if it is granted to renovate a building at the corner of Michigan Avenue and Sheldon for use as a senior citizen's activity center.

"If there is any money left, we'll probably use it for the recreation park at the corner of Cherry Hill and Canton Center or for the McIntyre sewer project," said Greenstein.

Detroit commissioners voting against him and the other two suburban commissioners voting with him.

Back harshly criticized Cedroni's budget and water rate increase, claiming there was no necessity for a financial "cushion" when "we have a moral responsibility to hold rates down in this deep economic recession."

"This is not a 'suburbs versus Detroit' issue," Back said.

"Our 'cushion,'" said Cedroni, "is in doubt, because we're not sure of the projected usage of the water from the system." Cedroni's budget and rate increases are geared to projected water sales figures through 1980.

"We have capital improvements down the road, such as Waterworks Park," he said.

Cedroni cited needs for water mains, pump stations, relining old water mains and installing new valves and other capital improvements.

"These things were not in the budget we approved," said McNamara, referring to the budget passed when all were present, including suburban commissioners.

"But they were necessary," said Cedroni.

"You revised the budget on your own," Back charged.

"A budget can be revised if brought back to the board," insisted Cedroni.

"You said you'd be operating in the red," said Miss Thompson, "if you got no rate increase."

"Yes," said Cedroni.

"What if we made the water rate increase effective next year?" asked Miss Thompson.

"I see no problem with that," said Cedroni.

McNamara then moved that the board vote to rescind the water rate increase. He, Back, Lamerato, and Beckham voted in favor of rescinding. Beckham had made the April 21 motion to raise water rates.

Miss Thompson, Sylvia Calabrese and William Brown voted against McNamara's motion to rescind.

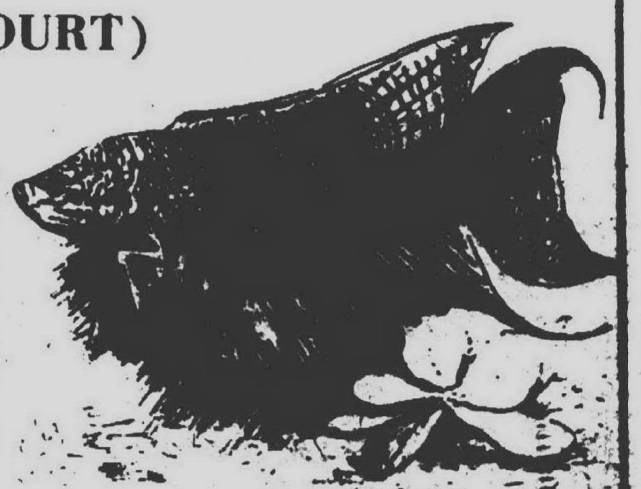

How children's sex problems can be prevented by parents

"Sexuality includes everything that has happened to you, everything you have learned, thought about, dreamed of or done that relates to being male or female."

This definition of human sexuality was offered last week to an audience at Schoolcraft College by a woman who has been characterized as "an aging libertine" and "a corrupter of youth."

Dr. Mary Calderone, 70 and wearing a saucy red suit, explained that she took up the cause of human sexuality because most education about sex centered solely on medical matters.

"Not enough was being done to consider relationships between men and women. Everyone should understand that a relationship is involved here."

She added that the organization of which she is executive director aims mainly to establish sexuality as part of total health.

The Sex Information and Education Council of the U.S. (SIECUS) also is working so that "in the next 10 years sexuality will be regarded as a human right."

THE WOMAN, who has also been called "a moral degenerate" and "a child seducer," disclaimed a role by her organization in the direct sex education of children.

"Our primary work has never been in the schools. We have never made up curriculum guidelines — that job should be done by the community. Our job mainly has been working with professionals."

Dr. Calderone believes that "the

sense of self as a worthy person is essential to acting as a sexual being.

"For centuries human sexuality has been the exclusive property of the churches. They took over a whole part of the human being and told him how to feel and act. He was badly served."

Today Catholics, Lutherans and Methodists have created strong groups at the national level to develop new ideas on the subject.

"The sexuality of the child frightens people most of all. They really believe children should be non-sexual. Actually they are sexual, but in a different way from adults. Yet sometimes adults project onto the child, adult feelings."

"They believe children should be pure in mind, have no fantasies or erotic feelings. Adolescents have been expected to receive information carefully doled out by a parent in an uncomfortable session."

"They don't know the erotic drive makes itself known early in life, soon after the baby is born."

DR. CALDERONE, who before her present job worked as medical director of the Planned Parenthood Federation of America, noted most persons accept the idea that children with certain organs grow up to be male or female.

"But a child is also programmed by parents to be male or female. There are all sorts of messages from parents and the culture on this."

"By the age of two, children identify themselves with one or the other sex. This is core gender identity that you can no longer change. Any attempt to change it risks tremendous upheaval in the child's life."

"The primary sex education of the child is done by parents by the time

the child is five, and the parents don't even know they are doing it."

"If the child has no role model, he might become a homosexual, but there are no absolute answers on this."

Dr. Calderone observed that "parents who are comfortable with their own sexuality will be more comfortable with their children."

"I mean joyously comfortable. What you are doing with the children is letting them in on a great thing — opening a part of life you find wonderful. That's the best kind of sex education."

ANOTHER GOOD kind of sex education is coming from the young, she believes, as they move toward changing traditional male and female role.

"The young are changing these concepts by living them. They know that maleness doesn't depend on baking bread, being aggressive or changing diapers. It depends on the feeling of satisfaction in being male."

"With men it has been found that sexual release is a spontaneous happening. In women it is more of a learned behavior. It doesn't happen as spontaneously. difference may lie in parental reaction. Many regard an indication of sexuality as frightening. Girls may be punished more for this."

She pointed out that the lines between sexual normality and abnormality are becoming less and less distinct. "At SIECUS we no longer even use the word 'deviant' any more. We use the word 'variant' which carries with it no moral judgment."

SEVEN STATES have recently adopted improved laws concerning sexual activity. "Any sex in private

between consenting adults is no longer of concern to the law in these states," she said.

"But there are still unrealistic laws in most states. These will be changed only when the public demands it."

Thinking in this country is changing about rape, she noted, adding that women in Bangladesh were raped by Pakistan soldiers were regarded as outcasts.

"We have always looked on rape as terribly damaging. What is damaging is the violence. One woman who had been raped told me how much she hated the violence."

"But I am still me. I don't have to feel my life is ruined."

In conclusion, Dr. Calderone passed on to her audience a comment made to her once by a student in her audience. It pleased her because it so neatly summed up her philosophy.

"I can see now there is more to sex than just doing it," he said.

Hearing on U.S. Census aimed to aid 1980 count

The public will have a rare chance to do the asking when the spokesmen from the Bureau of the Census are in Detroit Wednesday, April 30, to answer questions and gain public input.

The Detroit meeting, first in a series of free, public meetings to be held nationwide, will be in the McGre-

gor Memorial Conference Center at Wayne State University.

Opening the conference will be a 9 a.m. session dealing with all aspects of the content and collection of data. The afternoon session, beginning at 1:30 p.m., will consider what data shall be published, how to present it, and when and how to make the data available.

