Residents voice objections to proposed airport study

PLYMOUTH—A proposed aviation airport met rounds of opposition Thursday night, when residents and officials of six local communities blasted the airport concept at a public hearing held in Plymouth City Hall.

Representatives of the Michigan Aeronautics Commission (MAC), the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), the Wayne County Road Commission, the Michigan State Highway Department, State Rep. Thomas Brown (D—Westland) and State Rep. Roy Smith (R—Ypsilanti) sat on a panel, chaired by Marda Benson, Plymouth Community School Board vice president.

During the course of the two-hour public hearing, virtually no one spoke in favor of an airport, proposed for northwestern Wayne County, northeastern Washtenaw County or southwestern Oakland County.

Residents questioned the need for the airport and objected to its environmental impact on the community.

ROBERT LARSON, a representative of the Wayne County Road Commission which is sponsoring the airport study, said the FAA, the MAC and the road commission will evaluate the reactions of residents in their decision to go ahead with the study plans. That decision, he said, will take at least 60 days.

If the study, funded by the three agencies, proceeds as planned, a site for the airport could be selected in the Plymouth-Canton area. The study plan outlines a series of public informational meetings, an environmental impact hearing and a review team with local representation after a potential site is located.

The airport, representatives of the three agencies pointed out, would be constructed only if it is found financially and ecologically feasible. With runways up to 5,000 feet, the airport would accommodate small corporate jets and other privately owned aircraft.

BUT ONLY ONE of the 60 residents who attended Thursday's meeting spoke in favor of the airport study plan.

"I desire to be educated," he said.

"If you say we need an airport, why? Unlike some of these people, I don't fear a study."

Local officials who objected to the airport included Wayne County Commissioner Royce Smith, Canton Township Treasurer Carl Parsell, Plymouth Township Trustee Richard Gornick, Salem Township Trustee Harvey Barkley and Northville Township Trustee James Nowka.

State Rep. Smith read a letter from State Sen. Carl Pursell (R—Plymouth) in opposition to the airport. Plymouth City Commissioner Norbert Battermann voiced some personal concerns over the airport plan but noted the "noncommittal stand" of the Plymouth City Commission.

Parsell told panel members his views represent the unanimous feelings of the Canton Township board.

"We are unanimously opposed to the airport, because that happens to be the majority feeling of the people in Canton Township," Parsell said. "Everyone here tonight has the feeling that Willow Run will suffice. We want to know the capacity of Willow Run and can it be expanded?"

JERRY TROUT, a representative of the FAA, said a study of Willow Run is now under way.

"But we're finding that people are against airports everywhere," Trout told the audience. "I think maybe the chances are 50-50 that Willow Run will not be expanded. It may even decrease in size."

About 2,000 aircraft now are sitting in airports in southeast Michigan, added Edward Mellman of the Michigan State Highway Department. About half of those aircraft are housed in privately owned airports.

"We predict that most of these private airports will be out they can't get state and federal funds like public airports. It's impossible for existing public airports to absorb all of these 1,200 aircraft, even if the number of aircraft doesn't increase."

"Your answer is a good one," said Larry VanderMolen of Northville Township. "But what we're doing is using public funds to support private aircraft. If you'd like me to go door to door to conduct a public opinion poll, I'd be glad to do it."

ANOTHER RESIDENT added, "It would seem to me that private airports wouldn't go out of business if they were subsidized by the government. Why can't we use the airports already built? Why can't you study that?"

Federal money cannot be used to study and promote new legislation, Trout noted.

If the proposed airport were constructed, the federal government would cover 75 per cent of the costs, explained William Gehman, master planning engineer for the MAC. The state and the Wayne County Road Commission's aviation funds would equally finance the remaining 25 per cent.

Gornick countered, "Assuming we do have 1,200 aircraft that will have to be placed somewhere, I would wonder about the vested interest of 1,200 versus that of 100,000 residents."

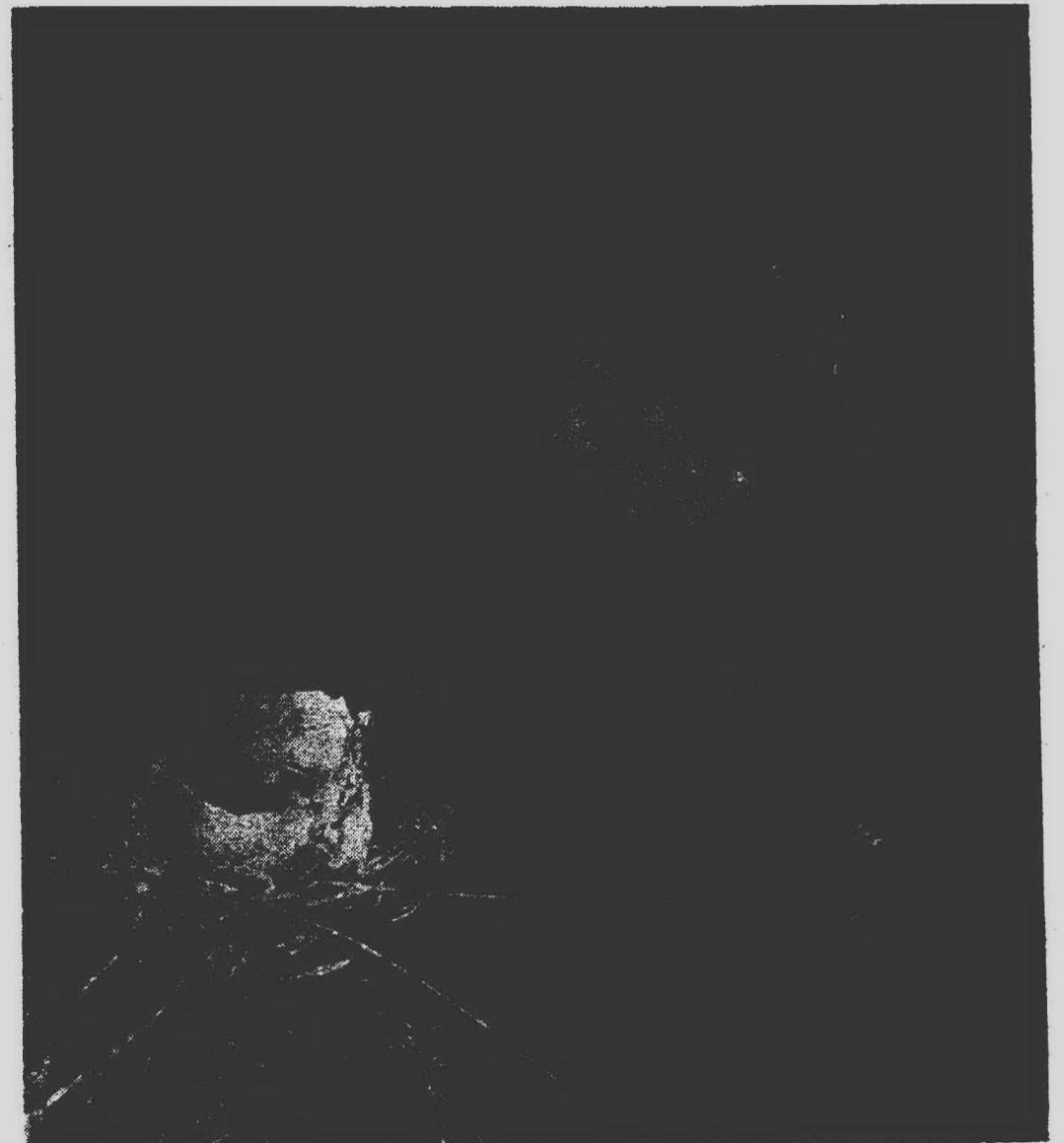
"I would question the basic wisdom of pulling out agricultural land for an

airport," Gornick continued. "We have about 13 per cent of our land left in agriculture, and we want to leave at least eight per cent. Airports do not stay at the size they're built and proposed."

Said one Northville Township resident, "I just moved into this area from a spot near Metropolitan Airport. I moved, because of the air traffic. Now you're presenting me with another airport that will make me move again."

ONE CANTON Township resident added, "I enjoy race cars. If I can get enough people together who enjoy race cars, does that mean I can conduct a feasibility study to run a track through Plymouth? I think airports are the same thing."

"Is this feasibility study nothing more than finding out where the least resistance is and attacking that spot?" he asked. "Do we have a voice in this, or is Big Daddy going to lay one on us?"

Water board expansion sought

Suburban officials from Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties want the Detroit Metropolitan Water Board expanded to represent their customers and prevent arbitrary rate increases in the future.

The committee of 20 officials, meeting Tuesday in the office of Mayor Edward McNamara of Livonia, overwhelmingly voted to endorse an expanded board of water commissioners instead of creating a separate water authority which would oversee water and sewer rates and expansions.

The officials also insisted that there be an independent audit of the water department's books with the hope that the Detroit and suburban costs and revenues would be separated.

SIMILAR ACTION was taken on that issue the previous day by a special House of Representatives study committee created in February to

look into the water department and how it sets rates.

The committee voted to ask the state auditor general audit the books.

The suburban officials, meeting at the suggestion of McNamara, who has spearheaded the opposition to the water board rate hikes, felt that an expansion of the board to include more suburban representatives would be the best route to follow.

They felt there would be serious political problems if a separate agency or authority were created to oversee the water system's operations and rates.

Mayor Eugene McKinney of Westland, named to the special committee of officials following a meeting last month in Southfield, strongly pushed for the water board expansion over the separate agency.

The answer to the problem is better

representation of the suburbs on the board, he said.

"Let's fight the battle on that ground," he added.

McKinney felt that another agency regulating the water system would create "another layer of government" and could mean more problems.

"We need an agency of reasonable men to make reasonable decisions," McKinney said in arguing for more suburban representation on the water board.

THE SEVEN-MEMBER board now has four Detroiters and three members from the suburbs, one each from western Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties. All are named by the Detroit mayor and serve without specific terms.

The size of the board is set by the new Detroit city charter.

Officials discussing suburban repre-

sentation agreed that the Michigan Public Service Commission isn't the answer to the water management problem and how rates are set.

McKinney said he "doesn't have much confidence" in the PSC and felt the commission "could be harder to get at than the water board."

There was no specific consensus on how the water board should be enlarged or what formula should be used to pick suburban members.

