## Township will join block grant group

PLYMOUTH—Although some minor questions remained unanswered, it appears that Plymouth Township will formally join the fold and participate in the federally funded block grant program.

The City of Plymouth and Canton Township are already enrolled in the program, and Supervisor J.D. McLaren indicated Wednesday night (May 7) that his questions concerning local control of the funds and forced continuance in the program had been answered satisfactorily.

McLaren attended a meeting at Plymouth City Hall Wednesday of the advisory council charged with distributing the money the county is applying for.

NINETEEN communities are joining the county in their application to the department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for the money. All communities applying with the county for the funds have populations less than 50,000 and are not eligible for the money individually.

Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein, and Plymouth Mayor Beverly McAninch are members of the advisory council who, along with several other mayors and supervisors, journeyed the nation's capital several

weeks ago to ask questions of HUD officials and congressmen.

The answers they received "were more than satisfactory" according to Greenstein, and those answers were relayed Wednesday to the supervisors and mayors of communities who were worried about joining in the application.

McANINCH commented, "We received complete reassurances from Assistant (HUD) Secretary David Meeker and four congressmen. Our questions were answered and they all seemed very interested in our concerns. Specifically, the county is liable, not the communities (if something goes wrong with the grant), and we are not required to do anything more than what we applied for."

Added Mayor Lada of Allen park, also a participant in the Washington trip, "We are very satisfied with the answers we got. The low income housing isn't being forced on us. The point of the housing is to satisfy the population already residing in our communities. HUD is not forcing us to integrate."

Greenstein explained, "We asked Meeker if there were any hidden little gremlins in the program and he assured us there weren't, in the presence of our congressmen. We gave him hard questions and he answered

all of them. They aren't planning any expansive social experimentation."

THE CANTON supervisor added that they were expecting a letter from Meeker reiterating the answers to all their questions.

Other points made were that the program was on a year-by-year basis. The county, not HUD, "would be the watchdog" over the local communities and the block grant funds "could be parlayed to use as matching funds for other federal grants."

Perhaps the most important answer of the trip was that acceptance of the block grant funds would not obligate communities any more than acceptance of revenue sharing funds and CETA money.

"I see no problems," said McLaren. "We are already just as hung by CETA and revenue sharing."

Although the Plymouth Township board empowered him remain in or withdraw from the application, McLaren said he would ask the township board on May 13 before signing a cooperative agreement with the county which would formalize Plymouth Township's participation in the application. The cooperation agreements are due by May 15.

## Plymouth Twp. to hold part of liquor license

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP—Any liquor license granted to the township's Hilltop Golf Course is going to stay there.

The board of trustees made sure of that recently, when it voted to add the township's name to that of golf course manager Daniel Ross on its application to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission for a Class C license.

The board voted several weeks ago to place Ross's name "above all

others" on its list of liquor license applicants.

At the time, the township could not legally place its name on the application, according to Clerk Helen Richardson, even though the township owns the golf course.

A representative of the Liquor Control Commission recently informed the township that the legal requirements have changed. Mrs. Richardson said, "Municipalities may

now grant liquor licenses to themselves.

Although the township will not receive any proceeds from liquor sold at Hilltop's clubhouse, a license listing the township as a "co-licensor" will guarantee that Ross cannot take the license elsewhere in the township.

"If Ross leaves, we want to make sure the license stays there," explained Mrs. Richardson. "I don't

## Tax breaks open for farmers

"There's no way you can earn enough money on your land to pay taxes. They're going up every year."

That's how one farmer, who owns land in Plymouth Township, describes the economic plight of the farmer, who is being pushed off his land in western Wayne County for the concrete and cement of industrial and residential developments.

A new state law, designed to hold back the loss of farm acreage in Michigan, will take its first steps this week in helping the farmer keep his land.

According to Supervisor Robert Greenstein, Canton Township is preparing its own tax relief package for farmers. Although Greenstein refused to disclose details of the program, he said the township may unveil the program by July.

"We're going to be able to offer substantial tax relief to our farmers," Greenstein said. "If I have my way, at least the people in Canton Township will have enough to eat."

Under the new state law, farmers who sign a contract with the state, agreeing to continue the agricultural use of farmland for a 10-year period, will receive tax breaks.

Farmers who sign such contracts will be exempt from all special assessments levied after their applications are approved. Property taxes on farmland which exceed seven per cent of the landowner's income will count as Michigan income tax credit.

That means a farmer with an annual income of \$10,000 who pays \$1,200 in property taxes would receive an income tax credit of \$800.

Dennis Hall, a staff member of the Department of Natural Resources' (DNR) Office of Land Use, said his office will release applications to the public beginning this Thursday, May 15.

Some applications may be available by that date in Canton and Plymouth township offices, Hall said. Persons may obtain applications by writing to the Office of Land Use, Department of Natural Resources, Stevens T. Mason Building, Lansing, Mich. 48926.

Under provisions of the act, township offices must certify the eligibility of farmers on the basis of income and size of farms.