SPONSORS HOPE the conference will gain local participation in planning the 1980 census of population and housing.

While the conference is expected to draw census data users and potential users, the entire public is invited to attend.

"We're coming prepared to listen," said Edgar Elam, supervisory statistician of the Bureau's Demographic Census staff. "With federal revenue sharing allocations based on population, local areas have a bigger stake in the census than ever before."

Staff members will answer questions and carry back all comments, suggestions and criticisms voiced at the meeting.

"We expect to hear some griping about the 1970 census, but we hope to get suggestions that will help the 1980 census be the most accurate ever."

"This kind of feedback from ordinary citizens and from census data users is important to us so we can make the data as useful to as many persons as we can."

IT WASN'T until 1900 that Congress established the bureau on a permanent basis as part of the Department of Commerce. The first census (Constitution Article I stipulates one census every 10 years) was directed by then Secretary of State Thomas Jefferson in 1790. He delegated the job to 17 U. S. Marshals who hired assistants called enumerators.

The task was difficult. Few roads linked settled places, boundaries were poorly defined, paper was expensive, and many persons were suspicious and uncooperative.

Originally used for apportioning seats in Congress, census data today is used for city planning, revenue sharing allocations, marketing research, economic and other social research.

SEVERAL THINGS have not changed since 1790, though.

One is the serious problem of undercounting. Minority groups and many cities have complained about being undercounted. Bureau spokesmen hope the local meeting will generate suggestions for reducing undercounting.

Cosponsors of the meeting are: The Detroit Chapter of the American Statistical Association, American Marketing Association, Detroit Chamber of Commerce, Detroit Regional Census Advisory Committee, Eastern Michigan University, Merit Computer Network.

Also: Michigan Bureau of the Budget, Michigan Library Consortium, Michigan Municipal League, Michigan State University, Oakland University, Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments, United Community Services of Metropolitan Detroit, University of Michigan and Wayne State University.

Metric magic begins June 23

The "Magic of Metrics" will be taught in a one-week workshop at Madonna College, Livonia, beginning June 23. Classes will meet from 1 to 4 p.m. daily.

Intended to introduce teachers to the metric system, the course taught by Wayne State University graduate Sr. Kathleen Marie is also open to other adults and advanced high school students.

Because metric measure is based on multiples of 10, Sr. Kathleen believes persons will like it better than the English system once they learn it.

"We will deal with linear and liquid measure as well as mass and temperature," said Sr. Kathleen noting that some elementary textbooks are already using a dual system to acquaint students with basic metric units.

Although the U.S. is the only major world country not using the metric system, she said some communities are using signs to indicate distances in kilometers.

Tuition is \$35 for the one semester hour course. Registration may be completed at Madonna College, 36600 Schoolcraft.

WCCC class registration begins today

Registration begins today (Monday) for eight and 16-week spring classes at Wayne County Community College at 15 instructional centers throughout the county.

Registration will be in John Glenn High from 6-9 p.m. Monday through Thursday, April 28-May 1. Persons may also register in the Milton Center, 1771 Henry Road, Inkster, from noon to 3 p.m. Monday through Thursday, April 28-May 1.

Tuition is \$11 per credit hour. There is a \$2 registration fee and certain science and technical courses will have \$5 laboratory fees. Senior citizens 60 or older may enroll without paying tuition.

Classes for both the eight-week and 16-week terms begin May 5. Prospective students may also register during this period for eight-week summer classes which begin June 30.

The college's open door admissions policy enables anyone 18 or older to enroll without a high school diploma. Persons under 18 must have a high school diploma or obtain parents' permission.

Bike Day is Saturday

The first of four Bike Days on Edward Hines Drive this year will be held Saturday, May 3, from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Only this year, bicyclists will get more mileage from the Bike Day outings. State Rep. John F. Markes (D-Westland), whose district includes part of Livonia, says the Hine Drive section to be closed to motorized traffic and turned over to bicyclists will be two miles longer this year.

The change will make the bicycling course 12 miles long — from Ford Road in Dearborn to Haggerty Road in Plymouth Township.

Markes, chief sponsor behind the event, says arrangements have been made with the Wayne County Road Commission to close Hines Drive for bicycling on four Saturdays — May 3, June 7, Sept. 6 and Oct. 4. This is the second consecutive year four days have been set aside for bicyclists on Hines Drive.

Motorized traffic is kept off the roadway by barricading the access points along the course, just like the county does when the floodplain is inundated. The Wayne County Sheriff's Department, with help from local police departments, will provide manpower to supervise the event.

"The local governments of Livonia, Westland, Plymouth Township and Dearborn Heights have joined in the effort to make the event a safe bicycling activity everyone can enjoy," said Markes. "Bike Days have turned out to be lots of fun for thousands of persons. It's the kind of thing the entire family can take part in and is safe, healthful, and enjoyable."

All bicyclists are invited to participate. Persons transporting their bicycles to the area will find ample parking west of Haggerty and at the Warren, Telegraph and Merriman Road access points.

Smith opposes new airport

A proposed airport in the Plymouth-Northville area is getting opposition from Wayne County Commissioner Royce E. Smith who represents the 27th district including part of Canton Township, Plymouth and Belleville.

A hearing on the proposal is set for 8 p.m. Thursday, May 1, in the Plymouth City Council chambers.

Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation Bureau of Aeronautics is studying the possible location of a general aviation airport for business and private craft.

"In my opinion, there is no need for another airport in that area, and there is no way an airport can be located there without stirring up a hornet's nest of opposition," Smith said.

He charged at least 200 homes would have to be condemned to assemble enough land for an airport.

"This would be a waste of public money and a needless imposition on more than 200 families. When I-275 is completed — and that will be before any new airport could be in operation — Willow Run and Pontiac airports will be only 30 minutes away from that area."

During the hearing bureau of aeronautics representatives will conduct an informational panel at the hearing.

Greek dessert, baklava, on foreign pastry cart

When Kingswood and Cranbrook Schools got together to plan their first joint fund-raiser, the result was the upcoming "Foreign Connection." An international supper, from 5 to 8

p.m. in the baronial hall, is part of the day's activities Saturday at Cranbrook in Bloomfield Hills. According to Sally Parsons, whose daughter attends Kingswood, "We were going to have the Cranbrook din-

ing room do the whole menu, but so many mothers wanted to do desserts, the pastry carts will bring with their contributions." Also wanting to share in the dessert making were students of Francine

Rode from her January enrichment course in Greek culture and cooking.

A TEAM of girls gathered last week in the Kingswood School kitchen where they made the Greek, honey-drenched dessert, baklava.

Ms. Rode, who heads the English department, is not Greek herself but explained, "My major in school was classical studies. I've been to Greece many times and wound up with Greek friends. I've got a lot of Greek recipes."

She describes Greek food as "very traditional home-type dishes. They have unique spices and flavor."

To make baklava, you alternate layers of Greek filo ("It's really strudel dough," Ms. Rode said) brushed with butter and a mixture of nuts and spices.

"GREEKTOWN tends to be expensive to buy things," she said, "so I just buy the specialties." She added, "But they have fantastic prices on lamb. The traditional lamb chops are always good for a meal."