PART OF the two-hour discussion touched on the water department budget and its relation to the proposed rate boost which was first rejected, then approved and later rescinded by the board of which McNamara is a member.

Smith adds U-M students

PLYMOUTH—College students at Smith Elementary? Unlikely perhaps, but students from the University of Michigan have been sharing the classrooms with first through fifth graders at Smith the past four months as part of the university's "Project Outreach Schools Project."

It seems to have helped both the students from the U-M and the youngsters at Smith.

"It's really been a fantastic program," said Mrs. Sandy Scott, third grade teacher at Smith. "The kids really benefited from it."

THE PROGRAM, developed by the university psychology department, is

intended to give university students practical experience "outside the lecture hall."

Said a university spokesman: "The purpose of the program is to act as a link between the university and local communities in an attempt to bridge the gap between learning about the world in the classroom and experiencing it first hand."

He continued, "Our goal in the schools project is to make the experience of learning synonymous with direct involvement in the classroom."

The university students are given two credits for participating in the program.

Six U-M students have visited Smith each Wednesday afternoon since January and assisted teachers with their regular programs as well as developing their own.

Although the students worked as teacher aides, they were not all education majors, and the Smith pupils benefited from a wide range of interests.

THE OUTREACH students taught Smith youngsters everything from cooking and drama to athletics and art. They worked in small groups as tutors and taught full classes as well.

One "outreacher," Barbara Fishletter, worked on a skit with class members, while another, Peter Schroeder, worked on a science project where students grew carrots under varying environmental conditions.

"They weren't education majors and this wasn't mandatory teaching for them. They were interested in the kids and they brought various skills to the classroom," said Smith School Principal William Lutz. "Actually, I've never seen a group so well received by the teachers. We'd like them here more of the time."

He added, "I think the interaction was profitable for both the university and elementary students."

Here's suburban status in Detroit busing case

DETROIT — It will be several months, if not a year, before any suburb becomes directly involved in the federal lawsuit to integrate the Detroit School District.

That explanation was given Friday by Joe Madison, executive director of the Detroit chapter of the NAACP, to the Observer & Eccentric amid confusion about the status of the suburbs in the busing case now being heard by U.S. District Judge Robert DeMascio.

"At this point, it is too premature to say which suburbs will be chosen and what evidence will be used. There will be no immediate filings involving a cross-district plan and it will be at least a year before any hearings will begin."

The NAACP legal staff is now concentrating efforts on a Detroit-only plan, Madison added, which is the

only matter now being considered by DeMascio.

DeMascio had kept the suburbs in the lawsuit based on a motion made

by the NAACP and then gave the plaintiffs several days to return with substantial evidence of suburbs being guilty of segregation which affected Detroit schools.

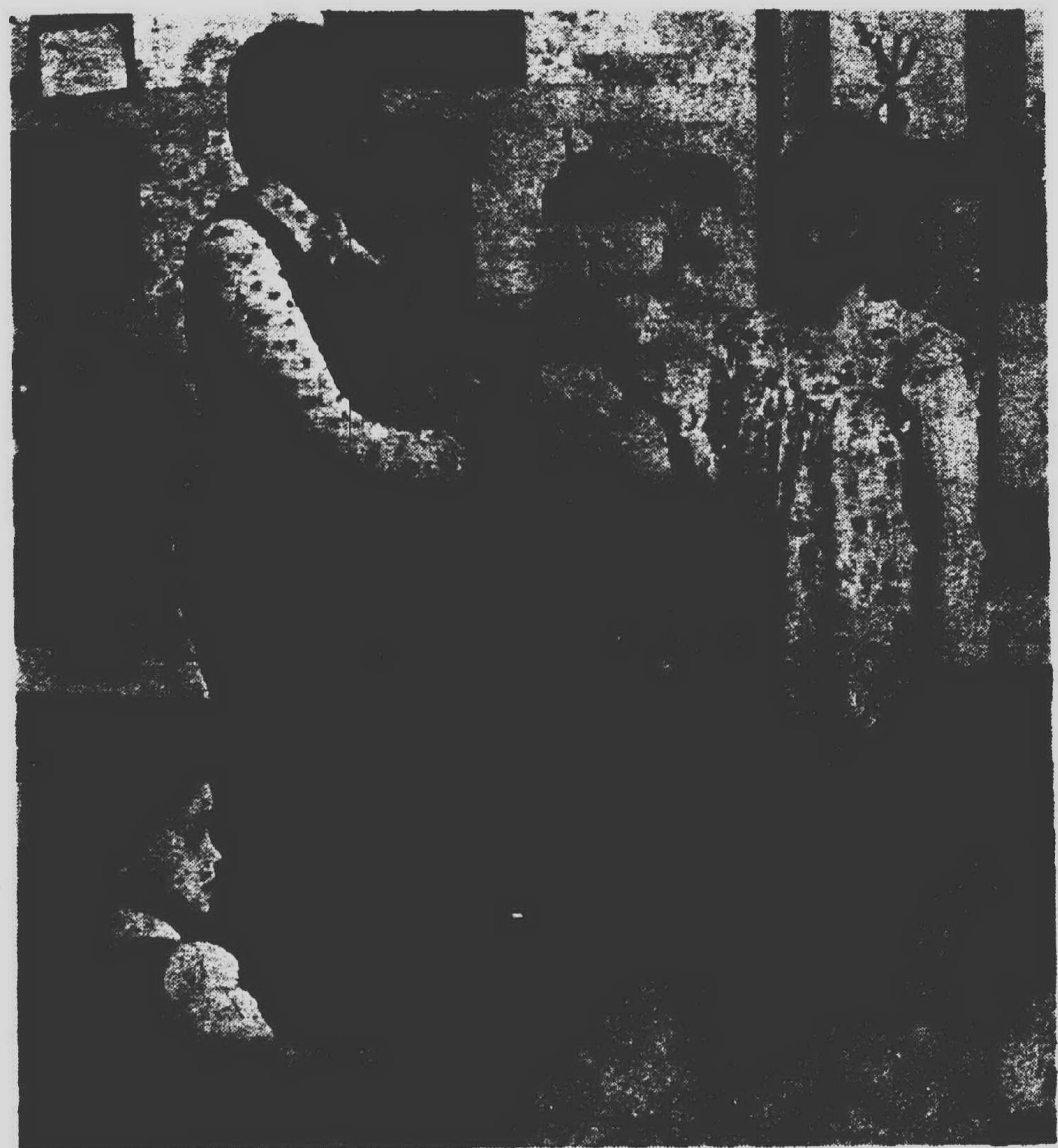

HUD freezes fund applications

DETROIT — A freeze has been placed on approval of Community Development Act (CDA) applications of 26 suburbs by the Detroit office of the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The freeze affects block grant applications submitted by Livonia, Southfield, Rochester, Redford Township, Westland and Garden City.

The temporary freeze was ordered Wednesday by HUD in Washington, which directed the Detroit office not to approve any application until formally investigating complaints of the Coalition for Block Grant Compliance, Detroit.

THE COALITION filed a 10-page complaint in Washington, Wednesday, charging the suburbs with violating CDA requirements to estimate and plan housing for persons working in a community but living elsewhere.

The complaint was filed by attorneys for the National Committee Against Discrimination in Housing which has agreed to provide free legal counsel to the coalition. The NCDH is a 25-year-old civil rights organization engaged in research, public relations, technical assistance, legal services and monitoring government enforcement of fair housing laws.

The 10-page filing was supported by a 200-page appendix which contained specific charges against each of the 26 suburbs. As of press-time, only the 10-page filing could be obtained.

THE COMPLAINT asks that funds be denied for 12 suburbs which have "deficiencies of such a magnitude as to require substantial changes" to comply with the Community Development Act of 1974.

Among the 12 in this category are Livonia, Southfield, Rochester and Dearborn. The Detroit HUD office was reportedly ready to approve Dearborn's application when it received the freeze order.

The administrative complaint states

13 suburbs are "guilty" of less substantial violations which the coalition believes can be easily corrected. If not corrected, the coalition will ask for denial of funding, reports Joe Guggenheim, a coalition leader and executive director of the Michigan Committee on Law and Housing.

Among the suburbs in this category are Garden City and Westland.

Redford Township is in a special category because township officials had asked for a meeting with the coalition to discuss alleged deficiencies in its application. Guggenheim says Redford will not be named as an "offender" until it is determined whether the application is satisfactorily changed.

THE 10-PAGE filing also includes a complaint against HUD practices which the coalition alleges have "forced or added to the pattern of discrimination" it sees in the 26 applications.

Guggenheim adds the coalition will file suit in federal district court if HUD fails to review the complaint. "I'm pretty sure we could get an injunction from federal court if HUD doesn't consider our complaints."

"We have temporarily stopped the funding and the Washington office is now involved in the investigation — it is no longer a Detroit office only involvement."

AS OF APRIL 30, the formal complaint filed by the coalition was the first comprehensive challenge in the nation to actions of suburbs and HUD itself under the newly-enacted CDA block grant program.

"The administrative complaint also could have an impact on the efforts of the NAACP to prove de jure segregation and gain a cross-district busing remedy in the Detroit school segregation case," said Guggenheim.

Besides failing to provide housing for workers, the complaint states, the sum total of housing assistance plans submitted by the 26 suburbs "violate the rights of minority persons under

Title VI of the 1964 Civil Rights Act to benefit from activities financed by federal funds."

The complaint alleges that the aggregate impact of the 26 block grant applications "will have the inevitable effect of perpetuating exclusion of low and moderate income persons, particularly minority group members, from entering and residing in suburban parts of the Detroit metropolitan area and to discriminate against those low and moderate income persons who already reside there."

The coalition sent complaints in March to each of the 26 suburbs, Guggenheim said. Although the Detroit HUD office advised all 26 they were required to respond to the coalition in a "timely and responsive manner," he added, as of April 30 only nine suburbs had responded.

The complaint charges that 23 of the 26 suburbs contain estimates of workers living elsewhere that are "plainly inconsistent with facts and data generally available."

The filing also claims the coalition forwarded data to 17 of the 26 suburbs demonstrating housing needs far greater than those indicated in the applications submitted to HUD for approval.

It is charged that 19 of the applications are plainly inconsistent with regional goals as to housing opportunities for minority group workers that are related to employment opportu-

nities adopted by the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG). "None of the 19 applications contains an explanation for the inconsistency."