Owners of farms 40 acres in size or larger are eligible, as well as owners of specialty farms with gross annual incomes of \$2,000 or more. Owners of five to 40-acre farms are eligible, if the minimum per-acre income is \$200 a year.

"The state is losing 35,000 acres of farmland and open space to more intensive use purposes each year," Hall said. "If we keep building on farmland, we're not going to keep enough food production in the state. People should be aware of the need to keep agricultural land in production."

About 36 million acres, or 30 per cent of Michigan's total land area, is currently used for agricultural purposes, Hall said. Those farms provide 52 per cent of the state's current food needs.

But, if agricultural land continues to disappear at the current rate, Michigan will have to import vast quantities of food by the year 2000, Hall said. Imported food is more expensive because of transportation costs.

According to Jack Smiley, assistant director of public policy for the Wayne County Extension Service, only about 13 per cent of the county's 623 square miles are still used for agriculture. About 1,000 farms are still operating in Wayne County.

But much of that land is dwindling. "You can see much of that farmland is being rapidly developed," said Smiley, "especially in Canton and Plymouth townships."

Plymouth Township records do not show how much land is still used for farming within township limits, according to Clerk Helen Richardson. Only a small portion of land in the western portion of the township is designated agricultural under the township's recently adopted zoning ordinance.

Greenstein says 6,000 to 8,000 acres land are used for farming in Canton.

"Until recently, farmland was disappearing so rapidly that in two years there wouldn't have been any left," Greenstein said.

Although the Farmland and Open Space Preservation Act is designed to help farmers keep their land, Mrs. Richardson and Canton Township Clerk John Flodin say no one has come to their offices to apply.

"I think all the farmers know about it," said Greenstein, "but I think they're as confused about it as I am."

"I think it's a legislative rip-off," he said. "The act doesn't do anything near to what the farmer needs to survive. They need some real property tax relief."

Under the act, a farmer who breaks his agreement to waive development rights on his land for a 10-year period must pay back all the tax benefits he has received plus six per cent annual interest.

"They're throwing farmers the bone and telling them that's the whole meal," Greenstein said. "They need some real help. The act is the first stumbling step to preserve eight million acres of farmland in Michigan. It's better than nothing, but barely."

Canton Township's proposed tax relief package should provide the needed help, according to Greenstein, who noted that some of the land in the township's western portion is owned by speculators.

"This is one speculation that won't pay off," he said. "If speculators don't

like it, they can hitch themselves to a plow. With the economic crunch and the price of oil, you can't ship food in from other states. That can be avoided by having food centers near growth centers.

"It's very rare in this society that you can find something vital," the supervisor added. "Farming is the only thing. It's acceptable to aesthetics and the environment. You sure can't get along without food."

The retention of farmland, Greenstein maintains, would not erode the township's tax base.

"Agricultural land means no improvements and is a tax plus," he said. "If we let the western half of the township develop like the eastern half, we'd be bankrupt."

Although Plymouth Township has done nothing to help farmers tax-wise, Supervisor J.D. McLaren agrees with the necessity of farmland.

"I think open space is desirable in any community," he said. "If you keep moving, all the farmland out, where do you eventually go for farmland?"

Guy and Pat Bunyea of Plymouth Township are one farming family whom taxes have forced to sell portions of their land. The family once owned the land in Canton Township where the Deer Creek Apartments are now located.

"We were forced to get out of there because of taxes," Mrs. Bunyea said. "We had to sell a couple of our farms, because we couldn't pay the taxes. We've been under this pressure for 10 years."

"We're now looking for farms farther out, where it's still farm country," she said. "The trouble is some of the best farmland is being eaten up for development."

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
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## County orders department cuts

WAYNE COUNTY—County commissioners are beginning "to bite the bullet" and come down to the hard business of cutting the county's deficit, last reported to be \$8.8 million.

The deficit amounts to about six per cent of the personnel services costs in the \$304 million annual budget.

In a special meeting May 8 of the Ways and Means Committee, a committee of all 27 commissioners, recommendations to cut \$2.5 million from hospital and court appropriations were approved.

Committee recommendations must finally be approved by members acting as the board.

ALTHOUGH all departments are on notice to save a total of \$6 million by not filling vacant jobs, Wayne County General Hospital was told to further reduce its spending by \$1.7 million; Circuit Court by \$407,000; Recorder's Court and its probate department by \$214,790; and Common Pleas Court by \$150,375.

Steps yet to be taken include a cap on cost-of-living adjustments for all union employees; stringent enforcement of the freeze on hiring; expanding use of Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) employees; and reserving \$3.5 million in Capital improvement projects appropriations for possible operating expense use.

Area commissioners Royce Smith (D-Bellefonte), Mary Dumas (R-Livonia), John Barr (D-Dearborn Heights), Tom Taylor (D-Westland) and Richard Manning (D-Redford Township) attended the meeting which counted 20 members present at one point.

An earlier meeting May 2 was adjourned because a quorum could not

be found to deal with the deficit some project up to \$12 million by year's end. Smith and Taylor were present during the entire session; Barr was present and left; Manning and Dumas were absent.