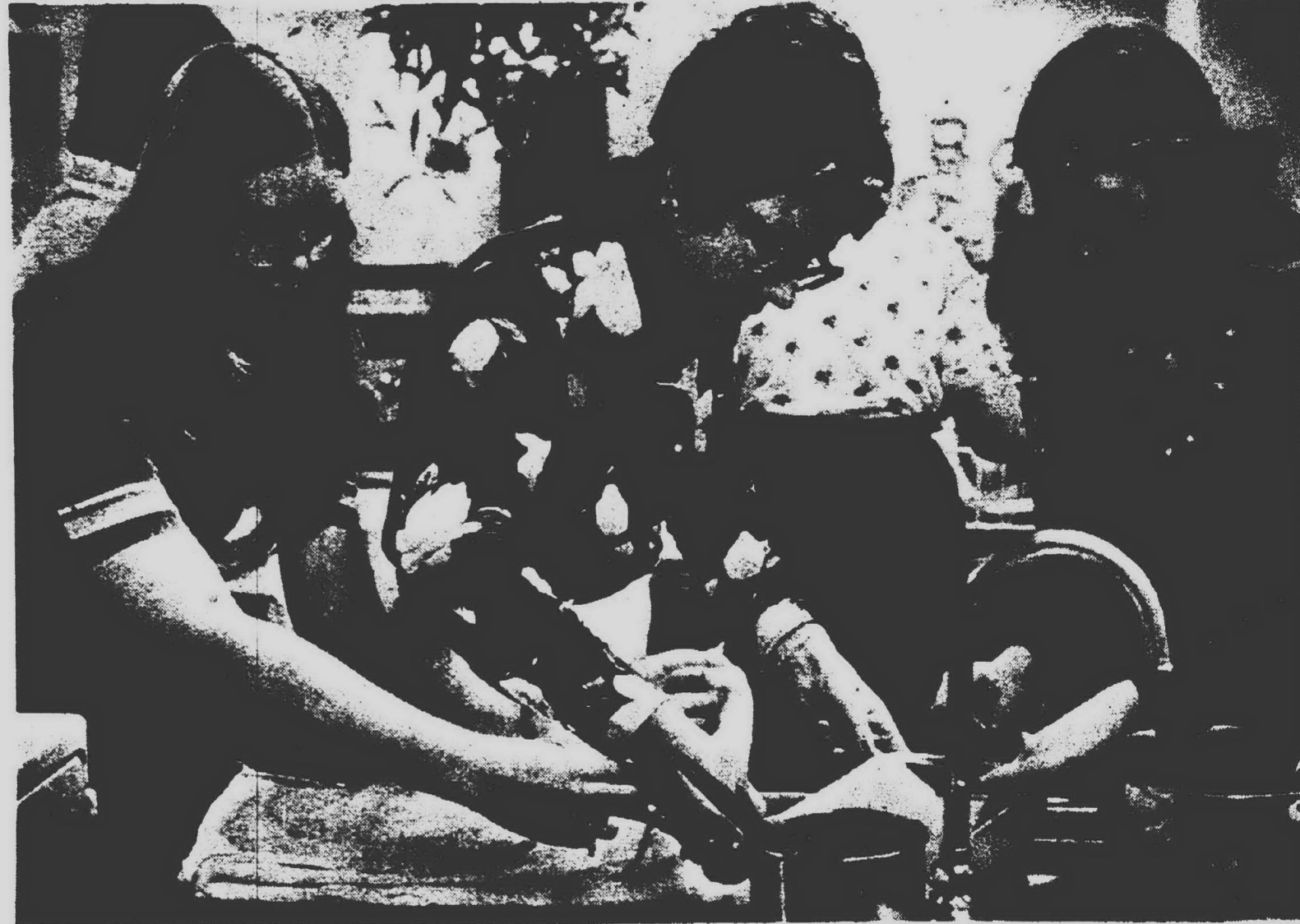
A Kingswood girl removed the damp towel that kept the filo from Greektown moist, then tenderly lifted and folded a sheet before laying it in the baking dish.

"It feels like parchment," she said. Other students chopped almonds and walnuts.

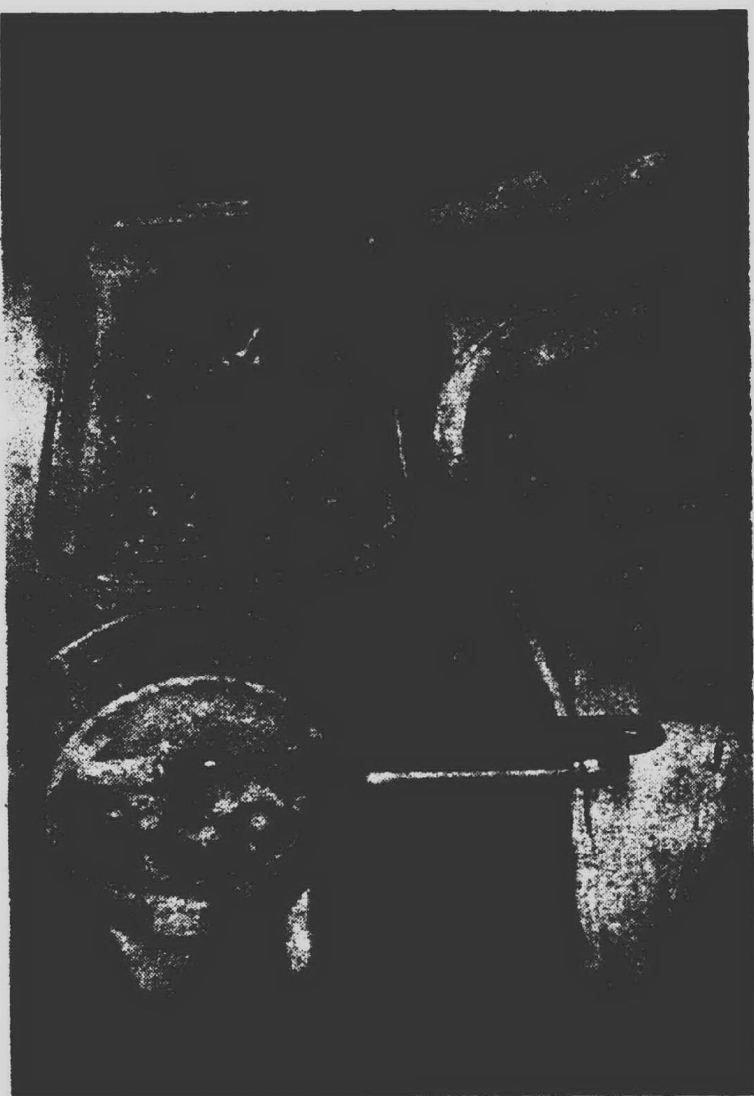
"It takes forever," one girl declared.

Mrs. Rode said making baklava isn't difficult. "It's just tedious."

The baklava was to be baked that evening, then covered with the syrup before going into the freezer. It would be thawed out a few days before the supper and refrigerated until the day of "The Foreign Connection."