The coalition states that of the total 2,765 proposed assisted housing units of the 26 suburbs, some 2,067 (75 per cent) are designated for the elderly and not for families. Only 37 units (1.3 per cent) of proposed Section 8 units are to be newly constructed units for families to meet the needs of workers.

The complaint asks that HUD request all necessary revisions reject those applications which don't contain the following:

- A realistic assessment of the needs of families expected to reside.

- Goals for assisted housing which realistically take into account the number of families expected to reside.

- Housing assistant plans consistent with the achievement of regional goals adopted by SEMCOG.

- Housing assistant plans to use Section 8 funds for family housing.

- Community development plans which accord maximum feasibility priority to activities to benefit low or moderate income families or aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight.

Esch fights delay of block grant OK

WASHINGTON, DC — U.S. Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) has demanded from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) assurances that there won't be any undue delay in approving local Community Development Act (CDA) applications.

Esch, whose 2nd District includes Livonia and Plymouth, made that demand to David Meeker, assistant secretary for the Community Planning and Development division of HUD.

For the past couple weeks, Esch has met with officials from Plymouth, Canton Township, Livonia and Redford Township about difficulties Michigan communities are having with their CDA applications.

In assisting in arranging meetings between local administrators and HUD, Esch said public officials who represent townships and cities in the Detroit area feel certain HUD officials are using the CDA as a vehicle to force particular programs, such as specific housing plans, on local communities.

"While I recognize there must be compliance with existing federal law, the intent of the CDA was to maximize decision-making at the local level, and not force precise bureaucratically mandated programs on local residents."

"I am going to continue to work with local officials and to insist that the bureaucrats in HUD don't subvert the intent of Congress by undue delay in bureaucratic regulations."

Specifically, Esch wants assurances from HUD that:

- HUD won't dictate what must be included in individual community programs.

- Communities will have control over their program as approved by their governing bodies.

- HUD won't dictate that specific types of housing be included in individual programs.

- Changes in environmental regulations won't affect a proposal that has already been approved.

"I've received preliminary assurances from federal officials in this regard, but due to misunderstandings that have clearly arisen I have de-

manded of Secretary Meeker that written assurances be provided in these matters."





Centennial Park Band honored in Lansing

Joining the ranks of only two other Michigan high school bands, the Plymouth Centennial Park Symphony Band was honored April 30 as the "best high school band" in the state.

Taking the stage in Lansing's Civic Center Auditorium, the band performed a strong repertoire for the third annual Governor's Concert.

Topping off a year highlighted by a trip to the Orange Bowl and a straight I rating at district band competition, the band was selected to perform the concert from the more than 500 high school bands in the state.

Unable to make the concert because of a conference at the White House, Governor Milliken was represented by Lt. Gov. James Damman and his wife, Peggy.

Noting humorously "We can always use more harmony in Lansing," Damman praised the band, noting that the members demonstrate "the real character of the state of Michigan."

"You should be very proud of what you've been able to achieve," the lieutenant governor commented, adding "You're the best that the state of Michigan has tonight."

In a dinner awards ceremony preceding the concert, the band was awarded and honored with a joint resolution by both houses of the State Legislature, and a four-foot trophy noting the band's accomplishment as the best in the state.

The 92 band members were each given a governor's medal to commemorate the achievement.

Speaking on behalf of the band, director James Griffith accepted the many honors and commended his band, noting, "I probably don't tell you enough how much I appreciate you, but I'm proud to be the catalyst and part of you."

The evening was sponsored by McDonald Restaurants of Michigan, who have provided the financial backing for the concert since its beginning in 1973.

The Saginaw Community Youth Band launched the Governor's Concert program in that year and was followed last year by the Ann Arbor Huron High School band.

the Centennial Park Band, Frank Mills, director of the Saginaw Community Youth Band noted, "We've proven that music is important."

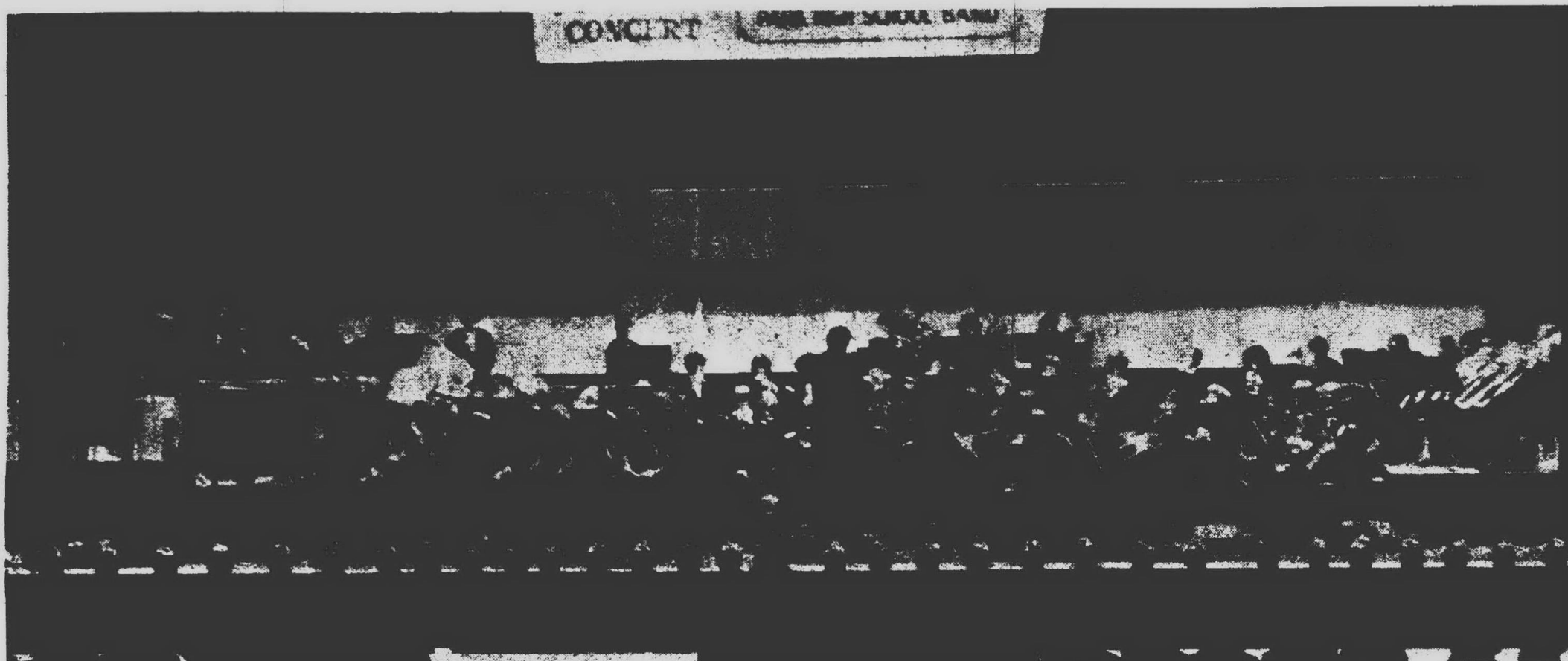
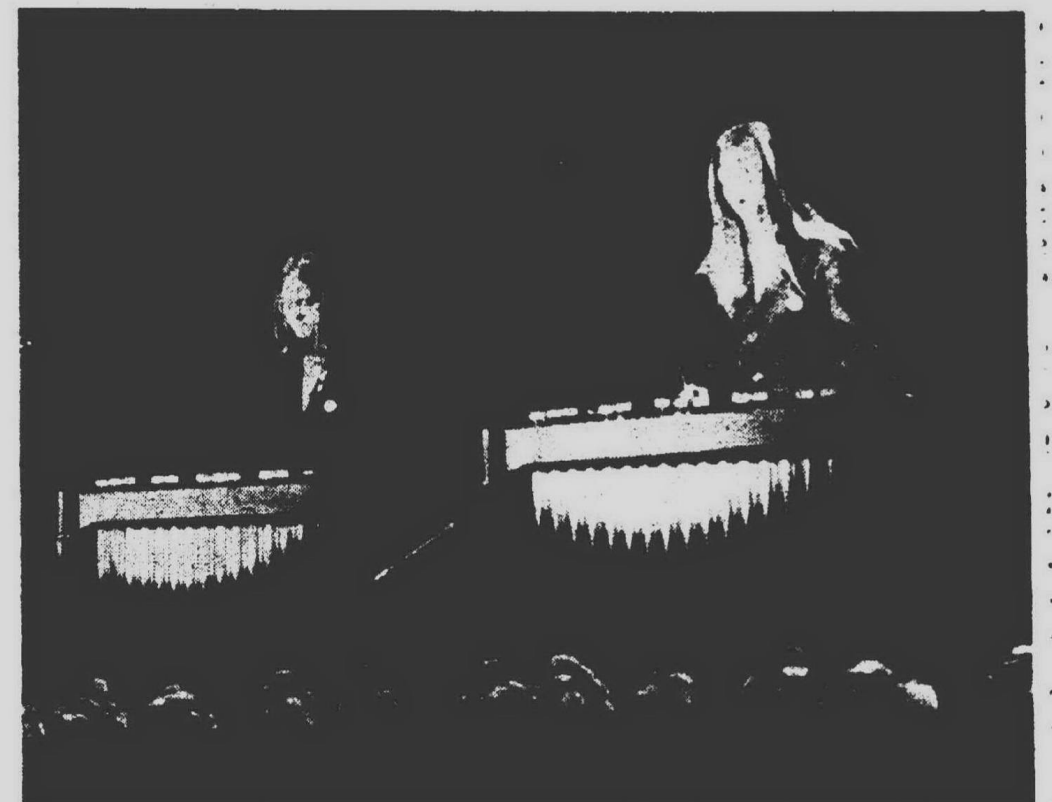
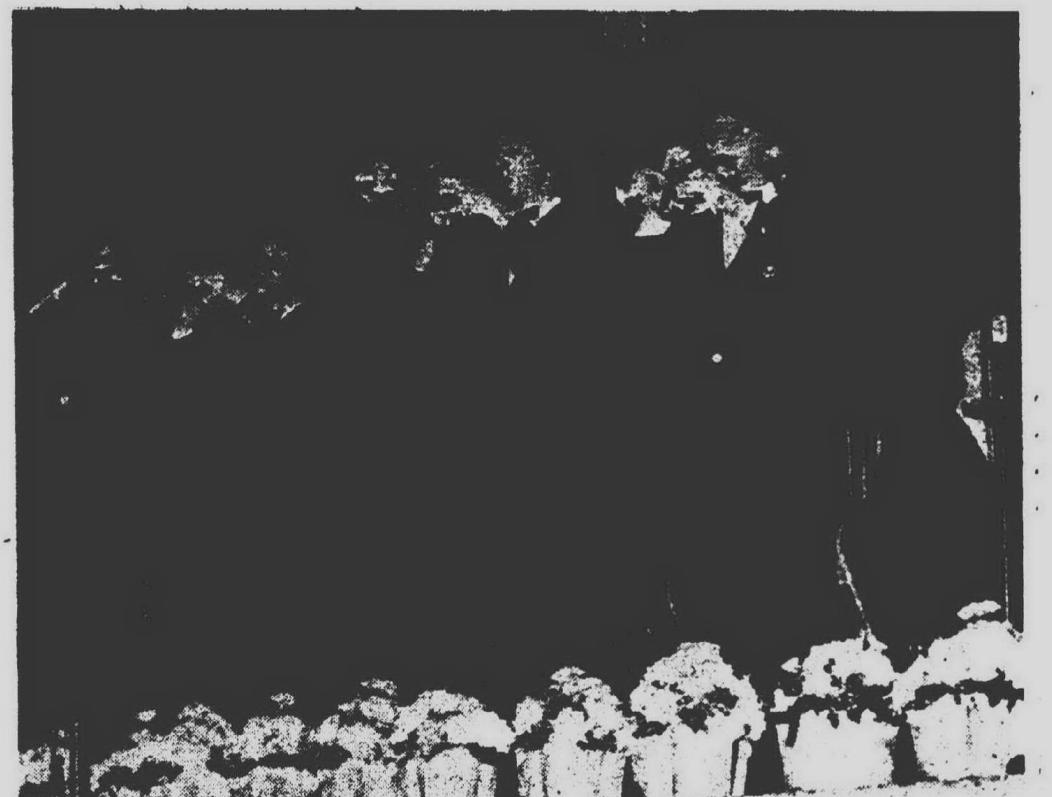