WHILE SOME of the commissioners praised Taylor's proposal to cut 10 per cent of all elected and appointed officials' pay, none gave it unqualified support. Many said it was a fine idea, but countered that its savings would be minimal. Taylor has pegged the savings at \$1.8 million.

At least one commissioner thought Taylor was "grandstanding."

The Westland Democrat said his proposal didn't make him popular among his fellow politicians.

Taylor said his five-point proposal, which also includes a freeze on nonessential travel and consideration of a union labor payout, will be brought up as new business on the board's next agenda.

During the board's regular Ways and Means Committee meeting called after a recess, the board decided to:

- Approve equity raises for 11 administrative and executive classes in the Board of Auditors and Register of Deeds offices, amounting to \$11,660.
- Approve a supplemental appropriation of \$20,000 for overtime in the Wayne County Youth Home.
- Approve \$46,000 for overtime for Sheriff's deputies and refer back to committee another \$42,000 requested. The approval was necessary to head off a contract grievance, officials said.

These committee recommendations must be approved by the board when it meets May 15 before taking effect.

## Milliken reveals transit concept

SOUTHFIELD—A plan by Gov. William Milliken to improve mass transportation in seven southeastern Michigan counties was unveiled Wednesday (May 7) before the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce by members of state and city transit planning agencies.

The plan, to be introduced in the Legislature this week, will be financed by a \$175 million revenue bond issue and a weight tax on private automobiles in Wayne, Oakland, and Macomb counties.

It follows in the wake of an ambitious \$1 billion state bond issue defeated at the polls last November. The fate of the new plan will be decided by a vote of the Legislature.

AS PROPOSED by Milliken, the plan consists of five parts:

- A high level mass transit system beginning in the Detroit central business district and radiating into three corridors along Woodward, Gratiot and Michigan. The system, costing \$66.1 million, would later be expanded

regionwide in follow-up programs.

- Intermediate level bus mass transit expanding present bus routes into the suburbs.
- Forty-nine miles of new and 64 miles of expanded rail commuter service.
- A 2.3 mile automated "people mover" circulation system looping through downtown to tie together central business district-related services.
- Restructuring the administrative board of SEMTA to include 12 members, with five appointed by Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) five by the Mayor of Detroit, and three by the Governor's office.

WILLIAM KELLOGG of the Department of State Highways and Transportation stressed the urgency of approving a plan in order to secure nearly \$500 million in federal funds to support the project.

"The federal government will not seriously consider us unless we are ready to move," Kellogg said. "We find ourselves in that position now."

Essentially, Kellogg was asking for area business support of Milliken's proposal, especially the weight tax on automobiles, averaging about \$10 per vehicle, which would apply only to the three counties most likely to benefit from the program.

"There is no way we can provide services unless we develop some kind of local funding base," Kellogg said at the SEMCOG-sponsored meeting. "The weight tax seemed to be the best idea when you look at the alternatives."

"We estimate that every dollar invested here will generate three dollars in terms of business opportunities. The program has tremendous job potential," Kellogg said. "There will be almost 5,000 jobs created immediately. The long-term benefit for the region will long overshadow the initial cost of the program."

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
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# A mini rocket launching at Isbister School

PLYMOUTH—If anyone spots small rockets zooming through the skies in the Plymouth area these days, don't panic. It is probably the doings of a science class from Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic School.

One member of the class some time ago got a free rocket kit, and that started things moving. Teacher Judy Blake said the 26 students in her class took to rocket making like ducks to water.

"One firm which sells and makes engines and rockets said it will pay \$50 to anyone who can prove he has built a rocket and launched it successfully."

She said the students decided to test various class-built rockets before witnesses and last Friday got permission to demonstrate their work before students of Isbister Elementary School.

"If we can get some proof that our rockets have been successfully launched, we will be eligible for the \$50 which the class plans to use to buy more rocket kits," the teacher said.

CHRIS DAZER, a seventh grader, and Tim Callahan, eighth grader, were among several students who gave the demonstration.

Chris, who said he has been interested in rockets for some time, explained they are set off by an electrical system, using a regular automobile battery.

"We have several different types of rockets which vary in size from three inches to three feet," Chris said.

The rockets, depending on the amount of propellant and size, can climb as high as 1,700 feet, the student said.

Parachutes are stuffed inside some rockets, allowing the main part to float gracefully to the ground once the powder-driven engine has burned out.

"We have had rockets go up to 300 miles an hour," Tim said.

"There isn't any real danger to firing rockets as long as we stand back so the initial firing doesn't burn our hands," Tim added.

Chris said he had heard of some persons who tried to build their own rockets from homemade material, using heads of matches to fire them. "This can be very dangerous."

IT'S DOUBTFUL all members of the science class will follow the rocket field once they are out of school.

As Chris explained it: "I never was too good at math, but getting interested in this hobby has made me more aware of its value. We have to figure wind velocity and distance. Now I think I may go into

the Air Force when I complete my schooling."


Three successful launchings before several classes of Isbister School last Friday proves the students know what they are doing.

earlier firing failures, the young technicians agreed.