BEFORE THEY get to pastries, Cranbrook guests will enjoy English roast of beef, French green beans almandine, Swiss potatoes and Greek salad. Tickets for the modestly priced supper can be purchased by calling Cranbrook.

Other events Saturday include a fair with an assortment of booths from 3 to 6 p.m. in the Cranbrook Little Gym and an evening coffee house, with live dance music, for older students in the Cranbrook lower dining hall.

"The Foreign Connection" proceeds will be used to sponsor foreign exchange students, as well as students on special scholarship programs.

Depending on individual taste, the recipe for the syrup may be halved to cut down on the sweetness a bit.

Combine all ingredients for the syrup in a saucepan, bring to a boil, simmer for 10 minutes, strain and allow to cool.

Coarsely grind or chop the almonds and walnuts. Mix thoroughly with cinnamon, allspice and sugar. Brush an 8x8x2-inch pan with butter, lay a sheet of filo in the bottom, brush with butter, cover with another sheet of filo, brush with butter, and repeat process until about 6 sheets are used.

Then spread one thin layer of the nut mixture on top of the filo; cover with a sheet of filo, brush with butter, cover with another layer of nuts, and repeat process until all nuts are used.

Then cover with remaining filo sheets, brushing each sheet with butter. With a very sharp knife, cut the top filo sheets into rectangles. Insert a clove in the center of each rectangle, and bake at 350 degrees for one and one-half hours.

When the baklava is evenly browned, remove from oven, and pour the cooled syrup evenly over it, so that it penetrates the layers and covers the baklava. Allow to cool several hours before serving. Makes 15-18 pieces.

From society's banquet table

If you had been one of those who attended the society banquets of a few years back, you'd know all about cocoa paintings. Also ice carvings and tallow figures.

These works—edible but never eaten—graced many a delicacy-laden table in the days of more lavish and leisurely dining, says Laura Kriss, a brand-new graduate of Schoolcraft College's culinary arts program.

But they have become pretty much lost arts, according to Miss Kriss, who is delighted that she had a chance to learn them during her studies in the Livonia school.

Cocoa painting involves pictures created in intricate detail on a hardened gum-paste base that resembles fine china. You don't see it often, but Miss Kriss and her fellow student, Pam Michael of Garden City, intend to do something about that with a small business.

Ice sculpture is better known, but not often practiced because facilities and materials to learn the art aren't very available.

Tallow work involves molding the tallow you render from animal fat around a wire form to create a sculptured figure. It's impressive, Miss Kriss says, but she has to admit there are drawbacks.

The tallow is greasy to work with, she says, and pretty smelly when soft. (It arrives at the banquet table refrigerated and odorless, though).

MISS KRISS, a Northville resident, showed samples of cocoa painting and tallow figures in the recent culinary arts salon at Oakland Community College, Orchard Ridge campus.

She and Mrs. Michael have concentrated on the cocoa works during the Schoolcraft term just completed.

"The gum-paste base," she said, "is made of sugar, glucose, cornstarch and a little water. You roll it out like pie dough—it's that consistency—and then form it over the back of a dish. It has to dry for a couple of days, and when ready to paint it's more delicate than fragile china."

The picture is outlined first and then painted with a fine brush dipped in a melted chocolate mixture.

"Or you can use cocoa mixed with cocoa butter," Miss Kriss said. "We use white chocolate for the shading, and sometimes white chocolate is tinted for pastel pictures."

MISS KRISS does her paintings free hand. "I studied at Schoolcraft for two semesters," she said. "It helps if you're an artist."

Mrs. Michael isn't an artist, but comes up with attractive paintings by tracing lines sketched in.

Both have studied the art with Jim Van Buren, one of the chefs in the culinary arts program.

They are following in the tradition of many great chefs of the past who did decorations of this kind for their elegant banquets.

Most good pastry chefs today are

learning the art, Miss Kriss added.

PASTRY CHEF WORK is Miss Kriss' ambition, with her culinary arts training now completed. She said she got into the program "because my father wanted me to get some training I could use to support myself."

He recommended the culinary arts program, because his daughter had "thought of restaurant and hotel work, and she has found it a fine outlet for

her artistic talent as well as being a practical skill.

Mrs. Michael, who has won 25 ribbons in cake-decorating shows, is employed by a Detroit bakery and makes special occasion cakes.

The two women currently are working on a supply of cocoa paintings to offer for sale.

They figure the paintings will be back soon as decor for the elegant banquet.

The water rate flap: Is there a better way?

ESC should take a look

Last week's action by the Detroit water board hiking rates for all its customers presented the strongest argument in favor of placing the board under control of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

And it may, in fact, light a fire under State Rep. Alfred Sheridan's (D-Taylor) bill pending in the House Committee on Public Utilities which would do just that.

Currently the water board, a creation of the Detroit city charter, answers only to the Detroit mayor and city council. The state has no voice in its operations, and suburban interests are outnumbered on the seven-member board. This is all in spite of the fact that nearly half of Michigan's residents buy Detroit water, and of 96 communities pay into the water system.

The sheer size of the system mandates some type of state supervision. The entire suburban and out-county area served by the Detroit water system has only three representatives on the water board, and conceivably those appointments made by the Detroit mayor could go to Detroit representatives in the future.

If the water board was placed under supervision of the three-member Public Service Commission, public hearings would be mandated before rate hikes could be effectuated. The commission, whose two Republican and one Democratic members are appointed by the governor, would be able to look into the system's operation before approving the rate hikes.

Although the commission is already overburdened with problems facing the gas, electric, telephone and transportation systems, it appears the best existing authority to assume responsibility for the water systems.

Currently the water board is the only utility which operates almost autonomously without any state supervision. If it isn't placed under the Public Service Commission, local residents may continue to be threatened with rate hikes at the whim of the Detroit water commissioners.

Let SEMCOG control water

Last week's bombshell decision by the four Detroit members of the Detroit Metropolitan Water Department (DMWD) board to raise water rates for suburban customers is a case pointing to the increased need for regional cooperation.

For years, fearful suburban politicians have warned against regional cooperation. If, however, the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) had control of the metropolitan water board, suburban communities would have had a voice in the water rates reflecting the population.

The point in last week's incident wasn't the need for a rate increase but the suburbs' right to have a voice in the decision. The water board is operated under an archaic system, logical at its genesis when Detroit constituted the entire urbanized area. Today a Detroit-controlled system is outmoded, unresponsive and wrong.

The decision was nothing short of political chicanery on the part of Mayor Coleman Young. He continually will be able to make such arbitrary decisions as long as he holds the reins.

Twenty years ago, the suburbs were toddling communities, dependent on their well-to-do mother. Today the suburbs are of age and should grasp the responsibilities that come with growing up. Detroit shouldn't hold the purse strings of economically thriving suburbs.

Some would endorse turning the responsibility over to state agencies. That, too, would be a mistake. The state has more than it can handle.

Regional government is tailor-made for water control. The suburbs would have overwhelming control of their own destinies.

Not only would it prove advantageous in determining water rates, but regional control also would benefit the suburbs by having an agency of professionals available to research avenues for a more efficient water system.

Water board plays sneaky

The Detroit Metropolitan Water Board of Commissioners—particularly the Detroit members—staged a public ripoff of its millions of customers last week in trying to railroad through a 30 per cent boost in water rates.