Patrol funding extension approved

By a 16-4 margin, the Wayne County Board of Commissioners voted to fund the Sheriff's road patrol an additional 90 days through the end of July. The vote, taken Thursday, May 1, came one day after funds had expired for the patrol. The Ways and Means Committee had recommended approval or the funding extension seven days earlier.

THE COUNTY has been negotiating with representatives from seven townships currently serviced by the patrol since Wayne Circuit Judge Thomas J. Foley ruled the county was no longer obligated to fund the road patrol. Members of the county's Public Safety and Judiciary committee met with township officials from Northville, Plymouth, Canton, Van Buren,

Sumpter, Brownstown and Huron two weeks ago and asked them to help fund a portion of the patrol. Township officials replied they were awaiting a decision on the appeal of Foley's decision and they would not chip in any money. An appeal of Foley's decision was filed several weeks ago by the townships' new attorney, Bert Burgoyne.

He says a decision will not be rendered for several months. While township officials were pleased with the funding extension, some dissatisfaction was expressed over the fact it was only for 90 days.

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP Supervisor J. D. McLaren called it "harassment" while Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein said the action was "detrimental to the morale of the road patrol officers." "How can you expect them to put forth a decent performance when they are constantly under the gun. They don't even know if they are going to be working the next day," Greenstein seems confident the appeal will be successful. He says the fact that the roads are the county's property will aid in the appeal. "If they own them, they should have to patrol them."

The fight over funding of the patrol has been going on for almost five years. In August 1974, the county threatened not to fund the patrol for the last fiscal quarter of 1974 (Sept.-Nov.)

Cargo leaves Plymouth after 7-year ministry

PLYMOUTH—After completing seven years as senior minister of the First United Methodist Church of Plymouth, the Rev. Paul M. Cargo has been appointed minister of the First United Methodist Church at Clarkston. Rev. Cargo's present associate, Rev. Dale M. Miller, was reappointed associate minister here by Bishop Dwight E. Loder. At worship services on Sunday, announcement was made of the appointment of the Rev. Samuel F. Stout of Marquette, to be Rev. Cargo's suc-

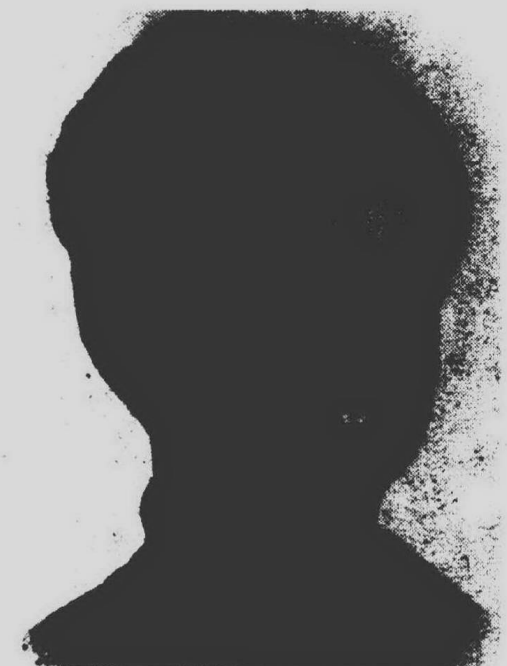

She took first place in the Ford Employees and Families' Art Exhibit with a pastel nude entitled "Irma." A needlepoint wall hanging called "Navajo" won a premium award at the 1974 Michigan State Fair and Miss Hay won the first award in last year's fair for a hand woven wall hanging called "Taqhamenon," inspired by the upper Michigan falls. Some of Miss Hay's pastels were commissioned by Plymouth residents and hang in local homes. Friends say Jan Marie Hay was "involved and excited about any craft or skill she considered creative." She was treasurer and dancer in the fledg-

Fishback is on dean's list

A graduate of Plymouth High School and majoring in transportation, Fishback is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Fishback, 1754 Fantucket.

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP—An apartment complex may one day rise at the southeast corner of Five Mile and Bradner despite opposition from township officials and residents.

Wayne County Circuit Judge Charles Kaufman has ended a three-year battle between Binder & Lark Building Co. and the township over rezoning of the 8.3-acre parcel from single family to multiple residential.

In his decision, Kaufman forever enjoined the township "from preventing the construction, development and use of the land for multiple residential use."

The township board of trustees recently voted to forego appeal of the decision. A May 1 deadline governed filing of the appeal.

"I guess our decision was based upon the advice of our attorney (Donald Morgan)," said Supervisor J. D. McLaren. "Apparently he didn't feel we had a strong chance of winning the appeal."

CLERK HELEN Richardson added, "I personally felt we had spent enough money. I think Don did an excellent defense, and I don't think there's too much more the township can do."

According to Mrs. Richardson, the case has cost the township "well over" \$6,000. Morgan has not yet submitted his bill for the case, but town-

ship planner Norman Dietrich, who testified as a township witness, has submitted a bill for more than \$6,000.

The rezoning battle started in May 1972, when the township planning commission recommended denial of the rezoning request. The board of trustees voted against rezoning in July 1972.

"There was a tremendous amount of opposition from residents living in the area," Mrs. Richardson explained.

Binder & Lark Building Co. filed a suit against the township to obtain the zoning change, needed to construct a 72-unit multiple residential development on the site.

"OUR POSITION was that R-1 (single family residential) was reasonable and in accord with the master plan of the township," said Morgan. "The whole thing relates to the question, 'Did the ordinance designate an appropriate land use?' The judge is basically saying that apartments aren't inappropriate."

In his decision, Kaufman said, "This court would find that from the standpoint of the public health, safety or welfare, there is no valid justification to deny the R-2-A (multiple family residential) classification."

"There was a substantial amount of evidence produced regarding the need for multiple dwelling units in the general area. This evidence should strong-

ly indicate to the court that the Plymouth Township ordinance does not take adequate recognition of the needs of the public welfare of Plymouth Township and the region within which it exists."

REGARDING THE R-1 zoning of the site, Kaufman said, "It appears that this property is completely unsuitable for development as single family units. The evidence as presented and accepted by this court clearly indicates that the cost of developing 36 single residential lots would exceed the value of the aggregate lots thus produced."

"It is also interesting to note that in all the evidence presented concerning negotiations for sale of this parcel as R-1, there were no offers," Kaufman said. "All the negotiations concerning this parcel were subject to a change of zoning to multiple."

Mrs. Richardson said Binder & Lark Building Co. has not contacted

the township about the apartment project, since Kaufman delivered his opinion about a month ago.

Representatives of the construction company and its attorney, Norman Hyman, were unavailable for comment.

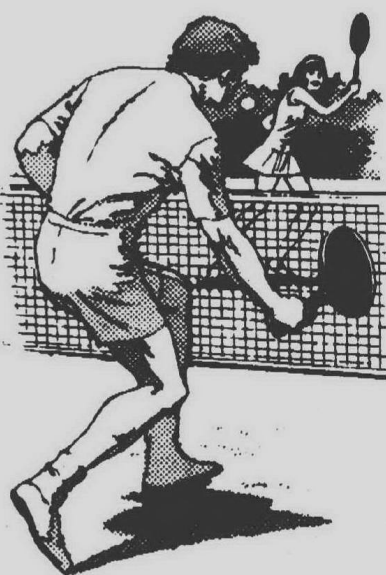

Total moon eclipse comes on May 25

ANN ARBOR—The astronomical highlight of May will be a total eclipse of the moon, notes University of Michigan astronomer Hazel M. Losh.

"At about 12:01 a.m. May 25, (Eastern Daylight Saving Time), the moon's eastern edge will make its first contact with the earth's shadow, and a noticeable dimming at this edge will begin."

THE DARKENED area will gradually spread over the surface, she continues, until, at 1:04 a.m., the moon will be in total eclipse.

"Although not nearly as dramatic as a total eclipse of the sun, the passage of the moon through the earth's shadow is a fascinating event — and safe to observe with the unaided eye," the U-M astronomer adds, pointing out that for a lunar eclipse to occur, the phase of the moon must be full, and it must be situated in nearly the same plane as the earth and sun.