Mrs. Blake smiled when she saw the blast-offs and the rockets climbing skyward.

"We just might get that \$50 for our class. The kits are expensive, and we sure could use the funds," she grinned.

## Michigan Week celebration dropped

Michigan Week, scheduled for May 18-24, may pass practically unnoticed in the Plymouth-Canton area this year.

A week traditionally packed with a flurry of activities in many communities across the state, observances in the Plymouth-Canton area will be limited to classroom activities and any celebrations private organizations may plan.

Officials of Canton and Plymouth townships say their township boards have planned nothing official this year but add they rarely have.

Neither are official activities planned in the city of Plymouth, where Mayor Beverly McAninch says she could not find a person willing to chair Michigan Week activities.

Mayors Exchange Day, the highlight of Michigan Week activities in many cities, has been wiped from Plymouth's calendar this year.

Mrs. McAninch, accompanied by City Commissioner John Moehle,

exchanged places with Grosse Pointe officials last year. Mrs. McAninch and Moehle toured Grosse Pointe's municipal facilities and attended a banquet in their honor, while their Grosse Pointe counterparts did the same in Plymouth.

"It was a very nice occasion," said Mrs. McAninch, "but all I gained was tours of their parking lots. It took a whole day out of my time and other officials. I'm not sure it was worth all the time and the money."

Mayors Exchange Day, Mrs. McAninch estimates, cost the City of Plymouth about \$500 last year. Visiting mayors are traditionally honored at a banquet, presented with a gift and ushered across the city in a helicopter.

"I don't see any point in wasting our city's or any city's money this year," Mrs. McAninch said. "I've talked to other city officials who are also abandoning Mayors Exchange Day."

"The purpose of it is to further

interchange and good will and to discuss mutual problems," she continued, "but we do that at Michigan Municipal League meetings."

Some schools in the Plymouth Community School District are planning activities to celebrate Michigan Week.

Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton high schools have scheduled log cutting and log rolling sessions, a lumber jack dress-up day, tree planting, a pancake eating contest, a pioneer dress-up day and a tug of war to celebrate Michigan Week.

Daily lunches will use Michigan products at Smith Elementary School, and a third grade "Bring a Parent to Lunch Week" is scheduled. Teachers will exchange places on Education Day—May 22.

Fiegel School will elect a governor to celebrate Government Day, and flag raising ceremonies will take place.

think that was his intent, but we just want to make sure.

"We were originally told when we bought the golf course that we couldn't hold a license," she said. "It wasn't like that years ago, but they're evidently changed the policy back again."

Ross, Mrs. Richardson said, has not objected to the addition of the township's name on the license, which would allow beer, wine and liquor to be served by the glass.

The original liquor license application, listing Ross as the only holder, was never sent to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission, pending signing of the lease with Ross.

Supervisor J. D. McLaren said Ross signed the lease with the township on April 29. Under conditions of the lease, Ross will pay the township annual rent of \$10,000 plus five per cent of the gross income exceeding \$100,000.

Ross replaces Chris Burghardt, who managed the course for 22 years.

Recently, after members of the workshop read their poems over a Detroit radio station, one of the station's technicians told Mrs. Aust that at least "you are clean poets."

Mrs. Aust's thoughts have been bursting out in meter and rhyme for many years and she had often longed for a few fellow spirits with whom to commune.

Bouncing a metaphor off someone else's head can help a poet see which of his words are best understood and appreciated.

So Mrs. Aust signed up for a poetry class at Franklin High School, taught by Mrs. Gloria Mauthe. Here the nucleus for the poetry workshop was formed.

SUBSEQUENTLY the slowly expanding group had the opportunity to practice poetry in two classes at Schoolcraft College.

"David Perkins' class was more traditional, while the one led by Art Lundberg was more modern, with a greater emphasis on free verse," says Mrs. Aust.

By this time enough poets had emerged to plan on monthly meetings and the Livonia Poetry Workshop was born. Because a love for the rhythmic and the lyrical is confined to no particular age group, the age range of its membership was wide, 20-61.

Besides the poets already mentioned, the workshop includes Mrs. Joseph Griffith, Mrs. George Nelson, Paul Barnes, Carol Rembacki, Ruth

Lamb, Shirley Cuning and Allen Weise.

"We get along fabulously," notes Mrs. Aust. "We can criticize without breaking anyone's heart. As poets we can accept the suggestions of the others, or leave our poems as they are."

Mrs. Aust admits sometimes her ideas clash with those of others, but that is the point having a workshop.

"I have played the violin a long time and have a sense of rhythm and beat," she explains. "I don't like poetry so far out that no one can understand it, not even the poet. But I'm not against free verse or modern poetry if it makes sense."

"Poetry is a way of expressing thoughts and feelings in words you wouldn't ordinarily use. You select stronger and more meaningful words and you transfer this emotion to the reader."

"If you don't do that, I feel you've missed the point."

WHILE APPLAUDING the CAMEO program which introduces poets into Livonia schools, Mrs. Aust feels that for the most part not enough poetry is taught in schools.