Fortunately, one of the commissioners changed his mind three days later, and the board, with its suburban members present, killed the rate boost 4-3.

But the memory lingers, and the earlier action demonstrates that some public officials will violate basic rules of decency and political ethics when given the chance.

The commissioners voted on the rate increase after the two suburban members present had left the meeting. The printed agenda for the meeting listed only a sewer rate increase and didn't suggest that a water rate boost was to be discussed.

The board, just one month earlier, with support from Detroit Mayor Coleman Young, said there would be no water rate boost for the new fiscal year.

The procedural point about the agenda is important because most school boards, city councils and township boards have rules requiring that no action be taken unless the issue is on the agenda.

The only exception is when the board of council members unanimously approve the action on the unscheduled issue.

The Detroit water board should take note of that policy and prevent another disaster from repeating.

Public should get a hearing

Despite last Thursday night's reversal of the decision of the board of water commissioners to impose a massive water rate increase, problems continue to exist with regard to that body's policies and practice.

Among those is the matter of public participation in the decision made by the water board. The board of commissioners constitutes a governmental body not unlike township boards and city councils. Those governmental units would not be allowed to impose new taxes or rate increases without the benefit of public hearings. Neither should the water board have such a privilege.

"Imperial decisions" made from on high without regard for citizen involvement are often bad ones. The commissioners' reversal of the increase would seem to substantiate that. The commissioners apparently only took notice of the public when the hue and cry reached the lofty recesses of the City-County Building.

Whether the increases are needed by the board to maintain its budget is one question, the needs and wishes of the citizenry is another.

Such public bodies must realize the importance of public hearings, both for the purpose of hearing the public voice, and for the equally important purpose of informing the public of the needs and reasons for increased taxes and service rates.

The public is not unreasonable, if need can be demonstrated. Why does the board of water commissioners seem so reluctant to do so?

There's a way

A family of four that I'm familiar with used 100,000 gallons of water last year. That was used to run the dishwasher, fill the washing machine, bathe the kids, water the plants, flush

the toilet, shower, shave, and cook.

Of course, the kids occasionally have "tea parties" where the bathroom sink is filled to overflowing and the bulk of the water in the tea cups gets spilled on the dining room floor. Then there's that leaky faucet in the basement, and the toilet that just won't stop running unless you "jiggle" the handle in the proper manner.

The cost for all that water which is considered "free" (the landlord pays the bill) is in the range of \$75 per year. And while that is cheaper than the electricity and the gas, it's still quite a bite out of the budget for someone.

Lacking any better solution to the proposed rate increase by the Detroit Water Board, I would humbly suggest some alternatives for at least this particular family of four:

Put a brick in the toilet tank to reduce the amount of water used when flushing.

Fix those leaky faucets and the running toilet.

Don't let the water run while shaving, brushing teeth, or doing dishes (the dishwasher broke).

Reduce the number of "tea parties."

Not only would this family save on their landlord's water bill (and probably on their rent) they'd also be using only what they need, leaving more water for others to either use or abuse.

If Plymouth voted again...

"A rise in rates as high as 120 per cent is what City Commissioner and Wayne County Supervisor Arch Vallier predicted it would cost Plymouthites if the city were to accept water from the City of Detroit."

That's a quote from the old Plymouth Observer of June 9, 1964, telling of Vallier's remarks to a Chamber of Commerce forum, and it helps demonstrate how long water has been a hot political topic in Plymouth.

It was back on the front burners during the past week because of the on-again, off-again antics of the Detroit Water Board.

MANY YEARS of loud emotional debate in Plymouth were climaxed March 24, 1970 when exactly 1,030 of us who live there voted "yes" on the question: "Shall the City of Plymouth enter into a contract with the City of Detroit for furnishing of water to the City of Plymouth?"

There were 1,014 who voted "no"—meaning that what I considered at the time, in my role as Plymouth editor, to be forward-looking, metropolitan minded good guys had won by 16. In due time we all got Detroit water, just as the majority had asked, but along with it we also fell prey to the tactics of the high-handed Detroit Water Board.

When that special election was held five years ago, the average residential water user in the city of Plymouth was paying 34 cents per thousand gallons for the hard-as-nails, brackish stuff that came from the city's own wells. Now the same dweller is paying 78 cents per thousand gallons for the nectar from Lake Huron and never knows when the Detroit Water Board will sneak up on his blind side and hoist the price even more.

THE THOUGHT that Plymouth might quit the Detroit system in disgust and reactivate its own wells is far-fetched, for the city is hooked on a 35-year contract that leaves little room for escape. But if that election of 1970 were being held tomorrow, after the sordid power play we have just witnessed on the part of the water board, it's six, two and even the "no" votes would win resoundingly.

As City Commissioner Harold Guenther said in a commission debate Nov. 24, 1969, "I abhor getting in bed with Detroit for the next 35 years with no control over rates."

The people had been forewarned time and again; let's hope the nectar is worth the price.

How area schools operate at lunchtime

Down but not out is the way you'd have to describe the Type A lunch program for school districts in this area.

Type A lunches get plenty of competition—from vending machines full of snacks, from brown bag lunches from home, from fast food eateries near some schools, from a la carte offerings in the cafeterias.

But still they are served and eaten in quantity, because many of the money-conscious recognize them as a filling value.

In the Livonia school district, this federally-run and specifically outlined type of school lunch no longer is served. The reason is money.

But in other districts—Plymouth, Redford Union, South Redford, Wayne-Westland and Garden City—it's still going strong or not so strong, depending on a number of factors.

THE TYPE A LUNCH is delineated by the federal government as to what kind of food it must provide from a nutrition standpoint.

Required in each lunch served are two ounces of cooked meat, cheese, eggs or other protein, three-fourths cup of fruit or vegetable, a slice of bread, roll or muffin with butter or margarine and eight ounces of milk.

When the lunches served meet these requirements, the government supplies some of the ingredients, like ground beef, canned beef, cheese, dry

milk, peanut butter, frozen vegetables, noodles, cooking oil and canned pork.

This year it hasn't supplied as much flour as formerly because it is in shorter supply nationally.

EVEN WITH THIS help, Livonia district administrators came to the conclusion several years ago that serving Type A lunches was not economically feasible.

The district that once had had the nation's model satellite food service system—foods prepared in central kitchens and shipped to surrounding schools—began phasing out that operation six or seven years ago.

"It was a matter of inflation and the higher cost of kitchen help and less government subsidies," said Geraldine Joyner, school board member. "You could buy prepared food cheaper than you could prepare it, even with what was provided."

The decision to discontinue the Type A lunch came, said Mrs. Geraldine Tobin, director of school food services, when studies showed that only about 10 per cent of the students were choosing that lunch but the from-scratch preparation was taking about 70 per cent of the kitchen time.

SO NOW LIVONIA junior high schools and three senior highs—Bentley, Stevenson and Franklin—have a la carte selections and a complete

lunch costing 65 cents, but the district does not have to meet the federal re-

quirements and does not receive subsidies. Churchill High, built without

an expensively-equipped kitchen, uses vending machines.