"When the moon is wholly immersed in shadow it will not be invisible, as one might suppose, but rather will shine with a dull reddish or copperish light because of the sunlight being refracted into the earth's shadow by our atmosphere."

Prof. Losh says at the time of the eclipse, which ends at 3:37 a.m., the moon will be located almost directly south about 25 degrees above the horizon.

MAY WILL ALSO bring perhaps an hour more of daylight by the end of the month.

"Coupled with Daylight Saving Time, the later setting of the sun will be especially noticeable."

One of the most interesting constellations of May is Lyra, she observes. Rising in the northeast, Lyra consists of an equilateral triangle and parallelogram with the bluish star, Vega, at the apex of the triangle.

"Not only is Vega the goal of our

solar system, for it is in its general direction that our sun seems to be dragging the planets, but it is also our former and future Pole Star.

"Some 14,000 years ago Vega served in this capacity, and will again in about 12,000 years," she says. Vega will be six times brighter than our current Pole Star, found at the end of the handle of the Little Dipper.

Also referred to as the "Arc Light of the Sky" because of its bluish tinge, Vega is comparable in brightness to the yellow Capella, which sets in the northwest, and the orange Arcturus, positioned higher in the northeastern sky.

"These colors are believed to be an indication of temperature, blue being hotter and orange cooler," Prof. Losh notes.

Public works action asked

With nearly one fourth its potential work force jobless, quick approval of a proposed \$5 billion public works bill is needed to relieve Detroit area poverty, the chairman of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners has told a Congressional committee.

Detroit unemployment tops 23 per cent, Chairman Roscoe L. Bobo told a Washington hearing of a House Public Works committee. Some sections of the city have more than 50 per cent unemployed.

Some 313,600 persons, representing more than 16 per cent of the work force, are idle in the five-county area surrounding Detroit, Bobo said, creating what he called a "prairie of poverty."

County construction needs include court facilities, two new jails — one in downtown Detroit and one in a suburb — better quarters for the County Medical Examiner and more office space for the State Department of Social Services which the law demands the county provide.

Festival to aid blood pressure

Cloche hats, a "speakeasy" and vaudeville acts will recreate the spirit of the 1920s on the Henry Ford Community College campus May 16, 17 and 18.

The "Good Time '20s" festival, sponsored by the Associated Student Government, is co-chaired by Karen Gabrys of Redford Township and Karel Tess of Dearborn Heights.

Proceeds will go to Blood Pressure Control, a new health agency in Southeastern Michigan formed to fight hypertension.

Students attired in period dress will man games and rides, supervise gaming tables, serve bootleg (root) beer and introduce impersonators of such famous vaudeville acts as Laurel and Hardy.

Livonia may hire Lansing lobbyist

LIVONIA — Livonia's city government may soon have a man in the state capital to represent it before the state government and keep the city informed about issues affecting it.

The City Council will discuss May 21 the request of Mayor Edward McNamara who asked the city pay one-third, or \$5,000, of the representative's salary, plus expenses, up to \$1,000.

"With a push for an improved formula for state shared revenue (to cities) and several other bills pending that could be most helpful or detrimental, I believe this would be money well spent," the mayor said.

The approval of the representative would be in the form of a contract with the Michigan Municipal League, of which McNamara is present.

The representative, who would

make personal reports to the council to discuss pending state legislation, would be known as a "state capitol assistant."

He would be required to keep informed about state issues affecting the city and provide the city with information on programs in which the city would be interested.

The person would "contact state agencies regarding the city's interest in state programs or the city's inter-

est when city applications are under consideration by such agencies," the agreement stated.

Finishes sales training course

Michele T. Castiglione of Redford, a sales representative for Norwich Products Division, Morton-Norwich Products, Inc., recently completed a basic sales training course at the division's home office in Norwich, N.J.

Miss Castiglione, a native Detroit, earned her BBA degree in marketing from Eastern Michigan University in 1974. She joined Norwich later in the year and is now assigned to a sales territory headquartered in Detroit.

MoTech center to service cars for police force

LIVONIA—Livonia policemen will soon be able to spend more time on the road and less waiting for patrol cars to be serviced and repaired.

The change will come if the city council approves a new car maintenance and servicing agreement with MoTech, an auto training school, next Wednesday, May 7.

If approved, the agreement would have MoTech, a Chrysler Corp. department at 35155 Industrial Road near Levan in Livonia, have two fulltime mechanics available for the police department's 76 patrol cars.

Capt. James Mogan told the council

last week that the plan would save the department about \$7,000 a year and put patrol cars and officers back on the road faster than before when cars were serviced at private service stations.

The MoTech agreement would cost the city an estimated \$73,000 a year. Another advantage of the plan would be that the department would have one firm handling its auto maintenance records.

Without the change, the department could have to assign a policeman as maintenance coordinator at an annual cost of \$20,000 a year.

Livonia fund-raising policy OK'd

By MARILYN FITCHETT

LIVONIA—The Livonia school board Monday gave tentative approval to a policy covering gifts to the district and setting guidelines for school fund-raisers.

The policy gives the district the right to reject a gift and names the superintendent responsible for accepting gifts of more than \$250 in value.

10 students from C'ville to be honored

Ten Clarenceville High School students will be honored at the honors convocation of the Detroit Area Association of Phi Beta Kappa Monday, May 12, in Ford Auditorium, Detroit.

Students with a 3.7 scholastic average or higher from 100 area high schools will be recognized for their outstanding academic achievement.

Students, with their parents, invited to attend are Beth E. Berman, Judy Craig, Jody Craig, Victoria Dutton, Sandra Flack, Arnold Goldman, Robert Kaplan, Val Luka, Sally Shoop and Roger Zacks.

According to Dale Collier, Franklin High School principal and head of the policy committee, the district "now has the right to say no to something like a junk car which would be more a liability than an asset."

KEY STIPULATION of the policy is that students are not allowed to participate in door-to-door or shopping center solicitations.

Collier's committee reported that while some schools did not sponsor any fund-raisers, some schools held as many as 42 last year. More than \$200,000 was raised district wide with one high school which Collier would not name, earning \$35,000.

The burden of the responsibility in accepting gifts under \$250 and regulating fund-raising activities involving students or use of school facilities rests with the school principals.

The board initially listed some objections to the policies with secretary Charles Akey questioning one rule which says, "The total value of all contributions made by school related community organizations to a particular school shall not exceed \$10 per student."

THE LIMIT was originally listed in the policy recommendations as \$5 per student but Supt. George Garver

agreed to change the limit to \$10 as in the current policy.

Akey charged that the policy was inconsistently defined and suggested that the limit per student could be eliminated.

His criticism was answered by Deputy Supt. Dr. Paul Johnson, who defended the policy as one which can be "fairly administered."

"The buck has to stop somewhere," Johnson said, "and with this policy it stops with the principal."

"If it wouldn't you'd have teachers and others promoting trips to Europe and advertising the trips in our school newspapers."

"You'd have people exploiting kids and cutthroat competition for the most profitably enterprise."

"You can try to be laissez faire about this but there will come a time you'll want to turn around and go back to a policy."

With the board still discussing the policy, President Mark Scarr was about to appoint a committee of three board members to go over the policy with Collier. But Trustee Martin Seitz contended the issue should be immediately settled.

After further discussion, the board agreed to accept the policy as it was submitted. The issue will be taken up at Monday's (May 5) board meeting.

The policy would limit students to participating in two in-school charitable drives per year.

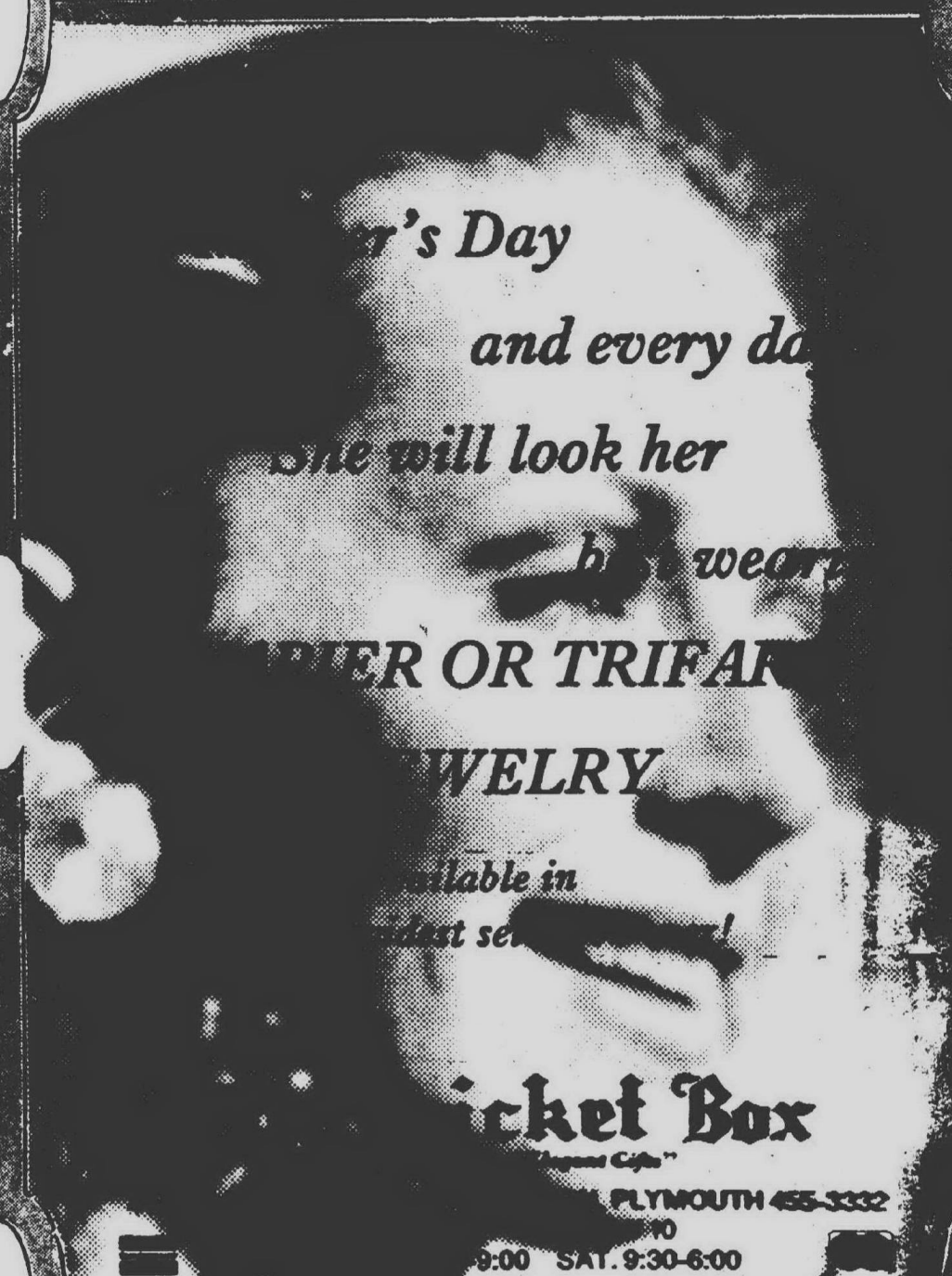

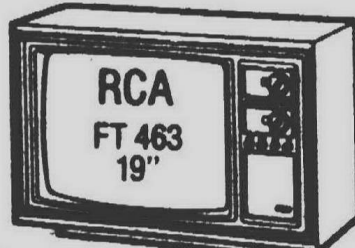

Miller parents grill board again

CANTON—More than 100 residents in the Miller School attendance area confronted school board members and