"They should teach children the basics of meter, rhyme and form. It's like music. Unless you know the basics, you can take off on some wild faking job. But kids are not usually getting the basics."

"Poetry would bring out their sense of rhythm and their imagination. They have fantastic imaginations."

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

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## Seniors are growing power group

"You are the fastest-growing power group in America," senior citizens were told Thursday at a public hearing in Livonia to get area residents' views on helping the elderly.

The speaker was Julius F. Otten, chairman of Dearborn's Commission on Aging, one of the seven panelists who also are members of the Detroit-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging (DWCAAA).

Senior citizen officials from Livonia, Westland, Garden City, Plymouth, Redford Township and Canton Township attended the session as well as visitors from many other communities.

"BUT THE OLDER citizens must band together to let their local and state officials know how they feel," Otten continued. "These are federal monies and city fathers will respond to the needs of the people."

The monies referred to by Otten are \$791,729 in Title III funding available to Detroit and out-Wayne County for the elderly.

Of that, Detroit is allocated \$554,210 while the rest of Wayne County will receive \$237,518, or 33 per cent. Title III funds can only be spent on services and not for building purposes.

Spending of the money will go into: health, counseling, preventative services—(45 per cent); housing-related social services (35 per cent); and information and referral (20 per cent).

THURSDAY'S HEARING was chaired by Mrs. Mildred Wieland, chairman of Livonia's Commission on Aging.

Although senior citizens were notified in at least eight surrounding communities, less than 50 attended.

But those who did attend voiced deep concern with the needs of the elderly. Much of the discussion centered on teenagers and their growing involvement in helping the elderly.

Mrs. Jane Gaitskill, a volunteer worker with Northville senior citizens, said that city's high school was giving credit for helping the elderly.

"Community services of the high school has established a bus service and students are receiving class credit for helping senior citizens on and off the buses. They have meal delivery for those who want it."

She said that the 1970 census showed 16½ per cent of Northville and Northville Township residents were senior citizens, an unusually high number.

ANOTHER VOLUNTEER worker, Emil Schroeder of Garden City, said: "Whoever has tried to get housing for senior citizens knows how difficult it is. Owning your own home is not an advantage today, it's a liability for the older person."

Westland was represented by Frank Dobrowolski, chairman of that city's commission on aging. He echoed Mrs. Gaitskill's comments, adding: "Wayne-Westland students taking social services classes could get credit for doing work in homes. Juvenile delinquency is great in the metropolitan area. We should encourage teenagers to get involved in helping others. "He suggested giving them a little money would make it more acceptable to them to work in this area. "Getting them involved would accomplish two things. Curb juvenile delinquency and help senior citizens."

DOBROWOLSKI ANNOUNCED plans to hold a large rally in Westland in June to include city officials from surrounding communities, senators and state representatives.

"We hope to make it a gigantic rally at the Wayne-Ford Civic League Hall on Wayne Road and are trying to get local and even national television coverage to spotlight the needs of the elderly," he said.

DANTE DEVITO, director of Wayne County Commission on Aging, cited the need for housing-related social services.

"Home ownership increased 60 per cent in the 1960s and many of the elderly need help to maintain their homes," he said.

"Property taxes take eight per cent of a senior citizen's income and many older persons have neither the money nor energy to improve their homes."

Edward Wilson, disappointed with the small turnout, asked: "Who's lacking in communication? There's only these few here—how come?"

MRS. WIELAND replied that at least eight surrounding communities were notified, adding: "It seems senior citizens only turn out for those things that they're really interested in themselves."

"I announced the public hearing at two senior citizen's homes to about 300 elderly, but only two are here today," reported a registered nurse from Schoolcraft College.

Spokesmen from other communities offered suggestions and comments, with a Dearborn Heights' man conveying the idea of many persons.

"Is our city involved at all in this? I'm just attending on my own to find out what I can."

The hearing was one of six held by DWCAAA in the past two weeks (three in Detroit, one in Livonia, one in Romulus and the other in Wyandotte) to find out what senior citizens think.

Included on the panel besides Mrs. Wieland and Otten, were: Fred Ferris, director of DWCAAA; Virginia Crowthers, vice president; Lulu Wil-

liams and Beulah D. Carter, both of Detroit.

Ten of the 15-member DWCAAA board are from Detroit, the other five from out-Wayne County and half are 60 years or older.

ALTHOUGH disappointed by the

small turnout, Mrs. Wieland observed:

"We'll continue to work hard for the senior citizens and hopefully they'll get involved to make their needs known to city officials who designate where the Title III funds will be spent in their community."


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

Hickman said the seminar, intended for men and women, may be particularly helpful to women traveling alone or with children in recreational vehicles.



With the revival of the victory garden programs in many of our suburban communities in which we are given the opportunity to raise our own vegetables to beat the high cost of living, come memories of the days after World War II when some of us "city" fellows became "gentlemen farmers."

With these memories of his youth The Stroller looked forward to a victory garden at the close of World War II. He had just moved to Livonia a few years before and had wondered what to do with all the land.