And Mrs. Tobin, while worrying about the lack of fruits and vegetables in the selections as students move down the lunch line, is pleased to see less wasted food than in the days when kids were dumping into the trash barrel the fruit dessert required by the Type A lunch standards.

Rising food and labor costs and a changing philosophy about lunch hour led to elimination of hot lunches in Livonia district elementary schools.

"The decision was that the dollars we had should be used first for education rather than food," explained Mrs. Joyner, "and there was a strong feeling among elementary teachers and administrators that it was better for children to go home for lunch."

Elementary brown-baggers still use the cafeteria, and lunches are provided for some children from low-income families.

OTHER DISTRICTS have worked out a variety of solutions to the school lunch needs. All include Type A lunches and a la carte offerings too.

Redford Union's entirely "home cooked" lunches are served in all schools, with the high school also offering selections off the Type A program.

The students select the full lunch most of the time, said Mrs. Mary LaCroix, food services director, because it's available for 55 cents and an a la carte meal is likely to run close to \$1.

The same is true of South Redford's lunch picture, although the preparation there is done by an outside contractor, American Retailer Association. Type A lunches at Thurston are 60 cents.

Indications are, though, that changes may have to be made in the South Redford program.

"We are operating the food service completely with no contribution from the school district," said Horst Achenbach, district manager of ARA. "With increased food costs, it is not a profitable operation, even though we re-

ceive the government food subsidies.

"We are planning to outline a different proposal to the school district early in May to see if we can change this arrangement and continue to serve the district. It is most unusual for a private firm to operate in a school setting on a strictly profit-and-loss basis."

IN PLYMOUTH, hot lunches are strictly Type A in elementary and middle schools and both Type A and a la carte in the high schools.

Raymond Hoedel, assistant superintendent for business, said a recent lunch count indicated an average of 3,621 Type A lunches were served per day in a district that has some 12,000 students in grades one through 12. Of those, 428 were purchased by high school students.

Hoedel pointed out that many elementary students go home for lunch and many in high school are on mobile schedules and probably do not eat at school, but agreed the figures indicated the a la carte selections are more popular.

"They offer a wider choice, and I think that may be needed at this age," he said.

THE GARDEN CITY school district serves Type A lunches in all schools with an a la carte alternative offered in the two high schools. A cafeteria supervisor in Garden City West indicated the choice among students who buy lunches goes about 90 per cent to the Type A.

"A complete lunch for 65 cents is a good bargain," she said, "and we try to plan the menus to give a choice and the kind of things kids like, hamburgers, hot meat sandwiches, Swiss steak, fish on a bun. These meet the requirements and still are popular."

The Wayne-Westland district has Type A lunches in all schools except Wayne Memorial High School, but John Glenn High students seem to buy more a la carte items.

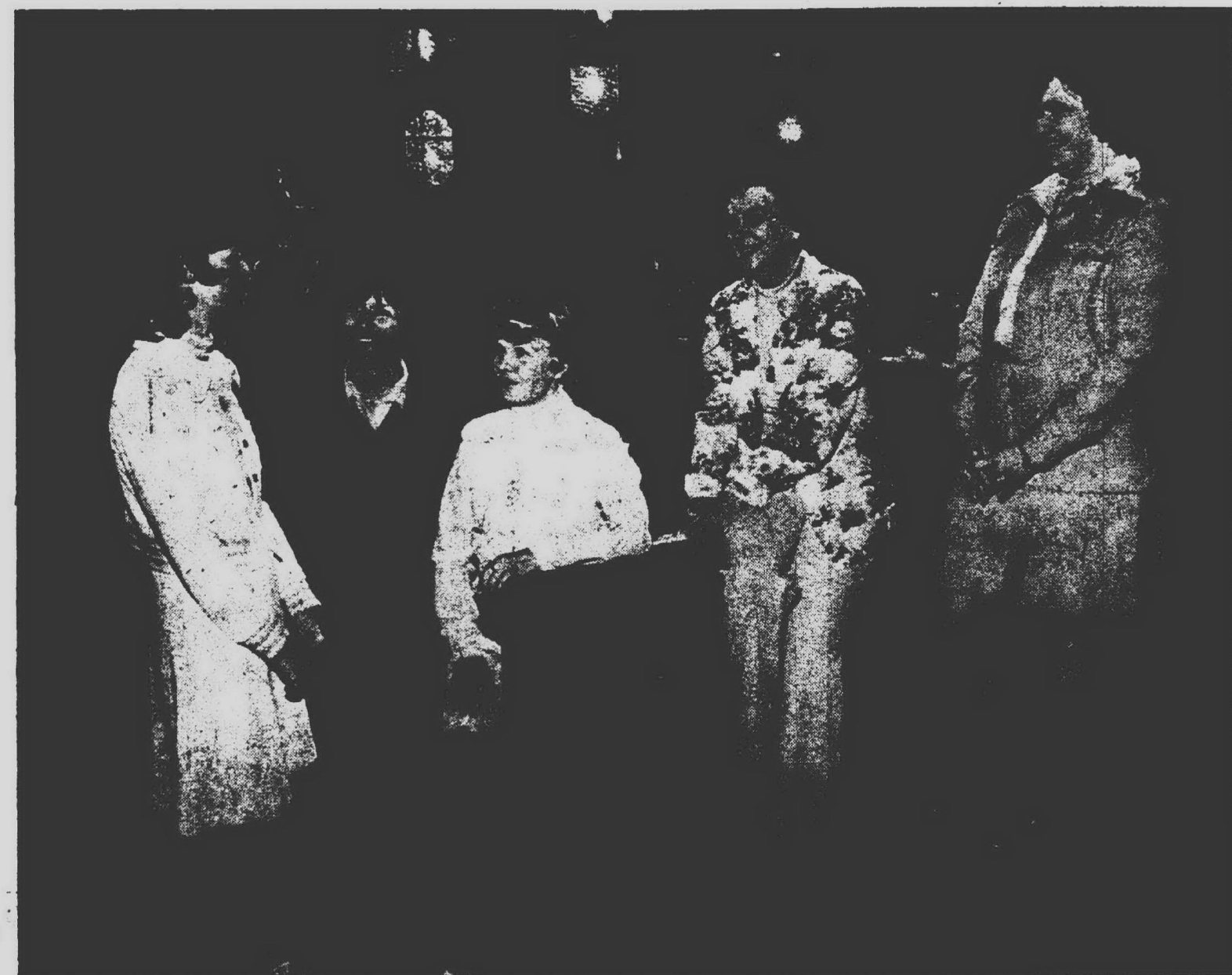
This group also gives parties at Christmas and Mother's Day for residents of a home for seniors.

West Trail Nursing Home cited by state for violations

PLYMOUTH—The future of West Trail Nursing Home, 395 W. Ann Arbor Trail, is clouded with uncertainty.

Carl Lampton, who founded the nursing home 15 years ago, recently received a letter of intent from the Michigan Department of Public Health to deny a license renewal because of alleged building and operational deficiencies.

An administrative hearing, which could determine the fate of the facility and its 46 residents, has been set for June 3 in Lansing.

Lampton, whose license expired on March 31, is allowed to run the facility, pending a final determination of the case.