administrators Thursday over the controversial 45-15 year round program at a meeting arranged by the "Concerned Parents in the Miller School District."

The meeting, which took place in Miller School auditorium was supposedly arranged "to provide better communication between school board members and parents of students attending Miller."

"We want a constructive meeting to help parents better understand the 45-15 program," said "Concerned Parent" chairman E. J. Marville.

The meeting however, developed into a forum for complaints. Residents attending the meeting interrupted guests and one another repeatedly as they complained about the cost, scheduling of vacations, and educational drawbacks of the 45-15 program.

SHOUTS OF RECALL, filled the air when school board trustee George Lawton indicated a reconsideration of the 45-15 program by the board was unlikely, while Secretary Marcia Borowski wasn't allowed to speak.

Cheers greeted trustee Gary Mirto's comment that the school board had acted arbitrarily in voting for the 45-15 program.

Parents against the program repeatedly voiced complaints about the track system, particularly where students would have as many as 38 days off over the winter. "What am I supposed to do with my kids for six weeks," one irate resident asked.

The 45-15 program is set up so that students attend school for nine weeks and then have three weeks off. Students are assigned to one of four "tracks" which are staggered so that the school is used year round.

Others said they had received nothing but political answers and they would now opt to have their children bused from the attendance area.

INVITED to speak at the meeting were deputy superintendent Dr. Earl Hogan, the entire school board, (Mirto, Borowski and Lawton showed) and two guests who were familiar with the 45-15 program in operation. They were Cathleen Lupton, of Shepard grade school in Lincoln Park and Jim Bonner, principal of a middle school in Taylor.

The biggest complaint voiced by residents against the 45-15 program

was that the board was not listening to them. They said surveys they had taken had been ignored. Judy Uttermark said a new survey, "completely unbiased," was being mailed to Miller School parents and she asked Lawton and Mrs. Borowski if the board would consider it.

Lawton responded that "the decision had been made," and he said given the fact that the responses were being mailed back to Mrs. Uttermark who had a distinct bias, he would pay little attention to the results.

MRS. BOROWSKI, who had not been allowed to speak earlier because of crowd noise, said, "I would look at the results of the survey, but I don't think it would compel me to reconsider the issue."

She added, "We are elected officials of the entire district and we are here to serve the needs of the entire district. We have a critical problem of space throughout the district. We don't have schools where we need them."

"We have not been arbitrary in choosing the 45-15 program. For two years we have looked at the achievements of students involved in other 45-15 programs. We looked at all the options."

Mrs. Borowski continued, "A survey doesn't answer the problem of what you do with extra children when the schools are busting at the seams. If you went out and took a survey against taxes you know what the result would be, but that wouldn't solve the problem."

Mirto countered, "I would prefer to accept the petition. I have never been one to impose my will on other people. As it stands now there are more people against the 45-15 than there are in favor of it. The board has acted arbitrarily and I for one do not want to ram this program down anybody's throat."

The 45-15 program is due to begin July 14, when students in the first track will begin school.

Canton signs are disappearing

CANTON—Residents driving through the township may notice a difference around the major intersections in Canton—the multitudes of builders' sign and advertisements have disappeared.

Calls have been going out from township offices daily, instructing builders to remove their signs.

The new sign ordinance, part of a comprehensive "interim zoning package" passed by the township board, is behind the change. "We've taken down about 100 signs said Supervisor Robert Greenstein. We have removed every illegal sign I know about."

He added, "It's been a Herculean task and I think it has resulted in a great benefit to the visual image of the township. I think it's one of the more important accomplishments of this administration."

THE ORDINANCE, originally passed as a measure to "maintain the status quo," has had retroactive effects.

The old sign ordinance, passed in 1967, stated that before signs could be erected a permit had to be paid for.

According to the supervisor, few builders followed the procedure. "It's their own negligence," commented Greenstein. "It was right there in the ordinance."

Since passage of the new sign measure, assistant ordinance officer Bruce Phillips has been calling builders telling them they must pay for a permit.

When they come to township hall, they are told their signs are not in conformance with the new ordinance, which stipulates the size, location, and number of signs a builder may erect.

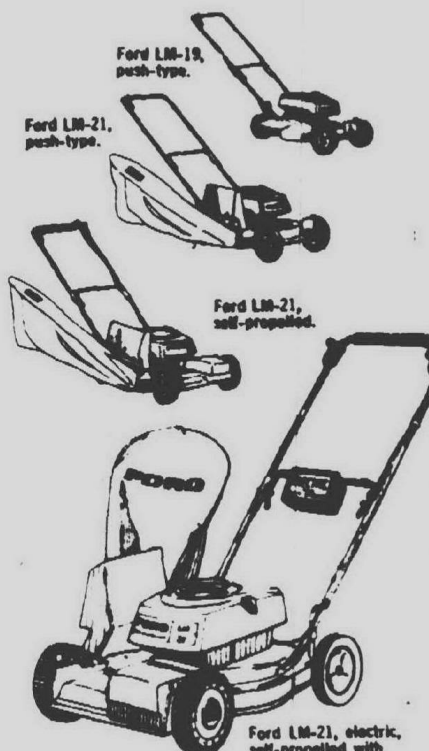

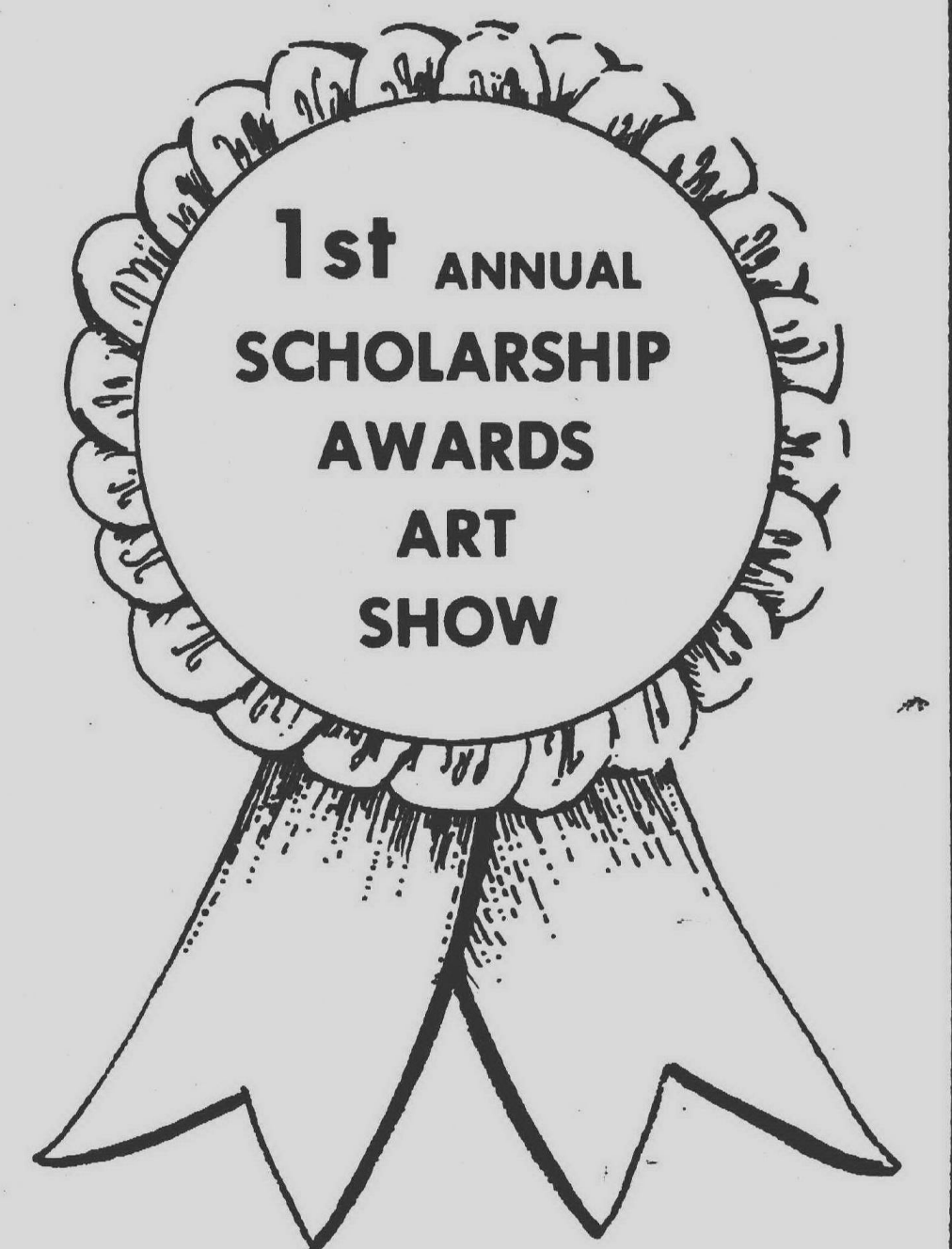

Gourmets, guests feast at informal ethnic dinner

There's another side to the Confrerie de la Chaine des Rotisseurs.