THEN, ONE MIDNIGHT at the close of work at the Free Press, he joined several of his newspaper cronies at the now defunct Fort Shelby Hotel to enjoy a snack before starting for home.

As he told of his plans for a garden, Tom McMahon, then a feature writer at the Detroit News who was a permanent guest at the hotel, challenged

him with, "I'll bet I can raise bigger and better tomatoes in my room than you can out in the country."

With that Harold True, then the late newscaster at radio station WWJ, who spent his weekends in Brighton, joined in the challenge.

Each night we boasted of our gardens and the progress of the tomatoes until it became harvest time when we agreed on a showdown with the display of our prize specimens.

The showdown was something The Stroller never will forget. He had selected the largest and reddest of his crop and proudly took it to town. But when the displays were placed on the table he learned, much to his surprise, that his tomato rated no better than third.

McMahon, who was quite a trickster, laughed aloud for his entry was tops and we accused him of making a purchase at one of the markets.

"Come up to my room and I'll show you skeptics," he said. So off to the room we went and it was a sight that stunned us.

There on the window sill was a chemical garden with some of the nicest looking tomatoes one ever could see.

AND HOW McMahon laughed.

Over the years he had been a devotee of chemical gardening and

never told anyone for fear of being kidded about raising tomatoes in a hotel room.

We were still chuckling over his victory in the garden sweepstakes when a fellow worker dropped in on the group for a visit one midnight. After listening to us for a while he offered: "When it comes to raising things I've got you all beat."

The next night he joined us for a snack and as the food was placed on the table he opened a bag and took out a square of honey.

"Beat that," he said with an air of superiority.

"What do you mean?" we asked "you fellows talk about raising things in your hotel rooms. Well I raise bees in my room at the Metropole Hotel—just off Grand River—and this is from my first hive."

Sure enough, we drove by the next day. And there, extending from from his window was a box looking much like today's air conditioners. It was his beehive.

So, when The Stroller thinks of a "victory garden," these days he can't help recalling the hotel room farmers and the fellow who raised bees in the heart of downtown Detroit.

I wonder what memories the present garden program will produce in the years to come?

## From our readers The case for advisory vote

Editor:

Some clarity relative to my proposal to the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees concerning my advocacy of an advisory vote by the electorate of the district in the June 9 election seems to be in order. No advocacy as to the number of trustees or method of their election was made.

I submitted the following proposals to be placed on the June 9 ballot as advisory to the State Legislature:

"1. The Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees shall be composed of seven members. Yes—No—"

"2. The Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees shall be composed of nine members. Yes—No—"

"The Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees shall be elected at large. Yes—No—"

"4. The Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees shall be elected from equally apportioned districts. Yes—No—"

My proposal was voted down at the April 16 special meeting and was presented again at the April 23 regular meeting. Again it was voted down with Cox, Blatt, Kadish and Raymond

voting for it; Bennett and Cowden voting against it. Trustees Vallier and LaRue were absent.

We had here a classic example of the kind of minority rule that can exist under our school law which states that we must have a majority of the trustees elect (five) to pass any act. This, however, is another issue.

Two alternates relative to advisory input by the people remain: If we can garner or turn around one more vote at a special meeting May 15 (the last day to place the issue on the ballot), then the people will have an opportunity to send their message to the Legislature directly via the ballot box.

Failing this, the boards of education and superintendents of the five school districts should make their preferences known to the Legislature. The latter could be in addition to any other citizen advisory input, including the ultimate advisory vote by a majority of the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees.



## Cookbook beats mealtime blues

Former Bloomfield Hills resident Rita Leinwand, now living in Los Angeles, appears to be the toast of the West Coast when it comes to cooking.

People have lined up as early as 4 a.m. to assure themselves getting into one of her university-system classes, which begin enrollment at 9 a.m.

Mrs. Leinwand, speaking on the phone from Los Angeles, delightedly recalled the women who came in a chauffeur-driven limousine and had the driver set up a card table, chairs and tea to ease their wait.

You can see there would be a ready market for Mrs. Leinwand's first cookbook "How to Beat Those Cordon Bleus: Rita Leinwand's Lessons in French and Other Great Cuisines," published last fall.

"IT WAS the best-selling book on the West Coast during the Christmas season," the graduate of L'Ecole du Cordon Bleu said. Seventy-five hundred copies of the first edition have been exhausted, and the cookbook is now in its second printing.

Mrs. Leinwand collaborated on "How to Beat Those Cordon Bleus" with Lois Peyser, a friend, amateur cook and professional TV scriptwriter.

Also on the team was Fran Raboff who did the lively drawings that illustrate the text.

"The illustrations are not flawless," Mrs. Leinwand explained. They are pertinent to understanding the recipes, step by step with diagrams.

"IT'S LIKE watching me in class, and the recipes really work," she continued. Take Mrs. Leinwand's recipe for brioche (French yeast dough).

"I've been one of Julia Child's assistants, and her recipe goes on for pages. Mine is concise."

All the recipes have been tested in Mrs. Leinwand's classes—on more than 3,000 people.