THE HEALTH department cites numerous building and operational violations of the Michigan licensure rules for nursing homes, according to Elwood McLeod, administrative consultant of the Standards and Licensing Division of the Michigan Department of Public Health's Bureau of Health Facilities.

Alleged building violations include the lack of emergency lighting, night lighting and handrails throughout the facility, the lack of a public lobby and toilet facilities; obstacles in some corridors; the lack of an isolation room; and the lack of a nurse call system.

The nursing home, the health department alleges, lacks office space for the director of nursing, a separate dressing room for employees, cubicle curtains in one room, a clean linen holding room, a constant temperature of the hot water heater and adequate kitchen facilities.

OTHER VIOLATIONS cited by the health department include the lack of an authorized alternate administrator, the lack of documented inservice training for employees and the lack of diversional activities for patients. Nursing home workers also lack current skin and chest x-ray tests.

"I don't think there is any question of these violations existing," said McLeod. "Our workers have been there. As far as our office is concerned, these are deficient."

Lampton can plea guilty or not guilty to the violations at the hearing in June, McLeod explained. If he admits the violations exist and presents a timetable to correct them, the hearing officer may recommend the renewal of his license.

But if the license is denied, Lampton has 60 days to work with the health department and the Department of Social Services to transfer his patients to another facility, McLeod said. He can, however, appeal the ruling to Circuit Court.

Lampton admits the violations exist but cites financial difficulties in correcting them.

"AS FAR AS the violations, I admit I have them," Lampton said. "But if they're not going to renew my license, how will I pay off the mortgage for the improvements? Mr. McLeod would not give me a commitment one way or the other."

Lampton applied for a \$100,000 bank loan to cover the cost of improve-

ments, after he received the health department's letter of intent.

But the bank has refused to approve the loan without a written assurance from the health department that the license would be approved.

"There's no bank in the country that's going to loan me money on a building that's not brought up to code and may be denied a license," Lampton said.

"IF I DON'T get that letter, there's going to be a bunch of crumbled bricks over there, and the patients will have to be transferred. I have no idea what I'd do."

Lampton said the building violation existed when the health department issued the nursing home's 1974 license. The department passed over the violations, he said, because a planned new addition and the razing of a portion of the old facility would have corrected them.

The project, Lampton added, would have corrected a fire code violation, which cited lack of sprinkling systems in a combustible portion of the facility.

But Lampton abandoned the project last November, when construction bids came in higher than he had anticipated.

Operational violations cited by the health department are "a matter of paperwork," Lampton said, especially one violation which cites the lack of an authorized assistant administrator.

"Someone's always in charge, when I'm not there," he said. "They just want the name on paper."

REFERRING TO one violation, which cites the lack of documented diversional activities, Lampton added, "We have an activities director now, but no one ever wants to do anything with her."

PNHA seeks sale to postal service

PLYMOUTH—Abandoning hopes of constructing a senior citizens housing project at Ann Arbor Trail and the C&O railroad tracks, the Pilgrim Non-Profit Housing Authority has decided to try to sell the parcel for a new post office site.

The Pilgrim Towers group, headed by James Houk, was turned down by the Michigan State Housing Development Authority earlier this year on the Ann Arbor Trail site, and the PNHA is currently investigating alternative sites in the downtown Plymouth area.

According to Plymouth City Manager Fred Yockey, the group has submitted plans to the MSHDA, and he said, "There is one site that will be completely acceptable to the state housing authority in downtown Plymouth for a senior citizens site."

Yockey cautioned, however, that approval by the state on a site will not mean the housing project will be constructed there.

"The group should be receiving word from the state within a month on a particular site, but whether the site can be acquired is a completely different matter," Yockey said.

While the PNHA is negotiating for the purchase of a new site the group

is equally hopeful the old site will be accepted as the site for a new post office.

Supermarket sets opening

Improvements in the Wrigley Supermarket at Haggerty and Ann Arbor Road will be completed April 29, in time for the store's grand opening celebration.

For the next four weeks, grand opening specials will be offered to customers and for the first five days of the celebration free gifts will be given away to customers, according to store manager John Postolan.

The first 500 customers to shop on April 29, will receive a free rose bud. On each of the next four days, April 30 through May 3, the first 200 customers each day will receive free gifts.

Store hours are from 8 a.m. to midnight on Monday through Saturday and 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Sunday.

According to Postolan, the store will be decorated with bunting and pennants and a lighted sign outside will feature grand opening specials during the next four weeks.

"I admit I'm guilty of the job orientation violation," he continued. "We're supposed to provide continuous training to nurses aides. But what we're actually doing is training these girls for the hospital, since they can get better wages there."

A letter of assurance from the health department will allow Lampton to obtain the loan needed to correct the violations, he said.

But if the letter does not arrive, Lampton does not know what the future holds in store.

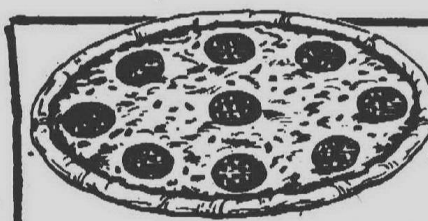
"I guess it's just 15 years of work down the drain," he said.

Top area trackmen Glenn face tough week

Everyone knows and admits that Westland John Glenn has the best track team in the northwestern suburban area.

Everyone, that is, except Rocket coach Barry Basel.

But as Glenn heads into a week in which it will face two undefeated Livonia teams, the fact that the Rockets are among the best squads in the

state may become obvious even to the "underconfident" Basel.

GLENN WILL go against a strong Livonia Churchill team Tuesday and Churchill coach Fred Price admits his team will play the role of the underdog.

"Glenn is just too talented. They're a very good team and I don't see how

we can beat them," said Price.

Last Thursday, Glenn took it out on North Farmington in Northwest Suburban action, 63-40.

TOM JACUBOWSKI CONTINUED his standout performance for the Rockets, taking firsts in the long jump, the high and low hurdles.

Terry Bixler handled the dashes for Glenn, winning both the 100 and 220 events and competing on the winning 880-relay team.

Fred Shoemaker anchored that team and took a second in the 220. Shoemaker double-faulted out of another sure place in the 100-yard dash.

"I lost my concentration. I've been running long enough so that shouldn't happen," he said afterwards.

Dave Johnson picked up the only other Rocket double win with victories in the 880 and 440-yard run.

"He never really hit me. I got in some good punches in the first round," O'Neill said.