The prestigious gourmet society has its formal dinners—sumptuous feasts—where members and guests wear black tie, and wine accompanies each course.

It also has its informal ethnic dinners, dress more casual and menu elaborate, but maybe even served with beer.

Restaurateur David Lum's Rikshaw Inn in West Bloomfield was the setting Monday (April 28) for the Chaine's ethnic dinner featuring Chinese specialties.

After a cocktail hour, where everyone sipped California champagne (Almaden N.V.) and nibbled Har Yen (deep-fried shrimp balls) and steamed Beef Shui Mai, the diners sat down to a first course of Tunc Gai.

WAITRESSES PASSED around to show the whole chicken in a tureen before returning with individual bowls of boneless chicken stuffed with bird's nest, and brandy.

Dr. Pat Daoust of Dearborn is bailiff, the baliff or president, of the Chaine. He stood to explain the society's "ground rules."

"Eat as soon as you are served. Don't wait for anyone else."

A practical measure for lovers of good food at its peak.

"No smoking during dinner."

It can interfere with those taste buds.

"No salt and pepper. The food has been seasoned optimally."

"Ordinarily the dinners are formal and no water is served, only wine. But with ethnic foods, we're more informal and may even serve beer. It's a better accompaniment than wine to some meals."

Dr. Robert Clark of Birmingham, the Chaine's charge de mission, who was present, is in charge of the wines at formal dinners.

With the ethnic meal, a German Mosel wine was served (Trittenhei-

mer Altarchen, Kabinett 1973), a Japanese beer (Asahi) and Japanese plum wine (Akadama).

Host Lum described each course after guests had eaten and commented on it. Wat Tong Goo (Black Mushrooms) are large, fleshy tasting, with oyster sauce.

Chow Mack Yee (Calemari) was strips of scored octopus, marinated, with oyster sauce. Diners found it delicate and delicious.

SHANGHAI Young Yee (Boneless Whole Stuffed Pickerel) seemed to meet with not as much enthusiastic response. It was stuffed with a seasoned paste.

Most courses could be enjoyed with chopsticks, depending on your skill and determination.

Chow Har Look was whole shrimp in a pleasant red sauce.

Said Lum, "We pan fry the shrimp with green onion. You'll probably laugh when I tell you what the sauce is—it's ketchup, and oyster sauce."

Mongolian Beef Tenderloin was the star of the evening, tender and flavorful, although Lum apologized for it.

"IT IS TOO well done for my taste," he said. "We didn't do it in a long time."

"We use a special salt, a five-spice powder, marinate and hang the meat and barbecue. We cook it with soy sauce and vegetables."

Lamb Chunking followed. "With lamb, always sesame oil," he said. "We cook it very quick, with a nice

curl. It goes through hot oil—450 degrees."

Dessert was a marvelous Korean White Peach Flambe, ice cream and a peach half covered with peach brandy and Grand Marnier.

"That's not really Chinese," Lum said with amusement.

AMONG THE guests was TV personality George Pierrot, the grand old man of the good life. A traveler, raconteur, and gourmet, he delighted the table with limericks, touching off a round of jokes from other guests.

"Has this party degenerated?" he said firmly, at one point.

At the evening's close, he tossed off another bon mot: "Do you suppose if we stick around, they'll serve dinner?"

Tasting party economical way to enjoy wines

Wine tasting is certainly a delicious activity, but it also can be an expensive one. Unless, of course, you attend a wine party.

More than 500 guests turned out recently to sample 28 varieties of wines, snack on assorted cheeses, fresh fruits and freshly baked breads at Schoolcraft College.

Wine stations were placed throughout the dining hall in the Waterman Campus Center, and guests were given a wine list with space to rate each sample and save for future buying reference.

Cosponsored by the SC Gourmet Club and the Michigan Chefs Association, the festival also included entertainment by Ziggy Bella and his strolling violins.

"The purpose of cheese and fruit is to enhance the flavor of each wine and the bread served to clear the palate and let the true taste of each wine come through," explained Breithaupt as he sampled Deinhard Green Label Berich Bernkastel, a crisp moselle wine from Germany.

Breithaupt and other members of the culinary arts faculty including

chef-instructors James Van Vuren, Richard Benson and Leonar Sec were on hand to answer guests' questions.

Torkild Nielsen, vice-president and general manager of the Detroit division of Warner Vineyards, also was available to help guests on wine selection. Nielsen teaches a wine tasting class each semester at Schoolcraft.

The SC culinary art students added the decorative touches, arranging wines, cheeses, foods and centerpieces along the buffet setting. Several students also served as festival hosts and hostesses.

Tickets for the wine party were \$7.50 per person and most agreed it was a fair price for such delectable fare.

The Gourmet Club will use proceeds from the festival to increase its scholarship fund, support a foster child and send some 30 students and faculty members to the Culinary Arts Salon at McCormick Place in Chicago.

Airport questions still aren't answered

If one thing is certain, it's that public sentiment on a general aviation airport in this neck of the woods is downright hostile.

Environmental impact, feasibility and other such terms of governmental language used when testing the waters seem worthless when confronted with overwhelming public sentiment leaning in one direction.

A comment by one official present at last week's "meeting of the minds" on a proposed airport study noted that the public was, perhaps, uniformed of the need for airports.

His suggestion was that people could not decide on the issue unless all the facts were in front of them. If that be the case, then representatives of the Wayne County Road Commission, the Michigan Aeronautics Commission and the Federal Aviation Administration all failed in their function.

No substantial information on the need for an airport was produced, and it's probable that those

who spent the two hours voicing their objections learned nothing more than what their neighbors thought—namely, "We don't want an airport."

No one is willing to forget fears about pollution, noise, decreasing land values, and a wide assortment of other maladies that may come with an airport unless one can be convinced otherwise.

Proponents of an airport missed a golden opportunity to turn a few heads and gain some support for what they feel is a "needed" facility in the area. Sitting quietly by and not answering one question, they have solidified the opposition and may, in the end, doom what they believe is necessary.

Lacking any information to the contrary, we would have to side with those who oppose the addition of an airport in or near our community, at least until someone can prove that a need exists.

Frankly, we doubt it.

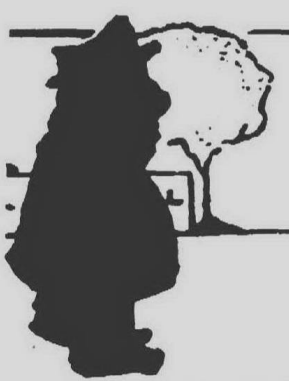

The Stroller

A haunting question

Ever since that day many years ago when the death of his father caused The Stroller to become a high school dropout while a member of the freshman class, he has been plagued by a question:

"Where would he be today, what would he be doing, and what kind of a life would he have lived, if his father's plans had materialized and The Stroller had graduated from college?"

The question ran through his mind again as he sat in the auditorium at Schoolcraft College during the annual commencement exercises and watched the small army of graduates march up to the stage and receive their diplomas and certificates from President E. Nelson Grote.

The Stroller had gone there principally to help pay a final tribute to Richard (Tommy) Thompson, who was awarded an honorary degree posthumously. Tommy had been a colleague for years and it was only fitting that the Stroller be there when the honor was bestowed.

PRIOR TO THIS touching scene, though, the Stroller was given to thinking again what changes there might have been in his life if, in his youth, he had been one of the marchers to wear the cap and gown and receive a diploma.

From the first day The Stroller had gone to school back in the Pennsylvania Dutch Country, his father had stressed the need of a college education and that his only son was to have the opportunity to attend a great school.

In every mention of college his father talked of Penn State, up in the mountainous section of the state, and how thrilled he would be to go there to see "my boy" graduate.

At the time, The Stroller's father was the proud proprietor of the only eating establishment in our little town.

It was a six-stool lunch counter and the meals were prepared on a three burner gas stove, while mother slaved over a hot wood stove at home, baking pies and other tasty dishes which we youngsters had to deliver to the lunch counter. On special occasions we even delivered the pastry products to the home of the more affluent families in town.

At one time The Stroller's father was employed in the Bryden Horse Shoe Factory (the largest horse shoe factory in the world) but had to leave because of sickness.

SOMEWHERE ALONG the line he contracted tuberculosis which forced him out of the factories and into the lunch counter.

Never one to give up easily, he envisioned the day when the lunch counter would expand into a large seafood house and "his boy" would be graduated from Penn State and join him.

But it was not to be. The ravages of the disease finally claimed him and The Stroller, then only 10 years old, had his outlook changed, too.

By dint of hard work, Mother kept us going to school. But the day came when The Stroller was forced to leave school with the demand from his mother that he learn a trade.

Over the years he has walked with the kings and queens of the sports world, has met and spoken with the kings of industry and civic leaders.

WITH HIS PORTABLE typewriter he has traveled the length and breadth of the country, "covering" the major sports events of the times.

It has been a colorful life and enabled him to acquire an "estate" in the suburbs.

Most fellows would be content to sit idly by and glory in the thrills that were his along the way.

But The Stroller, while enjoying the fruits of his labor, still is plagued by the question: "Would I have been any better off if my father had lived and provided me with a college education?"

The one resident you referred to in your editorial is the same resident who rudely interrupted another resident with such remarks as "God and apple pie," while he was presenting facts of a survey conducted by concerned residents to the school board.

I do not see why this resident should be spared any criticism, regardless of what side he is on.

It is apparent what side the Observer is on in this issue. Keep up the good work, Gary.

Plymouth AAUW to mark bicentennial with new film

From cable television to bicentennial project is the history of an idea bouncing around among members of the Plymouth branch of the American Association of University Women.

And, with work begun on filming "A Plymouth-Canton Bicentennial Salute," AAUW member Peggy Fisher says her groups feels "we have an idea whose time has come."

Last week the local branch received word the Michigan AAUW will give \$100 for the project as one of seven grants of feed money for branch action projects.

The next step will be selecting a narrator for the historical film, and auditions are scheduled Thursday, May 8, from 7 to 10 p.m. in the studio of WSDP radio station, Plymouth Salem High School.