"We were supposed to turn in 190 pages to the publishers (The Ward Ritchie Press, Pasadena) but we turned in 450." The publishers added 88 pages to the originally requested length.

MRS. LEINWAND was the fifth generation of a family living in South Orange, N.J., when she and her husband moved to metropolitan Detroit.

"I didn't know one person," she said.

She began teaching cooking by accident, when an adult education course suggested, "If you don't see a course you want, ask."

Mrs. Leinwand taught in the Birmingham area from 1962 to 1966 and by the time she left her combined classes had an enrollment of 300 persons a week.

SHE ORIGINATED the Connoisseur's Kitchen gourmet cooking class at Birmingham's Community House, she said, and this has continued with Charity Suczek as teacher.

The Leinwands had just built their dream house ("You KNOW the kitchen had to be good," she said.) and lived in it only two months when they got word they were moving.

He was sent to Los Angeles to head up American Standard's Aerospace Division; he and friends have since bought the plumbing and heating company.

Mrs. Leinwand's co-author, Mrs. Peyser, usually works as a team with her husband Arnold. Together the Peyser wrote a book with the late comic Allan Sherman called "Instant Status," on letters to be left around casually.

THEY HAVE done scripts for TV series including "Mission Impossible" and "Dick Van Dyke" and TV movies of the week, among these "Suddenly Single" with Hal Halbrook.

Mrs. Peyser, in Birmingham on a promotion tour for "How to Beat Those Cordon Bleus," said she and Mrs. Leinwand first met at a party, although their parents had known each other in East Orange.

"She has an enormous following," Mrs. Peyser said in admiration of Mrs. Leinwand. "She's a phenomenal teacher. She never stops learning. She makes people feel very, very confident."

Of her part in the book, Mrs. Peyser said, "I pulled it together and organized it. I thought I'd just dust it off in a weekend, but it was done over a period of a year."

IN ANOTHER year, the two women will bring out another book, on menus.

Mrs. Peyser mentioned the books' recipes for soups that are a meal in one, such as Black Bean Soup and Fish Soup with Red Garlic Sauce. Mrs. Leinwand always calls Zucchini Soup with Green Garlic Paste "absolutely wonderful," her friend said.

There are six recipes in the book the co-authors decided to call perfect.

"They are as close to foolproof as possible," Mrs. Peyser said. In the cookbook these are given as Perfect Onion Soup, Perfect Pate, Perfect Pie Crust, Perfect Quiche, Perfect Roast Chicken and Perfect Souffle Grand Manger.

### SOUP AU PISTOU VERT (Zucchini Soup with Green Garlic Paste)

6 zucchini, sliced (not peeled), about 3 cups.  
2 medium onions, sliced (1½ cups)  
4 Tablespoons olive oil or butter  
6 cups chicken stock, homemade or commercial  
2 cups lima beans (one 10-ounce frozen package)  
1 cup peas (half of 10-ounce frozen package)  
Salt and pepper  
2 Tablespoons sour cream

### Pistou

2 cloves garlic, minced  
1 slice bacon, fried until crisp, drained and crumbled  
2 teaspoons fresh basil, or 1 teaspoon dried basil  
4 Tablespoons parsley, minced  
2 egg yolks

¼ to ½ cup Parmesan cheese, grated.  
1 teaspoon olive oil  
Garnish  
4 slices bacon, fried until crisp, drained and crumbled

Serves 6


1. In a 4 to 5 quart saucepan, saute the onions and zucchini in olive oil or butter until a light brown.

2. Add the chicken stock and bring to a boil. Add the lima beans and peas, and when the mixture comes to a boil again, reduce the heat and simmer until the vegetables are soft, 20 to 25 minutes. Add salt and pepper to taste.

3. Puree the soup in the blender. Return to the saucepan.

4. Pistou: in the blender, put the garlic, bacon, basil, parsley and egg yolks. Blend for 1 minute. Add the Parmesan cheese, and blend again. It should now be a thick paste. If neces-

sary, add more Parmesan. Stir in 1 teaspoon olive oil.

5. Bring the soup to a simmer over low heat. Stir in the sour cream. Do not allow the soup to boil.

To serve: Ladle the hot soup into individual bowls. Add 1 teaspoon of pistou on top, and a little crumbled bacon. The soup should be stirred at the table.

Ahead: The soup and the pistou may be prepared four days ahead through Step 4 and refrigerated separately.



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
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

## Bringing the generations together

Mrs. Janet Bettis recently telephoned an elderly woman in her Redford Township neighborhood.

She didn't know the woman, but she explained she was taking a new course at Madonna College and the course had as one of its purposes putting volunteers in touch with older persons in this area.

She asked if she might drive the lady at the other end of the telephone line on necessary errands—maybe to the grocery store.

"This isn't really happening," said the woman. "This must be a mistake. You mean you really would take me to have my hair done?"

"It isn't really happening. You'll leave me."

BUT IT DID happen, and Mrs. Bettis won't leave her new friend.

She drove her to the beauty parlor, then to the hospital and the grocery store. She had been helping several other older persons, and her studies at Madonna had taught her more

about keeping up continuing relationships.