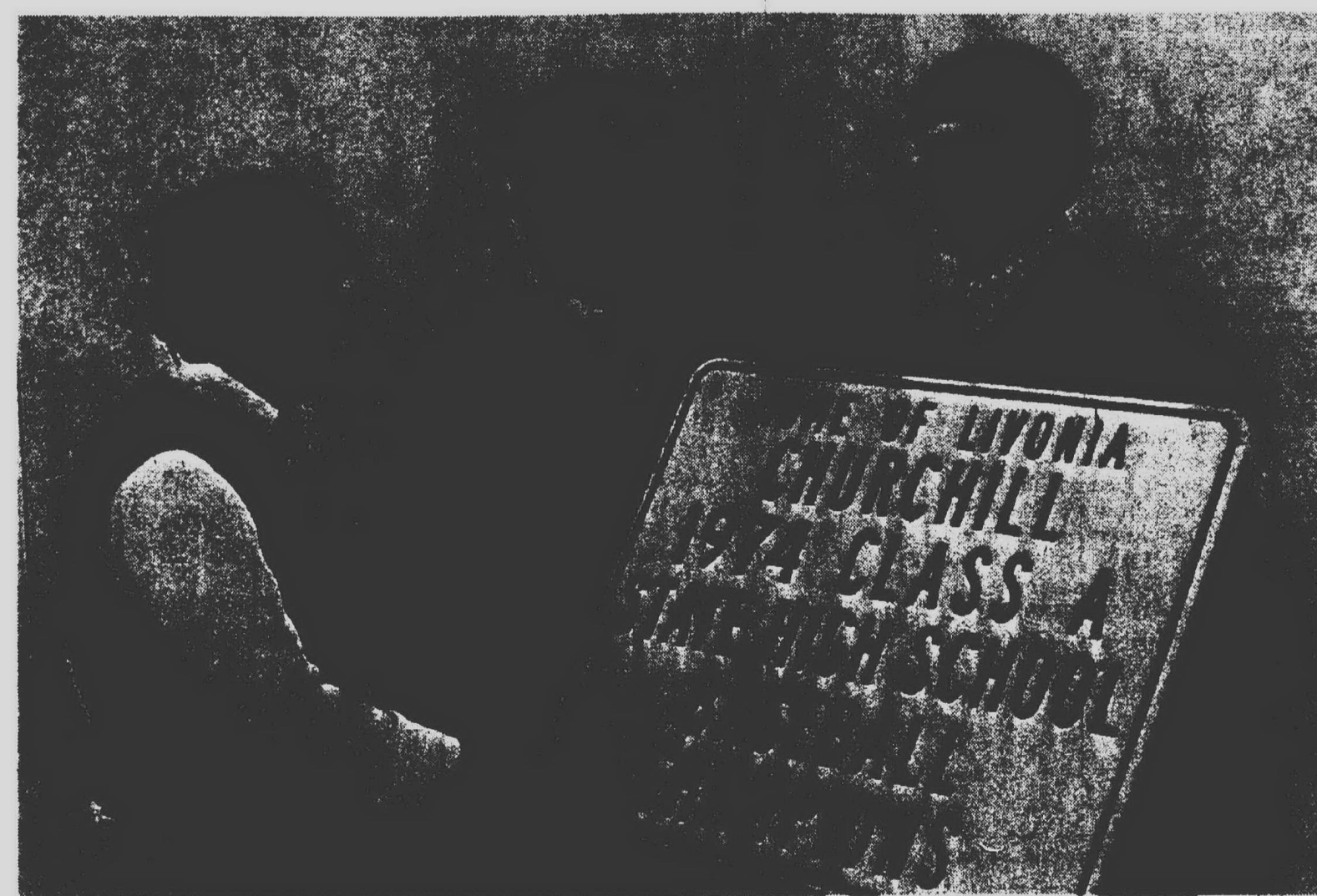
"I didn't avoid clinches enough. He was a good inside fighter."

A final determination of the funding extension will be made by the entire board of commissioners Thursday, May 1.

The funds for the patrol are currently scheduled to expire at the end of April, and the extension would allocate money for the patrol through the end of July.

"It's not what we asked for," said Plymouth Township Supervisor J.D. McLaren of the Ways and Means vote. "We asked them to fund the patrol until a final legal determination was reached. Instead they have chosen to continue this 90 day harassment."

"I guess they didn't buy our arguments. We'll probably have to go through this 90 day thing until the courts rule on the appeal."

McLAREN ADDED, "I'm sorry they didn't see it our way because it's rough on all concerned; the county, the townships and the sheriff's men."

"The worst thing about these 90 day extensions," said Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein, "is that it's detrimental to the morale of the sheriff's men. How can they put forth a decent performance when they're constantly under the gun. They don't know if

they are going to be working the next day."

Before the Ways and Means vote, representatives from the seven townships, (Canton, Plymouth, Northville, Sumpter, Van Buren, Brownstown and Huron) met with members of the county Public Safety and Judiciary Committee to request the patrol be funded until the end of the fiscal year (Nov. 30).

According to a county spokesman, the meeting was unproductive, "and nothing new was discussed."

Greenstein said the townships were united in their demands. "We stood firm. We shouldn't have to pay until a final verdict from the courts is in," he added.

A MARCH 27 ruling by Circuit Court Judge Thomas J. Foley dismissed the townships' request for a declaratory judgment ordering the county to fund the patrol.

Foley said in his opinion the county was not obligated to fund the road patrol, although he did add that sheriff's men would be expected to answer calls.

Supervisors from the seven townships met after that ruling and decided to appeal the case. They hired a new attorney, Bert Burgoyne of Detroit, and an appeal was filed about two weeks ago.

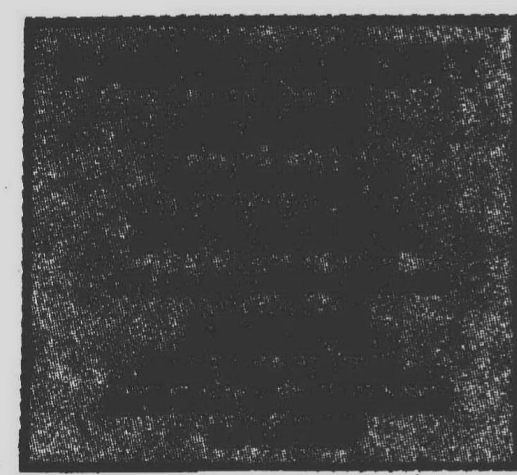
According to Burgoyne, however, a final legal determination will probably not be made for at least three months.

Greenstein said, "We intend to pursue another legal argument in the appeal. Except for a few, the roads in

townships are owned by the county. Those streets are the responsibility of the county through the road commission. A concomitant and concurrent legal responsibility of the county is to patrol those roads.

"I have talked this over with Burgoyne and he thinks it is an exceptional argument."

"They already have to answer calls. You add that together with them having to patrol the roads and you get the road patrol back where we started."

State test results presented to board

PLYMOUTH—Fourth and seventh graders in the Plymouth Community Schools have met or surpassed all but two of more than 50 test objectives in the Michigan Educational Assessment Test.

That is the word school board members will receive tonight (Monday) in a report to the board on the statewide test results.

The tests are given each year to fourth and seventh grade students and contain questions geared primarily to math and reading skills.

ACCORDING TO Pupil Services Director Dr. Edward Page, "Our fourth and seventh graders, by and large, did better than children in the same grade levels statewide."

Fourth graders only scored below the desired state norm on one question out of 49. The question involved reading a thermometer.

Seventh graders also were only off on one item, out of 60 presented, and fell below the norm in comparing fractions with like denominators.

Page pointed out however, that both items produced low scores statewide, and Plymouth students had outperformed scores of last year's fourth and seventh graders on the items that were under the norm.

Page said this year marks the first time in the six-year history of the state assessment tests that comparisons can be made from the previous year.