THE STUDENT STATION came into the project fairly recently, and Mrs. Fisher, who has been spearheading the work for the AAUW, explained how it all came about.

The beginnings involved a study a couple of years ago on the possibilities of cable TV channels in the Plymouth area.

"We felt it imperative that local citizens be prepared to utilize cable channels when such telecasting became a reality," she said.

"As we began to discuss cable TV with local groups and individuals, we quickly became aware that most people did not understand that it might be used as a vehicle for public cultural, educational and civic communication as well as a commercial medium."

IT WAS ABOUT THEN that investigations of communications media led AAUW members to Plymouth Salem and its new, well-equipped television studio.

"Here was the catalyst that could make community TV programming a reality," Mrs. Fisher added. "Working together could benefit both the students and the community."

With plans moving forward to make a TV tape, AAUW members suddenly realized the theme should be bicentennial.

"We realized our historical heritage was a strong, unifying force in our community," Mrs. Fisher said, "and we decided that a tribute to the past that has shaped our present offered a natural and fitting background for a

visual portrait of a growing, moving community."

AS THE PROJECT now stands, the AAUW is working closely with Wisam Kazaleh, teacher of the television class work, and Nancy Beets of the Wayne-Oakland federated library system. Mrs. Fisher has worked out the first draft of a script, and some filming of specific events, like the recent visit of the Michigan Opera Theater, has taken place.

We'll have some scenes of Plymouth's life and dum corps in a

Memorial Day parade," Mrs. Fisher said, "and we'll use some of the pictures that Sam Hudson has offered us—things like landmark homes and well known places in the area."

"We also have to figure out a way to get the Fall Festival into the film. Since we want to have it completed this summer, we may have to fudge a bit by showing the Michigan Day crowds in Kellogg Park."

IN SEEKING AAUW funding for the project, the local branch applied

to the national organization as well as the one in Michigan, and word still being awaited on that decision.

Mrs. Fisher said anyone living in Plymouth or Canton would be eligible to audition for the narrator's role in the bicentennial film.

She will serve as a judge in the auditions, working with John Seidelman, general manager of WSDP, Pat White, representing the bicentennial commission, Jerry Snider of radio station WJR and Byron McGregor of CKLW.

invited to share in the sessions.

The mandatory special education law (Public Act 188) gives parents the right to be directly involved in the education of their learning-disabled child, said Mrs. Mary Messerschmidt, workshop organizer.

It provides for a local committee for education, planning and placement, she explained, and as members of that committee parents may request special programs and services in the local school.

"IF YOU FEEL your child is having a difficult time in school and his needs are not being answered, this workshop can give you some useful answers," she noted. "This is true no matter what grade level your child has reached."

Mrs. Messerschmidt described a learning disabled child as one of normal, potentially normal or above-average intelligence who does not perform well in school because of disorders in basic learning processes. These processes are needed in understanding or using spoken or written language, she added.

So the child with these disorders may be handicapped in thinking, talking, listening, reading, writing, spelling or arithmetic, she went on.

He may be hyperactive, poorly coordinated, impulsive, distractible,

withdrawn, immature or uncooperative. He may have behavior problems, but is not primarily emotionally disturbed, mentally retarded or crippled.

THE MACLD is a group of parents and professionals who work at local and state levels for appropriate public school education for learning disabled children.

The May 10 workshop will be led by Fran King, one of the first parents to organize in the area of learning disabilities in 1965. She now is state level parent advisor to the organization.

Parents who attend the workshop are asked to bring a copy of the special education code which may be obtained from the local school district, the Wayne County Intermediate School District or a state representative or senator.

The workshop is open to all MACLD members. New memberships will be available at registration time. These are \$5.

Participants are asked to bring sack lunches. Coffee will be furnished.

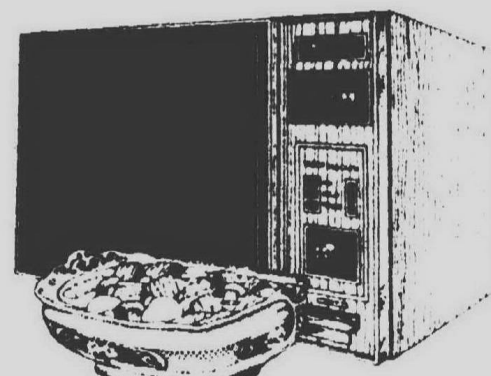

Four records fall in meet

Redford Union dominates O&E Relays

Neither wind nor rain nor dark of night could stop the records from falling at the fifth annual Observer & Eccentric Relays Saturday night.

Through threatening skies and intermittent rain, Redford Union played rude hosts and took three firsts to win the relays 34-22 over runner up Livonia Churchill.

Livonia Stevenson finished third with 20½ points and Southfield-Lathrup took fourth with 18 as sixteen schools vied for honors.

Other finishers were Bishop Borgess (12), Livonia Franklin (6), Garden City West (11½), Farmington (9), Li-

vonnia Stevenson (6), Plymouth Canton (6), Farmington Harrison (5), Garden City East (5), North Farmington (5), Salem (5), Livonia Bentley (3) and Northville (3).

"We were really pointing for this meet. This makes us the only team to ever win two team titles. I'm very pleased with the effort," said winning Redford Union coach John MacKenzie.

THERE WAS LITTLE DOUBT throughout the meet as to the team winner. Redford Union took an early first in the shot put as Brad Ross posted a personal best and handed Chur-

chill's Bill Readon his first losing day of the year with a 55 foot toss. RU won that event with a team total of 144-2.75, less than two inches off the meet record.

With that win and seconds in the broad jump relay and the high jump relay, the Panthers had a commanding lead after the first three events.

Churchill stayed within striking distance through most of the meet, but Redford Union posted seconds in the shuttle hurdle relay and the 440 yard relay and a first in the mile relay—the last three events of the day—to win going away.

RU posted a meet record in the 880 relay with a team that has just recently begun to run together. Dane Eschmaker, Ron Pawlak, Joe Austin and Jim Lalonde combined for a 1:31.3 clocking in the event, two-fifths of a second better than Livonia Bentley's 1974 record.

Garden City East scored only five points all night, but those came when East posted a new meet record in the distance medley relay with a time of 10:39.7. Brian Howard, running the half mile and Denny Volz sprinting the quarter, kept the Panthers close to pacesetting Redford Union after

the first two exchanges of the baton.

DOUG SWEAZEY TOOK OVER for the three-quarter mile distance and pulled steadily away from the pack. When Sweazey handed off to Art Kitz for the final mile, there was little doubt and Kitz passed a flock of rivals on his record breaking anchor leg.

Livonia Franklin broke a meet record but didn't event get first place points for its efforts. The Patriots ran the sprint medley relay in 2:28.4, three-tenths of a second better than

Churchill's 1973 record, but had to settle for second place when it lost a stretch duel to Livonia Stevenson in one of the most exciting finishes of the night.

Stevenson's John Lokar, Bill Rowley, Paul Pongor and Ken Brown combined for the record in 2:28.

In the final event of the evening, Churchill's Paul Schultz, Fred Powers and Brad Gootie combined for 37 feet, three inches in the pole vault relay to break the existing record of 37 feet set at Redford Union in 1973.

"We want to be as helpful as we can in the various athletic programs," Heaton stated. "We plan to discuss the various types of ankle and knee injuries, shoulder problems, along with emergency care for head and neck injuries."

"With this kind of information the coaches and trainers will be better equipped to handle cases on the field of play. That's why we would like to have all area coaches and trainers in attendance."

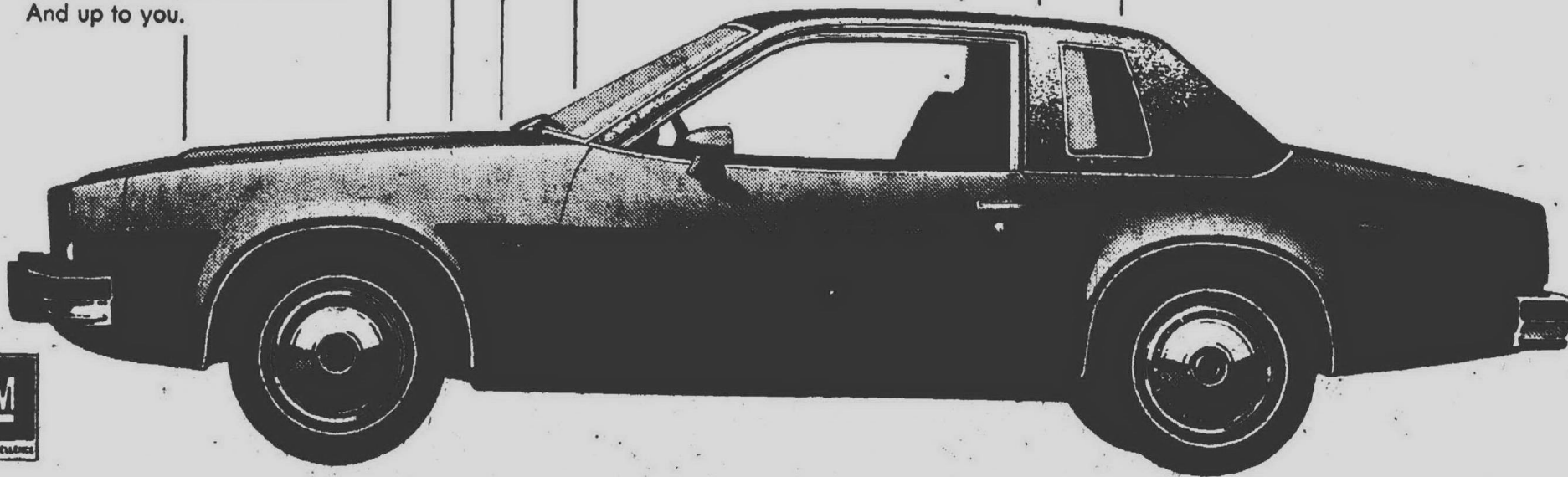

Thomas pitched well, limiting Ford to three hits, but contributed to his own demise by committing two errors in the third. Both miscues were overthrows of attempted sacrifice bunts.

"We didn't hit the ball hard at all," said Salem coach Wayne Sparkman. "Now we're going to start working again on bunt situations and take a lot of batting practice."