"It's a tremendous course. My outlook and views on the process of aging are completely different now."

"I've learned we should look at each other as human beings, rather than as members of a particular religious age or club group."

"And I've learned that with older people we should let them tell us what they would like to have them do."

"And I've learned that we must do for older people what they want rather than what we want."

Mrs. Bettis already has placed her new knowledge at the disposal of the Redford Township program for the aged. It is inaugurating a telephone reassurance program to give senior citizens daily contact with a volunteer.

WHEN MADONNA announced the free series last November, up to 200 volunteers were expected to respond. The list turned out to number 276, indicating the college had touched on a real need.

The thrust of this federally-funded

program is training volunteers to reach out and give old people services which enable them to be independent and stay in their own homes.

Sister Colleen Morris, director of gerontology at Madonna, put it this way:

"The people taking the class do for older people what they can't do for themselves. They also can be their voices when they can't speak for themselves."

A class member added that "a vol-

unteer having indepth knowledge on relating to older people can provide the hands and the heart to reach out and help."

THE BASIS of the Madonna project is 14 classes, given once a week, in which specialists in problems of aging provide expertise on everything from nutrition and psychology to nursing homes and legal matters.

The class also encourages members who are not already working with older people to go to neighborhood senior citizen clubs, churches, or the local hospital to find out about older people who need a little brightness in their lives.

The main difficulties the elderly face, Sister Colleen said, involve transportation, carrying groceries, shoveling snow and getting accomplished home maintenance chores like fixing a faucet or putting up a screen.

Because these problems remain with seniors all the time, she is hoping a further federal grant will allow the course to be held again next fall so younger citizens can continue to

gain the know-how of giving of themselves to the elderly.

CAROL KANE of Plymouth has found it is by no means always a case of the volunteer giving help an elderly accepting it. They like to give, too.

"It's been very heartwarming," she said. "I visit a woman, Mrs. Velma DePriest, who writes religious articles and has had them published. I decided she might like to have books brought to her from the library. In return she baked homemade bread for my family."

"On Valentine's Day she called my children to tell them she had a secret surprise for me. It turned out to be a Biblical loaf of bread — all the ingredients were mentioned in the Bible."

"She is a very independent person, but she loves companionship."

ANOTHER VOLUNTEER who discovered that old people yearn for companionship is Mrs. Olive Shay of Livonia.

"I got into the program very casu-

ally. It sounded as though the information would be useful to me and to the people I work with."

"I have some friends who got older and now need help, though I never think of it as help. We are just having a nice time together. Older people really need that."

"We shop together and then have lunch. I have even driven their cars for them on trips — we share expenses. They're able to drive around home, but distance is a problem."

Mrs. Shay finds her friends are always glad to see her.

"I help them make cookies or do their shopping," she said.

"I often do their mending, as their eyesight is sometimes poor."

Mrs. Shay feels she has a special affinity with older members of society, having always enjoyed her older relatives. "And I still do."

She finds the experience rewarding because "I don't like to stay home and do housework all the time."

"It's a good outlet for me. I'm happy to help people."

## Free blood pressure tests set

Free tests to check for high blood pressure are scheduled in several area hospitals during May, designated as National Hospital Month. The exhibit runs 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Saturday, May 12 to 17, and nurses will be available to administer blood tests from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and from 6 to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. Saturday.

Special lecture program topics will include high blood pressure, 7 p.m. Tuesday; emergency procedures, 7 p.m. Thursday; breast cancer, 11 a.m. Saturday and alcoholism, 1 p.m. Saturday.


At that time he had a 72-inch waist and a 22-inch neck, and says he wore the largest trousers and shirts in the world.

# East runner sets 2 mile mark

When Doug Sweazy finds someone to run against, he's going to turn in some fantastic times.

The senior distance runner from Garden City East didn't do a bad job of it Thursday with the fastest two mile performance in the area this year, jogging the distance virtually by himself in 9:29.6.

The time was exactly two seconds faster than the only runner from the area who would have a chance at beating him at that distance — East teammate Art Kitz.

Franklin won the meet 82-41 in a display of good depth.

"I didn't ever feel really good out there," said Sweazy after his effort.

"But I wanted to get the school record."

Even though he didn't feel up to par running, Sweazy said that the time approached what he thought would be his best time at that distance.

Franklin took nine of 15 firsts, sweeping the 100 yard dash.

"Beyond Sweazy and Kitz, our ranks grow thin," said East assistant coach Terry Cherry.

Franklin got good performances out of Dan Quinn, who swept both sprint events and won the long jump and Rick Lee who took firsts in both hurdles.

Quinn, one of the area's fastest sprinters, won the 100 yard dash in

the not-exceptional time of 10.5 seconds. Quinn has gone that distance in 10.0, tied for tops in the area.

The victory gave Franklin a 3-1 record in the Northwest Suburban League.



THE RECENT Lansing flood disaster was a test as well as proof of both these concepts and we would like to use this column as a means to thank our employees for helping us be a good neighbor.


